All records furnished to national committee representative by Mrs. FELDMAN.

MARLENE CATHERINE FELDMAN, 1706 Swallow Drive, El Cajon, California, was interviewed at the San Diego Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) on July 7, 1975. She read and signed an "Interrogation; Advice of Rights" form. The purpose of the interview was explained to her. She furnished information incorporated into the following statement which she read and signed on July 14, 1975, in the presence of her attorney, WAYNE A. HUGHES, 2150 First Avenue, San Diego, California.

"July 14, 1975

"I, Marlene Catherine Feldman, having read and signed an "Interrogation Advice of Rights" form, make the following voluntary statement to and who have identified themselves to me as Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I am aware that this statement can be used in a court of law.



"I was coordinator of the San Diego Committee for the nomination of Hubert H. Humphrey from about November, 1971, through the time the Democratic Convention was held in July or August, 1972. We had an office in the California Theatre Building, 1122 4th Avenue, San Diego, California. I later went to work for the State Deomocratic Central Committee in San Diego, California, in January, 1973.

"David Alvernaz, presently employed for Project & Concern in San Diego, California, kept all records made all reports and sent the reports to the

national committee in Washington, D.C. for the local committee. He did not handle funds except to handle the paper work . concerning them.

"I was able to write checks on our checking account up to \$100.00 each. Any check over that amount needed two signatures. Robert Driver, Wayne Hughes, an attorney and I were able to cosign checks.

"David Alvernaz kept a ledger and every check written or received was recorded. All records were xeroxed and were forwarded to the national committee. This was done on a time schedule set by the national committee who would advise when reports should be submitted and would tell us if reports had not been received on schedule. do not recall how often reports were submitted. An individual I recall only as Ben who I met at the Century Plaza in Los Angeles would telephone us and ask that reports be submitted. know where his offices were other than Washington, I believe Ben was with the national committee. I do not recall receiving any confirmation from the . national committee that any of our reports had been received by them. I only recall them telling us they had not received reports on occasion.

"We had no system of informing the national committee if we received a significant contribution. Most of our contributions were small, that is, below \$500.00. A loan was made with the downtown office of the Security Pacific Bank. This loan was cosigned by seven or right gentlemen who later paid off the loan. The receipt of this money was reported routinely to the national committee. No money was ever sent out of San Diego to the national committee to my knowledge. All of the money raised in San Diego was spent on the local campaign for Humphrey. Other money was given by people from San Diego directly to the State or National Committees. The money was sent directly to the State or National Committees from San Diego residents.

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"At one time, I was given a list of five person who had contributed over \$100.00 each. I do not recall their names. I was instructed to check to see who they were. I learned that one of the contributions was from a corporation and that money was returned to them. I do not now recall what the corporation was. I recall that the other four individuals had individually given the money. I did this at the instruction of the national committee.

"I had no knowledge that a part of the records in San Diego had not been reported on a timely basis until after I had been contacted by an Agent from the San Diego office of the FBI for an appointment. On about July 7, 1975, one of the secretaries employed by the Wyman law firm in Los Angeles, California, telephoned me and said I would probably be contacted by the FBI as they were conducting an investigation into the reporting of contributions by the Humphrey committee.

"I have examined a page of paper containing the names of eight individuals who contributed \$200.00 each on June 2, 1972. I believe this might have been contributions from a cocktail party held by Keene Walcott, Route 1, Box M-19, Del Mar, California. I do not recall having seen any such report previously or having anything to do with reporting the receipt of this money to the national committee. This would have been handled by David Alvernaz who assisted me. The \$1600.00 involved would have been spent locally in San Diego and would not have been sent to the national committee. I have never been contacted by the national committee regarding this report.

"Sometime after the Democratic National Convention in 1972, I gave all of our records to the man I recall as being Ben at Century Plaza in Los Angeles. At the present time there are no records in my possession regarding the campaign for the nomination of Humphrey. "I have read this statement of this page and two others and it is true and correct to the best of my knowledge.



"Wayne Hughes, an attorney in San Diego, held the official title of Treasurer. Mrs. Feldman could write checks up to \$100.00. check over \$100.00 had to have two signatures. Persons authorized to sign were Marlene Feldman, Robert Driver and Wayne Hughes. We had a checking account at the downtown branch of the Security Pacific Bank. I received bank statements on the account for some time after the end of our activity indicating a small balance and I refered them to Mrs. Feldman and I finally stopped receiving the statements. I do not recall anything further regarding the identity of the bank account and I have no records at this time. -.

"I was responsible for keeping records, sending reports to higher headquarters in the committee and for paying bills for the San Diego We had a 'Vending Code Number' for Committee. This was a number we placed on each account. all of our communications that identified the I do not recall what this number originator. I kept a ledger in which I recorded the date of each check, the amount of the check, to whom it was paid or who it was received from, what it was for and any other information I thought was pertinent. I also had a check book ledger which included the same information.

"Until about May, 1972, I would furnish all information regarding our financial activity to Joe Cerrell's office in Los Angeles. I do not know his specific address but he was a professional political consultant. I would receive a telephone call from them and would give all of our information to them over the telephone. I do not recall making any written reports at that time.

