DEMONSTRATIONS PROTESTING UNITED STATES INTERVENTION IN VIETNAM

The Communist Party and other organizations are continuing their efforts to force the United States to change its present policy toward Vietnam. There is set forth below a summary of current and planned future activity through which they hope to accomplish this end.

Demonstration Against the President

It was previously reported that the Los Angeles Peace Action Council, the membership of which includes representatives of the Communist Party, is sponsoring a demonstration at Los Angeles, California, on June 23, 1967, during the President's visit to that city.

The Council has announced it plans a "peace-in" at Cheviot Hills Park near Century City at noon on June 23. demonstrators will then march to the Century Plaza Hotel at 6 p.m. A demonstration and a rally will begin at 7 p.m. in the vicinity of the hotel. Participating groups are being urged to bring their own placards. The Council has made no specific plans for civil disobedience; however, the Civil Disobedience Committee, a recently formed group, has discussed the possibility of committing civil disobedience during the President's visit. It is considering circulating false bomb threats to the hotel; throwing eggs at women arriving at the hotel for the fund-raising dinner; spreading glass on the streets leading to the hotel; placing stink bombs in the hotel; cutting off the electric supply for the hotel; turning in false fire alarms; and plugging the hotel toilets with newspapers to cause an overflow into the banquet hall. 20 1361

At a meeting on June 4, 1967, the Committee discussed the possibility of holding a "lie-in" near the hotel to prevent cars from arriving at the hotel entrances. The Committee has also discussed the feasibility of demonstrators handcuffing themselves to the President's car and to law enforcement officers in the area. It is also considering

the possibility of demonstrators handcuffing themselves together so as to form a human chain to prevent entrance to the hotel.

The Committee has not yet decided on any specific civil disobedience.

The Civil Disobedience Committee is not connected with the Los Angeles Peace Action Council. It has no formal membership; however, youth members of the Communist Party; the Progressive Labor Party, a pro-Chinese Marxist group; and the Socialist Workers Party, which has been designated as subversive by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450, have attended its meetings.

Women Strike for Peace

The Southern California Council of Women Strike for Peace, a pacifist group, has announced that it will demonstrate at a meeting of the American Ordnance Association at Pasadena, California, on June 19, 1967. This demonstration is for the purpose of protesting biological and chemical warfare.

Wigils for Peace

The American Friends Service Committee, a pacifist group, held a silent vigil at Seattle, Washington, on June 7, 1967. The ten demonstrators displayed a sign protesting killing in Vietnam.

The Committee of Citizens Concerned about Vietnam, which has sponsored previous vigils for peace, held a vigil at Middletown, Connecticut, on June 7, 1967. Eighteen individuals stood for one hour in front of the Church of the Holy Trinity.

Twenty-three Yale Divinity School students held a silent vigil at New Haven, Connecticut, on June 7, 1967. The demonstrators displayed a sign urging peace in Vietnam.

The Communist Party and other organizations are continuing their efforts to force the United States to change its present policy toward Vietnam. There is set forth below a summary of current and planned future activity through which they hope to accomplish this end.

Demonstration Against the President

It was previously reported that the Los Angeles Peace Action Council, the membership of which includes representatives of the Communist Party, is sponsoring a demonstration at Los Angeles, California, on June 23, 1967, during the President's visit to that city. The Civil Disobedience Committee, a recently formed group, is considering engaging in various forms of civil disobedience during the demonstration. This Committee has no formal membership; however, youth members of the Communist Party; the Progressive Labor Party, a pro-Chinese Marxist group; and the Socialist Workers Party, which has been designated was subversive by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450, have attended its meetings.

The spokesman for the Council now estimates that 25,000 to 30,000 individuals will participate in the demonstration. Bill Taylor, Vice Chairman of the Southern California District Communist Party, is contacting various trade union and civil rights leaders in the Los Angeles area to gain support for the demonstration. He claims that this demonstration will be the largest ever held in Los Angeles and that he hopes for the a turn-out of 100.000 demonstration a turn-out of 100,000 demonstrators.

Several of the proposed demonstrators have allegedly obtained tickets to the fund-raising dinner at which the President will speak and have reserved rooms at the Century Plaza Hotel. They hope to confront the President in urge him to stop the war in Vietnam.

The Los Angeles Chapter of the Socialist Workers
Party held a meeting on June 7, 1967, to discuss the demonstration. It was the consensus of opinion that President Johnson on learning of the size of the proposed demonstration will not appear at the fund-raising dinner. The Socialist Workers
Party is giving full support to the demonstration.

Jim Berland, Chairman of the Youth Commission of the Southern California District Communist Party, will be in charge of the monitors during the march. He has stated that he has recruited a large number of students to act as monitors. A meeting of the prospective monitors will be held on June 19, 1967, at which time they will be given instructions concerning their duties during the demonstration.

The Civil Disobedience Committee held a meeting on June 9, 1967. Only five persons were present during the meeting. These individuals discussed possible civil disobedience, including the jamming of the locks to the doors of banquet rooms at the Century Plaza Hotel and the releasing of skunks, mice, and snakes during the dinner. However, the Committee has not yet decided on any form of civil disobedience. Due to the lack of support from other groups participating in the demonstration, a reliable source believes that the possibility of civil disobedience is waning.

While the Civil Disobedience Committee has no formal membership, Donald Freed, a Beverly Hills, California, school-teacher; Professor Donald Kalish, Chairman of the Philosophy Department at the University of California at Los Angeles, who has been active in previous demonstrations; Jim Berland; Marvin Trieger, a member of the Communist Party; and Jim Dann, a member of the Progressive Labor Party, a pro-Chinese Marxist group, have attended meetings of it. Vietnam Summer

Vietnam Summer, a project designed to organize resistance to the war in Vietnam in local communities throughout the United States, has established an office at 129 Nount Auburn Street, Cambridge, Massachusetts. Sponsors of Vietnam Summer include Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.; Dr. Benjamin Spock, Cochairman of the National Committee for



a Sane Nuclear Policy, a pacifist group; Robert Scheer, an official of "Ramparts" magazine and a former member of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, a pro-Castro group; and Carl Oglesby, former leader of the Students for a Democratic Society. Students for a Democratic Society is a militant youth group which Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, has described as a group which the Party has "going for us."

Cooperating groups include the American Friends
Service Committee, a pacifist group; the National Council of
Churches; the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, a
civil rights group; Students for a Democratic Society; and
the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, a civil rights
group. The Executive Committee of Vietnam Summer consists
of Lee D. Webb, National Director; John Maher, Jr.; and
Gar Alperovitz, a member of the Marvard University faculty.
Webb is a conscientious objector. Maher was a member of the
May 2 Movement, which was dominated by the Progressive Labor
Party. Its Steering Committee includes members of the
Students for a Democratic Society, the American Friends
Service Committee, and the Communist Party.

Vietnam Summer has been described as a Harvard University based group. According to a release by Alperovitz, the group seeks to defeat President Johnson and to end the war in Vietnam. It has called for 10,000 college students to spend the summer organizing opposition to the war in Vietnam in local communities. Methods of organizing such opposition are being tested in the Cambridge area under the leadership of Michael L. Walser, a member of the Harvard University faculty.

Michael Bisenscher, a member of the Communist Party, USA, National Committee, and the leader of the Milwaukee Organizing Committee, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, has issued a leaflet calling for support for Vietnam Summer. According to the leaflet, Hank Werner is serving as National Program Director of Vietnam Summer. Werner is the son-in-law of a Communist Party official.

A spokesman for the Council now estimates that 25,000 to 30,000 individuals will participate in the demonstration. A Communist Party official hopes for a turn-out of 100,000. The Socialist Workers Party, which has been cited by the Attorney General, is giving full support to the demonstration.

The Civil Disobedience Committee has not yet decided on any form of civil disobedience. Due to lack of support from other groups, a reliable source said that the possibility of civil disobedience is waning. The Civil Disobedience Committee has no formal membership; however, its meetings have been attended by representatives of the Communist Party and the Progressive Labor Party, a pro-Chinese Marxist group. The project has also been endorsed by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr; Dr. Benjamin Spock, a prominent pacifist; Robert Scheer, an official of "Ramparts" magazine and a former member of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, a pro-Castro group; and Carl Oglesby, former leader of Students for a Democratic Society, which has been described as a group the Communist Party has "going for us." All of these individuals are sponsors of Vietnam Summer.

DEMONSTRATION PROTESTING APPEARANCE OF PRESIDENT LYNDON B. JOHNSON IN LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA JUNE 23, 1967

Reference is made to Los Angeles memoranda dated June 9, 1967, and June 14, 1967, concerning a demonstration planned for June 23, 1967, at Los Angeles, California, to protest the appearance of President Lyndon B. Johnson on that date in Los Angeles, and at the same time, the United States policy in Vietnam.

On June 15, 1967 discoursed that a meeting of the Los Angeles Peace Action Council (LAPAC) took place during the evening of June 14, 1967, at the Mt. Hollywood b7D Congregational Church in the Hollywood area of Los Angeles.

> The "People's World", a weekly West Coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, described the LAPAC as "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

On July 22, 1966, reported that the LAPAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council. was formed during the early summer of 1966 for the express purpose of protesting the

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war in Vietname during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California, from July 4 to July 8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the LAPAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates.

