2nd Aide's Lawyers Paid by Campaign Fund

Rep. Dan Rostenkowski (D-III.) now has spent more than \$153,000 in campaign funds to pay lawyers representing him and his aides in a

federal grand jury investigation, records show. Federal Election Commission reports released Monday indicate that the Rostenkowski for Congress committee paid \$62,507 in the last five weeks of 1992 as an investigation of improprieties at the House Post Office widened to include aspects of the Northwest Side congressman's personal finances.

Rostenkowski's mounting legal bills are one barometer of how seriously federal prosecutors are pursuing the investiga-

tion. The Rostenkowski fund reported for the first time that it is paying lawyer bills for Mary A. Lesinski, a legislative aide in Rostenkowski's congressional office in Washington.

Lesinski, whose annual federal salary is about \$29,000; received \$36,403 from the campaign to reimburse her for legal expenses. Lesinski's

The campaign fund also paid \$16,113 between Nov. 24 and Dec. 31. to reimburse Virginia C. Fletcher, Rostenkowski's top aide in his Washington office, for her legal expenses. Earlier, Fletcher had received \$19,393 from the campaign for her legal bills!

Fletcher, who oversees Rostenkowski's office expenses as his \$95,000-a-year administrative assistant, has worked for him since 1963.

In November, the federal grand jury subpoenaed about 20 current or former staffers from Rostenkowski's office and records from his 1992 campaign.

The grand jury had been investigating whether Rostenkowski and two other congressmen or their staffs used the House Post Office to convert government vouchers or campaign checks into

cash through phony transactions disguised as stamp purchases.

The investigation has broadened into other Rostenkowski transactions, including one reported Dec. 13 by the Chicago Sun-Times in which the congressman paid himself and his sisters rent for a little-used campaign office in a building they own adjacent to his home.

Rostenkowski's payment of the legal bills with campaign funds is permitted by the House of Representatives. But federal prosecutors appear to view with suspicion the arrangement to reimburse his aides. One former Rostenkowski staffer who went before the grand jury said he was questioned about who was paying his lawyer.

A Rostenkowski spokesman has said the practice is legal and proper.

Rostenkowski's own lawyers at Brand & Lowell were paid \$5,912 in campaign funds during the latest reporting period, records show. They had received \$66,000 previously from the campaign.

The campaign also has paid about \$10,000 to the Chicago law firm of Katten Muchin Zavis & Dombroff. Rostenkowski aides would not say, what role the law firm has in the investigation.

Meanwhile, state campaign reports showed that Republicans are positioned much better financially than Democrats for 1994 races for

governor and secretary of state.

Gov., Edgar had \$2,371,341 in his campaign fund on Dec. 31, while his fellow Republican,

Secretary of State George Ryan, had \$1,015,772.

The three Democrats holding statewide offices reported the following balances: Attorney General Roland W. Burris, \$305,989; Treasurer Patrick Quinn, \$112,211, and Comptroller Dawn Clark Netsch, \$55,647. Another potential candidate for governor, Cook County Board President Richard J. Phelan, reported last week that his campaign had \$383,490 in the bank.

Mayor Daley has \$895,483 in his fund.

The disclosure reports also showed that former Senate President Philip J. Rock (D-Oak Park) paid back \$10,000 in personal loans from his campaign committee. Rock has said the loans were used to pay for college expenses for his children. His campaign fund still has \$627,474.

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Prosecutors quizzed on Rostenkowski leaks

WASHINGTON—A federal judge wants government prosecutors to explain alleged leaks about a grand jury investigation of House Ways and Means chairman Dan Rostenkowski (D-III.) Judge John Garrett Penn said six newspaper and magazine articles and a TV broadcast dating back to last May appear to reveal information that was presented to the grand jury. The Chicago congressman asked Penn last week to hold U.S. Atty. Jay Stephens in contempt of court, blaming him for leaks. For 15 months, Stephens office has been leading a grand jury investigation into the House post office scandal, in which Rostenkowski is under suspicion of diverting campaign money to personal use, taking money from the post office and violating tax laws. Stephens has denied his office leaked any information. No date was set for the contempt hearing.

