We have just been advised by IRM of new training programs available on various ISM equipment in Endioett, Poughkeepeie, and New York City, New York. Training is new being afforded in the following fielder

> IBM Accounting for Management (general tabulating machine techniques), held at Endicett.

> IM Accounting for Executives (general tabulating machine

techniques), held at Endicatt.

EDFM for Executives (specialized courses in the 650 and 205 series of Electronic Data Processing Machines). held at Poughkeepele.

Programming for the 700 series of Electronic Data Pro-

occaing Machines, held at New York City. Scientific Computing (covering eclentific computing work in mathematice, physical eciences or engineering), held at New York City.

Of the above, only the first and third courses are of interest to the Bureau at the present time. In order to bring the training of our personnel up to date, it is believed that the following individuals should be scheduled for training in the courses indicated:

EDPM for Executives:

This course includes the petentialities of the 650 and other EDPM equipment, the type of service that management can expect from it, typical applications, personnel problems and the like. The course lasts one week. It would recommend that Mr. DeLosch, Mr. Leonard and Mr. Row be designated to attend.

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





SUBJECT:

For record purposes, on the night of July 12, 1956, upon preparing for bed I noticed a slight swelling to the left of my groin rele. Room possibly indicating a hernia. There was no pain and the swelling subsided after lying in bed for a period of time. I had attended gym class that afternoon between 4:00 and 5:00. The same swelling was again noticed the next day and throughout the week. On July 17, 1956, there being no pain whatsoever, I again attended regularly scheduled gym class; however, I mentioned in an informal manner to Coach Howard Meyers the swelling in question. He properly suggested that this condition be checked by medical authorities.

On August 8, 1956, Bethesda Naval medical authorities checked this condition and indicated that a hernia was apparent but that they recommended examination by the surgery department. On August 10, 1956, Dr. Durden of the surgery department advised me there was a definite hernia and recommended surgery for repair. He stated that this was entirely elective on my part as to whether I desired repair or not but that, for my own safety and in order that I would not be worried about this matter in the future, he would recommend that surgery be performed. He indicated that I should lead a perfectly normal life, fully handle all my responsibilities, and he saw no reason to refrain from doing such things as mowing the lawn, et cetera. He did indicate that no violent exercise should be taken. Consequently, I have stayed away from gym-accordingly.

If convenient here at the office the latter part of September or October, I plan to have the above operation performed in the Bethesda Mayal Hospital. This will necessitate being away from work approximately two weeks, which includes six days in the hospital and the remaining time at home. I am not aware of any undue exertion at my home which would have caused the above condition.

National convention held September 3-6, 1956, Los Angeles. Estimated 100,000 Legionnaires attended. Meetings of Americanism Commission and Countersubversive Activities Committee began 8-31-56.

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING FBI:

Four resolutions commending FBI presented to convention. These emanated from District of Columbia, Maryland, Tennessee, and the National Americanism Commission of the Legion. These resolutions coordinated into one which passed unanimously before full convention. Director's telegram to National Commander thanking Legion for commendation of FBI read before convention 9-6-53 and received with ovation. Press releases issued to wire services and newspapers regarding commendation of Director and FBI personnel. These releases carried by all Los Angeles papers (example attached).

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS:

Total of 91 resolutions considered by convention committees and brought before full convention. Seven resolutions condemned UNESCO. Four resolutions criticized the Fund for the Republic and called for speedy removal of tax-exempt status. Two resolutions called for congressional investigation into activities of American Civil Liberties Union and Emergency Civil Liberties Union. One resolution reflected that many charges had been made regarding communist infiltration into National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and that these charges should be investigated to determine whether true or false. Four resolutions called for restoration of states rights legislation regarding subversion, sedition, and communist control statutes. These resolutions specifically set forth that states rights were being usurped by Supreme Court. All foregoing resolutions mentioned were coordinated and passed successfully on floor of convention.

