The June 22, 1961 Rochester Times Union (City wide newspaper), carried an article "Young Man Accepted As Freedom Rider" which reflects Gordon L. Harris, 147 Summit Drive, Rochester, New York, was the first Rochester resident to be accepted for a mission as a Freedom Rider and was scheduled to leave that day. His acceptance came from the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE).

The article read that Harris would first go to New York City for briefing; then to New Orleans, and from there to participate in a Freedom Ride into Jackson, Mississippi.

The article mentioned that Harris is a pacifist by conviction and believes in non-violent methods of achieving racial equality. He stated he was prepared for any eventuality in the South, even a long jail sentence.



The Rey. Mr. Zimmer was among the group of seminary students who left Sewanee as a protest against racial policies in 1953. The university has no authority in the normal operation of Sewanee Inn and Claramont Res

taurant.

Freedom Riders-Miscellaners

Re Memphis letter to Bureau dated 8/23/61, which reflects that among charges billed for the telephone at the office of the Student Central Committee (SCC) at 1905 Jefferson Street, Nashville, Tennessee, were charges for a call on June 9, 1961 to Louisville, Kentucky phone 585-2331, and on May 19, 1961, to Louisville phone 774-3331.

According to the August, 1967 issue of the Louisville, Kentucky Telephone Directory, phone 7/4-3331 is listed to the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated (SCEE), 4403 Virginia Avenue, and also to CARL BRADEN, 4403 Virginia Avenue, Louisville, Kentucky.

Inasmuch as Memphis undoubtedly has a current thumbnail sketch of the SCEF, no characterization of that organization is included.

Following is a current characterization of GARL BRADEN:

Louisville, Kentucky, a self-admitted former member of the Communist Party (CP), Louisville, Kentucky, in testifying on Recember 11 and 13, 1954, in Jefferson County, Kentucky Criminal Court, in a state sedition prosecution against KARL EXADEN, identified CARL BRADEN and his wife, ANNEXERADEN, as having been known to her as members of the CP, Louisville, Kentucky, from January, 1951, to shortly prior to the time of her testimony.

The booklet entitled "Communist Infiltration and Activities in the South", printed for the use of the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, on pages 2667 through 2681, reports the testimony of CARL BRADEW before the sub-committee of the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, on July 30, 1958.

BRADEN identified himself as a worker in the integration movement in the South and as a Field Secretary of the Southern Conference Education Fund (SCEE), which organization he identified as "a South-wide inter-racial organization working to bring about integration, justice and decency in the South". BRADEN also said he was Associate Editor of the newspaper of the SCEF, "The Southern Patriot", which he said "disseminates information on integration in the South and about people who are working for integration".

BRADEN testified that he was previously "unemployed as a result of harassment and prosecution resulting from... efforts to bring about integration in Louisville, Kentucky."

BRADEN declined to answer the question; "... Are you now a member of the Communist Party?" on the basis of the First Amendment, stating that the question. "Has no possible pertinency to any legislation."

He declined to answer on the same grounds a question as to whether or not was in error when she testified before the Committee on Un-American Activities that while she was a member of the CP, she knew BRADEN as a CP member

BRADEN thereafter refused to answer other questions on the basis of invasion of rights guaranteed by the First Amendment, which he designated as freedom of speech, beliefs and associations.

The Courier-Journal, Louisville, Kentucky, a news-paper of general circulation, on February 3, 1959, reported that CARL BRADEN had been sentenced to one year in prison on a charge of contempt of Congress on February 2, 1959, in Atlanta, Georgia. The story noted that he had been convicted under this charge on January 21, 1959, and that the charge arose from his refusal to answer questions before the House Committee on Un-American Activities.


