A graduate of Columbia Law School, member New York Bar, prior to entering Government service was Business Trend Editor, Newsweek Magazine, and Executive of Courrnment Employees investigation re Abels. Nothing derogatory. (#140-5979)

Book is, as title suggests, attack on Truman administration dealing specifically with Reconstruction Finance Corporation, Federal Bousing Administration, and various tax cases. Author compares scandals of Truman administration with those of Grant and Harding administrations, but says Truman's was worst.

Numerous references to the FBI and the Birector. Bufiles cleaked concerning each reference and pertinent information in files has been set forth parenthetically below each detailed reference. References generally not critical of Bureau. Page 176 states Benry F. Grundwald "By his own account, ... could get J. Edgar Hoover on the phone to discuss a personal problem." The manner in which the author states to discuss impression it is true. On page 329, in connection with briding a witness in a narcotics case, author states that the San Francisco grand jury "Cospite repeated pleas to Fashington" could get "no help from the FBI." Actually, this case was a Treasury Department an extensive investigation into the matter. Other feferences not

The book "The Truman Scandals," by Jules Abels, was released recently by Henry Regnery Company, Chicago, Illinois.

AUTHOR. JULES ABELS

Jules Abels, United States Government economist, has served since October, 1953, as Economic Adviser to the Administrator of the Small Business Administration. Prior to joining the Government, he was Business Trends Editor of Newsweek Magazine and Executive Editor for the Research Institute of America. Hr. Abels is a graduate of Columbia Law School, a member of the New York Bar and was a Littauer Fellow in Economics at Harvard University. He is the author of the book, "The Welfare State: A Mortgage on America's Puture" (1951), a critical analysis of the economic policies of the Truman Administration. (Book Jacket)

A check of Bufiles reflects a "Security of Government Employees" investigation (140-5979) re one Jules Abel, aka. Jules Abels, Julius Abels, Acolph Jerome Abelsky, Director, Office of Economic Advisor, Small Business Administration, Washington, D. C. Abels was born June 19, 1913, at Taunton, Massachusetts, and is single. He received a B.A. degree from the College of the City of New York, 1931-34; Ll.B. degree from Columbia University Law School, 1954-37; and Master of Public Administration, Harvard Graduate School of Public Administration, Cambridge, Mass., 1940-41. Employed as a law clerk in New Jersey, September, 1937-April, 1938; Juntor Attorney, Marketing Laws Survey, Works Progress Administration, Washington, D.C., and New York City, September, 1936-August, 1940; Economic Analyst and Editor, Research Institute of America, New York City, November, 1941-September, 1951; employed preparing campaign material by Republican Congressional Committee, Washington, D. C., October, 1951-January, 1952; Associate Editor, "Newweek" Magazine, New York City, January, 1952-May, 1953; toured Europe studying economic conditions regarding material for his publication, May, 1953-August, 1953; Economist and Economic Advisor, Small Business Administration, Washington, D. C., from October 12, 1953. Nothing of a derogatory nature in file.

A check of Bufiles reflects that the Henry Regnery Company was the publisher of a book written by Prince Louis Ferdinand Fon Hohenzollern, who was investigated under the Registration Act in 1953. Ho information of a subversive or derogatory nature regarding the Company was disclosed (97-3115).

*Investigation conducted re Abels as result of information from another Government agency reflecting allegations that his sister-in-law was sympathetic to the Communist Farty and had allegedly made statements concerning Communism in the presence of Abels, a Government employee.

THE SUCK

The book, "The Truman Scandals," is, as the title suggests, an attack on the Truman administration, and deals specifically with activities involving the RFC, FMA, and various tax cases. The book contains a brief summary of former President Truman(s entrance into politics and his tie-up with the Pendergasts. The author compares the scandals of the Truman administration with those of the Grant and Harding administrations, and states that all previous cases of corruption, serious as they were, are very small compared with the corruption which took place in the administration of Harry S. Truman. "Never had there been so much corruption practiced by so many public officials in so many different places," says the author.

In his "Conclusion," the author states that (1) the corruption (in the Truman administration) was of far greater danger to the nation than in any previous cases since it invaded almost every department of the government, not only in Washington, but all over the country; (2) the scandols of the Truman administration were epidemic, the cases in the Truman era being a continuous band covering many agencies and localities; (3) the fraudo were not only epidemic, but they were a disease endemic to the Truman administration, and was a necessary and natural conscovence of a philosophy of government which was in essence political; (4) the administration, far from taking effective action to wipe out corruption, was in some cases protecting the wrongdoers, in other cases was indifferent and in other cases the machinery of the administration was used to block and theart the investigators of corruption. He concludes by saying that a graver indictment may yet emerge against the Truman administration following the trials of T. Lamar Caudle and Matthew J. Connelly.

Elventaces To Tal Fal:

There are numerous references to the FBI and/or the Director taronghout the book. They are set out in detail below:

Page 13 - James P. McGranery, having been appointed by the President to replace Attorney General J. Howard McGrath, stated he would not use the questionnaire method of investigation proposed by Newbold Morris, "but would use the FBI to root out corruption." The author adds, "The FBI by law could not investigate Treasury personnel."

(The April 4-10, 1952, Facts on File reflects McGranery made statement "he would look around and, if he saw any corruption, would 'straighten it out' with FSI aid...")

Memorandus for Mr. Alchols

June 22, 1956

Page 25 - Concerns the Kansas City primary elections of 1948, and refers to activity of kansas City Star in collecting affidavids to substantiate cry of fraud. Author states, "In October the general clamor forced Attorney General Clark to permit an investigation of the vote by the FBI."

(Aymeno 10/11/45, following a study of material submitted by the Kansas City Star, the Attorney General requested the FBI to make a preliminary investigation. 56-639-5)

rage 28 - "The assistant Attorney General in charge of the criminal aivision, Theron Lamar Caudle, gave instructions to the FBI. It was not until June 1947 that it was disclosed that Caudle had authorized the FBI to make only a 'preliminary investigation' and had instructed the FBI to interview only two reporters from the Kansas City star and four election inspectors. As former Attorney General Biddle testified before the Chalf committee this was unprecedented and 'improper' since even a 'preliminary investigation' of civil rights cases was by practice unrestricted. Cauale's office drafted the instructions three times before submitting the mean to Attorney General Clark who approved it and transmitted it to J. Edgar hoguer."