NEW NATIONAL COMMANDER:

As Director had been previously advised, W. C. "Dan" Daniels was selected as the 1956-1957 National Commander. Daniels paid courtesy call upon Director in May, 1956. He is 42 years of age, makes good appearance, is excellent speaker, and very security-minded. Cooperation with Daniels should be excellent. A call was made on him during convention, at which time the Director's congratulations were expressed. A letter has been prepared also extending congratulations.

MISCELLANEOUS:

- (1) Our book, "The FBI Story," is to be placed on the "must reading list" for all Legionnaires. This is a list maintained by national headquarters of the Legion and concerns all top-notch books recommended for reading by Legion members.
- (2) Two thousand (2,000) copies of Director's article, "The Communist New Look A Study in Duplicity," were disseminated by Legion staff members to delegates attending convention. Many favorable remarks were overheard regarding this article.
- (3) FBI received a great deal of acclaim during convention as result of Weinberger and Riesel cases.
- (4) Gordon W. Roselip, national executive committeeman from the State of Wisconsin, spoke extemporaneously before the Americanism Commission for approximately 15 minutes lauding the FBI and its work in the internal security field. He called upon the Legionnaires to offer constant support to the Bureau. Roselip has been very friendly for the past several years. DeLoach rose and thanked him for his commendatory remarks and included the fact that all members of the Americanism Commission had been of service to the FBI. Roselip's remarks were strictly voluntary and it is being recommended that the attached letter be forwarded to him thanking him for his remarks.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) A letter has already been forwarded to the new National Commander, "Daniels; consequently, no recommendation is being made concerning a letter to him in this memorandum.

- (5) SAC John F. Malone was most helpful during the convention and spent numerous hours of overtime in meeting Legionnaires. He made a most favorable showing for the Bureau at the national commanders banquet. There is attached a suggested letter to Malone.
- (6) Special Agent John M. Cashel, Los Angeles, was very helpful in assisting in the arrangement of newspaper contacts and the handling of the press release given out concerning the Bureau. Special Agent Albert S. Rose, Jr., was also most helpful in the same regard and a suggested letter to him, as well as Cashel, is attached.

(7) Special Agent Donald G. Hanning accompanied DeLoach to the convention and made a most favorable showing for the Bureau. Hanning is one of the few survivors of the Bataan death march and, as a result, is always regarded very highly in Legion circles. He, like DeLoach, attended all meetings of the Americanism Commission and the Countersubversive Activities Committee. He put in a large number of hours of overtime and is believed worthy of commendation regarding his performance. A suggested letter is attached.





Payment will be made for death by self-destruction after the Agent has been a member of the fund for a continuous period of two years. It is understood and agreed that the sum tendered herewith is a voluntary, gratuitous contribution to said fund which I understand is to be administered in the following manner.

The Director of the FBI will appoint a committee which shall consider all matters pertaining to the acquisition, safe keeping and expending of said fund, which committee will recommend appropriate action to the Director in pertinent matters. Upon the death of any Special Agent who is a member of said fund the appointed committee will consider the case and submit a recommendation to the Director as to its conclusions. C. D. DeLoach, an inspector for the FBI, will be nominated for the post of District Department commander tonight at the 36th annual American Legion department convention in the Shoreham Hotel. The threeday meeting ends tomorrow.

Mr. DeLoach, 37, past commander of the FBI Post 56, is the choice of the official nominating committee and is expected to be elected without opposition at tomorrow night's meeting. He will succeed James A. DeForce.

He is a native of Georgia and a law graduate from Stetson University, DeLand, Fla. He joined the FBI in 1942 and served in Norfolk and Cleveland before his transfer to Washing ton in 1947. He served for 1 months in the Navy during World War II.

Active in "Americanism"

Mr. DeLosch has been active in the Legion's "Americanism" program for the last six years, touring the Nation to address local Legion organizations. He is vice chairman of the national counter-subversive activities committee and consultant to the national Americanism commission.

"There is very close liaison between the American Legion and the FBI," said Mr. De-Loach, "I have addressed many Legion groups on confidential matters relating to internal security."

