MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON
MR. MOHR

Administrative Review

I have previously called to your attention my concern relative to the matter of promotions to the positions of Assistant SAC's. I have suspected for sometime that there is little or no system in making these selections and that some men are being designated as Assistant SAC's from supervisory positions at the Seat of Government who have entered the Bureau subsequent to the time other supervisors have entered it; who have served in Washington not as long as other supervisors; and who have not had as good or any better records than supervisors who have not been promoted.

On previous occasions when I brought this matter to your attention you have always indicated that my concern in this matter was somewhat unfounded and that a very careful system is followed in making selections for promotions to Assistant SAC's. I was not satisfied with this rather nonchalant brushing off of my concern so I have had a study made of the last 18 promotions to Assistant SACships and I am attaching hereto that study.

I would like to call to your attention the cases of 6 of the supervisors who have been promoted to Assistant SACships, namely, ASAC's Doyle, Gotschall, Stiles, Holtzman, Plaxico, and Obenshain. All of these men performed less than one hour of overtime in October, 1950 so it cannot be claimed that the reason other supervisors who have not been designated as Assistant SAC's were not designated because they did not show the industry expected by the Bureau in October, 1950. I would now like to call your attention to the case of Supervisor Courtney A. Evans of the Investigative Division who entered the Bureau in December, 1940 and was transferred to the Seat of Government as a supervisor in December, 1945 and whose record throughout has been excellent with many commendations. It is true that in October, 1950 his overtime was but 33 minutes. However, it is also to be noted that there was one occasion at least of a man who has been promoted to Assistant SAC who performed but 14 minutes of overtime in October, 1950, and another one performed but 31 minutes of overtime in that month and several others less than one hour.

I have only taken Mr. Evans' case as one example because there have been a number of others which I have noted in the last several weeks. Several of those individuals who have been designated as Assistant SAC's certainly did not have the aggressive personalities that we so desire in our executives.

and in talking with Mr. Evans and a number of other men who have not been promoted I have failed to note any lack of personality on their part so therefore any deficiency in personality is not the reason they have been overlooked and not promoted to an Assistant SACship. There is nothing that can more acutely affect the morale of our personnel, particularly men who have been with us for five or ten years, than not to be properly recognized and given consideration when promotions are made. Few, if any, will bring to our attention the fact that they are concerned about being promoted, but the majority I fear have sought, and will continue to seek, employment outside of the Bureau where they will have given to them proper recognition for advancement.

I cannot express too strongly my complete dissatisfaction with the gross lack of any system in handling these promotions. My fears also extend to promotions of persons in other grades and other positions. Unless there can be an immediate correction of this situation I will have to remove from Mr. Mohr's supervision the handling of these matters and try to set up in my office a procedure for making recommendations for promotions. It doesn't properly belong in my office but I am no longer going to delay effecting a correction of this situation.



Having filed an application for a position as Special Agent in the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, I hereby agree that in the event of an appointment I will be governed by the following conditions:

4. 5. That the confidential character of the relations of the employees of the Federal Bureau of Investigation with the public is fully understood by me, and that the strictly confidential character of any and all information secured by me, in connection directly or indirectly with my work as a Special Agent, or the work of other employees of which I may become cognizant, is fully understood by me, and that neither during my tenure of service with the Federal Bureau of Investigation nor at any other time will I violate this confidence, and I agree that I will not divulge any information of any kind or character whatsoever that may become known to me, to persons not officially entitled thereto.

I further agree that nothing connected with this certification is to be construed by me as an assurance that an appointment will be tendered me; that I fully understand all of the foregoing and that the conditions specified herein are agreeable to me; that if appointed I will abide by the foregoing conditions, and I am fully cognizant that the provisions mentioned above are to be complied with and they are to be regarded as a part of my appointment if it is subsequently tendered to me and accepted.





Applicant, Courtney A. Evans, resides at 14022 LaSalle Boulevard, Detroit, Michigan. He was born November 12, 1914, in Wright County, Missouri, is married and has one child, three months old. His wife is native-born and her maiden name was Betty Ulrich. His father is in the Engineering Department of the Fisher Body Corporation and is native-born. His mother is native-born and her maiden name was Frances Gregory. She teaches school in St. Clair County, Michigan. Applicant has one brother who works on a ferry boat in St. Clair County. He has no relatives in Federal service and none in foreign countries. He has no subversive connections. With regard to the various un-American isms he thinks that there must be a line drawn between free speech and license.

Applicant graduated from Highland Park High School in 1932. He then went to the Highland Park Junior College for one year and a half and then to the University of Michigan two years, receiving about average grades. He then went to the Detroit College of Law for four years, receiving a LL.B. degree in 1940. His grades were good in the Detroit College of Law. He took the State Bar examination in September and had not learned his grade at the time of the interview.

Applicant's employment history includes work for the Fisher Body Corporation from June, 1935, to September, 1935; Consolidated Coal Company from September, 1935, to March, 1936; Fisher Body Corporation again from March, 1936, to September, 1937; Crane Company from September, 1937, to April, 1938, and with the City of Detroit Comptroller's office from July, 1938, to the present, where he is senior technical clerk in accounting. He has taken one course in accounting in Ann Arbor and sat in on a couple of courses in Wayne University while in law school. He has passed the Detroit Civil Service examination in accounting and presently his salary is \$1980.00 per year.



Humbly recognizing the responsibilities entrusted to me, I do vow that I shall always consider the high calling of law enforcement to be an honorable profession, the duties of which are recognized by me as both an art and a science. I recognize fully my responsibilities to defend the right, to protect the weak, to aid the distressed, and to uphold the law in public duty and in private living. I accept the obligation in connection with my assignments to report facts and to testify without bias or display of emotion, and to consider the information, coming to my knowledge by virtue of my position as a sacred trust, to be used solely for official purposes. To the responsibilities entrusted to me of seeking to prevent crime, of finding the facts of law violations and of apprehending fugitives and criminals, I shall give my loyal and faithful attention and shall always be equally alert in striving to acquit the innocent and to convict the guilty. In the performance of my duties and assignments, I shall not engage in unlawful and unethical practices but shall perform the functions of my office without fear, without favor, and without prejudice. At no time shall I disclose to an unauthorized person any fact, testimony, or information in any pending matter coming to my official knowledge which may be calculated to prejudice the minds of existing or prospective judicial bodies either to favor or to disfavor any person or issue. While occupying the status of a law enforcement officer or at any other time subsequent thereto, I shall not seek to benefit personally because of my knowledge of any confidential matter which has come to my attention. I am aware of the serious responsibilities of my office and in the performance of my duties I shall, as a minister, seek to supply comfort, advice and aid to those who may be in need of such benefits; as a soldier, I shall wage vigorous warfare against the enemies of my country, of its laws, and of its principles; and as a physician, I shall seek to eliminate the criminal parasite which preys upon our social order and to strengthen the lawful processes of our body politic. I shall strive to be both a teacher and a pupil in the art and science of law enforcement. As a lawyer, I shall acquire due knowledge of the laws of my domain and seek to preserve and maintain the majesty and dignity of the law; as a scientist, it will be my endeavor to learn all pertinent truth about accusations and complaints which come to my lawful knowledge; as an artist, I shall seek to use my skill for the purpose of making each assignment a masterpiece; as a neighbor, I shall bear an attitude of true friendship and courteous respect to all citizens; and as an officer, I shall always be loyal to my duty, my organization, and my country. I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same, and will constantly strive to cooperate with and promote cooperation between all regularly constituted law enforcement agencies and officers in the performance of duties of mutual interest and obligation.

The duties thus imposed upon this Bureau constitute a vital function in the national defense program of this country.

Courtney Allen Evans is a trained Special Agent and has been continuously employed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation since December 9, 1940. He cannot be replaced satisfactorily because of the shortage of persons with his qualifications and experience in such activity, and his removal for induction would cause material loss of effectiveness in the conduct of the national defense work of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS: Applicant was born November 16, 1914, at St. Louis, Missouri. He attended Highland Park High School from 1923 to 1932, entering from Hutchison Intermediate School of Detroit. He made a "B" average at Highland Park and [redacted] advises that applicant graduated with honors and also participated in extra-curricular activities. He attended Highland Park Junior College from January 1932 until June of 1933, making a "B" average. He then entered the University of Michigan in 1933 and withdrew in June of 1935. He made a "C" average but records show that he was placed on probation in June of 1935 because of two low marks. He served as one of the editors of the "Michigan Daily," a University of Michigan publication. He received an LL.B. degree from the Detroit College of Law after attending that institution from 1936 until 1940. His grades there were above average and he is highly recommended. Employment favorable except the Crane Company where applicant was let go when the force was reduced in April 1938, which action followed and possibly was connected with an alleged remark of applicant to the effect that "he did not want to kill himself working for a big organization." References recommend him highly. Neighborhood investigation good. Applicant was successful in passing the recent Michigan State Bar Examination given in September. Credit record at Detroit good and none found in Ann Arbor. No criminal record located in Ann Arbor or Detroit.

DETAILS: AT DETROIT, MICHIGAN

EDUCATION

[redacted] the attendance department of Highland Park High School advised that her record disclosed that applicant entered the Highland Park High School in 1928 as a 9-B student. She said that he graduated in 1931 and later attended the Highland Park Junior College where he accumulated 47 college hours. She explained that he needed 56 college hours to graduate from the Highland Park Junior College but he transferred to the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan, before completing his Junior College work.

[redacted] employee of the Highland Park High School, made available to Agent records which disclosed that applicant entered Highland Park High School September 5, 1928 and was there four years. She said that his present address, or the last address that she had, was 14022 LaSalle, and that he was born November 12, 1914. She said that he averaged "B" and that he took part in dramatics, worked on the school paper and was active in debating and public speaking.

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[redacted] the Highland Park High School, stated that he knew applicant and that applicant graduated with honors from the Highland Park High School. He produced the 1932 "Polar Bear," the school annual, which made the following remarks concerning applicant:

"Spectator Proof-Reader - 1931 and 1932.
Polar Bear, Junior High Editor - 1931.
All School Comedy - 1931.
Debating - 1930-31-32.
Cross-Country - 1930
Forum Club - 1929 and 1930-31-32."

[redacted] advised that at no time did applicant indicate subversive tendencies and said it was his opinion that applicant was a good, patriotic American. He said that applicant was mild mannered and cooperative and that he was reasonably neat in appearance. He said that because of his small stature he could not picture applicant as a police officer. He added, however, that it was his opinion that applicant would be successful in anything he undertook. He qualified his remarks by saying that he had not seen applicant for at least eight years.

[redacted] employee of the office of the Highland Park Junior College, advised that her files showed that applicant entered the Junior College in February of 1932 and withdrew in June of 1933. She said that the records show that applicant made a "B minus" average in his grades and that on June 1, 1933 a transcript of his record was sent to the University of Michigan, which indicated that applicant planned to attend that institution.

