Reference is made to Bureau letter dated
February 8, 1941, in which the New York Division was requested to contact for the purpose of securing a list of officers and members of the German-American Bund and also for any additional information he might be able to provide concerning the activities of the German-American Bund.

For your information, but he resides and generally b7C maintains his office at 22 - 67th Street, West New York, b7D New Jersey. who has frequently furnished the New York Office with information about German matters generally, has recently appointed himself an adviser to b7C in connection with prosecution on criminal charges by the State of New Jersey. b7D reports that he generally locates at the above address at West New York or at telephone number PAlisade 6-2500.

The Newark Division is accordingly requested of the contact and endeavor to obtain from him a list of the officers and members of the German-Americanay 19 Bund. In this connection, the Newark Division is advised that in the January 9, 1941, issue of "The Free American M. & Deutscher Weckruff & Beobachter", official newspaper of the German-American Bund, an article appeared which indicated that expressed himself as being ready and willing at all times to cooperate with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and intimated that upon request, he would furnish a list of members and officers of the German-American Bund.

- #1. | Jule, last name unknown. Employed at Boehm Ranch. Assistant to Boehm with whom he entered the United States.
- #2.) These are leaders in the Bund at Fortland, Oregon. Their #3.) names are unknown. #2 is the head man.
- #5. Willie Kendzia, cashier of Los Angeles Bund. Works at American Can Company, Los Angeles. Physical director of the Bund, and financially interested, with Arno Risse, Photograph F, in a business deal, maybe tin shop in Roscoe. He is a member of the National Rifleman's Association and owns a rifle.
- #6. Name unknown. Former employee of the Hamburg American Line. Now in Germany working for them.
- #7. Mrs. Fred Boehm.
- #8. Fred Boehm, San Gabriel and El Monte Bund leader.
- #9.) Two members of the Bund orchestra. Names unknown. #10.)
- #11. Unknown Bund leader from either Seattle or Portland.
- #12. Name unknown. Member of staff of Hamburg American Line, at Los Angeles, until September, 1939. Discharged when war stopped operation of Hamburg American Line. Now owns restaurant somewhere on Vermont Avenue, Los Angeles.
- #13. W.A. Bockhacker, Member of Los Angeles Bund. Formerly "big shot." Can give more information on this party if desired.
- #14. Miss ? Assmann, sister of #19, Photograph A, and #15, Photograph C.
- #15. Miss Eunice Ropplemann, daughter of a member of the Uniform Guard, who is now employed as a chauffeur in Beverly Hills. This girl was sent last fall to Germany to participate in a study of Girl's Youth Groups (B.D.M.), through the efforts of Willie Sellim, a carpenter and member of the Los Angeles Bund.

Sellim is the youth leader for the West Coast. Fred Kuhn, on his last trip to Los Angeles, offered Sellim a position with the New York office as National Leader for the Youth Movement. Sellim refused because he and his fiance did not want to go to New York.

The fiance is Ester Maass, daughter of a butcher, George Maass. George Maass is the vice-President of the German American League, and also the leader of the Tyrolean-Bavarian Group. His butcher shop is located at 905 West Jefferson Blvd., telephone PRospect 1616, and his residence is 1303 West 23rd Street, telephone Richmond 4507.

- #17. Miss ? Stebner, Russian-German member of Bund orchestra, and also of the Military Band. Miss Stebner's two brothers, ages twenty and twenty-one, are also members of the Bund Military Band. Stebner, Sr. is shown on Photograph B, #9.
- #18. Miss ? Rast, sister of former owner of Roscoe Tin Shop.
  This firl returned to Germany and died there of tetanus in
  the Fall of 1939. Her father is in a Los Angeles Mental Institute, where he is a charge on the State. Her two brothers
  Helmuth Rast and Herbert Rast, shown on Photograph D, #3,
  liquidated all of their assets and leaving the father, where
  he is a public charge, returned to Germany with their money
  and are now in the German army.
- #19. Lucy/Assmann, sister of Max/Assmann, Photograph C, #15, now married to a chauffeur, (talter?, Employed in San Pedro.

- #1. Name unknown. Color Guard of Uniform Group.
- #2. Robert Lee, very active member of the Bund. Loaned five hundred dollars towards the purchase of the German House. Is the most trusted aide of Mike Drey, leader of Uniform Guard. Lee lives with Mike Drey.

Lee is a member of the National Rifleman's Association and owns a rifle.

He participated with Mike Drey, Photograph B, #15, and Herbert Rast, Photograph D, #3, in tearing down and destroying signs used in recent advertising campaigns of studies. These signs read "Moving Pictures Are Your Best Entertainment." The truck of Rast was used in this destruction.

The concubine of Robert Lee is a former German Army nurse. Is very prominent in all German clubs and was decorated by the German Government many times during the World War. Has nearly every German decoration.

#### THIS WOMAN WARRANTS PARTICULAR ATTENTION

This woman is well informed on all Nazi activity due to her association with Robert Lee. Is a rabid Nazi. Wears Indian bead work headband, with large swastika in front, carries handbag with large swastika ornament in front, and wears swastika brouche.

She makes a habit of visiting local stores and pretends a desire to make purchases. Always picks Jewish appearing salespeople and when the sale is about consumated she suddenly looks very closely at the person and says, "Oh, you are Jewish. I do not buy from Jews," and walks out of the store.

