Generally, she stated that if the Congressman had nothing on the agenda for a Friday, he would often times leave for home (Pennsylvania) on Thursday evening and return on Sunday evening. Otherwise, he would leave on Friday evening and return on Sunday evening.

She stated that the only time that "supervises her", is for matters such as scheduling annual and/or sick leave. Regarding the procedure for obtaining postage stamps, stated that a voucher with a control number must be filled out either in typewritten form or in pen and taken to the House Post Office. She stated that when the postage stamps are obtained, the employee must show his or her identification and sign the voucher which shows receipt of the stamps. She stated that she believes that the members are not required to sign the vouchers inasmuch as the postal employees probably know all of them by sight. She stated that the only

person in Congressman MURPHY's office who may request stamps is Congressman MURPHY himself. He also must sign the voucher authorizing the purchase of these stamps. She stated that the Congressman always prefers his stamps in sheets, rather than in rolls. She could think of no reason why he had this preference. She stated that the Congressman kept these sheets of stamps in his desk drawer. She stated that she was unaware of how many sheets at one time he kept there, or what was the greatest amount of stamps he kept at any one time. She stated that she was always allocated a specific amount of stamps for her need, and that when the other staffers needed stamps, they would come to her. She stated that she could recall no time when the staffers would go directly to Congressman MURPHY for stamps.

She stated that her need for stamps per month varied depending upon how many "non-frankable items" she mailed out. She stated that generally those items which required postage stamps were thank you cards, congratulatory letters/cards, overseas mail, and correspondence which contained a selfaddressed return envelope. She stated that she could not give an "average" number of items which required stamps per month. could only guess that ten would be an average number. She stated that twenty to thirty items "could be a lot". She stated that it was not uncommon for other staffers in the office to come to her for stamps. Generally one, two, three, or four were requested at a time for non-frankable correspondence. She stated that she can recall no one staffer who would come to her more often than the others for stamps. She stated that generally when she gets down to two to four postage stamps herself, she would go to Congressman MURPHY for an additional supply. She stated that he would generally tear off a portion of stamps from a sheet and give them to her. She stated that there was no set number of stamps he would give her each time. On a few occasions when the Congressman was not in his office, she would go into his drawer where the stamps were kept (which was unlocked) and take whatever she needed. She stated that she did not know how many sheets of stamps were in there on these occasions. \_stated that she never bought stamps from the House Post Office on her own but only at the request of Congressman MURPHY. It was her impression that he kept track of the amount of stamps in the office, and made decisions on when to purchase them. She can recall no time when he never had any stamps in the office.

He took the voucher along with the sheet prepared by laid it on the corner of his desk. She stated that this was the last she heard of this incident. She stated that to her knowledge, no other stamps had been purchased in his office since that time. After received grand jury subpoenas in July, 1992, Congressman MURPHY had a meeting in his office and discussed the procedure for stamp purchases with his staff members and advised them that he would provide legal representation for them if needed.


Regarding mass mailing procedures in Congressman
MURPHY's office, stated that she does not handle
anything in this regard. She stated that in general, she has nothing to
do with the Congressman's campaign and/or re-election efforts,
and she stated that she can recall no time when stamps were
purchase by either her or anyone in the office with campaign
checks.

Regarding her relationship with the other staff members in Congressman MURPHY's office, stated that she gets along well with everyone, however, does not "socialize" with them. She stated that she knows little of what the other staff members do in the office, and stated that she has never questioned their duties, particularly the amount of stamps that they had signed for on the vouchers that she receives to record be her monthly expenses. She stated that the only information that back she knows about Congressman MURPHY's stamp purchases was through back the media. Subsequent to the time that she received her subpoena for the grand jury, her attorney, advised her to discuss this matter with no one, particularly her co-workers in Congressman MURPHY's office.

Throughout the interview, AUSA showed various vouchers which were used for purchases of stamps and questioned her as to whether she had any knowledge why they were purchased. In particular, she was asked why on November 7,

## Ex-Aide to Kolter Indicted in House Post O

By Michael York Washington Post Staff Writer

A federal grand jury investigating the House Post Office yesterday indicted former congressional aide Gerald W. Weaver II on drug, obstruction of justice and conspiracy charges.

Weaver, 37, is a former assistant to Rep. Joe Kolter (D-Pa.), who also has been identified as a subject of the federal investigation. Kolter was defeated in a primary earlier this year.