This source was recontacted on May 10, 1967, and reported that the LAPAC continues to operate under the same basic concept.

Irving Sarnoff*, co-chairman of the LAPAC, chaired this meeting. He announced that publicity for the demonstration has been excellent to date. Time Magazine and Newsweek Magazine, both national weekly publications, have been given interviews by the LAPAC concerning plans for the demonstration. The Los Angeles television affiliate of the National Broadcasting Company has advised the LAPAC that this station will give television coverage of the march from Cheviot Hills Park to the Century Plaza Hotel. It was stated that several thousand leaflets announcing the demonstration have been sent by the LAPAC to area far removed from Los Angeles, including San Francisco, Santa Barbara, and San Diego, California.

Raphael Konigsberg*, treasurer of the LAPAC, gave a report concerning the finances of this organization. He indicated the LAPAC currently has about \$1200 in its treasury. He said that it is estimated that printing costs for publicity for the June 23, 1967, activities will amount to about \$400. Expenses for lights and electric sound systems for that date will be about \$1200. There is to be a meeting of the march monitors on Monday, June 19, 1967. The monitors will be given sealed containers in which to take up collections on June 23, 1967. The money will be counted immediately thereafter by Kenneth Rottger* and Konigsberg.

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stated that concurrently with this LAPAC meeting, a meeting of the Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam was being held at 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, so many of the younger persons were not present at this LAPAC meeting.

The Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, according to is composed of young people, primarily of school age, who are interested in protesting U.S. policy in Vietnam. This committee is an outgrowth of the Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, which sponsored large demonstrations protesting U.S. policy in Vietnam, in San Francisco, California, and New York City, on April 15, 1967.

It was announced that normally the Los Angeles Parks and Recreation Department has a "Fun Day" at each city park on the last day that the public schools in the city are in session before the summer holidays. Coincidentally, June 23, 1967, is the last day the schools are in session. There has not been any research done to determine if the Cheviot Hills playground area in the park will be put to this use for the school children. If so, there will be a lot of confusion with the activities for the school children and the activities of the peace demonstrators.

At about this point in the meeting, Ferrell Broslawsky, who was late in arriving, asked to be recognized by Sarnoff. Broslawsky is a history instructor at Valley State College in Los Angeles. He said that he had been tipped off to something he thought/the people in the LAPAC should be aware of; namely, that the California Attorney General's Office is planning to have him, Donala Kalish*, and Don Freed* arrested a day or so before the demonstration on a charge of conspiracy to commit a misdemeanor, which is a

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The charge arises out of earlier statements in the felony. press which have been attributed to these persons concerning civil disobedience. Broslawsky believed that reporters were present at a Civil Disobedience Committee (CDC) meeting, which was chaired jointly by Freed, Kalish and himself.

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advised that the CDC is an ad hoc committee which took form during the latter part of May, 1967, for the specific purpose of exploring the possibilities of committing civil disobedience during the visit of President Johnson to Los Angeles on June 23, 1967. The CDC is not connected to the organization sponsoring the demonstration or with any other organization. It is, in itself, no organization as such inasmuch as it has no officers or members. It is composed primarily of youth who are, at this point, interested in committing civil disobedience.

At this point, the meeting split wide open. Konigsberg spoke up and said that he felt it was wrong for professors, such as these three persons, to encourage young people to participate in such irresponsible acts as projected at the CDC meetings. Don Healey* also charged that Broslawsky was irresponsible; and that despite the attempts that had been made to clearly exclude such irresponsible suggestions from the meetings of the LAPAC, that Broslawsky and others had kept insisting that these things be discussed by the LAPAC. Healey said that under the circumstances, he felt Broslawsky had come to the wrong place to seek advice and solace. He said that the whole civil disobedience matter has caused trouble, not only with the press, but has also caused disruptions of the LAPAC meetings.

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Healey called for a motion to stop further discussion on this matter of civil disobedience. Sarnoff said that he did not like to do such things, but that he was going to have to exert his prerogative as chairman and declare the whole matter out of order and to insist that the meeting continue with other items of business.

All through this discussion, Bill Beasley, a Negro who has been active in the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (a militant civil rights organization), had his hand raised, attempting to gain recognition from the chair. Sarnoff never did recognize him and instead went ahead and called for a vote on the motion to table the discussion of Broslawsky's. Beasley then started calling out, "Irv, Irv!" Roslyn Schuldenfrei*, who was sitting near the front, turned to where Beasley was in the back of the room and shouted to him, "Shut up, Bill!" This made Beasley extremely made, and he answered, "I will not shut up; I'm going to have my say whether you like it or not," as he came charging down to the front of the meeting.

At this point Sarnoff started shuffling his papers together and said he was declaring the meeting adjourned, and at that time began to leave via the back of the room.

Beasley made his way to the front of the room and charged that there was a clique with the executive structure of the LAPAC, and that Sarnoff used as a tactic his failure to recognize individuals who might have an objection to something he wanted to get through. He said he thought it was wrong for Healey and Konigsberg to attack Broslawsky as irresponsible because they themselves had not been to the civil disobedience meetings and so therefore could not know what part Broslawsky had taken in such meetings.

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He said that if this was the way things were going to be run in the LAPAC, then he would want no further part in it and he would encourage others like himself in the "Black Community" to have nothing more to do with it, either.

He said most of the people on the Executive Board are anti-youth. He said that a statement was made by an LAPAC member many weeks earlier to the effect that picket signs should be screened and that everyone should act in a dignified manner. This statement "turned on" the youth members and got them thinking along the lines of civil disobedience, just so they would not be domineered by the elderly and more conservative members of the LAPAC.

He specifically pointed out that Roz Schuldenfrei was against youth. She came right back stating that was not at all true as she had a son of her own in Vietnam right now.

Broslawsky said he wanted to make it clear that he had not come here tonight to cause trouble, or the disruption that he was being accused of. He said also that he was not irresponsible at the CDC meeting, but in fact, had only called for a picket line to completely circle the hotel and thus keep the guests from entering the fundraising dinner. The main reason he brought the matter up at all was that he wanted the people to be prepared if such arrests were made.

The meeting continued for a short time in this aura of confusion and then those present adjourned to the sidewalk outside the church where the arguments continued for a short period of time. Prior to this both Healey and Konigsberg got up and said the LAPAC should not let this break it up, but that this should be a factor to get more people out to the next meeting the following Wednesday evening.

Wilkinson lives in Los Angeles and so he will not charge any fee for his services.

DISOBEDIENCE ISSUE

Johnson Visit Causes Split Among Peace Action Group

Members of the Peace Action Council of Southern California differed Thursday on whether there should be civil disobedience at the anti-Vietnam war demonstration scheduled for President Johnson's appearance here June 23.

Lawrence Sherman, PAC member and treasurer of the volunteer California Democratic Council, told a news conference at the Press Club that "if anyone intends to indulge in civil disobedience, I will disavow him and any such act and will not participate."

"I will countenance no civil disobedience," he declared. "We are free American citizens petitioning our government for redress."

Council Member Dissents

But another peace council member, Mrs. Mary Clarke, local leader of the Women's Strike for Peace, said she wanted to "separate myself from the statement by Mr. Sherman."

"The laws of our country are being broken by our Administration," she said. "I find civil disobedience not an intolerable means of dissent."

Although she and her group are not planning civil disobedience, Mrs. Clarke went on, "we do not disayow civil disobedience as we know it."

She added that she excluded "acts of violence" from civil disobedience.

Mrs. Clarke said she saw nothing wrong with "sitins, sit-downs or standing in front" of the Century Plaza where Mr. Johnson will attend a dinner sponsored by the President's Club, a \$1,000-a-member Democratic Party fund-raising organization.

"We're not organizing this, but we certainly wouldn't disavow it," she said.

Sherman, who used the Vietnam issue to run unsuccessfully for the congressional seat of Rep. Alphonzo E. Bell Jr. in 1966, replied:

"I sincerely believe that people participating are not going to introduce any violence. There is no reason for it. We are protected by law."

Sherman said there would be "sufficient law enforcement to control any fringe that might indulge in violence" during the demonstration.

Irving Sarnoff, co-chairman of the Peace Action Council, said he also

was against any acts of
violence during the demonstration.

"I personally do not foresee acts of this type taking place," he said.

Sarnoff noted that the Police Commission Wednesday approved a permit for the council, an alliance of 70 Southland anti-Vietnam war groups, to stage a parade from Cheviot Hills Park to the Century Plaza on the night of June 23.

Says Right Guaranteed

"We have been assured by the Police Department that our right to demonstrate and picket will be guaranteed," he said.

Sarnoff said the council plans to furnish 200 to 300 "monitors" to assist police in handling the crowd and to "guarantee the safety of the President."

Another council member, Dr. Donald Kalish, chairman of the philosophy department at UCLA, said he was "in deep sympathy with Mary Clarke's comment on civil disobedience."

"If the police try to remove the demonstrators, they will be perfectly justified in demanding to remain," he said.

Kalish said that the council's objective would be met if President Johnson fails to appear at the dinner.

