No explanations for the error were requested of Miami and none were submitted. made no comment regarding possible administrative action.

EXPLANATIONS RECEIVED: By memorandum dated 2/25/55, SAC Charles E. Weeks of the Miami Division advised that it was his opinion that SA Wendel should be criticized for failure to set out the correct lead in the first instance and that Field Supervisor should be criticized for having subsequently approved this report. SAC Weeks recommended letters of censure be directed to these two agents.

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SOG Supervisor Robert J. Garvey advised that upon reviewing referenced report he felt it advisable to direct an inquiry to the Miami Division to determine whether the lead set out for that office was not one more properly handled by the U. S. Attorney's office. Miami's report contained a lead for that office to reinterview _______, one of the subjects, to ascertain if and when he was planning to consummate certain arrangements with the Assistant U. S. Attorney. SA Garvey advised that he did not instruct the Miami Division to submit amended pages but merely questioned their actions and suggested same in the event his comment was correct. He stated further that upon reviewing the entire matter subsequent to the receipt of the amended pages from the Miami Division, he did not feel that this was a matter requiring explanations or administrative action.

CONCLUSION: It appears that Supervisor Garvey took improper action with respect to incorrect reporting on the part of the Miami Division. The amended pages were initialed for the file by Supervisor Garvey without requiring any explanations on the part of the field. The change made by the field was in regard to an improper lead which, in effect, is incorrect reporting. As a result of the failure of the responsible individuals to comply with existing Bureau regulations, unnecessary expense and undue correspondence was incurred.

RECOMMENDATIONS

(1) SAC Charles E. Weeks, Miami....Recommendation being submitted separately covering this and other similar matters.

Wendel 1/19/55 contained a lead for action which was not properly the function of the Bureau (ascertaining from one of the subjects whether he was planning to complete certain arrangements with the Assistant United States Attorney), and (2) not requesting foregoing explanations and recommendations when Miami submitted amended pages of said report 2/10/55.

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

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Service Act of 1948; Conscientious Objector...Failure to instruct Albuquerque to submit explanations of personnel responsible and recommendations regarding administrative action, following receipt of Albuquerque letter 2/8/55 transmitting amended pages of report of SA 1/10/55 changing the original description of "Enclosures to Bureau" from "Two photostatic copies of registrant's Selective Service file" to "Two photostatic copies of pertinent portions of registrant's Selective Service file."

The weaknesses in each of the above-described cases caused undue expense and unnecessary correspondence.

EXPLANATIONS OF SECTION CHIEF EVANS:

"Supervisors in the Accounting and Fraud Section have been instructed and have in the past called serious errors to the attention of the field by teletype, airtel or letter, specifically requesting explanations for delinquencies and thereafter making recommendations for administrative action.

"In accordance with all Bureau instructions minor errors of form have been called to the attention of the field by use of the Bureau error form (0-17) and explanations were requested only in those instances where a large number of such errors occurred in a single report or where other circumstances were present making necessary explanation for such errors of form."

CONCLUSION:

Because of the undue expense and unnecessary correspondence resulting, it is felt that the Accounting and Fraud Section, as well as the field, was derelict in handling the two afore-mentioned cases. In view of his over-all responsibility as Chief of the Accounting and Fraud Section, it appears that Mr. Evans shares the blame for these weaknesses.

RECOMMENDATIONS

(1) Section Chief Courtney A. Evans, Investigative Division...censure...because of the ineffective functioning of the Accounting and Fraud Section.

Mr. Evans serves as Section Chief of the Accounting and Fraud Section of the Investigative Division. He has been in this position since November 13, 1953. In this capacity he is highly competent, enthusiastic in his approach, reflecting intelligence and ability to work under pressure. Mr. Evans is capable of assuming additional responsibilities.

His Section handles fraud and bribery and related matters of a complicated nature and the responsibility for the control of accountants and accounting matters is centered therein.

Mr. Evans was in a probationary status during this rating period and was removed therefrom June 4, 1954. On June 22, 1954, he was demoted and transferred to the Philadelphia Field Division, which transfer was cancelled by letter dated July 21, 1954, at which time he was reinstated as Section Chief. Under date of October 1, 1954, he was removed from a probationary status. In connection with the demotion and proposed transfer, Mr. Evans voluntarily cancelled his vacation in July in order to remain acting as Section Chief until his replacement arrived. INSPECTOR VAN PELT: Comparison of criminal statistical accomplishments of the Accounting and Fraud Section for the first six months of this fiscal year with those for the similar period of the previous fiscal year showed (1) convictions increased 23%, (2) fines, savings and recoveries up 114%, and (3) fugitive apprehensions increased 21%.

Individual classifications showing decreases in above comparison covering convictions are (1) National Bank and Federal Reserve Acts - 11.59%, (2) Selective Service Act of 1948 - 33.63%, (3) National Bankruptcy Act - 37.5%, and (4) Bribery - 70.37%. Prospects for improvement appear favorable in (1) National Bankruptcy Act, wherein 50 cases are pending prosecution and (2) National Bank and Federal Reserve Acts, wherein 125 subjects are awaiting prosecution. Possibilities for bettering the record in Selective Service Act of 1948 and Bribery cases do not appear to be favorable because of (1) 27.1% decline in volume of selective service matters handled and tendency not to prosecute these violations during peacetime, and (2) first six months of 1954 fiscal year being an abnormally high period in bribery convictions, and some of the type cases prosecuted in the past are now being referred to governmental agency involved for personnel action.

