

Dear Wr. DeLoach:

In connection with the inspection of the Birmingham Office, you included in the administrative data under the caption of Plant Informants a reference to those facilities deemed vital by the Special Agent in Charge. In connection with these facilities, you reported a failure to indicate the identity of the interested agency and the agency having security responsibility. Inasmuch as these facilities were declared vital by the Special Agent in Charge, it was not possible or practical to endeavor to show the responsible agency. As you know, these plants are selected by the Special Agent in Charge on the basis of potential value of the plants in connection with any possible future national emergency.

It is essential that Inspectors he meticulously accurate in presenting their findings, in offering constructive criticism, and in issuing instructions to Special Agents in Charge. It is realized that this error is primarily attributable to a Special Agent who assisted you on the inspection; however, inasmuch as you were in charge of the inspection you must bear the responsibility of any errors resulting.

Inspector J. H. WILLIAMS telephonically contacted the writer as of July 13, 1953, at 2:00 P.M., relative to having knowledge concerning the captioned case. Inspector WILLIAMS advised that there is a pending file in the Atlanta Division at the present time regarding this matter and that the file contains information indicating that former Atlanta SAC, KLINE WEATHERFORD, had been sued by the above-mentioned subjects relative to the recovery of an automobile.

This file was not brought to my attention during the May, 1953, Inspection of the Atlanta Division, neither did any Inspector's Aide discuss this matter with me during the Atlanta Inspection. Should the fact that the SAC of the Atlanta Division was sued have come to my attention, the Bureau would, of course, have been immediately advised and an explanation would have been obtained from Atlanta relative to a delay in this matter.

It is my understanding, from remarks of Inspector WILLIAMS, that the above-mentioned file was reviewed by Inspector's Aide, HENRY A. DONAHUE, of the Birmingham Division, who was assigned to the Atlanta Inspection in May, 1953. DONAHUE is an experienced Agent who also has had considerable experience on Inspections. DONAHUE, however, considering the fact that all serials were actually in the file at the time of his review. did not bring this matter to the writer's attention.

SYNOPSIS

Findings

Inspector John H. Williams checked into this matter. He interviewed AUSA ______ who first stated that he heard of this suit by reading about it in the newspaper. A sheck of hewspapers by Inspector Williams was negative. _____ then said he heard of it through his secretary. She was interviewed by Inspector Williams and stated she did not see anything about the suit in the newspater. AUSA _____ then concluded that he probably first heard of the case through SA Rollin A. Stanley of the Atlanta Office or SA Ernest G. Coleman, also of the Atlanta Office. Coleman resigned in November, 1952. _____ never has discussed this matter with either SAC Weatherford or SAC Crawford H. Carson.

Weatherford was SAC of the Atlanta Office during the pertinent period until 3-28-53 when he left on transfer to become SAC at Chicago. Weatherford denies any knowledge of the suit, the filing thereof, subsequent negotiations, or any other phase. Weatherford advised Inspector Harry C. Van Pelt, who interviewed him in Chicago, that the first he ever heard of the suit was when the Bureau asked for an explanation from him in late June, 1953. On the other hand, former SA Coleman,* who was interviewed by SAC Ellsworth in Oklahoma City 7-6-53, stated that the case was assigned to him from 9-29-52 until 12-2-52 and that he discussed the matter fully with SaC Weatherford shortly after the filing of the suit against Weatherford. Weatherford denies this. It does not appear that this can be clarified for in no other instance is there any indication that anyone discussed the suit or brought it to the attention of SAC Weatherford. It appears, however, that in an office of slightly more than 50 Agents such as Atlanta the SAC would have some knowledge that he is being sued, even thought it was a relatively unimportant suit merely to obtain custody of a car, without there being any indication of mishandling.

Former ASAC Lehman (who has since been reduced to the status of an Agent and transferred to Chicago) stated he had knowledge of the suit, being advised of it initially by either Agent Coleman or Agent Stanley. Lehman did not discuss the matter with Weatherford. He gave instructions to Agent Stanley to check with USA concerning the suit against Weatherford. He does not recall what initiated this instruction. He admits failing to advise the Bureau as to his knowledge of the suit and failing to advise the SAC.

*Coleman, an N. A. graduate, was an Agent for two years and highly recommended by Weatherford when Coleman resigned. He is not attached to Shawnee, Oklahoma, P. D.

SAC Carson, who has been in charge of the Atlanta Office since 4/4/53, claims he never heard of the suit and knew absolutely nothing about it until the Bureau's inquiry in late June and request for an explanation.

Agent Stanley had full knowledge of the suit and consulted with the AUSA concerning it. However, he did not prepare any memoranda for the file inasmuch as he claims ASAC Lehman instructed him such action would not be necessary. Lehman made a longhand notation on a memorandum requesting investigation at Pitts, Georgia, wherein he advised Agent William S. Lee, who was to cover the lead, that the SAC was being sued in this matter. Lehman recalls correcting and adjusting an affidavit which was to be filed by Agent Stanley asserting that the car in question never had been in the official custody or possession of SAC Weatherford. Lehman felt that since the car never had been in the custody of SAC Weatherford it would not be necessary to advise the Eureau.

Supervision of Case

The case was supervised by Frank R. Southerland until 11-21-52 and again from 2014-53 until the present. Southerland said he did not know of this suit until the Bureau inquired concerning it in late June, 1953. Inspector Williams asked Southerland how he could review files with Agents each 30 days as required and not know of the suit and Southerland stated he reviewed the assignment cards with the Agents rather than the files.

This case was supervised by SA Joseph T. Sylvester, Jr., from 11-21-52 until 2-11-53. Sylvester was interviewed by Mason 7-6-53 and he stated he had no knowledge whatsoever of the suit and that he reviewed assignment cards with Agents monthly rather than the files themselves.

SA George H. Treadwell was acting as the Relief. Supervisor when a copy of the letter to Assistant Attorney General Warren E. Burger, dated 5-25-53, from USA J. Ellis Mundy was received in the Atlanta Office. Treadwell noted that the case was assigned to Ridgeway and routed this copy of the letter to Ridgeway without taking any action of particular note of it. This letter advised Burger of the decision of the Federal Judge in favor of the Government in connection with the suit. Treadwell has no explanation to provide for failure to bring this matter to the attention of the SAC or advise the Bureau.