The Louisville Times, Louisville, Kentucky, a newspaper of general circulation, on February 27, 1961, reported that the U.S. Supreme Court had, on that date, affirmed the contempt of Congress conviction of BRADEN. LS 157-89

The Courier-Journal, on May 2, 1961, reported that CARL BRADEN had surrendered to the U.S. Marshal at Atlanta, Georgia, on May 1, 1961, to begin serving a one year prison sentence for contempt of Congress.

In connection with Louisville telephone number 585-231, mentioned above, in connection with referenced letter, it is noted the August, 1961 issue of the Louisville, Kentucky Telephone Directory reflects this number to be listed for the Henry Clay Hotel, Louisville, Kentucky. It is noted the call to this number from the phone in the office of the Student Central Committee, Nashville, Tennessee, was made on June 9, 1961.

In this connection, the attention of the Bureau and Memphis is directed to Louisville letter to Bureau, with copies to various offices, dated June 30, 1961, entitled "Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee - RACIAL MATTERS", which reflects that the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee met in Louis ville, Kentucky for three days ending June 11, 1961. Meetings were held in the Henry Clay Hotel, Louisville, Kentucky. Included on the reported agenda for the meeting were policy decisions about future "Freedom Rides" and discussions of Negro efforts to desegregate recreational facilities this summer.

It would appear from the above that the call of June 9, 1961, related to the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee which was then meeting in Louisville, Kentucky.

Pierce, Detective Bureau, Jackson, Mississippi, advised that at 6:10 p.m. on July 7, 1961, a group of Freedom Riders, were arrested at the Trailways Bus: Terminal, Jackson, Mississippi by Captain Jackson Police Department. Pierce advised that this group of Freedom Riders had arrived in Jackson by bus from Montgomery, Alabama, had entered the white waiting room of the terminal and were ordered to move on by police officers. When they failed to obey the order of the officers, they were arrested on a charge of Breach of the Peace, and transported to the city jail, where they were booked. Pierce stated there were no incidents in connection with the above arrests.

On February 29, 1956, a second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that on that date had contacted the Soviet Embassy in Washington, D. C., and requested that he be allowed to enter and live in the Soviet Union because he could not expect to receive justice since was greater than social justice in the United States.

On February 2: 1959, a third source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, made available a piece
of the letterhead stationery of the Committee to Combat Racial Injustice, which reflected that
the Union County, North Carolina, NAACP
the Committee to Combat Racial Injustice.

On December 19, 1958, a fourth source, who has furhished reliable information in the past, advised that the committee to combat Racial Injustice was being set up in order
to concern itself mainly with the racial issue involving the
conviction and incarceration of two Negro youths, ages eight
and ten at Monroe, North Carolina, who were convicted of kissing
a white girl. This source added that this committee would concern itself with other racial incidents and intends to become
a prominent organization. This same source also stated that
this committee was initiated through the efforts of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), which was the motivating force in
the formation of this committee.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450

The April 6, 1960, edition of The New York Times carried an article which maintained that the United States Press had made certain charges against Cuba which were not true and that the "Fair Play for Cuba Committee" was organized to tell the truth about Cuba in the interest of fair play.

Among those listed as members of this committee was

on August 10, 1960, a fifth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that on August 7, 1960 he attended a meeting at 116 University Place, New York City, at which time was introduced as a noted Negro leader from Monroe, North Carolina, a sponsor of "Fair Play for Ouba Committee" and that had just returned from

an extended tour of Cuba, where he observed the revolution, first hand, and participated in the July 26, 1960 celebration on the Sierra Maestra. stated he visited Cuba to see the advancement of the Cuban Revolution and was very impressed by its success. stated today in Cuba one does not see any racial discrimination and that the United States Government and the States Department are making a definite effort to keep Negroes out of Cuba. stated "the progress of the revolution can be see all over---. If this is Communism then I vote for Communism".

They waited about two minutes for a police patrol wagon during which time Chief TEASLEY asked all of the members of the group for their names and he also asked if they had a meeting to plan this action. said they had. The group was then taken away in the patrol wagon.

