MEHORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Mr. Purvis called on the 'phone and said that Joe Bergel had made bond of \$15,000.00 in the harboring case against him at Chicago; that they had Abe and Charles Kaplan still in custody. These are two of three brothers who operated the house at 1150 Michigan Avenue, at which place Kathryn Kelly instructed that mail be forwarded to her under the name of Bert Edwards.

Purvis said they he wanted as witnesses the Arnolds, Mrs. Luther and Geraldine at least. He thought he wanted the three of them; also Lankford Remsey and John Tichenor at Hemphis. He also wants Agent I told him to communicate with Blake at Dallas with regard to the Arnolds and have Blake send the Arnolds up with the understanding that the Marshal would pay their traveling expenses under subpoena in the usual manner; that after the Arnolds testified they should be immediately returned to Dallas; that so far as Lankford Ramsey or Tichenor was concerned, my understanding was that they were in custody at memphis and I doubted whether he could arrange for their testimony in Chicago, although he might take up the matter with the United States Attorney.

It is expected the hearing will be held Thursday or Friday.

Purvis also said they had found George Kelly's Cadillac car in the Cadillac shop in Chicago. Of course, this would be the last place where one would look for a Cadillac car. At any rate Kelly's lawyer, Mather, is in Chicago looking for the car and he will probably seize it.





I am taking the liberty of writing to you direct, because of my very pleasant relations to Mr. John M. Keith, of your department. Mr. Keith is a very excellent gentleman, and he and The Commercial Appeal had some arrangements which worked out very satisfactorily.

What I am writing about is this:

The Commercial Appeal owns and operates WMC radio broadcasting station. I was told tonight that complaint had been made that the departure of Machine Gun Kelly from Memphis this morning was broadcast over our station. This, I understand, was reported by Chief of Police Will Lee.

The complaint is not justified. I understand that a Mr. Wooten, owner of WREC, a private radio station here, was at the jail when Kelly was taken away, and soon thereafter, broadcast the fact over his station. This may or may not be true. If true, he probably did not realize the secrecy of the entire proceeding.

The point I am making is that The Commercial Appeal, either in its news columns or over its radio station, did not deviate from the understanding we had with Ur. Keith. We neither printed his time of departure, nor broadcast it.



"San Angelo, Texas, October 17, 1933. ....

"I, CASSIC EARL COLEMAN, of Coleman, Texas, state that on the morning of September 25th, 1935, just a short while before daylight, a man in a sedan automobile of some kind came to my house about 13 miles South of Coleman, Texas. This man was accompanied by a girl. - The girl got out of the car and opened my pasture gate and the man drove his car up to the fence that runs along the forth side of my yard. I saw the car coming in and went out to the yard fonce. The man did not get out of the car, but the girl as she was getting back in the car said, "bir. Coleman -," about that time the man in the car said "Are you Cass Coleman," I said "Yes." He then said "Well, I am contact man for Coorge and mathryn Kelly, my mamo is --" I told him "I don't care anything about your name." He said "Well, Kathryn wanted me to arrange a safe meeting place for you to meet her."

I stopped him by telling him I didn't want to meet her or George Kelly or to have anything more to do with thom.

lle said "Will it be safe for me to take her furs with Le." I told him "No" it would not be safe to take anything out or bring anything in - you will be arrested before you get to that other read down there - the place is covered with laws and they are watching my place." He (the man in the car) said "Well, I am not hot." I said "Hell you will be before you get far - they will tail you out of hero." The man seemed to be anxious to gut away then and drove off."

I then took Kathryn's furs which she had, left in my home on a visit she made there about August 16th, 1933, in a pillow slip, to my barn, stuffed them in a bucket and buried them in the cats.

I believe I could identify the man who came to my house on the morning of Sept. 25th, 1933, who said he was a contact man for tdorge and Kathryn Kelly, should I again see him.

I will testify to the above facts should I be called upon to do so in any Court of the United States.

The above statement is made by me voluntarily at San Angelo, Texas, this 17th day of October, 1933, to Special Agent Division of bl Investigation, U.S. Department of Justice, without promise of reward or immunity and without threat or fear of duress.