Of 150 files reviewed in classifications supervised in Accounting and Fraud Section, one substantive error was found or .67%, low. Said error consisted of supervisory failure to detect and request Field explanation for not including in a report a description of a subject who was personally interviewed. Separate recommendations being submitted concerning responsible SOG and Field personnel. Over-all operations of the section seemed to be very satisfactory.

INSPECTOR EDWARDS: The favorable results accomplished in this section indicate that Supervisor Evans has manifested proper leadership, guidance and control of subordinate personnel and close attention to the work of his section. He is conscientious in the performance of his duties and is genuinely interested in efficiently carrying out the responsibilities expected of him. He makes a favorable, businesslike appearance. He is a competent Supervisor in Charge and considered capable of assuming additional responsibilities.

It is understood and agreed that the sum tendered herewith is a voluntary, gratuitous contribution to said fund which I understand is to be administered in the following manner.

The Director of the FBI will appoint a committee which shall consider all matters pertaining to the acquisition, safe keeping and expending of said fund, which committee will recommend appropriate action to the Director in pertinent matters. The Assistant Director of the Administrative Division of the FBI shall receive all contributions and account for same to the Director. Upon the death of any Special Agent who is a member of said fund the appointed committee will consider the case and submit a recommendation to the Director as to its conclusions. Appropriate instructions will then be issued to the Assistant Director of the Administrative Division, directing him to pay to the designated beneficiary the sum of \$10,000. 2-DAY REGIONAL WEST COAST CONFERENCE ON CURRENT CRIMINAL MATTERS (SAN FRANCISCO - JULY 11/12, 1955)

Current criminal matters and improving the Bureau's record of accomplishments during the new fiscal year were emphasized at the West Coast-Regional Criminal Conference conducted by the Investigative Division on July 11/12, 1955, in San Francisco, which was attended by representatives from 9 western field offices, plus representatives from Anchorage, Honolulu, and the Training and Inspection Division.

It was the opinion of the Seat of Government representatives, as well as those representing the different field divisions, that this Criminal Conference was timely, instructive and practical. This view was shared by Inspector Edwards who said that the conference was "enlightening," and "very helpful" to all in attendance.

The conference was led by the writer who laid the groundwork for the 2-day effectsion of criminal matters and continually emphasized the Director's interest in leadership, enthusiasm, aggressiveness and

Mr. Price, That of the Criminal Section at the Bureau, stressed the Director's desire the ter field implement the various programs which have been initiated by the Seat of Government for improving the Bureau's criminal accomplishments. Specialization of Agents in criminal work, the importance of public Education programs, and obtaining public press recognition for work, polydone was also highlighted. Among new developments in the criminal field that were specially discussed were (1) importance of the new obscene literature law approved by the President 6-28-55, (2) present status of the negotiations on the military jurisdictional problem, (3) the need for continued success in the Top Ten Fugitive Program, (4) the value of criminal informants and the need for their close supervision, (5) the importance of close cooperation and free interchange of information among offices on the West Coast. Particular emphasis during the conference was placed on White Slave Traffic Act matters in view of recent case developments on the West Coast which were of particular interest to those in attendance. However, it is felt that any future criminal conferences would not necessarily have to stress white Slave Traffic Act violations to the same extent since some of the time might more appropriately be devoted to special regional problems which confront offices operating in other parts of the country.

This West Coast Criminal Conference was the first of a heretofore proposed series of conferences. In view of the results obtained at San Francisco, it is believed that the Bureau should at this time give consideration to establishing definite times and places for the holding of similar conferences. This will enable all offices to obtain the same instruction that has now been made available to the western divisions.

RECOMMENDATIONS .

- (1) That in accordance with the original proposed plan for holding regional criminal conferences throughout the United States, approval be given for the holding of conferences similar to that held in San Francisco as follows:
 - (1) Chicago September 12/13-55 MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE
 - (2) New York City September 15/16-55 EASTERN CONFERENCE
 - (3) New Orleans October 3/4-55 SOUTHERN CONFERENCE

If approved, Seat of Government representatives according to this schedule would proceed directly to New York from Chicago. The Administrative Division and the Training and Inspection Division have advised that at this time there is no conflict with any other training programs and the SACs at Chicago, New York and New Orleans are scheduled to be in their offices on the above dates, on the basis of information now available. If approved, detailed agenda and recommendations for personnel to represent this division at these conferences will be submitted.

(2) It is recommended that SAC William Whelan of San Francisco be commended by letter for the manner in which he personally participated in the conference by actively engaging in discussion, for the providing of suitable facilities for the conference and his administrative handling of the details.

The success of this program is dependent upon the attention the SAC's will give the criminal work as a whole. I feel that not enough spade work is being done in allowing some of the suggested programs to really take root. I have in mind the missionary work that has to be done in developing WSTA cases, auto theft rings and in police contacts in order to insure the referral of not some but all cases within our jurisdiction.

All this adds up to the need for the SAC, the ASAC, and the field supervisors who are responsible for the handling of criminal violations to give these programs a tangible push. If we are to properly plan and keep the pressure on here at the Seat of Government, we need to get the field behind this program if we are to improve our record of accomplishments.
