I was very such concerned on receiving your telegrem of Movember 10, 1934, advising that Clara Feldman and her son had been placed in the Multnomeh County Jail and a complaint filed against them, charging conspiracy to kidnap, because the filing of this complaint and the incerceration of Clara Feldman in a County Jail absolutely procluded any possible vigorous interview of this person by Division Agents. You were instructed to handle this matter in such a way that there would be absolutely no publicity, and to bold Clara Feldman secretly for a period long enough to permit a complete interview of her by Bivision Agents. Excellent results have been obtained by Division representatives in other parts of the country through the rigorous questioning of persons held in Division field offices. Such procedure cannot. however, be followed when the persons apprehended are taken to jails or other penal institutions and complaints filed against them, which result in considerable publicity. The Division had indicated to you the precedure that it desired followed in this matter. In all cases in which the Division issues instructions from Washington as to the manner in which a particular case should be handled, I desire that the Division's instructions be exactly and implicitly followed out.

I have been advised of your statement that this complaint was filed because of the fact that certain publicity had appeared concerning the arrest of Clara Feldman. I do not consider this explanation satisfactory, since, despite the publicity, it would have been possible for you to held Clara Feldman at least over the week and of Movember 10, 1934, it appearing that it would have been impossible for an attorney to have attempted to serve a writ of habeas corpus upon your prior to Monday, Movember 12, 1934. Undecibtedly, the questioning at a Division Office of Clara Feldman for an extended period would have resulted in the disclosing of considerable evidence and information which will probably not now be obtained.

Please submit immediately a full explanation of your failure to carry our Division instructions in this matter.

Mr. Spears telephoned from Ashland, Oregon and advised they had dug up \$4,680 additional ransom money; that this money had been dug up on the premises in Medford, Oregon.

Mr. Spears stated there were about five acres of land, a six room house and several out buildings; that he was satisfied there was still a large amount of the ransom money on the premises; that they were trying to get CCC workers to dig up the land, and that it might be necessary to tear down the buildings; that if this were necessary, some arrangements could probably be made to purchase them; that they were owned by a building and loan association, and valued at \$2,000.

Mr. Spears stated that unless it was absolutely necessary to call him, to wait until he called the Division. I advised him that if an urgent situation arose, we would call the Portland office and have them contact him. Mr. Spears stated that they had gotten no additional information from Clara Feldman.





Scott and the City, Oklahoma, charging Scott and with conspirate to violate the kidnaping statute inasmuch as a part of the ranson money was found in their possession at the time they were apprehended.

On November 9, 1934, Clara Feldman and her son, Ed Felandn, were taken into custody at Dunastir, California. On the person of Clara Feldman there was found \$1,100 in ranson currency and an additional \$1,000 in \$10 bills which were not part of the ranson paid in this case. On Hovember 10, 1934, a Federal complaint was filed at Oklahoma City charging the Feldmans with conspiracy to violate the kidhaping statute. An additional \$4,680 in ranson maney was located by Division Agents and local authorities at Medford, Oragon on Hovember 13, 1934.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Spears telephoned and advised that the following story had been obtained from Ed/Feldman, son of Clara Feldman; that he implicates Ben Laska. He states that they have paid him 510.000 of the hot money; that they paid him \$8,000 in Denver and \$1,000 in Oklahoma City at the Biltmbre Hote; that he implicates a second party by the name of Mr. Hyde, a United States Attorney; that he did not know whether there was enything to this information but had called Oklahoma City and they were working on this angle of the case there. Feldman stated that at Oklahoma City he was supposed to deliver to Laska an additional \$2,000; that he drove from Chicago to Denver where he was to meet Laska; that he then returned to Oklahoma City where he had an appointment with Laska at the Biltmore Hotel; that when he arrived there he found another party who was introduced to him as Mr. Hyde; that Laska told him, Ed, that Mr. Hyde was to help in some way, he didn't know how, for which he, Hyde, was to receive \$1,000.; that Laska told him to place \$1,000 under the bathroom rug; that his recollection was that they went into the bathroom and got this money and came out and counted the money saying that it was okeh. Mr. Spears stated that Mr. Brantley was sending him a photograph of Hyde so that he could show same to Feldman; that Feldman states that he has not seen Hyde; that he was taking Ed Feldman to Roseburg today to talk with Scott; that he, Spears, believes this boy is telling all that he knows; that they went out and dag \$1520 of the ransom bills: that altogether they have \$10,600 in actual ransom money, and \$14,200 including everything.

Relative to buying the house in question, I advised Mr. Spears that we were holding this in abeyance until we heard from him; that then we would take the matter up with Oklahoma City and see if Urschel would not purchase same. He stated to hold the matter up for a little while longer; that they were trying to find out where the rest of the money was; that he has talked with Clara Feldman continuously, but she will not talk; that she says the fact that they place her in jail made no difference to her; that she did make one offer, however; that she will tell where the remainder of the ransom bills are if we will release Ed and Scott. Mr. Spears further stated that Ed Feldman is trying to obtain information from his mother as to where the other money is. He stated he thinks there is between \$40,000 or \$50,000 of the money which they

I advised Mr. Spears with reference to the Laska situation to develop every detail and to try and get all corresponding possible. Mr. Spears stated that Ed Feldman stated that last August Ed Feldman and his wife drove from Idaho to Denver; that they went to Laska's house at night; that Laska telephoned the neighbor next door and told the neighbor that he had friends there from California and wanted to know if the car could be placed in their garage; that this was arranged, and that it is Ed Feldman's recollection that the car was in this garage for two days and two nights; that Laska drove down to the hotel to get reservations for them; that while they were there, Laska tried to obtain from Ed; through his mother, the \$2,000 which Laska knew they had.

Mr. Spears stated that the \$8,000 given to Laska was money which he wanted for expenses to date; that Laska accepted ransom money and also made an offer to Ed Feldman to exchange some of the money.



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



Based upon information received that Alvin H. Scott, brotherin-law of Clara Feldmann, had become involved in a serious automobile accident at Roseburg, Oregon, on November 2, 1934, Special Agent
of this office proceeded to Roseburg, Oregon, on November 3, 1934, on
instructions to ascertain whether Clara Feldmann and Edward George Feldmann, who have been wanted for interrogation in connection with the ransom
money in the instant case, would contact Scott, or whether any information
could be obtained in Roseburg involving these individuals.

