

The quarterly report due 4/1/69 is as follows for the Dallas Division:

I. POTENTIAL COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION

Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) continues to have in existence in the Dallas Division small off-campus inactive chapters at Denton, Lubbock, and Dallas, Texas. All of these chapters operate off the campus, with meetings very irregular. Recently, MARK WILLIAM RUDD, SDS National Leader (Key Activist), from New York, appeared on the campus of University of Texas at Arlington (UTA) on 3/25/69, and on the campus of Southern Methodist University (SMU), on 3/26/69, being sponsored at both schools by the American Association of University Professors. Attendance at both his speeches was very light, with over half the audience leaving in the middle of his speech at SMU - RUDD attempted to obtain a group of students as an audience on the grounds of the Student Union Center, SMU, during the afternoon of 3/26/69, but only about 40 students appeared, with with some of these being curiosity seekers. Sources in the Dallas Division area, have stated that RUDD's speeches and appearances were a failure, since he was unable to obtain any following.

Since submission of last quarterly letter on this matter, and his wire, have moved to Houston, lexas, and are active in that area, especially in organizing the National Council meeting of the SDS which was held at Austin, Texas during the period 3/27 through 3/30/69.

With the moving from the Dallas area, SDS activities in this Division have decreased. With the exception of the above two speeches by RUDD, there have been no New Left activities within the Dallas Division.

POTENTIAL COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION

Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) has chapters in existence within the Dallas Division at Denton, Lubbock, Canyon, Commerce, Wichita Falls, and Dallas, Texas. The chapter at Dallas has about eight actual members, although about four additional persons are strong sympathizers who attend the meetings. Six or eight other persons also attend the meetings for reasons unknown. The other above mentioned chapters are smaller. at Denton, Wichita Falls, and Commerce have been created only during the past few weeks. Chapters at Canyon and Lubbock have been practically inactive during the current school year. major SDS and New Left activity within the Dallas Division center around (Bufile 100-450202) (a Key Activist) in Dallas but work as regional travelers in Texas and Oklahoma. He is a member of the SDS National Interim Committee (NIC).

The Dallas Office by LHM and airtel dated 11/6/68. under caption "STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY (SDS), IS - SDS; SEDITION", Bufile 100-439,048, reported SDS demonstration activities at North Texas State University (NTSU), Denton, Texas, that occurred on 11/4/68. On 11/2/68, SDS people handed out some leaflets just outside the NTSU Stadium during a football game. One of the items handed out was a leaflet that reflected SDS reaction to the National elections and announced a demonstration would be put on at NTSU, Midnight 11/3/68, to Midnight, 11/5/68 (Election Day). Another item distributed there was a "Special Election Issue" of "Dallas Notes", a Dallas published underground type newspaper. of these handouts contained at least one 4 letter word which Denton local authorities considered obscene and in violation of a Denton City Ordinance which forbids distributing indecent and obscene literature. While these items were being distributed the Denton Police Department arrested 10 of the persons engaged in such activity, charging them with violation of that city ordinance.

STUDENT NONVIOLENT COORDINATING COMMITTEE

Literature distributed by the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), headquartered at 360-362 Nelson Street, S.W., Atlanta, Georgia, described itself as not being a membership organization, but rather an agency attempting to stimulate and foster the growth of local protest movements. SNCC was born out of the sit-in movement which erupted across the South beginning on February 1, 1960. A conference at Raleigh, North Carolina, that Spring, brought together many of the demonstrating Southern students in a loose network of militant youth which was officially named SNCC in October, 1960.

A source has advised that in May, 1966, Stokely Carmichael was elected National Chairman by the Central Committee. In May, 1967, Carmichael was replaced as Chairman by H. Rap Brown, with Carmichael assuming the position of Recruiter and Organizer for the SNCC. In August, 1967, at the invitation of Fidel Castro, Carmichael participated in the Organization of Latin American Solidarity Conference which was held in Havana, Cuba. Subsequent thereto, Carmichael traveled to Hanoi and other sections of North Vietnam. He returned to the United States in December, 1967, at which time his passport was picked up because of travel to unauthorized countries.

A source advised that when Carmichael was elected Chairman of SNCC, the organization embarked on a program of eliminating Caucasians from its ranks. With the election of H. Literature distributed by the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), headquartered at 360-362 Nelson Street, S.W., Atlanta, Georgia, describes itself as not being a membership organization, but rather an agency attempting to stimulate and foster the growth of local protest movements. SNCC was born out of the sit-in movement which erupted across the South beginning on February 1, 1960. A conference at Raleigh, North Carolina, that Spring, brought together many of the demonstrating Southern students in a loose network of militant youth which was officially named SNCC in October, 1960.

A source has advised that in May, 1966, Stokely Carmichael was elected National Chairman by the Central Committee. In May, 1967, Carmichael was replaced as Chairman by H. Rap Brown, with Carmichael assuming the position of Recruiter and Organizer for the SNCC. In August, 1967, at the invitation of Fidel Castro, Carmichael participated in the Organization of Latin American Solidarity Conference which was held in Havana, Cuba. Subsequent thereto, Carmichael traveled to Hanoi and other sections of North Vietnam. Specific requests for Bureau authority to make contacts with either news media representatives or officials of educational institutions will be made at a later date.

