Jury selection starts in sexual-torture case

ESTANCIA - Jury selection in the retrial of an Elephant Butte man accused of sexual forture began today, although David Parker Ray's actual trial won't begin until January to avoid conflict with the holiday, season.

Ray is being retried on charges that he kidnapped and sexually tortured a Colorado woman in 1996 in Truth or Consequences. Two other similar cases also are pending against him.

Jury selection probably will take weeks. state District Judge Neil Mertz said. Smaller groups of potential jurors will be questioned over a number of days instead of a single pool of 50 to 100, Mertz said.

The trial probably will not begin until af-. ter the new year, Mertz said. Lee McMillian, Ray's new attorney, said the trial is targeted to begin Jan. 2.

Attorneys for both sides said many factors make this a different case from the one that ended in a mistrial in Tierra Amarilla in July 15, the Colorado woman.

The public defender did a good job of District Attorney Ron Lopez will no longer be in office when the trial begins. He was defeated by Clint Wellborn in the Nov. 7 general election.

Lopez was unsure whether he would participate in jury selection. In the meantime, he said he is trying to make the transition as simple as possible.

Wellborn said Assistant District Attorney Jim Yontz, who argued the first case, will: stay on and lead the prosecution of Ray.

"Jim has been handling the case from the beginning," Wellborn said. "I think Jim is a very capable attorney and he will do a good iob with it."

Wellborn said he will take office Jan. 2 and probably will not have a hand in the prosecution because he will have too many responsibilities getting settled into his new job. McMillian said leaving Yontz in the position would be logical.

"You'd have to be stupid to get rid of Yontz. He has 20 years of experience. He knows the case," McMillian said.

Ray's first trial was moved to Tierra Amarilla because defense attorneys argued he could not get a fair trial in Truth or Consequences because of the publicity surrounding the case.

McMillian said he thinks Estancia is probably one of the best sites possible for the next

"Let's face it, there's not anybody in New Mexico that doesn't think they know all about this case already," McMillian saids "As long as we're not in Albuquerque or Tor C, I suspect anywhere we go is going to be about the same."

Unlike Rein, he said he plans to call witnesses in Ray's defense. However, he said he wouldn't know if Ray would take the stand until the moment arrived.



Ray Trial Jury Pool Questioned

Prosecutor Describes Graphic Testimony.

ESTANCIA — A prosecutor told potential jurors Monday that the retrial of a man accused of sexual torture would be rife with nudity, graphic photos and explicit fan-guage. Assistant District Attorney Jim

Yontz and defense attorney Lee McMillian began what promises to be a weeks-long process of picking a jury for David Parker Ray's second trial on charges that he kidnapped and sexually tortured a Colorado woman in 1996 in Truth or Consequences.

Yontz asked four men called for possible jury duty Monday morning if they had a problem with the material. All four said no.

He asked one woman if she could describe a rapist.

When she said she no and he asked why not, she responded: "Because you can't tell from the outside."

McMillian asked several potential

State District Judge Neil Mertz said jury selection probably would take weeks as smaller groups of potential jurors are questioned over a number of days instead of in a single pool of 50 to 100:

The Elephant Butte man faces trial on 12 charges; six counts of criminal sexual penetration and one each of kidnapping, assault with intent to commit a violent felony, criminal sexual contact, conspiracy to commit kidnapping, conspiracy to commit criminal sexual penetration and conspiracy to commit criminal sexual contact.

Court affirms Hendy conviction

SANTA FE - The state Court of Appeals on Thursday upheld the convictions of Cynthia Hendy, who pleaded guilty to helping David Parker Ray kidnap and sexually torture women.

Hendy was sentenced in May to 36 years in prison.

Ray, her ex-boyfriend, is charged with kidnapping and sexually torturing three women in his Elephant Butte home. Ray's first trial ended with a deadlocked jury earlier this year, and he faces a retri-

Last year, Hendy pleaded guilty

to two counts of kidnapping, two counts of criminal sexual penetration and one count of conspiracy to commit kidnapping in connection with the abductions and sexual tortures of two women.

As part of an April 1999 plea deal, Hendy agreed to cooperate with investigators in exchange for a lighter sentence than life in prison. The judge could have sentenced her from a minimum of 12 years in prison to a maximum of 54 years.

One of the victims said she was kidnapped by Hendy and Ray in Albuquerque in March 1999. She

said she escaped three days later. She was found wearing only a padlocked metal collar and chain.

In the appeal, Hendy's lawyer contended that the district court made a mistake in not allowing herto withdraw her guilty plea.

The Court of Appeals disagreed, saying the district court's record "indicates that defendant was aware of and understood the plea terms, and that her attorney reviewed extensively the case with her. Defendant's assertion that expediency and efficiency in the justice system somehow prejudiced her is thus unpersuasive."



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Jury selection to begin Ray case

ALBUQUERQUE - Jury selection in the retrial of an Elephant Butte man accused of abducting and sexually torturing a Colorado woman is scheduled to begin Nov. 27, but a trial will not immediately follow.

Ajury will be selected in Torrance County for the retrial of David Parker Ray. In July, a Rio Arriba County jury failed to reach a verdict on 12 counts and a judge declared a mistrial.

After jurors are picked for the second trial, "the court's going to take a break (for the holidays) and reconvene in January. That's when the testimony will begin," District Attorney Ron Lopez said.
Ray faces similar charges in cases involving two other victims.



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
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David Parker Ray An Overview of Case 31B-AQ-52484

Spencer said there are subcategories of post-traumatic stress disorder, and one of them is re-experiencing events, as the alleged victim in this case does.

Another subcategory is avoid-

ance, he said.

"The person would block out the memory so they can't share" did not go to police earlier.

Among things she has avoided as a result have been sexual encounters, which have caused problems with her current husband, Spencer testified under questioning by Assistant District Attorney Jim Yontz.

Defense attorney Jeff Rein asked Spencer if he was aware that such problems date back to. her time with her former husband and predate her alleged encounter with Ray.

"I'm just aware that it was present when I met her," Spencer replied.

The woman was missing for several days before Ray drove her to the home of her then-husband's family, saying he found her wandering on a beach at Elephant Butte Lake.

"We're not suggesting that she wasn't at David Ray's house," Rein said. "But she has an awful selective memory."

Cheri Archuleta, 21, said she voted for acquittal "because of the fact hat her (the witness's) story doesn't bund so convincing."

The other juror, 23-year-old Phyllis Ortiz, said the Colorado woman's testimony "didn't make sense at all."
Lopez said the defense tried the

Colorado woman instead of Ray.
"Unfortunately, this could've

played a role in the jurors' decision," he said.

During the two-week trial, prosecutors showed jurors torture devices, a six-minute silent video and a written list of instructions for holding women captive.

The defense called no witnesses but referred to the videotape and sexual devices during closing arguments earlier this week.

Jurors were given the case Wednesday and deliberated over the course of two days for about 8½

hours.

The sex-torture accusations against Ray surfaced in March 1999 when a naked woman fled down a street with a chain on her neck, claiming she escaped from Ray's trailer.

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DA Wants Ray Case Back in Court Soon

■ Mistrial blamed on having to have separate trials for each of the three alleged victims

TIERRA AMARILLA — Prosecutors are regrouping to retry an Elephant Butte man accused of kidnapping and sexually torturing a woman four years ago.

Prosecutors filed the paperwork necessary to retry David Parker Ray shortly after a judge declared a mistrial in the case on Thursday.

Ray was being tried on 12 counts involving the abduction and sexual torture of a 26-year-old Colorado woman in 1996 in

Truth or Consequences.

After more than eight hours of deliberating over two days, a Rio Arriba County jury was unable to reach agreement on any of the 12 charges.

District Attorney Ron Lopez said the case against Ray was damaged when the judge ruled separate trials would be held for each of the three women who accused the 60-year-old defendant of sexual-tor-ture.

"We knew that once the case was severed we were going to have a difficult time," Lopez said Friday from his Socorro office.

"It's much easier to attack the credibility of one woman than it is to discredit three women who are telling the same story," he said.

Public defender Jeff Rein was in favor of separate trials.

"If somebody is charged, they should be

tried for one thing at a time," Rein said Friday from his office in Albuquerque.

He said it would be impossible for jurors to keep the facts of the three cases straight.

Rein said he has no immediate plans in response to the prosecution's move to retry his client.

Lopez plans to retry Ray on the 12 counts involving the Colorado woman as soon as possible. "I'm very anxious to get this case back to trial," he said.

The prosecution also plans to ask state District Judge Neil Mertz to reconsider some of the evidence excluded from the first trial.

Ray will remain locked up at the Sierra County jail.

Prosecution promises to retry Ray

TIERRA AMARILLA—Prosecutors have vowed to retry an Elephant Butte man accused of abducting and sexually torturing a Colorado woman four years ago.

A judge on Thursday declared a mistrial in the case of David Parker Ray. Jurors could not reach an agreement on any of the 12 counts against Ray.

"We're disappointed," District Attorney Ron Lopez said. "We're going to retry Mr. Ray on all of the charges."

Ray, 60, will remain jailed as he awaits trial on similar charges involving two other women who have accused him of holding them against their will in 1999.

Ray, a former mechanic at Elephant Butte State Park, was arrested in 1999 after a woman escaped from his mobile home and ran to a neighbor's home wearing only a padlocked collar.

Police searched Ray's trailer and found torture devices, including surgical tools and chemicals, as well as video cameras. Eventually two other women filed charges against Ray, one of them the Colorado woman.

Ray, who faced up to 151½ years in prison if convicted, showed no reaction. Thursday.

Meanwhile, the woman whose allegations were at the heart of the trial began crying when the judge declared a mistrial. She was led from the courtroom through a back door.

Lopez said the defense tried the woman, instead of Ray.

"Unfortunately, this could've played a role in the jurors' decision," he said.

Lopez added that it may be harder to get a conviction against Ray since the three women's cases are being heard in separate trials. The district attorney said the jury might not have seen "the whole picture" during the first trial.

The jury was divided by two women who were in favor of Ray's acquittal.

Ray's attorney, Jeff Rein, said he was pleased the two jurors did not believe the Colorado woman's story.

Juror Cheri Archuleta, 21, was in favor of acquitting Ray "because of the fact that her (the woman's) story doesn't sound so convincing."

The other juror, 23-year-old Phyllis Ortiz, said the woman's testimony "didn't make sense at all."

During the trial, prosecutors showed juriors sexual torture devices, a sixminute silent video and a written list of instructions for holding women captive. The Colorado woman also took the stand.

The defense called no witnesses but referred to the videotape and sexual devices during closing arguments earlier this week.

Jurors were given the case Wednesday and deliberated over the course of two days for about 8½ hours. However, the abrupt end to Ray's first trial was a long time coming.

After a contentious debate in early May between the judge and several New Mexico media organizations, jury selection was made public. It took 12 days and two delays over a four-week period to seat a jury.

The start of Ray's trial, scheduled for June 27, was put off for a few days because of questions about what the judge would allow as evidence as well as Ray's failing health.

The opening day of his trial was interrupted when Ray complained of chest pains and was taken to a clinic for testing.

On Wednesday, shortly after jurors began deliberating, Ray was whisked away in an ambulance after complaining of chest pain.

His attorney said Ray has suffered heart irregularities for some time.

Torture trial delayed over whether to allow therapist's testimony

TTERRAAMARILLA - Prosecutors in the rape-andkidnapping trial of David Parker Ray showed jurors sexual torture devices and written list of instruc-

tions for holding women captive. But they didn't wrap up their case Friday, as expected. Instead, state district Judge Neil Mertz sent jurors home for the weekend, then heard arguments between the prosecution and defense over whether to allow the jury to hear from the alleged victim's therapist. He then heard some testimony from the therapist.

Mertz ruled that when the trial resumes Tuesday, the therapist

may testify. He will say that the alleged victim suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder.

The prosecution is now expected to finish its case Tuesday, then the defense will present witnesses.

"As far as I know, it will go to the jury next week," said Jeff Rein, Ray's public defender.

The items of evidence - introduced over the defense's objections - were seized from a cargo trail-

er next to Ray's Elephant Butte mobile home last year. The massive investigation by state and federal agents was begun in March 1999 when a bloodied Albuquerque woman, naked except for a padlocked collar, escaped from Ray's mobile home.





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Ray jurors view sex video

TIERRA AMARILLA - Jurors in the rape and kidnapping trial of David Parker Ray saw key prosecution evidence on Wednesday - a graphic video tape of a naked woman lying strapped to a table.

Somber-faced jurors watched intently as a man prosecutors say is Ray repeatedly stroked the woman's body as her wrists, thighs and feet were restrained.

At one point during the silent, sixminute segment of video, the man could be seen placing a piece of tape over her mouth.

Then he released first one wrist, then the other. The woman moved her arms and folded them over her chest.

The video camera was positioned near the woman's feet, which were placed in stirrups as though she were on a gynecological examination table.

Ray, 60, is being tried on criminal sexual penetration, kidnapping and other charges. The alleged crimes occurred July 25-28, 1996.

It's the first of three planned sex-torture trials for Ray, a former mechanic at Elephant Butte State Park, who also faces charges involving two other women between 1996 and 1999.

Sgt. K.C. Rogers, a criminal investigation supervisor with the state police, said he viewed the tape just after it was retrieved from a utility trailer next to Ray's mobile home in March 1999.

The woman was strapped to a table, her feet in what appeared to be stirrups, legs spread wide apart ... Mr. Ray was touching her, fondling her," Rogers told jurors before they viewed the tape. "Her face was duct-taped."

The identifying characteristics — a woman with cornrow braids and a distinctive tattoo of a bird on her leg eventually provided investigators with a first name, which in turn matched a tip that had been called in by her former mother-in-law, Rogers said.

The woman — a former resident of Truth or Consequences who now lives in Colorado — may testify as early

His wife claimed not to know where she had been, Murphy said, "She was out of it. She wasn't coherent ... I thought she was under the influence of a narcotic or something," he said.

Angry, he told her to leave. Assuming she had left him, he had already filed papers to dissolve the marriage, Murphy said in his statement.

Murphy said his ex-wife was a friend of Ray's daughter and that he figured the three had concocted Ray's story See Ray, Page A-3

Trial starts for man accused of sexually torturi

Associated Press Writer TIERRA AMARILLA — The trial of an Elephant Butte man accused of abducting and sexually torturing a woman was interrupted Thursday when the defendant complained of chest pains and was taken by ambulance to a clinic.

David Parker Ray went on trial in the first of three prosecutions he faces for allegedly abducting and torturing three women at his lakeside home in southern New Mexico. Ray faces up to 150 years in prison if convicted of all 12 charges in the first sex-torture case.

Opening statements in the case had concluded and the trial was in recess before the prosecution called its first witness when Ray complained of chest pains, District Attorney Ron Lopez said.

Ray was taken to a nearby clinic, examined and late Thursday was returned to a jail cell across from the Rio Arriba County courthouse.

State District Judge Neil Mertz recessed the trial until Friday. He informed the jury of James Yontz recounted for the Ray's condition and told them

that if the trial resumed, it would do so on Friday after-

The judge did not provide any information on what doctors who examined Ray at the local clinic found. Defense attorney Jeff Rein declined comment.

Earlier this year the 60-yearold Ray was hospitalized for several days with what was described as a heart condition. He arrived at a court hearing in March wearing a heart monitor and was later taken to a Las Cruces hospital.

The first trial will focus on allegations by a woman that she was held at knifepoint, handcuffed and gagged in July 1996, then taken to a trailer and raped.

Ray arrived for the opening day of the trial wearing black jeans, cowboy boots and a striped western shirt. Before the trial started, he was smiling and joking with his two lawyers. Most of the time he was leaning back in a cushioned chair observing the proceedings.

In opening statements to the jury, Deputy District Attorney



David Parker Ray, 60, faces 12 charges based on the testimony of a woman who alleges she was held at knifepoint, handcuffed and gagged in July 1996, then taken to a trailer where she was raped.

Ray's trial had been slated to begin Tuesday, but the state Supreme Court agreed with a prosecution request to delay it until state District Judge Neil Mertz ruled what evidence would be admitted.

Mertz on Tuesday threw out dozens of pieces of evidence, including photographs of sexual devices, guns, knives, chains and straps and a printed sheet detailing psychological and physical procedures for handling captives. He said prosecutors could not show that the items, seized during a 1999 raid, were present in 1996 when the crimes allegedly occurred.

The judge also refused to allow the testimony of an FBI profiler and crime scene analyst. The judge said she lacked the proper education to be considered an expert witness.

Mertz said other pieces of evidence, including a trailer where the alleged torture occurred, could not be introduced unless prosecutors could lay a foundation showing why they should be allowed.

Prosecution unsure how sex torture case will go

TIERRA AMARILLA — Pros-

cutors in the sex-torture case of David Parker Ray were unsure Friday what evidence and which witnesses will be allowed in the trial, which is set to begin Tuesday.

Prosecutor Jim Yontz on Friday asked state District Judge Neil Mertz, who is presiding over the case, to rule on the evidence, and Mertz responded: "You better bring what you've got."

District Attorney Ron Lopez said later that the evidence in question includes more than 300 items, including a trailer where two of Ray's three accusers say they were held against their will and sexually tortured.

"We're anxious to get a ruling on the admissibility of the evidence in order to anticipate how we're going to head to trial," Lopez said. "How do you prepare an opening statement when you don't know what evidence or witnesses will be allowed?"

Ray's three accusers will be heard in separate trials. The first one starts Tuesday at the Tierra Amarilla courthouse at 8:30 a.m.

In that trial, Ray faces 12 charges based on the testimony of a woman who alleges that in

July 1996, she was held at knifepoint, handcuffed and gagged, and then taken to the trailer where she was raped with sexual devices.

Ray faces a total of 37 counts, including kidnapping and rape, stemming from the allegations of the three women.

The incidents allegedly occurred at Ray's home near Elephant Butte between 1996 and 1999.

Lopez said he is concerned that Mertz won't make his ruling until the jury is assembled in the courtroom on Tuesday.

"Our legal remedies are greatly curtailed once the jury is impaneled," Lopez said, noting that an appeal of a ruling excluding evidence would no longer be possible at that point.

Other evidence includes videotaped testimony identifying Ray's voice on an audio tape describing how victims would be tortured, photographs of items found in the trailer and inside Ray's home, diagrams depicting sexual torture and other items.

Witnesses include an FBI profiler from Quantico, Va., who said in an earlier hearing that Ray is a sexual sadist who held the women against their will.

TIERRA AMARILLA — The state Supreme Court on Monday delayed the trial for an Elephant Butte man accused of abducting and sexually torturing a woman, ruling that before David Parker Ray faces a jury the judge must tell prosecutors what evidence he will let them present.

When prosecutors asked state District Judge Neil Mertz to rule on the evidence Friday, he responded: "You better bring what you've got."

District Attorney Ron Lopez had complained that he could not prepare an opening statement without knowing what evidence or witnesses would be allowed in the trial.

The trial was set to begin today. The

Supreme Court, however, ordered Mertz to halt further proceedings "until not less than 24 hours after the court (Mertz) has entered its decision in writing" on the evidence. The Supreme Court said he should make his decision as soon as possible.

Prosecutors argued in their writ to the Supreme

Court that the delay would be only 24 hours. since Mertz said Friday he would rule before opening statements.

Prosecution files motion to retry Ray in sex case

TIERRAAMARILLA — Prosecutors said Friday they have filed the paperwork needed to retry an Elephant Butte man whose trial on charges of abducting and sexually torturing a Colorado woman ended in a hung jury.

State District Judge Neil Mertz on Thursday declared a mistrial in the case of David Parker Ray. Jurors could not reach an agreement on any of the 12 counts against him.

The paperwork for another trial was on Mertz's desk before everyone left the Rio Arriba County Courthouse Thursday, District Attorney Ron Lopez said Friday from his Socorro office.

"We're just awaiting approval," Lopez said. "We have requested that this trial be scheduled to retry as soon as possible."

retry as soon as possible."

The judge will decide when and where the next trial will take place, Lopez said. Local publicity would make it difficult to retry Ray in Tierra Amarilla, he added.

Mertz was unavailable for comment Friday.

A message left for Ray's attor-

ney, Jeff Rein, was not immediately returned.

Ray, 60, will remain jailed as he awaits trial on similar charges involving two other women allegedly held against their will in 1999.

Ray, a former mechanic at Elephant Butte State Park, was arrested in 1999 after a woman wearing only a padlocked dog collar ran to the home of one of his neighbors, saying she had escaped from his mobile home.

Police searched Ray's trailer and found torture devices and video cameras. Eventually two other women were identified by police, including the Colorado woman.

Lopez said Thursday it may be harder to get a conviction against Ray since the three cases are being heard in separate trials.

The Tierra Amarilla jury was divided by two women in their 20s who were in favor of Ray's acquittal.

Rein said Thursday he was pleased the two jurors did not believe the Colorado woman's story.

"It's clear that the jury paid attention to the evidence," he said.

Angelicia Montano dièd last month, and medical examiners are still trying to determine the cause of her death. But her death is apparently unrelated to Ray, who was in jail when she died.

She had claimed she went to Ray's home last year to pick up

a cake mix and was taken captive. Ray is accused of kidnapping and sexually torturing her at a trailer in Elephant Butte.

State District Judge Neil Mertz ordered Wednesday that Ray will stand trial Nov. 27 in Estancia on those charges.

Mertz has ruled that Ray is to be tried separately for crimes relating to each of three alleged victims.

Ray is currently on trial for charges relating to a woman who claims she was taken prisoner and raped in 1996.

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Lawyers argue to suppress other evidence in Ray case

TIERRAAMARILLA — Lawyers for a man accused of kidnapping and sexually torturing three women at his home near Elephant Butte filed a motion Friday to exclude photos, diagrams and other evidence in the case.

David Parker Ray, 60, is charged with 37 counts involving the alleged kidnapping and torture of three women. His first trial on 12 counts, scheduled to start here in early June, involves only one of the women, who said she was kidnapped and tortured in 1996.

Defense attorney Jeff Rein argued in his motion that evidence sub-

mitted by prosecutors is related to the two more recent alleged incidents.

He asked state District Judge Neil Mertz to throw out photos of a trailer referred to as the toy box, which contained a chair with restraints and torture devices.

Rein argued there is no evidence the trailer was present on Ray's

Prospective juror calls Ray 'scum of the earth'

TIERRA AMARILLA — Most of the prospective juriors questioned Thursday in the sex-torture trial of David Parker Ray seemed to have their minds made up: Guilty.

"As far as I'm concerned, he's guilty and he should be tortured like he tortured those women, and then be sent to prison to die," one woman said when questioned about the case by state District Judge Neil Mertz.

Neither the defense or the prosecution had any questions for her, and she was excused from the Rio Arriba County Courthouse. On her way out, she spoke to defense attorney Jeff Rein and referred to Ray, sitting at the table, as "the scum of the earth." Ray did not show any visible reaction.

Rein explained to another prospective juror, a man, that the case would involve graphic sexual evidence. Rein asked him how he would react if exposed to pornography, and he responded, "I think I would be disgusted."

Rein told the man he needed to look at all the evidence if he were a juror. "If jurors are so disgusted by the evidence that they think he's guilty before hearing the case, then we don't have a chance," he said.

Many women questioned thought Ray guilty

TIERRAAMARILLA — Many of the women questioned Wednesday as prospective jurors in the sex-torture trial of David Parker Ray said they believe Ray is guilty, while some said they haven't decided.

The women, without looking at Ray, gave their responses under questioning by state District Judge Neil Mertz, Assistant District Attorney Jim Yontz and defense attorney Jeff Rein.

Rein did not bother to question those who indicated they already had made up their minds.

"I just think it was a very sick mind that gave rise to such acts against women," one woman said when Mertz asked what she knew of the case.

Asked if she could assume Ray innocent, she said: "I don't know." And she said she does not wish to be a juror.

"This was a terrible crime, whoever committed it, and I just don't feel comfortable serving on this just" she said

this jury," she said.

When Yontz asked if she thought it would be an interesting case, she replied: "It would be interesting, but I wouldn't want to be responsible for anybody's life or future."

A videotape found in Ray's Elephant Butte mobile home showed her bound to a table in an instrument-filled trailer, state police Sgt. K.C. Rogers said during a preliminary hearing last year.

"In the video, it was fairly apparent that she was not a will-

ing participant," Rogers testified.

State District Judge Neil Mertz moved the trial to Tierra Amarilla in Rio Arriba County because of extensive news coverage in Sierra County.

Initially, Mertz ruled jury selection would be closed to the public and news crews. But the media protested, and Mertz ruled May 9 it would be open.

One woman who was questioned told Mertz she did not believe she could base a verdict strictly on what she heard in court — and that she would "definitely" be influenced by what she has already seen and heard about it. She told the judge she had made up her mind.

When Yontz asked which way, she answered: "Guilty."

Another woman who was questioned suggested that she might not automatically believe police. She claimed her son was falsely accused of molesting a 5-year-old girl four years ago and was pressured by police into confessing.

District Attorney Ron Lopez asked her if she could objectively listen to police testimony and believe it.

"I think I would like to hear both sides of the story before I



TIERRA AMARILLA — Lawyers warned potential jurors Tuesday that testimony in the sex-torture trial of <u>David Parkers</u> are Ray could get graphic, and the attorneys wanted to know if they could handle it.

Ray, 60, is charged with 37 counts involving the alleged kidnapping and torture of three women. The sex-torture accusations surfaced in March 1999 when a naked woman fled down a street near Elephant Butte with a chain on her neck, claiming she escaped from Ray's trailer.

The current trial involves only one of the three alleged victims and 12 of the counts. Separate trials are planned on charges involving each of the two other victims.

One member of the jury pool said Tuesday she avoids movies that have rape and violence.

"I made a decision not to be entertained by it," said the woman, whose name was not released.

Defense attorney Jeff Rein

told her some of the testimony could be demeaning for women.

"It could trigger memories," Rein said.

Her response: "I think it may have some effect on me."

"Some people may not be able to hear the evidence and hold the state to their burden (of proof beyond a reasonable doubt)," Rein said.

The jury pool is from Riol Arriba County in northern New Mexico, about 250 miles from Elephant Butte.

Ray sat in the Riy Arriba County Courthouse as panelists were questioned by defense and prosecution lawyers.

The jury selection process is expected to take about two weeks.

Assistant District Attorney Jim Yontz said about 80 people need to be questioned to end up with a final pool of 35. Attorneys will choose 12 jurors and six alternates from the final pool.

By the end of the first day Tuesday, seven potential jurors



The first was a woman from Santa Clara Pueblo who works for a gambling casino, watching for cheaters.

The woman, who said she has taken a class in law enforcement, said she believes she can be objective about evidence in the case. She said she avoids reading news or watching it on television.

The second woman said she subscribes to a Santa Fe newspaper, The New Mexican, and had read a little about the case. She said, for example, she had heard investigators were looking for other victims to step forward - and that homicides might be involved. Yontz told another pool member: The evidence is going to be graph-

ic in nature. It's going to involve "nudity, pornography."

He asked the woman if she could discuss such evidence with , strangers, and she said she could. But when asked if she could 'look at exhibits that might be considered pornographic, she said:

"No, I don't think so."

The woman, who lives near Española, said she works at San Juan Pueblo's Oh-Kay Casino in a job that involves handling money.

Defense attorney Kathy Love asked her if she would hold it against someone who didn't wish to speak in their own defense.

"Maybe they're guilty if they don't want to talk about it," the

woman said.

This trial involves an alleged victim who says she was taken, unawares, to Ray's trailer in July 1996. The woman testified at a preliminary hearing last year that she had been visiting bars in the Elephant Butte area with friends and was taken to Ray's trailer, that a knife was held to her throat, that she was handcuffed and that duct tape was placed over her mouth and around her wrists.

A videotape found in Ray's Elephant Butte mobile home showed her bound to a table in an instrument-filled trailer, state police Sgt. K.C. Rogers said during the pre-

liminary hearing.

"In the video, it was fairly apparent that she was not a willing participant," Rogers testified.

The woman's former motherin-law testified the woman appeared drugged when she returned home and remembered little about the days she had been missing. Ray pleads guilty to kidnap, rape

Attorney says he wanted to protect his daughter

ESTANCIA — David Parker Ray pleaded guilty Monday to kidnapping, rape and conspiracy to commit kidnapping because he wanted to protect his daughter, his attorney said.

Ray's plea abruptly ended his weeklong trial on allegations he abducted an Albuquerque prostitute two years ago, took her to his Elephant Butte home and tortured her.

Ray was arrested after the 23-year-old woman escaped in March 1999 and fled, wearing nothing but a collar with a chain.

Ray, 61, had been charged with kidnapping, criminal sexual penetration, criminal sexual contact, assault with intent to commit a violent crime, aggravated battery and related conspiracy charges. He agreed to plea to first-degree kidnapping, second-degree criminal sexual penetration and second-degree conspiracy to commit kidnapping.

Ray's daughter, Glenda "Jesse" Ray, and his girlfriend, Cynthia Lea Hendy, also were arrest-

ed. Hendy pleaded guilty to two counts of being an accessory to kidnapping, two counts of being an accessory to criminal sexual penetration and one count of conspiracy to kidnap. Glenda Ray faces 12 counts involving the kidnapping and torture of one woman.

Ray's attorney Lee McMillian said Glenda Ray will be offered a plea agreement "that will get her probation if she'll take it."

"Freedom is the ultimate gift that a father can give to his daughter," he said.

Assistant District Attorney James Yontz neither confirmed or denied that such an agreement was made for Glenda Ray, but said he has no deals with her attorney, Billy Blackburn of Albuquerque. Blackburn is out of town for the week and could not be reached, his office said.

