

Cde. L.F.S. Burnham Office of the Prime Minister Public Buildings, Georgetown, Guyana.

Dear Cde. Burnham,

As you may have already heard or read in the paper, there were two very important and influential progressive leaders who visited Jonestown in the past week. Dr. Carlton Goodlett, Pres. of the Mational Newspaper Publishers Association, one of the larges press associations in the United States and the main representative for the black press in America, and Dr. Donald Freed, noted author, investigator, socio-linguist, cultural anthropologist and lecturer, both spent time at the Peoples Temple Agricultural Project touring the facilities and speaking with Case. Jim Jones. The visits are most significant for Jonestown and Guyana, as well be born out in the future.

pr. Goodlett, an M.D. and Php, was deeply impressed with Jonestown and with the direction and progress of the Guyana government. Pr. Goodlett is a longtime friend of Cde. Jim Jones and deeply respects his work and his opinions. It was Cde. Jones who impressed on Dr. Goodlett the correctness of the bold direction the PRC government is taking, and Dr. Goodlett will be lecturing across the U.S. and Africa on what he saw in Jonestown and the forward thrust of the Guyann government. What Dr. Goodlett will be sa,ing about Peoples Temple and Guyana will erode the opposition's support among progressive blacks and other minorities in the U.S., and will embance and increase the respect, support, and reconsition of jourself and the leadership of the PRC. Dr. Goodlett is highly regarded throughout the progressive community in the U.S. (Incidentally, Dr. Goodlett was not pleased to hear about the oportunistic and demanning manner of the opposition leader's wife. She refused to shake hands with a black woman who is a good friend of Peoples Temple and who is known to not lie about things.)

pr. Goodlett raved about the agricultural, educational, cultural, and social development he witnessed in Jonessown. He saw it as a continuation of the aignificant work the peoples Temple was woind in the United States. A little over a year alo, when it was measured that many nessers of the Peoples Temple would be soving to Guyenn to take on permanent residence, and the sometionalist press started its hysterical attacks on Jim Jones, it was Dr. Goodleti who led a very widesprend railying of support for the beleagued manitarian group. This support included hundreds of community

leaders, progressive organizations, civic, state, and national officials, and many others. In a full page deitorial in the largest Afro-American newspaper in California Br. Goodlett wrote: "An institution that feeds the poor, houses the homeless, rescues the young and old from wretchedness and despair; and marshalls the political potential of a people, and husbands the economic pittance of the poor masses into a powerful instrument for justice, freedom, and equality, while building a just and humane society, by its very nature will have many enemies hidden, lurking in the shadows of greed, ignorance, neurosis, and hallucinations....Surley many good men and women of courage, steadfastness, and fundamental belief in the power of the organized masses will see in Jim Jones and Peoples Temple not a comet that of Edmund Burke's prophetic words,.....*All that is necessary for evil in the world to triumph is for enough good men to do nothing."

As Br. Goodlett was leaving Guyana he remarked that he would do meverything in my power to spread the word" about the "hope" the Jonestown community has to offer.

ponald Freed, whom you may recognize as the author of the prizewinning play on the Rosenbergs "The Inquest," was also author of the books on the assasination of President Kennedy, <u>Recutive Actor</u>, and gush to Judgement. He has also written The Killing of RFK, and is currently publishing a book titled "<u>code Name Zorro</u>", that details the shocking facts of the conspiracy to murder Dr. Martin Luther King, and the subsequent cover-up of the assasination. Dr. Freed came to Guyana from Washington D.C. where he had been in hearings as a member of the Select Committee for the Rouse of Representatives to investigate the King assasination. Freed is convinced that there is a profound conspiracy to destroy and discredit Peoples Temple, and he is throwing his entire research committee into investigating the matter.

Freed spent a week in Jonestown looking closely at the facilities, gainering facts for a book he hopes to write, and participating in community activities. He affirmed that it is the most outstanding willed community he has ever seen, and called it "unparalleled" and "unequaled". He reserved his highest praise for the leadership of Jim Jones, saying he had more respect for him then any other leader he had not. He was deeply touched by all that he saw, chiling it "awasome," and said; "Jonestown...offers a microcosm of what we have seen on a large scalemnia China, the Soviet Union, and Cuba... you are driven to the conclusion that the most extraordinary material and social experiment is being carried out...The community is characterized by an extremely sophisticated human behavior accross a wide scale of "languages" and skills...The community is a dialectic of struggle and care which is expressed outwardly towards a "class family" and the world and inwardly toward aembers of the Jonestown community,

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from the infants to the seniors...it is essentially an unspeakable experience, but no doubt it will be spoken about and written about widely and there will be a steady traffic out to the community..."

pr. Preed explained that efforts to harm the community are "an attempt to criminalize those who are making the leap into a new life", and more importantly, stated that these efforts are not herely directed against Peoples Temple, but Guyana as well, for following a socialist course. Dr. Preed will be lecuturing on Jonestown and Guyana across the United States. He has over a thousand lectures to give and will get to as many as he possibley can.

In their reflections on Jonestown, both Dr. Goodlett and Dr. Preed affirmed that the community had totally eliminated racism, elitism, ageism, and sexism. Furthermore, both have learned through Cde. Jim Jones that the present government and leadership represents the true socialist direction that is best for Guyana. Both were able to see that the opposition leader is not a true Karxixt-Leninict and had made opportunistic appeals to race (apanjat) that characterized his politics.

You may recall another visitor to the Jonestown project, a white moderate-conservative by the name of Dr. Walter Thain, who is an internationally reknowned cytologiest. Dr. Thain was very deeply impressed by the project, and he too was "sold" on Guyana and its dynamic thrust. Interestingly, people involved in the conspiracy to destroy and discredit Peoples Temple found his address and dumped all kinds of anti-Peoples Temple and anti-Guyana literature on him. He was not at all affected by it, and in a written response said that the Temple's medical facilities were outstanding, and that the project physician was on of the best doctors he had come across in his life, and he knew at least five thousand.

Those involved in this conspiracy have been going all out to create confusion, mistrust, fear, and hatred to wards Peoples Temple and Guyana, most recently a journalist named Mrs. Kathy Hunter entered Guyana under false pretenses, (and subsequently attacked Guyana and Peoples Temple in the press). The Mational Enquirer magnaine sent a plane over the morth West to take pictures and conduct illegal air surveillance. The Enquirer flight circled Jonestown at low altitude eleven times, and caused so such consternation that one claer woman suffered a hear attack. (It should be noted that it is a well known fact that the mational Enquirer works closely with the CIA.) These are just two of the more recent efforts against Peoples Temple and Guyana.

