Gaughan and Matschullat have said they will call about 15 witnesses, including the redheaded defendant himself. Gaughan said Starkweather will probably be on the witness stand "for the better part of the day."

The youth will be called, Gaughan said, after several other members of his family have testified but before 2 psychiatrists and a psychologist are called. A plea of "innocent by reason of insanity" has been entered by his attorneys for Starkweather, and Gaughan said last week that the youth was "suffering from delusion" and therefore was legally insane when he shot Jensen.

A letter which Charles Starkweather wrote to his parents shortly after his capture in Wyoming was revealed for the first time at Monday's trial sessions, introduced as evidence by Starkweather's defense attorneys.

The letter, never mailed, was written on stationery bearing the Converse County sheriff's office letterhead and read (spelling unchanged):

Dear Mon and dad,

A total of 30 exhibits have now been received in evidence in the trial, which will begin its 7th day Tuesday. These include bullets removed from Jensen's head and the .22 rifle allegedly used to kill him (which reportedly was stole from farmer August Meyer o Bennet, one of the victims) Two Wyoming lawmen.

Sheriff Earl Heflin of Douglas and Dep. Sheriff-William Romer of Casper, testified. Monday. Heflin told of how. he and Douglas Police Chief Robert Ainslie chased Starkweather at 115 mph and fi-nally took him into custody about 31/2 miles east of Douglas Jan. 29.

Heflin said Starkweather just suddenly stopped in the middle of the road and got out after he (Heflin) had been firing at him with a 38 pistol and a 30-30 rifle (a piece of flying glass had nicked Starkweather's ear but he was not shot). He said Starkweather told him that "I'da hit somebody headon anyhow," an apparent refer-ence to the high-speed chase.

Gaughan asked Heflin if Starkweather at any time seemed to realize the "enormity" of the acts he was alleged to have committed. In the morning Heflin answered "no;" that he did not, but he reversed himself upon further questioning by Scheele in the afternoon and said that Starkweather did seem to realize what he had done. The sheriff said Starkweather showed no remorse, but said he did not think this unusual for a killer.

Tells Of Caril

Romer told how Caril Fugate ran up to him about 14 ' miles west of Douglas, wherehe had stopped his car when he saw 2 men (Starkweather and Joseph Sprinkle of Casper) wrestling for a rifle. He said Caril ran to him and said Starkweather had just killed a man (Merle Collison of Great Falls, Mont.) and that he (Romer) then radioed ahead for a road block to halt Starkweather, who had driven off at high speed. He also told of recovering a .22 rifle (used to kill Jensen) from the site where he came upon Stark-weather.

Cinc witnesses with testified Monday and a brief summary of their testimony:

Robert Zimmers, FBI ballistics expert of Washington, D. C. — testified that the .22 rifle sent him for examination was the weapon from which several .22 bullets be also examined had been fired. "The gun was recovered in Wyoming, the shullets from Jensen's body.) Louis Meyer of Bennet, brother of the stain August Meyer — identified the '22 pump rifle recovered by Romer in Wyo-ming as having belonged to his brother.

The watch was stopped at 9:07, he said. (Zimmers has stated that the watch stopped because of the crystal being smashed not because it ran down.)

Dr. B. D. Zeman of Lincoln the patible gist who performed the autopsy tified that he took a color, slide showing the 6-bullet holes in Jensen's head near the right ear. The slide was producted on a screen for the survers to view.



STATEMENT OF FACTS

About 4:30 P. M., January 27th, 1958, the body of Marion Bartlett was found in an old chicken shed at the rear of his home at 924 Belmont in this city. The body of his wife, Velda Bartlett, and his three year old daughter, Betty Jean, were found in an abandoned out-door toilet at the rear of the home. All three bodies had been wrapped in various articles of bed clothing, rags, paper, etc. It was determined through autopsies that Marion Bartlett had been shot in the head with a .22 calibre hollow point bullet. Mrs. Bartlett had also been shot with a .22 calibre hollow point bullet. The daughter, Betty Jean, had numerous skull fractures and a stab wound in the throat. All three bodies had numerous wounds and abrasions on them.