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[redacted] the Highland Park Junior College, advised that applicant attended the Junior College for four semesters. He said that the records show he made almost a "B" grade and that he could have graduated from Highland Park High School in January of 1932 but preferred to wait until June of 1932. He said that applicant's record there was very good and that during one semester he had a perfect attendance. He added that applicant, in his opinion, was 100 per cent American in his views, that he had a fine enthusiasm for his work and displayed tendencies which indicated that he would not give up. He added that applicant debated some but was not on the Varsity team of the Junior College.

AT ANN ARBOR, MICHIGAN

[redacted] the University of Michigan, made available to Agent records which disclosed that applicant entered the University of Michigan in September of 1933. The records showed that he was born November 12, 1914, and that he was accredited with 38 college hours and 38 college

points. It will be noted that there is a slight discrepancy between the reported hours and points attained at the Junior College and that as recorded and credited to applicant by records at the University of Michigan. During the 1933-34 semesters applicant made a "C plus" average and in September of 1934 it was noted that he entered the field of Economics as the subject on which he desired to concentrate. During the 1934-35 term applicant made nine "C's" and three "D's." As a result of the three "D's" a notation of probation appeared on the record for June of 1935. It will be noted that applicant's address was said to be 210 Highland Avenue, Highland Park, Michigan, and that the name of his father was given as CHARLES W. EWINS.

[redacted] the Alumni Catalog Office of the University of Michigan revealed records of her organization which showed that applicant was born November 12, 1914 at St. Louis, Missouri. The files indicated that applicant's father is an accountant and that his address, as well as that of applicant, was said to be 210 Highland Avenue, Highland Park, Michigan.

The Alumni records showed further that applicant requested that a transcript of his work be sent to the Detroit College of Law August 24, 1936.

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The Michiganensian, the University of Michigan Annual, revealed that applicant was one of the night editors of the "Michigan Daily," a University publication.

NEIGHBORHOOD AT ANN ARBOR, MICHIGAN

[redacted] advised that applicant resided in her home for approximately two and one-half years. She explained that it was her opinion that applicant was in her home about 1933 and 1934, but she could not be exact as to the dates. [redacted] advised that it was her belief that applicant is "a lovely boy" and she added that she could not say enough for him. She said applicant is nice looking, made a nice

appearance, dressed neatly, and that he was well liked by the boys of the college. She added that he at no time used any "rough language" and that he paid his bills promptly. She did not think applicant drank and she believed he was single. [redacted] advised that at no time did applicant display un-American tendencies. She concluded by saying that she had never had anyone in her home nicer than the applicant and she definitely would recommend him.

[redacted] who also resides at [redacted] [redacted] told Agent that applicant was smart, polite, and that she thought he had studied journalism while at the University. She explained that he worked for the school paper in some capacity.

MISCELLANEOUS

[redacted] of the Ann Arbor Credit Bureau, 701-3 Wolverine Building, 202 East Washington Street, Ann Arbor, advised that her files contained no credit record on applicant.

Sergeant [redacted] of the Ann Arbor Police Department, after a check was made, advised that there was no criminal record on applicant in the files of his organization.

Officers [redacted] and [redacted] of the Washtenaw Sheriff's Office, advised that they were unable to find a criminal record on applicant in their files.

AT DETROIT, MICHIGAN

[redacted] the Detroit College of Law advised that applicant attained an LL.B. degree from the institution with which he is connected. He disclosed records on applicant which showed that applicant attended the College from September 14, 1936 to June 18, 1940. His marks were fairly good and the records showed that he won distinction at the College.

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Under remarks in the records the following was noted:

"June 27, 1940 - won trial practice award
of Detroit Legal News.

June, 1940, - average grade 2.82,
3rd in a class of 29.

July, 1940, -certified to take bar
examination."

The records also disclosed the following data on prior attainments (educational) of applicant:

"Highland Park High School, University of Michigan, presented 102 semester hours credit from the College of Literary Science and Arts of the University of Michigan. Entered on 38 semester hours advanced standing from Highland Park Junior College."

Applicant was a member of the evening class at the College of Law and was born November 12, 1914, at St. Louis, Missouri.

[redacted] advised that he had instructed applicant and he considered him a very fine boy. He said that applicant possessed a good mind and was in his opinion a superior student. He went on to say that applicant was a very fine-looking chap and had a polished manner. He advised that applicant passed the Michigan Bar Examination given this fall. He concluded by saying that he thought applicant was a superior kind of young man, that he could talk with any type of individual, that he had noted no un-American tendencies in applicant, and further that he would recommend him.

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[redacted] Detroit College of Law, stated that he had taught applicant and that he considered him a first-class student. He said that applicant was in the upper fifteen per cent of his class and that, in addition to his being very neat, he was very much of a gentleman. He also said

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that applicant made a nice appearance, possessed the ability to meet and mingle with people, and had never given the school any trouble whatsoever. He stated that he considered applicant a good citizen and concluded by stating that he knew of no un-American tendencies on the part of applicant.

EMPLOYMENT

[redacted] of the Fisher Employment Office, Fisher Plant, Piquette and St. Antoine, Detroit, Michigan, advised that applicant worked for the Fisher Company as typist from March 13, 1936 until September 23, 1937. He said that applicant was paid 60 cents per hour for eight months and then was raised to 65 cents an hour, later to 85 cents an hour, and then reduced to 75 cents per hour. [redacted] explained that applicant averaged approximately \$125 per month while employed as typist with his organization.

[redacted] stated further that it was noted in his record that applicant was laid off because of "no work." He explained that it was his opinion that applicant either went back to school or took up some other occupation. He explained that applicant worked three days in the plant of the Fisher Body Plant, from September 27, 1937 to September 30, 1937. He said this work paid 75 cents an hour and was obviously connected with the aforementioned 75 cents an hour applicant is said to have received while with the Company.

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Records show that applicant had been connected with the Fisher Body Company in 1935 as clerk. He said applicant worked for \$120 per month, or approximately that, from June 13, 1935 until September 15, 1935.

[redacted] said he knew applicant personally and that he considered him as an individual of excellent character. He thought applicant was a high school graduate and had had four years work at the University of Michigan. He explained that it was his opinion that applicant left because he found better prospects. He classed applicant as a very fine chap, a good mixer, a thorough gentleman, and one whose ethics and morals are above reproach. He stated that he worked with applicant and that at no time did he observe any indications that might cause

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him to believe that applicant was un-American in his views. [redacted] stated that applicant had a "nice approach," that he thought he could keep a confidence, and further that he would trust him. He concluded by saying that he would recommend applicant highly and that he could use a man like that for a son-in-law.

[redacted] of the Consolidation Coal Company, 2432 Buhl Building, said that applicant was employed as a clerk by that company from September 30, 1935 until March 17, 1936. He said that applicant received \$95 a month for his services and that he worked as a clerk on the order desk doing typing. [redacted] said that the job was one at which "you couldn't expect a boy like that stay." He thought applicant left of his own accord to teach at Wayne University. He concluded by saying that he found no fault with applicant's work and that it was his opinion that applicant was perfectly honest and honorable.

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[redacted] who has charge of the personnel of the Crane Company, advised that applicant was employed by his organization from October 18, 1937 until April 15, 1938. He said that he was not connected with the Detroit Office of the firm at the time applicant was but that his records show that applicant started at a salary of \$115 per month and was given an increase to \$125 shortly before he left. He said his records showed no reason for applicant's release on the 15th of April, 1938. It was also disclosed that applicant was twenty-three years of age in 1937 and was a graduate of the University of Michigan.

[redacted] stated that applicant was employed as a claim clerk. He pointed out that applicant had no previous experience with the organization prior to his position as claim clerk and in reality he should have had at least two years' experience before being assigned the difficult job he held. He added, "I wouldn't put a man in that job unless he had at least two years' experience."

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[redacted] the Crane Company, advised that she was personally acquainted with applicant and that she considered him a quiet and pleasant person. She said that he was a good worker but was slow. She added that the work he was assigned was very difficult. She advised that applicant's Social Security Number was 374-07-3047 and she thought he had been connected with the McGregory Library, a reporter on the University of Michigan college paper, and had worked for the Fisher Body Corporation before he came to the Crane organization. She said that at no time did he have any trouble and that he was always clean and neat.

[redacted] said that because applicant smoked a pipe, and because he sat and thought for some time on different occasions, he was referred to as "Sherlock Holmes" by members of the Crane Company. She advised further that applicant requested that he be given a raise and received it about two months before he left. [redacted] concluded by saying that she thought applicant had no bad habits, that his ethics and morals were good, and that she had observed nothing unusual about applicant relative to his being un-American in his views.

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[redacted] the Crane Company, stated that applicant was "let go" when the Company deemed it necessary to cut the force. When questioned as to why applicant would be let go shortly after he was given a raise, [redacted] [redacted] said he thought it might have a bearing on a prior remark allegedly made by applicant to a Company auditor. The statement was to the effect that he, applicant, was of the opinion that "you shouldn't kill yourself working for a big organization--put in a day's work and that's all."

[redacted] said that applicant made a good appearance, that he was neat and well equipped to handle accounting work as he did that well, such as his job with the Crane Company. He explained that he knew of no bad habits of applicant and he

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did not think he was the type of person who would be un-American in his views. He added, however, that he thought the applicant possessed a tendency not to exert himself and was somewhat slow.

[redacted] the Survey and Systems Bureau, City Comptroller's Office, Detroit, Michigan, advised that applicant became an employee of the Bureau July 15, 1938, as a Junior Technical Clerk on a per-diem basis of six dollars a day, five days a week. He said that on September 5, 1939, applicant was promoted to the position of Senior Technical Clerk, which job he now holds at the rate of \$1980 per year compensation.

[redacted] stated that applicant was a very fine-appearing person and very tactful. He said that of late applicant has been supervising the work of three or four men in the Civil Service Department of the City's set-up and that he thinks he is very capable. He said that applicant possesses a good education and has recently passed the State Bar Examination. He went on to say that applicant can meet people well and that he dresses quite conservatively. He said that he is modest and appealing to the public. [redacted] also advised that he considers applicant's morals to be very good and it is his opinion that applicant possesses no un-American tendencies. He stated that applicant's health was good, that he thought he could keep a confidence, that he could be trusted, and that he would recommend him.

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[redacted] said that he thought applicant would advance in the work he is now doing and that he understands applicant has taken an examination as a Junior Accountant and has passed the written examination but, reportedly because of lack of experience, has not passed the oral examination. This examination referred to above, [redacted] explained, is one given by the City of Detroit's Civil Service Department.

