Dear Mr. Young:

This confirms our telephone conversations of June 26 and June 28, 1978, in which I informed you that as of Saturday, June 24, transmissions emanating from WB6 MID/8R3 in Jonestown, Guyana, have been obstructed. You informed me at that time that both stations in Guyana, 1) WB6 MID/8R3, Jonestown, and 2) WB6 MNH/8R1, Georgetown are in fact legitimate operating stations in good standing and since they are not within the borders of the United States, they are not within the jurisdiction of the Federal Communications Commission (F.C.C.).

Since our conversations of June 26, I have received further clarification of the nature of the interference. Each time amateur radio station WB6 MID/8R3 has tried to utilize services of the Maritime Mobile Net (14,313 Kilohertz) for phone-patch traffic, the operator has been denied service. He has been informed each time by a man who called himself a "Net Coordinator" that the Net could not and would not help him because they had been informed by the F.C.C. that WB6 MID/8R3 was operating illegally. They were further informed that a letter would be forthcoming from the F.C.C. verifying this.

You further informed me that no such interference was authorized by the F.C.C. and that the interference was not caused by the F.C.C.

My clients (Peoples Temple), operators of these Guyanese stations, are participants in a church Agricultural and Medical mission. They have used the Maritime Mobile Net over the past several years in locating and contacting medical doctors to assist them in medical emergencies. There are no telephones available into this remote South American jungle region. The health and safety of well over 1,000 mission residents and the success of their medical outreach program to the entire northwest region of Guyana are seriously jeopardized by being deprived of this vital amateur radio service. It is the only means of communication for emergency, life and death medical traffic.

Please be informed that Peoples Temple is hereby registering a complaint with the F.C.C. for these interferences with their transmissions.

International third-party traffic

This topic has been touched on several times recently in this department, but it seems that more needs to be said. The FCC, as well as several Amateur Radio groups, have felt it necessary to call to mind the rules governing third-party traffic handled between amateur stations of different nations because of abuses by too many amateurs, and because of the importance of a clean record when Amateur Radio's frequency allocations are up for grabs in 1979. The rule in question is quite simple and categorical. It is not couched in obscure legal jargon. Article 41 of the General Radio Regulations says simply, "It is absolutely forbidden for amateur stations to be used for transmitting international communications on behalf of third parties." A third party, the FCC adds, is any person other than the control operators of the stations in contact.

As mentioned last month, similar suggestions have been made in the past, but this one seems to have stronger support than previous ones, and, if adopted worldwide, just might work out. At any rate, the FCC wants to know what U.S. amateurs think of this proposal.

As for communication with countries with third-party agreements, it's an everyday occurrence for those of us who operate on the HF bands, and so it's important that we know which countries have such agreements. Here's the list of countries with which the U.S. and Canada have third-party traffic agreements.

U.S. has agreements with: Argentina, Barbados (only U.S. stations operating with calls like K4ZN/8P6), Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Ghana, Greenland (XP calls only), Guatemala, Guyana, Haiti, Honduras, Israel, Jamaica, Jordan, Liberia, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Trinidad and Tobago, United Nations (only 4U1TU in Geneva), Uruguay and Venezuela.

Permitted prefixes: CE, CM, CO, CP, CX, EL, HC, HI, HK, HP, HR, JY, LU, OA, PT, PY, TG, TI, VE, VO, XE, XP, YN, YS, YV, ZP, 4X4, 4Z4, 8R, 9G1, 9YA.

Canada has agreements with: Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Guatemala, Guyana, Honduras, Israel, Mexico, Nicaragua, Peru, Trinidad and Tobago, U.S., Uruguay and Venezuela.

Permitted prefixes: AA, CE, CP, CX, HI, HK, HR, K, N, OA, TG, TI, W, XE, YN, YS, YV, 4X4, 4Z4, 8R, and 9YA.

Restrictions

All such third-party agreements incorporate restrictions. The exact wording varies from one agreement to another, thus, the agreement made with Canada back in the early 1930s reflects the fact that at that time telegraphy was the ordinary means of,

party traffic is permitted where "recourse to public electric communications is not justified," and makes no mention of the mail service. All the same, just now it's better to err in that direction than it is to bend the rules by handling traffic of questionable legality.

One group that has come under scrutiny lately is that of missionaries, taking the term in a broad sense to include, besides church people, other volunteers working in the Third World. For these people, separated as they are from their homes, Amateur Radio provides a welcome way to maintain contact with their families, and can be a lifesaver in emergencies, whether the emergencies involve the missionaries themselves or the people with whom they are working.

