On October 19, 1951, the Executives' Conference consisting of Messrs.

Index cases should be reopened at such time as summary type reports and the subsequent yearly reports are rendered by the Field, or whether they should remain in a closed status and be followed by administrative tickler.

Inspector (, during the inspection of the Minneapolis Division, advised that there is some confusion in the field as to whether cases on Security Index subjects employed in vital facilities should be reopened each six months at the time that the employment in the vital facility is verified and the appropriate Armed Forces agency is advised of the correct status of the subject by investigative report. (L recommended that the cases be reopened each six months for the purpose of verification and thereafter closed when the investigative report is written.

We have recently instructed the field to submit summary type reports on all Security Index subjects, regardless of whether they are employed in a vital facility, and to submit yearly reports thereafter. Therefore, the problem pointed out by Inspector exists in connection with all Security Index subjects and not just those employed in vital facilities. Heretofore, we have instructed the field that when they verify the current address and employment of Security Index subjects each six months, the case should be followed by administrative tickler and not be reopened or carried in a pending inactive status unless it falls in a specialized group, such as Key Figures. However, by SAC Letter Number 95 a dated September 22, 1951, the field was instructed to follow cases for the yearly summary reports by administrative ticklers. They were instructed that these cases should be reopened when the summary reports become due, re-evaluated in light of existing instructions and brought up-to-date to determine the subject's current activities.

Executives Conference . Recommendation:

The Executives! Conference was of the unanimous opinion that as it is necessary to conduct research, and in many instances investigation, prior to preparing the required reports, and further to insure the proper administrative handling and following of these cases, it is desirable to reopen these cases at the appropriate time and assign them to Agent personnel for handling. After the required reports are submitted, the cases should again be closed and subsequently followed by administrative tickler.

We will continue to follow our past procedure of maintaining specialized cases such as Key Figures, Top Functionaries, etc., in a pending-inactive status, as there is need for continued investigative attention in those cases.

In order that we can be sure that the field is following Bureau instructions requiring the submission of summary type and investigative reports in Security Index cases, the Conference recommended that during both official inspections by Bureau inspectors and self-inspections in the field, the inspector be required to check the files on all Security Index subjects for the purpose of ascertaining whether reports are being submitted at the required intervals.

In the event you agree, the attached SAC Letter advises, the field that this procedure is to be followed and the Training and Inspection Division will issue appropriate instructions to Inspectors.

Reference is made to SAC letter #73, Series 1951, dated 7/24/51, Sub-section A, which advised that standards for the inclusion of individuals in the Security Index are now broadened to include persons "holding, at any time after 1/1/49, membership in any organization or political party which seeks to overthrow by force or violence the Government of the United States." Relet suggested the following reviews as a means of locating those persons so reported:

- 1. Review of all individual security cases which have been opened since 1/1/49.
- references from 1/1/49 to date. 2. Review all .
- 3. Review the Communist Index for the names of persons reported as active in such organizations subsequent to 1/1/49.

These suggestions, as they relate to this office, have been given very careful and thorough consideration, and I respectfully desire to make the following observations:

Concerning Bureau suggestion designated as #1 above, it is pointed out that there is no available record which would enable this office to determine which case files have been opened or reopened since 1/1/49 nor would such a record, if available, reflect all persons reported as active in the Communist Party or related groups subsequent to 1/1/49. Until July of 1950 there was no necessity of opening active files merely on the allegation of membership slone and, therefore, a review of files opened for investigation Since 1949 would not serve to locate all those persons reported as active since 1949.

Concerning Bureau suggestion designated as #2 above, namely that should be reviewed from 1/1/49 to date, it is pointed out that such a review can be expected to be of little value since it has been the of the New York Office even prior to January, 1949 to open at least a dead on any person reported to be a member of any of the organizations with which referenced SAC letter is concerned.

