


Following Freedom Riders in this group entered pleas of nolo contendere to Breach of Peace Charges in Hinds County Court, Jackson, Miss., on dates indicated: [redacted] 10/2/61; [redacted] 10/9/61; PAUL S. GREEN, 10/9/61. All sentenced to 4 months in jail suspended and fined \$200. Fines paid. [redacted] tried and convicted in Hinds County Court, 10/24/61, on Breach of Peace charge. Sentenced to 4 months in jail and fined \$200. Was released on appeal bond same date. On 11/20/61 [redacted] tried and convicted in Hinds County Court on Breach of Peace charge. Sentenced same date to 4 months in jail and fined \$200. Released on appeal bond same date. Date for hearings appeals indefinite.

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Details:

AT JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI

On October 2, 1961, City Prosecuting Attorney J. A. TRAVIS, JR., City of Jackson, advised SA [redacted] that on October 2, 1961, [redacted] appeared in Hinds County Court, Jackson, Mississippi, and withdrew his previously entered not guilty plea to a charge of Breach of the Peace. He entered a plea of nolo contendere to this charge and was adjudged guilty. He was sentenced to four months in jail and suspended and fined \$200. The fine was paid.

On October 9, 1961, [redacted] Deputy Clerk, Hinds County Circuit Clerk's Office, advised

SA [redacted] that on October 9, 1961, Attorney [redacted] appeared in Hinds County Court, Jackson, Mississippi, representing [redacted] and PAUL S. GREEN, who were not present. [redacted] withdrew a previously entered not guilty plea and entered a plea of nolo contendere to Breach of the Peace charge on behalf of his clients. The court then adjudged [redacted] and GREEN to be guilty and imposed a sentence of four months in jail suspended and fined each \$200, which fine was paid by Attorney [redacted] on behalf of his clients. b6 b7C

On October 24, 1961, [redacted] Deputy Clerk Hinds County Circuit Clerk's Office, advised SA [redacted] that on October 24, 1961, [redacted] was tried and convicted in Hinds County Court on a Breach of the Peace charge. He was sentenced to four months in jail and fined \$200 the same date. On the same date he was released after posting a \$1,000 cash appeal bond plus a \$500 cash cost bond, both returnable in Hinds County Circuit Court, Jackson, Mississippi.

On November 20, 1961, City Prosecuting Attorney J. A. TRAVIS, JR., City of Jackson, advised that on November 20, 1961, [redacted] was tried and convicted in Hinds County Court, Jackson, Mississippi, on a Breach of the Peace charge. She was sentenced the same date to four months in jail and fined \$200. NIXON was released the same date on a \$1,000 cash appeal bond plus a \$500 cash cost bond, both returnable in Hinds County Circuit Court, Jackson, Mississippi.

On November 9, 1961, Assistant City Prosecuting Attorney [redacted] City of Jackson, advised that due to the extremely heavy docket in Hinds County Court, the Court Reporters are far behind in transcribing the records of Freedom Rider Trials. Until these records are transcribed, the Hinds County Circuit Court cannot rule on the appeals to it from the conviction of Freedom Riders in Hinds County Court. [redacted] stated there is no way of knowing when the Hinds County Circuit Court will handle these appeals as this is a matter for the court, however, he indicated that it would probably not be until at least late in 1962.

On November 19, 1961, Inspector [redacted] of the Baltimore City Police Department advised the Baltimore Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that on the previous day approximately 400 demonstrators sat in restaurants or picketed outside restaurants in Baltimore City and near Annapolis in connection with an attempt to integrate Maryland restaurants. The demonstrators were in part made up of college students from Maryland, Washington, D. C., New England and New York Colleges. Specifically, the students were from Morgan State College, Johns Hopkins University, Goucher College, all in Maryland, and George Washington University of Washington, D. C. and Wellesley College and Harvard Divinity School of Massachusetts. Yale University of New Haven and New York University. Inspector [redacted] stated that the demonstrations in Baltimore City were orderly and between the police and the restaurant owners, many of whom employed private guards, the demonstrations were kept within orderly bounds. Only two people were arrested for trespass and both were from out of state and of the white race. They were [redacted] of New Haven, Connecticut, and [redacted] of Washington, D. C.