State District Judge Kevin Sweazea told the jurors, who were dismissed following announcement of the plea, that Ray-waived his right to appeal and in a previous case involving similar accusations by a Colorado woman. He was convicted of 12 counts in April in the second trial of the Colorado woman's case. The first trial had ended last summer with a hung jury.

Yontz said Ray also agreed to plead guilty to federal charges related to the state cases. Ray will appear before a federal judge to plea to two counts of violating the so-called white slavery act, according to the plea agreement.

Ray could face up to 20 years in the federal case in addition to the 238-year maximum sentence he could face in the state cases, Yontz said. Yontz talked to both victims Monday morning before accepting the plea.

"Both of them were in favor of this," he said.

"They are very pleased to have this over with. They will come back for sentencing and get on with their lives," Yontz said.

No exact sentencing date has

been set, but Ray will be sentenced in 60 to 75 days.

Ray, in an interview with Albuquerque television station KOAT, said he expects to spend the rest of his life in prison.

"Tll deal with it the best way that I can," he said. "I've already been in almost 2 1/2 years and I'm pretty well used to it. ... I don't like it, but it's something that I had to do."

McMillian said Ray had another reason for accepting the agreement: "Every soul yearns for redemption. The guy has a desire to do something good."

Ray has changed his attitude that he had done nothing wrong, McMillian said.

"This agreement is in the best interests of Mr. Ray and the public at large," he said.

Ray, who once worked as a mechanic at Elephant Butte State Park, originally was charged with 37 counts involving three women — including the Coloradan and the Albuquerque woman.

Ray's sentence stèmmed from charges involving two victims, one tortured in 1996 and another in 1999. Both were present at Thursday's hearing. A third victim died "neck," she said: "I was being pulled of pneumonia last year; that case was dismissed as part of a plea agreement.

Before Ray was sentenced. Attorney General Patricia Madrid, representing the state, said it was necessary to "keep the animal in his cage. The animal can't live among us."

Ray, who had worked at Elephant Butte State Park, was convicted in April of kidnapping and torturing in the 1996 case.

He said he pleaded guilty in July to kidnapping, rape and conspiracy to kidnap in the 1999 case to prevent his daughter, Glenda "Jesse" Ray, from serving additional prison time as his accomplice.

His daughter also entered a plea agreement and was sentenced earlier this week to time served - 21/2 years - plus five years probation.

After her father was sentenced Thursday, she said, "Dad," and when he turned, she blew him a ·kiss.

- The first victim, who came forward only after she was contacted in Colorado by investigators, testified last April that a knife was held to her throat during the 1996 encounter at Ray's trailer.

"They put a dog collar on my by the neck, like they had a leash."

Investigators identified and located her by leg and ankle tattoos seen on a videotape found at Ray's trailer showing her being tortured while tied to a table.

"I was scared. I didn't know what they were going to do. I wanted to go home," the woman said, adding she went through "total hell ... because I have to live with this every .dav."



Attorney General Patricia Madrid, appearing Thursday for the state, said it was necessary to "keep the animal in his cage. The animal can't live among us."

"As a community and state ... we can't risk him being out on the streets," Madrid told the court.

During his testimony, Ray said to Madrid: "I'm sorry that you got all the credit" for the case.

Several witnesses testified, including FBI agent Mary O'Toole, who said she believed that Ray was a criminal sexual sadist who might be untreatable.

Ray, who had worked at Elephant Butte State Park; pleaded guilty in July to kidnapping, rape and con-

spiracy to kidnap in connection with the 1999 victim. He had been convicted last April of kidnapping and torturing the 1996 victim.

He has said he entered the guilty plea because he wanted to protect his daughter, Glenda "Jesse" Ray, from having to serve additional prison time as his accomplice in the case.

His daughter also entered a plea deal and was sentenced earlier this week to time served — 2½ years — plus five years probation. She was charged as an accomplice in the sex-torture case.

After her father was sentenced Thursday, she said, "Dad," and when he turned around, she blew him a kiss.

Lee McMillian, David Ray's

lawyer, alluded afterward to Ray's heart condition, which had troubled the defendant throughout the case.

"Anything over six months is a death sentence in this case," McMillian said. "There's no question we'r's dealing with a sick man here."

Besides Ray and O'Toole, wit nesses Thursday included the two victims, the grandmother of one o them and the mother of Angelica Montano.

Before sentencing Thursday, the defense attempted to withdraw the July guilty plea, saying Ray has been mentally impeded by medication, but the judge said it was cleathat Ray was sufficiently coherer at the time of the plea, and the motion was rejected.



As part of the plea agreement, the 'District Attorney's Office is dismissing the third case, Yontz said.

The first State Police investigator at Ray's trailer, Sgt. Wesley LaCues-

ta, said he had expected a more typical crime, "then I realized this was a very large-scale criminal investigation."

LaCuesta, who called Ray "one of the few documented serial sexual sadists," said he was pleased by the outcome.

"It feels good. As far as these victims, it puts the case at full circle," he said.

During the opening day of testimony last week, the Albuquerque woman alleged Ray placed clamps on her body and sent electric shocks through the clamps. She described being hung from the ceiling and her legs spread apart with a bar and being flogged with leather whips.

After the woman's escape, police searched Ray's trailer and found video cameras and torture devices, including surgical tools. The other two women later accused Ray of abducting, chaining and sexually torturing them as well.

Sweazea took over the case after the previous judge, Neil Mertz, died of a heart attack last November.

Woman testifies Ray abducted, tortured her

ESTANICA — A woman who alleges David Parker Ray placed clamps on her body and flogged her with leather whips broke down on the witness stand Monday, causing the judge to call paramedics to her aid.

The 23-year-old woman, who fied an Elephant Butte trailer naked except for a collar with a chain in March 1999, said she agreed to perform one sexual act with Ray in exchange for \$30, "because I was hooked on drugs." They were in Albuquerque.

At that point, the woman testified, she got into a camper-type vehicle with Ray and another woman appeared from the back. She said Ray showed a police-type badge — a silver star — and handcuffed her.

They started driving, and she freed herself from the handcuffs, struggling with her captors, who then tied her up and duct-taped her mouth.

"She told me all they were going to do is rape me and let me go," the woman testified, sobbing.

During the ride, Ray and the other woman put a black mask over her head with a zipper over the mouth, she testified.

Claire Harwell, state assistant attorney general, showed a mask to the woman, who started crying, saying, "I want to go home."

After a few minutes, she said, "It's the mask they put on my face."

Eventually, the woman said she ended up handcuffed to a wall and a bed inside Ray's home.

"They did a lot of different things, so many things ... I don't know which happened first," she said.

She described how clamps were placed on her breasts and other body parts.

"He turned the machine on and it sent shocks through my body," she said, weeping. "I don't want to talk about this." (Indicate page, name of newspaper, city and state.)

Ray speaks out on his sex-torture conviction

ALBUQUERQUE — David Parker Ray, the man convicted of kidnapping and sexually torturing a Colorado woman in 1996, denies ever torturing or doing anything against the wishes of his sex partners.

"I got pleasure out of a woman getting pleasure. I did what they wanted me to do," he said in an interview with Albuquerque television station KOB-TV following his conviction.

Last week, jurors in Estancia found the 61-year-old Ray guilty of 12 charges — ranging from kidnapping to criminal sexual penetration and assault with intent to commit a violent felony. A prior trial ended in a hung jury.

Speaking out about the case for the first time, Ray said he feels he has been "maliciously prosecuted" because he was not able to tell his side of the story, among other reasons.

"I feel raped," he said.

Ray, a former mechanic at Elephant Butte State Park, was arrested in 1999 after a woman wearing

only a padlocked dog collar ran to the home of one of his neighbors, saying she had escaped from his mobile home.

Two other women also accused Ray of sexually torturing them. Prosecutors say there are plans to try Ray in those two cases.

Ray admitted during the interview aired Thursday that the sex happened, but said it was not a crime.

"It was consensual," he said.

During Ray's retrial in Estancia, prosecutors played a sexually explicit audiotape recorded by Ray. The tape detailed specific acts of sexual penetration and forms of punishment and mutilation.

"It was a source of entertainment for me to create these tapes," Ray said. "That's why there was a disclaimer at the beginning of the tape stating that it was for adult entertainment only."

Ray's attorney, Lee McMillian, said he was not permitted to bring in an expert witness to explain that the tape could have been intended for use in a consensual ritual involving sexual fantasy.





Jurors at the trial of David Parker Ray were dismissed for the weekend after hearing testimony from a Colorado psychotherapist who is treating the 27-year-old woman.

Videotape shown in retrial for Ray

ESTANCIA — A videotape shown to jurors in a sex-torture trial Tuesday shows a woman strapped to a medical-type bench, her eyes and mouth covered with duct tape, while David Parker Ray circles the bench, occasionally stroking her or adjusting the straps.

At first, as he touches her, she rolls her head from side to side. Later, he unstraps her wrists, and she pulls her arms across her chest, almost hugging herself, as he continues to move around the bench.

Ray, 61, is being retried on 12 charges of abducting and sexually torturing the Colorado woman near Elephant Butte Lake in 1996. His first trial in Tierra Amarilla last summer ended in a hung jury.

The woman, now 27, wiped away a steady stream of tears as she and jurors watched the videotape. Jurors showed no reaction.

The woman testified Monday in Ray's retrial that she was tortured with sexual devices, but couldn't scream for help because her mouth was taped.

"I was scared. I didn't know what they were going to do. I wanted to go home," the woman told jurges

The tape was seized from Ray's backyard trailer, and state District Judge Kevin Sweazea allowed it into evidence Tuesday. Defense attorney Lee McMillian had objected to the tape's introduction Monday, saying it was prejudicial.

Ray, dressed in an olive suit, appeared relaxed during the proceeding. During a brief recess Tuesday morning, he chatted with his sister about the book, "Lonesome Dove."

"I read the book twice, I'd sure love to read the sequel," Ray said.

Among other evidence admitted Tuesday was a 40-minute audiotape of Ray's voice, criminal investigator John Briscoe testified. The monologue went into detail describing sexual acts expected of a captive "sex slave."

"You are going to kept in a hidden slave room; you are going to be kept like an animal," the tape said. "Your only value to us is that you have an attractive body."

As the tape played, one female sexually assaulted.

juror covered her face with hands for a few minutes. Ray was taking notes and occasionally talked to his lawyer.

Other evidence admitted Tuesday were two lists removed from the trailer, Briscoe testified. He quoted from the first, titled "Remember."

"A woman will do anything to get loose," Briscoe read. "Never trust a chained captive ... If she is worth taking, she is worth keeping."

Another list, titled "Don't Forget," lists such items as a neck chain, handcuffs, leg irons, bondage bar, door deadbolts and "the unexpected," Briscoe read.

Briscoe also narrated a separate videotape and identified photos of items found inside the trailer

McMillian questioned Briscoe, asking whether he knew what the trailer looked like in 1996 since Briscoe had been there in 1999. Briscoe agreed he did not know about it in 1996.

The woman's alleged ordeal began after she and some friends went bar-hopping in 1996 while she and her newlywed husband were estranged.

One of the group, Todd Thompson, who now lives in Sturgis, Mich., testified Tuesday that the alleged victim did not seem drunk to him. He said he only saw her drink one beer. But he said the next time he saw her, she didn't seem to remember where she had been and looked "disheveled, as if she had been sleeping in her clothes"

On Monday, the Colorado woman testified that her friends left her alone in an Elephant Butte bar with Ray's daughter, Jessie Ray, who initially promised to take her home or to a friend's house.

Instead, she said she was taken to Ray's house and was threatened with a knife in his living room. She said her eyes and mouth were taped, and that she was handcuffed with a dog collar around her neck. Then she ended up on the bench.

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Alleged victim testifies in torture retria

ESTANCIA - A woman alleged Monday she was strapped to a weight-lifter's bench and tortured with sexual devices in Elephant Butte, but she couldn't scream for help because her mouth was taped shut.

"I was scared. I didn't know what they were going to do. I wanted to go home," the woman testified in the retrial of David Parker Ray, accused of holding her captive and sexually torturing her for days.

Ray, 61, is being retried on 12 charges of abducting and sexually torturing the Colorado woman near Elephant Butte Lake in 1996. His first trial in Tierra Amarilla last summer ended in a hung jury.

The woman said she married in 1996, but sexual problems immediately cropped up.

"I have female problems, and sex hurts," she testified.

She said her marriage broke up rather quickly, after which she and some friends went bar-hopping in the Elephant Butte area.

The woman said her friends left, and she found herself alone with Ray's daughter, Jessie Ray,

who initially promised to take her home but then agreed to take her to a friend's house.

But instead, she was taken to David Ray's house, where she said she was threatened with a knife as she sat in Ray's living room.

"One sat beside me on the couch. The one on the couch held a knife to my throat," she testified.

She said she could not remember if that was Ray.

The woman said tape was placed over her eyes and mouth and she was handcuffed.

"They put a dog collar on my neck," she said.

The woman recalled walking 20 to 30 feet to another place.

"I was being pulled by the neck, like they had a leash," she said, adding that she also was pushed from behind.

The woman said the next thing she remembered, "I was already tied to the table, naked. I was kind of in a position a woman is in when she has a baby - my feet were in stirrups."

She said her ankles and thigh were tied with half-inch-wide straps, but she was unsure if the collar still restrained her.

Her voice broke as she testified have been a "harmless fantasy." she felt scared.

"He (David Ray) said I was with some Satanic sex-worshipping group," she said.

She said she was sexually penetrated with dildos of varying sizes at least 30 times.

She said at one point, the tape on her eyes came loose, and she could see Ray, who touched her sexually. She also said his daughter was present.

She said she was left locked alone in the trailer at times but could not guess how long those occasions lasted.

"I heard the keys. I heard him lock and unlock it all the time. she said. "I wanted to escape."

The woman said she was led 2 feet to a portable toilet when she had to use the bathroom and was given nothing to eat or

Her voice broke as she said the last five years of her life have been "total hell ... because I have to live with this every day.".

Lee McMillian, Ray's attorney, said in opening statements Monday that the circumstances under which the woman alleges she was held without her consent could

But prosecutors said she was sexually assaulted and confronted with weapons, handcuffs and a neck chain secured to the floor.

"She's being kidnapped. She does as she's told if she has weapons held on her," said Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz, who told the state district court jury the woman was held captive for three days.

Ray came under scrutiny in March 1999 when an Albuquerque woman wearing nothing but a dog collar ran to the home of one of Ray's neighbors and said she had escaped from a trailer full of sexual torture devices.

The current alleged victim came forward in 1999 after hearing that Ray was under investigation for sexually torturing the Albuquerque woman and another female.

McMillian questioned why it took the woman nearly three years to accuse Ray.

She "never made any allegations that David Parker Ray ever did anything wrong," he said. Only later did she "decide she was a victim," he said.

Sex torture retrial jury selection continues

ESTANCIA — The defense attorney for man accused of abducting and sexually torturing. a Colorado woman in New Mexico five years ago has warned potential jurors they will hear testimony about sexual practices "none of us ever thought of before."

Jury selection entered its second day Tuesday for David Parker Ray of Elephant Butte, who is being tried on 12 charges, including six counts of criminal sexual penetration. His first trial in Tierra Amarilla last summer ended in a hung jury.

Prosecutors and defense attorneys hope to complete jury questioning by Wednesday.

Defense attorney Lee McMillian told one prospective juror Monday the panel would see "photos of things that most of us have never done."

One man questioned by attorneys said he met Ray while mak-

ing a delivery to Elephant Butte State Park, where Ray once worked, and that Ray helped him unload his truck. He said he did not believe meeting Ray would affect his judgment, but added, "He seemed quite friendly to me out there."

Another potential juror, asked what he thought after hearing about the case in the media, said, "It's bad what happened, if it happened."

Jury selection for Ray's retrial began in November but was halted when presiding judge Neil Mertz died of a heart attack. The case was rescheduled for January, but was delayed again when the defense and prosecution rejected two proposed presiding judges.

State District Judge Kevin Sweazea, who replaced Mertz, is hearing the retrial.

Judge in Sex-Torture Case Dies; Ray Trial Delayed

By RORY McClannahan Journal Staff Writer

State District Judge Neil P. Mertz, who was presiding over the David Parker Ray sex-torture case, died of a heart attack in Socorro early Thursday.

Mertz's death will delay Ray's trial, 7th Judicial District Attorney Ron Lopez said Thursday. Jury selection began in the case

Monday in Estancia, and the trial was scheduled to begin in January.

Cathy McClean, court clerk in Sierra County, and Kim Padilla, court administrator in Socorro, said Mertz had the heart attack at his home · morning. Thursday Padilla said he was taken to the emergency room of Socorro General Hospital.

McClean said Mertz seemed fine Wednesday.

Padilla said she was not aware Mertz, 55, had heart problems since he was named to the judgeship four years ago.

Padilla said she received a call about the judge's death just before 8 a.m.

Mertz, a Democrat, was named to the bench by Gov. Gary Johnson in February 1996 and won election to the 7th Judicial District post later that year. His six-year term would have expired in 2002. District 7 covers Torrance, Catron, Socorro and Sierra counties.

Lopez said Thursday that he had known Mertz for many years and "respected him as an attorney, as a judge and as a person."

Mertz was a longtime attorney in Socorro and at different times served as city attorney and as an assistant district attorney. He also had a private practice. He had

been serving as Lopez's chief deputy district attorney for three years when he was appointed as a judge in February 1996.

As a judge, Mertz ran his courtroom well, Lopez said.

"I always knew he was going to be thorough and conscientious," Lopez said.

In his short tenure as a judge, Mertz presided over two high-profile cases — the Torreon cabin killings and the Ray case.

Mertz earned an undergraduate degree from Phillips University in Oklahoma as well as a master's degree in political science and a law degree from Baylor Uni-

Lopez said he had talked to Mertz on Wednesday night and the judge seemed to be in good health. The two men talked about the several delays in the Ray case.

"The ironic thing was that he said, 'I wonder what else can go wrong with this case,' "Lopez said.

Lopez said he has contacted the New Mexico Supreme Court to ask for an extension on the Ray case. It could take months before the case gets back in court, he said.

The Ray case gained international attention in March 1999 after a woman wearing only a padlocked collar ran to the Elephant Butte home of one of Ray's neighbors, saying she had escaped from his mobile home. An FBI search of Ray's trailer turned up torture devices and video cameras.

Ray's first trial last summer ended in deadlock. He faces retrial on 12 charges: six counts of criminal sexual penetration and one each of kidnapping, assault with intent to commit a violent felony, criminal sexual contact, conspiracy to commit kidnapping, conspiracy to commit criminal sexual penetration and conspiracy to commit criminal sexual contact.

Two similar cases against Ray will be tried separately.

Sex-torture case goes to new trial

ALBUQUERQUE — Jury
selection in the retrial of an Elephant Butte man accused of sexual torture was scheduled Monday morning in Estancia,
although David Parker Ray's
actual trial won't begin until
January to avoid conflict with
the holiday season.

Ray is being retried on charges that he kidnapped and sexually tortured a Colorado woman in 1996 in Truth or Consequences. Two other similar cases also are pending against him.

Attorneys for both sides say many factors make this a very different case from the one that ended in a mistrial in Tierra Amarilla in July.

"I think this one will be even more interesting than the last time," said Ray's new defense attorney, Lee McMillian. "I'm more of a proactive kind of guy."

McMillian replaced Ray's former attorney, Jeff Rein.

The public defender did a good job of preparing the case but there was a lot of information to cover in a short time, McMillian said.

"I've gotten rid of everything else I was doing and read through eight bank boxes of material," McMillian said. "My life is on hold until I finish these cases."

Ray, a former mechanic at Elephant Butte State Park, was arrested in 1999 after a woman wearing only a padlocked dog collar ran to the home of one of his neighbors, saying she had escaped from his mobile home. Police and FBI searched Ray's

trailer and found torture devices and video cameras.

Eventually two other women were identified by police as alleged victims, including the Colorado woman.

District Judge Neil Mertz has ruled the three cases will be tried separately.

The defense is not the only side that has gone through some major changes in the months leading up to the second trial.

District Attorney Ron Lopez will no longer be in office when the trial begins in January. He was defeated by Clint Wellborn in the November election.

Lopez was unsure whether he would participate in jury selection. In the meantime, he said he is trying to make the transition as simple as possible.

"We're preparing the cases as if we're going to try them," Lopez said.

Assistant District Attorney Jim Yontz, who argued the first case, likely will stay on with Wellborn, Lopez said.

Wellborn did not return phone calls from The Associated Press. McMillian said leaving Yontz

in the position would be logical.
"You'd have to be stupid to
get rid of Yontz. He has 20 years
of experience. He knows the
case," McMillian said.

Ray's first trial was moved to Tierra Amarilla because defense attorneys argued he could not get a fair trial in Truth or Consequences because of the publicity surrounding the case.

McMillian said he thinks Estancia is probably one of the best sites possible for the next trial. (Indicate page, name of newspaper, city and state.)

RAY has never abducted any woman for purposes of sexual or bondage activity. RAY has never injured any woman other than on one occasion. That incident occurred because RAY "panicked." RAY explained that he is very concerned about his sexual fantasies and has contacted psychologists on 2 different occasions because he believed that he was potentially dangerous and still believes he is still potentially dangerous.

On one occasion in Phoenix, Arizona, RAY paid a prostitute to engage in bondage with him. The prostitute understood beforehand what her role was to be and what was expected of her. RAY had the prostitute tied with all 4 limbs extended and the woman apparently became frightened and bit RAY on the upper-right chest. The woman would not release the bite, and RAY, who was bleeding severely, struck the woman on the head with his right hand and broke several bones in his hand. The woman was able to get free, and she ran out of the residence naked. A short while later, the prostitute's boyfriend came to RAY'S residence to obtain her clothing. The incident was never reported to law enforcement.

RAY acts out his fantasies primarily by writing and drawing and explaining that his writings and drawings initially depicted simple bondage activity and increasingly depict more violent bondage activities.

RAY is unable to understand why he "can't kill a litter of puppies and conscientiously dislikes violence, yet unconscientiously he likes violence."

RAY believed that as long as he was active and interested in bondage activity, he might as well make his interest pay. For a period of time, RAY advertised custom-made S.& M and Bondage Equipment and "Fetish Times" under the name "FESTIVAL." RAY is extremely handy with his hands and is able to make "almost anything." RAY made custom sex/bondage equipment to the exact specifications of his mail-order customers.

RAY made the full spectrum of bondage equipment, including "electrical dildos," dildos with real stats and transformers designed to deliver increasing amounts of electrical current when administered. RAY also carved dildos out of wood and made dildos out of "bondo," an automotive body filler material. RAY identified a series of dildos displayed by the interviewing agents and drawings as having been made by him. RAY also made "racks" for bondage activity and currently has one of his "racks" at a residence near Truth or Consequences, New Mexico. Several years ago, RAY experienced a house fire and nearly all of his personal property, household goods and all records and items pertaining to the manufacture of S & M and bondage paraphernalia were destroyed. has no record of mail-order customers for S & M and bondage equipment.

RAY compared his interest and drawing, writing and manufacturing bondage equipment to a person collecting stamps.

While living in Fence Lake, New Mexico, RAY set up a basement in his residence as a "dungeon" or "model torture chamber," complete with iron rings in the floor. The basement was RAY'S "get-a-way" where he manufactured paraphernalia, drew, wrote, fantasized and masturbated. RAY never used the basement for bondage activity with any person. Family members may have entered the bacement, which RAY normally kept locked.

All of RAY'S tapes were destroyed

RAY has always been interested in law enforcement and "loves law enforcement work." RAY desired a career with the NEW MEXICO STATE POLICE, but was rejected because he was underweight. RAY has been very active in ALBUQUERQUE SEARCH AND RESCUE as a volunteer, the BERNALILLO COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE RESERVES, has owned one private security guard organization and has been employed by at least three different security guard organizations, including the ALBUQUERQUE OFFICE OF VERN'S SECURITY.

RAY realizes that he has been a thief from time to time in his life and explained that he has a "code" in which he "considers corporations and insurance companies to be fair game."

RAY described himself as shy and a "loner" most of his life. Recently, RAY has had a problem with lonliness and considers himself to be trying to get his life "in order" at this time.

Hendy sentenced to 36 years

The Associated Press TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES — The former girlfriend of a man charged with kidnapping and sexually torturing three women was sentenced to 36 years in prison on accessory

charges. Cynthia Hendy was sentenced by state District Judge

Neil Mertz in Sierra County.

Her ex-boyfriend, David Parker Ray, is scheduled to go to trial on May 23 in Española.

Ray is charged with kidnapping and sexually torturing three

women in his Elephant Butte home last year.

Last year, Hendy pleaded guilty to two counts of accessory to kidnapping, two counts of accessory to criminal sexual penetration and one count of conspiracy to commit kidnapping in connection with the abductions and sexual tortures of two women.

As part her April 1999 plea deal, Hendy agreed to cooperate with investigators in exchange for a lighter sentence

than life in prison.

Mertz could have sentenced her from a minimum of 12 years

in prison to a maximum of 54 years.

One of the women who accused Hendy of abuse said that "no amount of prison time could pay for what she did to me." The woman said that Hendy and Ray had kidnapped her in Albuquerque in March 1999. She said she escaped three days later. She was found wearing only a padlocked metal collar and chain.

Hendy plans to appeal the sentence. She did not speak dur-

ing her sentencing.

Though the defense tried to say that Hendy's actions were based on a past history of abuse from men, Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz said she was not shy or had any problems in whipping, chaining and sexually torturing her the

Yontz said he was satisfied with Mertz's verdict.

Yontz said Hendy will be transferred to a woman's correctional facility in New Mexico or possibly in another state.

Accuser in sex torture case dies

ALBUQUERQUE — One of three women who accused <u>David</u> <u>Parker Ray</u> of kidnapping and sexually torturing her has died, a prosecutor said Monday.

Angelicia Montano, believed to be in her mid-20s, died Sunday, said Jim Yontz, deputy district attorney.

The cause of death wasn't known, Yontz said. An autopsy was conducted and the results have not been released yet.

Last year, Montano alleged in an affidavit that she went to Ray's trailer in Elephant Butte to pick up a cake mix for her boyfriend's birthday party, then was taken captive, chained and tortured with sexual devices and electric shock.

Ray had shared the trailer with a former girlfriend, Cindy Hendy, who pleaded guilty last year to being involved in a sex-torture case. She is scheduled to be sentenced Thursday. Montano's death has not affected the sentencing

Last year, Montano alleged in an hearing, said Yontz and Carmen fidavit that she went to Ray's Garza, Hendy's attorney.

Montano said in the affidavit that she persuaded Ray and Hendy to release her a few days after she was taken captive, promising to keep quiet.

"Our victim witness person was attempting to contact her" to ask if she wanted to testify at Hendy's sentencing, Yontz said. "While he was attempting to contact her, her mother called and said she passed away."



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

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

"It's human nature that we have a hard time trusting what we can't

see," Purcell said.

Mertz participated actively in the four-hour debate Wednesday, often suggesting scenarios and asking the lawyers for their reactions.

Jeff Rein, Ray's attorney, argued that with media present during jury selection, some prospective jurors would not provide truthful answers to questions about their own experiences of sexual abuse or sexual experimentation.

"If we're not allowed to get accurate, truthful responses from the jurors, Mr. Ray will not get a fair trial," said Rein, who has filed a motion to close jury selection in the subsequent two trials.

Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz said media coverage would make it harder to get impartial jurors for Ray's trials and for the trial of Ray's daughter, Glenda. She is charged with similar crimes based on allegations from one of her father's accusers.

But media attorneys argued that restricting public access to jury / selection can only be done if there is a compelling reason.

"The burden (of proof) is not on the media or the public,' said media lawyer Martin Esquivel. "What Mr. Rein has offered — opinion, argument, speculation — is not enough."

Mertz also is expected to rule next week on related issues, such as whether media can publish juror names or addresses, whether photographers can take pictures of Ray outside the courtroom and whether television satellite trucks can park in the courthouse parking lot.

Mertz has moved Ray's first trial up north to Rio Arriba County because of pretrial news coverage.

On March 24, the judge said he would close the jury selection process to the public and the media,

saying: "Only prospective jurors, court personnel and sheriff's personnel would be allowed in the jury assembly area."

Reached at home that night by The Associated Press, Mertz wouldn't explain why he closed the proceedings. His only response: "That's the procedure in this case. I'm not going to give any interview on it. That's my order."

Bob Johnson, executive director of the New Mexico Foundation for Open Government, had said this was the the first time he had heard of closing the questioning of prospective jurors to the public and media.

Prosecutors want to use evidence in sex torture case

SANTAFE - Prosecutors say evidence a state district judge threw out in a sex torture case shows that a naked woman who escaped an Elephant Butte mobile home was going to be held as a sex slave.

District Attorney Ron Lopez told the state Court of Appeals in a document filed Monday that prosecutors want to use the evidence in the case against David Parker Ray

Ray is to be tried for kidnapping, rape, aggravated battery and other charges in the first of three cases in which women say they were raped and sexually tortured at his home.

The victim in the first case alleges she was kidnapped in Albuquerque in March 1999 by Ray and his girlfriend, Cynthia Hendy, who has pleaded guilty and is awaiting sentencing.

The woman says she escaped from Hendy three days later, while Ray was working.

Ray's trial is on hold while Lopez appeals Judge Neil Mertz's refusal to allow certain evidence and the testimony of two experts to be used.

The items found in a white cargo-type trailer Ray allegedly referred to as the "playroom" bolster an important piece of evidence - an audio tape the woman says was played for her, prosecutors said.

The tape described what would happen to the woman while she was held captive, the district attorney said. But at its beginning, there is a disclaimer that the "very graphic sexually oriented material" was "for entertainment purposes."

Prosecutors must demonstrate that the tape was not for entertainment purposes but rather was an actual introduction to the captive of what would happen to her, the district attorney said.