Will Ask Questions

Sarnoff said that an attempt will be made "to address certain specific questions to Johnson via telephone while people are leaving" the dinner.

Carl Wood of UC Riverside, head of the Student Mobilization Committee, said members of his group taking part in the demonstration are "not out to cause any undue trouble" or "to take any illegal action."

A Negro minister, the Rev. James H. Hargett, said the demonstration will be of particular concern to Negroes.

Southerners and northern conservatives in Congress, he said, are using expenditures for the Vietnam war as an excuss for withholding money for such projects as slum clearance.

He said a "greater proportion" of Negroes than whites are fighting the war in Vietnam and that this is "unfair."

Earlier, Police Chief Tom Reddin said during a Press Club news conference to announce a community relations meeting that there would be "tight security" during the President's visit.

Reddin said he doubted any trouble would break out at the hotel although the department had heard a "mile-high stack of rumors" that there would be violence.

The group sponsoring the demonstration has issued "y'all come" invitations which do not exclude anyone, the chief noted.

The City Recreation and Park Commission voted 4 0 Thursday, afternoon to deny the council a permit to use the Cheviot Hills Recreation Center for a "peace-in" and mobilization area on the day of the demonstration.

Commission members explained that special events by school groups have already been scheduled for the center on June 23, the last day of school.

The events will require the use of the entire center, the commissioners said. About 3,500 youngsters are expected at the park during the day and about 1,500 for a dance and baseball games that night.

The Student Mobilization Committee had appealed to the commission for a permit after the park department staff denied the request when it was made May 23.





AMERICAN INSTITUTE FOR MARXIST STUDIES Also Known As AIMS

A source advised on April 9, 1963, that on April 7, 1963, at a meeting of the District Committee of the Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA) of New England, held in Boston, Massachusetts, HERBERT APTHEKER stated he was developing an organization called American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS), which would eventually legalize the CP. He stated AIMS would publish literature on History, Science, Physics, Archeology and other subjects which would be put out quarterly with various supplements.

A second source advised on June 30, 1966, that HERBERT APTHEKER was elected to the National Committee, CP, USA, at the 18th National Convention of the CP, USA, held June 22-26, 1966, in New York City.

A third source advised on June 7, 1963, that on June 3, 1963, HERBERT APTHEKER spoke at the CP, USA, New York District Board meeting concerning AIMS. APTHEKER stated that AIMS would unite and strengthen the CP although the CP would not be connected with it. He stated AIMS was being formed to operate within the scope of the McCarran and Smith Acts and would legally bring Marxist material and opinions to the attention of American scholars and the general public.

A fourth source reported on August 29, 1966, that AIMS was located on the fifth floor west of 20 East 30th Street, New York, New York, and issues a "Newsletter" every other month. This source made available the information that AIMS issues publications and holds symposiums concerning Marxism.

COMMUNIST INFILTRATION OF THE
WOMEN STRIKE FOR PEACE,
Also Known As
Women's International Strike for Peace

A source advised on May 17, 1966, that the Women Strike for Peace (WSP) in the Southern California area began its operations in the late fall of 1961, as an affiliate of the national organization formed in Washington, D.C. It is a peace oriented women's organization which is opposed to the present American foreign policy in Vietnam and the Dominican Republic. It has also sought legislation which would bring about the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA). In recent months the organization has sponsored demonstrations protesting the United States involvement in Vietnam and calling for the complete withdrawal of all United States troops from Vietnam. In the spring of 1966, it was instrumental in originating and putting into effect a campaign advocating support for "peace candidates" in the upcoming 1966 Congressional elections.

The same source stated that WSP is a non-membership organization and has no officers. The organization is open to women of all political opinions who are interested in world peace. It makes no effort to exclude from its activities members of, or persons sympathetic to, the Communist Party and related groups.

The guiding force behind the Southern California WSP groups is MARY CLARKE. A second source advised in July, 1955, that CLARKE was dropped from the Western Division, Los Angeles County Communist Party (LACCP) in the Spring of 1955, for personal reasons and not because of any political differences with the LACCP.

The first source advised that Southern California WSP maintains its office at 2308 Clyde Street, Los Angeles. It receives mail through Post Office Box 19737, Los Angeles 19, California.

DISCUSSION UNLIMITED, INC.

Records of the Division of Corporations, California State Department of Investments, Los Angeles, California, indicate that Discussion Unlimited filed its Articles of Incorporation as a nonprofit corporation, with the Secretary of State, Sacramento, California, on or about June 4, 1963, noting its principal site of office as Los Angeles County, California. The aims and purposes of the organization, as listed in the Articles of Incorporation, are "...to promote full and open discussion on our society and problems".

A source advised on May 8, 1963, that Discussion Unlimited, Inc. actually was originated in Los Angeles, California, in May, 1962, and was composed largely of a number of present and former Communist Party members who assist in staging panel forums and in promoting such events. Original coordinator of the group was BERNARD LUSHER, who in 1961, was educational director of the Southern California District Communist Party.

This source was recontacted on April 9, 1965, and indicated that the basic concept of Discussion Unlimited, Inc. has not changed. It continues to present "left ideas" to at least partially non-committed audiences. It proposes to develop special activities around various issues on an irregular basis. It is not a membership organization, and does not hold regular meetings as such, but rather is strictly a forum-type organization.

On May 10, 1966, another source reported that Discussion Unlimited, Inc. continues to operate as a forumtype organization.

NATIONAL COMMITTEE TO ABOLISH THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" issued December 1, 1961, by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, Page 115, contains the following citation regarding the National Committee to Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC).

"Cited as a 'new organization' set up in the Summer of 1960 to lead and direct the Communist Party's 'Operation Abolition' campaign. Seven of the national leaders of this group have been identified as Communists.

(Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 1278 on the Truth About the Film 'Operation Abolition', Part 1, October 3, 1961, P.5)"

A source has advised that the NCAUAC changed its name on March 3, 1962, to include the word "House" in its name, thereby becoming known as the National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NCAHUAC). A national meeting of this organization was held in Chicago, Illinois, on April 27, and 28, 1963.

A second source advised on May 9, 1966, that as of that date the NCAHUAC continued to function with headquarters, at 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California.

THE NEW LEFT SCHOOL OF LOS ANGELES

In October, 1965, a source advised "The New Left School of Los Angeles" originated in the Education Commission of the Southern California District, Communist Party. DAN BESSIE originated the idea and more or less organized the school. As of October, 1965, approximately 100 persons were enrolled in the school. Source further advised that as of October, 1965, JOHN HAAG appeared to be one of those involved in the inner organizational work of the school.

Source further advised as of July, 1965, DAN BESSIE was a member of the Education Commission, Southern California District, Communist Party.

A second source advised in September, 1965, JOHN RICHARD HAAG was present as chairman of a meeting of the Los Angeles Area Council, Du Bois Clubs of America, at 1733 West Temple Street, Los Angeles. At this meeting he stated he was not a member of the Communist Party (CP) because if he joined, his wife, ANNA, who is not a citizen, could be deported. He also stated if he became a member, he would lose effectiveness in the community because many people look up to him as an independent radical. He stated he would join the CP if it were legal, and not under pressure by the Government.

In May, 1965, a third source advised that EDMOND KOVACS, commonly known as Theodore Edwards, had been voted approval by the Los Angeles Local - Socialist Workers Party (LAL-SWP) to associate himself with "The New Left School of Los Angeles" as a representative of the Socialist Workers Party.

This source further advised in September, 1965, that EDMOND ANTHONY KOVACS, commonly known as Theodore Edwards, was the organizer of the Los Angeles Local - Socialist Workers Party (LAL-SWP), and alternate member of the National Committee, SWP.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

On May 2, 1966, a fifth source reported that The New Left School continues to operate at 1853 South Arlington Avenue, Los Angeles, California, and that DAN BESSIE continues to be one of the driving forces in the operation of the school.

A source advised on January 25, 1966, that the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms, (CCPAF) 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California, had recently changed its name to Southern Californians for Abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

The same source advised on June 9, 1966, that subsequent to the adoption of the new name in January, 1966, the officers began to refer to it by the name Southern Californians to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee. This is now the official name and the new letterhead of the organization carries the name as "Southern Californians to Abolish HUAC".

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations", revised, December 1, 1961, pp. 43-44, describes the CCPAF as follows:

"The Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms * * * specializes in propaganda aimed at abolishing the Committee on Un-American Activities and discrediting the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Created in Los Angeles in 1952, the front organization is run by FRANK WILKINSON, an identified Communist who recently resumed the full-time, paid post of executive secretary after approximately a year's leave of absence to assist in a similar campaign by another front in New York City, the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee.

"When the Committee on Un-American Activities held hearings in Los Angeles, September 2-5, 1958, to inquire into the nature of the Party's recent reorganization in California, the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms sponsored a series of public meetings to protest the hearings and the very existence of the Committee. Communists subpoenaed as witness were guests of honor.

Mrs. HEALEY declared that the Party preferred public protest meetings to be held by the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms rather than under party auspices because Communists could attend without danger of being exposed as members of the Party. She also noted that Communists scheduled as congressional committee witnesses could not appear beforehand at open Communist rallies without creating the impression that the Party was conspiring with witnesses to withhold information from the committee".