On October 13, 1933, arrangements were

The above arrangements were made after long distance telephone conversations with Assistant Director Harold Nathan at Cklahoma City, Oklahoma, in order to eliminate a delay of approximately 12 hours at the Union Station, Kansas City, Missouri, where the Union Station Plaza Massacre had taken place last June. Arrangements were effected here at Kansas City, and Mr. Nathan was notified at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Shortly before 5:00 p.m. the same day, S. A. C. Conroy was advised by over the telephone that the United States Marshal at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, had canceled the arrangements, and that it would be impossible to operate the special train unless Mr. Conroy could personally give the Missouri Pacific assurance that payment would be forthcoming; informed that Mr. Conroy would call him back in a few minutes; immediately, Mr. Conroy got in touch with Mr. V. W. Hughes of the Division at Washington, D.C., who ascertained from the Department the expense was authorized, and shortly thereafter, Mr. Conroy informed he would be personally responsible for any expense, requesting him to go ahead with the arrangements for the special train. 

Vaucht, which was postmarked "Minneapolis, Minnesota, September 25, 1933", that received by Mr. Charles Urschel, of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, postmarked "Minneapolis, Minnesota, October 11, 1933, and that addressed to George Kelly, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, postmarked "Muskogee, Oklahoma, October 10, 1933.

These letters have been examined by Technical experts of the Identification Unit, and a number of latent prints developed thereon. These latent prints have been compared with the fingerprint impressions of Wilbur Underhill, Identification Order #1191, Charles Arthur Floyd, Identification Order #1194, Vernon C. Eiller, Identification Order #1195, Richard Tallman Gelates, Identification Order #1201, Ed Davis, Identication Order #1193, Robert G. Brady, Identification Order #1190 and James Clark, Identification Order #1192, but in no instance were the latent prints found to be identical with the fingerprint impressions of these suspects. Such of the latent prints as can be classified have been searched through the Eingle-fingerprint file maintained in the Division, but no identification has been effected. These latent prints will be filed in the unidentified section of this file with a view to possible identification at a later date, as the fingerprint impressions of additional suspects are added.



On October 7, 1933, at Dallas, Texas, Judge William H. Atwell sentenced Manion to two years and \$10,000. fine and Bevill to Fourteen months, both defendants to be incarcerated in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

On October 9, 1933, before Manion was taken to the Penitentiary by the United States Marshal, Dallas, Texes, he was brought to the Dallas Division Office and interviewed, but no information of value could be obtained from him, Manion stating that, notwithstanding the verdict, he is innocent. Bevill had previously been interviewed and made a detailed statement of his part in effecting the escape of Harvey Bailey. Bailey was not named in the two new indictments.

The bribery indictment returned against Manion and Bevill is still pending, the case having been continued until the January, 1934 term of Court at Dallas, Texas



Harvey J. Bailey, a notorious criminal, who escaped from the Kansas State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas, on May 30, 1933, was apprehended at Paradise, Texas, on August 12, 1933, and incarcerated in the Dallas County Jail, Dallas, Texas pending removal to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on a Federal Kidnaping Charge in connection with the abduction of Charles F. Urschel, a wealthy oil man of Oklahoma City. On September 4, 1933, Bailey escaped from the Dallas County Jail, and was captured four hours later at Ardmore, Oklahoma, and taken to Oklahoma City, later being convicted at that place and sentenced to life imprisonment in the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas.

Investigation of Bailey's escape disclosed that Grover C. Bevill turned over to Thomas L. Manion, deputy Jailer in the Dallas County Jail, a revolver and hack-saw blades, which were smuggled into Bailey's cell, by means of which Bailey effected his escape.

Indictment was returned in five counts against Grover C. Bevill and Thomas I. Manion in Federal Court at Dallas, Texas on October 4, 1933, for aiding and assisting Bailey to escape. On the same day Bevill entered a plea of Guilty, and was sentenced on October 7, 1933 to serve fourteen months in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

AGGRAVATING AND MITIGATING CIRCUMSTANCES:

Grover C. Bevill has been operating a butcher shop at Dallas, Texas, and, for the past fifteen years has been more or less associated with Thomas L. Manion, assisting him in investigations and political work. At the request of Manion, Bevill furnished Manion with a 44 caliber S. & W. pistol, and purchased twelve 44-caliber-Colt cartridges and 3 hack-saw blades for Manion, all of which were turned over by Manion to Beiley in effecting his escape from the Dallas County

Jail. Bevill made a complete detailed statement of his part in assisting Bailey to escape, pleaded Guilty to the indictment returned against him and Manion, and at the trial took the stand against Manion. Bevill cooperated with the Government in the investigation and assisted materially in the conviction of Thomas L. Manion, who undoubtedly arranged and planned with Harvey J. Bailey for the latter's escape.

#### HISTORY OF DEFENDANT:

At the time of his arrest, Grover C. Bevill stated that he was 49 years of age, a resident of Dallas, Texas, American citizen, married, and had one child, a girl six years of age. He is a butcher by occupation. Nothing is known of his home life and surroundings. Bevill's general reputation at Dallas, Texas was considered good, prior to his arrest in this case.

