



APPENDIX

INDEPENDENT STUDENT UNION

On May 3, 1961, a source advised that the Independent Student Union (ISU) was formed by a group of Los Angeles City College students in March, 1960.

The preamble to the ISU constitution states in part:

"We, the members of the ISU, are dedicated to giving our energies to building a world of peace, wherein the peoples of all lands will not have to live in constant fear of nuclear, biological and chemical warfare.

"We pledge our efforts to ending of all social inequality based upon race, creed or national origin and to further the eradication of discrimination in all walks of American life.

"We affirm the right and value of both students and instructors to take an active role in the political life of the nation, and believe that no restriction should be placed upon the free expression of ideas and opinions within and outside the classroom."

The source stated that the ISU was originally controlled by three co-chairmen, one of whom was a member of the Southern California District Communist Party (CP). In September, 1960, was elected to be president of the ISU and served until April, 1961.

The CP, USA has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The source stated the ISU claims to have a member-ship of 200; however, membership does not necessarily indicate sympathy to the CP.



The above article also reflected that EUGENE B. IEVINE, a professor of English at Oklahoma State University. Stillwater, Oklahoma, had been arrested by the police in Jackson, Mississippi, and charged with committing a breach of the peace. According to the article, Jackson police quoted. 

It has worked closely with the Ithaca Freedom Walk Committee, a community sponsored group which has worked in raising funds for the anti-segregation forces in the south, and it was the sponsoring organization working with the Congress of Racial Equality in recruiting freedom riders at Cornell. "CORNELL STUDENTS FOR ABOLITION OF THE HCUA"

According to Proctor, Cornell b7c University, this is an officially recognized student group formed during the 1960-61 school year for the main purpose of circulating a petition to the 87th Congress urging the abolition of the HCUA as a standing committee.

"PROGRESSIVE YOUTH ORGANIZING COMMITTEE"

On February 9, 1961, a source advised that the PYOC was established at a national socialist-oriented youth conference held in Chicago, Illinois on December 20, 1960, through January 1, 1961. This conference was the result of a mandate issued by the National Executive Committee of the Communist Party, USA calling for a youth conference to establish an organizing committee whose objectives would be to set up a national socialist-oriented youth organization. The conference scheduled a convention to be held within a year to found a new national socialist-oriented youth organization.





As the Bureau has been previously advised, Baltimore newspapers are giving wide publicity to the statement of JULIUS HOBSON, of CORE, New York City, that CORE plans to send approximately 750 of its members to Delaware and Maryland for the purpose of testing the refusal of restaurants and hotels along U.S. Route 40 to serve colored people. The plan of CORE is that the 750 members are to be drawn from the CORE Chapters in New York, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, Virginia and the District of Columbia, as well as Maryland. They are to arrive in Baltimore on November 11, 1961, and one group plans to leave from Baltimore, and the other will begin its march from the Delaware Memorial Bridge, and the two groups plan to meet at a half-way point.

For the information of the offices receiving copies of this airtel, numerous incidents have occurred along U.S. Route #40 growing out of the refusal to serve colored people including representatives of the new African States. incidents caused the holding of various meetings with the restaurant owners by representatives of the U.S. State Department and the Maryland Commission on Interracial Problems. It would appear that on one hand, CORE has announced that 750 "freedom riders" would come to Delaware and Maryland on November 11 next, and on the other hand, representatives of the State of Maryland are attempting to forestall this move and to get legislation passed in the State Legislature making it mandatory on the part





I. BACKGROUND

Starting in May through July, 1960, the Civic Interest Group (CIG) and the Baltimore National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) were successful in influencing Baltimore City downtown department stores and restaurants to serve all customers, both Negro and white, in their restaurants. The methods used by the group were mainly sit—down and picketing. The CIG is a protest organization made up primarily of students from Morgan State College, Baltimore. These demonstrations were accompanied by arrest and fines for trespassing. Under the Maryland law, restaurant owners are not under obligation to serve Negroes and a restaurant owner, who does not wish to serve a Negro, orders the Negro off the premises. The Negro is usually arrested for trespassing when he refuses to leave on the complaint of the proprietor of the restaurant.