W.E.B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA (DCA)

A source has advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party (CP), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates were told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America (DCA) was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. The aims of this organization, as set forth in the preamble to the constitution, are: "It is our belief that this nation can best solve its problems in an atmosphere of peaceful coexistence, complete disarmament and true freedom for all peoples of the world, and that these solutions will be reached mainly through the united efforts of all democratic elements in our country, composed essentially of the working people allied in the unity of Negroes and other minorities with whites. We further fully recognize that the greatest threat to American democracy comes from the racist and right wing forces in coalition with the most reactionary sections of the economic power structure, using the tool of anti-Communism to divide and destroy the unified struggle of the working people.

Over the Labor Day weekend, 1965, the DCA held a conference in Chicago, Illinois, and a new slate of officers was elected to the National Executive Committee (NEC) of the DCA. Since Labor Day, 1965, identities of those serving on the NEC has varied; however, according to a third source as of May, 1966, thirteen of the fifteen members of the NEC were members of the CP in the San Francisco Bay area.

As of July, 1966, the headquarters of the DCA was located at 180 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, Illinois.

The meeting ended with no plans made for any type of civil disobedience to be undertaken.

The above source stated that there were no future scheduled CDC meetings planned as of June 10, 1967.



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DEMONSTRATIONS PROTESTING UNITED STATES INTERVENTION IN VIETNAM

The Communist Party and other organizations are continuing their efforts to force the United States to change its present policy toward Vietnam. There is set forth below a summary of current and planned future activity through which they hope to accomplish this end. \cup

Demonstration Against the President

It was previously reported that the Los Angeles Peace Action Council, the membership of which includes representatives of the Communist Party, is sponsoring a demonstration at Los Angeles, California, on June 23, 1967, during the President's visit to that city. The Civil Bisobedience Committee, a recently formed group, is considering engaging in various forms of civil disobedience during the demonstration. This Committee has no formal membership; however, youth members of the Communist Party; the Progressive Labor Party, a pro-Chinese Marxist group; and the Socialist Workers Party, which has been designated as subversive by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450, have attended its meetings.

The Council met on the evening of June 14, 1967. It was announced that the proposed demonstration was being widely publicazed. Representatives of "Time" and "Newsweek" have interviewed officials of the Council. It was also announced that there will be television coverage of the parade to the Century Plaza Hotel. W

On June 15, 1967, the Council held a press conference. Irving Sarnoff, Cochairman of the Council and a former member of the Communist Party; Mary Clarke, an official of Women Strike for Peace, a pacifist group, and a former member of the Communist Party; and Professor Donald Kalish, Chairman of the Philosophy Department of the University of California at Los Angeles, represented the Council. They stated that

the Council is not planning any civil disobedience during the demonstration and, in fact, hopes that no civil disobedience will take place. They denied that the purpose of the press conference was to disassociate the Council from the proposed civil disobedience.

At the meeting on June 14, 1967, a representative of the Civil Disobedience Committee said that he had heard that the leaders of the Committee were to be arrested on the day before the demonstration on a charge of conspiracy to committe misdemeanor. At that time, members of the Council complained that a Council meeting is not the place to discuss civil disobedience as the Council had made it clear that is will not endorse such tactics.

It was announced that Dr. Benjamin Spock, Cochairman of the National Committee for a Same Nuclear Policy, a pacifist group, may speak at the demonstration on June 23. It was announced that Frank Wilkinson, Executive Director, National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee, has agreed to speak. The National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee has been described as a communist front by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives. It was also announced that there is a possibility that Muhammad Alimay speak at the demonstration. (LAtel 6/15 revidem)

Washington Mobilization Committee

The Washington Mobilization Committee, Washington, D. C., the membership of which includes members of the Young Socialist Alliance, the youth group of the Socialist Workers Party, which has been designated as subversive by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450, met on the evening of June 13, 1967. According to announcements made at the meeting, a demonstration will be held at the Armed Forces Induction Center, Washington, on June 23, 1967. Demonstrations will also be held at Fort Holabird, Maryland, during the time that inductees are undergoing their physical examinations. Demonstrations will also be held at the Induction Center on June 26, 27, and 28, 1967.

The Committee is considering demonstrations at the homes of members of the Selective Service Board and at the home of General Lewis B. Hershey, Director of the Selective Service System. (WFOairtel 6/14/67 re Washington Mobilization Committee)

Civil Action Day Committee

The Civil Action Day Committee, Oakland, California, is distributing a leaflet calling for a demonstration at the Oakland Induction Center, Oakland, California, on June 29, 1967, as a protest against the draft. According to the leaflet, the demonstrators will engage in civil disobedience in the hope of disrupting the induction of individuals into the Armed Services. The Civil Action Day Committee is a recently formed group which has met at the home of Judy Eleanor Robinson, Oakland, California. She was arrested on December 3, 1964, while engaging in a sit-in at Sproul Hall, University of California, Berkeley, California. (SFairtel 6/9/67 re Civil Action Day Committee)

Stockholm Conference

A Conference on Aid to Vietnam will be held at Stockholm, Sweden, July 6-9, 1967. The Reverence James Bevel, National Director, the Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, has reportedly promised to attend the Conference provided the sponsors of it pay his expenses. It was also reported that Stuart Meacham of the American Friends Service Committee, a pacifist group, and Dr. Benjamin Spock will participate in the Conference. This Conference is being sponsored by international peace groups, such as the International Confederation for Disarmament and Peace of London, England. A representative of the Confederation recently visited the United States to secure United States participation in the Conference.

Flag Day Demonstration

The Denver Committee to End the War in Vietnam, Denver, Colorado, the membership of which includes members of the Socialist Workers Party, sponsored a demonstration at Denver on June 14, 1967, during a Flag Day celebration. The

fifty demonstrators distributed leaflets and flowers to spectators. One demonstrator attempted to block the automobile carrying the Governor of California and Lieutenant General Lewis Walt of the United States Marine Corps, the principal speaker. This demonstrator was removed by irate spectators. (DN 6/14/67 re Demonstration at Flag Day Celebration) Houston Committee to Stop the War in Vietnam

It was previously reported that the Houston Committee to Stop the War in Vietnam, Houston, Texas, which has been active in protesting the war in Vietnam, was sponsoring a demonstration at Austin, Texas, on June 16, 1967, during the President's visit to that city.

The University of Texas Committee to Stop the War in Vietnam, which includes members of Students for a Democratic Society, joined the Houston group in sponsoring the demonstration. Approximately 95 demonstrators, carrying signs demanding an end to the war in Vietnam, participated in the demonstration. Twenty-five members of Veterans of Foreign Wars held a demonstration in support of United States policy toward Vietnam.

Students for a Democratic Society is a militant youth group which has been described by Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, as a group which the Party has "going for us."

Due to the interest of the President in protests concerning United States policy toward Vietnam, we have prepared a summary, copy attached for ready reference, setting forth the current and planned future activity in this matter. High lights of this summary are as follows:

It was previously reported that the Los Angeles Peace Action Council, the membership of which includes representatives of the Communist Party, is sponsoring a demonstration at Los Angeles, California, on June 23, 196 during the President's visit to that city. Another group the Civil Disobedience Committee, is considering engaging in various forms of civil disobedience during the demonstration. The Council has announced that representatives of "Time" and "Newsweek" have interviewed Council officials concerning the demonstration. There will also be television coverage of the demonstration. The Council also announced that it is not planning any civil disobedience. Speakers at the demonstration will include Dr. Benjamin Spock, a prominent pacifist, and Frank Wilkinson, leader of the National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee, a communist front.

The Washington Mobilization Committee, which includes members of the Young Socialist Alliance, the youth group of the Socialist Workers Party which has been cited as subversive by the Attorney General, is holding a series of demonstrations at Fort Holabird, Maryland. The Campus Mobilization Committee is the name used in Berkeley, California, for the Student Mobilization Committee, which is a nationwide organization on college campuses whose purpose is to protest United States participation in the Vietnam war. It is noted 2001 Milvia, Berkeley is in the same building as the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) Headquarters, Berkeley.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

On June 8, 1967, a second source advised that at a meeting of the San Francisco County Committee and Club Chairmen of the Communist Party (CP) held in San Francisco on June 5, 1967, it was announced that President Johnson would be visiting in Los Angeles on June 23, 1967. It was stated that picketing is being planned by the CP in Los Angeles

On June 12, 1967, the second source, and on June 15, 1967, a third source reported that the San Francisco County CP held a convention in San Francisco on June 11, 1967. It was announced at that meeting that President Johnson would be in Los Angeles on June 23, 1967. It was stated this may be a big affair to picket the President, but as yet it is not known how many persons from San Francisco will participate. Plans are being discussed to charter two or three buses to go to Los Angeles. From the nature of the announcement, it did not appear that the picketing was strictly a party function.

On June 15, 1967, a fourth source furnished a mimeographed sheet captioned, "Minutes of the Student Mobilization Committee Meeting June 4, 1967." The sheet had the following paragraph under "Announcement":

"On June 23 in Los Angeles President Johnson will be receiving an award, the cause of which is still unknown. The LASMC has asked for support of a picket, and we will try to send at least one car from San Francisco. Berkeley is in the process of organizing car pools also. If you have a vehicle to offer, either come to the next SMC meeting, which you should do anyway, or call 431-5560."