[redacted] of the McGregory Library, 12244 Woodward Avenue, advised that applicant worked there as a page and did other odd jobs about the building a number of years ago. She

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said she thought it was about five years ago but that her records would not disclose the exact dates of employment. She advised that pages received 20 cents an hour for their work and she thought applicant gave up his job there because his school work became too heavy. She said that at the time applicant was there he was quite young but he was a faithful and good worker. She added that from what she knew about applicant she would recommend him.

REFERENCES

Mr. R. McANULTY, 152 E. Buena Vista, Highland Park, Michigan, informed Agent that he has known applicant for about fifteen years. He explained that he, McANULTY, is a member of the Boy Scout Highland Park Committee, or has been a member of that Committee, and that he knew applicant thoroughly because of his connections with the aforementioned organization. He said that applicant went through the Boy Scout Troop and that he chummed with McANULTY's son. According to Mr. McANULTY applicant is upstanding, a good mixer, possesses a nice personality, has no bad habits, can be trusted, can keep a confidence, and displays no traits which might lead one to believe that he was un-American in his views. Mr. McANULTY advised that applicant put himself through school. He also said applicant could drive a car and he believed applicant's mother has been, or is, a teacher at Harsen's Island across from Algonac, and that his father is employed by Fisher Body. It will be noted that Harsen's Island is situated not far from Algonac, Michigan, in Lake St. Clair.

[redacted] Traffic Representative of the American Express Company, 1227 Washington Boulevard, Detroit, advised that he has known applicant for nine or ten years and that he met him when he and applicant were attending Highland Park High School together. He said he also knows applicant's father-in-law, one OTTO E. ULRICH. [redacted] advised that he thought applicant made an excellent appearance and was very smart and intelligent. He said that applicant dresses well, that he can meet people, and that he possesses the ability to mix with different types of individuals.

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[redacted] said that when applicant was young he was very quiet but as a result of experience he has become more talkative. [redacted] advised that applicant and his wife became the parents of a girl last July. He stated that he thought applicant was honest, that he could be trusted, and that he considered him to be an "A-1" man and he would recommend him highly. He added that he knew nothing about applicant or applicant's family that was to their discredit. He advised that applicant's father-in-law is well fixed financially. He said that applicant "gets along well with his father-in-law now, and although his wife's people did not approve of applicant at first they are now highly in favor of him." He said he thought applicant and applicant's wife were married by [redacted] (phonetic) of the Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church.

[redacted] of the Detroit Trust Company, advised that he knew applicant and that he thought applicant made a good appearance and although not striking looking was always neat. He said that applicant wears glasses and apparently is quite conservative. He advised further that he has been very favorably impressed by applicant and he thinks he is a sound thinker and a hard worker. He said he thought applicant put himself through school and that he recently passed the Bar Examination. He also stated that applicant started work on a C.P.A. Certificate but later switched to law.

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[redacted] said he was well acquainted with applicant's father-in-law, a Mr. ULRICH, whose office is located at 2842 West Grand Boulevard, Detroit. He said Mr. ULRICH was in the machine tool business and that he is well fixed financially. [redacted] advised further that he would recommend applicant and that he considered applicant's ethics and morals excellent. He said he would trust him and he didn't think applicant possessed any un-American views. He explained that he did not think applicant's financial status was good because of numerous expenses. However, he said that he did not think applicant owed anything but he knew applicant's father had sided him, especially when the baby came. He said, also, that applicant received a \$50 check from his father-in-law for passing the State Bar Examination.

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[redacted] concluded by saying that he had met applicant only through the latter's father-in-law, but that he had talked to him and as a result of these conversations he considered applicant a fine student and a hard worker. He said that applicant impressed him very favorably.

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[redacted]
[redacted] Detroit, advised that he had known applicant since December, 1935. He explained that he attended Mrs. EVANS, applicant's wife, during the past summer when her baby was born. [redacted] described applicant as being somewhat short but nice. He said that applicant was clean and neat and that he had put himself through Law School. The doctor said that he knew applicant finished Law School in June and took the Michigan State Bar Examination recently.

He went on to say that applicant possesses a pleasing personality, makes a favorable impression on any class of individuals, and that he can meet people easily. He stated that he did not know a great deal about applicant's morals but he did know that applicant took care of his doctor bill and as a result of his diligence in this matter he thought applicant was honest. [redacted] stated that applicant was in good physical condition and said he was hard working and that he admired him. He continued by saying that it was his opinion that applicant and applicant's wife did not drink and that he knew they had stopped associating with a young couple who did. According to [redacted] applicant's wife was BETTY ULRICH prior to her marriage. He said she worked for three or three and one-half years for the R. L. Polk Company, Directory Publishers, Detroit.

[redacted] concluded by saying that he thought applicant was outstanding and a very likeable person. He said that applicant's only drawback would be his short stature. [redacted] advised that his records showed applicant's residential addresses in Detroit for the past five years. This data is being set out in detail under "NEIGHBORHOOD INVESTIGATION" of this report.

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[redacted]
[redacted] Highland Park, told Agent that applicant had been a classmate of his son, [redacted] who is now connected with the Wage and Hour Council, Washington, D.C. He said that as a result of this relationship of applicant with his son he has known applicant for eight or ten years. He said that applicant makes a nice appearance, is neat, very quiet, and possesses no traits of personality which "grate." He stated that applicant is a little shy--maybe too shy. He explained however, that he thought applicant could talk with different types of people and he pointed out that applicant had distinguished himself as a law student, having graduated from the Detroit College of Law with honors, and he stated, also, that applicant recently passed the Michigan State Bar Examination.

[redacted] advised that he was impressed by applicant's exceptionally high ethics. He advised that applicant's father-in-law did not approve of applicant's relationship with his daughter at first but he now approves of their marriage. He said that he knew applicant could drive a car and that he was outwardly normal and healthy. He said that he did not know all of applicant's hobbies but he knew he did like ping-pong and had been active in debating and was very good in the latter. [redacted] said that from what he knew of applicant he would recommend him for even the most important job, if that job was one having to do with applicant's qualifications and experience.

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He said that he knew of no trouble applicant had been involved in and it was his opinion that there was nothing in applicant's record or that of his family which might ever embarrass an employer in the future. He said also that applicant is of solid, conservative stock and has no un-American tendencies. [redacted] said that applicant's wife was employed in some office prior to the baby's birth.

[redacted] stated that applicant was involved as plaintiff in a civil legal action about the first of the year 1940. This lawsuit, [redacted] explained, resulted from an automobile accident occurring on or about the 16th of December 1933 in Highland Park.

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No criminal action resulted involving either the plaintiff or the defendant. [redacted] said that he recalled that applicant was driving a car in which some school girls and boys were riding. He said that two of the young people were hurt and as a result the action was brought but a settlement was reached although he did not remember the exact amount of the settlement. He thought it was a few hundred dollars. The defendant in the action, according to [redacted], was one [redacted] [redacted] thought applicant was accompanied by BETTY HURLOW, now his wife, [redacted] [redacted] (phonetic). He classed it as an automobile suit resulting from an unavoidable accident. He gave the number of the case as being 185478 and stated that the action was brought in the Circuit Court of Wayne County, Michigan.

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MISCELLANEOUS

[redacted] of the Basement Records Bureau, Wayne County Courthouse, Detroit, Michigan, made available to Agent the Court File on Circuit Court Case Number 185478. The case was styled "CONSTANCE EVANS versus GEORGE KAPPEL" and the word "suppressed" appeared stamped on the file. It was noted that the records of the file showed that applicant was born November 11, 1914, at St. Louis, Missouri. A petition was contained among the records requesting that applicant's father, CHARLES W. EVANS, 210 Highland Avenue, Highland Park, Michigan, be named as "next friend" due to the fact that applicant at the time was an infant. The case officially was marked: "CONSTANCE EVANS, an infant, CHARLES W. EVANS his 'next friend', versus GEORGE KAPPEL." BILMAN and COHEN were the attorneys for the plaintiff and STEWENS T. MASON was the attorney for the defendant. However, R. BRONLEY HUNT, 203 1/2 National Bank Building, Detroit, acted for the aforementioned STEWENS T. MASON.

The plaintiff in the action alleged that on or about December 16, 1933, at approximately 1:30 a.m., an automobile accident occurred at the intersection of Woodward Avenue and Strathcona Drive. At the time applicant was reported to be driving a Pontiac automobile and the defendant was operating a Ford. The bill charged the defendant with reckless driving and averred that as a result of his carelessness the

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applicant was thrown from the machine he was operating and was rendered unconscious. The defendant's address at the time was said to be 61 Grove Street, Highland Park. It was disclosed further that the case was settled. The records showed a judgment in open court in the sum of \$150 and costs for plaintiff. The date of the document indicating the settlement was January 23, 1935.

[redacted] of the Detroit Field Office, was contacted and he advised that he has known the applicant for approximately eight years. He said that applicant makes a good appearance, is small in stature, and that he appears, from his face, to be younger than he really is. He advised that applicant dresses well, is married and is the father of a baby girl. He thought EVANS was employed by the Detroit Street Railway as an accountant. He pointed out that he thought applicant was qualified for a position as either an SA or an SA (A), as he had recently passed the Michigan Bar Examination and can pass an Accounting Examination. He said applicant can operate an automobile and he knows of no trouble applicant has ever had.

[redacted] thought applicant had been married about five years and added that he knew applicant's wife's parents did not approve of him (EVANS). He thought applicant occasionally took a social drink but never drank to excess. He also believed applicant was a good mixer although he was a quiet person. He said he knew of only one disadvantage concerning EVANS and that was his stature and his boyish appearance. He went on to say that he thought applicant's wife's name was MRS. ULLICH prior to her marriage and he knew she was of German descent. He said her father is quite well-to-do and did not think she was marrying into the financial and social standing of which she was capable.

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[redacted] advised that applicant was a hard worker and could be trusted. He said EVANS could keep a confidence and he believed applicant and applicant's wife to be "true blue Americans." He believed applicant could adjust himself to Bureau life. He added, however, that he did not think applicant was athletically inclined. He concluded by stating that he would recommend applicant highly on the basis of qualifications and adaptability, adding that he thought EVANS had recently passed the Michigan Bar Examination.

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[redacted] of the Michigan Bar Association, 3211 Barlum Tower, Detroit, Telephone Number Cadillac 4167, advised that her records show that applicant passed the Michigan Bar Examination given in September of 1940.

[redacted] of the Selective Service Board Number 33, 1802 Cadillac Square Building, Detroit, Telephone Number Randolph 6981, advised that applicant is registered for the Selective Draft and that his serial number is 4468. His order number is 239.

[redacted] advised that applicant's addresses during the past five years were as follows:

[redacted] whose telephone number is Townsend 7-5133, and whose apartment is managed by the Detroit Trust Company, advised that applicant has been a resident of the apartment for approximately two years. She described applicant and his wife as being "the nicest tenants I've got." She said that he made a nice appearance and seemed to be about twenty-five or twenty-six years of age. She advised that he was business-like, clean, and neat. She also informed Agent that he pays \$42.50 rent monthly and pays it promptly.