HOWEN, Chief of the Annapolis Police Department, Annapolis, Maryland, advised that the following were arrested on November 18, 1961, for trespassing on that date which grew out of the attempts of these persons to integrate the Antoinette Restaurant at Annapolis:

Chief HOWEN advised that all of the above individuals were charged with trespassing and disorderly conduct with the exception of [redacted] who was charged only with trespass. The disorderly conduct consisted of holding onto the table legs and each other so that the police in arresting them dragged the tables with them. All were arraigned before the Trial Magistrate in Annapolis on November 20 and bond was set at \$205 each, with the exception of [redacted] whose bond was set at \$104. Although jury trials were requested, no date has been set for the trials.

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The Sun, a Baltimore daily newspaper, in its issue of November 21, 1961, reflects the decision of the Reverend Dr. LOGAN KEARSE, leader of the demonstrators, supra, to demonstrate on a smaller scale on the coming weekend. Same paper reflects the fact that the restaurant association had recently made and released a statement agreeing on a need for a bill to be passed by the State Legislature granting state-wide equal public accommodations. The article reflects that the demonstrations scheduled for this coming weekend would be confined to Baltimore.

Previously, The Sun, in its issue of November 20, reflected the decision of Congress on Racial Equality (CORE) to test the good faith of 35 restaurants along Route 40 who had previously taken the position that they would be willing to serve all people regardless of their race. CORE indicated that they would test these restaurants on Thanksgiving Day.

Captain [redacted] Shreveport, Louisiana Police Department, advised that just after 2:00 P.M., September 9, 1961 he had been telephonically contacted by Officer [redacted] who patrols the area in which Trailways Bus Depot is located. He said Officer [redacted] reported to him that at 2:00 P.M. a Trailways bus arrived from Dallas, Texas. Aboard were several Negroes and one white man who held tickets from Los Angeles, California to Jackson, Mississippi. One [redacted] female, [redacted] and one [redacted] male, [redacted] entered the waiting room designated for white intrastate passengers and approached the ticket counter. [redacted] asked them to leave, whereupon [redacted] did depart from the room. [redacted] refused to do so and [redacted] arrested her for disturbing the peace. [redacted] then re-entered the room and [redacted] arrested him.

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[redacted] stated that upon his arrival at the bus station both persons were in custody and they were taken to the Caddo Parish Sheriff's Office for incarceration.

Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) on December 16, 1961, from approximately 11:00 AM to 1:00 PM, observed approximately 150-250 Negro and white persons, male and female, the majority of whom were of college age, gather at the last Howard Johnson Restaurant on the New Jersey Turnpike near the Delaware State Line. Among the group were a number of colored ministers. The gathering was orderly and presided over by [redacted] Congress of Racial Equality (CORE). [redacted] gave the assignments to the participants, who were divided, Negroes and whites, to private automobiles and to each automobile was assigned a leader. All were instructed to conduct themselves in an orderly manner and were admonished to remember they were under the scrutiny of the nation and to follow the instructions of their leaders and to report their observations to him. Each car was given sheets of white and yellow paper which contained their instructions, the identity of the restaurant to be visited and telephone numbers of CORE, Baltimore. They were specifically told not to use alcohol and not to resort to force. Designated persons approximately ten in number, were instructed to remain in the restaurant and submit to arrest and the remainder were told to leave the restaurant after the Trespass Law was read to them.

E. MILLER, U. S. District Judge, Nashville, entered an order
in the case entitled [redacted] ET AL, versus State
Board of Education, ET AL, Civil Docket Number 3129. This
order concerned the decision of the court with regard to the
petition by the plaintiffs for injunctive relief from their
dismissal from Tennessee A & I State University after being
arrested in connection with their participation in a Freedom
Ride at Jackson, Mississippi. The court ruled that it was
felt that injunctive relief should be given to the plaintiffs
to enforce their rights to procedural due process with respect
to any disciplinary action on the part of Tennessee A & I
State University growing out of their Mississippi convictions
and any alleged violations under the regulations of the State
Board of Education as enunciated in a letter by that Board on
April 8, 1960 to the heads of all educational institutions
in the state. This particular letter was the basis upon which
the university's disciplinary committee dismissed the students.
In substance, the court ruled that the students should have
been given a hearing by the Disciplinary committee prior to
the time that they dismissed them from school. The court ruled,
however, that the parties should agree on the exact terms of
the injunction and then come before the court to fix terms upon
which the court would issue the injunction.

