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
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

CONCERNING MATTERS OF INTEREST TO PRESIDENT,

PUS-Pag At 10:01 a.m., today, I received the attached memorandum dated 10-21-66 for the Director which I understand was written by Cliff Sessions in the Office of Public Information at the Department. Lit is 🕏 addressed "To All Division Heads and Bureau Chiefs" and initialed by Ramsey Clark. It states the President has asked for a daily report on governmental matters of interest to him while on his Asia trip. Starting today (Monday through Saturday) reports should be sent by 2 p.m. to Sessions from every Division on developments. Similarily, if there is nothing to report a statement should be given to that effect.

It is recommended that we inform Mr. Sessions that we have FBI men at the specific request of the President stationed in countries being visited by him. These men currently furnish significant information to the Presidential party along the way. Also, as we have in the past, we by teletype, and letter twice daily supply the White House directly with significant developments. Copies of such letters, of course, go to the Acting Attorney General. In the event any information of an emergency nature over and above the data currently thus disseminated arises, we will call the same immediately Ito the attention of Mr. Sessions. 🖼 💯 🗥





It is to be noted that at the conclusion of the President's visit to Canberra, Assistant Director WALITER YOUNG of the Secret Service personally expressed his appreciation for the assistance given to the Secret Service by the FBI representatives in Australia.

The presence in Australia of Bureau representatives for a two-week period afforded an excellent opportunity to promote the Bureau's interests, and discussions were held with various Australian police departments

Attached is a summary cablegram from our Legal Attache in Manila, submitted for information; therefore, no dissemination necessary at this time.

Legal Attache commented that Philippine police and security forces generally considered to have done a better job than expected. Success of President's visit from a security standpoint attributed to fact President's exposure limited to one occasion. This was a direct result of information furnished by Legal Attache concerning local conditions.

Mrs. Mildred Stegall called from Manila at 9:45 this morning. She is in charge of the President's office in Manila.

She stated that the President appeared to be in fine health and good spirits. In connection with the recent travel of the President to the Manila Summit Conference and various Pacific countries, I thought you would be interested in an account of the participation of FBI representatives.

Sixteen Special Agents departed with the advance party and were stationed at the various points to be visited. In addition, Special Agent Robert H. Haynes accompanied both the advance party and the President on his trip. My liaison representative at Manila furnished assistance to the White House Staff and Secret Service, and the FBI field offices at Honolulu and Anchorage furnished support during the President's stops in those two cities.

The Special Agents were active in contacting foreign government representatives and police officials to secure and develop information which would be of assistance in maintaining the safety of the President and avoiding as much as possible any embarrassment to him or other U.S. officials. In this regard, police officials who are graduates of the FBI National Academy were particularly helpful. A high percentage of these graduates hold important positions in their respective police Lagencies. In addition, other police and government officials who are regular contacts of my liaison representatives covering the Pacific areas were contacted by the Special Agents. All of these persons were most cooperative and eager to assist in making the President's BEELLO QUETOHIND C visit ansuccess.

Two Who Threw Paint at Johnson Are Fined \$761,50

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Two brothers were fined a total of \$761 today for throwing paint over President Johnson's car during his ride through Melbourne Oct. 21.

John N. Langley, 21, a sales representative, and his brother David, 18, a student, had spent 14 days in jail before Magistrate E. J. Danaher passed sentence. David was put on 18 months probation and John on two years. The magistrate ordered John' to undergo psychiatric treatment.

Danaher said he was satisfied that the incident during Johnson's motorcade here stemmed from the brothers' views on the Viet Nam war and that there was no organization behind it.

The magistrate also ordered that \$1,940 paid to the court by the brothers' father be distributed among bystanders whose clothing was damaged by the paint. President and Mrs. Johnson escaped the paint because the bubbletop of their limousine was up.







Assistant to the Director C. D. DeLoach contacted Inspector J. A. Sizoo, Domestic Intelligence Division, early on the morning of 12-21-67. Mr. DeLoach had received a call from Marvin Watson at the White House who advised Mr. DeLoach that the President is considering visiting Rome en route to the United States from Australia.