The grand jury said Weaver cashed \$2,800 in checks at the Post Office to buy cocaine but lied and said the cash was used to buy stamps.

Weaver is the first congressional

of justice, tampering with a witness and conspiring to commit wire fraud. If convicted on all charges, Weaver could face a maximum sentence of 49 years and fines up to \$500,000. Federal sentencing guidelines could provide for a substantially shorter sentence.

The indictment alleged that ·Weaver attempted to persuade Magruder not to cooperate with the grand jury by promising him a job in Weaver's lobbying firm, a loan and assistance in finding a lawyer. In addition, the indictment charged Weaver with conspiring with Magruder and others to stage a

theft of a car owned by Weaver's wife and then file a false automobile insurance claim.

Magruder admitted embezzling more than \$13,000 from his stamp drawer at the House Post Office, concealing a material fact from federal investigators and conspiring to distribute drugs. In return, prosecutors agreed to drop a fourth charge, distribution of cocaine, which carries a maximum 25-year sentence.

Earlier this year, the grand jury subpoenaed the expense records from 1986 to April 1992 for Kolter. House Ways and Means Committee

# Ex-aide on Hill indicted on House postal charges

By Paul M. Rodriguez

A former top aide to Rep. Joe Kolter of Pennsylvania was indicted yesterday by a federal grand jury on charges of obstruction of justice and cashing \$2,800 worth of personalchecks at the House post office to buy cocaine.

Gerald W. Weaver II, 37, also was charged with a conspiracy to have his wife's 1987. Toyota Celica stolen in an insurance-fraud scheme, according to the 14-count indictment announced yesterday by U.S. Attorney Jay B. Stephens.

Mr. Weaver, a lawyer and lobbyist in the District, also was charged with tampering with a witness and with conspiring with a former business associate to conceal the nature of the checks used to buy cocaine.

Mr. Stephens said the indictment demonstrates that we will hold accountable those who seek to impede the ongoing criminal investigation into the operation of the House post office. Six former employees were convicted of a variety of charges, including sales of illegal narcotics and embezzlement.

Three Democratic congressmen — Reps. Dan Rostenkowski of Illinois, Austin Murphy of Pennsylvania and Mr. Kolter — were implicated in the scandal and served subpoenas to appear in person before the grand jury, which is probing whether House expense vouchers used to buy stamps were improperly converted to cash.

While all three congressmen denied any wrongdoing and invoked their Fifth Amendment rights to avoid testifying before the grand jury, they cooperated with other subpoenas for detailed office expense records and access to dozens of current and former congressional and campaign aides.

The indictment of Mr. Weaver alleges that he attempted to impede the grand jury's investigation by getting a former business asso-

ciate to write a letter falsely stating that he purchased about \$2,900 worth of postage for the company at the House post office.

Mr. Weaver allegedly tried to get a former post office employee, Wendell Magruder to conceal his knowledge of the cocaine purchases in return for a loan and a job.

Magruder pleaded guilty to embezzlement and cocaine-related charges and is cooperating with the federal probe, which started after cash shortages were discovered at the post office.

After a series of stories in The Washington Times beginning on Jan. 22, 1992, House lead; er's launched an investigation of the post office. The lawmakers fired Postmaster Robert V. Rota, 57, in mid-March.

After a six-month inquiry, a special House task force concluded that the post office, which operates as a contractor for the U.S. Postal Service in several locations on the House side of the Capitol, was grossly mismanaged.

Congressional and federal law enforcement officials who spoke on the condition that they not be identified said that the post office also was used for a variety of illegal activities such as cashing personal and campaign checks for cash and "other monetary services."

The grand jury is probing allegations of embezzlement and narcotics trafficking, said the officials.

In the indictment, Mr. Weaver is charged with buying cocaine from 1984 through Nov. 13, just five days before he allegedly gave false testimony before the grand jury.

Mr. Weaver, whose attorney, Russell F. Canan said "strongly denies these charges," worked for Mr. Kolter from 1983 until 1987, when he became a lobbyist-lawyer.

If convicted of all 14 counts, Mr. Weaver faces a maximum penalty of 49 years in prison and \$2.7 million in fines.

### Rep. Rostenkowski Faces New Pressure Over Use of Funds

By JOHN HARWOOD

Staff Reporter of THE WALL STREET JOURNAL WASHINGTON — Reports that Rep. Dan Rostenkowski spent \$99,000 in political contributions to rent office space in a family-owned building and to purchase stamps from the House post office could signal mounting political problems for the powerful House Ways and Means chairman.