Mr. DeLoach has been active in the Legion's local youth activities. He is responsible for the District's participation in the Boys State program for the first time this year. He has also been active in the Legion's child welfare and baseball programs. He noted that his FBI post

He noted that his FBI post has sponsored a Scout troop at the juvenile training center in Laurel, Md., since 1948. "U. Edgar Hoover has assisted us greatly in our youth activities here," he noted.

He and his wife and five children live at 107 Morning Side drive, Alexandria. He is a member of the St. Mary's Catholic Church in Alexandria.

The Legion last night honored Robert E. McLaughlin, chairman of the Board of District Commissioners, Maj. Gen. Ruben C. Hood, jr., USAF, of Bolling Air Force Base, and Dr. Edwin J. Rose, retired manager of Mount Alto Hospital. Mr. McLaughlin was cited for his co-operation in Legion activities during the last 12 months, including the Soap Box Derby and Boys State, Gen Hood, for his "interest in national security," according to Commander Deforce, and Jr. Rose for service to hospitalised veterans.

Fulton Lewis, jr., radio commentator, received an Amajicanism citation from Mr. De-Loach. Dewey Short, Assistant Secretary of the Army, will address tonight's session.




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

Name check request received from Department of Labor on 1/10/58 which reflects Inspector DeLoach being considered by Department of Labor for service on State Re-Employment Rights Committee, Washington, D. C. Membership is in connection with his position as Department Commander of District of Columbia Department of American Legion.

Inspector DeLoach was contacted concerning any knowledge he might have concerning the committee. He stated that this was first time he had heard of it and that if he were tendered appointment to serve on committee, he would decline appointment for obvious reasons.

SA Supervisor W. P. Baker, Name Check Section, Investigative Division, determined from Mr. Raymond J. Doyle, Jr., Division of Investigations and Security, Department of Labor, that State Re-Employment Rights Committee consists of members appointed by Secretary of Labor. Committee acts in an advisory capacity to Secretary of Labor in connection with problems concerning re-employment rights of veterans. in Washington, D. C. area which have come to attention of Department of Membership in committee is voluntary and appointees to the committee; are notified of their selection after check has been made on their backgrounds by Department of Labor. Members of committee receive no compensation and are not considered to be employees of Department of Labor. Mr. Doyle informed that selection of Inspector DeLoach was based on his position as Commander of D. C. Department of American Legion rather than on basis of his FBI employment. on committee is voluntary and Inspector DeLoach could decline the appointment if it is tendered to him.

MR. NEASEN C.D. DeLOACH

Congressman Prince Preston, a close friend of mine and who has always been extremely cooperative with the Director and the Bureau, asked me over to the University Club last night After discussing various topics with Prince, he stated he had a problem which he desired to discuss in order to determine whether I felt it was proper for him to take certain action. He then proceeded to say that he needed an administrative assistant in his office who not only could run the office but who could be of assistance to him in his home district of Georgia, which is rather extensive. He stated he had thought the matter over very carefully and that he would like very much to come down and see Mr. Hoover for the purpose of inquiring as to whether I could submit my resignation from the FBL and take over as his administrative assistant. He stated that he was not aware \$\frac{1}{2}\$. of the salary I was receiving but that he would be glad to match this salary and could insure that working for him would lead to bigger dividends later on, either in the Government or private industry. He then stated most frankly that he didn't want to offend the Director in any manner by attempting to proselyte but that he felt this move could be of some benefit to both of us and, at the same time, I could be of benefit to the Bureau by taking part in activities on the Hill. He added that perhaps I might like a day or two to think this proposition over and, if so, he would not say anything to the Director until I had indicated a willingness for this to be done.