TO AustraLia

Inspector Sizoo had contacted Legal Attache Thomas J. Biamonte at Rome and instructed Biamonte to ascertain the potential of demonstrations or other disturbances occurring should the President visit Rome. Biamonte has been instructed to submit a cablegram which will be made immediately available to Mr. DeLoach.

At 7:50 a.m. this date, Biamonte was contacted via Defense telephone system at which time he advised that he had in transmission a cablegram which reads:

Potential for Demonstrations Against any Ranking Official of U.S. Government who may Visit Italy. Rome paper this A.M. reported President Johnson was considering brief stop in Rome to visit Pope Paul, following visit to Far East.

In opinion of

ranking U.S. Government official would undoubtedly provoke demonstrations protesting U.S. policy in Vietnam.

Demonstrations would be promoted by Italian Communist Party; however, it usually loses control of demonstrations to pro-Chinese communist elements who have predilection for more violent activity. Pertinent parts of attached were furnished by teletype to White House, Secretary of State, Military, and Secret Service.

Honolulu subsequently advised that President Johnson and President Thieu have arrived in Honolulu and are staying at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel. Approximately 50 individuals, most of whom were University of Hawaii students and members of the Students For A Democratic Society, staged a demonstration outside the hotel last night.

On July 7, 1965, Honolulu T-1, who has furnished reliable information in the past, reported that the Committee to End the War in Vietnam (CEWV), Honolulu, a characterization of which is appended hereto, had suspended meetings until after the November 1965, Presidential election and in the meantime the members of the group would work within the framework of the Peace and Freedom Party.

On July 11, 1968, the same source reported that members of the Peace and Freedom Party had met in Honolulu the previous evening and they believe President Johnson will arrive in this city about July 19, 1968. The group has definitely decided to demonstrate and picket during the President's visit, but the dates and sites for the picketing have not been decided on. However, members were advised that these matters would be discussed at the coming meeting of the Students for a Democratic Jociety (SDS), a characterization of which is appended hereto, to be held in Honolulu on July 12, 1968.

On July 15, 1968, Honolulu T-2, who has furnished reliable information in the past, reported that as of the evening of July 14, 1968, members of the SDS had not learned

the exact arrival time for President Johnson and had no information where he would be staying in Honolulu. As a result, to date, no plans for a definite picketing or demonstration have been agreed upon. However, this source reported that the SDS will again meet at the University of Hawaii on July 17, 1968. At that time they hope to have information concerning the President's plans in Honolulu and will discuss possible demonstrations.










### APPENDIX

## STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing the United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965 SDS National Convention, an anticommunist proviso was removed from the SDS Constitution. In the October 7, 1966 issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

On July 18, 1968 President Lyndon B. Johnson and President Nguyen Van Thieu arrived in Honolulu, Hawaii.

On July 18, 1968 a demonstration was held in front of the Royal Hawaiian Ectal in Honolulu where President Thieu was residing during his talks with President Johnson. The demonstration was jointly sponsored by the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), the Committee to End the War in Vietnam (CEWV), "The Resistance", and the Peace and Freedom Party, organizations opposing the war in Vietnam. Characterizations of the SDS and the CEWV are appended hereto.

Agents of the FBI observed the following during the demonstration:

Approximately 50 individuals, consisting mostly of University of Hawaii (UH) students and faculty and members of the sponsoring organizations, picketed in front of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel. The demonstrators included

The SDS met in the patio at Bachman Hall at 7:30 PM on July 19, 1968. There were more than 50 persons in attendance. The first part of the meeting covered a discussion of the sedition trial in Taiwan of a former East-Wester Center Grantee. It was announced that would attempt to journey to Taiwan to observe trial on behalf of the SDS. The group also voted to direct a letter to President Lyndon B. Johnson, expressing sympathy for and asking the aid of the U.S. Government in bringing about his release.
The remainder of the meeting turned into a Eugene McCarthy for President Rally.
The group was not aware of the plans that evening for President Johnson and President Thieu of the Republic of Vietnam, and hence, agreed to again picket and demonstrate in front of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel. The meeting at Bachman hall finished at 9:00 PM and the majority of the participants went to the Royal Hawaiian Hotel where they picketed until 11:30 PM Among those picketing ware:
had been present at the SDS meeting.