Bailey, a notorious criminal, who escaped from the Kanstate Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas, on May 30, 1933, was apprehended at Paradise, Texas, on August 12, 1933, and incercerated in the Dallas County Jail, Dallas, Texapending removal to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on a Federal Kidnaping charge in connection with the abduction of Charles F. Upon being arraigned on October 16, 1933 in United States District Court at San Angelo, Texas, before United States District Judge, William H. Atvell, Coleman entered a guilty plea to the indictment charging him and Will Casey with conspiracy to harbor and conceal a fugitive, George Kelly, to which indictment at the same time Will Casey entered a plea of not guilty. A jury was selected and Casey was tried. Upon the conclusion of the trial the jury returned a verdict of guilty as to Casey, - Coleman having testified upon behalf of the Government in this matter.

Judge Atwell requested that Special Agent in Charge, F. J. Blake, furnish him in writing any facts which had been developed by virtue of the investigation and not brought cut in the evidence during the trial; that he desired this information before he passed sentence on October 17. Therefore, on October 17, Special Agent in Charge, Blake, furnished the following information by letter addressed to Judge atwell:

"The records of the Division of Investigation, U. 3. Department of Justice do not reflect that either Cassie Coleman or Will Casey has ever been convicted of a crime.

The Division has no material information to report concerning Will Casey other than developed during the trial.

Coleman, since being taken into custody, has apparently assisted the Government to the full extent of his ability. In the trial of George and Kathryn Kelly at Oklahoma City he testified freely and without reservation and has expressed a willingness to testify at Memphis, Tennessee, in a case in which the Atterney who went to Coleman's place to arrange a meeting between Kelly and Coleman, is charged with harboring and concealing Kelly and his wife.

Press reports indicate that the case against the Attorney, Ramsey Langford, will go to trial at Memphis, on Saturday of this week, and from inquiries I have received from our office covering that territory Coleman will probably be used as a Government witness.

On October 17, CASSIE ULRI COLEMAN was sentenced to serve one year and one day in United States Penitontiary at Leavenworth, Kunsas.





KATHERINE KELLY BARNES with aliases arrived in Cincinnati, Ohio at 9:20 P.M. October 17, 1933 in the custody of U. S. Marshal panied by Special Agents and of the Oklahoma City Office, and was met at the station by me, with suitable police guard provided by the Cincinnati also accompanying us, and she Police Department, United States Marshal was escorted to the Cincinnati Workhouse, where she was received under date of October 17, 1933. The newspapers carried the account of the fact that she would arrive at Cincinnati, at the time indicated, on the morning of October 17, and arrangements therefore were made for Agents and to meet the train at Covington, Ky., and proceed into Cincinnati with the officers, who had Mrs. Barnes in custody and in order to avoid the crowd at the Central Terminal here, arrangements were made to have the train brought in on track #4 instead of track #7 without the knowledge of anybody other than the operator of the Central Terminal Station.

possibilities of information, and at this time she advised Agents and myself in substance, as follows, as to various circumstances which will be set out as related by here. It is to be noted that she was in a very fatigued condition, at this time, and could not recall definitely dates and names, but indicated a willingness later, if she could think of anything to advise us further.

She indicated that the party who operates the Don Moore Hotel, Chicago is a very close friend of Verne Miller, and that there would be a possibility of possibly getting some information as to Miller through this source, although, of course, this party would not knowingly disclose any real information. She also indicates that from general conversations with Kelly and others, it was indicated that possibly Verne Miller and others, who had participated in the Kansas City killings might have been hiding out, for a time, with one she not being certain of the name, who has a place at Squaw Iake, Wisconsin, this being a summer resort where he has a number of cottages on the lake, same being in a more or less inaccessible location and it has been indicated in the past that various of the crooks had hidden out there when they were being hunted particularly; that Keating and Holden and their wives were up there with her and George Kelly for possibly a period of six weeks at one time and it would be her opinion that possibly such parties as Verne Miller might hide out, at this place.

