 VISIT OF PRESIDENT EISENHOWER TO MEXICO FEBRUARY 19 THROUGH 21, 1959. JAMES HAGGERTY OF WHITE HOUSE TELEPHONED AMBASSADOR HILL TODAY ADVISING HAGGERTY AND ELEVEN OTHERS ARRIVING MEXICO CITY ON COLUMBINE MIDNIGHT TONIGHT AND PROCEEDING ACAPULCO, MEXICO TOMORROW TO GO OVER GROUND AND PREPARE PLANS FOR PRESIDENT EISENHOWER'S VISIT BEGINNING FEBRUARY 19 NEXT. HAGGERTY REPORTEDLY STATED PRESIDENT EISENHOWER WOULD NOT VISIT MEXICO CITY BUT WOULD BE IN ACAPULCO FEBRUARY 19 THROUGH 21, PROBABLY STAYING AT HOTEL PIERRE MARQUES. HAGGERTY INDICATED GROUP OF FOREIGN CORRESPONDENTS, PHOTOGRAPHERS AND TV TECHNICIANS COVERING PRESIDENT'S VISIT WOULD RUN FROM 50 MINIMUM TO 150 PERSONS MAXIMUM. DUE TO EXTREMELY LIMITED COMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES OUT OF ACAPULCO PROBABLY PRIMARY COMMUNICATIONS RESPONSIBILITY WOULD LIE WITH APPARATUS OF COLUMBINE AT AIR FIELD RELATIVELY NEAR HOTEL. HAGGERTY DID NOT INDICATE WHAT OFFICERS OF EMBASSY WOULD BE EXPECTED TO BE IMMEDIATELY AVAILABLE IN ACAPULCO SHOULD PRESIDENT EISENHOWER DESIRE BRIEFING BUT I WAS AMONG SMALL GROUP OF EMBASSY OFFICERS ALERTED BY AMBASSADOR HILL AFTER HAGGERTY'S PHONE CALL. WILL KEEP BUREAU ADVISED. AMBASSADOR HILL HAS NOT ASKED THIS OFFICE TO ASSUME ANY IMPROPER RESPONSIBILITIES AND I SHALL BE CAREFUL TO BE FULLY COOPERATIVE WITHOUT ASSUMING INCORRECT RESPONSIBILITIES.

On 5-7-59, [redacted] of the Liaison Section talked to Major John Eisenhower, son of the President, at the White House. While talking Major Eisenhower mentioned that his son, David, is getting proficient with the shotgun in shooting skeet. Major Eisenhower said that David has a small gun but recently has been using the President's 12-gauge shotgun and indicated that David gets a big "kick" out of shooting skeet. Major Eisenhower confesses that he is a notorious poor skeet shooter and when asked if he ever had competent instruction he answered in the negative.

On Monday, August 24, 1959, an air express package was received at Washington National Airport addressed to the President of the United States and bearing the return address:

Some incoherent typing, in English, on the front of the package indicated the contents to be a cure for polio.

Mr. Roy E. Keeny, Quarantine Inspector, U. S. Public Health Service, received the package and because of the indicated contents took it to NIH (National Institutes of Health). NIH officials were hesitant about opening the package which was a wooden box 10 1/2" x 8" x 6 3/4" secured with nails and screws. NIH officials contacted Assistant Director D. J. Parsons on the afternoon of August 25, 1959, and arrangements were made for us [REDACTED] the instant suspicious box.

Mr. Keeny brought the box to our building this morning and it was [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] revealed the box to contain several dozen glass ampules. Mr. Keeny was advised of the results and he requested a short written note relative to the findings. Attached hereto is a copy of the note given to Mr. Keeny.

The above position has been vacant for several months since the resignation of Mr. R. G. May.

While talking with a General Services Administration (GSA) official on another matter today, he advised me that as of 10:30 A.M. this morning Mr. Karl E. Wallace was appointed Commissioner of the Public Buildings Service (PBS). Mr. Wallace was formerly GSA Regional Commissioner for Region Three which covers the Washington, D. C. area. He will be succeeded in the above position by Mr. R. T. Daly who is presently Assistant Commissioner of the Federal Supply Service and according to individuals from GSA he has no prior experience in the PBS field.

You will recall that Mr. Wallace was talking with an Agent assigned to the Dallas Office during a recent visit there at which time he stated that he had previously been proposed to head up PBS by the GSA Administrator, Franklin Floete; however, when the recommendation was taken up with President Eisenhower he had declined to go along at that time since Mr. Wallace was a close friend of Lyndon Johnson and the President was miffed at Johnson for his role in blocking the nomination of Mr. Strauss as Secretary of Commerce.

Apparently the matter has been reconsidered somewhere along the line resulting in today's appointment of Mr. Wallace.

Immediately following the President's press conference this morning, Mr. Rowley, Special Agent in Charge of Secret Service at the White House, called to advise that a reporter had asked the President whether the Director was unduly concerned about Russians visiting this country, and the President's reply was warmly commendatory of the Director.

At 12:45 p.m. Mr. Rowley called back and furnished the verbatim question and answer as follows:

QUESTION (by Lambert Brose, who represents the "Lutheran Layman": -

"You referred before to Mr. Mikoyan's visit to Cuba, and a month ago J. Edgar Hoover talked about another famous Russian or two's visit to our country, said that Mr. Khrushchev's visit had some effect in making Americans more receptive to communism; and since it is the FBI's job to detect subversive activities in this country, is Mr. Hoover, perhaps understandably but unduly, sensitive and apprehensive in this matter? Or do you think his contention might have some merit?"

ANSWER (by the President): -

"Well, I haven't talked to Mr. Hoover about this effect of Mr. Khrushchev's visit. Now, I have stayed very--in very close touch with him over the years. He is a man for whom I have the greatest respect; not only for his views, but for him as a character, as a public servant. Now this is what I know about his views: Once I proposed we study the matter of just inviting a very great number of Russians, particularly students, in our country. And he looked it over and said it would not increase the difficulties in his department whatsoever. Now, what he thinks about this one I don't know. I never talked to him about it."

I thanked Mr. Rowley for his very real thoughtfulness in calling us immediately on this. He said he knew the Director would be interested.

Jack Adler of the Department's Personnel Office, called at 10:00 A. M. this morning and advised that the Attorney General has issued instructions that he desires employees of the Department of Justice excused in sufficient time to greet the President upon his arrival back to Washington. This applies to all Justice employees in the Department of Justice Building, the Old Post Office Building and the Identification Division Building according to Adler and with respect to the Identification Division Building employees, they should be excused in sufficient time so that they can greet the President as he proceeds up 4th Street, Southwest toward Pennsylvania Avenue. Employees are to return to their duties after the motorcade has passed. At the moment it has been indicated that President Eisenhower will pass along Pennsylvania Avenue at approximately 3:25 to 3:35 P. M.