In June and July of 1961, there were a number of instances where representatives of the various African countries were refused service at restaurants along Route #40, which is the route commonly used between Delaware and Washington, D.C. The CIG protested this refusal to serve the African dignitaries to Governor J. MILLARD TAWES, of Maryland. In October, 1961, six Negroes, including the President of the CIG, attempted to force service to them at a restaurant on Route #40 and were arrested for trespassing.

In September, 1961, two statements were made by representatives of the United States State Department; namely, Mr. CHESTER BOWLES, Under Secretary of State, and Mr. PEDRO SAN JUAN, Assistant Chief of Protocol. Their statements pointed out that the refusal of restaurant owners to extend their service to diplomats and foreign visitors from Africa was not only embarrassing to the United States Government in its foreign policy, but provides a ready source of propaganda material for Soviet Russia. They both urged the Governor to see that an equal-accommodations law for the service of both Negroes and whites be passed by the Maryland Legislature.

In the same month, under the auspices of the State Department, meetings were held with representatives of the State of Maryland and the restaurant owners. At these meetings, a statement was read on behalf of the President of the United States, the Honorable JOHN F. KENNEDY, wherein he urged voluntary desegregation in these restaurants, and that such action would have a good influence in showing the world that the ideals of freedom and democracy were actually put into practice. During the same month and at an annual Conference of Southern Governors, held in Nashville, Tenn., reference was made to the above incidents.

One of the concrete results from the above meeting between the representatives of the United States State Department and the restaurant owners was the formation of a committee of restaurant owners to consider the problem. However, this committee after considering the problem for a very short time resigned with a communication to the Governor of Maryland, pointing out that the problem of service by restaurant owners to Negroes was a state-wide problem and not one confined to the restaurants along Route #40.

Governor TAWES has repeatedly taken the position that eventually an equal-accommodations bill will be passed by the Maryland Legislature; however, he pointed out that it will take time for the legislation to be found generally acceptable, and he asked for patience and forbearance from the citizens.

In October, 1961, JULIUS HOBSON, of the Congress on National Equality (CORE), New York city, made a statement that it was going to send into Maryland approximately 750 Freedom Riders who would enter restaurants along Route #40 in an attempt to be served. It was made clear that CORE was not satisfied with the position taken by Governor TAWES and wanted immediate action toward the passage of an equal-accommodations law. They later added to this demand the further demand that the restaurant owners, in advance of the Freedom Riders entering the State, desegregate their restaurants. The date set by CORE for the Freedom Ride is November 11, 1961. According to the plan of CORE, its 750 members would be drawn from CORE chapters in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, Virginia, District of Columbia, and Maryland. They will travel along Route #40, testing service to colored people in the various restaurants and hotels. One group was to leave from Baltimore and the other to start at the Delaware state line and the two groups would meet at a half-way point.

In the evening of October 27, 1961, five New York Negroes staged a sit-in at a restaurant along Route #40. According to the Maryland State Police, this was in the nature of a "trial run." The arrested Negroes were four officials of the NAACP, New York, and the editor of the New York Courier. These individuals had in their possession a tape recorder and movie camera.

II. CURRENT SITUATION

b2 b7D

On October 28, 1961, CORE Headquarters, New York, held a general meeting at which representatives of the CORE branches were present. A confidential source available to the Baltimore office advised that not only CORE representatives were at the meeting but also NAACP members were there. At this conference, JULIUS HOBSON announced the firm intention of CORE to send at least 750 - 1000 Freedom Riders into Maryland on November 11, 1961. The confidential source advised that the local branch of CORE is taking cognizance of the rumor that the restaurants along Route #40 may close their doors on November 11, 1961, and consequently CORE is considering the advisability of staging a demonstration in advance of November 11, 1961, possibly November 9. This is very tentative and the informant expects to get more exact information at a subsequent date.

Although the State Commission on Inter-Racial Problems and Relations is meeting with CORE officials on November 3, 1961, in a last minute effort to avoid the Freedom Riders demonstration, the Maryland State Police and the Baltimore County Police are making their plans on the basis that the demonstrations will take

place as announced by CORE. On October 30, 1961, Special Agents of the Baltimore office in the role of observers attended a conference of officers of the Maryland State Police, Baltimore County Police, and the State's Attorney of Baltimore County, where plans were worked out to handle the Freedom Riders.

