
Memorandum to Mr. Belmont RE: JOSEPHINE BAKER





In April, 1954, the Legal Attache, Paris, froarded a report on Josephine Baker dealing with her race prejudice, which was submitted by the Political Section of the American Embassy in Paris. The document goes into detail concerning her activities, primarily dealing with anti-United States statements and her fight for racial equality. In summing up, the report indicated that Baker appears to have confined her political interests to the question of race prejudice, that although in several instances she has identified herself with communist-supported causes, her main activities seem to have been limited to her association with a French organization, the "International League Against Racism and Anti-Semitism (French abbreviation LICA). Baker in her statements wherein she represented this organization indicated that she had suffered the terrible consequences of racial discrimination in the United States and she was bent on exposing such According to this report, LICA conditions wherever she goes. was an anticommunist organization. Although a number of the campaigns of LICA have coincided with campaigns backed by the communists, it does appear that the organization is entirely anticommunist. In 1954 American newspapers carried accounts of a libel action that had been previously filed by Baker against Walter Winchell and the Hearst Corporation for \$400,000. Baker in this civil action alleged that Winchell had indicated that Baker was a "Fascist, a communist or one who consorts with communists, an anti-Semite, an anti-Negro, an enemy of the people of her own race, intelligently dishonest, a fraud, and a person of low or doubtful character." This action arose out of the Stork Club incident.

The New York Office advised in May, 1955, that an examination of the civil court docket for the United States. District Court in New York City revealed that a special pretrial hearing had been held following which the case was dismissed.

An article in the "Washington Star" on May 6, 1954, date lined Tokyo, indicated that Baker had issued a statement saying that she planned a trip to Russia "where many races live in harmony." She adopted two Japanese boys while on a concert tour in Japan and stated "she hoped the boys may one day follow the footsteps of Paul Robeson who she described as a great man who has fought the battles for racial justice and world peace."

An article in the "Daily Worker" on April 13, 1956, indicated that Josephine Baker sang her last adieu to the Paris stage on April 12, 1956. She sang for more than an hour to a jammed auditorium for her final performance of her career.

Subsequent information in Bureau files indicates that Baker has continued her travels throughout the world and continues her anti-United States statements in lectures, and conferences. It appears that most of her activities have been in connection with or under the auspices of the International League Against Racism and Anti-Semitism.

Your letter dated April 1, 1960, addressed also to the Immigration and Naturalization Service, has been received, and the interest which prompted you to write is appreciated.

Although I would like to be of service, it is not within the scope of this Bureau's authority to make evaluations or draw conclusions as to the character or integrity of any organization, publication or individual since we are strictly a fact-gathering agency. Furnishing information of the type you desiré would, in effect, constitute an approval or disapproval of the individual you named, and I am unable to answer your inquiry. Please do not infer in this connection either that we do or do not have the data in our files.

I am taking the liberty of enclosing some material concerning the general subject of communism which may be of interest to you. A copy of your letter is being referred to the Commissioner, Immigration and Naturalization Service, U. S. Department of Justice, 119 D Street, Northeast, Washington, D. C.



I stated when she first applied, her visa was denied; that it was appealed and apparently the State Department and Justice Department had waived the restrictions and allowed her to come in under an exception. The Attorney General stated he did not remember this case.

I told the Attorney General that he might think it wise to have somebody look over the Baker case because I thought it was going to break in the press and he might want to get the facts on it and be prepared to handle it.

The Attorney General thanked me for this information.

On June 8, 1960, Mr. CHARLES SELAK, Visa Section, U. S. Embassy, Paris, advised that his office in mid-1959 received information which indicated Miss BAKER would soon request a visa to enter the United States. In order to forestall any difficulty involved in the issuance of a visa to Miss BAKER, it was deemed advisable by the Visa Section, U. S. Embassy, Paris, to furnish Miss BAKER's complete background history to the Department of State so that the Department would have sufficient time to examine her case prior to an actual request in order to ascertain whether Miss BAKER qualified for a nonimmigration visa.

Mr. SELAK stated his Department by Department of State Cable No. 1250, dated September 18, 1959, advised that Miss BAKER was not considered ineligible under Section 212(a)(27)(28) or (29) of the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952 which authorized the issuance of a visa to Miss BAKER in the event she so requested one.

Miss BAKER, according to Mr. SELAK, applied for a visa to visit the United States in early February, 1960. On February 8, 1960, an H-1 visa (issued to temporary visitors of distinguished merit) was given to Miss BAKER. She departed from Orly, France, at 1 p.m. on February 10, 1960, via Air France, and arrived at New York City on February 10, 1960, at 3 p.m.

Mr. JOHN DIGGINS, U. S. Consul, Visa Section, U. S. Embassy, Paris, on June 8, 1960, advised he interviewed Miss BAKER prior to the issuance of her H-1 visa on February 8, 1960. He stated that the issuance of this visa was considered a routine matter and did not entail any hearings.

