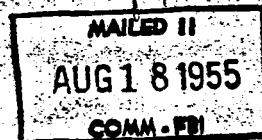

[redacted] advised 9/22/55, that captioned individual, a former WAC officer who was assigned as secretary, aid and chauffeur to President Eisenhower, while he was European Commander, was [redacted] under an assumed name. The Director indicated "See if we can discreetly get the name."

[redacted] contacted re an attempt to procure name assumed by Summersby. He later called back, 9/27/55, and advised his [redacted]

[redacted] did not reveal interest of FBI in matter and it has been indicated to him that interest in this stems from personal curiosity and has no connection with the FBI.

Bureau files reflect little concerning Summersby. She was attacked by one Marion Bryant, Negro, 2/12/47, at WAC Officers Quarters, Hamilton Field, California. Subject tried and convicted of intent to commit rape and sentenced to 15 years imprisonment. Summersby married on 11/20/52 to Reginald H. Morgan, of New Canaan, Connecticut, a Wall Street broker. She is currently 46 years of age, born in Ireland and served in British Armed Forces before becoming a WAC Captain in U. S. Army Auxiliary. While President Eisenhower was Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, Summersby served as confidential secretary, aid and driver. In 1948, she wrote and published a book entitled "Eisenhower Was My Boss."

Summersby has been married twice. Her first marriage ended in divorce in England, in July, 1943, when her husband, Gordon Summersby,

She wrote a book of her close association with General Eisenhower published in 1948, and entitled "Eisenhower Was My Boss." Her first marriage ended in divorce.

When the Attorney General investigated the failure of the [redacted] to the F. B. I. on questionable activities by a certain clothing manufacturer, [redacted] discovered that some of the G. A. O. staff had been instructed by McCarthy to hold back such information until McCarthy felt the right time had come for producing it. Sherman Adams remarked dryly that the G. A. O. staff situation was being corrected."

O. files are there any memos or directives to show that any instructions were given orally or in writing by Senator McCarthy to hold back information from the FBI until McCarthy felt that the right time had come to produce it nor could anyone handling the Celler investigation at G. A. O. recall any such oral instructions from McCarthy. [redacted] advised that there is nothing in the files of the Committee to show that Senator McCarthy had ever instructed G. A. O. not to give the FBI any information and that there is no one on the Committee that knew of any such instructions. [redacted] Senator McCarthy felt that somebody should ask Brownell to explain just what he meant because there is certainly nothing, either in the Committee's records or at G. A. O., to indicate that any such instructions were given by Senator McCarthy.

Reference is made to my memorandum to you dated July 8, 1956, concerning statements appearing in the book by Robert J. Donovan entitled "Eisenhower: The Inside Story." These statements indicated that the Attorney General investigated the failure of the General Accounting Office (GAO) to report to the FBI on questionable activities of a certain clothing manufacturer and that the GAO staff had been instructed by Senator McCarthy to hold back such information. As I pointed out in the July 8, 1956, memorandum, Joseph Campbell, Comptroller General, had requested clarification from this Bureau regarding the statements appearing in the Donovan book.

Comptroller General Campbell has been advised that the question as to whether the FBI could or could not clarify the statements in the Donovan book is academic; that, as a matter of propriety, this is something which should be left to the Attorney General. Mr. Campbell stated he understood and intended to contact the Attorney General in the next few days. Campbell commented that he had checked and had determined that the McCarthy Committee in 1954 furnished information to the GAO concerning [redacted] and asked for a GAO investigation. When this investigation indicated possible criminal activity, the GAO went to the committee indicating that the matter had proceeded to the point where it should possibly be referred to the Department of Justice. The committee indicated to the GAO that it would take care of the matter. Therefore, according to Campbell, the GAO's hands were tied and they could take no further action. This statement is similar to information furnished to you by this Bureau in a memorandum dated July 11, 1955, which was confidentially furnished by Mr. William L. Ellis of the GAO.

Campbell has also indicated to a representative of this Bureau that several days prior to the July, 1955, Cabinet meeting on which the comments in the Donovan book were based, Sherman Adams called him and stated that he had received information that a GAO employee might be personally involved in an inquiry being made by GAO. Campbell said he would check into it and if true, would see that the employee was removed from any work on this particular case. Campbell stated that the statement by Sherman Adams in the Donovan book might be based on this conversation.