The Chicago Sun-Times reported that the Illinois Democrat has spent \$73,000 in campaign funds to rent what appears to be a yacant office in a building he owns with his sister. The newspaper also said that two Rostenkowski-controlled political committees had indicated that they spent \$26,000 on stamps from the House post office, in addition to the widely reported \$29,000 in stamp purchases made by his congressional office.

Mr. Rostenkowski disputed the newspaper's claim that he had paid himself to rent a "phantom office," saying he uses the space to store campaign materials and monitor congressional activity on cable television. Aides to the veteran lawmaker yesterday noted that the newspaper reports didn't accuse the lawmaker of illegal actions. "He just is reiterating his previous statement that he has done nothing improper," said a spokesman.

The post office's operations are the subject of a federal grand jury investigation here. Mr. Rostenkowski and two other House members, Pennsylvania Democrats Joseph Kolter and Austin Murphy, declined to testify before the grand jury in July, dismissing the inquiry as a "fishing expedition." The grand jury has subpoenaed at least 20 current and former aides to Mr. Rostenkowski. The lawmaker has denied any wrongdoing, and his aides have said he hasn't been told that he is a target of an investigation.

Earlier this year, it was reported that a former post office employee told prosecutors that the 17-term lawmaker had received cash in exchange for vouchers intended for postage stamps for official use. Six post office employees have pleaded guilty to various charges arising from a criminal investigation of the office's operations that was begun last year by the U.S. attorney.

# Renting office from self

Rostenkowski on hook again

By Paul M. Rodriguez THE WASHINGTON TIMES

Rep. Dan Rostenkowski has reported little or no income on his annual financial disclosure statements for a building he owns in Chicago although his campaign has paid at least \$73,000 to rent space there during the past six years.

The Illinois Democrat, who chairs

the powerful tax writing Ways and Means Committee, listed one of two addresses for the building in North-side Chicago as a "rental" in his May 1992 disclosure form but said the venture produced no income. The 1992 form covered calendar, year 1991.

The building, which is worth from \$50,000 to \$1,000 in rental income in 1990, according to Mr. Rostenkowski's 1991 disclosure statement.

The Chicago Sun Times reported this week that his campaign has been renting an office space in the building from at least 1986 and has paid from \$500 to \$1,250 a month for an office in the building the congressman and his elder twin sisters inherited from their father in 1970.

The campaign funds, which have been paid to Nobel Building Accounts, have been listed as rent on public campaign expense reports filed several times a year with the Federal Election Commission. However, until the Sun-Times report, it was not known that Nobel Building Accounts was a yenture affiliated with the congressman's family

Mr. Rostenkowski's sister Gladys told the newspaper Friday, that the ground-floor space has been vacant for years and she knew nothing about it being leased for campaign purposes.

But Mr. Röstenkowski, who main-

tains two full-time congressional offices in Chicago, told the newspaper; "It is a normal office," and when asked who staffs it, he replied: "I am the staff."

Mr. Rostenkowski currently is being investigated by a federal grand: jury in the District for alleged wrongdoing at the House post office, including a stamps for cash scheme involving thousands of dollars in congressional expense vouchers.

Mr. Rostenkowski charged taxpayers and political funds \$55,000 for stamps from the post office since 1986 in several large transactions, the Sun-Times reported yesterday.

The newspaper said Mr. Rostenkowski bought \$1,000 or more in stamps from the House post office on at least 27 occasions

On the Chicago rental property, a spokesman in Mr. Rostenkowski's office could not explain yesterday why it was reported as a minor profitmaking venture in 1990, but not an income producer a year later. The spokesman also could not provide. details about the congressman's ties to the property or any financial connections Mr. Rostenkowski has with Nobel Building Accounts.

In a 1972 campaign filing, Mr. Rostenskowski listed the Chicago property — located at 1349 West Nobel St. — as headquarters of "Rostenkowski for Congress Committee." He also listed his personal residence in an adjacent building around the corner at 1372 West Evergreen St. It is in this back-to-back building complex bordered by Nobel and Evergreen streets that Mr. Rostenkow ski's family built at the turn of the century and he has lived in for years

The business and residence build ings apparently are connected inside in at least one section, accord-ing to sources familiar with the structures, where Mr. Rostenkowski and his surviving sister maintain separate residences.