The entire conspiracy is along complicated story, but we hope that soon everything will be clarified. Our belief is that the efforts against us are not originating in the State pept. or with the President at all. We do know that we obtained deficinite insight into its operation when our own investigators uncovered a military intelligence surveillance team outside our church. The team was traced to a military installation the south and it was learned they were under orders from a powerful

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reactionary, racist southern Senator who is now with open conflict with the president. It is obvious that the efforts are right wing and target not only peoples Temple and Guyana, but all who are working for socialism anywhere in the Hemisphere and the world. (The scope of these efforts has been revealed in various publications. Ebony magazine detailed how all black progressive leaders have been targeted for amears and/or investigations to discredit them.) The eminient black Congressman and committee chairman, Lewis Stokes, D-Oh, and Congressional black Congressman william Clay, D-Ho, have told that "there is a national conspiracy to alimanate black leadership in the United States, particularly the outspoken ones." reactionary, racist southern Senator who is now with open conflict with

I hope that the above information has been of interest and help to you. The visits of Mr. Freed and Dr. Goodlet are most encouraging and offer great hope that the efforts against Peoples Temple and Guyana will soon be exposed. Mr. Freed, in his parting words to us, said that Jonestown was the best community and Jim Jones the most exemplary leader he ever had the pleasure to know. We are confident that the people who have come here, and who have seen what is being accomplished in Jonestown and in Guyana, will be able to be strong voices against the reactionary tide that seeks to stem the progress of the masses who are on the road to socialism.

Dear Cde, Leader,

We were visited this week by the new Regional Minister, Cdc. Durant, and we were most impressed by his obvious political awareness and humbin attituded. He is, indeed, a gentleman - both courteous and sensitive. In creasingly, we find that those of his age, and those of Minister Mingo's years, have a depth of understanding that youth lack.

Cde. Durant is the kind of man who takes initiative. We had told him about the Guyanese children that we were privileged to treat in our mode of clinic (several of whom had TB), and he took a list of some of the modifications we badly need. (Our medical costs are enormous. One months order alone was \$56,000.) Cde. Durant said he would take this list to the name to see what could be done. His attitude was one of real concern, and every word out of his mouth was of socialist character.

Cds. Durant is such a contrast with some of the others we have dealt with in the region. Gregory Gaskin, for example, is a brilliant young man, but his arrogance and vulgarity is apalling. His comments revolve almost exclusively around sex, and his comments to our women (such as: "How do now get free sex here?" or "Do men nurse on the breasts?") are not only of fewer ive --- they are absolutely insulting. Our women don't even know how to tell to him, his realm of consciousiness is so far removed from their con now being the prespectives.

On the other hand, the new Reginnal Minister is a complete contrast. He is a real man of the people. He will be coming back in a few days to spend some time and talk with the people in Jonastown (he was not able to do this on his first visit as he was on a tight schedule and could not stay).

We commend you on your "inisterial choice for our repton, and we can say that some of the aliemation and loneliness we felt in the past is meanily reduced by our contact with this fine man. We look forward to his future visits, and to working with him for the development of the region.

One of the things that touched Cde. Durant, as it does many people, or the political awareness shown by our children when they are asked questions. Cde. Durant questioned some of our 9 year olds, and Carl Blachnen and Books Earper welked into different classrooms at random and asked questions, of they were treated with explanations on the evils of spanjat, the current

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situation in Zimbabbe. One new treaty between Angola and Zaire and here is $\theta_{\rm co}$ helped ease tensions, and that the PNC stands for. Any one they would have talked to could have answered questions like these. It is our responsibility to be internationally and politically informed, and everyone who visits us remarks about the high degree of awareness of the domestic and world scene, from the socialist perspective. Currently we are studying Spanish, Russian, and Chinese as part of our town forums so the entire community may benefit, and chinese as part of our town forums so the entire community may benefit, and it is essential to non-aligned countries that the languages of principled socialist countries be learned. You have our undying support always. We are deeply appreciative of the opportunity to live in this proud, free, and Socialist Republic under your brave and inspiring leadership.

Dear Mr. Burnham,

I am writing to you because I am desperately worried about the safety and well being of my son, Brian Bouquet, and his wife, Claudia. They are with Jim Jones, in the jungle of Guyana, at Jonestown. After reading the publicity about the Peoples Temple (including the enclosed article) for over a year, and talking with reporters, the San Francisco District Attorney's Office, and former church members, I am convinced that the situation is extremely critical.

The very lives of those eleven hundred Americans may be in jeopardy. I do not believe that they are free to leave, if they desire to do so. For this reason I implore you to take some immediate action to get to the bottom of what is really happening there, and see to it that those people are protected. They must be given an opportunity to leave, under protection, without fear or duress imposed by other church members.

I am counting on your belief in human freedom and dignity to motivate you to help in this grave situation. Thank you.

Layton, who was in charge of church finances here before joining the Guyana colony last December, and Jones controls bonk accounts in Europe, California and Guyana containing "at least \$10 million."

In our approximation, in many cases, we have given much in help and support, and although we have strong support, nevertheless little in practical loyalty has returned. We have learned to be cautious, and that to why we ask questions, such as about the resignation of the Foreign Cinister. Minister Kingo allayed our fears about it being indicative of a move to the far right. (We had heard that the far right of the party had forced you to make that move.)

We gether from verious sources that berhaps there was a mismen of funds, and, from your nan negeches we concluded that not on much work war being done as the need for productivity required. It would have been helpful if someone had immediately told us the currents of change. We went through some anxious moments. We had caucht the Foreign Minister in rilly little lying games, but we still like him because he highly recorded you, and interpreted you in an intelligent manner to us. We had been getting all kinds of diametrically opposed views on what your attitude was, vis a visour movement. It seems a lot of people like to stir up mischiof.

life has certain parameters of the basic elements of freedom we have to have. However you can depend on our loyalty. We would never go to your opposition. We are Third World people predominantly Black, and distrust smyone who would appeal to racism as a basis for support. Even the Soviets have always been friendly to us at home, and as far as we can tell, they have been friendly to us abroad.