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Moseley-Braun Debt Grows

Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun's political fund will-have to dig deeper to climb out of campaign debt with a report released Tuesday showing that the committee owes \$543,871; or \$97,182 more than previously stated.

Moseley-Braun's latest Federal-Election Commission report shows a total of \$6.5 million in expenditures and debts of \$541,871. Most of the increase in spending was because of bills received by the campaign after the Nov. 3 election.

The new report shows a \$7,500 debt to Kgosie Matthews, Moseley-Braun's campaign manager, whom she acknowledged dating after her return from Africa and England in December.

The senator has done relatively little fund-raising since the election, raising only \$49,637.

In contrast, her Republican opponent, Richard S. Williamson, raised \$24,555 during the same Nov. 24-Dec. 31 reporting period. His disclosure report shows he still owes \$172,462 on a \$2.4 million campaign.

Senator Leaving Costly Tower

Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun (D-Ill.) is leaving the \$3,000-a-month luxury Lake Point Tower penthouse apartment she had moved into last Thanksgiving after selling her South Shore condominium.

The Lake Point Tower lease expired Jan. 31, and the senator is close to buying a home in the city, said chief of staff Michael Frazier.

Meanwhile, Frazier said, Moseley-Braun's Chicago home will be the South Shore residence of her brother, Joey, a Chicago homicide detective. In Washington, D.C., Moseley-Braun has rented a twobedroom apartment in the Kalorama section.

The move to Lake Point Tower had been a political problem for Moseley-Braun because it seemed to clash with the working-mother image she cultivated during the campaign. Frazier said it was not intended as a permanent residence.

Braun's campaign used the private planes of two politically connected Downstate lawyers, Paul Pratt and L.

Thomas Lakin.

Planes from Pratt's East Alton law firm were used for trips in June and July, said Michael Frazier, the senator's chief of staff. However, billings of \$5,147 for those trips are just appearing on the new report.

Lakin, a political associate of state Rep. James McPike (D-Alton), had his Wood River law firm plane provide \$8,868 in charter service in July and on Nov. 2.

• A political action committee controlled by Rep. Dan Rostenkowski (D-Ill.) gave Braun \$5,000. State Lottery Director Desiree Rogers, who works for Republican Gov. Edgar, gave \$1,000. Her husband, Jonathan, was a finance chair for Moseley-Braun.

Another report filed Jan. 28 shows Braun still owes \$8,800 to a campaign fund that financed her previous recorder of deeds campaign. Braun lent herself \$10,000 from the fund to payfor personal expenses. She repaid \$1,200 to the fund Aug. 12, the report shows.

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Moseley-Braun owes \$544,000, report says

Rostenkowski pays \$153,000 in fees

By Ray Gibson

U.S. Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun, who raised more than \$6.5 million for her Senate race last year, owes nearly \$544,000, according to campaign finance reports filed Tuesday.

Moseley-Braun's cash-strapped political fund has been mired in debt since the November election, and without the benefit of any large fundraiser, the debt has continued to increase, the report shows.

Michael Frazier, Moseley-Braun's chief of staff, said the debt was typical of many Senate candidates and that it eventually will be erased.

In another congressional filing, U.S. Rep. Dan Rostenkowski's political committee revealed it has now paid out more than \$153,000 for legal expenses stemming from the ongoing federal grand jury probe in Washington of his personal finances.

Moseley-Braun, a Democrat, filed a report in December showing campaign debts of \$477,000. In the final weeks of 1992, the debt increased to \$544,000 as the campaign paid past due bills and salaries of former staffers.

During the final weeks of the year, Moseley-Braun became mired in controversy. She was forced to defend her hiring of patronage employees at the Cook County recorder of deeds office, her handling of a sexual harassment investigation of campaign workers' charges, and her 26-day vacation in Africa with her campaign manager, Kgosie Matthews.

The controversies took a toll on fundraising. Campaign reports show she raised only \$49,637 in 1992's final five weeks. Her campaign spent \$83,201 in the same period.