(the AC's memo of 10/11/46 specified the information which should be determined and requested that 4 members, Board of ElectionsConmissioners, Jackson County Courthouse, be interviewed; also two reporters who had written articles and such other Mar employees as participated in Star investigation. 56-699-6)

"The FBI in submitting a 245-page report stated that 'Ita contents do not constitute the results of an investigation but pursuant to the specific instructions of the Attorney General are merely a summary of the data developed by the Kansas City Stor and the Election Board.' The memorandum stressed tals point 'to prevent the possibility of our reports being cited as a result of investigation proving that further investigation or prosecution is not justified.'"

(Inder cover of memorandum dated 10/25/46, the Attorney General was firnished a 355-page report reflecting the results of the investigation requested by the Bepartment. At the conclusion of the memb, the following statement was made: "You will note that only the specific investigation requested in your memorandum has been conducted and I shall appreciate your advising me as soon as possible whether any further investigation is desired. Bufile #56-639-7; 12)

Memorandum for Ar. . ichols

June 22, 1956

Pages 26-27 - "U. S. Attorney Sam Wear prepared a twentythree page synopsis of the report. He submitted it to three federal
judges in Kissouri, who rightly concluded that there was no basis for
a grand jury investigation. These judges testified that they assumed
the investigation would continue; they were not informed of the limitations in the FBI report; they were not asked as to an opinion of an
additional investigation and they said that on the basis of the full
FBI report, their opinion would have been different. Hear informed
the Justice Department in Mashington of the opinion of the judges based
upon this synopsis. On January 6, 1947, assistant Attorney General Caudle
stated that the investigation was closed. The department said, 'The
investigation in the case was thorough.' In 1952, testifying before
the Chelf Committee, Caudle admitted frankly that the investigation by
the FBI had been a highly restricted one."

(Judges testified they had seen only U.S. Attorney Year's synopsis of the FBI report and did not know at the time that it was based on the Kaneas City Star reporters' investigation. 56-639-129x21. Symemo dated 1/6/47 former dast. Attorney General Caudle advised the Eureau that our investigation was thorough and the Criminal Division had concluded that "there is no certain basis for prosecition of anyone for election fraud conspiracies." Hr. Caudle advised that he was closing his file and no further investigation was desired. 56-639-15

"Senator Kem of Lissouri started asking questions. Attorney Ceneral Clark told Kem, The FBI at my instance conducted a full investigation as to the charges of fraud in the primary--no evidence of a Federal violation was established."...

(Fay 21, 1947, issue, Fashington Times Herald, reflects Senator Ken made public a letter from Clark dated 2/10/47 in which the Attorney General told Ken"a careful and thorough review" by the FBI disclosed "no evidence of a Federal violation" in the primary. 56-639-32x)

June 22, 1956

Page 51 - Concerns activities of General Faughan. States "General Youghan appears as the spensor of one Franklin Lamb, who was hired without an FBI check as an assistant to Charles Wilson, head of the Kar Mobilization Board." Indicates Lamb was tied up with known criminals.

(lamb car employed by Office of Defense Mobilization from Cepterber 4, 1951, to October 24, 1951. On October 3, 1951, an ASAA investigation was ordered on Lamb on request of A.C in view of Lamb's appointment to the Office of Defense Yehilization and in view of te feet that Lamb coula have access to restricted Atomic Energy information. 116-27736:-10)

Page 107 - "In December, 1951, the FBI investigated emberalements from the Thomasville bank in Alabama, and arrested Stutts; according to J. Edgar Hoover \$300,000 of the RFC loan was used to cover up illegal loans which were made to Stutts."

(The December 7-13, 1951, Facts on File reflects "The FBI said #200,000 of the RFC loan had been used to reduce some of the lumber company's \$700,000 in illegal credit extensions from the bank.")

Tage 149 - Concerne Caudle's involvement in Tettelbaum case.
"It never occurred to Caudle as one of the chief law enforcement officers of the country to report the fix to the Attorney General or the FBI."

(Author's remark.)

Page 181 - Concerning Theron Lamar Caudle.

"In 1945, when Clark succeeded Biddle as Attorney General, he was responsible for Caudle's appointment to head the criminal division. An FSI report was submitted on Caudle to Clark, in which Caudle admitted he was 'indiscreet' and said that 'somebody kept putting presents in his automobile' while it was in a parking lot."

(nothing readore in memo to AI concerning Caudle dated 6/27/45. In telephone conversation with SAC Scheidt, Guarlotte, 7/17/45, Caudle said he had been a "sucker" in connection with Beaty matter. Bufile #62-23824-22;26)

"Clark reviewed the report.... In a conference in the Justice bepartment with two FEI agents from Charlotte, he (Clark) asked, 'Will he embarrass ms, does he know his way around?' Caudle passed the tests and so the appointment went through."

Theith Y. Beaty was a wealthy Charlotte, N. C., businessman, a friend of Caudle's, who was mixed up in - 6 - various racketsering activities.

(Two Agents did talk with Clark concerning Caudle. The above question attribated to Clark was erroneous, however. Clark asked if Caudle were a good publicarelations man and if he had the ability to say "no". 62-95844-21)

Page 168 - Concerning Caudle's involvement in case of Norman I. Willer, Petroit, Michigan. States: "J. Edgar Hoover sent several memorando to Caudle protecting the delay, referring to the shady maneuvers of Miller and pointing out the unfavorable publicity."

(Aurean sent two memoranda to caudle re above; memo 3/23/47 pointed out numerous attempts of Miller and his attorneys to prevent case reaching logical conclusion; memo 5/16/47, in reply to Caugle's memo 4/24/47, pointed out civil suit for recovery might be instituted if criminal prosecution should be unsuccessful. Bufile 946-2169-156; 162; 195)

Fare 168 - "An FRI complaint on Coudle before he came to Eashirgton was in part connected with an association with a friend, Yeith Boaty, and lack of proper prosecuting real growing out of that friendship in the case of law violations."

A momorandum from the Director the Attorney General dated 6/27/45 set out certain allegations concerning Coudle which come to light during the investigation of another case in the district where Caudle was U.S. Stroney. Sufula 132-33634-33; he applicant-type investigation concerning T. Samur Caudle at the time of his appointment as assistant Atverney General in charge of the Orinanal Livision in July, 1945. 162-95844-37)

Page 175 - Converne testimony of Charles Oliphant, former chief councel, Eureum of Internal Revenue, re Renry E. Grunewald before hear subcommittee. "As soon as Oliphant mentioned Grunewald in the Teitelbaum case, Grunewald got into a hospital bed and thereafter was an elusive object. He refused to testify on the ground of illness. Then then he disappeared the FBI had to be turned out to uncover him and found him on a farm in Tirginia." (62-92645-151)

June 22, 1956

Fage 176 - Concerns Kenry W. Grunewald. "By his own account, he could get J. Edgar Hoover on the phone to discuss a personal problem."