The representatives of the Police Department and Caddo Parish Sheriff's Office remained in the Tral lways Bus Terminal until the 5:45 AM bus for Jackson, Mississippi had departed. There were no other incidents at the bus station.

During the above there were approximately fifty persons in the bus station; however, most of them had luggage with them and did not appear to have much interest in the happenings and appeared to be travelers. 

On January 28, 1960, NY II-2, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that while in Washington on January 25, 1960, mentioned to several members of the delegation which was to appear before the United States Parole Board in behalf of Henry Winston, that he was formerly a member of the Communist Party (CP).

On July 20, 1948; Henry Winston was indicted in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York (USDC, SDNY), under the Smith Act of 1940 and convicted on the same charge on October 14, 1949.





On September 3, 1961, I attended a convention held at 8751 Grand River in Detroit. There was about 35 people there, 17 of them men, and the rest women. There was 5 Negro work women there and 2 Negro man.

Saul Blackman gave the first talk. It concerned working with other organizations. His talk was quite brief and he mention CORE and the Trade Union Labor councel. He said that he thought CORE was doing a great job and that they would support them, but he didn'T have such good words for the TULC. He said that they organizied to help the men in the unions, but they have an altogather different attitude, since they formed it. He said that they are soliciting new members and that he was talking to a carpenter that works in the same shop that he does and that the man said they approached him about jaing joining the TULC and that the sales talk they used was that they had a nice bar. Saul said that it showed just how much they planned on helping the members.

Louise, one of the Freedom Riders, gave  $\phi n \not e / \phi f / t \not n \not e$  the next talk on her experiences in Jackson Mississippi when she was arrested with the other Freedom Riders. She said that 8 minutes after the bus load of Freedom Riders got in Jackson, they were arrested. They were taken to the city jail first and then were moved to the county jail. She said that they were put into maximum security, but she said that only hardened criminals are supposed to be put there, but they told them it was for there own protection. She said that the Negro and white \$4666 girls were all put together and the Negro men and white men were separated. There were 13 girls to a cell and only four cots, so the rest of them  $\psi \not e \not r \not e$  had to sleep on the floor and that the whole place was full of bugs.

Louise said that they served 40 days there and that during this time, the guards came one day and took nine of the Negroes(including Mary) out of the cell and no one saw them for a long time. Louise saw one of the guards and asked him to give Mary her toothbrush that she had left behind and he said "to never mind because she would be coming" and then stopped in the middle of his sentence. She said they finally found out why they were taken away and it was because they were having an official inspection and they didn't want it to look overcrowded. She also mentioned that they discoved that the quarters where the desperate criminals and murderers were being held was right behind them and that all they were being fed was one biscuit and one teaspoon of whathever was being served for each meal, so they hooked up a string and passed biscuts through a ventilator to the men. One day, some one stuck his hand through the ventilator and they thought it was the prisinors so they started pushing the biscuits as fast as they could, but it turned out to be a guard. They were taken before the warden and she said that he was so mad they were afraid they were going to kill them, but instead they took their mattresses away from them and also their towels and toothbrushes. After serving their 40 days, they went to New Orleans, because they had to be back in Jackson in a few days for their trial. She said they new better than to get into any trouble, because of their coming trial, so they were minding their own business when the police picked up her, Mary and another girl. She said that they were waiting for a bus and she had \$15.00 in her pocket, but they charged them with loitering and vagrancy. They booked them, but CORE bailed them out and then the next night they were arrested again the and they charged them with being prostitutes

said that they were going to call in the FBI and Louise said she got so mad that she told them that she wished they would, because a FBI man rode all the way to Mississippi on the bus with them to protect them from popi people like the the mops and that they would be doing her a favor if they would call them. She said after that they didn't bother them and they were released.

Mary Hamilton, A Negro Freedom Rider, gave a brief talk about the way she felt about the Freedom Riders. She said that she now thinks that things will change for the Negroes and they will be given more tights.