Information requested in Bulet, 5/23/68, is as follows:

(1) False Allegations of Police Brutality

There have not been any direct student-police encounters or riots within the Dallas Division to present. There is no detailed information under this heading.

(2) Immorality

"Notes From the Underground" a publication being put out at Dallas, which has advocated SDS membership, appeared in early 1967 and at present copies are available publicly. Articles therein have been written by numerous SDS people, and others, some of which articles contained vulgar and obscene words.

(3) Action by College Administrators

Although there have been no student-police encounters, riots, uprisings, or insurgencies on college campuses within the Dallas Division, it appears necessary for college officials and administrators to take a firm stand in resisting militant minority elements attempting to disrupt or take over campuses. There have been some anti-Vietnam demonstrations on some of the campuses in which militant elements participated. A very small per cent of the student bodies and faculties were participants, and extent of outside influence in the demonstrations was very little.

In 1967 an SDS chapter was in existence at Fort Worth-Arlington, Texas, which was centered to a large degree around The University of Texas at Arlington (UTA), Arlington, Texas. Immediately after the University of Texas at Austin, in 1967, denied recognition of SDS at Austin, the UTA administration at Arlington took a firm stand and also refused to approve SDS there as a campus organization. Immediately thereafter SDS activities at Fort Worth-Arlington slowed down and soon that chapter disbanded. In 1965 and again in about December, 1967, efforts were made to set up an SDS chapter at North Texas State University (NTSU), Denton, Texas, but NTSU officials refused to recognize SDS as a campus organization. SDS activities therefore at Denton have not gotten much foothold.

Dallas, in 1967 made an effort to start up a SNCC chapter at Bishop College, Dallas, but met with little success. Information was received from a Bishop College administrative official on 5/31/68 that a review was made of Bishop College students who were involved in SNCC and related activities, and at the end of the 1967-68 school-year those students were notified it would be preferred they not return to that college as their attitude and actions were considered incompatible with the ideals and philosophies of that college. Also that official stated a few instructors who were sympathetic to the activities of those students were not expected to return in the Fall, 1968.

In early May, 1968, the president of East Texas State University (ETSU), Commerce, Texas, was presented with a "Declaration of Rights", adopted by "Black Student Representatives" of the Afro-American Student Society (AASS), a local organization of Negro students at ETSU. It made certain demands of the ETSU administration. Attached to that leaflet was a petition signed by numerous members of AASS which requested the ETSU president to be present at its meeting on 5/15/68 and which stated they would be anticipating a positive reply to their "Declaration of Rights." Since the ETSU president already had a commitment to speak to the Student Senate on 5/15/68 at the time the AASS meeting was scheduled, he so informed the AASS leader and invited the AASS group to attend the Student Senate meeting. About 25 of the AASS members, including its leader, attended. The ETSU president spoke to the meeting taking a firm stand, explaining, after taking up each of the AASS demands, that some of the demands were out of the question; that others were already in effect; and that others were to be considered at a later date. He made it clear to those listening that he did not intend to let any one group of students upset the educational processes at ETSU since it was his job to see that students there received an education. Those listening then gave the president a standing ovation.

Immediately following that meeting, on 5/15/68, AASS had its own private meeting at which SNCC at Dallas, and one associate (from Arlington, Texas) of were outsiders present and attempted to take over that meeting, advocating that AASS should picket and demonstrate at ETSU. SDS chapters exist at Dallas, Canyon, and
Lubbock, Texas, and each have participated in demonstrations
or other activities of anti-Vietnam or anti-draft nature.

assisted by two or three associates, to start a chapter of
SNCC in Dallas, but has had little success.

in New Left activities in Dallas. DCPSV throughout 1967 and

Left activities thrive on publicity through newspapers, radio and television. It would appear therefore they will become less interested in such activities if they receive little or no publicity. It is believed potential counterintelligence action against these groups would include giving encouragement, through trusted and reliable news media representatives, toward their withholding news publicity about New Left events, unless the event was unfavorable to the participants, in which instance much publicity should be encouraged.

Potential counterintelligence action against these groups includes education of presidents and/or deans of colleges and universities as to the true nature of the groups that need to be exposed, disrupted and neutralized. It is believed in some instances heads of colleges and universities can be effectively contacted by experienced Bureau personnel and brought to realize how important it is to take positive stands against unreasonable and anarchistic activities being espoused under the cover of academic freedom. In many other instances such messages undoubtedly can be gotten to such school officials through reliable civic leaders, local police or other public officials. School officials should be educated to the fact that the New Left is not seeking to reform society, but to destroy it; and that its overall aim is to have total and radical student autonomy of universities.

At present Dallas does not have any specific recommendations for immediate counterintelligence action. This matter, however, will be discussed with all Agents handling investigations pertaining to the New Left, and effort will be made to formulate some specific recommendations.
