Mike Charles Place

Basically, Mike doesnot want Guyanese dollars because they are not useable on the money market.. He can use CARRIBEAN DOLLARS which are from St Lucia, Monstrane, San Croix... He said that only Guyana currence is not changeable.

Said \$250,000 in Guyanese or Carribbean value --but won't take Guyanese dollars because he can't get rid of them. Will cut this by 30% or bringing it down to:

\$175,000 which might be broken down as follows...  
(90,000) Stock --but not sure how much he has in stock..  
Whatever we dicker for, I think we should figure to include \$90,000 for stock, then take an inventory at time of purchase and deduct whatever amount it comes up below the 90... that is Let's say our final offer was \$150,000 total, to include \$90,000 inventory.. Thus if his inventory proves to be only 60,000, then another \$30,000 should be deducted from our price...I think we should negotiate this way..

---

85,000 balance of price after stock is deducted  
(23,000) is the value we figured as tops for the store without inventory

---

62,000  
(20,000) house

---

(42,000) disco

Further, he said he would consider a time plan...on balance.. If we could negotiate two separate deals... the store on one and the disco on the other with two separate titles... then we might pay cash for the store and pay on some "as we get it" basis for the disco.. if it is successful, we pay him off faster.. Meanwhile, our money would be available to us to spend or make a profit from... Particularly if we could negotiate a no-interest type of loan on the balance of the disco business.. Keeping in mind that we care for a lot of Guyanese children and orphans and seniors... We could straggle out payment on the disco for a long time to come, probably, if we wanted to... or make it interest free for 1 or 2 years, at least... keeping the store clear and free of incumbrances.

To get him to give it to us for a lower price, we might consider "exchanging some of his Guyanese dollars" for some of our Granada dollars... Since his problem is the inability to get the Guyanese dollars out or the inability to sell his Guyanese dollars, if he sells them he will have to HEAVILY discount them --perhaps 50 to 75% on the dollar... I may be far too high, but it is a possibility where the Guyana dollar cannot be used on the foreign market. And, this may change after Reed's trip to Russia... or within thenext year..

In other words, we might offer him \$150,000 and offer to exchange \$10 or \$20 thousand of his guyanese dollars for \$10 or \$20 thousand of our Granada dollars... or maybe it would be too risky?

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS: Mike said that the government took over the 2.4 million fines business..manganese mine.. Mentioned they "took" the company owned housing over and sold to the dwellers conditionally: that they could only sell it back to the government if they wanted to leave.. Some paid \$250 and some

paid \$1.00... that is what they get refunded if they want to leave the housing. But they can sell to no one else.

Mike also mentioned he owes \$9,000 on his truck and has already paid \$8,000 on it... that he will have to pay this off and go to the Traffic Office and change the registration... It seems strange, if he has so much Guyanese money in hand that he would be owing \$9000 on the truck... it seems a little inconsistent. I think he put a lot into the building of the disco... and I think he may have sold Julian some of his stock... since he was last time quite certain he had around \$90,000 inventory, and this time was "very" uncertain.. Also, Julian was coming out to talk to us about buying his business at the ridge and never came out. It is just a thought.

.. Mike said the C. O. had said would pay cash to the people, and on the last two pay periods he did pay them, but the back pay is not yet paid.. Mike said this was promised, however.

FEB MEETING WITH RICHARD JANARO  
11 August 78

*Dad*

Attending: Johnny Jones, James Morrell, Charlie Touchette, Jan Wilsey, Harold Bogue, Lee Ingram, Kay Nelson, Gene Chaikin, Jack Beam, Tish Leroy, Mike Prokes, and Richard Janaro of the F. E. B.

and Helen Swinney, Cleve Swinney and other triumvirate members Sarah Tropp and Carolyn Layton.

We had heard that Richard was unhappy.. Yes, he said, and he did not know if he was right or wrong. Felt that at one time he had been considered quite indispensable and now that he was the subject of disfavor. He assumed that he needed help in judgment. He tried to behave as concerned as he knew how.. He said he tried to get the message on the radio, but without much success so he tried to resolve things by himself.

Lee Report? Lee asked: Dealing with the amount of money you had to deal with, I'd think you'd push at ever you had to to get to the radio. Then, he should have at least written up a report and sent it in to Dad.. he did not do this.

Richard complained he kept Maria informed and had asked several times to have the message sent in on the radio.. but admitted he had not and should have sent in the written report to Dad. He committed to write regular reports in the future.

Potential The boat's potential is up to \$1,000 per day.. and with that in mind, he should have done something to communicate the loss to dad. In his report to dad he accounted for a specific loss of over \$1000 per day..and he anticipated a 10 day time loss..or \$10,000. Under those circumstances he should have communicated --since even small expenditures must be cleared by Dad directly.