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She thought applicant could mix with any type of individual and expressed the view that he was a "perfect fellow." She knew of no un-American tendencies on the part of applicant and pointed out that no one ever came seeking applicant in connection with accounts or bills, as was the case at times with other tenants. She thought applicant associated with nice people and that he never has parties or anything unusual going on in his apartment. She stated that she would recommend him for anything.

[redacted] was contacted and he advised that he thought applicant was a little better than the rest of the tenants, adding that he was of the opinion that applicant was "worth any position he might ask for."

[redacted] advised that she had resided there since June. She said that she knew applicant and his family and that he is a very nice-appearing, clean-cut young man and possesses a pleasant personality. She thought he was able to meet people and said he was what she would call an "up and up person." She added that she knew of no bad habits applicant possesses or of any trouble he has ever had. She advised that applicant and his wife spend most of their time at home and that they were the parents of a child about four months old. She concluded by stating that she had observed no un-American tendencies on the part of applicant or his wife.

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[redacted] stated that she knew applicant and that she had resided in that apartment since early last Spring. She said that applicant was liked very much and that his family are considered nice people. She said apparently he was a "A-1" man and she thought he had a lovely wife and baby. She added that applicant stood as high as any other tenant as far as reputation was concerned and that no parties, strange visitors, or unusual noises occurred in his apartment. She thought he was honest and as much an American as anyone. She explained that she did not know him well but that from what she had observed he appeared to be an honest, straightforward man.

[redacted] advised that applicant and his wife resided in her home and occupied the upstairs apartment for approximately seven months during 1937. She said she considered applicant and his wife to be a wonderful young couple. She advised

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that she thought applicant became unemployed and that he moved, probably to the home of his parents. She said, however, that while he was living in her home he paid his rent promptly and in every respect he appeared to be a very fine gentleman. She stated that she would recommend him and added that while there he had no strange visitors and nothing unusual occurred. She said she knew of no one now living in her neighborhood who would have any knowledge of applicant.

[redacted] who is connected with a dress shop at 243 Fisher Road, Grosse Pointe, Telephone Number TWkado 2-4300, advised that she had resided at [redacted] and that applicant, for about one year, occupied the upper part of the house. She stated that she did not know the exact dates applicant resided in her home but she thought it was some time in 1936. She advised that applicant was a very fine person and that he paid his bills "right on time." She said he had no drinking parties and that nothing unusual occurred. She added, however, that he had a number of young men visitors. She said that from what she knew of him, she would recommend him. In conclusion she stated that applicant was apparently very honest, very intelligent and was always neat, in addition to being kind and thoughtful. She pointed out that applicant aided by shoveling snow and doing other such work when he had no moral obligation to do so, preferring to be useful and to assist her. No other individual in the neighborhood of [redacted] could be located who remembered applicant.

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[redacted] Superintendent of the apartment, advised that applicant resided there approximately three years ago. He said he thought applicant moved in November of 1937 after a year's stay but he was not at all certain as to the date. He explained that applicant paid his bills promptly and apparently was a clean-cut chap that caused no trouble. He said he noted no un-American tendencies and he did not think applicant drank. He advised that applicant possessed a very pleasant personality and added that he would recommend him as he thought he would make a very good man. [redacted] stated that he was of the opinion that there was one now occupying an apartment at [redacted] who would know applicant, as a considerable length of time has elapsed since EVANS resided there.

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[redacted] of the apartment at [redacted] advised that she had no knowledge of anyone by the name of WYNN having resided in the apartment house under her supervision. She stated, however, that she had been there approximately eighteen months. She advised that the Bondholders Management Incorporated, 211 West Congress, Detroit, Telephone Number Cadillac 9602, had charge of the building.

[redacted] who resides in apartment [redacted] at [redacted] stated that she had occupied the same rooms since 1931 and that she did not know anyone by the name of WYNN. She stated that her occupation was that of dressmaker and that she generally knew everyone who resided in the apartment.

[redacted] who occupy apartment [redacted] stated that they had been in their present location for approximately eight years and had no knowledge of anyone by the name of WYNN ever having resided in that apartment house.

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[redacted] of Bondholders Management Incorporated, 211 West Congress, advised that her organization had taken over the 13730 Dexter Avenue property from a Mortgage and Contract Company, 150 West Fort Street, in 1938, and her records would not disclose information as to renters prior to that date. Inasmuch as no one in the apartment could remember applicant, no further investigation is being made at that address unless advised to the contrary.

[redacted] who has charge of the records of the Wardell Management Company, 15 East Kirby, Madison 9500, advised that his organization rents apartments at the 210 Highland Avenue, Highland Park, address and that he is personally acquainted with the applicant. It is his opinion that applicant and applicant's wife reside with applicant's parents at 210 Highland Avenue, Highland Park, Apartment B-3. He stated that applicant did not rent directly from the Wardell Management Company but applicant's father rented from that Company. He explained that as a result he would have no knowledge of the dates applicant occupied the 210 Highland Avenue apartment.

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He stated, however, that at no time while applicant or applicant's parents occupied the apartment was a complaint registered. He said that it was his opinion that applicant and his family were very fine people. No one at 210 Highland Avenue could be located who remembered applicant.

CREDIT RATING

[redacted] Merchants Credit Bureau, 18th Floor, United Artists Building, Detroit, Michigan, advised that her records showed that applicant and applicant's wife, BETTY, were on her files as individuals who seek a little credit. She said there was nothing derogatory concerning applicant. Her records also indicated that he went to the University of Michigan and that he was employed by the Fisher Body Accounting Department. She said his bank was the Manufacturers National, Main Branch.

CRIMINAL RECORD

[redacted] of the Wayne County Identification Bureau advised that he could locate no record on applicant among the files of his organization.

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[redacted] of the City Bureau of Records stated, after a check was made, that he could find no data on applicant in the files of his Office.

Detective [redacted] of the Bureau of Identification, Fingerprint Department, Detective Division, reported that he could find no record on applicant among the files of his Office.

At the request of Mr. K. W. FIPER of the Bureau, a telephonic inquiry was made of the Roseville Police Department by Special Agent [redacted] concerning the possibility of applicant having a criminal record with the aforementioned Department. Patrolman [redacted] advised that the records of the Roseville Police Department were checked under applicant's name, and all possible combinations of the same, and no record could be located.

(Detroit File 67-1655)

It will be noted that following the inquiry by Mr. W. N. PIPER concerning the possibility of a criminal record on applicant at Roseville, [redacted] the Detroit Field Office, reported in a memorandum for the Special Agent in Charge that applicant and applicant's wife, then his girl friend, were involved in a rather serious motor accident a few years ago. [redacted] suggested that [redacted] Attorney, mentioned before in this report as a reference, was Counsel for the applicant and that he might be able to shed light on the matter in question. Thereupon, Attorney [redacted] was contacted concerning the motor accident and related the information set out above in this report pertaining to same.

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[redacted] did not tell Agent of the accident while being interviewed as a reference and made no mention of any legal action concerning applicant, but he willingly told of the lawsuit when he was re-contacted.

REMARKS

At the conclusion of his training on January 25, 1941, Mr. Nathan stated the reports were that he is intelligent, conscientious, and average. Mr. Nathan stated that he thought he was better than average and that he was resourceful. He was assigned to the Richmond Office on January 25, 1941.

On March 5, 1941, SAC Hennrich stated that this agent presented a satisfactory appearance; dressed neatly; was enthusiastic toward his work and possessed a good knowledge of his duties; that his rough draft had required an average amount of supervision and that his dictation had been satisfactory; that he had been engaged on surveillances and that his work had been entirely satisfactory and that he was of the opinion that this agent's chances of developing into a good agent were average.

On January 22, 1941, this agent was advised that the board of examining physicians had stated that he had a possible pilonidal fistulae and that while the condition was not disabling it should be investigated and operated on in the near future.

On April 5, 1941, this agent advised that his private physician had informed him that the probable fistulae was merely one of inconvenience and that it did not impair his physical condition but should be removed. That the necessary operation might be performed at the convenience of the patient and would require an absence from work of three to four weeks and that he desired that the matter be continued until such time as he had become more firmly established in the Bureau before having to ask for a leave of this duration.







It is observed that during the course of the recent inspection of the New York Field Office, you made a grade of 84 on the Manual of Instructions.







SPECIAL AGENTS

This position has been designated as a key position by the Review Committee of the War Manpower Commission.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has been designated as the sole civilian government investigative agency having jurisdiction over the investigation of matters pertaining to national defense such as espionage, sabotage, registration of agents of foreign principals, sedition, treason, and the like, and further, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has sole investigative jurisdiction in a great number of other Federal statutes which embrace bank robbery, kidnaping, extortion, white slave traffic, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, and numerous others. The investigative work in connection with the above violations is performed by the Special Agent personnel of this Bureau, who are recruited from applicants between the ages of twenty-three and forty. They must be graduates of a law school or an accounting school with the necessary accounting experience, or graduates of a university with extensive investigative experience, or with linguistic qualifications, or have basic educational training and possess satisfactory prior law enforcement experience which will enable them to satisfactorily perform the duties imposed upon them. For certain of the scientific investigative work, Special Agents are secured who primarily are qualified in the sciences, such as ballistics, chemical analysis, spectography, cryptography, mineralogy, metallography, toxicology, and other like sciences. Applicants for appointment to the position of Special Agent must meet the physical standards and requirements for this position, which are exceedingly high. They must have vision of no less than 20/40 in one eye, 20/50 uncorrected, both eyes to be corrected to 20/20. They must have no color deficiency whatever.

Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation undergo a rigorous training program. All newly appointed Special Agents in the Federal Bureau of Investigation attend training classes for a period of sixteen weeks; the hours of training are from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily, which course of study is equivalent to two full years of college study. During this period of training, they are thoroughly instructed in the basic rules and regulations and jurisdictions of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. They must satisfactorily pass numerous written examinations during their period of training. If a trainee fails to pass any of these examinations, he is dropped from the school.

The duties of a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation are most arduous. They must be available at a moment's notice to go to any part of the United States or to any assignment outside the United States. The hours of duty for these employees are such that they must be in excellent physical health. The average work week for a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation is no less than seventy hours. The work of a Special Agent, regardless of his particular qualification, is such that he cannot lead a sedentary or well regulated life. Due to the small number of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation presently handling the work under the jurisdiction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation within and without the continental United States, it is necessary that the entire staff be highly mobile.