"In about the middle of May, 1972, we were instructed to begin sending written reports to Washington, D.C. to the National committee. I do not recall the address. I sent xerox copies of everything to them about every three weeks. I do not recall the exact spacing of the reports but we were instructed as to how often they were to be sent. The reports were mailed first class or air mail. This continued until June, 1972, when Mr. Humphrey lost the primary election. Until that time we sent in reports to Washington headquarters of the Humphrey committee. In addition we were still giving oral reports to Joe Cerrell's office in Los Angeles.

"After the primary election was lost, activity in San Diego slowed practically to a stop. I took a two week vacation. I returned to San Diego on about July 4, 1972, and at that time I again xeroxed all records not previously sent in and sent them to the national office of the committee. The information was sent in self addressed envelopes made available to us by the national committee.

"Our office was on the third floor of the California Theatre Building located at 1142 4th Avenue, San Diego, California. There was little or no activity at the office from the primary election in June until the Convention in about August, 1972. After the Democratic Convention was over, I xeroxed everything and mailed a final report to national headquarters.

"At that time a loan from the Security Pacific Bank remained outstanding in the amount of \$20,000.00. This loan was paid off by the co-signers.

"I do not recall ever getting any indication from the national committee that they had received everything that we had mailed to them. They would advise us if some report was due and they had not received it.

"No significant contributions were ever received. There was no special procedure or forms for reporting such a contribution should one have been received. No money was sent to the national committee as far as is known to me. All the money received in San Diego was spent on the local campaign.

"I have examined a page listing eight contributions from individuals on June 2, 1972. I do not recall ever seeing such a list of contributions. I have never been advised that such a list was not received on time by the national committee for Humphrey and I am not aware of the reason for this series of contributions of \$200.00 each on June 2, 1972. I could have sent this report in and not recall it at this time.

"I have read this report of this page and three others and it is true and correct to the best of my knowledge.

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Attorney WAYNE ALAN HUGHES, 1069 Lincoln, San Diego, California, was interviewed at his office at 2150 First Avenue, San Diego. He is a member of the Dillaway, Hughes and Wilson Law Firm, 2150 First Avenue, San Diego.

Mr. HUGHES read and signed an "Interrogation: Advice of Rights" form. He was advised of the purpose of the interview and he furnished the following information:

He held the official title of Treasurer of the San Diego Branch of the Committee for the Nomination of HUBERT H. HUMPHREY, during 1972. He does not recall the exact dates. He possibly held the position until about September, 1972.

He was appointed Treasurer of the group for the use of his name and because he would be available to co-sign checks. Any check over \$100 needed two signatures. Persons who could sign checks were MARLENE PELDMAN, Coordinator for the group, ROBERT DRIVER and HUGHES. MARLENE FELDMAN could write checks up to \$100 using only her signature.

Mr. HUGHES said he had no duties in keeping of records, making reports, preparing checks, or anything else connected with the committee except the co-signing of a few checks and possibly making a few telephone calls asking for funds. DAVID ALVERNAZ handled most of the record keeping and reporting duties. He said he does not have any records in his possession nor has he ever seen any of the records.

The state and national committees had assumed the responsibility for reporting receipts and expenditures as required by law.

Mr. HUGHES examined a page reflecting the donation of \$200 cash by eight individuals. He said he is not acquainted with any of these individuals but that on about June 2, 1972,



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a cocktail party was held in the Del Mar area. Mr. HUMPHREY attended this cocktail party and it is likely that the eight individuals contributing \$200 each were also at the party.

Mr. HUGHES said he has never been contacted regarding the delayed reporting of the receipt of the eight \$200 contributions and knew nothing about it until interviewed.

JULIUS GLAZER, home address 1803 East Ocean Boulevard, Long Beach, California was contacted at his office, 9454 Wilshire Boulevard, Suite 209, Beverly Hills, California, telephone number 278-2264. GLAZER was advised of the identity of the agents and that investigation was being conducted concerning contributions furnished to the Committee for the Nomination of Hubert H. Humphrey, Incorporated. GLAZER was furnished with a copy of an Interrogation; Advice of Rights form which he read, stated he understood and signed. He then furnished the following:

From the period of May 1972 until January 1973 he was the Accountant for the Southern California Committee to Elect Hubert Humphrey. He was employed during the above dates by the committee and reported to EUGENE L. WYMAN who was in charge of collecting contributions in California.

GLAZER was asked the method employed by him for reporting receipts of contributions to the National Committee in Washington, D. C. He stated all contributions were deposited. in the committee account at the City National Bank, Beverly Hills Branch, Beverly Hills, California. Every time he made a deposit he sent a copy of the deposit slip and each check pertaining to that transaction to the National Committee in Washington, D. C. He would place the person's occupation on the check for their information. He also kept one copy of each check and deposit slip and one copy was furnished to The copy furnished to the National Committee Mr. EUGENE WYMAN was sent to PAUL THATCHER who was Treasurer, but he does not know who ultimately received the reports. He sent the reports by regular mail and has no record of whether or not they were received by the committee. He did not receive acknowledgement from the committee that they received the checks and deposit slips. He is almost certain Mr. WYMAN received some type of confirmation of the deposit slips inasmuch as he was in contact with the National Committee frequently each day.