BAKER volunteered that she had never been a Communist and was pleased by the treatment she had received in the United States except for TAUB. According to BAKER, her publicity man, ERNEST F. QUIROT was in San Francisco and Los Angeles to publicize her chateau in France for the tourist trade to France. She had planned to send money with him to France for her chateau and for her family but she had no documents to send.



The March 15, 1960 issue of the "Daily Variety," a show world publication of Hollywood, California, contained an article captioned, "JOSEPHINE BAKER Revue May Play Huntington," indicating that producer WILLIAM L. TAUB, in association with RCA, is producing the revue, and that TAUB "is in town negotiating for a suitable site." Also, according to this article, Miss BAKER arrives in the U. S. from Paris April 22."

The May 2, 1960 issue of the North Hollywood, California, "Valley Times" carried an article entitled, "Interesting Reception on Return" indicating Deputy Sheriff's waye looking for international star, JOSEPHINE BAKER, to serve her with an order to appear in Superior Court on May 9, for a hearing in connection with a judgement in the amount of \$5,512.00 obtained against BAKER by attorney SIDNEY BARTON. The lawyer claimed BAKER owed him the amount for legal services rendered in a 1952 tax problem. The judgement was awarded to BARTON in San Francisco in 1955.






Dear Mr. Hoover,

Recently the Attorney-General of the United States, Robert Kennedy, issued a statement to the effect that you had told him there were no Communists involved in the various Negro organizations such as, NAACP, SCLC, CORE, SNCC, National Urban League, etc. I took this to mean none of the current kegro leaders were considered to be Communists. I do not remember Mr. Kennedy's exact words concerning this.

However, just the other day, I heard a different version of this story. In our city we have a radio program called "Party Line". Citizens of Memphis call and discuss varied and sundry subjects with the moderator of this program, and it attracts a listening audience of many thousands. On a recent program, during the course of a discussion concerning "possible Communist activity in the current Negro movement", one of the people heard quite often on the program stated she had received a detter from you in which you said you had not given Mr. Kennedy the information his statement claimed you did. Was the statement he gave the press factual, Mr. Hoover, or was it a falsehood? To what extent, if any, are Communists involved in the present social dis-orders? Does the Bureau consider that the Highlander Folk School was Communistic? If so, of what possible significance, if any, is Martin Luther King's connection with them?

I also wish to inquire about Josephine Baker. I read in today's powspaper that she was planning to come from Paris, in order to participate in the Washington march. The last I heard of this



woman was when she and Paul Robeson were denied passports, so they could not leave the country. To the best of my recollection, she managed to leave illegally and make her way to South America. The information at that time, as I recall, was that Miss Baker and Mr. Robeson were Communists, and their activities abroad were such as to be detrimental to our country. It seemed they were both extremely active in the Communist cause and vehement in their denunciation of the United States. Is she now welcome to return to this country?

I would appreciate hearing from you, as I am most anxious to have the questions raised in this letter answered.

Newspaper article concerning Josephine Baker Bouillon, appearing in the 8/18/66 issue of "Le Razon," published in Buenes Aires.

"Fraternity Well Understood"

Josephine Baker arrived with her twelve adopted children and their two little friends. They were all dressed in sport clothes and they presented a spectacle of human solidarity in Ezeiza. A small Eorean member of the group, age 14, explained that they did not wish to be treated like museum pieces. They show reserve toward affection. "We would like to be as other children." Hoel, age 6, was found in a trash can by a rag picker moments before the trash was loaded into a truck. The "Venus de Ebano" heard about this dramatic event and requested the adoption of the child who had almost been burned to death. The children will remain in Buenos Aires until the early part of October, when they will return to classes in France. Baker is returning today to fulfill contracts with Paris theatre and television. She will return to our capitol in 20 days to be reunited with her children. In Exeiza she was met by her husband, Jo Bouillon.

A true spectacle of human solidarity took place
this afternoon at Ezeiza airport upon the arrival of Josephine
Baker with her 12 adopted children and their two little friends,
born in Costa de Marfil. As they descended from the airplane
which had brought them from Mexico, the airport burst into a
pure and sincere joy. The clearness of the day contributed
toward giving the reception a brilliance which the little ones
deserved. All were dressed in sport clothes: Baker were a
white pullover sweater, slacks, brown sandals, glasses, and
she carried a white portfolio full of documents. Upon touching
Argentine ground the ex-star was warmly greeted by her husband
Jo Bouillon, who has resided in our country for several years
now. The little ones displayed a reserve toward the affection
of the public. It was evident that they were not pleased with
the feelings of sympathy extended to them by those present.