I told Prince that I was deeply appreciative of his personal interest, that I respected his friendship and that I knew the Director valued him as a close personal friend, but that, frankly, I didn't need any time to think the matter over. It was then indicated that the Bureau had been my career for the past 16 years, that perhaps more money could be made outside, but that I felt that although I could handle the assignment he wanted me to take, at the same time I could never be absolutely happy in any other job but with the FBI. I also told him that from a practical standpoint I doubted that a position of the type he was mentioning would offer the security that my present position in the Bureau offered.

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Prince then stated that he doubted all along that I would accept his proposal but that he wanted to make the offer anyhow. He made the remark that he certainly wished that people in all Federal agencies could be as loyal as he had known FBI employees to be.

Congressman Preston next brought up the subject of the Bureau possibly knowing of an individual who would make a good administrative assistant. He was told that no names came to mind but that we would, of course, make his inquiry a matter of record in the event the Director had any ideas. The Congressman was most apologetic about his having to leave town this morning because of an emergency which arose and stated that he hoped he would never miss an appropriations hearing again at which the Director would be present.

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

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

On Tuesday, January 28, 1958, I saw Inspector C. D. DeLoach. Mr. DeLoach stated that he had a personal matter which he wanted to discuss with me.

Mr. DeLoach stated that he had been contacted by Governor Craig, of Indiana, former Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson, and several other prominent persons who have been quite active and prominent in American Legion affairs for some years. Mr. DeLoach stated that these gentlemen had been quite concerned over the fact that a certain individual in New York City who is an adjutant of the American Legion has gathered together approximately two hundred votes which he controls at American Legion National Conventions where the election of officers takes place. As a result of this, the gentlemen who talked with Mr. DeLoach are concerned that the Legion may fall more and more into the hands of individuals who may not have the best interests of the Legion at heart.

These gentlemen inquired of Mr. DeLoach whether he would be willing to consider being advanced by them as a candidate for the National Commandership of the American Legion. Mr. DeLoach observed that he would have to resign from the Bureau for at least two years if he acceded to this request. He also observed that the National Commander of the American Legion receives a salary of \$44,000 a year.

I told Mr. DeLoach that, of course, this was a matter for his personal decision but that it seemed to me that he should face reality and realize that even though his candidacy might be successful, I doubted very much whether politics could be excluded from American Legion affairs any more than they could be excluded from the affairs of other organisations of all types. I also called his attention to the fact that he obviously would have to be in a travel status almost continuously for two years, that is, for the year he would be campaigning for the National Commandership and then for another year while he was the National Commander if he was successful.

Mr. DeLoach indicated that he intended to turn down the offer which had been extended to him but that he did want me to know of it.

Pursuant to your request for a statement showing the conditions alleged to be the cause of the injury, the following information is being furnished:

On 10-7-57, I left Bolling AFB, Washington, D. C., enroute to Spence AFB in Georgia on official business. The cabin of this airplane was nonpressurized and the fact that I had a head cold at the time is believed to be the cause of my left ear stopping up. He left Spence AFB on 10-7-57, and arrived at Eglin AFB, Valparaiso, Florida on 10-8-57, and returned to Bolling AFB on the same date.

When I got off the airplane I noticed that my left ear appeared to be stopped up. I was not of the opinion at that time that medical treatment should be obtained, but when the condition did not clear up by the following morning, (10-9-57), I reported to the FBI Health Service at which time I was referred to the U.S. Public Health Service for treatment.

The condition no longer exists and I am not making any claim for compensation under the provisions of the Federal Employees' Compensation Act.

On Saturday, 2-15-58, the Washington, D. C., area was blanketed by fourteen inches of snow as a result of a storm which the Weather Bureau termed the worst that has struck this area in twenty-two years. Thereafter, high winds and near zero temperatures set in for several days making travel conditions extremely hazardous.

On Monday, 2-17-58, in recognition of the hardships and hazards that Federal Government employees would face in coming to work, a White House announcement was made encouraging such employees to stay home and take a day of annual leave. During the late afternoon of 2-17-58, a further official announcement emanated from the White House instructing that all Government employees who were not considered essential would be excused from work on 2-18-58 on Administrative Leave.

