PURPOSE:

JUNION BEN To advise that a name check on Jos Louis, former heavy nu. weight boting champion of the world, has been completed, and to recommend that the results be forwarded to G-2 via liaison.

DETAILS:

A request for a file check on Joe Louis has been repetited from G-2 apparently in connection with the fighter's contemplated exhibition tour in Japan.

Although no investigation has been conducted of Louvs our files disclose that he has been associated with Paul Robeson. and either by personal appearances or through the use of his name. has aided the following Communist organizations: Council of African Affairs, New Masses, Southern Conference for Human Welfare, American Youth for Democracy, United Negro and Allied Veterans of America. All of the above have been cited by the Attorney General with the exception of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare which has been cited by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

The "Daily Worker" on June 29, 1948, published a takement attributed to Louis which was delivered for him at a meeting sponsored by the United Negro and Allied Veterans of America in Washington, D.C., June 26, 1948, in which Louis allegedly attacked bath Republicans and Democrats for their failure to pass legislation benegicial to the Negro people and declared his personal admiration and support of Paul Robeson.

The "Washington Post" of the same date carried a purported repudiation of the above statement on behalf of Bouts stating that Louis was "not for Wallace," that he was uncommitted politically and would "not work with the third party."

No investigation has been conducted by this Bureau concerning the above captioned individual. However, the following information may be of interest to you.

A confidential informant of known reliability advised that Joe Louis was a member of the committee for a birthday party held April 16, 1944, for Paul Rebeson under the sponsorship of the Council on African Affairs.

Robeson is a well known concert singer, Communist sympathizer and Russian apologist.

The Council on African Affairs has been designated by the Attorney General as a Communist organization within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

The "Daily Worker" dated December 25, 1945, page 11, contained an article captioned "New Masses" Annual Cultural Awards Dinner, Jan. 14," which stated that "Joe Louis, the outstanding Negro in the field of sports" would be one of the persons to receive honors at the annual cultural awards dinner of the "New Masses" to be given January 14, 1946, at the Hotel Commodore, New York City.

The "New Masses" has been cited as a Communist periodical by Attorney General Francis Biddle in the Congressional Record, September 24, 1942, page 7,688.

The "Daily Worker", January 16, 1946, page 8, contained an article eaptioned "22 Peoples" Heroes Honored", which reported information concerning the cultural awards dinner of the "Hew Masses" held January 14, 1946, and referred to Joe Louis as one whose "first public act as a civilian was to endorse Ben Davis for re-election." Ben Davis was the incumbent Communist Party candidate for New York City Councilman.

A confidential informant of known reliability advised that a street rally under the sponsorship of the Southern Conference for Muman Welfare took place, Thursday, September 19, 1946, at 12:30 P.M. in the heart of the garment district on 38th Street between 7th and 8th Avenues, New York City. The informant stated that approximately 10,000 people attended the rally, and that Joe Louis

heavyweight champion of the world, was the principal attraction. Through his efforts thousands of dellars were collected for the organization. Many of the contributions were given merely for the privilege of shaking Louis' hand.

The Southern Conference for Human Welfare has been cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities in its report of March 29, 1944, page 147.

The "Daily Worker", September 20, 1946, page 2, contained an article captioned "The Champ Touches Off Aid to Dizie Campaign" which reported that Joe Louis officially opened the street collection campaign of the Southern Conference for Munan Welfare at the above described street rally. The "Worker" quoted Louis as stating "The Southern Conference is a good organization. I am 100 per cent for it because it stands for a better south."


A confidential informant of known reliability advised that Joe Louis, the world's heavyweight boxing champion, accepted an invitation to be guest of honor at the Third Annual Banquet of the American Youth for Democracy scheduled for the Crystal Ball Room, Adelphia Rotel, Philadelphia, Pennauluania, December 5, 1946. The informant further advised that of the American Youth for Democracy for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania indicated that Louis was fully aware of the nature of the organization sponsoring the banquet at the time he accepted the invitation.

The American Touth for Democracy has been designated by the Attorney General as a Communist organization within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

The New York World Telegram dated April 25, 1947, contained an article by Frederick Voltman, World Telegram staff writer, which referred to the United Negro and Allied Veterans of America as an organization which has been selling itself on the prestige of Joe Louis, its honorary national commander."

The United Negro and Allied Veterans of America has been designated by the Attorney General as a Communist organization within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

A confidential informant of known reliability advised that the United Megro and Allied Veterans of America sponsored a concert at the Verment Avenue Baptist Church, Mashington, D. C., on October 16, 1947, featuring Paul Robeson, The informant advised





that the first page of the program for this event contained a picture of Joe Louis in an Army uniform and referred to him as a honorary commander of the organization.

A confidential informant of known reliability advised that a press release issued June 22, 1948, by the United Negro and Allied Veterans, Vashington, B. C., contained the signature of "Joe Louis, Honorary National Commander UNAVA."

The "Daily Worker", June 29, 1948, contained an article on page 5 captioned "Joe Louis Jabs at Demos, GOF For Betrayal", which article read as follows:

Joe Louis, fresh from knocking out Jersey Joe Walcott, threw blows at the Democrate and Republicans for betraying my people. Louis statement was a personal tribute to my friend Paul Robeson, and was delivered for him at Uline Arena, Washington, D. C., June 26, by Winston Edwards, national chairman of the United Megro and Allied Veterans.

"The escasion was 'A Tribute to Megro Veterans' jointly b7C sponsored by SMAVA, and the Vermont Avenue Baptist Church, Paul Bobeson sang, as well as the Galbraith Choir, Louis originally had agreed to appear in person, but the postponement of the championship fight made his appearance impossible.

"The full test of his statement follows:


"A few people in our country say Congress did a good job. In a way they are right. Congress did a good job all right, for a few people but not for me and my people.

"That's why I'm here today, to pay tribute to Paul Robeson, my friend and a great fighter for the Negro people. Because Paul Bobeson fights for the things that Congress didn't do for me and my people, I want Paul to know that I stand squarely, both feet in his corner, because he is in the corner of the Negro people.

"There are some people who don't like the way Paul Robeson fights for my people. Well, I say to that that Paul Robeson is fighting for what all of us want, and that's freedom to be a man. Some of us may not like the way he fights but none of us can afford to stand aside from what the fight is for and what the fight's against.

In Bar Graves

"A lot of Negro GIs I served with are lying in their graves in France, Germany, and in the Pacific. They stopped bullets and shrapnel to keep America free. A lot of other Negro GIs are dead on American soil, after the wan, fighting for the same things that



those GIs fought for abroad. All of them gave up their lives so that my people could live in dignity in this America of ours. All of them loved Faul Robeson and were proud of him, because they knew as I know, that he is one of us.

"Paul Robeson led the fight for an anti-lynching bill, an anti-politar bill, and an FBPC. Congress didn't pass any of these laws, and Songress didn't pass the civil rights program.

"Now some people say one party is to blame, others say another party is to blame. I say both parties have forgotten the Negro GIs who gave up their lives to make America a free country for Negroes, Jows, Protestants, Catholics and all other minorities.

Because of what we lost, a few people got a lot of money out of it. I say that 12 states have get Congress and the government buffaloed. Twelve states South of the Mason Dizon Line. But the other 36 states didn't seem to mind.

Frat's why I salute Paul Robeson, because he's fighting for Megroes, poor whites, Jews, and all the others who suffer, because we haven't get democracy in America. I'm with him and I'm with you, because I know that if we don't fight for our rights, America won't get to first base as a free country for your children and mine.

"I want peace because I know you can't eat guns, I want peace because you can't build a decent home with a rifle. I want peace because you can't be a man if you are looking over your shoulder to another guy whose listening for every word you say so he can put it in a book and then have you called before some board to explain why you want to be free.

"So I say again, a salute to Paul Robeson and to all you GIs. "
We "re with you, Paul, in the fight to the end."

The Washington "Post" dated June 29, 1948, carried an article on page 3 captioned "Joe Louis Net For Wallace." This article stated that Joe Louis was reported as "Not for Wallace" and otherwise still uncommitted politically. According to the article Louis disauowed a statement which placed him "squarely with both feet" in the corner with singer Paul Robeson, a Wallace supporter. This article quoted a spokesman for Louis as saying that he intends to "take a part in the Presidential campaign but will not work with the third party." The "Post" also pointed out that although placards advertising the June 26th meeting of the United Negro and Allied Veterans of American announced that Louis would appear. The fighter did not actually attend the rally.

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In January, 1949, two informants of known reliability advised that they were unable to state whether or not Joe Louis, the fighter, participated in the affairs of the United Negro and Allied Veterans of America nationally, but they did know that he did not support the local New York chapter of the organization or have any affiliation with it.

The foregoing information is furnished as the result of a request for an FBI file check only and is not to be considered as a clearance or nonclearance of the individual involved. It is furnished for your confidential use only and is not to be disseminated outside of your agency.

In WALTER WINCHELL's column in the "New York Mirror" for 1/18/60 appeared the following item:

"Ex-Champion Joe Louis' quote: 'Cuba is the only vacation spot for Negroes to go without bias' Joe Louis and his Public Relations partner, Billy Rowe, are handling 'special' promotion for Castro's Tourist Board! "

In the "New York Mirror" for 1/24/60 in WALTER WINCHELL's column appeared the following item:

"Dictator Castro has hired ex-champ Joe Louis and other fast-buck press agents in the U.S. in an effort to attract tourists. At the same time, Castro is discouraging tourists by attacking the U.S. and suppressing the Cuban press."

advised SA on 1/22/60 that JOE LOUIS resides at 1711 Willington Road, Los Angeles, California, telephone RE 3-3077.

advised that JOE LOUIS had reportedly been in New York for one week from 1/13/60, staying at the Park Sheraton b7C Hotel. The informant also advised that the individual named in the article as gave his address as Los Angeles, California.

The WFO is requested to make an appropriate check to determine if JOE LOUIS is registered as an agent for the Cuban Government.

This information is being furnished to the Los Angeles Office for any action it might deem appropriate.