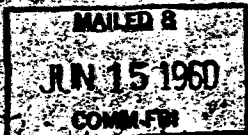

By reference from the Director's Office shortly before 9 AM today, Wick talked on the telephone with Colonel Robert Schulz, aide to former President Eisenhower who was calling from Gettysburg. Pa

Col. Schulz said his only purpose in calling was to advise on Sunday, July 16, 1961, General Eisenhower will take a two-week fishing trip with his brothers and can be located through Larry Fisher at Watersmeet, Michigan. Wick asked if we could be of any assistance and Col. Schulz said nothing at the moment came to mind and he simply wanted Mr. Hoover to know where Gen. Eisenhower would be for the next two weeks.

Col. Schulz then brought up this matter: He said he understands he is to call telephone number National 8-7117 in accordance with recent correspondence Gen. Eisenhower had with Mr. Hoover. He said he understands he would be referred to Mr. Hoover's office. Col. Schulz pointed out he wants to leave an instruction sheet at Gettysburg so that aides other than himself, if handling travel with the FBI for Gen. Eisenhower, will not be mixed up. He asked Wick precisely what instructions he should set forth for this purpose.

Wick told Col. Schulz he might consider simply setting forth that the number National 8-7117 should be telephoned. The person calling should identify himself or herself as calling on behalf of Gen. Eisenhower and then ask for Mr. Hoover's office. Col. Schulz said he understood.

OBSERVATIONS:

The possibility exists that Gen. Eisenhower's secretary or one of his aides may telephone on a Sunday afternoon or late at night following the closing of the Director's Office. I think it behooves us to make immediate arrangements so that such a call is handled promptly and the necessary instructions issued to provide assistance to Gen. Eisenhower.

He said perhaps he is going to visit the site of the coming World's Fair.) Former President Eisenhower will be staying at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel and will engage in other activity which was not specified. The length of his stay in New York City is not known.

4. On 10-17-61, he will be traveling about the State of New Jersey in connection with rallies being given in connection with the campaign of former Secretary of Labor Jim Mitchell who is running for Governor.

(b)(7)(C) 5. On 10-18-61, he will travel to New York City where he will spend approximately one week engaging in a "variety of functions." [REDACTED] did not have the details.

6. On 11-14-61, the former President plans to go to Augusta, Georgia, where he will spend considerable time. He will be making trips to various places out of Augusta, and [REDACTED] said that this would be given to us at a later date.

My memorandum of August 30, 1961, reflected a call from [redacted] relative to General Eisenhower's travels in the near future. [redacted] outlined six trips. (Memorandum attached.)

(b)(7)(C) Pursuant to the Director's instructions, I call^d Colonel Schulz, General Eisenhower's aide at Gettysburg and informed him of [redacted] call and told him the Director wanted to be of every possible assistance, however, we needed a few more specific details. Col. Schulz stated that General Eisenhower had not informed him of such travel plans and that he felt [redacted] had been talking out of turn. He stated he would immediately check with General Eisenhower and would call me back.

(b)(7)(C) Col. Schulz called at 4:45 PM this afternoon. He stated that as he expected, [redacted] had "jumped the gun." General Eisenhower had not requested [redacted] to contact the FBI relative to the six trips in question. General Eisenhower had apparently mentioned to [redacted] the Director's kindness in offering to be of assistance. Later on in the conversation, General Eisenhower told [redacted] of his plans for the future. [redacted] took it upon himself to inform the FBI of these plans.

Col. Schulz stated that he personally will get in touch with us on the occasion of each need for assistance. He stated he was still a little confused as to what assistance the Director desired to furnish General Eisenhower. I told him that Mr. Hoover wanted to be of every possible assistance. Col. Schulz then mentioned that he plans to make a "dry run" to Hagerstown, Maryland, to make final plans for General Eisenhower's visit September 3, 1961, to rededicate a Confederate cemetery. He advised that the Executive Flight Detachment of the Air Force would pick him up at 3 PM Saturday and fly him by helicopter to Hagerstown. He mentioned that the cemetery commission is furnishing cars, therefore, there will be no need for the FBI to furnish transportation for General Eisenhower at this time.

Col. Schulz, in a most friendly manner, stated that his greatest difficulty in providing for the comfort of General Eisenhower was the control of enthusiastic people. He stated in some instances huge mobs try to merely touch General Eisenhower,

that often they press him against cars in attempting to get souvenirs, pieces of his clothing, etc. He added that the result is the possibility of physical injury to the General. In this connection, Col. Schulz wanted to know if we could possibly convey to the local police in such situations the fact that General Eisenhower would be in town and that it would be appreciated if the mobs were controlled to the extent that General Eisenhower was not bodily harmed in any manner. I told the Colonel that the Director would naturally want us to maintain liaison with the police and that we, of course, could inform local law enforcement in each instance, however, in different localities you have different qualities of law enforcement; consequently we could not always guarantee the absolute maximum of safety. Col. Schulz stated that he deeply appreciated this and that he, of course, was not asking for "protection" from the FBI.

Col. Schulz indicated that he was personally "rusty" on diplomacy and liaison with local law enforcement. He mentioned that sometimes the police and local civic groups become too security conscious and, therefore, the delicate feelings of a sentimental public are injured because they are not allowed to exhibit the cordial atmosphere they desire for the former President. Col. Schulz stated that he, of course, desired to reach a happy medium whenever possible.

Col. Schulz mentioned that he and General Eisenhower are most anxious not to take advantage of good friendship. He stated we should not hesitate to refuse him favors whenever he steps out of line on any occasion in the future. At this point he stated that General Eisenhower had confidentially told him that he knows that "Mr. Hoover is as usual proving his great qualities and friendship in offering to do this, that the FBI could, of course, be embarrassed by having a representative drive a former President when such service is not included under the jurisdiction of the FBI." I interrupted Col. Schulz at this point and told him that this was not a matter of jurisdiction, that to the contrary this was a sincere and genuine desire on the part of Mr. Hoover to be of service to a great man. I informed him that Mr. Hoover was not the least bit afraid of any possible embarrassment and that the Director had instructed us to be of every possible service. I told Col. Schulz for his confidential information the Director had been of great assistance to former President Herbert Hoover over the years and not the slightest embarrassment has occurred as a result. Col. Schulz told me that General Eisenhower was most anxious to avail himself to the services of the FBI and that the former President had stated several times "the FBI is one organization that doesn't forget someone merely because they are no longer in high office." I told Col. Schulz he was certainly correct in this statement.