The captioned employee considered his work and his services to the FBI so essential that in spite of the foregoing announcement he took it upon himself to come to work and perform his regularly assigned duties. This is considered a highly exemplary attitude on the part of this employee and his actions in this instance certainly demonstrate his devotion to duty and the fact that he places his employment with the FBI above his personal convenience.

RECOMMENDATION:

That this memorandum be placed in the employee's personnel file.



The following is a brief and concise summary of Mr. DeLoach's record for the Director's use.

His file reflects that he entered on duty as an agent on 12-14-42 and was assigned to the Norfolk Office. Since then he has served in various field offices, having served as a Resident Agent, and he has been assigned to the Seat of Government since 7-14-47. On 12-10-51 he was designated as an Inspector and is presently serving as #2 Man to Mr. Nease. On 3-31-57 Mr. Nichols rated him EXCELLENT.

Since January, 1957, he has been COMMENDED on two occasions the last being on 2-19-58 for his highly exemplary attitude for reporting for work on 2-18-58 notwithstanding the extemely hazarduous travel conditions as a result of a snow storm. By letter dated 9-20-57 the Director expressed appreciation to him for the excellent arrangements he made in connection with the Director's appearance before the National Convention of the American Legion in Atlantic City. He was CENSURED one occasion for a number of nonsubstantive errors which had been detected in official correspondence reviewed and approved by him. This letter was dated 11-21-57.

By letter dated 7-30-57 the Director congratulated him on his election as Commander of the Department of District of Columbia. On 1-29-58 the Director congratulated him on the occasion-of-his-Fourteenth Anniversary with the FBI.

On 1-28-58 the Director saw him me, DeLoach advised that he had been contacted by Governor Craig of Indiana former Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson, and several other prominent persons in the same American Legion who inquired whether he would be willing to consider being advanced by them as a candidate for the National Commandership of the American Legion. He observed that he would have to resign from the Bureau for at least two years if he acceded to this request. He also observed that the salary would be \$44,000 a year. The Director advised him that this was a matter for his personal decision. Deloach indicated that he intended to turn down the offer and the Director thought this was a wise decision for he certainly had a good future in the Bureau.

The above-captioned organization is a committee formed by the White House under the guidance of Eric Johnston, President, Motion Picture Association of America, Incorporated, and Eart Cocke, Jr., past National Commander of the American Legion and a former candidate for Governor of the State of Georgia. Cocke's father, Earl Cocke, Sr., is President of the American Banking Association this year. The captioned committee has been formed for the purpose of encouraging mutual assistance if foreign aid. Cocke called Mr. De Loach April 24, 1958. He and National Commander Jack Gleason have discussed the designation and appointment of a Legionnaire who will serve as a liaison representative between the American Legion nationally and the captioned committee. The committee believes that the American Legion can be very instrumental in assisting in its public relations drive for mutual aid for foreign countries. Cocke stated that he had recommended Mr. DeLoach's name to this appointment and that Gleason had concurred. He stated the position would not detract from DeLoach's job at the FBI but would entail considerable work at might in meeting with the various committees and in keeping the National Commi advised of the day-to-day activities of the captioned group. Cocke indicated the acceptance or rejection would not have to be given at this time but that I would appreciate an answer by April 29, 1958. he felt Cocke was merely trying to use the FBI and that we should not be roped in on this matter. The Senator was told that Cocke's reputation was well-known and that we appreciated his advice. Senator Talmadge mentioned he, of course, needed Cocke's influence in the State of Georgia but he personally was very much against foreign aid and very definitely would hate to see Cocke pulling his shenanigans with the FBI. He stated that Cocke's reasons for being with the captioned committee were mostly to gain publicity for himself in order to support a campaign for the Governorship of Georgia within the near future. The Senator will not support Cocke in his campaign.

