



Bureau files reflect that as of June, 1950, Harry Gurantel, born in 1889, and Goldie Gurantel, born in 1899, were paid-up members of IWO Lodge 141 (Callfornia), holding certificates No. 1802 and 1801, respectively. It was indicated that both had joined (entered) in April, 1930.

As set forth in the report of SA 6-16-33 at St. Paul captioned "Persons Located St. Paul Office District, Gold Hearding," Harry Gurshtel, 928 4th Street, Sioux City, Iows was interviewed on 6-8-33. Gurahtel admitted withdrawing \$2,000 in gold coin in 1932 but claimed he subsequently converted 14 or 15 hundred dollars of the gold into gold certificates which he surrendered in May of 1933. He claimed that he had exchanged 3 or 4 hundred dollars of the gold to customers and surrendered \$200 worth to the bank on the morning following the day he was interviewed.

As set forth in report of SA 3-13-41 at Des Moines captioned "Communist Activities in Iowa, IS - R." Sioux City, Iowa, advised that although he did not know the individual's name he had heard from others that the operator of a clothing and haberdashery store at 928 4th Street, Sioux City, was disseminating communistic literature. According to the city directory the business was operated by Harry Gurshtel who resided at 928 4th Street with his wife, Goldie.

This same report reflected that on 12-16-40 informant advised that Harry Gurshtel, proprietor of Harry's Square Deal Clothing Co., Sioux City, Iowa, was a Communist.

The report also set forth information obtained from Comfidential Informant Sioux City) who, on 12-7-40, stated that Harry Gurahtel was a Communist and that he had seen Gurahtel at Communist meetings during the time the Communists were holding outdoor meetings in Riverside Park in the Riverside section of Sioux City, Iowa. Among individuals whom the informant stated he had seen attending Communist meetings and had talked to personally was Harry Gurahtel, 928 4th Street, Proprietor of Harry's Square Deal Store, same address.

As set forth in report of SA dated 10-17-42 at Dec Meines, captioned "Russian Sutual Aid Society, IS - R", of the Mayfair Hotel in Sioux City, produced his record book which disclosed that H. Gurshtel, 928 4th Street, Sioux City, had made the arrangements for a meeting held at the hotel on 10-26-41 by the Russian Mutual Aid Society. An article appearing in the Sioux City Journal of 10-29-41 concerned a meeting held at the Mayfair Hotel by the Russian Mutual Aid Society at which General Victor A. Yakhontoff, former general in the Carriet Russian Army and later Secretary of war during the Kerensky regime, had spoken. Harry Ourshtel was reported as having been chairman of the committee in charge of arranging the event.

According to a memorandum from the Chicago office dated 5-28-42, Harry Gurahtel, Sioux City, Iowa was named in a supplementary list of Communist suspects furnished by the office of the Hinth Haval District Headquarters, Chicago, Ill., on 4-2-42.

As set forth in Bureau memorandum to Los Angeles dated 5-5-54 captioned "American Peace Crusade, IS - C, Internal Security Act of 1950", the "Current Intelligence Summary" of 12-9-53 contained information to the effect that the American Peace Crusade had launched a mation wide campaign to send Christmas cards to President Risenhower and Members of Congress containing a "peace" theme, although the cards were not to be identified with the American Peace Crusade. The "Current Intelligence Summary" of 1-6-54 set forth information that the Southern California Peace Crusade, affiliate of the American Peace Crusade, claimed it was responsible for sending appreximately 7,000 "peace" messages to the White House during the Christmas seeson. Among such cards, furnished to the Bureau on 2-26-54 by

to the President, were cards from Goldie Gurshtel and H. Gurshtel, postmarked at Los Angeles, Calif.

"Paul Silver, et al, Radical Activities, Communist," disclosed that Paul Silver had come to Sioux City from Laurel, Nebraska, about a year and a half or two years before and lived at 1316 Villa Street. He conducted a grocery store at 11th and Court Streets, Sioux City, and while there was reported to have become intimate with some small girls in the community and was threatened with prosecution. In October, 1923, he bought a fruit stand at 312 4th Street, Sioux City but sold it in December, 1923, stating that he was going into the copyrighting business in Chicago, Illinois. and planned to do some writing on the side. and from whom Silver rented his place at 312 4th Street, described him as being "dead" both physically and mentally. They stated that although they did not admire him, they considered him honest in business and advised that they had noticed no radical literature among his mail and that his conversation did not tend toward "radicalism." His father and mother were reported to be residing on the west side of Sioux City, his father being very old and inactive. He was also reported to have a brother who conducted a grocery store in South Sioux City, Nebraska, and another brother who conducted a grocery store at Laurel, Nebraska.

Paul Silver was described as follows:

Height: 5.6"

Weight: 160 pounds. Heavy set.

Age: Approximately 25 years old (1924)

Wears heavy rimmed glasses.

Has appearance of being well educated.

activities. As a youth, Koval himself was arrested in Sioux City in 1930 as the leader of an alleged Communist pressure group which marched on the offices of the Overseer of the Poor.

George Koval attended public schools in Sioux City and studied engineering at Iowa University for two years, and appears to have been an excellent student. However, in 1932 the entire Koval family returned to Russia.

In various records Koval has furnished fictitious information concerning his whereabouts and activities during the period 1932-41. He has claimed that his parents were deceased, that he was raised in an unidentified orphan asylum, that he lived with an unnamed aunt, and that he worked on "various farms." His only specific claims, that his parents had died during his early youth and that he had been employed for a period with the Square Deal Clothing Company (owned and operated by his uncle) have definitely been established as fictitious.

There is no accurate record of George Koval's return to the U.S. until January of 1941 when records disclose his employment with Benjamin W. Lassen and the Raven Electric Company. (In this connection, it is significant to note that although required by law to register under the Selective Training and Service Act in October, 1940, Koval did not register until January 2, 1941, although there is no explanation as to his late registration.)