The devices indicate Ray's "planning, care and preparation for the commission of the crime," the document said.

Prosecutors also said it's important for jurors to see the items, including illustrations of women being restrained and tortured.





Ray, 60, has been charged with 37 counts involving the alleged kidnapping and torture of the three women. The sex-torture accusations surfaced in March 1999 when a naked woman fled down a street near Elephant Butte with a chain on her neck, claiming she escaped from Ray's trailer.

Police searched the trailer and found torture devices, including surgical tools and chemicals as well as video cameras. Two other women later made similar allegations of being abducted, chained and sexually tortured.

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

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State appeals ruling in Parker Ray case

SOCORRO (AP) — A judge on
Thursday ruled to suppress evidence in the trial of David Parker Ray, who is accused of kidnapping and sexually torturing three women. A prosecutor appealed the ruling to the state appeals court.

District Judge Neil Mertz's ruling suppressed physical evidence and expert testimony following a hearing Thursday involving FBI testimony on hair samples. Prosecutor James Yontz later filed an appeal with the New Mexico Court of Appeals. It was not immediately known when the court would hear the appeal.

Calls made to Yontz and defense attorney Jeff Rein were not returned Thursday.

In the meantime, a hearing scheduled Friday on a news media request to allow reporters and the public at jury selection for Ray has been postponed indefinitely, an attorney representing the media groups said.

Martin Esquivel said Mertz called him Thursday afternoon to say the hearing, which was scheduled to take place in Truth or Consequences, is off for now. Mertz ruled last week that the public and news media are to be excluded from the jury selection process.



TRUTH OR CONSE-QUENCES — An inmate accused of sexually torturing three women was released from a hospital and returned to jail Tuesday, a week before his first trial was expected to begin.

David Parker Ray, 60, had been taken to Memorial Medical Center in Las Cruces on Friday with a heart condition, prosecutors have said. After undergoing a checkup, Ray was taken back to jail Tuesday, Sierra County jail administrator Russ Peterson said. He arrived at about 5:30 p.m.

"He's back, safe and sound — ambulatory, but moving a little slowly," Peterson said.

Ray's lawyer, Jeff Rein, declined to comment on the medical situation, saying it was private information between doctor and patient.

Jury selection is expected to begin April 4 in Española for Ray, charged with 37 counts, including kidnapping and rape involving the three women. Separate trials are planned for each of the three victims, state District Judge Neil Mertz has ruled.

Mertz also has ruled that the public and news media are to be excluded from the jury selection process in the first trial, which had been set to begin Tuesday before Ray was hospitalized.

The trial has been moved north because of pretrial publicity Mertz, meanwhile, agreed Tuesday to hold a hearing on a news media request to allow reporters and the public to attend jury selection. Mertz scheduled the hearing for 9 a.m. Friday at the Sierra County Courthouse in Truth or Consequences.

Mertz received a letter Monday from news media attorney Martin Esquivel asking him to reconsider the closure order.


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

Ray trial delayed after he's hospitalized with heart problems

SOCORRO - The first trial of David Parker Ray, accused of kidnapping and sexually torturing three women, has been delayed at least a week because Ray has been hospitalized since Friday with a heart condition, a prosecutor said Monday.

The delay will give attorneys for news media extra time to oppose a judge's ruling closing the jury selection process to the public and the media.

Ray, 60, is accused of kidnapping and sexually torturing the women at his residence in Elephant Butte, in southern New Mexico. State District Judge Neil Mertz moved the trial up north to Rio Arriba County because of pretrial publicity.

Mertz received a letter Monday from news media attorney Martin Esquivel asking Mertz to reconsider his closure order, which Esquivel said is unconstitutional. The order says, "Only prospective jurors, court personnel and sheriff's personnel would be allowed in the jury assembly area."

Mertz replied in a letter that he will make no decision on Esquivel's request "before I have had

an opportunity to review the cases cited by you."

Ray appeared in court last Thursday wearing a heart monitor and was taken to Memorial Medical Center in Las Cruces on Friday because of readings from the monitor, Assistant District Attorney Jim Yontz said.

Of Mertz's closure order, Ray's lawyer said: "We respect the ruling. I think it makes sense. With all the extraordinary pretrial publicity, anything we can do to make it easier for potential jurors will assist us in getting a jury seated more quickly."

A message was left with Mertz's office seeking comment on whether a hearing would be held on the closure issue. A woman who answered the telephone in the judge's office confirmed that Mertz received Esquivel's letter via fax Monday. Esquivel said the hospitalization delay will give him time to take his challenge to the state Supreme Court if Mertz does not rescind his

"In this case, he seems to have done it by himself. No one has requested closure of the voirdire (juror-questioning) proceedings," he said. "He hasn't given any reason why he wants to do so."

If it's a matter of juror privacy concerns, he said, "courts have held that isn't reason enough 'in itself to close voir-dire proceedings."

He said the judge can always discuss matters involving privacy interests in chambers without closing the entire proceedings.

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Parker's Killer Pleads Guilty

20-Year Prison Sentence for Yancy 'As Good As We Could Get,' DA Says

Dennis Roy Yancy, 28, of TorC, is guilty of strangling 22-year-old Marie Parker to death in July 1997. He will be incarcerated for the next 20 years in a state correctional facility and then serve five more years of supervised probation.

In a surprise move Thursday afternoon, Dec. 2, Yancy plead guilty to second degree murder and conspiracy to commit the murder. The meeting was scheduled as a pretrial conference.

Yancy's case was set to begin jury selection Monday, Dec. 6, in District Court in TorC.

In a small courtroom in Socorro, at a hearing attended by only a handful of observers, Seventh Judicial District Judge Neil P. Mertz handed down the sentence. Yancy fought back tears as the sentence was pronounced.

District Attorney Ron Lopez and Assistant DA Jim Yontz reached the plea and disposition agreement in the case with defense attorney Gary Mitchell before the conference began. Mertz carefully went through the rights Yancy was giving up and then asked Mitchell if his client was ready for sentencing.

Yancy was sentenced to 15 years each, sentences to run concurrently, on charges of second degree murder and



Yancy is the son of Anna B. Norton of TorC. He graduated from Hot Springs High School in 1989.

"You will spend a considerable period of time locked up in the penitentiary," Mertz told Yancy. "You can do one of two things. You can simply serve out the time and continue to live the same wretched life. Or you can take advantage of the programs available to you there and make something of yourself. I present these choices for your careful consideration and recommend the latter."

Yancy was arrested Friday, April 9, 1999, on a warrant from Magistrate Court. He was placed in custody at his new job as a cook at the Black Range Restaurant— a

job he had begun that day.

Yancy appeared pale after his 216 days of incarceration in the Doña Ana County Detention Facility.

It was his first appearance in public since his arraignment. Since then he had waived the right to appear in court at each of his scheduled hearings.

In an interview outside the courthouse, before her husband's arraignment Monday afternoon, April 12, Yancy's wife, Christina, told the press her husband told her he killed Marie Parker, but that David Ray "forced him to do it." She said she wasn't sure excatly how Ray forced Yancy to strangle Parker.

"They were leaving Blue Waters (Saloon)," Christina Yancy said. "Jesse (Ray) put a gun to her head and told Marie and Roy to get into the back of the truck. He did. David Ray took pictures. He (Yancy) strangled her."

Christina said Yancy told her these things the night of his arrest. "The FBI brought him to my house the night he was arrested," Christina said.

The prosecution said earlier in the case that Mrs. Yancy's statements alone were not enough to bring charges against the Rays in Parker's death. It is not known at this time if prosecutors are contemplating such charges. (Indicate page, name of newspaper, city and state.)

Torture Case Plea Change Denied

■ Cynthia Lea Hendy could be sentenced soon on charges connected with kidnapping of two women

A judge on Tuesday determined a woman who pleaded guilty to being an accessory to two kidnappings in the Elephant Butte sexual-torture case cannot change her plea.

State District Judge Neil P. Mertz also requested during the hearing in Truth or Consequences that a presentence report be prepared for Cynthia Lea Hendy, according to 7th Judicial District Attorney Ron

Lopez.

That means Hendy could be sentenced within four to six weeks, he said. She faces 12 to 54 years in prison.

As part of her April 6, 1999 plea deal, Hendy agreed to cooperate with investigators in

exchange for a lighter sentence than the nearly 200 years she was facing.

Hendy pleaded guilty to two counts of accessory to kidnapping, two counts of accessory to criminal sexual penetration and one count of conspiracy to commit kidnapping in

connection with the kidnappings and sexual tortures of two women.

Late last year, Hendy changed attorneys and asked to withdraw her plea.

Lopez said that in cross-examination Tuesday, Hendy admitted she still loves her co-defendant and boyfriend, David Parker Ray.

Ray is charged with 25 counts in connection with the kidnappings and sexual tortures of the same two women. He also faces 12 charges that allege he teamed up with his daughter, Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray, to kidnap and torture a third woman in 1996. The Rays are to be tried separately later this year.

"Initially, when (Hendy) was arrested, she didn't want to have anything to do with him," Lopez said. "I think when she changed her mind on the plea agreement, she started to have feelings for Mr. Ray again. That was basically what came out (in court)."

Carmen Garza, who is representing Hendy, said her client testified Tuesday that her former attorney, Xavier Edward Acosta, didn't explain the consequences of the plea deal, and pressured her into accepting it.


The defense also argued Hendy was "sexually and physically abused by men" during her childhood, had an eighth-grade education, and that she has a mental disability — things that would show Hendy's inability to understand the consequences of the plea deal.

Lopez said Acosta testified he explained the consequences to Hendy at great length, and that Mertz said Hendy "knowingly and voluntarily entered into the plea deal."

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Yancy pleads

SOCORRO - A 28-year-old man pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 20 years in prison Thursday for the only murder charged in a sex-torture case cortered at Elephant Butte Lake.

Dennis Roy Yancy entered guilty pleas to charges of seconddegree murder and conspiracy to murder Marie Parker, whose body was never found. Yancy was sentenced to 30 years - 10 of them suspended.

"If he screws up, he goes back for 12 (additional years)," District Attorney Ron Lopez told Truth or Consequences radio station KCHS.

Neither Lopez nor Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz returned calls to The Associated Press seeking information on the plea bargain and sentencing.

State District Judge Neil Mertz also did not respond to an AP message seeking information, and Ms. Parker's foster sister, Julie Lawrence, said her family had not been notified of the plea or sentencing. First word, she said, came from The Associated Press.

Had she known, she said, she would have been in court Thursday and would have sought an opportunity to speak before sentence was pronounced...

"To not give the family a chance "to say anything — it's not right," she said.

"I can't begin to express to you the absolute devastation I've gone through since we lost her. I loved her very much," Ms. Lawrence said, her voice breaking. "She had a heart bigger than anybody Tve ever known. She fed hungry, homeless children, found places for them to sleep so they wouldn't freeze to death. She frequently put other people ahead of her own needs. That's who she was, and now she's gone."

Ms. Parker vanished from an Elephant Butte bar in 1997. She

Yancy was arrested April 9. Ms. Lawrence said she had visited Parker just days before her disappearance. She said she and Parker had been in a bar when Yancy came in, frightening Parker.

She explained they had dated briefly, and she was obviously afraid of him — very afraid, horrified," Lawrence said by phone Thursday night from Belen.

Lawrence said the guilty plea and sentencing were a relief but "it doesn't bring her back."

She said she suspected Yancy all along and believed Parker was dead because her children had been left unattended.

"I knew for her to leave her kids and not come and get them, I knew she was gone. She would never leave her kids," she said.

When she heard of Parker's disappearance she drove to Truth or Consequences, picked up the children and cared for them for a few weeks until the state intervened. Custody was awarded to Parker's mother, Kate Parker, See Yancy, Page A-3

"My daughter was no angel," Mrs. Parker said Thursday. "She had a lot of problems in her lifetime, but she didn't deserve to die that way, and my grandchildren don't deserve to be orphans."

The absence of a body and Yancy's cooperation with police weighed in the plea bargain, the district attorney said.

Yancy's wife, Christina Yancy, long had said her husband admitted killing Ms. Parker.

"He strangled her, I guess," she said last April. She said her husband told her he had been forced to kill the woman.

State and federal investigators have said Ms. Parker's killing was interwoven in a tapestry of sexual torture for which three other people have been in custody for more than six months.

The case surfaced last March

when a naked woman broke a restraining chain and escaped from a mobile home belonging to defendant David Parker Ray, where police found torture devices. Two other women later came forward with similar allegations of kidnapping and torture.

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Ray, 60, his daughter Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray, 32, and David Ray's live-in companion, Cynthia Lea Hendy, 39, were all charged in connection with the alleged kidnappings and-or torture but not with murder.

Investigators have said they suspected numerous victims might yet be found.

For weeks during the spring, state and federal teams used a backhoe and search dogs to look for bodies, but none was found.

Police never said how the Parker murder was connected with the sex-torture case.

The missing woman had a long history of troubles. A runaway at 14, pregnant at 19, she was believed by friends and relatives to have been involved in the drug culture around Elephant Butte, where David Parker Ray had worked as a state parks maintenance man.

After running away and living on the street, she was placed in foster care with the Lawrence family.

"My mother was her foster mother. I was her foster sister. We were very close," Julie Lawrence said.

Two days after her disappearance from the Blue Waters Saloon, she was reported missing by her teen-age brother, Tom McCauley, who was living near Silver City at the time.

Last month, Mertz ordered the trials of Ray and his daughter severed and moved out of Sierra County.

Mertz set Ray's trial March 28 in Tierra Amarilla on 37 counts involving the alleged kidnapping and torture of three women. Mertz ordered Ray's daughter tried next July in Gallup on 12 counts involving the kidnapping and torture of one woman.

Hendy was charged with 25 counts relating to two kidnappings.

Man tied to sex-torture case implicates father, daughter

SOCORRO - Aman convicted of killing a 22-year-old woman told police he strangled her in an Elephant Butte "torture chamber" on orders from David Parker Ray, who is charged with sex-

ually torturing three other women.

Dennis Roy Yancy, 28, pleaded guilty Thursday to second-degree murder and conspiracy to commit murder in the July 1997 death

of Marie Parker.

Yancy told police at his April arrest that he used a rope or cord to strangle Ms. Parker, District Attorney Ron Lopez said Friday,

"He indicated that she was killed in the trailer - what you would call the sex torture chamber - of Mr. Ray," Lopez told The Associated Press in a telephone interview. "What he indicated to the police was that he did it because he was ordered to do so by Mr. Ray."

Investigators have no physical evidence to corroborate Yancy's

statements, Lopez said.

According to Yancy, Ms. Parker was lured into captivity by Yancy and Glenda "Jesse" Ray, David Parker Ray's daughter, on the pretext of a drug transaction, Lopez said.

Yancy said the woman was tortured before she was killed, Lopez

"They placed the body in Mr. Ray's truck, wrapped the body in either a blanket or some type of tarp, took her out to a remote area and that's where they buried her," Lopez said.

It's the first time prosecutors have been specific about such a connection between Yancy and the Rays, who are co-defendents in a related sexual torture case...

The Rays are charged with kidnapping and torture, but not with

murder.

Billy Blackburn, Glenda Ray's attorney, said Yancy's credibility is shaky, particularly since he couldn't lead investigators to Parker's body.

"I would assume that if Mr. Lopez said.

Yancy was a credible witness, one, they would find the body, and, two, Mr. David Parker Ray and Jesse Ray would have been charged with some type of conspiracy and murder," Blackburn said. "We always knew the Yancy situation was out there, but neither my client nor her father was ever charged with that. ... I very seriously doubt I'm going to ever have to worry about Mr. Yancy."

Defense lawyer Jeff Rein, representing David Ray, expressed concern that disclosure of Yancy's allegations would hurt Ray's chances for a fair trial.

"There's no evidence to support any of that," he said of Yancy's statements.

Investigators searched a desert area described by Yancy, but never found Ms. Parker's body. They found no physical evidence of Ms. Parker's presence in Ray's trailer, Lopez acknowledged.

"We found nothing to tie in Marie Parker," he said.

Yancy never said why Parker

was targeted for death.

"He just says the girl had been tortured and that after she went through the sexual torture, Ray said: 'You have to get rid of her.' And Yancy took that to mean he had to kill her," Lopez said.

Yancy and Parker had a prior relationship, according to Parker's one-time foster sister, Julie Lawrence. The two women had been in an Elephant Butte bar in July 1997 just days before Parker disappeared. Yancy entered the bar, and Parker expressed-fear and wanted to leave immediately, Ms. Lawrence said Thursday.

The plea and sentencing had been unscheduled, although a plea offer had been on the table awhile before Thursday's pretrial conference, Lopez said. Yancy's trial was scheduled for Dec. 6.

Yancy's lawyer, Gary Mitchell of Ruidoso, had been busy with another trial and hadn't responded to the plea offer until this week,

David Parker Ray's former girlfriend Cynthia Hendy, 39, faced 25 charges related to two of the alleged kidnappings but had signed a proposed plea bargain.



Woman in sex-torture case wants to change guilty plea

The Associated Press

TRUTH OR CONSE-QUENCES — Awoman accused in a kidnapping and sex-torture case in the Elephant Butte area wants to withdraw the guilty plea she made earlier this year.

Cynthia Hendy wants to plead innocent and take the case to trial, her new lawyer said Thursday.

Carmen Garza, a Las Cruces lawyer who has taken over as the 39-year-old Hendy's lawyer, said she's met with Hendy several times and plans to file a motion to withdraw the guilty plea Hendy made in April.

Hendy and her boyfriend, David Parker Ray, 59, are suspected of taking part in the kidnapping and sexual torture of two women in February and March.

Hendy originally faced 25 charges that could have sent her ito prison for nearly two centuries if convicted. She pleaded guilty in April to two counts of accessory to kidnapping, two counts of accessory to criminal sexual penetration and one count of conspiracy to commit kidnapping.

With the plea, Hendy cut her possible prison time down to 12 to 54 years. She has not been sentenced but remains jailed.

Garza said Hendy told her the guilty plea wasn't knowing and voluntary, a requirement for entering into such a deal.

State District Judge Neil P. Mertz found in April that Hendy gave her plea freely, knowingly and voluntarily, prosecutor Jim Yontz said Thursday.

Yontz also said Hendy and her attorney at the time, Xavier Edward Acosta, signed the plea agreement, which means Hendy read and understood the deal and Acosta reviewed it with her.

"We will oppose any such withdrawal of any plea," Yontz said.
"I've had one or two defendants in 17 years of doing this stuff who has successfully withdrawn a plea."

In addition to allegedly taking part with Hendy in the kidnapping and torture of two women, Ray and his daughter, Glenda "Jesse" Ray, are suspected of pairing up in the alleged kidnapping and sexual assault of another woman in 1996.

Both of the Rays maintain their innocence. Trial dates have not been set, Yontz said.

A fourth person arrested in the case, <u>Dennis Roy Yancy</u>, was charged on suspicion of killing a Truth or Consequences woman who has been missing since July 1997. A tentative trial date was set for December.

Easter churchgoers reflect on

The Associated Press ELEPHANT BUTTE - In a small church about a mile from the alleged scene of a strange sex-torture case, Pastor Herb Munson prepared to talk about sin and salvation on Easter Sun-

Munson said he didn't know David Park-

er Ray or Cynthia Lea Hendy, each charged with counts that include rape, kidnapping and aggravated battery. The couple are suspected of holding two

women against their will in separate incidents and torturing them with electric shock and sexual devices.

Ray, held at the Sierra County jail in Truth or Consequences, received a holiday visit from some family members, including a woman who has been identified as his daughter, Jesse, who declined comment on the case.

Munson said he didn't believe it would be appropriate to talk about the case in his Easter Sunday sermon but spoke on the subject in an interview before the service.

"There's a basic human flaw in all men," Munson said. "I have the same seed in me personally

that Ray did that made him do what he did. All men apart from Christ have the capacity to be the worst and do the worst.

Gwen Hankla, who has lived in Truth or Consequences for three years, held a Bible and shivered slightly in the wind as she stood in front of the Lakeside Community Church where Munson is pastor.

"It's a shame that could have happened here because there's so much good here," Hankla said. "I have a lot of faith. Unfortunately the devil gets more press than God."

Meanwhile, at the alleged crime scene, neighbors walked their dogs and curious people drove past the house, which still has yellow crime-scene tape along the chain-link fence that marks the property boundary.

"It just seemed kind of bizarre," said Don Seeley, a Truth or Consequences resident who drove past with his wife, Nancy, "We hadn't seen the property yet."

"I reckon it could happen anywhere in America, it's just amazing it could happen in our neck of the woods," Don Seeley said.

Area residents were looking forward to returning to normal. Janice Gorham's family has leased property in the lakeside community since the 1950s. She has a small house right behind Ray and Hendy's home.

"He would be out having coffee and he would wave and say




Jesse Ray, daughter of David Parker Ray, leaves a Truth or Consequences jail after visiting her father Sunday afternoon.

hello," Gorham said. "He wasn't overly friendly but he wasn't standoffish. Everybody out here pretty much sticks to them-selves."

Don Richardson, who shares the home with Gorham, said he bought a tractor from Ray and talked to him about buying the trailer where one woman now says she was tortured.

"I never looked in the trailer. but I was talking about buying it from him," Richardson said, adding that Ray said he might be

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Investigation slows for Easter holiday

ELEPHANT BUTTE — A scaled down crew of investigators remained on the job over the Easter weekend to investigate leads in a bizarre case in which two women said they were sexually tortured.

With much of the evidence collection complete, FBI agents and state police followed new leads and re-examined old cases that might be connected to this case, state police Lt. Randy Bertram said.

No police activity could be seen Saturday at the half-acre lot where agents had spent several days collecting evidence from a double-wide mobile home and a trailer that was removed from the property Friday.

A cadaver-sniffing dog roamed the property Thursday and investigators did some hand digging last week. Officials still are not ruling out the possibility of excavations later.

The 25 remaining investigators "will be following up anything that's urgent, that couldn't wait until Monday," Bertram said Saturday. "We didn't want to jeopardize the investigation."

Bertram would not comment on the nature of the leads. Although law enforcement officials said they have found no human remains at the home, they haven't ruled out the possibility of homicide.

Two women have accused <u>David Parker Ray</u>, 59, and <u>Cindy Hendy</u>, 39, of holding them against their will in two separate incidents. The women say Ray chained and sexually tortured them while Hendy watched. They say Hendy, armed with a gun, threatened to

kill them if they tried to escape.

An Albuquerque woman escaped last month from the home of Ray and Hendy wearing only a padlocked collar and chain. She said the pair allegedly abducted her from Albuquerque and sexually assaulted her.

The Sierra County woman said Ray and Hendy held her in a trailer and used surgical tools and sexual devices to torture her. She said her captors released her in February along Interstate 25.


Ray and Hendy each have been charged with 25 counts, including kidnapping, rape and aggravated battery. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for April 15. Their attorneys have said they will plead innocent.

Law enforcement officials said Friday the number of investigators in the case could increase from the nearly 100 that were involved last week when work resumes on Monday.

The investigators staying over the weekend will be pursuing leads in the Elephant Butte and Truth or Consequences area, Bertram said. Each team is composed of two people, one person from the FBI and one from the state police.

Some of the remaining investigators also will be answering the phones taking new leads, which are "considerably" over 100. Investigators outside the area are being allowed to tend to previous commitments during the holiday as well, Bertram said.

"We're not scaling back, we're just pausing for a moment," Bertram

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Cadaver-sniffing dog\ assists investigation

Guinness, a proven veteran of grim searches, is at work once

The 6-year-old purebred black Labrador retriever on Thursday helped state and federal investigators examine an Elephant Butte trailer where two women say they were sexually tortured.

The investigators say they have not ruled out homicides in the case, but bones found outside the trailer where co-defendants Donald Parker Kay and Cynthia Lea Mendy live were not human. The task force is doing some limited digging around the trailer.

On Thursday, Guinness and his handler, Lette Birn of Los Alamos, roamed the scene looking for human remains.

Strong winds in the area could blow scents away, FBI agent Doug Beldon said later at a news conference. The weather service recorded gusts up to 49 mph Thursday.

Last January, Guinness, a member of the Los Alamos Mountain Canine Corps, helped a rescue team locate body parts strewn around Sandia Peak near Albuquerque after a plane crash.

"He's a highly trained dog, and the handler is very, very skilled," said Marshall Maez, a member of the Los Alamos Mountain Canine Corps and a state incident commander for search and rescue. "I've seen the dog work. He's just incredible."

Guinness and his handler received a commendation from the state after the Sandia plane crash search, Maez said.

Cadaver dogs are also trained to find bodies under water. The FBI said it has not yet begun a search of Elephant Butte Lake, which is a fraction of a mile from Ray and Hendy's trailer.

"As bodies begin to decompose, they produce gases that rise to the surface," Maez said. "It produces a viable scent they can detect."

A well-trained dog and a skilled handler can play the wind currents along the water's surface to find any bodies.

One black Lab on the Los Alamos team found a body in 20 feet of water, he said.

The cadaver dogs respond to the scents of dead animals as well as to human remains, he said, but they respond differently,

"The handlers are very adept about reading (the dogs') behaviors and discerning whether the dog is alerting to animal cadavers or human cadavers," he said.

Guinness lives with the Danish-born Mrs. Birn and her family in Los Alamos. He has been trained as a search dog since birth, Maez said.

Usually a cadaver dog is rewarded with a toy, like a ball, or a treat, after finding human remains, he said.

In Guinness' case, the preferred toy is a pine cone.

"The dog just loves to retrieve pine cones — he just mouths them and keeps them in his mouth as though it were a tennis ball," Maez

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Sex-torture investigation expands into at least two more states

The Associated Press TRUTH OR CONSE-QUENCES - The investigation into a case with claims of rape and torture has expanded into at least two more states, though the FBI said Monday it was following leads, not collecting evidence.

"We don't have crime scenes in other states," FBI agent Doug Beldon said at a news confer-, ence. Beldon again said homicides are possible, though no murder charges have been filed in the case.

Law enforcement officials previously said they were following leads in Phoenix and Tucson, Ariz., and El Paso and Victoria, Texas, as well as in New Mexico. Beldon would not specify which additional states were involved.

Beldon said about 30 agents were following leads Monday in rape, kidnapping and aggravat-

and around the neighboring cities of Truth or Consequences and Elephant Butte, where two women said they were held captive and tortured with sexual devices.

David Parker Ray, 59, and Cindy Hendy, 39, are accused of

ed battery in the case. Two women, one from Albuquerque and one from Truth or Consequences, have accused Ray and Hendy of holding them against their will in separate incidents.

The women say Ray tortured them with sexual devices and electric shocks while Hendy watched. Hendy is accused of holding a gun on them and threatening to shoot them if they tried to escape. Ray and Hendy have pleaded innocent.

A "big briefing" Monday morning brought investigators up to speed after some returned from a short break during the Easter holiday, state police Lt. Randy Bertram said.


Additional agents are involved in Albuquerque processing documents and other physical evidence, while agents in other states are following leads, Beldon said.



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Cadaver-sniffing dogs again join search in tortu

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES Two cadaver-sniffing dogs searched the desert north of the city Tuesday as investigators intensified efforts to find a corpse and other evidence in a sex-torture and murder case.

The Labrador retrievers, Carbon and Guinness, combed the arroyos off Interstate 25, in the same general area investigators searched Saturday with shovels and probes.

"They are looking for anything that can help them locate a body, evidence, whatnot," state police Lt. Greg Richardson said. "We have

someone who said he murdered someone. That's the only body we have to look for right now."

Dennis Roy Yancy, 27, was arrested Friday and charged with murder and other counts in the disappearance of Marie Parker, 22, in July 1997 from a bar in nearby Elephant Butte.

Parker's body has not been found, but District Attorney Ron Lopez said there was enough evidence to proceed without it.

Investigators say Parker's murder is connected to the case against David Parker-Ray and Cynthia Lea Hendy, who are accused of and more suspects.

sexually torturing two women. Yancy is the only one charged with murder, and police have not said how the cases are connected.

The case against Ray and Hendy broke March 22 when an Albuquerque woman escaped their mobile home and told police she had been abducted, shocked with electricity and sexually tortured. A second woman came forward a few days later, accusing the couple of kidnapping and sexually torturing her in February.

All along authorities have said there could be more homicides

Ray, 59, and Hendy, 39, have pleaded innocent to 25 charges each, including kidnapping, sexual penetration, aggravated battery and conspiracy.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled Thursday in district court. however, a plea bargain appears to be in the works for Hendy, who was moved last week from the jail that houses Ray. Yancy was moved Monday.

An order sealing Hendy's "plea and disposition agreement" was dated April 6. Her lawyer, Xavier Acosta, said no agreement had been signed by a judge.

Man's wife claims he confessed

TRUTH OR CONSE QUENCES — Dennis Roy Yancy's wife said her husband told her Sunday he killed a woman who disappeared from an Elephant Butte saloon in 1997.

Christina Yancy, who visited her husband for about 40 minutes at ter, said he told her he was forced ed innocent. Jeff Rein, Ray's attorto kill Marie Parker.

"He strangled her, I guess," Mrs. Yancy said.

Yancy confessed to authorities and is cooperating in the investigation of a sex-torture case that also involves David Parker Ray, 59, and Cindy Hendy, 39, Mrs. Yancy told The Associated Press.

Yancy is worried he could face the death penalty, she said. She said he had received a threat, passed on by another inmate: "Rats die in jail.'

FBI agent Doug Beldon said Sunday he couldn't comment on the matters discussed by Mrs. Yancy because they could be evidence in the case. Detention center officers wouldn't allow the AP to talk to Yancy, who goes by his middle name, Roy. His wife said he doesn't have a lawyer yet.

Sierra County Magistrate Thomas Pestak said Yancy likely will be arraigned Monday or Tuesday in Truth or Consequences, at which time a date will be set for a preliminary hearing.