With regard to suggestion #3; it is not 100 19 195 April, 1948 the New York Office reviewed an approximate total of 119,000 closed and pending files classifications? -Atythe time of the review a Communist Index card was prepared on each person residing in the New York Division, who had been reported at any time prior to the date of the review, as a member or

sympathizer of, a subversive organization. As a result of the review, 28,000 Communist Index cards were prepared. Since this review the New York Office has continued to prepare C. I. cards on all persons reported to be members or sympathizers of a subversive organization. As a result of this policy there are now approximately 56,500 C. I. cards on file in this office, which figure represents a total of all persons who have resided in the New York area and who have been reported at one time or another to be active in a subversive organization. However, since there is no requirement that C. I. cards be maintained in a current status, it will not be possible to secure the desired information from a review of the cards themselves. To ascertain those individuals reported as active in one of the organizations since 1/1/49, it will be necessary to review each of the 56,500 files represented by a C. I. card. For reasons which will be set forth below, it is not believed that the results to be achieved by such a project will compensate for the extensive research that will be required in carrying out the project.

By SAC letter #48, Series 1950, dated 7/22/50, the Bureau advised that consideration should be given for inclusion in the Security Index those persons who were as of July, 1950 "active, participating members of the Communist Farty or related groups, or those who actively appouse the line of those groups."

Since July of 1950, the above instructions have been strictly adhered to by this office. Whenever information has been received indicating that an individual is a member of, or active in, one of the organizations listed above, a case file has been opened for investigation. In addition, however, this office has adopted a somewhat liberal interpretation of the above instructions. The date of July, 1950 has not been utilized as an absolute line of demarcation when consideration is given to opening a file for investigation. A lack of information indicating current Communist Party activity on the part of a subject has been considered to be due more to the security measures adopted by the Party rather than to the lack of activity on the part of the subject.

As a result of the above interpretation, this office has been opening investigations on individuals active in one of the organizations under discussive even though the activity may have occurred during the year 1949. These cases have been opened in a routine manner as information indicating Party activity was received from Sutec, trash covers, informants and other sources. In this manner approximately 7000 Security Matter - C cases have been opened during the past fourteen months.

Because of this system in which files are continually coming to the attention of the Security Matter supervisor, it is felt that cases already have been opened on the vast majority of persons who have been reported to this office to be active in the Party subsequent to 1/1/49. Reurlet October 11, 1951, wherein you advice that you will not attend to review the 56,000 case files represented by Co municit Index cards for the purpose of investigating the subjects thereof who come within the meaning of the instructions issued in SAC Letter No. 73(A), dated July 24, 1951.

You point out that you feel that cases have already been opened on the vast najority of persons who have been reported to your office to have been active in the Party. subsequent to January 1, 1949.

The extent and nature of any review prompted by the Bureau's instructions must necessarily be a matter for your own decision. I desire to point out, however, that you are responsible for the investigation and consideration for inclusion in the Security Index of all incividuals coming within the octegory defined in LIG Letter No. 73. This does not merely mean the majority of such individuals. Unless you are certain that all such individuals have been investigated and that all such individuals have been considered for inclusion in your Security Index in line with the standards which were broadened by LAC Letter No. 73, it is manuatory that you conduct any review necessary to comply with these ihstructions.

If the reviews suggested by the Bureau in SAC Letter No. 73 are necessary to accomplish this, such reviews should be hade. Second, it would reduce the possibility of overlooking the proper handling of some of these cases, which possibility it is felt exists to a higher degree while the cards are filed with the ordinary Security Index subjects; and

Third, it would present a more ready picture of the general composition of our index.

(A) INTERVIEWS IN SECURITY CASES -- I desire to emphasize again the importance of thoroughness in the interviewing of persons involved in security matters. It has been our experience that all data in an individual's possession cannot be developed in one or two interviews. It should be recognized that where a person has been active over a period of years in the espionage or communist field, he or she has possession of a great deal of information which is often of utmost value to the Bureau.

Prior to an interview of a person who may be expected to have considerable information of value to us, there should be a thorough preparation for the interview. This preparation should encompass not only a knowledge of the known background and activities of the person being interviewed, but should also include knowledge on the part of the interviewing Agents of matters concerning which the person being interviewed might logically have information. It is, of course, recognized that situations may present themselves where such preparation is not possible, but wherever it is feasible such preparation should be made.