a daily newspaper published at Nashville, Tennessee, on December
28, 1961 in which it was stated that the parties had agreed on
the terms of the injunction and that the order had been prepared

On December 20, 1961, Major [REDACTED] Caddo Parish Sheriff's Office, advised that [REDACTED] was still incarcerated in the Caddo Parish Jail, having never made the \$750.00 bond set on the local sentence passed August 23, 1961, or the \$5,000.00 bond on the narcotics charges in New Orleans.

On December 21, 1961, [redacted] First Judicial District Court, Caddo Parish, made available the docket on instant case, which reflected the following information:

On October 11, 1961, the Louisiana Supreme Court refused a writ of mandamus certiorari and prohibition, stating, "the showing does not justify the exercise of our supervisory jurisdiction." b6 b7C

A petition for stay of execution was filed with the Louisiana Supreme Court by [redacted] and [redacted] attorneys for the petitioners. This petition reflects that the Louisiana Supreme Court, on November 6, 1961, refused application for a rehearing, and states that "the opinion of the Louisiana Supreme Court deprives the petitioners of rights secured and guaranteed them by Article 1, Section 10, Constitution of the State of Louisiana, and the 6th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States in that defendants were forced to trial without being properly appraised of the charges against them, in that the statute fixed no ascertainable standard of guilt." This petition also states "the defendants have thus been deprived of the right to peaceably assemble, as guaranteed by the 1st Amendment of the United States Constitution and Article 1, Section 5 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana."

The petition also states "the petitioners were deprived of rights secured to them by the Equal Protection and Due Process clauses of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States in that they have been convicted of having disturbed the peace despite that there is no evidence of any misconduct on their part and have been deprived of the Equal Protection of the laws as guaranteed by the 14th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States in that they were convicted for attempting to use facilities of which is permitted by persons of races other than their own and that they were arrested therefore solely because of their race and color."

The petition further states "the petitioners aver that they timely raised all of the questions referred to above at the time of their arraignment and after their convictions in a motion for a new trial and in a motion in arrest of judgment, and by their assignment of errors."

The petition further states that "petitioners now show that they wish to apply to the Supreme Court of the United States for writs of Certiorari and Review, or Appeal, to review the decision of this Court upon the issues shown by the record in this case, and desire stay or delay in which to apply to said Court, and that the decree or mandate of this Court be stayed so they can so present their petition to the Supreme Court of the United States for relief."

The petition requests "stay of execution of the sentences and judgment herein, and requested delay of 90 days to prepare and file in the Supreme Court of the United States their application for a writ of Certiorari Mandamus and/or Prohibition and as appeal to review the decision of the Louisiana Supreme Court."

The docket reflects that on November 21, 1961, the Supreme Court of the State of Louisiana granted the petitioners a stay of execution of the decree of this Court for 60 days dating from the date of this order within which to apply to the Supreme Court of the United States for appropriate relief.

The docket also reflects that on November 21, 1961, First Judicial District Court Judge ROBERT J. O'NEAL ordered a stay of execution of all sentences and judgments imposed herein for 90 days from that date for the purpose of filing application for relief in the Supreme Court of the United States.



On 1-20-62 information received from a Baltimore confidential informant that a bus load of members of the Civic Interest Group of Baltimore and several car loads of members of the Congress of Racial Equality were proceeding to Cambridge, Maryland, that date to engage in sit-in demonstrations at Cambridge restaurants was furnished to the Maryland State Police and the Cambridge Police Department.

On 1-19-62 Brice G. Kinnamon, Chief of Police, Cambridge, had advised that in anticipation of the demonstrations, arrangements were completed for the use of 200 law enforcement officials consisting of members of the Maryland State Police, Dorchester County Sheriff's Office, and the Cambridge Police Department to insure the maintenance of law and order.

It subsequently developed that these two groups were joined by 30 students from Maryland State College of Princess Ann, Maryland, and sit-in and picketing demonstrations were conducted at nine restaurants. Following these demonstrations, a rally was held at Bethel Church in Cambridge, after which a prayer meeting was conducted in front of city hall in which approximately 400 persons participated. The demonstrators departed from Cambridge about 10 p.m., 1-20-62.