But, as any genuine missionary organization is chronically short on funds, the temptation can be great to use Amateur Radio also for communications directly concerning the organization's work itself, especially as such work is often in an isolated place where mail comes by oxcart, air mail by carrier pigeon and telegrams by lorn-lorn. In addition, the non-profit nature of the work may cause some to feel they are not prohibited from using Amateur Radio to pass traffic in connection with the work. It's all right, they feel, because this traffic is not commercial.

But note the third-party agreements and the FCC rules say nothing about whether or not a group is organized for profit, but rather, internationally, whether the message is important enough to justify the use of commercial telecommunication channels, or, domestically, whether the message concerns the regular business affairs of any person.

Granted, there is a gray area here, where some would consider a cablegram or an overseas phone call justified and others would not, but there are also many instances where there is no question. If a \$20 phone call saves the caller \$200, there's no question that recourse to public communication

too, stricter than the administrations of many other nations, because of the size of the U.S. Amateur Radio Service, and because of the large volume of domestic traffic being handled by U.S. amateurs.

As for asking for a clarification from the FCC, don't do it. On previous occasions the FCC's staffers have replied that they think the rule is clear as it stands, couldn't be any clearer. Furthermore, the FCC is already overworked and understaffed and underfinanced, and to make such a clarification would only add to the burden and the expense. For the FCC must follow all the requirements of the Administrative Procedures Act if its ruling is to be legally binding, and what good would an invalid ruling be?

If too many questions are raised on this matter, the FCC might even in frustration decide that the whole question of third-party traffic is too much of a nuisance, more trouble than it's worth, and so it would be simpler just to prohibit it entirely. In this way the rule would be clear, which is what the petitioner requested, but certainly no what the petitioner wanted.

With the World Administrative Radiotelegraph Conference coming up the thought arises of amending the General Radio Regulations to permit amateur stations in isolated locations to handle third-party traffic, else to make a special arrangement for missionaries and others in similar work to have their own radio communication service. But don't hold your breath until either happen. To secure passage of either proposal would require a huge selling job.

Many of the frequency-hungry Amateur Radio will be more inclined to grant it any additional privileges. That's one reason why it's important we scrupulously observe the rule at this time, leaving no doubt that we are law-abiding group. A clean record by itself won't mean much

and except where special agreements have been made between the countries concerned, the rule is simple and clear: absolutely no third-party communications.

This means not only no formal traffic, it means no phone patches. It even means that you may not permit a visitor in your radio room to talk to an amateur in another country, nor may you address a person in the other station's radio room other than the control operator, unless there is a third-party agreement between the two countries. Only if the visitor to your station is a licensed amateur qualified to operate on the frequency you are using may you allow the visitor to communicate with the other station by turning the control operator's function over to the visitor. It seems stupid to some of us, your columnist included, but it's the law.

Third-party agreements

The first exception, distress traffic, is rare enough that few of us have to make use of it, but it's good to bear in mind. On occasion, operators trying to handle such traffic have been obstructed by lide objecting that, "It's third-party traffic with prohibited countries," and proceeding to cause such interference that communication becomes difficult or impossible, not realizing that they themselves are violating a law, as deliberate interference is always prohibited. In this case there's the aggravating circumstance that they are interfering with distress communications.

Incidentally, paragraph 33 of the Eighth Notice of Inquiry in Docket 20271, the FCC's ongoing preparation for WARC-79, proposes to add a footnote to the table of allocations that would provide for setting aside the top 10 kilohertz of each HF amateur band worldwide for disaster communication. It would be open to general amateur use at other times.

long-distance telecommunication and directs that important traffic be put on commercial telegraph circuits at the first opportunity. Back then, long-distance phone calls cost much more than telegrams, a coast-to-coast phone call running maybe \$12 for three minutes. More recent agreements have no such provisions.

In actual practice, however, the agreements are all much the same, and, since the FCC's ruling in the Eye Bank matter (Docket 19246) back in 1972, international and domestic traffic are for practical purposes governed by the same rules.

Only personal messages may be handled, not business messages, not commercial traffic, except for emergency traffic. And emergency traffic does not mean any traffic in times of emergency, but only such traffic as is necessary for protection of life and property. If it's a message that would otherwise be sent by commercial circuits, it has no place on an amateur net.

Some amateurs are a bit too strict, however, and object to handling traffic where one would otherwise write a letter. The international agreements say that third-

services is justified, and such traffic should not go by Amateur Radio.

