Weeting with the Lr. McCoy from the US embassy, on 2 Avent/ Sept.

1977----Laura Johnston

Issue- McCoy wanted to meet with me because my "mom" had written to the US Ambassador to Guyana and asked what was going on with me, and would they check on my health, general wellbeing.

McCoy's statementwo

If there was an unofficial inquiry about someonw with ${\it FT}$ in Suyana, He'd call the Georgetown office to confirm that they live here.

If there was an official inquiry from the .ashington office, then he'll have to visit the person himself.

He recommended in his reprot to Lashington that he visit every 6 months, since so many US citizens are there, and plans for his next trip in February, '78.

He said that he was very impressed with the hard work that has been done there, but that it isn't the life for him. He said that it was too isolated—he couldn't jump in a car and move around if there, and on the other hand, there-was-tee-he couldn't do his own thing there. He said that he is comfortable, and didn't like wrivations, tho he has been through some, like the marines for 4 years, and the morean war, and he has chosen buyana because he can work as a free agent here, in his own office and doing things his way-- not like some of the big embassies which have alot of supervision. He said that the bb almost broke relations with buyana last October, and he was the charge'de Affairs, and at that time was tied to his desh. His medcaceor had had some problem, and he had been training 2 other staff, and he hadn't been able to visit when he would have liked to.

He said that the custody problems and the inquiry problems would continue, because for a group getting started in Luyana, not in the well-known parts of the world, parents not alarmed over not having more information. He said that Jim may or may not lose over the custody of John Stoen.

From accoy to JIN--- McCoy told washindon that he had visited, and that he was impressed with Jonestown. He wrote them that everyone was free to come and go. Teople were happy, healthy and that every in his short visit, he saw that no one was fearful, and there were no armed guards. He wrote that much work had been done in 3 years, and that altho he couldn't know everything in just 2 1/2 hrz., none were ther involuntarily. Everything was in the open. He wrote that everyone was free to come and go, as with broussard, who tent to Fort Kaituna, to Watthews Ridge, and then into Georgetown, and in now awaiting travel arrangements home(In other words, he didn't know that Leon had left already.) He said that he couldn't state categorically that no one was beaten, but his own observations show that he couldn't categorically say that they were. THIS HAD HIS REFORT

He said that in with his regular visits every ℓ mos. he'd take care of registering babies (must be done with in the first 5 years ofage), of seeing personally those getting social security—requirement that they be seen yearly; and he'll notify us ahead of time when he plans to visit so we can organize that part. Also, we must notify him of any deaths.

He has 7000 applications for visas to US, out af a country of 65000--10% he pointed out.

He said that he asked Carolyn Looman if she wanted to go, when they were in private, and he had his vehicle right there, and she said no. he said that he included this in a report.

He said that the Embassy could be helpful to us if we had a medical emergency and needed GDF to get someone out, or if someone had an emergency in the US that they had to go back for, or if someone had to go to Trinidad for a medical problem, etc. He said that the Embassy didn't just look into people's lives, that it would be helpful.

He said that Jit was very, very upset about the custody contacts, and the inquiries, and said that $\Re CCOy's$ own feelings were that he wouldn't investigate custody unless officially asked to because he felt that if we were able to get passports for the children, that obviously the parents had participated in that.

He said that if a lawyer, or a private investigator asked him to extradite someone on a charge, or for investigation, he would not, only if an "official court" sent him word would be turn the matter into the Luyanese officials for returning a person to the UL.

A man from the "to has called him, and talked to him since he's returned fromfrom J/tn. Then "cloy told him that he'd been impressed, the man didn't want to hear that. He said that the man had given him a list of names, he couldn't place the letter right then, but he wasn't'too worried about it, of children that were problems with custody. He said that he'd told the man his honest opinion.