Heard of it When Richard heard or had been told that the GEARS AND THE CLUTCH PLATES were damaged -- that day he should have contacted Dad because he knew there was down time to fix it all..

Richard: "When I discovered that we couldn't load the boat, I was shocked." He had gone around and gotten a full load lined up, but when he approached the Captain with it --the Captain advised against loading the boat. The Captain had not told Richard of the problem until this point.. which he clearly had a responsibility to do because Richard is the person who pays him his salary and all of the expenses

Richard agrees that he gave the matter too little thought when it happened. He should have "felt" more critical of the Captain and former owner in the matter. In talking with us, he was somewhat defensive of them.. he later agreed with us that we had been taken for a ride...

Clutch We have a repair part for the clutch plate -- but we do not have the lining. Need a total of 7 clutch plates.

Lining?

No lining for them is available in Guyana. It is possible that this is available in Trinidad. Richard had the agent telex the company in Holland and get prices on 7 clutch plates. He finally decided to order them in spite of the time it takes to get it--they will be on hand for future use, if we are able to get them locally or in this area.

If we could get those things, we could get everything that is necessary to assemble this.

The following goals of this meeting:

DEVELOP A PLAN OF ACTION FOR DEALING WITH RAMBARON, LOOKING AT THE FACT THAT WE WILL BE LOOKING AT BEING OUT OF OPERATION FOR SIX WEEKS OR LONGER... and

THE BOOKS ON THE ALBATROSS -- WE ASKED YOU TO BRING ALL THE PAPERS OUT WITH YOU..Richard brought what he had, but had gotten no message though Prokes had advised us that he had given the message for Richard.

The lining:

Does it take special equipment to install? Richard said he talked with a machine operator in town who said that they could put the lining on without any trouble and that they were doing it for another boat in Georgetown now..

Rambaran

Richard thinks there are two things we must see as possible.

Rambaran ordered the parts when he needed them and ordered the rest and put it in place in his store room and Richard was told that Rambaran had the parts there... (When Richard bought the boat, Rambaran said that he had some parts in the store room and Richard could pick them up -- he had rest of parts on the boat which Rambaran wanted to be paid for --about \$12,000 and Dad had said to get Rambaran to let them stay there and we'd talk of payment later..)

Rambaran told his brother to let Richard have access to any of the parts that he wanted. It took another 6 to 7 days to dissemble this. He gave us the clutch plates but no lining.

Engineer

Jack mentioned that the engineer should have let us know that this was a possibility of its happening to us.. He knew about the prior inspection -- and when the trouble happened on the trip back to Georgetown why did he not tell us this if such a problem and he knew it?

Rambaran

The former owner has no legal responsibility to reimburse us... We have \$12,000 in parts on the boat for the engine. The parts are stored away on the vessel.

Insurance

Because this boat is insured by LLOYDS OF LONDON, before they will insure it everything must be good. The Captain had to know that there was a serious

problem.

**Philip** Philip will be going on the boat and possibly Helen. However, Dad said he doesn't want her on the boat till her arm is healed.

**Sarah** Sarah said the \$12,000 in parts is a good start, and we aren't going to give them back to him. He had to give us the spares.

**DONATION** We sited several possibilities for talking with Rambaran.. Since we have no legal hold against him for redress, it was decided we should appeal to his conscience.. the children we feed and care for, the medical care we give the people in the district, etc. TRY FOR A DONATION.

**Van Sleitman** Charlie said that Van Sleitman is one of the hardest of businessmen to approach for money or donations.. and that C. T. had spent 1 1/2 hours telling him all about our project. At first he did not want to come down any because it was a fixed deal.. the price had been set and we had accepted it. Then, he softened when he heard all that we were doing and finally ended with promising to make a sizeable donation to us..or a STRONG donation as C. T. phrased it.

**The crew** Lee said we should question the crew.. It was decided that this happened because someone had put it in reverse at too high an RPM. The 3 sailors, captain, engineer, mate and cook -- we decided not any use to approach other than the captain: responsibility was with him..and Richard said that the boat had stalled twice enroute back to Georgetown and only the Captain and Engineer had known it and they had not communicated this to Richard.

When the crew allows the big beam to just swing to with no notice that they are coming out of the hold with something.. they are not very concerned! There should have been a safety whistle or something. Our people could have been seriously injured.. or people could be killed and our insurance would be charged.

**Passengers Free** Richard said the people riding free on the boat were at the prerogative of the captain... The board felt Richard was far too permissive on this issue. The owners of boats do have some say in what does and does not go on on the boat! We are responsible for any on board and all that happens to them -- and we are paying for the food. As long as we are footing the bill, we have a say...