Although Mr. Rostenkowski is a years in the House, he keeps his per sonal life and finances well protected.

For example, while his campaign committee now rents; the original

Nobel Building Accounts, Mr. Rostenkowski does not list such a venture on his private financial disclosure statements reviewed yesterday by The Times.

House officials and associates of the congressman suggested yesterday that Mr. Rostenkowski has avoided publicly disclosing his ties to Nobel Building Accounts through a series of complicated tax maneuvers that involve his family, including his elder sister and a daughter.

"Just because the man may be intimately involved with his family's affairs doesn't mean that he's done anything illegal," said one of the congressman's associates.

In fact, federal election laws are unclear about such arrangements; as are House ethics rules. Generally, the rules prohibit transactions that may cause a conflict of interest for a member. Lawmakers are also banned from enriching themselves well-known public figure after 34; with public funds, such as campaign monies.

The rules, however, do provide loopholes, such as allowing members to lease office spaces to their. campaign organizations so long as campaign headquarters on Nobel the rents are similar to those Street and pays \$1,250 a month to charged in the same area.

and involvement of the U.S. Postal Inspection Service (USPIS) in July of 1991.

Audits and other investigation conducted by the USPIS found that 9 of the 12 employees responsible for cash and stamps at the HPO were short a total of approximately \$37,000.00 out of a total cash and stamp accountability of approximately \$475,000.00. The USPIS and the Capitol Police determined that certain HPO employees were involved in the embezzlement of Government funds and other illegal activities such as drug trafficking, check kiting, failure to work overtime that was claimed, backdating of mail and the use of special HPO accounts to express mail personal items.


A total of five individuals have pleaded guilty as a result of this initial investigation conducted by the Capitol Police and the USPIS. These individuals and the crimes that they have pleaded to are as follows:

Per their plea agreements, the above named individuals all agreed to cooperate fully with the government in its investigation of the HPO.

Interviews of these individuals as well as independent investigation conducted by the Capitol Police and the USPIS determined, in addition to these individuals and charges, that the management of the HPO and various Representatives were involved in certain illegal activities. These illegal activities included the improper conversion of U.S. funds allocated for postal expenses to cash for the Representative's personal use and the utilization of the HPO to convert checks, drawn on the Representative's Campaign Fund accounts, to cash for the Representative's personal use.

Involvement of the Washington Field Division of the FBI into this matter was predicated upon the corroborative







Besides these three Congressman which are currently under active investigation, this second phase of this investigation has led to the identification of other House officers, staffers and other individuals who have been involved in this scheme or have attempted to obstruct this investigation. These individuals and their current status in this investigation are as follows:

In the way of background information for the Chicago Field Division, the aforementioned vouchers involved in these allegations are used to obtain various office services and supplies, including postage stamps for official mailings. To utilize a voucher to obtain postage stamps, a Member completes the voucher specifying the quantity and price of the item requested, and submits it to the House Post Office. The Member receives the stamps and a copy of the voucher. The original voucher is kept by the Director of

Accountable Papers until he forwards it to the House Finance Committee for reimbursement. After the voucher is paid, the Member's administrative expense account is debited in the amount of the voucher. The paid voucher itself is stored with the disbursing office of the Clerk of the House.





In 1980, WMFO conducted an investigation with parallel allegations regarding this "stamps for cash" scheme. This investigation, which was initiated upon a request for a preliminary investigation from the Department of Justice, centered around information that retiring Members from the House of Representatives were leaving office with large amounts of postage stamps obtained from the House Post Office. This matter was eventually closed as prosecution was declined by the Public Integrity Section of the Department of Justice due to lack of criminal intent on the part of the Members involved.

team, which contains personnel from WMFO, the USPIS and the U.S. Capitol police as well as the three Assistant United States Attorneys assigned to this matter, have subpoenaed and have

as well as other persons who may have knowledge of these allegations.

The sum and substance of these interviews has been to verify that very few, if any, postage stamps were used in the Washington or District offices of the subjects as Members have the Franking privilege, and most had no knowledge whatsoever that large amounts of stamps were being purchased. Also, corroborative information has been obtained concerning the conversion of campaign funds to cash by creating checks made payable to the HPO for postage expenses and then having these checks redeemed by the HPO Postmaster for cash.