According to Federal Election Commission reports, only six other candidates for Senate had debt levels higher than Moseley-Braun's. Brook Johnson, a Connecticut millionaire who unsuccessfully challenged U.S. Sen. Christopher J. Dodd, was the leader, ending his campaign with \$1.9 million owed to himself and others.

While Moseley-Braun was in debt, Rostenkowski was dipping into one of his political war chests, which holds \$1.3 million.

The federal probe began last year and originally focused on whether the Northwest Side Democrat illegally converted postage stamps purchased from the House Post Office for cash. It has broadened into a more wide-ranging investigation of his personal finances.

Rostenkowski's congressional campaign fund paid \$62,500 in the final weeks of 1992 to his Washington lawyers as well as paying the legal expenses of two aides and other Washington staff members.

The lastest disclosure shows Rostenkowski's committee reimbursed legislative aide Mary Lesinski more than \$36,000 for her legal bills in late November.

Lesinski, who could not be reached for comment Tuesday, receives a salary of about \$25,000, federal reports show.

Rostenkowski previously disclosed that he was paying legal fees for his longtime administrative assistant, Virginia Fletcher, and that another law firm had been hired to represent other aides.

In late November, Rostenkowski's committee paid another \$16,113 for Fletcher's legal expenses and \$4,079 in expenses for other Washington staff members, according to the report and interviews.

Fletcher, who receives more than \$90,000 annually as Rosten-kowski's top aide, has now received \$35,506 for legal fee reimbursement, while the law firm of Katten Muchin Zavis & Dombroff has received more than \$10,000 on behalf of other Washington staffers.

Judge Rejects Rostenkowski's Complaint Against Prosecutors

A federal judge yesterday dismissed House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski's complaint that prosecutors leaked details about a grand jury's investigation of him to the news media.

"The court is satisfied that the

"The court is satisfied that the government has shown that it was not the source of the leaks," said Chief U.S. District Judge John Garrett Penn.

Based on identals in sworn affidavits from U.S. Attorney Jay B. Stephens, former attorney general William P. Barr, FBI-Director William S. Sessions and 71 other prosecutors, federal officials or law enforcement officers, Penn said he is convinced "that the government did not divulge the information," related to the grand jury's probe of irregularities at the House Post Office.


Rostenkowski (D-III.) has acknowledged that stamp purchases by his office and their alleged conversion into cash are being probed. But he has denied any wrongdoing and accused Stephens, a Republican, of politicizing the investigation.

Rostenkowski last week asked Penn to hold an open-court hearing on why Stephens should not be held in contempt for violating grand jury secrecy (rules. The congressman cited 13 newspaper and magazine articles and two television broadcasts about various aspects of the investigation.

Stephens had suggested that virtually all of the information in the articles or newscasts cited by Rostenkowski originated from either Rostenkowski, his staff and attorneys, other House colleagues, or grand jury witnesses or their attorneys not subject to the secrecy rules.

Rostenkowski again target of an old foe

Their campaign was a year ago, but former Ald. Dick Simpson was still lobbing grenades Thursday at U.S. Rep. Daniel Rostenkowski, alleging that the powerful incumbent illegally used political funds to win re-election.

At a downtown news conference, Simpson said he will file formal complaints against Rostenkowski with the Federal Election Commission and the House Ethics Committee, asking them to investigate \$37,750 in spending by the Northwest Side Democrat from his America's Leaders Fund.

The Chicago-based political action committee, one of five that Rostenkowski controls, is registered as a state campaign fund and cannot be used to supplement the congressman's federal fund in his election efforts.

But Simpson, who unsuccessfully challenged_Rostenkowski_in_the March primary, maintains that the money was transferred from the America's Leaders Fund to the campaign committees of six other candidates and 11 party leaders in the new 5th Congressional District to benefit Rostenkowski's campaign.

Because of reapportionment, Rostenkowski ran in a city-suburban district that was largely unfamiliar to him. Nearly \$22,000 of the America's Leaders Fund contributions were doled out to political organizations in the new district.