This is the person who has been throwing the Nazi leaflets from the roof of the May Company Building in downtown Los Angeles. She frequents open forum meetings and puts on Nazi demonstrations.

She is a nymphomaniac and a dypsomaniac. Will drink anytime with anyone, and when even slightly inebriated becomes very loquacious. Would be an easy prey for a good operative.

- #3. Otto Gieske, gardener of Beverly Hills, married, has two children, member of Uniform Guard. American citizen, very quiet.
- #4. Reinhold Kusche, 2951 Finch St., telephone Morningside 17883, husband of Emma Kusche, present bookkeeper of the Bund.

Carl Spahr, 1876 Lucretia Ave., telephone Olympia

Carl Spahr, 1876 Lucretia Ave., telephone OLympia 0857.
Inventor and wine maker. Frequent visitor to Bund. Has
three children who are sent yearly to Camp Sutter, at Hindenberg
Park. The entire family is vegeterian in its diet. His wife
is very prominent in all German circles, is a beautiful blonde,

highly sexed flirt, who loves to drink and has almost a mania for dancing of all kinds. Many times when Spahr goes to Bund meetings the wife takes up with other men, especially you, good-looking ones, and when Spahr is ready to leave the wife has

- #14. Same as member shown on Photographs A, #5, C, #11 and D, #1.
- #15. Mike Drey, West Coast chief of the Uniform Guard. Born and raised in Dachau, a suburb of Munich, is a graduate of the Munich Agriculture University; very fine shorthand stenographer and typist; good student of politics and is very fine writer, especially of oratorial matter, but a very poor public speaker.

Is a fanatical and dynamical leader of Nazism, would go to any extremes to foster Nazism, although he is an American citizen. Is an extremely rabid anti-Semitic. Was formerly married to a girl from Dachau, from whom he was divorced and by whom he had a boy, now about ten years old. Was re-married in 1939, present wife being a housemaid in Beverly Hills.

The brother of his present wife went to Germany late in 1938 and returned to Los Angeles in the summer of 1939, from where he went to New York, where he is at present residing.

- #16. Name unknown. An intermittent visitor to the German House, but not a member of the Bund.
- #17. Paul Schumacher, chemist and metallurgist, Married, has one son. Member Uniform Guard. (Not identical with Paul Schumacher, member of Musician's Union.) Formerly in charge of correspondence of Bund. Is a prominent and trusted member. German-born American citizen.

In the summer of 1939 sold car and household goods and sent proceeds to Germany to exchange bor building marks. (German government exchange, with a conversion value of 20 marks for one dollar. This type of exchange only allowed for persons returning to Germany permanently to build home and business. This type of exchange can never be reclaimed or used for any other purpose.)

Wife of subject, shown in Photograph E, #7, and her son left for Germany in the summer of 1939. Paul was to leave Christmas, 1939, as a crew member of a German steamer whose route was via Japan, I dia, etc., but stayed on the claim that he wished to make more money before returning. Enthusiastic supporter of Nazi cause while in the United States, both mother and son very disappointed (according to letters) with conditions in Germany. Early in 1940 mother and son returned to the United States.

- #18. Robert Patenge, 1411 Albany, telephone RIchmond 9048. Glass Blower and maker. American citizen, born in Berlin. First leader of Uniform Guard, and at request of Group took over the House, but disagreements arose over Naziideals and ideas and he quit the Bund. Is a wonderful organizer, and has been asked by the German American League to head Park Committee of Hindenberg Park, of which he is a founder.
- #19. Hans Diebel. Optometrist. German citizen and fears this information will become known to the United States authorities.

A copy of a letter written by Herman Schwin to Fritz Kuhn was read to Schwin by a high Nazi official on Schwin's visit to Germany in 1937. Because of this, and due to the fact that Diebel does all of the official correspondence with German, he is suspected by all important members of the Bund as being a Gestapo agent.

Die bel has plenty of money. Gets money from former employer, name unknown, on Hollywood Blvd.

He is over-sexed, a sadist, high-stake gambler on horses & cards.

He always accompanied Schwin on all trips. Was sent all over as speaker of Bund.

Is the owner of Aryan Book Store at German House. On last visit of Fritz Kuhn was offered head of German propaganda in the United States. Offer was refused by Diebel because of lack of friends in East and intimate contacts on "Western Front."

He still corresponds with people in all parts of the world. His important in coming mail is addressed to fictitious names at branch post offices. Only trusted members sent to claim this mail.

He is a member of "Weltdienst."

- #2. Miss Molfe, seventeen years, La Crescenta.
- #3. Otto Wolfe, father of E #2. Former cafe or restaurant owner in Los Angeles.
- #4. Paul Kendzia. German World War Veteran and German citizen. Intimate and trusted friend of Herman Schwinn. Former song leader and physical director of Bund. Writer and poet who has written many of the German fighting songs, very prominent in production of Bund song book.

Returned to Germany in 1939 leaving at San Pedro. Brother of Willie Kendzia, present cashier of local Bund. Age is approximately 46. Last girl friend in U.S. same as Photograph ##2.

- #5. Herman/Schwinn.
- #6. Herma Carlson, 6102 Alviso. Married 3 times. Rabid pro-Semite, friendly and intimate with Jews. Friend of Old Germany - Bund hater. With rest of this group only as a friend of E #9.
- #7. Mrs. Schumacher, wife of 器 #7, B #17.
- #8. Mrs. Armenius Walter. Mother of 2 children. Now tubercular patient in Los Angeles General Hospital. Close friend of Schwinn and all top flight members of Eund. Second person in L.A. to join Eund.