It is the property of the FBI and is loaned to your our our conHe did not employ a system for informing the National Committee of the receipts of specific significant contributions and he assumed Mr. WYMAN would have told them of any large contribution.

GLAZER explained that money that they collected was used to pay bills in California and the money was also used by the National Committee in Washington, D. C. Money was sent to the National Committee from the Beverly Hills account by WYMAN whenever it was needed. He thinks the money was sent by wire to the National Committee. Both WYMAN and GLAZER's names were on the account and either one could draw money from the account. He thinks it is possible JOE CERRELL, who was the Campaign Manager for HUMPHREY in California may also have been on the account and able to draw from it.

GLAZER said he could confirm all of this if he had his records, however, in January 1973, BEN FELLOWS came to get all of his records and took them back to Washington, D. C. for PAUL THATCHER.

GLAZER was asked why no reports were sent to the National Committee after June 27, 1972. Mr. GLAZER stated he did not discontinue sending reports after June 27, 1972. He used the above system for reporting contributions to the National Committee from the time he sharted until the time he was no longer with the Committee. He does not know why anyone would say he had not been sending reports after June 27, 1972 because that was not true. He again stated he could not furnish any back up material on this inasmuch as all of his records have been taken to Washington, D. C.

GLAZER is aware the General Accounting Office conducted an investigation of the late reporting of money by the Humphrey Committee. He had reviewed the report and does not understand some of it. It is his understanding the National Committee found out on some date that all of the money they collected and some of the expenditures had not been reported to the Federal government as required. He also found out that the Humphrey Committee waited 11 months before talling the Federal government of this. He can not understand why they waited such a long time to tell the Federal government.

It is his understanding that after the convention in Miami Beach, Florida HUMPHREY was more or less out of the race for nomination for President on the Democratic ticket. Evidently things "fell apart" after this and this is when the problem arose.

Asked when and how the National Committee ultimately received the information not reported after June 27, 1972, GLAZER said he assumed that FELLOWS obtained the entire picture when he picked up his records here in January 1973. He also understood FELLOWS went to San Francisco and San Diego and picked up their records also.

GLAZER was not instructed not to report anything after June 27, 1972. It was his understanding all Federal reporting would be made by the committee in Washington, D. C. This was a rather unusual procedure but when the committee was first organized in Washington, D. C. it appeared to be the easiest way to report the information to the Federal government.

GLAZER said he had no explanation on why the June 26, 1972 report of the Los Anglees Committee and the June 1, 1972 report of the Los Angeles Dinner Committee were not received by National Headquarters.

GLAZER learned the above reports were not received when FELLOWS came to see him in 1973.

GLAZER was asked how and when he originally and ultimately informed the committee of the information contained in the error report and he again stated he continually sent the deposit slips.

It was the opinion of GLAZER that this entire matter was a problem of "lousy accounting". He thinks it was an error to go to central reporting which the committee did and this is what caused all the problems.

He first found out there was some type of problem in the Humphrey reporting system from HERB ALEXANDER who is the President of the Citizens Research Foundation. This foundation is a scholary institution that investigates contributions of political figures. He believes ALEXANDER called him in July 1973 and asked prim about this matter.

In conclusion GLAZER stated the procedure he used in reporting information to the National Committee had been copied by numerous campaign individuals. At one point he even xeroxed cash that he received and when he testified before the Senate Investigating Committee on campaign contributions he was "chewed out" by one of the investigators when they found out he had xeroxed money. He did not know it was a violation of Federal law to xerox the money.

Mr. GLAZER added it was unfortunate that Mr. WYMAN had died but he could shed some light on the situation.
Mrs. WYMAN worked on the campaign some and she may have information concerning the contributions. He also added that Mr. WYMAN's records may contain copies of the deposit slips and checks he sent to WYMAN.

The interview was then terminated.

Mrs. ROSALIND WYMAN, 10430 Bellagio Road, Los Angeles was contacted at her-home. She was advised of the identity of the agent and that an investigation was being conducted concerning the Committee for the Nomination of Hubert H. Humphrey. She furnished the following information:

Her husband had been the California Chairman of Fund Raising for Hubert Humphrey and he died in January of 1973. She did not get involved in The campaign that much with her husband and she did not remember him making any comment about the operations of sending reports back to the National Committee in Washington, D. C. regarding campaign contributions for HUBERT HUMPHREY. She did know he complained about the reporting system on numerous occasions but she has no further information regarding his complaints. She did state Mr. WYMAN was extremely fastidious about keeping records and she was sure he would have made memorandums concerning his contact with the National Committee regarding the contributions.

She was asked if his records would reflect any of his actions with the committee and she said she thought they would. She has no objections to the FBI reviewing his records if they can be located. Mr. WYMAN's secretary quit approximately two years ago and some of his records are at his office and some are at home. The biggest problem will be locating the records. She suggested SA contact Mr. FRANK ROTHMAN who is a law partner of Mr. WYMAN.

Mrs. WYMAN said she could furnish no further information regarding this investigation.

Mr. PALMER furnished xerox copies of the bank statement for the period ending June 2, 1972, July 3, 1972 and July 20, 1972 when the account was closed.

He had reviewed the banks records and could only find this one account involved with GLAZER. There were three other accounts for numerous HUMPHREY committees, however, GLAZER was not involved in the account and therefore can not furnish any information regarding those account without authorization.