This is to advise the Attorney General's reply to Senator John L. McClellan, furnished by Rogers 7/6/56, requesting Bureau comments, has been reviewed and statements therein are in accord with the facts as known to this Bureau. Memorandum so advising Rogers enclosed.

This concerns a statement in Robert Donovan's book "Eisenhower: The Inside Story" wherein the Attorney General is quoted at a Cabinet meeting concerning Senator McCarthy instructing General Accounting Office (GAO) to withhold information concerning clothing contractor from the FBI.

The proposed letter to Senator McClellan, after identifying the remarks in the Donovan book, furnishes facts known to the Department concerning this matter. The letter highlights the dates of the committee hearings, discusses information developed by the committee indicating a criminal violation, and outlines the Department's handling of this matter, including investigation by the Bureau. The letter further indicates that the Department made arrangements with the Comptroller General in 1955 to have allegations of Fraud Against the Government referred to the FBI by GAO promptly. The letter concludes that because this understanding with the Comptroller General would preclude a repetition the subject was carried no further. Specific references to the Bureau contained in the letter are set out below, together with pertinent facts from the Bureau files. **62-81742-**

In the meantime we contacted GAO who advised some investigation had been conducted, but committee clearance would be necessary before the results of that investigation could be furnished to us. You will recall that Robert Kennedy on 5/11/55, refused to furnish information developed by GAO or the committee until committee hearings then scheduled for 5/18/55, were completed.

Inasmuch as we only had general information and not the specific allegations, and sources thereof were denied us by the committee at that time, the matter was referred to the Criminal Division for decision as to whether the investigation should proceed or should be deferred pending completion of the committee hearings.

A news article dated June 25, 1956, in the "Daily Mirror," a New York newspaper, reflects that Maxwell Rabb, a Cabinet secretary, was summoned, on June 24, 1956, by Senate Investigators, to explain why an author was given access to secret White House information denied to members of Congress. The Senate Investigations Subcommittee Chairman, Senator McClellan (D. Ark), announced that Rabb had been asked to appear on June 26, concerning information which appeared in the book written by Donovan, a Washington News man.

The book in question is entitled "The Inside Story" deals with the Eisenhower administration. It is alleged to contain the confidential minutes of Cabinet meetings, advisory opinions and other information which the Executive Branch has withheld from Congressional Committees. Chairman McClellan noted particularly that the White House had refused to make available information on the decontrol of embargoed trade goods sent by NATO allies to the Soviet Union and other communist countries.

News releases on June 25 and 26 concerning this matter indicate that Maxwell Rabb has denied furnishing any information to Donovan in connection with the publication of Donovan's book and further stated that to his knowledge, none of his staff gave confidential minutes of Cabinet meetings to Donovan. Rabb declined to appear before the McClellan Committee as requested to testify regarding the information in Donovan's book which is to be released to the public next Monday. Excerpts from Donovan's book previously appeared in the Washington "Star."

OBSERVATIONS:

1. Based on information appearing in the press, it appears that the request for Rabb to appear is based on an old point which has been raised many times between the Executive and Legislative Branches of the Government, namely, the right of Congress to have access to information in the files of the Executive Branch of Government.

2. Information in the files of the Executive Branch of the Government is classified under an Executive Order and it appears that it is the prerogative of the White House to declassify that information for such purposes as it deems advisable.

3. Maxwell Rabb has denied furnishing information from White House files to Donovan, and there is, in fact, no specific allegation as to what information was actually leaked to Donovan which was denied to the Congressional Committee. Therefore, it would appear that so far as this allegation is concerned, we should institute no investigation. The question as to what may be classified information is one which the White House is in a position to resolve.

RECOMMENDATION:

Since Donovan's book should contain much information of interest to the Bureau, it is recommended that the Crime Records Section obtain a copy of the book when it becomes available and that the book be reviewed.

R. representing Communism, I believe that our cause would be furthered if tens of thousands of these definitions of Communism were hanging in homes, schools, stores, and offices all over the world.

If you wish copies to send to your friends and acquaintances, I am happy to tell you that [redacted] is prepared to make them available at cost (i. e., reproduction plus shipping expenses). Small pocket size cards bearing the definition have also been prepared. Please address your inquiry to me.

