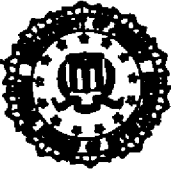

The March 13, 1964 edition of "The New York Times", a daily newspaper published in New York, New York, contained an article on page twenty concerning Malcolm X, the former head of the Nation of Islam (NOI) Mosque in New York City who broke with the Nation of Islam and Elijah Mohammad on March 8, 1964. The article indicated that on March 12, 1964, Malcolm X announced that he would form his own mosque in New York City, and it would be a meeting place for his Muslim followers and the base of a politically oriented black nationalist movement.

A characterization of the NOI and NOI Mosque Number 7, New York City, are attached hereto and all sources therein have furnished reliable information in the past.

Malcolm X, in Traffic Court Denies Speeding on Bridge

Malcolm X, leader of the Black Nationalists, pleaded not guilty to a speeding charge in Traffic Court yesterday and was scheduled for trial May 19.

In his affidavit, he gave his name as Malcolm X Little and his address as 23-11 87th Street, Flushing, Queens.

He appeared in court about 8:55 A.M. before Judge Larry M. Vetrano.

The Negro leader said with a grin that the policeman who had issued the speeding ticket was a "prejudiced cop."

The patrolman, D. A. Giarruto, of Motorcycle Squad 4, gave Malcolm X the ticket at 12:50 A.M. on March 6, saying he had driven 55 miles an hour on the Triborough Bridge, a 40-mile zone.

The trial will be held in trial part of Traffic Court, 53 Chambers Street.

Malcolm X--An Explosive Force: An African's View

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Mr. Nkusi is a young African writer from South Africa who has just visited the Southern states and New York City for the Observer.)

The defection of Malcolm X from the extreme racist Black Muslims is likely to have a far-reaching and possibly explosive impact on the civil rights movement in the United States.

Malcolm X is the only black man in America whose face I have watched turn radiant with hate against white people.

It was he who converted the world heavyweight box-

ing champion, Cassius Clay, now Muhammed Ali, to the Black Muslims.

The defection of Malcolm X may split the Muslims down the middle. Hitherto

Elijah Muhammad, the wily leader of this 100,000-strong religious sect, has survived harassment from the Ku-Klux-Klan, the police, the white press and from some Negro leaders for so long that his leadership had seemed all but unchallengeable.

But the departure of Malcolm X, of Temple Number Seven, by splitting the movement and weakening Muhammad's authority, may yet accomplish what Muhammad's enemies have so far failed to do.

Malcolm X, "the angriest

Black Muslim," is certainly most arrestingly articulate, and far superior in intellect to the man under whom he served.

He was suspended from the movement late last year, after he had made his notorious speech about President Kennedy's assassination in which he described himself as a "farm boy who had always believed in chickens coming home to roost."

However, none of the Negroes I talked to recently believed this to be the real reason for suspension.

He was playing an increasingly important role in the movement. His handsome bespectacled face is known to millions of television viewers in America.

The Black Muslims are drawn largely from semi-literate, lower working class

Negroes of the urban areas of the north, and Malcolm X has proved an invaluable asset, with his ability to articulate the aches of the ghetto-trapped Negro masses.

A professional gambler, Malcolm X became converted to the movement in 1947. He was born Malcolm Little, son of a Baptist minister in Omaha, Nebraska, in 1925.

Though Malcolm X had little formal schooling, he is enormously well-read and was generally acknowledged as the intellectual leader of the Muslim movement.

In a statement to the press last week Malcolm X said that the movement was "too inhibited to assume its responsibilities in the nation's social struggle."

This, in fact, has been the quandary of the Black Muslims. For a movement so

thoroughly racist in ideology, Elijah Muhammad and his followers have remained surprisingly unassertive in practice.

The real attraction of the Black Muslim movement has for Negro masses is largely emotional.

"For the first time," says a Harlem social worker, "Negroes are hearing black men getting up on the platform and telling the truth as they know it. This is a new thing altogether."

"Negro leaders who have been courting respectability have always pulled their punches when it came to saying what white America has done to the Negro people. Well, the Black Muslims aren't pulling any punches."

The somewhat apocalyptic aspect of Muslim ideology, the call for a separate black

state within America and the doctrine that white people await providential destruction by 1970, does not bother many of these people except the intellectuals.

What will Malcolm X do now that he has left the movement?

He has said he means to start a separate Black Muslim group whose emphasis will be "black nationalism as a political concept and a form of social action against the white oppressors."

He has also said that he will instruct his followers to defend themselves by the use of violence if physically attacked by "white supremacists."

Will Malcolm X find a large following?

In an excellent study of the movement, a Nigerian sociologist, Dr. E. U. Essien-

Udom, foresaw the struggle for leadership:

"Malcolm X," he wrote, "appears to wield a more prominent leadership role than any other minister. A split between him and Muhammad's successor could shatter the movement. If such a situation developed, Minister Malcolm X could probably carry a large number of followers with him."

Malcolm X Backs Today's School Boycott

By JOHN MALLON

Insisting that his movement's boycott today of the city's public schools "cannot fail," the Rev. Milton A. Galamison yesterday was offered the support of a new alliance—a group consisting of Rep. Adam Clayton Powell, Harlem rent strike leader Jesse Gray and "black nationalist" Malcolm X.

The long-established civil rights groups—the NAACP, CORE and the Urban League—had declined to support this second boycott. They had backed the Galamison boycott's first one on Feb. 3.

Galamison, Powell and comedian Dick Gregory will march in the vanguard of a boycott brigade which will demonstrate in front of Board of Education headquarters this afternoon.

Gray at Rally

Asked if he would accept the support of Malcolm X, who has urged American Negroes to arm themselves for civil rights battles, Galamison said:

"I haven't talked personally with Malcolm X. We operate on a philosophy of nonviolence. If he wants to support us under these rules, he can."

Gray, at a late-afternoon rally in Harlem, told this newspaper of the new alliance backing Galamison. Gray said of the de-

fection of other Negro leaders: "He may have been abandoned by the leaders, but not by the rank and file."

"We will support him. We're here to express support for Galamison. Malcolm X is a part of the new alliance, and we welcome him."

Malcolm at Rally

"We are expressing the need for action. Others will join us."

Malcolm X, arriving late at the rally in the Millbank Community Center, 32 W. 118th St., said:

"I'm not an integrationist. But I will work with anyone to improve the plight of the Negroes. If the only way we can bring about attention to the injustices of the world is through boycotts, then we must boycott."

A spokesman for the long-established civil rights organizations which have shunned Galamison's continuing boycott program told THE NEWS yesterday

that the boycott chief's influence started to wane when Galamison went to Chicago to confer with leaders of last month's boycott there.

Out on Limb, He Says

The older rights groups backed out, the spokesman said, to preserve their identity and independence. He said their leaders expect Galamison to "fall flat on his face" in the boycott today. "He's out on a limb," the spokesman declared, "and the limb is being cut off."

Bayard Rustin, Galamison's "pilot" who ran the first boycott will not participate in today's demonstration.

To Meet at Church

After picketing schools in the morning, groups of demonstrators will meet at Galamison's Siloam Presbyterian Church, 260 Jefferson Ave., Brooklyn, at 1 P. M.

They will then march the 3 1/2 miles to the school board head-

quarters at 110 Livingston St., Brooklyn, arriving at 1:45. Other groups will gather at City Hall at 1 P.M. and then march across the Brooklyn Bridge to the school board headquarters.

Malcolm X Vs. Murphy

By DOUGLAS ANDERSON

Denounced as "irresponsible" by Police Comm. Murphy, three civil rights spokesman today defiantly retorted they will pursue the same course which the Commissioner warned might "turn New York City into a battleground."

The most outspoken was the controversial Malcolm X. He charged that Murphy's statements "will start a race war."

"What he said will change the attitude of his policemen toward Negroes," Malcolm said.

"It will give the bigots on the Police Department open season on Negroes. I'm afraid that they may do something off that the Commissioner will regret."

After bolting the Black Muslims last week, Malcolm X spoke of a revolution, with bloodshed if necessary in organizing his own Black Nationalist party. He called on his followers to arm with rifles "to defend themselves."

He was singled out for criticism by Mr. Murphy along with Herb Callender, chairman of the Bronx chapter of the Congress of Racial Equality and Jesse Gray.

Leader of The Harlem Riot Strikes

Some 3,200 policemen gave the Commissioner a standing ovation after his most strongly-worded statement to date on civil rights.

Speaking at a Holy Name Society Communion breakfast at the New York Hilton, Mr. Murphy served notice that his department will not permit irresponsible civil rights leaders "to turn New York City into a battleground."

"No one will be allowed to turn neighbor against neighbor," he said.

MALCOLM IS 'SHOCKED'

He denounced Malcolm X as "still another self-proclaimed leader who openly advocates violence, bloodshed and armed revolt, and sneers at the sincere efforts of reasonable men to resolve the problem of equal rights by proper, peaceful and legitimate means."

In reply, Malcolm said: "I am shocked that a man of Mr. Murphy's caliber would take it upon himself to malign and libel me without first calling me and asking me what I had said."

Asserting that the Commissioner had been misinformed, Malcolm said "I have never advocated any kind of violence, bloodshed and armed revolt."

CITES HARLEM RALLIES

"I've said only in cases where Negroes are victims of brutality and the government has been either unwilling or unable to protect them, then Negroes should do whatever is necessary to defend themselves."

Malcolm said he had staged some of the largest outdoor rallies in Harlem and all had been peaceful and orderly.

"The type of irresponsible

statements the Commissioner has made," he said, "will spread the irresponsibility among policemen themselves."

"The kind of tension there is in Harlem now will set off an explosion that even the Commissioner and all the help he can get won't contain."

Mr. Callender answered Mr. Murphy's charges that he had presented a series of demands to the Police Dept. and "set a deadline for answer under threat of further direct action."

"Our demands are just," Mr. Callender said. "In calling for a public review board, we are asking that the top officials of the city properly consider these demands to end the whitewashing of legitimate police brutality complaints."

"If this cannot be done, then demonstrations will continue."

In his speech, Mr. Murphy rejected as "lies" statements by Mr. Gray who called for picket lines to "destroy the image that New York police are democratic and not on the side of the slumlords."

Replying, Mr. Gray repeated his charges that Mr. Murphy was allied with slumlords and should be forced to resign.

"Police?" said Mr. Gray. "When you want them, you can't find them. When you need them, they arrive drunk. They shake down prostitutes for a dollar. They shake down numbers bankers and dope peddlers."

"Commr. Murphy called me a liar in a statement, and this coming from the center of corruptness."

Murphy Warns Trio On Negro 'Disorder'

Battle lines were drawn today between the Police Department and some of the city's Negro leaders after a warning from Commissioner Michael J. Murphy against disorderly civil rights demonstrations.

Murphy declared his men would "not be intimidated" or prevented from doing their duty.

Addressing about 6000 policemen at a Holy Name Society breakfast at the New York Hilton, Murphy picked out Malcolm X, Jesse Gray and Robert Callender for special criticism.

Talking about the Black Muslim leader, Murphy said he "openly advocates violence, bloodshed and armed revolt, and sneers at the sincere efforts of reasonable men to solve the problem of equal rights by proper, peaceful and legitimate means."

Malcolm later replied that the "greatest compliment anyone in the power structure can bestow upon me is to call me irresponsible. . . responsible Negroes are those who are controlled by downtown."

Murphy quoted Gray, the Harlem rent strike leader, as saying the police are not demo-

cratic and are on the "side" of the slumlords. "We reject your lies," Murphy said of Gray, asserting: "We will not be intimidated."

Gray said later the police commissioner is on the side of the landlord, and the force was marked by "graft and corruption."

In a shot aimed at Callender, Murphy said the Bronx chapter chairman of the Congress of Racial Equality had presented demands to the Police Department and threatened "direct action" if they were not met.

"We reject his demands and serve notice we will not be dictated to nor will we bargain or compromise with pressure groups," Murphy said.

Callender said later the right to demonstrate cannot be taken away by a Bull Connor reference to Birmingham's police commissioner during last year's disturbances there.

NEGROES PONDER MALCOLM'S MOVE

Differ Over Significance of
His Political Effort

By FRÉD POWLEDGE

Leaders of the civil rights movement here and in the South are weighing the significance of the decision last week by Malcolm X, the former Black Muslim leader, to start his own Negro nationalist political movement.

Some leaders think the slender, intense former convict will capture large numbers of Negro intellectuals and working-class people. Others think his popularity will exist only in relation to the amount of space and time the white man's newspapers and television networks spend on him.

Some see Malcolm's entry into the broader field of civil rights as a prelude to a bloody summer. Malcolm, who has advised Negroes to purchase weapons for self-defense, has predicted an increase in racial violence for the coming warm months. A similar prediction was voiced frequently a year ago by close observers of the movement. But Negro frustration was effectively channeled into such nonviolent demonstrations as the March on Washington.

Frustration Greater Now

This summer, these same sources say, the frustration is much greater and the traditional civil rights leaders have less control over their followers. "There have been no concrete victories for a long time," one observer said yesterday. "I am really scared about what Malcolm may be able to do."

diminished, Mr. Rustin said, by "the degree to which the established civil rights organizations are more vigorous and develop a program which quite obviously affects the man in the street."