Once the interview is undertaken and it is found that the person being interviewed can furnish us information of value, we should attempt to develop and exploit the person's knowledge to the utmost. The person being interviewed should be informed of the fact that we are interested in interviewing him or her in great detail. Arrangement should be made to conduct the interviews over as extended a period as is necessary fully to develop the matter. During the course of the interviews, if it is necessary to have investigation and research conducted to verify or add to what is being developed, this should be done. Information may be needed from other offices or from the Bureau to assist in the interviews, and if so, a request for such information should be made immediately. It should be constantly borne in mind that we desire to profit by the interview in as greatly a manner as possible. Undoubtedly, if the person has knowledge of espionage or communist activities, we will want to recontact him or her in the future on a variety of matters, and the establishment of confidence in the Bureau should be developed for our future benefit.

A thorough and accurate reporting of information developed is, of course, absolutely essential. This reporting requires careful preparation, with an understanding that a permanent record is being

established of what the individual being interviewed furnished. There should be a careful organization of material being reported. Care should be exercised to see that the data developed are reported in the appropriate investigations, and that offices with an interest in the results of the interview are furnished the applicable information.

In many instances it will be a desirable practice to report all information developed in the main file on the individual
being interviewed and at the same time report pertinent information
developed in the main files on other individuals, and where there
is no main file the information should be reported under the caption of the individual to whom the information pertains.

The above instructions are for your guidance in conducting interviews in security cases, and it is felt that careful attention to this phase of the Bureau's work can benefit our responsibilities in the security field.

The Bureau desires that summary reports be prepared in the security investigation of any individual in the Security Index regardless of the fact that the subject has been the subject of an LERA investigation.

It should be noted that while detailed information is required in the summary reports dating from the date that a subject signed his non-Communist affidavit, such detailed information is not required concerning his activities price to the date of his signing the affidavit. BACKGROUND

As you know, current Bureau instructions to the Field concerning interviews of subjects of security investigations require that these interviews be conducted by two experienced Agents.

Attached herewith is a letter from the Buffalo office advising that due to a shortage of personnel experienced in security investigations they are desirous of using "first office" Agents in the company of an experienced Agent in conducting these interviews.

The requirement that two experienced Agents be assigned to interview security subjects was made when the interview program was first instituted. So far our interview program has been highly successful with over 1446 interviews conducted and no serious repercussions have arisen from these interviews to date.

I believe that in the interest of expeditiously handling these cases it would be desirable to instruct the entire field that it is permissible to have "first office" Agents participate in the interviews of security subjects so long as the actual interviews are conducted by Agents experienced in security investigations. Such a procedure will not only facilitate the handling of these interviews when the cases are assigned to "first office" Agents for investigation but will also/broaden-tre training of such Agents in the matter of security investigations.

Attached herewith is a list of names of individuals who were investigated under the Loyalty Program. The main loyalty file and subversive file numbers are shown where known. Each of these individuals was either dismissed from, or denied Federal employment. Their current activities and present employment are not known.

You are to call for all main files on each of these subjects and review them to determine whether the effice of origin has received all pertinent loyalty reports and copies of any other reports where main security files are existent. In any instances where pertinent information has not been made available to the office of origin, such information should be furnished as enclosures to a memorandum to the office of origin.

If the main files do not reflect the results of hearings conducted before the Loyalty Review Board in each case, the Washington Field Office should be requested to obtain a photostatic copy of the hearing and transmit it to the office of origin.

The office of origin should be requested to review all information in its possession and to conduct active investigation to determine the subjects' current activities and employment. In each instance where a current report is not reflected in the files, a current report should be submitted by the office of origin. Each case should be handled as any other current security investigation and the field should be instructed to determine whether the subject should be in the Security Index at this time. If not, the Field should be instructed to consider the subject for interview and submit its recommendation for same to the Bureau for approval.

You may find that in many of these cases, current investigation is being conducted or the above requirements have recently been complied with or some other action has been taken which would obviate the necessity for complying with the above instructions. If so, no further action need be taken by you.

The object of this review is to be fully certain that the Security Index Unit has taken all action necessary to assure that each of these cases has been fully developed as of this time and that all of these subjects have either been placed in the Security Index where warranted or consideration has been given to interviewing them for information in their possession.

Communications concerning this matter should bear the character Security Matter.

You are to complete this project by January 7, 1952. Your copy of this memorandum and the attached list should be returned with a notation adjacent to each name on the list as to the action you have taken in each case.