SA H. A. Donahoo, while assisting Inspector C. D. DeLoach on an inspection of the Atlanta Office 5-27-53, prepared a case write-up charging a substantive error in the handling of the Smith casek which error was fixed on SA Robert L. Ridgeway and Supervisor Trank R. Southerland. This write-up did not, however, take note of the suit against the SAC, the fact that there was no indication the SAC knew of the suit, and the fact that the Bureau had not been advised. Donahoo has no explanation to offer and he does not recall the file. Inspector DeLoach, who was in charge of the inspection, has no explanation to offer, and he did not personally see the file, although he was responsible as Inspector in Charge for all inspection findings.

Conclusions

1. SAC Weatherford of the Atlanta Office was a defendant in a suit as to the revovery of an automobile, which suit was initiated 10-13-52. He claims to have been unaware of this action.

- 2. In at least this instance the file was not properly reviewed by Supervisors Sylvester and Southerland and by Relief Supervisor Treadwell. Agnet Stanley was handling matters relating to the suit but the case was not assigned to him. The file was not carefully reviewed by certain Agents to whom it was assigned. In the file reviews with Agents each 30 days this case was not properly reviewed by the Supervisors in conferences with Agents.
- 3. Former ASAC Lehman was erroneous in instructing that no memorandum need be written for the file concerning the suit. He exhibited imporper judgment in not seeing to it that the Bureau was notified and that the SAC was notified. It can not be clearly resolved whether SAC Weatherford did have knowledge of the suit as claimed by former SA Ernest Coleman and as denied by Weatherford.

REOMMEND ATTOMS

1. Kline Weatherford, SAC, Chicago - probation and censure because as SAC in Atlanta from 5-5-52 until 3-29-53 he should have had effective controls in his office assuring that he would be aware of matters of interest, including the fact that he was being sued; he shares responsibility for the inadequate reviewing of files with Agents monthly by Supervisors as indicated in this instance; instructions to Agents and Supervisors in this instance were inadequate as exhibitied by the fact that the Bureau was not notified of the suit. BRIED ATTACHED.

8. SA George H. Treadwell, Altanta - censure. As a Relief Supervisor Treadwell, without carefully reading, routed to SA Ridgeway, to whom the case was assigned, a copy of a letter dated 5/25/53 from USAMUNDY to Assistant Attorney General Burger advising that the suit had been adjudicated in favor of SAC Weatherford. Proper action by Relief Supervisor Treadwell would have been to digest the document and see to it that the SAC was notified and that the Bureau was notified, which he failed to do and has no excuse. SUBJECT: NEW ORLEANS DIVISION

Inspector DeLOACH had a three hour stopover between trains in New Orleans, Sunday, July 19, 1953, while proceeding to Houston, Texas, from Louisville, Kentucky, This time was spent in looking over the New Orleans Office and discussing administrative matters with SAC Milnes.

The office looked to be in good physical shape. Desks had been freshly polished. Chairs and cabinets were neatly arranged. The Agent on duty was dressed appropriately and business-like in his approach.

Current delinquency is 13.9%. Security cases are 23.6% delinquent. This delinquency dropped 8.3% in May, 1953. The importance of reducing the delinquency in these cases was discussed.

Agents are averaging two hours and one minute per day voluntary overtime. The SAC, ASAC and one Supervisor have higher averages. SAC Milnes was told to watch this carefully, that it should be equitable at all times, and that no Agent should spend wasteful time in the office just for the purpose of putting in overtime. Time in the office averaged 18% for agents assigned to general criminal and applicant work. Milnes was instructed to reduce this percentage unless unusual problems arose which demanded more time in the office.

There has been an increase of two qualified Criminal Informants within the past month. Milnes indicated he had a strong program while SAC at Birmingham and that he intended accomplishing the same result in New Orleans. An increase in speeches was noted. Milnes has scheduled five for himself within the next three weeks. He has been averaging one speech each week.

The subject of police schools was discussed and Milnes indicated he was attempting to better coordinate such matters by having a large number of representatives at one meeting instead of having small scattered meetings in towns of very small population. The necessity of publicizing the

Bureau's good work in this regard was mentioned to Milnes.

Inasmuch as Mr. Milnes was SAC at Birmingham before reporting to New Orleans, DeLoach discussed all delinquencies found during the recent inspection at Birmingham in May, 1953. Milnes indicated he had taken the Eureau's letter to him regarding this inspection very seriously and that he intended to make certain that such delinquencies do not occur in his present office.

Milnes is young and aggressive. He appears to be interested in his work and evidently is trying hard in New Orleans. He answered questions without hesitation and was familiar with all phases of operations in the New Orleans Office.

Yesterday I saw Inspector Cartha D. De Loach of the Training and Inspection Division. Mr. De Loach stated that he had a personal problem which he wanted to advise me of, although he was not making any specific request at the present time. He stated that as an Inspector he had been on the road for extended periods of time. He stated that

practically does not know him because of his long absences from the city. He was hopeful that if there was any work to which he might be assigned that would keep him at one place for a while he might be considered for it. I inquired of Mr. DeLosch as to whether he wished to be considered for the position of SAC in one of our field offices because if he did I would endeavor to make the assignment upon the next vacancy. I pointed out to him, however, that this would necessitate his moving from Washington to whatever field office in which there might be a vana cy. Mr. DeLoach said he had bought a home in Washington and he would suffer a financial loss if he endeavored to sell it at the present time. I told him that, consequently. During the entire rating period Mr. DeLoach has served as a Field Inspector and his services have been entirely satisfactory. He was afforded a physical examination on April 20, 1953, and was found to be in satisfactory physical condition. He had no disqualifying defects.

During the rating period Mr. DeLoach has served as Inspector in charge of various inspections of field divisons and he has inspected several of the larger field divisions. He also conducted an inspection of the Records and Communications Division. He assisted in the training of a new Inspector. He conducted several inquiries involving rather delicate investigations and handled each with dispatch, effectiveness and efficiency.

Mr. DeLoach was commended by the Director for his expeditious handling of a personnel matter involving an employee of the Chicago Office in April 1953. Mr. DeLoach was censured in May 1953, for deficiencies in the presentation of his findings and for not completely resolving all questions relative to an inquiry made by Mr. DeLoach as to allegations against an Agent of the Atlanta Office by an attorney. It was necessary to call the attention of Mr. DeLoach on June 8, to the fact that he delayed too long in submitting a write-up as to the meritorious work of Mr. Joseph P. McMahon of the Chicago Division who assisted Mr. DeLoach as an Aide during an inspection of the Detroit Office. By letter of July 9, 1953, it was brought to the attention of Mr. DeLoach that he had made an error in the inspection of the Birmingham Office for he had charged the office with failure to indicate the identity of the interested military agency in connection with those industrial facilities deemed vital by the Special Agent in Charge. Inasmuch as the Special Agent in Charge was required to personally designate those facilities which he deemed vital there was, of course, no interested military agency and Mr. DeLoach's presentation was improper.