All expenditures of the committees on which he worked were reported to the National Committee by sending them a copy of the check when money was drawn on the account for the expenditure. Voucher checks were used and a copy of this check is what was sent to the National Committee. copy was furnished to EUGENE WYMAN so he was aware of what was being spent.

GLAZER was advised that only one account could be found at the City National Bank in Beverly Hills where he was a co-signer. After reviewing the bank statements from June of 1972, until the account was closed, GLAZER stated it was apparent there were other bank accounts which were used to deposit money received by him after June of 1972. He said the accounts were probably in the name of EUGENE WYMAN because WYMAN had the right to withdraw money from all of the accounts they used.

GLAZER said he could furnish no further information concerning this matter.

JAMES J. DE LANEY, white male, born being interviewed at his residence, 418 Union Avenue, was advised of the official identity of the interviewing agent and the nature of the interview.

DE LANEY advised he had previously been employed as the Administrative Assistant for Senator HARRISON WILLIAMS of New Jersey; however, because of WILLIAMS backing Senator MUSKIE for running in the Presidential Primary, 1972, he terminated his job. Shortly afterwards he was asked to be the campaign Manager of New Jersey for the Committee for the Nomination of HUBERT H. HUMPHREY which he accepted, remaining in this position from April, 1972, until sometime in June, 1972. He stated that he immediately secured rooms at the Winfield Scott Hotel, Elizabeth, New Jersey, for the campaign headquarters and that numerous persons assisted in the campaign, most of which were unknown youths from all over the country working in a part-time, volunteer basis. He added that there are no records available which would reflect names of any employees.

DE LANEY advised that the campaign headquarters for the nomination of HUMPHREY was located in Washington, D.C., exact address unrecalled, and that he frequently dealt with ROBERT BARRIE. He stated that all instructions and directins were made in Washington, D.C. He advised that sometime shortly after April, 1972, HUMPHREY won the Pennsylvania Primary and that during his contact with unrecalled persons in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, who were from the campaign headquarters, it was agreed that New Jersey would receive a budget of \$140,000. He added, however, that they never received this amount and that during the entire campaign, only received \$10,000, which had been received originally opening the secount Citizens for Humphrey, at the Somerset Trust Company, Watchung Branch, Blue Star Shopping Center, Watchung, New Jersey. This amount was for expenses in running the campaign.

DE LANEY advised that during May or June, 1972, a fund raiser was scheduled to be held at the Railburn Country Club, Florham Park, New Jersey, to raise proceeds for the

campaign. He stated, however, that HUMPHREY was unable to attend and by this time, the \$10,000 had been spent and they had incurred expenses amounting to approximately \$7,000. He stated that Washington had never forwarded any additional money to them and they needed to raise money to pay these expenses, so they decided to go ahead with the fund raiser.

DE LANEY advised that he believes this fund raiser was held approximately 10 days prior to the California Primary and that it consisted of two affairs at the Railburn Country Club, Florham Park, New Jersey, both held on the same date, which was not recalled. The first was a cocktail party at which approximately 15 persons attended and at which KEN O'DONELL from Boston, Massachusetts, who was the Campaign Manager for HUMPHREY, spoke. He stated that he does not recall who attended the cocktail party nor the amount of money which was raised.

Following the cocktail party, a dinner was held at the country blub. This dinner was attended by approximately 150 persons, a number of which were the kids assisting in the campaign. Money was also raised at the dinner.

DE LANEY advised that he does not specifically recall the amount collected at the two affairs; however, it was less than expenses incurred in New Jersey, as when the bills were paid, the bill for a car rented by the committee could not be fully paid.

DE LANEY advised that HUMPHREY did speak at the dinner, however, it was over the telephone. He stated that the amounts collected and the names of the contributors were obtained at the two affairs; however, he does not recall who recorded this information nor does he have any of these records.

DE LANEY advised that because of the above and that HUMPHREY lost the primary in California, the New Jersey Committee for the Nomination of HUMPHREY broke up. He stated that none of the records were maintained by him nor does he know of anyone who might have the records of New Jersey, except Washington, D.C. He stated that regarding their campaign,

that monthly reports were prepared and furnished to Washington, D.C. He stated that although he does not recall who specifically would have received the information from New Jersey, he does recall the names of JENNY BROOM or ROOM and GLADYS KNIGHT. He further stated that ROBERT BARRIE should have knowledge of their quration along with PAT O'CONNOR or O'CONNELL who was an attorney for the committee preparing reports.

DE LANEY advised that there was no one person who contacted Washington or filed the reports. He stated that anyone could have forwarded the reports. He advised that the names and amounts collected during the fund raiser in New Jersey was forwarded to Washington, D.C., adding that records of every transaction occurring in New Jersey during the entire campaign were sent to Washington, D.C.

DE LANEY advised that JOAN FINLEY was working with the campaign as Treasurer and made out the checks for the expenses. He stated, however, that for personal reasons at home she suddenly left the group. He stated that she possibly deposited the original \$10,000; however, she had left the group prior to the fund raiser.