Briefly, the Maryland State Police is assuming a supporting role. This agency was of the opinion that the Baltimore County Police Department could handle the occurrences along Route #40 within the County. However, the Maryland State Police were preparing blown-up maps of Route #40 area, listing some 75 restaurants and also locations of local magistrates. The entire force of the Maryland State Police has been alerted and all leave cancelled and everyone is held on stand-by basis. The Maryland State Police has formulated plans whereby they will be promptly alerted by the Delaware State Police of the size of the caravan and the mode of transportation of the Freedom Riders as they cross through Delaware.

Chief GILBERT L. DEYLE, Baltimore County Police Department, has assumed primary responsibility for the handling of the Freedom Riders in Baltimore County. They have made an analysis of the 73 restaurants on U.S. Route #40, east, in Baltimore County, and have noted that the largest concentration of 37 restaurants is on Route #40 between Baltimore City and Harford County line.

Both the Maryland State Police and the Baltimore County Police Department have agreed on the following procedure re the Freedom Riders:

At the time the Freedom Riders appear at a restaurant, the proprietor of the restaurant will read Section 577, Article 27, of the Annotated Code of Maryland, with respect to trespassing. In the event the Freedom Riders refuse to leave the restaurant, police officers will be summoned and they too will read the trespassing law. Accompanying the police officers will be committing magistrates who will ride in the patrol cars and immediately following the reading of the trespassing law by the police officers, the magistrate will issue a warrant. The individuals who violate the trespassing law will be placed under arrest and will be taken to the closest Baltimore County police station where a trial magistrate will advise them of the charges and set collateral. They will be fingerprinted at the station house. The State's Attorney advised that in addition to the trespassing law, the Freedom Riders may also be charged with disorderly conduct, inciting a riot, or resisting arrest as the case may be. Collateral will be \$100.00 for the trespassing violation and \$25.00 each for the other violations. Matrons will be available for women prisoners. Women with small children will be released on their own recognizance.

All police officials will bend backward to avoid any civil rights complaints. At the time of the conference, the greatest concern was over the activities of the white citizen groups or general mob misbehavior.

Chief DEYLE stated that it was his opinion that the October 27, 1961, incident (supra) where the colored individuals arrived on the scene with tape recorder and motion picture camera, is something that can be expected to happen with the Freedom Riders.

The question of diplomatic immunity arose when it was suggested that CORE officials may be accompanied by African diplomats. It was the opinion of the State's Attorney that if

The question of diplomatic immunity arose when it was suggested that CORE officials may be accompanied by African diplomats. It was the opinion of the State's Attorney that if the diplomats did not identify themselves as diplomats by presenting proper credentials, they should be taken into custody and that immediately upon the establishment of the fact that they are diplomats, they should be released. It was announced at the meeting that another meeting of the same personnel plus representatives of their police agencies would meet on November 7, 1961.

It was further determined that the Maryland State Police would handle Route #40 outside of Baltimore County in conjunction with the local police departments in Harford and Cecil Counties.

The meeting was concluded with the expression of an opinion by Colonel Superintendent of the Maryland State Police, that his agency should contact CORE, requesting information concerning the number of their groups and the mode of transportation because of the traffic hazards that may occur on Route #40, on November 11, 1961.

III. PHYSICAL CONDITIONS

The mileage along Route #40 from the Baltimore City line to the Delaware State line is approximately 50 miles.

The Baltimore office made a physical count of eating establishments along this same route and have come up with a figure of 116. CORE, from its Headquarters in New York, has stated that it has made a survey of the restaurants along U.S. Route #40 and intends to visit 65 restaurants. The Baltimore office survey shows the concentration of the restaurants and from the Exhibit Unit of the Bureau will have in its possession detailed maps showing the location of each restaurant. Sufficient copies of these maps will be made available to the personnel of the Baltimore office in its planning for the Freedom Riders' visit to Route #40 and the actual coverage of the event.

