

In October and November, 1970, the SDS in Sacramento split into two groups as a result of factionalism. One group, operating on the campus of Sacramento State College (SSC), advocates social change by non-militant means. This group is of the opinion they are under intensive investigation by both local and federal police agencies.

The second faction, operating off campus, advocates social change by "street activity". They publish an underground newspaper, "Outlaw", which is militant in nature. The last two issues of "Outlaw" have numerous articles advocating the use of drugs. Because of these articles, factionalism is now developing within this second group.

and his followers contend that "Outlaw" should be purely political in nature with no reference to drugs.

Additional factionalism is developing within the second group because of lack of leadership. Some members of the second group, as individuals, have been involved in acts of vandalism such as spray painting obscenities and antiestablishment slogans on public buildings. And his followers advocate that such activity should be agreed upon by all members in advance and should be a joint effort

At present, because of the various phases of factionalism, the SDS in Sacramento has been unable to agree on any tangible program of New Left activity. If such a program is agreed upon, plans will be made to disrupt such activity.

It is not felt that the documents listed in relet should be disseminated in your division on such a widespread basis and particularly, by cover letter, signed by the Special Agent in Charge (SAC). There is no objection to your furnishing this material to selected schools through personal contact with established and reliable contacts at these institutions. Prior to doing so, you should obtain Bureau authority and identify suggested recipients of the documents.

Relet also suggests that a follow-up survey be made of these institutions to determine the effectiveness of the literature furnished. As it is not felt that such a survey would serve any substantial or useful purpose. you should not conduct any such followup.

Since relet failed to indicate whether you have a supply of these articles on hand, you should advise as to whether they should be sent. Bear in mind that only a limited number is available to be sent you.

In the future, your suggestions in regard to captioned Program should be made by separate letter and not in conjunction with your quarterly summary.

There are 24 two-year and four-year colleges and one branch of the University of California located within the Sacramento Division. In all instances in order for a student organization to become officially active on the college or university campus, it must have the sanction To be sanctioned, the organization of the administration. must file with the administration the names of current officers and the aims and purposes of the organization. The officers listed must be full-time students with an average academic record. These papers must be filed within six weeks after the opening of the fall school term and must be renewed each year. During the 1968-69 school year, the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) and The Resistance were active at University of California-Davis; San Joaquin Delta College, Stockton; Fresno State College, Fresno; and Chico State College, Chico. It has been determined that to date the SDS and The Resistance have not filed the necessary papers with the schools' administration for the 1969-70 school year.

It is believed that the receipt of the literature listed herein will greatly influence the university and college presidents and their staffs in deciding whether or not the SDS, The Resistance, and similar groups should receive official recognition. If an organization is sanctioned by the college or university, it receives certain privileges such as the use of school buildings for meeting purposes, the use of certain school equipment such as public

address systems and movie projectors, and the use of motor vehicles to be used on campus. It is obvious that it is greatly to the advantage of any organization to receive official sanction by the university and college administrations.

If Bureau permission is granted to distribute the literature, it will be enclosed with a short cover letter under SaC signature explaining that the literature is being sent for the information of the president and his staff in order that they may be aware of the potential dangerousness of the New Left movement as it exists on many campuses throughout the United States. If the literature is distributed, a discreet follow-up survey will be made to determine its effectiveness.

You should give this matter careful study and devise methods of utilizing the disorganization to prevent the New Left from becoming active.

Continued attention will be given to the program and when a desirable plan which will serve a useful purpose is devised, Bureau authority will be requested to institute it.

To date, these groups have been relatively quiet and have engaged in no disruptive acts or attempted to instigate civil disobedience.

College. So little student interest was generated on the campus that representatives of the organization failed to appear before school authorities to apply for recognition.

New Left leaders in the Sacramento area have rejected proposals by their counterparts from San Francisco that the Sacramento groups support San Francisco State College troublemakers with strikes, sit-ins and violence.

So long as the New Left organizations and leaders remain innocuous, effective counterintelligence action is difficult. In addition, it could have the unwanted effect of giving publicity to, or generating student sympathy for, an otherwise ignored movement.

Continuing attention is being given to this matter and when a desirable plan which will serve a useful purpose is devised, Bureau authority will be requested to institute it.

Re Sacramento letters to the Bureau dated 6/28/63 and 7/2/68.

Referenced latters point out the lack of an effective, aggressive New Left organization on any campuses in this division.

As was noted in the letter of 7/2/63, the Students for a Democratic Society and the Black Student Union had chapters on the campuses at Fresno State College, Chico State College, Sacramento State College, and the University of California at Davis. All of these have become inoperative during the summer vacation months.

These schools have only recently reopened and thus far no information has been received that chapters of these two organizations, or any other New Left organization, have been reactivated.