Such a rule does impose a hardship on workers in remote areas who don't have any available means of telecommunication except Amateur Radio and who are forbidden to use it except for emergencies. The only agreement that makes provision for this is the one between the U.S. and Canada where amateur stations may handle any traffic from persons in isolated places with no other means of telecommunication available, with such messages to be put on the regular public circuits at the first opportunity.

Write to FCC?

Some, faced with this problem, have suggested writing to the FCC to ask for a clarification or for a rule change. As far as changing the rule, the FCC did not make the rule governing international third-party traffic, either the general one prohibiting it entirely or the special agreements between countries permitting it. The FCC has only the responsibility to enforce it as it stands, and has to take a rather strict position on it

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though, except to make it a little harder for those who want to take our frequency. What is really needed is something positive, something to make the delegates, in particular those from nations without much Amateur Radio activity, to want to support our Service.

In the past we had the discovery of the value of short waves back in the 1920s, extended-range VHF propagation in the 1930s. We have our ongoing public-service record, and our efforts to improve and extend our ability to serve the public are most important at this time.

To clinch our position, though, a technical breakthrough would be most helpful to convincing skeptical delegates that making frequencies available for amateurs is not waste but an investment. So get smart somebody, please!

Mid States Mobile Monitoring Service to be reactivated

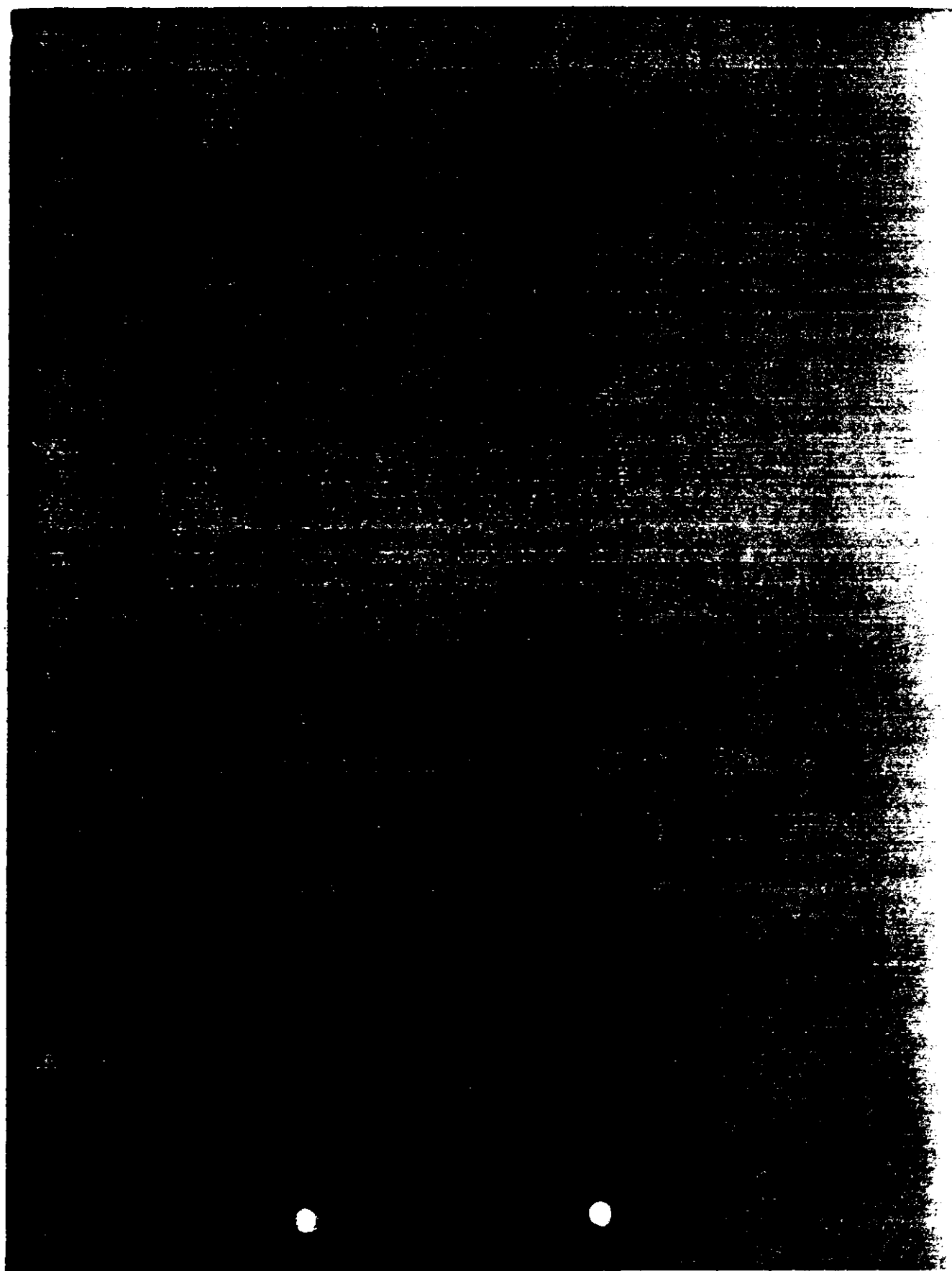

It was at this point that Mr. Stoen proposed that Rev. Jones become sexually involved with his wife, because, he sated she was obviously interested and he, Stoen, could not fulfill her sexual needs. He said that his position as D.A.s extremely important to him, and a divorce ~~that~~ at that time, with his "secret life" opened up for the public to see would destroy him. His insistence upon this plan-- which he presented as the only way out of his personal dilemma -- was intense. He pushed for the relationship ~~and~~ stressed over and over that "it was the only way out". The veiled threat of suicide was apparent.

However, there was another angle that at the time was not so aparent but which, in retrospect, is evident. Provocateurs are a well known phenomenon on the landscape of social activism. From an analysis of events over a period of time, it has become quite clear that Mr. Stoen,

was also using the opportunity as part of a design to disrupt the organization. There are several things which point to this conclusion. I will outline in brief.

2. On yet another occasion, Mr. Stoen was the only person who knew that Jim Jones was going to be in a certain place at a particular time. He was insistent that Rev. Jones be at that place, although Rev. Jones was going to cancel ~~because he didn't see it as all that important.~~ At the time, Mr. Stoen's intense, almost passionate argument for Jones to be there was puzzling.

Dear President Carter:

Our church has established a mission/community of over 1000 people of all races in the interior of Guyana, under the leadership of Rev. Jim Jones. We are pursuing a co-operative lifestyle as a kind of confessing community, according to the Acts of the Apostles, and live by Christ's commandment to feed the hungry and house the homeless.

We are engaged in practical projects centered around agriculture and livestock development, and are building much good will, showing the best of the American character (practicality, industriousness, neighborliness), and helping to eradicate the "Ugly American" and "Yankee" stereotypes among the local people which have been such an ~~enormous~~ obstacle to Hemispheric co-operation. We have won ^{COUNTLESS NO. OF} friends, and have been most praiseworthy of your Administration's efforts towards better U.S.-Caribbean and Latin American relations. The government of Guyana has been most ^{friendly} helpful to us, and it is clear that our presence here is a healthy factor towards ~~the~~ continued improvement of U.S.-Guyana relations.

In addition, thousands of amateur radio operators in the United States are also aware ^{and sympathetic to} of our work (Rev. Jones makes contacts nightly on the band), as well as many local government ~~ministers~~ and U.S. officials who have visited us here. We have been recently praised for our work by the World Council of Churches, as well as by many civic, religious and governmental officials, both locally, and in the United States.

You may be aware, however, that reactionary elements within the United States -- from the same quarters as those who have tried to sabotage your efforts to ~~make~~ make the Panama Canal Treaty a reality -- have conducted a relentless campaign against us, that has included efforts by various government agencies to harass ~~us~~ us. Our mail has been tampered with; ^{we have been reliably informed} the IRS has initiated efforts ~~against~~ against our assets; Social Security checks were withheld from our almost 250 senior residents here (though ^{because of your office intervention} the situation is now under control), and various schemes have been engineered, including attempts to pressure Congressmen and State Department officials to collaborate in the attacks and harassment. Just recently, the FCC has ^{been of the form of harassment} ~~tried to cut off our only means of communication~~ --amateur radio-- by dredging up a situation that was resolved a year ago, when it arose. The efforts have one purpose: to destroy our

It is difficult for us to understand why something cannot be done to protect us from these vicious efforts. How much can people be expected to bear? We need to be able to be free to pursue our work, to grow food, extend medical services, to educate children, to build homes -- the campaign against us is disrupting and undermining our work, diverting our funds into legal expenses, making it most difficult to function.

Finally,
With so much being expended by our government to safeguard human rights in various nations, it is ironic that efforts originating within the United States that would endanger the human rights of American citizens trying to do good for our country, would be an area of concern!

It is our desire to move forward in a ~~xxxxxxxxxx~~ progressive direction to build bridges of understanding, and in this we feel we are acting in the highest interests of both our host nation here (which, ~~is~~ although socialistic, is pursuing an independent, non-aligned course, and wants to be on friendly terms with the United States), and our American homeland.