A boy about 19 years old stood up and talked a few minutes. He told how he belonged to a group of students called the Student Peace Unit. He said that it originated in Chicago and that they now have about 3,000 members.

There was another boy there who said his name was Bob Speck and that he was 17 years old. He's from Texas, but is not connected with News and Letters. He told how he was arrested several times in connection with integration. He said that it one jail in Texas he was peat up by the guards and that in doing this they inticed the other prisoners to beat him up and that when he got out of jail, he filed a complaint with the FBI against the Guards.

GREENE was described in the article as a member of CORE who will be discharged from the Air Force 7/7/61.

An item from the "People's World" (a West Coast weekly communist newspaper) of 7/15/61, tells of a group of Freedom Riders sponsored by the 2nd Baptist Church, Los Angeles, leaving Los Angeles on 7/12/61 for the South. The article states, "A man who wanted to make the trip but did not was WILLIAM GREEN, just discharged from the armed services. GREEN had been selected by the Congress of Racial Equality to serve as Freedom Ride coordinator in this area."

On September 25. 1961. Nashville, Tennessee, advised that the various organizations sponsoring the Freedom Rides to Jackson, Mississippi, are in bad financial straits as a result of the trials, the bonds, and the fines which are having to be paid in Jackson. stated that the attorneys for the Freedom Riders have advised them that if the cases are taken through the courts to the last court in Mississippi and from there to Federal Court, it will cost approximately one million dollars or more. stated that they do not have this kind of money and it looks as if they will have to drop the appeals. He stated that this will mean that the fines levied on the Freedom Riders will have to be paid which, in itself, will be a severe financial strain on the various groups involved and also mean that the participants in the Freedom Rides will have to serve time in the Hines County Jail or at the State Penitentiary at Parchman, Mississippi.

stated that he feels that there is a possibility that the State would drop the cases now that the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) has ruled that the bus lines have to maintain nonsegregated facilities in their terminals and that he considers this to be a victory for the Freedom Riders. He stated, however, that from a legal standpoint the State of Mississippi would not have to drop the cases and, therefore, the situation would be unchanged. He stated that they realized now that they sent too many people to Jackson, Mississippi; that they should have only used the first groups as a test case rather than having so many cases on which they would have to pay fines.

#### FREEDOM RIDERS

In further discussing some of the various aspects of the Freedom Rides pointed out that efforts are being made in Nashville, Tennessee, to have Tennessee A&I State University, a Negro school, reinstate 14 of the A&I students who were dismissed from the school in May of 1961 because of their participation in the Freedom Rides. He stated that the school authorities have refused to reconsider the cases and stated that even though the students are continuing to demonstrate at the school and in Nashville, Tennessee, the demonstrations do not appear to be bearing any fruit. He stated that insofar as he knows the State school authorities will not change their stand on the issue nor will Governor Ellington. He stated that there is some hope that the fact that the ICC has ruled that the bus facilities will have to be desegregated may give the school authorities an excuse to change their ruling; however, he stated that this appears to be a dim possibility. He also stated that attorneys have been consulted relative to taking the case of these 14 students to Federal Court in an effort to have a court order issued that the school should reinstate them. He stated, however, that no effort has been made by the attorneys to actually take the case to court at this time.





A confidential, source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on January 7, 1957, that an application was made to Brooklyn College Faculty-Student Committee on Student Organizations for permission to organize a Eugene V. Debs Society at Brooklyn College. The purpose of the proposed organization was to further the ideas of democratic socialism, which necessarily implies opposition of all forms of totalitarianism and to treat current social, economic, and political events from a socialist point of view.

# YOUNG SOCIALIST LEAGUE (YSL)

The March 1, 1954, issue of the "Young Socialist Challenge," published as page three of "Labor Action," an official publication of the Independent Socialist League (ISL), contained an article concerning the creation of the YSL, which pointed out that at a unity conference occurring February 12-14, 1954, at Labor Action Hall, New York, New York, a merger occurred between the Young People's Socialist League (YPSL) and the Socialist Youth League (SYL). The new organization was named the YSL.