By letter of July 29, 1953, the Director expressed his appreciation to Mr. DeLoach for making a quick check of matters in the New Orleans Office during a three-hour period on Sunday while changing trains in New Orleans.

Inasmuch as this Performance Rating is submitted because of Mr. DeLoach's transfer to a position in the office of the Associate Director, it is desired for record purposes to record generally in synopsis form the services of Mr. DeLoach during the two years that he was assigned to the Training and Inspection Division as well as during the current rating period.

When Mr. DeLoach initially reported to this Division on October 14, 1951, to commence inspection assignments he had had no field experience since July 14, 1947. Widespread field experience is, of course, an essential and fundamental need for any Inspector who will conduct field inspections. Nevertheless, Mr. DeLoach very rapidly and with vigor assumed his responsibilities and embarked upon a period of reorientation as to field techniques and operations, many of which had never previously come to his personal attention. He discharged his assignments with intellicence, good judgment and vigor! His entire service in this Division was marked by enthusiasm which is one of his prime characteristics, by initiative, resourcefulness and a constant desire to succeed in any task given him. Mr. DeLoach made some mistakes and committed certain errors of judgment, as indicated in this Performance Rating and in past Performance Ratings. However, they were relatively minor in that they did not seriously jeopardize his very favorable performance. In all respects Mr. DeLoach discharged his duties in this Division and during the rating period in a most capable fashion, marked by finesse, a clear-cut sense of duty and obligation to the Bureau, diligence and desire to handle completely every situation which confronted him. Many favorable comments have been received concerning the progress of Mr. DeLoach as a Field Inspector and concerning his thorough, hard but fair, constructive approach in finding the weak spots in the organization and seeking to apply corrective measures.

Mr. DeLoach makes an above average personal appearance, has an excellent personality and in all respects fulfills each of those points expected by the public of an FBI representative. One of his last assignments in this Division was completed two days prior to transfer and involved handling a very delicate situation concerning police relations in the State of Georgia. It was possible for Mr. DeLoach to avert previously planned action by certain local officers to criticize the FBI publicly and, as a result of Mr. DeLoach's personal contact with officers and through his supervision of the Special Agents in Charge of the Atlanta and Savannah Offices, Mr. DeLoach was able to turn what appeared to be a most unfavorable situation into a very happy and bright ending which resulted in commendation of the Bureau for its work.

PROPOSED CIVIL BIGHTS BESOLUTION

FEACE OFFICERS ASSUCIATION OF GEORGIA

SYNOPSIS:

C. D. L.

Chief Troy . McClung, La Grange, Ga. (meber of Resolu-tions Committee, Georgia Feace Of Licers) advised SAC Carson on 10-2-53 that plans formulated for resolution to be presented to Georgia Pence Officers Association 10-13-14-53 in Savannah, G, which would be critical of FBI and attorney General because of civil rights investigations. McClung later advised that R. E. Warren, Director of Ga. State Board of Correction (hostile to FBI for long time) has approached Lt. Vol. E. S. Burke, President, GFOA and second in command CA. State Highway Patrol, relative to this resolution being passed. Burke indicated he would go along "if enough of his group desired the resolution." Warren suggested that the civil rights investigation of Sheriff Jewell Futch, Valdosta, Ga. (Chairman, Resolutions Committee, GrOA) be used as an example of FBI investigating law enforcement officers. Burke reportedly contacted Futch and Futch agreed that he would present this resolution to his committee.

SACs Carson, and Schlenker of Savannah were instructed by letter dated 10-5-53 to constantly keep Bureau advised as to developments. Fermission was given for Carson to interview burke so as to tie down the extent and reasons for his hostility. Director arrove recommendation that Inspector DeLoach be at this meeting in view of Savannah being DeLoach's home and due to his many contacts in the law enforcement filed in the State of Georgia. DeLosch was instructed to take the floor at the meting of GPOA and present Bureau's position with respect to civil rights matters in the event mentioned resolution was brought up.

SAC Carson interviewed Burke 10-6-53. Burke denied that he had ever heard of the resolution.

SIC Carson con acted Resolution 576 ommittee members, Ichief of Police Morton Burnette, Albany, GA.; Chief. of Police R. T. Humphrey, Bainbridge, Ga., and Capt. B. Harbin, Ga. State Highway Patrol, Canton, Ga., prior to the Meeting of 10-13-14-53. The first two mentioned officials were friendly to the ureau and opposed the resolution. Committee mebers Warden L. C. Burns and Chatan oun y Sheriff. William Harris, Savannah, prior to Association meeting. They were friendly and opposed to resolution.

DeLoach, upon arriving in Savannah, contacted Committee member Chief Edgar Har, Statesboro, Ga.; Commissioner of Police J. B. Howell, Valdosta, CA. (whom Burke depends upon for some financial assistance), then re-interviewed all members of the Resolutions Committee. Sheriff Stoddared Deal, Tulloch County, GA., a family friend, volunteered to speak defending Sureau's position. Sanford Sutler, Commissioner of Police, Savannah, was approached; he was solidly against the resolution.

SAC Carson and Deloach talked with Ga. Lt. Gov. Marvin Griffin briefly on 10-13-53, following his address before GPOA. Griffin brought up the subject of civil rights. Bureau's position was explained to him. He agreed wholeh artedly; he stated, however, he intended working hard for purpose of haveing civil rights law! of 1866 repealed. He indicated that Governor Talmadge was great admirer of FoI, however, disliked Attorney General prownell. Gov. Griffin stated his views regarding FBI's position should also be views of administrative heads of State Government in Georgia and that he intended "passint the word." (Griffin is being prominently mentioned as next Governor of Georgia.) DeLoach talked with Lt. Col. Burke 10-13-53. Burke admitted he "had heard rumors" of resolution critical to FBI but that members of hesolutions Committee, also Lt. Cov. Graffin, Governor Talmadge and prominent members of of law enforcemnt were so somlidly against any criticism of FBI, that resolution would not stand a chance of being passed by Association. Burke was advised he had been placed on notice by SAC Carson relative to true facts surrounding Folis position in civil rights matters, however, if necessary, DeLoach would take facor during Association meeting and explain to all law enforcement officers present not only facts surrounding FBI's position but also statistics regarding civil rights cases in Ga. Burke was advised that undoubtedly such a stand would cause some dissension in GPOA ranks in view of many friends of FBI who planned to attend Association meeting. Burke indicated he didn't feel that it would be necessary to take the floor, that he wanted no dissension in Association meeting, the he had heard some rumors as to possibilities of his not being re-elected and that he wanted meeting to go as peacefully as possible.