We wish to make you aware ~~fixing~~, again, of this serious situation, and we appeal to you to protect ~~fix~~ our community and our efforts of good will, from the kind of schemes and undermining activities that have make it difficult for us to serve to our fullest capacity. We have made an impact here for ~~xxxxxxxxxx~~ the good intentions and helpfulness of the American people, and should efforts against us succeed, it would reflect very badly on the United States, needless to say.

It is our desire to be of service to the ideals of brotherhood and human service which are at the heart of our faith, and which we have seen given a very high priority in your presidency. We look to you, Mr. President, ~~for~~ as a man who can do something to ameliorate our situation. Thank you very much for your concern. (Rg. from JJ, etc.)

I would ^{also} like to make special mention of an incident that took place at our San Francisco headquarters church on March 8th that was most disturbing to us. A U.S. Government automobile (Lic. F-612658, California) parked behind our church, and one of the inhabitants proceeded to extensively photograph our church *from several different angles.* This was profoundly alienating to us, serving no purpose except to harass.

Furthermore, With regard to ~~the~~ IRS 'auditing' procedures: many of our members are completely 'fed up' with this obvious harassment. Friends have told us that they ~~are-tempted-to-just-lose-all~~ ^{have all but completely lost} faith in the integrity of governmental institutions because of such blatantly ~~inappropriate~~ abusive procedures, attacking the constitutional rights of literally thousands of people. Hundreds of people have told us not to even bother to protest these actions: that there is just no use. We haven't lost faith, and we will continue to demand integrity from our governmental institutions. ^{These} IRS activities are preposterous, especially in light of the fact that for many years our members have restricted themselves to asking only for a standard 10% deduction for contributions, though many were entitled by law to more. Our policy (instituted by Rev. Jones) that we ask for no more than 10%-no matter how much we have contributed, - was even mentioned admiringly in the press, as a testimony to our consideration of not wanting to ~~claim more~~ ^{take more of our rightful claims} in light of the general needs of the nation's general health, educational and welfare needs. Some of our members have followed this policy for

as long as ten years. *Our people have concluded in town forum meeting that for the last 10 years that we've been entitled to more deduction than we are well as our churches there. I am sure you understand. It has already been decided that if the government is not going to give us our rights*

So though we have done nothing wrong, we are now forced to pay for legal counsel to fight these reprehensible actions being undertaken by the IRS against us, as part of the efforts cited above. The feeling among many of our members now is such that, though we haven't received in our tax returns what we could have by our 10% policy, we will try to collect that money if we continue to be harassed, if only to recover some of our legal costs. These efforts against us, we are convinced, have one purpose: to destroy our work (CONTINUE WITH TEXT)

to do is not to help with your efforts to support peace and goodwill and understanding.

We are very tired and have now been the subject of harassment of several agencies of government. First it was Social Security, which through your intervention has been correct, but now it is The IRS, The Treasury department, and now the FCC are trying to cut our lifeline. These same agencies which are out to get us are the ones that would destroy a populist President like yourself. Every night on ham radio we build the Carter administration by praising the forward strides you have made throughout the world. We do not understand why the FCC would want this good will cut off.

Radical terrorist elements which defected from our church when we would not follow their posture, in our more idealistic days are now out to destroy our organization. 
How do you know what I've heard? I'm responding to your letter because it is the least presumptuous of all the 70-odd missals I've received from Peoples Temple members -- all of which betray a vacuous ignorance of both the Amateur Radio Service and the international and domestic regulations governing it.

Let it be said once for all: I have no qualms whatsoever with the Temple, or with its programs. My contention is with the illegal use of Amateur Radio to accomplish your goals. Period. I wish I could make it plain to your people that this is simply not a question open to debate: it is the conclusion of the Federal Communications Commission, and I expect it will soon be that of the International Telecommunication Union in Geneva, as well.

If you construe this to be evidence of a conspiracy against your movement, I pity you. For it is nothing more than a fair warning put forth to American radio amateurs that their licenses are in jeopardy if they engage in handling any illegal third party traffic emanating from WB6MID/8R3 in Guyana. We have more than 167,000 licensed members in our organization, and we are sworn to uphold their interests.

And to be assured that I am not in communication with anyone opposed to your movement, and hold no ill will towards The Peoples Temple.