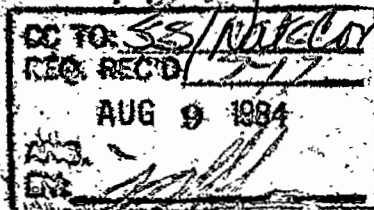

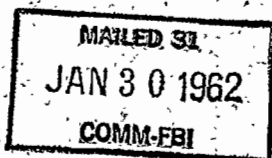

With reference to the inquiry of Congressman Fred Marshall at the Appropriations Committee Hearing 1-24-62 concerning a group of Freedom Riders from St. Paul, Minnesota, the Congressman is undoubtedly referring to a group of six Freedom Riders who departed Minneapolis by Greyhound bus on 6-9-61 en route to Jackson, Mississippi. Upon arrival at the Greyhound Bus Terminal in Jackson on 6-11-61 members of the group, all of whom were white, proceeded to the terminal's Negro waiting room. When they refused to comply with an order to move on, they were arrested by officers of the Jackson, Mississippi, Police Department and charged with breach of the peace. All were subsequently tried, convicted and sentenced to pay \$200 fines and serve four months in jail.

In connection with the inquiry of Congressman Fred Marshall at the Appropriations Committee hearing 1/24/62, the Minneapolis Office was telephonically contacted 1/24/62 to obtain pertinent information concerning the group of freedom riders from Minneapolis-St. Paul arrested at Jackson, Mississippi, 6/11/61, information concerning any additional groups from Minneapolis - St. Paul which may have engaged in freedom-ride activity, and to ascertain whether there was any public source material available concerning the subversive affiliations of members of the group arrested 6/11/61.

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SA [redacted] of the Minneapolis Office subsequently furnished the following information obtained from a review of pertinent Minneapolis files on 1/24/62.

The group of six freedom riders from Minneapolis - St. Paul who were arrested at Jackson, Mississippi, 6/11/61, was the only group from that area involved in freedom-ride activity.

Available subversive data concerning [redacted] and [redacted] was set forth in Minneapolis letterhead memorandum dated 8/16/61 captioned, "Freedom Ride 1961, Greyhound Bus M 4446, Nashville, Tennessee, to Jackson, Mississippi, 6/11/61, Racial Matters, Civil Rights."

[redacted] is the subject of Bufile 100-141790. She was active in various CP front groups, including the Civil Rights Congress, the Progressive Party, and the Minnesota Committee to Secure Justice for the Rosenbergs, from 1948 to 1952.

[redacted] is currently included on the list of Security Index subjects of the Minneapolis Office. She was a CP member in Boston, Massachusetts, prior to moving to St. Paul, Minnesota, in 1951. She was an active member of the CP in St. Paul from 1952 - 1955, at which time she was ostensibly dropped from membership for failure to attend CP meetings or pay dues; however, as recently as 1958, she was described by her brother as being an active CP member. At the present time she continues to participate in open and semi-open CP functions such as May Day meetings and CP sponsored picnics, as well as in various CP front groups activities. When contacted by Agents of the Minneapolis Office in an effort to interview her, [redacted] was completely hostile and uncooperative.

There is no public source data available concerning the subversive affiliations of the [redacted] and [redacted]

The files of Minneapolis reveal that in late July, 1961, one [redacted] Minneapolis, signed a petition sent to President Kennedy calling for a reversal of the State Department's policy of hostility towards Cuba. This individual cannot, however, be positively identified as being identical with [redacted] who was arrested at Jackson, 6/11/61.

In connection with Congressman Marshall's inquiry, SA [redacted] noted that the 11/17/61 issue of the Minneapolis Star contained an article concerning freedom rides. In this article Dr. Leo Bishop, identified as vice president of the National Conference of Christians and Jews was quoted as saying that many of the freedom riders jailed in the South had been disillusioned to find that many of the riders were communists, leftists, atheists, or people who believed in violence as a dynamic of social progress. SA [redacted] noted that this article may have been the source of Congressman Marshall's opinion that the freedom riders from Minneapolis were "odd-balls and beatniks."

