Agent in Charge Blake called and stated that he had talked to Barney Finn; that the reason for the letter which Finn addressed to the Division was that the two Fort Worth Police officers who located the second telegram sent by Attorney Ramsey to Memphis, which gave the specific address at which Kelly was later found, had gone to Oklahoma City the day after this development and had talked with Agent in Charge Colvin, who was quite brusque with them and gave them no satisfaction. They then talked to Mr. Charles F. Colcord, the person who offered the reward, and later to Mr. Kirkpatrick, the man who paid the ransom, who both told them that they did not know anything at all about their locating a telegram and that they would rely upon the recommendations of Special Agents in Charge Colvin and Jones in paying the rewards. Agent Blake states that at the time these officers called on Colvin. Colvin had been up for two nights and probably was brusque with them without intending to offend them in any way and it was through their fear of the fact that Colvin might not recognize their part in the discovery of Kelly and thus deprive them of a portion of the reward that they requested Finn to write the Division. Agent Blake stated that he had assured Mr. Finn that he had not made any recommendations end that the Division would make no recommendation, but that he felt quite sure that if the Division were called upon it would furnish the facts and the distribution of the rewards would necessarily be in the discretion of the donor of the reward. Agent Blake stated that Mr. Finn seemed quite satisfied when he heard that the Division would make no recommendations. Blake states that the two police officers did do excellent work as they had gone to the home of the man who has charge of the telegraph office at Fort Worth after the office had closed. They had caused the office to be re-opened, made their search and not being satisfied with the finding of the telegram sent concerning the girl they made a further search and discovered the telegram going to Memphis.

Dear Sire

The Division recently received a letter from Mr. Barney Finn of the Identification Unit of the Fort Worth Police Department, complaining of the alleged attitude of certain of the Division's employees with reference to the division of the reward in the Urschel kidnaping case. I immediately communicated with Agent in Charge Blake to ascertain the circumstances leading to this complaint. Hr. Blake interviewed Mr. Finn and ascertained that the two Fort Worth police officers who had located the telegram at Fort Worth, which had been sent by Attorney Bansey to Memphis, later proceeded to Oklahoma City and conferred with you; that you were very brusque and indicated very plainly to them that you knew nothing about the part which they had played in ascertaining the location of the Kellys; that later they saw Mr. Charles F. Colcord, who offered the reward, and Mr. Kirkputrick, and that these gentlemen told them they would rely upon the recommendations of your self and Agent in Charge Jones in paying any reward.

I desire that you submit an explanation of the alleged contect with these police officers when they called upon you on arrival in Oklahoda City.

I, of course, do not want any of the employees of this Division to make any recommendations with reference to the payment of reverds. I am extremely desirous of remaining outside of any such controversy. I realise, of course, that the person who offered the reward will seek information from you with reference to the part played by each of the claimants, and, of course, I desire that such information be furnished, without, however, any recommendation whatsoever. I desire that you exercise the utenst care in dealing with this subject, and I believe that you should acquaint the Division with any such request before responding to it.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR TICE

Information contained in the Division's files indicates that Kathryn Thorne Kelly was born at Saltillo, Mississippi, March 18, 1904, the daughter of James Emory Brooks and Mrs. Ora L. Shannon. After twenty-four years of married life Mrs. Shannon was divorced from Brooks and later married h. G. Shannon, a Texas rancher. Kathryn attended grammar school until she reached the eighth grade. At the age of 15 she married Lonnie Fry at Asher, 'klahoma. This union, however, did not last long, and they were soon divorced, and Kathryn then married Charlie Thorne at Coleman, Texas. Thorne was a stock raiser, and the marriage lasted until Thorne committed suicide, leaving a note "I cannot live with her or without her". After several years, about three years ago, she married George R. Kelly, and since that time seems to have been working in full cooperation with him in his illegal activities, enjoying many luxuries, such as large automobiles, expensive jewelry, and a nice home which she maintained at Fort Worth, Texas. Kathryn Thorne was first arrested at Fort Worth, Texas, as Dolores Whitney, November 20, 1929, charge shoplifting, and the case was later dismissed.