Yancy was charged over the weekend with Parker's murder. Police on Saturday searched for her body but didn't find it. Yancy is the first person charged with murder in the case.

Ray and Hendy, who were arrested last month, face 25 counts, including criminal sexual penetration, kidnapping and aggravated battery. Two women have alleged Ray and Hendy abducted and sexually tortured them in separate incidents in February and March.

Ray and Hendy both have pleadney, couldn't be reached for comment Sunday.

Yancy, 27, who is being held without bail, is a known associate of Ray and Hendy, according to law enforcement officials.

State police and FBI investigators have said they are not ruling out more homicides, more victims or more suspects.

Mrs. Yancy said her husband told her he was forced to kill Parker, 22, by someone who has not been charged in the case. She said he believes he isn't the only one who was manipulated into killing

She said her husband was taken to Elephant Butte Lake and a stretch of N.M. 195 north of Truth or Consequences on Saturday to help police look for Parker's body. But Yancy believes Ray moved the body, she said.

"He was there when she was kidnapped and murdered," Mrs. Yancy said. "He said he was manipulated into doing it. He didn't want to kill her is what he said.

She said her husband told her he, Ray and the other person went. to the Blue Waters Saloon in Elephant Butte to conduct a drug deal for Parker. She said the other person held a gun on Parker and told her to get into the back of a pickup truck.

Later during the abduction, that person held Parker down while he held a rope around her neck, Mrs. Yancy said. She said her husband thinks authorities have a picture of him at the murder scene.



"They got information this was a good place for them to come looking and do some searching ... They picked up some items, but they don't know if they are related in any way" to the case, state

police Lt. Greg Richardson said.
The only murder charge in the case is the one filed against Dennis Roy Yancy, 27, of Truth or Consequences. He was arrested Friday night and charged in the death of Marie B. Parker, 22, who disappeared in 1997 in Elephant Butte.

But Beldon said he wouldn't rule out the possibility of other homicides.

The investigation last month led to charges of kidnapping and sexual torture against David Parker Ray and his girlfriend, Cynthia Lea Hendy.

Yancy, ordered held without bail, is a known associate of Ray and Hendy, Beldon said.

A prior interview with Yancy led to his arrest, Richardson said. Parker was last seen July 5,

1997, at a since-closed saloon not far from Ray's home, Beldon said.

The investigation started March 22 when one of Ray's neighbors saw a woman naked and bloody on a road, wearing only a padlocked collar. The woman told police she had been shocked with electricity and tortured sexually.

Since then, dozens of FBI agents and federal authorities have combed Ray's home, collecting more than 1,000 pieces of evidence, digging around the property and bringing in a cadav. er-sniffing dog to roam the prop-

Beldon said the investigation

has expanded across 10 states and law officers also have searched Elephant Butte Lake for evidence. State and federal authorities won't list all the states, but said two of them are Texas and Arizona.

John Branaugh, an acquaintance of Hendy, has said she told him Ray killed four to six people, mutilated the bodies and dumped them in the lake.

Authorities have said they seized photos, some explicit, from Ray's property and were crosschecking them with missing-persons reports.

Ray, 59, and Hendy, 39, have pleaded innocent to counts of kidnap, sexual abuse, battery, conspiracy and other charges. Each remains in jail in lieu of \$1 million bail.

In addition to murder, Yancy was charged with kidnapping, conspiracy and evidence tampering, Beldon said.

A woman who said she once rented a trailer to Yancy said she saw him with Hendy a few months ago.

"These people were all running together and they weren't very approvable," Dee Phillips, 68, said in a telephone interview Saturday. "I had that whole bunch around here. When I went to bed at night, I put a bar on the back door,

Yancy bagged groceries and worked in the kitchen of a fast food restaurant after getting out of the military, Mrs. Phillips said.

He "didn't seem to have a conscience," she said. "I didn't like his company."

Yancy was arrested in Truth or Consequences in October and charged with aggravated drunken driving and possession of drug paraphernalia. It was not immediately known whether the case' was still pending.

Parker had two daughters, ages 4 and 5.

Her mother, Kate, said last week the FBI had requested dental records, clothing and photos of her daughter.

A missing person's report filed by Parker's half-brother, Tom McCouley, said he feared she was involved in a bad drug deal.

Another man interviewed about Parker's disappearance told police she was going to the Blue Waters Saloon to meet two men for a drug deal the night she vanished. The man said he advised Parker not to go, but she said she wanted the money, the police report said.

Another woman who disappeared, Jill Troia, also had a connection to Ray. The last person to see her in 1995 was Ray's daughter, Jesse Ray, at an Albuquerque restaurant.

Jesse Ray was taken to Sierra Vista Hospital in Truth or Consequences on Saturday for an undisclosed emergency, charge nurse Kelley Alexander said.


"She was seen here today in emergency, and she's in stable condition," Alexander said, declining further comment.

Albuquerque homicide detective Carla Gandara told the AP on Saturday that she interviewed Jesse Ray about Troia's disappearance.

"These two had got into a disagreement or argument," Gandara said. "Supposedly, Jesse went her way and left Jill at the Frontier Restaurant."

She said Troia's parents, who live out of state, have been in frequent contact with the Albuquerque police missing persons bureau since their daughter's disappearance. Troia's roommate, Woody Davidson, reported her missing, Gandara said.

"She just completely vanished from the face of the earth," Gandara said, adding there were no known witnesses to anything that might have seemed like an abduction at the time.

FBI Adds Agents To Torture Inquiry

ELEPHANT BUTTE STATE PARK — A second alleged victim has come forward and more than two dozen FBI agents have joined the investigation of a man and woman suspected of kidnapping and torturing an Albuquerque woman last weekend, a State Police official said Saturday

official said Saturday.
On Saturday, about 30 FBI agents from New Mexico and surrounding states, along with about 20 State Police personnel, swarmed over the mobile home, trailer and storage shed on the half-acre lot where David Parker Ray and Cindy Lea Hendy lived.

Herman Silva, deputy chief of the New Mexico State Police, said another woman has come forward in the case but he declined to say anything more about her.

Seventh Judicial District Attorney Ron Lopez said Friday that there were "reasonable grounds" to believe there was more than one victim.

At about 2:45 p.m. Saturday, two women and two men in a car approached a police roadblock on Bass Road about 50 yards from the property. One woman could be seen with her arm around the other as though to comfort her.

They got out of the car and walked up to the roadblock. Moments later, four State Police officers walked down to the roadblock, placed a black jacket over one of the women's heads — appar-

ently to shield her face from onlookers — and walked her to a recretational vehicle that was being used

as a police command post.
When asked later if that was the woman who'd come forward, Silva said: "We're talking to a lot of people and at this time I can't comment on that."

Silva said he could not release much other information because it's an ongoing investigation. He said representatives of the State Police, the District Attorney's Office and the FBI would meet later Saturday to discuss the status of the investio discuss the status of the investication and what could be made public.

The arrival of FBI agents appeared to be a substantial escalation of the investigation. Park rangers and State Police Mounted Patrol officers for the first time this week blocked the roads in front of and in back of the home.

Silva said the FBI arrived several days after the investigation began and it took time to gather enough agents together. He also said the roads were blocked to make room for all the police vehicles at the

Earlier Saturday, several investigators, most in white cover-alls and wearing blue latex gloves, could be seen on the back porch of the mobile home. Two were wearing FBI shirts or jackets and could be seen removing boxes from an adjacent shed and sealing them with

tape.

When the agents spotted a reporter on the public road behind the trailer, they hastily put up a tarp to block the view. A Mounted Patrol officer then drove up and shooed onlookers off the road.

From a distance later Saturday, investigators could be seen carrying boxes out of the mobile home. Officers also began placing small red flags in the front yard of the home. Sliva declined to comment on what the flags meant.

Ray and Hendy are being held in the Sierra County jail on several charges in connection with the rape and forture of a 22-year-old woman who said she was kidnapped from Albuquerque on March 20.

That woman was seen running in an Elephant Butte roadway on March 22 with a padlocked collar and chain around her neck.

She told police she was kidnapped from Albuquerque by Ray and Hendy and that they tied her up, beat her with a leather object, shocked her with some sort of electrical device, threatened her with a gun and sexually assaulted her over three days.





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DA: Sex Case Could Have Other Victims

Investigation Near TorC May Take Days

A woman who was allegedly kidnapped, beaten and sexually tortured for three days at a trailer home near Truth or Consequences might not be the only victim in the bizarre case, a prosecutor said Friday.

"It's one of these crime scenes that just gives you that feeling — that there's something else out there," 7th Judicial District Attorney Ron Lopez said. "There's reasonable grounds to believe we may have other victims out there."

State Police investigators and an evidence team from the FBI on Friday, remained at the home where suspects David Parker Ray, 59, and Cynthia Lea Hendy, 39, allegedly kept an Albuquerque woman for three days before she was able to escape. Lopez said the crime-scene teams would likely remain there for several more days.

"It's one of these crime scenes that just gives you that feeling — that there's something else out there."

"We'll be here for quite a while," Lopez said of Ray's home, which is near the village of Elephant Butte east of Truth or Consequences.

"There's no indication of homicide at this point," Lopez said.

Darren White, director of the state Department of Public Safety, added that "they're trying to put the pieces together of what appears to be a very sick and disturbing puzzle. That takes time."

Arrest-warrant affidavits filed against Ray and Hendy allege that during the ordeal, which began last Saturday, the 22-year-old victim was tied up, beaten with a leather object, shocked with some sort of electrical device, threatened with a



He said he did not anticipate expanding the search by moving any of the boats or trailers on the property.

The investigation has not led to

searches at other locations, he said. Lopez said jailed suspects must get a preliminary hearing within 10 days of their arrests, but he would probably seek an extension from District Court to allow investigators to finish examining Ray's home and

property. Ray and Hendy are charged only

Lopez said that "in my experience, there must be other victims" or people who participated willingly. He said the alleged victim got the impression she wasn't the only per-

son to have been targeted.
"The victim at this point may be leading us to believe there are other victims out there." Lopez said. But the said that as of Friday afternoon, iffvestigators had not tracked down any other possible victims.

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In '86 Jesse Ray told FBI her father tortured women

ELEPHANT BUTTE — The daughter of sex-torture defendant David Parker Ray came forward nearly 13 years ago, telling the FBI of alleged whiteslavery abductions by her father, an agent said Thursday.

She told the FBI her father abducted, tortured and then sold women in Mexico, agent Doug Beldon said. The bureau investigated for a year but never substantiated the allegations, Beldon

said.

Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray, now 32, was about 19 or 20 at the time. Now Ms. Ray is a co-defendant with her father in the sextorture case that surfaced March 22 when a naked woman fied David Ray's mobile home wearing only a metal collar with a padlocked chain. Two other alleged victims have since been located, and the three form the basis of 37 charges against Ray.

"In June 1986, Jesse Ray volunteered information to the FBI in New Mexico concerning her father," Beldon said. "She alleged that David Parker Ray was abducting and torturing women and selling them to buyers in

Mexico.

Beldon said agents never could determine specifically who was abducted. No names were given and no homicides alleged, he said.

"The allegations were nonspecific," he said.

"For over one year thereafter, the FBI in New Mexico conducted an investigation in an effort to substantiate the allegations. The investigation was conducted under the FBI's jurisdiction in White Slave Traffic Act cases," he said. "No victims were identified, and none came forward.

"The investigation was conducted in both New Mexico and Arizona. A thorough investigation was accomplished based upon information known at that time. When logical investigation was completed and leads were covered, the case was closed," he

Beldon declined comment on 25 preliminary hearing.

whether evidence in the old case was being incorporated into the new investigation.

"Due to the pendancy of the cases against Jesse Ray and David Ray, the FBI cannot provide the investigative details of the 1986 investigation or the

current one," he said.

The FBI generally does not comment on pending cases. Documents released Wednesday, including material involving FBI profilers who said Ray fits the description of a "sexual sadist, were unsealed by state authorities who are also involved in the joint state-federal investigation.

The documents said another co-defendant, Cynthia Lea Hendy, told investigators that Ray had admitted involvement in as many as 14 killings.

She said the dead included men and women whose bodies were dumped in ravines and in Elephant Butte Lake, near Ray's

home, the court papers say. No bodies have been found, and Ray's attorney, Jeff Rein. said these allegations arose after Ms. Hendy worked out a deal with prosecutors.

"She told them what they wanted to hear," Rein said.

Ray's 37 counts include kidnapping, conspiracy and sexual attacks on three women — but not murder.

As many as 100 agents from the FBI and state police investigated the 1999 case at its peak, following leads in 10 states, using ground-penetrating radar and bringing in dogs trained to find human remains.

Ray's daughter is charged with 12 counts involving kidnapping and sexual assault. Hendy, 39, has agreed to plead guilty to five counts involving conspiracy, Hendy's lawyer has said.

Defendant Dennis Roy Yancy, 27, is charged with murdering Marie B. Farker, 22, who disappeared from an Elephant Butte bar in 1997. Her body was never found. Investigators haven't said how the Yancy and Ray-Hendy cases connect.

Investigation headquarters moves to town

ELEPHANT BUTTE — Investigators working on a sexual torture case have moved their headquarters to Las Cruces, where they were gathering Monday to examine evidence.

"We have a core group of agents still working on it, and we have investigators who are also looking in other areas," state police Lt. Greg Richardson said Sunday.

"We're still going to be working on it just as hard," he said.

Investigators scaled back their work this past weekend, but were renewing their efforts Monday, he said.

The case came to light when two women accused an Elephant Butte man and his girlfriend of kidnapping and torturing them.

Investigators had been working out of the state Parks and Recreation Division boating center at Elephant Butte.

But the agency needed the building to prepare for the Memorial Day weekend onslaught of tourists at Elephant Butte Lake, Richardson said.

"The state parks people were a tremendous help to us. We were really grateful to them. They made it a lot easier for us to do our work," he said.

Investigators began moving out of the building Friday, Richardson



A Third Arrest in New Mexico In a Sex-Torture Investigation

ELEPHANT BUTTE, N.M., April 10 (AP) — A man has been charged with murder in a case that already has led to charges of kidnapping and sexual torture against a couple.

The man, <u>Dennis Roy Yaney</u>, 27, of Truth or Consequences, N.M., is the first person charged with murder in the multistate investigation, in which a Federal-state task force has searched a lake. The police have said for weeks that the case possibly involved murder, though no bodies have been found.

Mr. Yancy was arrested on Friday night and was being held without bail, a Federal Bureau of Investigation agent, Doug Beldon, said today.

Mr. Yancy is accused of kidnapping and murder in the death of Marie B. Parker, 22. She was last seen on July 5, 1997, at a now-closed saloon not far from the home of David Parker Ray, me of two people accused by two vimen of holding them in chains in separate days-long

incidents of torture.

M. Ray. 59, and Cynthia Lea Hendy, 39, have been charged with numerous crimes, including kidnapping, sexual abuse, battery and conspiracy. They have both pleaded innocent.

Ms. Parker's body has not been recovered, Mr. Beldon said.

The investigation began March 22 when one of Mr. Ray's neighbors saw a 22-year-old woman naked and bloody on a road; court papers said she also had a padlocked collar around her neck.


Since then, dozens of members of the task force have searched Mr. Ray's home, collecting more than 1,000 pieces of evidence, and excavated around the property.

Mr. Beldon said that the investigation had expanded across about 10 states and that law officers also had searched Elephant Butte Lake.

The Associated Press ELEPHANT BUTTE - Investigators used high technology equipment and a less sophisticated backhoe Thursday to search a piece of property that is the focus of a sex torture case. They found nothing.

Flags and splashes of white paint marked a few spots in the dirt lot after a two-man crew using ground-penetrating radar spent several hours scanning the

front yard.

The radar search went on elsewhere on the fenced half-acre lot as a backhoe driver began digging up pinpointed sites on the land that belongs to David Parker Ray who faces 37 charges, including kidnap and rape.

State police Lt. Greg Richardson said three or four holes were dug in Rays yard, but nothing of any significance to the case was

uncovered.

Richardson said investigators hadn't decided whether to dig in other areas of the yard Friday, but would again search Ray's residence.

FBI and state police searched Ray's double wide mobile home, a nearby trailer on the lot and the grounds for several days last month after two women accused him of abducting and torturing

when a bloodied woman wearing only a padlocked collar ran to a home near Ray's, pleading for help.

In the weeks since, investigators have used cadaver-detecting dogs in areas north of Truth or Consequences, but those dogs

turned up nothing.

Investigators also were sent to the Fence Lake area near the Arizona border to get additional information on reports that Ray owned property there, Richard-. son said. He said he was unaware of any property searches or digging in that rural area, about 50 miles south of Gallup near Zuni Pueblo.

The machine sends out a signal that reflects back, with the results displayed on a screen, Gustafson said. The signal reflects off underground objects and also looks different in soil that has been disturbed, he said.

The machine, which can scan 30 feet down, was dragged across the property, checking piece by piece. The crew interpreted the findings for FBI and state police, and pinpointed "areas that we think need to be looked at," Richardson said,





Ray's daughter arrested in torture case

TRUTH OR . CONSE-QUENCES - The daughter of the central figure in a sex-torture investigation was arrested Monday, the fourth person to be charged in a case that has expanded since a bloodied woman escaped in March wearing only a padlocked collar.

Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray was charged with 12 counts, including kidnapping, criminal sexual penetration and assault, FBI agent Doug Beldon said.

"We consider this a major development in the investigation, and we hope that today's arrest will generate further response from witnesses and past victims," Beldon said. Ms. Ray, 31, was arrested at

her father's mobile home in Elephant Butte, a small lakeside resort five miles northeast of Truth or Consequences. She was being held in the Dona Ana County Jail on \$1 million bond, Beldon said.

The district attorney's office filed an identical dozen charges against her father, David Parker Ray. He now faces 37 counts in the case.

The new charges involve a third woman. She told police she was abducted by the Rays about June 26, 1996, and sexually assaulted with objects for at least three days.

Two other women, one from Albuquerque and another from Truth or Consequences, testified against Ray at his preliminary hearing this month. They told a judge they were abducted, sodomized, shocked with electricity, sexually tortured and kept captive in padlocked collars in separate incidents occurred in





Hendy appears to be preparing plea

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES

— A woman accused of helping her boyfriend kidnap and sexually torture two women may have a

plea bargain in the works.

An order sealing a "plea and disposition agreement" in the case against Cynthia Lea Hendy has been signed by District Judge Neil Mertz, who was to preside over Hendy's preliminary hearing Thursday.

Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz and Hendy's attorney, Xavier Acosta, on Monday declined comment on the document dated April

Yontz said most pleas are an attempt to resolve a case before it goes to trial, and require a judge's approval. Acosta said there was no plea agreement signed by a judge.

It was not immediately known what the proposed plea bargain might provide, but pleas typically require defendants to admit to some charges carrying lesser penalties and perhaps cooperate with prosecutors.

Hendy, 39, is charged along with David Parker Ray, 59, in a sexual torture case that broke last month when their neighbor found a woman naked and bloody on a road, wearing only a padlocked collar. Dozens of FBI agents and state police have collected evidence

and searched for more victims in the case, which authorities say spans 10 states.

On Friday, an acquaintance of Hendy and Ray was arrested and charged with murder in the death of a woman who disappeared two years ago. Prosecutors say the charges are connected to the case against Ray and Hendy, but have given no details.

Dennis Roy Yancy appeared in court for the first time Monday, refusing to answer reporter's questions as he walked into the court-house.

Yancy. 27, will plead innocent at a preliminary hearing expected later this month, lawyer Steve Sosa said. Sosa appeared for Yancy's attorney, Gary Mitchell, a high-profile death penalty opponent from Ruidoso who was unable to attend.

Yancy was charged with murder, kidnapping, conspiracy to commit murder, conspiracy to commit kidnapping and tampering with evidence.

He is accused of killing Marie Parker, 22, who disappeared July 5, 1997, from the Blue Waters Saloon in nearby Elephant Butte. Her body has not been found.

"There is sufficient evidence that has made us we feel we can proceed without actually having a body," District Attorney Ron Lopez said.

Yancy is the only one charged with murder, although authorities say there could be more homicides and more suspects. The murder charge carries a potential penalty of life in prison or death by lethal injection. The other charges could net up to 46 1/2 years in prison.

Yancy was moved Monday to the Dona Ana County Detention Center in Las Cruces, where he was being held without bond. Jail officials were concerned about Ray and Yancy being in the same jail, Sierra County Jail administrator Russell Peterson said. Hendy was moved to Las Cruces last week,

"We transported them as the D.A. and our office had concerns about contact and threats being made by and to the co-defendants," Peterson said.

Yancy's wife, Christina, said Sunday that her husband had received a message passed on by another inmate: "Rats die in jail."

A preliminary hearing for Yancy should be set within the next 10 days unless attorneys for both sides agree to a delay.

Yancy's friend, George Padilla, said Monday he could not believe the charge. "It's a surprise. A big surprise. He would never do that. He loves kids. He takes my daughter to the park," Padilla said.

Mrs. Yancy told The Associated Press on Sunday after visiting her husband in jail that he had confessed to killing Parker, a mother of two young daughters, but said he told authorities he was forced to do it. He identified a third person who has not been charged in the

case

Mrs. Yancy said her husband was taken Saturday to Elephant Butte Lake and a stretch of N.M. 195 north of town to point out places to search for Parker's body.

State police and FBI investigators say Yancy is a known associate of Ray, 59, and Hendy, 39, but would not confirm that Yancy was taken on the search Sunday. FBI agent Doug Beldon refused to comment on Mrs. Yancy's statements, saying they could be evidence in the case.

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

Town still reels over arrests in torture case

ELEPHANT BUTTE, N.M. — She ran terrified down a dusty, southern New Mexico road, bloodsmeared and naked except for a padlocked metal collar and chain.

Daylight was fading as she spied an open door in a trailer about 100 yards away. She bounded across the porch, burst into the home without knocking, grabbed the woman standing inside and pleaded for help.

"She was terrified, she was crying and she kept saying 'Please, help me, don't let them get me! " said the neighbor, Darlene Breech. "And she went back and locked the front door."

Still frantic, the 22-year-old woman told police she had escaped a mobile home of horrors, where she had been chained to a bed and subjected to a ritual of sexual sadism.

"I'm alive! Yes, I'm alive!" she cried. "I broke free! I broke free!"

Ron Lopez, the local district attorney, took one look inside the mobile home and called for help. Within days, nearly 100 state police and FBI agents had mobilized in this small, lakeside town about 150 miles south of Albuquerque.

Even the top state official in charge of the case, Darren White, was disgusted by what investigators found. He described it as a "sick and disturbing" case that likely involved more victims and murder.

Since the case broke March 22, four people have been charged, one with murder. Despite a major search, no bodies have been found.

At two preliminary hearings, graphic testimony of sexual slavery shocked this quiet haven of retirees and vacationers in modest mobile homes. The front page of their weekly newspaper featured photos of the two main suspects, right next to one of the community's smiling fiesta queen.

The investigation quickly spread to nine other states — including Colorado, Arizona and Texas —

and two more women told tales of sadistic rape and torture at the home of David Parker Ray, 59, a mechanic for the state parks sys-

Ray and his girlfriend, Cynthia Lea Hendy, 39, were charged with dozens of counts of kidnapping and sexual assault. Police later charged Ray's daughter, Glenda "Jesse" Ray, 32, with 12 counts. They charged Dennis Roy Yancy, 27, inthe murder of a 22-year-old woman.

Hendy is seeking a plea bargain. The others have pleaded innocent. No trial dates have been set.

Hendy told investigators that Ray admitted killing as many as 14 people and dumping their bodies in the desert and in Elephant Butte Lake. She is seeking a plea bargain. Ray's attorney accused her of telling prosecutors simply what they want to hear.

In Ray's mobile home and a nearby trailer dubbed the "toy box," police found intricate, handcrafted torture devices, photographs of

women heing tortured, guns, a coffin-shaped box with a ventilation system to keep victims from suffoleating.

FBI profilers described Ray as a sexual sadist; prosecutors called him a sexual predator.

Prosecutors say Ray had a favorite place to degrade his victims, the "toy box," a large, sound-proofed trailer next to his mobile home.

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

High Court may remove judge in sex, torture case

SANTA FE — The state's highest court is being asked to referee an early dispute in how a trial will proceed for a father and daughter charged in a sex and torture case from southern New Mexico.

The Supreme Court will consider on Wednesday whether to remove a judge from the Truth or Consequences case and possibly decide whether a combined trial will be held for David Parker Ray and his daughter, Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray.

The Rays each face 12 charges stemming from the alleged abduction and sexual assault of a Sierra County woman in 1996. David Ray also faces 25 counts related to the alleged kidnappings and sexual torture of two other women this year.

Deputy District Attorney James Yontz, in written argu-

ments filed with the Supreme Court, said a ruling by the justices could determine how quickly the cases against the Rays go to trial.

"The action of this court is sought in this regard to allow this case to move forward," Yontz wrote. "At the present time, we are more than three months past these defendants having been bound over for trial and we do not even know the proper caption for the case because this court has refused to rule on a very simple matter."

In the proceedings before the Supreme Court, the prosecution and defense lawyers are united in trying to disqualify state District Judge Neil Mertz and combine the Rays' cases.

In criminal cases, defendants and the state have a right to remove a judge at the outset of a

case. But that challenge can't be made after a person has asked the judge to "perform any discretionary act." That's one of the main legal questions before the Supreme Court.

Mertz and Yontz work in the Socorro-based 7th Judicial District.

Ms. Ray's lawyer, Billy Blackburn of Albuquerque, sought to remove Mertz from her case. However, the judge rejected the challenge last month and said Ms. Ray had given up the right to excuse him because she had agreed with a request by the prosecution and her father to hold a combined trial.

Yontz and Blackburn contend Mertz is legally required to remove himself, and they're asking the Supreme Court to order the judge to with-.draw.

They contend it was the state that waived its right to disqualify Mertz — not Ms. Ray — in seeking to combine the cases at trial and in pre-trial pro-


ceedings. Ms. Ray and her father agreed with the state's proposal to combine their cases but have reserved the right to later seek separate trials.

Yontz wants the Supreme Court to order the Rays' cases joined for trial. Mertz has postponed a decision on that issue until after the high court decides whether he'll preside over the cases.

Mertz, in written arguments filed with the court, said the justices should determine whether Ms. Ray can remove him from the case. But Mertz said the high court shouldn't decide the question about a combined trial. That, Mertz argued, should be left for a district judge — him or a replacement.

Yontz maintains there's no reason to delay on the question of a combined trial.

He says one trial for the Rays would save time, money and make it easier for the dozens of expected witnesses. Separate trials, Yontz says, could create the potential for judges issuing different and conflicting rulings about the same evidence.

The FBL investigated allegations in 1986 that David Rarker Ray had abducted and tortured women and sold them as slaves in Mexico, but no victim was ever named or found.

Glenda "Jesse" Ray made the allegations about her father and co-defendant to the FBI in New Mexico in June of that year, FBI spokesman Doug Beldon said Thursday.

David Ray is accused of kidnapping and assault in the Elephant Butte sex torture case, in which three women have testified they were abducted and raped.

"The allegations made (by Ray's daughter) were nonspecific in nature," Beldon said. "Names and identifying information regarding the alleged victims were not provided. No homicides were alleged.

"For over one year after, the FBI in New Mexico conducted an investigation in an effort to substantiate the allegations," Beldon said. "No victims were identified and none came forward."

The investigation in New Mexico and Arizona was eventually closed.

David Ray worked in Phoenix from 1982 until 1990, according to his 1994 job application with the state Parks Division.

"The investigation was accomplished based upon the information known at the time," Beldon said. "We had very little specific information at the time."

Beldon gave few other details.

FBI Analysi Resulted In Search For Belongings

Analysis by FBI experts led investigators to search David Parker Ray's property for keepsakes from alleged torture victims, including mementos that may have been buried.

Newly released search warrants in the case detail some of the analysis by three FBI profilers who specialize in cases involving sexual sadism. They said Ray exhibits signs of a sexual sadist.

Ray is at the center of a wide-ranging investigation that began about seven weeks ago. He faces numerous charges, including kidnapping and criminal sexual penetration.

Three supervisory special agents with the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Center for Analysis of Violent Crime studied some of the writings, journals, audiotapes and videotapes seized at Ray's home at Elephant Butte. Two of them visited the property and the trailer where victims have said sexual tor ture took place.

ture took place.
One of the search-warrant affidavits released Wednesday includes the profilers' description of sexual sadism and how it might relate to the Elephant Butte case.

Sexual sadists derive sexual excitement from the psychological or physical suffering of the victim. They often engage in ritual sexual behavior.

The sexual sadists collect and save materials related to their fantasies and activities, even though the materials may directly implicate them in a crime, according to the warrant.

Using the expertise of the agents, investigators asked for permission to search for items that Ray may have saved from victims. These might include hair, clothing and jewelry.

One of the alleged victims testified Tuesday that after her kidnapping and torture ordeal she discovered she was missing a watch, an ankle bracelet and her wedding ring.

In other cases analyzed by the FBI sexual sadists have concealed keepsakes within walls and false ceilings, under floorboards and behind light fixtures, according to the affidavits.

Sometimes, items are buried near trees or plants, the experts reported in one of the affidavits. "And in watering the trees or plants (they) will be caring for the memento or trophy buried near it."

According to the affidavit, neighbors reported seeing Ray on numerous occasions digging up or replanting trees on the property.

Investigators were digging at Ray's property in late April, using a special radar device to search under the ground. They we said they did not discover human bones but they won't talk about the items they have taken from Ray's property.

Coffinlike Box Found in Search

A co-defendant of Elephant Butte kidnapping and fex-torture suspect David Parker Ray told police that Ray said he has been involved in "at least" 14 killings, according to court documents released Wednesday.