In addition to making this definition available in these forms in English, consideration is being given to reproducing it in the other principal languages of the world.

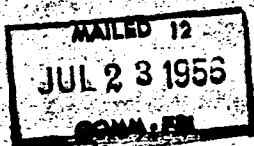

THE BOOK

"Eisenhower: The Inside Story," a pro-Eisenhower book concerning Eisenhower's first three years in the White House, gives an account of Cabinet meeting discussions and high-level conferences, neatly interspersed with incidents in lighter moments which serve to enliven the book, from pre-inauguration sessions in New York to the President's decision of February 29, 1956, to run for a second term.

While it would be impossible, from a practical standpoint, to mention all of the many and varied topics covered in this 407-page book, some of the items of particular interest to this Bureau include:

1. The President's decision in connection with the Rosenbergs' appeal for clemency. (Chapter 3; pp.42-47)
2. Civil Rights. (Chapter 11; pp.154-163)
3. The Brownell-Truman-Harry Dexter White Affair. (Chapter 12; pp.177-182)
4. Eisenhower and McCarthy--refusal to descend to McCarthy's level--Zwicker, Stevens and Peress Case--the Army-McCarthy Hearings. (Chapter 18; pp.243-258)
5. The Administration's revision of the Employee Security Program--Executive Order 10450--Ladejinsky and Chasanow Cases--Oppenheimer. (Chapter 21; pp.285-299)
6. Racial tensions and disorders in the South--the Director's reports to the Cabinet. (Chapter 29; pp.389-391)

REFERENCES TO THE FBI

There are numerous references to the FBI and/or the Director, none of which appear to be critical.

Cabinet Members Investigated

On page 80, the author indicates that when the President began his selection of high officials of his administration before his inauguration, he made it clear that those chosen must have records of conduct beyond reproach and that he (Eisenhower) let it be known that they must expect a systematic inquiry into their backgrounds, and even members of the Cabinet were subjected to full field investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Bohlen Nomination

In connection with the President's fight with Congress over the nomination of Charles E. Bohlen as Ambassador to the Soviet Union, there are several references to the FBI. On page 87, the author states: "On March 20 McCarran (Senator) charged in the Senate that R. W. Scott McLeod, the State Department security officer, had been 'unable to clear' Bohlen 'on the basis of information received from the FBI' but that McLeod had been 'summarily overridden' by Dulles." On page 88, he states: "Dulles had assured the Foreign Relations Committee that an FBI investigation had left 'no doubt' that Bohlen was loyal and was not a security risk." Further on page 88, he says: "Still, McCarthy and McCarran had stirred up such a tempest that on March 23 Taft and Senator John J. Sparkman, of Alabama, the 1952 Democratic Vice-Presidential nominee, agreed to act as a sort of two-man Senate jury and read the FBI summary of the Bohlen file."

Harry Dexter White Case

References to the FBI in connection with the Harry Dexter White case are as follows:

Page 178--"Brownell said that on December 4, 1945, an FBI report on the 'espionage activities' of White was delivered to Truman at the White House through his military aide, Brigadier General Harry H. Vaughan....The FBI, according to Brownell, then prepared a second report on White and gave it to Vaughan on February 4, 1946, 'for delivery to the President.'"

Page 179--"Truman explained that he first learned of the accusations against White early in 1947 through an FBI report brought him by Vaughan and through a warning from James F. Byrnes, then Secretary of State, who also had seen the report."

Page 180--Truman, after consultations with members of his Cabinet, decided to let White's nomination and appointment take its normal course, because "any unusual action might have alerted White to the FBI investigation being made of himself and others and thus imperiled it."

The author states: "Brownell and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover subsequently appeared before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee and testified that Truman's decision to retain White had hampered rather than helped the FBI investigation. Hoover said he had never agreed to it."

Page 181--At the President's press conference, November 11, 1953, a reporter asked, "What did you understand was the purpose of bringing information from the files of the FBI before a luncheon group instead of some official body, such as a grand jury or another body of Congress...?" The President replied he had not considered

the point since he had merely been told that certain information was going to be made public.

Page 182--At a Cabinet meeting on November 12, 1953, "Brownell told the Cabinet that in the controversy then raging the point should be stressed that the FBI reports actually went to the White House before White was promoted."