Special Agent contacted Deputy Sheriff at Roseburg, who stated he had covered the accident of Alvin H. Scott, which occurred about noon November 2d, and he had ordered Scott's automobile to be taken to the Stevens Garage at Roseburg. He stated that there was nothing unusual about the accident and Mr. Scott was at that time at the Mercy Hospital in an unconscious condition.

was informed by At the Mercy Hospital Agent that Alvin H. Scott had been brought to the Mercy Hospital some time during the afternoon of November 2d, at which time he was unconscious and he had at no time regained consciousness. She stated that was present at the time Mr. Scott was being prepared for his bed; that she went through his clothing and found a wallet containing approximately \$700.00. reflected that it appeared out of the ordinary for a man to carry that much money on his person and that she immediately went to his room. searched his clothing again and found a wallet containing approximately \$800.00 in currency plus a small amount of change, additional. stated that this money was taken to the property room and that it had not been touched from the time it was taken from Scott's clothing. exhibited Scott's personal effects to Agent in the presence of and Deputy The money was counted and it developed that there were \$1360.00 in \$20.00 Kansas City Federal Reserve Bank notes; four \$50.00 bills, and six \$5.00 bills, plus a small amount of change. in the presence of the above mentioned persons, recorded the serial numbers appearing on the \$20.00 Federal Reserve notes and ascertained that all of said notes corresponded to the published list of ransom money in the instant case. A claim has been made by the of the \$250.00, referred to above, found in Scott's possession which was not ransom money, for the purpose of covering expense of treatment, etc., of Scott.

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Further interrogation of Special Agent resulted in information that who is a sister of Clara Feldmann and who is referred to in the instant-file as being the housekeeper of Alvin H. Additional surveillance was maintained to determine any possible communications which might be received either by Alvin H. Scott, or the hospital, and through the post office it was learned that on November 6th, Preceived a letter from Redford, Gregon, daughter of Alvin H. Scott, it being observed through the envelope of the letter that a \$100.00 bank draft purchased at the First National Bank, Medford, Gregon, and payable to was enclosed therein. After delivery of this letter, on Movember 7th, proceeded to the Roseburg National Bank and deposited the \$100.00 bank draft plus an additional \$60.00 in a checking account, it later being determined that this was deposited for the purpose of meeting Scott's hospital and medical expenses at Roseburg.

Medical Arts Building, Roseburg, was the physician attending Alvin H. Scott. was contacted at numerous times by Special Agent it being ascertained that he had X-Rayed Mr. Scott's head and that the X-Rays developed a concussion. He received an injury to his back, but principally due to shock he did not regain full consciousness until on or about Hovember 13, 1934.

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On Movember 7th, it was learned by Special Agent in Charge C. C. Spears, who had proceeded to Roseburg, Oregon, on Movember 4th that the local newspaper representatives at Roseburg had received press dispatches from the East which they were about to release, which contained information relative to the alleged complicity of Alvin H. Scott

and and in the handling of ransom money in the instant case.

Special Agents and on the steps of the Mercy Hospital at Roseburg. She was vigorously interrogated for about ten hours Hovember 7th, which interrogation was continued from day to day without receiving any information of value pertaining to the ransom money found in Scott's possession or any additional information regarding the location of any of the ransom money, nor would she disclose any information regarding the whereabouts of subject Clara Feldmann or Edward George Feldmann, claiming she had no such knowledge.

After service of the warrant upon

H. Scott by United States Marshal Jack Summerville,
was taken to Eugene, Oregon, for arraignment before United States Commissioner E. C. Immel. Bond was set at \$25,000.00. Upon consent of
she was removed to Portland, Oregon, where she was
Incarcerated in the Multnomah County Jail to await hearing on removal.

Due to the condition of Alvin H. Scott, who was as yet unconscious, no steps were taken looking toward his removal to Portland.

Coincident with the taking of in custody at Roseburg on November 7th, telephone communication was had by Special Agent in Charge C. C. Spears with Special Agent on that date at Medford, Oregon, conducting a thorough investigation of all Medford banks for the purpose of obtaining information regarding the presence of some of the ransom money, at which time Agent structed to appear before United States Commissioner Victor A. Tengwald to secure a search warrant to permit search of the premises of Alvin H. Scott located on the outskirts of Medford, Oregon, where he had been living for the past six months with his children and with who served as his housekeeper. A search warrant was issued on November 7th and was served the same day upon three year old daughter of Alvin H. Scott, who was in charge of the Scott premises at that time. The warrant was served upon who is stationed at Medford. Deputy United States Marshal Oregon, and immediate search was commenced of the premises by Special Deputy United States Marshal assisted by State Police Officers and

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As a result of the search conducted on the Scott premises there were found at 9:44 p.m., November 7, 1934, two one quart size "Ball Perfect Mason" fruit jars buried in the soil in an outbuilding in the rear of the Scott house used as a wood shed and garage. These two jars were found buried about fifteen inches deep, both jars lying together. The discovery

was made by State Police Officer and dug up by him in the presence of Special Agent and Captain and Captain of the Oregon State Police. These two jars will hereinafter be referred to as Jar No. 1, Exhibit 1, and Jar No. 2, Exhibit 2. The exact location where these jars were buried was 178 feet 5 inches west of the southeast corner of the Scott premises, and north 47 feet 4 inches. The hole in which they were buried was located on the north side of the doorway leading from the wood shed to the garage. The hole was 11 feet 10 inches from the south wall of the structure and 13 feet 5 inches from the east wall.

As a further result of the search of the premises of Alvin H. Scott Jar No. 3, referred to as Exhibit 3, was found buried at a depth of 15 inches at 12:44 p.m., November 11, 1934, by Special Agent and dug up in the presence of State Police Officer and Deputy Sheriff This jar was located in the ground, buried at approximately the center of an old barn site located 234 feet 3 inches west of the southeast corner of the premises and 30 feet 1 inch from the south line.

This jar contained - 254 \$20.00 Kansas City, Missouri, Federal Reserve Notes representing ransom notes in the instant case - Total \$4,680.00.

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(Each note bears the initials of Special Agent and

While Special Agents and Special Agent in Charge C. C. Spears were interrogating at Roseburg, Oregon, Special Agent in Charge Spears received a telephone communication from Special Agent at Medford on Movember 8th advising that a confidential informant located at Medford desired to see Special Agent in Charge Spears. This agent accordingly proceeded to Medford, Oregon, where contact was made with the confidential informant and information was received that Clara Feldmann and Edward George Feldmann

were believed to be in Dunsmuir, California. The confidential informant is the same informant referred to in letter of this agent to the Division dated January 29, 1934, in instant case.