Akio, a fourteen-year old Korean girl (the oldest of the children) explained that they were made uneasy by people who treat them like suseum pieces. "We would like to be like other children," she added seriously, "we would like to study, play, and live like any child." The surprising thing was that she

explained her reasoning in perfect Castellian. She was asked where she had learned to speak the language of Cervantes so well. However, confirming her desire to pass unnoticed, she refrained from answering. The group consists of Luisito, age 13, born in Colombia; Jeannoit, age 13, from Japan; Jari, age 12, from Finland; Moise, age 12, from Israel; Jean Claude, age 12, from France; Brahim, age 10, from Algeria; Mariana, age 10, also from Algeria; Koffi, age 8, from Costa de Marfil; Mara, age 7, from Venezuela; Moel, age 6, from France; and the two little friends, Jeanine, age 10 and her brother Alain, age 6, both from Costa de Marfil. Akio, the Korean whose glasses give her the appearance of a young intellectual, is the most advanced at the school of Les Melandes. However, Noel has conquered the hearts of all her brothers and sisters. This is probably because of the dramatic way in which she arrived at Les Melandes.

A Parisian rag picker was taking papers and other items from a trash can. Noticing that the trash truck was approaching, he doubled his efforts. Just as the man was about to leave he found a bundle which contained Noel. When Baker heard about this dramatic discovery she expressed her desire to the Paris authorities about adopting the child, Today the child, age 6, is our guest. After telling us this impressive tale, Baker stated that her stay in Buenos Aires would be a brief ene. "Tomorrow morning," she said, "I will depart alone for Paris to meet various theatrical and television contracts. The children will remain in this city which I love so much until the first part of October when their vacations will end and they will resume classes. Within twenty days I will return to Buenos Aires to meet them."

Baker was asked the reason for her trip to Cuba. She diplomatically excused herself from replying: "Please forgive me for not discussing my trip to Havana. The truth is that I have a tremendous headache." The Legrand couple, co-proprietors, along with Jo Bouillon, of a restaurant in San Isidro, explained that the trip of the ex-U.S. star (now a French citizen) was for the purpose of obtaining contributions to sustain the costly villa of Les Melandes, inhabited by some 1,200 persons who participate in the work of Baker. These people come from the most remote areas of the world. They include Chinese cooks, Italian cabinetmakers, French teachers, etc. The travelers arrived in Exeiza accompanied by 82 suitcases filled with clothing and personal effects. The little ones were presented with gift packages of Argentine caramels in the airport reception hall. Some

of them still held in their hands plastic eating utensils from the plane, which they were keeping as a remembrance of the long trip. If time permits, they will take a tour of the capitol tomorrow and, probably within a few days, an excursion to the Parana Delta.






On February 2, 1968, a meeting was held at the offices of the West Side Organization (WSO), Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of affording Martin Luther King, Jr., an opportunity to solicit support from WSO members for the Washington Spring Project (WSP), being promoted and organized by King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). As publicly described by King, the WSP is an effort to mobilize large numbers of persons in Washington, D.C., in April, 1968, in protest of alleged United States Government failure to solve the problems of the poor of this country. King did not appear and it was announced that his wife was ill. Approximately 95 persons were present.

Among the guest speakers was Josephine Baker, described by source as a former well-known entertainer, now residing in France. She stated she had experienced a difficult time getting back into this country. She said she had marched with King in his earlier march on Washington, and, as a result, it appeared she was not wanted here. She described the importance of the tent-in on the White House lawn and urged all those present to participate. Her remarks, according to source, were received by those present with no enthusiasm and no apparent volunteers.

Other speakers were Reverend Ralph Abernathy, SCIC official, representing King, and Reverend James Bevel of the Urban Training Center, Chicago, a former SCIC official.

The WSO is a small civil rights type group operating Chicago's near west side. It concerns itself principally with employment and welfare problems of Negro residents of this area.

Other Information Concerning Josephine Baker

The following articles appeared in the indicated editions of the Illinois Edition of "The Worker", an east coast communist newspaper:

April 22, 1951, page 8, column 5 - States in part that Josephine Baker insisted on singing at the Chicago Theater only before a mixed band and that she also disturbed the composure of those who take the view that the real gains for the Negro people can come only after a long, long time. In her blunt, outspoken manner, she burst the 'progess' bubble which is used for hiding purposes by those who refuse to fight for liberation now. 'I can see no progress,' she said upon touring Chicago after 22 years."

July 22, 1951, page 1, column 5 - Article quoted statements by Josephine Baker as disclosed by Oscar C. Brown, Negro news commentator over Station WGES. Brown quoted Miss Baker as saying, "Support dynamic actions to save the life of Willie Mc Gee, like the protest parade being sponsored by the packinghouse workers. Wires and letters to the President to save Mc Gee are good but more forceful action is needed." The article further states that Miss Baker has previously interceded for the "Martinsville Seven" and that she recently visited the "Trenton Six" in their New Jersey prison where they face possible execution.





Every possible effort is being made by the Communist Party of France to exploit the case of EAVSTT LOUIS TILL, and in this consection, a protest meeting was held in Paris on 9/27/55. According to L'Humanite of 9/28/55, this affair was sponsored by the Enternational League Against Racism and Anti-Semitism. L'Humanite gave considerable publicity to the Wississippi trial of ROY BRYANT and JOHN W. MILAM, calling it "a miscarriage of justice", adding that "Paris loves justice, and the verdict in the Mississippi trial is inadmissible."