New York Office should note that Louis was in New York the week preceding the allegation. New York letter 1/29/60 does not indicate any impostigation being conducted by that office. Immediately initiate intensive inquiry to determine what Louis did while there and whether was with him. Consider establishing identity of his telephonic and personal contacts through inquiry at Park Sherston Hotel and thoroughly exploit your source and informant obverage regarding Cuban matters to determine if agreement was sulminated with elements of Cuban Government in New York City.

While Louis and may reside in Los Angeles their activities in fulfilling the alleged agreement cannot be expected to be confined to the Los Angeles frea. For that reason all offices receiving copies of this cirtel should consider whether Cuban sources and informants might be in position to furnish or acquire data in this matter. Advise Bureau and Los Angeles in this regard. In the event Louis and the come to attention in your respective areas intensive inquiry should be conducted to determine whether they are engaged in activities alleged.

This investigation must be given continuous and preferred attention and Los Angeles Office should afford it aggressive supervision and direction. Initial reports should be submitted no later than 3/18/60.



however, expressed the feeling that it was worth every cent that LOUIS and the others were being paid to come to Havana.

personalities were staying at the Havana Hilton Hotel and the St. John Hotel, and pointed out that in the United States the big hotels in Miami Beach, Florida, have numerous colored entertainers, yet these individuals cannot even eat in those hotels.

further said that he had originally contacted the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People (MAACP) in order to arrange for these individuals to travel to Hayana, and that a representative of the MAACP, whose name was not mentioned, was currently in Hayana overseeing the group.

referred to this organization by its letter abbreviation rather than its full name.

and had no moveledge of his accompanying LOUIS to Havana.

The purpose of this memorandum is to summarize the results of our investigation to date concerning allegations that subject had been hired to act as an agent for the Castro government.

Bureau has been conducting an investigation into the activities of Joe Louis, former heavyweight champion, to determine if his activities bring him within provisions of the registration statutes. This inquiry is based on information that appeared in Walter Winchell's column on 😸 1/18/60 disclosing that Louis and an associate had been hired by Castro to attract tourists to Cuba.

The records of the Registration Section, Internal Security Division, contain no information indicating that subject has registered as an agent of any foreign principal. The records disclose, havever, that a letter was received by the Department on 2/16/60 from the firm of Louis, Rowe, Fisher and Lockhart Enterprises, Inc., a New York City firm, requesting registration forms. The letter disclosed that the firm was doing business with a foreign government in the U.S.

Since subject may be member of afore-mentioned firm, we are furnishing the Internal Security Division a report containing the allegations against the subject and requesting that we be advised if subject activities would bring him within the provisions of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended. We are also requesting to be advised if subject's registration is solicited or if he has already fulfilled his obligation in this matter.

Fidol Castro has hired former heavyweight champion Joe Louis and three associates as his American public relations agents for \$287,000

Mr. Louis filed as a for-Artment of Justice on April 19 listing himself as vice president of Louis, Rowe, Fisher, Lockhart Enterprises, Inc., of 200 West 57th st, New York.

Mr. Rowe reported three Cuban trips between Dec. 19 and Feb. 25, and said his principal contribution would be "development of tourism thru writing of news stories and advertising."

Mr. Fisher also listed three Cuban jaunts "to start development of the February plan." Mr. Lockhart noted six trips to Havana, and also listed one from Havana to Venezuela on Feb. 2, the nature of which was not disclosed.

As expenses, Mr. Louis and his partners put down a \$504.66 telephone bill on Feb. 15; \$706.25 for a buffet luncheon on Feb. 19; \$173.25 for an ad in the Chicago Defender on March 7; \$86.64 for an ad in the Cleveland Call-Post on March 15, and \$17.25 to Pinkerton's Detective Agency for detective services on the same date.

For several months, Mr. Louis has been one of Dr. Castro's defenders, and has been quoted as saying Havana is the only place an American Negro can vacation on terms of complete equality.

Altho Mr. Louis earned better than \$4 million as heavy-weight champlon, he now owes \$1.5 million in back income taxes and interest. In the late 1940's, a U. S. Tax Court took away a \$66,000 trust fund set up for his two children and Mr. Louis later was reported to have turned over to Uncle Sam \$124,000 he had earned as a wrestler and a referee.

Mr. Louis showed up as a "spectator" in 1957 when Teamster boss Jimmy Hoffs was tried on charges he had planted a spy in the Senate probing his activities. Mr. Hoffs was acquitted, and Sen. John L. McClellan (D., Ark.) later revealed that the Teamstern had paid Mr. Louis'

particular paper for its 50th anniversary and Mr. Lockhart was interested in becoming a part of our office and we talked about different things and he said, "Well, perhaps I might be able to bring in a big account." I said, "If you can bring in a big account, we want you as a member of our firm."

So he came in and said, "I just received a telegram, a cablegram from Cuba." I said, "No kidding." And he said, "Yes." He said, "They would like to have me come down and discuss a proposition with them during, when the victory celebration takes place." I think it was in January of 1958 or the year before when Castro had invited all of these thousands of newspapermen down to what he called I believe was a Peace Corps, I think.

Mr. Sourwine. Let's get the dates straight. Castro came into power in January of 1959.

Mr. Rowe. Was it 1959?

Mr. Sourvine. Yes.

Mr. Rowe. Well, it was the time. He had all of the newspaper people down there. I think they had it or called it a Truth Corps when they were doing all the shooting and he said, "Would you like to go to Cuba with me." He said, "The government is going to pay the expenses." I said, "Certainly." So he got three tickets, one for himself, one for Mr. Fischer, and one for me. This was December 19th. We went down to Cuba to meet with the Cuban Tourist Commission. We didn't know what

it was all about at that point, but we had certain ideas in our mind which we, of course, would discuss with them once we got there. And we met Dr. Martinez who is a sub-director of tourism in Cuba.

Mr. Sourwine. Is that Dr. Jesus Martinez?

Mr. Rowe. Right. It was around 6:00 o'clock and we met with him at midnight in the Havanna Riviers Hotel. He said he would like to have about thirty guests from America come down for the -- for Christmas and to stay over for the anniversary celebration which would be New Years Eve. We said it was very difficult to get Americans to leave home on Christmas but thought we could arrange it for a New Years celebration. He said, "Fine," and he wanted to know who we would invite. We said certain people. We didn't have the names off-hand that we would have to go over our list and find out whom we thought would be the proper people to invite.

He asked if we could bring Roy Campanella, Jackie Robinson, Willie Mays and Joe Louis. We said we didn't know, that we would see and the meeting ended on that note.

He came back the next afternoon or should I say the next evening and went into the situation again about inviting people. It went from 35 to 50 and they decided that Dr. Castellanos who was head of the Cuban Tourist Commission would send the cablegrams of invitation to the people, to the names we gave them. We didn't have all of the addresses with us and we would

have to send them back to Cuba and he said that when he got back to New York, or when we got back to New York, to give us the names and addresses.

Mr. Sourwine. You did not send the invitations yourselves then?

If Rowe. No, we did not send the invitations but we sent out from America a follow-up so the people we would know, those whom we invited, would know what it was all about.

Mr. Sourwine. You contacted these people yourself?

If . Rowe. We contacted some by phone and some by telegram.

Mr. Sourwine. For instance, Roy Campanella, who got in touch with him?

Mr. Rowe. Mr. Fischer, I believe. Mr. Fischer discussed this with him.

Mr. Sourwine. Willie Mays?

Mr. Rowe. Willie Mays we discussed this with Willie Mays on the phone because he was out of town.

Mr. Sourwine. Jackie Robinson?

Mr. Rowe. We discussed it with him.

Mr. Sourwine. Did those gentlemen go?

Mr. Rowe. Well, Willie Mays said he would go. But at the last minute, he couldn't make it. His wife was ill or something he said and anyway he decided he couldn't make it at the last minute but accepted the invitation.

Roy Campanella felt the trip was too strenuous.

Mr. Sourwine. Did Jackie Robinson go?

Mr. Rowe. No, he said he had to be home with his kids.

Mr. Sourwine. You have a list of those who did go on this trip?

Mr. Rose. Yes, we have.

Mr. Sourvine. Will you offer that for the record at this time?

Mr. Rowe. I can offer it for the record certainly, but they were just people.

Mr. Sourwine. Yes, but you mentioned some of those whom you tried to get and we just want to make a record of who did go.

Mr. Rowe. We have the list.

Senator Keating. May I interrupt, Mr. Chairman?

There is no sinistry in this question. I think we ought to rest on that. The list is not intended to convey anything improper.

Mr. Rowe. Yes, because I am sure these people -- it was just an invitation to a party like we would send out to a party at my home or your home.

Mr. Sourwine. Just an indication.

Mr. Rowe. We have the list.

Senator Dodd. It may be included and made a part of the record, subject to objection.

Senator Cotton. Would the witness prefer it was made a

part of the record, but not made a public part of the record in case the public misunderstood some of these things?

Senator Dodd. Well, I don't know. What is your feeling about that? Do you prefer that it not be made public?

Mr. Rowe. I think, Senator, that I would prefer that because I am sure these people would get all kinds of sinister implications these days about Cuba.

Senator Dodd. We don't need to make it public.
(The document referred to is as follows:)

Mr. Sourwine. All right now, we are back to the time when you had agreed that you were going to go back to the states and furnish a list of these names.

Her was that the whole of it, the agreement or was there any more formal continue at that there

The Rowe. We had a contract, an agreement, a paragraph on that appropriate, the amount of mone that they were going to pay and what the money was going to be for.

Hr. Souwdise. See you effering that contract for the record?

Mr. Rowe. Mes, you may have this contract for the record. It is in Spanish, by the way.

Mr. Sourwine. May that be received, Mr. Chairman, with the instruction that it be translated and the English translation be printed?

Senator Dodd. Yes.

(The document referred to, in Spanish, is as follows:)

Mr. Rowe. The only thing I can understood there it was \$2,000 and \$1,000 was for expenses and \$1,000 was our fee.

Mr. Rowe. No, it was about three days later they gave us a check for 2,000 peros and we didn't know at the time, of course, there was no monetary exchange between America and Cuba and we accepted the 2,000 check in poses. We came back to America and turned it in to my bank and my bank says "Do you want me to make notes on this or give it back to you."

Senator Reating. That is funny to us but not to you.