We need guaranteer that our freedom and survival won't be hamnered by the machinations of a few reactionary radiate abroad. If the reactionaries are oming down on you and us, there is nothing so enobling than a good cause to die for. We all die sometime, so we take our life a day at a time, and fill it with so such joy in production and human services such as medical care in our own community and for the many who come daily from the community around

We are not interested in working with any administration but pours. Her can depend on that kind of layalty. We don't count that such on a fewers, because we have had too many of your so-called

"supporters" talk in a very dual fashion about their loyalty to you. We believe in Dr. Reid, Minister Mings, Minister Green, and Minister Jack who seems sincere. There are a few others that we have spoken to, but have not had enough contact with to be certain.

We keep hearing recurring rumors that this or that person will I the next F.F. - names other than Dr. Reid. He would have no confidence living under the administration of one person who appears interested in your position. We are not religious but one thing Jesus said is a valid guidepost: "No man taken my life. I'll lay it down on my own terms." When you stood up to ligninger, we heard all kinds of complaints. In fact he told us that it was, no doubt, the Muslims who made the overture to some here and he received, rather than the reverse case. He said that Guyana is under fire and just doesn't have the time to plan such affairs. I'm sure this is true but there are many leaders-religious, community, and governmental -- who look to Bishop Jones and intend to come here as racism continues to endanger the freedom that is left in America. If you are attacked, they intend to fight on behalf of Guyana, if you wish their services. The Bishop has told then that he would even prefer death then to see a good Socialist government like yours be destroyed. But for him to be most effective in his efforts to raise money for our mission and to gain the loyal support that is needed for your government and sustain the substantial support he has already gotten, a strong showing of public acceptance of our Bishop would be of tremendous help plus it wary likely would cause others to show meeded support for Guyana in these trying times.

The next trip in unive, Bishop Jenes will probably be accompanied by a number of leaders (both from high cohelons of government and the church) who are interested

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in seeing your country after hearing it praised as's great hope for the Third World by Bishop Jones. The trip will be made sometime in January or February and tentatively includes the Lt. Governor of California, a congressman, the head of all the overnised Black press in the United States, and a prominent Black church leader. Maturally, it will help immeasureably if Bishop Jones is received as a dignitary, which he cares nothing about because he detests anything that looks like social climbing. But he has a lot of prestige in the States. In fact he is influential and respected among virtually every segment of leadership in the U.S. A reception would enormously enhance the support of our people, the leaders that will be with Bishop Jones, and other dignitaries back in the States. There need be no concern about the Bishop coming back to the States and making the wrong sort of statements, from your vantage point, or circulating pictures of Dr. Jagan, as Wallace D. Muhammad did. The Bishop does not want to meet with Dr. Jagan or with anyone who does not give absolute support to your administration, and that has been his policy all along. Following N. D. Muhammad's visit, the Mation of Islam circulated a special edition of their paper in the U.S. which they gave out showing Muhammad's meeting with you and his meeting with Dr. Jagan. But there was no statement of support, expressed or implied, for Guyana or Jamaica (which was also covered), and there was no denunciation of destabilization efforts.

We felt it unwise for Mr. Muhammad or his public relations department to play up his meeting with Jagan equal to his meeting with you, in light of Jagan's divisiveness via his newsletter which goes to many socialists and liberals in the U.S. For Muhammad to put him on the same level as you made it look to many like he (Nuhammed) was holmobbing or trying to show political and social prestige. Confidentially, one of Muhammad's brothers recently said to Dr. Richard Tropp of staff that he feels closer to Bishop Jones than to Huhammad because, "He has the Black pride of my dad." But although the Bishop has educated many Muslims to socialism using Guyana as a model, we don't break ranks with them -- we both keep our respective stances uncompromised. Recently, for your information, the Muslims have occss out with a concept they term "capitalistic communism" which doesn't make any sense. Governmental leaders don't fool with Muhammad because he's off into theological sobbledyspok. But they do come to Bishop Jones, though it may only be due to the large following he has, which of course represents votes. However, they are aware that he does not give endorsements and there is significant appreciation of his forthright political stance in which he speaks about the danger to freedom in the U.S. and the model of freedom that is developing in Guyana. (However is accord with Dr. Wills excellent juigement, he will do so for the first time immediately upon returning after posing certain vital questions to the candidate

decided upon.)

The reason Bishop Jones has not given an endorsement in the past is because it has always been a choice between the lesser of two evils, and this time is probably no exception, though Black and Socialist leader friends of the Bishop agree that one would prove to be less reactionary than the other. Slinio Figurizido, United Matiena Ambassador from the Peoples sepublic of Angula speaks on the victory of the MPIA. Tapson Hamare, National Chairman of Limbabes African Matienal Union and Hamas Asis, political affairs attache of the Tanasania Ambassy, and representatives from Hamibia and the Jun African Geograes also speaks on the State of affairs of their respective countries. Our Jun Francisco Temple received neveral head threats for having the African Liberation Day colebrations where these leaders spake.

Alshop Jones raised the money to pay the \$20,000 ball for Ka-meek, the wife of American Livian Heremont leader, Dennis banks. Ka-meek was being held in an Ore; or prince where the gave birth to a baby girl and was immediately separated from the baby after birth by prince officials and did not see her baby, Iron Door bones, until Richep Jones heart of the mether's plight.

Thank you for taking the time to speak to our representatives who met with you at Port Kaituma this past week. They said you were most gracious. Bishop Jim Jones was working in the fields when we received word you were coming, and was sorry he missed the opportunity to see you.

If you max could spare a few minutes from your busy schedule, I would like to take this opportunity to express a few concerns and also bring your attention to some things I'm surm you're not aware of, but would appreciate hearing. our meople were disappointed by the reception accorded to Wallace U. Kuhammad of the Nation of Islam because it looked like he has greater acceptance here, when he is doing nothing here. Many of our members are planning to make Guyana their permanent home and naturally they was want assurance of that their leader has complete acceptance. Bishop Jones is mainly responsible for raising the nearly tops million dollary that has gone into our mission project. It is not something that has been easily afforded. It has been a game particularly heavy financial burden because of our socialistic lifestyle in the states where we are maintaining so many of our people through programs and facilities that meet all of their material meeds. The Bishop/wasn't at all bothered by Muhammad's reception. Dear Cde. Burnham.