(Bufile #65-6165-149 reflects conversation with John E. Tobin, General Counsel, Kean Committee, 4/27/53, in which you told Tobin Director was not intimate with Grunewald, and Director did not appreciate manner in which Grunewald had thrown the Director's name around.)

"After a term in the Navy, when he acquired the nickname of The Lutchman, he was an FBI agent and investigator for the alcohol tax unit."

(Crunewald was never an investigator for Mr. Hoover. Grune-wald was employed in old Bureau of Investigation, September, 1917, and resigned March 15, 1919. \$62-21343-11)

Fage 229 - Concerns case involving Archer Zamloch, a lawyer who had been indicted for bribing a witness in a narcotics case. Author states: "The Federal authorities gave the grand jury no co-operation. It could get no pronscript of its hearings, no information from Internal Revenue, and despite repeated pleas to Mashington, no help from the FBI."

(Policy of 201 not to investigate case where other agency has conducted investigation. Narcotics Division of Treasury Department had already conducted an extensive investigation into the entire Zamloch case and, therefore, was in better position to be of assistance. #72-496-20)

Page 230 - "An FBI investigation of the Zamloch matter, which was started in April, was concluded in May, but on May 28, Attorney General McGrath personally respend the investigation on charges that O'Gara and two others had intimidated a witness."

(On April 3, 1951, at the insistence of the Department, the Eureau initiated investigation into an allegation that Louise Ealler, a Government witness in the Zamloch case, had received death threats. Upon interview, Raller admitted lying; this information was furnished Department and bymene 5/24/51 Deputy Attorney General Peyton Ford requested Bureau to conduct an investigation into allegations against Assistant United States Attorneys Charles O'Gara and Joseph Karesh of San Francisco.

June 22, 1956

Page 231 - "On October 24, "Gara was interviewed by two FBI agents and on Accomber 8 the third ranking officer of the FBI told him that there were 28 separate charges ledged against him."

(The intersion of Para on October 24 lasted eight minutes and he regused to occurate with the FBI Agents. On 12/6/51 we was interviewed by Inspector H. H. Clegg at which time various items and allegations against him were discussed with his orally. O'Gara made copious notes at that time which any arently account for the "20 allegations" which were ablicized thereafter. Bufiles 172-559-21 & 162-95976-51)

"In Lovember, Declar was quiezed for three hours by FSI Agerts."

(Narch of Siles joiled to reflect any evidence of an interview of Foolan in November; however, Foolan, a feputy collector of internal Revenue, San Francisco, was into memora detaber 24, 1961, at which time he had a lengthy statement. [72-883-21]

Lage 136 - "his vice-chairman of Tele-King, Franklin Lamb, was given a job on refense robilizer wilson's staff without an FAJ check, on recovernation of General Voughan."



Page 294 - Concerns administration of the 605 program (the insurance of loans under Section 606 of the National Housing Act) which was discontinued in March, 1950. "Ar. Powell had a very interesting background of which the FII apprized the Civil Service Countssion both in 1941 and 1943."

(Sufile 400-0242-40 reflects Givil Service Commission unuals to locate any application forms or any information dealing with arrest record which the Identification Division indicated was furnished them in 1941 and 1946 in name of Clyde L. Powell, Assistant Commissioner of Fiss.)

Tage 300 - Johlerho FTA soundals. Author indicates these "grabs" could not have occur ed without the connivance of many FMA officials besides Clyde L. Powell. Author points out that "Over a period of two years, 133 cases were turned over by the FBI to FHA for investigation, of which only 3 were investigated by FMA."

(Sufile SE-35641-Sub A reflects that an article by sacitagion political reporter Faul F. Healy entitled "The Trath About the nousing Scandals" appeared in the Seturday Ivenia: Jost, February 26, 1955, in which it is scubed "...in the period 1949-52, FMA had ectally investigated only nine rat of 169 reports of Ittle I criminal violations forwarded by the Phi:... On receipt of the information from the St. Louis Office to the effect that Clara Perkins, cochairman of the St. Louis Committee to Secure Justice for Sobell, had stated that this organization was planning to have a contact made with former President Truman, possibly through Judge O'Brien of Detroit or another individual named Harper who are allegedly close friends of Truman, with a view of talking Truman into reading the John Wexley book and thereafter make a public announcement which could be used by Sobell and his group, I wish to advise that I called Bill Hillman and advised him in confidence that we had been tipped off from a reliable source that the Committee to Free Sobell was going to have an approach made to his friend in Independence with a view of getting his friend to read the Wexley book on the Rosenbergs and then issue a statement which could be used by the Free Sobell Committee. I told Bill that in Party circles where the discussion had taken place it had been suggested that a Judge O'Brien, who was a reported friend of the former President, was to be approached to approach his friend and that the Director felt that his friend ought to be tipped off.

Bill called me late Friday evening and stated that he had just talked to Mr. Truman who was most grateful and appreciative and asked Bill to relay back to us how warmly he appreciated the gesture and to express his deep appreciation to the Director for passing the word to him and that Bill should tell the Director not to worry that if anybody approached him on the Rosenberg or Sobell matter he wouldn't even listen to them but will "kick their out of the office." He further stated that he knows of Judge O'Brien in Detroit, O'Brien is no friend of his and there is another Judge by the name of Harper who is "a political hat" who is not a friend of his; that these people better not approach him because if they did they would "get thrown out on their ear." He stated he would not be a bit surprised, however, if they did try some stunt like this since "old Eleanor" has been trying to hoodwink him into an Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) conference and in fact had called him just a few days previously and asked him to address an ADA group. He, of course, was polite to her but he told Bill that he could not understand some of the things that Eleanor did such as fronting for the commies and that as long as he lives he will never address another "ADA meeting."

Bill stated that the old gentleman was most grateful and at least on three occasions said to tell Edgar how warmly he appreciated his thinking of him. Bill then told me in the strictest of confidence that the former President is getting ready to go on a trip through Europe and has made a deal with the Hearst press whereby he will report what he sees in Europe but will not write about politics on his trip. He specifically stated that regardless of how keenly he felt about how foreign affairs are being handle he would not do anything which would embarrass a present President in handling these things.

With regard to the Wexley book, I also told Bill that it was predicated upon the premise that the Rosenberg and Sobell cases grew out of a frameup and a frantic effort on the part of the Truman Administration to disprove the charge of being soft on Reds and to do this it claimed the Russians had stolen the atomic bomb.

THE HOME GUARD

It is a special privilege to be present at the graduation of you guardians of the home front. It would be more than tragic if, while fighting a world-wide war to preserve our democratic ideals, we would neglect the constant battle against evil forces at home.

