Beginning about February, 1945, it is noted that correspondence from the Division of Monetary Research to OSS and vice versa usually was signed by or directed to HAROLD CLAISER, the Assistant Director of the Division of Monetary Research. About July, 1945, OSS reports were directed to FRANK COE, Director of the Division of Monetary Research and Treasury Department reports being referred to OSS were forwarded through COE. (S-2)

The Treasury Department file captioned "OSS" reflects that Mr. EMERSON SIGELOW was the OSS Liaison Officer with the Treasury Department.

Office of International Finance files captioned "Portugal" and "Letters to WOOD" reflect that JAMES I WOOD, The Financial Attache at the American embassy, Lisbon, Portugal, submitted letters to subject who was Assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury beginning on June 12, 1943. WOOD initiated a regular series of these letters beginning on October 18, 1943, and these letters were referred to as pouch letters and are numbered from 1 to 229. These letters reflect that WOOD was furnishing the following type information to the subject who was then Assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury S-

- Data concerning individuals seeking relief under U. S. exchange control regulations.
- 2. Foreign exchange and foreign currency rates quoted in the Lisbon market.
- 3. Statistics concerning steel and chemical imports at Lisbon.
- 4. Summaries of news gathered from the Lisbon Daily Newspapers, such summary having been prepared by the American Legation at Lisbon.

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