Mr. Rowe. We were already about \$900 out.

Senator Cotton. What did you do with it?

Mr. Rowe. We called Dr. Martinez and told him the bank would not cash the check and he said, "Well, I am not surprised." He said, "However, we'll make the check good. We will send you a check on the bank of the United States." But we were going back to Cube for the party and we decided rather than to sweat out the mail we would just be on the scene and would then accept the check on the American Bank which they gave us for \$2,000 which covered most of the negotiations on getting these people to Cuba. We ran \$900 over the original agreement which they paid us, oh, I guess it was about a month later because he expressed to us that this was a very poor government and that they did not want to be spending a lot of

money that they couldn't afford. But we received that payment and the party, instead of 50 people, it turned out we had 72 people which we invited because they kept extending the list, kept saying. "Let's just go should and go all out on this."

had a special room, I think, on one of the higher floor in which they invited themselves, a contain amount of outstanding Cubane and the place was decorated with American and Cuban flags. Castro was there and he made a little, a short appech of welcome to the people and the place was quite crowded because he decided to let everybody and even those who didn't have an invitation and wanted to come, they call came in and they served food and what not and the same party business and I think they had a little more television cameras at that point than they have now. It was well-covered. The president was there and Mr. Louis was there with Mrs. Louis. Mrs. Louis was the quietest person in the house. Everybody was having quite a time and we left, I assume, about 2:30 and Castro was still there and the party went on.

Mr. Sourwine. This was a party in celebration of the Cuban Revolutionary Anniversary, was it?

Mr. Rowe. Right.

Mr. Sourwine. It was on a national level in Cuba because Castro was there?

Mr. Rowe. I imagine it was. There were a lot of TV

cameras on. They had the thing back here in America on television. The stowies were carried back here in America -meaning the names of some of some of the guests that attended this affair.

Mr. Sourwine. It was an outstanding public relations stroke, wasn't it?

Mr. Howe. Well, I would say no. As a public relations man I thought it was a great job. I was only sorry I hand't though it up.

Im. Sourvine. All right, go ahead.

Am. Rowe. Well, that was the end of that particular situation and we were the guests and were allowed to stay. They were given three to five days as guests of the government. In other words, the government picked up the hotel bill. They supplied the tickets for transportation and they supplied the feed, but they did not supply anything harder than water to drink. If you wanted anything harder than water to drink you had to buy it yourself.

Mr. Sourvine. They paid all expenses except the hard liquor?

Mr. Rowe. Right, and so we were going to stay over three days after the party. Some people were going to stay five days and the next day we were told that an official of the Cuban Government was going to come over to the hotel to speak with all the invited Americans and they stressed the fact that

they wanted us to invite both white and colored, not just the colored Americans. So there were quite a few white Americans with the party and they had been distributed in all the hotels in Havana. So we had to get them together to be on hand to be greated by that official of the Guban Movemment. They didn't tell up the it was going to be.

mbout ten stelsek, a lot of people were in swimming and me were told that this government official was upstairs in the particular room provided for this in the Havana Hilton Hotel -- wather the Havana Riviera Hotel, to greet us and many of us went up in our bathing suits and some of the girls had on their play suits; the ladies were all quite ready to go out and we went up and to our surprise, of course, it was Castro.

Now this was our first formal introduction to Castro and it was just the American guests that he came in to see.

Mr. Sourwine. This was before the party?

Mr. Rowe. After the party.

Mr. Sourwine. After the party. You had seen him at the party but not a formal introduction.

Mr. Rowe. No formal introduction, you see, and he spoke to us. He discussed the relationship between America and Cuba and he gave us the impression that he was very sorry about this relationship and that thing will be better and we assumed that things would be better because here he was going to spend all this money with us to invite American tourists and we knew

that American tourists would not go to Cuba if there was bad relations between the two governments. We assumed this would be better and we were asked the questions and he answered all the questions and I think he probably stayed there an hour and a half or two hours talking to us and he refterated to us in the talk to stay longer. He said, "I want you to see the people. Go to the different parts of Cuba and find out for yourself what is going on. There will be no guides, no guards, no anything. You just go and do what you want to do and then you will note for yourself."

Some of the people had reservations and wanted to get back. He said, "Don't worry about that. If you have to get back we will supply a plane for you," and of course he did. They chartered a plane to bring back twelve people.

Mr. Fischer. Ten or twelve people.

Im. Rowe. Ton or twelve people who had to get back, who lost their reservations because they decided to stay over and it was after this particular party and after this particular meeting that we then started discussing with Dr. Castellanes and Dr. Martinez this business of inviting tourists to Cuba.

Mr. Sourwine. Now, who is Dr. Castellanos?

Mr. Rowe. Dr. Castellanos is the director of INIT Avenida
Linea y A. INIT is what they call the Tourist Commission in
Cuba and he thought it would be a tremendous idea and the
tremendous thing for them to go into negotiation or rather to

effect a contract with us to do a public relations and promotional job for Cuba to get tourists, people to come to Cuba, both individually and in groups.

Mr. Sourwine. This is of some importance. You were discussing a contract to be public relations counsel, not for Crotro but for Cuba.

Mr. Rowe. That is right, for the Tourist Commission,

Mr. Sourvine. The Tourist Commission of the Republic of Cuba.

Mr. Rowe. Right, I mean as far as the government was concerned, it never entered into the picture at all because we were not political in any way, shape or form and couldn't afford to go into any political type of contract because we won't, you know, we just can't do it. The only thing we know to do politically is to build up a candidate for office.

Senator Keating. I am glad to hear that.

Mr. Rowe. You remember that from my statement.

Senator Keating. The Amsterdam News is very capable.

Mr. Rowe. Let's say you are very kind, Senator.

My wife happens to write a column for the Pittsburgh Courier. Anyway, we discussed the program of how we would go about bringing tourists to Cuba. He was very insistent whereby they wanted to hire our firm to do this job; that they wanted us to do an inter-racial job as far as tourists were concerned. They did not want us to go into the white press or the white

press or daily magazines because they have a \$6 million contract, I believe it was, with Harris & Company of Miami, Florida for that particular phase of American tours. I believe he just sued them. I believe he was going to get \$200,000 and some-odd which they one him. Unfortunately, they lost about \$150,000 and I don't think we are going to be able to --

Mr. Saurwine. They ove you \$150,000?

Mr. Rows. \$150,000 on the contract which we signed with them. That is the balance. In drawing up the contract we were very careful -- in fact, nobody even discussed anything except tours and how we would bring these tourists into Cuba.

Mr. Sourwine. This advertising campaign was to inspire the tours -- you weren't to be a tourist bureau?

Mr. Roue. No.

Mr. Sourwine. You were to carry on a public relations campaign, including advertising in the Megro magazines and newspapers?

Mr. Rowe. Right.

Mr. Sourwine. Inspire a desire among the people to go to Cuba?

Mr. Rowe. Right. I have a couple of the ads which we placed in the paper which you can have for the record.

Mr. Sourwine. May they be recieved, Mr. Chairman? Senator Dodd. Yes.

(The documents referred to are as follows:)

Mr. Sourmine. These are ads propared by you?

Mr. Rove. Right.

No. Sourwine. Unish did run?

Mr. Rowe, Right.

Mr. Sewring. There ald shope sas run?

Mr. Rose. In most of the larger fegre papers -- the Amsterdam News, the Pittsburgh Courier, the Chicago Defender, the Afre-American.

For Sourvine. How big was your advertising budget on this particular account?

Mr. Rowe. The entire budget -- it isn't broken down, but the entire account was \$287,000.

Mr. Sourwine. When you placed these ads, did the Cuban government pay for them or did you obligate yourselves as an agency to pay for them?

Mr. Rowe. We obligated ourselves to pay for them.

Mr. Sourwine. And you subsequently did pay for them?

Mr. Rowe. Yes, we did.

Mr. Sourwine. Did you accept and receive reimbursement from the Cuban Government?

Mr. Rowe. On two occasions, yes, we received two checks from them.

Mr. Sourwine. Do they still owe you money for reimbursement for ads you placed and paid for?

Mr. Rowe. Yes.

Mr. Sourwine. How much?

Mr. Rowe. On the advertising, I think it is a little less than \$5,000.

Mr. Sourwine. And in addition to that, they owe you approximately \$140,000 more as compensation for your part in the campaign?

Mr. Rowe. For fees and additional expenses.

Mr. Sourwine. You didn't receive very much as fees out of this deal then, did you?

Mr. Rowe. Ho.

Mr. Soumdine. Now, was there a second advertising campaign?

Mr. Rowe. Mo, there wasn't a second. We had one prepared but it never went out because we had decided that we were going to resign the account.

Mr. Sourdine. What happened to your magazine advertising?

Mr. Rowe. We weren't going to advertise, only the Johnston publications. All the other magazine advertisements were being taken care of by Harris & Company.

Mr. Sourwine. When was it that you decided that you were going to resign?

Mr. Rowe. Well, we decided we were going to resign in March but we had a six-month clause in our contract.

Mr. Sourwine. That is you had to give six-months' notice?
Mr. Rowe. That's right.

Mr. Sourvine. Did you got that notice in March of 1950?

Mr. Sourvine. I mean did you give that notice in March of 1960?

were going to do this in June because I went out of the country. I went to Mexico and we were going to take care of this matter when I got back because in the first place, we were trying to get the additional money out of them before we let them know we were going to resign because we were on the hook for about \$6,000 or so.

Mr. Sourwine. Did you eventually send a letter of resignation of the account?

Mr. Rowe. I didn't hear you.

Mr. Sourwine. Did you eventually send a letter resigning the account?

Mr. Rowe. Yes, I did.

Mr. Sourwine. When was this?

Mr. Rowe. This was in July -- July 7, 1960.

Mr. Sourwine. Do you have a copy of that letter?

Mr. Rowe. Yes, I do.

Mr. Sourwine. May we have it for the record?

Mr. Rowe. You certainly may.

Mr. Sourwine. May this be received?

Senator Dodd. It may be received.

FM. Sourwine. Now, who signed this letter?

Fire and I would like to read part of it to you.

Sonator Dodd. Co ahead.