Shortley following interview with Burke, Warden L. C. Burns confided to DeLoach and SAC Carson that Burke had immediately called emergency meeting of Resolutions Committee and

had instructed them in no uncertain terms not to pass any resolution which would reflect any criticism upon FBI. Sheriff Jewell Futch, previously mentioned, the Chariman, was not present. Warden Turns wanted to know if friends of FBI on Committee should strive to pass resolution commending FBI "for its splendid work and assistance to law enforcement in the State of teo gia during the past year." He was advised by LeLoach that FBI had not asked for such commendatory remarks and that no such recommendation could be made. Turns was of opinion that FBI deserved commendation in view of rumors floating around regarding passing critical resolution regarding civil rights.

Savannah Morning News of 10-;3-53 carried on its back page an article captioned "Civil "ights Controversy in Expected." Said article stated that resolution denouncing FBI's entry in case involving civil rights would be presented to committee of GPOA. Article continued, "The resolution is being drafted by a certain faction which feels FBI has no right entering such investigations. he resolution was expected to meet stiff opposition from law enforcement officers from the 1 rger cluies and towns who work more frequently with FBI Adents. An opponent of the resolution s id he felt it would be missing the mark by siming a denunciation of the FBI which enters such cases only under the order of the W. S. Attorney General." Sheriff "illiam Harris of Chatam County con identially advised later that day that he was responsible for thisarticle; that a reporter of Savannah Morning News had nuessioned him relative to wear ia Peace Officers resentment of Folis handling civil rights cases and Harris, in defense of Pureau, had advised this reporter that matter might come up before Association; however, it would be bitterly opposed by friends of FSI. (Harris is good friend of FRI and was of great assistance at Association. He is described as being somwhat slow mentally with respect to dealing with press.)

On 10-14-53 Chief Troy 4. McClung, La Grange, Ga., confidentially advised that Sheriff Futch had arrived in Savannah that morning and had immediately called meeting of Resolutions Committee. Tutch was presented resolution by Marden Burns and McClung relative to commending FBI for its assistance to law enforcement during past year. Tutch violently opposed this ENERGENERAL MARKEN PRESENTATION. He stated it would precipitate bitter Tight on floor if Committee tried to pass any such resolution. Tutch, however, was voted down by six remaining members of Committee who stated they were willing torisk such a fight.

At 11:50 a.m., 10-14-53, Sheriff Tutch presented following resolution before Association, "Whereas, the Feace Officers Association of Georgia takes this opportunity to commend the FBI and its personnel for splendid cooperation and assistance throughout the past year, signed baeriff Jewell Futch, Chariman, Resolutions ommittee." Chief McClung took the floor immediately and moved the resolution be a opted. Capt. Leonard Hollman, Savannah PD, immediately seconded the motion. other law enforcemnt officers were observed standing on their feet waiting to be recognized by the chair so as to second motion. There was no discussion. Resolution was passed unanimously. heriff william Harris of Chatam ounty, Ga., jumped on the rostrum, spoke to President Purke and took over loud speaker ennouncing that three officials of organization which had just been commended were in audience and he desired to present them to Association. He then introduced DeLoach, stating that DeLoach had been visiting his elderly mother in G. and had heard of meeting and had desired to attend so as to have opportunity of visiting with his many friends. Association was thanked for its commedatory resolution and necessity of good coordination of law enforcement was stressed in brief three-minute talk. SACs Schlenker and Carson were then introduced to Association.

Capt. Leonard Wallman, Savannah PD, saw to it that resolution commending PBI was immediately passed on to Savannah Evening Press representative Jack McQuade. Evening Press carried lengthy article one hour later reflecting commendation of FBI.

Governor Herman Talmage, State of Goergia, addressed Association at 2:30 p.m. Talmadge expressed his admiration for Director and PBI; however, he was critical of Attorney General. He is quoted as stating as follows:

"Herbert Brownell is making a mistake enforcing a decadent civil rights law of 166. This is a damnable law covering the matter of Federal representatives investigating penal and mental institutions and the manner in which local laws are enforced. I want to make it perfectly clear at this point that I have no criticism whatsoever of the FBI and its person 1. I am a great admirer of J. Edgar Hoover and I want to tell you he is doing an outstanding job in the performance of his duties. As governor of the State of Ceorgia I am in frequent contact with FBI Agents and I know them to be outstanding law enforcement officers in very sense of the word."

In view of Governor Talmadge's commendatory remarks of FRI, no attempt was made to make any statemnts relative to civil rights to him.

approximately 15 officers, who are warm friends of FBI either volunteered themselves or were lined up to speak from floor in defense of FBI's position in event critical resolution was passed. This number included Capt. Leonard mallman, NA, Savannah PD; Chief of Police Ward Ferkison, Valdosta, GA.; Sheriff Stoddard Deal, Pulloch County SO; Cheif Troy E. McClung, a Grange, Ga. PD; Sheriff "illiam Harris, Chatam County SO; Chief Sanford Butler, Savannah PD; Papt. I y Glyn Cowan, NA, Atlanta, Ga. PD; Warden L. C. Burns, Savannah; G. Department of Corrections, and others. the loyalty of National Academy Traduates to FBI was apparent at this time in view of several of them approaching Deleach and wanting to know if there was anything they could do to assist FPI during convention.

Muture Picture of Law Enforcement Relations in Georgia

We gained ground during Association meeting. Dituation with Burke, Futch and Varren will continue to be tense; however, recognizing multitude of friends FRI has, no open attempt will be made by these factions to destroy FRI*State law enforcement relations for some time in future. Governor almadge will be in office until January 1955. We will probably be succeeded by Lt. Gov. Marvin wriffin, who is most favorable at this time. Graffin has no love for Burke and will more than likely replace him as second in command of Ga. State Highway Fatrol. Burke, therefore, stands good chance of losing considerable popularity. There appears to be no reason why relations with all law enforcement organizations in Ga., other than factions tentioned above, cannot be carried on even stronger than before.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That no letters of commendation be sent to either President Burke or Sheriff Futch, Chariman of Resolution Committee. This action recommended despite Furke's re-election as President.