A review of Albany files in connection with the preparation of summary reports under referenced SAC Letter, has disclosed a number of reports written prior to the adoption of present standards for security reporting, which contain information without indicating the source.

I realize that any such information falling into the category of Sections 2, 3, 4 and 5 of the form indicated for preparation of summary reports, as set out on pages 6 and 7 of the referenced SAC Letter, must be attributable to a definite source in order to be included in a summary report. It appears, however, that a different view might be taken with respect to such information falling in category (1) -- Background, set out on page 6 of referenced letter, particularly items (c) Education: (g) Employment; and (h) Residences.

If a file review reflects that the source of information in these subdivisions of Category (1) is not available, two methods occur to me to handle this problem:

- 1. Submission of the summary report could be delayed until a source can be found for each item of pertinent information.
- 2. A surmary report could be submitted at the present time, based on the information in the file, with leads being set out to obtain sources for any information not presently attributable to a specific source.

Agent, who, in reviewing a file, found a report which made the categorical statement that the subject had previously resided at three addresses, which were listed.
No source for this statement appears in the file. If the first alternative were
followed, submission of the report in that particular case would be delayed while
the Agent made an intensive investigation to verify, through some course, the fact
that the subject did reside at these addresses. Use of the second suggested alternative would permit a more prompt submission of the summary report, and necessary
other investigation later in the case.

Bureau advice in this matter is requested. It would be helpful if this matter could receive as prompt a reply as possible, since a number of security reports are dependent on the Bureau's answer.

(H) SECURITY INDEX - PREPARATION OF SUMMARY REPORTS -- Reference is made to SAC Letter Number 95 (B) dated September 22, 1951. In response to several suggestions and observations concerning the matter of preparation of summary reports on Security Index subjects, the following instructions shall be adhered to in all Security Index cases where summary reports are being submitted.

INTERVIEWS OF SECURITY INDEX SUBJECTS WHEN WARRANTED

The following instructions should not be considered as changing in any way the standards for interviewing subjects of security investigations.

After the files have been reviewed concerning a Security Index subject for the purpose of preparing a summary report and all active investigation has been completed and it appears that the subject should be interviewed in accordance with current policy in our interview program, it will not be necessary to prepare a summary report until after the interview has been conducted.

In all instances, however, a current investigative report should be submitted with the necessary letter requesting authority to interview each subject. The investigative report should reflect all pertinent information not previously submitted in report form. Upon Burcau approval for interview the interview should be conducted in the prescribed manner.

If, after the interview, it is your recommendation that the subject not be retained in the Security Index, your letter to the Bureau advising of the results of the interview should contain your recommendation that the subject be removed from the Security Index. It will not be necessary to submit a summary report if the Security Index card is cancelled.

If, after the interview, it is your recommendation that the subject be continued in the Security Index, the summary report should be prepared immediately including the pertinent information concerning the subject developed in the interview. The administrative portion of the report should contain a statement advising that the subject is being continued in the Security Index.

In all instances where an interview is had with a subject of a security investigation who is of interest to other intelligence agencies, the results of the interview should be included in report form for dissemination to other interested agencies.

FORM AND CONTENT

Synopsis

A synopsis shall be prepared for each summary report on a pink summary report first page. The synopsis shall contain clear and concise statements summarizing the subversive activities of the subject of the report as set forth in the details. The synopsis should not include background information inasmuch as this will be clearly set forth in the first portion of the details under the cutline recommended in SAC Letter Number 95. The reports are not to be designated as "Prosecutive" or as "Investigative" summary reports.

Status

The status of each case will be reflected in the summary report at the end of the synopsis and at the end of the details as in regular investigative reports.

Details

In those instances where it is felt that further investigation is warranted, leads shall be set forth in the summary report as they would otherwise be handled until the required investigation is completed. It is not desired that the submission of these summary reports be delayed for the sole purpose of conducting current investigation in previously closed cases. Where further investigation is warranted as reflected from a review of the case, it should be covered through the use of leads as instructed above.