Security-Government Printing Office

Page 246--In connection with McCarthy's subcommittee investigations into security regulations in the GPO, it is stated: "...McCarthy and GPO officials got into a dispute as to whether the FBI file on a certain bookbinder listed forty informants as having reported that the man had engaged in Communist activities."

J. Robert Oppenheimer

Page 294--"On November 7, 1953, William L. Borden, former executive secretary of the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy, sent a letter to J. Edgar Hoover saying that 'more probably than not J. Robert Oppenheimer is an agent of the Soviet Union.'"

Pages 294-295--"After Borden's letter arrived, the FBI prepared an inch-thick summary report on Oppenheimer--the full Oppenheimer dossier, when stacked up, rises, it is said, four feet and six inches above the floor--and distributed it, along with copies of the letter, to the White House and interested government departments on November 30."

Page 295--"Simultaneously another copy had gone out from the FBI to the Pentagon, where it caused a shock."

General Accounting Office-Brownell

Page 341--"When the Attorney General investigated the failure of the GAO to report to the FBI on questionable activities by a certain clothing manufacturer, he discovered that some of the GAO staff had been instructed by McCarthy to hold back such information until McCarthy felt the right time had come for producing it."

July 9, 1956

Racial Tensions

The March 9, 1956, Cabinet meeting considered segregation.

Page 390 - "J. Edgar Hoover was present and made a long report."

The author continues: "In discussing resistance to segregation he noted that Democratic Senator James O. Eastland of Mississippi, new chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, had urged resistance at a meeting in Birmingham, Alabama, on February 10, saying, 'The Anglo-Saxon people have held steadfast to the belief that resistance to tyranny is obedience to God.' Hoover informed the Cabinet, however, that Eastland had not advocated violence. He quoted the Senator as having said at the same meeting, - 'The fight we wage must be a just and legal fight. Acts of violence and lawlessness have no place in our organization.' He reviewed the Negro boycott of buses in Montgomery, Alabama, in protest against segregation, and the disorders at the University of Alabama to bar the admission of a Negro student, Autherine Lucy. Hoover called the latter a 'disgraceful incident.'

"He then reported that the Communist Party was trying to infiltrate the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, but that the association remained anti-Communist.

"The Communists have decided now,' he continued, 'to concentrate their activities in Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi since these are the growing areas of industrial concentration where Communists think they have their best chance to infiltrate and expand the party strength. The party is now engaged in an active program to send party members from the New England States to these three states where they will concentrate in the textile industry.

"The Communists intend to inject the Negro question into every possible issue. They claim that the unfortunate and brutal killing of fourteen-year-old Emmett Till in Greenwood, Mississippi, in August, 1955, is the finest thing that has happened from their standpoint. For public consumption they claim that the Till case is an historic event and the turning point in the Negro struggle for liberation."

"The antisegregation white Citizens Councils throughout the South, Hoover said, 'either could control the rising tensions or become the medium through which tensions might manifest themselves.' The FBI knew of 127 of these which had come into existence since the Supreme Court decision on school segregation. Hoover told the (p.390) Cabinet: 'The Councils' program in some areas in applying economic pressure already has begun to make itself felt.'

Memorandum for Mr. Nichols

July 9, 1956

"He cited a number of cases. For example: 'A Negro dentist was told by the local bank he would be given no more financial assistance. A Negro gas-station operator who refused to put up a sign FOR COLORED ONLY was notified by the gas distributor that he would have to pay cash for oil and gas in advance. The local bank fixed a short deadline on his repayment of a loan. A doctor who was a member of the N.A.A.C.P. was told by patients that their employers would not pay their doctor bills in the future.

"Calm, judicious judgment, public education and real understanding are needed to avert explosive incidents,' Hoover concluded. 'The area of danger lies in friction between extremists on both sides ready with violence.'

"During the ensuing discussion Hoover said that the sale of firearms had increased significantly in the South--by 400 per cent in one community, he said, citing an extreme case."

CONCLUSION:

Inasmuch as references to this Bureau concern matters already widely publicized and in view of apparent non-critical nature of these references, Bufiles were not checked.