On January 28th, 1958, at approximately 12:30 P. M., the body of August Meyer, a bachelor farmer, was found at his farm home near Bennet, Nebraska, which is approximately eighteen miles southeast of Lincoln. The body was found in a small shed at the rear of his farm home, and it was determined that he had been shot while on the back porch of his home. He had been shot in the back of the head with a .410 gauge shotgun.

At approximately 4:00 P. M. on January 28th, 1958, the bodies of Carol King and Robert Jensen were found in an abandoned storm cave, which was located on abandoned school grounds one-half mile west of the August Meyer farm. Carol King had been shot

once in the head with a .22 calibre bullet. When found, her jeans and underclothing were down around her ankles. According to the autopsy report, an act of sodomy had been committed on this young girl. Robert Jensen had been shot in the head five or six times with .22 calibre bullets.

On January 29th, 1958, at 12:30 P. M., the bodies of C. Lauer Ward, his wife Clara Ward, and their maid Lillian Fencl were found in their home at 2843 South 24th Street, Lincoln, Nebraska. The body of Mr. Ward was found near the front door of his home, and he had been shot in the back with a .22 calibre bullet and in the head with a .22 calibre bullet. He had also supposedly been hit in the head or neck with a brass fireplace stoker. The body of his wife, Clara Ward, was found in an upstairs bedroom, lying between two beds, with her arms tied behind her and a gag in her mouth. She had been stabbed numerous times in the back. In another bedroom on the second floor of this home was found the body of the maid, Lillian, Fencl. Her hands had been bound in front of her, a gag placed in her mouth, and she had been bound about the ankles. There were numerous stab wounds in her chest and abdomen, and she b6 had been cut on the wrists and the back of her left hand. b7C Autopsies disclosed that neither Mrs. Ward nor Lillian Fencl had been shot.

During the afternoon of January 29th, 1958, Charles R. Starkweather and _______ were apprehended near Douglas, Wyoming. Starkweather has admitted the shootings of all victims mentioned but denies the stabbing of Mrs. Ward and Lillian Fencl and intimates that this was done by







Results of Examination:

The rifle sight, specimen Q1, is the type of sight assembled originally on .22 caliber Winchester rifles of the type represented by specimen K2. The sight of specimen K2 is missing and specimen Q1 could have come from this rifle.

The bullet specimen, Q2, found four steps from the basement floor in the C. Lauer Ward home is a mutilated fragment of a caliber .22 Long Rifle bullet. Because of its mutilated condition, it was not possible to determine the type of bullet from which this fragment came. The absence of marks on the bullet's surface precludes the possibility of identifying the type or particular weapon firing the bullet from which this fragment came.

The bullet specimen, Q3, found in the doorcasing in the living room at the C. Lauer Ward home is also a mutilated fragment of a bullet. This specimen was likewise too mutilated to permit identification as to bullet type. There were no marks present to permit identification of the type or particular weapon firing the bullet from which this fragment came.

The cartridge case, Q4, found on the basement floor at the foot of the basement steps at the C. Lauer Ward home is a Remington caliber .22 Short cartridge case. It was identified as having been fired in the caliber .22 Winchester pump action rifle, Model 1906, Serial No. 600590, referred to above as specimen K2.

The cartridge case, Q5, found on the sixth step from the top of the staircase at the C. Lauer Ward home is a Remington caliber .22 Long or Long Rifle cartridge case. It was identified as having been fired in the caliber .22 Winchester pump action rifle, Model 1906, Serial No. 600590, referred to above as specimen K2.

The cartridge case, Q6, found on the top landing of the basement steps at the C. Lauer Ward home is a Remington caliber .22 Long or Long Rifle cartridge case. It was identified as having been fired in the caliber .22 Winchester pump action rifle, Model 1906, Serial No. 600590, referred to above as specimen K2.

The cartridge case, Q7, found on the floor just south of C. Lauer Ward's head, is a Remington caliber .22 Long or Long Rifle cartridge case. It was identified as having been fired in the caliber .22 Winchester pump action rifle, Model 1906, Serial No. 600590, referred to above as specimen K2.

The cartridge case, Q10, found in the northwest bedroom at the Bartlett home is a Remington caliber .22 Long or Long Rifle cartridge case. It was identified as having been fired in the caliber .22 J. C. Higgins bolt action rifle, Model 103.18, referred to above as specimen Kl.