BA 157-351 OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS Based on the above, the following plan of action is recommended: 1. All offices are to alert all possible informants and sources who can be in a position to furnish any information as to the plans of any possible participants in this Freedom Ride. Bureau and Baltimore should be immediately advised by such communication as is necessary, depending on the urgency of the Bureau and Baltimore need to know all possible details concerning any of the participants. It cannot be stressed too much that all details are essential. Baltimore has established liaison with the Maryland State Police and Baltimore County Police. This liaison, as well as liaison with other Police Departments that may be involved, will continue in order to determine any further plans these Departments have concerning this Freedom Ride. In addition, liaison is being established by the Wilmington Resident Agency with the Delaware State Police in order to be advised of any information they may obtain concerning the arrival of Freedom Riders. 3. Baltimore plans to have observers on Route #40 on November 11, 1961. Twenty cars with two agents each will be dispatched to assigned sectors of Route #40. Six of these cars will have movie camera equipment to be available for photographing incidents where the Bureau may have a later investigative interest. Radio communication is being established in order that the Bureau may be promptly advised of any developments on that date. Detailed plans and assignments are being made by Baltimore to accomplish the basic purpose of agents as observers. V. REQUEST OF THE BUREAU UACB by November 3, 1961, this plan for observance will be completed by Baltimore and ready to go into operation by November 8, 1961, assuming the possibility that an earlier date may be set for this Freedom Ride. - 6 -

Julius W. Hobson, President, Washington Chapter, Congress of Racial Equality, (CORE) advised a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on October 30, 1961, the tentative plans for the Freedom Riders on November 11, 1961, are as follows:

A conference is being planned with the chairman of the Maryland Commission on Inter-racial Problems (MCIP) and members of CORE sometime between November 2, 1961, and November 6, 1961, in Baltimore, Maryland, concerning the Freedom Ride on November 11, 1961, when the restaurants along Route Number Forty in Maryland and Delaware will be tested to serve colored people.

Hobson said if assurance is given at this conference that the committee of restaurant owners, which has recently disbanded, will reorganize and reconsider discussions and conferences with members of CORE, the demonstration on November 11, 1961, will be postponed.

Further, Hobson said, if the proposed conference with MCIP is in any way productive, the proposed demonstration will be postponed.

Hobson stated he, himself, is not in accord with the demonstration as he feels the demonstration, which Governor Tawes of Maryland has opposed, will not result in the special session of Maryland legislative representatives. Hobson favors, he said, more conferences with the restaurant owners and the MCIP. He reiterated he, himself, feels the demonstration on November 11, 1961, will not take place.

Hobson commented on the point that the Department of State is doing a commendable job in trying to desegragate the restaurants along Route Number Forty.

serve Negroes except four who claimed they would not serve Negroes and two others who gave a qualified "yes", that they would mentioned that the announcement serve Negroes. by the Governor of Delaware, however, might prompt other restaurants not to serve Negroes. The same issue of "The Sun" reflected the fact that the legislative council of the Maryland State Legislature had endorsed a bill banning racial discrimination in hotels, motels and restaurants and specifically would make it a crime to deny service to a customer because of race, religion, or a national origin. The vote of the legislative council which is composed of most of the legislative leaders was 12 to 6. This action is advisory in its nature and will serve as a basis for the introduction of the bill at the next General Assembly which is scheduled for February, 1962. Governor J. MILLARD TAWES of Maryland has already refused to call a special session of the General Assembly to consider any bill. The restaurant owners along Route 40 are meeting tonight in an attempt to work out some common action in the face of the expected arrival of freedom riders on November 11, 1961. This office will, through the Maryland State Police and the Baltimore County Police, be advised of the results of the conference of restaurant owners.

The Baltimore Office, in view of the developments in the Delaware area, are taking steps to assure adequate coverage in this area and included in the plans of the Baltimore Office for November 11, 1961.

In connection with captioned matter, close liaison with local authorities and contact with other sources of information should be maintained for any information indicating that the freedom ride on Route #40 will take place on a date prior to 11/11/61 or that it may not take place at all.

With regard to the use of Agents as observers on Route #40, you should instruct the Agents assigned that they must be most discreet in any of their actions in carrying out the assignment. Since local police authorities have indicated that they intend to maintain order and enforce the law, it does not appear necessary that photographs be taken of any arrests being made by the local authorities in carrying out that intention. The identities of any individuals arrested can be obtained through liaison with the local police. If photographs are considered necessary in the event of any mob opposition to the freedom riders,

Agent personnel should be circumspect in obtaining these photographs and bear in mind the fact that their value would be for use in identification of unknown participants and possible witnesses.