Within a surprisingly brief period after his employment with the Raven Electric Company, Koval became a director and assumed a position of some control. From company records it also appears that in spite of the fact that the business was principally of a local character, he took various business trips outside the New York area.

On 2-4-43 Koval was inducted into the U.S. Army receiving an honorable discharge on 2-12-46. It is significant to note that while in the U.S. Army Koval was assigned for a period in 1944-45 on the Manhattan Engineering Project at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and Dayton, Ohio, with access to Ten Secret information. Koval had contact and was associated with various AEC employees, certain of whom are still employed with that Agency. As yet the exact period and nature of his employment and the information to which he had access is not known.

Memorandum for Mr. Belmont

Following his discharge, Koval returned to New York City, applied to the Veterans Administration for educational benefits, studying electrical engineering at City College of New York from which he was graduated with honors in February, 1948.

On 3-15-48 a U.S. passport was issued to George
Koval for travel to France, Belgium, Switzerland, Sweden, and
Poland. Koval was assisted in obtaining this passport by a
letter presumably signed by
Atlas Trading Corporation of New York which indicated that
Koval was being sent to Europe as their commission representative. However, available records of Atlas Trading Corporation
contain no reference to Koval, employees have no knowledge
of him whatsoever, and the nature of the company's business
was such that the commissioning of a European representative
would have been unnecessary. An attempt is being made to
interview

On October 6, 1948, Koval departed from the U.S. en route to Europe and his present whereabouts is unknown.

Investigation in this matter is continuing, copies of Bureau reports being furnished to AEC, G-2, CIA, State Department, and the Records Administration Branch of the Department of Justice.



In that connection each of the offices to be . indicated, with the exception of Chicago, will attempt to rocate and interview the designated former US Army officers assigned to the ASTP, CCNY, to develop any information relevant to that question, provided office indices do not disclose information for them which would preclude an interview at this time.

In that regard it is noted that the possibility of a conspiracy between the subject and a member of the USA in some way connected with the ASTP should be considered in attempting to resolve the point in question.



His main duty with the ASTU was to drill the ROTC segment of that unit. His recalled connection with the ASTP group was limited inasmuch as their training was primarily academic. The ASTP is recalled as having 'ended abruptly" before its scheduled completion and that assignments of the ASTP from CCNY were extremely secretive. He was not aware that any of the ASTP classes had been assigned to an atomic installation, but in retrospect considered such an assignment logical in view of their highly technical training.

The subject's photograph was described as "vaguely familiar," but the subject's name was unrecalled.

The possibility that a member of the ASTP could have had some prior knowledge of his assignment from CCNY was considered "inconcervable." The possibility that an individual's selection into the ASTP was the result of a preconceived plan was described as 'impossible unless that individual had some extremely high-level contact in the U.S. Army or U.S. Government."

Several names of former officers of the ASTU at CCNY were submitted, each of whom have been previously mentioned herein. Current addresses for those former officers were unknown.

Information furnished by the GURSITELS was based on a letter written by the subject's father, ABRAM, who has been residing in Russia since around 1932. Other than the above information, the subject's activities during the periods 1948 to present and 1932 through 1941, are unknown.

Most recently, investigation has been directed at determining the nature of the circumstances which led to the subject's assignment to the Manhattan Project, at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, during World War II, with emphasis being given to whether or not that assignment was the result of a preconceived plan of the subject or his Soviet espionage principals in the United States.

Available background data developed in Sioux City, Iowa, reflects that KOVAL is a native born United States citizen, of Polish derivation, who departed the United States in 1932, with his parents and brothers. He possibly resided in Russia or outside the United States from 1932 to 1939 or 1941. He was educated as an electrical engineer at the University of Iowa during 1929 to 1932, and received a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering Degree at CCNY on 2/1/48.



It is noted that the administrative section of the report of SA at New York, September 28, 1956, set forth the following information for the benefit of the New Orleans and Miami Offices in connection with leads for such offices. Such background information is likewise repeated herein for the information and assistance of the Houston and Cincinnati Offices, which offices do not appear to have received previous correspondence in connection with instant matter.

Investigation concerning the subject has established that during 1942 he was employed with the REC, NYC.

During 1945, he was employed in the Health and Physics Department of the Manhattan Project, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, where he had access to material that could have varied from "Unclassified" to "Top Secret." In 1948, while allegedly employed by the Atlas Trading Corporation, NYC, as a "commissioned representative," he was issued a passport for travel to various European countries, which included Poland. On October 6, 1948, he departed the United States aboard the "SS AMERICA," destined for Le Havre, France. His whereabouts were unknown until May, 1956, at which time his aunt and uncle, GOLDIE and HARRY CHRSHTEL, residents of Sherman Oaks, California, advised that the subject is presently an instructor at the Mendelaiv Institute, in Moscow, Russia.

Information furnished by the GURSHTELs was based on a letter written by the subject's father, ABRAM, who has been residing in Russia since around 1932. Other than the above information, the subject's activities during the periods 1948 to present and 1932 through 1941, are unknown.

Most recently, investigation has been directed at determining the nature of the circumstances which led to the subject's assignment to the Manhattan Project, at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, during World War II, with emphasis being given to whether or not that assignment was the result of a preconceived plan of the subject or his Soviet espionage principals in the United States.

Available background data developed in Sioux City, Iowa, reflects that KOVAL is a native-born United States citizen of Polish derivation, who departed the United States in 1932 with his parents and brothers. He possibly resided in Russia or outside the United States from 1932 to 1939 or 1941. He was educated as an electrical engineer at the University of Iowa during 1929 to 1932, and received a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering Degree at CCNY on February 1, 1948.