The piece of shotgun barrel, Q12, found on top of the piano in the Marion Bartlett home, is the muzzle end, 8 5/8" long, of the barrel of a .410 gauge shotgun. This barrel section was identified as having been sawed from the barrel of the .410 gauge J. Stevens shotgun, Model 59A, referred to above as specimen K4.

The Remington .410 gauge fired shotgun shell, Q13, found in the yard of the August Meyer farm, was identified as having been fired in the .410 gauge J. Stevens shotgun, Model 59A, referred to above as specimen K4.

The cartridge case, Q14, found in the kitchen of the August Meyer farmhouse, is a Remington caliber .22 Long or Long Rifle cartridge case from a round of ammunition that is unlike those rounds represented by any of the other cartridge cases examined in this case. This cartridge case was identified as having been fired in the caliber .22 Winchester pump action rifle, Model 62A, Serial No. 125936, referred to above as specimen K3.

The bullet, Q15, found in the kitchen of the August Meyer farmhouse is a mutilated fragment of a caliber .22 Long Rifle bullet. This specimen was too mutilated to permit identification of the type or particular weapon firing the bullet from which this fragment came.

The two pieces of shot, Q16, taken from the head of August Meyer are from a shotgun shell loaded with number 6 shot. In this regard, it is the same size shot as that submitted by your office under cover of your letter dated December 7, 1957, in the Robert George Colvert, Victim, Murder case and reported upon in Laboratory report number PC-51221 GY.

The bullet, Q17, removed from the head of Carol King, is the base portion of a caliber .22 Long Rifle bullet. This bullet was identified as having been fired from the caliber .22 Winchester pump action rifle, Model 62A, Serial No. 125936, referred to above as specimen K3.

The cartridge case, Q19, found at the cave at the Carol King - Robert Jensen murder scene is a Remington caliber .22 Long or Long Rifle cartridge case. The cartridge case, Q20, found at the cave at the Carol King - Robert Jensen murder scene is a Remington caliber .22 Long or Long Rifle cartridge case. It was identified as having been fired in the caliber .22 Winchester pump action rifle, Model 62A, Serial No. 125936, referred to above as specimen K3.

The bullet, Q21, taken from the right lung of C. Lauer Ward is the mutilated base portion of a caliber .22 bullet. Some similarities between the limited marks on this specimen and on test bullets fired from specimen K2 were noted. The similarities noted were insufficient to permit identification of specimen K2 as the particular weapon firing the bullet from which this fragment came.

The bullet, Q22, taken from the head of C. Lauer Ward is a mutilated portion of a caliber .22 Long Rifle bullet. There were, however, sufficient marks remaining on its surface for identification purposes and it was identified as having been fired from the caliber .22 Remington pump action rifle, Model 1906, Serial No. 600590, referred to above as specimen K2.

The bullet, Q30, removed from the brain of Robert Jensen was submitted by Chief of Police Joseph T. Carroll, under cover of the letter from his office dated March 1, 1958. This bullet was identified as having been fired from the caliber .22 Winchester pump action rifle, Model 62A, Serial No. 125936, referred to above as specimen K3.

The wrist watch, Kl4, belonging to Robert Jensen, bears the brand name "Broadway." When received, the time read 9:30 o'clock. The watch crystal, apparently broken, was missing. The case was damaged at the 11 o'clock position and the face dented at the 2 o'clock position. A clump of dirt was present at the 2 o'clock position, the presence of which would have stopped the minute hand at this point had the minute hand reached it. The sweep second hand is missing and the sweep second hand pinion is bent. It was concluded from an examination of this wrist watch that it stopped with the bending of the sweep second hand pinion. The spring was wound to within three or four hours of being fully wound.

The wrist watch, Kl5, removed from the body of Carol King, bears the brand name "Sheffield." When received, the time read 9:20 o'clock. The spring on this wrist watch was completely run down. There was no evidence of damage to this watch. In the Laboratory, this watch was fully wound and it ran without failure, keeping accurate time, for 28 hours 35 minutes.

Test bullets and cartridge cases fired from specimens K1, K2 and K3 and test shotgun shells fired from specimen K4 were compared with all comparable specimens in this Laboratory's National Unidentified Ammunition File without effecting any identifications.