Special Agents are required to be able to conduct investigations in more than 100 types of cases, including espionage, sabotage, subversive activities, frauds against the government, kidnaping, extortion, bank robbery, White Slave

Traffic Act, etc. They are trained in and required to maintain constant skill in the use of highly technical equipment, technical processes, such as those necessary for the development of latent fingerprints, concealed or obliterated numbers upon firearms, to understand the use of code messages, to conduct physical surveillances of subjects of espionage and similar cases, sometimes for periods of many months, and when necessary, to assume a necessary character to enable them to fit in an undercover capacity into the activities and operations of groups such as foreign agents, who are engaged in thwarting the war effort.

The arduousness and importance of the work of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was readily recognized by the military and naval leaders. The Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, for the Secretary of the Navy, requested Special Agent employees of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to submit their resignations from reserve commissions held by them in the naval services because it had been determined that those Special Agents could better serve their country in their present assignments than if they were to be called into active naval service. The Secretary of War, in 1942, addressed personal communications to 168 Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who at that time held reserve commissions in the Army. The Secretary of War at that time advised the Special Agents that their employment in the FBI is of such vital importance to the national defense as to necessitate their remaining at their posts of duty despite the fact that they held reserve commissions in the United States Army, and the request was made that these Agents, through the proper channels, submit their resignations from their commissions.

General Lewis B. Hershey of the Selective Service System pointed out in his Directive to all Local Boards of December 29, 1941, that Special Agent positions of the FBI were most important and essential to the national health, safety, and interests, and that the national defense functions of the FBI should not be impaired by the removal of trained personnel from critical positions in the Bureau.

The position of Special Agent has always been considered the most critical of all positions in the FBI, since, with the tremendous bulk of work placed upon us due to the war emergency, it is essential that a trained qualified staff be available for the handling of this work. If the Federal Bureau of Investigation cannot continue to retain its personnel in this critical position, aid and comfort would most certainly be given to the enemy and others whose interests are inimical to the best interests of the country today. Up to the present time the full complement of Special Agent personnel has not been secured and every effort is being made to secure the necessary additional Special Agent personnel.



He has testified once in District Court, twice before Grand Juries and once before an Alien Enemy Hearing Board. He makes a good appearance and has a pleasant personality. He is intelligent and alert, sincere and interesting. He evidences enthusiasm toward his work. He needs more general criminal investigations to round out his experience. In my opinion he has supervisory possibilities.



SPECIMEN SPEECH MANUSCRIPT
Special Agent COURTNEY ALLEN EVANS

On behalf of Mr. John Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, I wish to express my gratitude and pleasure at being with you today. It is particularly fitting that, in these times when the very existence of our nation is at stake, we gather to discuss law enforcement. With a moment's thought, it is readily apparent that the preeminent position in the world to which this country has advanced has been due, not only to the democratic framework of the government, but also to the manner in which the laws passed by the people's representatives have been enforced. The FBI is proud of the part that it has played in law enforcement. As Mr. Hoover's representative, I am happy to bring you the story of a portion of the FBI's work in this vital field.

You will recall that on September 6, 1939, the President of the United States appointed the FBI as the coordinating agency for the investigation of national defense matters, including espionage, sabotage, and internal security cases. The responsibility, and it was a great responsibility, was accepted by J. Edgar Hoover and the Bureau he directs, with a realization of the seriousness of the situation then facing the United States. Had the spy, the saboteur, the propagandist been allowed unhindered opportunity to work his deadly art, the fortunes of this country might have been far different than they are today.

A brief history of the FBI will give you some idea of the years of work and toil that made the Bureau ready to accept the responsibility given it by the President in 1939. Founded originally in 1908 as the

investigative agency for the Department of Justice, the FBI really did not begin to become the unique law enforcement body it is today until the appointment of Mr. Hoover as director in 1924. Mr. Hoover realized that a large duty in the field of law enforcement was owed the American public, and that this duty could be performed efficiently and thoroughly only by an organization that was divorced from politics. Strict educational and personal standards were set up for all personnel. Special agents of the FBI were required, as they are today, to be trained in law or accountancy, to be of excellent moral character, to be of good physical condition. A new agent, first coming into the Bureau, is given a vigorous and thorough training in the science of crime detection. Congress appropriated money with which a fine FBI training academy has been constructed on the Marine Base at Quantico, Virginia. Today, as a result of these facilities and training, more than 4,500 special agents are stationed in one of the 57 field offices of the FBI, located in various strategic points. Offices are maintained not only on the continental limits of the United States, but also in Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico.

One of the facilities of the Bureau which is available, not only to aid its own special agents, but also all other law enforcement agencies, is the FBI laboratory. This technical laboratory, which brings to crime detection all the facilities of the natural sciences, was founded by Mr. Hoover in 1932. Without going into the realm of scientific terminology that describes the work of this division of the FBI, it will suffice to say that qualified specialists in the various natural sciences are working in this laboratory in Washington with the aid of the latest in scientific

equipment. Having worked with these scientists for a number of years, I am still amazed at the results they are able to achieve. They can take a bullet that has been fired, or the shell casing from which it was fired, and tell you without any reservation whatsoever, whether or not it was fired from a particular gun. Equally astonishing are their identifications of minute portions of matter through the spectographic examination. Your local chief of police or sheriff can have the services of these experts at any time he feels their efforts would be of value in the solution of a crime under his investigation.

Another portion of the FBI'S activity which is centered in the nation's capital is the FBI National Police Academy. Students of this academy are made up of local law enforcement officers from the entire United States. The purpose of the NPA, as the academy is commonly known among police officers, is to train officers of local police departments in the scientific methods of crime detection. The first session of the NPA began July 29, 1925 and today there are 778 graduates who have had the benefit of this training. ✓

The work of the identification section of the Bureau is dramatic only in the sense that that which is huge in its scope and painstaking in its detail, is dramatic. Daily the FBI received more than 75,000 fingerprint records. These represent the fingerprints of persons entering the armed forces, those who enter the services of the federal government, persons securing positions in war industries, the fingerprints of unidentified deceased persons, amnesia victims, or missing persons. Also received are fingerprint records for aliens who registered in accordance with the Alien Registration Act.

Separate and apart from these records, the fingerprint impressions of persons arrested in every part of the United States go to the Bureau's identification section. More than 12,000 contributors are included.

The painstaking detail of which I spoke is apparent when we follow the work of the Identification Section. This section of the FBI is housed in the huge National Guard Armory in Washington. There are the many thousands of cabinets and drawers necessary to hold the 70 million fingerprint records now on file.

Each morning a truck backs up to the ramp of the Armory bringing the daily quota of 75,000 fingerprint cards, every one of which will be recorded, searched, and handled before the day is over. After the prints are dated and recorded, the classification of the prints is commenced. The classifying of the finger impressions is merely the process of indexing a fingerprint card so that the incoming fingerprint cards can be searched against all other fingerprint cards of a similar classification. The trained experts classify the fingerprints with a magnifying glass, rapidly counting the ridges intervening between the core and delta. This work is tedious and requires long training by highly skilled individuals who undergo extensive studies over a period of months prior to actually engaging in the classification of fingerprints.

Once the incoming fingerprint card is classified, it is sorted into groups by mechanical machines. When the fingerprint card has been broken down to a small classification, it is searched through the FBI file of fingerprints of similar classification. This latter process is highly complicated, precise, and tedious. Despite the complexity of the work, the FBI experts can search an incoming print in less than five minutes time.

The value of the work of this division of the FBI in peace time in quickly identifying a known criminal, despite any change in name or physical appearance, has long been appreciated by law enforcement agencies and the public alike. The war has brought many new duties to the identification division. The FBI assumed the responsibility for the armed forces of searching the fingerprints of soldiers and sailors through it files at the time they enter the armed forces and when casualties leave unidentified individuals. When the submarine menace was at its height in the Atlantic, not a day passed but that the bodies of unidentified seamen were washed up upon our shores. Through fingerprints, the FBI was able to identify them. Some comfort was brought thus to those parents who gave a son in defense of his country.

Another responsibility of the FBI has been the searching of the fingerprints of persons employed in industries supplying war material to the armed forces. In these highly critical war industries, it is necessary, to insure the internal security of the country, to keep those whose disloyalties are apparent from being placed in positions where they could hinder the war effort. Already the FBI has kept spies arrested in World War I in far away Australia, South America, and various parts of the United States from being employed in vulnerable positions. In one case a chemist in an eastern plant was being considered for employment. His fingerprints, when searched through the FBI revealed he was convicted in 1917 for espionage. In another case an individual was seeking employment in the highly critical Panama Canal zone as a bookkeeper. He was found to have been arrested for espionage in the first World War. Not a day passes but some persons are identified as arsonists and destructionists. Thus, Army, Navy and other

authorities in war plants are put on guard in assigning individuals, should they be employed, in positions where they will not endanger the internal security of the country. When individuals seeking positions in the war industry are fingerprinted and an identification is made, all previous data in the FBI fingerprint files are made available to the Army, Navy, or appropriate governmental service.

At the outbreak of the emergency, Director Hoover, through the identification facilities which he has built up over the years, was again ready with the FBI to do a job that had to be done. To their sorrow, many enemies of America, although changing their names found the FBI right behind them.

Among the new responsibilities brought upon the FBI by the entrance of this country into the present world conflict, were the investigations in cases involving aliens of enemy nationalities. While the investigation of subversive activity had, for some years, rested with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the laws and procedures under which the FBI could operate changed materially as the country went to war. Even though all aliens had been required to register as such in 1940, by presidential proclamations of December 7th and 8th, 1941, nationals of the enemy countries, Germany, Italy, and Japan were required to register again and apply for certificates of identification. Certain restrictions were imposed upon the movements and privileges of enemy aliens. For example, enemy aliens were not permitted to travel away from home except after the securing of special permission. They could not possess certain enumerated articles with which they might, if they so chose, benefit the enemy. These articles included guns, ammunition, and articles of war, short wave radio receivers and trans-

mitters, explosives, cameras, et cetera.

Through the first quarter of the present year, the FBI, with the cooperation of local law enforcement officials, took into custody 12,904 enemy aliens. This figure includes 5,443 Germans, 5,157 Japanese, 2,281 Italians, 23 Roumanians, Hungarians, and Bulgarians. More than 23,000 premises and dwellings of enemy aliens had been searched. The amount of contraband prohibited enemy aliens, found as a result of these searches is startling. It included over 4,000 guns, over a quarter million rounds of ammunitions, nearly 4,000 cameras, 2,625 short wave radio receivers and 14 short wave radio transmitters. ✓

Let me give you a typical case that has been handled by the FBI under this category. You will, of course, understand that the name of this alien is fictitious. Other than this substitution, the facts of this example came from an actual case.