The Bureau should be immediately advised of any developments of interest and in addition, pertinent information should promptly be submitted in letterhead memorandum form suitable for dissemination.

NOTE: On 10/28/61 the headquarters of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), New York City, held a meeting at which Julius Hobson, a CORE official, announced the firm intention of CORE to send 750-1,000 freedom riders into Maryland on 11/11/61 to test restaurant facilities along Route #40. The Maryland State Police and Baltimore County. Police, with whom close liaison is being maintained, have agreed on a definite procedure they will follow in maintaining order. If freedom riders are refused service at a restaurant the proprietor will read the Maryland trespassing law to the freedom riders and if they refuse to leave the restaurant upon request, police officers will be summoned and they too will read the trespassing law. If the freedom riders still refuse to leave the restaurant, they will then be placed under arrest. In the event any African diplomats participate, they will be taken into custody if they do not present proper credentials. They will be immediately released upon the establishment of the fact that they are diplomats. The Baltimore Office is assigning 20 cars with two Agents in each car along the 50 mile stretch of Route #40 for the purpose of observing the activity. Six of the cars will have camera equipment available for photographing incidents where the Bureau may have a later investigative interest. While there is some local opposition to integration among several of the restaurant owners and some of the communities involved, there is no indication that any violence is expected and no indication that the local police authorities do not intend to preserve the law if any violence does occur.


Our New Orleans, Louisiana, Office has furnished information that a Trailways bus from Shreveport, Louisiana, arrived at Jackson, Mississippi, at 7:24 a.m., Central Standard Time, November 1. 1961. A Negro female, identifying and a Negro male, identifying herself as himself as disembarked from the bus and walked into the white waiting room of the Trailways terminal where both approached the ticket counter. An officer of the Jackson Police Department ordered both of these persons to move on. is reported to have said to the officer, "We came here for some information." The officer then repeated his order for them to move on. then is reported to have stated, "Ish't your order in defiance of the ICC regulation?" The officer did not respond to this and again ordered the couple to move on. When they failed to do so, he placed both of them under arrest. They were escorted from the terminal to a police department car and were driven off. No incidents occurred during the arrest and it is reported that approximately ten press representatives were present at the terminal. The above information was orally furnished to



where they were booked. PIERCE said there were no incidents in
connection with the above arrests.





DETAILS: AT JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI

Investigation in this case was predicated upon receipt of the following communication from the Detroit Office of the FBI, which was dated September 7, 1961:

The August 30, 1961, edition of "The Detroit Free Press," Metro Final, Page 1, Column 2, carried an article reflecting that the following Episcopal ministers plan to become Freedom Riders on a "Prayer Pilgrimage" Bus departing New Orleans, Louisiana, on September 11, 1961, and arriving Dearborn, Michigan, September 16, 1961:

Rev. MALCOLM ROYD, Chaplain, Wayne State University, Detroit,

Rev. JOSEPH S VDICKSON, Rector, St. Joseph's Church, Detroit, Michigan.

Rev. JAMES B. GUINAN, Rector, Trinity Church, Farmington, Michigan. 10 15

According to this article, the Prayer Pilgrimage is being sponsored by the Episcopal Society for Cultural and Racial Unity, an Episcopal church group with headquarters in Atlanta, Georgia.

"The tour is primarily to alert the church and General Convention to the situation within our own structure and to recognize that we are all involved" (Quotes in article from un-named spokesman)

Article stated that the Society hopes to gather 37 priests from across the nation for a briefing and prayer session in New Orleans on September 11, 1961, and

then go to Jackson, Mississippi, the next day. The tour will include a half dozen Episcopal related colleges in the south, some integrated, some not. The men on the tour are warned to prepare for time in Jail in Jackson and to refuse bail; however, the Detroit priests are not expected to be among those risking jail sentences because of the church convention in Detroit September 17, 1961.