McCoy said that he didn't like J/tn for himself because he didn't like cooperative living for himself. /K//

Dear Ms. Murphy:

On behalf of Secretary Vance, I want to thank you for your communication concerning the custody case of John Victor Stoen, which is currently in the courts in Guyana.

All the parties to this case are American citizens. The parents of the child are on one side and the People's Temple, a California religious organization that also operates in Guyana, on the other.

Our Ambassador and his staff in Guyana have taken an interest in the case, but have emphasized that the interest of the United States is confined to assuring that the matter is fairly and impertially adjudicated in the courts strictly on its merits and without outside interference from any quarter. Consistent with this position, the Embassy has avoided taking any sides in what is essentially a civil dispute between two groups of Americans. Nor has any pressure been brought by the Embassy on the Government of Guyana or its courts, which have yet to rule on the matter, in favor of one side or the other.

The inquiries made by the American Embassy on behalf of the child's parents were normal protective services that any American citizen abroad could expect to receive from his government. The inquiries were not attempts to interfere in the internal affairs of Guyana and, indeed, have not been interpreted as such.

While we in the Department of State sympathize very much with Mr. and Mrs. Stoen in their efforts to regain custody of their son, regrettably there is little we can do to be of assistance. Neither the nepartment of State nor the courts of the State of California have the authority to enforce a U.S. court decision concerning the custody of John Victor as long as he is physically located outside of the United States. Child custody orders issued in the United States are normally not accepted for enforcement in another country on the basis of comity. While any American custody decision might be given evidentiary weight in the Guyanese proceeding, by no means will it be binding on that court.

Since the initiation of the custody suit in Georgetown, the Department of State and our Embassy in Guyana have been in close contact with the Stoens and their attorneys, both American and Guyanese. The Embassy has attended all court proceedings, when permitted to attend, and has assisted the Stoens in gaining access to Guyanese Government officials. The Embassy has regularly had conversations with the opposing attorneys and has spoken with Mr. Jim Jones, the head of the People's Temple. As Mr. Jones is also an American citizen and entitled to the same rights and protection as Mr. and Mrs. Stoen, the Embassy has been careful to avoid prejudicing the outcome of the dispute. It is the Embassy's responsibility to seek to ensure that the judicial outcome of the dispute results from a fair and impartial determination of the merits of the case, and all of our efforts are so directed.

I question this kind of involvement by the Embassy and I would like to see that the Embassy does keep a neutral course regarding custody matters. I feel it's inappropriate for such an agency to behave in this way and hope it will be corrected.



In on a since the second of th

th cet Pecion of Corana has a tropical climate, but it's it is a prior to present, tempered by frade winds. Even in the ration of more than two hours of rain a day. Though not a discrete the advantable, thanks to the trades and the 40-50% cloud cover, the heat is the appearance. Nights are in the upper 60's, cool enough for a light in a couble't begin to describe the natural beauty of the wilderness, the sifile or that you can almost hear. The people in the capital (Connectors about miles area), actually call this part of the world "paradise."

The community I live in is located on one of the world's last frontiers: the forests near the Venezuela-Guyana border. Here, on seven in the case of virgin jungle allotted by the Guyana povernment in 1973, a green richard has been huilding an agricultural project. Already over a the case have been converted into cropland and pasture. Bananas, caseana, more a vegetables, and beans of many varieties are being cultivated. It wiskens, pips, rattle, goats, ducks and rabbits. The community is the city of extensive experimentation with the aim of developing a continuously cropped married array of foodstuffs that will not only feed its nearly 1,000 to the cuts, but will help boost the productivity of the surrounding region.

Perhaps more remarkable then the hundreds and hundreds of acres of tropical forest that are now producing food; more remarkable than the development of this lovely community out of virgin jungle, the housing constitution, affect, electric lighting, sanitary facilities, fruit trees planted everywhere, is the population of Jonestown. Almost one thousand people are here in "Jonestown and more come in every week. There are people here from every race, or hackground. Our farm supervisorial staff, for example, includes a Pomo dultum woman, a young man from Northunberland who grew up on a farm in the shadow of Roman ruins, a former county attorney from Northern California, a young man from the Philadelphia ghetto who, through the inspiration and help of Jim Jones, studied agronomy at Cal State, a young woman from rural Mississippi, a 55 year old farmer chemical engineer from a prominent family in Delaware, and an ex Hormon dairy farmer from Shasta County.