Is the ARRL against phone patches? Well, aren't you the ARRL? Here at ARRL headquarters, we certainly haven't filed any petitions with the FCC regarding patching. Well, then what's all the furor about? Simply this: We have confronting us the most crucial *World Administrative Radio Conference* ever. And the indiscriminate phone patching one can hear any afternoon on 20 meters is beginning to cause radio amateurs the world over a lot of unneeded grief and concern. (We're talking about phone patches between the amateurs of different countries, of course, and not discussing in this column the domestic phone patch.)

Are international phone patches illegal? Yes - *unless* a third-party agreement has been signed between the countries involved. We print the list below; and we'll be printing it more often in the pages of *QST*. We can't use the patch to substitute for a landline call, either. Listen to what the international radio regulations have to say about that: "When transmissions between amateur stations of different countries are permitted, they shall be made in plain language, and shall be limited to messages of a technical nature relating to tests and to remarks of a personal character for which, by reason of their importance, recourse to the public telecommu-

nications service is not justified." (Article 41, ITU Radio Regulations)

So what you can talk about under the third-party agreements is rather limited. You can say "hello" to Aunt Min, but you can't say, "Sell Aunt Min's stock in Consolidated Ball and Chain!" You can say, "YA1XX will listen for you Friday at 1900Z," but not, "YA1XX is asking fellow amateurs to contribute pesos for a new tower." You can say, "We're praying for Father Jones and his mission"; you can't say, "Father Jones needs three gross more of hymnals in Swahili!"

If the third party for whom you are running a patch speaks in a language you don't happen to understand, you are still responsible for what that party says. So you should brief him before the patch as to what he can and can't talk about. We need hardly point out that all business communications are strictly prohibited.

On occasion, someone will write or call ARRL headquarters and say that we're making a mountain out of a molehill. Nothing could be further from the truth. Amateur radio has been stamped out in several countries already because of violations of this regulation, and its second part: "It is absolutely forbidden for amateur stations to be used for transmitting international communications on behalf of third parties" - *unless* third-party agreements exist between those countries.

We all know that WARC-79 will shape the future of amateur radio for the rest of this century. But are you aware that of the 153 member-countries of the International Telecommunication Union (which hosts the WARC and determines international telecommunications regulations), almost half (67) are not members of the International Amateur Radio Union - and that almost the same number have no organized amateur radio service? These countries comprise what is popularly referred to as the Third World. And at the present time, they hold nearly a majority of the votes at ITU. You can be sure that they are watching us closely, to see if what the ARRL/IARU WARC team has been saying about the need for amateur radio in developing countries is true. (We've been stressing, of course, that amateurs are law-abiding, professional communicators who provide vital technological expertise, emergency communications, and wide exposure to a developing nation's image.)

While we may not always agree with the severe restrictions imposed by international law (and the laws of other countries) concerning third-party communications, we had better adhere to them - or risk losing vitally needed frequencies at WARC-79 and, of course, the hope of signing future third-party agreements with other countries.

So, all we ask is that you think before you run that patch.

This is not to assail the operators for their commendable humanitarian acts, but merely to state for the record that their communications jeopardize the many privileges presently enjoyed by 347,000 licensed radio amateurs in the United States. Since the American Radio Relay League has as its chartered responsibility the protection of these privileges, I feel it my responsibility to point this out -- to you and to our members.

Field Operations is the monitoring department of FCC - Safety and Special ^{Radio} Services is the law enforcement/prosecution department. Safety and Sp. Svc. will prosecute you in court - Field Operations would come in and shut you down.

Confidential memo to Washington mentions informant who notified Washington we were going to switch licenses - before the switch ever took place. By the time Goldwater got into the picture, Field Ops had been on to us a long time, the Goldwater letter was not written by him, it was by someone else on his letter head. Didn't amount to much. 


The file which the Commission has on Peoples Temple and related activities is immense. We have examined not only the materials which the Commission has agreed to release to us but other files as well, including those containing thousands upon thousands of letters in support of the Peoples Temple.

Of primary interest to you will be a three-inch thick internal FCC correspondence file. This file contains copies of FCC intercepts, monitoring assignments conducted by members of the Field Operations Bureau, personal inspections of the Peoples Temple as well as complaints filed by members of the public against the Peoples Temple. The file is too voluminous to describe here. We have made arrangements to copy all of those documents which we feel may be of interest to you and your client.

These should follow in approximately one week.

Parenthetically, in our examination of the files, we did not see any letter from Barry Goldwater although we are digging deeper since we know it exists. We will be back to you shortly.