According to L'Humanite, numerous celebrities attended this affair and permitted their names to be used in connection with the protest meeting. Reportedly, JOSEPHINE BIKER, the noted colored American artist, was on the rostrum at the meeting.

Attached hereto is a clipping from L'Humanite concerning this protest meeting, which contains the photograph of JOSEPHINE BAKER.

The June, 15, 1960, issue of the Los Angeles Evening "Herald-Express" newspaper carried an article datelined "Montreal, June 15, (UPI)," indicating international entertainer JOSEPHINE BAKER and her manager, STEPHEN PAPICH, were arrested by four Quebec provincial officers the previous night at the Faisan Blue Night Club in suburban St. Martin on a warrant taken out by New York impresario WILLIAM TAUB, signed by Judge RENE THIBERGE, charging BAKER and PAPICH with bringing allegedly stolen clothing and music from the United States into Canada. Both were released on \$1,000 cash bail each and both were represented before Judge THILEERGE by Attorney REGINALD TORMAY.

The June 17, 1960, issue of the Los Angeles Evening "Herald-Express" newspaper carried an article datelined "Montreal, June 17 (UPI)," indicating entertainer JOSEPHINE BAKER and her director, STEPHEN PAPICH, were acquitted by Judge M.A. BLAIB, who threw out a charge brought by New York impresario WILLIAM L. TAUB charging them with bringing into Canada from the United States about \$10,000.00 worth of allegedly stolen clothing and music. TAUB failed to appear in court, BAKER and PAPICH, according to the article, were represented by Attorney PHIL CUTLER.

SUMMARY FROM FRENCH

This communication from Josephine Baker is concerned with her efforts to preserve "Les Milandes," a children's village which was about to be disbanded because of insolvency.

As a matter of fact, foreclosure proceedings took place when Miss Baker was in the United States and, apparently, Miss Baker had a chance to discuss the situation with Mr. Robert F. Kennedy.

Miss Baker rushed back home and started a publicity campaign to appeal for financial help enabling her to save the village.

This letter is intended to give Mr. Robert F. Kennedy a report on how things are coming along. A list of countries from which contributions have come is provided along with a statement that "we already have about 80 million old francs out of the 200 million needed."

Miss Baker describes the touching messages of sympathy she has been receiving from many parts of the world, but feels that Les Milandes is not too well-known in the U. S. A. She mentions receiving a telephone call from CBS in which it was inquired whether the July 3 sale of the village had taken place, to which question, thank goodness, she was able to answer that for the time being the worst had been staved off.

After describing the noble motives and ideals which inspire the community of the village, the three-page letter concludes with a plea for help to have Les Milandes officially recognized "in the section of the United Nations."

Miss Baker feels that Les Milandes is a "pilot village of world fraternity and will always stand as a symbol for all those who struggle with so much fervor for equality and rights of man."

Enclosed with the letter is a mimeographed note in which Miss Baker introduces the also attached brochure which is a description of the village, its ideals, present status, history, etc.

Finally, Miss Baker also encloses a reprint of a press conference she held at Les Milandes on June 1 (1984).



According to the article, EARL B. DICKERSON, President of the National Lawyers Guild, was the keynote speaker, while among the other speakers were PAUL ROBESON, Professor GOUDWIN WATSON, of Columbia University, and Professor EDWARD BERRY BURGUM, of New York University.

The National Council of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions has been cited as a Communist front by the Congressional Committee on Un-Imerican activities in House Report No. 1954, dated April 6, 1950, Page 2.

Some of the measures adopted at the aforcmentioned conference, according to the "Daily Worker" of November 14, 1951, Page 7, Column 1, included:

The day of the legal lynching of Willie McGeo

The day of the legal lynching of Willie McCee by the Southern Dixiecrats, the Free Press editorial offices received a visit from an internationally known artist, Miss Josephine Baker, who was at that time appearing at the Fox Theatre.

Miss Baker spoke to the editor and said that she would like to make a statement on the legal murder in Mississippi of one of her people, Willie McGee an innocent man.

The editor, after some fumbling, called a reporter and told him to take the statement.

The statement was given and assurance made that it would be printed.

That statement was never printed.

Miss Baker returned to the Fox Theatre, and probably sensing that what she had said would not be printed, took the opportunity to speak to the audience just before she commenced her first show. This is what she said and was, in the main, what she said in the office of the Detroit Press.

"Today is a tragic one for all American Negroes and darker peoples of the world. The execution of Willie McGee does not stop with just the death of McGee. It means a part of every American Negro died a little with him." Tears streaming down her cheeks as she spoke.

Not a single line of this speech was printed by any of the Detroit daily newspapers. During the

course of her stay in Detroit Miss Baker spent a number of days with Willie McGee's wife Rosalee, seeking to comfort and aid that courageous woman in the period up to the time of the execution.

Also during her visit here, Miss Baker was visited by many people from all walks of life. A constant stream of visitors came to the stage door to wish her well, congratulate her and to tell her of issues and conditions of the people. People from labor, church, community groups saw her and no one was surned away.