The following investigation was conducted by

On September 12, 1961, Jackson Clarion-Ledger Daily News, 311 E. Pearl Street, advised that an AP wire service story datelined at New Orleans on September 12, 1961, informed that a group of twenty-eight Episcopal Ministers, including the co-ordinator, JOHN BY MORRIS, of Atlanta, Georgia, the Executive Director of the Episcopal Society for Cultural and Racial Unity, have bhartered an unidentified bus at New Orleans and intend to depart New Orleans on the morning of September 12, 1961, en route to the 60 General Conference of their church at Detroit, Michigan. He informed this story states the group consists of six Negroes and twenty-two white clergymen who plan to arrive at Detroit on September 17, 1961. He said the story does not reflect that any of this group plans to test facilities at bus terminals or elsewhere on this trip. He advised that Reverend MALCOLM BOYD, Chaplain, Wayne State University, Detroit, Michigan, advised reporters in New Orleans that the group intended to visit "church related institutions in the south offering prayers where such institutions had been integrated and protests where they had not been integrated." Mr. STARR advised the group refused to furnish their schedule in advance except to state that they planned to visit Jackson, Mississippi, and spend the night of September 12, 1961, at this city and would proceed to Sewanee, Tennessee, on September 13, 1961. Mr. STARR advised that All Saints Episcopal College, Vicksburg, Mississippi, is the only church related. institution in this state and further advised that St. Andrews Day School at Jackson, Mississippi, is a private school, although it is located on property owned by the Episcopal Church.

On September 12, 1961. the above information was telephonically furnished to Cic Agent, Jackson, Mississippi, and to Chief of Detectives M. B. PIERCE, Police Department, Jackson, Mississippi.

On September 12, 1961, Chief of Detectives M. B. PIERCE, Police Department, telephonically advised that the chartered bus containing twenty-eight Episcopal Ministers arrived at Tougaloo Southern Christian College, Tougaloo, Mississippi, which is approximately five miles north of Jackson, at 7:00 PM, September 12, 1961, and the ministers apparently intend to spend the night at that college. He advised he had no further information concerning their intentions and has no information that they plan to test the facilities at Jackson or elsewhere.

The above information was telephonically. CIC Agent; Jackson, furnished to Mississippi, on September 12, 1961! On September 13, 196, AP Reporter Jackson. Mississippi, advised that advised the AP on September 13, 1961 that the group of twenty-eight ministers, of which he is a member, voted on the morning of September 13, 1961, to split up and that sixteen of the group will leave Jackson today by unknown transportation en route to Sewanee, Tennessee, time of departure not stated. said the other twelve members will remain in Jackson for several days and hope to talk with church leaders and city and state leaders. Ministers was arrested by the Jackson Police Department at approximately 11:45 AM, September 13, 1961, when they attempted to enter the white restaurant at the Trailways Bus Station. He could supply no further details except that this was a mixed group of white and Negro ministers.

On September 13, 1961, City Attorney JACK TRAVIS advised that the above fifteen ministers will be tried at 3:00 PM, on September 14, 1961, in Jackson Municipal Court and their bond has been set at \$500.00 each. He said they have expressed no intentions of making bond before their trial.

Associated Press Representative, advised that the following eight Episcopal Ministers departed Jackson, Mississippi, at 8:45 PM, September 13, 1961, via Delta Airlines Flight 406 which arrives at Atlanta, Georgia, at 12:17 AM, September 14, 1961. He said all except are en route to Detroit, Michigan, to attend the Episcopal Church Convention there on September 17, 1961, and they have expressed the intention to visit the University of the South, Sewanee, Tennessee, en route to Detroit. He noted they have declined to violate any local laws en route. He said they have indicated they do not intend to test facilities at any locations en route to Detroit and noted that there were no incidents at Jackson in connection with their departure:

(September 13, 1961, Patrolmen and Jackson Police Department, while stationed at the Trailways Bus Depot, Jackson, Mississippi, observed three Dotty taxicabs pull into the driveway on the east side of that station, at which time approximately 15 men in clerical garb disembarked from the taxicabs and started toward the white restaurant at that station.) PIERCE said Officer asked them again to move on, and said all we want to do is get some food to eat before we catch a bus, or words to that effect. They refused the order and Captain then asked them to follow him and he would take them to their bus. 





Our Atlanta Office has furnished information that a group of Negroes are planning to lead a group of freedom riders into Albany, Georgia, on 11/1 and 2/61 where they plan to use the white facilities at the Trailways bus station, the Carnegie Public Library and an unidentified theater.

The leader of this movement is alleged to be Chevene B. King, a Negro attorney in Albany, Georgia. also been alleged that a Negro male from Washington, D. C.; and a Negro male from the State of Virginia are directing the movement.