She also indicated that Verne Miller has a number of friends in Montreal, Canada, where he spends considerable of his time and he generally hangs out at a cabaret located there, but she could not furnish the name or location of this or the name of any persons whom he contacted and she indicated that a party at Minneapolis, Minne who runs a gambling place known as the "Plantation", one who who at one time was a crook engaged in the racket similar to Kelly and others, but since which time he has been out of the racket and is now apparently handling, seemingly legitimate enterprises, and who had gone to New York and had his nose remade by plastic surgery, is very friendly with various persons in the racket such as Kelly, Verne Miller and others and in fact he is a very close friend of Vern Miller and would undoubtedly assist him, if Verne Miller were to call upon hime

She advised that Tom Banks, Minneapolis, Minne, is a friend of Verne Miller and that she is satisfied that Banks probably had something to do with the turning of the money in the Boetcher case; that Abe Kaplan of Chicago and Jack Pfieffer, she not being certain of the spelling of the name, at Minneapolis, Minne, Pfieffer running a cabaret in St. Paul known as the "Holly Hock" with Tom Banks, are the so-called "big shots" in arranging for the handling of any paper stolen from banks, etc.; that she, together with Kelly went to Minneapolis to turn some of the money in the Urschel case and that Kelly did arrange to turn some of this for good money, although she can not say exactly with whom he made the exchange, but she believes it was arranged primarily through Tom Bankse

She advised that she believes Kelly had \$100,000.00 of this money as after they had departed with their share of the proceeds, they were stopping at the Sheridan Hotel in Chicago and she had stepped out for some shopping and upon returning to the room, Kelly had himself locked in and when he admitted her, he had this money lying out on the bed in small brown packages and Kelly said to her "Would you like to see a hundred thousand dollars?" indicating to her that apparently he had that amount of this money. She indicates that she did not see him give Banks any money but it was her understanding that they were going to Minneapolis for this purpose, that is, to have Banks arrange for the changing of the money for good money, and that she knows that Banks did call them from Minneapolis at the Sheridan Hotel, Chicago and ask them to go out to dinner with him; that Kelly knew this party would handle the money as that was the place where all of the gang and others such as Kelly would get rid of their paper, silver money, etc., which had been taken in bank stick-ups; that she would class Banks and Pfieffer at Minneapolis as being the "big shots"; that at one time they operated a hotel, which is now known as the Admiral and no longer operated by them and that she had seen in this place, rooms filled with various articles, such as dresses, etc., which had been taken by shop-lifters who operated under the direction of these two parties.

She advised that she has not seen Bernard Phillips since the time Bailey was picked up in Kansas City; that she has not heard from him since that time; that when she was first married, there were operating together Bailey, George Kelly, Bailey, being known then as Tom Brennan, Keating, Holden Frank Weber and a fellow by the name of "Harmon" known as "Little Charley"; that Frank Weber and Harmon were killed in connection with the Menomonie, Wisc., bank "stick-up", which job was pulled by two men whose names she does not know, but who were brothers; that both of these brothers, at the time Harmon and Weber were killed, were wounded and that they went to Banks at Minneapolis, Minn., who arranged to have them taken care of in their wounded condition.

Later, Kelly was associated with Bernard Phillips and Frank Nash in bank "stick-ups", at this time she living at Kansas City with Kelly and Bernard Phillips and Frank Nash with their wives being located there also; that this would be about the time Nash got out of the Penitentiary; that Nash upon his release from the Penitentiary, went to see one Chicago, Illinois, who occupies a position among crooks similar to that of and Banks work in close cooperation, that is Banks in Minneapolis and can not place these crooks in Chicago, in connection with any work, he will call Banks and arrange for them to be placed through him at is the party Kelly is supposed to have shipped the machine Minneapolis. guns to. He is connected with some theatrical union in Chicago and the general . understanding is that he had hidden Keating and Holden for thirty days at the time they escaped from the Federal Penitentiary and later sent them to Tom Banks in Minneapolis, who arranged to take care of them there; that when George got out of the Penitentiary he went to in Chicago in order to then called Tom find out where Keating and Holden were; that Banks in Minneapolis and sent George Kelly up there, but that Banks would have

nothing to do with him and would not talk with him until he received a picture from identifying Kelly-to him.