The Rev. Richard A. Hildebrand, a leader here in the effort for equal employment opportunity, echoed Mr. Rustin's feelings. He said:

"I welcome anybody who is going to help the civil rights struggle, but I cannot condone violence. Malcolm X is a brilliant person. I have a feeling that we can work together as long as we can contain that philosophy of violence."

Position Held Ridiculous

The Rev. Robert M. Kinloch, another local leader, called Malcolm's position ridiculous. "He's still preaching the same philosophy under a new brand name," Mr. Kinloch said.

Others in the civil rights movement expressed dismay at Malcolm's proposals. James Farmer, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality, said the black nationalist was proposing a race war that Negroes could not win.

Another acute observer of the movement, Bayard Rustin, believes that Malcolm's call to action may interest Negroes who formerly had shunned the Nation of Islam. Mr. Rustin, who coordinated the March on Washington last summer and other demonstrations, said in an interview:

"There are many elements in the Negro community—among the working class and among the intellectuals—who, out of the frustration of the current situation, have been deeply attracted to Malcolm's analysis but who rejected his synthesis."

"They're not interested in the separate state idea, or in the back-to-Africa thing, or in the religion," he said, listing three major aims of the Muslim movement. "But they do accept Malcolm's analysis of the evils that are being practiced on the Negro people."

Malcolm's influence will be

a few Negro activists will use Malcolm's proposals as a means of threatening whites.

"It's the idea of using a man like this to frighten the people into giving us what we want," one well-known leader said privately. "A lot of people are saying that we should let Malcolm scare the masses and Baldwin scare the intellectuals and Adam

scare the politicians." The references were to James Baldwin, the author, and Representative Adam Clayton Powell Jr., Democrat of Manhattan.

Another leader, Whitney M. Young Jr. of the National Urban League, believes that Malcolm's strength is artificial—that it is created on paper and videotape by the press.

"I think a great deal of the visibility which Malcolm receives from the media is due to an unconscious sympathy on the part of many reporters and others with the notion of separatism," he said.

Mrs. Gloria Richardson, whose civil rights movement in Cambridge, Md., has been abandoned by the national groups, said of Malcolm: "I think he can be helpful. He can offer something that has not been offered before."

James Forman, executive director of the Southern-based Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, agreed with Mr. Rustin that Malcolm's new position might be attractive to Negroes.

Has Many Followers

"It opens up possibilities for people who certainly thought the Muslims had something to say," he declared, "but who reject the whole concept of the separate state and the religion. That cat does have a lot of followers outside of the [Muslim] temple."

To Arms With Malcolm X

Malcolm X, the embittered racist recently ousted from the Black Muslim movement, has struck back in anger. He has called upon Negroes to form rifle clubs, ostensibly to defend lives and property in times of emergency. "It is legal and lawful to own a shotgun or a rifle," he says, adding, with a straight face, "We believe in obeying the law."

His is a call to break the law; to take the law into one group's own hands that would hold firearms; to erect a private militia. His is a call to arms against duly constituted police forces. When he mocked the assassination of President Kennedy, he exposed himself to Negroes and whites as the irresponsible demagogue he is.

The Negro civil rights movement has accomplished more in the past few years by non-violence—by what its real leaders call "active passive resistance"—than by appeals to armed mobs. Malcolm X will not deceive Negroes in New York or elsewhere.

Telegram To Muhammad

"You are still my leader and teacher, even though those around you won't let me be one of your active followers or helpers," Minister Malcolm X said in a telegram to Elijah Muhammad Wednesday attempting to explain why he had left the following.

Asserting that he had been "pushed out" of the nation of Islam, Malcolm said, "the tears you shed in Arizona gave the public the impression that you are also of the opinion that left of my own free will." Malcolm told Muhammad.

"The national officials there at the Chicago headquarters know that I never left the nation of my own free will. It was they who conspired with Captain Joseph here in New York to pressure me out of the nation."

Only Way

"In order to save the national officials and Captain Joseph the

disgrace of having to explain their real reason for forcing me out, I announced through the press that it was my own decision to leave.

"I did not take the blame to protect these national officials but to preserve the faith your followers have in you and the nation of Islam.

"I've never spoken one word of criticism to them about your family. I will always be a Muslim, teaching what you have taught me, giving you full credit for what I know and what I am."

"The present course I am taking is the only way I can circumvent their obstacles and still expedite your program," Malcolm's telegram said.

Clay Calls On 'Boss'

CHICAGO, March 14 (UPI). —Heavyweight champion Cassius Clay, proclaiming himself "a phophet, like Moses," met today with Black Muslim leader Elijah Muhammad (Poole) "to learn from my teacher."

Clay, who claims he has been a Muslim for more than four years, apparently has broken with Malcolm X, the former No. 2 man of the Muslim movement who has begun organizing a politically oriented Negro nationalist movement.

Clay said during an airport press conference after arrival here last night that he opposes Malcolm X's suggestion that Negroes organize "rifle clubs" and begin to "fight back in self defense."

Clay said, "I'm against that. There are too many rifles. I don't believe in violence."

Clay carried a thick wooden cane, carved like a totem pole.

It's the kind of cane that Moses carried. I'm a prophet like Moses. My predictions come true," he said.

Clay said he would dine tonight with Elijah Muhammed, the wispy, Oriental-looking Muslim leader, but declined to reveal the site of the meeting. I want peace and ~~good~~ said.

His Resignation Stuns Muhammad

By JAMES BOOKER

Black Muslim leader Malcolm X has filed papers for an incorporation, and will shortly open his own Muslim Mosque, Inc., here to continue his religious activities, he revealed to the Amsterdam News Wednesday.

The fiery leader, who announced earlier this week that he was pulling out of Elijah Muhammad's Nation of Islam to form his own group, said that he would hold his first public meeting Sunday at the Hotel Theresa, where he is establishing temporary headquarters for his new group.

'Forced Me'

In an exclusive interview with this newspaper, Malcolm charged that the Muslims Chicago headquarters had been waging a power struggle against him that led to his suspension last Dec. 3 by Mr. Muhammad allegedly for statements he made criticizing the late President Kennedy.

"They forced me to take the stand I am taking because I had to find a way to circumvent the forces in the movement that opposed me and at the same time to expedite Mr. Muhammad's

program as I understand it," Malcolm said.

What kicked off Malcolm's announcement was a letter he received from Mr. Muhammad last Thursday informing him that his suspension was remaining "for an indefinite period," even though he had been under suspension for three months.

Accusing officials in the Chicago headquarters of being "narrow minded," Malcolm charged that certain officials there had "misinformed" Muhammad of his activities for years because they feared his rising strength within the group.

Loyal

While refusing to openly criticize any individual in the Muslim group, Malcolm said that even though his suspension was originally said to be an official

MALCOLM X SEES RISE IN VIOLENCE

Says Negroes Are Ready to
Act in Self-Defense

By M. S. HANDLER

Malcolm X predicted yesterday that there would be more racial violence than ever in the United States in 1964. He declared that "Negroes on the mass level" were ready to act in self-defense.

The Negro leader broke last Sunday with the separatist Nation of Islam, or Black Muslim, movement headed by Elijah Muhammad.

He announced then that he would organize a broadly based, politically oriented black-nationalist movement composed of Muslims, Christians, and non-believers who were intellectually and emotionally ready to follow the black nationalist banner.

Yesterday, at a news conference in the Park Sheraton Hotel here, Malcolm formally opened this drive.

"There will be more violence than ever this year," Malcolm told the reporters. "White people will be shocked when they discover that the passive little Negro they had known turns out to be a roaring lion. The whites had better understand this while there is still time. The Negroes at the mass level are ready to act. It is dangerous to deceive the white people into believing that all is well."

Assails Nonviolence

Malcolm urged Negroes to abandon the doctrine of non-violence in the civil rights struggle. He asserted:

"It is criminal to teach a man not to defend himself when he is the constant victim of brutal attacks. It is legal and lawful to own a shotgun or a rifle. We believe in obeying the law."

"In areas where our people are the constant victims of brutality and the Government seems unable or unwilling to protect them," Malcolm said, "we should form rifle clubs that can be used to defend our lives and our property in times of emergency, such as happened last year in Birmingham, Plaquemine, La., Cambridge, Md., and Danville, Va. When our people are being bitten by dogs, they are within their rights to kill those dogs."

"We should be peaceful, law-abiding," Malcolm said. "But the time has come for the American Negro to fight back

in self-defense whenever and wherever he is being unjustly and unlawfully attacked."

"If the Government thinks I am wrong for saying this," he declared, "then let the Government start doing its job."

Accompanied by Muslims

Despite his statement Sunday that he would not seek to take members away from Elijah Muhammad's movement, Malcolm arrived at the news conference accompanied by several Black Muslims who have presumably followed him out of the Chicago-based organization.

Malcolm's nonsectarian appeal to Negroes is apparently producing results. Christians who were formerly inhibited from joining the black nationalist movement because they did not want to join Islam are now coming to New York to confer with Malcolm.

Malcolm announced that he had established temporary headquarters at the Theresa Hotel in Harlem and would soon open his own mosque for those of his followers who are Muslims.

He said the mosque would be a meeting place for Negroes of all religious persuasions who wanted to enter into discussions of the black nationalist movement.

Malcolm said his new movement was being financed by voluntary contributions. He said he would accept contributions from whites but that white people could never join the movement because, he said, when whites join an organization they usually take control of it.

Questioned about the school integration dispute in New York, Malcolm said that he did not oppose any rational solution but that he believed the only real solution would be to improve the quality of those schools with largely Negro student bodies.

Black Muslim Chief Rose From Squalor

The Black Muslims usually are thought of mainly as a Northern movement, but their leader, Elijah Muhammad, who refers to himself as "The Messenger of Allah," was born in the South.

Christened Elijah Poole, one of 13 children of a share-cropper near Sandersville, Ga., he attended the area's Jim Crow schools through third grade, then worked as a field boy, railroad laborer, sawmill hand, and brickyard helper.

In 1919 he, his wife and two children moved to Detroit. There he and other Negroes found themselves shunted from employment lines by returning white war veterans, and years of hunger, poor living conditions and fear of hostile nightsticks of police began.

Then one day he encountered a light-skinned Negro peddler who spoke words that intrigued him: "My name is W. D. Fard. I came from the Holy City of Mecca to teach the so-called Negroes of North America who are the Lost-Found Nation of Islam. More I cannot tell you."

Fard did not mention that if indeed he had come from Mecca, a recorded waystop had been California, where in 1918 as Wallie Ford he had been arrested on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon, but later released. Or that in 1926 he had gone to San Quentin State Prison on a narcotic conviction.

It was enough for Poole to know that Fard, whose ideas stirred him, intended to found a "Temple of Islam" in the Detroit Negro ghetto, and he, Poole, was to be designated "Muhammad, First Minister of Islam."

Thus was born the semi-secret, black supremacist, separatist movement known as the Black Muslims. Fard organized and directed it until 1934, when he mysteriously disappeared.

Poole, who moved its headquarters to Chicago, has headed it since then, and except during World War II, when he served a term in the Federal Correctional Institution at Milan, Mich., for refusing to cooperate with Selective Service authorities, the sect seemingly has prospered steadily.

What do the Black Muslims believe?

In essence, like other racist groups, white or Negro, they oppose integration as contrary to divine intent. They look upon themselves as part of a distinct nation of superior, chosen people, Fard's "lost-found Nation of Islam."

The sect's formal name, in fact, is The Nation of Islam. It has its own flag, the Islamic star and crescent, and its own police force, judo-trained guards of "The Fruit of Islam." In Chicago and Detroit it has its own private schools, currently accredited, and eventually, Poole tells his followers, it must have its own territory, an unspecified area within this country.

Because Muslims believe the white race and its Christian religion to be decadent and capable only of furthering exploitation of "so-called American Negroes," they refrain from voting or other political activity. Some decline, as Poole did in World War II, to serve in the U.S. armed forces.

They subscribe to a spartan personal code: No smoking, drinking, gambling, using narcotics, or sexual immorality.

No Muslim woman may use cosmetics or be alone in the same room with a male who is not a member of her family. Socializing with whites, who are regarded as "devils" who would defile the black race, and in their opinion already have weakened it by race-mixing, is strictly forbidden.

In the tradition of orthodox Moslems they refer to God as Allah. Prayers must be said to Him while facing the East five times daily. Only one meal a day may be eaten. Fasting periods must be observed. Neither pork nor anything cooked with pork may be eaten.

They are instructed never to carry weapons, and always to be polite, keep themselves and their homes immaculately clean, and to pay bills promptly.

In addition, they must participate in daily activities in

local Black Muslim temples, sometimes referred to as mosques (although they may be only a leased auditorium). These include classes in home economics for men, "physical hygiene" (judo, boxing and military drill).

All must agree to forgo use of their last name, which is considered only a "slave name" handed down from forebears' "slavemasters." Instead, they apply to Poole for a Muslim name, which is "X," for name unknown.