ACTION:

Mr. DeLoach will tell Cocke on April 29, 1958, that his offer is deeply appreciated but it will be impossible to accept this appointment. Cocke will be told that it is impossible for FBI representatives to divorce their professional connections from their Legion affiliations, that regardless of the fact that the FBI would have nothing to do with the appointment, at the same time many individuals might believe it was the FBI acting in such a capacity rather than the American Legion. He will also be told that the pressure of work just does not allow any additional responsibilities at this time.

Mr. DeLoach did not prepare a memorandum at the time the call was received. This should have been done. The following is not offered in any attempt to disregard responsibility, but occured with respect to this matter:

SAC Power's call was received late Friday, 6/6/58. Mr. DeLoach, over the week-end, attempted to procure further information in a discreet, informal manner so that we could have further information and a more informative memorandum could be written. No information was available through established contacts. Although SAC Powers referred Miss Cadwallader to the Bureau, she has not called as yet.

All previous memoranda written concerning this matter, including the considerable information procured on a confidential basis from the House Committee on Un-American Activities, have been written the same day it was: received. The information concerning Life magazine should have received the same treatment. This matter has been discussed thoroughly and will not recur. The failure to promptly advise the Director is sincerely regretted. This week's issue of Life will be on the newstands Thursday, 6/12/58. The editorial in question will be promptly analyzed and a summary memorandum will be submitted.

A memorandum was prepared individually yesterday (6/10/58)regarding the call from SAC Powers, but at the time the call was received from Mrs. Coleman, Railroad Retirement Board, another memorandum was prepared and it was deemed advisable to consolidate the two memoranda.

The following is a brief and concise summary of Mr. DeLoach's record.

His file reflects that he entered on duty as an agent on 12-14-42 and was assigned to the Norfolk Office. Since then he has served in various field offices, having served as a Resident Agent, and he has been assigned to the Seat of Government since 7-14-47. On 12-10-51 he was designated as an Inspector and is presently serving as #2 Man to Mr. Nease. On 3-31-58 Mr. Nease rated him EXCELLENT.

Since January, 1957, he has been COMMENDED on three occasions the last being on 4-14-58 for his excellent supervision of the preparation of a series of tapes which were used on the "Monitor" radio program. 





The exodus of thousands of Legionnaires left Chicago's Loop with the comparative quiet of everyday business. Hourslnog parades, antics of dele-

gates and whoops, sirens and bells had lent a carnival atmosphere to the city the last 10 days,

Mr. Moore, 38, a lawyer and World War II Army Air Corps veteran, was elected by a marsin of nearly 5 to 1 to head the Legion, which now claims 2.7 million members.

National vice commanders elected at the convention include FBI Inspector Cartha D. De Loach of 105 Morningside drive, Alexandria, Va.

Offensive Stand Urged

In his acceptance speech, Mr. Moore said the United States must take the offensive in the struggle between the free world and communism.

"We must rid America of the defeatist, destructive philosophy that we can only defend against communism." he said. ". Clearly, we must seize the initiative if the cause of freedom is not to be lost ultimately and completely."

Before the election, the delegates whipped through a host of resolutions. Among them, the Legion called for United States military strength second to none; condemned Communist activities in the Middle East, the Formosa Straits, Indonesia and Latin America; criticized United States leadership as aiding international communism in the Middle East by "lack of a firm foreign policy"; implied failure of United States policy makers to come to grips with Latin American problems, and rejected an assertion by Defense Secretary McElroy that America still leads the world in military strength.

Strong Defense Asked

The Legionnaires also demanded "a halt to any cutbacks in the defense program" and id that Congress "use every atamass against and/military preparedness:

In another resciution, the Legion backed the United States policy of aiding Formosa against aggression of Red China and renewed its sweeping opposition to any recognition of Red China in trade or diplomatic relations, or as a candidate for membership in the United Nations.

The Legion also opposed Federal funds for public schools as a possible step toward thought control of the Nation's children, and criticized the Supreme Court for having "adopted the role of legislative policy maker" in recent decisions, including a ruling that the FBI must make available its pertinent secret files to persons brought to trial on subversive charges.