1. She maintained she and the other Freedom Riders were denied equal protection of the law, and they were not allowed to eat together.
2. She spoke of the severe sentences they had received in the lower court on charges of breach of the peace, which she said were a \$200 fine plus four months in jail; she said she had been subject to vaginal search by four guards.
3. She lashed at civil rights and liberties in the South.

New Orleans is requested to follow and report results of the trial of ROSENBERG in Hinds County Court at Jackson, Mississippi.

APPENDIX

CITIZENS COMMITTEE TO PRESERVE AMERICAN FREEDOMS
(CCPAF)

A source advised on May 3, 1961, that the CCPAF was organized in Los Angeles, California, in January, 1952, for the announced purpose of supporting a number of individuals from the medical and legal professions who had been subpoenaed to appear before the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Since its establishment, the CCPAF in extending its scope, has worked for the abolition of all Congressional, State, and local committees investigating subversive activities and in the latter part of 1954 became very active in opposition to State and Federal legislation directed at the Communist movement.

The primary goal of the CCPAF is the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

[redacted] of the CCPAF, is described by the source as the "brains and energy" behind the organization. He periodically confers with [redacted] [redacted] Southern California District Communist Party and is in close touch with other leading Communist functionaries in the Los Angeles area.

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Another source advised on September 17, 1952, that [redacted] was a Communist Party member as of September, 1952.

As Wick entered Mr. Marshall's office, Mr. Marshall said he was completely amazed at the promptness with which Mr. Hoover answered his request. He said this promptness and thoughtfulness was characteristic of the Director and the great organization he heads. He said he was absolutely dumbfounded. Wick told him that Mr. Hoover wanted him to have the benefit of the letter and other information on a confidential, personal basis. Mr. Marshall said he would respect that confidence and would accept anything Wick had to say as such.

Mr. Marshall said further that the Director's testimony yesterday was superb and that many Congressmen had told him that they thoroughly enjoy hearing Mr. Hoover testify because he is so definitive, so direct, leaves no stone unturned, and is not given to quibbling, half facts and conjecture; when he speaks, he speaks with authority and they all enjoy that approach because it is so unusual.

DeLoach to Mohr memo
Re: Freedom Riders From

Congressman Fred Marshall (D-Minn.)

Mr. Marshall was told by Wick concerning the communist background of [] and [] Mr. Marshall said he very much wished he could utilize this on the Floor of the House but Wick told him that would be dangerous in that we could not back him inasmuch as our information came from confidential sources and could not be revealed at this time. Mr. Marshall said he thoroughly understood this fact, and would not so use the material. He said, however, that he has in mind contacting a colleague of the House Committee on Un-American Activities for the purpose of possibly calling the six Freedom Riders to testify before the House. He said this is his preliminary thinking so that once a record is built, he could then proceed. Mr. Marshall said this was not his final decision but he certainly believed such unscrupulous agitators should be exposed inasmuch as they have operated in complete defiance of the law and against the interest of the United States.

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Mr. Marshall mentioned at the conclusion of the interview again that he was most impressed by Mr. Hoover's testimony. He said he wondered if Mr. Wick would take up with Mr. Hoover the manner in which the record will reflect the Director's answer to his question concerning the Freedom Riders. He stated it would help if the record would show, in answer to his question whether the communists had infiltrated the Freedom Riders, that Mr. Hoover answered, "Yes," and then elaborated on that answer. Mr. Marshall hastened to add he well understood reasons why Mr. Hoover perhaps would not care to, or could not, answer his question directly with a "yes." He stated if Mr. Hoover could not do so, he would certainly understand inasmuch as the answer Mr. Hoover gave him was wholly responsive to his question and most comprehensive. Mr. Marshall emphasized he was not making this as a request and the Director should definitely feel free to simply forget the matter if he so desires. Wick assured him this matter would be brought to Mr. Hoover's attention.

Concerning James Douglas Peck, mentioned above, the "New York Post" dated May 16, 1961, carried an article entitled "A Freedom Rider's Story: Incident in Alabama" written by Peck who is described as an official of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) since 1946. In this article Peck described being assaulted in Birmingham, Alabama, on May 14, 1961, after he alighted from a Trailways Bus carrying a group of freedom riders. According to the article Peck received fifty stitches in his head and face as a result of this assault. 1915

The article further describes Peck as 46 years of age, a resident of 552 Riverside Drive, New York City, a graduate of Lawrenceville Prep in New Jersey, and a student at Harvard University for two years. The article further described Peck as a merchant seaman for a number of years, who spent three years in federal prison as a conscientious objector.