Upon receipt of this information, this agent, accompanied by and Captain Special Agents and Oregon State Police, proceeded to Dunsmuir by automobile, leaving Medford at midnight Movember 8th and arriving at Dunsmuir at 3:30 a.m., Movember 9th. After arrival at Dunsmuir, contact was had with California State who was known to be a reliable officer. Highway Fatrolman and at about 4 a.m., it was ascertained that subject Edward George Feldmann had rented a house located on the Pacific Highway at the edge of town. It was also ascertained that there was a vacant house immediately adjacent to the one allegedly rented by Feldmann and this agent, accompanied by the others above mentioned, gained access to the house at about 5 a.m. The vacant house was located about 30 feet south of the house allegedly occupied by subject. Edward George Feldmann and Betty Feldmann, his wife, and the same was kept under surveillance until 9:55 a.m., Hovember 9th, it appearing that no one was at that time in the house. At 9:55 a.m., a Ford V8 Cabriolet car, bearing California license, drove up to the front of the house occupied by the Feldmanns. Clara Feldmann, Edward George Feldmann and his wife, Betty, were observed to leave the car and enter the house. At 10:25 a.m., subject Edward George Feldmann came out of the house and stood beside the automobile, at which time the above named agents and two officers placed Edward George Feldmann in accompanied by Officer custody, and upon this agent and Agent entering the front door of the house, Clara Feldmann was found in the front room and Betty Feldmann in the kitchen.

Upon being taken into custody Clara Feldmann admitted her identity and refused to engage in any conversation bearing upon the instant matter.

On a couch in the living room Special Agent found a lady's purse, which proved to be that of Clara Feldmann, and two bill folds. The first contained \$1,000.00 in \$10.00 bank notes and one of the wallets, which is described as the larger of the two found, being black in color and bound on the edges with leather lacing, contained 55 \$20.00 bills or a total of \$1,100.00. This was checked as being ransom money in the instant case. This wallet will be referred to herein as Exhibit #4, and each of the fifty-five \$20.00 Kansas City Federal Reserve notes bear the initials of Special Agents and C. C. Spears and the date they were recovered. Subject Edward George Feldmann admitted that the wallet containing \$1,000.00 in ransom money was his wallet. There was also found a smaller black wallet containing \$45.00, consisting of \$5.00 bank notes. This wallet is being marked as Exhibit #5. The \$1,000.00 recovered in Clara Feldmann's purse and referred to above are being kept intact and marked Exhibit #5.

After being taken in custody, Clara and Edward George Feldmann were advised of their right to be taken before the nearest United States Commissioner where a complaint would be filed and before whom they would be entitled to a hearing on removal to the district of Oklahoma. However, they waived such rights and in fact Clara Feldmann stated that she would accompany this agent any place in the country and did not desire to appear before a commissioner having jurisdiction over Dunsmuir, California.

A thorough search was made of the premises at Dunsmuir without any additional evidence of value being located, and the two subjects were immediately taken by automobile to Portland, Cregon, arriving in Portland about one a.m., on November 10, 1934.

This agent interrogated Clara Feldmann for a period of about sixteen hours, during which she at no time denied her connection with the ransom money in the instant case and, in fact, when informed by this agent that \$1450.00 representing actual ransom money in this case had been recovered on the premises of Alvin H. Scott at Medford, she informed this agent that that was all that was left on his premises. The statement, while in the nature of an admission, was not correct inasmuch as \$4680.00 was dug up from Scott's premises.

Clara Feldmann admitted to agent that she had married Albert Bates under the name of George L. Davis and further than admitting that the \$1100.00 in ransom money and the \$1000.00 in miscellaneous cash recovered in Edward George Feldmann's house at Dunsmuir was all of the money she had in her possession, she would make no further admissions and invariably would reply to interrogations: "I have nothing to say". She continued this reticence in answering interrogations until November 17, 1934 while she was being interrogated by this agent in his office. At this time she admitted the existence of additional ransom money, stating she desired to take the entire blame and would advise the whereabouts of the additional ransom money if her son, Edward George Feldmann, and Alvin H. Scott were released. At this time she stated that she was the cause of all the trouble and that "she was taking somebody else's dirt" which statement she would not elaborate upon and no further information could be obtained from her at this time. On November 19th, upon being interrogated by this agent in the presence of

and Edward George Feldmann, she again reiterated the fact that she would disclose information as to the remainder of the ransom money and at this time stated that she would do so if she and her son, Edward George Feldmann could be allowed to take all the blame and Alvin H. Scott released from custody. Repeated interrogations, however, failed to secure from her any information as to the amount of money remaining or its location. She stated to this agent that she had been threatened in connection with the instant case, but would not state who threatened her and expressed fear that if she disclosed the person

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or persons who made the threats that either she or members of her family would be killed. She indicated this fear of death by drawing her hand across her throat, indicating she feared someone might cut one of their throats.

It should be stated that on Movember 10th an effort was made to secure a formal statement from subject Clara Feldmann, but after answering some preliminary questions she refused to continue. Following is quoted the results of this effort to secure a formal statement being the stenographer present:

A11 67C Mrs. Davis, my name as you know is C. C. Spears, Special Agent in Charge, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice at Portland, and the stenographer is I want to ask you some questions and desire that you understand that this statement is to be made freely and voluntarily. Mrs. Davis what is your true name?

- A. Mrs. Clara Davis.
- Q. When and where were you married to Mr. Davis?
- A. Denver.
- Q. When?
- A. It was May wasn't it.
- Q. I have here a marriage certificate found in a glass jar buried on the premises of alvin H. Scott, Medford, Oregon, Movember 7th, which was issued out of Arapahoe County, Littleton, Colorado, reflecting that one George L. Davis of Denver, Colorado, and Clara Feldmann of Denver, Colorado, were married on May 15, 1935, the witnesses being Mrs. C. A. Hurtienne and Mr. G. A. Hurtienne, the ceremony having been performed by Fred A. Bemis, Justice of the Peace. I will show you this certificate and ask if that is the certificate showing your marriage to George L. Davis?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Mrs. Davis, were you previously married and to whom?
- A. Mr. Casper Feldmann.
- Q. When were you married to Mr. Feldmann?
- A. 1908.
- 4. Mhere?

- A. Tacoma.
- Q. How many children did you have?
- A. (Refuses to answer).
- Q. Is George L. Davis the same as the person known as Albert Bates who was arrested at Denver, Colorado in August 1933 in connection with the Urschel kidnaping case.
- A. (Refuses to answer).
- Q. You don't want to answer any questions, is that it?
- A. It won't do me any good.
- Q. Don't you want to answer them?
- A. (No answer).