750 menior citizens, mostly black, mostly ghetto-dwellers who suffered from hypertension, are here finding a place of peace and beauty, a new lease on itse. The same goes for the over 200 teenagers and young adults who were unable to find the handle for their lives in the big cities. Here they have found something to put themselves into, a community to build, a challenging environment in a black nation.

The children have a future here. They are not, to use Paul Goodman's phrase. "growing up absurd." The world heregoakes sense. People are now part of a community, on land that is theirs, part of a purpose that is not confident to this community, but which is the pulse of the "third world." Here we have joined hearts, hands and minds with the Guyanese people in a massive effort to build a new society, based on the foundations of love and work, co-operation and equality.

The Temples Temple Agricultural Project has become a model competation. Guyans has been trying to get her people to settle the rich interior hero, to develop local resources, to move towards self-sufficiency and economic independence. We are doing just that out here, and in the process, as Americans, are building a kind of good will between the Caribbean peoples and our native United States. Government officials have praised our work high! American officials have come and have been impressed. One of Guyana's highest ranking ministers, a man who has traveled the world as a spokesman for a non-aligned nations, and who has addressed the U.N. General Assembly on several occasions, was moved to tears by what has been accomplished here, by the total absence of racism, sexism, and 'ageism,' and the place of honor given to senior citizens and children, the meticulous care of our medical staff, the happy faces, friendly and open people who have taken Guyana, and her people and her goals to heart. Visitors are chartering planes to come here, to see this group of Americans who defy the stereotypes.

My main task in coming here was to organize a high school program for about 90 youngsters. Besides several levels of instruction in language skills, math, and social studies, we have put together a "community development institute" that embodies practical study and training in all areas of building this entirely "home-made" community. The students are involved directly in learning about every aspect of agriculture, sanitation, mechanics, construction, food processing, composting, power plant technology, even some civil engineering and surveying, and more. The development of the community is the "open air school that brings study and practical application together. Since the school program merges with the life-style here, there is no such thing as "irrele vance."

It has been the most exciting, challenging, and rewarding educational experience of my life.

The students include local (Amerindian) teenagers along with the American settlers. We have dramatic proof out here in the jungles that social and environmental conditions determine what children will be like, and can bring about profound characterological changes that are almost unbelievable.

I have meen "street" kids who eraved only junk food, television and cars transformed, into gardeners, builders, scientists, leaders ... involved in constructive activity, regaining their health, eating and liking the natural foods here, developing confidence, responsibility, maturity. It is awe-inspiring to see them responding to the challenges of work and study in a culture, an environment that they can relate to. Some of the young people here were literally given up on by everyone — even the juvenile authorities didn't want to deal with them.

I'd note that quite a few of them -- bad they remained on the streets of San Francisco -- would have added hundreds of thousands, perhaps millions of dollars to what is being spent on programs for gahabilitation, and for the tepnir of wandalized property. Some of them were hell raisers and they would have no doubt helped to heat up the inner city.

1 have also been working on a program for the senior citizens who have come have retire. The oldest, a woman whose parents were slaves in Virginia.

to this besutiful, enchanting place. She will be 108 years old in Another fellow here, who came three years ago when the original

jumple acreage was being cleared, is 102. He remains active, by his own of the making furniture in his own shop.