The investigation to date, in substance, has resulted negatively with regard to the above objectives. In addition to completing investigation presently pending to locate and interview US Army officers, assigned to the ASTP, CCNY, during the period of the subject's assignment to that training unit, the following investigation

should be conducted prior to closing this case.

Regarding subject's assignment from the Army Specialized Training Program (ASTP), CCNY, to the Manhattan Engineering District (MED), Oak Ridge, National Laboratory (ORNL), commented as follows:

The "ASTP was a segment of the United States Army training program at CCNY, known as the "ASTU". The ASTP consisted of approximately 350 to 400 trainees who were selected at basic training centers on the basis of aptitude tests and previous education. for advanced technical training. The ASTP training at CCNY was terminated abruptly during August, 1944,

which happened to be concurrent with the timeoff "medical retirement" from the United States Army. The orders relating to ASTP assignments from CCNY were received at the Second Army Headquarters, 90 Church Street, New York City. Because his retirement from the United States Army occurred at the same time as the termination of the ASTP at CCNY, was unable to furnish any information regarding the nature or disposition of ASTP assignments from CCNY.
stated that the assignment could have possibly been the result of a preconceived plan if the subject had colluded with a faculty member of the CCNY or a "highly placed" member of the Armed Forces. In explanation, stated that to his recollection "a goodly number" of the faculty members of CCNY during and prior to 1944 performed some assignment in connection with the MED. He described as conceivable that the subject's acceptance into the ASTP and subsequent assignment from that program to the ORNL could have resulted from the influence of a "well informed member of the faculty at CCNY". was unable to recall any CCNY faculty members whose recalled activities at CCNY would suggest the possibility of their involvement with the subject in Soviet Espionage.
suggested contact with the following individuals whom he described as possibly being able to furnish information regarding the ASTP, CCNY: United States Army Reserve, (USAR) Intelligence Officer, ASTP, 1942-1944;
former resident of New Jersey and a lawyer by profession. (FNU) CCNY, during the approximate period of 1943-1944; believed to be a current resident of New York City.

He was born in Hungary. He served in the United States Army from 1942 to 1946. He entered the United States Army during June, 1942, at Governor's Island, New York, and was attached to Company A and Company B, 101st Engineers Battalion, 26th Division, Fort Jackson, South Carolina, where he remained until January, 1944. His subsequent service was at the Region Hospital, Fort Jackson, South Carolina. He presently has a rank of Captain in the USAR.
Upon being apprised of the subject's name, and known descriptive data, and upon observing a photograph of the subject taken during 1948. he described GEORGE KOVAL as "unknown" to him. stated that he did not attend CCNY and was not assigned to the ASTP or ASTU during his Army service.
recalled that some of the members of the United States Army who had taken ASTP training at CCNY, whose names he could not presently recall, had been members of his battalion at Fort Jackson, South Carolina.
Concerning the above, it is noted that in a questionnaire executed during 1944./MED. ORNL, the subject listed Engineers APO 26" as a reference.







Regarding George Koval

Investigation concerning George Koval has established that during 1942, he was employed with the Raven Electric Company, New York City.

During the period August 15, 1944 - January, 1946, while a member of the United States Army, Koval was assigned to the Manhattan Engineering District (MED), Oak Ridge, Tennessee and Dayton, Ohio, where he reportedly had access to information that could have varied from "Classified" to "Top Secret."

In 1948, while allegedly employed by the Atlas Trading Corporation, New York City, as a "Commissioned Representative," Koval was issued a passport for travel to various European countries, which included Poland. No record of employment with the Atlas Trading Corporation, New York City, could be located for Koval.

On October 6, 1948, he departed the United States aboard the "SS America," destined for Le Havre, France. His whereabouts were unknown until May, 1956, at which time his aunt and uncle, Goldie and Harry Gurshtel, residents of Sherman Oaks, California, advised that the subject is presently an instructor at the Mendelaiv Institute, in Moscow, Russia.

Information furnished by the Gurshtels was based on a letter written by the subject's father, Abram, who has been residing in Russia since around 1932. Other than the above information, the subject's activities during the periods 1948 to present and 1932 through 1941, are unknown.

Most recently, investigation has been directed at determining the nature of the circumstances which led to the subject's assignment to the Manhattan Project, at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, during World War II, with emphasis being given to whether or not that assignment was the result of a preconceived plan of the subject or his Soviet espionage principals in the United States.







In line with the above advise, it is noted that a formal renunciation before a diplomatic or consular officer of the United States in a foreign state, would appear to provide a basis for expatriation of a United States citizen residing abroad. On the basis of information now known, it also appears that KOVAL has elected to remain in Russia as a permanent resident and has evidenced no intention of ever returning to the United States. It occurs to WFO that if an interview with subject could be effected by State Department officials in Russia, such interview might bring about a formal renunciation of United States citizenship by the subject as well as possibly providing some further background information of interest and value to instant investigation.

Such possibility is, therefore, being called to the attention of the Bureau for any further consideration which the Bureau may feel warranted.

Questions raised in referenced New York letter concerned with subject's MED clearance were discussed with CLEMENT A. PALAZZOLO, Chief, Internal Security Branch, Division of Security, AEC, 3/26/57. PALAZZOLO, during such discussion, reiterated that previous attention to all logical AEC sources had failed to identify any further information, relating to such clearance, in addition to materials previously retained at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and later transferred to PALAZZOLO's office. PALAZZOLO, in turn, made such materials available, a recheck of which noted no additional personal information or investigative data not previously reported in instant matter.

In attention to authority for subject's MED clearance, it was noted that the above MED file contains a memorandum dated 9/20/44 under the letterhead of "Army Service Forces, U.S. Army Engineer's Office. Manhattan District, Oak Ridge. Tennessee." directed to from DIO," stating, "Subject (KOVAL) has been granted appropriate clearance by this office."

In the above connection, it was further noted that the signature of Colonel PARSONS as "C.E.,DIO," was indicated on all other letters directed to references and former employers of the subject, by MED, as previously identified in instant matter.