In an effort to improve the course for integration of our organization into the Guyanese stream of living, we wish to beg a few moments of your time to keep you abreast of developments and select matters which are felt to affect us both.

HARASSMENT:

In a letter to you dated November 15, the topic, "Examples of harassment" did not give the background required in understanding just how situations like that were able to develop. The location of the incidents of the arrest frame-ups of myself and my son, Lew Bric (who has a new son born in Guyana) was los Angeles which is notorious for a facist and racist police force. The late Cde. (Claude korrell (who was a courageous warriar against political repression and a great friend) was versed in the tactics of the Los Angeles Police force and mentioned to me the times when frame-ups were also attempted on him; a young woman he was seeing was approached by the L.A. police and offered a bribe to claim that Claude had raced her-enough of a charge to disbar him from ever practicing law again. Another time they tried to get a friend of his, who was a deputy sheriff, to lie on him. When the sheriff refused he was demoted and taken off of active duty. Claude confided to me the frustation of living in a racist legal system knowing that it was hopeless in receiving a fair trial for his clients. He felt a great pride in giving his life to Guyana and to a leadership which is working for socialist economic justice.

A book which gives a great of background to the operations of the L.A. police is called the Glassyous Tapes, written by Louis Tackwood, a black man who had worked for the L.A. police as a paid informer. He was later stricken by his conscience and told what he knew of the goings on within the "glassyouse" (as the political section of the police department was called). He told of the coordinated efforts of the L.A.P.D. with the C.I.A. In fact, it was Claude Worrell who first out Tackwood on the witness stand about the role he played as both informer and provocatour. (If you should wish to read outpured with the police force, although to this day we don't know the full background. Just outside our church some white ambulance. my oldest adopted son, Johnny (who is here with his wife and daughter), another married man who has a wife and son here, Michael Protes, and another black male member, C.J. Jackson. None of them had ever been arrested before and were only taken in after trying to stor the ambulance attendent from showing and forcing the woman into the ambulance after she stated she did not wish to go. There were no grounds for arrest.

I could see what was hammening; they were trying to provoke our pacifist people into violent action but I controlled the people and kept them inside. I told my people not get alarmed, that I would go to the police station, try to reason with them and get our meonle out of jail.

I walked into the police division with officials of our church, member-attornies, and visiting officials. While in conference with the p.r. man for the police department, three white officers stepped the p.r. man for the police department, whree white olikers been up to me and said that I was going to be taken into custod siso. They put me in a cell with blood splattered all over the floor, bossibly to intimidate me. My wife, who was at that time a high state official, was put into a room without windows. It was as if they knew the one problem she had not overcome was claustrophobia. One man (who I don't even remember the name of because thry all looked alike to me) came up to me and said, "Well, you've got lots of mennle, you dan afford bail." I told him that being we hadn't done anything wrong, I wouldn't dream of putting up any bail, and in the first place; moor people can't afford bail, I am a socialist and I don't believe in the bail system. He said that I couldn't stay in jail--it will be at least sir weeks before I would get on the court docket. I seid..that's your problem, I don't take bail. This went on for a fewhours when finally a police commander came in and said that he understood what I had refused bail and that there had been some mistake: my wife and I were to be released. I smid, "No, you won't. You will have to release all of us because we've done nothing wrong." I told him that I had instructed my entire congregation to wait for our return, I was cetting weary of this and so was my congregation and they'd probably be down to find out what is going on.

He left saying he had to call somebody, who it was I never knew. After three hours had passed he came back and said charter were dropped on all of us. I told him that we wanted someone to come to our church and applogize to the people because it is difficult enough precing pacifism. On the following Thursday a police officer apploaized publically to our congregation. Thereafter we paid for it

ly to our congregation. Thereafter, we baid for it.

Exassment went on and on for several weeks until it finally culiminated in a second arrest (described in the November 15 letter).

By arrest was not made at the scene of the "set-un", but out in a hall-way, a bublic place. I suppose it was meant to cause embarressment. They said something like, "we warn you, don't resist," which should that they were evidently counting on me to resist. Another attempt at intimidation occurred when we were crossing over a bridge. The policemen slowed down the car and said, "It would made a fellow in your position feel like jumping off a bridge, wouldn't it?" So I went through the same old process; told them I wouldn't take bail. I told them we didn't care what they did, that we knew their workings and we will consider anything they say "a badge of honor." The district attorney knew the judge I was to het was a conservative, or moderate at best, but even he knew the despicable tactics they use and the charges were dropped, as the record, which was ordered sealed, shows with "me sti-

pulation to probable cause "and" no swidence that violation occurred. By wife, my son, and all persons involved in both incidents have been completely exonerated. We will gladly produce affidavits as well as a copy of the sealed records showing that there was no evidence that any violation occurred. Amazingly, there was never a word in the press about it because of the sudacious stand I took by telling all of my people about it. I have told all this to my people because I believe in being onen and direct.

Although they were not members of our organization nor have they expressed a desire to come live in Guyana, they have been very supportive of us. This same department has even tried to frame the major of los Angeles on two different occasions. His oringion of this department was drastically modified.

You the head of the entire los Angeles Police Department, a man by the name of Davis, is running for governor of California. A man with a rejutation as a reactionary fascist running for governor of our state clearly shows which way the political scenario is moving. In the black rections of los Angeles there is an average of two slayings of innocent blacks each week.

After the riot they tried to start—, a man working in the L.A.F.D. came to make in confidence because he shares some of our views, and warned us to be very, very careful and watch out. Unfortunately we weren't careful enough. This same man has come to us again, speaking to my associate minister in Los Angeles. Again in confidence, he said for us to watch out, that the police department is starting these tactics again. He wasn't referring to us this time, but warned us (because of our association with Juyana, that any Guyanase official working in their line of duty was in imminent danger. These racists tactics have not involved any of our people, but they have involved black people we know. This warning about your officials worries me because it was through the knowledge of your consulate in L.A. that we met Claude Worrell and how we came to be in Guyana. Claude was a fighter and he knew the police state consciousness, but he is no longer there: I am a scrapper and a fighter but I am not there.


This is the same man with the same warning and his warnings came to reckoning. We have instructed all of our people to not go to any public places because we know we can't be too careful—the last incident took place down the street from our church in a theater.