  Married to a German who was illegally in this country but who voluntarily returned to Germany to prevent deportation between June and August 1939.

  Mrs. Walter returned to Germany two months before the first child was born in order that it might be born in Germany. Both children, one six months old and the other two years old, were put on a boat in care of the ship's nurse, and sent back to Germany.

  Heavy drinker. Loves to gamble (cards). Likes good clothes and is rather promiscuous in love affairs.
- #9. Mrs Bockhscher, wife of person showh in Photograph A,#13 and B #12 and C #6.

Arno Risse. Tree surgeon. Born in Rhineland, Germany. Former employee of the Huntington Library. Local Bund leader. Not well educated. Intimate of Schwin, in charge when Schwin absent.

Left for visit to Germany in 1938, there had meeting with former Bund members in U.S.A., in the home of Paul Kendzia, in Germany. Then made stop-over at Breman, where he visited Gestapo member (Dr. ?, formerly of Los Angeles and now head of German, G.U. clinics.) On return to U.S. married, and started back to Germany with wife on German steamer. Two days out of Los Angeles war broke and his boat ordered to proceed to Curacea, where he and his wife stayed for four months on the boat. Was offered passage to Germany on Italian boat which he refused saying, "Why should I go back and fight for that son-of-a-bitch."

His return from Curacoa was made possible by a fund from the local Bund. There refusal of one member of the local Bund to contribute to the fund for Risse's return resulted in the member's dismissal. After Risse's return his statement regarding Hitler became known and he was forced to resign from the Bund.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

Thank you for your letter of May 28th in reply to my letter of May 7th which included enclosures of the Nazi bund camps in New Jersey Camp(Nordland).

Incidently, I notice that tonight the radio anounced that this camp and some of their material had been confiscated .

I do hope that many mo e raids will be made thru out the United States, because they are in almost every city of any size.

I am enclosing a clipping of the Akron Council for peace action located in akron, Ohio. Also a letter I had from them over ayear ago when conscription was before the american public. They have been consistantly opposed to any measures that would help to strenghen this country. Today they are trying to divide our people, and I think this organization should be investigated for the protection of all americans, let us find out who is really behind this outfit and who is furnishing the moeny for all this advertising and the payroll for mailing out circulars to congressmen, senators, and thousands of people thruout the country.

Attached also are copies of two different letters written to your agent in charge in Cleveland, Ohio.

I have never received any mealy to either emperof athese letters on a d I have no way of knowing whether or not any investigation was followed thru on this case of Joe Elsie 5 Jil 1941

I see by the papers tonight that Your agent Mr. PHichmond hands resigned and I wonder if he has checked into the case of Joe Elsie, Massillon, Ohio. Best wishes. Yours truv.

The above mentioned Mr. Joe Elsie formaly had a resturant , har Grill and Etc. at the above address.

When the construction began on the Waval plant in Canton, Ohio he closed up his business and obtained a job as foreman at the naval plant, laying the railroad tracks inside the naval plant grounds.

Now I wound not have given this move on his part any thought, if it was not for the fact that he has been in such full somethy with every move that Hitler has made so far. He has made statements to many people including the writer that the Jews should be ran out of this country, and that Hitler was doing a great thing for the world when he took over the countries and banished the Jews from any partisipation in the affairs of the countries.

Then arain why would be close his business which 's showin a profit and take a job at the plant for much less money then his business paid him?

He has told me certain things at various times that have come true true as to the moves that Hitler has made in the past and he only said I have ways of finding out what is going to happen .I am almost certain that he belongs to some German organization that has ecess to the what is going on among the Mazi members in this country.

I am very much worrried over this case and I do with you

I have known this man for over five years and happen to know that he does not have to work at all, he has enough investments in real espate and other properties that he does not have to older his business and work like he is doing.

I do hope hope you will do your cent to investigate this case, and if I am wrong then we will at least know that nothing irregular is going on. He and his friends have predicted that Hitlers system rill eventually prevail in this country.

## COUNCIL ACTIVITIES AND PEACE CENTER NOTES

Since opening the headquarters, 130 S. Main St., two hundred new members have been added to the roll. The Bulletin Peace information service reaches members in 24 cities in four states.

Over 6,000 signatures to letters opposing conscription were sent to our Ohio Senators and Representatives. Numerous telegrams and night letters opposing conscription were sent by members and non-members of the Council.

As many as 130 post cards on the conscription issue were mailed from the Peace Center in one day.

The demonstration against conscription aroused wide-spread interest, and stimulated action on the part of individuals and groups not affiliated with the Council. We have received copies of letters and reports of telegrams sent by them to Congressmen.

Beacon Journal clippings on the demonstration and interview with Rep. Harter, together with editorials, were mailed to some 25 Congressional leaders. In some instances personal letters were received in response.

A personal request was made at the Center for assistance in organizing a Peace Council in Mansfield, Ohio. Plans are under way to meet the request.

Daily we are adding to the thousands of signatures on our petition against foreign war.

Our sincere thanks go to all persons who have assisted in furthering the peace cause. Our special thanks to those who endured the heat and the vituperative remarks of those whose opinions differ from ours, at the Center. As the pressure for war increases, name calling and smearing will increase. The situation demands courage.