We just cannot get the old folks here to "retire". The place turns them on, makes them formet they're old. Their wealth of experience has helped in no merous ways to find some tried-and-true, home-made solutions to prolitems that the younger folks never knew about. We have now set up a kind of high solutions program for those adults and seniors who didn't receive the advantages of the education (many grew up as children of tenant farmers and migrants, and happractically no schooling). It is moving to see people in their 70's and 80's diligently studying. They have also organized their own handicrafts and art classes. Their work has been displayed for the many visitors who come to the community, already famous and highly-regarded throughout the country.

Visitors stream in here. Guyana officials, as well as Americans, such as California's Lt. Governor Merv Dymally, anxious to see what has been termed by the Guyanese as a "model of co-operation."

The amazing thing to practically all who come is not only the co-operative spirit, the comprehensive planning and management that has gone into the project (with no outside funding), but the total lack of racism here: blacks, whites, Amerindians, latinos, Orientals, everyone working together like n big family. We know it has been precisely this level of human co-operation that has made the project such a success.

I wanted to also remark on the extensive medical services we have been able to bring to the region. Our clinic has saved lives, and is doing wonders in preventing and controlling parasite-caused illnessed common to the tropics, such as gastroeneuritis.

The level of health care among residents here is very high -- higher than it was previously. The climate, diet, and peaceful, pressure-free surroundings have practically eliminated hypertension problems, kidney ailments, even heart problems among the elderly. A group of specialists and naturalists in the community have been working on herbal medicines, and we've had many successes - for example, with papaya, in healing sores.

I took a leave from the college for one year. I didn't know what I was going to do when the year was up. I cannot see anything in front of me now but to continue with the work that is going on here. I will doubtless return to the States at some time in the future, but now, that is far from my mind.

The besuty here; the sense of the unexplored; the challenges of building a new community; the children who today have a new lease on life; the older people who can finally live in peace, in a place that is in real sense theirs, where they can have a voice, a dignity; these are all compelling reasons for me to remain.

While it may seem that this jungle is a place of excape, a retreat from the modern world, it is quite the opposite: here all is growth, all is rebirth, new horizons, becoming, development, a <u>future</u>.

He said that he did not say anything to them, and that not only did he not want to, but could not because of the privacy act. I He said the guy probably wants to kick himself because he had been in his office and had not mentioned anything about PT. McCoy said he would not have anyway because of the privacy act. The writer and the photographer had come in to see if McCoy could help get imm their stay extended since they had already gone through the normal channels and had been refused. They had been given only 24 hours. He told them there was nothing in he could do and keemed besides that, the writer, Gorden Lindsey, was m British. (The photographer is American). McCoy told them to go to the British High Command. We asked him if he could do anything about the situation with the plane of course he said no. He & said the plane is from Trinidad, and the responsibility would be on the pilot, not the people who hired him. Also, he said that the International Civil Aeronautics Code is very lax and me rarely enforced here. **ERRENTPlanes* in this part of the world often fly through each other airspace without filing a flight plan and that/is is not as uptight a situation as say planes flying between east and western Europe. M He said the story would probably be a smear, but that it didn't make anydiffernce since it was just a rag. --McCoy said that if he were im asked to comment about Jonestown, he could tell in people things like there is electricty, there is a communal kitchen. He said he could say that he is free to move around and that it does not appear that people are being held against theri will. He said that he could not comment about situations like mine. because it is not something tangible that you can prove, just a psychological opinion. Also he said he would have to say that a person is not being held against their will if that is what they told him. It would make no difference if he beleived it or not, he would still have to say it. --He would not put his comment on the bottom of either the Hunter or the Layton articles. We kept handing them to him and he kept saying he didn't have anything to say. (we will talk to him with the new instructions) He said it was untrue that Debbie graxix came in secretly, but that Dan Weber did give her a rideaxto the airport.

Issue- McCoy wanted to meet with me because my "mom" had written to the US Ambassador to Guyana and asked what was going on with $\pi\varepsilon$, and would they check on my health; general wellbeing.

McCoy's statements:

If there was an unofficial inquiry about someonw with PT in Guyana, He'd call the Georgetown office to confirm that they live here.