Fortunately, the specialized training provided here at the National Police Academy, under the supervision of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, assures America that we will continue to have well-equipped specialists to maintain peace and order within our borders.

Please permit me to pay special tribute to the man, who in addition to founding the National Police Academy, has played such an important part in improving law enforcement throughout the United States. I refer to your distinguished leader, the moving spirit behind the Federal Bureau of Investigation, my good friend, the Honorable J. Edgar Hoover.

You men have been especially fortunate in being selected for intensive training at the greatest crime clinic in the world. Here you have learned the wenders of modern scientific methods. You have acquired skill in using the latest weapons available. Even more important, here you have been taught the all-sential need of quick ecoperation with all law enforcement agencies, local, county, state and federal. If we hope to make sound progress for the benefit of all society, we must carry on a well-coordinated, all-out attack on crime.

You officers have had the opportunity to study the most modern methods of crime prevention and crime detection. Your intense training here at this most efficient center, should pay you and society great dividends in the years to come. You learned not merely the use of scientific methods in combating the enemies of society, but also the urgent need of effective cooperation with all the other useful agencies. Only by a nation-wide, coordinated campaign by all law-enforcement agents can we achieve the highest degree of efficiency, which in itself will be one of the most effective means of preventing anti-social acts. ** Cortainty of criminal apprehension is the most powerful check on crime.

Tramendous progress has been made in criminology during the last century. In the past the criminal was punished in a spirit of revenge, without proper consideration of the many factors which gave rise to this problem of social maladjustment. Criminals are not born such. They are usually the unfortunate product of their environment, experience and social background.

In view of the many economic and health factors, which frequently give rise to criminal tendencies, there remains a tremendous job for society to accomplish. Our statesmen must eliminate most of the outstanding inequities in our social structure, providing greater individual security, improved health, and a better economic opportunity for all our people. Then a most important step will be taken in removing some of the main reasons for crime.

The war has greatly complicated the problems of law-enforcement agencies. In the first place, there remains the constant danger of saboteurs, spies and enemy agents, all anxious to undermine our military power and the public morals. Fortunately, the splendid work of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, under the able direction of Mr. Hoover, has made these enemy efforts of little value. However, constant vigilance is still necessary for the preservation of life and property at home.

Another factor, which hit agencies charged with the maintenance of law and order, has been the call to arms of many of our most active officers. Yet despite all handicans, utilization of modern scientific methods has made possible the record achieved. As in all matters mortal, there still remains room for improvement.

The most distressing aspect of the current criminal record in America is the alarming increase in juvenile delinquency. Youngsters, still in their teen age, constitute one of the major groups of our criminal offenders. For the average layman, it is difficult to realize that the most frequent arrests in any male age group is seventeen, eighteen and nineteen years, respectively.

In a review of the 1941 figures, it is especially shocking to learn that, in a democracy where the voting privilege is denied until the age of twenty-one, our youth under twenty-one years committed 35 percent of all robteries, 52 percent of burglary, 35 percent of larceny and 63 percent of auto thefts. Of 110,000 crimes committed against property, fully 40 percent of the offenders were less than twenty-one years old! What a sad commentary upon the training of the youth of America!

As officers charged with the duty to protect society from crime, you have a most serious responsibility. You will require the active cooperation of all law-abiding citizens. For the most effective discharge of your duty, you need the help of every social agency created to improve living conditions in your community.

It is far better and cheaper to prevent crime than to pursue the criminal, and, after detention, try to rehabilitate him. For example, to direct the excess energy of youth to the gymnasium of a Boys' Club may prevent his joining a juvenile gang.

The future of America depends upon the character and quality of our youth. The primary problem is one of home-training, general education and character-building. However, as leaders in the cause of a progressive order, you should actively promote and help coordinate all welfare and social agencies which can be utilized to ease your burden.

Fresent social conditions naturally reflect the great dislocations caused by the war. Mothers with patriotic purposes work in war plants, while their neglected children become social problems. The strong guidance of fathers in service is missing in many homes. Children, who should be in school, are working long hours and, though helping the war effort, sometimes associate with the wrong kind of people. Many spend their salaries seeking release from wartime emotions.

Americans dare not wait until juvenile delinquency becomes more critical before combating the causes. We must act now to protect the welfare and future of our youth.

The total number of selected law enforcement officers from every state of the Union, as well as leading foreign police agencies, who have graduated from the National Police Academy, now total 1,047 men. These officials all know the methods taught here. They are all disciples of modern crime detection. These officers can and will be of great assistance in the fight for a decent social order.

Real beace and order cannot be obtained by vast armies of policemen merely trying to use force and arms to crush crime by old-fashioned methods. Today, more than ever before, we need quality, not just quantity, in our law-unforcing agencies. Small, but efficient groups, operating carefully and intelligently, can accomplish far more than a large untrained force. You are being sent forth to assist your community by applying the latest scientific methods placed at your disposal by this specialized training. You will guide others to appreciate the great benefits of modern techniques and efficient nation-wide cooperation in cambating crime.

Today millions of our joung men are fighting throughout the world for the preservation of democratic decency. It would be tragic indeed if they came back to find that the home-front had fallen down on the job. Our veterans have the right to expect us to safeguard their homes and their relatives, despite all wartime difficulties.

In this sacred trust, the home guard will not fail.

At home here we still have a tremendous task ahead of us. The dislocation of families by war work in distant plants, the growing threat of juvenile delinquency, and the psychological reactions of individuals exposed to the emotional hardships of war, all present problems of the first magnitude. If we intend to insure the proper social climate which wall permit orderly progress in keeping with our ideals, all of us must face these new problems frankly and act effectively. The modern law-enforcement official needs far more than a night stick and a gun to maintain peace and order. The efficient officer must know the nature and extent of local social problems. He must use scientific tests, as well as psychology. As a progressive leader he should effectively mobilize all available agencies in his locality, and throughout the country, for the prevention, as well as the detection of crime. This is a large order, but the times call for men of large stature.

As bigger social problems are presented, America needs better trained men to solve them. You are indeed fortunate in having the opportunity of association with the best and receiving the finest training available in your specialized profession. By your conduct and character you can make your profession one of the most progressive and useful in our national life.

In a few months the National Police Academy will celebrate its tenth ammiversary. During this decade tremendous things have been accomplished by its craduates. If we had time it could be shown how much money society was saved by the special training of these graduates. We could list also the arrests made, convictions obtained and pardons recommended by these officers.

No set of statistics, however, can adequately convey the heartache av reed, nor the deep-felt gratitude for crimes prevented, for lives saved, for missing people recovered, and for the countless worthy services rendered. Even the most comprehensive reporting system cannot reveal these things. For all such essential services, society is indeed grateful to the law enforcement officers, especially to the graduates of this splendid Academy.