It is noted that the above telephone number is listed to the San Francisco Student Mobilization Office.

On June 15, 1967, a fifth source advised that a leaflet urging persons to picket President Johnson in Los Angeles, was disseminated at a meeting of the Spring Mobilization Committee on June 12, 1967, in San Francisco. The source stated that there was very little discussion on the matter and no specific plans seemed to have been made for transportation of persons to Los Angeles.

The Spring Mobilization Committee is a nationwide organization with offices in New York City, which was organized to sponsor massive anti-Vietnam rallies in New York and San Francisco, on April 15, 1967.

All information developed concerning the demonstration has been furnished to the White House, Secret Service, local authorities, the Attorney General, and other appropriate agencies. There is attached a letter to the White House summarizing information which we have previously furnished to it so that it will have the information in one letter for ready reference.

This demonstration is receiving support from both the Communist Party and the Socialist Workers Party. Groups from San Francisco and San Diego, California, plan to participate. The Council is against engaging in civil disobedience during the demonstration and reliable sources have recently stated that talk of civil disobedience has died down. At a meeting of the Council on June 19, 1967, it was announced that 15,000 individuals are expected to participate in the demonstration.

We are continuing to follow this matter closely and will keep the White House and appropriate agencies advised.



On June 16, 1967, you requested information of Assistant to the Director Cartha D. DeLoach of this Bureau regarding an advertisement concerning civil disobedience which appeared in the Los Angeles Free Press" issue of June 9-15, 1967.

You were previously advised that the Los Angeles Peace Action Council, Los Angeles, California, which includes representatives of the Communist Party among its membership, is sponsoring a demonstration at Los Angeles on June 23, 1967, during the President's visit to that city. Another group, the Civil Disobedience Committee, is considering engaging in various forms of civil disobedience during the demonstration. This Committee has no formal membership; however, youth members of the Communist Party; the Progressive Labor Party, a pro-Chinese Marxist group; and the Socialist Workers Party, which has been designated as subversive by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450, have attended its meetings.

A spokesman for the Los Angeles Peace Action Council has staged that the Council does not condone civil disobedience and hopes that such actions will not take place during the proposed demonstration.

The "Los Angeles Free Press" has, in the past, carried articles critical of United States policy toward Vietnam. This paper is self-described as "a forum for free expression of critical comment and dialogue."



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

Dear Mrs. Stegall:

Previous memoranda from this Bureau captioned "Demonstrations Protesting United States Intervention in Vietnam" have advised you of a proposed demonstration against President Johnson on June 23, 1967, during his visit to Los Angeles, California. I thought you would be interested in a summary of the information which we have previously furnished to you.

The Los Angeles Peace Action Council, the membership of which includes representatives of the Communist Party, is the main sponsor of the demonstration. The Civil Disobedience Committee, a recently formed group, is considering engaging in various forms of civil disobedience during the demonstration. This Committee has no formal membership; however, youth members of the Communist Party; the Progressive Labor Party, a pro-Chinese Marxist group; and the Socialist Workers Party which has been designated as subversive by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450, have attended its meetings.

The Council has announced that it plans to hold a "peace-in" at Cheviot Hills Park near Century City at noon on June 23. After hearing a series of speeches criticizing the war in Vietnam, the demonstrators will then march to the Century Plaza Motel. The demonstration at the hotel will begin at 7 p.m. Participating groups are being urged to bring their own placards setting out their views. Some of the placards which will be carried by the demonstrators will read "LBJ - Liar," "LBJ - S.O.B.," "LBJ - War Criminal,"

"Impeach Johnson," and "LSD is a Drug - LBJ is Poison." The Council has estimated that 25,000 to 30,000 individuals will participate in the demonstration; however, other individuals have expressed the opinion that it is possible that 100,000 or more will participate. According to a Council spokesman, speakers will include H. Rap Brown, Chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, a civil rights group, and Frank Wilkinson, Executive Director. National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee which has been described as a communist front by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives. Wilkinson is a former member of the Communist Party. Dr. Benjamin Spock, Cochairman of the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy, a pacifist group, will also probably speak during the demonstration. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., has been invited to speak; however, there is no indication that he has accepted this invitation.

At a recent Council meeting it was announced that the proposed demonstration is receiving wide publicity. Representatives of "Time" and "Newsweek" have reportedly interviewed Council officials. It was announced that there will be television coverage of the parade to the hotel.

The Civil Disobedience Committee has discussed numerous disrupting tactics which it could use during the demonstration. These include circulating false bomb threats to the hotel; throwing eggs at women arriving at the hotel for dinner; spreading glass on the streets leading to the hotel; placing stink bombs in the hotel; cutting off the electric supply for the hotel; turning in false fire alarms; plugging the hotel toilets with newspapers to cause an overflow into the banquet hall; holding a "lie-in" near the hotel to prevent cars from arriving at the entrances; handcuffing individuals to the President's car and to law enforcement officers in the area; and handcuffing demonstrators together so as to form a human chain around the hotel. As yet the Committee has not decided on any specific acts of disobedience. The Council has publicly announced that it does not condone civil disobedience and hopes that there will be none during the demonstration.

Jim Berland, Chairman of the Youth Commission of the Southern California District Communist Party, will be in charge of the monitors during the parade to the hotel. He has stated that he has recruited a large number of students to act as monitors. Bill Taylor, Vice Chairman of the Southern California District Communist Party, is contacting various trade union and civil rights leaders in the Los Angeles area to gain support for the demonstration. The Los Angeles Branch of the Socialist Workers Party is giving full support to the demonstration. At a recent Party meeting, the members felt that President Johnson on learning of the size of the demonstration will not appear at the Century Plaza Hotel.

A meeting of the march monitors was held on the evening of June 19. Berland was in charge of the meeting. He announced that 150 monitors were needed and that they will wear red arm bands. It was stated that it is now expected that 15,000 individuals will participate in the demonstration. The monitors are responsible for leading the demonstrators in chants. Among the chants suggested are "Hey, hey, LBJ, how many kids did you kill today?," "Hell no, we won't go," "Let the people vote on war," "Bring the GIs home now," and "End the war now." The monitors were instructed that hecklers are to be ignored.

Irving Sarnoff, Cochairman of the Council, was present at the meeting. He strongly urged that the demonstrators not engage in civil disobedience. Some individuals who have been active in the Civil Disobedience Committee were present. They made no comment concerning Sarnoff's plea. Reliable observers are of the opinion that the demonstration will be orderly as talk of civil disobedience has died down. Any civil disobedience will probably be due to some incident rather than planned.

The Student Mobilization Committee, Berkeley, California, has distributed leaflets in the San Francisco area urging individuals to participate in the demonstration at Los Angeles on June 23. The Student Mobilization Committee includes members of the Communist Party and the Socialist Workers Party in its membership.

The San Diego, California, Branch of the Socialist Workers Party is supporting this demonstration and is attempting to arrange transportation for individuals who wish to participate in the demonstration. The San Diego Council for Social Action, which is dominated by members of the Communist Party, is sponsoring a motorcade to Los Angeles on June 23. Participants will carry "peace signs" on their cars and will leave San Diego for Los Angeles at 2:30 p.m. As yet there is no indication as to the number of individuals from San Francisco and San Diego who will participate in the demonstration.

All information developed concerning this demonstration has been furnished to the United States Secret Service and local authorities.

Reference is made to Los Angeles memorandum, dated June 16, 1967, concerning a demonstration planned for June 23, 1967, at Los Angeles, California, to protest the appearance of President Lyndon B. Johnson on that date in Los Angeles, and at the same time, the United States policy in Vietnam.

On June 20, 1967, advised that a meeting of the march monitors took place at the First Unitarian b70 Church in Los Angeles (see appendix) on the evening of June 19, 1967. About 100 persons were present. Jim Berland* acted as chairman of the meeting. During the course of the meeting, the following information was obtained:

About 150 monitors are needed to handle the march since some 15,000 persons are expected to participate. All

monitors will wear red armbands. Head monitors will wear red and black armbands. It was announced that the revised march route will be from Cheviot Hills Park north on Motor Avenue to Pico Boulevard; east on Pico to Avenue of the Stars; north on Avenue of the Stars past the Century Plaza Hotel to Constellation Way; east on Constellation Way to Century Park East; south on Century Park East to Pico; west on Pico to Motor and south back to the Park. The marchers are to be urged to join the picket line, which will already be in progress at the Century Plaza Hotel, when the march gets to this point. Participants in the march, not the monitors, are being asked to wear white shirts with black armbands to indicate mourning. Monitors will meet at the bandstand in Cheviot Hills Park at 5:30 p.m. on June 23, 1967, at which time final instructions will be given.

Five "walkie-talkie" citizen band radio units are expected to be used in the march. Three of these will be in the center of the marchers with one of these units at each end of the march line. Monitors will be responsible for keeping chants going among marchers. Chants suggested are: "Hey, hey, LBJ, how many kids did you kill today?"; "Hell no, we won't go"; "Let the people vote on war"; "Bring the GI's home now"; "End the war now"; "We want peace now". Hecklers will be ignored or handled without violence.