PM. Rewe. It is dated July 1980 -- July 7 -- and sent to Dw. Baudilio Castellanes.

"Dear Dr. Castellanes:

In view of the political chess game which has developed into virtually a war of words between our two governments -- America and Cuba -- we regretfully submit our resignation as the public relations representative of the Institute Nacional De La Industria Turistica.

the heated arguments between our two nations which have brought them to the brink of severing relationships. Repercussions of this political strife between your country and ours cannot help but lessen the effectiveness of our noblest efforts on the behalf of the Cuban Tourist Commission. It was the hope of our firm when we entered into a contract with you in February, 1960, that we would have an opportunity to bring about a better relationship between the people of our two countries. At that time we felt that the new leaders of Cuba would take over their politically ravished country with the same human affection and intensity for the rights of humanity that successfully brought them down from the hills of Oriente

Province to the luxury and comfort of Havana, the capital of Cuba. We felt that there would be a strict observance of justice, public faith, and a stury adherence to virtue in public office. We saw the people of Cuba reaching for that something called identity. We heard their leader speaking out things that have long required clarification. But through it all, together in their own land, we believed they would put others in other lands, into perspective, keeping in mind that faith and hope of those who tried to make it so.

"We understood and apprelicated the banning of discrimination in Cuba, and felt prone to publicize Cuba as a new utopia,
where the promise of first-class treatment as first-class
citizens would be a reality for American negroes, who have been
intimate with toll and sorrow, and who have too-leng dreamed
of equality -- in work and play -- with other free men ejoying
respect and dignity.

"However, the conflict of interest of which you are familiar, has continued to multiply and the failure of the INIT to overcome its financial problems leaves us no alternative except to resign."

I tried to express in here the true feeling and the real reason why we relinquished the contract. We had one feeling when we went into the contract and as things progressed, of course, we got another feeling and it was impossible to do a job when one country was talking against another country and it

got to the stage where it sort of like it was becoming a political situation and we stapped out.

Mr. Sourcine. Did the Cubang scoopt your resignation on this contract without any argument?

He. Rowe. Yes, they did. They never did it in writing but they called up when they received the letter and Dr. Castolianes said he was sorry and he would straighten out whatever differences that we had as far as monles that was due us was concerned.

Mr. Sourwine. Did they do that?

Mr. Rowe. No, we haven't heard from him. We didn't hear from him any more.

Mr. Sourwine. What efforts have you made to get your money?

Mr. Rowe. Frankly, we haven't made too much effort. We sent them a report and that was the end of it. I spoke to our firm's lawyer in relationship to the money and he made contact with Harris & Company in Miami to find out just what their lawyers had done and how they went about getting whatever money they are going to receive as a result of the confiscation of the planes which Cuba had here at one time and he is still negotiating this now with the lawyers down there so perhaps something might come out of it as a result of that. Of course, I understand that the money they planes were bringing will bring far more money than is due Harris & Company

which is in excess of \$200,000.

Mr. Sourwine. Are you party to this action?

Mr. Rowe. No, we are not.

Mr. Sourwine. Did you inform the Justice Department of the United States respecting what had happened to your contract?

Day Rome. Yes, we did. We had to fill out the necessary papers just like you have to register, you have to unregister so to speak and we did that and we kept in touch with the Justice Department at each step of the way because when they sent us any number of folders we had to fill them out and send them back. In fact, everything that came from Cuba, even in relationship to the special bonus tours and all that, we first contacted the Justice Department before we did anything about them.

Mr. Sourvine. What is that document you just referred to?
Mr. Rowe. A document that says -- well, it says \$1 bonus
for any hotel in Cuba. In other words, they were giving away
packages.

Mr. Sourvine. Is this part of your publicity or public relations or something that came from Cuba?

Mr. Rowe. This came from Cuba and this is a bulletin they sent us. It had a speech by Dr. Raul Roa before the General Assembly of the United Nations which was made on November 6, 1959.

Mr. Souwwine. Did you distribute copies of that speech?

Mr. Rowe. Mo, we didn't. They sent them to us and we sent a letter to the Department of Justice asking them whether or not and plus a copy of this, asking whether or not this was all right to send out and they wrote us back and said it was political and it was not.

Mr. Sourvine. Hay we have copies of that correspondence? Mr. Newe. Yes, you may.

(The documents referred to ore as follows:)

Mr. Sourwine. Now, I am just a little bit concerned as to this material that has been admitted to the record. I think it is all still there in front of you and I would like to get it separated and physically in the hands of the Committee so that we may be sure about it.

There is your contract; there is the letter to the Department of Justice and their letter of raply. There were two advertisements.

Mr. Rowe. You have everything so far.

Mr. Sourvine. And a letter of resignation.

Mr. Rowe. That is in.

Mr. Sourvine. You showed us two ads. Are they over there?
Mr. Rove. Yes.

Mr. Sourwine. The letter of resignation is over there. There is a list of persons who went on this first trip.

Mr. Rowe. That I haven't got yet.

Mr. Sourwine. That will be furnished, not for the printed record, but for the Committee.

All right, I think that is everything up to now.

Now, was it you or Mr. Louis who talked with Mr. Wartinez on the occasion of this first trip in terms which involved a separation and a conflict between the people of the United States and the Government of the United States?

Mr. Rowe. No, Mr. Louis wasn't in Cuba at that time. It was Mr. Fischer and Mr. Lockhart and myself.

It was Dr. Martinez who said that one of the main things that was wrong was that the American Covernment had the wrong impression about the Cuban Revolution and that the American press was giving the people the wrong impression and that they wanted the people to know that Cubans did not hate Americans and so on down the line.

I told them then that there was no separation between the American people and the American Government; that it was one and the same; that the government was the people, and vice versa. He said, "Be that as it may." We didn't discuss this any further, you see.

Mr. Sourwine. Now, who prepared this contract which you signed with the Cuban Government, your attorneys or the Cuban Government?

Mr. Rowe. The Cuban Government prepared the contract and our attorneys just looked it over and said it was all right, that it was in keeping.

Mr. Sourwine. Mr. Louis, on the occasion when you went down to Cuba, when you went on business, with whom did you talk?

Mr. Barrow. Well, I talked with Dr. Benavides.

Mr. Sourwine. Who is he?

Mr. Barrow. He is himself a member of the Tourist Commission.

Mr. Rowe. He is the head. Enrique Benavides is a colored Cuban who is in charge of the special markets for the Cuban

Tourist Commission.

Mr. Sourwine. Do you know if he is any relation to the famous Manuel Benavides?

Mr. Rowe. I think there is a family line some place. I am not too sure because at that particular time we had a biographical sketch. We have a biographical sketch if you would like to have it.

Mr. Sourvine. Yes. May that be admitted, Mr. Chairman? Senator Dodd. Yes.

Volume 1 contains testimony obtained during an Open Session of the Committee.

In the Open Session, the witnesses indicated that they were associated with a New York public relations firm that had entered into an agreement with the Cuban Tourist Commission which called for the firm to arrange for favorable publicity for the purpose of developing tourism in Cuba. They also testified that the firm had registered with the Department of Justice, pointed out they had severed their relationship with the Cuban agency with the increase of tension between the United States and Cuba, and claimed that the Cubans still owe their firm money for services rendered.

The testimony contained no information not already known to the Bureau and highlights of the testimony already appeared in the press.

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Castro's Cure government has joined in the long-standing effort of international communism to encourage radial troubles in the United States, Chairman James O. Eastland of the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee said today in releasing the latest in the subcommittee's series on "Communist Threat to the United States through the Caribbean."

The publication includes a previously unpublished staff study titled "Cuba and the American Negro," which documents Cuba's active participation in the traditional Communist project aimed at "subverting the American Negro against his own government."

"Thus far," the study points out, "it is evident Fidel Castro and his Communist henchmen have been unsuccessful in embroiling American Negroes in their nefarious designs."

The printed document, which is Part 11 of the subcommittee series, is the testimony of former heavyweight champion Joe Louis and his business partner, William Rowe.

Senator Thomas J. Dodd, vice-chairman of the subcommittee, presided over the hearing. Senators Kenneth Keating (R-N.Y.) and Norris Cotton (R-N.H.) took part in the questioning.

Louis and Rowe told the subcommittee how Castro hired their public relations firm to encourage American Negroes to vacation in Cuba. Advertisements placed by the firm in prominent Negro newspapers stated that there was "no segregation" and that Negroes in Cuba had "full citizenship."

Less than six months later, Louis and Rome cancelled their contract when they saw the trend of events in Cuba. The Cuban government had contracted to pay the firm \$287,000 for its work, but the Castro who boasted of "full citizenship" for Negroes has yet to make "full payment" on the contract. Castro still owes the firm \$150,000, and Louis and Rowe told the committee they spent \$6,000 more on newspaper advertisements for Cuba than they received in total payments.

The staff study published with the hearing states that within the United States "the bulk of the campaign to popularize Cuba among Negroes is carried on by the Pair Play for Cuba Committee," an organization shown by the Internal Security Subcommittee to be financed substantially by the Castro government.


"Its (Fair Play for Cuba) actual chairman is Richard Gibson, a Negro who invoked the fifth amount in refusing to answer questions regarding his activity," the study says. "He was one of eight Negroes among the founders of the committee. The others included Frank London Brown, John Killens, and Julian Mayfield: Joanne Alileen Grant, who has been listed as the secretary of the Pair Play Committee, a Negress, invoked the fifth amendment on October 10, 1960, before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee in refusing to answer all questions regarding her Communist Party affiliations."

The study said that Richard Gibson "has estimated that about one-third of the 3,000 members belonging to the Pair Play for Cuba Committee were Negroes."

Also documented in the study are the activities, in the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, of Robert F. Williams, NAACP chairman in Monroe, N.C., who was suspended for six months in 1959 by the NAACP for urging Negroes to "fight violence with violence."

Among other acts of Williams, the study describes his speech to the Columbia University Fair Play for Cuba Committee on February 10, 1961, where he said: "I don't know what kind of 'ism' they have in Cuba today, but whatever it is, we could use a little of it in the United States." This speech "was apparently part of an FPCC tour covering Indiana University, Antioch College, Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco, Seattle, Portland, Vancouver, and Denver," the study says.