Our fighting men on all fronts are today going through a most strenuous crical. They are bravely offering their lives so that we may live our democratic way. The heroes on the battle-front surely deserve all praise and credit for their noble fight.

The general public, unfortunately, does not fully appreciate the fact that right here at home other heroes are waging a relentless war against another deadly foe -- the modern criminal. This public enemy is resourceful, crafty and efficient. Fis attacks are frequently powerful and against the weak. Your bitter conflict against crime is endless.

To check the constant ravages of crime requires character of the highest order. As well expressed in the motto of the National Police Academy, to win your war you need "Knowledge, Courage, Integrity", The omission of any one part of this trinity of virtues makes the other two practically useless. Like the three-legged stool, it simply cannot stand on two.



Sometime ago the Bureau conducted an investigation of who was being considered by the Department for appointment as a Deputy Marshal, stenographer, in the Western District of Missouri. The investigation disclosed that the applicant had been suspected of having stolen money on three different occasions, another reference declined to recommend the applicant for any position in which she might handle funds, and the investigation disclosed that an audit made in 1939 of funds administered by the applicant in the Kansas City War Department disclosed a shortage attributable to her of more than \$1,400.00. Her credit rating is unsatisfactory and a family physician advised that the applicant was a kleptomeniae.

In addition to submitting the reports to the Department on this applicant, I did, as my custom, call Gus Vanech to my office and pointed out this information to him. Mr. Vanech advised me a day or so ago that this applicant was sponsored by Senator Truman and the fact that the applicant was a kleptomaniae, had stolen the \$1,400.00, etc. was brought to Senator Truman's attention. Despite these facts and the expressed reluctance of the Department to appoint the applicant, Truman insisted that the appointment be made and it is accordingly being made at his insistence.

A conv of a news story prepared by Ruth Montgomery of the Mashineton staff of the New York Daily News, which was not published for fear of libel, was given to Assistant Director Michels by a confidential source who felt it should be in our files. This story alleges that in 1944 several weslthy Missouri citizens chipped in when friends of Truman passed the hat to collect money for "a wardrobe and living expenses" for the "broke" Vice Presidential candidate. This was allegedly in addition to the Truman campaign fund raised by Tom I. Evana, Kansas City radio executive and long-time crony of President Truman. Evans in an accounting of the campaign fund declared that a total of \$7,403.47 was paid directly to Truman from the fund of \$33,390. Evans claimed the money was intended to reimburse Truman for "out of packet expenses." Several other prominent Missourians, however, allegedly stated Evans also passed the hat for more direct aid to Truman.

This article also alleges that Truman, immediately after his insururation, was able to pay \$18,000 in cash to reacquire the Truman homestead at Grandview, Missouri. It was alleged a loan of \$35,000 on this property had been foreclosed four years previously for nonpayment of taxes and interest. The property was reported to be now very valuable as a result of the construction of an airport and the construction of an Air Force Command Base in the vicinity of the property. It was also reported that on August 29, 1040, Evans, mentioned above, became Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Crown Drug Company and that two months thereafter, this come any applied for a \$500,000 loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation after several insurance

companies and banks had refused to lend this company money. It was reported that in January, 1950, the loan was authorized for \$350,000 and that on January 15, 1950, the Reconstruction binance Corporation Board of Directors reversed its own action and granted the full loan in the amount of \$500,000. It was also reserted that among the contributors was Paul Dillon, the St. Louis lawyer who pained prominence as the representative of former Capone mob members when they applied for parole.

Washington, P.C., Oct. 22--- Several wealthy Eissouri citizens today revealed that in 1964 they sympathetically chipped in when friends of Harry S. Truman passed the hat to collect money for "a wardrobe and living expenses" for the "broke" vice presidential candidate.

Immediately after his inauguration, it was learned, Truman was able to pay \$18,000 cash to reacquire the Truman homestead at Grandview, Missouri, which had been foreclosed by the county four years previously for non-payment of taxes and interest on a \$35,000 loan.

This private fund, the Missourians emphasized, was in addition to the Truman campaign fund of \$33,390 which was raised by Tom L. Evans, Konsas City radio executive and long-time crony of the president's.

Evans, in a recent accounting of the campaign fund, declared that a total of \$7,403.47 was paid directly to Harry S. Truman from the \$33,390. Evans claims the money was intended to reimburse the candidate for "out-of pocket expenses."

However, several other prominent Missourians told that Evans else passed the het for more direct sid to Truman.

Isaac and M. H. Kate, brother-owners of the huge Kate drug store chain in Kansas City told this reporter that after Truman was nominated vice president in 1944, Evans told them he "wanted \$500 to buy Truman a decent suit of clothes."

M. H. Katz said he contributed \$100 to this special fund. He said he'd been told by "some of the boys that I also gave \$500 to a fund, but I can't find the record of that."

Isaac and M. M. Kats both complained that "Tom Evans was always passing the hat for Truman for something or other, and we always gave a few hundred here or a couple of hundred there."

lease says he has a co-celled check made out to Trumen from his first senatorial race in 193h and has been "kicking in to the Pendergest Democratic club ever since because it's good business."

L. E. Whicher, a New York broker with offices at 25 Broad Street, said that in August of 1948, A. H. Rosenberg of St. Louis, then president of the Universal Match Company, told him during a conference at the waldorf-Astoria that "he and several of Truman's friends in St. Louis and Mansas City subscribed to a fund to provide a fitting wardrobe for the candidate and for such other persons as may be necessary."

Whicher said Rosenberg told him he did not know the size of the fund raised but that it was "to buy clothes and pay expenses of Truman."
Whicher added; "Wr. Rosenberg is an honorable business man and I am confident he will corroborate my statement."

Rosenberg, now retired and reached by telephone in New York, admitted that he had told whicher this. He now claims, however, that he was "just kidding." He said he gave Tom Evans #{1,000 for the campaign func but "that's all I'll tell you now." He treatened to sue if his name is mentioned.

Evans E. Flummer, associate editor of the Pacific Coast Record, a trade paper located at 412 West Sixth Street, Los Angeles, told The News of still another alleged fund.

*The week of August 29, 1944, I was in Kansas City, No. helping Farney Goodman, the hotel magnate who passed away this year, to promote and open the then new *El Casbah* room at his Belle River Hotel.*

"We spent many hours together and during our conversations, the subject of Harry Truman came up. Goodman said, We think Senator Truman is a square-shooter and to help him keep straight, a dozen of the prominent citizens of Kansas City, including myself, have made up a purse of \$12,000

wealthy man and it costs more than a senator's salary to live in Washington today."