Col. Schulz is to call me Saturday afternoon, September 2, 1961, from Hagerstown, Maryland, to advise if we can be of any possible assistance in connection with the rededication of the Confederate cemetery. He stated he wanted to reiterate he was not asking for "protection" but that he needed guidance badly. He also reiterated the fact that "he was a very easy fellow to get along with and he looked forward to working closely with us in the future. I reciprocated his sentiments in this regard.

Colonel Schulz, General Eisenhower's aide, called late Saturday night regarding the General's speech at the rededication of a Confederate cemetery in Hagerstown, Maryland, on Sunday, September 3, 1961. Previous memoranda reflected two conversations that Colonel Schulz and I had had regarding this matter.

Colonel Schulz stated he was concerned about two things. (1) The possibility of the General being mobbed by huge throngs upon his arrival at 11:45 AM at the Hagerstown Airport. (2) The possibility of the General being mobbed at the entrance to the hotel in Hagerstown. He stated he would appreciate it if we would establish liaison with the police and insure that the General had safe passage from the airport and into the hotel. He stated he did not think FBI transportation would be necessary, however, he would advise me in the event this later became necessary.

I contacted SAC Powers, Baltimore, immediately following Colonel Schulz' call Saturday night. Powers was instructed to have two experienced Agents on hand in Hagerstown to contact the police prior to the General's arrival and to set up plans regarding the two points listed above. Powers was told to have the Agents personally contact Colonel Schulz immediately upon his arrival, make known their identity and to be of any possible assistance.

The attached teletype from Baltimore reflected the assignment was handled satisfactorily. Colonel Schulz expressed his and the General's deepest appreciation.

Colonel Schulz, General Eisenhower's aide, called from the Gettysburg farm at 3:30 p. m. this afternoon. General Eisenhower is today in Newark, New Jersey. He will arrive at the Waldorf-Astoria at 10 p. m. tonight and will remain in New York until next Tuesday, 10-24-61.

(b)(7)(C) Colonel Schulz stated that he has been in touch with the New York City Police Department, specifically the Special Services Bureau, under the direction of [REDACTED]. He added that looking after the General in New York will be particularly a local situation and that he did not know of any assistance that could be rendered by the FBI but that he wanted to touch base with us to see if he could think of anything. He quickly added that he would like very much to know of some contact with the FBI in New York so that he could get in touch with someone immediately in the event the General needed transportation or some other matter needed to be handled.

I gave Colonel Schulz the name of SAC Harvey Foster and told him that we would be glad to lend all possible assistance. Colonel Schulz asked that I have Foster call upon him at 8:30 p. m., tonight, at the Waldorf-Astoria. I told him this would be done.

I called SAC Foster and explained the circumstances. He will call by Colonel Schulz' suite at the Waldorf tonight at 8:30 p. m. and will have Special Agent [REDACTED] with him at that time.

An Agent in the Baltimore Division called my office at 11 a.m. this morning and said they had received a call from the Hagerstown Airport Control Office at 10:35 a.m. this morning. The Airport Control Office said they had called the Resident Agency at Hagerstown, had gotten no answer and, therefore, were calling the Baltimore Office. The Control Tower reported that General Eisenhower was coming in on a plane in four minutes and inquiry had been made as to whether the FBI could be on hand to meet him. The time factor involved in getting a car to the Airport was explained and the Control Tower then indicated that State Police were immediately available and would be contacted by them regarding the General's imminent arrival. The Baltimore Office advised they were taking no further action.

Reference is made to my memorandum of October 27, 1961, setting forth our contact with Colonel Robert Schulz, aide to former President Eisenhower, regarding the former President's travel to San Antonio, Texas, on October 29, 1961.

Last evening we were again in touch with Colonel Schulz in order to learn more details of the flight.

Colonel Schulz advised as follows:

1. He had originally advised that the Continental Oil Company was providing the aircraft, but now he thinks it is a Gulf Oil Company plane. He then said he really did not know.
2. He said the plane is a Gruman Gulfstream. It is painted green and white and bears the number N708G.
3. They plan to take off from Friendship Airport, Baltimore, Washington, at 10:30 a. m. Eastern Standard Time on 10-29-61, and their approximate arrival in San Antonio will be 2:30 p. m. Central Standard Time.
4. He said that the President's party will be occupying Rooms 272, 274, 276 and 278 at the Menger Hotel.
5. The President will occupy 278 and across the hall from him in 273 will be Army Sergeant Mooney. He said that the manager of the hotel, Ernest Kunz, is a friend of his and that a buzzer arrangement had been set up between the Sergeant's room and the General's room in case of any emergencies.
6. He said that in view of the fact that this trip had political overtones, he was going to alert the CID Headquarters in San Antonio, but was not going to use CID men. He wonders if we could possibly contact the police department and

arrange to have a plain-clothes man available. He said usually police departments have officers who handle VPIs.

7. He also said that he would like to have a uniform policeman alerted who could be in Room 272 but that he did not know whether he would need this individual but would advise SAC when he arrived in San Antonio.

8. He said that the oil company was arranging for a car and a driver. He said he did not know the driver's name but that as soon as he could secure it, he would let us know so that San Antonio could make a quick check.

The Colonel was advised that we would be glad to make these arrangements and that SAC Williams would be at the airport with transportation and, if the need arose, we would, of course, be only too glad to take the General to the hotel.

The Colonel was again advised we would be very glad to assist the Friendship Airport, but he said this was not necessary.

SAC Williams had been given the above information and instructed that he should personally handle this matter and should be no slip-ups and that he should extend every courtesy to the General and advise the Bureau.

At 2:55 p. m. today Colonel Robert Schulz, aide to former President Eisenhower telephoned and while I was tied up on another phone talked to Wick. He said that General Eisenhower and a party of three will be taken to Friendship Airport on Sunday, 10-29-61, by the President's brother where the group will depart at 10:30 a. m., Eastern Standard Time, on a direct, non-stop flight to San Antonio, Texas, aboard a private craft owned by Continental Oil Company. Colonel Schulz did not know their arrival time in San Antonio. He said the group will stay at the Menger Hotel there. Those accompanying General Eisenhower will be a Sergeant Moaney, Bryce Harlow of Washington, D. C., and Colonel Schulz.

Colonel Schulz advised the plans are that a private dinner will be held in the hotel that night attended by the former President. On Monday, 10-30-61, General Eisenhower will have breakfast at the hotel and there will be a lunch that day and on Monday evening 10-30-61 the former President will attend a rally. Take-off from San Antonio (he presumed it will be the local airport) will be sometime Tuesday, 10-31-61, probably by private aircraft to either the Thomasville Airport at York, Pennsylvania, or Friendship Airport.