DE LANEY advised that the names of persons attending the fund raisers along with all of the records of New Jersey, had been furnished Washington, D.C. He stated that what happened to these records in Washington, D.C. he does not know; however, shortly after the committee broke up, he was contacted by an attorney preparing the HUMPHREY report, PAT O'CONNOR or O'CONNELL, requesting the New Jersey records. He stated that he informed him the original records had been furnished, however, he went back to the Somerset Trust Company, where their records were reproduced and furnished to Washington, D.C. He stated that he believes these records only consisted of zerox copies of checks which were written. He added that these records, if still available, can be obtained through the bank President, Mr. GIACOBELLO, Main Office, Somerset Trust Company, Somerville, New Jersey.

DE LANEY advised that he could think of no persons working for the New Jersey Committee who could provide

additional information. He added that the committee was made up largely of kids volunteering their help and that when no money or help could be furnished by Washington, and the fact that HUMPHREY was defeated in California, the committee ceased operation.

DE LANEY advised with respect to the report of ROBERT BARRIE, Receipt Error Analysis, that the amounts shown would have been collected at either the cocktail party or the dinner held at the Railburn Country Club. He stated that he himself recalls JOHN DONNELLY, JOHN CONNER, ALDO CAPUTO, FRANK LANGELLA and PHILLIP DAKEO attending the cocktail party; however, he does not recall the amounts given. stated that he could not explain the names "anonymous" except that this could have possibly represented the amounts collected at the dinners. He further added that he did not know why the three different dates of May 26, 1972, June 1, 1972, and June 2, 1972, appear, since the cocktail party and dinner were held on the same day. He advised that JOHN CONNOR is the Chairman of the Board of Allied Chemical and ALDO CAPUTO raises horses in New Jersey. Additionally, FRANK LANGELLA and PHILLIP DAKEO are members of the Railburn Country Club. added that the report setting forth the contributions would have been furnished to Washington, D.C.

William R. McGrana, Thirty-Eighth Floor, IDS Tower, SO South Eighth Street, Hinneapolis, Minnesota, furnished written responses to questions asked of him as follows:

you and Special Agent with the requested information prior to his departure for Arkansas, but after being on a month-long vacation, I have found the work of numerous clients has piled up and they are all demanding time immediately.

"In an offort to provide you with the answers to the questions given me during our interview on July 14, 1975, I have dictated those answers to the best of my recollection and have included them as an attachment. I am doing this primarily to expedite the information to you because I have to leave the city with a client tomorrow morning and, following my return early next week, will again be leaving the area on Thursday. Hopefully this information will be helpful to you in your investigation."

"1. What were the methods used to report receipts and expenditures to the National Committee for the Homination of Nubert N. Humphrey from the Minnesotans for Humphrey Committee and the Nebraskans for Humphrey Committee?

"As I remember, we received a type of mimeographed reporting form from the National Well Committee and we were directed to list basic information about the contributions, such as the name of the contributor, the amount and date of the contribution and the occupation of the contributor if it was known. According to the direction received from the National Well Committee headquarters on Jefferson Place in Mashington, D. C., and they would take care of all further reporting requirements.

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"I am not aware of any mechanism for the National Committee confirming to the local HHH committee that its information had been received. be kept in mind that most of the local committees were very short-lived, and therefore there would have been limited time in which to notify them. In my own case, I was in the State of Nebraska for approximately ten days prior to the primary election and left the day following the election. To the best of my knowledge, the records of the Nebraska Committee would have been sent to the Mational HHH Committee shortly after the date of the primary election, which I believe was on May 9, 1972. The records of the Minnesotans for Humphrey were sent in to the National Committee in May or June, 1972, as the Committee went out of chistonee for all intents and purposes after the June, 1972, DFL State Convention.

"3. What system was used by the state committees for informing the National Committee of significant contributions, that is, those contributions of \$5,000 or more, and are the documents substantiating these contributions and the reporting system thereof available?

"I was never aware of either the Minnesota or Nebraska HIIII Committees ever receiving a contribution in the amount of \$5,000. I faintly recall that a notice was sent by the National HHII Committee advising the need for immediate telephone reporting if a large contribution were received, but that was never the case with either the Minnesota or Nebraska Committees.

"4. How was the Treasurer of the local committee informed, and when was the Treasurer informed, that the reports from the state committees were not being received by the National Committee on a timely basis? How were the contributions and expenditures then reported and when were they reported?

"To the best of my recollection, neither the Minnesota nor the Nebraska IIIII Committees were advised by the National Committee that their reports concerning contributions were not being received on a timely basis. Again, I point out that these committees were of a relatively limited duration and I. don't believe either committee raised any significant amounts of money. is my understanding that the National HHH Committee submitted an amendment to its earlier GAO reports sometime in 1973, and that all of the previous reporting errors made by the National Committee relating to Hinnesota and Nebraska were corrected at that time. Regarding the copy of the Receipt Error Analysis for the Himesotans for Humpbrey Committee, which listed seven contributions and indicated the 'Report of '5-15-72 from 'Binnesotans for Humphrey' not received by reporting clerk.'-- I am not aware of why they were not received by the reporting clerk because the National Committee did require that the reporting dates be met promptly and I am quite certain that the Minnesotans for Humphrey submitted the reports on a timely basis. As for the Receipt Error Analysis roster involving the Nebraska Committee provided me by Special Agents Anderson and Henwood, I can only comment that the National 1988 Committee was equally concerned about prompt reporting in Nebraska."