Moreover, Simpson said, Rostenkowski has used the committee as a "slush fund" to get around federal campaign-financing laws prohibiting corporations from contributing to congressional campaigns.

A spokesman for Rostenkowski, the House Ways and Means Committee chairman, denied that anything illegal occurred. "Dick Simpson is wrong on the facts and wrong on the law, as usual," the spokesman said from Washington.

Simpson acknowledged that he is exploring a second bid for the 5th District seat in 1994.

In the last year, Rostenkowski has become the target of a federal grand jury investigation in Washington over transactions at the House Post Office and has come under fire for using campaign funds to pay himself and relatives rent for office space and for leased cars. Last month, the watchdog group Common Cause asked the Ethics Committee to investigate his finances.

Campaign-finance reports filed by the America's Leaders Fund show that the committee disbursed amounts ranging from \$500 to \$3,000 to suburban mayors, Democratic ward committeemen and candidates running with Rostenkowski on the organization slate.

Though he acknowledged that he

could not prove anything illegal, Simpson asserted that it was up to Rostenkowski and his allies to prove that the money from the America's Leaders Fund did not wind up helping the Ways and Means chairman's campaign.

Franklin Park Mayor Jack Williams, whose political organization received \$500 from the America's Leaders Fund, said: "He [Rostenkowski] knows we're the head of the Franklin Park precinct organization, and he thought this would help out on Election Day for precinct captains."

Rostenkowski's spokesman said the fund "exists for the explicit purpose of giving money to candidates. There was no quid pro quo in terms of them getting the money."



Mr. Rostenkowski, a Democrat from Chicago and the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, is probably the single most important lawmaker on economic and social policy issues. All legislation on taxes, Social Security, health care, welfare, unemployment compensation and most other items high on Mr. Clinton's agenda must originate in Mr. Rostenkowski's committee. A master-

ly legislator and unwavering supporter of Mr. Clinton, he is also perhaps the President's strongest hand in Congress.

But for a year-Mr. Rostenkowski has been under investigation by a grand jury led by Jay B. Stephens, the United States Attorney for the District of Columbia, a Republican who once worked in the Reagan White House and who seems to enjoy cases that put him in the

limelight.

If Mr. Rostenkowski is indicted, he must step aside as committee chairman, and the consensus in the Administration and in Congress is that no one else is remotely his equal when it comes to managing a fractious committee and handling controversiál legislation.

He says his lawyers have been told that he is not a target of the investigation. Indeed, no solid evidence of illegal activity by Mr. Rostenkowski has become public.

His friends say they cannot imagine that he had his hand in the petty-cash drawer. He could have retired and not run for re-election last year and kept more than \$1 million in leftover campaign funds, the last year it was legally possible for him to do so. If he were crooked, some supporters said, he could have found lobbyists in town who would have backed up a Brinks truck to his office and dropped off whatever loot he wanted:

But Mr. Stephens, who has said little about the case publicly, appears to have something, and he is pursuing it with an aggressiveness that seems to indicate that he thinks he can win an indictment. Time magazine reported last week, without saying where the information came from, that an indictment was expected this spring or summer.

If it happens, Mr. Clinton will lose the strong arm of perhaps Congress's most skillful manipulator of the legislative process. House post office chief takes pride in reforms

By Paul M. Rodriguez

Since he took over the House post office last spring, Michael Shinay has worked diligently to upgrade and depoliticize the facility.

"I- think I've succeeded," Mr Shinay said in an interview with The Washington Times: "This is a much

better place, I hope?

"People have worked very hard, and I think it shows? the former senior executive with the U.S. Postal Service said, happily pointing out the changes he has instituted since taking over.

For starters, he has cut the staff from around 160 to about 145, climinated much of the overtime budget his predecessor had built into the system and made better use of highspeed, high-tech mall handling equipment.

In all, Mr. Shinay said/he's helped save about \$350,000 in operating costs, including reduced overtime, in the short time he's been postmas-

"Don't give me any more money," he said, recalling a recent request to the House Appropriations legislative subcommittee. "That's, what I told them. I want to use some of what we've saved to pay staff more and to upgrade some jobs...