The serial numbers of specimens K2 and K3 were searched through the National Stolen Property Index of this Bureau but no prior record of the loss or theft of these weapons wars found.

Specimens K1 and K4 do not have serial numbers.

Specimens K1 through K4 functioned normally in every respect when they were test fired in the Laboratory.

By comparisons of contours of the torn edges it was ascertained that four of the five strips of cloth in specimen Q11, the two strips of cloth in Q28 and the three strips comprising Q29 had been torn from the bed sheet, specimen K8.

As a result of similar contour comparisons it was determined that one strip of cloth in Q11, the three strips in Q25, the three pieces of cloth in Q26, the two pieces of cloth in Q27 and a single strip found wrapped in the bed sheet, K8, did not come from K8. These strips were found to be contiguous pieces of another bed sheet and were found to comprise the major portion of one selvage edge and the entire wide or top edge of the sheet.

Human blood which was too limited in amount for grouping tests was found in specimen Q8, on the left sleeve and left shoulder of the jacket, K6, on the left rear portion of the coat, K10, on the left leg of K17 and on the right sleeve of K18.

Preliminary chemical tests for blood were made on a faint reddish smear present on the toe of the right boot of specimen K16 and on minute red stains appearing on the side of the heel of the left boot of K16. The results of these tests were positive, thereby indicating the possible presence of blood on the boots. The amount of material in the stains was too limited, however, for confirmatory blood analyses.

No blood was found in specimen Q9, on K5, K11, K12 and K13. The examination of K5 did not disclose any tissue particles or hairs thereon.

For purposes of record, grouping tests were made on the human blood present on specimens K8 and K19. The blood on K8 was derived from an individual belonging to International Blood Group "O." That on K19 came from a group "B" person.

No seminal stains were found on specimens K19 through K22.





LINCOLN, Neb. (II) Charles Starkweather the 19 year-old who went on a homicidal orgy that took il lives, was ordered to pay with his own Friday.

A jury of eight women and four men found the redhaired mass killer guilty of the murder of just one of his victims, but that was enough to commit Starkweather to the electric chair.

The former garbage hauler spoke not one word in the courtroom except to whisper what appeared to be "goodbye" to his defense attorney, T. Clement Gaughan, as he was led in handcuffs out of the courtroom.

Reporters stopped him in the corridor as he was being led out on the way to the state penitentiary.

They asked him: "How do you feel, Charlie?"
"I don't think they tried me for Jensen," he said. "They tried me for the whole thing."

KILLING RAMPAGE

By the "whole thing" he meant the rampage of killing that ter-rorized this community last January when he and his 14-year dd gill friend, Caril Fugate, left bodies strewn from the slums to the most exclusive residential dis-

treet of Lincoln.
Attorney Gaughan was asked what he thought of the outcome. "I' presume Charlie got what he wanted," Gaughan said. "That is what he always wanted."

Starkweather's execution may be delayed until next fall so that he could testify at the murder trial of Caril Fugate. His confession implicated her in the slaying of her own mother, her baby halfsister, 16-year - old Carol King, Mrs. C. Lauer Ward, and the Wards' maid in the Lauer home.

CARIL IN HOSPITAL

Caril was being held for safe-keeping in a state mental hospi-tal pending a ruling on whether she will be tried in district court on first degree murder charges or in juvenile court.

Starkweather was found guilty specifically on two counts in the

murder and robbery of 17-yearold Robert Jensen, whose body, along with that of the King girl, was found in a storm cave in an abandoned schoolyard.

attempt had been made to ravish her.

Stärkweather looked shaken Friday for the first time during the trial. He wore a green cotton shirt open at the collar and looked sweaty. He didn't have his customary chewing gum and the smirk was gone from his face; although he managed a few wan smiles.

His tiny redhaired mother, was at his side at the defense table when the verdict was announced hortly after, she rose and walke urriedly to the privacy of the

judge's chambers. Charlie's father, Guy, arrived at the courtroom seconds after the jury returned the verdict. He said that he talked to Charles after the verdict and his

son told him: "I committed some of these crimes and if I want to make my atonement to God and be electrocuted, that's my business."
The 70-year-old Lancaster County courthouse was filled with police. They lined the corridors and the stairs as Charlie was led in a waist chain to the sheriff's car for the trip back to the penitentiary, where he will die.