#### BULLETIN FOR AUGUST 1940

August -- vacation days and picnics - and increasing WAR tempo. The Senate just approved legislation giving the President authority to call out the National Guard for training and service anywhere in the Western Hemisphere and the U.S. decendencies, including the Philippines. The bill has been sent to the Fouse.

This action is unprecedented in peace-time history. Under the constitution the National Guard can be called out for only three purposes: to execute the laws of the union; to suppress insurrection; and to repel invasion. The men who joined the National Guard contracted to fulfill those duties as prescribed by the Constitution; now at the discretion of the President they may be forced to participate in an undeclared war on foreign soil.

As the Bulletin goes to the mimeographer, debate on Conscription is about to begin in the Senate. The opposition is organizing around the Senate Military Affairs Committee minority report ("Conscription is a Hitlerian method.") Debate may last two weeks.

#### THE FACTS ABOUT CONSCRIPTION

(1) Our country is at peace. (2) The leaders of our country have pledged that we will not enter the European war. (3) The possibility of invasion has been both ridiculed and denied by military experts of the highest authority. YET, for the first time in our history, compulsory military training in peace time is being considered by the Congress. — WHY??

The Administration wants it. The War Department believes it necessary.

#### BUT - WHERE DID THE CONSCRIPTION BILL ORIGINATE:

At the Harvard Club in New York City on May 22, 1940, there was a meeting of prominent business and professional men. The conscription bill in the form in which it was first presented to the Congress, was written as a result of that meeting. A few of those present were:

Granville Clark of the law firm of Root, Clark, Buckner & Ballantine. Gen. John F. O'Ryan, who has already advocated entrance into the war. Henry L. Stimson, now Secretary of War.

Robt. P. Patterson, now Assistant Secretary of War.

Elihu Root, Jr., also of the firm of Root, Clark, Buckner & Ballantine, Julius Ochs Adler, general menager of the New York Times.

K. P. Budd, director in North British & Mercantile Insurance Company, with headquarters in London.

F. M. Weld, a director of Baldwin Locomotive Works.
Brig. Gen. Benedict Crowell, Director of Munitions during World War.

We quote from the speech of Senator Holt of West Virginia on the floor of the Senate on August 6, (Congressional Record).

"They met on the 22nd of May and established this drive for conscription. On the 23rd day of May they went back to the same club and there passed resolutions for "aid to the Allies short of war." . . . . . On the 3rd day of June they met again. They met to raise money. It is hard to

tell how much they raised, but they said they were going to raise onequarter of a million dollars. That fort Why should men in business have to raise a quarter of a million dollars to drive a conscription bill through the Congress of the United States? Why, I ask again, should businessmen raise a quarter of a million dollars to drive conscription through the United States Congress?"

#### OPPOSITION MOUNTS - CONSCRIPTION SLOWED DOWN

Through the news columns and editorials of the Beacon Journal, previous Bulletins, and literature distributed at the Peace Center, the public has been acquainted with our position on conscription. Each day brings increased protest: more newspapers openly are denouncing the measure as unnecessary to the defense of America. We quote from two outstanding American newspapers.

"Compulsory training and disciplining by the state is only one short step removed from compulsory labor. How far should the United States go in accepting totalitarian devices to enhance our national strength;"

The Washington Post

"The bill should be denounced because it is being sold to the people as a defense measure when in reality it is a device to slide the United States into war." — Akron Beacon Journal. The editorial. "A bid for War" from which the above statement is quoted, was sent to every member of the United States Senate by Peace Council members, accompanied in many instances by personal notes.

#### MILITARY EXPERTS SPEAK

## Here is what Major George Fielding Eliot Says:

"By all basic considerations we are a sea power. The type of army we require is one which will be an adequate and immediately ready support to maritime operations; a vast universal service army can be really useful to us only if we are again to undertake large-scale operations in Europa."

Here is what Hanson W. Baldwin, military expert for the New York Times, writes in August Harpers Magazines

"Who ther or not conscription is guilding needed, it should maver be endorsed except after careful consideration and with an understanding of the basic change in our lives and our customs that it will entail ..... its adoption would create a profound, lasting and clearly inescapable change in the economic, social and political life of our country and might well retard the growth of our civilization. A measure of such consequence if enacted in time of peace may become a permanent part of our institutions; it should not, therefore, be considered by Congress in this era of hysteria, but, if intended as a permanent measure, only in time of calm calculation. On the other hand, if conscription is needed merely as a temporary emergency measure to last for the duration of the emergency, then the energency ought to be defined; if the international picture is black enough to warrant conscription, then the President should declare a state of mational emergency or Congress should declare a state of war .... we have not yet even had a chance to try to fill our requirements by voluntary recruiting."

#### THE GRRUAN AMERICAN BUND

On October 11, 1924 the National Socialist Association, "Teutonia", was founded in Chicago, Illinois. Out of this organization grew the League of the Friends of the New Germany which was established on June 30, 1933, in Chicago, Illinois.

On March 29, 1936, the name of the League of the Friends of the New Germany was changed to the German American Bund (Amerika Deutscher Volksbund).

The purposes and aims of The American League of the "Triends of the New Germany" as set forth in one of their official pamphlets are as follows:

"To unite all honorable, serious-minded, courageous and unselfish men and women of the Germanic Race, now loyal citizens or residents of the United States, proud of their Germanic Blood, and treasuring German traditions, language, and ideals of National and individual liberty, justice, truth, duty and absolute honesty, into one great, free, proud and respect-demanding German American Bund for the mutual benefit of the United States of America and Germany.