Further, it is realized that there exists the distinct possibility that this practice may not have been limited to just the three Representatives currently under investigation. Efforts are being made to determine if additional members of Congress were involved in this scheme. It is WMFO's belief that additional allegations identifying

Additionally, recent allegations have arisen regarding the possibility that U.S. Government funds as well as campaign funds mays have been illegally utilized by Rostenkowski. These allegations stem from Federal Grand Jury testimony as well as recent articles published in various newspapers. These allegations, which currently are being actively pursued, center around the questionable ownership and payments of rent of office space in Chicago at 1347-1349 North Noble St., which Rostenkowski claims to be a campaign office but appears to be vacant, and the ownership and payment of rent for his District office located at 2148 North Damen St., also in Chicago. It is believed, from initial investigation, that Rostenkowski may be returning all, or a portion, of the rents paid for these properties to himself.

The captioned matter is receiving the highest priority at WMFO and at the office of the United States Attorney. It is the intent of the prosecutors assigned to this matter, as well as the Department of Justice, to proceed toward returning felony indictments against Rostenkowski, Kolter and Murphy at the earliest possible date and to expeditiously pursue investigation of any other Members who are identified as having participated in this scheme as well as staff employees and or associates who may have assisted or participated in any criminal activity.

The above is provided for informational purposes and to update Chicago as it is anticipated that additional leads for the Chicago Field Division will be forthcoming. Chicago's assistance in this matter to date has been outstanding and leads have been thoroughly covered in an expeditious manner which has greatly enhanced this investigation.

## Rostenkowski caught between powerful forces

FROM COMBINED DISPATCHES

House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski faces two serious challenges to his power from a Justice Department investigation and disgruntled colleagues.

The Chicago Democrat, whose role as chief

tax writer makes him one of the most powerful men in the House, is poised to play a key role in the coming year as gatekeeper to President-elect Clinton's economic and health care proposals.

House Democrats, responding in part to complaints that Mr. Rostenkowski seemed more responsive to President

responsive to President Bush than fellow Democrats over the past two years, voted to check the powers of all committee chairmen.

Fifty-three of the 258 Democrats expressed special displeasure with Mr. Rostenkowski, casting secret ballots to end his reign.

And two publications carried reports last week of possible fiscal impropriety by Mr. Rostenkowski, who earlier this year used the Fifth Amendment shield against self-incrimination before a grand jury investigating the House post office scandal.

The Chicago Sun-Times reported he spent \$55,000 on stamps at the House post office in the last five years. The newspaper said Mr. Rostenkowski had rented vacant space in a house owned by himself and his sister with \$73,000 in campaign funds, which violates no law.

Time Mazagine reported investigators believe stamp purchases by Mr. Rostenkowski and others may be part of a larger scheme to launder campaign funds and convert them for personal use.

Subpoenas issued in the case have made it clear that investigators are looking into whether lawmakers or their aides illegally channeled campaign contributions through the House post office, the magazine says.

Since Jan. 22, The Washington Times has published a number of articles on wrong-doing at the post office, including allegations that members of Congress converted stamps for cash, used post office employees for non-postal functions, circumvented restrictions on franked mail and made use of special post office boxes to collect campaign contributions:

The Times, citing government records, has reported apparent discrepancies in campaign postage and printing expenditures by

Mr. Rostenkowski and other Democratic congressmen.

According to House records and federal campaign reports, for example, Mr. Rostenkowski purchased \$16,750 worth of postage stamps with campaign funds during the 1989-1990 election cycle — enough to mail 67,000 first-class letters or more than twice a many bulk-mail circulars — even though he had no opponents. A first-class-mail stamp was then 25 cents.

The congressman's campaign printing, stationery and envelope disbursements for the same period totaled less than \$2,000.

District of Columbia U.S. Attorney Jay Stephens has issued subpoenas to Mr. Rostenkowski and two other House members for their office accounts going back to 1986, including their records involving purchases of postage stamps.

Mr. Stephens told a news conference last week that "substantive progress" was being made in the Rostenkowski and House post office investigations, and that he would pursue them to "an appropriate conclusion"

In the meantime, Mr. Rostenkowski will need to be looking over his shoulder at fellow Democrats. Congressional sources say Democrats tightened up rules covering committee chairman as a shot across the bow of Mr. Rostenkowski and other powerful chairmen.