Above-captioned study commenced 10/24/57 with Colonel M. E.

Greover, physician in U. S. Air Force, assisting in studies concerning

participating Bureau officials. Blood samples taken from such officials at

monthly intervals since 10/24/57, last being taken 8/14/58. On occasion of taking

blood sample of 8/14/58, Colonel Groover stated studies by him indicated that Inspector

in Charge Gordon A. Nease and Inspector C. D/DeLoach, both of Records and

Communications Division, showed evidence of apparent stress which might ultimately

cause physical damage. Both Inspector in Charge Nease and Inspector DeLoach are

fully aware of Dr. Groover's findings as a result of his stress factor test inasmuch as

Dr. Groover personally talked to them both.

Additional information secured from Dr. Hames of Claxton, Georgia, who on an over-all basis has been the physician directly engaged in running and evaluating the tests, indicates that Colonel Groover's statements are premature and that no definite evaluation of a "stress factor" can be made until one year has elapsed from the time tests for the "stress factor" commenced. This information was furnished by Dr. Hames to Inspector DeLoach on the occasion of his contacting Inspector DeLoach to ascertain whether it would be possible to accelerate the shipment of the blood samples to him. There has been some delay out of Colonel Groover's office and action is being taken to accelerate such shipments.

Colonel Groover advised that such "stress factor" tests began only recently and that they have been made in conjunction with the over-all cholesterol blood factor study. These "stress factor" tests have been made by Colonel Groover unknown to Dr. Hames and although Colonel Groover has simply been extending additional services to the Bureau officials, Dr. Hames stated that since he now has the experimental facilities available in order to run such "stress factor" tests himself, he much prefers that from this point on he personally conduct such tests.

This entire "stress factor" field is a highly experimental one. Colonel Groover made it clear that the "stress factor" is developed as a corollary in conjunction with the three tests given the blood samples furnished by participating officials. One test consists of injecting a certain amount of serum taken from the blood into white rats. If an excessive amount of cholesterol is present in the blood, the portal vein of the rat is blocked within a particle of an hour or two and the rat died. 1 - Mr. Mohr 1 - Miss Kennedy Alpha Beta Lipoprotein. This latter test has been used recently as a substitute for a basal metabolism test. Colonel Groover stated that he does not know exactly what causes the "stress factor" which appears in the course of such tests and he stated that experimentation is far from complete in this field.

Attached is a chart showing the cholesterol averages for the participating individuals since the beginning of the program. Another portion of this chart shows the variation in the cholesterol count of such individuals. At the inception of the program Colonel Groover stated that this variation factor is a very important one and it has been found that where the cholesterol count varies to a great degree, a heart involvement may be likely. At the present stage of the study, Colonel Groover said that none of the participants show an excessive variation but he made it clear that the study itself cannot be evaluated until it has run for a period of about a year from the standpoint of the cholesterol factor itself.

It would appear that Colonel Groover and Dr. Hames are at variance to a degree only on the point of the "stress factor" as it appears in the cases of Inspector in Charge Nease and Inspector DeLoach. Neither doctor has expressed any feeling that the results of other tests involved to date show any problem concerning the participating officials. Inasmuch as Dr. Hames has clearly stated to Inspector DeLoach that the "stress factor" cannot be evaluated until tests have been run for at least a year, it is felt that no additional action should be taken at this time but the results should be closely followed and any recommended action taken at such time as complete information is available.

RECOMMENDATION:

That no action be taken at the present time but that the results of these tests be closely followed so that any necessary corrective action may be taken.

DeLoach told him this matter had already been in the papers in connection with the national convention and there did not appear to be any further need of writing anything. Epstein stated that he wanted to do this, however; that it would be entirely favorable to the FBI and the American Legion and he would appreciate a favorable response.

I have discussed this matter with De Loach and although he is somewhat embarrassed at the request, I see no harm in allowing a short, controlled write-up in connection with this matter. If you approve, I will tell him to call Epstein and tell him it will be perfectly all right.