Mr. McGrann added that Mary Conover, Secretary to the Minnesotans for Humphrey Committee, handled many of the details of the committee. Mr. McGrann does not know her present location.

He has reviewed the files of Mr. EUGENE WYMAN and could find no record of any acknowledgement from the National Committee to Elect HUBERT HUMPHREY for contributions made in the Los Angeles area after June 27, 1972. He did find a file containing correspondence after the election in 1972, which he showed to SA

There was nothing in the file concerning contributions.

ROTHMAN added that in January, 1973, BEN FELLOWS of the National Committee in Washington, D.C., contacted him. FELLOWS stated the General Accounting O ffice was conducting an audit of the campaign and he (FELLOWS) desired copies of all checks showing contributions to the HUMPHREY Committee in this area. ROTHMAN contacted the City National Bank, Beverly Hills, California, and told them he desired copies of all the checks and that he would pay for them. He had to pay approximately \$2,000 for copies of all the checks and he sent them to FELLOWS in Washington, D.C.

Mr. ROBERT BARRIE, Manager, Federal Legislative Relations Operation, General Electric, 777 14th Street, N. W., Vashington, D. c. (WDC), telephone number 637-4000, telephonically contacted SA on July 10, 1975. In previous telephone conversation, SA had advised BARRIE that the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) was conducting an investigation regarding a possible election law violation. The violation concerned the failure to report receipts and expenditures for the Committee for the Nomination of HUBERT H. HUMPHREY. BARRIE was previously advised he was being contacted regarding the failure of the New Jersey Committee to report receipts of money in the period from May 26, 1972 til June 7, 1972.

BARRIE stated he wished to give this information Bover the telephone. BARRIE was advised by SA Ithat the investigation concerned a possible violation of Federal laws, and BARRIE must be advised of his Constitutional Rights. BARRIE stated that he understood his rights and felt he had nothing to hide. He also stated that he had no personal knowledge of any wrong doings on the part of the New Jersey Committee for the Nomination of HUBERT H. HUMPHREY. BARRIE advised that since his initial contact with SA done some checking with other members of the RJ Committee in order to find out the procedures used for reporting receipts and expenditures. BARRIE said he had never collected any money himself or reported any receipts of contributions. The information he was about to give was obtained from another. individual. Thereafter, SA man advised BARRIE did not have to answer any questions and could have an attorney present if he decided to answer questions . BARRIE was advised he sould stop answering questions any time and anything he said could be used against him in Court. BARRIE said he understood these rights and repeated that he wished to give the information over the telephone. BARRIE, thereafter, furnished the fellowing information.

BARRIE advised he was the National Coordinator of the New Jersey (HJ) Committee for the Homination of HUNETT H. HUMPHREY. Barrie advised the NJ Committee had had a fund raiser for HUMPHREY at the Rayburn Country Club in Floorham Park, NJ, sometime early June of 1972. The fund raiser occurred on the weekend preceding the NJ and California primaries which were held on the same day. EARRIF stated a number of contributors were solicited for this party.

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SA great the following names to BARRIE:

JOHN DONNELLY, JOHN CONNER, ALDO CAPUTO, FRANK
LANGELLA, PERNARD HELLRINO, PHILLIP DAMRO, and ROOFR BUCKELEU
BARRIE advised that he believes these are the names of the
contributors who were solicited for this fund raiser.

BARRIE was also advised that two anonymous contributions took place on May 26, 1972 and June 1, 1975 for \$1,670.00 and \$500.00.

BARRIE stated that after HUMPHREY lost in California approximately two thirds of the staff of the UNJ Committee were fired. BARRIE stated that very little activity took place regarding the Committee for the Momination of HUMPHREY after HUMPHREY lost in California. PARRIE stated that the office was very unorganized at the time due to the lack of personnel.

BARRIE advised that all receipts and disbursements from the NJ Committee were supposed to be placed on a pre-printed form and submitted to the Washington Campaign Head-quarters. BARRIE said that there was a written instruction regarding this procedure. This procedure also required that all receipts and expenditures be called into the Washington Headquarters by telephone.

BARRIE advised that he did not remember collecting any money himself, however, an individual named, JOAN, last name unknown (LNU), deposited the money and sent out the forms. BARRIE advised that JOAN LNU'S immediate supervisor was JIM DELANKY, Scotts Plains, Hew Jersey, telephone number 201-322-9241. BARRIE said DELANEY was the Chairman of the NJ Committee. BARRIE advised that he has been in contact with DELANEY regarding this matter.

BARRIE stated that in 1972, BEN FELIOWS, Accountant for the HUMPHREY Committee, WDC, telephonically contacted him, BARRIE, requesting the reports of contributors who had given

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money to the HUMPHREY Committee in May and June of 1972. BARRIE Baid he then called DELANEY who advised that everything had been sent to WDC. DELANEY went to a New Jersey Bank where the New Jersey Committee Account for HUMPHREY had been kept and reproduced the records. DELANEY then supplied these records to YELLOVS. BARRIE believed that the bank in question was the Comerset Trust Company, Somerset, New Jersey.