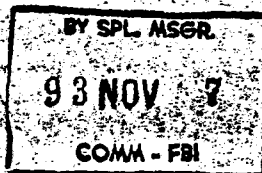

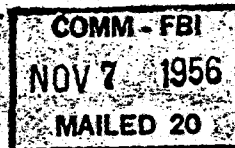

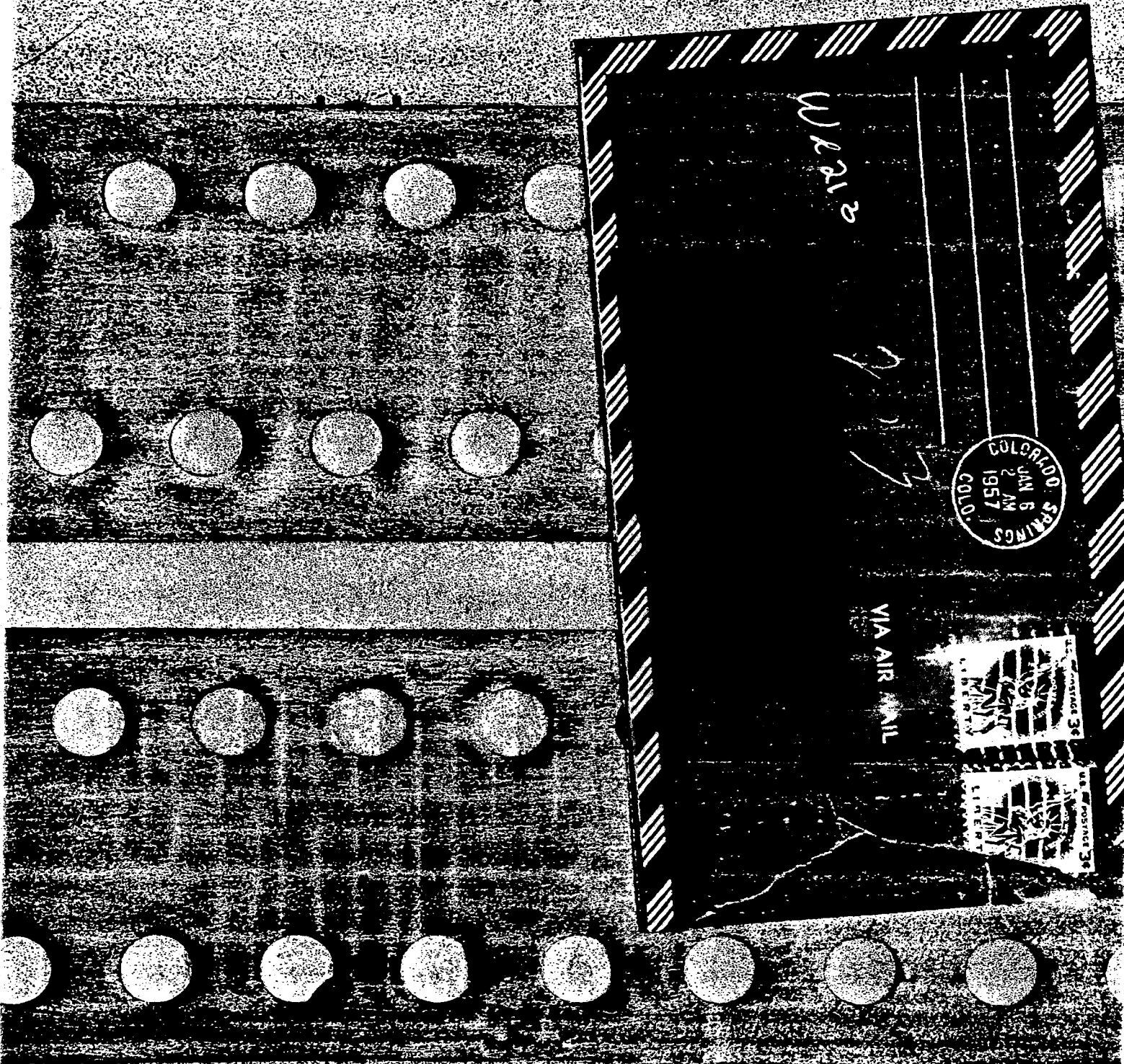

Pre-Colombian jewels with such an alloy become more and more rare and difficult to find as most of them appear very deteriorated due to the natural corrosion produced in the ground. But it happens that this one is in fine condition and complete.