"In his neweletter, the Crusader, Williams has carried to his Negro leaders a glowing description of Castro's agrarian reform progam."

The subcommittee met, pursuant to call, at 10:35 a.m., in room 2820, New Senate Office Building, Senator Thomas J. Dodd presiding.

Present: Senators Dodd, Norris Cotton, and Kenneth B. Keating.

Also present: J. G. Sourwine, chief counsel; Benjamin Mandel, research director; Frank Schroeder, chief investigator.

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Senator Dopp. The hearing will be in order.

Mr. Counsel?

Mr. Sourwine. Mr. Joe Louis, Mr. Chairman, and Mr. Louis is accompanied by Mr. William Rowe, as the chairman knows from the executive session. I would respectfully suggest that both men be

sworn. Their stories will supplement one another.
Senator Dopp. You will both rise and raise your right hands. Do you solemnly swear that the testimony given before the subcommittee will be the truth and nothing but the truth, so help you God? Mr. Barrow. Yes, I do.

Mr. Rowe. I do.

TESTIMONY OF JOE LOUIS BARROW AND WILLIAM ROWE

Mr. Sourwine. Mr. Louis, what is your full name?

Mr. Barrow. Joe Louis Barrow. Mr. Sourwing. And your address?

Mr. BARROW. 1711 Wellington Road, North Inglewood, Calif.

Mr. Sourwine. What is your present business?

Mr. BARROW. Public relations.

Mr. Sourwing. You were the heavyweight champion of the world? Mr. Barrow. Yes, I was.

Mr. Sourwing. For how long and from what period and until what

Mr. BARROW. From 1937 until 1948.

Mr. Sourwing. Now, Mr. Rowe, what is your full name!

Mr. Rows. William L. Rows.

Mr. Sourwing. And your present address?

Mr. Rows. 1 Fenamore Road, New Rochelle, N.Y.

Mr. Sourwine. Your business or profession? Mr. Rowe. Public relations.

Mr. Sourwine. You and Mr. Joe Louis Barrow are associated !

Mr. Rowe. Yes, I am president of the firm with which he is asso-

Mr. Sourwine. Mr. Louis, in the course of this committee's hearings we have dealt to some extent with recent events in Cuba. Have you been in Cuba?

Mr. Barrow. I was in Cuba in 1959.

Mr. Sourwing. Did you go there for business or for pleasure?

Mr. Barrow. My first trip was for pleasure.

Mr. Sourwing. You were there more than once Mr. Barrow. I was there again in January of 1960.

Mr. Sourwine. I think this latter trip was a business trip, sir?

Mr. BARROW. It was.

Mr. Sourwine. What was the purpose of this trip?
Mr. Barrow. Down there with Al Lockhart who also was an associate in the Louis, Rowe & Lockhart official offices, to negotiate a contract with the Tourist Commission.

Mr. Sourwine. The Tourist Commission of Cuba?

Mr. BARROW. Right.
Mr. Sourwing. What was the nature of this contract, Mr. Louis?

Mr. Barrow. Well, the Tourist Commission of Cuba wanted to enter into an agreement with our firm to develop tourists to come to Cuba.

Mr. Sourwine. What kind of tourists!

Mr. Barrow. Just American tourists to come to Cuba.

Mr. Sourwine. I mean were you conducting tours, were you arranging package deals where a number would come!

Mr. Barrow. No, we weren't arranging package deals—just we would put ads in the Negro publications, radio, and so forth.

Mr. Sourwing. You were just trying to get individuals to go!

Mr. BARROW. Right.

Mr. Sourwine. Not necessarily groups?

Mr. Barrow. Right.

Mr. Sourwine. Now, who conducted these negotiations in Cuba, you or Mr. Rowe!

Mr. Barrow. Al Lockhart and Mr. Rowe. At the time I was down there I was only down there with Mr. Lockhart.

Mr. Sourwine. Mr. Rowe, did you initiate these negotiations or

did someone come to you to initiate them !

Mr. Rows. No, it was brought to our office by Mr. Lockhart. Mr. Lockhart was a friend of mine and he was the advertising director of the Amsterdam News at that particular time.

Mr. Sourwing. That is a New York newspaper!

Mr. Rows. Yes. I was doing the public relations for that particular paper for its 50th anniversary and Mr. Lockhart was interested in becoming a part of our office and we talked about different things and he said. Well, perhaps I might be able to bring in a big account." I said, "If you can bring in a big account, we want you as a member of

So he came in and said, "I just received a telegram, a cablegram from Cuba." I said, "No kidding." And he said, "Yes." He said, "They would like to have me come down and discuss a proposition with them during—when the victory celebration takes place." I think it was in January of 1958 or the year before when Castro had invited all of these thousands of newspapermen down to what he called. I believe, a Peace Corps, I think.

Mr. Sourwine. Let's get the dates straight. Castro came into power in January of 1959.

Mr. Rowe. Was it 1959? Mr. Sourwine. Yes.

Mr. Rowe. Well, it was the time. He had all of the newspaper people down there. I think they had it or called it a Truth Corps when they were doing all the shooting and he said, "Would you like to go to Cuba with me?" He said, "The government is going to pay the expenses." I said, "Certainly." So he got three tickets, one for himself, one for Mr. Fisher, and one for me. This was December 19. We went down to Cuba to meet with the Cuban Tourist Commission. We didn't know what it was all about at that point, but we had certain ideas in our mind which we, of course, would discuss with them once we got there. And we met Dr. Martinez, who is a subdirector of tourism in Cuba.

Mr. Sourwing. Is that Dr. Jesus Martinez?

Mr. Rows. Right. It was around 6 o'clock and we met with him at midnight in the Havana Riviera Hotel. He said he would like to have about 30 guests from America come down for Christmas and to stay over for the anniversary celebration which would be New Year's Eve. We said it was very difficult to get Americans to leave home on Christmas but thought we could arrange it for a New Year's celebration. He said, "Fine," and he wanted to know whom we would invite. We said certain people. We didn't have the names offhand that we would have to go over our list and find out who we thought would be the proper people to invite.

He asked if we could bring Roy Campanella, Jackie Robinson, Willie Mays, and Joe Louis. We said we didn't know, that we would

see, and the meeting ended on that note.

He came back the next afternoon or should I say the next evening and went into the situation again about inviting people. It went from 35 to 50 and they decided that Dr. Castellanos, who was head of the Cuban Tourist Commission, would send the cablegrams of invitation to the people, to the names we gave them. We didn't have all of the addresses with us and we would have to send them back to Cuba and he said that when he got back to New York, or when we got to New York, to give him the names and addresses.

Mr. Sourwing. You did not send the invitations yourselves, then? Mr. Rowr. No, we did not send the invitations but we sent out from America a followup so the people we would know, those whom

we invited, would know what it was all about.

Mr. Sourwing. You contacted these people yourself?
Mr. Rows. We contacted some by phone and some by telegram. Mr. Sourwing. For instance, Roy Campanella, who got in touch

Mr. Rows. Mr. Fisher, I believe, Mr. Fisher discussed this with

Mr. Sourwine. Willie Mays?

Mr. Rows. Willie Mays, we discussed this with Willie Mays on the phone because he was out of town.

Mr. Sourwing. Jackie Robinson ? Mr. Rowz. We discussed it with him.

Charles Fisher, a former partner of Louis & Rowe, who had handled the Cuban ac-

Mr. Sourwine. Did those gentlemen go?

Mr. Rows. Well, Willie Mays said he would go. But at the last minute, he couldn't make it. His wife was ill or something, he said, and anyway he decided he couldn't make it at the last minute but accepted the invitation.

Roy Campanella felt the trip was too strenuous.

Mr. Sourwine. Did Jackie Robinson go?

Mr. Rows. No, he said he had to be home with his kids.
Mr. Sourwine. You have a list of those who did go on this trip?

Mr. Rowe. Yes, we have.

Mr. Sourwing. Will you offer that for the record at this time? Mr. Rows. I can offer it for the record, certainly, but they were just people.

Mr. Sourwine. Yes, but you mentioned some of those whom you tried to get and we just want to make a record of who did go.

Mr. Rows. We have the list.

Senator Keating. May I interrupt, Mr. Chairman!

There is no sinister implication in this question. I think we ought to rest on that. The list is not intended to convey anything improper.

Mr. Rows. Yes, because I am sure these people—it was just an invitation to a party like we would send out to a party at my home or your home.

Mr. Sourwine. Just an invitation.

Mr. Rows. We have the list.

Senator Dopp. It may be included and made a part of the record,

subject to objection.

Senator Corron. Would the witness prefer it was made a part of the record, but not made a public part of the record in case the public misunderstood some of these things !

Senator Dopp. Well, I don't know. What is your feeling about that?

Do you prefer that it not be made public?

Mr. Rowe. I think, Senator, that I would prefer that because I am sure these people would get all kinds of sinister implications these days about Cuba.

Senator Dopp. We don't need to make it public.

The document referred to was marked "Exhibit No. 58" and or-

dered retained in subcommittee files, but not made public.)

Mr. Sourwine. All right, now, we are back to the time when you had agreed that you were going to go back to the States and furnish a list of these names.

Now was that the whole of it, the agreement, or was there any more

formal contract at that time?

Mr. Rows. We had a contract, an agreement, a paragraph on that greement, the amount of money that they were going to pay and what the money was going to be for.

Mr. Sourwing. Are you offering that contract for the record!

Mr. Rows. Yes, you may have this contract for the record. It is in

Spanish, by the way

Mr. Sourwine. May that be received, Mr. Chairman, with the instruction that it be translated and the English translation be printed? Senator Dodd. Yes.

The document given the subcommittee was not, in fact, a contract, but a letter transmitting certain sums for work done by the firm.

(The document referred to was marked "Exhibit No. 59" and an English translation reads as follows:)

Revolutionary Government,

Havena, December 21, 1959.

Messra. Louis & Rows, Inc.

DEAR SIES: Attached please find a check [made out] in the name of that [your] company in the amount of two thousand 00/100 (\$2,000.00); \$1,000.00 expenses and \$1,000.00 [professional] fees for publicity in the United States for this organization.