On July 22, 1933, Mr. Charles F. Urschel was kidnaped from his residence at Oklahoma City and held by the kidnapers until August 1, 1933. The Division of Investigation immediately began an intensive and exhaustive investigation to determine where Mr. Urschel had been held in captivity and the identity of the kidnapers, as a result of which it was determined that Mr. Urschel had been kidnaped by one George R. Kelly and Albert L. Bates and taken to the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Shannon near Paradise, Texas. The Shannons, together with others, were arrested and convicted at Oklahoma City on this charge. Kathryn Thorne Kelly and her husband, George R. Kelly, were successful in evading arrest until September 26, when they were arrested at Memphis, Tennessee by Agents of the Division. Subsequent investigation has developed that Kathryn, though denied by her, cooperated fully with her husband in the kidnaping of Urschel, offering every assistance, and since the time Kelly's identity was determined Kathryn has traveled throughout the United States with Kelly and has protected him on all occasions, using many methods of disguise such as taking with them a small child to mislead suspicious persons. Kathryn had also dyed her hair. as had her husband. Kathryn and other defendants in this case were

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•

indicted at Oklahoma City on August 23, 1933 for the kidnaping of Mr. Urschel. Other defendants have been tried and convicted. the Kellys, however, were not tried with the others due to their being successful in evading arresting officers. Their trial is set at Oklahoma City for October 9, 1933.







IT CAN BE DONE

LL honor to the federal officers who closed in on and captured "Machine Gun" Kelly, his two companions and his wife. All honor to the soldier-like Memphis city police who assisted in surrounding the house and who, without flinching, went up to the door of that hide-out and took their prisoner. It can be done. The United States govern-ment has shown every city police force and every state marshal that the criminal can be brought to court. And when it is done the public should applaud the efficient service of the men who risk their lives that our lives may be

spared from the lawless attacks of the killer.

Capture of Kelly and his wife gives the United States

Department of Justice a record of 100 per cent on arrests
in the Urschel kidnaping case, so far as is now known of
the identity of participants in the crime. With Bates,
Bailey and the Kellys, the government has the ringleaders in custody. It has them wrapped up in evidence so airtight that every hoodlum in the country must quake in his boots as he wonders whether there is anything in his record that

might put the federal operatives on his trail.

The U.S. agents are laying the foundations of a fine tradition in this case. The criminal element has needed nothing so much as to be taught respect for law enforcement agencies. It has had too much experience with corrupt officers who could be bought off the trail, or pushed off by political pressure. It has been able to snap its fingers at the puny efforts of well-meaning but untrained officers who have no qualifications for police work. It has been too successful with habeas corpus, continuances, delays, appeals and other devices used by criminal lawyers in getting their clients out of jail or keeping them out of the penitentiary. And as far as detective work is concerned, the "master minds" of organized come in this country have come to feel in recent years that the only way the average detective on the average police force or sheriff's force can detect a crime is to be there when it happens.

Such "master minds" as Kelly and Bailey are no such thing. Any bright ten-year-old boy could best them in an intelligence test. Take away their machine guns and fastmoving automobiles, and they are slow-moving morons who couldn't plot a crime that would stump any first-class worker of jig-saw puzzles. They depend wholly upon the fix, the get-away and the hide-away.

One law enforcement organization that cannot be fixed, and whose members are allowed to follow the fleeing "master mind" across state lines, can do more to break up organized crime than a 100 per cent increase in the size of the police force of every American municipality. Scotland Yard is England's greatest crime deterrent. Although unemployment brought a big increase in petty crime, England has suffered comparatively little from major crime. In England, petty criminals of the type who, like Kelly, the former Tulsa bootlegger, graduate into major crime in this country, do not have the courage to attempt any job big enough to put

Scotland Yard on their trail. Kidnaping and other crimes of violence in the United States will fall off rapidly if the Department of Justice agents keep up their Scotland Yard efficiency in detective work and continue to build up their reputation for, like the Mounties of Canada, always getting their man.

done by courts that so forget their duty to society as to make it possible for a known criminal to gain his liberty after he is in custody. The judge at Memphis who fixed Kelly's bond at \$100,000 should be taught that it is as much his duty to help keep Kelly in jail as it was the duty of Department of Justice agents to arrest him. Bail for such a criminal as Kelly is nothing less than a license for continuation of his criminal career. He could not possibly raise \$100,000 except through crime. Our courts and our magistrates must not be allowed to make it possible for criminals to buy their freedom with the proceeds of crime. The theory that no criminal may be held in jail, however black his criminal record, is as vicious as corruption in law enforcement. It is one of the things that must be destroyed before the criminal element can be taught to fear and respect the forces of law and order.