Well, the last December Police Gazette on pages 3-4 brings a sensational report on the subject. And something of interest: practicing one of my hobbies -science of "radiesthesis"- the pendulum reveals and ratifies this, in relation with the en-closed pictures:

- Hitler is still alive;
- Borgman is dead;
- Hitler's dog is also dead;
- Hitler is in Switzerland but is really in Argentine at present!

I always thought that he was too much of a yellow devil, and with no family or military tradition to commit suicide.

When, -and if I come to the States-I will try to see you and communicate to you from person to person, something very serious concerning my last letter to you.

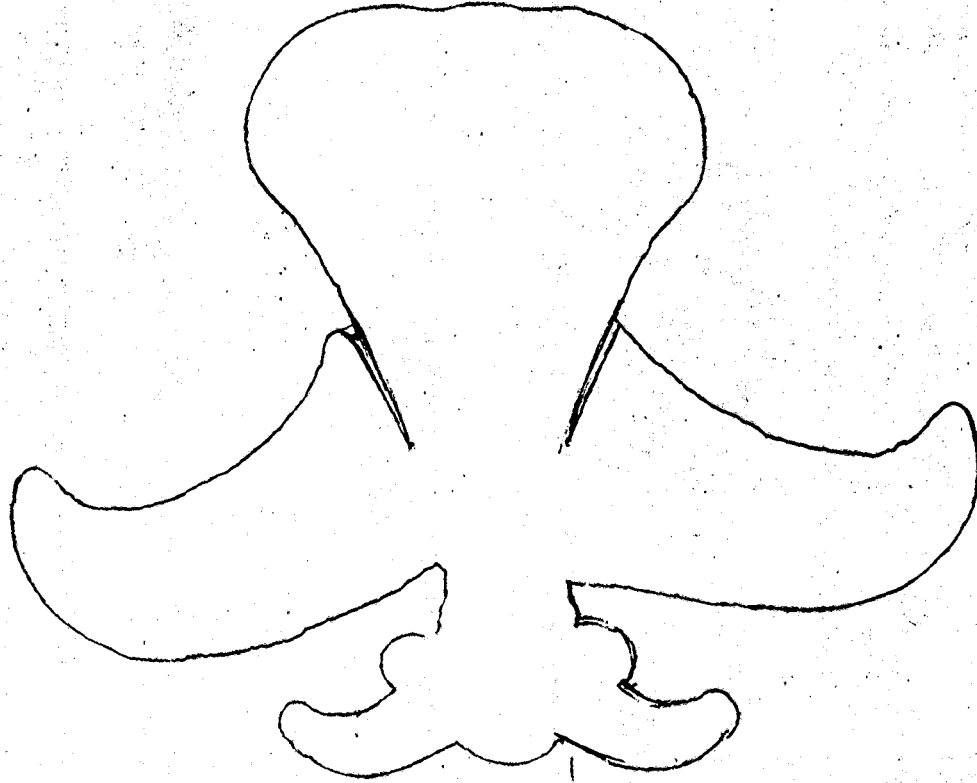

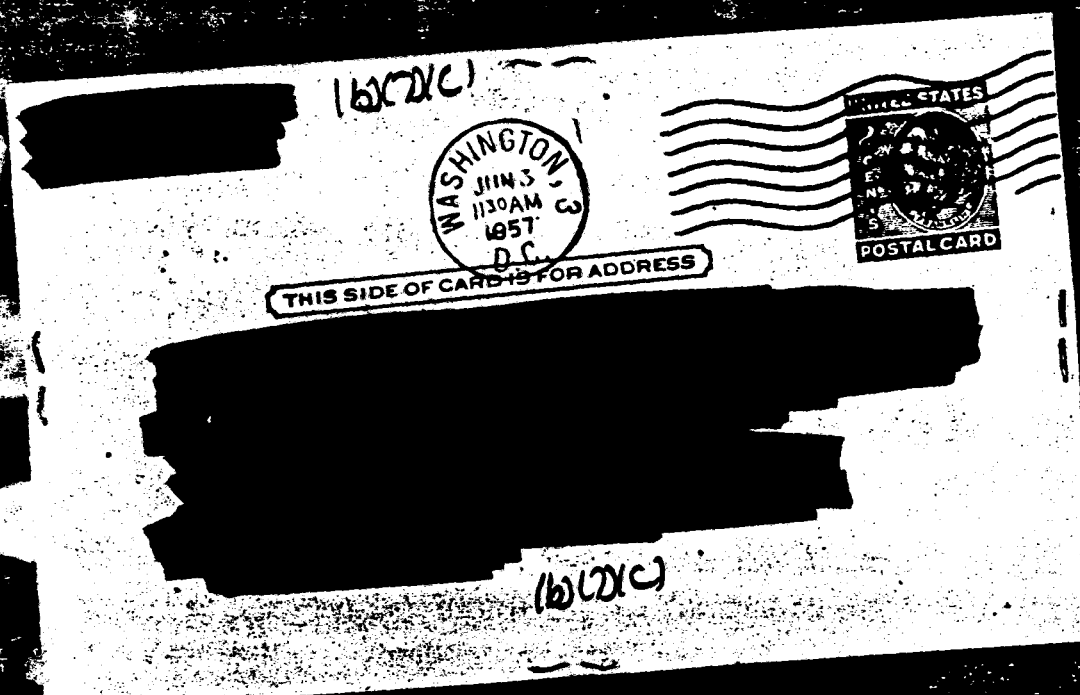

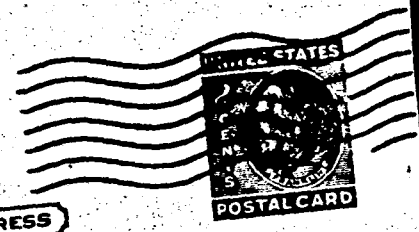

(b)(7)(C) [redacted] of the Liaison Section today contacted Mr. James Hagerty, Press Secretary to the President, in connection with the President's appearance at the FBI National Academy graduation November 8, 1957. [redacted] handed Mr. Hagerty a copy of the program. This interview took place immediately following Mr. Hagerty's announcement concerning the Attorney General leaving. Mr. Hagerty notices that Mr. Brownell was scheduled to give out the diplomas and said he was not sure exactly when Mr. Brownell was leaving and that we should take up this point with the Attorney General.

The 8th will be Brownell's last day. A.

(b)(7)(C) Mr. Hagerty advised [redacted] that he is extremely tired and that he had hoped to get away on vacation but that this has been delayed and if he is in Washington or even New York, he will attend both the banquet on November 6 and the graduation on November 8. Concerning the graduation, Mr. Hagerty stated that if he comes with the President he will sit on the platform if the Director insists, otherwise he will sit with the press. Mr. Hagerty stated that at the most one White House staff member will sit on the platform with the President; that the President does not like a large entourage.