The liability of the fund shall not under any circumstances exceed the amount of monies in the fund at the time any liability shall occur.

The Director of the FBI will appoint a committee which shall consider all matters pertaining to the acquisition, safe keeping and expending of said fund, which committee will recommend appropriate action to the Director in pertinent matters. The Assistant Director of the Administrative Division of the FBI shall receive all contributions and account for same to the Director. Upon the death of any Special Agent who is a member of said fund the appointed committee will consider the case and submit a recommendation to the Director as to its conclusions. At the time Mr. Pennington retired, we considered Supervisor D. G. Hanning, assigned to Crime Records. Hanning has an excellent war record and is one of the few survivors of the Bataan Death March. Mr. Hanning is the studious type and can do a very good job under certain circumstances. I thin, however, that we should consider twopeople, both of whom could take an active part in the Legion and prevent if from becoming a burden on any one.

I therefore suggest that Mr. DeLoach, from my office, be designated as the American Legion contact and Mr. Hanning to be associated with him. DeLoach was appointed an Ensign in the Navy in August, 1942; however, he resigned that same month to accept appointment as a Special Agent. In August, 19/1/1, due to a change in Bureau policy, it was not possible to request a deferment for him since he was single and under twenty-five years of age. Mr. DeLoach joined the Navy that same month and was assigned to the Great Lakes Naval Training Center for recruitment training. In December, 1944, he was Recruitment Insturctor at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center. February, 1945, he was assigned to Physical Education School at Bainbridge, Maryland, and in April 1945, was reassigned to the Naval Air Corps, Ardmore, Oklahoma, as Instructor for boxing, wrestling and other forms of athletics. At the end of the war, DeLoach was Assistant Welfare Officer handling physical training and was honorably discharged on March 13, 1946. He returned to the Bureau on April 1, 19/6. He is a member of the FBT American Legion Post and has had some experience in Legion activities in Ohio. DeLoach handles himself well and is eggressive, and I think he is well suited for an assignment such as this.

FBI TOURS CONTACT WITH ORGANIZATIONS HOLDING: CONVENTIONS IN WASHINGTON, D. C.

The Director has inquired, "Just what is being done regarding contacting organizations holding conventions in D. C. to take FBI tours? The current convention of pathologists were not contacted yet on several occasions I have suggested we make contact with groups coming to Washington for meetings."

In 1948, I instructed Special Agent B. M. Suttler to contact the Washington Board of Trade so that we could be constantly advised regarding conventions in Washington. Suttler contacted Clarance A. Arata, Exective Director of the Greater National Captional Committee of the Washington Board of Trade. He informed him that we desired information regarding forthcoming conventions and of the possibilities of visitors to these conventions being shown the facilities of the FBI while in Washington. Mr. Arata at that time put our name on the mailing list to receive notices M of forthcoming conventions. Since that time, we have received twice each year, in June and November, a brochure entitled, "Capital Conventions." O This brochure contains all conventions scheduled throughout the year and usually lists conventions up until the year 1960.

Immediately upon receipt of the brochure at the Bureau, my office marks those conventions in which we would be interested. The brochure is then sent to me for consideration and I either approve or disapprove of the convention committees to be contacted. Typical examples are the recent Coca Cola and American Legion conventions. Suttler contacted the Coca Cola people and advised them of our available facilities. I personally contacted the convention committee relative to FBI tours during the American Legion convention and, additionally, I had DeLoach appear before the Americanism Committee of the Legion to give a short talk relative to the possibility of Legionnaries and their families taking tours.

We did not contact the International Society of Clinical Pathologists, whose convention is being held in Washington between September 6 and 11, 1954, and whose expected attendance is a total of 1,500, principally because we have found through experience that we are wasting our time in issuing invitations to professional groups who as a rule are so busy during their conventions they do not find time to do any sightseeing. We have had numerous examples of various convention committees making arrangements for a large number of delegates to take bours RECORDED. 54

We have additionally found through experience that many convention delegates feel it is their duty to become quite disorderly while being in Washington. These, of course, are not the type of people we desire to take tours of the FBI.

Although we had fair attendance from the American Legion representation, at the same time we extended cordial invitations to the convention committee, to the Legionnaries in their bulletins and to all Legion groups; however, attendance at tours was certainly not as much as expected. Many thousands of Legionnaires came for the first two days of the convention only and then following the parade, proceeded to leave town.

I do not feel we are suffering from a public relations standpoint from a failure to contact convention committees relative to our
tours. If you desire, we will, of course, issue blanket invitations to
all groups; however, we have avoided this in the past because during the
Easter Season and months of May, June and July, we are usually so crowded
with visitors that it is impossible to take on any more. It is therefore
recommended that we continue following the policy of being selective in
all contacts with convention committees.

While attending the Executive Meeting of the American Legion in Indianapolis, Indiana on October 5 and 6, 1954, DeLoach had an opportunity to briefly look in on the administrative activities of the Indianapolis Office.

DMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

Indianapolis division

The field office delinquency from April through September, 1954 has ranged from a low of 15.6% to a high of 21.6%. The current delinquency is 17.4%. Cases closed have ranged during the same period from a high of 951 cases per month to a low 805 cases per month. Cases assigned to agents during this period have ranged from an average high of 22.8% to a low of 19.4%. Cases closed per agent have averaged approximately 12 cases per man per month during this six months. Indianapolis currently has 1459 cases pending. personnel has been reduced from a total of 86 to the current number of 77 agents.

In view of the above statistics and in connection with facts learned during a brief talk with SAC Blaylock, there is definitely no need of additional agent personnel in Indianapolis at this time. The clerk-agent ratio is approximately 50%.