The demonstrators had included a group of hippies who have recently arrived in Honolulu from San Francisco State college and they include 10 boys and 4 girls who are all living together.

Agents of the FBI observed the picketing and the demonstrato: numbered more than 60, carrying signs similar to those of July 18, 1968. It was noted the demonstrators walked into

## STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY



The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing the United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965 SDS National Convention, an anticommunist proviso was removed from the SDS Constitution. In the October 7, 1966 issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

Mrs. Mildred Stegard, secretary to former President Lyndon B. Johnson, called; however, I was-out of the office and returned her call approximately twenty minutes later. Mrs. Stegall stated that the Secret Service had checked out an employee that she was considering in the capacity of Assistant Librarian at the new LBJ Library, Austin, Texas. She indicated that in this individuals investigative report there appeared a notation to the effect that this individual had been given an honorable discharge from the Army for the convenience of the Government. She stated that further checking had reflected that this person was declared unsuitable because of personality. She told me there was no reference made in the report to perversion, crime or any other matters of a derogatory nature. She asked what I thought about having further investigation made.

I told Mrs. Stegall that the Secret Service had obviously made the inquiries in this matter in the first place and that, frankly, she should turn to Secret Service for an opinion rather than the FBI. She said she thought this would be the answer and that she would prepare a memorandum to the Secret Service in this regard. She did not furnish the name of the individual in question.

## LBJ Letter Briefs Congress on Man

President Johnson has sent a personal letter to every member of Congress, both Democrats and Republicans,

with a report on the Manila Conference. He has also sent a somewhat more detailed letter to the 14 leaders of Congress, Demoeratic and Republican.

In both reports, copies of

which have been obtained by this column, the President emphasized political reforms in South Vietnam together with its economic reconstruc-

To congressional leaders the President reported that he had received a pledge from South Vietnamese Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu and Premier Nguyen Cao Ky "to elect a chief of government six months after the constitution is completed-it will not be later than March, 1967; to begin holding village and hamlet elections early in

Johnson also reported to the congressional leaders that he had received a pledge from Thieu and Ky "to carry forward a program of National Reconciliation"— another important step, since it means permitting the Victoria, once they lay down their arms, to participate in the elections and serve in the South Vietnamese government if elected.

Third, there is profound understanding in Asia that by our firm stand in Viet-Nam and in Southeast Asia, we are buying time for all the nations of that region to face their own problems realistically and to begin to build their own future together as a region.

Finally, I found an Asia very much on the move. In one country after another I found leaders and governments intent on making a better life for their peoples. Their problems are immense. But they are not daunted by the scale of the task. And they are making progress — sometimes amazing progress — as in Korea.

We stated our resolve to resist aggression; conquer hunger, illiteracy and disease; build a region of security, order and progress; seek reconciliation and peace.

There were other accomplishments that received little or no attention in many of the reports from Manila. call your attention to the following commitments by Vietnamese Chief of State Thieu and Prime Minister Ky: to train and assign a substantial share of the Vietnamese armed forces to clear-and-hold actions in order to provide a shield behind which a new so-ciety can be built; to give land reform "top priority"; to begin mapping a new and expanded postwar economy (and the related allied commitment to plan conversion of military installations in the context of

Vietnamese peacetime planning); to elect anchier or gove ernment six months after the Constitution is completed it will be not later than March, 1967; to begin holding village and hamlet elections early in 1967; to carry forward a program of National Reconciliation; to ask their allies to remove their forces, as the military and subversive. forces of North Viet-Nam are withdrawn and peace becomes possible in the South - to which we replied, with Viet-namese agreement, with the six months proposition.