she advised that, in connection with the latter's operations in connection with bank "stick-ups", Bailey was the "big shot" and he would go out and locate the bank which was to be "knocked over" and thereafter would run the roads for approximately five hundred miles in all directions, in order to lay the ground work for their escape after the robbery; that he would then return to them and tell them that they were ready to do the job; that after they had "pulled" these bank "stick-ups" the paper would be taken to Minneapolis and handled by Banks; that last Winter, the exact time not being recalled, but during the cold weather, and snowing at the time, George Kelly had some paper taken in a bank "stick-up" which he took to Minneapolis in order to have Banks handle same and that she went with Kelly to the West Hotel where Banks maintained an office, Banks also having an office in the Dyckman Hotel, Minneapolis and that she listened to them, that is, Kelly and Banks, talk as to the handling of this paper and Banks said that he would have to call Abe Kaplan and that the following day Abe Kaplan came up from Chicago and George took something out of his bag and gave it to Abe and shedid not see just exactly what this was and Abe then gave him some money; that Abe then returned to Chicago on the train, it being possible that he came to Minneapolis by aeroplane; that Abe was a very "swell" dresser and operates usually from a saloon at 1150 Michigan Avenue, which place is undoubtedly owned by him and operated under the name of some other party; that when one of the crooks wishes to contact Kaplan they go to this place and the bartender will arrange for Kaplan to meet them; that she understood Kaplan also has a place on the Southside of Chicago; that when they were in Chicago they met Kaplan that is, during the time just before they were captured at Memphis, Tenn., and Kaplan advised them in conversation that he had to drive a considerable distance cut on the South side to his place and that it would take him about forty-five minutes to get there, but she is not certain of the name of the place. Mrs. Barnes advises that she had the addresses and telephone numbers of all of these parties on a memorandum when she was arrested in Memphis, but that she tore them up and flushed them down the toilet.

Katherine advises that she believes that she could write to Kelly and he would send her the telephone numbers of any of these parties whom she might wish to contact, if she advised him she wanted a number for the purpose of having her Attorney get in touch with the party; that Kelly, of course, would send this in code and for that reason she believes he would send it to her; that Kelly usually in writing his numbers of telephones down would write the figures backwards.

Questioned as to who the contact man was at Oklahoma City and how they had located this man, she advised that Kelly had told her that a lawyer in Oklahoma City had made the contact with the finger man in this; that she does not know who this particular lawyer is, but she recalls an incident which definitely places the fact that Kelly had a definite attorney in mind, who handled his matters in Oklahoma City, as on one occasion

tried to dispose of a car in Oklahoma City and apparently was picked up in connection with same and called Kelly, who was at her mother's place in Texas and Kelly made the remark he did not see why he should be calling him, for reason that they knew an attorney at Oklahoma City who could be seen and take care of things for them; that it is her opinion that Kelly was introduced by this attorney to Jarrett, the party who was playing cards with Mr. Urschel on the night he was kidnaped and that Jarrett, according to Kelly is the man who arranged to designate Urschel to them for kidnaping and worked with them in this case. Kelly advised that he owed Jarrett \$25,000.00 and that Kelly, at one time, addressed a letter to Jarrett and placed same inside another envelope, addressed to another party with a note that it was to be delivered to Jarrett and that she mailed this letter, which was addressed to Oklahoma City, but she is unable to recall to whom it was addressed and who acted as intermediary in delivering this letter to Jarrett; that possibly this was the Attorney who had represented them in Oklahoma City; that this letter was mailed in Chicago when they were there at the time she addressed a letter and mailed it to Mr. Keenan, Special Assistant to the Attorney General; that she went to the post office, bought two stamps and hurriedly placed same in the mail box, not paying any particular attention to the party to whom the letter was addressed; that Kelly expressed himself as to Jarrett to the effect that he did not see why this party, Jarrett, should be taking such an interest in the prosecution; that it was her understanding from Kelly that he had talked with Jarrett at least two weeks before Urschel was kidnaped; that the arrangement was for Jarrett to park his Pierce Arrow car in a certain way in front of the house which was to give them the signal as to when and if the kidnaping should take place; that when they, Kelly and Bates pushed their way into the Urschel home they made a remark to the effect "Which one is Urschel" and then said "We will take you both" and that they then looked at the billfolds of each in order to determine which was Urschel and which was Jarrett, but that this was only a stall in order to protect Jarrett, as they were thoroughly familiar with Mr. Urschel's identity; that she had written this same information in a letter addressed to Mr. Keenan as to the supposed part Jarrett had in the matter; that her information as to this situation is, as discussed with her by Kelly, who told her of this, at the time they were in Chicago; that Kelly became very incensed as to the remarks in the paper as to prosecuting them for armed robbery, especially in connection with the supposed hold-up of Jarrett; that they took the money off of both Urschel and Jarrett at the time of the kidnaping but that this was only to protect Jarrett in the matter; that in connection with the screen door Jarrett was to arrange to see that this would be open and provided he could not arrange this, they were to call through the window and make him open the screen door, however the door was open at the time they entered; that it is her understand that George Bates and Kelly met Jarrett, as they were there for two weeks arranging this matter in Oklahoma City and that previous to this time they had been in and out of Oklahoma City stopping as much as two days at any one time and that she is definitely satisfied that Kelly was thoroughly familiar with and did know Mr. Urschel when he saw him.

