

After SSOC ceased activity, the Oneonta Collective adopted a Marxist-Leninist point of view and on 3/21/70, during a visit by DANIEL RUBIN, National Organization Secretary, CPUSA, was constituted as the Oneonta Club of the CPUSA.

No potential counterintelligence action directed against the New Left was afforded during the period OctoberDecember 1969.

The RYM faction of SDS was in existence in Birmingham only from mid-August to mid-October 1969. During its existence in Birmingham this faction failed to achieve any results and apparently decided to terminate its connection with Birmingham in favor of Atlanta, Georgia.

The Oneonta Collective is reported to have no connection with SDS or any other campus oriented group. From available information, it appears the Collective intends to align itself with the planned New Marxist Youth Organization.

The New Left in the Birmingham Field Division territory now consists of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS). Southern Student Organizing Committee was dissolved early in June 1969. Accidental Assemblies of Cosmic Dust and Alabama Committee for Freedom and Peace have been inactive during this period, and these investigations have been closed by Birmingham.

SDS activity has been principally on the campus at the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa, Alabama. No information has been developed which would indicate a possible counterintelligence action.

With the advent of the summer vacation period, it is not anticipated that a potential counterintelligence action will be developed during the next three months.

SSOC was one of the organizations providing a speaker at an "International Student Strike - Protesting the War in Vietnam" demonstration which was to be held 10/21/68 at the University of Alabama. SSOC, however, did not furnish a speaker on that occasion.

Since SDS and SSOC are presumably in a formative stage, Birmirgham has not been able to develop potential counterintelligence action against either group.

ACFP was also listed as one of the organizations which would furnish a speaker on 10/21/68 at the demonstration to be held at the University of Alabama. ACFP, however, was not active on that occasion.

With respect to AACD, information reflected its last activity was a "Love-in" held on 11/5/68 protesting the 1968 National Elections. AACD has not published its newspaper "The Fuse" since the August 1968 edition.

The "New Left" in the Birmingham Field Division territory consists of:

Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) Southern Students Organizing Committee (SSOC) Accidental Assemblies of Cosmic Dust (AACD) Alabama Committee for Freedom and Peace (ACFP)

SDS, according to information available to Birmingham, publicly appeared on the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, campus in mid-September, 1968, coinciding with the beginning of the school year.

SSOC, in late August, 1968, was reported to have designated a "campus traveller" (organizer) for Alabama. More recently, information has been received that this "campus traveller" had been sent to Mississippi. No information is available as yet regarding a replacement.

Since SDS and possibly SSOC are in a formative stage, Birmingham has not been able to develop potential counterintelligence action against either group.

ACFP purports to offer "draft counseling" assistance, but is not known to have engaged in such on any sizeable scale. ACFP is apparently sponsoring a lecture by American Friends Service Committee for October 7, 1968, at the University of Alabama, Engineering Building Auditorium, Birmingham, Alabama.

The relative inactive status of AACD and the just emerging activity of ACFP have not afforded an opportunity for counterintelligence action. Both groups are of a public nature, and it would appear they are possibly open to some form of action upon the developing of activity on their part.

There have not been any disturbances on any campus, attributable to a "New Left" type organization, within the territory of the Birmingham Field Division. Consequently there is no summary to be made of any campus disruptive activity.

The Democratic Student Organization, chartered 4/18/68 at the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, Ala. has as its objectives to stimulate meaningful dialogue between students and faculty; encourage and support progressive candidates for state and local offices; engage in partisan politics.

DSO was also active during the school year 1968 in leading 'peace vigils' to express the feeling held by some members of the University community concerning the war in Vietnam.

It does not appear that DSO is a 'New Left' type organization within the meaning of relet.

Information has been received of an organization, terming itself "Students for Peace in Vietnam," being active at Samford University. Investigation has not yet developed the nature of this group in relation to the 'New Left."

Activities of DSO are covered through liaison with University of Alabama, because of the unsettled membership.

The Birmingham Office, upon the basis of available information, is of the opinion that the potential for violence on any campus in its territory in the coming school year is minimal.



AACD has not been publicly active singe 4/22-26/68 except for publication of "The Fuse", a monthly newsletter, the third issue of which appeared in June, 1968.

A return address was used of Samford University, Box 1168,

Baptist institution. Active investigation has been opened
on this organization.

Investigation of the above organizations has not progressed to the point where avenues for potential counterintelligence action have been developed. In view of the public nature of these organizations it appears that they possibly are open to infiltration and that, with the acquisition of more information, some form of counterintelligence action can be undertaken.

Specifically the only demonstrations occurring on a campus within Birmingham's territory were a series of peace vigils conducted once a week at the University of Alabama.

The policy followed by University administration was to allow no nonstudent to demonstrate on the campus. If such are identified, they are asked to leave and if they refuse, they would be arrested by the campus police and charged with trespass after warning. To date, nonstudents have not participated in any student protest.

Advice has been received from the administration at the University of Alabama that it is prepared to meet with firmness any activity contrary to present University policy.

Birmingham will continue to follow this matter and any information received coming within the above catagories will be furnished to the Bureau.

ReBulet to Albany, 5/10/68. Relet instructs all offices to submit a detailed analysis of potential counterintelligence action against New Left organizations and Key Activists within their respective territories.

The only New Left-type organization known to exist within the territory of the Birmingham Office is the Accidental Assemblies of Cosmic Dust (AACD). The leading activist in AACD is are presently the subjects of pending investigations.

AACD sponsored demonstrations 3/2-3/68, and 4/22-27/68, which centered around anti-draft and peace With these demonstrations, AACD seems to have effected a change from a "hippie" type body to one of the New Left type.

Investigation thus far indicates that are the only consistent activists in AACD. The individuals participating in AACD demonstrations vary from one to the next with few repetitions.

AACD has received publicity in the local press and has in general been treated with ridicule and its adherents described as "hippies".