Colonel Schulz said he was calling to simply alert us that General Eisenhower might desire our San Antonio people to meet the party upon arrival at the San Antonio Airport sometime Sunday, 10-29-61, and provide a car to transport the party to the hotel there. Colonel Schulz said he did not believe any further assistance would be necessary but at that point, frankly, he did not know.

Wick told Colonel Schulz that the Director wanted to be of all possible assistance to General Eisenhower, that Mr. Hoover would certainly welcome the opportunity of providing transportation and will do everything possible. Wick supplied Colonel Schulz with the name, office and home phone number of SAC Eldon C. Williams of our San Antonio Office and the home phone number of ASAC W. T. Brooking, Jr. He was told, however, that either or both of these men would, if desired, meet the party at San Antonio.

Colonel Schulz advised Wick that he intends to be at his home in Arlington sometime after 8:00 p. m. today, 10-27-61, at which time he would telephone either me or Wick advising us of the arrival time of the Continental plane with the party aboard at San Antonio, the name of the airport where they will land and whether General Eisenhower desired transportation or other assistance. Colonel Schulz said his home phone number is private and unlisted in Arlington: [REDACTED] Wick told him we would be in touch with him tonight if he did not call us so the matter could be resolved definitely inasmuch as there should be no misunderstanding. Colonel Schulz assured Wick he would be in touch with us giving us the details of the arrival, need for transportation, etc.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN:

I will definitely see to it that we are in contact with Colonel Schulz tonight, that we get the details and I will personally telephone SAC Williams of our San Antonio office thereafter pointing out precisely what he and ASAC Brooking should do to accommodate General Eisenhower.

Pursuant to instructions, I drove to Gettysburg early this morning, accompanied by SAs [redacted] and [redacted] of the Laboratory, at the request of Colonel Robert Schulz, aide to General Eisenhower. We met at the General's office, 300 Carlyle Street, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, and after a brief inspection tour of the facilities, Messrs [redacted] and [redacted] began a thorough scrutiny of the telephone system not only at the office in town but additionally at the apartments of Col. Schulz and Chief Warrant Officer Good who will serve as the General's secretary when Mrs. Ann Whitman leaves early next month.

General Eisenhower will be in Los Angeles until early March, 1962. He will then return to Gettysburg. His private office and conference room is replete with souvenirs of his military and Presidential days. One of the more prominently placed items is the gold badge and plaque presented to him by the Director on the occasion of his speech before the National Academy graduation exercises. Col. Schulz told me that the General is prouder of this souvenir than any he knows of.

Col. Schulz was most cordial and during luncheon mentioned a number of items of interest. He stated that the General had been somewhat embarrassed on occasions as a result of so-called friends attempting to do him favors. As a specific example, he mentioned that transportation is often offered in various cities only to find out the next day that the person offering such transportation has leaked this to the newspapers for self-publicity. He stated on occasions transportation has been offered to the General, then later the individual offering the transportation would seek to have the General intercede in some type of a contract. Col. Schulz stated for these reasons, plus the tremendous respect the General has for the Director, General Eisenhower was most appreciative when Mr. Hoover wrote him he would be glad to be of any service. He stated the General desired to utilize FBI service more often if the Director would not feel this was an imposition.

I carefully outlined to Col. Schulz what I believe the Director has in mind in attempting to be of service to General Eisenhower. I told him the Director would want to be of every possible service and this, of course, included transportation. I told Col. Schulz that Mr. Hoover not only felt deep respect and friendship for General Eisenhower, but personally had always felt that the U. S. Government is very sadly lacking in taking care of ex-Presidents. Col. Schulz agreed most

wholeheartedly. He stated within a period of five minutes following the inauguration, an ex-President's whole world collapses from under him. He reiterated that General Eisenhower was most grateful for the Director's kindnesses.

Col. Schulz brought up the subject of the Director and Mr. Tolson coming to Gettysburg. He stated General Eisenhower had often mentioned this possibility and he felt certain that in the early Spring the General would want to have the Director as his guest for luncheon at the Eisenhower farm. He stated the General would also take great delight in showing the Director around certain parts of the Gettysburg Battle Field.

Col. Schulz confided when the two of us were alone, that his greatest problem at Gettysburg is handling Mrs. Eisenhower. He stated she was quite temperamental and would not listen to reason on occasion. He mentioned she was quite possessive of the General and often insisted on talking with him regardless of who might be in the General's office at the time.

Col. Schulz told me that the General when in Gettysburg is in his office everyday and not only dictates a considerable amount of mail but additionally sees a large number of people. He is quite accustomed to a well disciplined schedule.

I talked briefly with Lt. Colonel John Eisenhower, the General's son who has an office right below that of his Father's. He, of course, is still in the service but is on loan to his Father for the purposes of writing a book covering his Father's life. Doubleday is handling the publishing of the book and has an employee assigned to Col. Eisenhower for assisting him in the writing.

It is believed that Col. Schulz is well aware of the Director's desire to be of assistance to General Eisenhower and that such assistance will probably pick up in the near future. Col. Schulz has both my office and home telephone numbers and I have told him the Director would want him to call me at any time day or night to be of service to General Eisenhower.

Today's hearing got under way shortly after 2:30 p. m. with the reading into the record of a brief letter from former President Dwight D. Eisenhower. You will recall that at the opening session of this series of hearings, a letter from Mr. Eisenhower was made a part of the record in which he questioned the desirability of requiring Government officials, whether military or civilian, to submit their proposed public statements for review. Mr. Eisenhower's current letter was in response to an inquiry by Senator Stuart Symington requesting a definition of those officials who should not be required to submit their statements for review. Mr. Eisenhower said he felt this should be applied to all top military officials, including the Joint Chiefs of Staff, as well as those top officials in appointive positions in the Defense Department and in other agencies.

In an opening statement, Senator Stennis reviewed the purpose of these hearings which would include an examination of the policies affecting censorship of the statements of military officials, the effectiveness of troop information and education programs, and the responsibility of the military in alerting its own members as well as civilians to the menace posed by communism. He stated that the use of questionnaires to question military personnel had been discontinued. He pointed out this procedure had never been authorized by ranking members of his Subcommittee; rather, it had been undertaken by a staff member who lacked proper "experience."

The witness for the afternoon, General George H. Decker, Chief of Staff, U. S. Army, read a prepared statement in which he pointed out that communism is an extremely complex subject, that members of the military should have some knowledge concerning it, but that the primary function of the military establishment is to insure the safety of the country from a military standpoint. He felt that a knowledge of communism and foreign policy was primarily the responsibility of other Government agencies. He said he had no

objection to having his speeches reviewed by the proper authorities, that it was not possible for him to be informed concerning every detail of our foreign policy, and he felt that such a review insured the accuracy of his speeches. He said that since he had become Chief of Staff, he had made approximately 18 speeches, and approximately 50% of these had been subjected to minor changes upon review. Personally, he felt the changes were picayune; however, he did not believe they warranted an official protest on his part. The changes which were made never prevented him from getting across the main points in his speeches.