Sincerely yours,

(S) JESUS MONTANE OROPESA, Subdirector of the NITI.

Translated by William Springer, Library of Congress.

Mr. Rows. The only thing I can understand there, it was \$2,000, and \$1,000 was for expenses and \$1,000 was our fee.

Mr. Sourwing. Did you receive that money at that time?

Mr. Rows. No, it was about 3 days later they gave us a check for 2,000 pesos and we didn't know at the time, of course, there was no monetary exchange between America and Cuba and we accepted the 2,000 check in pesos. We came back to America and turned it in to my bank and my bank says, "Do you want me to make notes on this or give it back to you?" They said they couldn't cash it.

Senator Keating. That is funny to us but not to you.

Mr. Rowe. We were already about \$900 out. Senator Corron. What did you do with it?

Mr. Rowe. We called Dr. Martinez and told him the bank would not cash the check and he said, "Well, I am not surprised." He said, "However, we'll make the check good. We will send you a check on the bank of the United States." But we were going back to Cuba for the party and we decided rather than to sweat out the mail we would just be on the scene and would then accept the check on the American bank which they gave us for \$2,000 which covered most of the negotiations on getting these people to Cuba. We ran \$900 over the original agreement which they paid us, oh, I guess it was about a month later, because he expressed to us that this was a very poor government and that they did not want to be spending a lot of money that they couldn't afford. But we received that payment, and the party, instead of 50 people, it turned out we had 72 people which we invited because they kept extending the list, kept saying, "Let's just go ahead and go all out on this."

The party took place at the Havana Hilton Hotel. They had a special room, I think, on one of the higher floors, in which they invited themselves, a certain amount of outstanding Cubans and the place was decorated with American and Cuban flags. Castro was there and he made a little—a short speech of welcome to the people and the place was quite crowded because he decided to let everybody in, even those who didn't have an invitation and wanted to come. They all came in and they served food and what not and the same party business and I think they had a little more television cameras at that point than they have now. It was well covered. The President

was there and Mr. Louis was there with Mrs. Louis. Mrs. Louis was the quietest person in the house. Everybody was having quite a time and we left, I assume, about 2:30 and Castro was still there and the

Mr. Sounways. This was a party in celebration of the Cuban revo-

lutionary anniversary, was it?

Mr. Rows. Right.

Mr. Sourwine. It was on a national level in Cuba because Castro

Mr. Rowe. I imagine it was. There were a lot of TV cameras on. They had the thing back here in America on television. The stories were carried back here in America-meaning the names of some of the guests that attended this affair.

Mr. Sourwine. It was an outstanding public relations stroke;

wasn't it!

Mr. Rows. Well, I would say so. As a public relations man I thought it was a great job. I was only sorry I hadn't thought it up.

Mr. Sourwine. All right, go ahead.

Mr. Rows. Well, that was the end of that particular situation and we were the guests and were allowed to stay. They were given 3 to 5 days as guests of the Government. In other words, the Government picked up the hotel bill. They supplied the tickets for transportation and they supplied the food, but they did not supply anything harder than water to drink. If you wanted anything harder than water to drink you had to buy it yourself.

Mr. Sourwing. They paid all expenses except the hard liquor!

Mr. Rowz. Right, and so we were going to stay over 3 days after the party. Some people were going to stay 5 days and the next day we were told that an official of the Cuban Government was going to come over to the hotel to speak with all the invited Americans and they stressed the fact that they wanted us to invite both white and colored, not just the colored Americans. So there were quite a few white Americans with the party and they had been distributed in all the hotels in Havana. So we had to get them together to be on hand to be greeted by this official of the Cuban Government. They didn't tell us who it was going to be.

About 10 o'clock, a lot of people were in swimming and we were told that this Government official was upstairs in the particular room provided for this in the Havana Hilton Hotel-rather the Havana Riviera Hotel-to greet us and many of us went up in our bathing suits and some of the girls had on their play suits; the ladies were all quite ready to go out and we went up and to our surprise, of course,

it was Castro.

Now this was our first formal introduction to Castro and it was just the American guests that he came in to see.

Mr. Sourwine. This was before the party!

Mr. Rows. After the party.

Mr. Sourwing. After the party. You had seen him at the party

but not a formal introduction

Mr. Rows. No formal introduction, you see, and he spoke to us. He discussed the relationship between America and Cuba and he gave us the impression that he was very sorry about this relationship and that things will be better and we assumed that things would be better because here he was going to spend all this money with us to

invite American tourists and we knew that American tourists would not go to Cuba if there was bad relations between the two Governments. We assumed this would be better and we asked questions and he answered all the questions and I think he probably stayed there an hour and a half or 2 hours talking to us and he reiterated to us in the talk to stay longer. He said, "I want you to see the people. Go to the different parts of Cuba and find out for yourselves what is going on. There will be no guides, no guards, no anything. You just go and do what you want to do and then you will know for yourself."

Senator Doop. I have here a preliminary study by the subcommittee staff on the subject "Cuba and the American Negro." I think I shall order it printed as an appendix in connection with this hearing.

Mr. Rowe, will you continue please?

Mr. Rows. Some of the people had reservations and wanted to get back. He said, "Don't worry about that. If you have to get back we will supply a plane for you," and of course he did. They chartered

a plane to bring back 12 people.

Mr. Fisher. Ten or twelve people.

Mr. Rowe. Ten or twelve people who had to get back, who lost their reservations because they decided to stay over and it was after this particular party and after this particular meeting that we then started discussing with Dr. Castellanos and Dr. Martinez this business of inviting tourists to Cuba.

Mr. Sourwine. Now, who is Dr. Castellanos?

Mr. Rowe. Dr. Castellanos is the director of INIT, Avenida Linea A. INIT is what they call the Tourist Commission in Cuba and he thought it would be a tremendous idea and the tremendous thing for them to go into negotiation or rather to effect a contract with us to do a public relations and promotional job for Cuba to get tourists, people to come to Cuba, both individually and in groups.

Mr. Sourwine. This is of some importance. You were discussing a contract to be public relations counsel, not for Castro but for Cuba.

Mr. Rowe. That is right, for the Tourist Commission.
Mr. Sourwine. The Tourist Commission of the Republic of Cuba.
Mr. Rowe. Right. I mean as far as the Government was concerned, it never entered into the picture at all because we were not political in any way, shape, or form and couldn't afford to go into any political type of contract because we won't, you know, we just can't do it. The only thing we know to do politically is to build up a candidate for office.

Senator Keating. I am glad to hear that.

Mr. Rows. You remember that from my statement.

Senator Krating. The Amsterdam News is very capable.

Mr. Rowe. Let me say you are very kind, Senator. My wife happens to write a column for the Pittsburgh Courier.

Anyway, we discussed the program of how we would go about bringing tourists to Cuba. He was very insistent whereby they wanted to hire our firm to do this job; that they wanted us to do an interracial job as far as tourists were concerned. They did not want us to go into the white press or the daily magazines because they have a \$6 million contract, I believe it was, with Harris & Co.,

The document is printed at p. 782. 48854—61—pt. 11-

Mr. Sourwine. They owe you \$150,000?

Mr. Rowz. \$150,000 on the contract which we signed with them. That is the balance. In drawing up the contract we were very careful—in fact, nobody even discussed anything except tours and how we would bring these tourists into Cuba.

Mr. Sourwing. This advertising campaign was to inspire the

tours—you weren't to be a tourist bureau?

Mr. Rowe. No.

Mr. Sourwing. You were to carry on a public relations campaign, including advertising in the Negro magazines and newspapers?

Mr. Rowr. Right.

Mr. Sourwine. Inspire a desire among the people to go to Cuba? Mr. Rowe. Right. I have a couple of the ads which we placed in the paper which you can have for the record.

Mr. Sourwine. May they be received, Mr. Chairman

Senator Dopp. Yes.

Mr. Rowe. Right.

Mr. Sourwing. Which did run?

Mr. Rown. Right.

Mr. Sourwing. Where did these ads run?
Mr. Rowg. In most of the larger Negro papers—the Amsterdam
News, the Pittsburgh Courier, the Chicago Defender, the Afro-American.

Mr. Sourwine. How big was your advertising budget on this particular account?

Mr. Rowe. The entire budget—it isn't broken down, but the entire

account was \$287,000.

Mr. Sourwine. When you placed these ads, did the Cuban Government pay for them or did you obligate yourselves as an agency to pay for them?

Mr. Rowe. We obligated ourselves to pay for them.

Mr. Sourwine. And you subsequently did pay for them?

Mr. Rowe. Yes, we did.

Mr. Sourwing. Did you accept and receive reimbursement from the Cuban Government?

Mr. Rowe. On two occasions, yes, we received two checks from them. Mr. Sourwine. Do they still owe you money for reimbursement for ads you placed and paid for?

Mr. Rowe. Yes.

Mr. Sourwine. How much?

Mr. Rows. On the advertising, I think it is a little less than \$6,000. Mr. Sourwine. And in addition to that, they owe you approximately \$140,000 more as compensation for your part in the campaign?

Mr. Rowe. For fees and additional expenses.

Mr. Sourwing. You didn't receive very much as fees out of this deal, then, did you

Mr. Rowe. No.

Mr. Sourwing. Now, was there a second advertising campaign?

Mr. Rowe. No, there wasn't a second. We had one prepared but it never went out because we had decided that we were going to resign

Mr. Sourwine. What happened to your magazine advertising?

Mr. Rowr. We weren't going to advertise, only the Johnston publications. All the other magazine advertisements were being taken care of by Harris & Co.

Mr. Sourwine. When was it that you decided that you were going

Mr. Rows. Well, we decided we were going to resign in March but we had a 6-month clause in our contract.

Mr. Sourwine. That is you had to give 6 months' notice?

Mr. Rowe. That's right.

Mr. Sourwine. Did you give that notice in March of 1960?

Mr. Rows. No, we didn't give them notice on that. We were going to do this in June because I went out of the country. I went to Mexico and we were going to take care of this matter when I got back because, in the first place, we were trying to get the additional money out of them before we let them know we were going to resign, because we were on the hook for about \$6,000 or so.

Mr. Sourwine. Did you eventually send a letter of resignation of

the account?