If there was an official inquiry from the Washington office, then he'll have to visit the person himself.

He recommended in his reprot to Washington that he visit every ϵ months, since so many US citizens are there, and plans for his next trip in February, '78.

He said that he was very impressed with the hard work that has been done there, but that it isn't the life for him. He said that it was too isolated—he couldn't jump in a car and move around if there, and on the other hand, there-was-tee—he couldn't do his own thing there. He said that he is comfortable, and didn't like privations, the has been through some, like the marines for 4 years, and the Forsan war, and he has chosen Guyana because he can work as a free agent here, in his own office and doing things his way—not like some of the big embassies which have alot of supervision. He said that the US almost broke relations with Guyana last October, and he was the Charge'de Affairs, and at that time was tied to his desk. His predeccesor had had some problem, and he had been training 2 other staff, and he hadn't been able to visit when he would have liked to.

He said that the custody problems and the inquiry problems would continue, because for a group getting started in Guyana, not in the well-known parts of the world, parents got alarmed over not having more information. He said that Jim may or may not lose over the custody of John (Stoen.

From McCoy to JIM---- McCoy told Washingon that he had visited, and that he was impressed with Jonestown. He wrote them that everyone was free to come and go. People were happy, healthy and that even in his short visit, he saw that no one was fearful, and there were no armed guards. He wrote that much work had been done in 3 years, and that altho he couldn't know everything in just 2 1/2 hrs., none were ther involuntarily. Everything was in the open. He wrote that everyone was free to come and go, as with Broussard, who went to Fort Kaituma, to Matthews Ridge, and then into Georgetown, and is now awaiting travel arrangements home(In other words, he didn't know that Leon had left already.) He said that he couldn't state categorically that no one was beaten, but his own observations show that he couldn't categorically say that they were. THIS WAS HIS REPORT

He said that in with his regular visits every 6 mos. he'd take care of registering babies (must be done with in the first 5 years of and), of seeing personally those getting social security—requirement that they be seen yearly; and he'll notify us ahead of time when he plans to visit so we can organize that part. Also, we must notify him of any deaths.

He has 7000 applications for visas to US, out of a country of 85000-10% he pointed out.

He said that the Embassy could be helpful to us if we had a medical emergency and needed GDF to get someone out, or if someone had an emergency in the US that they had to go back for, or if someone had to go to Trinidad for a medical problem, etc. He said that the Embassy didn't just look into people's lives, that it would be helpful.

He said that Jim was very, very upset about the custody contacts, and the inquiries, and said that McCoy's own feelings were that he wouldn't investigate custody unless officially asked to because be felt that if we were able to get passports for the children, that obviously the parents had participated in that.

He said that if a lawyer, or a private investigator asked him to extradite someone on a charge, or for investigation, he would not, only if an "official court" sent him word would he turn the matter into the Guyanese officials for returning a person to the US.

A man from the "US has called him, and talked to him since he's returned fromfrom J/tn. "When McCoy told him that he'd been impressed, the man didn't want to hear that. He said that the man had given him a list of names, he couldn't place the letter right then, but he wasnt'too worried about it, of children that were problems with custody. He said that he'd told the man his honest opinion.

McCoy said that he didn't like J/tn for himself because he didn't like cooperative living for himself. /ke/

He mentioned Joyce several times- not by her name, but as the medical practitioner. He mentioned in the context of the help the embassy could be-- that he'd noticed alot of seniors there, and also alot of children.

- -he said that at the State Dept they had asked about the decision and McCoy's \mathbb{A}_m bassador had said that we can't specialte on that as the case is in court and the attorneys are reputable

Now I'm sure, or I think it is a very good likelyhood that Debbie told him what I was coming in there for since she had spent the whole day there getting her passport.