Irving Sarnoff*, co-chairman of the Los Angeles Peace Action Council (LAFAC) was present at this meeting and made a strong statement against all civil disobedience and added that the LAPAC would not support any form of civil disobedience being committed. It was noted that Donald Kalish*, Bill Beasley, Don Freed*, and Ferrell Broslawsky*, all of whom, b2 according to have been previously active in Civil Disobedience Committee (CDC) meetings, were present at this meeting, but made no suggestions.

The "People's World", a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, described the LAPAC as "a coordinating agency

for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

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On July 22, 1966, reported that the LAPAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council, was formed during the early summer of 1966 for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California, from July 4 to July 8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the LAPAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates.

This source was recontacted on May 10, 1967, and reported that the LAPAC continues to operate under the same basic concept.

advised that the CDC is an ad hoc committee which took form during the latter part of May, 1967, for the specific purpose of exploring the possibilities of committing civil disobedience during the visit of President Johnson to Los Angeles on June 23, 1967. The CDC is not connected to the organization sponsoring the demonstration or with any other organization. It is, in itself, no organization as such inasmuch as it has no officers or members. It is composed primarily of youth who are, at this point, interested in committing civil disobedience.

advised on June 20, 1967, that some confusion exists as to whether the rally will take place before, after, or at a point during the march. Demonstrators do not believe they have permission to use the vacant lot east of the Century Plaza Hotel for the rally. Originally, the rally was to have taken place on this lot but the march route has been changed due to the demonstrators inability to obtain permission to use this lot. Additional changes in their plans are possible as regards the location and time of the rally.

Another monitor's meeting is scheduled to take place at 8:00 p.m. on June 22, 1967, at the First Unitarian Church, Los Angeles. Another LAPAC meeting is scheduled for 8:00 p.m. on June 21, 1967, at Mt. Hollywood Congressional Church in the Hollywood area of Los Angeles.

on June 20, 1967, stated they believed that the march and rally should be orderly as talk of civil disobedience has definitely died down. Civil disobedience, if it comes, will probably be spontaneous due to some incident.

on June 20, 1967, made available the attached, a copy of a leaflet, which was distributed to the monitors at their meeting on June 19, 1967.

DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES OF MONITORS

Overall, monitors have the responsibility of maintaining the direction, order and spirit of the march.

- 1. Monitors will be posted one per every 20-25 people, with a head monitor every 4-5 monitors. Monitors with walkie-talkies will be at the front, middle and end of the line. The march will start around 6 PM in Cheviot Hills Park and proceed to Century City Hotel.
- 2. Keeping the march orderly doesn't mean being done in a military fashion. Merely, keeping the marchers moving at an even pace, signs prominent etc. In the event of hecklers, the marchers should not heckle back--just ignore the provacations. If the heckler is persistant and overt, the monitor should contact other monitors to isolate and usher the heckler away from the march. However, take no direct actions on individuals unless directed to by a head monitor. In all dealings with hecklers, use tactical sense, be firm and don't panic. The march is our way of demonstrating our protest of the Vietnam War. We organized it and take the responsibility to maintain it.
- 3. The spirit of a march is quite important. This march should be the opposite of a funeral procession. It should be lively, energetic, with chants, slogans, songs, (snakedance?). Monitors can start a chant, keep one going or pass down what is being said ahead. Possible chants: Hey, hey IBJ, How many kids did you kill today? Hell No, We Worlt Go. Let the people vote on war. Bring the GI's home (when) NOW! End the war (when) NOW! We want peace (when) NOW. etc
- 4. In the event of an accident such as a person tripping, getting hit, fainting etc., monitors will have first aid kits. If an emergency occurs, an ambulance will be called.

All monitors will wear red armbands, head monitors will wear red and black armbands.

All monitors will meet at 5:30 in Cheviot Hills Park, near the bandstand, for last minute instructions. Some monitors will help with the collection at the rally.

Referenced memorandum set forth information on page three indicating that the Los Angeles Parks and Recreation Department normally has a "Fun Day" at each city park on the last day that the public schools in the city are in session before the summer holidays. Coincidentally, June 23, 1967, is the last day the schools are in session in Los Angeles.

On June 21, 1967, _______advised that the Los Angeles Parks and Recreation Department Commissioners have denied the request of the LAPAC to use certain facilities within Cheviot Hills Park on June 23, 1967. Facilities denied their specific use are the auditorium, ball field and play areas, which have been previously reserved for children and teenagers for the "Fun Day" activities. The Commissioners stated that the "Fun Day" activities, already scheduled, would "require use of the total facility."

Broslawsky was defeated in the June, 1966, Democratic primary election.

The Los Angeles Free Press has been described in the July 29, 1966, issue of Time Magazine, a national weekly publication, on page 57. The newspaper is described as a weekly tabloid which has been described by its publisher as "'a forum for free expression of critical comment and dialogue'".

DON FREED

on September 27, 1966, advised that Freed is listed as a faculty member of the New Left School of Los Angeles (see appendix) for the summer semester, 1966.

on March 15, 1967, made available a leaflet which indicated that Freed is a faculty member of the Beverly. Hills, California, public school system.

b2 b7D b7C advised on March 4, 1966, that in early 1966, Kalish was in contact with Herbert Aptheker, Director of the American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS)(see appendix) in New York City. Kalish indicated he was in agreement with Aptheker's work in AIMS.

The August 10, 1966, issue of Tocsin, a bi-weekly periodical, published in Davis, California, and describing itself as an "anti-communist intelligence report," on page 2, states that 'Kalish was one of the University of California at Los Angeles faculty members who signed a letter in May, 1966, to Attorney General Nicholas Katzenbach protesting his action requiring the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs to register as a Communist front organization." (See appendix for characterization of the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs.)

IRVING SARNOFF

On January 9, 1959 advised that as of January, 1959, Sarnoff is a current member of the District Council of the SCDCP.

COMMUNIST INFILTRATION OF THE FIRST UNITARIAN CHURCH OF LOS ANGELES


A source advised on July 25, 1966, that the premises of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, 2936 West 8th Street, Los Angeles, California, have been utilized for meetings by Communist Party members and sympathizers over a period of years. Speakers and lecturers at the church frequently espouse Communist causes or follow the Communist Party line. Communist front group literature is distributed at the church. The church is used by some Communist Party members for "mass concentration" work.

This same infiltration extends to adjuncts of the church such as the Unitarian Public Forum and the Fellowship for Social Justice, formerly known as the Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship for Social Justice.

STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN has been minister of the church since 1948.

Reverend STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN is described in the Fourth Report, Un-American Activities Committee in California, 1948, page 115, as a very active "Communist fronter" and connected with numerous "Communist front organizations and activities."

Membership in the First Unitarian Church does not, of itself, connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.



APPENDIX

THE NEW LEFT SCHOOL OF LOS ANGELES

In October, 1965, a source advised "The New Left School of Los Angeles" originated in the Education Commission of the Southern California District, Communist Party. DAN BESSIE originated the idea and more or less organized the school. As of October, 1965, approximately 100 persons were enrolled in the school. Source further advised that as of October, 1965, JOHN HAAG appeared to be one of those involved in the inner organizational work of the school.

Source further advised as of July, 1965, DAN BESSIE was a member of the Education Commission, Southern California District, Communist Party.

A second source advised in September, 1965, JOHN RICHARD HAAG was present as chairman of a meeting of the Los Angeles Area Council, Du Bois Clubs of America, at 1733 West Temple Street, Los Angeles. At this meeting he stated he was not a member of the Communist Party (CP) because if he joined, his wife, ANNA, who is not a citizen, could be deported. He also stated if he became a member, he would lose effectiveness in the community because many people look up to him as an independent radical. He stated he would join the CP if it were legal, and not under pressure by the Government.

In May, 1965, a third source advised that EDMOND KOVACS, commonly known as Theodore Edwards, had been voted approval by the Los Angeles Local - Socialist Workers Party (LAL-SWP) to associate himself with "The New Left School of Los Angeles" as a representative of the Socialist Workers Party.

This source further advised in September, 1965, that EDMOND ANTHONY KOVACS, commonly known as Theodore Edwards, was the organizer of the Los Angeles Local - Socialist Workers Party (LAL-SWP), and alternate member of the National Committee, SWP.

A fourth source advised on May 12, 1966, that the LAL-SWP has been in existence since the 1930's and continues to exist. The source further advised that the LAL-SWP is a local branch of the National SWP with aims and purposes identical to those of the National SWP.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

On May 2, 1966, a fifth source reported that The New Left School continues to operate at 1853 South Arlington Avenue, Los Angeles, California, and that DAN BESSIE continues to be one of the driving forces in the operation of the school.

W.E.B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA (DCA)

A source has advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party (CP), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates were told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America (DCA) was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. The aims of this organization, as set forth in the preamble "It is our belief that this nation to the constitution, are: can best solve its problems in an atmosphere of peaceful coexistence, complete disarmament and true freedom for all peoples of the world, and that these solutions will be reached mainly through the united efforts of all democratic elements in our country, composed essentially of the working people allied in the unity of Negroes and other minorities with whites. We further fully recognize that the greatest threat to American democracy comes from the racist and right wing forces in coalition with the most reactionary sections of the economic power structure, using the tool of anti-Communism to divide and destroy the unified struggle of the working people.