In most instances summary reports which have been prepared in the past in these cases are suitable for dissemination. There may be certain cases in which previous summary reports are not suitable for dissemination because of disclosure of sources. In such cases where dissemination of previous summary reports is not advisable, the information contained therein should be incorporated in the current summary reports in such a manner that the sources are fully protected and the information can be disseminated. It will be the responsibility of each office to be certain that all pertinent information concerning a Security Index subject has been incorporated in either a past or current

disseminative summary report as distinguished from investigative reports. It is intended that with the submission of the current summary reports on Security Index subjects each case will be in a current condition and that it will not be necessary to go beyond previous or current summary reports for pertinent information concerning each Security Index subject.

Sources whose identities would ordinarily be set forth in the details of an investigative report should be fully identified in the details of these summary reports.

Sources whose identities would not ordinarily be set forth in the details of an investigative report should be identified by temporary symbols in the details and fully identified in the administrative pages. Only one temporary symbol should be utilized for each informant in each report. If one informant has furnished information which should logically be broken down under two or more of the headings in the report, this should be done with the same temporary symbol being used for that informant throughout the report.

DOCUMENTATION OF EVIDENCE

In those instances where documentary evidence is reflected by previous investigation and the names of those individuals who could produce such evidence are already known, the names of such individuals should be reflected either in the details by name, or, if their identities should be kept confidential, by temporary symbol with full identification in the administrative pages. A statement as to the location of the original exhibit should also appear in the administrative pages. For example, if the information was obtained from a written report of an informant furnished directly to an Agent, the identifying information appearing in the administrative portion of the report might read:

T-1 S-1012 who furnished a written report to Special Agent John J. Doe on July 16, 1950. Informant's report is contained in New York file

If the information was submitted by an informant to an office via mail, that informant should be identified and the name of the Bureau Agent initialing the mail into the file as well as the

location of the exhibit in the office files should be set forth.

If the identity of the source of the information being reported, the identity of the Agent receiving the information and/or the date the information was received, are not available in the subject's main file for inclusion in the report such information should be obtained by file review or, if the information is reflected as being available in the files of another office, a request should be made for full identification of the evidence. It will not be necessary to engage in an extensive project of preparing documentary evidence through photostating of exhibits already in possession of the office of origin for inclusion in the main file of each subject.

It is not desired that extensive investigation be conducted further to identify and locate outside individuals who have furnished background information nor is it desired that extensive investigation be conducted to obtain documentary evidence of background information. For example, if previous investigation has reflected that a subject, according to reliable records such as birth records, school records, or records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, was born at a certain place on a certain date, such information will be sufficient for inclusion in the report. It will not be necessary to request investigation to obtain documentary proof of such data in these cases at this time. The place where such information was verified should, of course, be set forth in the report. If satisfactory verification of pertinent background data has not been made previously, such verification should, of course, be made at this time.

DISSEMINATION

The Summary reports prepared under the instructions in SAC Letter Number 95 and in this SAC Letter must receive the same dissemination on a local level that regular investigative reports would receive in these cases. The summary reports must be prepared in a manner suitable for dissemination to outside agencies and such dissemination must be made in all instances where warranted.

It is not desired that these summary reports be furnished to United States Attorneys at this time or at any time in the future until specific instructions are received from the Bureau.

PERIODIC SUMMARY REPORTS ON SECURITY INDEX SUBJECTS

Key Figures, Prominent Individuals and Subjects Employed in Vital Facilities

Current instructions require submission of investigative reports on these subjects each six months. After submission of the initial summary report in these cases as required by SAC Letter Number 95, the report submitted six months from that date shall be a regular investigative report. The report submitted one year from the date of the last summary report shall be a summary report. It will not be necessary to submit an investigative report at the time the yearly summary reports are submitted. Each summary report will include pertinent information not previously included in summary reports.

Top Functionaries

Current instructions require submission of investigative reports each three months on Top Functionaries. After submission of the current summary report as requested in SAC Letter Number 95, the quarterly investigative reports shall continue to be submitted as in the past. The report submitted one year fron the date of the previous summary report will be a summary report and will include information not included in previous summary reports.

All Security Index Cases

In any of the Security Index cases when the yearly summary report becomes due and it is found that insufficient information has been developed to warrant the preparation of a summary report, a regular investigative report should be submitted. The reason for not submitting the required summary report should be stated in the administrative portion of the investigative report.