I consider an or much the continuing effort to achieve a peaceful, secure, and prosper-

ous South Viet Nam.
In closing, I want to pass along my-impression of the men who are fighting in Viet-Nam and standing guard in Korea. They are magnificent: General Westmoreland told me that no Commander-in-Chief ever commanded a finer armed force. They are brave, and good humored, and self-

I sincerely wish you could have been with me-to see them and to see the vital and exciting Asia that is forming up and will take shape if we see it through to an honorable peace in Viet-Nam;

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#### LBJ Gets City's Biggest Ever Crowds

## Cheers, Jeers Rock Sydney

CANBERRA, Australia, Oct. 22 (UPI) — President Johnson got the biggest reception in Australia's history today but the "fair dinkum" welcome in Sydney was blemished by an ugly melee when anti-Viet Nam agitators fought police and sought to throw themselves in front of the President's car.

Over one million Aussies packed the Sydney streets and jammed its famed harbor with boats of every size and shape to greet LBJ and Ladybird. The President, to the distress of security guards, was out again in the crowds shaking hands.

Mr. Johnson flew back to Canberra in the afternoon and dined on Texas size steak at a barbecue at the picture-book "Lanyon" sheep and cattle station.

He flies to Northern Australia tomorrow and thence to the seven-nation conference in Manila.

#### RIOT

In Sydney, a near riot erupted outside the art gallery as the President's car arrived. Demonstrators, both young men and women, broke thru barriers and fell to the roadway in front of the motorcade.

They were hauled away.

Police and U. S. Secret Service agents were kicked as they tried to force the demonstrators back. Rolls of tollet paper and balloons painted black to simulate bombs were thrown at the President's limousine.


Mounted police charged the crowd.

At the Cabinet meeting just before President Johnson departed for Asia he was grouchy and discouraged. He

had been working long hours in preparation for his trip and he was convinced it would not be successful.

not be successful,

His discouragement showed up in the way he asked questions of

the Cabinet. They are accustomed to being driven hard, "chewed up" as one of them expressed it.

On this occasion the President seemed so down that four Cabinet members tried to counter his pessimism. Secretary of State Rusk gave an encouraging pep talk about the trip. Secretary of the Treasury Henry Fowler added some optimism on the economic picture. Vice President Humphrey chimed in.

And Secretary of Defense Bob McNamara, who carries the control of \$60 billion in atomic bombs in his pocket but also carries about the strongest olive branch in the Cabinet, gave some energetic views on the prospects of peace.

They all knew that, despite the criticism of outsiders, Lyndon Johnson has been the nost fervid advocate of peace and around his Administra-

Sand around his Administration. He worries about the men ne sends into pattle. He prays for the day when that obligation will end:

And he is also the most persistent, hard-driving salesman for peace. The difficulty, however, is that he is not selling politicians or people, but governments, and the selling has to be done long-range, not face-to-face.

#### LBI's Sales Efforts

The President did some effective selling with Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko three weeks ago, and while Gromyko was noncommittal, the sales talk for the getting some reality as the

conference ended, the President put his arm around the Soviet Foreign Minister's shoulder — something which isn't done in the formal chanceries of European diplomacy— and patted him affectionately as if their countries never had exchanged a harsh word or experienced a single difference.

The biggest thing the President gave Gromyko was an absolute assurance that there would be no sharing of atom weapons with West Germany. He guaranteed there would be no multi-nuclear force. This was a big concession, because Chancellor Erhard had been in Washingson only a few days before asking for at least some German participation in nuclear weapons.

Since then some noises nave come out of the Kremiin indicating that Mr. Johnson's sales effort was not in vain.

The recent meeting of the Soviet's East European allies, together with Mongolia and Cuba, is reported to have decided on overtures to North Vietnam to soften its peace terms on two points: 1—agree to South Vietnam as a participant at the conference table; 2—agree to stop sending troops into South Vietnam.

To meet these conditions, the President also had to do some tough selling in Manila, chiefly with Premier Ky, the tough little pilot who once fought in the French army against the Vietnamese, and who, coming from North Vietnam, has been resisting any idea of sitting down at a peace table with the North Vietnamese, let alone the Vietcong.