General Decker was questioned by Senator Strom Thurmond. Thurmond wanted to know if it was United States policy that we should be concerned primarily with communism as an external threat rather than an internal threat. General Decker replied that as a military man he did not feel he could give an opinion on this matter. Thurmond pointed out he was not requesting the General's personal opinion but rather his knowledge of an official government policy. Thurmond asked the same question two more times, and the General finally replied that he knew of no policy which would lead to the conclusion suggested by Thurmond. Thurmond then wanted to know if United States policy was based on the proposition that there is a lessening of control of world-wide communism by Moscow. General Decker again replied that he knew of no such policy.

Thurmond went into specific deletions which had been made in the General's speeches, and stated he believed that the deletions constituted a very definite pattern. The General stated that he noted no such pattern. Thurmond criticized reviewing authorities noting that at one time they had made deletions for the reason that sensitive international negotiations were taking place at the time but that they made the same type of deletions at other times when no such negotiations were taking place. Thurmond also noted that in October, 1960, the Army indicated that the film, "Operation Abolition," would be widely used by the Army; however, in April, 1961, it was removed from the Army's list of training films. Thurmond wanted to know the reason for this removal, and the General stated that it had been done upon instructions of the Defense Department.

General Decker's testimony was concluded with a discussion as to what the Army is doing to prepare its soldiers for the brainwashing techniques utilized in the Korean War. He referred to figures concerning the number of "turn coats" in Korea and, after Senator Symington questioned the accuracy of these figures, the record was left open for possible correction. General Decker said he would attempt to see if other figures were available.

Senator Stennis advised that the Subcommittee would reconvene tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 for the purpose of hearing testimony from Rear

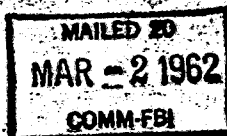

Colonel Bob Schulz, General Eisenhower's aide, called from Gettysburg at 4 PM this afternoon. General Eisenhower will leave Los Angeles, California, 9:30 AM Sunday morning, March 4, 1962, via American Airlines Flight #6. He will arrive at Idlewild Airport, New York City at 5:10 PM. He will be accompanied by [redacted] whom Col. Schulz thought was an FBI Agent. He will also be accompanied by Mr. Charles J. Jones of the Richfield Oil Company.

Col. Schulz stated he did not believe General Eisenhower would need transportation, however, would appreciate transportation being available just in the event Richfield Oil Company had not taken care of this matter. I told him the Director would definitely want this done and that the Director's personal car would be at the airport on Sunday afternoon for the General.

Col. Schulz stated that he would like to have one of our representatives meet him at the American Airlines Passenger Service Agent's office at 4:30 PM, Sunday, March 4, 1962, regardless of whether General Eisenhower desired transportation or not. I told him we would arrange for this. He also desired to determine whether [redacted] as mentioned above, was an FBI Agent.

General Eisenhower will stay at the Pierre Hotel in New York. He will attend funeral ceremonies on Monday, March 5, 1962, of Mr. W. Alton Jones, Chairman of the Board, Sun Oil Company. Following the funeral services, General Eisenhower will depart immediately for Los Angeles via commercial airline transportation which has not yet been arranged for.

Following my conversation with Col. Schulz, I called SAC Foster in New York and issued appropriate instructions. ASAC Winterrowd will handle this assignment inasmuch as SAC Foster will be in Washington at the time. I also called SAC Simon in Los Angeles and told him to be of any possible service in arranging for the General to be brought to the Los Angeles airport. SAC Simon will contact Ann Whitman, the General's secretary. SAC Simon advised me [redacted]

Colonel Bob Schulz, Executive Assistant to General Eisenhower, called from Gettysburg 4-24-62. Colonel Schulz is leaving Gettysburg within the near future to join General Eisenhower in Palm Springs, California. He and the General both will leave Palm Springs for Abilene, Kansas, 4-29-62. After staying in Abilene for approximately one day, they will take the Santa Fe Railroad Train #20 to Chicago, arriving there at 7:15 a. m., 5-1-62. They will change trains and then proceed to Gettysburg.

General Eisenhower will leave Gettysburg on May 4, 1962, and fly to Augusta, Georgia. He will be in Augusta on May 4, 5 and 6, 1962, returning to Gettysburg the evening of May 6. General Eisenhower will be in Washington on May 9, 1962, where he will check in at Walter Reed Army Hospital for his annual physical checkup. On May 10, 1962, he will hold a number of meetings with Republican leaders and on the night of May 10 he will attend a dinner at the Statler Hotel.

On May 14, 1962, General Eisenhower will be in Philadelphia to attend a luncheon at the Barkley Hotel. He will later speak at a dinner at the Union League Club in Philadelphia. On May 15 General Eisenhower will drive from Philadelphia to Princeton, New Jersey, where he will attend the dedication of the new John Foster Dulles Library.

Colonel Schulz was not requesting any assistance but stated he merely wanted to advise us of General Eisenhower's travels so that in the event assistance was needed he could call us at any time en route. I told him that the Director would want him to do so and that we would be happy to be of any possible assistance to the General and him.

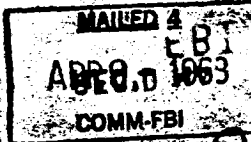

Former President Eisenhower called and stated once in awhile one or two of his Republican friends made statements suggesting he make statements in political attacks that he thought the FBI was being directed into unusual or illegal channels and was being used to do a lot of improper things.

I told President Eisenhower I have seen things by Republican leaders in New York State indicating we were investigating Governor Rockefeller for political purposes. I stated this is absolutely untrue, that I have under this administration followed the same procedure as under previous administrations of not conducting an investigation of anyone or any organization unless they were in violation of a Federal statute. I stated I have followed the policy of not making political investigations. I stated in assisting in civil rights cases down South where they wanted Agents to drive buses carrying Negroes I have insisted they use U.S. Marshals for this purpose as it was not within the Bureau's duties and that I have not been overruled on that.

President Eisenhower inquired about the [redacted] in which it was alleged the FBI was used to rout out newspapermen. I told him that the Attorney General asked us to interview [redacted]

[redacted] stated the conference was held in the afternoon and the reports carried in the evening paper and the President wanted the information the next morning.