With reference to subject Edward George Feldmann, he was interrogated immediately after being taken into custody at Dunsmuir, California, by Special Agent asked Feldmann Agent if he knew why he was being detained and he replied that he did. In response to interrogations pertaining to the ransom money, he stated that he expected to be picked up at any time; that he has had no peace of mind and that he has constantly been apprehensive of any strange cars or persons who appeared to be officers and he further stated to Special Agent that he was glad that the "beginning of the end had come" and that "he wanted to serve his time, get out, and earn a decent living". He also expressed his willingness to Special Agent to proceed to Portland, Oregon, or any other point where Federal complaint would be filed against him.

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Continued interrogation of Edward George Feldmann was had without any material results until the afternoon of November 17, 1954, about 4 p.m., agent called at the county jail at which time he stated he desired to tell all he knew about the case, and that he felt it was the best manner in which to proceed for the common good of all of them. Agent informed him that he had information indicating that some of the ransom money was paid to an attorney at Denver, Colorado in connection with the defense of Albert Bates at the former's trial. In this connection it was known to this office that the following exchange of telegrams had been had between Edward George Feldmann and B. B. Laska,

Attorney, Denver, Colorado:

"Portland, Oregon November 12, 1934

"B. E. Laska, Attorney Denver, Colorado -

MOTHER UNDER FIFTY THOUSAND MYSELF TWENTY FIVE THOUSAND BAIL BOTH CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY AND WIFE HELD MATERIAL WITNESS

EDWARD G. FELDMANN"

WILL ADVISE TODAY BY LETTER RELATIVE TO PROCEDURE ETC KINDLY NOTIFY YOUR MOTHER TO THAT EFFECT

Pursuant to the information contained in Laska's telegram of November 13th referred to above, the following is a copy of a letter addressed to subject Edward George Feldmann at the county jail, Portland, Oregon, by Laska, dated November 13, 1934:

"Received your telegram and contents noted.

"First, I desire to call your attention to the fact that neither you nor your mother were indicted in Oklahoma when Bates and others were charged with the conspiracy for the kidnapping of Urschell. I feel satisfied that you and your mother can resist the warrant for your removal to the Tenth Judicial District for the following reasons, towit:

- "(a) From my knowledge of the Bates case, together with other information, neither you nor your mother were in the States of Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Utah, Wyoming or New Mexico where the crime was alleged to have been committed, nor
- "(b) Neither you nor your mother aided, assisted or abetted in the commission of said offense, and I firmly believe neither you nor your mother had any knowledge of the same until after

Mr. Bates was arrested and charged with the said offense.

"You understand that you will have a hearing in Portland, Oregon, relative to your removal, and in the event you can make the proper showing as to mistaken identity and can show your innocence and want of probable cause I feel that the Court may deny the order for removal.

"In the event you believe that the order for the removal is unjust I suggest that your local attorney can apply for a petition for a writ of habeas corpus staying your removal until passed upon by the Appellate Court.

"If the order for the 'removal' is denied you will have no occasion to worry, but should it be sustained and you are sent to Cklahoma kindly notify me at once. I firmly believe that you and your mother will be exonerated of any complicity in connection with that case, for during the entire proceeding at Oklahoma City there was not one word, directly or indirectly, associating you or your mother with the same.

"For your information I want to call your attention to the fact that since December 11, 1933, a wife of a defendant in a criminal trial in a federal court is a competent witness in his behalf, and I trust that holding your wife as a witness will be conducive to your best interests.

"If you and your mother are taken back to Oklahoma and called upon for arraignment kindly askthe Court to continue the same until your attorney can file his motions and demurrers, should the indictment be faulty, and if the Court insists upon a plea at that time both you and your mother should enter a plea of not guilty.

"Bear in mind 'that mere knowledge or approval of or acquiescence in the object and purpose of a conspiracy without agreement to co-operate to accomplish such object or purpose is not enough to constitute one a party to the conspiracy,' so you will readily understand why I believe and know that you and your mother are innocent.

"What happened after the conspiracy had come to an end I do not know, and it is not admissible in evidence by any third person against a co-conspirator, but that is a matter that I will have to discuss with you when I see you.

"Kindly speak to your mother if you desire to have me repre-

sent you down there, and make the necessary arrangements with me concerning a reasonable fee and expenses.

"I am enclosing a copy of this letter for your mother, and will you please be so kind as to have the warden deliver the same to her.

"Awaiting an early reply, I beg to remain"

Following are the admissions made by subject Edward George Feldmann on November 17, 1934, in the office of this agent:

He stated that sometime early in the summer of 1935 he went to Denver, Colorado, where he joined his mother and Albert Bates, who was known to him as G. L. Davis. He stated that about the middle of July 1953, Davis asked his mother and him to make a trip to Portland, Cregon to see their folks; that he, accompanied by his mother, Clara Feldmann, drove to Portland in a Buick Victoria Sedan, and that they remained in Portland until approximately August 1st, when they returned to Denver, accompanied by subject Alvin H. Scott. He stated he was unable to furnish the exact time or dates of the trip to Oregon or the return trip to Denver, nor could he furnish the exact length of time Scott remained in Denver. He stated, however, that Scott left Denver after being there two or three days, and returned to Portland by bus.

He stated that when he returned to Denver Bates was not there, but that Bates did return to Denver after his mother received a telegram from him from some point which he does not now recall, and that shortly after his return to Denver Bates failed to put in his appearance at their apartment, and that the first actual knowledge that he and his mother had that Bates had been arrested was when a prisoner who had been released from the county jail in Denver called at their apartment and delivered a message to his mother from Bates to the effect that he, Bates, was in custody; that everything was all right and to "look in the suitcase".

In connection with the delivery of this message by the discharged prisoner, reference is made to the last paragraph on page 19 of the report of Special Agent in Charge John A. Dowd, dated August 24, 1933, at Salt Lake City, Utah, which reflects that the discharged prisoner was one

Feldmann stated that he does not know the exact context of the message sent by Bates concerning the suitcase and its contents, but that it was to the effect that Clara Feldmann should do what she saw fit about what she found in the suitcase. He stated that they opened the suitcase in question and that it proved to be a hand bag rather than a

suitcase and that they found that it was full of \$20.00 bills. He stated that he and his mother then proceeded to Cheyenne, Tyoming, where they stayed for several days in a rooming house, and later moved to some other address which he has not yet furnished. He also stated that the money found in the suitcase was buried in the vicinity of Cheyenne. Feldmann stated that they remained in Cheyenne two or three weeks and that during that time they maintained contact with the family at Denver. The lamily in question are direct relatives of Mrs. George Murtienne, George Murtienne being a brother of Clara Feldmann.