"We pledge our best efforts to expose and depose Communism, Marxism, Internationalism and Un-American Boycott Rackets within the United States of America,

"To defend with all lawful mean our disposal the good name and honor of our mother-country dermany against all base defamation, will-ful and poisonous lies, and purposeful malice, emanating from any fli-wishing, jealous, avaricious and ignorant source whatsoever,

be it race, people, tribe, clan, nation, association or individual, against a propaganda still being spread by print, script and mouth, openly and covertly, through books, magazines, newspapers, leaflets, and just cowardly rumors;

"To try to bring home to our American co-citizens the real and indisputable German achievements in the sciences and arts, the German inventions and contributions toward the advancement of agriculture, industry and commerce, the great, world-wide recognized, German institutions of learning, the German high standard of the various professions, handicrafts and labor, the outstanding German laws and institutions for the protection and welfare of especially the working classes, the high German ideals of liberty, of Justice, of honor, and of education, the honorable and energetic effort the new German Government is making to promote equality of classes of mental and physical workers, as long as they really work earnestly and intelligently not alone in their own individual interest but also in the interest of the commonwealth, the commendable, virtuous and forceful efforts of the new German Government to oppose, suppress, punish and eradicate all selfish interests trying to chisel, defraud, or iraft;

"To be and remain worthy of our Germanic blood, our German Fatherland, our German brothers and sisters, who are now fighting for their very existence and honor; to cultivate our German language customs, and ideals; and to be upstandingly proud of this all."

The aims and purposes set out above which were adopted by the "Friends of the New Germany" do not constitute their entire list but only those which are pertinent and of value to this memorandum.

The Constitution of the German-American Bund was first unanimously adopted during the National Convention at "Deutschhorst," Croydon, Pennsylvania, in 1935 and amended in Buffalo, New York, in 1936. The Preamble to this Constitution is as follows:

\*We associate ourselves together to unite all honorable, seriously-minded, courageous and unselfish men and women of the Germanic Race, loyal and prospective citizens of the United States, proud of their German blood, and treasuring German traditions, language and ideals of national and individual liberty, justice, truth, duty and absolute honesty, into one great, free, proud and respect-commanding German American En nd for the mutual benefit of the United States of America and Germany.\*

Article II of the Constitution adopted in 1735 sets forth the aims and purposes of the German-American Bund. The following sections appear in Article II:

"To defend with all lawful means at our disposal the good name and honor of our mother-country (Germany) against base defamation, willful and poisonous lies, and purposeful malice, emanating from an ill-wishing, jealous, avaricious or ignorant source whatsoever, be it race, people, tribe, clan, nation, association or individual; against propaganda spread by print, script or mouth, openly or covertly, through books, magazines, newspapers, leaflets, or merely cowardly rumors;

"To act at all times, everywhere, and under all conditions, as straight-ferward, courageous, just and honorable descendants of the Germanic Race, setting an example of blameless conduct, thereby creating an atmosphere of genuine Goodwill towards the German people and their government;

\*To be and remain worthy of our Germanic blood, our German Motherland, our German brothers and sisters, and to cultivate our German language, customs and ideals; and to be upstandingly proud

of these principles."

At a Convention of the German-American Bund held in New York City in 1938, the following purposes and aims of that organisation were promulgated:

"To unequivocally oppose all Racial Intermixture between Aryans (White Gentiles) on the one hand, and Asiatics, Africans or other non-Aryans on the other, to the end that the race-legislation already in twenty-eight States of the Union and to a degree incorporated in our Country's immigration laws, may be scientifically perfected and applied throughout the Nation; to earnestly strive to further a true respect, understanding and friendship between these racially dissimilar groups, based upon a recognition and not upon a denial of the Almighty's immutable racial Laws;

"To uncompromisingly fight, with every lawful means at our disposal, against all Subversive internationalism, in order that Marxism and all allied phenomena, from the Communist Party which openly advocates the overthrow by force and violence of our Government, to the Liberal-pacifistic forces undermining the morale of Youth, from the Aliencontrolled, international so-called Labor Movements preaching the madness of class-hatred throughout the world to the Rackets of international High Finance which are enslaving the Nation, may be outlawed and uprooted; to just as staunchly champion every American Political Movement, Labor Organisation, Financial Institution and so forth, insefar as nothing is placed above the Nation and no Alien Leadership or Domination is tolerated serving the interests of true Social Justice, teaching each element of the Citisenry to understand the need for cooperation with the others and recognizing as its ideal the following basic principle: 'The Common Good before Private Gain'!

"To unite with all Americans defending the Aryan Culture and code of Ethics upon which this Nation was founded, helping to build a great American Movement of Liberation under the Swastika, the common Symbol of the Defenders of Aryan Nationalism against the Bolshevik Scourge, regardless of the form of Government or Religion involved, which is already being used in Germany, Great Britain, the Netherlands, the Scandinavian Countries, White Russia, the Ukraine, France and Belgium, Canada and other Countries, in order that the Dictatorship of a small, racially and ethically alien, Jewish-international minority, to which the Mind of the entire Nation is rapidly being subjected, may be broken, restoring true Proportionate Representation to the hundred million Aryan Americans in the vital fields of the Press, Radio, Stage, Screen, Education, Legislation, Justice, Finance and the Professions, so that the Aims outlined in the preceding paragraphs may be achieved and these United States reconstituted the sovereign and independent God-fearing and cultured, racially and ethically healthy Nation envisaged by its Founders!