Allegelly this same minister in intimating that the twins do not in fact when exist, and has raised an issue about using our amateur radio with which we constituted in the constitute of the fact, that he wanted to terminate our use of amateur radio, which is intolerable to us. 3) Three people have asked rather odd questions about Gene Chailin, the coordinator of our circus project. 4) Someone representing themselves as being from the Ministry of Economic Development came to our front gate asking shout U.S. dollars 5)We have received telephone calls from persons saying they were from the opposition claiming that the "rovernment" had asked us to meet with

"ith the showe in mind, Minister Carmichael's questions arrowed some suspicion. He asked: Ulhow such were we paying for GDF flights (in fairness let me stress that he said he wanted to check to see if we were being overcharged only after Cde. Jim Jones pressed the issue). 2) He asked to see the twins and wanted to know if "there were communications with overseas" shout the birth. 3)He asked if Cde. Chaibin was not the noiser.

He stated at the outset that he had two things he wanted to talk about. In other words, the above were the object of his visit and we were simply part of a casual, informal conversation. In light of the above monitoned rumors however, we simply cannot believe his questions were coincidental, although he handled himself like a diplomat and was very thoughtful. Indeed, while he was in Jonestown he saw a very gravely ill child from the neighborhood who will need immediate treatment from George-town by a brain surgeon. Cde. Carmichael sungested that the baby stay under the surgivinion of the medical staff (the mother asked for this too) until arrangements could be made for his transportation into the capitol. The minister said he would check into GDF flights, and I'm sure he will. "We do understand the fuel shortane, and the expense entailed in these flights. However, we cannot afford to pay such GDF flights at this time. We are very concerned about this child, and will be sending the baby and into mother into "latthews Ridge in the ministers can on Friday, if it is not too late. It that time, Cde. Chaitin will meet the windaters land rover, so as to dissuade any ridiculous rumors. We was at the FNC meeting where any official could have asked him any question they had wished.

Just the other day, without any explanation, the sugar case chopper, and the sucar case prater/pitter that Grenory Gaskin (who was contacted by Peter Permandes) had invitially told us we could borrow for six months was picked up and returned to Natthewn Middle. We have had it two months, It was not being used before, and we are using it in a way which would have benefitted all of Guyana. When we contacted the vet who is telling Mr. Termandes place he said we could keep it after checking with the livestocknowledge between Port Kaityme and Natthews Ridge who own the machinery. Reverthelman, a truck came by and picked up the equipment. We are not unreasonable people. We would have pladly worked out nome arrangement —but we were not asked about it directly.

Perhaps it is too much to expect people to be direct and straightforward. It would now that such an approach would be devious — unless, of course, the intention is not to clarify a situation but to cloud it. From what we have beard, and from the nature it is questions saled, it ameans that the intention of one minister of neverowent to an investment to the situation of the latter.

We recognize that to some our approach towards life and death is an enigms. To have even heard that we have been called insance. No doubt, such a misinterpretation stems from a lack of comprehension about our attitude towards living, and especially, dving. We do not fear death. Eather, we would be proud to die for what we believe—proud to have our death menningful. Cuffy set limits on the usurption of his freedom, and finally gave his life. Vietnamese monks burn themselves for a just social cause — not out of some perverse "weird" sense of martyrdom, but because they felt the cause they weredying for was far more significant than their individual existence.

Such an attitude towards death does not hamper ones ability to live life to its most productive reaches. On the contrary, just because we have always been willing to give our lives in a moments notice for principle (in gleeds), white covernment officerials who are friendly to us said "the establishment" actually feared our courage to stand up for black peoples rights so voiciferously. After all, we were the only neeple who stood beside Angela Davis and our efforts were directly responsible for the release of activists (Billy Jo Swith). The sre shle to take each day and fill it with the love and the joy of living. Please do not underestimate the value of such lovalty to one's beliefs — when people are as prepared to die as we are, you can count on their loyalty. Some have an unreasoned prejudice against immigrants. We have come a great distance to help build Guyana, and, as you well know, often the "convert" to a "religion" can be more sealous a believer than one born to the faith. Tuesians told us that was the case with proople who came to the USSR to work on come farms just after the revolution. (We are not idealongues, but in terms of U.S. relations we have been asked to have friendly rapport with the USSR.)

We are very much in need of a boat, and have been negotiating on a vessel. We brought this to Guvana's attention and we have learned from one of your ministers that there is nothing to bar our Guvanese dollars from purchasing it. The boat is registered to Barbados and we were led to believe initially that the current comer is Barbadian. However, now we have heard there may be some question about the current comer's citizenship. We hope the matter may be speedily resolved. Although we are very much in need of this boat, we trust that no one would be attempting to put us unwittingly in the position of not followine Guyana's guidelines.

COURT ORDER

Initially, several American Embassy officials volunteered the opinion that it would be ridiculous to think that the court order would ever be invoked. Other than John Blacken, none of these persons have any sympathies for socialist organizations. The subject was discussed in the context of an invitation to come to the capital for some affair. We had to decline, citing the court order as the obstacle, and received the above response. Dumerous others of Guynna's officials subsequently gave us the same assurance, and naturally we felt relatively secure that the leader of our connerative could travel in absolute safety. ("e came to see Guynna knowing full well that the noverment could control such matters; we were told this by Cde. Claude Porrell.)

This is especially important at this time, with the upcoming cultural show. We felt that a first rate production could be highly beneficial to Guyana because it will demonstrate what the emphasis of cooperative living can achieve. Cde. Jim Jones is an excellent organizer and has considerable talent in his field of theatrical management. We consider his abilities essential to the program, and we made the decision about his coming based on that fact.

Cde. Jim Jones would participate with discretion in the show and arrange a few quiet appointments. Foreover, there are rumors that he is afraid to come to the capital, and that kind of talk reflects hadly on Guyana. One person, clone to the povernment, even wont so far as to say Jim would be assassinated. This rumor, even if it were in fact reality, would not prevent his coming into the capital. Death has no fear for him or any of us. Peath, in many ways, would be a velcome relief from a life of pain, responsibilities, and pressures, but such an act would tringer shealute chaos smong our people.