How do you know what I've heard? I'm responding to your letter because it is the least presumptuous of all the 70-odd missals I've received from Peoples Temple members -- all of which betray a vacuous ignorance of both the Amateur Radio Service and the international and domestic regulations governing it.

Let it be said once for all: I have no qualms whatsoever with the Temple, or with its programs. My contention is with the illegal use of Amateur Radio to accomplish your goals. Period. I wish I could make it plain to your people that this is simply not a question open to debate: it is the conclusion of the Federal Communications Commission, and I expect it will soon be that of the International Telecommunication Union in Geneva, as well.

If you construe this to be evidence of a conspiracy against your movement, I pity you. For it is nothing more than a fair warning put forth to American radio amateurs that their licenses are in jeopardy if they engage in handling any illegal third party traffic emanating from WB6MID/8R3 in Guyana. We have more than 167,000 licensed members in our organization, and we are sworn to uphold their interests.

I urge you, then, to withhold judgement until you have thoroughly familiarized yourself with Part 97 of the FCC Rules & Regulations, and Article 41 of the International Radio Regulations. And to be assured that I am not in communication with anyone opposed to your movement, and hold no ill will towards The Peoples Temple.

Think ... Before You Run That Patch

Is the ARRL against phone patches? Well, aren't you the ARRL? Here at ARRL headquarters, we certainly haven't filed any petitions with the FCC regarding patching. Well, then what's all the furor about? Simply this: We have confronting us the most crucial World Administrative Radio Conference ever. And the indiscriminate phone patching one can hear any afternoon on 20 meters is beginning to cause radio amateurs the world over a lot of unneeded grief and concern. (We're talking about phone patches between the amateurs of different countries, of course, and not discussing in this column the domestic phone patch.)

Are international phone patches illegal? Yes - unless a third-party agreement has been signed between the countries involved. We print the list below; and we'll be printing it more often in the pages of QST. We can't use the patch to substitute for a landline call, either. Listen to what the international radio regulations have to say about that:

When transmissions between amateur stations of different countries are permitted, they shall be made in plain language, and shall be limited to messages of a technical nature relating to tests and to remarks of a personal character for which, by reason of their unimportance, recourse to the public telecommunications service is not justified. (Article 41, ITU Radio Regulations)

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So what you can talk about under the third-party agreements is rather limited. You can say "hello" to Aunt Min, but you can't say, "Sell Aunt Min's stock in Consolidated Ball and Chain!" You can say, "YA1XX will listen for you Friday at 1900Z," but not, "YA1XX is asking fellow amateurs to contribute pesos for a new tower." You can say, "We're praying for Father Jones and his mission"; you can't say, "Father Jones needs three gross more of hymnals in Swahili!"

If the third party for whom you are running a patch speaks in a language you don't happen to understand, you are still responsible for what that party says. So you should brief him before the patch as to what he can and can't talk about. We need hardly point out that all business communications are strictly prohibited.

On occasion, someone will write or call ARRL headquarters and say that we're making a mountain out of a molehill. Nothing could be further from the truth. Amateur radio has been stamped out in several countries already because of violations of this regulation, and its second part: "It is absolutely forbidden for amateur stations to be used for transmitting international communications on behalf of third parties" - unless third-party agreements exist between those countries.

We all know that WARC-79 will shape the future of amateur radio for the rest of this century. But are you aware that of the 153 member-countries of the International Telecommunication Union (which hosts the WARC and determines international telecommunications regulations), almost half (67) are not members of the International Amateur Radio Union - and that almost the same number have no organized amateur radio service? These countries comprise what is popularly referred to as the Third World. And at the present time, they hold nearly a majority of the votes at ITU. You can be sure that they are watching us closely, to see if what the ARRL/IARU WARC team has been saying about the need for amateur radio in developing countries is true. (We've been stressing, of course, that amateurs are law-abiding, professional communicators who provide vital technological expertise, emergency communications, and wide exposure to a developing nation's image.)

While we may not always agree with the severe restrictions imposed by international law (and the laws of other countries) concerning third-party communications, we had better adhere to them - or risk losing vitally needed frequencies at WARC-79 and, of course, the hope of signing future third-party agreements with other countries.

So, all we ask is that you think before you run that patch.

(3) In cases of emergency, where the regular communication system is interrupted, amateurs may handle messages of any importance, same to be handed to the nearest point on the commercial telegraph system when in operation. (4) Amateurs may handle, in emergencies, traffic relating directly to the safety of life or property.

Yours of 18 October was a kind letter, and I want you to know that I appreciate it. Please rest assured that I am neither "the target of an effort to create problems for the radios of the Peoples Temple through questionable means," nor the bearer of ill will against your church.