It is the belief of this office, based on the limited previous New Left activity, that the best way to attack the movement will be through the press. One newspaper in particular in Sacramento is quite conservative in character and has published editorials critical of the lawlessness on campuses around the country. It is believed that in the event New Left activity increases in the Sacramento area, the conservative newspaper may be wilking to print articles exposing the true nature of the New Left movement and its leaders.



on the campus at the University of California at Davis, it is believed it will present the opportunity for counter-intelligence action. Last year this organization was composed of representatives of most of the campus groups such as the Young Democrate and Young Republicans and the Students for a Democratic Society was also represented. If the Students for a Democratic Society or other New Left groups attempt to gain any measure of control, it is believed that anonymous mailings to the leaders of the legitimate campus organizations could aid in neutralizing their effectiveness.

When it is determined what, if any, new Left groups will be organized and information is developed regarding the leaders, consideration will be given to counterintelligence action designed to combarrass and discredit these leaders and to create dissension among the various groups. However, no efforts along these lines can be made until some New Left activity is instituted.



CONDINATIAL

The Limi's are classified confidential as they contain information from the above mentioned sources of continuing value, the unauthorized disclosure of which could reveal their identities and compromise their future effectiveness.

Contacts with sources on the campuses of the various junior colleges, colleges, and universities within this division reveal that no New Left organization exists other than in those schools on which LH1's are submitted.

Shasta Junior College, Redding, California, has no New Left organizations or activity, however, two students have attempted to organize disruptive activity in the past year. They were unsuccessful in establishing any type of organization or in generating enough student interest to organize demonstrations. Consequently, no LHM is being submitted on Shasta Junior College.

To date, efforts to develop sources within New Left organizations have been unsuccessful due to the relative inactivity of these groups.

At present, several persons are being considered for development as panel sources to cover open activities of the various New Left organizations. In addition, all Special Agents handling security matters are aware of the need for the development of adequate coverage within the groups and are attempting to develop informants.

Due to the delicacy of these investigations, it is believed desirable to develop informants from "clean individuals" rather than present members or sympathizers of the New Left group. With this goal in mind, Special Agents are continuing to attempt to locate suitable students who may be agreeable to assisting the Bureau.

POTENTIAL FOR VIOLENCE

Contacts with sources on all campuses in this division and a review of past activity on these campuses indicates that there seems to be little likelihood that violence will occur during the forthcoming school year.

Obviously, it is not possible to foresee every potential for violence, however, what New Left activity there has been in the past has been peaceful and within the bounds of campus regulations.

The small sizes of New Left groups together with apathy on the part of non-member students has not made it possible to organize demonstrations which could result in violence.

With the re-opening of schools in the fall any New Left groups formerly in existence will have to re-organize. At that time, it should be possible to determine whether any existent groups have the inclination or ability to cause trouble.







STUDENT NONVIOLENT COORDINATING COMMITTEE

Coordinating Committee (SNCC), headquartered at 360-362 Nelson Street, S.W., Atlanta, Georgia, describes itself as not being a membership organization, but rather an agency attempting to stimulate and foster the growth of local protest movements. SNCC was born out of the sit-in movement which erupted across the South beginning on February 1, 1960. A conference at Raleigh, North Carolina, that Spring, brought together many of the demonstrating Southern students in a loose network of militant youth which was officially named SNCC in October, 1960.

A source has advised that in May, 1966, Stokely Carmichael was elected National Chairman by the Central Committee. In May, 1967, Carmichael was replaced as Chairman by H. Rap Brown, with Cermichael assuming the position of Recruiter and Organizer for the SNCC. In August, 1967, at the invitation of Fidel Castro, Carmichael participated in the Organization of Letin American Solidarity Conference which was held in Havana, Cuba. Subsequent thereto, Carmichael returned to the United States in December, 1967, at which time his passport was picked up because of travel to unauthorized countries.

A source advised that when Carmichael was elected Chairman of SNCC, the organization embarked on a program of eliminating Caucasians from its ranks. With the election of H. Rap Brown as Chairman in 1967, it embarked on a worldwide struggle for human rights and to take a firm stand against violations of these rights by the American Government and to strengthen its programs of opposition to the draft and to the United States involvement in Viet Nam.

On August 13, 1967, while addressing a group in the Watts area of Los Angeles, California, H. Rap Brown said "You better shape up America, or we'll burn you down." Later in February, 1968, in a publicized note Brown wrote, "America, if it takes my death to organize my people to revolt against you and to organize your jails to revolt against you and to organize your children, your God, your poor, your country, and to organize mankind to rejoice in your destruction and ruin, then here's my life."

A source who has furnished reliable information in the past has advised that the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) at Davis, California, is not presently an important factor in campus activity. The SDS Chapter is almost completely inactive and has little following among the student population on the campus. The source advised that the SDS has had no stable leadership at the University of California at Davis and, consequently, has been unable to generate sufficient student interest to organize an active chapter or any continuing program.