Cynthia Lea Hendy, who is now trying to hammer out a plea deal in the case, also said the 59-year-old Ray told her he had been involved "in the torture and sexual abuse of numerous females," the documents said.

Those documents contain details on what investigators were looking for and what they found, such as a 7-footlong box resembling a coffin and a map of Elephant Butte Lake marked with Xs at several locations,

Ray has not been charged with homicide, and no bodies have been found since the investigation began in late March. His attorney, Jeff Rein, said Wednesday that Ray is maintaining his

innocence.

Rein also said Hendy was potentially facing almost two centuries in prison before agreeing to a plea deal that cut her potential prison time to as little as a dozen years. He added that Hendy made the deal after law officials made statements that the case could involve homicide - and he suggested Hendy is telling investigators what they want to hear.

"Anything that involves Cindy Hendy" should be viewed with "some skepticism," he said. "Forty-five days later, we still don't have any bodies."

The investigation is still being

described by FBI supervisory special agent Doug Beldon as possibly being in its "very early" stages.

A raft of search warrants and affidavits that had been ordered sealed by a i judge were released Wednesday morning. They offer dark glimpses into the potential enormity of the investigation.

- Ray and Hendy, 39, are accused of taking part in the kidnapping and sexual torture of two women earlier this year. Ray and his daughter, Glenda "Jesse" Ray, 32, also are suspected of pairing up in the July 1996 kidnapping and sexual assault of another woman. Jesse Ray

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

FBI profilers say Ray fits sexual sadist

SOCORRO — The main defendant in a sex-torture case fits the profile of a sexual sadist who hoards "Keepsakes" taken from victims --anything from jewelry to body parts, court documents say.

David Parket Ray also might have kept a journal of torture episodes so he could relive the experiences, according to the profile, which was among the documents released Wednesday.

The psychological profile, done by FBI investigators from Virginia, specifically analyzed Ray's tendency to document alleged torture episodes in detail. It could mean he stashed items in secret places, the profile sug-

"It is believed that the 'stash' of keepsake items is probably still located on the property or in ... vehicles," dne April document says.

*Among things investigators sought were materials dealing with satanic and occult practices.

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

Photographs and videotapes of alleged torture episodes were found in Ray's home, investigators have said.

Investigators also found a diorama—a small mock-up using dolls posed in different positions depicting bondage and sexual sadism, the documents say.

Ray is charged with 37 counts, including kidnapping, sexual assault and aggravated battery related to three women who say they were tortured.

Cindy Mendy. 39, Ray's girlfriend, was charged with 25 counts involving two of the women but will plead guilty to five counts, including conspiracy to kidnap and conspiracy to commit criminal sexual penetration, her lawyer says. Aplea agreement with those charges has been approved by prosecutors and her attorney but still must be signed by a judge.

signed by a judge.

The court documents were released because investigators exhausted the leads outlined in them, Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz said.

Here are some details from the documents:

Investigators believe makeup kits found at Ray's Elephant Butte residence were used by Ray to touch up victims so they would photograph properly.

Police sought heavy items that could be used to weigh down bodies in water so they wouldn't rise to the surface and be discovered.

Police found identification cards at Ray's residence of people who were not known to have any connection with Ray, Hendy or

Ray's residence.

- More than 100 videotapes were found at Ray's residence, some of which display nude victims. Investigators used one tape to find one alleged victim. The woman testified against Ray's daughter, Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray, who then was bound over for trial on 12 counts Tuesday.
- Investigators searched Ray's workplace at Elephant Butte State Park to determine if he used machinery and tools there to fabricate items used to restrain victims. They also sought blueprints for making restraints.
- Maps of Elephant Butte Lake, with highlighted areas and Xs marking spots in coves on the lake near an area known as Kettle Top were found at Ray's residence. Kettle Top is the dominant feature that can be seen from Ray's backyard. Hendy told officials Ray admitted to disposing of bodies in the water between his residence and Kettle Top. No bodies have been found.
- Because profilers believed Ray might have hoarded keepsakes, they searched belongings taken from him at the jail. A brown necklace was listed among items investigators sought. The profilers suggested he might have collected body parts—such as hair and other, unspecified parts.
- Investigators got warrants to search Ray's mail, both at a post office box in Elephant Butte and at the Sierra County jail. They said bills, bank statements and other documents might help track Ray's and Hendy's travels, which might lead to victims shown in photographs and videotapes.
- Investigators found what appeared to be soundproofing material used in the alleged torture trailer called the "toy box."

This time, the defendant is Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray, the daughter of co-defendant David Parker Ray.

Asked what she expected as she went into court today, Glenda Ray responded, "I hope justice."

*Glenda/Ray, 32, and her 59-year-old father are accused of abducting a Sierra County woman who told police she was sexually assaulted for at least three days in June 1996.

Ray has denied the charges. Her father, who had a preliminary hearing on earlier charges, waived his preliminary hearing on the latest charges.

"Janet Murphy, the former mother-in-law of the Sierra County woman, testified today that the woman disappeared after last being seen with Glenda Ray. She said the woman returned later in the company of David Ray, who said he'd found her dehydrated near Elephant Butte Lake. Murphy said Ray stuck close to the woman, who appeared drugged.

Murphy said her son told the woman he was having their marriage annulled and that she was no longer welcome at his mother's house. Murphy said the woman left again with Ray.

State Police Sgt K.C. Rogers said the woman appeared in a videotape confiscated. from Ray's Elephant Butte property. Rogers. said the tape made it apparent the woman. whom authorities tracked down through her swan tattoo, was not a willing participant.

The woman charged in connection with the sex-torture case unfolding here has proposed a plea deal with prosecutors, according to court records.

No details of the proposed agreement with Cynthia Lea Mendy were available Monday, and 7th Judicial District Attorney Ron Lopez would not comment on the sealed documents, other than to say they don't necessarily mean anything has been finalized.

Another suspect said through an attorney at a court hearing Monday that he is innocent of murder, kidnapping and other charges. Steve Sosa, the temporary attorney for that suspect, Dennis Roy Yancy, said during the hearing Monday that Yancy is innocent of all the charges against him.

Lopez said he hasn't ruled out seeking the death penalty against Yancy.

Details about Yancy's alleged crime have also been sealed. But on Saturday, Yancy directed investigators with shovels at a remote, rugged area north of town. No remains were found, but authorities did find evidence that might be connected to the case, police said.

During his brief court appearance, Yancy solemnly answered questions about his finances and his understanding of his rights.

If prosecutors don't seek the death penalty, he may face a maximum of life plus 49½ years in prison.

Sosa said Ruidoso lawyer Gary Mitchell is expected to represent Yancy. Yancy, who said he was unemployed and broke during the hearing, would be represented by Mitchell through the public defender's office.

Yancy was moved to the Doña Ana County jail Monday.

Mancy 2Z was arrested Friday at his new job as a cook in a restaurant in Truth or Consequences, where his boss said he was a good cook who "made good biscuits."

Court records indicate Yancy's previous troubles with the law in Sierra County included aggravated drunken driving and possession of drug paraphernalia in October and several traffic violations.

Yancy's pregnant wife, Christina, observed her husband's hearing Monday. She said she and her husband had been married since 1997 and that he had previously served in the Navy and lived in Texas.

Marie B. Warker's 22 years were filled with plenty of rough spots before she disappeared from an Elephant Butte bar on July 5, 1997.

She had run away from home for

several years. She and her two toddlers briefly lived out of her Geo Metro.

Yancy's arrest was the third in the Elephant Butte sexual tofture and kidnapping case. The two other sus-pects, Dayld Parker Ray and Cyn-thia Lea Hendy are accused of kid-napping, and forturing two other women earlier this year but have not been charged with homicide.

Authorities have said Parker's murder is related to the other cases, but they haven't explained how. Parker and Yancy dated years ago, said Tom McCauley, Parker's half-brother. McCauley described Yancy as

"strange" and said his sister didn't remain friends with Yancy after

they stopped dating.

"She tried to avoid him as much as possible," he said.

McCauley also said his sister was friends with Jessel Ray — the daughter of Payid Ray.

For days, McCauley has been watching television newscasters talk about his sister, he said Monday. Police haven't called to speak with the family, he said, and they only know what the news tells them

Though police haven't found her body, McCauley said, he has lost hope that she's still alive.
"It angers me to hear about these

people, these so-called friends," he said: "I don't understand how they could do such a thing."

McCauley, 18, remembered his sister as a wonderful person who shared with the poor often giving food and shelter to homeless people. He last saw his sister on the day she

disappeared.
"I just want people to know how good a person she was," McCauley said. "She never once did anything to deserve this. Nobody deserves something like this."
When Marie was 14, she ran away

from their Belen home for about five years, her mother told police.

Kate Parker also told police Marie had an older brother in prison in Nevada on a murder charge. Marie, she said, testified against her brother and her fiancé.

In Truth or Consequences, she couldn't pull herself away from the drug culture, according to her friend Larry Brock.

Brock, who lives in Center Point, Parker, but he "couldn't live with the fact that she was running around with druggies."

Police interviewed people who said Parker used cocaine and speed.

And after she disappeared, another former boyfriend told police he thought she had "freaked out on

drugs" and had gone to Texas.

Julie Yawrence of Bolon, whose family took Marie in as a foster child when she was a teen-ager, took care of Parker's two young daughters after she disappeared.

Lawrence told police that Marie had broken off her relationship with Brock and had pawned the diamond ring he gave her.

The officer checked with a Truth or Consequences pawn shop. An employee there confirmed that Marie had pawned the "roughly 1/2. carat yellow-gold ring" for a couple of hundred dollars.



Woman Named

As Alleged TorC Victim

Investigators in the Elephant Butte kidnapping, sexual torture and murder case on Saturday were trying to find the body of a woman who allegedly was killed by one of their three suspects.

About 10 State Police officers and FBI agents gathered along N.M. 195 west of Elephant Butte on Saturday afternoon, and some of them had shovels in hand. They made measurements near a large map posted in the ground along the roadway.

State Police Lt. Greg Richardson confirmed the investigators were looking for the remains of Marie B. Parker — who was 22 and the mother of two girls when she disappeared from the Blue Waters Saloon in Elephant Butte on July 5, 1997.

The team spent about two hours at the site, then searched for another 30 minutes at a second spot about a quarter of a mile to the west. They didn't find any remains, but Richardson said the investigators did pick up several items. He would not say what those items were and said that "we don't know if they're related or not."

The man accused problems Parker, 27-year-old Dennis Roy Yancy of Truth or Consequences, was arrested late Friday. The other two suspects in the case, David Parker, Ray and Cynthia Lea Hendy, are accused of kidnapping and torthing two other women earlier this year but have not been charged with homicide.

Saturday's work on N.M. 195 came after State Police investigators took Yancy from the Sierra County Detention Center, then returned him, They would not say where they had taken Yancy. But Richardson said investigators "received some information" that the spot along the road "would be a good place to look" for Parker's remains.

"That's been our main objective today,"

Yancy has been charged with murder kidnapping, conspiracy to commit murder conspiracy to commit kidnapping and tampering with evidence, Richardson has said and a judge has ordered Yancy held without bond.

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
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He was shackled and wearing a brown T-shirt and beige pants when State Police investigators returned him to the Sierra County lockup just before 3 p.m. When a reporter asked Yancy if he knew what charges he was facing, Yancy said that he did. When asked if he had anything to say, Yancy said "No, not at this time."

Investigators have said repeatedly the case could involve other victims and other suspects. And Seventh Judicial District Attorney Ron Lopez said Saturday that Yancy's arrest "is not the end."

We don't anticipate this is the end of the line." Lopez said. "It's clear (that) it's starting to develop."

Lopez said he does not believe a victim's body is needed to charge a suspect with murder.

Parker's car, a 1993 Geo Metro, was found in the lot of the Blue Waters Saloon after she was reported missing by her half-brother, Iom McCauley, according to a Sierra County Sheriff's Department missing person report.

The report said that according to McCauley, he and someone named Kevin J. Renkin were with Parker son July 5 when she told McCauley and would be back in about two doors.

The report said Renkin confirmed fliat "Marie was going to Blue Waters to meet with two individuals," the report said.

Renkin said he believed Parker was going to meet two people hamed Clay and David, the report said, but he did not know David's last name.

Lopez said investigators believe that Parker was killed shortly after her disappearance

According to Lopez, Parker and Yancy had dated at some point.

Several years ago, Yancy bagged groceries at Bullocks grocery store in Truth or Consequences. Employees there remembered him as triendly.

State law requires prosecutors to have a preliminary hearing for Yan-cy within 10 days of his arrest if he remains in jail, Lopez said. The pre-liminary hearing for Hendy and Ray is set for Thursday and Friday in Truth or Consequences.



The investigation began March 22 when a 22-year-old Albuquerque woman, found naked except for a metal collar secured with a padlock to a chain, said she fled after being confined for three days at the double-wide mobile home. A second woman later came forward and said she had been tortured at the home in February.

"One of the women told detectives that numerous restraint devices and medical tools were hung on the wall of a trailer where she was tortured, stretched on a table and forced to have sex with Ray while Hendy helped hold her down, according to a criminal complaint.

2: But Mitchell and another friend, both of whom said they were frequent visitors to Ray's home and often went sailing with him, said his home was no torture chamber.

"It was just a typical home," said the 18-year-old friend, who asked that her name not be used because she has been the victim of an unrelated crime.

The women said they met Ray through his adult daughter Jesse, who had one of the two bedrooms in the home.

They described Ray as a nice man who kept to himself but who was al-

ways ready to help them, a stay-athome loner who last summer took them out on his sailboat.

Once when Mitchell and some friends came across a motorist who had flipped his car off the road, it was Ray who came to their aid, providing chains to help pull the car back upright.

Unlike Hendy, who told a judge in an unrelated case that she drank too much, the women said Ray was not a heavy drinker, preferring coffee on some occasions.

Neither girl said she ever felt threatened by Ray.

"I called him Dad," Mitchell's friend said. "Everybody did."

He never propositioned them, but once tried to get Mitchell's friend to wear-skimpy bathing suits on their boating trips, she said.

boating trips, she said.

"He just liked to watch us jump off the rocks into the water at this place we used to dock the boat at," the friend said. "He pretty much kept to himself, didn't talk much or anything."

Both women said Jesse left town several months ago to visit a relative. They haven't heard from her since.

And both say they lost touch with Ray, an Elephant Butte State Park maintenance worker and mechanic, about five months ago — Mitchell because she gave birth and her friend because she was back in high school.

Until the news reports broke, they had never heard of Hendy, who they said must have come along in those five months.

Coincidentally, they said, she is the spitting image of Jesse.

A State Police investigator said authorities have been in contact with Ray's daughter. He declined to provide her whereabouts.

The women said they are still stunned at the news of their friend's arrest and what he is accused of. And while they both said they don't believe he is guilty, they said they wonder how safe they really were on Ray's boat and in his home.

"It still gives me chills. I think about it every night. I wonder whether there are bodies out in the lake, out in this cove we always used to sail to," Mitchell's friend said. "It could have been me. It could have been a big mistake."

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Terrified victim says she broke free while being beaten with a lamp

"I'm alive, I'm alive! Yes, I'm alive!" she told sheriff's deputies responding to neighbors' calls. "I broke free! I broke free!"

The woman who fled naked, wearing a metal collar padlocked to a chain, sought refuge March 22 in at least two passing cars and finally in a neighboring home.

"She came straight in" without knocking, <u>Darlene Breech</u> said in an interview Thursday, Breech said she furnished the terrified woman with a pink robe, then called 911

El Paso resident Doris Mitchell said the woman tried to get in her car as she was driving by. "She was wild- or scared-looking," Mitchell said Thursday. Mitchell said her car doors automatically lock at 15 mph, so the woman couldn't climb in.

"It's something you never expect,"
Mitchell said of the case. "It's something you read about, but never think
you're going to be close to."

Patricial Home of Albuquerque told police the woman also tried to get in her car. Home declined to comment Thursday.

Minutes later, other neighbors —
William and Frances Graham —
watched the arrest of co-defendants
David Parker Ray and Cynthia Lea
Hendy outside their home.

Ray and Hendy were stopped in an RV headed in the direction of their mobile home a couple of blocks away. "They had them walk backwards and asked them to go down on the ground," Frances Graham said. "The other officers were holding their guns on them, and another officer went up and put handouffs on

The arrest has mushroomed into a state-federal investigation in which a second woman has come forward with similar allegations.

Police documents released Thursday give the first comprehensive picture of what the first woman told police about the three days she spent in the double-wide mobile home where Ray and Hendy live. Court documents say that among evidence found in the home was a photograph of that same woman in bondage.

The woman says she was abducted March 19 in Albuquerque by Ray and Hendy posing as police officers, court documents say.

"David Ray showed her a small badge and told her she was under arrest for solicitation," one affidavit says. "Cindy Hendy then came out ... and handcuffed her." It says she was taken to Elephant Butte in restraints inside a recreational vehicle.

A Sierra County sheriff's report says that four days later, Ray left the woman alone with Hendy, and she broke free.

The 22-year-old Albuquerque woman told deputies "she got hold of

the key to the lock that was tied to the chain around her neck and unlocked it from the bed.

"While she was doing this the sermale suspect was hitting her over the head with a famp. (She) said that she got loose and hit the female suspect over the head with a lamp to get free!" the sheriff's report says.

Another affidavit had said Hendy,

Another affidavit had said Hendy hit the woman with a lamp and she lashed back with an ice pick & ***

A deputy and a maintenance man removed the woman's collar with bolt cutters. "She had blood and scratches all over her legs ... (and) more blood coming from her head," the report

Investigators reported finding froken glass at the trailer "and observed an array of sexual devices along with various restraint type devices "in a bedroom."

The woman told deputies she had been beaten, raped and tortured "By a man named David ... and his girl friend."

A Truth or Consequences woman reported similar allegations Feb. 21 after being released by the co-defendants, another court affidavit says. That woman said she went to the Ray Hendy home to pick up a cake mix then was taken captive, chained and tortured with sexual devices and electric shock, the affidavit says.

It still wasn't clear Thursday what was done about the February report, although State Police said they were investigating.



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David Parker Ray goes by the names of Jesse Ray and Glenda Ray. But he would not confirm whether the Jesse Ray and Glenda Ray listed in the Troia report is Ray's daughter.

Beldon said he would not discuss specific cases but added that every referral to investigators is being looked into.

Asked if investigators were looking at a specific missing person's case, State Police Lt. Richard Newman said, "we're looking into a variety of different areas."

Asked if Albuquerque was one of those areas, Newman said, "We're looking mainly in the tristate area — New Mexico, Texas and Arizona. Not any cases in particular. We're just looking into all the states and seeing what information we can obtain."

"Certainly we do have an investigation ongoing in Albuquerque," Beldon added. "I can't characterize it, but yes."

In the early 1990s, Troia lived in Valerie Branham's Northeast Heights home.

Branham said in a telephone interview Thursday that Troia, an Asian-American, came to Albuquerque when she was in the U.S. Air Force. She described Troia, 5 feet tall and weighing 100 pounds, as "just a little toy thing."

"She's the kind of person who would be easy to snatch," Branham said. "She kind of thought she was Mighty Mouse. ... She was terribly trusting of people. I was always worried about her that way."

Her daughter, Claudia, went to the movies with Troia and Troia's male roommate on the day she disappeared.

Claudia Branham said shedropped Trois and the man off at their apartment at 10:30 on the night of Sept. 30.

According to a news release from the Albuquerque Police Department at the time, Trola later met friends at a local club, where they began drinking. She met a friend at the bar and later went to the Frontier Restaurant.

There Troia and her friend had a disagreement and the friend left, APD said, but Troia stayed at the restaurant.


Ann Troia said Thursday she had not heard anything about her daughter's case since it was filed. She said no authorities had called her about a possible connection to the Elephant Butte case.

Also on Thursday, a dog trained to sniff out cadavers was brought onto the lot near the city of Elephant Butte where suspects David Ray and Cynthia Lea Hendy live. And a dog, along with its handlers, could be seen working in areas where investigators had been digging Wednesday.

Beldon said during a news conference late Thursday afternoon that he couldn't reveal whether the investigators had recovered anything.

"I can't sit here and lay out evidence and say 'we've got these five pieces of evidence and we're going to draw this conclusion," Beldon said. "I simply can't do that publicly at this point."

Investigators on Thursday also searched a storage facility in Truth or Consequences as part of the case but remained silent on what, if anything, they found. Bedon said evidence teams would likely complete their work at Ray's home sometime later

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES anvestigators clad in white jumpsuits and surgical gloves carefully began digging Wednesday in the yard of kidnapping and torture suspect David Parker Ray, and p some of them spent time underneath his -trailer home.

Doug Beldon, supervisory special agent for the FBI, would not specify what the investigators — some of them wearing surgical masks — were looking for.

- Law officials also confirmed Wednesday they have been told of the existence Fof an "orientation" videotape that reportedly tells kidnapping victims what they

could expect during their capture.
Ron Lopez, 7th Judicial District Attorney, said he did not know whether that tape had been found and tagged into evidence. But Lopez said one of two alleged kidnapping victims told investigators she was forced to view it sometime during the three days she was held at Ray's home. Another law-enforcement source also confirmed investigators discussed the tape and described it as an "orientation."

John Branaugh, an Elephant Butte resi-

dent, said he talked with a second alleged kidnapping victim, a Sierra County I woman who said she had been held for five days, and took her to report the incident. He said that victim also said she

The digging began more than a week after Ray, 59, and alleged accomplice Cynthia Lea Hendy, 39, were arrested on suspicion of kidnapping and torturing an Albuquerque woman before she was able to escape. .

Prosecutors earlier this week filed additional charges alleging the couple also kidnapped and tortured the Sierra County woman in February. And investigators have repeatedly said they believe more victims

are involved.

As a result, about 100 State Police investigators and FBI agents - as well as scores of TV and newspaper reporters - have poured into the area near the shores of Elephant Butte Reservoir.

Ray and Hendy have each been charged with more than 20 crimes and remained behind bars Wednesday in/lieu of \$1 million bond apiece. JeffiRein, who represents Ray, and Hendy's lawyer, Kayier Edward Acosta, said Wednesday their clients are innocent and blasted law enforcement leaders for the comments they have made about the case. Rein said it will be difficult for his client to get a fair trial anywhere in New Mexico.

Acosta criticized comments state Department of Public Safety Secretary Darren White made at a town hall meeting Tuesday in Truth or Consequences. For example, after hearing someone in the audience describe the case as a "nightmare," White said the "nightmare is behind bars" and added that "this is a safe

community."

am thoroughly disappointed with the political posturing and unprofessional conduct being taken by (White)," Acosta said. "He has made this a one-man media show, and his grandstanding is being done at the expense of two defendants.

"Lurge everyone to calmly assess what's going on and to wait for facts rather than rumors," Acosta added. Hendy "will enter a plea of not guilty at her arraignment, and I would hope that irresponsible comments to the media would cease immediately."

White stood by his comments. After fielding numerous calls from the public, we felt it was necessary to bring the community together for Tuesday's town hall meeting to address their concerns and their fears, and I make no apologies for that," White said Wednesday.

dozen investigators walked into the backyard area of Ray's home in the Hot Springs Landing subdivision outside Elephant Butte and started turning the ground with shovels and probing with steel rods.

Team members worked off and on for more than two hours and seemed to be focusing on three areas: a spot near the back chain-link fence, an area near a white outbuilding that has a small decal of a trout on it, and a section right outside the trailer home. Branaugh, who is acquainted with the second alleged victim, also is an acquaintance of Hendy's. He said he met her about a year and a half ago when she came to stay at a motel that he and his wife, Jean, used to. manage.

Branaugh said Hendy stayed at the motel about 10 days, but his wife "kind of took her under her wing" and Hendy frequently stopped by their home after she moved out.

"She'd come over and want to borrow gas money. She only came over when she wanted something or a shoulder to cry on," Branaugh said. "My wife always tried to help her."

The Albuquerque woman was allegedly kidnapped March 20 and escaped from the home March 22, and the Sierra County woman was allegedly kidnapped Feb. 17 and talked her captors into releasing her

on Feb. 21.

Branaugh said he and his wife learned of the kidnapping of the Albuquerque woman by watching a TV report. The next day, he said, they took the Sierra County woman to the sheriff's department.

Truth or Consequences Police Chief David Bryant confirmed the Sierra County woman had called police dispatch and asked to speak only with a female lieutenant whom she knew.

She said, I need to report it. because nobody believes me, Bryant said.

Bryant said the lieutenant was attending a memorial service for a sheriff's deputy who had been shot and killed, but she called the woman from the service. After finding out the alleged victim was safe, the lieutenant asked her to come to the police station after the service concluded.

. "She never showed up," Bryant said. "We've never seen her since."

Court records show Hendy had some domestic troubles, including a: 1998 arrest for suspicion of battery and a case in which she sought a protective order against a man. The battery charge was later dismissed after she agreed to get anger management counseling.

Paperwork filed in the case involving the protective order said Hendy initially alleged that a man she once lived with was threatening: her and had beat her. But in a letter she wrote to a judge before the case was dismissed, Hendy said her statements weren't true.

"I am very sorry, that I lied," Hendy wrote in the lefter, which was filed in court Dec. 21. "I have been in counseling ... for manic depression and (am) on medications. And I tend to go off for no reason, I do and then think later. ... Please forgive me for trying to make trouble when there was no trouble to begin with. This will never happen again." 🌾



Next week's court hearing for a suspect allegedly linked to the Elephant Butte kidnapping and sex-torture case will apparently not take place.

_Dennis Roy Yancy — who was

arrested in early April'on suspicion of killing a missin. 25 sth Consequences woman — was scheduled to have a preliminary hearing May 25 in Sierra County Magistrate Court. But a court clerk said Friday that according to the office of Yan-

cy's attorney, Yancy will waive that hearing.

In a preliminary hearing, a prosecutor presents evidence against a suspect and a judge decides whether the prosecutor has enough evidence to send the case to trial.

Yancy, 27, is represented by defense attorney Gary Mitchell. Mitchell could not be reached for comment Friday afternoon.

Investigators have said Yancy's case is linked to the investigation involving David Parker Ray, Glenda "Jesse" Ray and Cynthia Lea Hendy Glenda Ray is David Ray's adult daughter, and Hendy is reportedly his girlfriend.

David Ray and Hendy are suspected of taking part in the kidnapping and sexual torture of two women earlier this year, and David Ray and his daughter are accused of teaming up in the kidnapping and sexual assault of a woman in 1996.

Yancy does not face any sex-related charges but has been charged with murder, kidnapping, conspiracy to commit murder, conspiracy to commit kidnapping and tampering with evidence. Court records that would provide more details about the allegations have been sealed by a judge's order.



Vite says suspect confessed to N.M. murder

FBI not ruling out multiple homicides in sex-torture case

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES. N.M. — Dennis Roy Yancy, accused of killing a woman who disappeared from a saloon in 1997, confessed to the crime, his wife said after a jailhouse meeting between the two.

Christina Yancy visited her husband for about 40 minutes Sunday at the Sierra County Detention Center. After leaving the meeting, she said her husband told authorities he was forced to kill Marie Parker.

"He strangled her, I guess,

Christina Yancy said.

She also said he told her he helped investigators search for Parker's body. No body has been found, but Yancy said her husband believes David Parker Ray, charged in a sex-torture case, moved Parker's

State police and FBI investigators | have said they are not ruling out more homicides, more victims or more suspects.

Yancy was arrested in Truth or Consequences on Friday and charged with the murder of Parker, a 22-year-old mother of two girls.

Christina Yancy said her husband was taken to Elephant Butte Lake and a stretch of New Mexico 195 north of Truth or Consequences on Saturday to point out places to search.

State police and FBI investigators wouldn't confirm that Yancy rode with them. However, investigators spent some time Sunday examining more possible search locations, said Lt. Greg Richardson, a state police spokesman.

Christina Yancy said her husband is cooperating in the investigation of a sex-torture case that involves Ray, 59, and Cindy Hendy, 39. Yancy is the first person charged with murder in the case.

Ray and Hendy were arrested last month. They face 25 counts, including criminal sexual penetration, kidnapping and aggravated battery. Two women have alleged Ray and Hendy abducted and sexually tortured them in separate incidents in. February and March.

Ray and Hendy both have pleaded innocent. Jeff Rein, Ray's attorney, declined comment Monday.

Yancy is worried he could face

the death penalty, Christina Yancy said. She said he had received a threat, passed on by another inmate: "Rats die in jail."

FBI Agent Doug Beldon said he couldn't comment on the matters discussed by Christina Yancy because they could be evidence in the case. Detention center officers wouldn't allow reporters to talk to

Yancy, who goes by his middle name, Roy.

Yancy's lawyer, Gary Mitchell of Ruidoso, was in court Monday and could not be reached for comment.

Yancy, 27, who is being held without bail, is a known associate of Ray and Hendy, according to law enforcement officials.

Christina Yancy said her husband told her he was forced to kill Parker by someone who has not been charged in the case. She said he believes he isn't the only one who was manipulated into killing people.

"He was there when she was kidnapped and murdered," Christina Yancy said. "He said he was manipulated into doing it. He didn't want to kill her is what he said."

Later during the abduction, that person held Parker down while Yancy held a rope around her neck, Christina Yancy said. She said her husband thinks authorities have a picture of him at the murder scene.

The case broke March 22, when one of Ray's neighbors saw a woman naked and bloody on a road, wearing only a padlocked collar. The woman told police she had been shocked with electricity and tortured sexually.

A second woman came forward,

later and accused Ray and Hendy of kidnapping and sexually torturing, her in a separate incident.

Dozens of FBI agents and other authorities have collected more than 1,000 pieces of evidence from Ray's

residence and property.

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



Tuesday, April 6, Hendy was transported to Doña Ana County Detention Center, however, not until she was taken to Socorro to appear before

a district judge.