Certainly, she was news. But the Detroit Free Press, the Pulitzer Price winner, did not think to. But the lily-white Detroit Free Press that has a single Negro on its editorial staff would think the great Negro artist was not news.

I didn't join the mourners; because such phony protest parades are led, usually, by phonies; and because I like to sleep late on Sundays.

tremendous protesta novement against the execution, the committee says, is based on the fact that no white man has ever been executed for rape in Mississippi and that the death penalty is reserved exclusively for Ne-

I know that, as do most people. I also know that every time a Negro in Mississippl rapes a white woman or kills white man, the police will either kill him on the spot, kill him "legally" or beat him half to death. It happened in Detroit only last week.

The Commies and various

other agitating groups wanted McGhee to die. They knew he was doomed six ago. But they did what every thinking person knew they were going to do. making a lot of noise. What happened to McGhee wasn't important — as long as he died.

"The moral bankruptcy of our present delegate is shown by his avid support of this measure (McCarran Act) and his attempts over the radio and through his newspaper to sell this white supremacy law to Hawaii's darker people as 'progressive legislation's

"I recall all too vividly that a couple of summers ago, while this same delegate was popping off in Washington about how well the races get along in Hawaii, his newspaper was trying its utmost to stir up anti-Negro prejudice by a series of articles on Smith Street after several of us had officially protested police brutality and discrimination. I know of mo metropolitan daily in the heart of the prejudice-ridden South that today would publish hate-inciting stories equal to that Star-Bulletin series.

"I can have no aloha for a peddler of racism. Such a person does not and cannot represent me in Washington.......

1 DAVIS' column in the issue of Movember 6, 1952, was captioned about Africa Again". Excepts from this column are set forth as follows:

"Britain fears that if UN ever takes up the white supremacy policy of the Malan government, South Africa will pull its air squadron out of Korea where it has been among those intervening in the internal affairs of that unhappy nation to make the world safe for democracy' and surb the "Communist menace.".....

"You've heard this column speak before of the mass campaign of civil disobedience by non-whites against the racist laws of the Malan government. No other nation in the world has an official program of restrictions based on color that comes close to the policies of this 'democracy'....


"This is what South Africa doesn't want brought before the UN. Melan and Company want no public airing of such catch-all laws as the Suppression of Communism Act. Similar to some of our own legislation, this Act, under the guise of 'banning communism', is intended to suppress all individuals and groups opposing white supremacy in South Africa....

"Our own United States has quietly backed the stand of Malan and Company in their opposition to UN intervention. With Britain, another of the 'democracies', doing likewise, is it any wonder that India and Pakistan refuse to join with the 'free nations' in a holy crusade against communism, and that the darker peoples of the world question our sincerity when we talk so glibly of 'democracy' and 'equality'?"

In his column of the "Honolulu Record" of November 20, 1952, DAVIS makes the following comments regarding JOSEPHINE BAKER: 4112.

"We have finally dropped to that low level in American history at which our officials will bar from this land an American-born Negro who dares to speak out against white supremacy.

"I refer, of course, to the announcement by the Justice
- Bepartment that St. Louis-born Josephine Baker, world-famous
singer and dancer, may be barred if she seeks to come back home.

"This would be done, you understand, in the name of democracy. While nobody can explain how it will promote democracy to keep out of the United States one of the foremost fighters for democracy, this little inconsistency a does not worry the boys in Washington.


"After all, the Justice Department is quite experienced in the trick of silencing those who dare criticise such good old American oustoms as jim crow and discrimination. Dr. W.E.B. DuBois, one of America's greatest scholars, and Paul Robeson, universally renowned artist, can't leave these shores and now it seems that To Eaker can't get in. Lesser lights who fight racism are hounded from their jobs....."

His column in the issue of December 11, 1952, was captioned "Revolt Extends in Africa". He makes the following comments in this regard:

"Looks as if I must write about Africa every few weeks. It so happens that many events are taking place there that are of world importance. What happens to the non-white peoples of Africa is of prime importance to the non-white peoples of Asia and vice versa....

"Kenya, however, is of strategic importance to Britain and Western Europe, backed by the U.S., in the cold conflict with Russia. Since these nations call themselves the 'free world', we again have the spectacle of the continued exploitation and brutalization of a non-white people in the name of 'preserving democracy."

In addition to the column of FRANK MARSHALL DAVIS which appears in every issue of the "Honolulu Record", this paper carries a number of articles on Negro discrimination. In this regard, the issue of November 27, 1952, carried a front page article captioned "Honolulu Landlords Bar Many Racial Groups; Barriers Highest in Waikiki." This article purports to set out findings of the Citizens Rental Committee which had been appointed by the Mayor of Honolulu. Excerpts of the article, which was attributed to a staff writer, are set out as follows:


"In Waikiki, as in other parts of the city, Megroes are the group most discriminated against, but Puerto Ricans run them a close second...