"We mail out about 100 million pieces of mail each year," Mr. Shinay said during a tour of the underground processing center in the Rayburn House Office Building, "That's a lot of mail, but nothing that we can't do, and do better."

A House panel, formed last year to investigate the post office amidallegations of embezzlement and drug sales, concluded that the facility was grossly mismanaged:

The panel, which spent six months looking into the scandal, also concluded that the former postmaster, Robert V. Rota, had inflated the volume of mail received and sent out by millions of pieces to justify a bloated budget that paid for unqualified patronage employees.

Mr. Shinay said those days were over, noting that he has terminated 15 or so employees since taking the

He also said he has not been asked for favors from members of Congress, such as free mailings, and has not been pressured to here or fire

"We have an evaluation system now to hiring employees," Mr. Shinay said, noting that all jobs are awarded on merit, not patronage.

Interviews with staff imembers offered a mixed bag of praise and complaints about the new management, but overall, employees said things were better.

"I don't feel like I'm just a piece of meat anymore," a clerk said. "If I've got a complaint, I don't have to be afraid anymore about losing my

Mr. Shinay said he encourages his

workers to talk to him about come plaints and to suggest how to make things work more efficiently. "My," adding with a chuckle, "and they use it."

The postmaster said he has other changes in the works, like getting new equipment to process the mail? He said that will help double the \$70,000 he plans to save this year through the bar-coding system he in stituted.

Mr. Shinay said he also has instituted an internal audit system where each window teller who sells stamps and takes mail from walk in customers is audited at least once every 90 days.

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New allegations slow House postal probe

By Paul M. Rodriguez

What started last year as a straightforward criminal probe of embezzlement and drug sales at the House post office has been bogged down by a variety of new allegations uncovered by prosecutors on and off Capitol Hill.

Despite the seemingly slow pace of U.S. Attorney Jay B. Stephens' probe, however, prosecutors are said to be confident that by spring they can hand up criminal indictInvestigation into drug sales includes lawmaker

ments against several people, including Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee.

Complicating matters is the uncertain status of the chief prosecutor in the case, Mr. Stephens, a Republican appointee who could be removed from office any day and replaced by a Clinton administration nominee.

Current and former federal law enforcement, congressional and other sources who agreed to speak to The Washington Times on the condition of anonymity said the tatest allegations involve everything from petty crimes to more serious violations of campaign finance laws to illegal drug sales by lobbyists, staff members and, in at least one case, a member of Con- leadership last year.

"It's like a family tree," said one source. "You end up finding relatives you never knew you had's

In addition, The Times has been told that illegal drug activities including sales of cocaine and PCP, continue at the House post office, despite the cleanup efforts initiated by the badly embarrassed House Michael Shinay, the House post-master, said he is unaware of these activities but acknowledged that he has not instituted a drug screening process for his employees despite the House post office's past problems in this area. When he has heard about an employee's involvement with drugs, Mr. Shinay said, he has referred the employee to an assistance program,

The postmaster has set up workshops with the House employee as-

sistance program to conduct seminars about drug and alcohol abuse. "Yes, we have several people who are in the program," he said. "Some have gone on their own, and some we have sent."

Regarding the drug allegations, the U.S. Attorney's Office has been told that:

• Lobbyists have bought and sold tens of thousands of dollars of cocaine in the past few years while conducting business in the House and Senate. The illegal drug sales are said to involve people who work or have worked in congressional offices and suppliers affiliated with local street gangs.

One or more members of Congress are suspected of illegal drug use, such as cocaine use at private parties both on and off Capitol grounds.

• Lobbyists and House employees have bought and sold cocaine at the Democratic Club and the Capitol Hill Club, locations where Democrats and Republicans, respectively, gather during lunch and dinner to discuss business and socialize.

Whether any of the new allegations leads to charges is up to Mr. Stephens' office and the federal grand jury investigating the House post office. Both are said to be overwhelmed with the amount of information being generated by the investigation.

Mr. Stephens has declined all requests for comment.