It is not desired that the yearly summary reports be coordinated with the previous summary reports in so far as the "T" symbols of the sources are concerned. If a certain temporary symbol number was used for a source in a previous summary report, the symbol number will not necessarily be the same for that source in the subsequent summary report. In other words, the temporary symbol numbers for each summary report on one subject will be listed in numerical order for that report independent of the other reports.

Reference is made to SAC Letter No. 95, dated September 22, 1951, Paragraph B, concerning the preparation of Summary Reports in Security Index cases.

Further reference is made to Miami letter to the Bureau dated October 24, 1951, outlining the plans formulated by the Miami office in undertaking this program of preparation of Summary Reports.

It will be recalled that it was my intention of opening ten cases on November 1, 1951, and ten cases on becember 1, 1951, for the purpose of preparing summary reports in accordance with the Bureau's instructions. Frankly, this program has suffered tremendously as a result of my having to utilize the experienced Agents who would normally be assigned to handling this program on other special matters in the office. We have had a deluge of Civil Rights investigations which, according to Bureau instructions, had to be given top priority. Special squads were set up to expeditiously investigate these matters, such squads having to be composed of the most experienced agents in the office.

The Bureau has advised me that they are transferring an additional 20 Agents into the Miami Division to assist in these specials that are being handled as well as the other work, which will mean that I will be able to relieve some of the non who would be working on this security summary report program and every effort will be made at this time to bring the program in line with the plans formulated in my letter of October 24, 1951.

It is sincerely hoped that the Bureau will bear with the Miami Division during this shortage of personnel and the next progress memorandum, I feel sure, will show that substantial progress has been made.

(I) SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS - INVESTIGATIVE REPORTS -- Reference is made to SAC Letter Number 95 (B) dated September 22, 1951, which contained an outline of the form to be used in the preparation of summary reports on Security Index subjects.

In order that uniformity will be established throughout the Field, the form set forth in SAC Letter Number 95 shall be used wherever possible in investigative as well as summary reports on security investigations of individuals. The headings prescribed in the recommended form should be used in each investigative report whenever information is being included in the report which would logically fall under such headings. Information appearing under each heading should be in chronological order. Of course, when no information appears in an investigative or summary report which could logically be placed under one or more of the headings, such headings should not appear in the reports.

The Bureau feels that by this standardization of the form for all security reports on individuals and adherence thereto by all offices wherever possible, review of such reports and preparation of future yearly summary reports will be greatly facilitated. Agents handling these cases will more readily be able to obtain the desired information from the case files of the subjects for appropriate action and will be able more readily to determine weak points in each investigation. Direction of each investigation to a logical conclusion will thus be greatly facilitated.

SAC Letter No. 121 will greatly facilitate the preparation of reports under this program and agents assigned to this project are now familiar with security work.

With regard to the 111 cases in the Special Section category, our files reflect that in 73 of these cases summary reports within the requirements of SAC Letter #95 have been submitted. The remainder of these cases are being followed closely in order to insure the early submission of summaries.

A survey of the files of this office reflects a total of 2,871 cases in categories 6 and 7. An analysis for the purpose of breaking down the total into the appropriate categories reflects that 204 cases fall into category 6. Of these 204 cases, 32 are in a pending status. Steps are being taken to see that all these 204 cases are reopened and assigned as soon as possible in order to comply with the instructions in referenced SAC letters.

Category 7, the survey shows, consists of 2,667 cases in which reports containing derogatory information have been submitted since January 1, 1949. Instructions are being issued in order that the next reports in pending cases in this category will be submitted as summary reports. It is contemplated that the remainder of the cases in this category, which are not pending at present, will be given attention under this program when the handling of the cases falling in the higher categories on the schedule has been substantially completed.

In spite of the heavy load of almost 7,000 Security cases, the subjects of most of which are being considered as possible additions to the Security Index, this office fully appreciates the importance attached to this program of preparing summary reports on those persons already listed in the Security Index. INTERVIEWS OF INTERNAL SECURITY - C AND SECURITY MATTER - C SUBJECTS

SECURITY INDEX

Reurlet dated December 20, 1951, in which you stated that it is assumed in connection with Eureau-authorized interviews of the above type that it is necessary for the interviewing Agent to warn the interviewee of his right to counsel, etc., and any statements furnished by such an individual would necessarily contain such warning in the first paragraph thereof. You request advice as to whether this procedure should be followed in all instances.