Whose address is shown as Denver, Colorado, in report of Special Agent dated Movember 9, 1954, at Denver, Colorado.

Feldmann stated that following the short period of time after he and his mother had gone to Cheyenne, he received word through that Ben Laska, Attorney for albert Bates, wanted to see "them" meaning he and his mother. Feldmann stated that on some date unknown to him, shortly thereafter, he called on Ben Laska in Laska's office. He stated that Laska told him that he was to defend Bates and that he would call on them (referring to Edward George Feldmann and Clara 💺 Feldmann) when he needed money. Feldmann stated that Laska "drilled" him as to what they should do and say to avoid detection. Feldmann stated that he had in his possession a Colorado automobile driver's license taken out under the name of Edward G. Feldmann and that Laska took this from him, together with other miscellaneous papers he had bearing his name, telling him that he was doing that so no one would find out his true name. Feldmann further stated that Laska told him to use the alias of Axel C. Johnson, stating to him that he "looked like a big Swede if anything". Feldmann stated that he had taken out this driver's license about June 1935, but that he is not sure of the exact date.

Feldmann further stated that Laska told him that he and his mother should go East, stay in large towns, and that he, Edward, should secure a job regardless of what kind of a job it was; that he further told him that if he ever got into a jam to communicate with him, Laska, in care of a woman attorney who had offices immediately above Laska in the Symes Building. Feldmann stated that he could not definitely recollect the name of this woman, but that his best recollection was that it sounded like for some similar name. Feldmann stated that he called upon Laska at his office upon several occasions and that he recalls Laska's stenographer or secretary as being a small, thin woman and "very tiny". He further stated that upon the occasion of one of these visits Laska told him that it would be necessary for him and his mother to pay him \$10,000.00 for expense money in connection with the defense of albert Bates.

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Feldmann stated that Laska also discussed with him the character of the ransom money as being "hot" money and made a proposition to Feldmann as to changing the "hot" money into good money for a fee of 25 per cent of the money changed. Feldmann stated that he is not exactly clear as to what Laska had in mind, as to whether he, Feldmann, was to get the 25 per cent for changing the money, or whether Laska had in mind that he would take 25 per cent for changing the money for them.

Feldmann stated that in response to this request for \$10,000.00 that his mother counted out an amount of the ransom money and that they kept an appointment with Laska at his residence, which he recalls to be 1154 Cook Street, Denver, Colorado. Feldmann and his mother went to the residence of Laska on an unknown date at night and stated that they were taken to a bedroom in the Laska house, where the money in question was paid to Laska and as a matter of fact he was given only \$8,000.00 instead of \$10,000.00, and that Laska did not discover the discrepancy until later when he referred to the fact that he had received only \$8,000.00 when he had asked for \$10,000.00, and was considerably disturbed over the fact that he had not received the full amount of \$10,000.00.

Feldmann stated that he had a fairly good recollection of the interior of Laska's home; that there were some Chinese appearing red lacquered pieces of furniture in the living room to the best of his knowledge, which appeared to be a bridge set. He stated that he met a blond woman who was supposed to have been Laska's wife and his best recollection was that this woman was introduced as Margery or Marg; that she was rather heavy set, had reddish blond hair, and was nearly fifty years of age. He stated that Laska had a large gray tom cat pet and that there was an archway leading from what he thought was the living room to the dining room and on each side of the archway and facing the living room were two china closets or bookcases, which contained books and on the top of one of these cases Laska's telephone was placed.

Feldmann stated that Laska informed him that when they went East he, Feldmann, should keep him advised of their whereabouts at all times, and that when communicating with him he should do so in a code form, no particular code being followed, but that he was instructed to word his telegram or other communication in such a manner so no one would determine definitely the message he was intending to impart.

During one of the visits Feldmann had with Laska, Laska asked him to draw him a diagram showing the location where the ransom money was buried. Feldmann stated that he drew such a diagram on a piece of paper and gave it to Laska, but that he deliberately drew a fictitious diagram so that Laska would have no chance of finding the money.

Feldmann stated that upon leaving Cheyenne, he and his mother proceeded to Chicago, Illinois, where they resided at the Warfield Apartment Hotel on Warren Avenue and later at the Lawrence Arms Hotel

on Kenmore Avenue. Feldmann is not at all definite as to dates of arrival and departure at these two places. (At this time reference is made to report of Special Agent dated February 12, 1934, Chicago, Illinois, wherein is recorded investigation made at the Warfield Apartment Hotel, 3307 Warren Avenue, indicating that Clara Feldmann, under the name of Ruth Johnson, registered there August 3, 1933. Inasmuch as there appears to be a discrepancy between this date of arrival and the information furnished by Feldmann, the Chicago office is being requested to clarify this matter if possible).

Feldmann advised that during the period that he and his mother were residing at the Warfield Apartment Hotel, at least it is his best recollection that it was during this period, he sent a Western Union telegram to Laska, which he believes he addressed in care of his residence on Cook Street, and in this telegram he furnished Laska with their Chicago address, stating that he did not, however, directly state the address but tried to incorporate that information as best he could in code form, but that when he later saw Laska in Denver, Laska "bawled" him out, telling him that the telegram was too plain and easily understood. Feldmann stated that he believes he signed the telegram A. C. Johnson, but was unable to give the date of sending or the Western Union office from which he sent it, inasmuch as he drove to a Chicago suburb when he sent it and is unable to recall the name of the suburb.

Feldmann stated that at some date prior to the trial of Albert Bates he drove alone from Chicago to Denver, where he again met Laska and Laska informed him that it would be necessary to deliver him an additional \$2,000.00, and that arrangements were made whereby he would deliver this money to Laska at Oklahoma City. Feldmann stated that he then left Denver and proceeded to Santa Fe, New Mexico, where he remained for about two days in one of the best hotels in Santa Fe, and he registered under the name of A. C. Johnson. Feldmann stated that he went to Santa Fe because Laska told him to stay away from Denver "as it was pretty hot".