"To strive for a true Peace, based upon mutual understanding and friendship between our Country and others, by recognizing and respecting the differences which exist between even the various Aryan Nations and by defending the fundamental right of every civilized Country to govern itself without interference from outside, by disseminating other Countries and of value in serving the cause of such Peace and Friend mip, and finally by exposing and combatting all atrocity and boycott propaganda, base defamation, distortion of news and malicious lies, tending to create hatred and a warpsychosis promising benefit only to the everlasting international parasites!

"To recognise as eternal Law that only he can serve his God and Country well who strives to develop his capabilities in accord with his inherited characteristics, and that consequently a renegade to his Race cannot be a good American Citisen; to therefore defend our Right to



cherish the German Language and German Customs and our might and Duty to defend the good name of all things German against slanderous attacks of any kind, emanating from any ill-wishing, jealous, avaricious or ignorant source whatsoever if he it Nation, Hace, Tribe, Association or Individual; to force nation-wide recognisation of the incontrovertible fact that our Organisation desires to be no more and no less than a useful part of the desperately needed Great Aryan Movement for a Free and Glean America, accords the same respect to every other Element of our Country's Citisenry which it demands for ours, is as American as any other and is entitled to the same Rights and Privileges under the Hill of Rights ascorded to any other Organisation in the country."

As to leadership, Fritz Kuhn has been connected with the German-American Bund since its inception as the League of the Friends of the New Germany, carrying his membership in the Detroit Local. Information is available that Fritz Kuhn was born in Munich, Germany. Kuhn served in the Bavarian Life Guard Regiment and also on the front lines during the World War from 1914 to 1918 as a Lieutenant in the Machine Gun Detachment of the Alp Corps and saw service on the French, Italian, Serbian and Roumanian fronts. He migrated to Mexico in 1924 and arrived in Laredo, Texas, on May 18, 1928. He is reported to have joined the Nazi Party in 1921 and to have participated in the famous Hitler Putsch at Munich. He worked his way up through the League of the Friends of the New Germany and the German-American Bund until he became the leader of the Bund. He is now in prison serving a sentence for embessing the funds of the Bund.

In 1938 Fritz Kuhn advised the members and visiting delegates to a Bund meeting at Camp Nordland that the Bund's Declaration of Principles was as follows:

- "1. A socially just, white, Gentile-ruled United States.
- "2. Gentile-controlled labor unions free from Jewish Moscow-directed domination.
- "3. Gentiles in all positions of importance in government, national defense, and educational institutions.

  "4. Serverance of diplomatic relations with Soviet

Russia, outlaving of the Communist Party in the United States, prosecution of all known Communists for high treason.

- \*5. Immediate constation of the dumping of all political refugees on the shores of the United States.
- \*6. Therough cleaning of the Hellywood film industries of all alien, subversive doctrines.
- \*7. Cossation of all abuse of the freedom of the pulpit, press, radio and stage.
- "8. A return of our Government to the policies of George Washington. Alcofness from foreign entanglements. Severance of all connections with the League of Sations."

Information has been obtained indicating that George Wilhelm Kunse was unanimously elected national chairman of the German-American Bund at a national convention of that organization held in Chicage, Illinois, from August 31 to September 2, 1940. It is also stated that Kunse had been the active head of this organization since December 1939.

Eurse was born in the United States and is an American citizen. He speaks fluent German and has been connected with the German-American Bund and its predecessors since 1983.

The German-American Bund has sponsored four newspapers in various cities of the United States, one of which is named "Der Deutsche Weckruf und Beobachter", which is reported to be the leading Hasi publication in the United States.

The Bund is also reported to have maintained many camps throughout the United States through which it carried on its program.

Information available in the first part of 1941 revealed that it was impossible to obtain an accurate list of the members of the Bund and that it was also impossible to arrive at an authentic estimate of the membership, inasmuch as the local leaders themselves were unable to furnish accurate estimates. This is occasioned by the fact that the Bund had been divided into various categories, and the individual members of same could not be counted.

Information has been recently received indicating that the German-American Bund throughout the United States has initiated the policy of not publicizing its activities or holding meetings or other public gatherings where an admission is made that it is the German-American Bund spensoring the gathering. Information has been received on numerous occasions indicating that the members of the German-American Bund are infiltrating other German organizations and taking an active part in the work of these organizations thereby establishing a pro-Mazi click in that group.

For the same reason I do not consider it desirable at this particular time to use search warrants to obtain the necessary information regarding violations of the Voorhis Act, although here again at a later date we may request such a procedure. is pointed out in my previous memorandum, it is practically impossible to obtain material of evidentiary value exclusively from confidential informants and it would be of considerable assistance if you would, following your review of the reports in this matter, indicate those instances where you wish to make an exception to the general rule of not interviewing officers and members of the German-American Bund.

#### THE GERMAN-AMERICAN BUND

#### Organization

The German-American Bund is a national organisation with a national leader and other officers. It has divided the United States into three divisions, namely: Division East, Division Middle West and Division West, each with a Division Director. There are a number of locals in each division, each of which has its own local leader and other officers. In all there are about 42 locals in the United States active at the present time.

The constitution of the Bund explicitly provides that all activities of locals shall be prescribed or sanctioned by the mational organization and its executive officers.