I told him we were asked to make an investigation at six o'clock in the evening; that our Philadelphia Agents indicated they could not reach [redacted] at his office or at his home; finally they went out to his home and found him there, at which time he said he would have to go down to his office with the Agents to check his notes in order to give us the names of [redacted]

(b)(7)(C) [redacted] I stated that our Agents took him down to his office and it was around eleven o'clock before we got the names [redacted] named were then called on the telephone; some were not available and some calls were made about two or three o'clock in the morning. I stated it was a chain of circumstances which never should have occurred; that there was no way to speed it up because [redacted] was not available and only he knew the names of [redacted]

(b)(7)(C) President Eisenhower asked if these critics have any right to criticize the action of the FBI. I told him I do not think they have; that this was information the President wanted for use the next morning and normally we would have concluded the investigation by eleven o'clock at night if we could have reached [redacted] who, I thought, was avoiding us. I said I thought he was at home when the maid told our Agents he was not there and then, when we reached him, we had to go back to his office with him to get his notes.

(b)(7)(C) President Eisenhower remarked that [redacted] would not have had to go. I stated he was cooperative after we reached him; that I thought he was trying to avoid us if he could without openly doing so; that he did not have to go to get those notes; that there was no way to compel him; that [redacted] did not have to give information - some refused and some gave information wanted the next morning by the President.

President Eisenhower stated he is going to say he worked with the FBI for a long, long time and never saw them do anything illegal or permit themselves to be used for improper purposes. I told him that never will occur under my administration. I stated if I received any order for an improper political investigation, or gestapo nature, or concerning the NAACP, Ku Klux Klan, or pressure of any kind, I would refuse to do it and, if they insisted upon it, I would leave.

General Eisenhower is concerned for fear the railroad strike, scheduled for 12:01 AM, Thursday, July 11, 1963, will affect his travel plans. General Eisenhower wondered if the FBI could provide two limousines and a station wagon from Omaha to Chicago sometime Thursday, July 11, after the party arrives from Denver. *Ch*

After checking with Mr. Tolson, I had Wick inform SAC Werner that he should tell General Schulz the Director would be very pleased to make any transportation desired available to him. SAC Werner was told by Wick he should instruct the Omaha and Chicago Offices to perfect the necessary arrangements to accommodate the Eisenhower party to the fullest extent. SAC Werner said he would so handle the matter and inform General Eisenhower this would be done.

Mrs. EISENHOWER will remain at Boone, Iowa until the railroad strike is terminated, or if the strike remains in effect over a period of time, Mrs. EISENHOWER's chauffeur will bring her car to Boone, and take her on to the EISENHOWER home. If Mrs. EISENHOWER is to stay in Boone, Iowa, close contact should be maintained with her by the Resident Agents in that area. General SCHULZ has requested that if she does drive back, that the Omaha Office assist her in setting out an itinerary and in making reservations for her between Boone, Iowa and her home.

In the event no railroad strike should occur, the EISENHOWER party will then proceed to Des Moines, Iowa via Rock Island Railroad Train #8, arriving at Des Moines at 1:30 a.m., 7/11/63. Their private cars will be sidetracked at Des Moines, where General SCHULZ requests that he be contacted at 8:00 a.m. on the morning of 7/11/63 with a limousine and a station wagon, at which time the party will proceed to Boone, Iowa. They will remain in Boone during the day and return to Des Moines on the evening of July 11, and will again board their private cars. These cars will be picked up at 1:45 a.m. on July 12, 1963 and they will proceed to Harrisburg, Pennsylvania by way of Chicago. Page A4498. Congressman Schwengel, (R) Iowa, extended his remarks concerning a recent visit to Iowa by former President and Mrs. Eisenhower. He included an article entitled "Ike and Mamie Greeted by Many Admirers at Boone" which appeared in the Cedar Rapids (Iowa) Gazette. The article stated "Eisenhower and his wife, Mamie, slept late Thursday morning after their private cars were shunted onto a siding about 1:30 a. m. They had breakfast aboard the cars before climbing into a limousine driven by a Federal Bureau of Investigation agent for a trip to Mrs. Eisenhower's hometown, Boone, 45 miles northwest of here. - - - Mrs. Eisenhower slipped almost

unnoticed from the railroad car to the waiting limousine while her husband talked rapidly with newsmen and signed a few autographs. Only about 15 persons were on hand when he stepped down from the railroad car. Two other cars carrying FBI agents accompanied the Eisenhowers to Boone."

BACKGROUND:

The November 10, 1963, issue of "The Washington Post" in its book review section contains a review by Henry Steele Commager of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's current book, "Mandate for Change." References to the FBI in the book review are as follows: In commenting on presidential appointments, Commager relates that Eisenhower asked the FBI to investigate every potential judicial appointee. Commager comments "Could anything be more centralizing?" In commenting upon Eisenhower's appointments to the Supreme Court, he asserts in his first of four criteria, "First, every appointee shall be thoroughly investigated and approved by the FBI." Commager comments that Eisenhower's criteria constitutes an abandonment of good sense. "Does not the President see that it is his responsibility to judge character, not that of the FBI? Does he forget so quickly that he and Secretary Dulles had to override the misguided advice of the FBI on the appointment of Ambassador Bohlen?" These are rhetorical questions offered by Commager.

"MANDATE FOR CHANGE" BY DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER:

A copy of former President Eisenhower's book has been obtained by the Bureau Library and the following references to the Director and the FBI were noted.

On Page 90 in discussing the formation of his cabinet, Eisenhower states that the man he picked for a particular post would have to pass with flying colors an exhaustive examination by the FBI as to his past record, reputation and standing in his community. At this point Eisenhower digressed that he heard rumors to the effect that the Director had been out of favor in Washington. "It was my respect for him that I invited him to a meeting, my only purpose being to assure him that I wanted him in Government as long as I might be there and that in the performance of his duties he would have the complete support of my office."

On Page 213 Eisenhower continues his discussion of his nomination of Charles E. Bohlen as an Ambassador to Moscow. He referred to the controversy in the Senate over the naming of this individual and Eisenhower stated, "The suggestion that Bohlen was unacceptable to the FBI led to Senators' demands to see the security file."

He then outlined how he had ordered the Attorney General to allow two Senators to see the FBI summary.

On Page 226 Eisenhower discusses his decisions with respect to appointments to the Supreme Court and how he directed Attorney General Brownell to use the FBI in making a thorough investigation of a prospective appointee's reputation and of every pertinent detail of his life.

In his chapter on "Problems of Internal Security," on Page 309 Eisenhower makes a passing reference to the FBI which conducted full field investigations on those individuals who worked in sensitive jobs or where the Civil Service Commission developed disloyal data on the individual involved.