DEAR FRIENDS:

The enclosed letter is sent to you from the stateside office of Peoples Temple Disciples of Christ and Bishop Jim Jones. Our church is, as you may already know, currently building a highly successful agricultural cooperative in Guyana's Northwest Region.

We have enclosed, for your information, an article written by our attorney, Charles Garry, about his first-hand impressions of the agricultral mission from his recent visit there. Mr. Garry is considered to be the greatest U.S. civil rights attorney and has helped a great number of especially black and minority defendants and political prisoners throughout his brilliant career. He was extremely impressed with everything he saw: with the country of Guyana, the many government leaders he met, and with the amazing progress of the Peoples Temple agricultural project under the direction of Bishop Jones.

Enclosed, also, is a statement by a highly trained social worker who has chosen to move to Guyana from the United States, Ms. Sharon Amos. Ms. Amos has three children in the Jonestown project and now resides there herself. As her report will show, she raves about the fullness and security of the cooperative lifestyle there.


Thirdly, and probably most important, we wanted to share with you a copy of the letter which the Lieutenant Governor of the State of California, Mr. Mervyn Dymally, sent to Prime Minister Forbes Burnham. The letter will speak for itself. It deals with the terrible realities of a conspiracy, a politically motivated attempt on the part of reactionary forces within the U.S. to render ineffective the progressive, socialist teachings and example of the Bishop Jim Jones. We are not the only ones to have suffered this kind of persecution. Martin Luther King, Malcolm X, John and Robert Kennedy, Black Panther Party leader Huey Newton, American Indian Movement leader Dennis Banks -even as far back as Sacco and Vanzetti and the Rosenbergs-people who have espoused progressive and collectivist views in this country have been subject to the extremes of harassment and in some cases even death.

clergymen in the nation by "Religion In America", an inter-faith organization

recognition of Paster Jones' guidance and inspiration in establishing the many humanitarian programs and facilities in Peoples Temple that attempt to meet every type of human need.

Peoples Temple extends throughout California with members in virtually every large city, who travel in the church's fleet of Greyhound-type buses to worship services at the Temples in Los Angeles, San Francisco, and the local facility in Redwood Valley.

The ministry is known for responding to both public and grivate appeals for assistance, giving strong support particularly to the local school system and law enforcement.

The Temple has rehabilitated ever 175 years people from hard-line drug habits and educated many local residents themsels in college reporters

through its college program.

Ronald Crawford is one young man who grew up in Ukiah and had to be rescued from the drug world. His rehabilitation by the Tumple was so anccessful that he is now on the dean's list in law school. His living expanses and education are fully aponored by the inter-racial church.

A young woman, Paula Adams, who was recred locally as a Listheran and still helds her faith precious, new Peoples Temple as a means of human service and is now helping to coordinate its agricultura mission in South America. reports to Washington on the strike were based on daily newspaper reports of the trouble.

FBI director J. Edgar Hoover himself vetoed a suggestion by the San Francisco office to print and distribute 40,000 leaflets to sow anger and confusion between the New Mobilization Committee to End the War and the Socialist Workers party, sponsors of the huge anti-war rally and march from downtown San Francisco to Golden Gate Park.

In turning down the proposal, Hoover expressed fear that the pamphlets might be traced to the FBI. Washington did not give approval to a scaled-down plan that called for mailing anonymous letters to local activists claiming the Socialist Workers were frozen out of the planning for the rally and march.

Another letter, aimed at dividing white and black activists, was drafted by FBI agents and sent to the Black Panther party newspaper. In part, the letter read:

"What's this bullshit SDS outfit? I'll tell you what they has finally showed there true color WHITE (sic). They are just like the commies and all the other white radical groups that suck up to the blacks and use us."

A covering note from Bates to Washington said, "This letter contains numerous errors, both grammatical as well as typegraphical. It is felt the editors of this newspaper will accept this letter as being legitimate and from one of their own kind."

The documents, which cover the period 1968 to 1971, say the FBI fed anti-left material to a source at the Examiner on a regular basis. The name of that person was deleted from the files by the FBI.