PARSON's signature is likewise indicated on a "Loyalty Check Sheet," dated 8/1/44, contained in above file. Such Sheet, directed to Pentagon Building, Washington, D. C., specifies a request that KOVAL's name be given file checks indicated therein, "MID - ONI - FBI." It was noted that the following comments appeared on such Sheet. "He will have access to secret or confidential material."

A return copy of the above "Loyalty Check Sheet," stamped September 13, 1944, showing notation of room 2D, 623 Pentagon, as sendor, listed the following results: "MID - NR.; ONI - NI; FBI - NI."

Above MED file was also noted to contain a termination statement dated 6/23/45 under KOVAL's signature, showing "Captain C E" as witnessing officer.

Mr. PALAZZOLO furnished a further opinion that in light of the above details, it appears that the entire processing of KOVAL for MED clearance was initiated and administered directly through the office of Colonel W. B. PARSONS, CE, DIO, at Oak Ridge, and that such office had. in turn, directly authorized KOVAL's clearance. PALAZZOLO noted that KOVAL's MED clearance did, therefore, appear to have evolved through regular Army channels for the MED interest of the Corps of Engineers, maintained at Oak Ridge, Tennessee. PALAZZOLO also volunteered the comment that while KOVAL's MED investigation was quite limited in scope, it is PALAZZOLO's feeling, based on attention to similar MED cases, that such extent of investigation was more or less standard in cases concerning military personnel, wherein other agency checks developed no derogatory information.

4. Regarding the identities of either military personnel or faculty members of CCNY, who might possibly be sources of information concerning the ASTP.

The following brief summary of previous investigation concerning the subject is being set forth for the assistance of the New Haven Office:

Investigation concerning GEORGE KOVAL has established that during 1942, he was employed with the Raven Electric Company. NYC.

During the period August 15, 1944 - January, 1946, while a member of the US Army, KOVAL was assigned to the Manhattan Engineering District (MED), Oak Ridge, Tennessee and Dayton, Ohio, where he reportedly had access to information that could have varied from "Classified" to "Top Secret". The subject was assigned to the MED at Oak Ridge, during August, 1944, after completing specialized training at CCNY known as the Army Specialized Training Program (ASTP). Recent investigation at CCNY has disclosed that the subject's ASTP class consisting of 17 students was the only class of trainees which was finally assigned to the MED.

In 1948, while allegedly employed by the Atlas Trading Corporation, NYC, as a "Commissioned Representative," KOVAL was issued a passport for travel to various European countries, which included Poland. No record of employment with the Atlas Trading Corporation, NYC, could be located for KOVAL.

On October 6, 1948, he departed the United States aboard the "SS America", destined for Le Havre, France. His whereabouts were unknown until May, 1956, at which time his aunt and uncle, GOLDIE and HARRY GURSHTEL, residents of Sherman Oaks, California, advised that the subject is presently an instructor at the Mendelaiv Institute, in Moscow, Russia.

Į

Information furnished by the GURSHTELS was based on a letter written by the subject's father, ABRAM, who has been residing in Russia since around 1932. Other than the above information, the subject's activities during the periods 1948 to present and 1932 through 1941, are unknown.

Most recently, investigation has been directed at determinging the nature of the circumstances which led to the subject's assignment to the Manhattan Project, at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, during World War II, with emphasis being given to whether or not that assignment was the result of a preconceived plan of the subject or his Soviet espionage principals in the United States.

Available background data developed in Sioux Eity, Iowa, reflects that KOVAL is a native born United States citizen, of Polish derivation, who departed the United States in 1932, with his parents and brothers. He possibly resided in Russia or outside the United States from 1932 to 1939 or 1941. He was educated as an electrical engineer at the University of Iowa during 1929 to 1932, and received a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering Degree at College of the City of New York (CCNY) on February 1, 1949.

The subject's known description is as follows:





Specialized Training Program, (ASTP) functioned at CCNY from May, 1943, to May or June, 1944. Under this program, the Army, through the Second Service Command, Governors Island, New York, brought to CCNY a large number of personnel from all over the United States to be tested and classified as to their abilities along given lines. All military personnel who took classification tests at CCNY had their examinations scored by an IBM punch card machine operation. Once the machine scoring of the classification test had been completed and an individual's ability along specialized lines determined, subsequent examinations were conducted to determine an individual's knowledge in his specialized field.

Results of the examinations conducted were forwarded to the Second Service Command at Governors Island, New York, and the military, through the Second Service Command at Governors Island, determined an individuals specific assignment to a teaching unit.

Determination of who took a classification examination, and where an individual was assigned for instruction subsequent to classification, was entirely within the province of the Second Service Command, Governors Island, New York.

If the military assigned an individual for instruction at CCNY, this individual received his instructions from faculty members of CCNY rather than from military instructors.

civilian personnel at CCNY had any responsibility as to whether military personnel showed up in class, or for the actions of military personnel while outside of class.

At the end of each marking period, consulted the heads of all departments working under him and obtained the accomplishments of the military personnel attending CCNY. Borderline cases were evaluated at a faculty conference, and a determination was made as to whether these individuals had successfully completed the courses they had pursued. Final grades were turned over to the Army Second Service Command at Governors Island, New York, and assignments were made by the military at Governors Island.

The faculty of CCNY did not in any way participate or recommend any individual for a particular assignment. In fact, the faculty of CCNY had no information relative to the assignment of a particular individual subsequent to his completion of courses.