Over the Labor Day weekend, 1965, the DCA held a conference in Chicago, Illinois, and a new slate of officers was elected to the National Executive Committee (NEC) of the DCA. Since Labor Day, 1965, identities of those serving on the NEC has varied; however, according to a third source as of May, 1966, thirteen of the fifteen members of the NEC were members of the CP in the San Francisco Bay area.

As of July, 1966, the headquarters of the DCA was located at 180 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, Illinois.

The War Resisters League, a pacifist group, will start picketing the Century Plaza Hotel, where the President will appear, to test the reaction of Los Angeles authorities Ito such picketing. The Council's rally will begin at 6:30 p.m., at Cheviot Hills Park, Los Angeles. From there, the demonstrators will march to the Century Plaza Hotel. The hotel has hired private detectives to infiltrate the Council and will use them as witnesses in a petition for an injunction to restrain individuals from demonstrating in the vicinity of the hotel. The Southern California District Communist Party has issued instructions that its members are not to participate in the demonstration in view of possible trouble with Los Angeles authorities. 105-1383/5-6 with Los Angeles authorities.

The American Nazi Party at Los Angeles will begin a counterdemonstration in the vicinity of the hotel at 3:30 p.m., June 23. Secret Service, local authorities and 26 1967 other appropriate agencies have been advised of the information.

STOP JOHNSON NOW!

JOHNSON AND A WAR-CRAZED CONGRESS ARE READY TO DECLARE "OFFICIAL" WAR. THIS WAR WILL BE AGAINST THE PEOPLE OF VIETNAL THE PROFLE OF CHIMA, AND AGAINST YOU.

In the week of May 21, 337 G.I.'s died. In that same week, hundreds of Vietnamese men, women, and children died for the crime of wanting to run their own country. Look around you. Who benefits from this wor? Small businesses get pushed aside by large corporations. The number of extremely poor continues to grow. (The N.Y. Times of June 4 says, "The U.S. Gov't. lists only 1,279 deaths from 'malnutrition'...in 1965.)

U.S. BILLIONAIRES AND THEIR PAY-TRIOTISM

Several companies can't wait until the shooting stops to establish branches in Saigon. American investors reap 20 to 30% a year profit in Vietnam even now. Chase National Bank (Rockefeller-owned) is taking over financing from French banks in Saigon. And the Bank of America, with a new branch in Saigon, is also getting in on the gravy.

They want to bring the same kind of "freedon" to Vietnan that they brought to South Korea, where American electronics companies are gettin; skilled labor for \$20 a north. This bosses paradise was established at the cost of 2,000,000 Korean civilian lives and thousands of Korean and American troops, and today is irotected by a military occupation of 60,000 American troops and 600,000 puppet troops—paid by your taxes!

They want the same kind of "freedom" in Vietnam that they have brought to Indonesia, where Goodyear, Standard Oil of California, U.S. Rubber, Union Carbide, and other companies are reaping lush benefits from the murder of a nillion Indonesian people by a U.S.-favored nilitary clique.

In Thailand, which bristles with American guns, corporations like Union Carbide, Lsso, and Bank of America, believe themselves to have a pretty secure stranglehold on the Thailand economy, but this stranglehold has to be protected by American flyers bonding the countryside and puppet troops going on patrols against peasant guerrillas.

OPPRESSED PEOPLE EVER MERE IN REVOLD

The people of South Vietnam, organized by the National Liberation Front, are fighting for freedom, and for the independence and reunification of their country. That is why they keep winning, even when all the military, industrial, and numerical odds are against them.

On June 2-just a few weeks ago-in Roxbury, Lassachusetts, a courageous group of Black wonen who had been on welfare and had been cut off without notice, staged a sit-in in the Velfare building. When the cops came to drag them out, the people of the neighborhood came to the women's defense. The police brought reinforcements, and a battle ensued throughout the night between 1,700 cops and 1,00 civilian Black people. The cops had submachine guns, bayonets, and police dogs, and the Black people faced then with rocks and bottles.

In Delano, California and the surrounding area, a hundred or nore families are holding out and enduring hunger and privation in their determination to win a strike against big grape-grover corporations whose financial control is linked with some of the biggest banks and industries in California.

In New Mexico, a group of Mexican-American citizens, descendants of old families who were dispossessed by the copper and cattle barons and by the Tederal and State governments, are in open revolu against the state police and have fled into the hills. Their families have been herded into covpens--make-shift concentration camps--with no charges brought against them and without being allowed to talk to newsmen.

In Cairo and Danascus, thousands of Arab working people, knowing who their main enemy is, have stormed the U.S. embassies, and forced their governments to break diplomatic relations with the U.S., and close down these front offices for Standard Cil, Texaco, and Gulf.

In every case, these impoverished and rebellious people are fighting the same energy. Behind the cop or the gunboat stands a billionaire bank or industrial corporation. And all of us-black, brown, white, or pink-are going to be right there confronting these same institutions if we want to stop union-busting, or inflation, or unemployment.



Characterizations of Workers World Party and Youth Against War and Fascism are contained in the appendix.

On June 19, 1967, a pretext call was made to telephone number which is listed in the leaflet. The person answering the telephone was a female who stated she had disseminated the leaflet in the San Francisco Bay area. She stated that three persons were going in her car to Los Angeles and that there would be room for a fourth. She refused to identify herself when asked.

WORKERS WORLD PARTY

On April 17, 1959, a source advised that on February 12, 1959, a Socialist Workers Party (SWP) minority group under the leadership of National Committee member, SAM BALLAN, split from the SWP.

The source stated that this minority group, referred to as the Marcyites, after many years of program and policy differences on varied issues concerning tactics and interpretation of political events, split from the SWP on the grounds that the Party was liquidating itself by departing from the Marxist precepts of LEON TROTSKY and retreating from the fight for the world socialist revolution. The final issue which ultimately forced the split was the minority's opposition to the SWP regroupment policy which involved cooperation with the Communist Party (CP) periphery - individuals characterized by the minority as petty-bourgeois.

The minority program, according to the source, advocated unconditional defense of the Soviet Union and has as its goal the building of a revolutionary party with a complete proletarian orientation for the purpose of overthrowing capitalism in the United States and throughout the world.

On May 12, 1960, the source advised that this minority group had chosen the name Workers World Party.

On May 2, 1966, a second source advised that the Workers World Party, which maintains headquarters at 46 West 21st Street, New York, New York, supports the People's Republic of China in its ideological dispute with the Soviet Union.

The SWP and the CP have been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

YOUTH AGAINST WAR AND FASCISM

A source advised on March 29, 1965, that the Youth Against War and Fascism (YAWF), formerly known also as the Anti-Fascist Youth Committee, was established by the Workers World Party (WWP) in the Summer of 1962, to bring college and high school youth into the periphery of WWP activities and thereby gain recruits for the organization.

A second source advised on October 23, 1964, that a flyer distributed by the YAWF describes that organization as a militant organization of young workers and worker-students for combating war and fascism.

The first source advised on March 9, 1966, that the YAWF maintains its headquarters at 58 West 25th Street, New York City, and publishes a magazine called "The Partisan."

Reference is made to Los Angeles memorandum dated June 21, 1967, concerning a demonstration planned for June 23, 1967, at Los Angeles, California, to protest the appearance of President Lyndon B. Johnson on that date in Los Angeles, . and at the same time, the United States policy in Vietnam.

b2 On June 21, 1967, advised that Ralph Porbes, the West Coast leader of the American Nazi Party (ANP)(see appendix) has written to ANP members in the Southern California area urging them to appear as "counter-pickets" at the Century b7C Plaza Hotel at 3:30 PM on June 23, 1967. This source advised that no more than about 15 persons affiliated with ANP are likely to participate actively. There are no known plans for any unusual types of counter-demonstration by the ANP.

On June 22, 1967, advised that a meeting of the Los Angeles Peace Action Council (LAPAC) took place during the evening of June 21, 1967, at the Mt. Hollywood Congregation Church in the Hollywood area of Los Angeles. furnished the following information concerning this meeting:

It was decided, after some argument: that the rally will take place at the Cheviot Hills Park at about 6:30 PM.

Jackin Goldberg, presently of Chicago, Illinois, and formerly active as a leader in the "Free Speech Movement" at Berkeley, California, is to be the person making the "pitch" for donations at the rally. A speakers' platform will be constructed at the park. Sound equipment which has been rented for use in the park and on the march will be used, despite the fact that the demonstrators have no permission from the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to use this equipment. The march is to begin at 7:30 PM. The march permit allows the march to be held from 7:30 to 8:30 PM. Although the permit specified the marchers are to remain on the sidewalk and obey traffic regulations, it is anticipated that if the 15,000 participants show up they will end up marching in the streets.

There was discussion regarding the use of clergymen of various faiths as monitors but by a voice vote, this was rejected. It was reported that at a monitors' meeting held the previous evening in Los Angeles that about 125 persons were signed up as monitors. About 75 additional persons are needed.