Reverting again to the activities of Tom Banks at Minneapolis, Minnesota she advised that she believes he knows more real crooks than any other man in the United States; that he has a number of so-called "set-ups" in Minneapolis through which he works; that the parties who were convicted in connection with the handling of the money at Oklahoma City were only the "fall" guys for Banks, who if they had any of the "hot" money obtained same from and through Banks; that the usual thing for a crook when he returns to Minneapolis is to be sent to some other fellow to be taken care of, if he is too "hot" to remain and that when they were in Chicago Abe Kaplan told Kelly that he knew he was very "hot" but "You can go out with your wife to my apartment and lay out for a time; also wants to fix you up if he can help you".

She advises that the alias from St. Louis, Mo., the former flyer, who has had both legs broken in accidents, and a reputed former member of the Colbeck gang, was at one time associated with Kelly in bank robberies; that at this time a party known as other name not being recalled, was the leader and there were also associated with them at this time Eddie Benz and and the hang-out was a small cabaret known as the "Island" at Burnham, close to Hammond, Indiana.

She advises that Frank Nash, when in Chicago, usually was located around the Don Moore Hotel, which is one of the places that she was associated with him, while with Kelly; that she does not know of any connections of these parties in Detroit and that she never heard of any connections in Hot Springs, Arkansas, but it was generally reported that Hot Springs was a right town, meaning that the Law would not bother them; that she does not know She advises that when they were in Indianapolis, Indiana, that is Kelly, herself and her daughter, they stopped at the Antlers Hotel, this being sometime during the past Summer and that it was at this time, there was also in Indianapolis and George Bates and they were figuring on a "stick-up" of a bank in Northern Indiana, Bates and at that time apparently stopping at the Claypool Hotel. They did not "pull" this job as apparently they got into an argument among themselves. She does not know where is, at the present time, as she understood Benz was arrested in connection with the Colfax; Washington bank robbery; that he was tipped off by the police that he was to be arrested but ignored this and did not leave and was thereafter arrested, placed on \$50,000.00 bond, which he skipped and is now still at large as to this; that Benz lives in Tacoma, where he has a sister; that she understands represented Benz in this case and apparently had some bonding company sign the bond.

She advised that there is a little hotel on State Street, 745 S. State, known as the Hayes Hotel, who is a very close friend of George Bates and that any time they wished to get in touch with the two Eddies, that is or Eddie Benz, they would communicate with at Chicago and he would locate them for them; that when called at the hotel always requested them to call him on his unlisted telephone, as he believed his listed telephone was tapped; that she believes has, at

different times loaned money to Bates, Kelly and Benz; that she believes he is a very close friend of George Bates and that she believes Bates paid \$1800.00 he owed him with the "hot" Urschel money; that Bates when he was in Minneapolis told Kelly, according to statements of Kelly to her, that he had paid about \$1800.00 but that he did not know if he could use it, indicating to her that apparently it was the "hot" money; that Bates is supposed to have stated that he just bundled up \$1800.00 and mailed it to telling him to be careful; that Bates also had a considerable number of friends and connections in Denver, Colorado; that Bates, at one time was supposed to have told her that was also handling stolen diamonds, etc., that if she wished to buy any diamonds, Bates could get same from yery cheaply.

She advises that Bailey and Verne Miller were only fair friends, but that Miller and Nash were very close friends; that the friendship of Miller and Nash dated back before the time of the Menomie, Wisc., bank robbery; that there was a party at Kensas City known as who was also working with Miller and Nash and that it was her opinion that possibly Miller recently robbed a mail truck in Denver, which robbery occurred about one month ago, she seeing notice of same in the papers when they were in Chicago, previous to her arrest.

She advises that on the day of the killings in Kansas City, June 17, 1933 she and Kelly were at the home of her mother in Texas and that they drove into Dallas and on this day Kelly called from the Baker Hotel, to some place in Chicago, possibly through and at that time apparently did not know anything about the Kansas City transaction, as no mention was made of it to Kelly; that they thereafter purchased a paper and noticed an account of the fact that Frank Nash had been captured; that George Kelly did not like Nash and in fact had made a remark that he was going to kill him, and George was apparently glad that they had gotten Nash; that on the following day George and her step-father Shannon went to Wichita, Falls, Texas and brought back with them the papers indicating the details of the killings at Kansas City and George Kelly made the remark that he knew Verne had done this or at least he thought he had and that thereafter George was in Chicago and when he came back to Texas he told her that Verne Miller had done the job and that all of the parties, such as himself, were very much incensed over this as it put the "heat" on everybody; that she, herself, did not hear the discussion in hervarious travels as to who was responsible for this job at Kansas City, but that later in conver⊷ sation Bailey indicated he was very mad that this had occurred, and at that time Bailey told Kelly that he was "hot" and that Kelly was not to say anything to anybody as to where he could be reached, as he did not want Verne Miller to contact him; that Bailey made the remark that he was over in Arkansas robbing a bank when this happened. Bailey did not further advise just why he did not want Verne Miller to contact him or know where he was, nor did he mention that he was wanted in connection with the Kansas City killing; that George Kelly and Bailey were very good friends and that they worked together most of the outfit or occasionally time except when George was working with the when they would become separated for an individual job; that, however, these