He should do so. Concerning the President's appearance on the platform, Mr. Hagerty said that the persons who are to be on the platform other than the Director and the President should take their places on the platform and that the President and the Director (the President standing on the Director's right) will appear in the doorway at which time the Marine Band will play Ruffles and Flourishes. After this phrase is sounded four times, the band then plays "Hail to the Chief," at which time the President and the Director will step forward to their chairs and remain standing until the entire piece is played.

Mr. Hagerty told [redacted] that he would like to announce the President's appearance at this graduation on Thursday October 31, and asked [redacted] if he could hand to him prior to this time a writeup on the FBI National Academy, the retraining session and the graduation. [redacted] said that he would see to it that this material was made available to him.

O'Connor, Administrator, Bureau of Security and Consular Affairs, Department of State. Such information should be confirmed by letter to Mr. O'Connor and to Mr. U. E. Baughman, Chief, United States Secret Service, Treasury Department, Washington, D. C. If information of a security nature is received and of interest to Mr. Dulles or the President, same should be furnished telephonically to the duty officer in Mr. O'Connor's office and to [redacted] who will notify the appropriate White House official. Letters of confirmation should be addressed to Mr. O'Connor and to Mr. Robert Cutler, Special Assistant to the President, Executive Office Building, Washington, D. C. *(b)(7)(C)*

The title to be used would depend upon the nature of the information involved. If a threat against the life of the President, the title could be as in instant caption. If the information involved is of a security nature, the appropriate title to which the information pertains might be used. In that event, the first paragraph should include the statement, "In connection with the Secretary of State's (the President's) visit to Canada on July 8-10, 1958, we have been advised of the following: *EX-128* REG-31 *62-81742-159*

After July 7, 1958, depending upon the urgency of the information involved, same will be forwarded by the most appropriate method of communication to the Legal Attache, Ottawa, Canada, for attention [redacted]. The most urgent method of communication would naturally be by telephone, otherwise by cable, [redacted].