Thus, newly recruited heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay presumably now will be known to Muslim brethren, and will refer to himself, as Cassius X.

Customarily there is no singing at temple services, only a prayer (while facing East to Mecca), and a sermon. A mandatory search of everyone who enters, and a painting on a blackboard by the front wall, set the tone.

The painting shows a Negro hung from a tree limb. Painted beside it is an American flag captioned, "Slavery, Suffering, and Death," and opposite that an Islamic star and crescent, "Freedom, Justice, and Equality." Large letters ask, "Which will survive the War of Armageddon?"

As a result of tight disci-

pline, dedication and camaraderie, there frequently are remarkable changes of personal conduct among members — the slovenly made responsible, criminals "set straight," alcoholics become teetotalers, dope addicts freed of addiction.

In slums and prisons where Black Muslims are most active, such transformations cannot help having a powerful impact, and many testimonials I heard from Muslims themselves were indeed impressive.

But according to psychologists, judges and law enforcement officials with whom I talked, there is another side of the coin which may be of greater consequence. That is the effect of Black Muslim teachings and practices concerning racism and violence.

These, as one official put it, are "a powder keg, so explosive that it might ignite at any time—with tragic results for whites and Negroes alike."

Malcolm X—A Cry of War and Peace

Malcolm X is now an independent operator in the service of Allah and black nationalism. Ousted as No. 2 man in the Black Muslim movement, he struck a fresh pose of militancy yesterday, urging Negroes to buy guns and form rifle-clubs for self-defense wherever they are not fully protected.

Predicting more racial violence in 1964 than ever before, he declared that "the time has come for the American Negro to fight back in self-defense whenever and wherever he is being unjustly attacked."

And the "non-violent" approach of civil rights groups he dismissed by saying: "It is criminal to teach a man not to defend himself when he is the constant victim of brutal attacks."

But the tall, muscular leader with a close-cropped beard, a razor wit and a quick smile, had some olive branches to wave, at least for Negroes. He did so standing in front of a modern tapestry in a room at the Park Sheraton. He called a press conference to clarify his

position, now that he is disassociated from Elijah Muhammad's group that is formally styled the Nation of Islam.

First, he intends to seek a "common approach" with other Negro leaders and organizations, despite sharp differences, in an effort to combat such problems as alcoholism, drug addiction and prostitution. "As of this minute, I've forgotten everything bad that the other leaders have said about me," he said, "and I pray they can also forget the many bad things I've said about them."

Second, he will organize a new apparatus, to be known as the Muslim Mosque, Inc. that will provide for the participation of non-Muslims in political, economic and social programs, "despite their religious and non-religious beliefs."

It will work, he said, to control community politics and "will organize to sweep out of office all Negro politicians who are puppets for the outside forces." A temporary headquarters has been set up in the Theresa Hotel, 2090 Seventh Ave., in Harlem.

Malcolm indicated that the movement was designed to

embrace all those Negroes, especially the youth, who subscribe to the Black Muslim's separatist, anti-integrationist views about race, but do not want the religious trappings of Islam.

"I'm too intelligent to take a stand as militant and controversial, and as you say, extremist, unless I had some indication of support," he said with a smile.

As for himself, Malcolm said, "I am and always will be a Muslim," and he will continue to espouse the back-to-Africa teachings of Elijah Muhammad. Leaving the door open for reconciliation, he distributed the text of a telegram to Mr. Muhammad saying that he had not left the Nation of Islam of his own free will, but announced he was quitting only to save its national officials "the disgrace of having to explain their real reason for forcing me out."

Malcolm X, who was suspended from leadership last December for allegedly mocking the assassination of President Kennedy, previously blamed his fall from grace on the jealousy of Mr. Muhammad's son, Akbar, and his son-in-law, Raymond Sharrief.

Pointing up his new involvement in non-Muslim affairs, he disclosed that he had been invited to meet in Chester, Pa., tomorrow with the Rev. Milton A. Galamison, Brooklyn school integration leader, and Mrs. Gloria Richardson, leader of the Cambridge, Md., Non-violent Action Committee.

- E.H.-h Muhammad, leader of the "Black Muslims" told the Chicago Daily Defender that "as soon as I hear from Malcolm X, I will make a comment on his decision."

Muhammad said Malcolm X had mailed a letter to him and that he expected to receive the letter within the next couple of days. "At that time, I shall have a comment," he said.

Malcolm X, suspended New York minister of the "Black Muslims," on Sunday had declared that he was breaking with the group to form his own organization, a "Black Nationalist Party to lead Negroes in active self-defense against white supremacists."

"There can be no revolution without bloodshed, and it is nonsense to describe the civil rights movement in America as a revolution," Malcolm said.

Malcolm was suspended last

December as New York leader of the Black Muslims after a speech in which he said President Kennedy's assassination was a case of the "chickens coming home to roost."

He said he now has broken completely with the Black Muslim group which has kept out of the fight for integration and concentrated on creating a separate black nation.

Malcolm said he had not been invited to the annual convention of the Black Muslims

in Chicago Feb. 25 and that Elijah Muhammad, has not clarified his status with the organization. He said, however, he still regarded himself as a Muslim.

Malcolm was critical of the doctrine of non-violence preached by major civil rights organizations and said it was a deception on the Negro "because they have only to examine the failure of this so-called revolution to produce any positive results in the past year."

Malcolm, who was apparently a factor in heavyweight boxing champ Cassius Clay's decision to join the Black Muslims, said he had been prevented by Elijah Muhammad from joining in the civil rights struggle in the South.

"It is going to be different now. I'm going to join in the fight wherever Negroes ask for my help, and I suspect my activities will be on a greater and more intensive scale than in the past," he said.

Malcolm said he had accepted an invitation to aid a civil rights committee in Plaquemines Parish (county), La.

"I am prepared to cooperate in local civil rights actions in the South and elsewhere and shall do so because very campaign for specific objectives can only heighten the political consciousness of the Negroes and intensify their identification against white society."

He said he would tell his followers "what a real revolution means—the French Revolution, the American Revolution, Algeria, to name a few."

He said the "main em-

phasis of the new movement will be black nationalism as a political concept and form of social action against the oppressors."

Malcolm said he felt he could "best spread Mr. Muhammad's message by staying out of the Nation of Islam and continuing to work on my own among America's 22 million non-Muslim Negroes."

Until his break with the Black Muslim leadership, Malcolm had been regarded as the organization's second most powerful figure and possibly the heir apparent to the ruling Elijah Muhammad.

A factor in the split was believed to have been the reported rivalry between Malcolm and Muhammad's son-in-law, Raymond Sharrieff, who is said to aspire to succeed Muhammad.

Sharrieff is in command of the Muslim's secret army known as "the Fruit of Islam."

Malcolm had been active in the Muslim movement for 15 years, rising to his position of leadership through an uncanny shrewdness and with his reputation for eloquence.

Before entering the movement he was involved in the rackets in Harlem and he served time in prison.

Malcolm has said he is not ashamed of this part of his past because "it was done when I was part of the white man's Christian world."

"As a Muslim, I would never have done these awful things that caused me to go to prison."

"But any time any segregationist or white supremacist bigot makes any effort whatsoever to brutalize the Negro, that Negro should . . . defend himself," he said.

Elijah Muhammad Weeps For the Loss of Malcolm X

Elijah Muhammad wept today for the loss of the brightest star in the Muslim firmament.

"I am stunned," the 63-year-old patriarch said of the defection of Malcolm X. "I never dreamed this man would deviate from the Nation of Islam. Every one of the Muslims admired him."

Interviewed at his Phoenix, Ariz., home, the leader of 300,000 Negro separatists was in tears as he acknowledged the departure of the top New York Muslim from the fold.

"What he has said makes it definite. He has deviated. Obedience is an important thing to us."

One consolation remained.

The most prominent convert to the faith remained faithful. In Louisville, heavyweight champ Cassius Clay, dubbed Muhammad Ali by his spiritual father, bowed to the west.

"I don't know much about what Malcolm X is doing, but I do know that Muhammad is the wisest."

The 22-year-old fighters allegiance to the parent movement may be an ironic footnote to the Muslim schism. Malcolm X, until now a fiery champion of the Muslim creed, is generally given credit for Clay's conversion.

Malcolm on Self Defense

"I am a fighter and I am religious," Clay declared. "I am not going to do anything that's not right."

In New York, Malcolm appeared on a CBS show, and defined what he meant by "active self defense."

"In any situation where Negroes are being brutalized," the erstwhile heir apparent to Elijah Muhammad declared, "they should defend themselves. In every part of this country where the Negro is constantly the victim of vicious assaults on the part of segregationists and white supremacists, I think that every one of those Negroes should have a shotgun or a rifle which he should always obey the law with."

But in Phoenix, Elijah Muhammad affirmed the peaceability of his own movement and cast doubt on Malcolm's capacity to initiate much violence.

"He has no guns, no ammunition," Muhammad said.

FROM LITTLE TO 'X' A Study in Hatred For 'Oppressors'

X is defined as the symbol for an unknown quantity and as such is a fitting surname for Malcolm X, the most articulate spokesman for the black supremacists.

Now Malcolm X has broken from the Chicago-based Black Muslim movement and has created a new unknown quantity—his own Black Nationalist Party.

Who is Malcolm X and what makes him tick?

What kind of person would mock the assassination of President John F. Kennedy?

CASTRO CALL

What was Malcolm X's motivation in being one of the first persons to call on Cuba's Communist Premier Fidel Castro on his trip to New York to attend a UN session?

Bitterness is as good an answer as any. Bitterness and a consuming hostility toward whites for the way in which he believes they have pushed the Negroes around in the U.S.

His deep hostility, in fact, was responsible for his name.

"I was once called Malcolm Little," he says, "but I gave my slave name back to the white man and now call myself Malcolm X."

BORN IN OMAHA

He was born in Omaha, Neb., and grew up in Lansing, Mich., New York and Boston.

His father was a Garveyite, a follower of an early black nationalist leader, and also a Baptist minister.

Malcolm X said the family homes had been burned by the KKK in Omaha and at Lansing.

"And he was like I say, a clergyman, a Christian, and it was Christians who burned the homes in both places—people who teach religious tolerance and brotherhood," he said.

Later, his father was found dead, his head bashed in.

two prison sentences for larceny. He said he was a dope addict for six years, using marijuana, opium, cocaine and heroin.

He was serving a term in the Maximum Security Prison in Concord, Mass., when a relative wrote him about his family's conversion to Islam.

Malcolm X said he was rehabilitated by Black Muslim leader Elijah Muhammad, and turned from atheism to Islam.

KICKED HABIT

With his conversion, Malcolm X said, he kicked his dope addiction cold turkey within 24 hours without any of the customary withdrawal symptoms or convulsions.

Now he is using a stronger opiate, drawing inspiration from his conviction that he has been designated in a master scheme to lead his race.

The Black Muslim followers of leader Muhammad were beginning to share Malcolm X's belief, insiders said, and that is why Malcolm was suspended last December by Elijah.

The sources contended that when Malcolm attributed President Kennedy's assassination to the "chickens coming home to roost," it provided a ready-made opportunity for Muhammad to "cut Malcolm down to size."

POWER STRUGGLE

Because for months Malcolm had been waging a power struggle, a struggle so successful that he and not Muhammad had become identified nationally as the leader of the Black Muslims.

Now that Malcolm X is organizing a militant Black Nationalist Party, where will he lead it?

"America will pay. The crimes of the white man will be avenged. The black man is the original man, the father of civilization. But America itself, because of the seeds it has sown in the past against the black man, is getting ready to reap the whirlwind today."

version of heavyweight champion Cassius Clay.

Malcolm said that "I remain a Muslim."

"But," he added, "the main emphasis of the new movement will be black nationalism as a political concept and form of social action against the oppressors."

Malcolm X is generally credited with clinching Clay's conversion to the Muslim sect. But the fighter's allegiances may be tested by Malcolm's break with national leader Elijah Muhammad.

Over the weekend, Elijah, in an apparent attempt to garner some of the reflected Clay glory, bestowed the name "Muhammad Ali" on the champion. Clay responded in kind: "I am honored."

Also, Clay has been outspoken in his contempt of integrationist goals. But in branching out on his own, Malcolm X declared he was ready to "cooperate in local civil rights actions in the South and elsewhere" in order to intensify Negro identification against white society.

Clay has said he will move to Long Island, close by Malcolm X's residence. And when Rudolph Clay, brother of the champ, attended a Muslim convention in Chicago, he pointedly abstained from hailing Muhammad. Instead, he spent the night of Cassius' victory with Malcolm X.

Malcolm's break with the Chicago-based Black Muslims came while he was still under suspension, ostensibly referring to the assassination of President Kennedy as "the chickens coming home to roost." Malcolm, however, blamed the "jealousy" of Muhammad's son and son-in-law for his downgrading. He also said his remarks on the assassination has been misinterpreted.

The split comes as a result of diverging points of view as well as personality factors. The Muslims, insisting on the creation of a separate Negro nation, have abstained from civil rights efforts—terming the futile—and urged their members to shun the white man.