On Page 314 and 315 references are made to the FBI in connection with the investigation of Harry Dexter White. He referred to a speech by the Attorney General on November 6, 1953, whereby White was characterized as a Russian spy and these statements were based on information from the FBI. He also referred to the fact that the Director supported the Attorney General by testifying that at no time did the FBI approve the previous administration's promotion of White for the avowed purpose of making it easier to keep him under FBI surveillance.

On Page 331 in discussing Senator McCarthy's Senate censure and McCarthy's investigations he stated that the benefits flowing from them "do not loom large." Eisenhower states he was told by members of the Executive Departments, including the FBI, that those discovered by the subcommittee (McCarthy's) to be disloyal or unreliable were few in number.

Reference my memorandum dated 12-4-63 in captioned matter recommending that General Schulz, former President Eisenhower's Aide, be contacted concerning the former President's desire as to having Special Agents of the FBI in his box at the reviewing stand of the 1-1-64 Pasadena Rose Bowl Parade. It was agreed this should be done.

ACTION TAKEN:

(b)(7)(C) I had Wick talk with General Schulz at 7:30 p. m. yesterday. General Schulz said this is all a mistake, that [REDACTED] had no authority to make such a request, that neither he nor the former President has made such a request nor does the former President desire anything of this nature.

General Schulz did say that he was concerned about the security of the former President during the festivities on the West Coast but that this is a matter he will discuss with the law enforcement people there charged with such duties, namely the Pasadena police, the Sheriff's Office, etc. General Schulz stated he did think he would call me and get my general ideas as to how he should proceed, whether it was the FBI's belief the General should ride in an open car, etc. Wick told him certainly we would be glad to help any way we could in discussing the matter and he should feel free to contact me.

(b)(7)(C) General Schulz suggested that we simply have SAC Simon personally contact [REDACTED]. Simon can tell [REDACTED] that normally his request concerning Special Agents sitting with the former President in his box is a type of request which comes from another source, namely, General Schulz direct to the FBI. Simon can tell [REDACTED] that if there is any change certainly General Schulz will be in touch with the FBI. General Schulz said certainly [REDACTED] will understand this kind of language. General Schulz regretted very much that [REDACTED] had been so presumptuous as to contact us on the West Coast. As the matter now stands, we are so informing Simon to take the matter up with [REDACTED] and straighten him out.

(b)(7)(C) At 11:25 a. m. today, SAC Simon of the Los Angeles Office telephoned Mr. Simon said that [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] told our Agent that former President Eisenhower will be the Grand Marshal of the "Tournament of Roses" and the former President and Mrs. Eisenhower will sit in a box in the reviewing stand January 1. [REDACTED] informally asked whether two Special Agents of the FBI could sit in the box with the former President and Mrs. Eisenhower to assure they would not be annoyed.

(b)(7)(C) Mr. Simon said our Agent asked [REDACTED] pointedly whether this was an official request or an informal request and [REDACTED] indicated it came from one of the former President's aides. SAC Simon got the distinct impression that possibly General Bob Schulz (whom I know personally) had possibly mentioned such an arrangement to [REDACTED]

(b)(7)(C) SAC Simon said that the Pasadena Police and law enforcement agencies from the whole area normally guard visitors such as former President Eisenhower and it would be their responsibility to do guard duty. SAC Simon pointed out he wanted to make it clear that neither [REDACTED] nor General Schulz had even intimated that the FBI do guard duty for the former President. It was merely a suggestion that Agents sit in the box to assure no annoyance.

RECOMMENDATION:

(b)(7)(C) That I get in touch with General Schulz to see if he has made such a request to [REDACTED] I doubt very much whether General Eisenhower would want us to be present in his box and I think we should stay clear of this. Simon can then be told how to handle the matter with [REDACTED]

H., possibly meaning Apple Creek State Hospital, appears in the letter, and on the white sheet, there appears the letters "FBI." Because of the illegibility, the text is not discernable, but no threats appear in those few lines which can be read.

[REDACTED] made same available to the FBI, since it was his opinion, at the closest scrutiny, that the letter was addressed to X. P. EISENHOWER, Gettysburg, Pa., and he was of the opinion that the X. P. possibly was written to indicate ex-President EISENHOWER.

It is noted that there is an Apple Creek State Hospital at Apple Creek, Ohio, (Wayne County).

This letter is being forwarded to the FBI Lab for search through the Anonymous Letter File and any other examination deemed advisable, due to the fact that it was possibly mailed to former President DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER.