Rather, I am a concerned radio amateur who has on my own time monitored the communications of WB6MID/8R3 and have found them to be blatantly illegal in several ways. Specifically, their communications violate Part 97.114 of the FCC Rules & Regulations and Article 41 of the International Radio Regulations. This is not to assail the operators for their commendable humanitarian acts, but merely to state for the record that their communications jeopardize the many privileges presently enjoyed by 347,000 licensed radio amateurs in the United States. Since the American Radio Relay League has as its chartered responsibility the protection of these privileges, I feel it my responsibility to point this out -- to you and to our members.

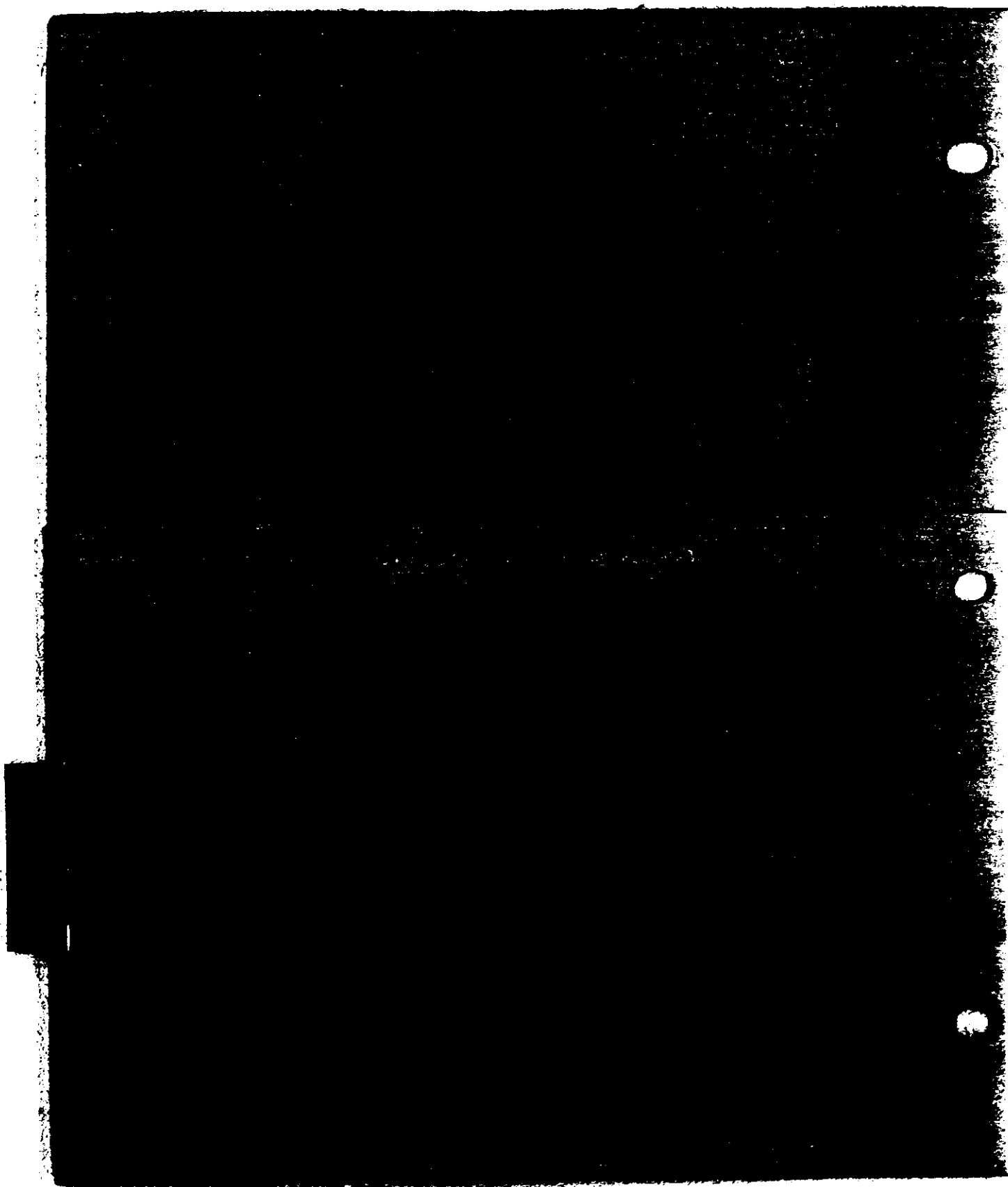