Through still avowing black nationalism, Malcolm X has promised to "Join in the fight wherever Negroes ask for my help." Unlike the national Muslims, Malcolm declared that he sees "black nationalism as a political concept and form of social action against the oppressors."

Malcolm X Breaks With Muhammad

Malcolm X, Black Muslim leader who became the sect's principal spokesman, said last night he is forming his own Muslim group as a result of a break with the parent organization.

Malcolm X said, "I want it clearly understood that my advice to all Muslims is that they stay in the Nation of Islam under the spiritual guidance of the Hon. Elijah Muhammad.

"It is not my desire to encourage them to follow me."

He added:

"I intend to work on my own among America's 22 million non-Muslim Negroes. My new Muslim organization — with black nationalism a part of its philosophy—will seek to convert Negroes from non-violence to active self-defense against white supremacists in all parts of the country."

Malcolm X was suspended by Muhammad as head of the Harlem Black Muslim mosque after Malcolm X referred to the assassination of President Kennedy as "the chickens coming home to roost."

Asked if heavyweight champion Cassius Clay, an active member of the Mus-

lms, would be a part of his new organization, Malcolm X replied:

"No I wouldn't want Clay to take any position which would endanger his international reputation and position as heavyweight champion of the world."

Malcolm X said he will hold a news conference this week to further explain his position.

Suspended Muslim Leader Plans Black Nationalist Political Movement

Malcolm X broke last night with Elijah Muhammad's Chicago-based Black Muslim movement and announced that he was organizing a politically oriented "black nationalist party."

He said the party would seek to convert the Negro population from nonviolence to active self-defense against white supremacists in all parts of the country.

"I remain a Muslim," Malcolm said, "but the main emphasis of the new movement will be black nationalism as a political concept and form of social action against the oppressors."

"I have reached the conclusion," he said, "that I can best spread Mr. Muhammad's message by staying out of the Nation of Islam and continuing to work on my own among America's 22 million non-Muslim Negroes."

Had Been Suspended

Malcolm has been under suspension by Mr. Muhammad as the New York leader of the separatist Black Muslim movement.

He asserted last night that the movement had "gone as far as it can" because it was too narrowly sectarian and too inhibited.

"I am prepared," Malcolm said, "to cooperate in local civil rights actions in the South and elsewhere and shall do so because every campaign for specific objectives can only heighten the political consciousness of the Negroes and intensify their identification against white society."

Malcolm said he had accepted

an invitation to help a civil rights committee in Plaquemines Parish (County), La.

"There is no use deceiving ourselves," Malcolm said. "Good education, housing and jobs are imperatives for the Negroes, and I shall support them in their fight to win these objectives, but I shall tell the Negroes that while these are necessary, they cannot solve the main Negro problem."

Malcolm continued:

"I shall also tell them that what has been called the 'Negro revolution' in the United States is a deception practiced upon them, because they have only to examine the failure of this so-called revolution to produce any positive results in the past year."

"I shall tell them what a real revolution means—the French Revolution, the American Revolution, Algeria, to name a few. There can be no revolution without bloodshed, and it is nonsense to describe the civil rights movement in America as a revolution."

Malcolm said Elijah Muhammad had prevented him from participating in civil rights struggles in the South although he had had many opportunities to do so.

"It is going to be different now," Malcolm said. "I'm going to join in the fight wherever Negroes ask for my help, and I suspect my activities will be on a greater and more intensive scale than in the past."

Would Speak at College

"I shall also accept all important speaking engagements at colleges and universities," Malcolm said, "because I find that most white students are more attuned to the times than their parents and realize that something is fundamentally wrong in this country."

Malcolm has spoken at more than 20 colleges and universities, including Harvard and Yale. He said his popularity as a university speaker had aroused the animus and jealousy of Elijah Muhammad's family.

"Envy," Malcolm said, "blinds men and makes it impossible for them to think clearly. This is what happened."

Malcolm's speech at Manhattan Center after President Kennedy's death was only the excuse for his suspension, Malcolm said. In that speech Malcolm declared that Mr. Kennedy's assassination was a case of the "chickens coming home to roost."

Malcolm contended that his phrase had been misinterpreted. He said he had meant that a spread of social hatred had created an atmosphere that made assassination possible.

Malcolm said he had not been invited to the annual Black Muslim convention in Chicago on Feb. 26. Later, he said, he telephoned Elijah Muhammad and requested clarification of his status.

He received a letter from Mr. Muhammad that left the question unanswered, he said.

Malcolm said he decided then that the time had come for him to act, but that he would not set himself up as a rival to Mr. Muhammad or provoke him.

Plans New York Base

Malcolm declared that his first task would be to construct an organization based in New York. He said that he was supported by many Negro intellectuals and professionals who could not accept Islam but accepted the Black Muslim view of race relations in the United States.

Malcolm contended that Negroes were dissatisfied with the progress of the civil rights movement and that this had created the basis for a successful black nationalist political movement. He declared:

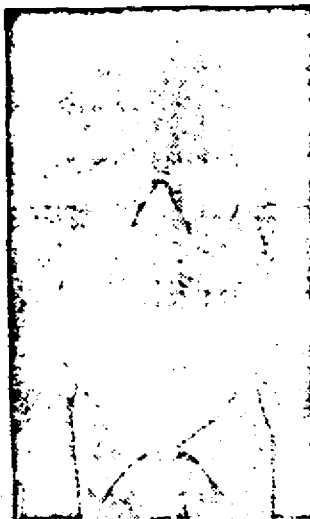

"Another thing. The Negroes still don't understand the power of the ballot in the North. We must make them understand that the Negro voters have it in their power to decide next November whether Johnson stays in the White House or goes back to his Texas cotton patch."

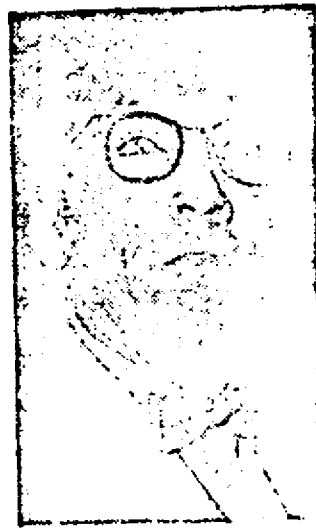
Malcolm said he was not trying to split the Muslims.

Malcolm X Quits the Muslims

Malcolm X, under suspension since December as the New York leader of the Chicago-based Black Muslim movement, made the break complete last night with the announcement that he is organizing a militant "Black Nationalist Party."

The party, he said, will plunge into the civil rights movement and attempt to turn Negroes away from nonviolence and into active self-defense against white supremacists in all parts of the U.S.

Muslims "Too Sectarian"

The Black Muslims and their leader, Elijah Muhammad, plugging for a separate black nation, have been aloof from the fight for integration.

Malcolm, while insisting he remains a Muslim, declared the movement has gone as far as it can because it is too narrowly sectarian and inhibited. He plans to "work on my own among America's 22 million non-Muslim Negroes."

He dismissed the so-called Negro revolution in the U.S. as a

deception practiced upon the Negroes because it has failed to produce any positive results in the past year.

Blames Jealousy in Fall

"I shall tell them," he added, "what a real revolution means—the French Revolution, the American Revolution, Algeria, to name a few. There can be no revolution without bloodshed, and it is nonsense to describe the civil rights movement in America as a revolution."

Malcolm blamed his fall from grace in the Black Muslim movement on the "jealousy" of Elijah Muhammad's son, Akbar, and his son-in-law, Raymond Sharrief, head of the Fruit of Islam—the sect's brawny, highly trained security guard. He said

MALCOLM X PLANS A NEW NEGRO GROUP

Political Party Is His Object

By The Chicago Tribune Staff

New York, March 8—Malcolm X broke tonight with Elijah Muhammad's son-in-law, Raymond Sharief, head of the Fruit of Islam (a security guard), and Akbar Muhammad, Elijah's son.

Both feared that Malcolm's national reputation and image as a Muslim leader would make him the natural heir of the movement.

Explaining his reasons for stepping out of Elijah Muhammad's family-controlled organization, Malcolm said the movement as it is presently constituted and oriented has "gone as far as it can" because it is too narrowly sectarian and too inhibited to assume its responsibilities in the nation's social struggle.

Invited to Louisiana

"I am prepared," Malcolm said, "to cooperate in local civil rights actions in the south and elsewhere and shall do so

because every campaign has specific objectives and objectives heighten the political consciousness of the Negroes and intensify their identification against white society."

Malcolm has received an invitation from a civil rights committee in Plaquemine parish, La., to help them break what he called the white power monopoly, and he said he has accepted the invitation. Mrs. Gloria Richardson, head of the civil rights committee in Cambridge, Md., also has contacted Malcolm. Plaquemine and Cambridge are the scenes of two of the most bitterly contested racial struggles.

"There is no use deceiving ourselves," Malcolm said. "Good education, housing, and jobs are imperatives for the Negroes and I shall support them in their fight to win these objectives."

"I remain a Muslim," Malcolm X said, "but the main emphasis of the new movement will be black nationalism as a political concept and form of social action against the white oppressors."

"During this 90 days of silence (imposed by Elijah Muhammad), I have reached the conclusion that I can best spread Mr. Muhammad's message [separation] by staying out of the Nation of Islam [Black Muslim movement] and continuing to work on my own among America's 22 million non-Muslim [Christian] Negroes."

"Advice to Muslims"

Muhammad silenced Malcolm last November after a statement in which Malcolm referred to President Kennedy's assassination as the "chickens come home to roost."

"I want it clearly understood that my advice to all Muslims is that they stay in the Nation of Islam under the spiritual guidance of the Honorable Elijah Muhammad. It is not my desire to encourage any of them to follow me," Malcolm said.

The man who calls himself Malcolm X is the most controversial and one of the most powerful of America's Negro leaders.

Until he resigned from the Black Muslim movement yesterday to form his own "black nationalist" organization, he was "minister" of New York's Muslim Mosque No. 7. He also was the East Coast leader of the fanatic, anti-white cult until the group's leader, Elijah Muhammad, suspended him last December.

'No Last Name'

Muhammad said he silenced his New York lieutenant because of a speech in which Malcolm mocked the assassination of President Kennedy as a case of "the chickens coming home to roost." But there were reports that Muhammad was worried about Malcolm's growing popularity and power.

frequently tells reporters—

White Devils?

The split-away of Malcolm X from Elijah Muhammad is an event with far-reaching potentials. It means that the racist and separatist Black Muslim movement, which has thus far prohibited political activity among its members and even frowned on voting, will now develop a radical political wing and try to build a political movement of "Black Nationalism."

Malcolm X, who has been generally recognized as the Number Two man in the Black Muslim movement, has clearly found the movement too small for "the Messenger" (Elijah Muhammed), and himself, and doubtless Elijah Muhammad has felt the same. The boy who was born Malcolm Little, in Omaha, whose father was a follower of Marcus Garvey's "Black Nationalism" of the 1920's, who struggled against poverty in a family of eleven children after his father's death, who found law as a profession blocked against him when he was sixteen, who turned to the underworld as "Big Red" and was converted to Elijah's faith in prison: this Malcolm X has become the orator, propagandist and intellectual of the movement.

It is clear that Malcolm, despite his long smoldering quarrel with Elijah Muhammed, does not yet dare challenge him in a membership duel: hence the "advice" to Black Muslims to stay in "the Nation of Islam." But it will be interesting to see whether Allah's "Last Messenger" will remain passive while Malcolm X carries the Black Muslim standard into political battle, in the thick of civil rights demonstrations in North and South alike.

It will be equally interesting to see how the leaders of the major Negro movements will respond to Malcolm X's offer to "cooperate in local civil rights actions." Coming from a man who has called them all "puppets" and "Uncle Toms," who has summed up the whole of their work as "tokenism," who has condemned the entire effort of integration and has preached an inevitable revolution of blood and violence instead of their peaceful revolution, this strangely bland offer is unlikely to be taken at its face value.

Anyone who wants to study the Black Muslim movement in the literature will find the best treatment in two recent books. C. Eric Lincoln, of Clark College in Atlanta, has done a sociological study in depth—"The Black Muslims in America" (Beacon). Louis E. Lomax has done a livelier and more popular little book, "When the Word is Given" (Signet Paperback).

The hold the Black Muslims have achieved on a segment of American Negro opinion, including some intellectuals, is witness to the extent to which the traditional Negro liberalism has been shaken up by recent events, and the soil prepared for a bitter crop of fanatical hatred.

"The white man," Malcolm X told Lomax, "is by nature a devil, and must be destroyed." An "evil black scientist, Yakub," says Elijah Muhammad, created the white devils by a grafting operation. Their destruction has been scheduled for some time; it has been heralded by the African and Asian revolutions. The only reason it has been held up is that the American Negroes are entangled with the white population. They must disentangle themselves: hence the command to Negroes to stay away from whites—not to have political or economic or social relations with them, not even to be on the same boat or plane with them (a command incidentally which delights some of the White Supremacists in the South); hence also the demand for a separate Black Muslim state, repeatedly voiced by Malcolm X in his speeches.