"It's certainly not viewed that way from here," said a spokesman for Mr. Rostenkowski. "I know of no instance in which the leadership asked him for something and he didn't deliver."

Mr. Rostenkowski's opponents are ready to enumerate cases — but anonymously, a reflection of the Chicago congressman's power on Capitol Hill.

They accuse him of delaying action on extending jobless benefits, which set Democrats on a collision course with Mr. Bush. Mr. Rostenkowski liked to characterize himself as a friend of the president's.

They also say he stalled for a year a vote opposed by Mr. Bush to cut taxes on the middle class and raise them on the rich. Critics say, too, that Mr. Rostenkowski stalled consideration of health care legislation.

"It's all not true," the Rostenkowski spokesman said. "Obviously you can print whatever you want."

The spokesman also said Mr. Rostenkowski has led the way in promising to cooperate with Mr. Clinton's program in the coming year.

His colleagues will be watching, backed up by new rules, including one that requires a vote on removing a chairman if 50 members sign a petition. page, name of r, city and state.)

### Rostenkowski **Probe Grows** In Its Scope

**Grand Jury Gathering** Records of All Funds

Investigators, supervised by U.S. Attorney Jay B. Stephens, have obtained records here and in Chicago of Rostenkowski's bank accounts as well as financial records of his campaign organization, congressional

paign organization, congressional offices, business accounts and statements filed with financial institutions, the sources said.

In a telephone interview yesterday, Rostenkowski complained about the widening nature of the investigation, which he said included subpoenas to some employees who had become the control of the said of the sai worked for him only a few months. look guilty," he said.

The "net worth investigation"

goes well beyond the scope of the original probe begun last spring, which sought to determine whether Rostenkowski and two other House Rostenkowski and two other House Democrats converted congressional expense vouchers or campaign funds to cash through transactions that were made to look like stamp purchases at the House Post Office.

In addition, sources said, at least two criminal investigators from the Internal Revenue Service have been assigned to work full time on the investigation here and in Chicago.

worth of stamps by Rostenkowski's campaign and congressional office, as well as allegations that some vouchers that were supposed to be used for stamps were exchanged for cash.

The probe also is examining more than \$73,000 in payments made by Rostenkowski's campaign committees since 1986 to rent office space in a building adjacent to Rostenkowski's North Side Chicago house. Rostenkowski and his two sisters jointly own the building.

Stephens has said the grand jury also is investigating possible obstruction of justice, and sources said yesterday that inquiry focuses on whether Rostenkowski, several of his aides and their lawyers have improperly agreed to impede the investigation.

At least two of the lawyers for Rostenkowski aides have been paid with funds from the congressman's

campaign or from a political action committee controlled by Rostenkowski, the sources said. While such financial arrangements are not illegal, the sources said, an agreement to withhold evidence could violate federal law.

House counsel Steven Ross declined to comment Thursday about the legal representation of Rostenkowski aides, but sources familiar with the defense said it is not unusual, or improper, for lawyers and witnesses to share information about the investigation among themselves while at the same time declining to cooperate with the grand jury.

The grand jury met for four hours Thursday and heard testimony from several witnesses, including Robert J. Leonard, former chief counsel and staff director of the Ways and Means Committee. Leonard, who spent nearly three hours with the jury, was accompanied by Ross and two other House lawyers.

House Sergeant-at-Arms Werner

Brandt and the director of House members' payroll, George Chapin, also made brief appearances before the grand jury, apparently to deliver subpoenaed documents. Ways and Means Committee, press secretary James M. Jaffe also is scheduled to testify before the grand jury.

At least 18 aides in Rostenkowski's congressional office and on the committee staff were supoenaed by the grand jury between Nov. 6 and Dec. 31, according to formal notices filed this week with House Speaker Thomas S. Foley (D-Wash.).

The grand jury previously subpoenaed expense vouchers dating from 1986 to April 1992 for Rostenkowski and two others, Rep. Austin J. Murphy (D-Pa.) and former representative Joe Kolter (D-Pa.), who also are being investigated for possible misuse of youchers written for postage stamps.

# Besieged at the Pinnacle of Power

Ways and Means Chairman Rostenkowski Dogged by Ethics Questions as He Starts 18th Term

By Edward Walsh and Eric Pianin

During the first week of the new year, Rep. Dan Rostenkowski (Dill.) celebrated his 65th birthday and began his 18th term in Congress. He is at the pinnacle of power, and after 12 often frustrating years of dealing with Republican presidents he can look forward to a burst of legislative activity under a new Democratic chief executive when Bill Clinton takes office on Jan. 20.