The voluntary overtime for the Indianapolis Office during the months of June, July, and August, 1954 averaged 1. hour 36 minutes, 1 hour 39 minutes, and 1 hour 38 minutes respectively. SAC Blaylock exceeded the office average during these three months. There appeared to be no shirking of responsibility in this regard. Special Agent Wonnell furnishes attached written explanation stating he originally prepared acknowledgment advising Corral that Bureau appreciated his interest and thanking him for co furnishing material for the attention of Bureau; states he rewrote letter on instructions of Special Agent Kamper to effect that singe subject of Corral's letter and enclosures was extremely controversial, Bureau should not put itself in position whereby Corral could infer that it apprediated reveiving anti-Catholic material or that At would investigate matter; Special Agent Kimper presently on annual leave and will submit written explanation on October 11, 1954. Special Agent Harold E. Wonnell has furnished written explanation, which is attached. In his explanation, he stated that he originally prepared reply to Corral acknowledging his letter and advising him that Bureau appreciated his interest and thanking him for bringing the material to our attention. Wonnell states that letter was rewritten by him on instructions of Special Agent Kemper to effect that since subject matter of Corral's letter and enclosures was exceedingly controversial, Bureau should not put itself in a position whereby Corral could infer that Bureau appreciated receiving anti-Catholic material or that we would investigate the matter.

Special Agent Kemper is presently on annual leave and will submit a written explanation on Monday, October 11, 1954. He has telephonically advised, however, that he approved letter as sent to Corral because subject matter was controversial, because he did not feel we should intimate that we would investigate the matter, and because he felt reply would forestall any possible future inquiry by Corral with regard to it.

It is to be noted that although Corral criticizes the Bureau letter to him of October 1, 1954, in his letter of October 4, 1954, he does not do so maliciously and indicates that he has the highest regard for the FBI and the Director and will not let an incident like this prejudice his opinion of the Bureau. It is felt that a reply should be sent to Corral thanking him for his observations and assuring him that the Bureau always welcomes data furnished to it by citizens.

Des Keines, Iowa, objected to Bureau letter to him of October 1, 1954, which was sent in reply to his letter of September 24, 1954. His objections were based on the grounds that the letter was not responsive and that it made for "bad public relations." He stated that he furnished information to the Bureau in his letter of September 24, 1954, and a simple acknowledgment of it would have sufficed. He further in pointing out to him of October 1, 1954, was erroneous Bufiles since he had not requested information from the Bureau.


On September 27, 1954, the captioned letter was assigned to the writer for reply. The correspondent enclosed scurrilous anti-Catholic material he had received from Herbert C. Holdridge, Brigadier General, U.S.A. (Retired).

The writer dictated a letter of acknowledgment indicating that the Bureau appreciates his interest and thanking him for bringing the enclosures to our attention. Supervisor SA Edward C. Kemper upon reading this letter advised that since the FBI is strictly a fact-finding agency and since the subject of the correspondent's letter and enclosures was exceedingly controversial, we should not put ourselves in any position whereby the correspondent could infer that we appreciate receiving anti-Catholic material or that we would investigate the matter.

The letter was rewritten by the writer to acknowledge receipt of the correspondent's letter and enclosures. In order that the correspondent would not be in a position to make an inference that the Bureau had taken a side and that the Bureau would be on record as not taking sides on such a controversial question, the facts that the Bureau is strictly a fact-finding agency and that information in the files of the FBI is confidential were pointed out.

The synopsis was completed by 9:30 a.m. and the memorandum assembled. I wish to add my own remarks to those of other personnel inasmuch as I feel I had the initial responsibility in this matter.

Prior to your call to me at home at 8:55 p.m. last night, I had already learned from Mr. Hanning of the Crime Records Section that instructions had been issued for this memorandum to be ready by 9:00 a.m. this morning. On Monday, May 9, 1955, I requested Mr. Jones' assistance in this matter in view of the self-inspection and numerous other projects which I have under way for you. Before the decision was made to have said memorandum ready by 9:00 a.m. this morning, I had reviewed the files on microfilm and the main "77" file on Harris. Mr. Hanning was so instructed. This caused some delay. Dictation of the summary was completed by 7:45 a.m. It took longer for transcription than anticipated. The details were completed and assembled by 9:00 am., but were held for the synopsis, which was completed and brought in to you by 9:30 a.m.

Last Friday afternoon, I asked Mr. DeLoach to start a project of checking to ascertain the identity of the individuals whom Assistant Attorney General Tompkins brought into the Department from Newark. Mr. DeLoach ascertained that one of the principal persons Mr. Tompkins had brought to Washington was David H. Harris. In addition, there were thirteen other individuals. I, accordingly, told DeLoach that we should have short summaries prepared on all of them. Mr. DeLoach was also checking with the Washington Field Office and the Baltimore Office to determine whether Agents there had any contacts with Harris in connection with confidential informants.

On the night of Tuesday, May 10, 1955, the Supervisor on duty in the Domestic Intelligence Division called to advise that they had been instructed to get a memorandum up by 9:00 a.m., May 11, 1955, on Harris. Since the files were charged out to us, he wondered what the connection was. I told him we were getting up summaries and that we would handle this.

I then called Mr. DeLoach. He had not arrived at homeas yet. Upon his arrival, he called me and I informed him we had to have the summary on Garris by 9:00 a.m. Tuesday morning. I further informed Mr. De Loach that I hadvialked to Supervisor Gordon E. Malmfeldt, on duty in Mr. Jonest office, and Maimfeld had determined that Supervisor Donald G. Mr. Hanning, in his explanation, stated that he was contacted by the Agent on duty at approximately 8:30 p.m. last night and advised of the instructions; that he immediately had animices search made; that he contemplated returning to the office but in view of the volume of the files, he felt that the files could not be delivered before 11:00 p.m. and that he would have difficulty in getting a stenographer at that time. 

The attached memorandum from Mr. Nichols to Mr. Tolson dated 10-20-55 recommended Incentive Awards for the following employees in the amount set forth: Maurice F. Row (\$400.00); William M. Robinson (\$200.00); Rush Buckley, Jr., (\$200.00); Paul T. Rosser (\$100.00); M. Ivon Soden (\$50.00); A. E. Leonard (\$100.00); Robert C. Byrnes (Commendation); C. D. DeLoach (Copy of memo in personnel file).

Yr. Nichols' memorandum clearly, yet briefly, set out the accomplishments of the various employees in bringing the new streamlined mechanization of the Bureau's payroll into effect. His memorandum stated:

"It is with some feeling of pride that I summarize the following results of our mechanization of the Bureau's payroll:

FBI has first completely mechanized payroll in Federal Government. Favorable publicity has resulted throughout Government. General Accounting Office (GAO) has been liberal in its praise recommending it to all Government agencies contemplating mechanization of payroll. Annual progress report of GAO on Government accounting commented favorably on FBI's mechanized payroll. GAO has requested IBM recommend the Bureau's procedure to interested Government agencies.