**Licensing** Tish questioned if we should not contact the licensing board for the Captain papers.. He had a liability to notify us of the trouble since Richard was on board and he knew Richard was in charge of the boat, and had been receiving his salary and stores from Richard. If he knows that Richard represents the owners of the boat, it may make a difference. THE LAW SHOULD HAVE BEEN LAID DOWN TO THE CAPTAIN. Richard was too passive with him and too

willing to please... in an area where he was buying the services of the captain, and should have kept the relationship in that context.

**RULES**

When they go back to the Captain, we must have in mind the rules the BOARD wants enforced on the boat..

Some of the rules suggested were...

**No woman**

If we propose no women on board, we are going to alienate the crew. They are used to having their parties on the boat.. they have wives in Georgetown but only go home occasionally.. The captain has 9 children and a wife in both Georgetown and Trinidad.. He is satisfied with his salary at this time.

All of the other boats in the harbor have the women coming on board with the exception of the government boat which has specific day hours and the crew goes home at night.. only the night watchman is allowed on board at night.

**Crane**

Tell them they must blow the whistle before bringing the crane out of the hold so that lives are not in danger from it..

**Painting**

The maintenance on the boat is poor --rusting on the hinges and hatches.. needs chipping and painting done regularly.. The crew is lazy or they would do this on a regular basis, and the Captain is remiss in this also. When they are in port, the maintenance should be done on a regular basis since they are being paid for their time.

**THE BOARD**

The "Board" will send Richard and at least one other, an integrated group, in to talk with the Captain.. Point out to the Captain all of the inconsistencies, that our Board is very upset, and these are our rules .. and since we are liable for injuries and pay the insurance on the boat --then we are going to be the controlling factors on the boat.

However, we must be prepared at this point that the Captain and crew might leave.. must have our people on hand to go on board if need be and be prepared to take it over.

**Itemization**

We need to itemize every point and be resolved as to the position we need to take on each point. We need to itemize every point on which they deceived us so that they will at least realize we are under no illusions. Let them know we are very pissed off...

**Staying on...**

Cleve said when the Captain got ready to come in and sell this boat to us, that the Captain said he had a meeting with us in the town in the evening with everybody and they talked him into staying with the boat and the crew. He had wanted to leave and go to a larger boat and Rambaran had promised him this...

Rambaran was assuring the Captain that he would have a job.. the Captain was to stay on for two months at least.

Engineer The engineer should be there when the motor is fixed.. (our own person).. and Philip should also be there to help put it back together. Philip must get his license and we must be prepared to lose this crew...

\$300 allowance Richard was asked what the captain used the \$300 allotment for that Richard gave him monthly for expenses.

Richard said the bulk of food is included in the \$800 a month for supplies including basic staples and meat and flour and beans.. Coffee, tea.. The previous owners provided him \$50 with the understanding that he buy the small day-to-day provisions.. ice, etc., as needed, with the stipulation that the captain furnish receipts, etc. With us, the captain buys the meats and fish and cheeses, etc.; which Richard would have to do for them and would probably not know where to get the best buys as the Captain does..

Purch 24 May We have spent \$6000 plus \$1300 which we furnished from our resources, since May 24. The rest has all come from the boat. The rest has been given to us in advances.

Carolyn suggested we offer him a raise --or say we would be willing to consider a raise "if he comes up to our standards.." of performance.

TEACHING PHILIP Richard did not think this was necessary at all --he does not feel we should even bring up a raise.. RICHARD FEARS THE CAPTAIN'S REACTION AT THE TEACHING OF PHILIP FOR HE WILL THEN KNOW THAT HIS DAYS ON BOARD ARE LIMITED.. Richard feels it will be necessary that we assure him how long he will have employment.. Can we have an understanding with RAMBARAN that he will take the Captain back and that he has a job for him. Maybe it should be re-stated and the man will do a better job of teaching Philip. Let the Captain and Rambaran know that we KNOW THAT WE WERE CHEATED but that we do not intend to have our friendship end with that.. rather it is our intention to maintain the friendship and do what we can in the future to help each other... and try to procure a sizeable donation for the project from Rambaran.

Captain now.. We must face the real possibility of having to get a new captain immediately, and it may take us a while to get Philip licensed.

One way? Gene asked if it was economically feasible to ship one way and dead run back.. and Richard said it was not. At this time, our expenses are cumulative.

How many loads How many loads can we get each month out of Georgetown?

Richard stated that one trip each way could be a normal expectation for now -- could not get more than this at this time.

Richard would have to be there and see that our loads are there and that our commitments are met. The captain helps with the cooperation of the stevedores on the docks.. They all know each other..and enjoy visiting. The stevedores have a lot to do with whether or not your boat gets unloaded promptly, etc.

Richard feels he would like to experience the whole process at least once or twice while we still have this captain.