DELANEY advised BARRIE that all files regarding the New Jersey Committee were sent to WDC to the National Headquarters for the NUMPHREY Committee. BARRIE stated he believes any errors in reporting contributions to the HUMPHREY Committee would be due to the confusion and lack of personnel at the New Jersey Committee following HUMPHREY'S defeat in the California Primary.

BARRIE said he knew of no system for informing the National Committee of the receipt of any large contributions. BARRIE added that: to his knowledge there were no large contributions given to the New Jersey Committee.

PARRIE advised he would search his records and attempt to find copies of the pre-printed forms used by the New Jersey Committee to report receipts of contributions.

Because of his political support of HUBERT H. HUMPHREY and his active participation in the activities of the Democratic Party in the Northern California area, he informally assumed and had been designated the Northern California Chairman for the Nomination of Hubert H. Humphrey by the National Committee sited in Washington, D.C. during the election year of 1972.

His primary activities in the capacity as Chairman were to solicit donations for the campaign funds of HUBERT H. On July 23, 1975, JAMES JARUDDEN, Vice President, Ray Oil Burner Company, 1301 San Jose Avenue, San Francisco, California, telephone number 415-333-5800, was advised of the interviewing Agent's identity and official capacity and thereupon provided the following information.

During the 1972 Presidential Campaign period he was the treasurer of the Northern California Hubert H. Humphrey Presidential Campaign Committee, and as such, was responsible for the accounting and reporting of campaign contributions and expenditures to the National Committee in Washington, D. C.

To accurately answer any questions regarding committee reporting information, he would have to conduct a review of committee documents and reports and therefore requested to be recontacted in approximately one week.

On July 31, 1975, JAMES J. RUDDEN was recontacted at his place of employment and provided the following information.

The method of reporting contributions and expenditures of the local committee to the National Committee consisted of a report made up of three sections as follows.

- Cover letter
- Listing of contributions
- Listing of expenditures

The cover letter set forth the sequential number and the period covered by the report with the first report covering the period April 7, 1972 through April 19, 1972, out of a total of approximately eighteen reports.

The contribution page (s) set forth the names, residence and business addresses, amounts and dates of each individual contributor whose contribution had been received during the period covered by the report.

The expenditures page set forth the check number, amount, date, vendor number and payee of expenses paid during the period covered by the report.

A copy of report number three for the period consisting of one day, May 19, 1972, was made available as an example.

The first report numbered one was transmitted to National Committee in Washington, D. C., by telecopier with the typed report transmitted via U. S. Postal Service on the same date. All subsequent reports were mailed via U. S. Postal Service either on or within a day of the last day of the reporting period covered by each report with no telecopy being transmitted to the National Committee other than the initial report.

All reports were transmitted to PAUL THACHER, Treasurer, Humphrey for President Campaign, 1225 19th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., attention LEF OTTMAN, Finance Office.

He has no knowledge of any formal confirmation of receipt system in effect by the National Committee to notify the local committee that reports submitted were actually received. As all local reports were submitted sequentially both in report number and period covered, the local committee assumed that if any report was not received by the National Committee, it would be evident to them as the result of the out of sequence pattern of subsequent reports and that the local committee would be notified.

He has no knowledge of any system in effect by the local committee wherein the National Committee was notified of specific significant contributions outside of the normal periodic reports made to the National Committee by the local committee.

He has on hand reports which reflect the following information regarding contributions made during the period May 16, 1972 through June 7, 1972.





#### I BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Hubert Humphrey is Mayor of Minneapolis, Minnesota, having assumed that office in July of 1945. In 1943 he ran for the office of Mayor but was defeated. Prior to entering politics Mayor Humphrey was, in 1944, Professor of Political Science at MacAlester College in St. Paul.

#### II ACTIVITIES AND CONTACTS

Mayor Humphrey prior to his political career was recognized as a well-known liberal in Minnesota. Reports have been received that he was an instructor at the Abraham Lincoln School Extension in Minneapolis in March of 1944; he spoke at the Soldiers' Rally in May of 1944, which was arranged by the American Youth for Democracy, and he reviewed the book "Under Cover" for the Student League for Democracy at the University of Minnesota.

Prior to assuming the office of mayor in July of 1945 the Communists in Kinneapolis worked very aggressively to elect Humphrey and according to one informant Humphrey was forced to associate with Communist Party members for political reasons.

In the same connection it is noted that in May of 1945 a highly confidential source stated that three of the functionaries of the Communist Party in Minneapolis held a conference during which they talked of the necessity of electing Humphrey on a Liberal ticket.

The interests of the Communists in Humphrey's election is reflected in an item which appeared in the Minneapolis Star Journal on May 29, 1945, revealing that John M. Jacobsen, National Director of the CIO Political Action Committee during the 1944 Presidential Campaign, would return to Minneapolis on June 1, 1945, and head a new CIO-PAC organization. It was noted that Jacobsen had just returned from Washington, D. C., where he had been with the staff of Senator Claude Pepper. This item went on to state that Jacobsen's return to Minneapolis aroused speculation over CIO plans for an all out campaign for its endorsed candidates, particularly Humphrey who was running for mayor. It should be noted that Jacobsen meets frequently with Minresota State Communist Party leaders and with Johnny Williamson, a National Communist Party leader.