Feldmann stated that he obtained \$2,000.00 from where the money was cached near Cheyenne and that he drove to Oklahoma City on an unknown date and registered under the name of A. C. Johnson, but he does not recall the name of the hotel. He stated that he met Laska in his room at the Biltmore Hotel pursuant to directions; that he had the \$2,000.00 with him which Laska had requested. Feldmann cannot fix the time except that he believes it was just before the trial of Albert Bates started or just at the beginning of the trial. He stated that in Laska's room he was introduced to an individual present, Laska referring to this man as Mr. "Hyde" and stated to Feldmann that Mr. Hyde was connected with the government and it would be necessary to pay him \$1,000.00 for some assistance he was

going to render in the case. Feldmann stated that Laska asked him if he had the money with him and upon receiving an affirmative reply he, Laska, told him to place \$1,000.00 under the rug in the bathroom. Feldmann stated that he went into the bathroom, and that there was a small bath rug on the floor, which he believed was green in color; that he placed \$1,000.00 under the rug as directed and came out of the bathroom. He stated that to the best of his recollection both Mr. Laska and Mr. Hyde went into the bathroom together and came out with the money and one of them said that "it's o.k." Feldmann stated that he gave Laska the remaining \$1,000.00 and that all of the \$2,000.00 was part of the original ransom money as was the \$8,000.00 previously given Laska at his residence in Denver.

Feldmann stated that the man introduced to him as Mr. Hyde was a rather young appearing man, who appeared to be in his thirties; dark complexioned; dark hair and had a rather full face. He stated that he would be able to identify this Mr. Hyde if photographs of Hyde could be shown him. (Telephone communication has been had with the Oklahoma City office to furnish such photographs as are available of the individual referred to as "Hyde".)

Feldmann stated that after remaining the one night in Oklahoma City he returned to Chicago, and that he at no time appeared at the trial of Albert Bates at all.

Feldmann informed of an additional trip made by him to Denver, Colorado during the month of August 1934, at which time he was accompanied by his wife, Betty, and that they drove from Idaho, where he was prospecting, to Denver in the new Ford Cabriolet purchased by him at Los Angeles and which bore California license plates. He stated that he had not advised Laska of his intended arrival in Denver and that he, accompanied by his wife, Betty, drove up to the Laska home on Cook Street at night, and that he, Ed, went in the house leaving Detty in the car. He stated that Laska was surprised to see him and scolded him for not advising him in advance of his intended arrival. He stated that while Betty was still outside in the car Laska phoned his immediate neighbor, whose house was situated on the right side of Laska's house, as viewed from the front of the house, and informed the neighbor that he, Laska, had friends who unexpectedly arrived from California for a visit, and asked whether they could keep their car in the neighbor's garage.

Feldmann's car, Feldmann and Laska left the front of the house and went to the car. He directed Feldmann how to drive around to the rear to enter the neighbor's garage. Feldmann and Betty drove to the rear, left the car there and both went into the Laska home. Feldmann stated that to his best recollection they were carrying three suitcases. Feldmann stated that the telephone used by Laska was in the front room of the house and that it sat upon one of the two bookcases or china cabinets built in between the living room and dining room.

Feldmann stated that Ben Laska asked him, Feldmann, whether Betty Feldmann knew about the money and Feldmann stated that he informed Laska correctly that Betty did not. This conversation was not in the presence of Betty Feldmann. Betty Feldmann was, however, present when Laska and Feldmann were discussing a draft in the amount of \$2,000.00 belonging to Clara Feldmann, at which time Laska stated he desired to secure that draft. Feldmann stated that Laska informed him that when he learned something definite about the draft that he should write him, Laska, or bring it with him when he again came to Denver, but that he should be sure to drop him a line and not to come unexpectedly as he did on the occasion in cuestion. Feldmann stated that Laska asked him in the presence of Betty as to the whereabouts of his, Feldmann's, mother, and Feldmann states that he informed Laska that she was in the East; that this information was not correct as he did not care to give Laska correct information in this respect.

While in the Laska home, Feldmann states that Laska, in the presence of Betty Feldmann, telephoned a hotel at Denver and made reservations for them it being the best recollection of Feldmann that the reservations were made either under the name of Johnson or Rock, Rock being the maiden name of Betty Feldmann. He stated that the reservations were accordingly made and that he and Betty went to the hotel and found that the room reservation had been completed and the room was held for them. Both Feldmann and Betty Feldmann state that they do not recall the name of the hotel, but that it was a small hotel which had no lobby and was located on Broadway, approximately three or four blocks south of the Cosmopolitan Hotel. Feldmann stated that they remained in Denver for two or three days and nights, and that when they left they returned to the place where he was prospecting near Nampa, Idaho.

The above information, together with any additional details that can be secured, will be incorporated in a written statement by Edward George Feldmann as soon as he is willing to sign such a statement. It should be stated that Feldmann appears to be perfectly

frank in the information furnished by him, and it is very apparent that the story told by him is not a fabricated story. He indicated that he desired to tell the entire truth and that he truthfully felt it would be much better for all concerned if he did so. He also stated that he would make every effort to ascertain the whereabouts of the remainder -of the ransom money if he could and on the night of November 17, immediately after making the above statement, he informed this agent that he could take us to a place where there was approximately 03.000.00 of ransom money buried. He stated this place was located about thirty miles north of Portland, (regon.

About 7:30 p.m. on the night of November 17th, this agent, Special Agents and accompanied by Edward Ceorge Feldmann, proceeded from Portland, Oregon, to Woodland, Washington, and under the direction of Feldmann proceeded from Woodland to a point six miles northeast of Woodland on the Lewis River Highway; this road leading high into the mountains and the point to which agents were directed proved to be the property of William Hurtienne, father of Clara Feldmann, and is a wooded plot of approximately 100 acres which had not been cultivated or improved in any manner with the exception of a small cabin located down the mountainside from the roadway approximately a half mile.

Arriving at the cabin Feldmann led agents to the rear of the cabin where he located the spot he was looking for and dug up a yellow colored fruit confection can, 10 5/8 inches in height and 42 inches square. The can was covered by a top which screwed onto it and within the can was a one pint thermos bottle, the exterior of which is red in color. The glass casing of the thermos bottle had been removed. Within the thermos bottle was found a handkerchief in which was rolled 1520.00 in 20.00 Mansas City Federal Reserve notes, all of which proved to be ransom money. These notes are each initialed by Special agents C. C. Spears, together with the date on which they were found.

approximately one hundred feet from the point where the above described can was dug up Feldmann led agents to another spot where there were a number of large wild ferms growing. . . He felt several of them All b7C and came upon one which was merely sitting upon the top of the ground and upon removing that he dug in the loose dirt and dug up a one gallon green thermos bottle. Upon opening the bottle it was found to be empty. This agent inquired of Feldmann how he could account for the fact that the thermos bottle was empty and his connent was "licther's been here". Peldman has not at any time to date given definite information as to. the burying of these two containers. He has stated, however, that he buried them, but has not directly stated he was accompanied by his mother at the time, although his statement as to "Mother's been here"

would indicate she was with him when they were buried or had definite knowledge as to when they were buried. Feldmann stated he has no knowledge as to the whereabouts of any additional ransom money, but reiterated his previous statement that he would do all within his power to obtain that information.