It has been reported that three to five Negro citizens of Albany attended a meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, during the week end of 10/28-29/61 for the purpose of instructing individuals concerning the proposed action. It has been alleged that this movement is being sponsored by persons who were involved in the freedom rides at Jackson, Mississippi.

It has been reported that unknown individuals have been on the campus of Albany State College, Albany, Georgia, a Negro institution, attempting to recruit students for the instantmovement. The president of the college has instructed that no student at the institution is to leave the campus until further notice.

Chief of Police Laurie Pritchett of the Albany, Georgia, Police Department has already instituted twelve-hour police patrols and has designated two plainclothesmen to be at the bus station until such time as there is no further threat of violence.



FREEDOM RIDE ROUTE 40 MARYLAND AND DELAWARE NOVEMBER 11, 1961

The Sun, Baltimore daily newspaper, in its issue of November 2, 1961, reflects a statement of Governor ELBERT N. CARVEL of Delaware in which he ascertained that Delaware restaurant owners have the "legal right to refuse service to Negroes." The Governor quoted as his authority a section of the Delaware law to this effect. In making the statement the Governor was commenting on the threat of a massive "freedom ride" scheduled for November 11 along Maryland and Delaware sections of United States Route 40. The position taken by the Governor was attacked by the Wilmington Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and the Congress on Racial Equality (CORE).

The Wilmington Resident Agency of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was advised by a confidential source that the Delaware State Police had conducted a survey of 27 restaurants on Route 40 from the Delaware Memorial Bridge to the Maryland State line. All of these restaurant owners advised that they would serve Negroes except four who claimed they would not serve Negroes and two others who gave a qualified yes. The source further advised that the announcement by the Governor of Delaware might prompt other restaurant owners not to serve Negroes.

The same issue of the Sun, supra, reflected the fact that the Legislative Council of the Maryland State Legislature had endorsed a bill banning racial discrimination in hotels, motels and restaurants and specifically would make it a crime to deny service to any customer because of race, religion or national origin. The vote of the Legislative Council, which is composed of most of the state legislative leaders, was 12 to 6. This action is advisory in its nature and will serve as a basis for the introduction of the bill at the next General Assembly which is scheduled for February, 1962. Governor J. MILLARD TAWES of Maryland has already refused to call a special session of the General Assembly to consider any bill. The same issue of the paper reflected that the restaurant owners along Route 40 were meeting on November 2 in an attempt to work out some common action

Police Department advised the Baltimore Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on November 3, 1961, that at their meeting held on the previous evening of restaurant owners and/or leasees, who are located along Route 40 East, there was a decided mixed reaction to what plans they would follow in the face of the Some 27 of the restaurant owners out of a possible freedom riders. 32 appeared. Some of the owners advised that they would close their establishments. Others will place reserve signs on their tables and refuse to serve Negroes on the ground that all the tables are reserved. Others will point blank refuse to serve under the existing law of the state. Very few advised that they would servebe Negroes that day and on the following will revert to their practice of not serving Negroes. It is the opinion of Inspector that depending upon the situation as it arises in each of their establishments on November 11, the restaurant owners individually will determine their own course of action. restaurant owners advised the Inspector that CORE has, during the last week, been taking photographs of their establishments and undoubtedly planned to use them in the course of the march. also advised on November 2, 1961, leaders of Inspector of the CORE, together with leaders of the NAACP, Maryland Crime Cocored Investigations Committee, States Attorney's Office for Baltimore County, various civic leagues totalling approximately 57 people, met in Baltimore City to discuss the coming freedom ride. NAACP and CORE, the former represented by Secretary, and the latter by Mr. JULIUS HOBSON, indicated that the proposed legislation of the Legislative Council was completely inadequate and that the march on November 11 will go forward. stated that at this meeting each individual spoke his own ideas and there was no unanimity except by the CORE and NAACP groups. At the conclusion of the meeting handbills were passed out urging citizens to join the State's Rights Ride on November 11, 1961, along Route 40 and these handbills were supported by the Maryland Petition Committee for State's Rights, Box 187, Jessups, Maryland.