C. T. has heard from others in town that with John Fernandes, you have no trouble with your loads.. but with Abrahams, you will have to have a man on the docks or you will not get your load full.. Abrahams has to be watched.. He is the most popular and the oldest agent in the business there and Rambaran has had a very successful relationship with him. He has made friends with many people.

SCHOONER CLUB

Thus far, our affiliation with him has saved us \$9000 on insurance alone.. and he has saved us on other items. Was one of the original "Schooner Club" --a group that set up in the islands to get loads for the boats when shipping was very hard times for the boat owners. There is another agent in the Barbados and around the Caribbean.

Security

The captain has advised us that if there is a load on board, he wants us to put security on it -- but if it is just the boat, that the Captain will take the responsibility for it. He will want it secured on board from 6 pm to 6 am...

Helen asked if some of our people should not be on the boat? Richard thinks we may do some amount of harm if we try to put people on the boat. Others felt that at least one of our people, Philip and the engineer if we send one in, would serve to inhibit their style just a little so they would not take so many liberties.

Appointments

Richard had a lot of appointments set up in Trinidad in July that he did not meet --including getting the inspection extension in writing that guaranteed our validity of insurance.

Law

We need to lay down the law to the captain that we need to be informed immediately of anything breaking on the boat.. and can tell them no passengers on the open sea.. let them have their guests in port.. as the other ships allow..

**Regular Hours** C. T. thinks we should do like the government boat and have the crew keep regular hours -- 6-4 or whatever.. while they are in the Georgetown port..they all have homes in Georgetown, This would mean putting our folk on board for security at night.

Charlie said that even in Port Kaituma.. they were inhibited by us a little at first, but after the second day they started their partying right there in Kaituma..

**Specifics** We must definitely tell them we think they failed to notify us and had that responsibility..

Need to select a second person --make up a list that Dad can select from.. Must have people with ties here. Can't bring down direct from the states--they must come out here first.

Jim Morrell suggested put some of our seniors to live on the boat -- the group did not concur with him.. felt they would not be sufficiently strong to make any impression on the captain or crew. If Philip is going in, Philip should be on the boat..

**PRIORITY** PRIORITY MUST BE ESTABLISHED FOR PHILIP..we must see that he is not used for other things in Georgetown. He will live on the boat, work on the repairs and NOT BE PULLED OFF FOR OTHER THINGS IN TOWN. WILL HAVE TO HAVE A DEMAND RULING FROM DAD ON THIS or town will not respect the priority we set..

Philip and another person to go on the boat. Must learn how to handle the boat and must take some trips with them.

The Chief Engineer and mate have no capabilities of captaining the boat..

**The Captain Lic.** The licensing people know that we have a future in Guyana.. They allowed Philip to get his license because Philip was doing it for P. T. Now that we have a store they might become more stringent because everyone knows that we are carrying cargo and doing the river run..

**Harbormaster** We must send someone into the harbormasters office.. they are pissed because we have not come in sooner. They were very upset with Tim because he would never go in..always sent in someone else. We need to get specific information on the licensing, etc. The time we are likely to get REDRESS FOR THIS, OR GET HAULED INTO THE LICENSING is when the Damien is repaired and back on the river. C. T. heard that the Harbor master is pushing for us to get Philip in there or get another captain. He is pushing for him to check in.. It takes 4 years at sea to be able to apply for a captain's license, however all time at sea counts.. Ujara can count his navy time as well.. Tim Swinney has repeatedly refused to go and check

in and it is very upsetting to them.

THE CAPTAIN

Tim ABSOLUTELY REFUSED TO GET THE CAPTAINS PAPERS ON THE BOAT..however, when asked about the Albatross -- he said he'd-be willing to take the position of chief engineer, but not the Captains position. UJARA IS ALSO A CANDIDATE..

STRESS

We need to consider carefully before we take on the responsibility of having to put people on the boat right now.. If going to run it as a business are we trying to be too cautious? the question was asked..

IF WE KEEP THE CAPTAIN for a while longer, must have a good understanding with him that there are certain things he must transmit to us..

Helen feels we should make the two selections now and send them into town with Cleve so they can work on the boat and learn as much about the engine as they can..

LEGAL ISSUE ON INSURANCE..

In the morning meeting the primary issue that was discussed was the possibility that our insurance might not be valid if we do not have a MARINE ENGINEER overseeing the work done on the gear box -- Harold had reported reading of large ships that literally broke apart at sea when something went wrong in the gear box and they could not steer the ship into the waves.. It is the most critical part of the ship.. We may be in some trouble now with our insurance where we have not established any procedures they might require relative to fixing such an item.. PRESUMABLY, AN INSPECTION OF THE GEAR BOX BY THE INSPECTION BOARDS WOULD COVER THIS.. but we are not sure.