Many agencies have contacted and visited Bureau concerning mechanized payroll. Representatives of the Air Force, Bureau of Standards, Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Geological Survey and others have visited our installation. In addition, Navy Department and Census Bureau have been urged by GAO to follow our system.

Attorney General upon being advised by outside sources of the favorable reaction to the Bureau's mechanized payroll commented, "JEH. Good work. Again you're in the lead."

Savings of 25 clerical employees have been accomplished at an annual dollar savings of approximately \$75,000. In addition, payment to employees of retroactive pay raise was accomplished in very rapid time with savings of approximately \$1,000 to the Bureau. The morale effect of the prompt payment of the retroactive pay on Bureau employees was a personnel accomplishment.

Savings throughout the Government resulting from the adoption of the Bureau's procedures cannot be estimated but should be considerable.

Admittedly, in beginning there were certain weaknesses. In one pay period 60 checks, out of 14,000 prepared, had names misspelled. These were caught by Administrative Division and corrected. Immediate corrections were made to the system and any errors at all now are very few in number.

CONCLUSION:

Mechanization of the payroll was initiated as a result of a Training and Inspection Division recommendation in 1953. The original estimate of the savings to be accomplished was 3 people at \$10,000 annually. DETAILS:

As you know, the mechanization of our payroll has now been in effect almost 10 months. The unit is working smoothly and considerable savings have resulted. Certain weaknesses evident in the first few months of operation have been corrected and the error factor is now considerably less than under the old payroll system.

It is with considerable pride that I point to the fact that the FBI has the first completely mechanized payroll in the Federal Government. As you know, the General Accounting Office (GAO) has been very liberal in its praise of our procedures. In a memorandum dated October 12, 1955, to the Attorney General the Director advised that GAO was making wide distribution in Government agencies of the FBI's payroll procedure and was recommending all agencies considering

a mechanized payroll adopt the Bureau's procedure. The Navy Department and the Census Bureau particularly were asked to install such a procedure.

The Director further advised the Attorney General that the GAO had requested IBM to substitute the FBI's payroll procedure in lieu of any of their own in any recommendation for mechanization of payrolls in the Federal Government. The Attorney General noted on the memorandum "JEH. Good work. Again you're in the lead."

Such agencies as the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Geological Survey, Bureau of Standards, Air Force, and others have either visited or have made arrangements to visit our payroll unit to examine our mechanized system.

Personnel-wise, the services of 25 clerical employees have been saved by the payroll mechanization or an annual savings of approximately \$75,000 to the Bureau. This does not take into account the ultimate savings throughout the Federal Government resulting from the adoption of the Bureau's procedures. The savings of 25 employees is computed as follows:

Other accomplishments have been realized as a direct or indirect result of mechanization. These are as follows:

- 1. Better scheduling of machine usage resulting in no extra cost of machine equipment.

- 6. Because of the mechanized payroll it was possible to compute the retroactive pay for our employees under the recent pay raise legislation in phenominal time. Checks were actually in the hands of employees in little over a week after the signing of the bill and could have been in their hands directly after the signing of the bill had funds been available. The resulting boost in morale of Bureau employees was tremendous and many favorable comments were received from the field and employees at the Seat of Government.

It is entirely possible that additional savings will occur as our employees gain in experience in mechanization procedures.

Mechanization of the payroll was initiated as a result of a Training and Inspection Division recommendation in 1953. Following this recommendation as a result of an inspection, the Executives Conference formed a committee to study the recommendation composed of Messrs. Harbo, Clegg and Mohr. DeLoach of my office, who at that time was with the Training and Inspection Division, was invited to meet with the group. The committee agreed that the recommendation was sound; however, suggested that the IBM Corporation make a survey to further determine the soundness or inadequacy of the recommendation. This was done, and the IBM people confirmed the recommendation. It was then decided that the new procedure would go into effect as of January 1, 1955.

In the beginning, as could be expected, certain weaknesses developed in the system. For example, during one pay period some 60 or 70 checks had names misspelled. These were caught by the Distribution Unit of the Administrative Division and corrected. Immediately a system was adopted to prevent the recurrence of any such error in the future. While no system is perfect, particularly

in as complex an operation as our payrolls, the incidence of errors at the present time is considerably less than under the old manual system since we have reduced the possibility of human error to a minimum.

While the mechanization of payroll was initiated as a result of an inspection, the accomplishments obtained and the resulting benefit to the Bureau both from a monetary and a publicity standpoint are due largely to the efforts of the following: Maurice F. Row; William M. Robinson; Rush Buckley, Jr.; Paul T. Rosser; and M. Ivon Soden.

All of the above employees have been outstanding in their performance over a period of time, particularly during the past 10 months. In addition to their enthusastic application to work, these employees have always put in a large amount of voluntary overtime without any request for compensatory leave or other compensation. For example, a tabulation for the first 6 months of 1955 when the mechanization of the payroll was accomplished reflects the following:

I. RESOLUTIONS PASSED AFFECTING FBI

(1) Seven resolutions commending FBI presented to Convention by States of Alabama, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Washington, and the District of Columbia.

(2) These seven consolidated into three resolutions; one commending "distinguished Director" of FBI and his associates for "unceasing fight to protect security of United States." The second resolution called attention to value of confidential security informants and brought out that CP, "pseudoliberals" and subversive organizations were waging organized campaign against informants. The third resolution called for awarding of "J. Edgar Hoover Trophy" to Legionnaire in United States who had done most in fight against juvenile delinquency. This will be annual award in Legion. All resolutions received wide acclaim among Legionnaires. Latter-mentioned resolution referred to National Executive Committee of Legion which will meet at Indianapolis, Indiana, within forty-five days. Purpose of this action merely to determine identities of awarding committee and method by which trophy will be purchased each gear.

(3) National press release issued by Public Relations Office, American Legion Headquarters, regarding FBI commendations. This information carried by several national commentators and the "New York Herald Tribune"."

(4) DeLoach appointed as member of Americanism Commission to serve on subcommittee handling Legion resolutions.