The Sun, in its issue of November 3, 1961, reflected the statement of the CORE leaders that they intended to hold a freedom ride institute at 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 7, 1961, at All Souls Unitarium Church in Washington, D. C. to indoctrinate

volunteers in the tactics of the ride. They also stated that they would hold a mammoth prayer meeting at 8:00 p.m. on Friday before the Governor's Mansion in Annapolis.

The Maryland Petition Committee for States Rights, Incorporated, has been incorporated under the laws of the State of Maryland since 1954 and in its bulletin describes itself as "designated to the preservation of our state, our country and our race."





On November 3, 1961, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that at a meeting of a special committee of the Baltimore Chapter of CORE, held on the evening of November 2, the following plans were announced concerning the November 11th mass sit-in demonstrations on Route 40 east of Baltimore.

- 1. At the meeting of CORE in National Headquarters in New York on October 28, it was decided that the organization would not backdown from its plan to hold the demonstration on November 11, 1961.
- 2. Delegates from New England, New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania will assemble at the last (southbound) Howard Johnson restaurant on the New Jersey Turnpike by 10:00 a.m. on the morning of November 11, 1961. There instructions would be given out concerning how each group of individuals should conduct themselves, including how they can get telephonic assistance in case of arrest.

Beginning at 10:00 a.m., parties will be dispatched at intervals and assigned to restaurants located on the north, or right-hand side (westbound), of U. S. Route 40, all the way to Baltimore.

At 12:30 all groups should make simultaneous sit-in approaches to their respectively assigned establishments.

- 3. Delegates from the Virginia, D. C. and Maryland areas will assemble at Cornerstone Baptist Church, 1627 Bolton Street, Baltimore, also by 10:00 a.m. on November 11, 1961, where they will receive instructions and be dispatched along the south, or right-hand side (eastbound), of U. S. Route 40. They too will commence sit-ins at 12:30 p.m.
- 4. JULIAN HOBSON, of Washington, D. C., stated he expects to have over 400 delegates from Virginia and D. C. This

group will hold a meeting on November 7, 1961, at Saul's Unitarian Church, Washington, D. C., to make plans for the trip to Baltimore on the morning of November 11, 1961.

- 5. All rank-and-file demonstrators will be instructed to avoid arrest if at all possible. If they are ordered by the police to leave or move on they should do so and proceed to another location.
- 6. The sit-ins will continue until 5:00 p.m., unless circumstances suggest it be extended beyond that time, in which case all will be notified. Any group which moves completely down its side of the highway before completion of the overall demonstration should reverse direction and start working the other side back towards their home state.

The source reported that the Maryland Petition Committee hopes to have approximately ten car loads of individuals to participate in this motor car caravan.

The "Cincinnati Enquirer", a daily morning newspaper published in Cincinnati, Ohio, in its issue of July 9, 1961, contained an article captioned "Bus Rider" Gets Back 'Home'". The article indicated that David D. Frankhauser, 617 Mitchell Avenue, one of the "Freedom Riders" arrested May 28, in Jackson, Mississippi, arrived back in Cincinnati last night after spending 37 days in Mississippi jails.

According to the article, Frankhauser, 19, white, and a sophomore at Central State College, Wilberforce, Ohio, where he is an honor student majoring in Chemistry, was arrested and sent along with sixteen other Freedom Riders for breach of the peace and disobeying an officer, when they refused to leave an all white waiting room in a Jackson bus station. The article quoted Frankhauser as follows: "We were prepared to be arrested but we wanted to continue on to New Orleans. When we were arrested, our trial was sure a farce. We were transferred to the penitentiary because the city jail was getting too crowded and the county jail was full. In the penitentiary we were kept in maximum security. We got very little exercise and were let out of the cell only twice a week to take a

When I was released late Friday I had numerous letters waiting for me but two envelopes were minus their content." On October 30, 1961, Deputy Clerk of Court Shelby Lafitte, First Judicial District Court, Caddo Parish furnished his file concerning charges against and for disturbing the peace. The file shows that on September 19, 1961, a bill of information was filed charging each with a violation of the Louisiana Revised Statutes, Title 14, Section 103.1. On the same date, the matter was continued and the defense was given until October 6, 1961 to file motions. On October 2, 1961, a motion for a bill of particulars and a motion to quash were filed by the defendants. On October 6, 1961, upon motion of the defense, a continuance was granted pending argument of the above motions filed.