We are now informed that the court orders will not be implemented unless Tim Stoom's attorney in the United States or another of the clique of racist consmirators pressure for the mapers to be implemented. In a personal sense whether Gde. Jim James is pursued with these papers nutters little - but such a move would result in pandemonium among our people. Pose in the U.F. on one occassion, when he and some others were attacked in a civil rights demonstration, the expanisation (including Jim Jones) went on a hunger strike. We were proposed to die unless the framed up charges were dropped. We regret that we came to Guyana already belanguaged by repressive, racist, and reactionary elements. However, such a history has attacked by enemies foreign or denostic we would be your best supporters. Our experience of racist and reactionary oppression is in that sense of some advantage.

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It seems that this reality is difficult to communicate. The most upsetting of the comments we heard came from two high government meople who were officials. They remarked that you were afraid to get close to un because "Jim Jones and the Peoples Temple have too many enemies in the United States." Please let all know that we have never begun to tell you of the many friends of the Peoples Temple in the United States. (At one point a very high official friend remarked that you would resent getting our supportive letters to you from very high and influential people in the United States. So we did not send even 100 of those received in our support.)

It is upsetting that any of Guyana's leaders would say that you are keeping your distance because Jim and his staff have enemies. If we'all adhere to that standard there are those who would never become friends with any principled people, such as those in Angola or Cuba.

He repeatedly hear that one minister in particular dislikes us and would do anything to harass our organization. As long as the government under your leadership does not change we are not worried.

We were told there was a complaint that we were given too much knowledge about matters pertaining to us. There are those member who tell us we are given too many assurance guarantees. This is ridiculous. Then we pointed out elements that hold respect in Guyana, we were told to shorten our letters, thus we do not go into as much detail as before - but we hold nothing back. Every bit of information we receive is conveyed to you. I am sure if you reviewed letters you will see this is the case. We were informed our letters were never read. We do hope in the interest of your most loval support from any sector that it is not true and you do study them. As for assurances, everyone knows the community produces much more effectively when its few basic requests, necessary for survival, are provided.

One report that we were lad to feel is absolutely reliable said we have been looked into by the Russians; another stears it is the KGB. I think we can feel confident and guarantee that no agents are in our ranks. On the advise of one of Gurana's officials, we took strong precautions to prevent such infiltration from ever again happening. If in your busy schedule you would ever have the time, we can document statements made about us from high levels that would altenate any other people. However, we are able to look at the overall picture and not be involvilized by details, so our lovalty has been unaffected.

After all the above, let me may there in a positive note. Minister Carmichael has acted quickly and notten a GDF plane to carry in a mother and her baby (the child appears to have a cranial disorder). Wis speedy action could have very well weant the life of the child. We repret that one person in the cabinet finds critician with this vital service, and even wants to silence our amateur radio which we use to consult with the best medical specialists. (This would be utterly intolerable.) Often such consultation obviates the need for emergency flights. It would also belt us greatly if we could expedite medical equiment we now have in customs. We have suffered the loss of musical instruments and other things in customs, but we cannot suffer the loss of our medical equiment. It is true that we could have saved the use of a GDF plane if we had had the special equipment. We are especially concerned about an x-ray mechine we know has been sent but have been unable to locate to date.

In spite of economic difficulties our homes are filled with our Guyanese compatriots. We make donations consistently that we cannot afford (their housing, medical services, etc.) Babies and children that have been brought to us have been nurtured back to perfect health. We consider such services our duty, as well as a privilege and a joy.

There have been many doctors and amatour radio operators who have been helpful but the following have given particularly expert consultations. Hight I suggest that a thank you note written to them by someome in Guyana would foster considerable goodwill. The doctors are: Dr. Richolas Ellym, opthemologist. George Rashington University Rospital. His consultations helped save an eye. Dr. John Wilson, cardiologist, Ressectuestts General Rospital; and the administrator of the Rassachusetts General Rospital. Foth of these fine doctors were very helpful with a man who had suffered a cardiac errest. As you may well know, the hospitals they are affiliated with are the most outstanding in the world. There is also Art (RITSR)who, although not a doctor, teld us he had written his congrassment in support of increased aid to Guyana. We have made over 4000 contacts via this medium, balking always of the beauty of Guyana, although we do not as! that the persons we contact do mything in particular. Responses like the above, I'm sure, are not successed. Not once have we encountered an unfriendlyor rude person. Che. Jim Jones apade every night talking about the beauty of Guyana. He gets only 2 hours of alsop a might and suffers from chronic Isryngitis as a result.

One final thing. A note of acknowledgment in a formal latter to our memple

would certainly boost the morale immeasurably. This is so especially when they have heard that one in the cabinet wants to deprive them of this means of communication.

Thank you once again for considering our remarks. We are deeply appreciative of all that you do. Our loyalty and support are with you always.





They feel his work is top motch and through an honorary membership you can receive medical supplies and medications. The only way a doctor can get medical supplies is to be a member of the met and you have to be licensed to do so.

As a result of one of Larry's communications, a Dr. Tructha even offerred to come to Guyana to give two months free medical services to the country. 

RE: REPORT OF MEETING WITH HONOURABLE VIBERT HINGO, MINISTER OF HOME AFFAIRS DATE: HARCH 17, 1977

TIM STOLN REPORT- (After discussion with Debbie and Paula)

On Wednesday, 16 harch, Cde. Hingo and an associate met with Debbie, Faula, Mike and me at our request. The meeting was sought by us to determine whether the government could expedite the immigration processing of our people. Defore we discussed that point Cde. Mingo mentioned a number of "complaints" that had come to his attention; in so doing he appeared friendly but with the usual aloofness of a police officer. He pointed out that he personally was impressed with our project but that we should know that "not everyone accepts your organization in Suyana." What follows are the salient points:

- 1. As an example of a person who fell into the aforesaid category, he mentioned nubert williams, whom we had a number of years ago accused of "harassing" us.
- 2. Kingo said, "Nany persons are very much impressed with what you are doing. I myself am impressed that you are doing a good job."
- 3. Hingo indicated that a concern had been raised that people could end up "infiltrating your organization so as to get into Guyana." Faula assured him that this could not happen because everyone is carefully screened and that in the past everyone who has come down has been a member of F.T. for at least three years before coming to Guyana. Deb said they had to live cooperatively, were encouraged to turn over their assets to worthy programs, said give their non-working hours to the work of the church, and other related things. The thought hingo seemed pleased about this. Paula and beb thought he didn't look moved one way or the other.
- 4. Paula got in most of the usual p.r. points, such as the Heligion in American Life awards, the State Senate commandation, the harmssment for speaking up for Guyana "telling the truth about Guyana", etc.
- 5. Mingo went on, "It's not I personally who have any doubts, but some are afraid, so we may have to tighten up agreements, we may have to do some of that." we said we would welcome that because we had absolutely nothing to hide and would want any fears regarding same put to rest.