While District Attorney Ron Lopez states he has "no comment" about the appearance he won't confirm, a clerk at the District Court reported the plea and an order sealing the agreement along with an envelope of sealed documents "discussed at the hearing" was received on Wednes-

The clerk stated all information in hearing has been sealed. and it is unknown when it will be released.

The State has entered a Motion to Compel the Giving of Trace Evidence Standards.

According to the Motion the search warrants that have been executed at the residence of Ray have brought the seizure of trace items such as; hair, latent prints; finger, paint and hose prices body fluids including; blood, saliva, semen, vaginal fluid, urine and feces.

As the items of trace evidence had been located at the residence and are from unknown donors the State is in need of the same samples from Ray and Hendy. The samples from the couple will be used for the purposes of comparison with the evidence located within the residence, vehicles, trailers and surrounding areas.

The State acknowledged in the Motion the probability of some of the evidence being from the couple as they had access to the areas. The! victims have been requested to produce similar samples for the purpose of comparison.

The State claims the samples are "important in the investigation of the

felony offenses."

Also the State has entered a Notice of Intent to Call Witnesses. The following people have been called by the State as witnesses at the preliminary hearing: Agent Wesley LaCuesta and Officer John Briscoe with the New Mexico State Police: Ann Hawkins and Marvin Bean with Sierra County Regional Dispatch; Lynn Cummings and Johnna Breoy, employees of Sierra Vista Hospital; Donald and Darlene Breech; the two victims and Sierra County Sheriff's Deputies Lucas Alvarez and David Elston.

It is not known whether any, part or all of the persons listed above will be called to testify at the preliminary hearing. Since a Joinder has been filed the two nameds will appear at the nearing together.

The charges stem from an incident when the first victim escaped after three days of torture when she was able to overpower Hendy while the two were left alone at Ray's residence. Neighbors found the victim running in the streets med a March 22 at about 3:30 p.m.

and brought to Ray's Bass Road residence.

The second victim to come forward, a Sierra County resident, stated she went to Ray and Hendy's residence to pick up a cake mix on February 17, 1999.

While inside, the victim alleges, Ray pulled a knife on her and the couple kept her locked up for five days before agreeing to let her go unharmed.

Both women told investigators in the case they were shocked with electricity and tortured with sex toys. Both victims also claimed they were kept locked up with a metal collar around their necks.

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
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

Information began to disseminate rapidly on Suturday in reference to Yancy's arrest. However, the court order on the Affidavit for the Arrest Warrant was still sealed as of press time, Monday.

According to Lt. Greg Richardson with the New Mexico State Police, Yancy was contacted by investigators and asked to go to the Command Post for questioning. Further investigation lead police to his arrest.

Saturday agents spent most of the day combing the area in an attempt to locate the body of Marie Parker. Agents searched not only by ground, but

in the sky using a New Mexico State Police heli-

copter.

Officers reportedly had some assistance in the search from Yancy on the ground, however, when he took them to the alleged burial site of Ms. Parker no evidence was found. Yancy allegedly told officers he believed David Parker Ray, the main suspect in the sex! torture cases, had moved the woman's body.

Police had reported earlier that they had found documentary as well as pictorial evidence at Ray's house. However, officials will not confirm, nor deny, they found a video or pictures of the murder of Parker.

Yancy s wife, Christina, told reporters her husband relayed to her the course of eyents leading up to the murder of Parker.

The accused murderer told his wife that he and Parker left Blue Waters Saloon that night to go get her drugs. Mrs. Yancy did not give details on what occurred after leaving the bar, until they got to Ray's home.

"Mrs Yancy stated David was taking pictures while Jessie; (Ray's daughter) held a gun on Marie and Roy strangled

Yancy's past produces nothing but bad news. At the young age of 16 he was allegedly involved in a satanic cult. The cult was well known in the Sierra County area in 1987, as they killed numerous household pets leaving them on the owner's doorstep to find.

The group reportedly made threats to harm small, infant children as part of a Halloween sacrifice. Members of the cult bragged about how they had sacrificed animals during their rituals.

While victims of the groups' activities were able to give police the names and descriptions of many of the youths. involved they also gave the name of "David" who was reportedly "older" gentlemen leading the group. In researching the case it was found that the description of "David" comes close to that of David Parker Ray. It is unknown for sure if the two are one in the same.

Ironically, all of the satanic activities began in 1987-just over a year after-Kay-made-his presence known in Sierra County.

Sources close to the investigation of the sex/torture cases report that satanic and cult like items were found in Ray's home. Those items reportedly included pentagrams and upside down crosses.

When T-or-C was experiencing the satanic activity in 1987 members of the cult often vandalized cemetery headstones and area buildings marking their territory with a pentagram.

Yancy's former teachers, as well as fellowclassmates report that he was involved in devil worshiping and satanic not ruling out the pos-behavior. One of his sibility of more homipeers stated that she always sthought he was

strange.
One teacher reported to the Sentinel that she made Yancy write a ten page report on satanism and devil worshiping. The long time teacher believed if he learned all there was to know about the subject he would no -longer want to be involved.

*Just ten days before Halloween, on October "21,"1987, Yancy was arrested in connection with the burglary of a teacher's home.

According to T-or-C Police reports three youths were arrested on burglary charges after \$3,000 worth of property was recovered.





Coffinlike Box Found in Search

A co-defendant of Elephant Butte kidnapping and sex-torture suspect David Parker Ray told police that Ray said her has been involved in "at least" 14 killings, according to court documents released Wednesday.

Cynthia Lea Hendy, who is now trying to hammer out a plea deal in the case, also said the 59-year-old Ray told her he had been involved "in the torture and sexual abuse of numerous females," the documents said.

Those documents contain details on! what investigators were looking for and what they found, such as a 7-footlong box resembling a coffin and a map of Elephant Butte Lake marked with Xs at several locations.

Ray has not been charged with homicide, and no bodies have been found since the investigation began in late March. His attorney, Jeff Rein, said Wednesday that Ray is maintaining his

mnocence.

Rein also said Hendy was potentially facing almost two centuries in prison before agreeing to a plea deal that cut her potential prison time to as little as a dozen years. He added that Hendy made the deal after law officials made state-Iments that the case could involve homicide - and he suggested Hendy is Itelling investigators what they want to thear.

"Anything that involves Cindy Hendy" should be viewed with "some skepticism," he said. "Forty-five days later, we still don't have any bodies."

The investigation is still being

described by FBI supervisory special agent Doug Beldon as possibly being in its "very early" stages.

A raft of search warrants and affidavits that had been ordered sealed by a judge were released Wednesday morning. They offer dark glimpses into the potential enormity of the investigation.

Ray and Hendy, 39, are accused of taking part in the kidnapping and sexual torture of two women earlier this year. Ray and his daughter, Glenda "Jesse" Ray, 32, also are suspected of pairing up in the July 1996 kidnapping and sexual assault of another woman. Jesse Ray

Among other things, the newly released court papers say Hendy gave police information that appears to be linked to a body that had been discovered in Elephant Butte Lake.

Beldon said the body discussed in the court papers is that of Billy Ray Bowers. Bowers' body was found floating in the lake in 1989 with a bullet wound in the head, and the FBI has said Bowers once worked with Ray in Phoenix.

Although prosecutor Jim Yontz. said the long list of what police found in their searches of Ray's home and several other locations has not been unsealed, the affidavits name numerous items. Those items include:

About 100 videotapes. One affidavit dated March 26 said the videos had not yet been viewed. But an investigator testified during a court hearing on Tuesday that one of them showed a victim strapped down inside a trailer — known as the "toy box" — that was on Ray's property.

Identification cards for people "who are not known to have had any connection with Ray, Hendy or Ray's residence." One affidavit said "the investigation is ongoing to

determine the location of the persons whose identification has been found."

Boating-related items that have tested positive for the presence of blood and maps of Elephant Butte Lake that are marked with X's "at various spots around the lake," including Kettle Top — an island that's clearly visible from Ray's house. One affidavit dated March 26 doesn't say whether the blood is human.

The affidavits said that according to Hendy, "Ray had admitted to disposing of bodies in the water between his residence and Kettle Top" and he would also allegedly "bury or dump victims at various locations in Sierra County."

Anatomy books, medical books "and a chart depicting what appears to be methods of sexual torture and bondage" that were reportedly found in the trailer known as the toy box, along with "photographs depicting women in various stages of bondage."

One affidavit said Hendy described those photographs and "officers were told that two of these women had been killed by defendant Ray." Another affidavit said the age of some photos that were found indicates the activity had taken place for some time.

A large coffinlike box and a diorama in a glass and wood case that contains "dolls posed and painted in different positions depicting bondage and sexual sadism." One affidavit said the coffinlike box was about 7 feet long and had carpeting inside. It also had ventilation holes "so that a person could be secured in the box and at the same time kept alive for an extended period of time."

■ Badges "and other identification related to law enforcement," police-radio scanners and material that might have been used to soundproof the trailer.

One affidavit also said Hendy told police that Ray "would use makeup on his victims so that they would

photograph properly if he ... felt portions of their bodies would not photograph well without makeup."

Investigators have pored over Ray's property for more than a week. The search-warrant paperwork said they also sought warrants to search the state parks division office where Ray worked, his Chevy work truck and a boat owned by his son. They also sought warrants for the post-office box that Ray and Hendy reportedly used, the nonlegal mail that Ray sends and receives from jail, the clothing Ray wore to jail and a Furr's Supermarket in Truth or Consequences, where a package of photographs listed under Hendy's name had reportedly been taken to be processed.

Beldon said the investigators have done some "preliminary searching" on Kettle Top, but "I can't get into what we've done."

Yontz said the Rays and Hendy will likely be arraigned within the next few weeks. Trial dates are set within six months of those hearings.

Yontz said a date to finalize Hendy's plea deal has not been set.

A fourth suspect in the case, 27year-old Dennis Roy Yancy of Truth or Consequences, was arrested in early April on suspicion of killing a Truth or Consequences woman who: has been missing since July 1997.

FBI Analysis Resulted In Search For Belongings

Analysis by FBI experts led investigators to search David Parker Ray's property for keepsakes from alleged torture victims, including mementos that may have been buried.

Newly released search warrants in the case detail some of the analysis by three FBI profilers who specialize in cases involving sexual sadism. They said Ray exhibits signs. , of a sexual sadist.

Ray is at the center of a wide-ranging investigation that began about seven weeks ago. He faces numerous charges, including kidnapping and criminal sexual penetration.

Three supervisory special agents with the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Center for Analysis of Violent Crime studied some of the writings, journals, audiotapes and videotapes seized at Ray's home at Elephant Butte. Two of them visited the property and the trailer where victims have said sexual torture took place.

One of the search-warrant affidavits released Wednesday includes the profilers' description of sexual sadism and how it might relate to the Elephant Butte case.

Sexual sadists derive sexual excitement from the psychological or physical suffering of the victim. They often engage in ritual sexual behavior.

The sexual sadists collect and save materials related to their fantasies and activities, even though the materials may directly implicate them in a crime, according to the warrant.

Using the expertise of the agents, investigators asked for permission to search for items that Ray may have saved from victims. These might include hair, clothing and jewelry.

One of the alleged victims testified Tuesday that after her kidnapping and torture ordeal she discovered she was missing a watch, an ankle bracelet and her wedding ring.

In other cases analyzed by the FBI, sexual sadists have concealed keepsakes within walls and false ceilings, under floorboards and; behind light fixtures, according to the affidavits.

Sometimes, items are buried near trees or plants, the experts reported in one of the affidavits. "And in watering the trees or plants (they) will be caring for the memento or trophy buried near it."

According to the affidavit, neighbors reported seeing Ray on numerlous occasions digging up or replanting trees on the property.

Investigators were digging at, Ray's property in late April, using a special radar device to search under the ground. They've said they did not discover human bones but they won't talk about the items they have taken from Ray's property.

Cindy Hendy said David Parker Ray, her boyfriend and co-defendant, buried bodies in the ravines and arroyos in eastern New Mexico's Sier-ra County, Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz said during an interview with The Associated Press

The information is from an interview with Hendy, 39, soon after her arrest and before she obtained a lawyer. The court documents detailing the interview are expected to be released soon, Yontz said.

Details from Hendy's interview could explain why law enforcement officials mounted a massive effort in March after a woman, bleeding and wearing only a padlocked collar, fled Ray's mobile home in Elephant Butte.

As many as 100 agents from the FBI and State Police gathered for an investigation that included the use of ground-penetrating radar and cadaversniffing dogs. Agents combed arroyos in Sierra County and searched parts of Elephant Butte Lake for bodies and other evidence.

Authorities have not ruled out more arrests or victims.

FBI profilers believe Ray, 59, kept items from the victims, including jewelry, hair or fingernails, Yontz said.

The profilers say people who commit serial, crimes collect such trinkets and keep them in a cache so they can relive the experiences. Yontz said investigators believe Ray may have buried some of the items.

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
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
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Ray was bound over for trial in April on 25 charges involving two women who accused him and Hendy of kidnapping and sexual torture. He waived a Tuesday hearing on 12 additional charges related to a third woman who says she was kidnapped by Ray and his daughter, Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray, 32, in July 1996.

Jesse Ray was ordered to stand trial Tuesday on the same 12 charges of kidnapping, sexual assault and conspiracy. Both Ray and his daughter have said they are innocent of

all the charges.

The woman who testified Tuesday said a wedding ring and a bracelet were taken from her during the ordeal. She said Jesse Ray helped kidnap her and Jesse Ray's father sexually assaulted her.

Yontz played an indoctrination-style tape during Jesse Ray's preliminary hearing that told kidnapped women they faced sexual slavery. State Police investigator John Briscoe identified the voice on the tape as Ray's.

"You're going to be kept naked and

chained up like an animal and used and abused any way we want to," says the voice. "You're not going to remember a thing about this adventure."

The voice warns of "graphic, sex-oriented material for adults only," and says it had "entertainment purposes." The speaker talked about using Phenobarbital and sodium pentothal on women "to erase memories and make them susceptible to hypnosis."

Briscoe said the tape was one of nine similar tapes found in Ray's Elephant Butte mobile home.

The third woman — from Truth or Consequences — testified Tuesday she was strapped to a table and sexually abused by Ray. She said some memories of the incident are unclear and, in some instances, only

recently recalled.

"I remember him telling me he was into a satanic group. He said members of the group had been watching me and they wanted me as a sex toy," the woman testified.

She didn't come forward at first. Police say they tracked her through videotape found at Ray's home, showing a distinctive swan tattoo on her right leg — and from a report filed by her former mother-in-law.

The five-minute segment of audio tape was played after the woman's testimony Tuesday. Defense attorney Billy Blackburn objected to its being played.

It would be "highly irrelevant and done just to inflame the minds of the court,"

Blackburn argued.

Two other women also accuse Ray and

Hendy of similar crimes. Those women testified in April that Ray kept them naked in chains and sexually tortured them separately this year.

A videotape found in Ray's Elephant Butte home showed the third woman bound to a table in an instrument-filled trailer on Ray's property dubbed the "toy box," State Police Sgt. K.C. Rogers said.

"In the video, it was fairly apparent that she was not a willing participant," Rogers

Hendy waived a preliminary hearing and plans to plead guilty to five counts, including accessory and conspiracy charges, her lawyer has said.

A fourth defendant, <u>Dennis Roy Yancy</u>, 27, is charged with <u>murdering Marie B</u>. Parker, 22, who disappeared from an Elephant Butte bar in 1997. No body has been found.

Investigators have said the cases are linked, but haven't said how. Yancy, scheduled for a May 25 preliminary hearing, will plead innocent, his lawyer has said.

Jesse Ray Will Go To Trial

Woman Accused In T or C Torture Case

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES -A judge on Tuesday ruled that prosecutors have enough evidence to send Glenda "Jesse" Ray — the daughter of kidnapping and sex torture suspect David Ray - to trial on charges she helped her father with of the

alleged abductions.

Sierra County Magistrate Court Judge Thomas Pestak ruled at the conclusion of a daylong preliminary hearing that Jesse Ray, who turned 32 in her jail cell earlier this month, can stand trial for a dozen felony

charges including kidnapping, six counts of criminal sexual penetration, assault and conspiracy. Her 59year-old father faces the same list of charges and also is accused of kidnapping and sexually abusing two other women. But he waived his right to a preliminary hearing in the case involving his daughter. The father and daughter both maintain their innocence.

Jesse Ray is accused of taking a young woman on her motorcycle to her dad's trailer home near the shores of Elephant Butte Lake, where she was then allegedly sexually abused for several days.

The young woman testified Tuesday that she initially didn't remember anything about the alleged July 1996 incident.

She said details have been seeping back into her mind for the past several years, but much of it remains hazy. However, she said she recalls leaving the nearby Blue Waters Saloon with Jesse Ray and

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

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going to David Ray's home. She said she also remembers one of them holding a knife to her throat while the other handcuffed her and covered her mouth and eyes with duct tape.

The woman said David Ray kept her strapped to a weight bench for several days inside a small trailer near his home that investigators have called the "toy box." She said he tried to sexually assault her "at least" 30 times.

""I remember him telling me he was in some kind of satanic group, and people in his group had been watching me — and wanting me as a sex toy," the woman said.

She added that during her ordeal, "I just kept telling him I wanted to go home."

The woman said she never saw Jesse Ray during the attacks. But a person can be convicted of a crime if proven to be an accessory, and prosecutor Jim Yontz alleged Jesse Ray knew what her father planned to do with the young woman.

"She procured the victim for daddy," Yontz said. "She's as liable as her father is for what occurred to (the woman) back in that toy box."

The alleged victim acknowledged to defense attorney Billy Blackburn that before talking to an investigator earlier this year, she told no one about what had happened. When he asked her why, she said "I couldn't remember exactly what happened."

State Police criminal investigator John Briscoe testified Tuesday that among the items found on Ray's property were several audio tapes. Yontz described one of them as an "advisory tape" for captives.

That tape was played during the hearing, and Briscoe said he recognized the voice on the tape as that of David Ray. The voice tells an abductee what is about to happen to her and says she will be pumped full of drugs at the end of her ordeal so she will not remember what has happened to her.

The cassette tape begins with a disclaimer that it is "for adults only" and "was designed and created to be used for entertainment only."

The narrator says he will tell the captive exactly what is happening to her.

The tape was made using "my experience in dealing with captives over several years," the voice says.

Among other things, the tape says:

"You probably think you're going to be raped. You're right about that. You will be raped thoroughly and repeatedly."

"It's no big deal. My lady friend and I have been (keeping captives) for years."

"We prefer to snatch girls in their early to mid-teens."

"I guess I've been doing this too long. As far as I'm concerned, you're a piece of meat."

Near the end of the tape, the narrator said, "If I killed every bitch that we kidnapped, there'd be bodies strung all over the country."

It then says, "After we get

through with you, you're going to be drugged up real heavy. You're going to be kept drugged a copple of days while I play with your mind," and adds that the victim won't remember anything after she's released.

The narrator also tells the tictim she will be washed before her release so "there won't be any DNA evidence."

Briscoe said investigators who searched David Ray's properly found "lots of articles" with blood and "possible DNA evidence."

Briscoe also said investigators found "numerous things" with Jesse Ray's name on them. But he acknowledged under cross examination by Blackburn that he couldn't pin down the last time she had been on the property.

The case involving David Ray began in March, when he and alleged accomplice Cynthia Lea Hendy were arrested on suspicion of taking part in the imprisonment and torture of two other women earlier this year. Jesse Ray was arrested in late April.

State Police Sgt. K.C. Rogers testified Tuesday that after Ray and Hendy were arrested, investigators found a videotape on Ray's property that showed a woman "strapped down to a table of sorts" in the trailer known as the toy box. Investigators believe she is the woman who was allegedly kidnapped by Jesse Ray.

"In the video, it was fairly apparent she was not a willing participant," Rogers said. He said the woman in the video had a unique tattoo on her right leg, and that helped investigators track her down.

A plea bargain involving Hendy is pending.

A fourth suspect in the Elephant Butte investigation, Dennis Roy Yancy, was arrested April 9 on suspicion of killing a T or C woman who has been missing since July 1997. He is the only suspect facing a charge of murder, and a preliminary hearing in his case has been set for May 25.

It's the second time in recent weeks that investigators have searched the Elephant: Butte mobile home of David Parker Ray, one of four people charged in the case.

Two alleged victims, one from Albuquerque and another from Truth or Consequences, testified this month at Ray's preliminary hearing that they were abducted, shocked with electricity, sexually tortured and kept captive in padlocked collars.

Richardson said the latest search was prompted by new information police ob-

tained in the case.

"They ve come up with additional information from following up on leads," he said. They felt it was necessary to get another search warrant to look for new evidence that could help with the cases of people already charged as well as to help us identify any other victims."

Richardson said investigators had called in some heavy equipment in the event they decided to begin digging in Ray's yard. Such a search would depend on what investigators uncovered in their search of the residence, he said.

On Tuesday, the lawyer for one of two women charged in the case said he expects more arrests after his client — Ray's

daughter — was charged.

"We're getting a lot of calls every day, all day long," Richardson said Tuesday.

A May 11 preliminary hearing was scheduled for Glenda Ray. Hendy has waived her preliminary hearing and intends to plead guilty to five of 25 counts against her, including accessory and conspiracy charges, her lawyer has said.

Yancy who is accused of killing Marie B. Parker in July 1997, is scheduled for a May 25 preliminary hearing. Her body has not been found.

Glenda Ray was arrested Monday at her small lakeside resort northeast of Truth or Consequences, and charged with 12 counts, including kidnapping, criminal sexual penetration and assault.

Prosecutors filed an identical dozen charges against her father, bringing the number of charges Ray faces to 37. Ray, who has pleaded not guilty earlier was bound over for trial on 25 counts. F.E.)

Ray's daughter arrested in torture case

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES — The daughter of the central figure in a sex-torture investigation has become the fourth person to be charged in a case that began when a bloodied woman wearing only a padlocked collar ran into a home calling for help.

Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray, 31; was arrested Monday and charged with 12 counts, including kidnapping, criminal sexual penetration and assault, FBI agent Doug Beldon said.

Ms. Ray was to be arraigned this afternoon in magistrate court in Truth or Consequences.

"We consider this a major development in the investigation, and we hope that today's arrest will generate further response from witnesses and past victims," he said.

She was arrested at her father's mobile home in Elephant Butte, about 5 miles northeast of Truth or Consequences. She was being held in the Doña Ana County jail in Las Cruces on \$1 million bond, Beldon said.

The district attorney's office filed an identical dozen charges against her father. David Parker Ray, bringing to 37 the number of counts he faces. Ray earlier was bound over for trial on 25 counts and has pleaded inno-

cent to those charges.

The new charges involve a third woman who told police she was abducted by the Rays about June 26, 1996, and was sexually assaulted with objects for at least three days.

Two other women, one from Albuquerque fand another from Truth or Consequences, tes-

tified against Ray at his preliminary hearing earlier this month. They told a judge they were abducted, sodomized, shocked with electricity, sexually tortured and kept captive in padlocked collars in separate incidents in February and March.

Jeff Rein, Ray's afforney, could not be reached

Monday at his office for comment on the new charges.



All along, the FBI and state police have said they were searching for more victims and more suspects—and potentially some murder victims.

Dennis Roy Vancy, an associate of the Rays and Hendy, has been charged with murder in the death of a woman who disappeared from an Elephant Butte bar two years ago.

Investigators have said the tortures and the murder of Marie B. Parker, 22 are linked, but



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have not explained how. A preliminary hearing for Yancy, 27, is scheduled for May 25. Hendy originally also was charged with 25 counts but intends to plead guilty to five, including accessory and conspiracy charges, her lawyer, Xayier Acosta, has said.

The criminal complaint against Ms. Ray gives a Galveston, Texas, address. Yancy lived in Galveston for at least six months between late 1997 and the summer of 1998, investigators have said.

Ms. Ray moved out of Crockett Courts, an old motel that operates efficiency apartments in Galveston, a couple of months ago, said the manager, who declined to give her name.

"She was a very nice lady. She was a quiet lady who lived here and she was clean," the manager said.

Albuquerque police also have questioned Ms. Ray in the disappearance of another woman, Jill Troia. Ms. Ray was the last person to see her in 1995 at an Albuquerque restaurant, authorities said.

Albuquerque homicide detective Carla Gandara said this month she has discussed the Troia case with FBI agents investigating the Elephant Butte case.

Except for the padlocked metal collar and chain on her neck, she was naked as she ran down the street seeking help.

"I rạn ánd ran ánd ran," she said, "It seemed like I ran forever. I seen some door open in some trailer - some lady was in some trailer. I just grabbed her and told her to help me."

In testimony today, Darlene Breech described how the woman barged into her home, then turned and locked the door behind her. Breech gave the woman a pink robe and called police.

The next witness, Sierra Vista hospital nurse Lynn Cummings, described the woman's happiness at being free. Cummings testified that the woman kept repeating: "I'm safe!

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The woman said she had been strung up with leather straps, whipped with a belt and at one point gravy was poured on her and a dog licked it off.

"He brought this thing with a bunch of wires and it had clips and he attached the clips to my breasts and my vaginal area and it sent shocks through my body," she said.

On March 22 while Ray was away, she said, she hooked her legs under a coffee table where a padlock key was kept and pulled the table toward her.

She said Ray's co-defendant, Cynthia Lea Hendy, caught her moving the table and began hitting her with a lamp. She said she grabbed an ice pick and hit Hendy in the head with it as the chain came loose.

She wept describing the ordeal and required a brief court recess.

Ray is also accused of abducting and torturing a Truth or Consequences woman a month earlier. That woman also testified Thursday.

Another defendant, Dennis Roy Yancy, is charged with murder in the disappearance of a woman who vanished from an Elephant Butte bar two years ago.

Unlike the Albuquerque woman, the one from Truth or Consequences testified that she persuaded her captors to release her. She said she knew the pair and had gone to their Elephant Butte home to pick up a cake mix for her boyfriend's birthday. She said Ray pulled a dagger.

"I thought he was kidding until he punched me in the mouth," she testified.

She said Ray and Hendy held her captive five days.

"I had to play the part to be their friends in order to still be alive," she testified. "I'm surprised I made it out of there.... I didn't know if I was going to see my kids again."

Investigators still have not ruled out other homicides, arrests or victims in an investigation that generated more than 1,000 pieces of evidence and more than 100 leads and involves as many as 10 states.

volves as many as 10 states.

Hendy has waived a preliminary hearing, and the charges against her have been reduced from 25 counts to five. Her attorney entered a not guilty plea for her Thursday. She is

charged with two counts of being an accessory to kidital ping, two counts of being an accessory to criminal sexti penetration and a single count of conspiracy to kidnap, defense attorney Xavier Acosta said.

A proposed plea agreement, released today, require Hendy to plead guilty to the five charges and serve a sent tence of at least 12 years in prison and not more than 54 years. It has not yet been signed by District Judge Neil Mertz.

The Truth or Consequences woman said she was stripped and handcuffed to a bed, sodomized, shocked with a stungun type of device and, on the fourth day, taken to a nearby trailer called the "Play Box."

She described electric shocks similar to those testified about by the Albuquerque woman and said she was also forced to perform a sex act on Ray.

She was driven to Interstate 25 and released after promising not to tell anyone. The woman flagged down off-tluty Luna County sheriff's investigator Gary Leyba, who testified Thursday that he had doubted her story until he heard the other woman's allegations reported.

The Truth or Consequences woman said she, too, called police after hearing about the Albuquerque woman's ordeal. She said she had been afraid to report it earlier.

She also acknowledged making two phone calls while being held captive, including one asking for a money order that Hendy then cashed. She said Hendy gave her the cash before her release.

The Albuquerque woman said she met Ray and Hendy in an Albuquerque parking lot. She said they were negotiating the price of a sex act when Ray showed a badge and told her she was under arrest for prostitution.

she was under arrest for prostitution.

Jeff Rein, Ray's attorney, asked if she overlieard any conversation. She said Hendy commented she had "only been kidnapping, raping and murdering for the last year" while Ray had been doing it longer. Neither Hendy nor Ray is charged with murder.

Yancy, 27, is charged with murder in the 1997 disappearance of Marie Parker. Her body has not been found. Yancy will plead not guilty, his lawyer says.

Public May Gain Insight At TorC Suspects' Hearing

The public in the next two or three days might get a . more detailed look at the Elephant Butte sex torture case, which could become one of the most exhaustively investigated in New Mexico's history.

A preliminary hearing is to begin at 10 a.m. today in Truth or Consequences for suspects David Parker Rayand Cynthia Lea Hendy, and could stretch into Saturday. Exactly what new information will emerge is

Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz of the 7th Judicial District said the hearing is to determine if there is probable cause to send Ray, 59, and Hendy, 39, to trial.

Security is being beefed up. The Sierra County Sheriff's Department and the Truth or Consequences Police Department will station seven more officers in addition ... to the normal one to two sheriff's deputies.

Yontz said the hearing is similar to a grand jury hear-

ing but open to the public.
"It's best described as a mini-trial," Yontz said. "I would anticipate details will come out. There'll be live

testimony."
Yontz would not say what details would come forth or what questions the hearing will answer. For example, investigators and prosecutors have not specified how... Ray's and Hendy's case is connected to the case of a third suspect who has been charged with the murder of



Court records and Youtz said prosecutors could il call 12 people to testify. Among those are two women who have accused Ray and Hendy of kidnapping, sexual abuse and torture.

Ŷontz said Judge Neil P. Mertz will decide afterward whether there is enough cause to send the

r defendants to trial.

If so, "he will enter what's called a bindover order and we will then file a criminal information (document) on the charges that he binds over for " trial," Yontz said.

That document is similar to an indictment, which is produced by a grand jury if it finds enough evidence that a crime was committed.