The Daily Worker for June 13, 1945, stated that labor and liberal forces in Minneapolis had won a sweeping victory in the city's election, which included Humphrey's defeat of Marvin L. Kline for mayor. The Worker pointed out that Humphrey was the State Campaign Manager for President Roosevelt and that in the local campaign he had the unanimous endorsement of the AF of L.

the CIO, as well as other labor groups.

Following Humphrey's election he appointed Ed Ryan, a graduate of the FBI National Academy, as Superintendent of Police. Information from a highly confidential source reflected that the Communists were opposed to this appointment and that Robert Wishart, a member of the State Board of the Communist Political Association, told Humphrey that the CIO was against the appointment of Ryan and raised the objection to Humphrey that Ryan had worked for the FBI. Humphrey is alleged to have replied that he would see to it that the Minneapolis Police no longer did FBI work. During the same conversation the Acting District Chairman of the Communist Political Association stated that the Communists could no longer depend on Humphrey and that in the future the CIO would be more militant. The same functionary stated that it was now evident that Mayor Humphrey was trying to please all sides and therefore could not be considered a close ally of the Communists. It appears, however, that Humphrey did pay his political debt to the Communists inasmuch as he appointed Wishart as a member of the Minneapolis Welfare Board.

When Hubert Humphrey took office as mayor he instructed former Superintendent of Police, Elmer F. Millner to see that all gambling in the city was stopped. In July of 1945 when Ed Ryan became Superintendent of Police he issued similar instructions.

The Minneapolis Tribune for January 3, 1946, reported that individuals had appeared before the Minneapolis City Council and complained of discrimination in the awarding of Civil Service jobs in Minneapolis. The charges were made that there were no Negro school teachers or office workers in the Minneapolis school system. The item states that Humphrey had asked the Council to introduce an antidiscrimination ordinance in Minneapolis patterned after the Presidential Executive Order establishing the Wartime Fair Employment Commission but that the Council had taken no action.

The February 1, 1946, issue of the Minnesota Labor stated that Local 1145 of the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers' of America-CIO had begun the publication of a shop paper. Humphrey sent a message of congratulations to the paper and stated that the progressive movement in Minnesota had come to expect leadership from Local 1185 and also from Robert Wishart, the Business Agent for the Local. As previously noted Wishart is a Communist Party member and is President of the Hennepin CIO Industrial Union Council.

The Minnesota Labor for April 5, 1946, carried a report on the Democratic Farm Labor Convention held at St. Paul. The article indicated that Humphrey and others had supported the Right Wing faction of the Convention.

The Minneapolis Tribune for March 31, 1946, in reporting on the same Convention stated that Humphrey had led the so-called progressive Right Wing delegates and had defeated the Left Wing element over the question

of a unit rule in regard to apportioning delegates.

A handbill entitled "Terror in Tennessee" was distributed at a May Day rally announcing a mass protest meeting which would be held on May 8, 1946. The speakers included Mayor Humphrey and Raymond Lockridge, a victim of the Columbia, Tennessee, race riots. The meeting was under the aponsorship of the MAACP in Minneapolis.

A report in October of 1946 reflects that Humphrey is not connected with the underworld in Minneapolis and since he has been Mayor he has "cleaned house."

On November 15, 1946, the Editor of the Minneapolis Star Journal received a letter from the Democratic Nationalists Party of the United States of America which contained a veiled threat against Hubert Humphrey. The letter stated that freedom of speech and freedom of assembly had been abrogated by the local city administration under the infamous Jew and Negro lover, Hubert Humphrey. The letter denounced Humphrey as a traitor to his people and consequently the Democratic Nationalists Party officially condemned him. Because the letter contained only a rather indirect and veiled threat, the United States Attorney in St. Paul declined prosecution; however, an internal security case was opened on the organization. It was later determined that the Democratic Nationalists Party was an anti-Jewish, anti-Negro organization along the same lines as the Columbians. The head of the Democratic Nationalists Party was later identified as Maynard Orlando Nelsen, who was arrested and charged with breach of the peace.

In February of 1947 information was received from a confidential source that the Communist Party in Minneapolis planned a projected attack on Humphrey. The hope of the Party is to be able to bring about unity between the CIO and the AF of L in so far as the Minneapolis municipal campaign goes and thereby remove the support of labor groups from the mayor.


On February 28, 1947, a functionary in the local Communist Party stated that the Party could no longer trust Humphrey.

Humphrey and by former Howard Hughes aide Robert A. Maheu with reference to an alleged \$50,000 cash contribution from the Hughes organization during the 1968 presidential campaign. We request that a preliminary investigation into this matter be undertaken by the Bureau. Copies of those portions of the statements given in depositions in connection with the on-going civil libel suit captioned Maheu v. Hughes Tool Co., a corporation, Byoir & Associates, a corporation, and Richard Hanna, No. 72-305HP, in the United States District Court, Central District of California, relevant to the \$50,000 contribution should be obtained. The Criminal Division has no objection to the Bureau advising Senator Humphrey that an investigation into a possible perjury violation has been initiated by the Department in connection with the testimony given by the Senator and by Mr. Maheu concerning the alleged contribution.