So how is the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee feeling these days?

feeling these days?
"He feels sort of besieged," said a
Rostenkowski aide on Capitol Hill.

In fact, these are far from the best of times for the gruff Chicago Democrat who has held public office since the age of 24. In Washington, a federal grand jury is investigating whether Rostenkowski used unusually large, purported purchases of stamps from the House Post Office in an elaborate money-laundering scheme to convert campaign contributions and office expense vouchers into personal funds. That investigation has been broadened to include subpoenas of records of virtually all of Rostenkowski's financial transactions in recent years.

In Chicago, the Sun-Times has been in hot pursuit of Rostenkowski, most recently questioning why his campaign organization is paying \$1,250 a month to rent an apparently little-used office in a building owned by the congressman and his sister, who lives in an apartment above the storefront office.

No one likes to be a punching sea. Rostenkowski said in a telephone interview from his home in Chicago. He described himself as the continuing grand jury interestigation and its possible impact on his leadership role in Congress.

"I want to be a strong leader and chairman," he said. "I want to participate. That's why I ran again after 34 years. I didn't need 36 years."

The federal probe of allegations that Rostenkowski may have illegally pocketed nearly \$56,000 in public and campaign funds through an arrangement with House Post Office officials has left many of his

"As far as any of us are concerned, it's a non-issue," said Rep.
Benjamin C. Cardin (D-Md.), a member of the Ways and Means
Committee.

A similar skepticism exists among Rostenkowski allies in Chicago. "The initial reaction of people is that this is impossible," said Alderman Patrick J. O'Connor. "He had all that money in the campaign fund and he could have taken it. [The Post Office allegation] seems kind of inconsequential and most people are saying it doesn't make

Because of a change in the this month marked the last this month marked the last this retiring members of Congress conditions are considered in accumulated campaign funds for personal use. When he took the oath of office as a member of the 103rd Congress last week, Rostenkowski forfeited that right. "He raised his hand and gave away \$1 million," said Chicago banker William M. Daley, the brother of Mayor Richard M. Daley and a Rostenkowski confidant.

Still, U.S. Attorney Jay B. Stephens is pressing ahead and appar-

ently widening the investigation. Last week he began calling Rostenkowski aides before the grand jury. And while Rostenkowski's friends are quick to point to the forgone campaign funds as evidence that he is not driven by a desire to enrich himself. Rostenkowski has never fully explained why a member of Congress who enjoys free mailing privileges would need thousands of dollars in stamps.

In the recent telephone interview, Rostenkowski, citing his lawyers' advice, said he would not discuss the House Post Office investigation. He said he offered to meet informally with prosecutors and again cited his lawyers' advice as the reason he refused last summer to testify before the grand jury. Asked if there is a plausible explanation for his large stamp purchases, he said, "I think so."

Rostenkowski's allies in Chicago and in Washington hope that is the case, for the importance of the man they call "Rosty"—both to his city and his party—has never been greater. When Clinton bypassed william Daley for the post of transportation secretary, it left Chicago without a representative in the president's Cabinet for the first time in decades. Should the city's most powerful member of Congress then be toppled by the grand jury investigation, "that would be a tremendous blow to Illinois and Chicago," said Daley, reflecting the views of downtown business and political leaders.

But not everyone sees Rostenkowski that way. According to

David Axelrod, a Chicago poli cal consultant who worked for Rostenkowski in the Democratic primary last March, there is "a vast disparity between the two worlds" of Rostenkowski's life in Washington and Chicago. "He's exalted in Washington," Axelrod said. "He comes back here and he's just another old ward committeeman."

In November, running against a political unknown, Rostenkowski won 57 percent of the vote, a respectable showing but well below the overwhelming landslide margins he has enjoyed against hapless Republican opponents in the past. There were mitigating circumstances: He was beaten up by his primary opponent's negative campaign; he was a longtime incumbent in a year in which many other incumbents didn't survive; and about 80 percent of his district was new territory, including areas where Rostenkowski's antiabortion stance was unpopular.

But, Axelrod said, "there's been damage, no question about it. Right now the only stories you see associated with his name are negative. The question is what happens when he starts to move health-care reform and other major legislation through Congress."