A HEROIC EXAMPLE FOR EVERY AMERICAN

Mr. Charles F. Urschel Shows What Can Be Done When Citizens Cooperate in the War on Crime

BACK of the success in the two trials thus far concluded in the Urschel kidnapping case lies an involved record of achievement. Federal investigators and State law-enforcement officials did the kind of work expected of picked men intent on doing the best possible job. Federal prosecutors prepared an open-and-shut case against Bailey, Bates and the Shannons, and again against the Kellys. A Federal Judge who would not countenance technicalities or delays conducted the trials. Juries having a keen sense of public responsibility passed on the evidence despite threats on their lives.

All this was essential to the capture, conviction and sentencing of one of the most brazen and openly defiant gangs in the country. But even this swift, efficient work could not have succeeded so completely or so quickly—it is only about ten weeks since the kidnapping took place—had Mr. Urschel and his family been afraid or unwilling to cooperate at every turn of the way.

It is now known that immediately after Mr. Urschel was kidnapped, his wife got in touch with the Department of Justice in Washington. That put Federal investigators on the case at once. That was the first act of cooperation with the Government.

When Mr. Urschel was released and the ransom paid, he immediately told his story to the Federal men, despite warnings from his captors that such action would be punished by death. From his remembered details, the investigators located the house where he was held captive. There, eventually, they captured Harvey Bailey and found evidence which involved others of the gang. The net spread and those others, with the exception of the Kellys, were captured.

Mr. Urschel received repeated threats against his life; several of which have now been traced definitely to the Kellys. Despite these threats, he continued his co-operation identified the prisoners and took the princes stand in the first trial.

So did Mrs. Urschel. Their testimony was invaluable. Meanwhile, the threats continued, against Judge, jurious and witnesses.

and witnesses.

Then the Kellys were explured. Again the Urschels testified and again the accused were convicted. Throughout that trial, as before, the threats continued, this time muttered by Kelly who insisted that his griends still at large would "get" the Urschels.

Now, less than ninety days after Mr. Urschel was kidnapped, the case is virtually cleaned up. Two men are still to be tried for harboring criminals, three others are under arrest at cused of trying to recover part of the hidden ransom money and more than \$125,000 of that money is yet to be found. But nine persons have been tried and convicted, six of them to life sentences. Now, for the first time since July, Mr. Urschel can, as he says, "go back to work."

When the Federal drive against crime got fully under way less than five months ago, it was pointed out that two things were essential for success. One was public co-operation. The other was police work and prosection that would justify public confidence.

I called Colvin at Oklahoma City on the telephone telling him that the newspapers had carried the information that Kathryn Kelly before she left offered \$15,000 to failer Hepbern, of the Oklahoma City Jail, if he would permit her to escape. I inquired if he knew anything about the matter. He said "Yes" the jailer had said something about it yesterday afternoon but he thought it was "bunk" and paid no attention to it. I asked him if he had made any inquiries concerning it and he said no.

I told him to immediately get in touch with the jailer and secure an immediate statement, and also secure any and every information relative thereto - statements from witnesses, if any were present, and the like.

Le-I told him to forward this information by telegram.

Colvin said he thought this money was money said to be in the possession of Tom Banks at Minneapolis. He said he had heard from the rooming house of rather doubtful character in which Brooks, the father of Kathryn Kelly, resided and at which Mrs. Arnold had also resided for a time) that Kathryn Kelly had \$15,000 in Minneapolis. Colvin said he spoke to Kathryn Kelly before she left and asked her about the money she was alleged to have had in Minneapolis. She admitted she had the money but said it was not ransom money.

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