- 6. We asked if any incidents had been reported about us, but singo said no othis must be

read in conjunction with the complaint about "smuggling", infra.)

- 7. Mingo said that "What might perhaps cause some fear and doubts, unfortunately, is another group (Shalom) who came to the North West District at the same time, and did not do so well."
- 8. We told Kingo that 800 persons would be coming, "as Dr. heid had approved and encouraged/" We said that they would be coming in groups of 45 or 90 at a time. hingo and his assistant requested that we submit a list of the names of all persons coming at least two weeks in advance." We indicated we often did not know until the last minute, because of work schedules, etc., but that we would try to comply with this request. Hingo also asked that we give some additional "background" material on each person, in addition to the basic information required on the official forms. He said such would be "helpful" but did not press it. (P.A.note-Hango was not aware that we were filling out any form at all, other thanssubmitting the names, so the forms will be sufficient unless they ask for more)
- 9. Mingo said, "Thereis another aspect of your activities 1 did hear a complaint about—a question of education. We understand you have your own school system." We said that exams a complaint he heard is that "you are unwilling to integrate into our school system." We assured him we intended to do so, but that the secondary school was not yet finished and meanwhile we had a fully-trained teacher helping out. We said we wanted our teachers to become integrated into the Guyana teaching system as well as our students and that the reason our children were not attending the school system was because of the lack of transportation. He asked how many children we had and Faula said that there were 22 under the age of 18. Tim's Recommendation: That we IMADIATELY send a few of our more reliable students to the Port asituma school so that we can truthfully say that we are already integrated into the achool system partially, and that when the secondary school is completed, we will be integrated completely.
- 10. Mango then said, "There is another area, too; I heard this as a complaint, that you have a trawler. It was reported once that there was a possibility some sauggling could have been done, possibly involving gold." he assured him that there was absolutely no basis to that complaint, that they were welcome to come look and would find no gold or silver, and that the incident referred to had happened many months ago, when our trawler failed, inadvertently, to stop at morawhanna where we are to check with the police, because we did not know at that time we were supposed to; and that upon learning the law, we at all times since have stopped. Paula told him that Eric Clarke had asked her about the trawler not stopping at Morawhanna and that there was some question about sauggling several months ago and that upon fishing out that we were required to stop we have done so on every occasion. Kingo seemed satisfied with the explanation. D-3-E-15b

- 11. We then asked Mingo what he would suggest we do to show the Guyanese government and people that we came with good intentions. He made the following suggestions:
 - (a). "Try to integrate as much as you can into the Guyanese society."
 - (b). "Another thing which would dispel doubts and fear; have a program to get people into your project to show what is going on." He suggested we invite Ministera, government Efficials, and ordinary people." He indicated he did not expect us to pay the transportation of such people into the interior. We told him this was a very good idea, and that we would implement it. <u>lin's Recommendation:</u> that we set one or two days every month as a Jonestown Open House, advertising in the newspaper and radio that everyone who cares to may come visit. We could keep the disruption to aminimum because of the limited spaces on airlines going in, and it would be a good way to displace paranola by showing openness.
- 12. Mingo mentioned that Minister Carrington (Minister of Labour) had visited and was impressed and that "he saw pictures of him there". There was a picture in the Citizen newspaper of Carrington along with Joyce, Jan, and a few other persons.
- 13. In response to our inquiry as to the possibility of the Immigration Dept. processing our people in the North West District so as to avoid the housing problems of staying in Georgetown, Mingo did not think that would work and seemed reasonably convinced about it, even after we mentioned that we would pay the extra costs incurred.
- 14. We asked whether the new drop-gate boat we were buying would go directly to horawhanna and bypass Georgetown. Lingo said no, the boat would probably have to come to Georgetown to be registered here and mentioned a few other things it would have to do in Georgetown.

 (P.A. note-the boat does not have to be registered in G/tn so I think he just wants it to come into a more organized pool.)
- 15. Hingo asked the question, "What kind of relationship to the Einistry of Agriculture do you have?" He said that he had called the Einistry of Agriculture to enquire about us and they didn't know much about what wegare doing. We mentioned that Einister mennard had visited only a few weeks ago and seemed impressed. We mentioned that many of our concerns were now being treated by the Ministry of Accommic Development which had formerly been treated by the Einistry of Agriculture, which resulted in less contact with the Einistry of Agriculture than before.
- 16. During the conversation, Eingo said sceething puzzling; when indicating that some people and groups had doubts or questions about us, he said "including people in high places." He did not elaborate, but we did not make a point to press this.

17. Mingo said, that when people asked him about Papples Temple, his response was: "Peoples Temple is an inspiration to the people around and is of tremendous value to Guyana. Their enthusiasm...is a menefit to the farming community in that particular area."

Tiles OverAll InBrabellon: mingo is a direct person who morked himself up through the ranks without the benefit of extensive formal education. He was willing to go into the aforesaid matters to help us, not harrass us, and that he is not particularly worried about us at this time. He will probably become more worried as we increase our numbers substantially. Although he was gracious to us, I felt distinctly out of place as a light-complected person, particularly when he mentioned people who did not accept us because we were Americans. We should act on the suggestions of Mingo and let him know when we have done so. I am also convinced we need, not now but as soon as the folks start pouring in, A BLACK MALL as our lead representative. Hight now the government sees an undue proportion of white faces, which probably creates questions as to how much we in F.T. have shed the American syndrome. Unce they see our leadership here in Juyana, particularly our spokespeople, as Black, they will accept us much more as legitanztely dissatisfied with American oppression. Fine is important, so someone like hollvane would be helpful. It's very good that both like and I are small in this respect, (r.A. note-I agree that it is essential to have the lead spokesperson as black, but I don't think that anything will be that effective until we have black Guyanese in our p.r. group. There are two Black American groups that we are succeeding that left bad impressions with the government. One was the chalom group and, two, was the house of Israel leader.)

18. Final note: We invited hingo a round-trip to visit us in the U.S. to see first-hand at our expense, our operations. He seemed pleased, if reserved, by the invitation. We also invited his to the Project at our expense.