The source advised that after the death of Hartin Luter King, the SDS became part of the Hartin Luther King Coalition which was established. This coalition is made up of most of the recognized campus organizations such as the Young Republicans and Young Democrates and others. The SDS has no control in this organization, the stated purpose of which is to attempt to improve the status of Negro students on the campus.

A second source has advised an SDS Regional council meeting was held in Berkeley, California, in March, 1930, and that the University of California at Davis was represented by

I. Potential Counterintelligence Action

To date no suitable counterintelligence action has been devised.

As was pointed out in referenced Sacramento letter, New Left activity in the Sacramento Division has been very limited and with the end of the school year it has almost completely ceased.

A survey of colleges in the Resident Agency territories revealed only three at which there was New Left type activity during the past school year and indications are that this activity has ended with the completion of the school year.

Consideration has been given to various counterintelligence activities; however, it is not enticipated that/
specific recommendations will be made until it is determined
whether New Left activity will begin again and what form it

The following is set forth as directed in re Bureau letter:

1) False Allegations of Police Brutality

To date there have been no recorded allegations of police brutality. There have been no clashes as yet between student groups and the police due to the fact : that what little new left activity there has been in this territory, was Jegal and peaceful. No attempts have been made to seize school property or stage sit-ins as has happened at many colleges and universities. The police have not been the object of any violence which can be attributed to new left activity.

2) Immorality

While it is probable that some of the new left adherents in this area are of low character and morals, the activity of these persons has not been so notorious as to become public knowledge. Sources close to these new left individuals have provided no information regarding licentious behavior nor any information regarding traits or habits indicating such behavior.

For a short time in Sacramento, mentioned above, and other students with leftist leanings maintained an apartment which was described as a "pad" by neighbors. Observation of the premises revealed that it was not in a residential neighborhood and was not the squalid establishment which is often associated with the "hippie" type new left members in larger Metropolitan areas.

3) Action by College Administrators

To date there have been no confrontations between new left groups and college administrators. Thus far, the new left organizations have not attempted to seize or disrupt any educational institution in connection with their demands.

In April, 1968, the Martin Luther King Coalition at the University of California at Davis met to discuss action to be taken against the Board of Regents of the University of California, who were to meet at Davis on April 18, and April 19, 1968. Those present decided to press demands for additional scholarship funding for minority group students at Davis. They specifically wanted 100 minority group students to be admitted free to the university at a cost of approximately \$2,000.00 each.

They were to demand that the particular student be selected by the Martin Luther King Coalition and the Black Student Union.

The Coalition decided that a sit-in or violence would be employed by the students if the Board of Regents did not satisfy their demands. This planned violence did not come about because the regents unexpectedly invited the coalition to delegate a spokesman to present its demands. This so confused the students that their planned demonstration collapsed and their demands were not presented inasmuch as a suitable spokesman could not be decided upon.

Other than the above, there has been no new left activity directed against a college or university which has necessitated action by the administration.

Review of New Left activity in the Sacramento Division reveals that activity by organizations in this movement is limited to the campuses of the University of California at Davis, Sacramento State College, Fresno State College and Chico State College.

COUNTER PARTY

As has been set forth in reports and memoranda dealing with Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) activity, as well as anti-war and anti-draft activity, the New Left movement has been generally unsuccessful in its disruptive tactics. In the past, small anti-draft demonstrations have been held but have received little support or publicity.

Since the intensification of the Government's efforts to negotiate peace in Vietnam, anti-war activity, other than picketing representatives of Dow Chemical Company, has been almost nonexistent.

Leadership of the SDS, as well as other New Left organizations is, at the moment, somewhat disoriented. The principal SDS spokesman at Sacramento State College has left the area. The SDS at University of California at Davis has joined the Martin Luther King Coalition, along with such groups as the Young Democrats and the Young Republicans, in an effort to improve the status of Negro students. On this Coalition, the SDS has little voice or authority.

To date the New Left movement has done very little along the lines of attempted campus disturbances. One attempt was made to disrupt a meeting of the Board of Regents at University of California at Davis; however, this failed when the Coalition was offered the opportunity to present its views and no speaker could be decided upon.

The above indicates the inactivity and lack of organization of the New Left movement in the Sacramento Division. It is anticipated that within the next week, when colleges end the regular school year, the activity will almost completely cease, as this has been true in the past.

As a result of the above, a continuing counterintelligence program is most difficult to plan. However, a program has been instituted and it is anticipated that, through sources and the press, the immorality, duplicity and desire for personal aggrandizement of the leaders will be exposed.

Sources on the various campuses throughout this Division indicate that a large portion of the students, outside of Sacramento, come from basically conservative rural families and it is felt that publicity, as mentioned above, could develop an interest in stamping out the distasteful activity of the New Left. Since little publicity has been given to the activity of the New Left in this area, public sentiment has not been aroused against the organizations or leaders.

Sacramento recommends no immediate counterintelligence activity as it is believed that such would be wasted coming at a time when there is no New Left activity.

This matter will be followed closely to insure that no opportunity for disruptive activity is overlooked.