various organizations were close enough to each other to know what was going on among the various gangs; that George Kelly worked one job with Verne Miller that is, the Sherman, Texas bank robbery, which was about two years ago; that they were all then in Kansas City, Verne Miller and his wife, herself and Kelly; that Kelly left her in Kansas City at this time and indicated that he was going to Mami, not telling her he was going out to rob a bank; that later he wired her \$400.00 from Dallas, Texas telling her to come to him; that after she arrived in Dallas, she met him at the Adolphus Hotel, and he indicated he had just driven in from Hot Springs. where he left Bailey who was then drinking some beer and at this time he had a lot of money; that she asked him about the bank robbery and he would not tell her; that Bailey and George Kelly had left Kansas City on this occasion, together and Verne Miller had left a few days later, apparently to join them; that Verne Miller was accompanied by Keating and Holden and presumably all joined up before robbing the bank indicated; that Kelly and Bailey drove in her Cadillac; that a party who was associated with Verne Miller in Kansas City at this time, known as from New York City about whom Tom Banks had made the remark recently that was now with the Federals and that should she meet him on the street or anything she was to have nothing to do with him, she not being certain as to just what was doing; that he is a Jew with black eyes, 5' 5" in height, age 33, weight about 150 lbs; that she can not recall his name; that she associated with him some in Kansas City in fact she and George Kelly, together with and his wife played golf together; that she would be unable to say who was working with Verne Miller at the present time, as she has not seen him since the above indicated occasion about two years ago at Kansas City; Kelly, however told her that he had seen Verne Miller in Chicago when they were there just previous to their arrest in Memohis: that Kelly indicated Verne asked him to go to New York City with him, but that she persuaded Kelly not to go with him, in fact, she indicated at that time she desired to return to Texas to give herself up; that Verne Miller is well known in New York, as she has heard his wife, Vi, talk of the cabarets that they had visited and the people they knew, but she could not advise as to any of these, that she is satisfied that Verne's wife knows where he is at the present time

As to Bernard Phillips, she advised she does not know where he is at present and has not seen him for about two years; that he has been working with some mob out of Minneapolis and might have been with Verne Miller, possibly having been connected through Tom Banks; that sent Phillips to Minneapolis for the reason that they had too many men in Chicago and could not place him; that she believes the wife of Verne Miller is now at Brainerd, Minne, where she has her daughter; that Kelly advised her in Chicago that when he talked with Banks in Minneapolis, Banks had told him that Verne had written his wife a letter to Minnesota from Atlantic City, indicating that possibly he was only passing through and that the "Federals" had this information, according to Banks; that Banks knows everything the "Federals" are doing in Minneapolis; that Banks apparently has an "in" at this place and that she is very fearful that any statements she makes as to this information may go to Minneapolis; that it is her understanding that Banks knew the Federal men

were in Minneapolis working on the Urschel case before anybody else knew it and that the Federal man was supposed to have let him know on the afternoon that the matter broke, for further details as to this; that Banks has been obtaining this information for years; that he received information immediately that any search was made for Keating and Holden in Minneapolis; that she believes somebody in the Federal Government was giving him this information as to the fact that they were looking for Keating and Holden, as Banks has boasted that he elects the Mayor and others in the city and he is also supposed to have elected the Sheriff in one of the counties, as one time he made the remark to George Kelly, if he wished to go up in this County and hide it would be perfectly safe.