#### Selling Premier Ky

Ambassador, Henry Cabot Lodge had done some advance arm-twisting with Premier Ky before they left Saigon. But President Johnson did the final selling to get Ky to agree that the Vietcong, if they laid down their arms could run for election, hold public office, and participate in the government.

Manila Previously it had been announced that South Vietham would permit the National Liberation Front (the Vietcong) to participate in the peace talks.

Selling these concessions to

Premier Ky was not easy as shown by the fact that five minutes after he got off his plane back home he shot off a hot statement at a news conference that he would never negotiate with Communists or permit them in the Cabinet.

"No, never," he exploded.

Ky held the news conference only by accident—milder President Nguyen Van Thieu was supposed to hold it; so Premier Ky's explosion isn't too important. He can be resold. In the end, the United States will write the peace.

Unfortunately, whether hegets a peace for Southeast. Asia will depend largely on the Red Chinese. The Russtans have some influence, but not as much as the Chinese. The latter are too close. The Vietnamese must live under their shadow. The Russians are too far away.

Meanwhile the most important development to come outof recent diplomatic events is a tacit agreement between the USA and the USSR to pull together for peace.

The Russians don't want any fanfare about it. They get too much ribbing from the Chinese that they are "stooges of the imperialistic Americans."

So they have suggested that we go slow about publicity. Nevertheless, the tacit understanding is there.

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

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At the request of Councilman Frank Fasi, the City Council has asked the Police Department for a report on the alleged manhandling of three anti-war demonstrators Monday at the East-West Center.

Dr. Willis Butler, 47, cochairman of the Hawaii Committee to End the War in Viet Nam, and two University of Hawaii students, George P. Sarant, 20, and Robert P. Hoen, 23, were charged with disorderly conduct.

They posted \$25 bail each and intend to plead innocent.

t their trials.

Fasi cited Star-Bulletin reporter Judy Chase's account of the arrest of three men carrying a sign protesting. President Johnson's policies in Viet Nam an hour before. the President was to speak.

Mrs. Chase wrote that the three men "were, as I saw it, shoved to the ground by police when they refused to remove their sign.".

"I don't agree with these men or their position," Fasisaid, "but I know all of us: would like to see our citizens protected in their legal rights to demonstrate any place on this island.

Acting Council Chairman Matsuo Takabuki moved to refer the matter to the Financ'e Committee, which handles police matters. Fasi. is a member of the committee.

But Finance Chairman Clesson Chikasuye objected.

"It was my understanding that this was done to prevent a riot of other members of the crowd," he said. "I think it was justified."

Councilman George Koga asked. "What kind of a precedent is being set. There are many other cases of rioting. which do not get the notoriety of this one."

He said he did not think a council inquiry would be "delving too much into the administration."

Councilman Ben F. Kalto said he thought there could be grounds for a disorderlyconduct charge against the (Mount Clipping in Space Below)

As far as the merits of the case are concerned, who is right and who is wrong, and whether undue force was used, he said, the court is in the best position to deter-mine that.

But the council has asked the police for similar reports of the facts and at least we can request it again, he add-

Chikasuye o p p o s e d the idea of giving free publicity to the three Viet Nam protesters.

"By giving them publicity, we give them what they want," he said. "The have be en charged before the court. I certainly don't want it to be considered by my committee."

Councilman Eugene Kennedy, a former policeman, said, "I feel we have an excellent police chief and police commission. This is their job."

The incident needs investigation, he said, they can make the investigation and the council can ask for the report.

Fasi asked that the Police Department report to the council what the actions of their men were.

"I think we should show the police we are concerned about any allegations" of brutality or misconduct "whether they go to court or not. We are entitled to hear the police side. The paper's version makes it appear that brutality did take place."

Chikasuye suggested that Fasi ask the police for the information as a council-

"Why make it a council matter?" he asked.

"In the past," Fasi replied, "it has been difficult for a councilman to get information from the administration. This should go through the council."

Councilman Kekoa D. Kaapu said, "I think the chief and the commission can present the facts as they know them. I know that in other parts of the Mainland, very often people who sup-





Coolidge took a modest junket to Cuba, and I tagged along. Herbert Hoover took a long trip around South America as President-elect and I tried to go along but was thrown off his battleship in San Pedro harbor.

