Seiling under the motto "Books for a Free Hamibia", the ship Golden Harvest has just arrived in Dakar, Senegal to be refitted for the final phase of its 7,000 mile journey from Fortsmouth, England to Walvis Bay, Namibia. The 9 member international crew consisting of 2 women and 7 men (from Australia, Britain, Germany, Ireland, New Zealand, U.S.A., and Japan) will present 4,500 books benned by the South African Government but requested by the legitimate representatives of the Lamibian Excepte (the South West African Feonle's Organization and the Lamibian Estional Convention) meeting in Windhoek, Namibia in May 1977. The crew is openly challenging South Africa's illegal control in Ramibia by delivering these books.

like their South African neighbors, Lamibians are forced by the government to live under the rigid apartheid system, which denies blacks their most besic human rights. Blacks are forbidden to travel about the country without a special permit, and are compelled to work in a contract labor system which requires that they leave their homes and families for periods of at least a year, to do hard manual labor for berely subsistence wages. As a result of poverty and lock of pervices, 50% of the children in samibia die before the age of 5.

South Africa continues to maintain this control over the Namibian people inspite of both U.N. and World Court edicts declaring it illegal.

In addition, thousands of books, many of them by African writers, are banned because they are political, critical of government policy, or about black culture. Fven Black Reputy, a children's story about a horse, was banned at first because of its title; the ban was lifted because of embarrassing publicity about the incident.

The Golden Harvest and the banned books left Portsmouth, England on October 27, 1976, the tenth anniversary of the United Mations resolution declaring South Africa's occupation of Mamibia illegal. The 69 foot sailing vessel called on the port of Santa Cruz, Genery Islands, in December to lead a seminar about Mamibia at the University of Tenerife. The crew will continue to visit West African ports on route to Mamibia to contact supporters and government officials and to build public agareness of their action. After a short layover in Senegal for the rerigging, the boat will next sail to Accra, Ghans.

This action, known as the "Books for a Free Namibia" project, is part of (peration Namibia, a transmational compaign supporting independence for Namibia. Since its conception in 1975, Operation Namibia has grown to include organizers and supporters on five continents. Locally the project is represented by the Bay Area Lamibia Action Group. Other actions include a project focused on illegal corporate activities in Namibia.

In the M.S. the project has the support of the Derional Council of Courages and the sceniors griends Service Condittee.

SACRAMENTO UPDATE

Both the Senate and the Assembly have been hearing bills that propose to reinstate the death penalty. At the Senate Judiciary Committee hearing on February 22, Senator Deukmejian introduced his bill, SB 155, a comprehensive proposal setting up a three-phase trial for a variety of death-penalty crimes. First degree murder, sabotage, treason, train-wrecking, procuring the execution of an innocent person, bombing involving a death, and assault by a life prisoner would all be subject to the death pralty under SB 155. In the penalty is se, the presumption is that the sentence shall be death, unless the defendant is able to establish that mitigating circumstances call for leniency.

Deukmejian brought Evelle Younger and other state employees to the hearing who testified that the murder rate had gone up since the death penalty had been abolished in California, and that policemen's lives were endangered by fleeing felons. Opposing witnesses testified that the death penalty is useless as a deterrent, that it involves every citizen of the state in a killing, that it is barbaric, vengeful, morally unjustifiable and constitutionally unsound.

Testifying on behalf of the Friends Committee on Legislation, Isabel Bachels said "The legislature is embarking on a futile attempt to find the right way to do something that is fundamentally wrong...It is not surprising to see the crime rate go up when the United States spends time building up its armaments, when young men are required to give up years of their lives to learn how to kill, and when hour after hour of television programming is devoted to violence."

SB 155 was passed by the committee by a vote of 7 - 2.

Dear Mr. President:

During the past ten months the National Newspaper Publishers Association—Black Press of America has attempted on three occasions to establish communication with you. In accordance with an NNPA tradition, you were invited to the 36th Annual Convention of our association, June 9-12, 1976, to use our 36th Annual Convention as a forum to address yourself to issues confronting the Black electorate. Your refusal to attend the Philadelphia convention was announced in a telegram, June 11, 1976, in which you proffered an alternative proposal to meet with representatives of the National Newspaper Publishers Association any time after June 15, 1976. Many efforts were made between your nomination by the Democratic National Convention and the Presidential election, November 2, 1976, for the Black publishers to confer with you.

Shortly after your inauguration as the 39th President of the United States, NNPA invited you to appear as guest speaker at the Sesquicentennial Banquet honoring the founding of Freedom's Journal, the nation's first Black newspaper. The first two unsuccessful efforts to meet with you occurred while you were an aspirant to the high office of President of the United States; we recognize that every candidate has the right to accept or ignore the invitations of those who wish an audience with him. Moreover, the President of the United States also has a right to decide with whom he will confer. But, during a period of approximately 45 days you and your staff played a cat and mouse game, neither accepting nor rejecting our invitation to be the only speaker at the Banquet, highlighting a three-day commemorative event. The National Newspaper Publishers Association considers your behavior rude and disappointing.