A confidential informant on June 15, 1954, made available the minutes of the YSL's National Action Committee meeting of which reflected that one of SP (Socialist Party)

had objected to a statement appearing in "Commerce," a
New York University journal, which indicated that the YPSL
merged with the SYL to form the YSL. He explained that
the YPSL did not merge with anyone, that it continued to
exist as the youth section of the Socialist Party. He
explained that a small group of the YPSL was dropped,
expelled, or suspended from that organization and joined
the SYL, which he characterized as the youth group of the
"Trotskyite ISL." He explained that after these few former
members of the YPSL joined the SYL, the SYL them proceeded
to change its name for its own purposes.

On April 9, 1956, another confidential informant advised as follows:

The YSL has frequently worked in close sympathetic cooperation with the ISL toward similar objectives, although each major issue given mutual consideration is decided upon by these organizations individually. The YSL serves as an apprenticeship for the ISL, but ISL selection of members from YSL ranks is made on an individual and personal basis. In many instances YSL members are also members of the ISL,

# YOUNG SOCIALIST LEAGUE (YSL) CONT'D.

The YSL and ISL utilize the same printing house in New York City and the YSL publication is printed as an insert in "Labor Action." Frequently, lecturers before the YSL are ISL members.

The September 22, 1958, issue of "Young Socialist Challenge," which appeared as page five of "Labor Action," contained an undated statement from the National Action Committee of the YSL which indicated that the YSL had been dissolved. The statement appeared under the caption "Join the Young Peoples Socialist League."

The YPSL is publicly known as the youth affiliate of the Socialist Party-Social Democratic Federation.

# INDEPENDENT SOCIALIST LEAGUE (ISL) FORMERLY WORKERS PARTY (WP)

The May 4, 1942, issue of "Labor Action," then an official publication of the Workers Party (WP), carried an article which reflected that the WP was formed in April, 1940, as a result of a split within the leadership of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). The article stated that when the Hitler-Stalin Pact was signed and Poland invaded, the minority group within the SWP, in proclaiming the formation of the WP, condemned the pact as being imperialistic in nature and stated it would not support either imperialist camp.

The April 25, 1949, issue of "Labor Action" contained an account of the Fifth National Convention of the WP, held March 24-27, 1949, in New York City, which reflected the change of name of the organization from the WP to the Independent Socialist League (ISL) in order to emphasize the character of the group as a propaganda group for the spreading of socialist ideas and not as a full-fledged political party.

The July 14, 1958, issue of "Labor Action," an official publication of the ISL, contained an article captioned, "The ISL Program in Brief." The article indicated: "The ISL stands for socialist democracy and against the two systems of exploitation which now divide the world: capitalism and Stalinism. The ISL, as a Marxist movement, looks to the working class and its ever-present struggle as the basic progressive force in society. The ISL is organized to spread the ideas of socialism in the labor movement and among all other sections of the people. There can be no lasting and genuine democracy without socialism and there can be no socialism without democracy."

The September 22, 1958, issue of "Labor Action" contained an undated statement signed by the Political Committee of the ISL which indicated that the ISL had been dissolved. The statement urged former ISL members to join the Socialist Party-Social Democratic Federation.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

# SOCIALIST YOUTH LEAGUE (SYL)

A confidential informant has advised that the Socialist Youth League (SYL) began in 1945 when several militant members of the Young People's Socialist League (YPSL), the youth organization of the Socialist Party, accepted a proposal that they become affiliated with the Workers Party. The first issue of the group's newspaper, "Youth Action for Socialism," in October, 1945, contained an article which indicated that "...Only socialism can answer youth's needs for jobs, peace, education and a fuller life...Our organization is the only national revolutionary youth group in America."