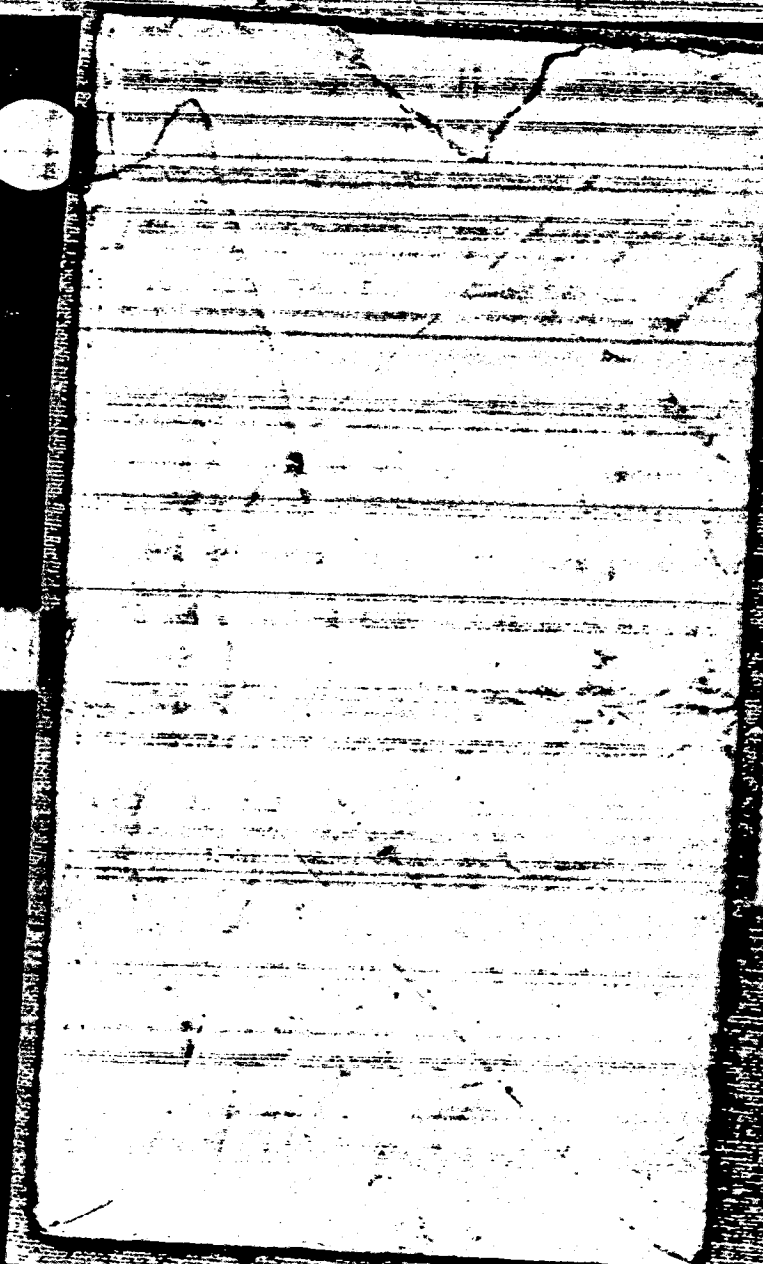

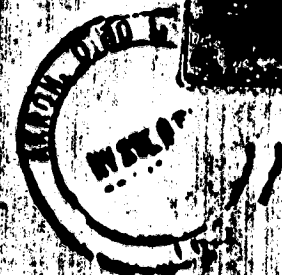

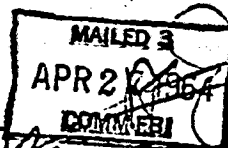

Unfortunately I do not have a copy of the testimonial brochure used by the Traid Corporation to pass on to you.

To my knowledge all sales of the Fotron camera have been made in the home of the customer. There was no verbal or printed advertising material presented to us prior to the time that the salesman visited our home.

At that time we were shown various pieces of literature relating to the work of the Traid Corporation in developing high speed cameras and film for government reconnaissance work.

The salesman then showed us a printed brochure which contained the names of a large number of prominent people who had allegedly used the Fotron camera and endorsed it as a quality product. One of the names at the top of the list was that of General Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The brochure was not given to us to keep. Therefore it is not in our possession, and we regret that we are unable to supply you with any printed material to assist your inquiry.

Your name is being used by the Traid Corporation of Encino, California to endorse their Fotron Electronic Camera.

I wonder if you are aware of the misrepresentation of this product and its inferior quality.

My husband is now a [REDACTED] but in July will become a [REDACTED]

We bought this Fotron camera primarily for his professional use.

We bought the camera in September 1963 under the impression that we were a "test family" and that the camera was coming to the market in December at a much higher price than the \$289.00 which we were to pay. The camera and its film are not on the open market. One camera store owner was asked by the Traid Corporation to buy the camera for \$80.00 and sell it for \$130.00, but he refused as he does not feel that the Fotron camera is a quality product.

This store owner also said that the pictures taken by this camera which he has seen have been poor, and this has been our experience.

The Better Business Bureau of Long Beach has a large file of complaints against this product. The camera has been presented in varying ways and at varying prices.

Your name was one of a number which they were using to endorse their product and their company. I do not remember any of the other names. But I feel that you would want to know that their customers are disappointed in their product and their business practices.

Brigadier General Robert L. Schulz, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, Executive Assistant to General Dwight D. Eisenhower, by note to you dated 4-22-64, enclosed copies of three letters which constituted an exchange of correspondence between his office and [REDACTED]

The initial letter in this exchange, dated 4-1-64, from [REDACTED] complained that General Eisenhower's name was being used by captioned company as an endorser on advertising material for their Fotron Electronic Camera. [REDACTED] had purchased one of these cameras and found it to be of poor quality. She stated the Better Business Bureau, Long Beach, California, had received many complaints concerning this product.

General Schulz, by letter of 4-10-64, replied to [REDACTED] advising that he knew of no such commercial endorsements by General Eisenhower and requested advertising material reflecting General Eisenhower's name. To this, [REDACTED] replied that she had no such material but had seen the General's name as an endorser on a printed brochure which had been shown to her by a salesman of the Traid Corporation.

General Schulz, by his note to you, requested that the Better Business Bureau in Long Beach be checked to determine if [REDACTED] statements concerning the use of General Eisenhower's name were correct.

INFORMATION IN BUFILES:

[REDACTED] is not identifiable in Bufiles. Files reflect that in February, 1960, a letter was received from an attorney of the Traid Corporation advising that his client had developed a remotely controlled camera for use in banks and markets at the time of an attempted robbery. He stated his client planned to trademark this camera as "FB. Eye" and asked if the Bureau had any

General Schulz told me that he had found it necessary to call upon SAC Simon in Los Angeles to arrange for airline reservations for him and General Eisenhower. He stated that they also used transportation while out in California.

General Schulz additionally told me that the Director had recently written him a personal note concerning an individual by the name of [REDACTED] who had made threats against General Eisenhower. He stated that the fact the Director had taken time to personally do this made him feel very good indeed. I told him that I was aware of the case and that we had also advised Secret Service of the fact.

WASHINGTON, D. C.**

At 10:10 a.m. today, General Robert Schulz telephoned from Gettysburg and talked to Wick. He said that former President Eisenhower has accepted an invitation to make the principal address at 1:00 p.m., Saturday, 6-27-64, at the unveiling of the monument honoring the Ukrainian Poet-Laureate Taras Shevchenko. This ceremony, said General Schulz, takes place at about 1:00 p.m. in the vicinity of 23rd and P Streets, Northwest, Washington, D. C.

General Schulz said that former President Eisenhower will only attend the unveiling although there is a parade, a line of march and other festivities planned in conjunction with this affair during the day.

REQUEST OF GENERAL SCHULZ:

General Schulz stated that he is dealing with Major William Rutherford (telephone OXford 5-7187) who is the Aviation Officer of the Military District of Washington in arranging air transportation from Gettysburg to Washington. General Schulz said that a helicopter will bring former President Eisenhower and General Schulz to a landing area at Ft. Myer at approximately 12:30 p.m., Saturday, 6-27-64. General Eisenhower would then appreciate having the FBI provide him transportation with an FBI driver from Ft. Myer to the site of the unveiling in the vicinity of 23rd and P Streets, Northwest. The car should wait until the completion of the address (in the neighborhood of 15 to 20 minutes) and then drive former President Eisenhower and General Schulz back to Ft. Myer to board the helicopter for the trip to Gettysburg. General Schulz says he is alerting the necessary law enforcement officers in the area but the one thing lacking is transportation for his boss. Wick told him he knew the Director would be very happy to assist and that we would, in turn, be in touch with Major Rutherford to ascertain details of the exact landing site of the helicopter, etc.

When arrangements are worked out, we will be in touch with General Schulz to confirm the final details.