The "New York Daily News" dated June 23, 1948, reported that Peck who spent three years in the penitentiary at Danbury, Connecticut as a conscientious objector, on June 22, 1948, entered the White House in Washington, D.C. with a group of tourists and in protest against the draft laws chained himself to the bannister of the stairs leading to the historic East Room.

Records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York reviewed on December 21, 1961, reflected a credit report dated September 8, 1954, which indicated that a federal tax lien in the amount of \$8,143.36 had been levied against James D. Peck, 552 Riverside Drive, New York City. There was no further information regarding this matter in the credit file.

The sit-in was aimed at segregation in the company's Austin, Texas theater.

The article related that Lucy Komisar, 19, 224 Locust Street, Valley Stream, Long Island, yielded to her father's plea that her mother was being made ill by her activities and went home with him. Shortly thereafter the police ejected Komisar's three companions.



Numerous informants who have furnished reliable information in the past have furnished information that ROSE ROSENBERG has spoken at several public and private gatherings from September to December, 1961 concerning her participation in a Freedom Ride in July, 1961. One informant reported that in a private meeting on October 8, 1961 held at 1115½ South Hayworth Avenue, Los Angeles, for the purpose of raising funds for the "People's World" Newspaper, ROSE ROSENBERG was the principal speaker. During her talk she stated she felt free to express herself with this group inasmuch as they knew her and she could admit her affiliation with the Communist Party. *OK*

The "People's World" Newspaper is a west coast weekly newspaper. *U*

According to other informants the talks of ROSE ROSENBERG generally dwelt around these points:

1. She and other Freedom Riders were denied equal protection under the law; they were not permitted to eat together in Mississippi.
2. Severe sentences received in Municipal Court, Jackson, Mississippi, were not commensurate with the charges of breach of peace; these penalties were \$200.00 fines and four months in jail. Also she stated she had been subjected to a vaginal search by four male guards.
3. Lack of civil rights and liberties in the South.

The New Orleans Office of the FBI has advised that ROSE ROSENBERG's trial in Hinds County Court, Jackson, Mississippi, has been postponed to March 26, 1962.

On April 17, 1959, a source advised that on February 12, 1959, a Socialist Workers Party (SWP) minority group, under the leadership of National Committee member, [redacted] known in the SWP as [redacted] split from the SWP.

The source stated that this minority group, referred to as the [redacted] after many years of program and policy differences on varied issues concerning tactics and interpretation of political events, split from the SWP on the grounds that the Party was liquidating itself by departing from the Marxist precepts of LEON TROTSKY and retreating from the fight for the world socialist revolution. The final issue which ultimately forced the split was the minority's opposition to the SWP regroupment policy which involved cooperation with the Communist Party (CP) periphery-individuals characterized by the minority as petty-bourgeois.

The minority program, according to the source, advocated the unconditional defense of the Soviet Union and has as its goal the building of a revolutionary party with a complete proletarian orientation for the purpose of overthrowing capitalism in the United States and throughout the world.

On May 12, 1960, the source advised that this minority group had chose the name Workers World Party (WWP).

On May 4, 1961, the source stated that Headquarters of the WWP were located at 46 West 21st Street, New York, N. Y.

The SWP and the CP have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

The May 1960 issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), page 1, column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled, "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA), was established at Philadelphia, Pa. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication YS.

The above issue, page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles, and that the supporters of the YS have come into basic political solidarity with the SWP on the principles of revolutionary socialism.

A source advised on May 3, 1961, that the original YSA was an organization formed during October 1957, in New York City, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The leaders of this group were the guiding forces in the establishment of the national organization.

The source further advised that the YSA is dominated and controlled in its leadership and ranks by members of the SWP. The source added that the SWP considers the YSA as a training field for hard-core SWP leadership activity and as its current and future hope for recruits and the promulgation of the SWP movement throughout the United States.