Rostenkowski, who has chaired the Ways and Means Committee since 1981, is being counted on by many to play a crucial role in guiding Clinton's fiscal and health-care proposals through Congress.

By all accounts, he has quickly developed a close working relation-See ROSTENKOWSKI, A7, Col. 1

## Rostenkowski Asks Court To Bar Leaks

Rep. Dan Rostenkowski (D-III) asked a federal court yesterday to prevent what he called prosecution leaks in a grand jury investigation of the House Post Office, an aide to the lawmaker said.

The motion was immediately placed under seal by the chief judge of U.S. District Court, John Garrett Penn. The judge's chambers said court rules require that all grand jury matters be sealed.

Rostenkowski has acknowledged the grand jury is investigating his purchase of stamps at the House Post Office to determine whether he illegally obtained cash through stamp transactions. But he has denied any wrongdoing and accused U.S. Attorney Jay B. Stephens, a Republican, of conducting a political fishing expedition.

A Rostenkowski aide said the lawmaker's attorneys objected to placing the motion under seal, adding that Rostenkowski originally intended to make it public.

A number of news stories, quoting sources, have said that the original investigation of possibly illegal stamp transactions has expanded significantly. Areas now under investigation, according to the stories, include Rostenkowski's tax, financial and campaign records, campaign payments for office space in a Chicago building owned by the Rostenkowski family and alleged attempts to obstruct the probe.

## Scandals tax Rostenkowski

### **Dealings** are target of probe

Dan Rostenkowski, a con-summate Washington insid-er, finds himself at the center of a criminal investigation as he prepares to steer the in-coming Clinton administration's crucial economic and health-care through Congress proposals

Rostenkowski is the gruff, 18-term Democratic con-gressman from Chicago, longtime chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means committee and one of Washington's most influential elected officials.

But he's in hot water:

A series of Chicago SunTimes articles criticized him for spending \$73,000 in cam-paign money for renting of-fice space in a building he coowns. Rostenkowski said the space was a campaign office. The Sun-Times questioned

the use of the room, saying the arrangement was "slea-zy." House members aren't allowed to use campaign

money for personal use.

"It's not only brazen, it's illegal," says Rostenkowski's press secretary Pat Jones about the reported leaks.

"Rostenkowski is a su-preme pork politician," says Chicago political consultant Don Rose, who informally advised his Democratic pri-

mary opponent last year.

way of the Chicago machine politician is to beat the game. It doesn't matter if you're

beating the game for pennies, nickels or dimes." Chicago media consultant David Axelrod, who worked on behalf of Rostenkowski in

on benan of Rostenkowski in the last campaign, has a dif-ferent point of view.
"This guy's got some big is-sues on his mind," Axelrod says. "The notion of him sit-ting down there plotting and scheming to get \$500 in walking around money is crazy. It just doesn't make sense."

Rostenkowski's decision to run for an 18th term last year means he forfeits \$1 million in campaign funds he could've kept had he retired. First elected to the House in 1959, Rostenkowski enjoyed comfortable victory margins for years — often

running unopposed.

But the 1992 election was his hardest race. He had a primary opponent for the first time in his career and he ars time in his career and he won his general election in November by his smallest winning margin ever — winning with only 59% of votes. During the course of the post office investigation, six

postal employees have plead-

postal employees have plean-ed guilty and former post-master Robert Rota resigned. Rostenkowski and Reps. Austin Murphy and Joe Kolter, both Democrats from Pennsylvania, were subpoenaed before a grand jury last summer but invoked their Fifth Amendment rights against self-incrimination.

Aides to the congressmen have since been subpoenaed and questioned.

The investigation "is clear-ly already interfering with his ability to run his committee and move legislation through Congress, by his own admission," says Heritage

admission, says heritage Foundation congressional an-alyst David Mason. "He's distracted as one nat-urally would be," he says. Democratic Caucus rules would require Rostenkowski to sten down as chairman of to step down as chairman of Ways and Means if indicted.

Stephens, who serves at the pleasure of the president, surely will be replaced with-in the next several months. But his Democratic re-

placement might find it diffi-cult to end a longstanding in-vestigation that also has an impaneled grand jury.

Any decision to indict a po-

litical figure as prominent as Rostenkowski would likely need approval from high Justice Department officials.

But the incoming Demo-cratic president might be exnected to remain uninvolved to maintain the appearance of impartiality.