A photograph of GEORGE KOVAL was displayed to advised that KOVAL was unknown to him. He was also unable to identify GEORGE KOVAL through name or description.

was questioned regarding his information concerning the possibility that the subject's assignment to the Atomic Installation at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, from the ASTP at CCNY, could have resulted from a preconceived plan and commented as follows:

advised that he has no concrete information as to whether or not the subject's assignment to the Atomic Installation at Oak Ridge from CCNY could have resulted from a preconceived plan. If a preconceived plan did exist, this plan could not be executed by faculty members at CCNY, inasmuch as faculty members at CCNY had no knowledge of the Oak Ridge installation. In addition, no faculty member at CCNY had anything

advised that if the subject's assignment to the atomic installation at Oak Ridge from the ASTP at CCNY resulted from a preconceived plan, it might have been accomplished in the following manner:

The subject's identity must be known to some military personnel connected with the ASTP in the Army Second Service Command at Governors Island, New York. The subject then would be picked by the Army to go through the classification center at CCNY with prior knowledge that the subject possessed the qualifications to rate highly on the machine scored classification test. Once the subject's rating was determined and this information passed to the Army at Governors Island, the subject then, on the basis of the classification test, could be assigned by the Army to CCNY for specific courses, and to the class of ASTP trainees which would be assigned to the atomic installation at Oak Ridge. The subject, who undoubtedly had an excellent educational background, would successfully complete his courses at CCNY, and then having been placed in a strategic class, would be assigned to the atomic installation at Oak Ridge.

Once the subject was placed in the class which would be assigned to Oak Ridge, and his educational ability was known, it would be unnecessary for his sponsor to assist in having him assigned to Oak Ridge, inasmuch as this assignment was made on a class basis rather than on an individual basis.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" revised and published as of January 2, 1957, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, reflects the following citation concerning the American Labor Party:

"1. 'For years, the Communists have put forth the greatest efforts to capture the entire American Labor Party throughout New York State. They succeeded in capturing the Manhattan and Brooklyn sections of the American Labor Party but outside of New York City they have been unable to win control.'

(Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 1311 on the CIO Political Action Committee, March 29, 1944, p.78).

"2. 'Communist dissimulation extends into the field of political parties forming political front organizations such as the * * * American Labor Party. The Communists are thus enabled to present their candidates for elective office under other than a straight Communist label.'

(Internal Security Subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Handbook for Americans, S. Doc. 117, April 23, 1956, p.91)".

On October 7, 1956, Peter Hawley, New York State Chairman, American Labor Party, publicly announced the American Labor Party State Committee unanimously approved a resolution dissolving the organization and ordering the liquidation of its assets.

In that regard, WFO suggested consideration be given to effecting an interview with subject at Moscow, Russia through utilization of appropriate State Department channels, which might possibly result in formal renunciation by subject of US citizenship.

The NYO has considered above recommendation and is of the opinion that the suggested action should be deferred pending completion of outstanding investigation in this case.

At present, the NYO is conducting a thorough file review to outline investigation remaining prior to bringing this case to a logical conclusion. The Bureau and interested offices will be advised upon the completion of the above mentioned review.

In 1948, while allegedly employed by the Atlas Trading Corporation, New York City, as a "Commissioned Representative," KOVAL was issued a passport for travel to various European countries, which included Poland. No record of employment with the Atlas Trading Corporation, New York City, could be located for KOVAL.

On October 6, 1948, he departed the United States aboard the "SS America", destined for Le Havre, France. His whereabouts were unknown until May, 1956, at which time his aunt and uncle, GOLDIE and HARRY GURSHTEL, residents of Sherman Oaks, California, advised that the subject is presently an instructor at the Mendelaiv Institute, in Moscow, Russia.

Information furnished by the GURSHTELS was based on a letter written by the subject's father, ABRAM, who has been residing in Russia since around 1932. Other than the above information, the subject's activities during the periods 1948 to present and 1932 through 1941, are unknown.

Available background data developed in Sioux City, Iowa, reflects that KOVAL is a native born United States citizen, of Polish derivation, who departed the United States in 1932, with his parents and brothers.

He possibly resided in Russia or outside the United States from 1932 to 1939 or 1941. He was educated as an electrical engineer at the University of Iowa during 1929 to 1932, and received a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering Degree at CCNY on February 1, 1948.





August 15, 1944, - January, 1946, while a member of the United States Army, Koval was assigned to the Manhattan Engineering District, (MED), Oak Ridge, Tennessee and Dayton, Ohio, where he reportedly had access to information that could have varied from "Classified" to "Top Secret".

In 1948, while allegedly employed by the Atlas Trading Corporation, New York City, as a "Commissioned Representative," Koval was issued a passport for travel to various European countries, which included Poland. No record of employment with the Atlas Trading Corporation, New York City, could be located for Koval.

On October 6, 1948, he departed the United States abourd the "SS America", destined for Le Havre, France. His whereabouts were unknown until May, 1956, at which time his aunt and uncle, Goldie and Harry Gurshtel, residents of Sherman Oaks, California, advised that the subject is presently an instructor at the Mendelaiv Institute, in Moscow, Russia.



In view of the fact that this investigation is based upon the probable espionage activities of the subject for the Soviets, it is suggested that the supervision of this case be transferred to the Espionage Section.



In 1948, while allegedly employed by the Atlas Trading Corporation, New York City, as a "Commissioned Representative," KOVAL was issued a passport for travel to various European countries, which included Poland. No record of employment with the Atlas Trading Corporation, NYC, could be located for KOVAL.

On October 6, 1948, he departed the United States aboard the "SS America", destined for Le Havre, France. His whereabouts were unknown until May, 1956, at which time his aunt and uncle, GOLDIE and HARRY BURSHTEL, residents of Sherman Oaks, California, advised that the subject is presently an instructor at the Mendelaiv Institute, in Moscow, Russia.

Information furnished by the GURSHTELS was based on a letter written by the subject's father, ABRAM, who has been residing in Russia since around 1932.