Court documents suggest Hendy agreed to enter a plea to unidentified crimes connected to the case, although neither her attorney, Xavier Edward-Acosta, nor prosecutors will acknowledge that.

The plea and disposition agreement - a document that details what charges a defendant will plead to and what penalties he or she faces in exchange — has been sealed.

James F. Blackmer, a veteran judge in the 2nd Judicial District, said that in general it's unusual to see plea and disposition agreements filed so early in the case.

Hendy and Ray are each charged with 25 counts that include criminal sexual penetration, kidnapping and aggravated battery. Under a plea agreement, Hendy could plead to those or lesser charges.

Two women -one from Albuquerque and one from Truth or Consequences — have accused Ray and Hendy of abducting and forturing them.

The woman who fled Ray's Elephant Butte home March 22 told police Ray and Hendy kidnapped her from Albuquerque, took her to Ray's home, shocked her with electricity and tortured her sexually. After those allegations surfaced, the TorC woman came forward and accused Ray and Hendy of torturing her in February. She told police, however, that Ray and Hendy let her go.

At the height of the investigation, which drew national and international media attention, as many as 100 agents and officers with the New Mexico State Police and the FBI were on the case. They have collected more than 1,000 pieces of evidence from Ray's property in connection with the case.

And "we're covering leads and doing things in as many as 10 states in furtherance of this investigation," Doug Beldon, supervisory special agent of the FBI in New Mexico, said Wednesday.

A third suspect, Dennis Roy Yancy, 27, was arrested last week:

He is being held on charges of murder, kidnapping, conspiracy to murder, conspiracy to kidnap and tampering with evidence.

Yancy is accused of killing Marie Parker, 22 who disappeared July 5, 1997, from the nowclosed Blue Waters Saloon in Elephant Butte:

Investigators will not say how Yancy's case is linked to Ray and Hendy.

The only thing I'll say is Yancy is a former friend or former associate of David Ray and Cindy Hendy," the FBI's Beldon said.

Woman tells cour graphic details in sex-torture hearing

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES — The testimony got graphic as two of the suspects in the sex-torture case near Elephant Butte appeared in court this morning.

The first suspect, Cynthia Lea Hendy, 39, waived her preliminary hearing today on 25 counts, including criminal sexual penetration, kidnapping, conspiracy and aggravated battery, and her attorney entered a not guilty plea on her behalf.

A second suspect, David Parker Ray, had his preliminary

hearing today on 25 similar counts.

In the hearing, a police officer testified that he picked up a woman who claimed she had been held captive by two people, shocked with a stun gun and sodomized with a broom handle, but did not completely believe her story.

"She said they had her in the trailer like an animal with the chain and dog collar," said Gary Leyba, an officer with Luna County sheriff's department. "She called the man an old pervert."

Leyba, a narcotics investigator, was the second witness in. today's hearing. Leyba said he was off-duty and in his dwn: pickup truck when the woman flagged him down Feb. 20 near Truth or Consequences. He quoted her as saying, "If Itell you something, you're not going to believe me.". itim

"She said they were using, like, a stun gun on her. And they were shocking her with it on her side," Leyba told Ray's attorney, Jeff Kein, on cross-examination. Leyba also testified that the woman said the man and woman who held her placed clips on her nipples and attached the clip to a chain they tugged. The woman said she was kept in the trailer with a TV monitor, so they could watch her from their nearby mobile home.

"I thought she might be making something up," Leyba testified. "If I had thought it was 100 percent legitimate, I would have taken her (to police) right then and there.".

The woman said the other woman was a friend and she thought a bad drug deal may have caused her friend to turn on her, Leyba said. He also testified that he offered to help her make a police report, but she declined, saying she would not be believed.

Leyba said he dropped the woman off at a bus stop in Albuquerque and did not report the incident until he saw another woman's report of a similar incident.

Today's first witness, State Police Agent Art Ortiz, described the contents of Ray's recreational vehicle. He said police found a plastic gag with a breathing tube, teeth marks and remnants of duct tape.

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Ortiz said they also found a white plastic wastebasket with duct tape and what appeared to be human hair, condoms, a chain, nylon rope, a 12-inch knife, a jar of Vaseline, and a battery or charger attached by a cord to metal clips.

Two women have told police they were abducted and kept in padlocked collars and chains at the home of Ray and Hendy.


District Judge Neil Mertz is hearing the evidence today to determine if there is enough evidence to order a trial for Ray, 59. A third defendant, charged with murder, faces a separate preliminary hearing later this month.

An open letter by Hendy's lawyer, Xavier Acosta, and dis tributed to news media Wednesday, asks New Mexicans not & to rush to conclusions based on what amounts to rumors until all facts are disclosed."

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES - A plea bargain appeared to be in the works for one of three co-defendants in a sex torture-homicide case, and the one charged with murder was said to be cooperating as well.

Two co-defendants have been moved out of. the jail that houses the third - David Parker Ray-because of concerns about "contact and threats," a jail official said Monday.

Ray, 59, is charged with 25 counts including kidnapping, sexual penetration, aggravated battery and conspiracy in the 10-state case.

An order sealing a "plea and disposition" agreement" involving co-defendant Cynthia Lea Hendy was signed April 6 by state District Judge Neil Mertz. But Hendy's lawyer, Xavier Acosta, said Monday there was no plea agreement signed by a judge. Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz declined to comment other than to say most pleas are efforts to resolve cases before trial and require a judge's approval.

It was not immediately known what the proposed plea bargain might include, but such pleas often require defendants to admit certain allegations and cooperate with investigators.

The case broke last month when neighbors found a fleeing woman, naked and bloody, wearing only a padlocked collar. Dozens of FBI agents and State Police have been search-

ing for other victims.
On Friday, Dennis Roy Yancy, an acquain tance of Hendy's and Ray's, was arrested and hearing expected later this month, lawyer Steve

charged with killing a woman who disappeared two years ago.

Yancy, 27, appeared in court for the first time Monday, declining to answer reporters' questions as he entered the courthouse.



They are looking for anything that can help them locate a body, evidence, whatnot," State Police Lt. Greg Richardson. "We have someone who said he murdered someone. That's the only body we have to look for right. now.".

Yancy is the only one charged with murder, although authorities say there could be more homicides and more suspects. The murder charge carries a potential penalty of life imprisonment or death by lethal injection. The other charges could net as much as 461/2 years in prison, Lopez said.

Yancy was moved Monday to the Doña Ana County jail in Las Cruces, where he is being held without bond. Hendy, 39, was moved to the Las Cruces jail last week.

"We transported them as the DA and our office had concerns about contact and threats being made by and to the co-defendants," Peter-

Yancy's wife. Christina, said Sunday that her husband received a message relayed by another inmate: "Rats die in jail." She said her husband is cooperating in the investigation.

A friend, George Padilla, said Monday that, the charges against Yancy were "a big surprise. He would never do that. He loves kids. He takes my daughter to the park."

Ray and Hendy have each pleaded not guilty to the 25 counts that don't include murder.

Two women accuse Ray and Hendy of abducting and sexually torturing them in separate incidents. An Albuquerque woman who fled the Elephant Butte home told police March 22 she was shocked with electricity and tortured sexually. A Truth or Consequences woman also accused Ray and Hendy of kidnapping and sexually forturing her in February.

Acosta said Hendy had only a three-month association with Ray, while some of the alleged acts occurred years earlier.

Dozens of FBI agents and other officers have collected more than 1,000 pieces of evidence from Ray's property. Agents say the investigation, now in its third week, has expanded across 10 states, including New Mexico, Texas and Arizona. They won't list the other states.

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES Dennis Roy Yancy had been at his new job for an hour and a half when the authorities came for him, according to his boss.

Yancy was arrested Friday and charged with murder in connection with the sex-torture case continuing to unfold at nearby Elephant Butte.

"I thought he was going to be a good cook," said Williams, who had hired Yancy the day before his arrest. "He made good biscuits."

Yancy is charged with killing Marie B. Parker, a 22-year-old mother of two who disappeared from a bar in Elephant Butte on July 5, 1997. State Police and FBI investigators with shovels looked for her remains in a rugged area off of N.M. 195 near town Saturday.

ay. They didn't find any, but police said they discovered other possible evidence that might be related to the case.

Authorities have not explained how Yancy is connected to the case against David Parker Ray and Cynthia Lea Hendy, who are accused of kidnapping and torturing two other women.

into Room 18 at the motel April 5.

Three doors down, in Room 15, were FBI agents investigating the case of Ray and Hendy, Williams said. Beldon said that was a coincidence.

Police have said Yancy is from Truth or Consequences, but Williams, said Yancy told her he had come from Albuquerque to see his child.

He stayed with the child and a woman, whom Williams thought was either his girlfriend or his wife. Beldon said Yancy is married.

Yancy stayed for three days and was constantly on the phone, tying up the motel's only line, Williams said. Records of his calls were turned over to investigators, she said.

After Yancy checked out, he came back looking for a job and was hired as a cook.

"He was a clean, good-looking guy," Williams said. He started around 1:30 p.m. Friday, and an investigator came by and arrested him a short time later.

"It's been very distressing," she said. The only murder charge in the case is the one filed against Yancy, but Beldon said he wouldn't rule out the possibility of other homicides.

The investigation started March 22 when one of Ray's neighbors saw a woman naked and bloody on a road, wearing a padlocked collar. The woman told police she had been shocked with electricity and tortured sexually.

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Two Jailed In Sex Attack Case

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES -State Police investigators continued Thursday to search the home where two people are charged in the threeday rape and torture of an Albuquerque woman;

Sierra County sheriff's deputies and State Police officers began investigating the case Monday afternoon when neighbors spotted a nude. bloodied woman wearing chains walking or running down the roads.

David P. Ray, 59, and Cynthia Lea Hendy, 39, were arrested Tuesday. The charges against Ray include kidnapping and criminal sexual penetration; Hendy is charged with kidnapping and accessory to criminal sexual penetration. Both are also charged with conspiracy and assault with intent to commit a violent

They remained in the Sierra County Detention Center in TorC on Thursday in lieu of \$1 million cashonly bonds, jail officials said.

Investigators sealed off Ray's home on Bass Road near the village of Elephant Butte. They could be seen Thursday morning going through a mobile home on the halfacre lot but were paying particular attention to a smaller trailer there.

Officers wearing gloves and carrying cameras went in and out of the smaller trailer, but the only items visible from a nearby dirt road were a fire extinguisher, a propane tank and a folling chair.

State Police spokesman Lt. Greg Richardson said Thursday afternoon that the did not know how much longer the search would go on. He added that he could not release details because the investigation was continuing and because District Attorney Ron Lopez wanted questions referred to his office.

López did not return calls requesting information Thursday afternoon.

Bill Elwell, a special agent for the FBI in Albuquerque, said Thursday the agency dispatched its evidence response team to assist in the investigation.

A search warrant had not been filed in District Court by Thursday afternoon.

Sheriff's and jail officials said Ray

had no prior criminal charges in Sierra County.

Hendy was arrested Jan 10, 1998. on a charge of aggravated driving while intoxicated, according to TorQ Municipal Court records. She was found guilty on Jan. 22, 1998. On March 5, 1998, she was sentenced to 50 hours of community service, six months of probation, 30 days in jail and was ordered to attended school



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

Officials confirmed that they found photos of other possible victims and were told of an "orientation" videotape that reportedly told kidnapping victims what they could expect during their capture.

1.7. Among the missing-person reports being looked into in connection with the case are those of Jill Troia, an Albuquerque woman. who disappeared in 1995, and Marie B. Parker, a Truth or Consequences woman who was last seen in 1997.

The investigation began March 22 when one of Ray's neighbors saw a 22-year-old woman naked and bloody on a road; court

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papers said she also had a padlocked collar around her neck.

The court papers also said that, according to the victim, she had been kidnapped in Albuquerque on March 20 and taken to Ray's home, where she was assaulted and beaten before she escaped beaten before she escaped.

Court papers on the second alleged victim

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Sex-torture inqui spreads to five states

ELEPHANT BUTTE — An investigation into allegations of sexual torture now involves at least five states, the FBI says.

About 30 agents followed leads Monday in and around the neighboring cities of Truth or Consequences and Elephant Butte, where two women said they were held captive and tortured with sexual devices, FBI agent Doug Beldon said.

And he said the state-federal task force has expanded its investigation of co-defendants David Parker Ray and Cynthia Lea. Hendy into two additional states. Law enforcement officials previously had said they were following leads in Phoenix and Tucson, Ariz, and El Paso and Victoria, Texas, as well as in New Mexico and northern Mexico.

Beldon would not identify the two additional states. He said the task force has begun following leads in those states but not collecting evidence in them.

"We don't have crime scenes in other states," Beldon said at a news conference.

Ray, 59, and Hendy, 39, are accused of rape, kidnapping and aggravated battery. Two women, one from Albuquerque and one from Truth or Consequences, have accused Ray and Hendy of holding them against their will in separate incidents.

The women say Ray tortured them with sexual devices and electric shock as Hendy watched. Hendy is accused of holding a gun on them and threatening to shoot them if they tried to escape. Ray and Hendy maintain their innocence.

A briefing Monday brought investigators up to speed after some returned from a short break during the Easter holiday, State Police Lt. Randy Bertram said.

Additional agents are in Albuquerque processing documents and other physical evidence, while agents in other states are following leads, Beldon said.

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FBI Expands TorC Probe

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES—An FBI spokesman said at news conference Monday that the investigation into a kidnapping and sexual torture case has been expanded into at least two more states and that agents are "busier than ever."

Doug Beldon, FBI supervisory special agent, said he couldn't say which states have been added to the case. Police have disclosed previously they are investigating leads in Texas and Arizona.

"I'm very pleased with the progress of this case," Beldon said. "We are making excellent progress."

However, he said, he expects the investigation to be "long-term and intense."

Beldon said while police are most likely finished with collecting evidence at

the alleged crime scene—the Elephant Butte residence of suspect David Parker Ray—more agents have been brought into the case to process the evidence taken from the home.

A trailer where a victim was allegedly held and tortured and many boxes of evidence and other items have been removed from the property.

Beldon said a number of teams consisting of a State Police officer and an FBI agent are following leads in New Mexico and other states.

He said 25 to 30 investigators will continue to follow leads in Truth or Consequences and Elephant Butte.

"The FBI and the State Police are continuing to work hand-in-hand," he said.

Ray, 59, and Cynthia Lea Hendy, 39, are each charged with 25 counts including kidnapping, sexual abuse, battery and conspiracy. They are accused of kidnapping and sexually torturing an

Albuquerque woman and a Sierra County woman during two separate incidents. They have not been charged with any other crimes, and their attorneys have said they're innocent.

The suspects are in custody at the Sierra County detention center.

Beldon declined to answer reporters' questions about whether more charges might be filed or if more arrests are possible. But he reiterated that none of those possibilities has been ruled out.

In response to a question about whether police are looking into any possible connections with the rapes and beating deaths of more than 100 young women in the Ciudad, Juarez area, Beldon said he couldn't "confirm whether we have talked to the Mexican authorities or any other authorities."

"But we hope to solve as many crimes as we can in this case," he said.



TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES - Investigators e are looking into whether the disappearance of a young Truth for Consequences mother of two could be linked to a kidnapping and sexual torture case, law enforcement sources involved in the investigation said Friday.

- According to a Sierra County Sheriff's Department missing persons report, 24 year old Marie B. Parker was last seen at the Blue Waters Saloon in Elephant Butte on July 5, 1997.

eThe report on Parker's disappearance does not name David Parker Ray, who with Cynthia Lea Hendy is accused of kidnapping and torturing two women.

"Ray and Hendy have not been charged with any crime relating to the Marie Parker case or any other missing-person case.

They have been charged with kidnapping, sexual assault and conspiracy in the alleged attacks on two women who said they were imprisoned at

Ray's home and assaulted.

Kate Parker, Marie's mother, said during a telephone interview earlier this week that she last saw her daughter on the morning of July 5 before leaving on a trip.

I have been searching and searching for two years. I've got her on almost every prayer chain in the entire United States," the elder Parker said. The years is a hell of a long time to go without your friend, your daughter, your blood.

Kate Parker, who lives in Albuquerque, is caring for Marie Parker's daughters, ages 4 and 5. The missing person report said Parker's car, a

Ray's driver's license number, obtained by the Journal from a police report on a traffic accident in Truth or Consequences, her address of 513 Bass Road matches that of David Parker Ray's in Elephant Butte.

Gandara confirmed that "the FBI requested some information" about the Troia case. She also said she interviewed Jesse Ray but the interview is not yet a public record because "it's an active case."

Doug Beldon, FBI supervisory special agent, declined to say whether Glenda or Jesse Ray was sought for questioning, was considered a part of the larger investigation or had been interviewed.

"I can't tell you who we're talking to," he said.

Meanwhile, the process of collecting evidence wound down Friday.

About mid-morning, a trailer next to David Ray's home was taken to a storage area in Santa Fe, Beldon said. Two small storage trailers full of evidence were taken to the FBI's New Mexico headquarters in Alburquerque.

Crime scene tape that surrounded about seven homes behind Ray's property was taken down, and police removed barriers blocking Bass Road.

Crime scene tape around Ray's property was not removed, and a State Police Mounted Patrol officer kept watch.

The evidence recovery compothent of the investigation is pretty well caught up," Beldon said at an afternoon news conference.

Beldon, State Police Lt. Randy Berram and Deputy District Attorney Jim Yontz offered very little new information on the case.

Bertram and Beldon said many of the investigators would be allowed to go home.

"We are not scaling back the operation," Bertram said: "We just got some people who have been here for 11 days, and we don't see a need to keep them all here for the weekend."



"In fact, with the number of leads that continue to roll in, we may very well increase the number of special agents that are here assisting the State Police with leads," Beldon said.

Meanwhile, Jeff Rein, David Ray's attorney, said Friday afternoon that he was filing a motion asking a judge to "preserve the defendant's right to a fair trial" by "restraining" the comments made by law enforcement officials about the nature of the investigation.

Rein said he faxed the motion to court before it closed at noon Friday filed.

Rein said Darren White, director of the state Department of Public Safety, has publicly made comments that could make it hard for Ray to get a fair trial. Rein said among White's comments were those made at a town hall meeting to the effect that the case was 99 on a scale of 100 when it came to severi-

■ Torture investigation has brought the media and unsettling attention to the quiet communities around Elephant Butte lake

ELEPHANT BUTTE - This weekend getaway spot has been getting national attention for more than a week, but stories of torture and missing women are not welcome publicity to the people who live and work here.

"It is negative, but it's news, so what are you going to do?" said Elephant Butte Mayor Bob Barnes. "I understand it."

Elephant Butte and nearby Truth or Consequences became datelines for the Dallas Morning News, The New York Times, the CNN, ABC, CBS, NBC and FOX television networks, "Good Morning America," and the "Today" show.

Scores of reporters and photographers from Albuquerque, El Paso, Phoenix, Tucson and other parts of the Southwest were also here. The case has even attracted the attention of the British Broadcasting Corp. and Australian radio.

For more than a week, state and federal investigators have been rummaging and sifting through the property of David Parker Ray as they look into allegations of kidnapping, rape and torture. Ray's trailer home is in Hot Springs Landing, a subdivision just outside the small city that borders Elephant Butte Reservoir, the state's largest lake.

Barnes said the city of Elephant Butte has about 2,500 permanent residents. But on weekends, the population swells to as many as 80,000 people as leisure-seekers. arrive to water ski and fish for striped bass at the reservoir.

The population has been swollen slightly more by dozens of investigators and some 50 journalists.

"It definitely increased business," said Shawn Zug, general manager for Best Western-motels in Truth or Consequences. "It's unfortunate that business picks up because of something like Beth Care

Restaurants were packed.

"It's brought a lot of people into town," said Bob Middleton, owner of the Los Arcos restaurant. "There's more people than normal in here, but it's sad to get business this way."

The two are charged with 25 counts, including criminal sexual penetration, kidnapping and aggravated battery in the sex-torture case that has shaken this small town on the southwest shore of Elephant Butte Lake.

Two women accused Ray, 59, and Hendy, 39, of holding them against their will this winter. They said they were molested by Ray while Hendy watched. They said Hendy held a gun and threatened to kill them if they tried to escape.

Ray's co-workers are flabbergasted by the allegations.

Glen Parks, a volunteer who works at the Blephant Butte State Park visitor center, said Ray was the "neatest, cleanest politest person you could ever want to meet."

Ray was a maintenance worker at the state park for about five years, fixing vehicles and heavy machinery in a garage on the grounds, said his boss, Jerome Madrid

Madrid said Ray was dependable. We are as shocked as everybody else," he said.

In July 1995, a state board awarded Ray \$1,182 and a certificate of recognition for "special achievement" in a cost-savings program. A letter extended its "sincere appreciation and congratulations to Mr. Ray for his exemplary work and dedication!"

Parks said Ray offered to help fix the state park trailer where Parks lives. Parks declined, but said Ray still offered his tools. "To me it's totally mind-boggling that this is happening it's scary," Parks said.

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

Hendy's background filled with abuse, trouble, son says

SEATTLE — A woman charged in a sexual-torture case in New Mexico had a life marred by abusive men, alcohol and drugs, her son says.

Cindy Lea Hendy, 39, is in the Sierra County Jail in Truth or Consequences. She and co-defendant David Parker Ray, 59, have been charged with 25 counts each, including kidnapping, aggravated battery and conspiracy.

At least two women have said they were held and tortured by the couple.

Hendy, who has three children in the Seattle area, moved to New Mexico in 1997, said her son. Shane Larson of Kent.

"I'm still shocked. I can't really believe it. She ain't the person who would do this kind of thing," said Larson. 22.

He said Tuesday he hadn't seen his 'mother for more than two years but spoke with her on the phone last week.

He said he suggested she come pack here and just straighten up." He said his mother cried throughout the call.

Hendy told him "she was going out with a park ranger and quit drinking and was coming up here to see us because my sister was having a baby next month. She asked how we were all doing, said "she loved us."

Hendy's older daughter, Heather Hendy, 18, said she had expected her mother to return to Everett, Wash., soon for the birth of her first child.

Hendy has another daughter, 212, who lives in Everett with a grandmother.

Hendy's three children all had said.

different fathers, Larson said.

"A lot of her boyfriends were very abusive; (drank) alcohol a lot. We've seen that our whole life growing up," he said. Many also had drug problems, he said, and he sometimes got "beat up" by these men.

Larson said his mother was present only "on and off" as he was growing up, and that he lived with others, including stretches with his grandmother and his father.

Heather Hendy questioned whether her mother was with Ray voluntarily.

"It didn't seem like she got very far out of his sight," Heather Hendy said. "Everybody agrees, I mean, everybody in my family's knows her, too, and they just don't feel like that's something my mom would do willingly on her own."

Court records show Cindy Hendy filed domestic-violence charges twice against a man she spent several years with in the Seattle area. Hendy and the man were arrested July 4, 1995, on charges of stealing \$3,300 worth of aluminum pipes from a King-County Department of Transportation storage lot in Kirkland, court records show. That case is still pending.

Hendy was also charged with forgery and possession of stolen property in 1979, and for cocaine possession in 1993. Both of those cases resulted in deferred prosecution.

Larson said his mother grew up in Seattle's University District.

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

on't call them profilers. They are FBI "supervisory special agents," and local, state and even international law enforcement agencies call on them when they have "bizarre or vicious, high-profile crimes," said Kurt erawford, spokesman of the FBI Academy at Quantico.

He said "profiler" is a term pop-

ularized by the media.

The special agents usually have about 16 years' experience in law enforcement, have a specific area of expertise and most are culled from the FBI's 56 nationwide offices, he said.

"We have people with backgrounds in the lab, maybe forensics or psychology," Crawford said. "They could also be former homicide detectives from major

law enforcement agencies or even? lawyers. We have a lot of resources."

He said the agents work for the FBI's National Center for the Analysis of Violent Crime, which was created in 1995 by combining the Investigative Support Unit and the Child Abduction and Serial Killer unit.

"The Investigative Support Unitmovie, "Silence of the Lambs,"

In that film, an FBI agent tries to gain the confidence and insights of a jailed serial killer to catch another serial killer.

Several of the special agents are assisting in the investigation, at Elephant Butte.

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Police prepare community for worst as teams scour Elephant Butte property

ELEPHANT BUTTE — Federal and State Police officials are warning the public to brace itself for the horrific as the investigation of kidnapping and sexual-torture allegations continues in this Southern New Mexico community.

More than 100 state and federal agents and other police personnel have been called in to help investigate, while additional state and federal agents are looking into more than 100 leads nationwide. They're looking for more victims of sex-torture crimes that they say a couple committed at their home in a weekend-residence neighborhood on the shore of Elephant Butte Lake.

"This is a very dark, very disturbing case for everyone involved," Darren White, New Mexico's secretary of public safety, told a horde of

reporters at a press conference at the State Police Office in Truth or Consequences on Tuesday afternoon.

David Parker Ray; 59, and his girlfriend, Cindy Lea Hendy, 39, were arrested March 22 after a 22-year-old Albuquerque woman crying for help — naked except for a metal collar with a chain attached — was encountered near their house by a neighbor.

The woman said the couple had kidnapped her and sexually tortured. her for three days before she escaped.

On Tuesday, additional charges were filed against the couple on the basis of a criminal complaint by a second woman, who said she was kidnapped by Ray and Hendy at their home Feb. 17 and subjected to sexual torture for five days before escaping.

"There may be more victims across the country," White said.


"We have collected and catalogued over 1,000 pieces of evidence," he said. But to reveal specifics, he said, "would be to give descriptions so vile" that they might "deter other victims or witnesses from coming forward" and could also violate the suspects' legal rights and endanger prosecution efforts.

"We believe this case involves more victims, and we do not rule out the possibility that it does include homicide," White said. "We have

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found no bodies, but in this case anything is possible.

White said officials are even "worried about the mental health" of police personnel involved in the case, because "this is pretty chilling information we're sharing with them."

At the press conference, and at a public forum later in the day attended by about 120 area residents. White was flanked by Frank Taylor, chief of the New Mexico State Police; David Kitchen, special agent in charge of the Albuquerque division of the FBI; and Ron Lopez, district attorney for state judicial District 7.

When briefed by on-site investigators, White said at the press conference, "each of us recognized something we have never encountered before — the experience, the emotion, the stomach-turning. We knew we had a case that could go in directions unimaginable.

"We are attempting to put together the pieces of a dark and disturbing puzzle. We could be here for a week, a month — we could be here for a year."

Even so, he said, "this current situation may prove to be the community's worst nightmare."

As the case proceeds, he said, Elephant Butte and Tor C—and even the lake itself—may be "demonized" by the national media. But with the arrest of the suspects, he said, "this is a safe community, with wonderful people who live here."

The public forum at the Truth or Consequences City Commission Chambers was held to "put to rest rumors that have literally been frenzied," White told the crowd. "But the allegations do suggest the unthinkable."

He said of himself, Taylor, Kitchen and Lopez: "What we witnessed during those briefings (with crime-scene investigators) was something none of the four of us had witnessed or encountered during our careers."

And for himself, he added: This very easily may be the most significant case I ve ever dealt with in my life.

Among the rumors was one that human bones had been found on the grounds of Ray's house. Not true, White said. Analysis has shown they were fragments of animal bones.

Also not true, he said, were "a lot of runiors floating around about locations for burial sites" and that the bodies of 11 to 14 victims had been recovered from the lake.

Earlier in the day, the officials had said there are no plans at the moment to dig for evidence at the Ray house or any other site, and also no plans to drag the lake for bodies.

Were videotapes recovered from Ray's house? asked a member of the audience. "Can't comment," White said.

One questioner at the evening meeting tried to pin White down: "On a scale of 1 to 100, how disastrous is this?"

White first answered, "on the lower end," but when pressed by the unsatisfied questioner he said: "99 on a scale of 100."

Taylor, of the State Police, said the investigation is proceeding methodically because "we don't want to lose anything (in court) on a technicality."

"We will share what we can, as long as we don't jeopardize the investigation," he said

Ray and Hendy have been charged with 25 counts each, including multiple counts of conspiracy and assault. Ray has been charged with kidnapping and criminal sexual penetration. Hendy is charged with kidnapping and with being an accessory to criminal sexual penetration.

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The two are being held in jail with bail set at \$1 million each. No date is set for a preliminary court hearing on the charges.

Kitchen described Ray as being "not cooperative" with investigators, but said Hendy is "being a little more cooperative."

The scene of the suspected crimes is Ray's house and half-acre dirt yard on Bass Road, a seven-mile drive northeast of downtown Truth or Consequences.

A chain-link fence encloses his double-wide mobile home; two boats and a roofed storage area. The residence is not within the city limits of Elephant Butte, but on land leased from Elephant Butte State Park.

News photographers and reporters were allowed to peer over the fence from the gravel road in front of the house, but they were not permitted inside the property because FBI "evidence-response teams" from Albuquerque and El Paso were examining, cataloging and removing items found on the property.

Kitchen said a third FBI evidenceresponse team was on its way from Phoenix to help with the task

"Typically," one team would be called in, and it would be done with a crime scene in a day or two."
Kitchen said, "But the type of evidence we're collecting here is rather unusual."

He said investigators are particularly interested in hearing from any victims or witnesses in Phoenix and Tucson, in Victoria and El Paso, Texas, and in Juarez, Mexico—all

places where Ray has lived or spent significant time.

Investigators are "scouring all e ports" of missing persons and horncides not solved that might be "matched up" to the case, Kitchen said. "We're looking for any passible connection."

The FBI is just beginning to develop a history of Ray's life, Kitchen said.

But neither he nor the other police officials would reveal any biographical details discovered so far.

However, they confirmed that Ray, who has worked as a maintenance man for the park for the past six years, has owned his lakeside home for about 15 years.