The headquarters of the YSA are located at 10 East 23rd Street, New York City.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A source advised on November 6, 1957 that in August, 1957 a meeting of all "radical youth" in Philadelphia was held to discuss the formation of a new broad socialist youth organization. According to the source, youth representing the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), the Communist Party (CP), and other socialist-type organizations participated in organizing this new youth organization, which on November 1, 1957, ratified its constitution and adopted the name Young Socialist Club of Philadelphia (YSCP).

On March 19, 1958, a second source advised that the CP youth and the youth from the other socialist-type organizations had withdrawn their membership and support of the YSCP due to the influence and control exercised over the YSCP by the SWP. The source advised that the YSCP membership now consists primarily of SWP youth. According to the source, the YSCP is similar in scope and nature to other young socialist clubs throughout the country which are in support of the "Young Socialist" (YS) newspaper; that the SWP look at the YSCP and all youth organizations built around the YS publication as a youth outlet for SWP youth; and that the SWP in Philadelphia was using the YSCP as a broad front youth group, both to bring youth into the SWP and to train their own youth people.

A third source advised on April 22, 1960, that on April 15-17, 1960, the YS supporter clubs held a national conference in Philadelphia, Pa., and organized a new national socialist youth organization Young Socialist Alliance (YSA). The national headquarters of the YSA is located in New York, N. Y. The Philadelphia affiliate, YSCP, has changed its name to Philadelphia Young Socialist Alliance (PYSA).

The May 1960 issue of the YS, a monthly publication, self-described in the May 1960 issue as the newspaper of the YSA, on page 6 set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the SWP as the only existing political party capable of providing the working class with political leadership on class struggle principles, and that the supporters of the YS have come into basic political solidarity with the SWP on the principles of revolutionary socialism.

At Lafayette, two members of the group attempted to enter the waiting room which is customarily used by white persons and a uniformed police officer of the Lafayette Police Department told them to use the other waiting room which is customarily for Negroes and the request was complied with. The bus departed Lafayette at 10:30 AM. It arrived at Crowley 11:14 AM where there was no stopover and it arrived at Lake Charles 12:45 PM. The three Negro males went into the terminal cafeteria where they purchased and consumed glasses of fruit juice, seated at a table. This cafeteria is customarily used by white persons and the other patrons in the cafeteria were white. They were not interfered with.

The bus followed the same route to New Orleans and no further testing was attempted until the bus arrived at New Orleans, where the group entered the desegregated waiting room and were not interfered with.

in taxicabs and returned to the bus station at 12:50 PM and seated themselves in the south end of the waiting room. About 15 minutes later, three of the group walked to the opposite end of the waiting room and two of them approached the door of the cafe in the terminal. As these two Negroes opened the doors of the cafe, they were approached by a police officer of the Monroe Police Department and were advised that what they were about to do would be considered a Breach of the Peace, if they did not move on. These two then walked out of the bus station.

The third Negro, who was seated in the north end of the station, which is customarily used by white travelers, was also approached by a police officer of the Monroe Police Department and advised that his actions in sitting in that portion of the waiting room would be considered a Breach of the Peace if he did not move on. He also walked out of the bus station.

All four members of the group then boarded a Trailways Bus which departed at 1:10 PM for Alexandria, Louisiana.

The group arrived in Alexandria at 3:35 PM, left the bus terminal and departed Alexandria at 4:10 PM the following day, March 16, 1962. Prior to departure, two of the group sat in the customarily white section of the waiting room for a few minutes. They were not interfered with in any way and they then boarded the bus.

The bus arrived at Shreveport, Louisiana, at 7:50 PM and none of the Negroes on the bus entered or attempted to enter the area normally occupied by white people and the four uniform police officers observed in the bus station area had no conversation with the Negroes.

Throughout the entire trip, there were no arrests made.

For information of the Bureau, Mr. TRAVIS advised on 4/9/62 that he expects to clean up all Freedom Rider trials in Hinds County Court during the first week of May, 1962. He also advised that he has received word that the transcripts of some of the first Freedom Rider trials in Hinds County Court, wherein the defendants were convicted and then appealed, have now been prepared, and have been forwarded to the Hinds County Circuit Court. He stated that no dates have yet been set for hearing of these appeals, but they will not commence until at least May, 1962.