As one of the "white devils" I suppose I cannot be wholly objective toward a movement which creates an apartheid for me, and consigns me to violence and destruction. Nor is the open anti-Semitism of the movement (called "anti-Zionism," but nonetheless a fact) likely to attract those who recall the gas ovens of Europe. Lomax points out the ties between Malcolm X and the Arab propagandists in Cairo, and the interest that Nasser's representatives at the UN have in the movement.

I can understand why many Negroes, in the depth of their bitterness about white injustice and white hypocrisy, should feel some sympathy even with the blatant absurdities of Elijah Muhammad and Malcolm X. But the new step to thrust the strength of the movement into national politics ought to make them take a second hard look at it. It has no learning, no research, no historical perspective; it talks of universal love and brotherhood and preaches hate and destruction; it rejects the whole course of American and Western history, except for its aping of such former Communist ideas as a separate black state in America; it mocks the courage and devotion of millions of Negroes and whites who have worked for a better America for both.

Some day we shall all look back at this episode as one of the most grotesque of our confused time. But meanwhile, unless we see what it means, it can work great destruction.

Malcolm X to Form Own Muslim Sect

Malcolm X, New York leader of the Black Muslims, has quit the Negro segregationist sect to form his own "black nationalist" organization.

He was suspended from his Muslim post last December by Elijah Muhammad, national head of the cult, after referring to the assassination of President John E. Kennedy as a case of "the chickens coming home to roost."

Since then, Malcolm X has spent much of his time advising heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay. After his surprise victory over Sonny Liston in Miami Beach two weeks ago, Clay disclosed his membership in the Black Muslims.

Tour of Moslem Nations

He said last week that he will take Malcolm X with him on a tour of Moslem countries in Africa and the Middle East next month.

Asked if Clay will be a part of his new organization, Malcolm X replied: "No. I wouldn't want Clay to take any position which would endanger his international reputation and position as heavyweight champion of the world."

He said he will not encourage Black Muslims to join his group.

'Active Self-Defense'

"I intend to work on my own among America's 22 million non-Muslim Negroes," he said. "My new Muslim organization, with black nationalism a part of its philosophy, will seek to convert Negroes from non-violence to active self-defense against white supremacists in all part of the country."

Malcolm said he will continue to accept invitations to speak at colleges and universities. He added that Elijah Muhammad and his family were "jealous" of Malcolm's popularity.

Envy blinds men and makes

Clay in Malcolm X's Corner In Black Muslim Power Fight

By TED POSTON

Cassius Clay today was emerging as the central figure in a fight which may be tougher than the one in which he wrested the heavyweight crown from Sonny Liston.

This one may decide who will succeed Elijah Muhammad as ruler of the Nation of Islam—the official name of the powerful and growing Black Muslim movement.

Clay, who announced his conversion to Islam shortly after dethroning Liston, is not a principal in the upcoming contest between suspended Minister Malcolm X and Muhammad's son-in-law, Raymond Sharrieff, for successor to the aging Muhammad.

But recent developments in the dissension-rant movement have indicated that Clay is a potent second in Malcolm X's corner in his coming showdown with Sharrieff, who is the captain of the Muslim's paramilitary organization, the Fruit of Islam.

Struggle Comes to Light

The struggle between Malcolm X and Sharrieff came into the open last December when the New York leader of Mosque No. 7 was suspended by Muhammad—ostensibly for disrespectful remarks concerning the assassination of President Kennedy.

And Clay, regarded as the Clown Prince of boxing until his surprising defeat of Liston, has figured in several developments in the undercover fighting which has made Malcolm X's suspension stick months beyond its expected duration.

First Malcolm X, who remains as minister of Mosque No. 7 at Muhammad's Temple of Islam, 153 Lenox Av., persuaded the then heavyweight contender to come here secretly to address a Muslim rally. But the news leaked out—probably not accidentally.

Then Malcolm X showed up as Clay's guest in Miami Beach shortly before the fight which was held on the day before the Muslims' one-day national convention in the Chicago Coliseum.

One source close to Muslim leaders said that Malcolm X,

who was not invited to attend the convention, had offered to bring Clay with him to the Chicago assemblage if his suspension was lifted.

"The offer was turned down," this source said, "because Muhammad, no more than the bookmakers, expected Clay to win, and Sharrieff's supporters pointed out he would be just another beaten boxer."

But Clay won. Muhammad, in addressing the Muslim convention hailed Cassius Clay as a convert to Islam. Clay, whose Muslim brother, Rudolph Valentino Clay, attended the Chicago convention, did not hail Muhammad. Instead, he hailed Islam and spent his night of victory with Malcolm X.

And the impending split was further emphasized when all Muslim temples, except New York, sent greetings to the convention.

The Sharrieff forces struck back at Malcolm X, the most articulate spokesman of the movement, by giving a big convention buildup to Lonnie X, new minister of the Muslim Temple in Washington, D. C., which Malcolm X, before his suspension, had been ordered to head along with his New York mosque.

Clay Moving Here

Then Malcolm X struck back. Cassius Clay, the most noted convert of the movement, not only came here to visit with him, but also announced that he is shifting his permanent home here—out on Long Island where Malcolm X lives.

Sharrieff still has the support of most of Muhammad's numerous relatives in the movement, including Akbar Muhammad, the youngest son who heads the principal Mosque No. 2 in Chicago.

But Malcolm X apparently has Cassius Clay. And that may count for much when they come out fighting.

Cassius Is Here ... 'to Stay'

Cassius Clay said yesterday that come what may he's here to stay.

Or, goodbye Louisville, hello New York.

"This is my home," the new champ announced after flying into town to show himself to some loyal subjects and the big-city press.

"I'm going to buy a house here for about \$100,000," he confided.

A spokesman said Clay has his residential sights set on Long Island. For the moment, he is installed at Harlem's Ho-

tel Theresa with a chauffeured Caddy parked outside.

Last night the 22-year-old king held court for about 50 fans in the Theresa's lobby, and it went like this:

CLAY: "I am so pritt-ty, and I am the greatest."

CHORUS: "Yes, yes you are."

Earlier, New York's Black Muslim leader, Malcom X, joined Clay for a Times Square review of the movies of Tuesday's upset of Sonny Liston.

His Night

A crowd of 500 waited for Cassius to emerge from his pleasure at the Newsreel Theater on Broadway at 49th St. and when he did, it was with startling modesty.

"Malcolm X got more requests for his autograph than I did," Clay said. "He's the greatest."

Clay: Allah's the Greatest

Harlem greeted him with chants of: "You are the greatest!"

But amiable, "purty" Cassius Clay made it clear to the shouting teen-agers that he abdicated the title Tuesday after winning the world's heavy-weight title. He's now merely the greatest of mortals.

"Allah is the greatest," he modestly observed before touring Harlem and Times Square yesterday in the company of Black Muslim leader Malcolm X.

By last night, after a leisurely day of praising Allah and Cassius to all who cared to listen, the garrulous champ had converted Harlem—at least—to the Cult of Clay.

THEY LOVE HIM

Harlem now seems to love smiling Cassius as madly as he does himself.

After saying good-bye to Malcolm X, Clay staged a 10 p.m. show of his famous stand-up comedy routine in the jam-packed lobby of the Theresa Hotel on 7th ave. and 125th st.

The crowd of about 100 roared at every quip and verse—and they kept smiling approvingly as he slipped in among his usual patter a few casual plugs for the religion of the Muslims.

"I am the champ!" Clay crowed to the delighted crowd. "Liston was only the chump."

After briefly noting that he mixed a "prayer to the right god" among his jabs and hooks, Clay lyrically described the

scene in battered Sonny Liston's corner as the bell rang for the seventh round.

"But Liston says: 'I'm no fool.'"

"I'm staying right here, on the stool!"

Who does he want to fight next?

"Eddie Machen and Doug Jones on the same night. I predict I will need only eight

rounds altogether with both these chumps. Liston? He needs a few more fights. He needs more experience."

How long is he staying in New York?

"I'm living here in the hotel from now on—until I buy a 100,000 house."

Clay, wearing a short leather coat and sporting a colorful cane, interspersed his boasts with relaxed likable, small talk.

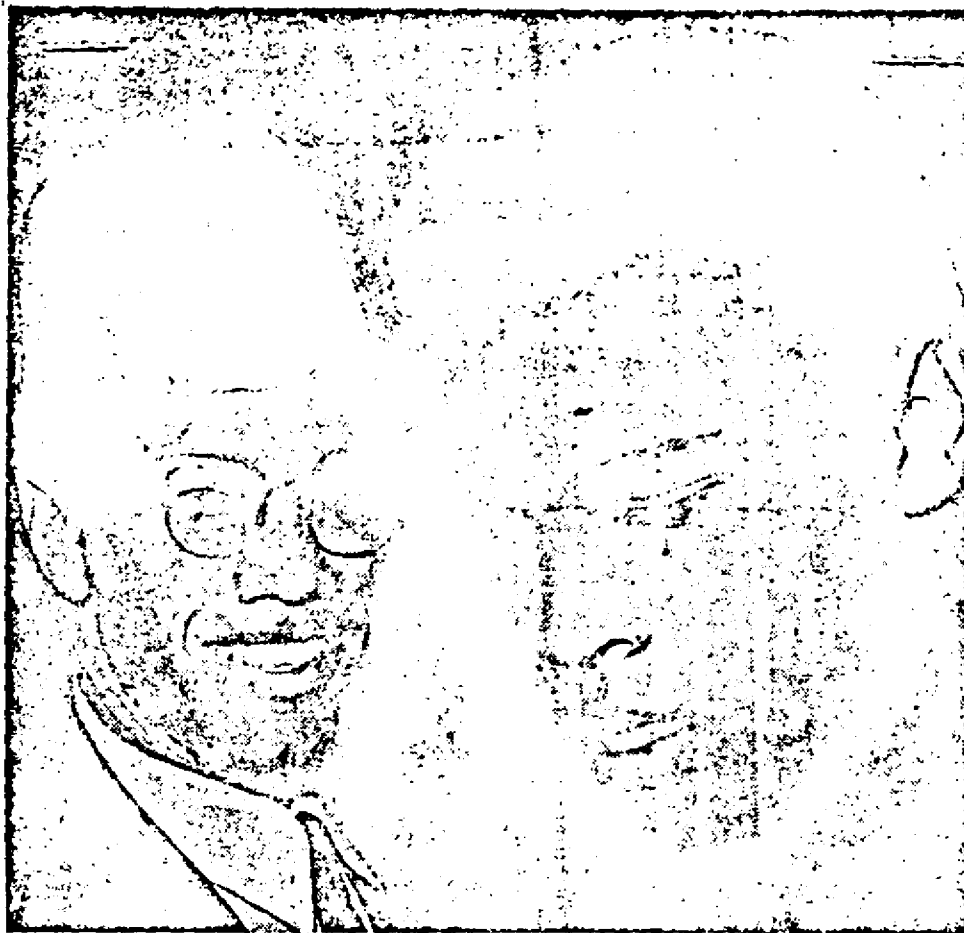

ance of the new champion at a Muslim rally.

"The Greatest!" They Chant

When Cassius and his party drove up to the hotel in a black 1964 Cadillac limousine, with

chauffeur, the word crackled through the neighborhood that the champ had arrived.

Spearheaded by kids from a nearby church, some 100 persons quickly surrounded Cassius and adoringly chanted "You are the greatest." Cassius was quick to agree but added this newcomer: "Allah is the greatest."

Clay was more than eager to keep his well-wishers around. He stood in the hotel lobby for more than an hour, gladly signing autographs.

Report Clay, Malcolm X Plan New Organization

NEW YORK — Malcolm X, suspended New York leader of the Black Muslims, may soon break his ties with the group and form a new organization with the backing of new heavyweight champion Cassius Clay, according to Major Robinson, writer for the New York Courier.

Malcolm was recently suspended from all of his former official duties as minister of Mosque No. 7, in New York's Harlem area, when he made some allegedly derogatory remarks concerning the death of late President John F. Kennedy.

He was suspended by Elijah Muhammad, leader of the Muslims.

Robinson states he learned that "the newly-crowned heavyweight champ, Cassius Clay, is solidly in Malcolm's corner and would lend the influence of his nation-wide standing to any efforts of his friend to establish a cult of his own."

In Miami, several weeks ago, Clay's father told the press that his son was a member and, in fact, did attend a Muslim confab last fall in Philadelphia, Pa.

Robinson's article points out that the Muslims in New York are much more direct and militant.

"An insider said," Robinson wrote, "that Malcolm wants to participate more actively with other Negro groups in every phase of the current Negro revolution while Muhammad's inner circle, is satisfied with their present image."

Several "omens" are in Malcolm's possession, Robinson says, should the Muslim leader decide upon forming a splinter group.

Robinson also points out the fact that "business interests of the New York mosque have multiplied and prospered, creating employment for many Negroes."

Lewis Michaux, president of the African Nationalist Council in America, Robinson said, "wired Muhammad to give

careful judgement before he condemned Malcolm. He is regarded as being sympathetic to the latter and has supported him in the past."