All interviews conducted by Special Agents of the Bureau must be handled in such a manner that there will be no basis for an allegation that the constitutional rights of the individual interviewed were violated.

Interviews of this type must be planned in accordance with the information available concerning the persons to be interviewed and the interviewing Agents must be thoroughly familiar with the background information regarding persons interviewed. It is not mandatory that signed statements be obtained; however, when possible and the facts warrant, a signed statement should be taken.

In those instances when the subject makes admissions as to his participation in Communist Party activities or activities in violation of the Pederal code and it is covious to the Agents conducting the interview that prosecution may be expected at a later date, the Agents should be certain that Bureau instructions in this regard, as they apply to interviews and the taking of signed statements, are closely followed.

Reference is made to Section H of SAC Letter 121 dated December 20, 1951, concerning the preparation of security index summary reports and in particular to the instructions therein pertaining to the documentation of evidence. It is noted that if the required information is available only in the files of another office, a request should be made of that office for a full identification of the evidence.

It is recognized that such offices as New York City, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle which frequently disseminate information utilized by other field divisions are currently burdened with a tremendous amount of work, particularly in the security field. Requests under the above instructions in all probability will throw an additional load of a detailed file review nature upon such offices. Subsequently it is anticipated that a considerable time lag will result following the receipt of such requests in those offices and the time these requests can possibly be answered. It is believed that this unavoidable lag will cause a considerable delay in the preparation of many reports in that it will necessitate raintaining summary notes for a considerable period before dictation can be accomplished; may cause in some instances duplicate file reviews because of re-assignment of work and in general will result in a slow-down of the summary report program.

For these reasons, if so approved by the Bureau, the Portland Office will submit future summary reports utilizing information incrediately available in its files for evidence identification purposes on the administrative page. Should it be necessary to obtain additional information from another office, a lead will be set cut in the summary report for that effice to supply the needed data. Upon receipt of this information, the Fortland Office will submit amended administrative pages, thereby making the report current and complete in accordance with Bureau instructions.

An administrative tickler is in operation to insure verification on each Security Index subject on a six months basis, and five and one-half months after the last such verification, FD-154 is routed to the Agent who has identified the subject for apprehension purposes, or if the case is open, to the Agent to whom the case is assigned. In the case of those subjects found to be unemployed the tickler is set so that the employment is verified each two months until such time as the subject obtains employment.

Attached herewith is a list of names of individuals who were investigated under the Loyalty Program. The main loyalty file and subversive file numbers are shown where known.

The files will reflect that the majority of these subjects were still employed by the Government as of the date of the most recent information. A few will reflect the subjects to be no longer employed by the Government.

The loyalty investigation in each instance developed documentary evidence or an admission on the part of the individual of past membership or affiliation in the Communist Party or other revolutionary groups.

You are to call for all main files on each of these subjects and review them to determine whether the office of origin has received all pertinent loyalty reports and copies of any other reports where main security files are existent. In any instances where pertinent information has not been made available to the office of origin, such information should be furnished as enclosures to a memorandum to the office of origin.

If the main files do not reflect that a copy of hearings conducted before the Loyalty Review Board in each case is in the possession of the office of origin, the Washington Field Office should be requested to obtain a photostatic copy of the hearing and transmit it to the office of origin.

The office of origin should be requested to then:

(1) check its files for any derogatory information received subsequent to the Loyalty investigation; (2) review all information in its possession; (3) determine whether the subject should be included in the Security Index or whether he should be interviewed for information in his possession concerning subversive activities, and (4) advise the Bureau of its recommendation.

You may find that in many of these cases, current investigation is being and nducted or the above requirements have recently been complied with or some other action has been taken which would obviate the necessity for complying with the above instructions. If so, no further action need be taken by you.

The object of this review is to be fully certain that the Security Index Unit has taken all action necessary to assure that each of these cases has been fully developed as of this time and that all of these subjects have either been placed in the Security Index where warranted or consideration has been given to interviewing them for information in their possession.

Communications concerning this matter should bear the character Security Matter.

You are to complete this project by January 15, 1952. Your copy of this memorandum and the attached list should be returned with a notation adjacent to each name on the list as to the action you have taken in each case.