Although extensive investigation concerning the subject has failed to establish any specific involvement by him in Soviet espionage, sufficient information has been developed concerning his background and activities in the United States which strongly suggests that he was dispatched by the Soviets to this country for the purpose of espionage, Of particular significance in that regard; is/reported departure from the United States to the USSR during 1932 with his family; his knawn_employment during 1942 with the Raven Electric Company, NYC, owned by BENJAMIN W. LASSEN; his known sudden departure from the United States to Europe during 1948, and his reported residence and employment in the USSR from 1948 to 1956.

Following development: of information indicating residence and employment by the subject in

Moscow, USSR, during 1956, the NYO requested the Washington Field Office to make inquiry at the Passport Office, Department of State, to determine if evidence of subject's residence in the USSR would be sufficient to effect his denaturalization despite his native born American citizenship status.

advised that assuming the subject's reported residence and employment in Moscow, USSR, are factual, denaturalization proceedings could not be taken against the subject, who is a native born US citizen, until formal proof of an expatriative act by him has obtained. Washington Field suggested that consideration be given to effecting an interview with the subject at

Moscow, USSR, through utilization of appropriate State Department channels which might possibly result in a

formal renunciation by the subject of his US citizenship.

On 3/13/59 HARRY and GOLDIE GURSHTEL, were interviewed at their residence, 15302 Hartsook Street, Sherman Oaks, California. They advised that they last received correspondence from ABRAHAM KOVAL, subject's father, in 1956. They stated that this was the letter previously furnished to the FBI which reflected that GEORGE KOVAL was then residing in Moscow and worked for the Mendeleev Chemical Institute. His wife was identified in the letter as LYUDMILA.

GOLDIE GURSHTEL stated she had written at least one letter each year since 1956 to her brother, ABRAHAM I. KOVAL, addressing the letters to: 2nd Volchaevska Station. Khabarovsky Territory, "18th Party Congress" Collective RUSSOA Farm.

Mrs. GURSHTEL stated she had received no replies from the letters written by her. She said that she knows of no other relatives who have heard from or received correspondence from the KOVAL family in Russia. She stated that she does not know the residence address of GEORGE KOVAL in Moscow but that he could probably be reached through the Mendeleev Chemical Institute.

Both, HARRY and GOLDIE GURSHTEL, stated that in 1936 when they visited the KOVALS on a collective farm in Birobidjan, ABRAHAM and his wife, ETHEL KOVAL gave no



The following is being furnished for the Bureau's information, inasmuch as the planned travel to Europe by HARRY and GOLDIE GURSHTEL may possibly have some bearing in connection with investigation in case captioned GEORGE KOVAL, ESPIONAGE - R (Bufile 65-62911; LA file 65-6124), in which case New York is office of origin (New York file 65-16756). GEORGE KOVAL is the nephew of GOLDIE GURSHTEL.

A review of the Los Angeles file concerning GEORGE KOVAL reflects that GOLDIE GURSHTEL's brother, ABRAM KOVAL, and his family, including his son, GEORGE KOVAL, departed from the United States in 1932. They returned to the USSR, where it is quite possible that GEORGE KOVAL was recruited into the Soviet intelligence service and trained and dispatched to the United States in the latter part of 1940 or early 1941. In 1942 GEORGE KOVAL was employed for the Raven Electrical Company. New York.

GEORGE

KOVAL was inducted into the U.S. Army, assigned to special training at New York City College, and in 1945 was employed in the Health and Physics Department of the Manhattan Project, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, where he had access to classified matters. In 1948, after discharge from the U.S. Army, he applied for and was issued a passport for travel to Europe, and on 10/6/48 he departed the United States destined for Le Havre, France. His whereabouts from that period until 1956 was unknown. In the spring of 1956 it was established that GEORGE KOVAL was employed by the Mendeleev Chemical Institute in Moscow, USSR.

Inasmuch as the Los Angeles file regarding GEORGE KOVAL contains no information from a specific source that GEORGE KOVAL was an espionage agent, no information concerning him is being included in the letterhead memorandum.



EMMA LAZARUS JEWISH WOMEN'S CLUBS, aka Emma Lazarus Council of Jewish Women (ELJWC)

An informant advised on June 13, 1958, that the Emma Lazarus Jewish Women's Clubs of Los Angeles are affiliated with the Emma Lazarus Federation of Jewish Women's Club, having national headquarters in New York, New York, which, until the early part of 1951, were known as the Emma Lazarus Division, Jewish People's Fraternal Order. According to the informant, the Emma Lazarus Jewish Women's Clubs, Los Angeles, in about 1952 and early 1953 were also known as the Emma Lazarus Council of Jewish Women.

The Jewish People's Fraternal Order has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

An informant advised on March 11, 1958, that the aims and objectives of the Emma Lazarus Jewish Women's Clubs of Los Angeles are directed mainly towards raising funds for the publications, "People's World" and "Morning Freheit," and for the organization, Los Angeles Committee for Protection of Foreign Born. Financial support for these is solicited at the majority of functions of the Emma Lazarus Jewish Women's Clubs of Los Angeles.

According to the California Senate Fact Finding Committee on Un-American Activities, Report 1955, page 388, Los Angeles Committee for Protection of Foreign Born "is well known as a Communist front."

The "People's World" is a West Coast Communist newspaper.

The "Daily Worker," which was an East Coast Communist newspaper which suspended publication on January 13, 1958, in its issue of December 9, 1946, page seven, column one, in an editorial referred to the "Morning Freiheit" as a Jewishlanguage Communist paper.

SERVICE BUREAU OF JEWISH EDUCATION (SBJE), aka Service Bureau for Jewish Education, Jewish Educational Service, Committee for Progressive Jewish Education (CPJE)

On March 12, 1953, an informant made available a pamphlet captioned "Questions and Answers About the Progressive Jewish Children's Schools," which states that for more than twenty years the children's schools of the Jewish People's Fraternal Order (JPFO) constituted the progressive wing of secular Jewish education.