The Missing Malcolm X

The absence of Muslim Eastern leader Malcolm X, and his New York followers, from the one-day national convention of the Temple of Islam in Chicago last week caused widespread comment.

Mr. Muhammad, the national leader of the cult, was there, and so was a vast conclave of his followers, but his brilliant young New York subordinate was not, and because he had been squelched by Mr. Muhammad, he could make no comment about it.

Does this mean that there is a split in the Black Muslim cohorts?

Does this mean that there are real differences of opinion on upcoming Muslim tactics and strategy?

Does this mean that Muhammad, jealous of his leadership, has sought to denigrate his able lieutenant, Malcolm X, and cut him down to size?

Certainly the younger man has logically made more sense in his statements and talks than has Mr. Muhammad, who seems to be in semi-retirement and less voluble than he was in the late 'Fifties.

The Muslim movement has ample precedents insofar as voluntary segregation of Negroes and their possible emigration to presumably more hospitable shores; and the bitterness engendered by the cries of apartheid arising from them has undermined the integrationists; that is to say the overwhelming majority of Negroes unwilling to follow the counsels of despair.

Muhammad is not as bitter and vitriolic as is his young disciple, and seems to be more resigned to coexistence with white America than Malcolm X, who continues (or did until muzzled) to urge a separate state for Negroes, on the order of the Navajo reservation.

He, too, will eventually come to see that American Negroes have no intention of leaving their native land nor departing from the white man's midst.

Nationalist Pleads For Malcolm X

Harlem's number one Black Nationalist this week asked the nation's number one Black Muslim to deal lightly with Muslim Minister Malcolm X.

The plea from Harlem was sent to Chicago by Louis Henri Michaux, President of the African Nationalists Council in America. He sent the message to Elijah Muhammad spiritual leader of the muslims, on the eve of the Black Muslim's convention scheduled to be attended by thousands.

Mindful of the fact that Malcolm X has been officially suspended and silenced by Muhammad since the death of President Kennedy, Michaux said in a telegram to Muhammad:

"As an admirer of your great work in bringing truth to the American 'so-called Negro race' I feel duty bound to wire you just before you mount the rostrum in Chicago at the Judgment Hall.

"Please remember 'He that ruling in the fear of God', read ruling in the fear of God', read Second Samuels, chapter 23, verse 3. Remember Jesus had to be brought before His accusers and judged by Pilate who washed his hands of the unjust accusation after he heard Jesus. Read Matthew, chapter 27, verses 19 & 24. The Apostle Paul who took up the cause of Jesus, had to be brought by his accusers before King Agrippa and after hearing Paul he found no fault in him. Read Acts, chapter 26."

"Minister Malcolm X will have to be judged before he can be condemned otherwise the condemnation will fall upon his accusers. All praise due to Allah who is just in all his judgments."

Unconfirmed reports state that Mr. Muhammad will lift his suspension ban on Malcolm X at the end of the Muslim's Chicago convention.

The AMSTERDAM NEWS revealed exclusively that Malcolm X was not eligible to attend the convention.

Post Mortem Puts Crowd In Corner

They came along just for the ride and couldn't believe it when they got their money's worth -- if that is possible at up to \$250 a head.

Startled stupefaction at the sudden, punchless ending gripped the Convention Hall. The vacuum of surprise almost drowned out the rising cries of joy in the Clay camp and the dismay in Liston's.

Not until 20 minutes after it was over did the crowd's mutterings flower into a full-fledged post mortem with scores of angry debates.

Inevitably, the charge of "Fix!" reverberated through the hall.

"Well, it wasn't on the level it sure was a great show," said Austin Burke, Miami Beach clothier and TV personality, who for once was wearing a coat that fit him. "But in the 5th round it looked like Liston should have killed him."

"Something smells rotten here," said Irving Segal, 512 Venetian Way, Miami Beach. "We need to get all the facts and a commission should be appointed to investigate it, including the supposed Vaseline episode in the 5th round when Cassius got grease in his eyes."

George Keyko of Westfield, N.J., also wondered why Liston let Clay keep him away in the fifth with a weakly flailing left arm when the champion had four inches more reach.

By this time, Clay had been spun away to his dressing room on a tide of delirious supporters and sweating police. A half-dozen Cassius Clay Fan Club girls in evening gowns swirled in the new champion's wake.

At the lobby door to greet the new champ stood lanky Malcolm X, the "prime minister" of the Black Muslim movement which made Clay its champion before anybody else did.

"Very, very pleased," said Malcolm with the wide grin of a press agent who has just been given carte blanche to the front page.

A Misunderstood Man?

Us Hate the White Man? Not So, Says Malcolm X

A Black Muslim's White Paper

Malcolm X, the Black Muslim, is a misunderstood man. He says so himself.

Muslims, he declares, do not hate the white man.

They merely have no appreciation of the "progress" between the races. "A man sticks a nine-inch blade in your back, then pulls it out six inches. Is that progress?" he asks.

Malcolm calls himself "because his ancestors were a commodity, no different than cattle," and he refuses to accept his "master's" last name. The Black Muslims, he says, "are not a cult," "not a sect," but a "religion."

He is in Miami now not for sermons, but for a vacation and the Sonny Liston-Cassius Clay prizefight. Cassius he likes.

Shuffling picture postcards of chimpanzees, Malcolm X plopped onto a sofa in the lobby of the Hampton House the other night and discussed his religion and the misunderstandings thereto appertaining.

The general repute of "the religion" is not good; particularly among some civil rights groups trying to improve the plight of the Negro.

To some, the Muslims offer all the help of a dangling snake, pitched to a man in a well grasping for a rope.

Malcolm X is a tall man, light of complexion, Northern in upbringing, 38 years old, near sighted and bespectacled, and highly articulate. Through the blessing of literacy, he is able to share the atrocities of mankind.

Frequently he is identified as the No. 2 man in the Muslim organization. "This is not true," he says. "Many have more authority than I do."

How many? "I don't know." How many Black Muslims are there? "I don't know," he repeats.

At present, he is in a peculiar position as any sort of a spokesman these days.

Last Dec. 4 Elijah Muhammad, self-styled messenger of Allah and Muslims' No. 1 prophet, ordered Malcolm X not to make any speeches because he "expressed joy" at the assassination of President Kennedy.

The New York Times had quoted Malcolm X as saying Kennedy "twiddled his thumbs" at the slaying of Ngo Dinh Diem, president of South Viet Nam. Kennedy "never foresaw that the chickens would come home to roost so soon," Malcolm X was quoted.

"Being an old farm boy myself, chickens coming home to roost never did make any sense to me," he made no mistake.

Malcolm now says he was misquoted. "I was speaking of America collectively as a climate of hate; not of Kennedy as an individual."

"Texas is a lynch state. The chickens have also come home to roost there."

Consequently, Malcolm X sometimes prefers to give interviews through an imaginary spokesman; namely, himself. This does not detract from what he says.

The leaders of the Negroes, he says, are preachers; the leaders of the white are industrial leaders.

"And the Negro leaders aren't intellectually equipped to run a shoeshine stand."

"The Negroes will never solve anything by begging the white man to solve everything for him."

Does the Black Muslim hate the white man?

"No," declares Malcolm, reshuffling his postcards. "But you do not tell the sheep to love the wolf. The Negro must first learn to love himself, not love thy enemy."

Negroes, he preaches, should "integrate" only by pooling their money, their technical abilities and operating their own business and

MUSLIM PRAISES CLAY

'X' Marks The Champ

Malcolm X, the temporarily mute voice of the militant Black Muslims, was in town today with a conviction that Cassius Clay already is the champ — win, lose or draw against Sonny Liston.

Malcolm X has been ordered by the Muslim's "prophet" and boss, Muhammed X, to keep his mouth shut until March 1 for intemperate remarks made after the assassination of President Kennedy.

But through an associate, the tall, 35-year-old "prime minister" of the Black Muslim movement definitely claimed Clay as the sect's very own.

"Cassius is the champion because he lives clean and he thinks clean. — he is one of the few Negroes we can look up to with adulation who is also accepted by the white community," Malcolm X said.

Cassius, after making friendly remarks about the Muslims, was warned by his advisers to cease and desist and he has promised to stay away from politics and religion in his valuable statements.

His father charged the Muslims were out to milk Cassius for all the publicity they could get.

Malcolm X, who is staying at the Hampton House on NW 27th Avenue, is known to have visited Clay's Miami Beach training quarters several times and pronounced the challenger to be "looking great."

Tomorrow, he indicated through an associate, he may go to see Liston work out but he takes an unenthusiastic view of the champion.

"Cassius doesn't drink, he doesn't smoke and he doesn't chase women," Malcolm X was quoted. "And today, he no longer has to make all those wisecracks to draw attention."

The sports writers at first built up Clay as "Jack Armstrong, the all-American boy," but when they began to speculate on his religious beliefs he late on his religious beliefs he turned into the villain," Malcolm said through his spokesman.

"It is a dangerous thing when a sports writer or columnist allows himself to fall into the trap of not being objective, and letting it discolor his report of the fight itself," he was quoted further.

Malcolm X was not commenting what other activities he might be up to in this area, such as recruiting members for the Muslims, who have a Temple here.

"The main part of a tree is the roots, and they remain underground," was the answer relayed from him.

The Muslims have claimed as many as a million members nationally but other sources trim them down to 10,000 hard-core members. They believe steadfastly that integration is not the answer.

"Equality, yes," Malcolm X was quoted. "But it must be within ourselves to make ourselves equal, and that cannot be forced by cramming us into schools with whites."

"If I make myself equal and a white man wants to associate with me, fine; if he doesn't that's fine, too."

"But when we try to teach that, the integration leaders say

we are teaching hate. They think we are troublemakers because we don't pretend that the problem is being solved, through forced integration.

"I am saying that the problem is getting worse, not better. And when warmer weather begins to appear in the North the problem is going to get worse in 1964 than it was in 1963."

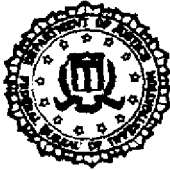

The March 16, 1964, edition of "The New York Times", a daily newspaper published in New York, New York, contained an article on page one concerning the school boycott in New York City planned for March 16, 1964, under the leadership of Reverend Milton A. Galamison, pastor of the Siloam Presbyterian Church, Brooklyn.

The article indicated that Reverend Galamison had received unsolicited support for the school boycott from Malcolm X and his Muslim Mosque, Inc. Malcolm X was the former Minister of Nation of Islam. (NOI) Mosque Number 7, New York City, who broke with the NOI on March 8, 1964, and formed the Muslim Mosque, Inc.

A characterization of the NOI and NOI Mosque Number 7, New York City are attached hereto and all sources therein have furnished reliable information in the past.

This pledge of support was given by Malcolm X while speaking at a rally on March 15, 1964, held at Milbank Center, 32 West 118th Street, New York City. Malcolm X stated that although he opposed integration, he favored the boycott in order to get better schools for Negro children. Reverend Galamison stated, according to the article, that he had not talked with Malcolm X, but if the latter adheres to non-violence, he will be welcome at the boycott.

The rally at which Malcolm X spoke on March 15, 1964, was sponsored by the Harlem Community Council on Housing (HCOH), which is conducting rent strikes in Harlem, and was attended by about 150 persons. Malcolm X was invited to speak by the leader of the HCOH, Jesse Gray, who said the rally was called to work up support for the school boycott.

Jesse Gray

Harlem Talks of Malcolm X in Scorn and in Praise

Walk the streets of Harlem today and listen to a people who have measured the words of Malcolm X and seem to want no part of him or his parttime "Rifle Club Army."

Yet, a century after the Emancipation Proclamation, the Negro community is still sorely tried and as a cresting tide of equality rolls onward they pause to listen.

What do they think of Malcolm X? How big is he? Is he taken seriously?

FOLLOWING UNKNOWN

Listen to a nationally prominent civil rights leader long known for his moderation. His name is withheld at his request.

"How big is Malcolm?" he asks. "Nobody knows. Has anyone asked Malcolm? Does he have 100, 200, 500 people? Nobody knows his following. All the millions of words published on Black Muslims, and not a single word on how many there are."

"He's a creature of the New York press," the leader said. "Whenever he says something, he gets headlines. But what's behind him—you never ask him that. His position as a mover in the great American scene has been given to him by the American press."

RIDING THE TIDE

"I have respect for his ability. He says he's dissatisfied with the old (Negro) leadership. That's nothing world-shaking. Malcolm has an old story to preach, and he appeals to people who are dissatisfied."

"The only difference is the times—we have a tide of rising expectancy. Nationalism is on the rise, reaching a point where it cannot be denied."

And what do the people on the street think of Malcolm X?

"There's nothing he stands for that I agree with," said Bill Cohen, owner of Jock's Place, a restaurant at 137th st. and 7th ave. He's not doing the Negro any good. I don't believe in extremists on either side."

"I am appalled and shocked," says Miss Hazel Sharper of Riverside dr., operator of a charm school. "But not surprised," she adds. "It's hate

propaganda, and I think it's very dangerous. I'm frightened. He's appealing to the base emotions of uneducated people."