### History

Out of an organisation called "Toutonia" which was formed on October 11, 1924 there was formed a new organisation called the Langue of the Friends of the New Germany" which was established on June 30, 1933 in Chicago. It is reported that this organisation was formed by one Richard Pennewits, a German intelligence efficer in the first World War, and that his activities in forming this organisation were in accordance with instructions from the German Foreign Political Office.

On March 29, 1936 the name of the League of the Friends of the New Germany was changed to the German-American Bund (Amerika Deutscher Volksbund).

#### Alma

The published aims of the Bund are stated in the constitution which was first unaminously adopted during a Mational Convention in 1935 and amended in 1936. The Presable to this constitution is as follows:

"We associate ourselves together to unite all honorable, spricusly-minded, couragebas and unselfish men and women of the Germanie Rase, loyal and prospective citizens of the United States, proud of their German blood, and treasuring German traditions, language and ideals of national and individual liberty, justice, truth, duty and absolute honesty, into one great, free, proud and respect-commanding German American Bund for the mutual benefit of the United States of America and Germany."

Article II of the Constitution adopted in 1935 sets forth the mins and purposes of the German-American Bund. The following sections appear in Article II:

"To defend with all lawful means at our disposal the good name and honor of our nother-country (Germany) against base defenation, willful and poisonous lies, and purposeful malice, emanating from an ill-wishing, jealous, evarietous or ignorant source whatsoever, bill race, people, tribe, class, nation, association or individual; against propaganda appears by print, coript or south, openly or covertly, through books, angesines, newspapers, leaflets, or merely coverdly remore;

"To act at all times, everywhere, and under all conditions, as straightfürmed, courageous, just and henorable descendants of the descendants have, setting on example of biameless counsel, thereby creating an atmosphere of genuine Geodwill terrate the German people and their government;

"To be and remain worthy of our Germanic blood, our German Motherland, our German brothers and sisters, and to sultivate our German language, sustant and ideals; and to be upstandingly preed of these principles."

At a Convention of the Germanulmerican Rund held in New York City in 1936, the fellowing purposes and aims of that organization were promaignted:

"To uncompromisingly fight, with every lawful means at our disposal, against all fulnersive internationalism, in order that Harmism and all allied phenomena, from the Communist Party which eponly advocates the overthrow by feroe and violence of our Government, to the Liberal-Pacifistis feroes underwining the morals of fouth, from the Alien-controlled, international so-called labor Hovements preaching the madness of class-hatred throughout the world to the Rackets of International High Finance which are enslaving the Nation, may be outlawed and







uprooted; to just as staumently champion every American Politic Movement, Labor Organization, Financial Institution and so forth, insofar as nothing is placed above the Mation and no Alien Leadership or Domination is tolerated serving the interests of true Social Justice, teaching each element of the Sitisenry to understand the need for cooperation with theothers and recognizing as its ideal the following basic principle:

'The Common Good before Private Gain'!

"To Unite with all Americans defending the Aryan Culture and code of Ethies upon which this Mation was founded, helping to build a great American Movement of Libbertion under the Swastika, the common symbol of the Defenders of Aryan Mationalism against the Bolshevik Forurge, regardless of the form of Government or Religion involved, which is already being used in Germany, Great Britain, the Notherlands, the Scandinavian Countries, White Russia, the Ukraine, France and Belgium, Canade and other Countries, in brder that the Dietatorship of a small, racial y and ethically alies, Jewish-international minority, to which the Mind of the entire Mation is rapidly being subjected, may be broken, restoring true Proportionate Representation to the hundred million Aryan Americans in the vital fields of the Press, Radio, Stage, Sureen, Muscation, Legislation, Justice. Finance and the Professions, so that the aims outlined in the preceding paragraphs may be achieved and these United States reconstituted the sovereign and independent God-fearing and cultured, racially and sthically healthy Mation envisaged by its Founders!

\*To strive for a true Peace, based upon mutual understanding and friendship between our Country and others, by recognizing and respecting the differences which exist between even the various aryan Maticas and by defending the fundamental right of every civilized Country to govern itself without interference from outside, by disseminating other Countries and of value in serving the cause of such Peace and Friendship, and finally by exposing and combatting all atrocity and boycott propaganda, base defamation, distortion of news and malicious lies, tending to create hatred and a war-psychosis promising benefit only to the everlasting international parasites!

"To recognise as sternal Law that only he can serve his God and Country well who strives to develop his capabilities in accord with his inherited characteristies, and that consequently a renegate to his Race cannot be a good American Citisen; to therefore defend our Aight to sherish the German

The aims of the Bund as confidentially communicated to the officers of the organisation are as follows:


"At is the duty of the Bund leader to maintain and prosote a defensive and offensive organisation of Volk-minded Germans for the purpose of affording a universal conception of Bational Socialism and State Politics dedicated to the service of creating an actual independent Aryan government in the United States."

#### Foreign Connections

The ideology and activities of the Bund in general closely follow those of the German Mani Party. Cortain officials prominent in the German American Bund travelled to Germany in 1937 Auring the Clympics. faring this visit they attended a convention of the National Bookslistic German borkers Party in Munemberg and attended a conference at the Auslands Institute at Stuttgart. The Auslands Institute is an agency of the German Government for maintaining contact with and coordinating and directing the activities of Germans and German groups living abroad. These facts tend to prove that the German-American Bund is linked directly to the National Jocialist German Workers Party, and that this link is maintained through the Auslands Institute. The Yearbook of the German-American Band for the year 1937 carries pictures of Hitler and Coering greeting the members of the Bund as they are lined up in front of the belong of the Reich Chans-liory on the occasion of the 1936 trip of the Band to Germany for the Olympic games. The Storm Troopers of the Bund are shown murching through the Streets of Berlin. In another picture Mitier is shown turning the pages of a book handed to him by Fritz Nuhn, called the "Goldon Book of American Germans."