She indicated she did not know who the so-called "big shots" were in Dallas or St. Louis, but that she understood Verne Miller had a friend in Joplin, Mo., a deaf and dumb fellow, whose wife's name is had some hide out in Arkansas, but she does not know the location of thise She advised that Bailey and Underhill robbed the Kingfisher Oklahoma Bank and that possibly Brady was in on this; that these same parties had also robbed a bank at Black Rock, Arkansas; that they had a hide-out in Oklahoma City where a man from St. Louis has a house and this place was apparently close to where the Urschel kidnaping occurred as Bailey later made the remark that he had missed by just one night being apprehended at this place, when the "heat" was on as to the Urschel kidnaping; that Bailey in talking of this kidnaping advised them that their action in doing this very nearly caused him to be caught at the place where he was stopping. She advised that George Kelly advised her in Chicago, after Bailey had been apprehended with some of this money in his possession, that he had given Bailey \$1,000.00 and he did not understand why he was "damn fool" enough to keep this money on him, knowing from where it came; that she does not believe Bailey participated in the actual kidnaping of Urschel, but that he was at the Armon place while Urschel was being held and that she believes Kelly had Bailey there for the purpose of watching him and to see that nothing went wrong. However, possibly they had in mind to give Bailey additional money when they had the Urschel money changed for good money.

She advised that Kelly made some remarks to the effect that and Verne Miller had something to do with the killings at Kansas City, Missouri; that it would be her opinion that possibly Phillips also was with them, but that she never heard this mentioned; that as to Phillips, his wife is always with him; that she understood Bernard Phillips was with Verne Miller on some recent robbery in Wisconsin where a bank messenger was held up. She could not recall the details as to the place where this occurred. She advises that she were placed in the position of desiring to locate Verne Miller she would go to Banks in Minneapolis and that if he could not have Miller come to her, he would take her to Miller, if this could be arranged under conditions different from the present. She advised that while they were in Dallas during the recent past, she noticed where an armored truck in Denver had been robbed and \$33,000.00 obtained and Kelly, at this time, remarked to her that he believed

Verne Miller had "pulled" this job, as Verne Miller had previously talked to him as to the possibilities of "pulling" this particular job; that she believes Miller possibly discussed this with Kelly when they were in Chicago and Kelly is reported to have met Miller, according to his wife's statements, but this job was about one month ago: She advised that it would be very difficult for anybody to get information out of such parties as Banks and cocasionally when Kelly would go to see them he would have to wait for two or three days before they would see him.

She advised that the outfit with which is associated in Chicago, Illinois, that is, the theatrical union undoubtedly "pull" a number of jobs in association with these crooks in order to handle the proceeds obtained from their robberies; that the tead of one of the theatrical unions is a very good friend of Kelly; that the formerly operated the Tivoli Grill at 63rd and Cottage Grove Ave., Chicago, Ill., now located apparently somewhere on the North Side.

Copies of this letter are being furnished to the Oklahoma City office, with the suggestion that same be considered in connection with any and all information in developments known to the office, in connection with the Urschel case and that they advise us, if desirable, as to any particular subject matter they wish discussed further with Katherine Kelly Barnes, it being noted that due to the conditions under which this first interview was had, she was not possessed of a clear head, in order to definitely recall dates and circumstances, which may come to her later.

Copies of this letter are also furnished to the Kansas City Office for the same reason.

Copies are furnished the Chicago office for their information and such instructions as the office of origin indicate to you. It is possible that this is the same who was previously involved with and at Chicago, Ill., and who were sentenced as income tax evaders there, and also associated, to some extent with all Capone.

Copies are furnished the above offices and one copy furnished the St. Paul office for their information, all of these going forward under personal and confidential cover, air mail, special delivery, today in order that all offices concerned may advise us as to the significant parts referring to their particular districts and as to any further desirable interview with this woman, as it is believed that she is inclined to be cooperative at this time in furnishing information, insofar as she is able to tell same. In fact she indicated particularly to Agent when we were leaving that she would be very glad to talk further as to this.

However, it is to be noted much of her information is based upon what Kelly has told her. She is, of course, very fearful that should any of this information get back to the parties whom she has discussed, they would not hesitate to kill her.

Responsive to the Division's letter of October 11, 1933, inquiring as to the testimony given by Chief of Police Joseph A. Lehmeyer of Minneapolis, Minn., in the Urschel kidnaping case, I beg to advise that although I do not have Mr. Lehmeyer's testimony before me I am informed he testified that the Minneapolis defendents voluntarily came to his office and surrendered upon being notified by him by telephone that they were wanted.

It is understood that the Chief of Police came here voluntarily by 'plane and without authority of his city government; also without subpoens, in order to appear for the Minneapolis defendants. It will be recalled that the Division has heretofore requested to be furnished with a transcript of the testimony in this case and as soon as it is received from the Court Reporter it will be forwarded to the Division, who may then scrutinize the exact testimony of Mr. Lehmeyer.