It will be noted that no mention was made in the debates of the FBI. Also that the debate apparently originated with an article appearing in the "Printed Word." I have been unable to obtain a copy of this.

The matter was again brought up in the House of Commons on Tuesday, 7-8-58, and there are enclosed an article from "The Ottawa Citizen," Ottawa, Ontario, dated 7-8-58, and two articles from "The Ottawa Journal," dated 7-9-58, reporting on this matter.

Security Measures During Visits of Heads of State

On the orders of the day:

MR. H. W. HERRIDGE (Kootenay West): Mr. Speaker, I should like to address a question to the Minister of Justice, with some restrained indignation. In view of the very disturbing tale in the "Printed Word," a periodical published by the public relations firm of Johnston, Everson and Charlesworth Limited, to this effect:

When President Truman visited Ottawa at the end of the war, his guards searched, without warrant, every house along the line of march, including clothes closets, attics and cellars.

Would the Minister of Justice (1) make inquiries as to the veracity of this report and later inform the house as to the result; (2) assure the house that such procedure will not be countenanced in Canada, at any time, for any purpose, and that the basic rights and freedoms of Canadians will be recognized and respected on all such occasions?

HON. E. D. FULTON (Minister of Justice): Mr. Speaker, I rather doubt whether an allegation about a matter that took place some 10 or 11 years ago, as the visit of President Truman did, is one of sufficient or immediate urgency to justify an inquiry on the orders of the day. However, I have had some inquiry made---

MR. SPEAKER: Order. If the minister is raising that as a point of order I would agree with him that the first part of the question might be dealt with differently, but the second part of the question remains.

MR. FULTON: Yes, Mr. Speaker. I can assure the hon. gentleman, as a result of inquiries I have made and discussions I have had with those connected with such matters that there is no likelihood of any such event taking place in connection with any future visit by any head of state who visits Canada. I am also able to say, since the matter has been raised, that the inquiries I have made indicate, so far as my present information goes, that the report of the incidents in connection with the previous visit to which the hon. gentleman has referred is greatly exaggerated, certainly in so far as any allegation of the searching of every private house along the route is concerned.

Mr. HERRIDGE: Would the minister inform the house if he considers that on such occasions the Royal Canadian Mounted Police are quite competent to provide all the security required?

Mr. FULTON: Of course, Mr. Speaker, I consider the Royal Canadian Mounted Police sufficiently and absolutely competent to provide all the security precautions that are necessary. However, the hon. gentleman will realize that certain protocols and forms are observed in connection with the visits of heads of state of other countries.

Dear Senator:

Thank God a few, and only a few, courageous Congressmen are to be found among the many loud-mouthed, spineless cowardly rubberstamper for Eisenhower. Your statement that we should go into East Germany and get our people regardless of the consequences is like a breath of fresh air in a dungeon.

SUBJECT: ~~X~~ PRESIDENTIAL POLITICAL CAMPAIGNING

While discussing other matters with Presidential Appointment Secretary Tom Stephens and Assistant to the President General Persons, Stephens voiced some concern over the President's forthcoming campaigning on behalf of certain Republicans seeking election in November. Stephens stated that in order to fill all the commitments, the President has made it will be necessary to use a helicopter in many instances on very short trips; that the press is objecting to this as they are not able to keep up with the President when he hops from one appointment to another. The press complained that they cannot afford helicopter transportation and that they will miss considerable coverage if they are not with the President at the time he leaves and at the place where he arrives. Stephens said they had come to a near impasse in that the President must get around fast but the press must be accommodated and it will be necessary to reach some type of compromise.

Stephens indicated that the President is committed to considerable extensive campaigning. His most recent trip to New York with Nelson Rockefeller being an example. Stephens commented that between those seeking appointments (Stephens' responsibility) and those demanding certain press rights (Hagerty's responsibility) they are having "one hell of a time." According to Stephens the President is getting a big kick out of the whole thing.