"My information is that he was well liked." White said. Law conforcement officers who encounted Ray while performing his park duties "considered him a very friendly person," White said.

The FBI's behavioral-science units has been called into the case, including specialists who try to create psychological profiles of serial killers.

After the town forum Tuesday, Bob Barnes, mayor of Elephani Butte, said, "I think this meeting was necessary." "I'm comfortable that the suspects are in jail," Gary Whitehead, chair man of the Sierra County Commission, said after the meeting. "Now want to see what the investigation brings."

said after the meeting: "I feel I'main good hands. I feel that these people (the investigators) are really capable."

Like others in the community, she said, she'd heard rumors that some bodies had been stuffed into its chests and buried in the desert.

At the press conference and at the meeting with area residents, White said Ray "is innocent antil proven guilty. We must respect his rights."

Jeff Ryan, a court-appointed attorney for Ray, said after the public meeting: It is a good idea to let folks know what is going on, but I think he (White) has tried and convicted Mir. Ray. It makes people feel better, But it will make it harder to get people to be fair and impartial" when the case comes to trial

Jerry Acosta, the court-appointed attorney for Hendy, agreed. "This process maybe should have been held differently," he said.

David Kitchen, the FBI special agent in charge of New Mexico, said investigators believe the case involves several victims of sexual abuse and torture and also could involve serial murer. Lopez said the photos will be cross-referenced

with missing person reports.

"I think the photos will no question be used at trial. They are of such a nature to give us a goodfaith basis to believe there are other victims. ... We'll have a better idea after identifying the indiyiduals in the pictures as the case moves along,"

When asked about the content of the photos, he said that "some are of an explicit nature and

some are just pictures."

Sierra County prosecutors filed additional criminal charges Tuesday against Ray and suspected accomplice Cynthia Lea, Hendy, alleging they kidnapped and fortured a second victim. Court papers say police have a photograph showing the second woman "restrained with her body being (stretched) with torture instruments."

The number of FBI agents and State Police investigators involved was expected to swell to almost 100 today while agents checked on about 100 leads from around the nation. A third FBI behavioral science expert was being called in, and Kitchen said Ray and Hendy have been inter-

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

ELEPHANT BUTTE - Bones found at the scene of a suspected sexmual-torture case have been tested and - are not human, State Police said today. :: "We're relieved they were not husmall bones," State Police Lt. Randy Bertram said.

The fragments had been found outiside the home of a couple accused in the case.

-15 Foot-high metal stakes with red "flags dotted the fenced yard where FBI, agents searched for evidence Monday ... in the case that now spans three states. FBI agents were on site today, cataloging evidence.

Authorities have been searching the property for several days, and have strung blue tarps across the rear of the home and set up picnic tables behind the tarps to process evidence.

The mobile home sits on a dusty half-acre lot that also contains a couple of storage sheds and two boats and is surrounded by a chain-link fence.

Darren White, state public safety secretary, and FBI agent Doug Beldon on Monday emphasized the bizarre nature of the case, in which an Albuquerque woman said she was shocked with electricity and tortured sexually before escaping wearing only a padlocked metal collar attached to a chain.

Beldon said the FBI had not ruled out homicides in its investigation, but said agents had not started digging.

David Parker Ray, 59, and Cindy

Lea Hendy, 39, are charged in the kidnapping and sexual-torture case.

KOB-Channel 4 reported that a friend of Hendy's named John -Branaugh said Hendy told him there . were other victims whose bodies were dumped in Elephant Butte Lake.



"I do not believe any of it is founded on anything more than rumors, sensationalism," he told The Associated Press in a telephone interview.

White said dozens of FBI agents and State Police were working on the case.

The grim scene was not lost on neighbors along the dirt street, lined by mobile homes and recreational vehicles.

"I raised my kids here, and I didn't even have to lock the door," said Mary Whitfield, who lives two houses away from the trailer being searched. "I'm still not afraid—you just have to be more careful."

Ray, a maintenance worker for the state parks system, is charged with kidnapping and criminal sexual penetration in the case of the Albuquerque woman. Hendy, who lives with Ray, is charged with kidnapping and accessory to criminal sexual penetration.

The Albuquerque woman told police Ray tied her up, shocked her with electricity and whipped her while Hendy, watching with a revolver, "I do not believe any of it is founded on anything more than rumors, sensationalism."


White and the FBI planned to hold a town meeting this evening in Truth or Consequences to talk with the public and local government officials about the case.

Ray has worked as a mechanic for the State Parks Division since 1994. His job application details his work history in several states over the last 30 years.







The case came to light March 22 when a nude, bloodied woman was found in Elephant Butte wearing a padlocked collar with a chain around her neck. She told police she was kidnapped by David Ray and Hendy from Albuquerque, taken to David Ray's home along the shores of Elephant Butte Lake and tortured and sodomized. She also said she managed to escape during a struggle with Hendy.

A TorC woman later came forward and said she had been held against her will for five days in February and sexually tortured by David Ray while Hendy watched.

Hendy pleaded guilty April 6 to two counts of accessory to kidnapment of federal authorities in the ping, two counts of accessory to acriminal sexual penetration and one count of conspiracy to commit kidnapping — all state charges — for her involvement in those incidents.

Daughter pleads innocent in sex torture case

Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray 32, pleaded innocent to 12 charges during an arraignment Wednesday in Truth or Consequences. She is the daughter of David Parker Ray 59, who has been charged with 37 counts in a sex-torture case involving four women.

Blackburn also said he will request that Ms. Ray be tried separately from her father.

Another hearing for the Rays on July 2 will determine a likely schedule for the trial, Blackburn said. Ray's trial on the first 25 of the charges has been set for October.

Ray was charged based on the testimony of three

women who say they were held captive, often in chains, and sexually abused for days at his Elephant Butte residence.

The charges against Ms. Ray stem from the testimony of one of the women, who said Ms. Ray helped kidnap her in 1996. She said David Parker Ray sexually tortured her.

Ray's girlfriend, Cynthia Lea Hendy, also an accused co-conspirator, could testify against her codefendants under a plea agreement that still needs a judge's signature before it goes into effect.

Hendy, 39, was accused of teaming up with Ray to kidnap, torture and sodomize an Albuquerque woman in March and a Truth or Consequences woman in February. Hendy admitted being an accomplice during a plea hearing in April.

Prosecutors have said Hendy also could take the stand against the two other defendants - Ms. Ray

and Dennis Roy Yancy.

Yancy, 28, is accused of killing Marie Parker, who was last seen alive at an Elephant Butte bar in 1997. Parker's body has not been found.

Feds drop charges against Hendy

ALBUQUERQUE - A woman accused in an Elephant Butte sex-torture case has cut a deal ensuring she will not face federal charges for two kidnappings, the Albuquerque Journal reports.

Cynthia Lee Hendy received a letter from U.S. Attorney John J. Kelly, promising her she would not face the charges if there's ever a federal case, the Journal said today in a copyright story.

Ron Lopez, Kelly's spokesman, said the U.S. attorney's office would have no comment.

The deal was revealed in recently released audio recordings of an April plea agreement reached in state district court, the newspaper said.

Hendy, 39, pleaded guilty to five state charges involving the kidnapping and sexual torture of an Albuquerque woman and a woman from Truth or Consequences earlier this year.

Hendy originally faced 25 counts and up to 200 years in prison, but under the plea, she faces between 12 and 54 years.

Hendy's co-defendant, David Parker Bay, 59, faces 37 state charges, including criminal sexual penetration, kidnapping and aggravated battery.

"The U.S. attorney's office for the district of New Mexico agrees that it will not prosecute Hendy for her previously disclosed participation and criminal activity relating to (the two cases)," the April 6

The letter also indicates Hendy is cooperating with authorities.

"It is my ... understanding that Hendy will assist in the investigation of all crimes known to her, and that such assistance will include her truthful responses to questions placed to her by law enforcement officers, as well as assisting in the recovery of physical evidence known to her," the letter says.


Two women testified during Ray's preliminary hearing in April that they were abducted, sodomized, shocked with electricity, sexually tortured and kept captive in padlocked collars early this year.

A third woman later implicated Ray and his daughter, Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray, in an alleged abduction and sexual assault in 1996.

A fourth defendant, Dennis Roy Xancy, 27, is accused of killing Marie Parker, who was 22 in 1997 when she disappeared from a saloon in Elephant Butte. Yancy is a known associate of the Rays, authorities said.

All the accused have said they are innocent of the

State District Judge Neil P. Mertz ordered the conditions of Hendy's plea to remain sealed. Mertz has not finalized Hendy's plea deal with the state because he is waiting for her to complete a 60-day diagnostic evaluation. No sentencing date has been set.



Supreme Court declines to remove judge in sex, torture case

SANTA FE - The state's highest court is leaving it to a district judge in southern New Mexico to decide whether to order a joint trial for a father and daughter charged with kidnapping and sexually torturing a woman near Truth or Consequences.

The state Supreme Court decided Wednesday to allow District Judge Neil Mertz to preside over the case of David Parker Ray and his daughter, Glenda Jean "Jesse" Ray. Ms. Ray's lawyer had wanted to remove the judge from the

A three-member panel of justices, after an hourlong hearing, also directed Mertz to schedule a hearing and determine whether to combine the Rays' cases for trial and pre-trial proceedings - something prosecutors and defense lawyers favor, at least for now.

The Rays each face 12 charges stemming from the alleged abduction and

sexual assault of a Sierra County woman in 1996. David Ray also faces 25 counts related to the alleged kidnappings and sexual torture of two other women this year. The three women say they were held captive, often in chains, and sexually abused for days at David Ray's Elephant Butte residence.

The ruling by the Supreme Court settled an early procedural dispute that lawyers complained was slowing down the case.

At issue were two legal questions: could Ms. Ray's lawyer disqualify Mertz from handling the case and should the Rays be tried at the same time.

In criminal cases, defendants and the state have a right to remove a judge at the outset of a case without giving a reason. But that challenge can't be made after a person has asked the judge to "perform any discretionary

The high court concluded that Ms. Ray's lawyer, Billy Blackburn of Albubecause of a mistake he made in the

querque, was precluded from trying to wording of a document that was intenddisqualify Mertz because he had joined with the prosecution and David Ray's lawyer in asking the judge to decide matters involving the combined trial

The Supreme Court announced its ruling from the bench after deliberating for about 45 minutes. The justices had heard arguments from lawyers during the hourlong hearing. The court did not provide a detailed legal explanation of its decision, however.

Deputy District Attorney James Yontz and Blackburn said the ruling ensured that Mertz would preside over the Rays' cases even if they later had separate trials. The prosecution and defense lawyers were united in trying to disqualify Mertz and combine the Rays'

Mertz and Yontz work in the Socorro-based 7th Judicial District.

Yontz said the legal dispute arose

ed to automatically provide for a joint trial for the Rays. The mistake, Yontz said, made it appear that lawyers were asking the district court to decide whether to combine the cases.

Yontz said one trial for the Rays would save time and money. Separate trials could create the potential for different judges issuing conflicting rulings about the same evidence. But Yontz told the justices that he expected any trial to be moved from Sierra County to another location because of extensive publicity about the case.

Despite the high court's decision, it's possible that the question of the judge's removal could resurface in a future appeal.

Ŷontz, in written arguments filed with the court, warned that Ms. Ray's lawver would almost certainly appeal if she was convicted and challenge whether she had a proper trial because Mertz remained as presiding judge.

Yontz contended the failure to remove Mertz "will result in an exercise in futility giving us a trial which was void from the beginning, one in which there is no jeopardy and which will only be a practice run for the real trial when the case is reassigned to another judge." He said that's what happened in another criminal case decided by a 1993 ruling of the state Court of Appeals.

An Oct. 4 trial had been set for David Ray on the initial 25 charges against him, but Yontz said he expected that to be changed to a later date. Ray's girl-friend, Cynthia Lea Hendy, also is an accused co-conspirator in the case and has pleaded guilty to several charges as part of a plea agreement that needs a judge's signature before it takes effect.

Another defendant, Dennis Roy Yancy, is accused of killing a woman in 1997 whose body has not been found. Authorities say the murder case is tied to that of the Rays and Hendy but have not spelled out the connection.

CONSE-TRUTH OR QUENCES — Police are testing human tissue fished out of Elephant Butte Lake in June in hopes of determining whether they are male or female, a state police official said Thursday.

Police are looking for possible links to the Elephant Butte sex torture case, state police Lt. Mark Weaver said Thursday. Dennis Roy Yancy, 27, has been charged with murdering Marie Parker, who disappeared from an Elephant Butte saloon two years ago. Her body has not been found.

If the testing successfully determines that the tissue is female, Weaver said laboratory technicians will try to match DNA in the tissue with Parker's DNA.

It is possible other missing women connected to the case could can find samples of their DNA in ever, some were sent to a state tors.

hair, fingernails or similar items, Weaver said. He said police have been working with Parker's family to get DNA samples.

But if the tissue is too decomposed, it may not yield the needed information, Weaver said.

"The tissue is rather deteriorated and in rather bad shape, Weaver said. "With some further testing, we hope to determine the sex."

Sierra County Sheriff Terry Byers said Thursday the burlap bag containing the material is too small to contain an entire adult human body.

Byers said the tissue is "pale, fleshy looking material" in strips about 6 inches by 12 inches. They were found June 30 by a fisherman from El Paso.

The material was described as "flesh or tissue" that looked like internal organs, according to a police report. Weaver said investigators can't tell what part of the body the material is from.

Police analysts having problems identifying flesh

The Associated Press SANTA FE - Police analysts can't determine the sex or any other details about human fleshy material found in a bag in Elephant Butte Lake.

State Police Lieutenant Mark Weaver said Friday the material in the bag was old and police haven't been able to reveal any other details about it using DNA testing. The bag was discovered by a fisherman in June.

Analysts may try testing a different sample, Weaver said.

And, the FBI has another type of DNA test that may reveal something about the material, he said.

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Terrified victim says she broke free while being beaten with a lamp

ELEPHANT BUTTE/— A key witness in the <u>David Ray-Cynthia</u>. Hendy case says she escaped their den of torture while being beaten with a lann.

"I'm alive, I'm alive! Yes, I'm alive!" she told sheriff's deputies responding to neighbors' calls. "I broke free! I broke free!"

The woman who fled naked, wearing a metal collar padlocked to a chain, sought refuge March 22 in at least two passing cars and finally in a neighboring home.

"She came straight in" without knocking, Darleno Breech said in an interview Thursday. Breech said she furnished the terrified woman with a pink robe, then called 911

El Paso resident Doris Mitchell said the woman tried to get in her car as she was driving by. "She was wild- or scared-looking," Mitchell said Thursday. Mitchell said her car doors automatically lock at 15 mph, so the woman couldn't climb in.

"It's something you never expect,"
Mitchell said of the case, "It's something you read about, but never think
you're going to be close to."

Patricia Morne of Albuquerque told police the woman also tried to get in her car. Home declined to comment Thursday.

Minutes later, other neighbors — William and Frances Graham watched the arrest of co-defendants David Parker Ray and Cynthia Lea Hendy outside their home. Ray and Hendy were stopped in an RV headed in the direction of their mobile home a couple of blocks away. "They had them walk backwards and asked them to go down on the ground," Frances Graham said. "The other officers were holding their guns on them, and another officer went up and put handcuffs on them."

The arrest has mushroomed into a state-federal investigation in which a second woman has come forward with similar allegations.

Police documents released Thursday give the first comprehensive picture of what the first woman told police about the three days she spent in the double-wide mobile home where Ray and Hendy live. Court documents say that among evidence found in the home was a photograph of that same woman in bondage.

The woman says she was abducted March 19 in Albuquerque by Ray and Hendy posing as police officers, court documents say.

"David Ray showed her a small badge and told her she was under arrest for solicitation," one affidavit says. "Cindy Hendy then came out ... and handcuffed her." It says she was taken to Elephant Butte in restraints inside a recreational vehicle.

A Sierra County sheriff's report says that four days later, Ray left the woman alone with Hendy, and she broke free.

The 22-year-old Albuquerque woman told deputies "she got hold of

the key to the lock that was fied to the chain around her neck and unlocked it from the bed.

"While she was doing this the Sermale suspect was hitting her over the head with a famp. (She) said that she got loose add hit the female suspect over the head with a lamp to get free;" the sheriff's report says.

Another affidavit had said Hendy, hit the woman with a lamp and she lashed back with an ice pick.

A deputy and a maintenance main removed the woman's collar with tolt cutters. "She had blood and scratches all over her legs ... (and) more blood coming from her head," the report says.

Investigators reported finding broken glass at the trailer "and observed an array of sexual devices along with various restraint type devices that a befroom

The woman told deputies she had been beaten, raped and tortured "HVA" man named David ... and his girliftend."


A Truth or Consequences woman reported similar allegations Feb. 21 after being released by the co-defendants, another court affidavit says. That woman said she went to the Ray. Hendy home to pick up a cake mix then was taken captive, chained and tortured with sexual devices and electric shock, the affidavit says.

Criminal complaints filed against the Rays on Monday in Sierra County Magistrate Court allege they kidnapped a woman in late July 1996 and sexually attacked her several times.

Prosecutor Jim Yontz said the alleged crimes occurred on David Ray's property ___ the same place where he's accused of torturing two other kidnapping victims earlier this year.

A law enforcement source involved in the investigation said Monday the alleged ordeal lasted four days and involved torture similar to what two other alleged victims experienced earlier this year. Those women have testified they were given electric shocks, sodomized,

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1: . The elder Ray has been in the Sierra County jail since his arrest late , of killing Marie B. Parker, a Truth or fast month. Yontz said he believes Glenda Ray has been staying at her dad's home on Bass Road since she returned from Texas shortly after his arrest.

Glenda and David Ray are each charged with kidnapping, six counts of criminal sexual penetration, criminal sexual contact, assault with intent to commit a violent felony and three counts of conspiracy. But court affidavits that provide more details about the alleged 1996 crimes were sealed by a judge.

David Ray also faces 25 charges for kidnapping and torturing the two other women this year.

Monday's arrest was the fourth in the case: David-Ray's girlfriend, 39year-old Cynthia Lea Hendy, was arrested with him late last month on suspicion of taking part in the

Yontz said Glenda Ray will likely be formally advised of the charges against her today.

Richardson said Monday that investigators are continuing to work on the case involving Jill Troia, an Albuquerque woman who disappeared in September 1995. Glenda Ray was reportedly with Troia at a Central Avenue bar the night of her disappearance.

In the early 1990s, she drove a cab, he said. Later she worked at Nunzio's Pizza in Albuquerque, Kitts said she's also been a mechanic.

He called her "quiet, reserved and

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laid-back."

"She's not the kind of person to be noticed in a big crowd," he said. "She's off to the side in a corner, smoking a cigarette and drinking her beer."

He added that while she can be charming, he has seen her become extremely angry.

For most of her adult life, she's lived in New Mexico, though Kitts said she would sometimes travel to Texas and Louisiana for months at a time. She briefly stayed with defendant Yancy when he was living in Galveston, according to Heather Norton, another friend.

Teri <u>Hafenbrack of Albuquerque</u>, said she lived with Glenda Ray for about 10 years and has continued to see her off and on for the past four years.

"She's a kind and caring individual," Hafenbrack said before Glenda Ray's arrest. "I've known her for 18 years, and I don't think she's involved in anything that her father may have done — not at all."

Albuquerque police have interviewed the younger Ray numerous times, including during several domestic violence incidents.

In November 1992, Hafenbrack told police Glenda Ray had threatened and pushed her several times.

Almost a year later, Hafenbrack reported another assault, telling police that Glenda Ray hit her and took her car without permission.

In both cases, Hafenbrack didn't pursue the charges.

In August 1995, Glenda Ray was living near relatives in Bernalillo County's South Valley. She stayed at Hafenbrack's home for a few days and reportedly got into another domestic dispute. Glenda Ray told police she had Maced Tammy Younglove, Hafenbrack's roommate, in self-defense. A witness told police. Glenda Ray sprayed the Mace when Younglove asked her to leave.

Marie B. Parker's 22 years were filled with plenty of rough spots before she disappeared from an Elephant Butte bar on July 5, 1997. She had run away from home for

several years. She and her two toddlers briefly lived out of her Geo Metro.

And a man who wanted to marry her said she was too entangled in the Truth or Consequences drug culture.

Yancy, of Truth or Consequences, charging him with Parker's murder.

Yancy's arrest was the third in the Elephant Butte sexual torture and kidnapping case. The pwo other sus-pects, Dayld Parkerikay and Cyn-thin Lea Hendy, are accused of kidnapping and torturing two other women earlier this year but have not been charged with homicide.

Authorities have said Parker's murder is related to the other cases, · but they haven't explained how. Parker and Yancy dated years ago, said Tom McCaulcy, Parker's half-brother.

McCauley described Yancy as "strange" and said his sister didn't remain friends with Yancy after they stopped dating.

"She tried to avoid him as much as possible," he said.

McCauley also said his sister was

friends with Jessel Ray — the daughter of David Ray.

For days, McCauley has been watching television newscasters talk about his sister, he said Monday. Police haven't called to speak with the family, he said, and they only know what the news tells them.

Though police haven't found her body, McCauley said, he has lost hope that she's still alive.

"It angers me to hear about these people, these so-called friends," he said. "I don't understand how they could do such a thing."

McCauley, 18, remembered his sister as a wonderful person who shared with the poor, often giving food and shelter to homeless people. He last saw his sister on the day she disappeared.

"I just want people to know how good a person she was," McCauley said. "She never once did anything to deserve this. Nobody deserves omething like this."

When Marie was 14, she ran away

from their Belen home for about five years, her mother told police, returning pregnant with the first of her two children. Kate Parker is now caring for the

two girls, ages 4 and 5, in her Albuquerque home. She said she moved the family out of Truth or Consequences to "get a fresh start" after Marie disappeared.

When Marie was reported missing, Kate Parker suggested that police look for her at the State Fair and at a Central Street motel in Albuquerque, telling them -she hooked (as a prostitute) out of according to the police there."

Marie Parker was never arrested for solicitation in Albuquerque or Truth or Consequences.

Kate Parker also told police Marie had an older brother in prison in Nevada on a murder charge. Marie, she said, testified against her brother and her fiancé.

In Truth of Consequences, she couldn't pull herself away from the drug culture, according to her friend Larry Brock.

Brock, who lives in Center Point, Texas, said he wanted to marry Parker, but he "couldn't live, with the fact that she was running around with druggies."

Police interviewed people who said Parker used cocaine and speed.

And after she disappeared, another former boyfriend told police he thought she had "freaked out on drugs" and had gone to Texas: -Julie Yawrence of Beled, whose

family took Marie in as a foster child when she was a teen-ager, took care of Parker's two young daughters after she disappeared.

Lawrence told police that Marie

had broken off her relationship with Brock and had pawned the diamond ring he gave her.

The officer checked with a Truth or Consequences pawn shop. An employee there confirmed that Marie had pawned the "roughly." carat yellow-gold ring" for a couple of hundred dollars.



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Woman Named

As Alleged Tor C Victim

Investigators in the Elephant Butte kidnapping, sexual torture and murder case on Saturday were trying to find the body of a woman who allegedly was killed by one of their three suspects.

About 10 State Police officers and FBI agents gathered along N.M. 195 west of Elephant Butte on Saturday afternoon, and some of them had shovels in hand. They made measurements near a large map posted in the ground along the roadway.

State Police Lt. Greg Richardson confirmed the investigators were looking for the remains of Marie B. Parker — who was 22 and the mother of two girls when she disappeared from the Blue Waters Saloon in Elephant Butte on July 5, 1997.

The team spent about two hours at the site, then searched for another 30 minutes at a second spot about a quarter of a mile to the west. They didn't find any remains, but Richardson said the investigators did pick up several items. He would not say what those items were and said that "we don't know if they're related or not."

The man accused of killing Parker, 27-year-old Dennis Roy Yancy of Truth or Consequences, was arrested late Friday. The other two suspects in the case, David Parker, Ray and Cynthia Lea Hendy, are accused of kidnapping and torturing two other women earlier this year but have not been charged with homicide.

Saturday's work on N.M. 195 came after State Police investigators took Yancy from the Sierra County Detention Center, then returned him. They would not say where they had taken Yancy. But Richardson said investigators "received some information" that the spot along the road "would be a good place to look" for Parker's remains.

"That's been our main objective today," he said.

Yancy has been charged with murder, kidnapping, conspiracy to commit murder, conspiracy to commit kidnapping and tampering with evidence, Richardson has said and a judge has ordered Yancy held without bond.

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He was shackled and wearing a brown T-shirt and beige pants when State Police investigators returned him to the Sierra County lockup just before 3 p.m. When a reporter asked Yancy if he knew what charges he was facing, Yancy said that he did. When asked if he had anything to say, Yancy said, "No, not at this time."

Investigators have said repeatedly the case could involve other victims and other suspects. And Seventh Judicial District Attorney Ron Lopez said Saturday that Yancy's arrest "is not the end."

We don't anticipate this is the end infithe line," Lopez said. "It's clear (that) it's starting to develop."

Dopez said he does not believe a victim's body is needed to charge a suspect with murder.

Parker's car, a 1993 Geo Metro, was found in the lot of the Blue Waters Saloon after she was reported missing by her half-brother, Tom McCauley, according to a Sierra County Sheriff's Department missing person report.

The report said that according to McCauley, he and someone named Kevin J. Renkin, were with Parker on July 5 when she told McCauley, she was going to the Blue Waters and would be back in about two hours.

The report said Renkin confirmed that "Marie was going to Blue Waters to meet with two individuals," the report said.

Renkin said he believed Parker was going to meet two people hamed Clay and David, the report atd, but he did not know David's

last name.

Several years ago, Yancy bagged Efficiency at Bullocks grocery store in Truth or Consequences. Employes there remembered him as friendly.

I thought he was a real good guy, real friendly. We never had any problems with him," said Brenda Miller, the store's bakery manager.

"He's just a happy-go-lucky kid," said head cashier Grace Gilbert.

Brian Pape, an assistant manager for the store's liquor department, said, "I wouldn't call him normal. He's a little off, but it didn't seem like he'd hurt anybody. He's just sort of goofy. Smiling, laughing."

More recently, Pape said, he'd seen Yancy come into the store with friends in the morning to buy beer: "Old Milwaukee 16-ouncers."

Lopez would not specify where the alleged murder took place but said it was in Sierra County. He also would not specify who Yancy is accused of conspiring with for the alleged murder and kidnapping.

State law requires prosecutors to have a preliminary hearing for Yancy within 10 days of his arrest if he remains in jail, Lopez said. The preliminary hearing for Hendy and Ray is set for Thursday and Friday in Truth or Consequences.

The investigation began March 22 when one of Ray's neighbors saw a 22-year-old woman naked and bloody on the road. Court papers said she had a padlocked collar around her neck.

The court papers said that, according to the woman, she had been kidnapped in Albuquerque on March 20 and taken to Ray's home, where she was assaulted and beaten before she escaped.

Court papers relating to another alleged victim said that on Feb. 17, she went to Ray's home to pick up a cake mix. She told investigators she

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
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was kidnapped by the duo, who were armed with a knife and a gun.

According to court affidavits, the second woman was "stripped of her clothes and was bound with (a) metal neck collar and other restraints."

She allegedly was held for five days before persuading her captors to let her go.

FBI agents and State Police spent nearly two weeks at Ray's home, collecting more than 1,000 pieces of material for evidence. Officials confirmed they found photos of other possible victims and were told of an "orientation" videotape that reportedly told kidnapping victims what they could expect during their capture.



Authorities s searching Ray's mobile home for clues

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES — FBI .. agents and State Police investigators were searching the residence of sex-torture suspect David Parker Ray again today.

"They've executed a search warrant," said State Police Lt. Greg Richardson. "We | have evidence-collection people at the residence."

It's the second time in recent weeks that investigators have searched the Elephant Butte mobile home of David Parker Ray, one of four people charged in the case.

Two alleged victims, one from Albuquerque and another from Truth or Consequences, testified this month at Ray's preliminary hearing that they were abducted, shocked with electricity, sexually tortured and kept captive in padlocked collars.

Richardson said the latest search was prompted by new information police obtained in the case.

"They've come up with additional information from following up on leads," he said. "They felt it was necessary to get another search warrant to look for new evidence that could help with the cases of peoidentify any other victims."

Richardson said investigators had called in some heavy equipment in the event they decided to begin digging in Ray's yard. Such a search would depend on what investigators uncovered in their search of the residence, he said

On Tuesday, the lawyer for one of two women charged in the case said he expects more arrests after his client — Ray's daughter — was charged.

"I just think from looking at some of the affidavits that have been produced in this case and talking to members of the district attorney's office, I've got to believe there are going to be more charges coming for

Investigators also have not ruled out the possibility of more victims or arrests in the case that began March 22 when a bloody woman fled Ray's mobile home wearing only a padlocked collar. The investigation, which tapped nearly a hundred FBI agents and State Police officers in its early stages, has generated more than 1,000 pieces of evidence and scores of leads involving as many as 10 states.

"We're getting a lot of calls every day," all day long," Richardson said Tuesday.

A May 11 preliminary hearing was scheduled for Glenda Ray. Hendy has waived her preliminary hearing and intends to plead guilty to five of 25 counts against her, including accessory and conspiracy charges, her lawyer has said.

Yancy who is accused of killing Marie B. Parker in July 1997, is scheduled for a May 25 preliminary hearing. Her body has not been found.

Glenda Ray was arrested Monday at her small lakeside resort northeast of Truth or Consequences, and charged with 12 counts, including kidnapping, criminal sexual penetration and assault.

Prosecutors filed an identical dozen charges against her father, bringing the number of charges Ray faces to 37, Ray, · who has pleaded not guilty, earlier was bound over for trial on 25 counts. FLED /

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