Beacon Realty Company, a partnership enterprise of Goodman's is also listed as a \$1,000 contributor to the campaign fund which Evans raised. Evans emphatically denies having ever passed the hat for other Truman funds.

Evans: own name curiously does not appear in the list of contributors to the campaign fund he solicited, although he is reportedly a millionaire and one of Truman's closest friends. Evans is a frequent visitor of Truman's in Washington and has accompained the President on numerous trips in the planes, the old "Sacred Cow" and the newer "Independence."

Among the contributors to the Evans-raised fund for Truman's campaign were paul Dillon, St. Louis lawyer given prominence by a House committee for his representation of four former Al Capone gang members in their successful application for pareles from federal prison, and James Carroll, St. Louis, is betting commissioner who get into trouble with the federal tex authorities on winnings he paid off.

One \$5,000 gift from Herman S. and Julius C. Shapiro, Kansas City real estate operators, mysteriously returned to them after President Roosevelt died and Truman became president. A total of \$7,500 of the money was turned over gradually to the Democratic Estimal Committee during the next four years after Truman moved to the White House.

Evens, at the time he collected funds for Truman, was president of the Crown Drug Company, Kansas City drug chains. He was also president of Radio Station KCHO in that city.

At that time KCMO was a weak station of only 10,000 kilowattage. In Jan. 16, 1946, Truman's Federal Communications Commission granted a much coveted daytime increase of power to 50,000 watts.

Evans! drug firm also prospered.

On Aug. 29, 1949, Frans became chairman of the board of directors of the Crown Brug Company.

Two months later, the Grown Drug Company applied for a \$500,000 loan from the Reconstruction Finance Company after several insurance companies and banks had refused to lend the money. The first week of January 1950---in almost record time even for that patronage-ridden agency---a loan was authorized for \$350,000.

However, this lesser amount did not suit the drug company and a few days later, on Jan. 15, 1950, the RFC board of directors reversed its own action and came through with the entire \$500,000.

After a series of scandals had prompted a congressional investigation of the RFC, Truman was forced to reorganize it under one director—
Stuart Symington—investigators discovered that the two RFC diaries kept
by two of the RFC directors—Walter L. Dunham and William Willett—on this
case, which would have shown what influence was brought to bear for Crown
Drug Company had apparently disappeared from the files.

President Truman's finances during these years are also interesting in light of the contributions allegedly made to a "broke" candidate for the vice-presidency.

Shortly after he was sworn in as vice-president, but before he became President, Truman sent an \$18,000 bank draft to Kansas City to buy back the old Truman homestead which had been foreclosed.

On March 31, 1938, after the Truman family had failed in an attempt to borrow more than \$17,500 from the capital school funds.

The law required that to insure such a loan, two sureties "unencumbered for twice the value of the loan" had to endorse it.

In this peculiar instance, however, Vivian Truman, the future president's brother, and fred Canfil, a Truman crony, were allowed to act as sureties although neither man had any known funds to back up their surety.

Canfil was then superintendent of the county courthouse from which the records of these financial statements have subsequently disappeared. Truman later had his old friend appointed U. S. Karshal.

In 1939 and 1940 the stench in Jackson county had become so odorous that a citizens clean-up committee was organized to sweep out the mass. J. W. Perry, a wealthy and highly respected citizen of Kansascity headed this committee and as a result of that work, 142 indictments were returned and the resignation of Mayor Bryce Smith, a Truman crony was forced by Perry.

Ferry, during his investigation, discovered that not one cent of interest had been paid by the Trumans on their \$35,000 lean, taken in the mame of their mother, Mrs. Martha Truman. Further, no taxes had been paid. He therefore recommended that the property be foreclosed and on July 20, 1940 this was done.

Harry S. Trumen, then a senator, permitted his mother to be dispossessed of her homesteed. The county took over operation of the 292 acre farm, but, after Trumen was nominated vice-president, he made approaches to reacquire part of it. On Feb. 17, 1945, the county accepted sealed bids and the highest bidder was the Charles F. Curry real estate firm.

The 92-agre section of the farm containing the homestead and out-buildings was transferred briefly from Curry to Vivian Truman and then deeded to Harry S. Truman. The remaining 200 agres were listed first in the name of Curry, then Ellen G. Huston, a straw woman in the Curry firm, and then to Rose Conway---president Truman's long-time personal secretary. On July 26, 1949, Miss Conway deeded the property to Truman.

The Kansas City attorney for Vivien Truman told this reporter that in the early spring of 1945, after Truman became vice-president and shortly after the nat had allegedly been passed to buy him clothes, etc., Vivian showed him a bank draft from Harry S. Truman for approximately. \$18,000 with which to buy part of the farm.

Asked about this, Vivian told the News: "It's Herry's own business where he got the money."

Curry, in an interview with this reporter, said he had made a private secret agreement in advance to let Harry S. Truman acquire the 92 scres and buildings for \$20,000 after he bought in the whole property. He said his accessful bid was \$43,000.

He admitted that he used the name of a straw woman, Ellen G. Huston, to register the deed and that Harry Truman's name did not appear for sometime on the public records.

Curry said that he, Tom Evens and R. Kemper Carter (now deceased) put up the money for the transaction and that he owned three-fifths and Ivans and Carter each one-fifth of the syndicate deal.

According to Curry's records, he declared, Trumen bought the remaining 200 sores from them for exactly the amount they had paid--without
interest---on May 6, 1946. However, the public records now that the
property remained in the name of Trumen's secretary until

Shortly after Trussen bought the property, the city of Grandview began buying up land in that vicinity for a big airport to augment the Kansas City field. Then President Trusse's land was further enhanced by the selection of this area to construct a vast airforce command base there.

The government brought water, sewage etc. to the area Vivien Truman has told friends that "Harry's land is now worth \$1,000 an acre". This is the 200 acres for which Curry says Truman paid him \$111 an acre.

Evens, told of Curry's report on their joint finances, said he "corldn't remember ever having a business deal with Curry and Carter in my life."

SECOND EDITION OF EX-PRESIDENT TRUMAN'S MEMOIRS

On January 13, 1955, Admiral Strauss, Chairman, Atomic Energy Commission, made the following comments to Liaison Agent Bates. Strauss has been advised that the second edition of ex-President Truman's memoirs will shortly be released and in them he makes several references to General MacArthur. MacArthur received a copy of the material pertaining to him and found some very glaring inaccuracies. MacArthur was elated that he had "caught" Truman in a deliberate falsehood and has written a reply which will be published. According to Strauss, MacArthur commented, "At last I have Truman where I want him."