On March 17, 1951, another informant reported that as of January 17, 1951, the school system of the JPFO was then known as CPJE, the former name being the National School and Cultural Commission of the JPFO.

On September 14, 1955, this informant advised that on the afternoon of September 13, 1955, the CPJE acceded to the demands of the New York State Department of Insurance, as liquidator of the International Workers Order (IWO), that the CPJE surrender itself to the state as an asset of the IWO. The state on that date took control and closed the office of CPJE located in Room 903, 160 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

On January 23, 1956, another informant made available a letter of SBJE, Rocm 1005, 1123 Broadway, New York City, dated January 19, 1956, which reflected that, although "to a certain extent the attacks on our schools paralyzed our normal contact with you," the SBJE established its own office, opened, and is serving all progressive Jewish children's schools.

The JPFO, the Jewish nationality section of the IWO, and the IWO have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The SBJE continues to be located in Room 1005, 1123 Broadway, New York City.

Another informant advised that the Progressive Jewish Children's Schools of Los Angeles were formerly identified as the Jewish People's Fraternal Order Children's Schools and are also known as the Jewish Kinder Shules of Los Angeles which are affiliated with the Service Bureau of Jewish Education and are currently active in the Los Angeles area.

In connection with an investigation regarding HARRY GURSHTEL (LA 100-38357) and GOLDIE GURSHTEL (LA 100-38768), a pretext interview was conducted with GOLDIE GURSHTEL on Pretext utilized was inquring b70 6/16/59, by SA newspaper reporter interested in their trip to Europe.

GOLDIE GURSHTEL advised that she and her husband returned from their European tour about ten days ago. They visited England, France, Austria, Israel, Poland, and the Ukraine, USSR. She stated they did not visit Moscow or Leningrad as previously planned because of her husband becoming ill with pneumonia.

It has been previously established through interview of the GURSHTELS that they are the aunt and uncle of GEORGE KOVAL.

The Bureau has previously requested interviews of the GURSHTELS to determine their knowledge of subject's current address and employment in Moscow. The GURSHTELS, prior to their recent trip to Europe, have admitted no knowledge of KOVAL's address. During a previous trip to Russia in 1936, they visited the KOVAL family. In 1956, they received correspondence from ABRAN KOVAL, subject's father, reflecting that KOVAL was then as the Mendeleev Institute in Moscow.

It is reasonable to assume that if the GURSHTELS reached the USSR during their recent European tour that they may have made an attempt or actually visited with KOVAL or some member of his family.

In considering results of investigation conducted by the State Department, the New York Office has afforded consideration to the possibility that GEORGE KOVAL, who departed Sioux City, Iowa, during 1932 or 1933, with his father, ABRAM, is, in fact, identical with the GEORGE KOVAL who departed the United States during October, 1948, and whose background during the period 1941-1948 is generally known to this Bureau as a result of investigation conducted in this case.

While it is impossible to render a conclusive opinion, it would appear that the subject in this investigation is identical with the GEORGE KOVAL, born in Sioux City, Iowa, on 12/25/13. The foregoing is based upon the favorable comparison of passport photographs of the subject, taken during 1948, with photographs of GEORGE KOVAL, taken in Sioux City, Iowa, during 1929, prior to the reported departure of the KOVAL family from that city during 1932 or 1933.

On 9/28/59 HARRY TURSHTEL was interviewed by SA's at his residence, 15203 Hartsook Avenue, Sherman Oaks, Calif.

GURSHTEL advised that he and his wife GOLDIE GURSHTEL travelled to Europe and the USSR during May and early June, 1959. They took this tour with a group of tourists from the Los Angeles area. GURSHTEL advised that in late May, 1959 he and his wife reached Kiev, USSR where he became sick. His wife, GOLDIE, continued on without him to Moscow with other members of the tour group. He followed in two days and rejoined the group in Moscow.

He said that prior to departing the United States he and his wife had written ABRAHAM KOVAL, GEORGE's father, and requested him to meet the CURSHTELs in Moscow. He said they received a letter from him reflecting that because of his advanced age and difficulty of travel, he would not be able to come to Moscow to see them.

He said that they learned after arriving in Moscow that travel for them to Ambijan was not possible, therefore, they did not see ABRAHAM KOVAL during their stay in Europe. GURSHTEL advised that both he and his wife attempted to contact GEORGE KOVAL by telephone calls to the Mendeleev Institute in Moscow, however, they were advised that he was not there and no information could be obtained as to his residence address. GURSHTEL stated that neither he nor his wife saw or were in contact with GEORGE KOVAL other member of the KOVAL Ramily during their to USSR.

ReWFOlet dated 11-4-59, which set forth that the Passport Office, State Department, had requested an official opinion from the Foreign Adjudications Division as to subject's citizenship status.

On 11-10-59, SA reviewed a memorandum dated 11-6-59, prepared by the Chief of the Foreign Adjudications Division, State, entitled "GEORGE KOVAL". It was noted that in addition to subject's passport file, his file at State Security also was reviewed and this file contained all the information that had been furnished State by the Bureau.

The memorandum dated 11-6-59, set forth that there is no information of record on which the State Department could make a finding that KOVAL lost citizenship of the United States under any of the sub-sections of Section 349(a) of the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, or under any of the sub-sections of Section 401 of the Nationality Act of 1940, the predecessor law. As KOVAL is reported to have informed the Embassy at Moscow that, "I have been a citizen of the USSR since 1932", it is necessary to consider his status in the light of the first paragraph of Section 2 of the Act of March 2, 1907, which was in effect in 1932.

This memorandum noted that the file regarding ABRAM BERKONGOVAL, father of the subject, was reviewed and it was found that the application upon which a passport was issued to him on 5-14-52, included the other members of his family, including GEORGE KOVAL. From the statements contained on the application, and other background information, it was believed that the elder KOVAL was one of those many individuals living in the United States who was induced and solicited by the Amtorg Trading Corporation to go to the Soviet Union to assist that country in its development programs. A large number of these persons immediately took appropriate steps to be recognized as Soviet nationals not only for themselves but for members of their families.