"It is recommended that a copy of the enclosed be furnished to (name deleted) for the San Francisco 'Examiner' who is an established source of the San Francisco Office and has been used on prior occasions under COINTELPRO," Bates wrote in a memo to Hoover on June 15, 1970.

The subject of the memo was the Institute for Policy Studies, a liberal think tank in Washington, and its San Francisco affiliate, the Bay Area Institute, which has offices at 604 Mission street in San Francisco.

Hoover approved providing the material, which linked the institutes to left wing organizations, but it appears a story was not published. Explained Bates in a later memo:

"They felt that it would be more proper to wait until they engaged in some activity which would make this article newsworthy. It would also make it easter for them to ask more direct and embarrassing questions. They are interested, will retain the material and advise when it is used."

Bates indicated he had better luck a year earlier, reporting that he provided the information that led to an Examiner story linking former Stanford professor H. BruceFranklin with a Maoist group at Stanford.

Before the article appeared in March, 1909, the professor's connections with the group had been secret. Bates said the story "sent shock waves through the group's executive board."

Ed Montgomery, a retired investigative reporter for the Examiner, filed a \$750,000 libel suit against the weekly Bay Guardian in May in connection with an article it published entitled "How the FBI "Nailed H. Bruce Franklin."

The suit claimed that the article characterized Montgomery as a "conduit for the FBI to plant stories in the Examiner." Montgomery denied yesterday that the FBI supplied him with any inside dope about Franklin.

According to FBI records in Washington, the San Francisco FBI office paid \$399 to an employee of the Express Times, who was also a member of SDS, to attend and report on a meeting of the underground press held in Madison, Wis., from Nov. 28 to Dec. 1, 1988.

According to FBI records, the informant chose to fly to the conference because he feared his colleagues planning to drive would be "snoking marijuana and frequently have accidents or are arrested en route over long distances."

In October, 1908, the FBI became aware of a radical plan to hijack a truck delivering military munitions in the Bay Area, according to the bureau's internal documents.

The agents knew who was behind the plot, but instead of taking action aginst the conspirators, the FBI suggested to Washington that the Army plant a story in area newspapers to let the radicals know authorities were on to them.

The San Francisco office heralded the success Young Republicans and the Young Americans for Freedom were having in countering left-wing activity at Stenford and recommended that Washington try to encourage similar activities around the nation. Hoover did so.

Hoover's high regard for COINTELPRO was demonstrated by an incident involving Vippie Jerry Rubin. Rubin was flying from Chicago to San Francisco on a student airline ticket even though he was not a student at the time.

He said they would send someone out to us when it came time to check out the SSA thing. He also said it took 3 months to get the checks changed to here.

I said it had been approved but that there was some bureaucratic red tape in getting it out of customes. He said he would mention it to the head of customs who he said was a friend of his. You never know what he will say to someone as he is so dual, but I that since he seemed to express that it was a good idea that it wouldn't hurt.

I mentioned how well the health of the Seniors was monitored also. At this time I mentioned that we had one older person with a terminal disease the I did not mentioned the name. I that I had better to this to prepare him in case someone did pass so that they wouldn't start a rumor. I say that everything had been done medically that could be, and now he was with hiswife and family there. I said it could be several months. He daid that if anyone did die, and wanted to receive insurance for the family, he would have to be notified and submit some official document which was apparently routine. He also said that if a family wanted to send the remains back to the US it would cost the family about \$\$\frac{1}{2}\$,000. I siad that would be unlikely in this case since the entire family was out there.

-In regard to parents contacting him-he alluded to Carolyn Looman again and said it was routine. I said something to the effect that parents just can't seem to relate to the idea that a younger person might want to live outside the U- and mentioned that I had studied in France, etc.i.e. my parents that this, he added and also the negative press has caused additional concern of parents or something to that effect. 