If the American Newspaper Publishers Association (the White Press) had invited you to be the main speaker at a banquet honoring the 304th anniversary of the

founding of Public Occurrences, the first newspaper published in the American Colonies in 1673, would you have treated their invitation in such a cavalier fashion? Did your evening meal, March 18, 1976, with Dr. and Mrs. Henry Kissinger, former Secretary of State, and your foreign policy advisers better serve the interests of the nation? Does the 39th President have two different standards for dealing with former adversaries: one white and one black?

After the '76 presidential election, I have accommodated to the reality that for the next four years Jimmy Carter is the 39th President of the United States. Apparently you find it difficult to accommodate yourself to the reality that the organized Black Press of America has only one president. Whether the President of the United States or the President of NNPA display traits of mutual admiration is not particularly important. The welfare and tranquillity of the nation suffer when the Chief Executive and the leadership of the Black Press are neither communicating nor coordinating efforts to rescue the nation from both the institutional and the individual ravages of racism.

If there is honesty in his interrogation, a President who asks the question, "Why not the best?" must understand and utilize the Black Press, the interpreter and chronicler of the Black experience. The officers of NNPA have been successful in their efforts to communicate with every Chief Executive since the administration of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Of course, there have been many areas of serious disagreement between several of our presidents and the spokesmen for the organized Black Press. Yet, through all of these exchanges of ideas and the stating of seemingly opposite positions, your predecessors have never refused to reply to an invitation from the one sole Black-owned communication medium in the nation.

Hamilton Jordan and other members of your staff informed William Rowe, Acting Executive Director, NNPA, and John Smith, Executive Vice President and Editor, the Atlanta Inquirer, that we could expect a reply from your office seven days before the banquet event. Every effort on the part of our representatives to get a definitive answer to our invitation was strung along; at noon, March 18, in a telephone call to the White House, William Rowe was told that the White House's sending Vice President Mondale, as a drop-in on the NNPA convention luncheon, was the intended reply to our invitation to you. Moreover, your surrogates

stated that the White House briefing, not scheduled on our program and indeed conflicting with our schedule of events, was an additional response to our invitation to you as the Banquet speaker.

Previously, I have been impressed that a deeply religious man, who was a Sunday School teacher, sought and achieved the position of 39th President of the United States. It was hoped that an individual committed to religious principles of morality in his personal life would be able to start the process by which morality could become a behavioral trait of the nation, reflected in more equitable and moral treatment of those citizens who daily endure the ravages of racism, sexism and classism in our society. Foreign policy is the mirrored image of domestic policy; therefore, a nation being led by a religiously committed president trying to implement the principles of morality on the broad terrain of our national affairs would be able to infuse the same national commitment to high morality and human dignity in the nation's policies in the international community. As a former Sunday School teacher and Trustee of the Historic Third Baptist Church in San Francisco, California, as one Christian I proclaim: "Your failure to reply either yay or nay to our invitation, thereby preventing the Sesquicentennial Banquet from having a featured speaker, was an evil deed not anticipated from a President who professes to march to the drumbeat of high moral and ethical principles."

From the distance, you appear to be a highly intelligent man using the rhetoric of concern for "the least of these," but the true test of what the 39th President of the United States is "all about" is neither your magnanimous behavior in the affairs of state with a world-wide public preview, nor your plous utterances in defense of human rights, but will be found in the petty little things which you do in your personal vendetta against the most politically important force in Black America, the press serving twenty-five million Black Americans, who are more numerous than the population of any of 157 other nations in the world.

For some 150 years this Black Press of America has struggled along Freedom's Road with a few friends and many mighty enemies. The Black Press of America would like to have a friend in the White House; yet, if the hand of friendship, extended thrice, is to be permanently refused, so be it! We shall always demand respect from our enemies.

There are many programs affecting the nation in the area of housing, education, employment, police-community relations, the four cornerstones of our racist society delineated in President Johnson's Commission on Civil Disorder's Report.

Moreover, as a nuclear scientist you understand the futility and the insanity of the world's headlong ravaging of its resources in nuclear and military armaments. Not even the USA can endure the staggering annual expenditure of \$120-plus billion of its economic resources in the folly of guaranteeing peace through strength. Many sacrifices will be required of our people. They must be told the stark reality; rich USA cannot provide both guns and butter for her people. A president castigated by the military-industrial-political complex as "visionary and naive" when he talks about nuclear and general disarmament is not a visionary, but a man possessed of the capacity to see the dire consequence for civilization. The American people must understand this President's mission to stop the madding international nuclear and conventional arms race; moreover, tens of millions of our people must rally to such a President's crusade to rescue a suffering humanity.

For 150 years the Black Press has struggled to articulate the needs of both the Black masses and the White majority which it serves. Proudly, we proclaim that some small service has been rendered to the nation by the Black Press. As it moves toward its bicentennial anniversary, this Black Press shall continue to criticize public and private officials, in high and low station, whose covert and overt behavior we deem inimical to the well-being of the people.

Mr. President, I apologize for having written two letters in one: one a protest of an insult to the Black Press of America, and the other a statement of concern for your search for a world-wide formula of nuclear and general disarmament. It is obvious that the first subject triggered the opportunity for a discussion of the second. Since the opportunities for an exchange of correspondence will be limited, I hope that my rationalization for this letter's length is understood.