Prosecutors already have secured five guilty pleas from former low-to mid-level post office clerks and the, conviction of the former post office chief of staff on charges ranging from drug peddling and use to embezzlement.

House Postmaster Robert V. Rota, who was forced to resign last March, is still under investigation for possible civil and criminal violations. An aide to then-Rep. Joe Kolter, Pennsylvania Democrat, has been indicted on charges of cocaine distribution, mail and wire fraud, and filing a false claim of an automobile theft.

Along with Mr. Kolter, two current senior House Democrats — Mr. Rostenkowski, of Illinois, and Austin. Murphy of Pennsylvania — are under scrutiny by the grand jury, as are current and former staff aides to the members.

The high-profile position of Mr. Rostenkowski, chairman of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee, has overshadowed much if not most of the media's attention since a House task force last summer released the results of an internal sixmonth probe into the post office scandal.

That task force, itself a first in Congress by nature of its bipartisan composition, concluded that the Democratic controlled House patronage system was at the root of most of the post office's problems.

Besides patronage, the power of members to place family and friends in congressional positions, the task force found gross misman agement at the postal facility and a pattern of abuse involving free mail worth hundreds of thousands of dollars arranged for certain powerful House members.

The post office, which operates in five locations on the House side of the Capitol, serves as an independent contractor for the U.S. Postal Service.

While the task force sent recommendations and the names of up to a dozen. House members and staff to the House ethics committee for follow-up investigation, no activity on the referrals has occurred pending the outcome of the criminal probe by the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Sources told The Times that hundreds of people have been interviewed in the criminal investigation about the new allegations. Prosecutors, the sources said, are tracking down all leads, but, said one, "You've got to remember, Stephens only has three prosecutors working on this."

Even when indictments are made public, "this thing is far from over I expect they're in it for the long haul," another source said, adding that new allegations are being investigated almost daily.

"This isn't a Lawrence Walsh type of thing," one source said, referring to the \$35-million-plus, six-year investigation by the Iran-Contra independent counsel.

"They don't have unlimited resources like Walsh had," the source said. "It's not like they don't have other cases to work on."

Involvement of the Washington Metropolitan Office of the Federal Bureau Of Investigation (FBI) in this matter was a result of a request for assistance by the United States Attorney (USA) for the District of Columbia in May of 1992. The USA's office, aided by the United States Postal Inspection Service (USPIS) and the United States Capitol Police (USCP), had been involved in an investigation into improprieties at the United States House of Representatives Post Office (HPO) since April of 1991.

The initial allegations under investigation by the USA centered around crimes committed by HPO Stamp Clerks and other HPO Staffers that included conspiracy, drug possession, embezzlement and other charges. As a result of this initial investigation six HPO employees have pleaded guilty to felony charges, one has been indicted and is currently awaiting trial, and one is expected to be indicted within the next 30 days. All of the individuals—who have pleaded guilty have entered into cooperation agreements with the Government.

Specifically, involvement of the FBI was predicated upon corroborative information provided by one of the individuals who had entered into a cooperation agreement with the Government. This information corroborated previous information that at least three U.S. Congressmen and the former House Sergeant-at-Arms, aided by utilized the HPO b7C to obtain sums of cash through the illegal use of a voucher system that is available to Members of Congress. 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Congressmen have been identified as Dan Rostenkowski, Joe Kolter and Austin Murphy. The former House Sergeant-at-Arms is Jack Russ.

Investigation conducted into this matter has developed information that these Representatives were also utilizing the HPO to obtain cash from their respective campaign funds. This was accomplished by the Representatives authorizing checks, which were written on campaign accounts for postage expenses, made payable to the Postmaster of the HPO. In reality, no postage expenses were incurred. These checks were then cashed at the HPO and the funds were provided to the Representatives. Additionally, investigation is being conducted regarding Rep. Rostenkowski's payments for District Office space in Chicago, his payments for campaign office space and the leasing of three automobiles which were intended for use by his District Office.

The USA has provided a favorable prosecutive opinion in this matter and aggressive investigation of this case is continuing.