Strauss also commented that the Truman memoirs also gave credit to former AEC Chairman Gordon Dean for the development of the hydrogen bomb. Strauss stated this, of course, was not true, that he himself had been responsible and that this had been proven by previously released comments. Strauss stated, however, he intended to make no reply.

On 9/21/71, former President Johnson personally appeared at the Johnson City Bank and executed an affidavit certifying that the signature on the forged check was a forgery. We are currently conducting extensive investigation (office of origin - New Haven) into the negotiation of a 6/4/71, check also in the amount of \$735 and also payable to Charles Herndon which contains the forged signature of former President Harry S. Truman. The New Haven case has uncovered extensive check passing activities by the unknown subject, using the name Charles Herndon (

We are instructing interested offices to intensify and coordinate these investigations. U. S. Secret Service has been advised of the New Haven case and is being advised of the San Antonio case.



Similar checks were cashed in Canada, dates and places not known. During March, 1971, unknown subject, as CHARLES HERNDON cashed two checks in Boston, Massachusetts on the accounts banks in Palm Beach, Florida and Newport, Rhode Island.

During June, 1971, unknown subject opened an account at City Trust Company, Bridgeport, Connecticut using the name CHARLES HERNDON. Subsequently, he presented a check for collection at that bank in the amount of \$735.00, payable to himself and signed HARRY S. TRUMAN. The check drawn on the National Bank of Washington, had the correct account number of HARRY S. TRUMAN written thereon at the time of presentation. Upon the check clearing the National Bank of Washington, that amount was credited to HERNDON'S account. He then cashed a check for \$700.00 on that account.

Also during June, 1971, unknown subject as CHARLES HERNDON opened an account at the McLachlen National Bank, Washington, D.C. He subsequently sent through for collection a check in the amount of \$735.00 signed LYNDON B. JOHNSON and drawn on the Johnson City Bank, Johnson City, Texas. Upon the check clearing and being deposited to his account, he returned to the Washington Bank and withdrew \$660.00.


Dear Mr. Hoover:

Enclosed herewith is a communication received by Senator Truman from which because of its contents appears to be a matter within your jurisdiction.

Some time agreement was interviewed by a member of the Committee stair and it appears that he is a mental case.

This letter is being referred to you for whatever action you may consider appropriate.





Senator Harry S. Truman United States Senate Washington, D. C.

Sir.

I have previously made attempts to contact members of the Senate Investigating Committee, but apparently to no avail. On October 25, 1943, I visited your office in an effort to influence you in the conception of investigating proceedings with myself as the nucleus. I was passed down the line as usual, first to the counsel for the committee, Hugh Fulton; then to a subordinate interviewer by the name of Sawyer. The outcome was evidently fruitless as was my second attempt, a letter to Senator Homer Ferguson on March 29, 1944.

On this my third attempt, I am not merely appealing to you. I am demanding that I receive a favorable declaration within a reasonable space of time preceding the presidential election, November 7, 1944. If during the subsequent period I receive no affirmation then I will undermine and destroy any aspirations you may now have for the vice presidency.

I am an honorably discharged veteran of World War II. As an ablebodied 1-A draftee, I refused to fight because of the disgraceful and unjustifiable conditions existing in the shipbuilding industry between labor and management.

My maneuvers were conducted in such a manner as to prevent anyone calling me a draft-dodger or a conscientious objector. I believe that my actions were entirely american and backed by good common sense. My main objective is the Philadelphia Navy Yard where I was discharged unjustly, along with so many others. I am attempting to bring about a federal investigation of the Philadelphia Navy Yard because of inefficient management, corruption, and impediments of production.

With three witnesses required for a public investigation, I had hoped to be the principal witness, as a serviceman on strike. These existing conditions are also known to be present in other shippards but no thorough effort has been made to clean up this situation. There is enough deplorable evidence accumulated by the investigating committee along with numerous witnesses to warrant such an investigation that I advocate.

By one bold stroke, the entire shipbuilding industry would be revolutionized as a cautionary or threatening measure to labor and management throughout the nation. The most logical shippard to investigate is the largest federal shippard in the country, the Philadelphia Navy Yard.

I believe that an American serviceman on strike because of such conditions is the most forcible and logical rebuttal to the discrepancies of labor and management.

Let me impress upon you, Senator Truman, not to ignore or disregard this letter as the work of some fanatic or crank. An immediate thorough invastigation of my personal case records will corroborate any threats or statements I make.

Unless I receive some encouragement from you or the Senate Investigating Committee, I will definitely launch an unconditionally treacherous, revengeful and ruthless wave of d estruction. I will strike with such sudden and cold-blooded fury that resounding repercussions will cause the entire political set-up right up to the top totter on its foundation.

Mine is a diabolical scheme remotely nutured and instigated by the inefficiency and incompetence I have encountered through a series of miraculous escapades.

I presume that for fear of mingling into political and lobbyistic affiliations you have filed to uphold the honorable position intrusted you. I accuse you for gross negligence and deliberate failure in the utilization and distribution of manpower in the shipbuilding industry.

This letter is undoubtedly a brazen affair but do not misconstrue it as being rash. I am determined to get or implicate every person responsible for my predicament if it costs me my own life.

It is useless for me to continue any further diplomatic or tactful measures to bring about an investigation that should have taken place a long time ago. By threats may appear absurd but I sincerely urge you to consider them seriously. I'm afraid that our country's political and incompetent forces have created a monster they are now unable to control. When discharged from the United States Army I was unwittingly and unintentionally presented with an abnormal power to speak or kill as I pleased without fear of prosecution. I intend to take full advantage of this.

I must again remind you more strongly that to ignore this letter entirely will result in bloodshed. I must and will have my way. You may definitely be assured that I will kill at least one innocent person and I will main and incapacitate many others on my list. Death is too good for them. I cannot be stopped until it is too late.

In my defeat will drag everything down with me; for even in my failure and frustration, I will find a victory.

Since this date he has endeavored by letters and personal contact with numerous Covernment officials and newspaper writers to have an investigation conducted at the Philadelphia Kavy Yard. was arrested by the Ellitary Police On January 18, 1944, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for illegally wearing a uniform. Rowever, the United States Attorney declined prosecution. The facts regarding the sending of this letter through the mails to Senator Truman have been presented to the United States Attorney but he has not as yet rendered an opinion as to prosecution. I will indeed be glad to commincate with you upon receipt of the decision from the United States Attorney regarding prosecution in this matter. The claim has been established that my disability was undoubtedly acquired, developed and aggravated while in the service of the United States Army.