It was stated that if determined during the course of the date of the demonstration that President Johnson is not coming to Los Angeles, a press conference will immediately be held in the vicinity of the Century Plaza Hotel.

During this evening meeting, a leaflet issued by the ANP and bearing the signature of Ralph Forbes, was circulated. The leaflet called upon fellow Nazis to demonstrate against the "traitors" at the Century Plaza Hotel. The various persons present expressed considerable interest in this leaflet.

The "People's World" a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, described the LAPAC as "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

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On July 22, 1966, reported that the LAPAC, which has also been known as the Great Los Angeles Peace Action Council, was formed during the early summer of 1966 for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California, from July 4 to 8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the LAPAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates.

This source was recontacted on May 10, 1967, and reported that the LAPAC continues to operate under the same basic concept.

At the above LAPAC meeting there was no talk of any civil disobediance. It was noted that some of the persons who have been active in Civil Disobedience Committee (CDC) meetings in the past, said nothing at all.

advised that the War Resisters League, a pacifist organization, and its sympathizers are planning to begin picketing in the vicinity of the Century Plaza Hotel at 9:00 AM on June 23. This picketing will be in the nature of a test as to what action the LAPD may take against picketing later in the day. It was reported that if this group meets any resistance from the LAPD, it will leave the area and decide what to do next.

advised that the CDC is an ad hoc committee which took form during the latter part of May, 1967, for the specific purpose of exploring the possibilities of committing civil disobedience during the visit of President Johnson to Los Angeles on June 23, 1967. The CDC is not connected to the organization sponsoring the demonstration or with any other organization. It is, in itself, no organization as such inasmuch as it has no officers or members. It is composed primarily of youth who are, at this point, interested in committing civil disobedience.

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APPENDIX

AMERICAN INSTITUTE FOR MARXIST STUDIES Also Known As AIMS

A source advised on April 9, 1963, that on April 7, 1963, at a meeting of the District Committee of the Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA) of New England, held in Boston, Massachusetts, HERBERT APTHEKER stated he was developing an organization called American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS), which would eventually legalize the CP. He stated AIMS would publish literature on History, Science, Physics, Archeology and other subjects which would be put out quarterly with various supplements.

A second source advised on June 30, 1966, that HERBERT APTHEKER was elected to the National Committee, CP, USA, at the 18th National Convention of the CP, USA, held June 22-26, 1966, in New York City.

A third source advised on June 7, 1963, that on June 3, 1963, HERBERT APTHEKER spoke at the CP, USA, New York District Board meeting concerning AIMS. APTHEKER stated that AIMS would unite and strengthen the CP although the CP would not be connected with it. He stated AIMS was being formed to operate within the scope of the McCarran and Smith Acts and would legally bring Marxist material and opinions to the attention of American scholars and the general public.

A fourth source reported on August 29, 1966, that AIMS was located on the fifth floor west of 20 East 30th Street, New York, New York, and issues a "Newsletter" every other month. This source made available the information that AIMS issues publications and holds symposiums concerning Marxism.

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AMERICAN NAZI PARTY LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA (ANPLA), Also Known As The American Nazi Party Western Division (ANPWD)

A source advised on August 2, 1966, that the American Nazi Party, Los Angeles, California (ANPLA), which branch has also been known as the American Nazi Party, Western Division (ANPWD), maintains its headquarters at 4375 North Peck Road, El Monte, California, and that RALPH PERRY FORBES is the Captain in charge of the Western Division.

At a press conference on May 2, 1963, in Los Angeles, California, RALPH PERRY FORBES stated he was at that time a Lieutenant in the ANP and the ninth-ranking officer of the organization. He stated he arrived in Los Angeles May 1, 1963, to take charge of the party's headquarters in the Los Angeles area, which has control over party activities in the Southwestern United States.

GEORGE LINCOLN ROCKWELL, self-styled national commander of the ANP, arrived in Los Angeles on May 6, 1963, and was photographed by the local press with RALPH PERRY FORBES.

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W.E.B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA (DCA)

A source has advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party (CP), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates were told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Cate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America (DCA) was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. The aims of this organization, as set forth in the preamble to the constitution, are: "It is our belief that this nation can best solve its problems in an atmosphere of peaceful coexistence, complete disarmament and true freedom for all peoples of the world, and that these solutions will be reached mainly through the united efforts of all democratic elements in our country, composed essentially of the working people allied in the unity of Negroes and other minorities with whites. We further fully recognize that the greatest threat to American democracy comes from the racist and right wing forces in coalition with the most reactionary sections of the economic power structure, using the tool of anti-Communism to divide and destroy the unified struggle of the working people.

Over the Labor Day weekend, 1965, the DCA held a conference in Chicago, Illinois, and a new slate of officers was elected to the National Executive Committee (NEC) of the DCA. Since Labor Day, 1965, identities of those serving on the NEC has varied; however, according to a third source as of May, 1966, thirteen of the fifteen members of the NEC were members of the CF in the San Francisco Bay area.

As of July, 1966, the headquarters of the DCA was located at 180 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, Illinois.

On June 22, 1967, a source advised that MICHAEL BROWN leader of the San Francisco Bay Area Unit of the American Nazi Party (ANP), located in Oakland, California, had attempted to secure financial assistance to enable himself, as well as who are also associated with the ANP, to go to Los Angeles, California, by plane during the appearance there of President JOHNSON.

Source stated that RALPH FORBES, leader of the ANP Unit in Los Angeles, will make available to BROWN approximately fifty (50) ANP members to counterdemonstrate. BROWN indicated that if any demonstrator attempted to burn the American flag, it would be the duty of any ANP member to stop them "with lead pipes or brass knuckles."

Source stated that BROWN was unable as far as he knew to secure financial assistance which would enable the trio to make the trip to Los Angeles.

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A characterization of the National Socialist White Peoples Party, aka American Nazi Party, is contained in the appendix.

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NATIONAL SOCIALIST TITE PEOPLE'S PARTY, ALSO KNO AS THE AMERICAN NAZI PARTY, AMERICAN NAZIS, THE WORLD UNION OF FREE ENTERPRISE NATIONAL SOCIALISTS, THE GEORGE LINCOLN ROCKWELL PARTY

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In his book, "This Time The World", copyrighted in 1961, George Lincoln Rockwell identified himself as Commander, American Nazi Party of the World Union of Free Enterprise National Socialists (ANP - WUFENS), Arlington, Virginia.

The April 4, 1963, issue of "The Richmond News Leader", a Richmond, Va., daily newspaper, reported that George Lincoln Rockwell, had, on the previous day, again applied for the American Mazi Party to be chartered in the State of Virginia, but this request was turned down by the Virginia State Corporation Commission. This action was taken pursuant to an act of the 1962 Virginia Assembly which prohibits use of "Nazi" or "National Socialism" in a Virginia charter. This article further pointed out that Rockwell's Party is presently chartered in the State of Virginia as the George Lincoln Rockwell Party.

On August 14, 1964, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that ANP-WUFENS was organized by George Lincoln Rockwell at his residence in Arlington, Va., on February 26, 1956, as an international "National Socialist" movement based on the German Nazi Party headed by Adolf Hitler. He added that Rockwell is the dominant force and personality in this Party; that he is espousing a "line" of hatred against the Jews and Negroes; and that he is seeking, through speeches, distribution of literature and picketing, to establish a cohesive and dominant political party in the United States and in foreign countries.

According to the "Stormtrooper's Manual", an official publication of the ANP, the phases of ANP struggle for power are fourfold, namely, first "to make ourselves known to the masses"; second, "the dissemination of our program and truth about the Party"; third, "organizing the people who have been converted to our propaganda"; and fourth, "the attainment of power through the votes of the newly-won masses."

On August 19, 1966, the source advised that George Lincoln Rockwell presently believes that he has completed the first two phases in his struggle for power and is well into the third stage, to wit, "the organizing of the people who have been converted to our propaganda". The source added that Rockwell had previously believed that he would be elected Governor of Virginia in November, 1965, and when defeated, he made the statement that he was not ready for stage four.

On December 27, 1966, the source advised that Rockwell mailed a communication to all members of the ANP entitled, "National Directive from the Commander, Effective 1/1/67". This communication reflected that the formal name of the Party would be "National Socialist White People's Party" and they would still be known as the "American Nazi Party" and "American Nazis" for short.

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MARCH PROTESTING WAR IN VIETNAM SANTA BARBARA, CALIFORNIA June 24, 1967

On June 21, 1967, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that a march to protest the war in Vietnam would be held at noon Saturday, June 24, 1967, at Santa Barbara, California. The march would gather at noon at Alameda Park and proceed south on State Street to De La Guerra Plaza, where speeches against the Vietnam war would be given. The march would be held under the sponsorship of the recently organized Community Council to End the War in Viewnam, which was organized at the suggestion of Professor Arnold M. Paull of the History Department, University of California at Santa Barbara.

On June 25, 1967, the source advised that the march was held as planned from noon to approximately 1:15 p.m. on June 24, 1967, and that no incidents took place. 279 persons took part in the march and there were no pickets present.

On June 21 and 25, 1967, Counter-intelligence Corps Detachment, Santa@Barbara, California, was advised of the above facts.

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