It was pointed out that the Soviet law in force at the time the KOVAIS went to the Soviet Union provided that if both parents became citizens of the -Soviet Union their children also acquired Soviet citizenship if they had not / reached fourteen years of age. For children from the ages of fourteen to majority to acquire Soviet citizenship through their parents, the consent of such REG 1: 65-62911-221 children was required.

This memorandum continued that since GEORGE KOVAL was over fourteen years of age when he went to the USSR with his parents, and since it is now reported that he has been a citizen of the USSR since 1932, it would appear that his acquisition of Soviet citizenship took place through his parents with his consent, although this could never be confirmed even if we desired to do so.

The information available in the case of GEORGE KOVAL as it now stands is insufficient to enable us to request the Embassy at Moscow to prepare a formal certificate of expatriation pursuant to the first paragraph of Section 2 of the Act of March 2, 1907. On the other hand, KOVAL is reported to have made an admission against interest which would appear to be sufficient to deny him recognition as a citizen of the United States until such time as he may present himself at the Embassy at Moscow and submit to appropriate interrogation.

Legal Division's Passport Office, advised that a special memorandum was being placed in subject's file to the effect that should any additional information come to the attention of the State Department it should be referred to the Legal Division.

In view of the above, no further logical investigation at State suggests itself re this matter. The Legal Division has taken special action to see that any additional information is brought to its attention; therefore, WFD does not believe it necessary to place a stop with the Passport Office. Information developed to date is insufficient to attempt to expatriate subject as a U.S. citizen. It was noted that a letter, purportedly written by subject, and received at American Embassy, Moscow, USSR, during July, 1959, represented an "admission against interest" by the subject which was described as apparently sufficient to deny him recognition as a citizen of the U.S. It was also noted that the latter condition would require the subject to appear before State Department authorities for interrogation in the event he returns to the U.S.

Inasmuch as all logical action has been taken to effect subject's expatriation and since as outlined in re NY letter all other investigation has been completed, this case is being placed in a closed status. A lookout notice placed with INS on 10/27/57, concerning subject's return to the U.S. will be maintained at this time. C



He associated the name of KOVAL with the aforementioned background information, most specifically due to the fact that KOVAL was in the Army, had been assigned to Oak Ridge, and had subsequently been a student at what the informant believed to be NYU rather than CCNY. Informant, in fact, was under the belief that CCNY was NYU. He further stated that this person not only attended CCNY as a student, but most probably taught there following his graduation. Informant advised that undoubtedly KOVAL is identical with based on his recollection and knowledge of the above facts.

KOVAL served in the US Army during World War II. He was described as a tall individual with black hair who wore glasses and who was of Jewish nationality.

KOVAL remained in the US until 1948 or 1949, when he returned to the Soviet Union. According to KOVAL was afraid to work as an illegal agent while in the US and "did nothing" during his period of assignment. The GRU invested a considerable amount of money to establish KOVAL in the US and received nothing from him in return.

Upon returning to the Soviet Union, KOVAL made application to join the faculty of the Mendelaev. Institute of Technology in Moscow. His application was initially declined, but he was subsequently granted a position following a phone call to the Institute by a member of the Central Committee of the CP, who directed that KOVAL be placed on the faculty staff. KOVAL is presently a doctor of science at the Mendelaev Institute of Technology and teaches in the Department of General Chemical Technology.

Extensive investigation has developed the following pertinent information concerning George Koval who has been identified by a confidential source as a Soviet GRU (Intelligence Service of the Red Army) illegal agent who operated in the United States from approximately 1938-1948.

George Koval was born in Sioux City, Iowa, on December 25, 1914. His father and mother, Ethel and Abram Koval, both natives of Pinsk, Russia, immigrated to the United States during 1910. In addition to George Koval, the Kovals had two other sons. Isaiah and Gabriel, house both born in Sioux City, Iova, on and respectively.

Records of the Passport Office, Department of State, reflect that Abram Koval, who had been naturalized as a United States citizen on September 8, 1919, was issued a passport on May 14, 1932, for travel with his family to England, Poland or Russia. Investigation in Sioux City, Iowa, established the approximate date of the departure of the Koval family from the United States as during May, 1932. The reason for the departure was reported as Abram Koval's desire to return to the Biro-Bidjan Region in Russia to participate in a Russian program of Jewish resettlement in that area. The exact date of George Koval's return to the United States is not known. The first verified record of his presence in the United States was the payroll records

His military service consisted of tours at the atomic installations at Oak Ridge and Dayton, Ohio, where he reportedly had access to "for secret" information concerning the development of the atomic bomb.

Following his honorable discharge from the United States Army in 1946, Koval enrolled at CCNY where he was awarded a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering degree in 1948.

The files of the Passport Office, Department of State, reflect that Koval was issued a passport on March 15, 1948 for proposed travel to France, Belgium, Switzerland, and Poland as a representative of the Atlas Trading Corporation, New York City.

Departure Manifest records of the "SS America" reflected that Koval departed the United States at New York City on October 6, 1948 destined for Le Harre, France.

Information furnished during 1956 by Harry Surfel and Goldie Gurshtel, uncle and aunt of George Koval, disclosed that George Koval was in the Soviet Union at the time of a visit by the Gurshtels to that country in 1936. A letter received by the Gurshtels from Koval's father, Abram Koval, during 1956 disclosed that George Koval was at that time employed as a professor at the Mendelaev Institute of Technology in Moscow, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR). This employment was subsequently verified by the United States Embassy in Moscow, USSR.

Then certain specific information is of such a nature as to prohibit dissemination, the Eureau should be advised of the basis for non-dissemination.