"Some of his charges are true," said Dr. Lawrence Christmas, 35, a dentist of W. 81st st., Manhattan. "But his methods of trying to solve the problems—I don't advocate violence, or any form of racism."

PUZZLED BY ACTIONS

A Black Muslim and former brother of Malcolm in that know "why he's doing it. Malcolm is a brother—the basic movement says he doesn't feel of every black man. But no one is going to lead me other than Elijah Muhammad."

"His program's a little different than my way of thinking," said old-time baseball

I am calling you, Mr. MUHAMMAD, in connection with [redacted] stories on Mr. MALCOLM X's split with your organization and I shall be preparing [redacted] a [redacted] piece on the Muslim movement and on Mr. MALCOLM. I wondered what effect MALCOLM's decision has had on your movement with his new creation which is a "Black Nationalist Political Party".

None at all.

Why not sir?

Because my work is divine work and the people that believe in what I am teaching of the truth as they have learned and the one Lord of facts which I am teaching is resurrection of the dead of my people, mentally dead of my people. And one that accepts Allah and Islam you don't just walk away from the sect of Islam as a deviator or hypocrite and someone weep and cry over it. Nobody can say a thing about one broken away from Islam.

Repeat that about hypocrite.

Anyone that deviate from Islam are a hypocrite. They both is the same. There is no weeping and moaning of that person by the believer. We are glad to know a hypocrite. There is no weeping or moaning over no one that leaves Islam as a hypocrite or deviator or one that would not like to live under the guidance of God's messengers.

(asking MUHAMMAD something about support)

I don't need anyone to support me to deliver this message but Allah himself.

No, no. I say who will MALCOLM get his support from.

You will have to ask him.

It will not be Muslims, will it.

Not these that is following me.

Listening to Mr. MALCOLM on TV last night, he spoke in very reverent tones about you and his devotion to you and to the Muslim movement. How do you evaluate that sir?

Y:

If he spoke favorably, he had no other alternative. If he speaks favorably and he believes in a divine mission of Allah that he has given to me and the message that he has given to me to deliver to my people, I would remain with me. He would not go after other groups who have not accepted Islam.

The Muslims so far as I have studied this movement, have stood for non-violence. Am I correct about that?

M:

That's right.

In his interview [REDACTED] he speaks about the sect of coming violence. He says there can be no revolution without bloodshed. What is your comment on that sir?

M:

I have nothing to do with his ideas or anyone else's ideas. I am absolutely following the dictation of Allah to me. I have no such thing as guidance from MALCOLM or anyone else. I have nothing to do with anyone who wants to follow their own ideas. That is up to them and they are independent to do what they please.

There are some Negro leaders here in New York who cynically seek to think that this is not really a breakaway by MALCOLM from the Muslims but secretly there is a new strategy being devised to set up a political action group. Is that true?

M:

I don't know whether it is true or not. MALCOLM nor anyone else of the group leaders have had anything to say to me.

Did he discuss this with you when he came to see you in December in Phoenix.

M:

No.

What did you discuss then?

That I am not saying but this was not under discussion.

Well sir, what is finally your feeling about what MALCOLM has done so independently?

I am absolutely surprised at the man.

Why are you surprised, sir? He was boxed up for 90 days.

He didn't have 90 days. He had an indefinite suspension.

And why are you absolutely surprised?

I am absolutely surprised at a man who has represented himself publicly here for several years.

At this point the conversation was inaudible and had to be picked up as follows:

The Civil Rightest Movement.

That's right.

You realize that MALCOLM on the TV and his interviews with newspaper people is very emphatic to the effect that he was still a Muslim, still believed in the NOI, and was still devoted to Mr. MUHAMMAD. You realize he is still saying that here in New York?

No, I don't. I have not heard him say so myself.

He said that to me last night. He also said it on TV here.

More belief counts for nothing in Islam unless carried into practice.

And you feel he isn't doing that?

He is not following me. Well, I heard him on TV yesterday in Phoenix. He was referring to preparing our people to arm themselves and fight and I think this is silly of him to say such things.

Why?

M:

Because where are they going to get their guns and arms?

Would you be in favor if they quit the guns and arms?

M:

I am in favor of what Allah has given to me and what I have been teaching for 33 years.

What is that, sir?

M:

Just what I have been teaching all over the country. That my followers do not--that we carry no arms and we don't seek to win victory with arms. We only follow what Allah has revealed and that is be ourself and do nothing to no one that we would not have done to us.

That's the Golden Rule isn't it?

M:

Yes. We carry it in practice.

You don't call it the Golden Rule.

M:

We trust to anyone to name it, to put the gold there but I know it is a standard universal rule because that is the best religion. Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.

Well, Mr. MUHAMMAD, I just clarified a great deal in my own mind, if I go about re-evaluating the research I have been putting together this past week. I thank you very much for the extremely rewarding interview.

M:

You welcome.

You know that I have made some effort. I had booked my ticket to Phoenix back in December hoping to have an audience with you, but I was told by your people out there that your telephone had been disconnected and that you were not available. But I hope that one of these times that it will be possible for me to come and talk with you.

Q: Yes [redacted] I would like to say these last few words. This particular work of reforming the so-called Negro for him to take his place in society cannot be done by anyone that have not God on his side. It is absolutely a divine work guided divinely.

You don't think that MALCOLM has that.

He did have it as long as he was with me, but otherwise he does not have it.

And, therefore, you think that the so-called Negroes will follow him.

A: I think there are lots of religious scholars that these people will have to be completely reformed and the talk that I heard Brother MALCOLM say on the TV in Phoenix yesterday it not the way to reform them.

[redacted] was in contact with [redacted] and told [redacted] had received a phone call from MALCOLM X and he was wanting to have a conference.

[redacted] on 3/11/64 at 12 noon and, if not, it will have effect on the whole nation. [redacted] that MALCOLM was spreading gossip concerning the family, saying the reason they don't bring him up is that they don't want anything to get in front of the believers. [redacted] that MALCOLM is also saying that the headquarters is out of line and that the messenger is not getting his mail, etc.

[redacted] that MALCOLM has two "little black flunkies". [redacted] instructed [redacted] to make sure those flunkies don't come into the mosque. [redacted] told [redacted] to just hold tight adding that [redacted] doesn't hear anything [redacted] to do nothing. Elijah Muhammad's Mao

There is a crack in that mirror image of the white supremacists, the Black Muslim movement. Malcolm X, the most dynamic of the lieutenants of the Messenger of Allah, Elijah Muhammad, is setting up his own shop. He asserts that the present Muslims should remain "in the Nation of Islam, under the spiritual guidance of the Hon. Elijah Muhammad," but that he intends to work among those who are now non-Muslims, inculcating black nationalism and converting Negroes "from non-violence to active self-defense."

This sounds ominous. The Black Muslims have taught frank race hatred (which they say, with much justification, they have learned from the whites); they have set up their own schools and boycotted white institutions. But they have observed the laws and they have not taken part in demonstrations for civil rights. This is because they do not believe Negroes will ever be granted their rights in a white country—they want their own nation. Either this would be a section of the United States or, as some of their more extreme spokesmen have

hinted the whole country whites shipped back to Europe.

This is a goal that is both nebulous and distant. It is possible that Malcolm X finds it too vague and too remote, that he is seeking a shorter cut to power. He was suspended by Elijah Muhammad, allegedly for gloating over President Kennedy's assassination. There is evidence, however, that a subterranean contest for the succession is under way among the Black Muslims and that Malcolm X's departure is a part of it.

In any case, Malcolm X stands for intensified Muslim militancy in a movement that is theoretically militant but practically devoted to building up its own internal strength. He is, in a way, the Mao Tse-tung of the group, and like Mao he is at the outset avoiding a head-on clash with the head man. Whether he fires the Muslims with his spirit, or whether he infects other civil rights groups, the prospect is dangerous. The potentials of a serious clash are increasing—the need for genuine statesmanship among responsible leaders must match the pace of events.

MUHAMMAD CLAIMS CHAMP IS MEMBER

Dan Parker Bared Clay's Muslim Link

By Jack Mahon

The revelation by Elijah Muhammad, leader of the Black Muslims, that heavy-weight champion Cassius Clay is a member of the Negro racist extremist organization confirms repeated exclusive stories to that effect by N.Y. Journal-American sports columnist, Dan Parker.

Parker first revealed on July 6, 1963 that Cassius wore the Black Muslim pin, attended the sect's meetings in Chicago and was outspoken in defense of the anti-white leaders' philosophy.

ATTENDED RALLY

Parker quoted Clay as stating, in Chicago:

"I'm for the Black Muslims. I've looked real hard at every organization that's for the black man. This is the greatest. The Black Muslims are the sweetest thing next to God."

On Nov. 20, 1963, in the Journal-American, Parker wrote that on Sept. 29 the new champion had attended another Muslim rally in Philadelphia. Though denying he was a member, Clay constantly applauded leader Muhammad who called the American people "the most evil on earth."

Two months later Cassius, in the company of three burly, known Muslims, popped off on their philosophy in a visit to a Madison ave. business office. Describing some recent Muslim meetings, young Clay said:

"I've just spent four hours with God. He's going to fix it so's I won't have to serve in the Army."

HEW TO MEETING

To the inevitable question, "Are you a Black Muslim?" Clay has issued evasive statements.

He next made the headlines

late in January when he took an unauthorized flight from his Florida training camp to attend a New York Muslim meeting.

In Florida, uncautious Clay admitted he was a "racist" and that he would tell his true feelings toward the Muslims "If someone gives me about two hours TV time."

'RUINED MY BOYS'

On advice of his strategists Clay went into a shell on the Muslim subject but his dad, Cassius Sr., early in February, stated in Florida that Cassius and his younger brother, Rudolph Valentino Clay, were indeed members of the radical Negro sect.

Mr. Clay Sr. insisted the Muslims got after Cassius and enrolled him as a member right after Clay had won the Olympic light-heavyweight title in 1960 at Rome.

"They hammered at him and

brainwashed him ever since," said Mr. Clay. They've ruined my two boys. The Black Muslims should be run out of town. Cassius and his brother's association with Malcolm X, one of the Black Muslim leaders in the East, made me so mad I threatened to whip the three of them."

The father allegedly told one interviewer that the Black Muslims tell the boys "to hate all white people; to hate women and to hate their mother."

The latest chapter in the Clay-Black Muslim quiz program took place in Miami yesterday where the new champion was quoted as follows on the subject:

WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

"I go to a Black Muslim meeting and what do I see? I see there is no smoking and no drinking and their women wear dresses down to the floor. I come out and you tell

me I shouldn't go in there. Well there must be something in there . . ."

"I know the truth and I don't have to be what you want me to be."

In reply to the inevitable "are you a card-carrying member of the Black Muslims," Clay said:

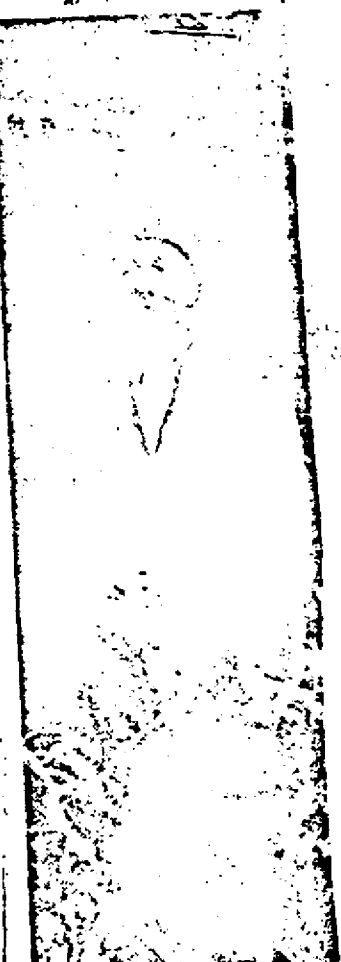
"Card-carrying, what does that mean?"

The champion then heatedly emphasized "it was human nature to want to be with your own kind." He defended Malcolm X, a top Muslim with whom he has fraternized all over the U.S.

Cassius said he had attended a "private victory party with some friends," following his kayo victory Tuesday night.

It was learned the party was held at Hampton House, a Miami hotel.

One of the guests was Malcolm.

It is in the paper that he had a new organization which he, with [redacted] money, he's gonna depend on from some new organization he's forming with [redacted]. And the way I understand it, it is a Import Export thing which MALCOLM is some kind of leader of it. I think MALCOLM wanted to meet these Africans actually to start Import Export plus to get the publicity of taking his picture with all the different people.

M: He have many little things going on up his sleeve. That don't make any difference.

MUHAMMAD expressed appreciation for [redacted] calling him and stated that he had not restored MALCOLM back. He added that MALCOLM

had been over-stepping his bounds all the time.

b7c [redacted] had heard on the radio today that the Army turned down [redacted] because [redacted] was mentally unbalanced.

b7c [redacted] then spoke with ELIJAH MUHAMMAD and told him [redacted] had just been looking at articles and it looks like that man (probably MALCOLM) was courting [redacted] just for publicity and would like to hold [redacted] for [redacted] risk that [redacted] caught.