In the fall of 1917, just after America's entry into World War I, Federal officers in New York City entered a barber shop on Sixth Avenue and took into custody a young German alien who was having the color of his hair changed by a barber. His story was that he was disguising his personal appearance so as to avoid a man attempting to "shake him down" by threatening to expose his past criminal record to his employer. This alien, whom we shall call Walter Schmidt, but who has many times since changed his name and address, as well as his appearance, to escape detection by Federal authorities, had been seen frequenting the New York water front under suspicious circumstances, however, and he was subsequently interned as a dangerous alien for the duration of World War I.

After the war, Schmidt was released from internment and returned to Germany. The situation there was apparently not to his liking since in the early part of 1920 he returned again to the United States, reentering this country illegally by jumping ship. He married and resided continuously in New York City where he was engaged in business, and did not come again to the attention of the Federal authorities until just before this country's entry into the present war.

Shortly before Pearl Harbor, the Federal Bureau of Investigation received information that Walter Schmidt was an arrogant and despicable German who was strongly pro-Hitler and who made no pretense of being loyal to America. The complainant advised that Schmidt had applied for United States citizenship, but had stated that he saw no need to obtain final citizenship papers since, in his opinion, Hitler would take over the United States within the next few years.

Based upon this information, the Federal Bureau of Investigation immediately conducted an investigation which developed information largely confirming the original complainant's allegations concerning Schmidt's pro-German and anti-American sympathies. It was determined that Schmidt had been enthusiastic and jubilant at every German victory, had predicted that Hitler would win the war, and had pronounced anti-Semitic tendencies. It was also learned that he had been telling his friends that he had been an American citizen for over twenty years. Investigation disclosed, however, that Schmidt had moved from the address given by the original informant, and that he had given a fictitious address to his draft board. He had also given a fictitious address when he registered as an alien enemy, and after the

declaration of war Schmidt and his wife disappeared, leaving, they thought no trace of their whereabouts.

Special Agents conducted further investigation and determined that Schmidt, who was engaged in the furniture business, had filed a petition in bankruptcy and was discharged from bankruptcy on December 2, 1937. Special Agents then inquired of Schmidt's largest creditors and it was determined that Schmidt had bought considerable furniture from auction houses around University Place in New York City. Inquiries in the vicinity of University Place disclosed a furniture auctioneer who remembered Schmidt and believed Schmidt was presently residing at an address in New York City.

With this information a Special Agent, without revealing his identity, inquired at the address where the landlady stated that she recalled a man by the name of Schmidt who resided there, however, this individual had moved to Hartford, Connecticut, some time ago where he was employed in a defense plant. He had left no forwarding address but had returned for his mail on one occasion since leaving and she thought he might return again. The Special Agent, immediately recognized the landlady as Schmidt's wife and served upon her an Executive Search Warrant authorizing a search of the premises of the alien. His wife, admitting her identity, then confirmed to some extent information previously developed concerning Schmidt. She stated that Schmidt desired to return to Germany for the last several years but had failed to do so because he was enjoying himself here and was being supported by her. She also stated that Schmidt had prevented her from obtaining final citizenship papers. Mrs. Schmidt, however, did not know of the whereabouts of Walter Schmidt, except that he had packed his clothes the previous day and was presently residing somewhere in New York City. During the course of following other leads in an effort to determine the

whereabouts of Walter Schmidt, Special Agents saw him on a street corner at 104th Street and Broadway. When approached, Schmidt gave another name but finally admitted his identity.

Walter Schmidt was closely questioned by a Special Agent, and admitted his internment during the last war. He stated that he had spent twenty months in the reformatory at Elmira, New York from stealing from a railroad boxcar.

Walter Schmidt was taken into custody by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on October 3, 1942, under authority of a Presidential Warrant. He was afforded a hearing before an Alien Enemy Hearing Board which recommended his internment, and Schmidt was ordered interned for the duration of the war by the Attorney General on February 22, 1943.

State and local police authorities throughout the entire United States have cooperated wholeheartedly with the FBI in locating violators of the Selective Service Act. The primary purpose of the investigations in these cases has been to secure compliance with the law, rather than to prosecute the violators. It is more important to put men in the army than to put them in prison. In the first year and a half this act was in force, nearly 100,000 men were located and complied with the act. However, where compliance with the act could not be secured, prosecutions naturally followed. Up until June 1st, 1943, there had been nearly 4,300 convictions totaling over 9,000 years in sentences and fines of \$450,000. The investigation of draft delinquents has progressed smoothly and the entire situation is well in hand. There have been no "slacker raids" such as those which took place during the first World War. Consequently, rumor and hysteria caused by such wholesale

roundups of possible draft dodgers have not occurred. As a matter of policy the FBI is opposed to large scale arrests and indiscriminate challenging of men of Selective Service age.

Many are the stories related to FBI agents by men who have sought to evade services in the armed forces. For example, a middle-aged Mississippian for several years sold "good luck medicine" to colored people living in that state. He began a flourishing business of selling "magic oil and medicine" to Selective Service registrants which would cause them to fail in their physical examinations and thus not be required to serve in the Army. For the sum of \$5.00 he would provide the necessary medicine for each man. The FBI heard about his questionable business and the merchant of magic potions was questioned. He admitted selling the medicine to several different boys. Each registrant purchased "two brand new horseshoe nails, one bottle of Hindu style magic oil, and one small red bag of roots wrapped in yellow colored cellophane". The bag of roots contained one John the Conqueror root, two Adam and Eve roots, two devil's shoestring roots, and one life everlasting root.

One of these registrants, in following the instructions of the "doctor", as he liked to be known, drove one of the nails in the front door of his house and then made a wish. He then went to the back door of the house, drove the other nail into the back door and made another wish. He also poured three drops of the magic oil in each shoe each morning. Three drops of the magic oil were poured into the bag of roots and then the bag of roots was placed in a trousers pocket. The "doctor" informed each of his "patients" that just before he was to be examined at the army camp he should rub some magic oil above the eyebrows and behind the ears. This

would be absolute insurance that he would fail the Army examination and come home. The United States Attorney authorized the filing of a complaint charging the pseudo doctor with the violating of the Selective Service act, in that he aided and abetted registrants to evade the act. Before the law would take its course, however, the dispenser of magic medicine was found dead as a result of a self-inflicted bullet wound.

A 42 year old Chinaman in Washington, D. C., and ten fellow Chinese pretended they couldn't speak or understand a word of English, but the FBI demonstrated a complete knowledge of Chinese. The principal in this case, who grossed \$20,000 a year tutoring feigned illiteracy and physical disabilities, and his onetime "illiterate" pals were placed in Federal custody on draft evasion charges last January. In obtaining the deferments for his fellows, the Chinaman attempted to court the favor of local board members by bestowing upon them valuable Oriental presents. On one occasion he even brought sufficient Chinese food to feed the entire personnel of several local boards.

I would be amiss in my duty, however, if I did not stress that cases such as these are far from the general rule. The FBI makes it a point to handle selective service delinquents cases exactly the same as sabotage and espionage cases. In the present war, the delinquency rate is less than one percent of the total registration. By comparison, it totaled about 7% in the last war. ✓

The word "sabotage" strikes terror into the hearts of a nation striving to carry on in total war. And well that it does, for every vigilance must be preserved to assure that the enemy is not given the opportunity to use this sinister weapon to hinder and delay the country's war effort. The

best known attempt of the enemy to use this weapon against the United States was the landing of eight highly trained saboteurs from German submarines in the summer of 1942. In the darkness of the night on June 13, 1942, four of these saboteurs were landed on the beach near Amangansett, Long Island. Four days later, the second group of four were landed from a Nazi submarine in the vicinity of Jacksonville, Florida. All were in custody of the FBI by June 27th. The eight arrested were as follows: ERNEST PETER BURGER, 36, GEORGE JOHN DASCH, 39, HERBERT HANS HAUPT, 22, EDWARD JOHN KERLING, 34, RICHARD QUIRIN, 34, HERMANN OTTO NEUBAUER, 32, WERNER THIEL, 35, HEINRICH HARM HEINCK, 35. All of these eight had spent considerable time in the United States and had returned to Germany since the outbreak of the war in Europe with the exception of PETER BURGER who had returned to the fatherland in 1933. The eight had been trained by a Lieutenant WALTER KAPPE of Abwehr 2 of the German High Command. This is the section of the Germany Army that is responsible for all intelligence, espionage and sabotage work. KAPPE had resided in the United States from 1925 until 1937, and he had been active in German organizations in this country. He first organized the Teutonia Society in Chicago and later was the principal founder of the Friends of New Germany, predecessor of the German American Bund. The eight saboteurs were schooled on a high walled estate near Berlin. This estate had formerly been owned by a wealthy Jewish family later confiscated by the Nazi Government. The saboteurs were given extensive training in the methods of sabotage, the manufacture and use of explosives and incendiary material and in chemical and electrically delayed timing devices. Following this instruction, the saboteurs were taken on a three day tour of aluminum and magnesium plants, railroad shops, canals and other vital manufacturing facilities in order to learn the vulnerability

of these production enterprises. Maps of the United States were studied in order that the important locations could be determined. On the two submarines which transported them from Lorient, France, the saboteurs brought four cases of high explosives and timing devices. The German Government supplied them with a large sum of money in American currency. At the time of their arrest, the FBI recovered nearly \$175,000 of this money. It is interesting to note some of the errors made by the German Government in connection with this money. A part of the sum was in gold notes which are no longer in circulation in this country and some of the bills had Japanese letters or other foreign bank markings upon them. The saboteurs were supplied with forged Selective Service cards and Social Security cards. The saboteurs landed at night and in the German uniform, in order that they might have a military status in the event they were immediately detected. The four saboteurs who landed on Long Island, New York, were discovered at the time they disembarked from the submarine by a Coast Guard Patrol. They attempted to bribe him with \$260. The Coast Guardsman, who was unarmed, pretended to take the bribe and immediately reported the presence of the suspicious individuals to his superiors. However, by the time the Coast Guard could return, the saboteurs had disappeared inland. The men were arrested in the following order: HEINCK and QUIRIN were arrested at New York City on June 20th. BURGER was likewise arrested on June 20th. DASCH was arrested at New York on June 22. These comprise the four who landed at Long Island. Of the group that landed at Florida, two went to Cincinnati and thence to Chicago. The other two went directly to New York City. KERLING and THIEL were arrested at New York on June 24th. HAUP and NEUBAUER were arrested at Chicago on June 27th. Following the arrest of the eight saboteurs by the FBI

the President ordered them tried before a military commission. This commission met in Washington and heard the case from July 8th to August 4th. The case was prosecuted by the Attorney General, Mr. Biddle and by the Judge Advocate General of the War Department, Major General MYRON C. CRAMER. The verdict handed down on August 6th, 1942 resulted in six being sentenced to death, BURGER sentenced to life imprisonment and DASCH getting a 30 years sentence.