Discrimination gainst non-haole (non-Caucasian) groups, especially in Waikiki, is seen, however, as discrimination by color and of a type that would be difficult, if not impossible for an individual to break, regardless of his personal acceptability. In Waikiki, it would seem, the restrictions are based on the likes and dislikes of tourists from the Mainland-especially the most racist of tourists, such as those from the Southern states...

"Property rights, it would seem, still get a far higher consideration than human rights, the spirit of the Constitution and the Supreme Court notwithstanding."

Another article, also appearing in the issue of November 27, 1952, on page 2, columns 1 and 2, was captioned "White Racists Vow Force Against United States, Smear 'Reds', Negroes, CIO, Truman." This article reviews a story appearing in the magasine, "Color", in the issue of November 1952, "which carries a detailed, illustrated report on thirteen Americans who fel the fires of racism in the United States with little or no interference from the FBI or the Department of Justice, which pushes cases against Communists under the Smith Act." The article then goes on to quote extensively from this story.

The article said that there were five hundred delegates to this meeting which was held under the auspices of the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions. According to the article, EARL B. DICKERSON, President of the National Lawyers Guild, was the keynote speaker, while among the other speakers were PAUL ROBESON, Professor-GOODMIN MITSON, of Columbia University, and Professor EDWIRD BERRY BURGUM, of New York University.

The National Council of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions has been cited as a Communist front by the Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities in House Report Number 1954, dated April 6, 1950, Page 2.

Some of the measures adopted at the aforementioned conference, according to the "Daily Worker" of November 14, 1951, Page 7, Column 1, included:

A call to President TRUMIN to appoint a fact finding committee of cultural and professional leaders to conduct an investigation of said Jim Crow in the arts, sciences and professions, and recommend appropriate action in Congress.

A resolution supporting the Humphrey Bill for a permanent Fair Employment Practices Commission.

A call to the major radio and television networks to enforce their publicized statements in regard to utilizing and integrating negroes into all levels of the industry.

A request that the Federal Communications Commission withdraw and withhold radio and television channels from these institutions and companies which perpetrate stereotypes and job discrimination.

 - 3. To restore independence to all colonial territories.


The first is the most urgent. In regard to the second she said that it was India's conviction that the U. N. should recognize the government of the Chinese People's Republic. "Without the participation of Chinese delegates, all the U. N's discussions and decisions are useless."



increase in scope, the U. N. will do me to an end. Vishinsky has proposed that the U. N. set up a special committee of representatives from countries concerned and others to work out a solution. His proposal which is the only means of solving the problem, is to cease fighting immediately, return all war prisoners according to international law and to withdraw all foreign troops from Korea within two or three months. The only hindrance is America's refusal to repatriate her prisoners. This is contrary to all international law and agreements. The Russian proposal is the only road to peace.

The famous Negro singer, Josephine Paker?, in a speech on racial discrimination which she made retently in Argentina, spoke of so-called American "democracy," which she called a false thing because of the unfair treatment of colored people by the whites. The speaker herself, having spoken unfavorably of the U. S. several times, has been refused permission to reenter the U. S.



The "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist newspaper, on May 30, 1951 carried an article describing a "Sunday Brunch" at the Hotel Theresa, New York City, on the preceding May 27. The article described this affair as a tribute to JOSEPHINE BAKES and honoring twelve other Negro and White cultural personalities for work in behalf of Negro Artists, sponsored by the Committee for the Hogro in the Arts. Awards were presented on this occasion by HILDA HAYNES, "last seen in 'Street Car Named Dosire', and by ERNEST CRICHLOW, described as chairman of the Committee for the Negro in the Arts.

The "Daily Worker", January 29, 1952, page 7, column 3, announced that the School for Advertising Craftsmen of the New York Council of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions, would begin courses February 4, 1952, and continue them for ten weeks. The article stated that a brochure on the school could be obtained by writing School for Advertising Craftsmen, ASP, 47 W. 44 Street. The article also stated that "As part of the ASP Advertising Division's Program to fight discrimination against Hogroes by advertising agencies, several scholarships for these workshop classes are being offered to Negro students."

THE TREASON CRUSADE MARCHES ON. Last Thursday, Mar 15, the Amer-ican "Peace" Crusade held its pilgrimage to Washington. An estimated 2500 Communists, fellow travelers and dupes took part in the demonstration.

Well-worn CP propaganda devices were used to give an "American" touch to the Crusade. A delegation from the American Women for Peace visited Walter Reed Hospital with gifts for wounded soldiers. Another delegation from the Veterans for Peace (also a front) went to Arlington Cemetery and placed a wreath on the grave of Communist Marine Gen EVANS CARLSON.

This group was not allowed to place wreaths on graves of the Unknown Soldier and Gen JOSEPH W STILLWELL, as it had originally planned.

Religion was cynically exploited by the Communist directors of the Crusade. Several days before the pilgrimage was held, the "religious committee" of the Crusade prepared a prayer for peace. Twenty-four ministers and rabbis joined in a nationwide appeal for religious leaders to use this peace prayer. During the pilgrimage itself, a one hour prayer meeting was held in a public square on U Street and it was announced that the Crusade prayer had been said in over 200 churches throughout the country.