#### Antional Leadership

a to leadership, Fritz Auin was connected with the German-American Bund since its recention as the Legue of the Friends of the New

Germany, carrying his membership in the Detroit Local. Information is aveilable that Fritz Kuhn was born in Munich, Germany. He served in the Esvarian Life Guard Regiment and also in the Front lines during the orla far from 1914 to 1918 as a Lieutenant in the Machine Gun Detachment of the Alp Corps and saw service on the French, Italian, Serbian, and Acusanian fronts. He migrated to Maxico in 1924 and arrived in Laredo, Texas, on May 18, 1928. He is reported to have joined the Hasi Party in 1921 and to have perticipated in the famous Hitler Putsch at Maxich. He worked his way up through the League of the Friends of the New Germany and the German-American Bund until he became the leader of the Bund. He is now in prison serving a sentence for embessling the funds of the Bund.

Information has been obtained indicating that George Wilhelm Kunse was unanimously elected mational chairman of the German-American Bund at a national convention of that organisation held in Chicago, Illinois, from August 31 to September 2, 1940. It is also stated that Kunse had been the active head of this organisation since December 1939.

Kunse was born in the United States and is an American citizen. He speaks fluent German and has been connected with the German-American Bund and its predecessors since 1933.

#### Mational Publications

The Bund has sponsored four newspapers in various dities of the United States, oneof which is named The Free American and Per Deutscher Weekruf und Beobachter. The following is an editorial from one of these publications:

## Givilian Military Aqtivities

Ever since the formation of the Greatensor of the German-American Bund in the United States, provision has been made for Storm Troopers which are called Ordnungs Dienst or OD. As stated by Kuhn, the national leader, in an order dispatched to all branches of the organization, "the OD be the backbone of the Bund. Without it the Bund is valueless."

The OD was organized on a strictly military plan and its activities as demonstrated by orders issued to local leaders include provisions for guard duty, salutes, how to wear medals and emblems, and other strictly military procedures.

Up until fairly recently drilling with rifles was a regular part of its activities. Rifles were legally obtained by enrolling the mambers in the Estimal Rifle Association.


Then national publicity of the activities of the German-American Bund curtailed their activities, the OB subsided, but in such places as Los Angeles, California, there is evidence of recent reorganisation and activity on the part of this branch of the Bund's activities. Evidence indicates that under the reorganised plans the OD sections of the Bund are now organising as singing societies and bowling groups. Secret drills are being held in localities away from the public eye and the adquiring of steel helmets, etc. indicates a renewed activity on the part of the OD.

Although the officers of local organizations profess to have a connection with the Mari government or its activities, there is evidence that these same officers have been in the employ of Masi agents and consulates of the German government. The Bund, as a part of its activities, has a definite policy of encouraging the formation of youth groups to educate them in the Masi ideology. Such a youth department is a subdivision of a Bund local and is carried on according to uniform plans prescribed by the national leader. Many of the locals establish camps. In these samps are held elaborate activities which include murching, wearing of uniforms, inculestion in Basi philosophy, and education in the standard hates of Jewry, and Communism, and instruction in militant Germanism.

## Division Fest

Evidence of subversive activities of the German-American Bund on the Facific seast was centered primarily around the director of the western division of the German-American Bund, one Hermann Schwinn. I Seawinn is reported to have resigned the presidency of the Los Angeles Unit of the Bun', although retaining Divisional Directorship for Department lest of the German-American Bund. Evidence discloses that on March 1, 1941 Hermann Schwinn was forced to resign his position as leader of the Division West because of his difficulties with the Immigration authorities and one George Probesse has been installed in his place.

Schwing is reported to have been active in the formation of the Mexican Gold Shirt-, headed by Micholas Rodriques, now in skile in the United States. The task, an informant reports, was undertaken at the beheat of Goebbels. Information from the same source indicates that Schwing was descrated by Mitler and that he visited Germany in Esptember 1937 expressly for the purpose of delivering to Hitler a \$3,500 gift solicited from the Los Angeles Mand. Schwing is also known to have attempted to introduce forged evidence in the trial of Frits Kuhn.

Schwinn's citizenship was remained in 1939 in the United States District Court, Los Angeles. Schwinn is the author of many pro-Masi pronouncements. In his speech at Los Angeles, July 29, 1939, he expressed himself as follows:

"But we have furthermore recognized that without Haticael Socialism, or, let us say, without real socialism, neither this country the United States here nor any mation can become well again. Chearly and poignantly present conditions show that only measures as taken in Germany can create order. Not only measures but principally the realisation that socialism is a life necessity for a nation."



From in informant it was learned that a chapter of the Bund was organised in Portland in approximately 1934; that from the date of its organisation until some time in 1935 it was affiliated with the national organization. In 1935 membership in the national organization was discontinued and the Bund was maintained as a local organization until, on the occasion of a visit by Fritz Kuhn in 1936, it rejoined the national organization.

Through an informant it was disclosed that the Bund held open meetings regularly in Fortland from August 11, 1939 to October 27, 1939. Since them it is not openly functioning, although all of theofficers of the Bund and certain select members continue to meet.