Mr. Rows. I didn't hear you.

Mr. Sourwine. Did you eventually send a letter resigning the

Mr. Rowe. Yes, I did. Mr. Sourwine. When was this?

Mr. Rowe. This was in July—July 7, 1960.

Mr. Sourwing. Do you have a copy of that letter?

Mr. Rowe. Yes, I do.

Mr. Sourwine. May we have it for the record?

Mr. Rowe. You certainly may.
Mr. Sourwine. May this be received?
Senator Dopp. It may be received.

DEAB DR. CASTELLANOS: In view of the political chess game, which has developed into virtually a war of words between our two governments—America and Cuba, we regretfully submit our resignation as the public relations representative of the Instituto Nacional de la Industria Turistica.

There can be no question as to the titanic nature of the heated arguments between our two nations which have brought them to the brink of severing relationship. Repercussions of this political strife between your country and ours cannot help but lessen the effectiveness of our noblest efforts on the behalf of the Cuban Tourist Commission. It was the hope of our firm, when we entered into a contract with you in February 1960, that we would have an opportunity to bring about a better relationship between the people of our two countries. At that time, we felt that the new leaders of Cuba would take over their politically ravished country with the same human affection and intensity for the rights of humanity that successfuly brought them down from the hills of Oriente Province to the luxury and comfort of Havana, the capital of Cuba. We felt that there would be a strict observance of justice, public faith, and a sturdy adherence to virtue in public office. We saw the people of Cuba reaching for that something called identity. We heard their leaders speaking out things that have long required clarification. But through it all, together in their own land, we believed they would put others in other lands into proper perspective, keeping in mind the faith and hope of those who died to make it 80.

We understood and appreciated the banning of discrimination in Cuba, and felt prone to publicize Cuba as a new Utopia, where the promise of first-class treatment as first-class citizens would be a reality for American Negroes, who have been intimate with toil and sorrow, and who have too long dreamed of equality—in work and play—with other freemen enjoying respect and dignity.

equality—in work and play—with other freemen enjoying respect and dignity. However, the conflict of interest, of which you are familiar, has continued to multiply, and the failure of the (INIT) to overcome its financial problems leaves us no alternative except to resign. Mr. Lockhart, the Account Executive, will be in touch with you to effect the final closeout.

It was a tremendous pleasure working with you and your staff, and being able to visit Cuba as INIT's Representative. It is heartbreaking to have to sever our financial relationship, and I hope it will be compensated by the continuation of our friendship. I am sincere when I repeat that I hope that the day is not too far in the distant when our two countries can see eye to eye, and shake hands instead of fists.

Mr. Lockhart's report will show that in view of the pressures and the job we tried to do put us in the red in excess of the budgets we received several months ago, some \$5,000-\$6,000. In addition, there is a fee of \$6,250 due on the basis of our signed agreement. I do hope that once the report is complete that this amount will be forthcoming.

In closing, I would like to say that we terminate this agreement with no rancor or regrets, but with the hope that soon we can get together again; and that there will be no obstacles to prevent us from doing the kind of job that all of us are aware can be done for so fine a country and such wonderful recoile.

Mr. Sourwine. Now, who signed this letter?

Mr. Rowe. I signed the letter as the president of the firm and I would like to read part of it to you.

Senator Dopp. Go ahead. Mr. Rowe. It is dated July 1960—July 7—and sent to Dr. Baudilio Castellanos.

DEAR DR. CASTELLANOS: In view of the political chess game which has developed into virtually a war of words between our two governments—America and Cuba—we regretfully submit our resignation as the public relations repre-

sentative of the Instituto Nacional de la Industria Turistica.

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However, the conflict of interest of which you are familiar, has continued to

multiply and the failure of the INIT to overcome its financial problems leaves

us no alternative except to resign.

I tried to express in here the true feeling and the real reason why we relinquished the contract. We had one feeling when we went into the contract and as things progressed, of course, we got another feeling and it was impossible to do a job when one country was talking. against another country and it got to the stage where it was sort of like it was becoming a political situation and we stepped out.

Mr. Sourwine. Did the Cubans accept your resignation on this con-

tract without any argument?

Mr. Rows. Yes, they did. They never did it in writing but they called up when they received the latter and Dr. Castellanos said he was sorry and he would straighten out whatever differences that we had as far as moneys that was due us was concerned.

Mr. Sourwine. Did they do that?

Mr. Rows. No, we haven't heard from him. We didn't hear from

him any more.

Mr. Sourwing. What efforts have you made to get your money? Mr. Rowe. Frankly, we haven't made too much effort. We sent them a report and that was the end of it. I spoke to our firm's lawyer in relationship to the money and he made contact with Harris & Co. in Miami to find out just what their lawyers had done and how they went about getting whatever money they are going to receive as a result of the confiscation of the planes which Cuba had here at one time and he is still negotiating this now with the lawyers down there so perhaps something might come out of it as a result of that. Of course, I understand that the money the planes were bringing will bring far more money than is due Harris & Co. which is in excess of \$200,000.

Mr. Sourwine. Are you party to this action?

Mr. Rowe. No, we are not.

Mr. Sourwing. Did you inform the Justice Department of the United States respecting what had happened to your contract?

Mr. Rows. Yes, we did. We had to fill out the necessary papers just like you have to register, you have to unregister so to speak and we did that and we kept in touch with the Justice Department at each step of the way because when they sent us any number of folders we had to fill them out and send them back. In fact, everything that came from Cuba, even in relationship to the special bonus tours and all that, we first contacted the Justice Department before we did anything about them.

Mr. Sourwine. What is that document you just referred to?

Mr. Rowe. A document that says—well, it says \$1 bonus for any hotel in Cuba. In other words, they were giving away packages.

Mr. Sourwing. Is this part of your publicity or public relations or

something that came from Cuba?

Mr. Rowe. This came from Cuba and this is a bulletin they sent us. It had a speech by Dr. Raul Roa before the General Assembly of the United Nations which was made on November 6, 1959.

Mr. Sourwine. Did you distribute copies of that speech? Mr. Rowe. No, we didn't. They sent them to us and we sent a letter to the Department of Justice asking them whether or not, and plus a copy of this asking whether or not this was all right to send out and they wrote us back and said it was political and it was not.

Mr. Sourwing. May we have copies of that correspondence?

Mr. Rowe. Yes, you may.

Gentlemen: The ending of the agency relationship with the Instituto Nacional de la Industria Turistica, Habana, Cuba, as stated in your letter of July 8, 1960, will permit the termination of your registration under the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended, provided you file a final statement in accordance with rule 260 thereunder.

The final statement should be submitted on the enclosed forms and should cover the period from April 6, 1960, to the date on which the agency relationship ended. It should give a full description of all activities performed during that period on behalf of the foreign principal as well as a detailed accounting of all funds received or expended in connection with these activities. This state-

ment must be filed in duplicate.

In view of the termination of your connection with the Cuban tourist agency, the inquiry made in your letter of June 24, 1960, concerning the dissemination of literature on its behalf will not require a detailed reply. For your information, however, the material submitted is considered political propaganda and its dissemination within the United States and Indiana. its dissemination within the United States would require compliance with the filing, labeling, and reporting requirements of section 4 of the act and the rules and regulations thereunder. Mr. Sourwing. Now, I am just a little bit concerned as to this material that has been admitted to the record. I think it is all still there in front of you and I would like to get it separated and physically in the hands of the committee so that we may be sure about it.

There is your contract; there is the letter to the Department of Jus-

tice and their letter of reply. There were two advertisements.

Mr. Rowe. You have everything so far. Mr. Sourwing. And a letter of resignation.

Mr. Rows. That is in.

Mr. Sourwine. You showed us two ads. Are they over there?

Mr. Rowe. Yes.

Mr. Sourwine. The letter of resignation is over there. There is a list of persons who went on this first trip.
Mr. Rowe. That I haven't got yet.

Mr. Sourwing. That will be furnished, not for the printed record, but for the committee.

All right, I think that is everything up to now.

Now, was it you or Mr. Louis who talked with Mr. Martinez, on the occasion of this first trip, in terms which involved a separation and a conflict between the people of the United States and the Government of the United States

Mr. Rowe. No. Mr. Louis wasn't in Cuba at that time. It was Mr.

Fisher and Mr. Lockhart and myself.

It was Dr. Martinez who said that one of the main things that was wrong was that the American Government had the wrong impression about the Cuban revolution and that the American press was giving the people the wrong impression and that they wanted the people to know that Cubans did not hate Americans and so on down the line.

I told them then that there was no separation between the American people and the American Government; that it was one and the same; that the Government was the people, and vice versa. He said,

"Be that as it may." We didn't discuss this any further, you see.
Mr. Sourwing. Now, who prepared this contract which you signed with the Cuban Government, your attorneys or the Cuban Govern-

Mr. Rowe. The Cuban Government prepared the contract and our attorneys just looked it over and said it was all right, that it was in Mr. Sourwine. Mr. Louis, on the occasion when you went down to

Cuba, when you went on business, with whom did you talk?
Mr. Barrow. Well, I talked with Dr. Benavides.

Mr. Sourwing. Who is he?

Mr. Barrow. He is himself a member of the tourist commission. Mr. Rows. He is the head. Enrique Benavides is a colored Cuban who is in charge of the special markets for the Cuban Tourist Commission.

Mr. Sourwing. Do you know if he is any relation to the famous

Manuel Benavides #

Mr. Rows. I think there is a family line some place. I am not too sure because at that particular time we had a biographical sketch. We have a biographical sketch if you would like to have it.

Mr. Sourwine. Yes. May that be admitted, Mr. Chairman?

Senator Dopp. Yes.

The document referred to was marked "Exhibit No. 63" and reads as follows:)

EXHIBIT No. 63

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH, ENRIQUE BENAVIDES, DIRECTOR OF SPECIAL MARKET PROMOTION. DEPARTMENT OF THE CUBAN TOURIST COMMISSION

Enrique Benavides, 34 years old, married. Studied Social Science and Law at the University of Havana. Possessor of a Bachelor's Degree. He was a classmate and is a close friend of Dr. Fidel Castro. He was a member of the Revolutionary Movement in the struggle against Batista and is today a member of the Revolutionary Government. He was the foremost leader in the planning and the eventual abolition of all forms of discrimination in Cuba.