Showdown Set Feb. 26

Chicago to be scene of convention

(Special to the AFRO)

CHICAGO — February 26 is expected to be the tell-tale date as to whether there's any substance to reports that bitter fighting among themselves has developed into a national split of the Black Muslims movement.

The 26th is the date the annual Muslim Convention is slated for Chicago.

And close observers believe this is when and where factional showdowns will be staged, if one of the alleged faction leaders, Malcolm X, is allowed to attend.

DEPENDING ON one's locale, reasons vary for the reported power struggle between Elijah Muhammad, the Muslim leader, and Malcolm X, the sect's No. 2 man, who is currently under suspension.

Take Washington and Chicago, for instance.

In Washington, the story goes that a split has erupted because the articulate Malcolm X was muzzled for making "wise-cracks" about the assassination of President Kennedy.

In Chicago the prevailing reason — from an "inside" man — is that Muslim unity has been shattered by jealousy stemming from Malcolm X's "fantastic" financial success in New York as compared to a business failure in Chicago.

WHEN QUESTIONED concerning the alleged split, John Ali — the Muslims' national secretary in Chicago — debunked the reports as "garbage" and linked them to a scheme of the "white power structure" to halt progress toward colored advancement.

"There is a strong movement underfoot to bring disunity to the colored movement," charged Ali, adding:

"The white power structure has been maneuvering to split up groups striving for the betterment of the colored man."

Back on the East Coast, Minister Lonnie 3X, head of Muhammad's Mosque No. 4 in Washington, gave a terse

"No comment" when approached concerning the matter

THE CHICAGO "inside" man, through his recent letter to a Chicago newspaper, has assumed the role as the city's "know-it-all."

In his letter, the inside man revealed that Malcolm X is a "firebrand revolutionary" who is feared in higher councils of the organization because he is hard to control.

The letter writer said that "Muhammad's family, controlling most of the organization's business, wants to 'preserve' the family position of wealth, and has grown 'conservative' with the fear that Malcolm's 'extreme extremism' will rock their luxurious boat and force them to seek employment like the rest of the Muslims."

ALTHOUGH MALCOLM X has been suspended since last December by Muhammad, he has remained in the public eye through his association with fighter Cassius Clay whose father has confirmed he (Clay) is a Muslim.

Whether Malcolm's public appearances with Clay was intended for "political" purpose to favor the No. 2 man is also not known.

TO SUBSTANTIATE his point that the Muslims are united, Ali said "we are brothers, having one common goal."

The common goal of the Muslims, according to Ali, is to acquire a Muslim-controlled state separated from the "bigotry of America."

Whether the Muslims have "one common goal" could very well be decided at the Feb. 26 meeting.

The publication above set out in full and interview with subject that appeared in the May 1963 edition of "Playboy" magazine. The publication noted that they do not make a practise of quoting from a magazine such as "Playboy", but they had found the article interesting and important.

The article in question has already been reviewed by the NYO, and pertinent parts thereof have been reported in captioned matter and also in the main NOI case, NY 105-7809. Consequently, this publication is not being retained and will be destroyed.

Bar Malcolm X From Muslims' Chi Convention

Muslim Head Is Silent

Minister Malcolm X, fiery Black Muslim leader, will be unable to attend the Muslims annual convention in Chicago on Feb. 26 because of his suspension, a spokesman for Elijah Muhammad told the Amsterdam News this week.

"We expect some 2,000 delegates and all Muslims who are in good standing can attend. Since Malcolm is still under suspension, he is not in good standing," John Ali, national secretary of the Muhammad's Mosque, told this newspaper Tuesday from Chicago.

Muhammad was said to be in Phoenix, Ariz., but would return to Chicago prior to the convention.

Ali said that Malcolm's suspension had been for "an indefinite period," and he doubted that it would be lifted before the convention. He asserted that the sole decision is up to Muhammad, and it is not something that is decided upon by the members or would be brought up at the convention.

Strongest

Malcolm considered one of the strongest and most powerful of the Black Muslim religious leaders, still remained silent in New

York on his suspension, and continued to reject all public and religious appearances. Muhammad suspended him in early December for remarks critical of the late President Kennedy during the national period of mourning. He is now in his third month of suspension from Muslim activities.

Since the suspension, visiting religious leaders have taken over Malcolm's duties at Muhammad's Mosque No. 7 here. A large delegation of New Yorkers have chartered planes to fly to the one-day convention.

Malcolm X Barred From Convention?

Reports circulated today that Malcolm X, leader of New York's Black Muslims, will be barred from the sect's national convention in Chicago Feb. 26 because of his disciplinary suspension.

Elijah Muhammad, the sect's national leader, suspended Malcolm early in December for his "chickens coming home to roost" comment on President Kennedy's death.

According to Muslim sources, the suspension was for "an indefinite period."

"All Muslims who are in good standing can attend," a Muslim source added. The convention is expected to draw about 2,000 delegates.

Malcolm X was not immediately available for comment.

There also were published reports that local Muslims have chartered planes to travel to Chicago for protests against Malcolm's exclusion.

[redacted] just advised [redacted] that MALCOLM was having a meeting now with some photographers. [redacted] stated that all of the papers have it. [redacted] was upset but [redacted] told [redacted] "It's not going to do anything." [redacted] replied, "No, we've had worse cause we could really play if we wanted to you know."

b7c [redacted] attempted to contact [redacted] in Phoenix, Arizona but he was out. [redacted] instructed that he be told that the information "we" sent to him Sunday is now being printed in the paper and "we" will be putting letters in the paper against this.

2/11/64

b7c [redacted] was in contact with ELIJAH MUHAMMAD regarding "this thing that came out in the paper". [redacted] stated that we have a letter here to our paper that we are going to put in that will stop all that kind of talk. ELIJAH asked if he was referring to the article [redacted] sent him by [redacted] [redacted] replied it had gone to [redacted] [redacted] stated that

b7c [redacted] called New York and all the brothers there said it was all up there in all the papers and that this week end "the man" told us to look out for it because it would be in most of the papers.

b7c [redacted] asked MUHAMMAD if he wanted to hear the letter and MUHAMMAD stated he did. [redacted] asked if ELIJAH has the letter that [redacted] sent him to which ELIJAH replied he did and asked if it was the same one. [redacted] replied it was not, adding that the letter ELIJAH has is the one that has been in the paper already.

b7c [redacted] subsequently read this letter which was as follows:

"Dear Editor:

I have been a reader of your paper for many months. However, I am not a Muslim and don't go along with your saying that all white people are devils. There are a few good ones. Mr. Elijah Muhammad is doing many things to aid our people and he has a fine program. I was very much surprised to see how Minister Malcolm responded to his being suspended by your leader. Particularly since Malcolm had mouthed (phonetic) how Muhammad's word was law for him and other black Muslims. Evidently your teachings is not as strong as you think it is. Because Malcolm acted the way other Negroes, so called as you call us, would act. As soon as Malcolm got slapped on the wrist he begins to cry in an attempt to drive other people into his dilemma with him. Frankly, I'm glad your leader reprimanded Malcolm for making reckless statements on a dead man. Our problem is with the living. Now Malcolm ceased to discredit members of Mr. Muhammad's family and even discredit Mr. Muhammad himself. I thought Islam was a more solidifying force. Evidently Malcolm must not have been a strong believer, but just wanted to join the benefit of being self-

exalted, all ways being in the public. When I use to read about Malcolm flying about the country at the expense of Mr. Muhammad and his followers, I wondered why you did not keep a better control of him. I know of many reckless statements he made before President Kennedy's death. I'm always suspect of anyone wanting to go before the cameras unless they are actors or models, as I know acting and models profession. I have admired the way Mr. Muhammad has kept himself aloft from phase making and image making newspaper and TV media. Frankly, I would say that Malcolm is a victim of the monster which created him as the public figure, the press, because if Malcolm followed Mr. Muhammad even Malcolm by his own admission would be speaking today as the Muslims' spokesman."

ELIJAH stated that this one is similar to the one he received. [redacted] stated it was not but added it was about the same in some parts. ELIJAH stated that one thing that can be put in the paper is "regardless of what is put in the paper about Malcolm or any other Muslim, there is no discord in the Nation of Islam". [redacted] stated "OK". ELIJAH stated that whatever is printed is done to try to show to the public that there is discord in the NOI because Mr. Muhammad suspended Malcolm for an indefinite time. ELIJAH continued that they will find themselves disappointed because there is no discord among us. He stated we don't take Malcolm for no enemy nor are we enemies of him. ELIJAH instructed that they should say, "We believe Malcolm is a believer as he has always preached that he was." He continued they should also print that it is not true that MALCOLM is trying to ruin or run Muhammad's family and we don't believe Malcolm is against us or that we are against Malcolm. [redacted] stated "OK".

[redacted] and ELIJAH then spoke about the letter [redacted] had sent to ELIJAH on Sunday and it was indicated that whoever was "sending this letter" was sending it around to everybody. [redacted]

b7c [redacted] was talking with [redacted] of the "Sentinel" and both of them think the letter was sent by Minister MALCOLM. ELIJAH replied that the words sounded like it but he asked why they would print something when they didn't know who the sender was.

[redacted] then stated that "See Minister MALCOLM has been having secret meetings with, like this picture of him and [redacted] that was sent out, was taken by another brother from California and Brother MALCOLM, he gave it to a photographer in New York and had it sent out to the papers itself." ELIJAH stated [redacted] called yesterday after MALCOLM had called and he, ELIJAH, would not talk with [redacted] "Well, this [redacted] that's MALCOLM's man who he put [redacted] to make favors and friends for him." ELIJAH replied, "Yes, and I told [redacted] we would not have nothing to do with [redacted] I hadn't called [redacted] but I had called them all to stay away from there. I called [redacted] Saturday and I told [redacted] that to keep everybody away from there and if they wanted to carry [redacted] in food out there that you alone told it to him. But no one else go with you. So [redacted] would see that it was done. I think they must have gotten wind of this and so [redacted] called and [redacted] told me that [redacted] wanted to know for sure that if this means [redacted] too, to stay away [redacted] because if it did [redacted] would do so. But I told [redacted] no, not since you are [redacted] I says. . . I say you have to be there."

b7c ELIJAH stated he told [redacted] to go ahead with the lawyer, [redacted] stated, "Well, [redacted] one [redacted] that MALCOLM has put in down there to make favor [redacted] for him." ELIJAH replied, "Yeah, well that's all right, that's all right." He continued that MALCOLM wrote out here to him last week and told him to tell the Muslims not to go [redacted] after he had been [redacted] himself. He stated MALCOLM told him it looked pretty bad with all of them going down there. ELIJAH stated it has changed some since he called down there. ELIJAH instructed [redacted] publish the letter in "our paper" and in also "The Defender". ELIJAH instructed [redacted] tell the paper that, "We don't know what Mr. Muhammad will do or when he will put him (MALCOLM) back but it's indefinite, may put him back tomorrow, or back next month,

that we don't know and there is no discord whatsoever between MUHAMMAD and MALCOLM. Also we believe Minister MALCOLM is a Muslim." [REDACTED] said, "OK".

As stated earlier there are enclosed herewith for the Bureau and for New York two copies and one copy respectively of the article that appeared in the "Chicago Sun Times" on 2/10/64 and the article that appeared in the "Chicago Daily Defender" on 2/11/64.

New York and Phoenix should alert their sources in this regard and any further developments regarding dissension between MALCOLM LITTLE and ELIJAH MUHAMMAD or activities concerning the NOI connections [REDACTED] should be furnished to the Bureau and interested offices in appropriate communication.

Chicago did not include the above in a letterhead memorandum as the source involved could be readily identified and in view of the lack of intelligent conversation which was set forth from this installation.

not be done and that it is not the Muslim way of life. He said they do not worship fighting and sometimes the fighters lose their lives. ELIJAH stated there are many tricks that can be played in something like this. He said it was not good for anyone who professes Islam to be seen around there. He stated there was too much publicity about this and he has been reading about it here and it was getting in all the newspapers. ELIJAH stated there was too much talk going on that they are hanging around hoping to get something out of this fight. He said it was not good for them. He said to warn the Muslims whoever they are that he, ELIJAH, said for them to stay away.

ELIJAH said to tell [REDACTED] ELIJAH, didn't want to offend [REDACTED] but this will not serve to any good for [REDACTED] ELIJAH commented if [REDACTED] wants to eat the Muslim food and someone is there to cook then [REDACTED] should take it personally. [REDACTED]

ELIJAH commented he was so sorry MALCOLM went down there, that he, ELIJAH, did not know what to do. ELIJAH said they did not want to have their name in it.

[REDACTED] had been getting the papers and pays for them [REDACTED] is up-to-date but [REDACTED] wanted to get another 1,000 copies. [REDACTED] had asked for them but the secretary must have overlooked [REDACTED] and maybe [REDACTED] should send the money in advance. ELIJAH said that place (Miami) should take many papers and should sell 50,000 copies. [REDACTED] said they could and ELIJAH said he would advise the secretary about it.

The above information is not being put in a letter-head memorandum based on the sensitive nature of the source involved and the Phoenix Division feels the data should not be disseminated outside the Bureau.