Some of the Communist fronts that took part in the pilgrimage, in addition to those already mentioned, are: the American Slav Congress, Nat'l Labor Conference for Peace, Labor Youth League, American Jewish Labor Council and the International Workers Order.

Speakers at the mass rally that wound up the pilgrimage included:
PAUL ROBESON: Dr ROBT MORSS/LOVETT, former acting Gov of the Virgin Islands;
Prof PHILIP MORRISON of Cornell (supported by a Cornell student delegation);
Dr CLEMENTINE PAOLONE, Chairman of the American Women for Peace, and Mrs
THERESE ROBINSON, leader of the Improved and Benevolent Protective Order of
Elks of the World and a delegate to Stalin's recent Warsaw Peace Congress.

Prof MORRISON announced that a nationwide congress of the American Peace Crusade would be held in Chicago on June 1 & 2, and that between now and then the Crusade hoped to reach "many millions" with its message.

Most significant development of the pilgrimage was that approximately 100 trade union delegates from all over U S remained in Washington an extra day to map plans for mobilizing industrial workers in the Crusade.

COUNTERATTACK has already shown that the present Crusade is the counterpart of the American Peace Crusade of 1940 (Letter #194, Feb 9, p 1), which developed into the American Peace Mobilization, principal front of the Stalin-Hitler pact period. Part of CP's "peace mobilization" of that time was the calling of a series of Communist-led strikes in Allis Chalmers, North American Aviation and other vital industries to weaken U S defense effort.

<u>CP hopes to sabotage present defense effort</u> in the same way. This is why a special effort will be made to build support for the new "Peace"

Crusade among industrial workers. The Crusade's purpose is to convince Americans that the danger of war comes from Washington, not from Moscow... that the American people must ACT NOW to prevent the Wall Street-Washington "warmongers" from plunging the world into another conflict. If this line can be sold to enough industrial workers, it will be much easier for the CP to call and foment strikes and walkouts in key defense industries.

WHAT CAN YOU DO? Continue your efforts to expose the Crusade for what it really is, a CP-engineered hoax to sell the Moscow line.

On same day the pilgrimage was held in Washington, the Crusade hq announced that 166 more "notables" had joined in sponsoring this Communist front. Many were college professors...40 of them were ministers and rabbis.

COMMUNIST-LINE UNIONS SUFFER FURTHER SETBACKS. Early this month the National Conference of Social Work, leading organization of social workers in the U S, refused to renew the membership of the Joint Committee of Trade Unions in Social Work.

Joint Committee of Trade Unions in Social Work is sponsored by the United Public Workers and United Office and Professional Workers of America (UOPWA)...both expelled from CIO for following the Communist line. UOPWA is now a part of CP-led Distributive, Processing and Office Workers Union.

Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of NY struck another blow at Stalin's fifth column in U S labor last week when it announced that it would withdraw recognition of the UOPWA's Social Service Employes Union (SSEU) on June 20, when the present agreement with the union expires.

SSEU has many contracts with nationally known charitable and social work organizations. Directors of these groups should follow example of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies to further weaken the CP-led UOPWA.

THE COMMUNIST SABOTAGE NETWORK IS BEING CAREFULLY ORGANIZED. A report from Italy last week highlighted the plans Communists in all parts of the world are now making to sabotage the free world's defense effort and facilities at a time that will be of greatest value to Stalin.

A sabotage circular was found on the British ship Peryville in Naples harbor. It had a long title which stated that it contained simple, elementary methods for stirring up the crews of merchant ships against their "capitalist" masters. The circular was dated "London, December, 1950" and was apparently prepared by the British Communist Party.

It outlined eight steps Communist agents should follow to foment dissension on ships and at the same time cover up the acts of sabotage they commit. The circular orders them to follow the instructions given in "Booklet No. 10". This booklet is evidently a manual (copies of it have not yet been found) which gives detailed information on sabotage techniques.

Several British naval vessels have been sabotaged since Stalin launched his military offensive in Korea.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PREVENT SABOTAGE? The U S, as free world's defense production center, will be the chief target for Communist sabotage.

CP will make every possible effort to cripple U S production, transportation, public utilities, communications and other wital facilities. It has hundreds of agents who have been trained to do this work in the Lenin School in Moscow as well as in special schools for sabotage it has conducted in this country. These agents are now working in key industries in all parts of the country...waiting for the signal to begin their operations.

The Research Institute of America has prepared two excellent memoranda on industrial security. One, "The Supervisor's Role in Company Security", is prepared for the information of plant supervisors and foremen. The other, "Protecting Your Company's Security", is designed for executives.

The circulars should be studied...and their recommendations followed wherever practicable...by all executives, supervisors and foremen in every plant that plays a vital part in the U S economy...whether the company has defense contracts from the Govt or not.

Security is everybody's business. Some concerns are now doing all they can to set up security systems that will prevent sabotage by Communist agents. Too many are doing little or nothing.