The ways of a spy have always been secretive. By the very nature of his work, despicable though it is, the espionage agent has been forced to keep his methods unpublicized. You will appreciate the fact, I know, that I am unable to discuss with you the methods presently being used by our enemies in order to secure information which is vital to them in their attempts to resist our armed forces.

I would like to recall, however, one of the most notorious espionage rings that has ever been smashed in the United States. This espionage circle was headed by a FRITZ JOUBERT DUQUESNE, a professional spy for many years. The background of this case which can be related is especially interesting. WILLIAM GOTTLIEB SEBOLD, a naturalized United States citizen of German birth was visiting his relatives in Germany prior to the outbreak of the war. He was contacted by responsible persons in charge of the German espionage system and under the threat of violence to his relatives, was apparently induced to aid the German espionage program. I say "apparently" because SEBOLD was an American despite his German birth. He reported his so-called enlistment to the American authorities and agreed to act as a counter-espionage Agent. Instructions to German Agents in the United States

were brought back by him, condensed into minute micro photographs which he concealed in the back of his watch. SEBOLD was directed to set up a radio transmitter. This was done for him by the FBI and this radio station was in communication with the German espionage headquarters for about 16 months. Operated by the Bureau, you may be assured that only the information or "misinformation" which the United States Armed Forces wanted the Germans to have was transmitted. Thirty-three members of this espionage group were arrested in June of 1941. Nineteen of these pleaded guilty. The trial which began in September of 1941 resulted in a guilty verdict for fourteen members. The combined persons sentenced of this group totalled 320 years and the fines amounted to \$18,000.

Another important espionage ring was that of KURT FRIEDRICH LUDWIG and it was likewise smashed. He, together with eight associates drew sentences totalling 117 years. ✓

The war has vitally changed and enlarged the work of the FBI. We of the Bureau are proud of our record. Our ability in preserving the internal security of the United States has been due in a large measure to the thorough and willing cooperation of the American public. I know that you will agree that it is far better for you should you come on any information which might indicate activities detrimental to the country's war effort for you to report this information to the FBI where it can be evaluated in connection with all other information of a like character.

It is vitally necessary that we unite on the home front as well as on the battle field. With the continued wholehearted cooperation of the public, we of the FBI will strive to carry on in order that the gains our country has achieved on the field of battle will not be negatived by enemy action at home.

With reference to your letter of September 21, 1943, transmitting for the Bureau's approval the speech prepared by Special Agent Courtney A. Evans of your office you are advised that the talk is generally satisfactory and that this Special Agent may be used before small groups.

A few minor inaccuracies were noted in the speech and these should be called to the attention of Special Agent Evans. For example, the date appearing in the next to the last line of the first full paragraph on page three should be July 29, 1935, instead of 1925.

In connection with the discussion of alien enemy registration on page six it should be noted that this was authorized by a Presidential Proclamation dated January 14, 1942.

The alien enemy figures on page seven are somewhat out of date and later data should be available in your office.

The Selective Service data on page ten likewise should be brought up to date.

Mr. Tolson _____ On page twelve it is not believed desirable to compare the delinquency rate data with that during the first World War. Differences in the manner of handling Selective Service violations in the first World War with the procedure used _____ make impossible an exact comparison of the delinquency rates.

He makes a good impression upon all persons with whom he comes in contact and gets along very well with his co-workers. He has had considerable police contacts and has handled assignments with the Police most satisfactorily.

He handles a large volume of work, having the happy faculty of organizing and directing his investigative attention to the pertinent facts. His reports are detailed, complete and require little correction. He is attentive to administrative detail in the performance of his duties and exercises good judgment and common sense.

Appeal Procedure

Any person entitled to do so may take an appeal to the board of appeal within 10 days after the above date of mailing of Notice of Classification to registrant in either of the following ways:

- (1) By filing with the local board a written notice of appeal. Such notice need not be in any particular form but must state the name of the registrant and the name and identity of the person appealing so as to show the right of appeal.
- (2) By signing the "Appeal to Board of Appeal" on the Selective Service Questionnaire (Form 40).

When an appeal is taken from the classification or reclassification of a registrant and when such appeal is upon the ground that the registrant should have been deferred by reason of his occupation, the appeal shall be transferred to the board of appeal having jurisdiction over the area in which the registrant is employed, provided all of the following conditions are met (but not otherwise):

- (1) The first person to appeal from such classification or reclassification files with his appeal a written request for such transfer;
- (2) The written request states in what respect an occupational question is involved; and
- (3) The written request states the name of the registrant's employer and the street address, county, and State where the registrant is employed.

The person appealing may attach to his notice of appeal or to the Selective Service Questionnaire (Form 40) a statement specifying the respects in which he believes the local board erred, may direct attention to any information in the registrant's file which he believes the local board has failed to consider or give sufficient weight, and may set out in full any information which was offered to the local board and which the local board failed or refused to include in the registrant's file.

Appeal to the President from classification by the board of appeal may be taken at any time within 10 days after the date of mailing of notice to registrant, provided the registrant was classified by the board of appeal in either Class I-A, Class I-A-O, or Class IV-E and one or more members of the board of appeal dissented from such classification. Otherwise, the decision of the board of appeal is final except when an appeal is taken to the President either by the State Director of Selective Service or the Director of Selective Service on the ground that he deems it to be in the national interest or necessary to avoid an injustice.

SPECIAL AGENTS

This position has been designated as a key position by the Review Committee of the War Manpower Commission.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has been designated as the sole civilian government investigative agency having jurisdiction over the investigation of matters pertaining to national defense such as espionage, sabotage, registration of agents of foreign principals, sedition, treason, and the like, and further, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has sole investigative jurisdiction in a great number of other Federal statutes which embrace bank robbery, kidnaping, extortion, white slave traffic, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, and numerous others. The investigative work in connection with the above violations is performed by the Special Agent personnel of this Bureau, who are recruited from applicants between the ages of twenty-three and forty. They must be graduates of a law school or an accounting school with the necessary accounting experience, or graduates of a university with extensive investigative experience, or with linguistic qualifications, or have basic educational training and possess satisfactory prior law enforcement experience which will enable them to satisfactorily perform the duties imposed upon them. For certain of the scientific investigative work, Special Agents are secured who primarily are qualified in the sciences, such as ballistics, chemical analysis, spectography, cryptography, mineralogy, metallography, toxicology, and other like sciences. Applicants for appointment to the position of Special Agent must meet the physical standards and requirements for this position, which are exceedingly high. They must have vision of no less than 20/40 in one eye, 20/50 uncorrected, both eyes to be corrected to 20/20. They must have no color deficiency whatever.

Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation undergo a rigorous training program. All newly appointed Special Agents in the Federal Bureau of Investigation attend training classes for a period of sixteen weeks; the hours of training are from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily, which course of study is equivalent to two full years of college study. During this period of training, they are thoroughly instructed in the basic rules and regulations and jurisdictions of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. They must satisfactorily pass numerous written examinations during their period of training. If a trainee fails to pass any of these examinations, he is dropped from the school.

The duties of a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation are most arduous. They must be available at a moment's notice to go to any part of the United States or to any assignment outside the United States. The hours of duty for these employees are such that they must be in excellent physical health. The average work week for a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation is no less than seventy hours. The work of a Special Agent, regardless of his particular qualification, is such that he cannot lead a sedentary or well regulated life. Due to the small number of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation presently handling the work under the jurisdiction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation within and without the continental United States, it is necessary that the entire staff be highly mobile.

Special Agents are required to be able to conduct investigations in more than 100 types of cases, including espionage, sabotage, subversive activities, frauds against the government, kidnaping, extortion, bank robbery, White Slave

Traffic Act, etc. They are trained in and required to maintain constant skill in the use of highly technical equipment, technical processes, such as those necessary for the development of latent fingerprints, concealed or obliterated numbers upon firearms, to understand the use of code messages, to conduct physical surveillances of subjects of espionage and similar cases, sometimes for periods of many months, and when necessary, to assume a necessary character to enable them to fit in an undercover capacity into the activities and operations of groups such as foreign agents, who are engaged in thwarting the war effort.

The arduousness and importance of the work of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was readily recognized by the military and naval leaders. The Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, for the Secretary of the Navy, requested Special Agent employees of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to submit their resignations from reserve commissions held by them in the naval services because it had been determined that those Special Agents could better serve their country in their present assignments than if they were to be called into active naval service. The Secretary of War, in 1942, addressed personal communications to 168 Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who at that time held reserve commissions in the Army. The Secretary of War at that time advised the Special Agents that their employment in the FBI is of such vital importance to the national defense as to necessitate their remaining at their posts of duty despite the fact that they held reserve commissions in the United States Army, and the request was made that these Agents, through the proper channels, submit their resignations from their commissions.

General Lewis B. Hershey of the Selective Service System pointed out in his Directive to all Local Boards of December 29, 1941, that Special Agent positions of the FBI were most important and essential to the national health, safety, and interests, and that the national defense functions of the FBI should not be impaired by the removal of trained personnel from critical positions in the Bureau.

The position of Special Agent has always been considered the most critical of all positions in the FBI, since, with the tremendous bulk of work placed upon us due to the war emergency, it is essential that a trained qualified staff be available for the handling of this work. If the Federal Bureau of Investigation cannot continue to retain its personnel in this critical position, aid and comfort would most certainly be given to the enemy and others whose interests are inimical to the best interests of the country today. Up to the present time the full complement of Special Agent personnel has not been secured and every effort is being made to secure the necessary additional Special Agent personnel.

I, J. Edgar Hoover, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I am the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and that the foregoing statements are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

Mr. Evans is a Special Agent and as such holds a key position as designated by the Review Committee of the War Manpower Commission within the meaning of Executive Order 9309. The performance of his duties is essential and critical to the execution of the work assigned by law and Executive Directive to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

To the Federal Bureau of Investigation is assigned the responsibility of investigating all acts of espionage, sabotage and all actions tending to undermine the internal security of the nation. We must also investigate and enforce all those federal statutes assigned to the investigative jurisdiction of this Bureau such as: bank robbery, kidnaping, interference with the interstate transportation of goods, National Stolen Property Act, White Slave Traffic Act, etc., the enforcement of which is necessary to the preservation of the national health, safety and interest.

To carry on this work it is necessary to maintain a corps of trained investigators. Mr. Evans is such a trained investigator. In the attached Form 42 S further information relative to Mr. Evans is set forth.

