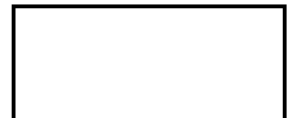

Continued contact with the [redacted] has determined no information in addition to that set forth in referenced Paris communications concerning contact between British Black Panther Party (BPP) supporters [redacted] in Paris to arrange for French BPP supporters to participate in a demonstration planned for March 23, 1971, in London for GEORGE/JACKSON of the Solidad Brothers.

The April 20, 1971, issue of the "International Herald Tribune," published in Paris, contained an article concerning the arrival of one [redacted] described as the American defense attorney for ANGELA DAVIS, in London on April 18, 1971, to organize a rally on April 19, 1971, in favor of DAVIS. According to the article, American Negro author JAMES BALDWIN and French author [redacted] were to speak at this meeting. It is to be noted that both BALDWIN and [redacted] were supposed to participate in the meeting on March 23, 1971, on behalf of JACKSON as set forth in referenced Paris communications.

There is no information currently available to Paris sources which would indicate the appearance of BALDWIN and [redacted] at the April 19, 1971, rally had been arranged by contacts between [redacted] sources noted, however, the original contact between these individuals to arrange participation in the March 23, 1971, rally.

Dramatic Challenge to Jail Chiefs

GEORGE JACKSON "MURDERED" CHARGE

AMERICAN black novelist James Baldwin declared yesterday that he believed that George Jackson— one of the famous Soledad brothers—was murdered.

The authorities at the notorious San Quentin Jail, California, claim that Jackson and two other prisoners were killed in an attempted breakout from the maximum security wing.

They say that he was shot dead by a tower guard "as he made a break for freedom, carrying a revolver that had been smuggled into the jail."

Like Philosophy lecturer Angela Davis and other black leaders held in jail in America, the Soledad Brothers have become symbols of their people to win their freedom.

At a London Press conference yesterday the Soledad Brothers' literary agent, Mary Clemmey, who visited him in San Quentin jail last December, said: "I see no grounds for believing the story about the gun and George trying to shoot his way out.

STORY OF GUN

"I myself had to pass through an electronic scanner which detected everything metal, even my belt buckle."

She thought that the official version that Jackson attorney's briefcase was not screened extremely unlikely, since everything she had been carrying was.

The versions of what happened on Saturday had all come from the prison authorities, and these had changed from day to day.

Miss Clemmey found it not credible that George would have run across an open yard toward an unscalable wall, knowing that it would have been to his certain death.

Mr. Baldwin, who flew in from France specially for the Press conference, declared: "Nothing the Governor of St. Quentin or Governor Reagan says will be believed by me or any other black person in America."

INCONTROVERTIBLE

He said that whatever the details of what happened last Saturday, there was one incontrovertible fact: "A boy of 18 (George Jackson) was put in jail 11 years ago for a trivial crime and was kept there until he died. That itself is murder."

Mr. Baldwin, referring to colour discrimination here, especially in education, and obliquely, to support for South Africa, warned the British people to look to America as an object lesson.

In the middle of working, in the South of France, on a new novel, Mr. Baldwin said he was considering staying in London long enough to be at Monday's Trafalgar Square rally (2 p.m.) in support of Angela Davis and the remaining Soledad brothers.

'Shot in back'

"Soledad Brother" John Clutchette shouted out in court in San Francisco yesterday that fellow prisoner George Jackson was shot in the back and then in the head by guards at San Quentin Prison last Saturday.

Lawyers for Clutchette and the other surviving "Soledad Brother" Fleeta Drumgo, also said the two black convicts were beaten and burned with cigarettes by San Quentin guards after the "escape attempt" had been quashed and Jackson killed.

A large crowd, separated from the rest of the courtroom by a specially built bullet-proof glass screen, cheered when the two defendants walked stiffly into court.

"What about George?" they shouted. Clutchette responded: "George? They shot him in the back and when he wasn't dead they came up and shot him in the head."

*Writer seeks
penal inquiry*

A CALL for an immediate investigation into America's penal system following the shooting of George Jackson was made in London last night by James Baldwin, the American Negro writer.

He flew from Paris to urge pressure for this by British public opinion and said he was considering staying in London for a demonstration in Trafalgar Square on Monday.

Mr Baldwin, 47, said last night that he hoped Jackson's death would become a rallying point for Black people in America. "He was not murdered on Saturday. He was murdered when he was 18," said Mr Baldwin.

\$.70 robbery

Jackson was jailed ten and a half years ago, at 18, for a \$70 robbery on a "one year to life" sentence that made him eligible for early release, but only if he did not anger prison authorities.

"I am calling on you, as America's ally, to look at us and yourselves, because what is happening in America is happening to you," said Mr Baldwin. He did not believe a gun was smuggled into the prison for Jackson. "I believe he was murdered."