In connection with the statement of Edward George Feldmann as to the payment of \$2,000.00 in the room of Ben Laska at the Biltmore hotel, telephone conversation was had with Special agent in Charge Dwight Brantley at Oklahoma City, requesting that effort be made to locate the registration of Feldmann in one of the better hotels in Cklahoma City and requesting advice as to the dates attorney Laska was registered at the Biltmore. Special Agent in Charge Brantley caused investigation to be made and advised that Laska was registered upon three occasions at the Biltmore, namely: September 4 to 9, 1933; September 15 to 28, 1933; and December 3 to 5, 1936. To date information has not been furnished by the Oklahoma City office as to whether the registration of Feldmann has been located.

Reference is made to page two of this report, referring to the \$1360.00 in ransom money found in the possession of Alvin H. Scott, Roseburg, Oregon. As stated above they were found by the and that due to regulations within the church they did not care to be witnesses. They could not be prevailed upon to initial the notes, but it is believed that proper arrangements may be made to call them as witnesses. The twenty dollar notes in question have been initialed by Special Agent and the date they were first turned over to him by the Sisters is also incorporated on each bill.

Of the total amount of ransom money recovered there are eight notes whose numbers do not correspond with numbers appearing on the published list of ransom. However, they are all Kansas City Federal Reserve notes and without question are part of the ransom money, and it is believed that there was a possible discrepancy at the time the notes were listed by the bank prior to paying of the ransom. The following is a list of the eight notes in question:

All of the ransom notes recovered were checked and recorded by Special Agent and stenographer in the Portland office.

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At the time of the apprehension of Edward George Feldmann and Clara Feldmann, Feldmann had in his possession a 1934 Ford V8 Cabriolet, Motor #875382, which was purchased by him from the Fortner Motor Company, 4120 South Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California, on June 18, 1934, the sales price of the car being \$950.69. Feldmann readily admitted that this car, as well as other cars referred to hereinafter, was purchased by him with the proceeds of ransom money, although he stated that he at no time paid a lump sum of actual ransom money for any of the cars.

Investigation has been conducted by the Los Angeles office verifying the purchase as noted above, with the further information that Feldmann traded in a 1935 Auburn Speedster and paid in cash to the Fortner Company §308.69. Information was obtained by the Los Angeles office that payment of the balance on the Ford car was made in cash with numerous ten, five and one dollar bills, but no one was able to recall whether the cash included any twenty dollar bills.

Investigation conducted by the Los Angeles office developed that the Auburn Speedster referred to above was a 1933-12 cylinder car, motor BB1000, Serial 1148-E; that it was purchased on June 4, 1934 of the Auburn Motor Company, 3443 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, by one George Feldmann. The purchase price of this car was 5941.00 and on June 3, 1934, Feldmann made a deposit of 5501.00 in currency. This deposit consisted of five, ten and one dollar bills. Feldmann completed the purchase the following day by paying 5465.00 in cash, consisting of five, ten and one dollar bills.

of the Auburn Company, was unable to recall whether the payment included any twenty dollar bills.

The following automobiles are known to have been in the possession and purchased by Edward George Feldmann, and he admitted the purchase of all of them, using changed ransom money in each instance.

Pontiac Roadster, Motor #P475376, serial $_{T}416440\mathbb{E}$, purchased under the name of Axel C. Johnson, August 21, 1933. This was a used car and purchase price not known.

Chevrolet Coach, Motor #2446168, serial 21AE28858, purchased——September 1, 1933, in the name of Axel C. Johnson, from the Community Motors, 4949 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, payment in cash \$185.00 and trade in allowance of \$110.00 on the above referred to Pontiac. (See report of Special Agent February 12, 1934, Chicago, Illinois).

Dodge Coach, Motor #DP55800, serial #3629360, purchased from J. F. Goodwin, Dodge Dealer, 5725 Broadway, Chicago, Illinois, October 9, 1955, in the name of Axel C. Johnson, payment in cash #400.00 with

trade in allowance on Chevrolet Coach, referred to above. (See page 3, report of Special Agent February 12, 1934, Chicago, Illinois).

Chevrolet Cabriolet, Motor #3126905, serial #6BA0314291, purchased from the Sherer Motor Company, Eugene, Oregon, in the name of A. C. Johnson October, 1933, trading in above described Dodge Coach, balance of purchase price not immediately available.

1955 Chrysler Sedan, which bore 1954 Illinois license 510-502. Facts surrounding the purchase and disposition of this car not yet available.

Ford Roadster, 1929 model, bearing 1934 Oregon license 12-434, purchased at Medford, Oregon, about March 1934, purchase price \$200.00. This car is presently stored in a garage at Seattle, Washington, and being held for this Division for proper disposition.

Auburn Speedster, Motor mBB1000, serial 1148-E, ourchased June 4, 1934, from Auburn Motor Company, 3443 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, total purchase price \$966.00, under the name of George Feldman.

1934 Ford V8 Cabriolet, motor #875382 purchased from Fortner Motor Company, 4120 South Western Avenue Los Angeles, California, June 18, 1934, under the name of George E. Feldman. Cash payment \$308.69 and trade in allowance given on above described Auburn Speedster. This Ford Cabriolet is presently stored in the Portland Garage, Portland, Oregon, held by this Division for proper disposition.

Subject Alvin H. Scott was removed from the Mercy Hospital, Roseburg, Oregon, by the United States Marshal to Portland, Oregon, on Movember 22, 1934, and he is presently confined in the Good Samaritan Hospital under guard, pending removal proceeding. Scott has been interrogated since the time of the accident at Roseburg on November 2d, but it was not until Movember 18th that he became at all rational. Scott denies any knowledge whatever of any of the ransom money, states that if any of the ransom money was found in his possession at the time of the accident that "He must have been doped and somebody planted the money on him". Interrogation of Scott is being continued and further report in detail will be submitted with respect to this subject and the information obtained from him.