Whether you represent management or labor, you should seriously consider whether or not sabotage in your place of work will in any way impede defense production or weaken civilian morale by causing unnecessary shortages, etc. And if there is no security system or an inadequate system in your office or plant, you should bring this fact to the attention of the responsible authorities.

COUNTERATTACK officials, experienced in plant security work, are willing to discuss the problem of setting up security programs with corporation officials charged with this responsibility.

JOSEPHINE BAKER WON'T SUPPORT COMMUNIST FRONTS. U S born, French citizen JOSEPHINE BAKER recently returned to the U S after 27 years abroad ducing which time she has won international acclaim as an entertainer. She is now featured at the Strand Theatre in NYCity.

At the request of "friends" she promised to speak at a "Save Willie McGee" rally on Mar 19. WILLIE McGEE is a Negro sentenced to death for rape by the Mississippi courts. Last week Supreme Court Justice HUGO BLACK granted a stay of execution for McGEE (his electrocution was set for March 20) to permit the filing of a petition for a review of his case.

It is claimed that no white man has ever been sentenced to death for rape in Mississippi. Because of her conviction that the sentence was discriminatory in McGEE's case, Miss BAKER consented to speak at the rally.

Her "friends" did not tell her that the meeting was sponsored by the CP-controlled American Labor ("Progressive") Party...or that PAUL ROBESON and VITO MARCANTONIO would also speak at the rally.

When she learned these facts she cancelled her speaking engagement. But she did send a personal message of sympathy to Mrs McGEE expressing the hope that her fight to win justice for her husband would be successful.

Miss BAKER has fought discrimination. Since her return to the U.S., she has refused to entertain in any place that bars Negroes.

But her action in the case of WILLIE McGEE demonstrates the fact

that, unlike some other entertainers, she will not use her fight for justice and civil rights as an excuse for underhanded support of the CP.

WHAT'S BEHIND "THE FACE WITH THE FOUR-WAY STRETCH"? Actor-comedian GILFORD is known as "The Face With the Four-Way Stretch". Last Sunday night he was featured on "Showtime U S A", a nationwide ABC - TV program sponsored by the Dodge Brothers Corp.

GILFORD's record in "RED CHANNELS", the book on Communist influence in radio and television published by COUNTERATTACK, indicates that his mind, too, has rubber-like qualities...he has been able to adjust it to support of Communist fronts and causes through three twists and turns of the CP line.

In the days of the Stalin-Hitler pact he was a supporter of the American Peace Mobilization, CP's major front of the time, which was formed to sabotage the American defense effort to help the two dictators.

After Hitler attacked Stalin and the comrades went all out in their support of the war effort, GILFORD was listed as a sponsor of the Artists Front to Win the War, which demanded a second front in Europe.

When the CP line again changed in 1945 from support of, to attack on the U S, GILFORD continued to support Communist fronts. He has since been listed as a supporter of, or entertainer for, People's Songs, Stage For Action, Progressive Citizens of America, Waldorf "Peace" Conference, Civil Rights Congress (CP's chief defense front), Young Progressives of America, Spanish Refugee Appeal of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee and the Voice of Freedom Committee.

When CP's Jefferson School of Social Science held its annual dinner

in 1949, GILFORD was listed as an entertainer for the affair.

Less than a year ago, DAVID PLATT, film columnist for the Daily Worker, mentioned in an intimate "closeup" that JACK GILFORD and a few other CHARLIE CHAPLIN fans from way back "had themselves a time" at a revival of several CHAPLIN films given by the Midtown Film Circle (a CP front in NYCity) at Yugoslav Hall (favorite meeting place for fronts).

GILFORD, like many other performers with front records, got his start in NYCity's Cafe Society Downtown which was run by BARNEY LOSEPHSON (identified as a CP member), the brother of LEON JOSEPHSON who has been identified as a Comintern agent, has admitted he forged a passport for GERHART EISLER in 1934 and has served time in jail for contempt of Congress.

The "Daily Worker" dated May 22, 1951, stated that Councilman STANLEY ISAACS headed the growing list of leading citizens sponsoring a nonpartisan, nonpolitical conference to fight discrimination against Negroes in the sale and rental of Levitt Homes at Levittown, Long Island.

The "Daily Morker" continued with a letter addressed to the Committee to End Discrimination at Levittown from ISAACS which stated: "It seems shocking to Es, after the decisions of the United States Supreme Court denouncing restricted covenants, and after passage by the State of New York of the bill prohibiting segregation and discrimination in all publicly-aided housing, and after the action of the City Council, which I was proud to spansor, finally penalizing discrimination in Stuyvesant Town that Levitt & Sons should still think it proper to refuse to sell or lease their houses to Negroes.

"I realize, of course, that the development is a private enterprise and that there is no law controlling such action. I hope that the State Legislature will, at the session of 1952, appoint a legislative commission to study the entire problem of discrimination and segregation in private housing developments and suggest remedies for the un-American attitude pursued in far too many private developments."