He is the former head of all the public beaches of Cuba. He was Captain during the revolution, at which time he organized an integrated revolutionary league, which worked within the cities of Cuba to aid the revolutionary armed forces. He is at present a member of the Revolutionary Government and Director of Special Market Promotion Department of the Cuban Tourist Commission. He is the Secretary General of the Gastronomic and Touristic Industry Union.

APRIL 15, 1960.

Senator Dodd. I am sorry but I have to leave because I have made

another engagement that I must fulfill.

I want to thank you, Mr. Louis and Mr. Rowe and Mr. Fisher, for helping us unravel this whole story. We have been working on it for some time and I will ask Senator Keating if he will preside here in my absence.

Mr. Sourwine. What was the nature of the discussion with Mr.

Benavides, Mr. Louis?

Mr. Barrow. Well, to tell the truth I didn't do any talking at all about contracts or that the condition that we were going to bring the tourists to Cuba on because that was the part we left up to Bill Rowe and Al Lockhart. So I just started the conversation about it, what we intend to do for them, and Lockhart took it on from there.

Mr. Sourwine. You were both present?

Mr. Barrow. I was just there and started the conversation and I went out on the balcony and at no time did I stay and listen to the conversation on the idea on how they were going to develop the tourists.

Senator Keating (now presiding). Is that January 1960?

Mr. Barrow. January 16, 1960.

Senator Keating. You were not there after that?

Mr. Barrow. No, I was there on the 29th of December 1959 and January 16 of 1960. I never went back.

Mr. Sourwing. What did you, yourself, do in connection with the performance of this contract, Mr. Louis?

Mr. Barrow. Nothing. Mr. Sourwine. Mr. Rowe, what did you, yourself, do in connection with the performance of this contract?

Mr. Rowe. Well, more or less I drew up the month-to-month plans and I wrote the releases that went out to newspapers and drew up the ads which went out to the newspapers. We had several programs which we really never entered into. The program itself never really got off the ground because of this barrier of understanding.

Mr. Sourwine. Since the termination of your contract with the

Cuban Government have you had any dealings with them?

Mr. Rowe. None whatsoever.

Mr. Sourwine. Except, of course, your efforts to get your money.

Mr. Rowe. That is the only thing. Mr. Sourwine. Mr. Chairman, I have no further questions of these

Senator Keating. Just let me ask a question or two.

Have you, Mr. Louis, had any contact with the so-called Fair Play for Cuba Committee?

Mr. Barrow. No, I haven't.

Senator KEATING. Have they entered into any communications with you at all?

Mr. BARROW. I don't think so.

Mr. Rows. They haven't called our office at all. In fact, we don't even know who they are. We didn't know it until we saw the ads in the newspapers.

Senator Keating. There is a Mr. Gibson who is now the executive

director, executive secretary.

Does either of you know him? Mr. Rowe. No, I don't know him.

Senator Keating. You don't know him, Mr. Louis?

Mr. Barrow. No.

Senator Keating. He hasn't been in touch with you?

Mr. Barrow. No, sir.

Senator Keating. There was some evidence taken here, and I don't know if it was anything that came to your knowledge about Mr. Robert Taber taking tourists to Cuba and having taken \$19,000 from a bank account of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee to pay the expenses of these tourists. Is that operation anything that you knew about?

Mr. Rowe. No.

Senator Keating. Did you ever meet Mr. Robert Taber?

Mr. Rowe. No, I don't know him.

Senator Keating. Senator Cotton, do you have any questions?

Senator Corron. No.

Senator Keating. Well, we certainly are very grateful to all three of you.

I think perhaps counsel's name should be entered in the record. Mr. FISHER. I am not the counsel. I am a former partner of the firm that handled the account.

My name is Charles Fisher.

Mr. Barrow. My wife is the counsel. She is behind us. Every time I make a mistake she will pull my coattail.

Senator Keating. Thank you very much. We appreciate your

appearance.

APPENDIX

CUBA AND THE AMERICAN NEGRO

Once again the forces of international communism and its allies are utilizing their powerful resources in an effort to subvert the American Negro against his own Government.

Cooperating in this effort are the Cuban Government, the Fair Play for Cuba

Committee, and the Communist Party, U.S.A.

From the time of the establishment of the movement in 1919, the Communists have always looked upon the American Negro as so much explosive tinder for the revolutionary confiagration they seek to incite within the United States. At the Sixth World Congress of the Communist International in August-September 1928, the question of the American Negro came up for prolonged discussion in which American Communists participated. On the basis of the congress decisions, the then representative of the Communist International in the United States, John Pepper, proclaimed for the United States the slogan that "The Negro Communists should emphasize in their propaganda the establishment of a Negro Soviet Republic" to be restricted to the Black Belt in the South. In other words in furthering this slogan in pursuance of their revolutionary goal, the Communists advocated for a number of years the sacrificing of American Negroes to a bloody civil war for a Negro Soviet Republic, in which they would be the chief victims

Within recent years and under the guidance of Moscow, this slogan has been abandoned by the Communists. After the establishment of the government of Fidel Castro, however, the Communist forces entrenched in Cuba have sought to make that island a beachhead for the subversion of the American Negro against his own Government. They endeavored to enlist his support for the pro-Soviet and anti-American government of Castro, 90 miles from our shores. The efforts

and and-American government of Castro, so mines from our shores. The entits made in this direction during the past 2 years have been manifold.

In the May 1961 issue of the Crisis, official organ of the National Association for Advancement of the Colored People, is an article by Dr. Juan Rene Betancourt, who was appointed by Castro a delegate-intervenor in the National Federation of Negro Societies, Cuba's main Negro organization. In his article he declares that "One can truthfully say, and this is without the slightest exaggeration, that the Negro movement in Cuba died at the hands of Senor Fidel Castro."

"When Fidel Castro returned to Cuba from New York," says Senor Betancourt, "he had us to understand that he had won over the American Negro and that he was going to bring 300 of them to Cuba to view the 'terrestrial paradise.'" In other words, Castro is making a decided effort to build up the reputation of Cuba in the eyes of the American Negro as a land which recognizes no racial discrimination, as a shining model in contrast with the United States. Yet Betancourt has declared that "Cuban Negroes do not own a single hotel or commercial establishment, or industry * * * Cuban Negroes continue to live as pariabs."

In line with Castro's effort to enlist the support of American Negroes, the Cuban Institute Nacional De La Industria Turistica (INIT) signed a contract in February 1960 with a New York public relations firm including Joe Louis, former heavyweight champion of the world, and William L. Rowe, a former

New York deputy police commissioner, both Negroes, to encourage Negro tourists to come to Cuba. Castro appeared and was publicly photographed with Joe Louis in connection with this project. However Messrs. Louis and Rowe refused to lend themselves to Castro's anti-American designs and canceled the

On September 19, 1960, Fidel Castro came to New York for a meeting of the U.N. General Assembly, he ostentatiously moved his headquarters from the Hotel Shelburne to the Hotel Theresa in the heart of Negro Harlem.² In an equally spectacular bid for Negro favor, Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev equally spectacular bid for Negro favor, Soviet Fremier Nikita S. Khrusucnev visited Castro at the hotel on the next day. On the same day the employees of Havana's swank Hotel Riviera decided to change its name to the Hotel Theresa. The Hotel Theresa is known as the Waldorf-Astoria of Harlem, where most leading social and political functions of the area are staged.

In connection with the Hotel Theresa incident, Representative Adam Clayton Powell made the following caustic comment. He deplored the use of Harlem by

Premier Fidel Castro "as a battleground for his own political ends" and added that "His staying in Harlem is sheer hypocrisy." He warned that the hospitality extended to Fidel Castro "will end the moment he launches any Communist-inspired activity or rioting in Harlem."

Addressing the North Carolina State Conference of NAACP Branches, Gloster B. Current, national director of NAACP branches, declared that Russian Premier Khrushchev's Harlem meeting with Cuban Premier Castro was an attempt to make it appear that "Negroes of America are friendly to the Communist conspirators." He made it plain that "Negroes are not fooled by the Communists." THE REPORT OF THE PARTY OF THE

On Saturday, September 24, 1960, Benjamin Davis, a Negro Communist. Party leader, and his followers sought to get into the act by staging a rally at 126th Street and 7th Avenue in New York's Harlem, which drew less than 150

onlookers. No prominent Negroes responded.

The Fair Play for Cuba Committee arranged a private reception for Castro in Harlem, but this drew only a few minor officials. Langston Hughes, Mrs. Daisy Bates, State Senator James Watson, and NAACP Branch President

Joseph Overton refused to attend.

In a telegram to Governor Rockefeller and Mayor Wagner, the Baptist Ministers' Conference of Greater New York and Vicinity, representing 500 clergymen and over 100,000 Baptists, the largest religious group in Harlem, deplored and condemned "any attempts by Fidel Castro to make the Harlem community a battleground for his ideologies and a cesspool of his doctrine of hate and greed, and importing anti-U.S. agitators who have by their riotous actions brought discredit upon our community."

According to Conrad Lynn, a member of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, accommodations at the Hotel Theresa for Fidel Castro were arranged through Robert Taber, executive secretary of the committee, who is now in Havana.

Within the United States the bulk of the campaign to popularize Cuba among Negroes is carried on by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, shown by testimony before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee to have been supported financially by the Cuban Government.¹⁹ Its acting executive secretary is Richard Gibson, a Negro who invoked the fifth amendment in refusing to answer questions regarding his activity. He was one of eight Negroes among the founders of the committee. The others included Frank London Brown, John Killens, and Julian Mayfield. Joanne Allieen Grant, a Negress, who has been listed as the secretary of the Fair Play Committee, invoked the fifth amendment on October 10, 1960, before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee in refusing to answer all questions. tions regarding her Communist Party affiliations.

Mr. Gibson has estimated that about one-third of the 3,000 members belonging

to the Fair Play for Cuba Committee were Negroes."

Robert F. Williams, NAACP chairman in Monroe, N.C., who was suspended for 6 months in 1959 by the NAACP for urging Negroes to "fight violence with