The following prosecutive action has been taken to date in connection with this case:

Fugitive complaint filed against subjects and Alvin H. Scott before United States Commissioner Kenneth Frazer, Fortland, Oregon, November 6, 1934, based upon complaints filed in

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Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and bond was fixed in the amount of \$25,000.00, each. Both of these subjects entered pleas of not guilty to the arraignment and hearing upon removal was originally set for December 4, 1934. is incarcerated in the Multnomah County Jail, Subject Fortland, Oregon, in default of bail.

Fugitive complaint against subjects Clara Feldmann and Edward -Teorge Feldmann was filed November 10, 1934, before United States Commissioner Menneth Frazer, Portland, Oregon, based upon complaint filed at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Bail as to Clara Feldmann was set at \$50,000.00 and bail as to subject Edward George Feldmann was set at \$25,000.00. Both are incarcerated in the Multnomah County Jail pending hearing on removal which was originally set for December 4. 1934; information having been received by the United States Attorney, Fortland, Cregon, that the presentation of the facts in this case would be made before the Federal Grand Jury at Oklahoma City, on December 11, 1934, the removal proceedings at Fortland are being set forward to December 18, 1934.

Betty Feldmann, wife of Edward George Feldmann, was held as a material witness under bond of \$10,000.00 and in default of the same she is presently incarcerated in the Bultnoman County Jail, Portland, Oregon. The principal value of her testimony will be to substantiate subject Edward George Feldmann in connection with the visit of Feldmann to Ben Laska in Denver, Colorado, in August 1954. She has expressed her willingness to substantiate his statement to the extent of her knowledge.

Attached to the Division copies of this report and the Cklahoma City office copies of this report is a set of photographs taken on the premises of Subject alvin H. Scott at Medford, Cregon, each of which bears a brief description of the photograph on the reverse side. These of the Oregon State Police, who photographs were taken by is referred to herein.



UNDEVELOPED LEADS.

DERVER OFFICE: It is requested that the Denver office at Denver locate the registration of Edward George Feldmann and Petty Feldmann during the month of August 1904, in a small hotel described as being located three or four blocks south of the Cosmopolitan Hotel on Broadway. The registration may have been under the name of A. C. Johnson, or Rock, and possibly Feldmann, although it is not believed that Feldmann was used. If the investigation can be made discreetly and in confidence, effort should be made to determine the identity of the person who may have received the telephone call from Ben Laska when he made the reservation prior to the arrival of Feldmann and his wife at the hotel. Also discreet inquiry should be made as to any telephone calls made from the hotel, although

Feldmann states he does not recall having made any phone calls.

Reference is made to page thirteen, referring to the prisonwho was released from jail at Denver, and who
carried the message from Bates to Clara Feldmann. Efforts should be
made to ascertain the present whereabouts of this individual in order
that he may be thoroughly interrogated further at the proper time, regarding the exact substance of the message he carried from Bates to Clara
Feldmann.

Verification should be made as to the identity of the woman attorney, recalled by Feldmann as having a name similar to Edison and who was believed to be located in an office directly above that of Ben Laska.

If investigation can at this time be made discreetly and entirely in confidence, effort should be made to ascertain the location of all bank accounts of Ben Laska and any safety deposit boxes he may have rented. The same discreetness in making investigation should apply to ascertaining the identity of Laska's next door neighbor in whose garage Feldmann's car was placed during the past August for a period of two or three days. Feldmann believes that this neighbor was very friendly to Laska and this belief on his part should be borne in mind.

Verification should be made of Feldmann's statement that he had a 1953 Colorado driver's license, in partial verification of his statement that such a license was taken from him by Laska, together with other papers, in order to hide Feldmann's true identity.

Discreet investigation should be made to learn the present whereabouts of who was referred to by Feldmann as being the person who carried the message to him that Ben Laska, Bates' Attorney, wanted to see him and his mother, or one of them.

Verification should be made of Laska's residence address, or more particularly his address during the summer or fall of 1933, which was recalled by Feldmann as 1164 Cook Street.

Exhaustive and discreet investigation should be made of the Western Union Telegraph Company for the purpose of locating if possible telegram sent by Feldmann from a suburb of Chicago to Ben Laska at his residence address in Denver, the estimated date being sometime in August or September 1933. This is the only communication Feldmann can presently recall that he sent to Laska which is susceptible of being found. The importance of locating this telegram is invited to the attention of the Denver office.

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This agent desires to emphasize the necessity for the utmost discreetness and care in conducting any investigation in Denver relative to Laska, inasmuch as it is believed it may be possible to secure some documentary evidence of importance if the investigation can be completed without Laska's knowledge to the point where he might be placed in custody in his office where a thorough search could be made for such documentary evidence. It is not improbable that Laska may have a separate file in his office under the name of A. C. or Axel C. Johnson which would contain invaluable evidence in connection with Laska's activities.

EL PASO OFFICE: It is requested that the El Paso office refer to page sixteen of this report on which it is noted that Edward George Feldmann stayed for a short period of time in a hotel at Santa Fe, New Mexico, under the name of A. C. or Axel C. Johnson, at which time he was merely standing by awaiting time to return to Oklahoma City. Verification of this registration at Santa Fe is of considerable value and every effort should be made to locate it and insure the preservation of any records pertaining to the registration.

Effort should also be made to locate, if possible, the registration of Chevrolet Coach, Motor #2446168, which was driven by Feldmann at the time he made the trip to Santa Fe. This car is believed to have carried Illinois license plates. The 1933 Illinois license plates may have been 1236347. These were the plates that were assigned to this Chevrolet car, although it is possible that he did not as yet have those plates on the car at the time of the trip he made from Chicago to Denver and Santa Fe, etc.

For the information of the El Paso office, there is enclosed herewith Multnomah County, Oregon, photograph of subject Edward George Feldmann.

CHICAGO OFFICE: The attention of the Chicago office is invited to report of Special Agent dated February 12, 1934, at Chicago, and particularly to page five which refers to investigation made at the Warfield Apartment Hotel, 3307 Jarren Avenue Chicago. According to information furnished by and recorded in that report, her records reflected that Ruth Johnson had registered there on August 3, 1935, and was joined a few days later by Axel, who was supposed to be her brother. Immediate investigation is requested to determine definitely that her records actually show the registration on August 3d. · inasmuch as that date was prior to the arrest of Albert Bates and is of particular significance, inasmuch as it would indicate that if Clara Feldmann as Ruth Johnson registered on August 5, 1933 at this hotel in Chicago, she may have been providing for a hide-out for Bates and herself and that she may have subsequently, after staying in Chicago a few days, returned to Denver, where she was known to be at the time Bates was arrested on August 12, 1933.

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