"I cannot warn you too strongly that I, a diagnosed paranoic case, inevitably and maliciously resorts to suicide or homicide. Unless I receive an immediate favorable notification, I will resort to homicide to convince you to the fullest extent of my service connected disability. I could hardly consider suicide for I cannot continue my fight as a dead person.

some encouragement, I will definitely launch an unconditionally treacherous, revengeful and ruthless wave of destruction. I will strike with such a sudden cold-blooded fury which will cause resounding repercussions to the Veterans Administration and the army psychiatrists responsible for my disability. This is a diabolical scheme remotely nurtured and instigated by the inefficiency and incompetency I have encountered through a series of miraculous escapades.

"My threats may appear to be absurd but I sincerely urge you to consider them seriously. When discharged from the army I was unwittingly and unintentionally presented with an abnormal power to speak or kill as I pleased without fear of prosecution. I intend to take full advantage of this disability.

"I must again remind you even more strongly, that to ignore this letter entirely, will result in bloodshed. You may definitely be assured that I will kill at least one innocent person and I will maim and incapacitate many others on my list. I cannot be stopped until it is too late.

"If the accumulated evidence of my case records are not sufficient to warrant a pension, then I will attempt anything and everything in my power to reinforce my claim and impress you further of my service connected disability. Through the procedure of bloodshed, I will prove that I have been incapacitated to the fullest extent and am demanding a pension almost equal to total disability.

"I have had enough of your indecision, suspense and unsettlement of this situation. If the opportunity to prove my past mental stability is unattainable, then I prefer the priveleges of insanity and I demand the pension that I am justifiably entitled to.

The word minmediate evidently is insignificant, so I now offer you approximately a three week ultimatum expiring on October 21, 1944.

*By contacting my sister, you have converged upon her with low-minded tactics. When my sister signed for my release from the army and accepted full responsibility for me after my discharge, she had no idea that the army had distorted my mind.

"I am giving you fair warning to keep away from my sister. Furthermore, you will please transfer any further correspondence and transaction concerning me to my present address.



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
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

DETAILS:

This investigation is predicated upon a letter dated August 1, 1944, from to the Chairman, U. S. Senats, special Committee Investigating the National Defense Program, addressed to the Director and enclosing a letter written by the subject and addressed to Senator HARRY S. TRUMAN. The letter, copies of which were forwarded to the Philadelphia Field Division, is being retained in the files of the FBI Laboratory. The letter was registered and addressed to Senator HARRY S. TRUMAN, U. S. Senate, Washington, D. C. as of July 29, 1944 and is as follows:

Investigating Committee, but apparently to no avail. On October 25, 1943, I visited your office in an effort to influence you in the conception of investigating proceedings with myself as the nucleus. I was passed down the lines as usual, first to the counsel for the committee, HUGH FULTON; then to a subordinate interviewer by the name of SANYER. The outcome was evidently fruitless as was my second attempt, a letter to Senator HOMER FERGUSON on March 29, 1944.

"On this my third attempt, I am not merely appealing to you. I am demanding that I receive a favorable declaration within a reasonable space of time preceding the presidential election, Bovember 7, 1944. If during the subsequent period I receive no affirmation then I will undermine and destroy any aspirations you may now have for the vice presidency.

"I am an honorably discharged veteran of World War II. As an ablebodied 1-A draftee, I refused to fight because of the disgraceful and unjustifiable conditions existing in the shipbuilding industry between labor and management.

My maneuvers were conducted in such a manner as to prevent anyone calling me a draft-dodger or a conscientious objector. I believe that my actions were entirely American and backed by good common sense. My main objective is the Philadelphia Mavy Yard where I was discharged unjustly, along with so many others. I am attempting to bring about a federal investigation of the Philadelphia Navy Yard because of inefficient management, corruption, and impediments of production.

"With three witnesses required for a public investigation, I had hoped to be the principal witness, as a serviceman on strike. These existing conditions are also known to be present in other shippards but no thorough effort has been made to clean up this situation. There is enough deplorable evidence accumulated by the investigating committee along with numerous witnesses to warrant such an investigation that I advocate.

"By one bold stroke, the entire shipbuilding industry would be revolutionized as a cautionary or threatening measure to labor and management throughout the nation. The most logical shippard to investigate is

the largest federal shippard in the country, the Philadelphia Navy Yard.

"I believe that an American serviceman on strike because of such conditions is the most forcible and logical rebuttal to the discrepancies of labor and management.

"Let me impress upon you, Senator TRUMAN, not to ignore or disregard this letter as the work of some fanatic or orank. An immediate thorough investigation of my personal case records will corroborate any threats or statements I make.

"Unless I receive some encouragement from you or the Senate Investigating Committee, I will definitely launch an unconditionally treacherous, revengeful and ruthless wave of destruction. I will strike with such sudden and cold-blodded fury that resounding repercussions will cause the entire political setup right up to the top totter on its foundation.

"Mine is a diabolical scheme remotely nutured and instigated by the inefficiency and incompetence I have encountered through a series of miraculous escapades.

"I presume that for fear of mingling into political and lobbyistic affiliations you have failed to uphold the honorable position intrusted you. I accuse you for gross negligence and deliberate failure in the utilisation and distribution of manpower in the shipbuilding industry.

"This letter is undoubtedly a brazen affair but do not misconstrue it as being rash. I am determined to get or implicate every person responsible for my predicament if it costs me my own life.

"It is useless for me to continue any further diplomatic or tactful measures to bring about an investigation that should have taken place a long time ago. My threats may appear absurd but I sincerely urge you to consider them seriously. I'm afraid that our country's political and incompetent forces have created a monster they are now unable to control. When discharged from the United States Army I was unwittingly and unintentionally presented with an abnormal power to speak or kill as I pleased without fear of prosecution. I intend to take full advantage of this.

"I must again remind you more strongly that to ignore this letter entirely will result in bloodshed. I must and will have my way. You may definitely be assured that I will kill at least one innocent person. and I will maim and incapacitate many others on my list. Death is too good for them. I cannot be stopped until it is too late.

"In my defeat I will drag everything down with me; for even in my failure and frustration, I will find a victory.

Senator Takes Leading Part In Congressional Effort To Rehabilitate "Iron Horse"

RAPS FINANCIAL ABUSES

Declares Receivership Racket Largely Responsible For Carriers' Difficulties

Outstanding in Senstor Truman's distinguished service as a lawmaker is the important role he played in drafting and putting through Congress legislation to rehabilitate the railroad industry and to enable it to compete on terms of greater equality with other forms of transportation. the result of disclosures during a seasational and far-reaching investigation of railroad finances and restganizations by a subcommittee of the Benate Interstate Commerce Committee, of which Benator Truman is a member.