COMMENTS FROM DESDIE "U NOTES THAT WERE NOT IN TIME !

19. Mingo said, "You are not totally accepted here. People have suspicion of American based organizations." "Even Ministers of Government have suspicion. I am satisfied you are doing a good job." "Our system of monitoring is not quite the best. I am concerned, not me personally with your credibility, but there is some concern withyour acreening of members." "What could cause fears or doubts is, unfortunately the other group of Americans, "Shalom"." Hingo spoke withma special branch of the government(did not state who) and they felt he lione Affairs should so special monitoring of people coming. He said he would do his best to expedite large groups coming.

20. Debbie's conclusion: Ginister Gingo was very candid with us, but did not appear hostile toward us. 0 - 3 - 6 - 3

21. Faula's conclusions: I have nothing to add to the comments listed (which haven't already been added). Mingo did stress that we were an inspiration to the Remarkity "people around us". This indicates to se the people in Fort Kaituma, Arakaka, and hatthews Ridge. If that is how he sees it, then I think we should immediately start an extensive public relations campaign in the area. Our p.r. is lousy and everyone that is down here has noticed the occasional hostility from the Port Kaituma area. Beings ratrices casteell has not jet been put in a powerent responsibility; It would be nice if the could do some pure two layer of the week. I think learned devers would be very good in that area to exceepeny here. It would be necessary to assign her before the becomes indispensable in the building programs.

4. Generally, Work Accomplished:

"I am concerned, not me personally with your credibility, but there is some concern with our screening of members" "What could cause fears or doubts is, unfortunately the other group of Americans, "Shelem". He spoke with a special branch of the government (did not state who) and they felt here Affairs should do special menactory of people comming. He said he would do his best to expedite large groups comming (we explained farty-rive to minty (45-90) could arrive at one time, equalling eight hundred (\$00) apprexx. Infact our teachers are looking into getting creditiiity for their experience to work in the school system here. Paula said we did have a qualified school teacher here working w/the children temporally until the transportation could be rectified, and the secondary school opens.

c. There was also a complaint about our fishing trawler. It was reported once that some sauggling could have been done. There was sene ideas there was gold. Paula explained, we didn't know we were to check into Maharuma (a place along the river where a custom agent is established). After we were told about it, we have followed rules and stopped each time. We have never seen gold around our area, although we've herd of it's existence in the North West Region.

d. Minister Mingo states, "There are persons in some of the highest places that still find our presence un-Smeetable". When Tim saked how can we rectify this? He stated, "You should integrate in the community." "Start a program to get people in to see what you are doing. Invite Official Heads fo Departments" .. Minister Frank Hope -- March 19, 1977

At Dr. Reid's request, Tim, Debbie, and Faula met with the Minister of Finance, Frank Hope to discuss keeping U.S. dollars in Guyana. Dr. Reid had first called Minister Hope to tell him what it was that we wanted and set up an appointment for us to see Hope.

 A background was first given on Jim and Peoples Temple. The following items were mentioned:

A. Adoption of children of all races.

- B. Receiving Senate citation. Claude Worrell attending testimonial dinner.
- C. Dr. Goodlett's esteem for Bishop. (Pres of National Newspaper Publishers Assoc.)

D. Picket for Fresno 4

- E. Visit to Cuba.

 F. Laura Allende speaking about concentration camps and tortures.
- G. Angela Davis speaking at our church and calling on Bishop for advice.

H. Unita Blackwell Wright and surveillance.

I. Attempts on Bishop's life (shot into bus, bomb in Marcie's car)

J. Bishop speaking about Guyana across the U.S

- K. P.T.is the only strong socialist group in the U.S.
- L. P.T. getting harassed because of stands for social justice.

M, Religion in American Life Award

- N. Herald-Dispatch "Greatest Humanitarian in the Nation Award"

- 2. Tim then explained the reasons why we would need to keep U.S. dollars in Guyana. Commitments for legal defense, support of refugees, and to ensure that we would have funds to send back anyone who attacement demonstrated anti-social behaviour.
- 3. Tim said that our money came from persons like ourselves who worked and contributed to church programs. Tim also said that no single person benefitted from the church contributions, that we didn't buy extravagantly and that our Bishop even wears used clothing.
- 4. Minister Hope said, "Dr. Reid told me about your request." "I discussed it with the Governor of the Bank of Guyana and the Deputy Governor of the Bank of Guyana, in fact, you probably noticed them leaving just before you came in. There is no difficulty technically. It is entirely feasible. It can be done. I have no objections at all." "You will have to discuss the mechanics with the Bank of Guyana (Mr. Matthews, Governor of the Bank of Guyana)." "I'll talk in advance to him; I mentioned it already." He said that he would set up an appointment for us for next week. Minister Hope said, "Money can be utilized for purchases overseas within the limitations of things we import (no banned items)." Min. Hope then said that the Bank will work out the details.
- 5. Frank Hope has been a Minister of Finance for 5 years. He was the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Finance before becoming the Minister. Before that, he headed a statistical department (where-?).
- 6. Paula then brought up the duty-free concessions that we submit applications for (which goes through his office). She said that Claude Worrell and Dr. Reid had indicated that anything which is not benned coming down for the agricultural project and its members would be allowed to come in duty-free. He nodded his head. She told him that there were some things pending his approval and he stated that he would look into them next week.
- 7. Tim Stoen invited Minister Hope to come to the U.S. and visit our church at our expense. Debbie invited him to visit our farm. Paula elaborated and said that it would be beneficial to have someone from the government come to get a first-hand look at our organization in San Francisco. Hope said that next time he visited the U.S. he would try to get to California.

Paula's Overall Impression:

I thought Minister Hope to be courteous and friendly. He listened attentively, nodding his head and an occasional "yes" to let us know that he was listening. Hope is a very organised person from the looks of his neat office(or his secretary is very organised). He is a short man. His wife is Black and he keeps her picture on his desk. There is a picture of himself on his wall behind him. There is not a picture of the Prime Minister or Dr. Reid beside his, nor in the whole room that I noticed. Hope seemed to understand what we said about fascism being close at hand in the U.S. and about managements suppression of rights (when we told about Freeno 4 and the watergate era). His answers were short and simple without dressing up with elaborate phrases. He was not pretentious and did not have to show that he was an important person. He stood and shook our hands on arrival and departure with a warm smile.