SPECIAL AGENTS

This position has been designated as a key position by the Review Committee of the War Manpower Commission.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has been designated as the sole civilian government investigative agency having jurisdiction over the investigation of matters pertaining to national defense such as espionage, sabotage, registration of agents of foreign principals, sedition, treason, and the like, and further, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has sole investigative jurisdiction in a great number of other Federal statutes which embrace bank robbery, kidnaping, extortion, white slave traffic, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, and numerous others. The investigative work in connection with the above violations is performed by the Special Agent personnel of this Bureau, who are recruited from applicants between the ages of twenty-five and forty. They must be graduates of a law school or an accounting school with the necessary accounting experience, or graduates of a university with extensive investigative experience, or with linguistic qualifications, or have basic educational training and possess satisfactory prior law enforcement experience which will enable them to satisfactorily perform the duties imposed upon them. For certain of the scientific investigative work, Special Agents are secured who primarily are qualified in the sciences, such as ballistics, chemical analysis, spectography, cryptography, mineralogy, metallography, toxicology, and other like sciences. Applicants for appointment to the position of Special Agent must meet the physical standards and requirements for this position, which are exceedingly high. They must have vision of no less than 20/40 in one eye, 20/50 uncorrected, both eyes to be corrected to 20/20. They must have no color deficiency whatever.

Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation undergo a rigorous training program. All newly appointed Special Agents in the Federal Bureau of Investigation attend training classes for a period of sixteen weeks; the hours of training are from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily, which course of study is equivalent to two full years of college study. During this period of training, they are thoroughly instructed in the basic rules and regulations and jurisdictions of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. They must satisfactorily pass numerous written examinations during their period of training. If a trainee fails to pass any of these examinations, he is dropped from the school.

The duties of a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation are most arduous. They must be available at a moment's notice to go to any part of the United States or to any assignment outside the United States. The hours of duty for these employees are such that they must be in excellent physical health. The average work week for a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation is no less than seventy hours. The work of a Special Agent, regardless of his particular qualification, is such that he cannot lead a sedentary or well regulated life. Due to the small number of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation presently handling the work under the jurisdiction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation within and without the continental United States, it is necessary that the entire staff be highly mobile.

Special Agents are required to be able to conduct investigations in more than 100 types of cases, including espionage, sabotage, subversive activities, frauds against the government, kidnaping, extortion, bank robbery, White Slave

Traffic Act, etc. They are trained in and required to maintain constant skill in the use of highly technical equipment, technical processes, such as those necessary for the development of latent fingerprints, concealed or obliterated numbers upon firearms, to understand the use of code messages, to conduct physical surveillances of subjects of espionage and similar cases, sometimes for periods of many months, and when necessary, to assume a necessary character to enable them to fit in an undercover capacity into the activities and operations of groups such as foreign agents, who are engaged in thwarting the war effort.

The arduousness and importance of the work of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was readily recognized by the military and naval leaders. The Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, for the Secretary of the Navy, requested Special Agent employees of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to submit their resignations from reserve commissions held by them in the naval services because it had been determined that those Special Agents could better serve their country in their present assignments than if they were to be called into active naval service. The Secretary of War, in 1942, addressed personal communications to 168 Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who at that time held reserve commissions in the Army. The Secretary of War at that time advised the Special Agents that their employment in the FBI is of such vital importance to the national defense as to necessitate their remaining at their posts of duty despite the fact that they held reserve commissions in the United States Army, and the request was made that these Agents, through the proper channels, submit their resignations from their commissions.

General Lewis B. Hershey of the Selective Service System pointed out in his Directive to all Local Boards of December 29, 1941, that Special Agent positions of the FBI were most important and essential to the national health, safety, and interests, and that the national defense functions of the FBI should not be impaired by the removal of trained personnel from critical positions in the Bureau.

The position of Special Agent has always been considered the most critical of all positions in the FBI, since, with the tremendous bulk of work placed upon us due to the war emergency, it is essential that a trained qualified staff be available for the handling of this work. If the Federal Bureau of Investigation cannot continue to retain its personnel in this critical position, aid and comfort would most certainly be given to the enemy and others whose interests are inimical to the best interests of the country today.

I, J. Edgar Hoover, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I am the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and that the foregoing statements are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

Appeal Procedure

Any person entitled to do so may take an appeal to the board of appeal within 10 days after the above date of mailing of Notice of Classification to registrant in either of the following ways:

- (1) By filing with the local board a written notice of appeal. Such notice need not be in any particular form but must state the name of the registrant and the name and identity of the person appealing so as to show the right of appeal.
- (2) By signing the "Appeal to Board of Appeal" on the Selective Service Questionnaire (Form 40).

When an appeal is taken from the classification or reclassification of a registrant and when such appeal is upon the ground that the registrant should have been deferred by reason of his occupation, the appeal shall be transferred to the board of appeal having jurisdiction over the area in which the registrant is employed, provided all of the following conditions are met (but not otherwise):

- (1) The first person to appeal from such classification or reclassification files with his appeal a written request for such transfer;
- (2) The written request states in what respect an occupational question is involved; and
- (3) The written request states the name of the registrant's employer and the street address, county, and State where the registrant is employed.

The person appealing may attach to his notice of appeal or to the Selective Service Questionnaire (Form 40) a statement specifying the respects in which he believes the local board erred, may direct attention to any information in the registrant's file which he believes the local board has failed to consider or give sufficient weight, and may set out in full any information which was offered to the local board and which the local board failed or refused to include in the registrant's file.

Appeal to the President from classification by the board of appeal may be taken at any time within 10 days after the date of mailing of notice to registrant, provided the registrant was classified by the board of appeal in either Class I-A, Class I-A-O, or Class IV-E and one or more members of the board of appeal dissented from such classification. Otherwise, the decision of the board of appeal is final except when an appeal is taken to the President either by the State Director of Selective Service or the Director of Selective Service on the ground that he deems it to be in the national interest or necessary to avoid an injustice.

SPECIAL AGENTS

This position has been designated as a key position by the Review Committee of the War Manpower Commission.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has been designated as the sole civilian government investigative agency having jurisdiction over the investigation of matters pertaining to national defense such as espionage, sabotage, registration of agents of foreign principals, sedition, treason, and the like, and further, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has sole investigative jurisdiction in a great number of other Federal statutes which embrace bank robbery, kidnaping, extortion, white slave traffic, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, and numerous others. The investigative work in connection with the above violations is performed by the Special Agent personnel of this Bureau, who are recruited from applicants between the ages of twenty-five and forty. They must be graduates of a law school or an accounting school with the necessary accounting experience, or graduates of a university with extensive investigative experience, or with linguistic qualifications, or have basic educational training and possess satisfactory prior law enforcement experience which will enable them to satisfactorily perform the duties imposed upon them. For certain of the scientific investigative work, Special Agents are secured who primarily are qualified in the sciences, such as ballistics, chemical analysis, spectography, cryptography, mineralogy, metallography, toxicology, and other like sciences. Applicants for appointment to the position of Special Agent must meet the physical standards and requirements for this position, which are exceedingly high. They must have vision of no less than 20/40 in one eye, 20/50 uncorrected, both eyes to be corrected to 20/20. They must have no color deficiency whatever.

Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation undergo a rigorous training program. All newly appointed Special Agents in the Federal Bureau of Investigation attend training classes for a period of sixteen weeks; the hours of training are from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily, which course of study is equivalent to two full years of college study. During this period of training, they are thoroughly instructed in the basic rules and regulations and jurisdictions of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. They must satisfactorily pass numerous written examinations during their period of training. If a trainee fails to pass any of these examinations, he is dropped from the school.

The duties of a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation are most arduous. They must be available at a moment's notice to go to any part of the United States or to any assignment outside the United States. The hours of duty for these employees are such that they must be in excellent physical health. The average work week for a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation is no less than seventy hours. The work of a Special Agent, regardless of his particular qualification, is such that he cannot lead a sedentary or well regulated life. Due to the small number of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation presently handling the work under the jurisdiction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation within and without the continental United States, it is necessary that the entire staff be highly mobile.

Special Agents are required to be able to conduct investigations in more than 100 types of cases, including espionage, sabotage, subversive activities, frauds against the government, kidnaping, extortion, bank robbery, White Slave

Traffic Act, etc. They are trained in and required to maintain constant skill in the use of highly technical equipment, technical processes, such as those necessary for the development of latent fingerprints, concealed or obliterated numbers upon firearms, to understand the use of code messages, to conduct physical surveillances of subjects of espionage and similar cases, sometimes for periods of many months, and when necessary, to assume a necessary character to enable them to fit in an undercover capacity into the activities and operations of groups such as foreign agents, who are engaged in thwarting the war effort.

The arduousness and importance of the work of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was readily recognized by the military and naval leaders. The Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, for the Secretary of the Navy, requested Special Agent employees of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to submit their resignations from reserve commissions held by them in the naval services because it had been determined that those Special Agents could better serve their country in their present assignments than if they were to be called into active naval service. The Secretary of War, in 1942, addressed personal communications to 168 Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who at that time held reserve commissions in the Army. The Secretary of War at that time advised the Special Agents that their employment in the FBI is of such vital importance to the national defense as to necessitate their remaining at their posts of duty despite the fact that they held reserve commissions in the United States Army, and the request was made that these Agents, through the proper channels, submit their resignations from their commissions.

General Lewis B. Hershey of the Selective Service System pointed out in his Directive to all Local Boards of December 29, 1941, that Special Agent positions of the FBI were most important and essential to the national health, safety, and interests, and that the national defense functions of the FBI should not be impaired by the removal of trained personnel from critical positions in the Bureau.

The position of Special Agent has always been considered the most critical of all positions in the FBI, since, with the tremendous bulk of work placed upon us due to the war emergency, it is essential that a trained qualified staff be available for the handling of this work. If the Federal Bureau of Investigation cannot continue to retain its personnel in this critical position, aid and comfort would most certainly be given to the enemy and others whose interests are inimical to the best interests of the country today. Up to the present time the full complement of Special Agent personnel has not been secured and every effort is being made to secure the necessary additional Special Agent personnel.



Special Agent Courtney A. Evans was ordered under transfer on November 7, 1945 from the Phoenix Office to the Bureau as a Supervisor in the Investigative Division. Subsequently a wire was sent to the Phoenix Office instructing that his transfer be expedited. Despite this, your division failed to cancel the In-Service Training which had been scheduled for Evans on November 19, 1945, with the result that he reported for this school with plans to return to Phoenix to pick up his family and proceed on transfer back to Washington.

I would like an explanation for the failure of your division to cancel the In-Service Training. Likewise, I want you to secure an explanation immediately from SAC Duffey at Phoenix as to why he did not take necessary action to arrange the cancellation of the In-Service. It is obvious that Duffey exercised extremely poor judgment in permitting Evans to come to In-Service with plans to return to Phoenix prior to proceeding on transfer.

STATUTORY PENALTY CLAUSE: "Any person who engages in a strike against the Government of the United States, or who is a member of an organization of Government employees that asserts the right to strike against the Government of the United States ***and accepts employment the salary or wages for which are paid from any appropriation contained in this Act shall be guilty of a felony and, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both: Provided further, that the above penalty clause shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for, any other provision of existing law."