II. OTHER RESOLUTIONS OF INTEREST

- (I) United Nations Economic, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).....Legion unanimously denounced Communist infiltration and policies of this organization and called for Congressional investigation. Of interest was terrific State Department campaign organized for purposes of obtaining favorable Legion reaction to UNESCO. State Department supported in its stand by Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith who had two representatives at convention. This matter bitterly fought. However, special subcommittee appointed by Legion voted 54 to 6 to denounce UNESCO.
- (2) One resolution called for commendation of Constantine Brown for his "unceasing fight against Communism." This resolution changed to include names of Fulton Lewis, George Cokolsky, Paul Harvey, Victor Riesel, and Ear Godwin. These individuals notified unofficially of this action by my office.
- (3) Two resolutions brought up condemning Fund for the Republic and Robert Maynard Hutchins. One resolution rejected due to poor phraseology and lack of factual information. The second resolution was referred to standing committee of Legion for purposes of drawing up stronger phraseology condemning the Fund for the Republic. This same resolution points out that Henry Ford, II, in future should pay more attention to whom the Ford Motor Company grants allocations.
- (4) One resolution called for Congressional investigation into American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU). This resolution mentioned that House Committee on Un-American Activities had in its possession a report condemning ACLU. The Legion requested this report be disseminated to general public.

III. NEW NATIONAL COMMANDER J. ADDINGTON WAGNER BATTLE CREEK, MICHIGAN

Very forceful, forthright, security minded, and has sincere, high respect for Director and FBI. Forty-one years of age, an attorney who has had considerable experience on Americanism Commission of American Legion. Desires to pay respects to Director on Monday, 10-24-55, or Tuesday, 10-25-55, according to convenience of Director. No derogatory information in Bureau files. Copy of summary memorandum dated 10-17-55 attached for information of Director. Letter of congratulation forwarded Wagner 10-14-55.

IV. CONCLUSIONS

TBI received widespread, favorable comment from Legionnaires during convention. Considerable favorable publicity received as result of resolutions passed commending FBI. Commander Wagner will be vigorous supporter of FBI and all security measures. A disconcerting note was represented by State Department campaign to "force" favorable reaction to UNESCO upon Legionnaires. One State Department spokesman (Ben Brown) speaking for UNESCO openly admitted that Alger Hiss had considerable influence in shaping policies of UNESCO but quickly added "Benedict Arnold also was a traitor but did wonderful work for his country before turning traitor." It is felt that Legion denouncement of UNESCO represents only temporary setback to those forces who are in favor of gaining favorable Legion reaction. These elements will come back next year even better organized.

V. RECOMMENDATIONS

- (1) Recommended that Director see new National Commander J. Addington Wagner on Monday, 10-24-55, or Tuesday, 10-25-55, according to convenience of Director.
- (2) Suggested letter to Seaborn P. Collins, retiring National Commander, attached. This letter thanks Collins for cooperation during tenure of office and for favorable remarks he made before convention concerning FBI.
- (3) Suggested letter to Hugh W. Overton, National Executive Committeeman from Alabama, attached. Overton has been most friendly and helpful. His department sponsored one resolution calling for commendation of FBI.
- (4) Recommend letters of commendation be sent to SAC Charles E. Weeks, Miami; SA Vincent K. Antle, Miami; and SA Donald G. Hanning, Supervisor, Seat of Government, for assistance rendered during National Convention. Their efforts contributed greatly to favorable publicity given FBI during convention.

- 1. The General Accounting Office has formally commended and endorsed our system; has requested multilith copies of our procedure in substantial numbers; has recommended that IBM endorse the FBI's system over all others.
- 2. It has been necessary to prepare a package explanation of our procedure, many copies of which have been distributed to other agencies at their request. The following have actually visited the Bureau or have indicated definite plans to copy our system:

- a. Bureau of Standards: (1 group from the Payroll Unit and 1 group from Research)
- b. U. S. Air Force throughout the country
- c. Bureau of Indian Affairs

- e. Army Quartermasters Depot
- f. Navy Department
- g. Census Bureau (pioneers in the field of machine tabulation)
- 3. The Attorney General upon being advised of the favorable reaction to the Bureau's mechanized payroll commented: "JEH. Good work. Again you're in the lead."

POSSIBLE ADDITIONAL SAVINGS:

Experience over the years has demonstrated when a major project such as this is successful the door is opened to future economies in streamlining as well as the absorption of additional work with a minimum of personnel. Concrete examples of this fact may be found in the mechanization of uniform crime reporting, Identification Division cost and production records, fiscal and accounting matters, security index work, as well as other areas. Undoubtedly we will experience similar additional economies in the payroll work.

It seems impossible to judge these five people on the basis that each should receive an equal amount when actually each person made a different contribution to this program. I feel strongly that each employee should be rewarded according to his or her individual contribution. As the attached individual memoranda reflect, each employee definitely made separate and distinct contributions, some greater and some lesser. In keeping with the true spirit of the Incentive Awards Program, I think each employee's award should be based on their specific contribution to the success of the program. (Administrative Division recommended similar amounts for five employees and a letter of commendation for Mr. Leonard, the Section Chief. Mr. Leonard's contribution has been worthy of greater recognition, consequently I feel the foregoing paragraph also applies to him and that a cash award is warranted.)

Undoubtedly the different employees made different contributions to achieve the over-all effort. It is my feeling, however, that this is more or less a group effort and a group achievement and although all members of the group might not equally contribute, they do equally share in any award that might be given. I think it would be very difficult, for instance, to differentiate between the various contributions and try to convert each into a dollar value that would equally represent the proper share of each individual member of the group. Under the circumstances I feel that the original recommendations made by the Administrative Division in its memorandum of October 31, 1955, should be approved whereby Messrs. Row, Robinson, Buckley and Rosser and Miss Soden each receive a cash award in the amount of \$150 and that Special Agents Leonard and Byrnes and Inspector DeLoach each get a letter of commendation.

The Director of the FBI will appoint a committee which shall consider all matters pertaining to the acquisition, safe keeping and expending of said fund, which committee will recommend appropriate action to the Director in pertinent matters. The Assistant Director of the Administrative Division of the FBI shall receive all contributions and account for same to the Director. Upon the death of any Special Agent who is a member of said fund the appointed committee will consider the case and submit a recommendation to the Director as to its conclusions. the fire congressman spoke of the coming battle between old Senator George and Herman Kalmadge in Georgia. He has great feelings for the Senator, but r alizes that the Senator document stand a chance against Talmadge and his popularity in the rural sections of Georgia. He thinks that Talmadge will have to campaign on the racial issue, but that once elected, he will not press the issue. He believes Talmadge has enough sense not to become another Bilbo. Senator George is very poor financially. His home in Vienna, Georgia, is worth only \$7,000 and he has no money set aside.