Franklin Roosevelt took several trips to Latin America, and three famous war trips to Casablanca, Teheran, and Yalta, the latter having been excoriated by critics for alleged generosity to Stalinthough history may be more tolerant in viewing the final results.

Harry Truman took his famous 1945 trip to Potsdam where he and Stalin rubbed each other the wrong way. Eisenhower took many trips to Geneva, most of Europe's capitals, Argentina, India and the Philippines; and tried to get to Japan until anti-American riots interfered.

John F. Kennedy visited Latin America, Vienna, and the capitals of Europe.

And since the difficult days when old-fashioned diplomacy thwarted Woodrow Wilson, most of these Presidents have done well. They helped their country internationally and themselves politically by these trips.

No Polished Diplomat

Lyndon Johnson, hitherto not a junketing President, has a lot going for him on the journey which he starts today.

Chiefly he can improve the chances of peace in the Far East, and parenthetically improve his lagging image at home. Or, if he fails, he could bring on an escalation of the war and end up with the tragic holocaust of World War

On domestic matters, Lyndon is probably the shrewest political bargainer to occupy the White House in half a century. But on foreign affairs he can be a babe in the woods.

Thus when touring South Vietnam as Vice President he fell for President Diem, whom Cardinal Spellman and Madison Avenue had contrived to put on the throne after the French exadus. Again, when he flew to Honolulu last February, Lyndon embrassed the former french pilot, Premiere Ky. In Lyndon's defense it should be noted that Ky was about the only reed we had to lean on, but the President didn't have to lean quite so enthusiastically - at least in public.

This time Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge has been doing some missionary work before Ky and Lyndon meet. Lodge had to use a lot of persuasion, even some arm twisting on Ky but he got a grudging agreement from him to accept Vietcong envoys as part of the North Vietnamese peace delegation in case of truce talks. Ky even agreed to grant amnesty to the Vietcong who accept a peace settlement and return to a peaceful life.

This is important, because Vietcong leaders could then become eligible to run for public office in competition with Ky and his cohorts.

This was a real triumph for Ambasador Lodge, since a few months ago Ky was even opposed to any peace talks at all.

#### Skeptical Critics

There are some skeptics who predict the Manila Conference will turn into a war nouncil, not one to promote peace. I don't believe so.

In the first place, Lyndon Johnson is desperately sick of the war which he inherited, but which he escalated. Second, even the ruddy-faced,

country-squire leaders of Australia and New Zealand are getting restless flak from the voters and would like to see an honorable peace; while President Marcos of the Philippines is being called a pro-American puppet by Manila voters because he is sending 2000 engineering troops to South Vietnam to rebuild the countryside.

The only Manila conferee who will want the war to continue — besides Premier Ky will be Premier Thanom Kittikachorn of Thailand, whose government remains in power only because 30,000 American troops are on his soil, plus eight military bases.

But when the President gets away from the picturesque and sometimes smelly canals of Thailand and the ivory elephants that feature the lovelypalaces of Bangkok, he will find that both communism and capitalism are isms which the people don't worry much about. What they want is three bowl of rice a day or the wherewithal to buy it.

Basically, food, clean water, housing, schools and health form the most effective weapons in the struggle for power in the Far East. And these are commodities which Lyndon Johnson knows as well, perhaps better, than any other President.

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## Bereaved Father Threatens LBJ

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 17 (UPI) — A man who said his 19-year-old son was recently killed while fighting in Viet Nam, phoned a newspaper here today and threatened to kill President Johnson. when he arrives Saturday.

The man assured Daily Mirror news editor William Perry he was not a "orank of phony."

"I am going to blow Johnson's head off Saturday," Mr. Perry quoted the man as saying. Australian secret servicemen were alerted. Police began searching thru files of recently killed servicemen for possible clues.

· Barlier, Adelaide police received an anonymous report that a group was plotting to come to Sydney to take Mr. Johnson's life.

In Wellington, New Zealand, Prime Minister Keith Holyoake said he had been warned that an attempt would be made to assassinate


