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

On February 12, 1965, the Free Speech Movement (FSM) held a rally on the steps of Sproul Hall, University of California. MARIO SAVIO spoke at this rally giveing the history of events of the FSM and claimed that the FSM's objectives had been realized. SAVIO announced that this would be the last FSM rally.

SAVIO stated the 800 people who helped in achieving the objectives were being treated as criminal offenders.

He advocated dismissal of charges against the students who were defendants.

JACK WEINBERG also spoke at this rally claiming that he wanted to expose the ill treatment being given to the arrested students by the court. WEINBERG advocated dismissal of charges against the FSM defendants.

Near the close of the rally, SAVIO, WEINBERG, and others complained about the lack of federal action in Selma, Alabama in connection with Negro voter registration. WEINBERG also registered a protest against U. S. policy in Viet Nam.

The members of the audience were then invited to travel to San Francisco, California, to the Federal Office Building to protest U. S. policy in Viet Nam.

SAVIO announced that car pools would be available at Bancroft Way and Dana Street, Berkeley, California, at 4:00 PM to transport demonstrators to the Federal Office Building, San Francisco.

On February 15, 1965, the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) and the Students Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) held a noon rally on the steps of Sproul Hall, University of California, in an effort to gain support for a mass demonstration on Friday evening in Oakland, California, protesting racial discrimination in Oakland.

Approximately 1,000 - 1,200 people stood in the Sproul Hall Plaza to hear MARIO SAVIO and LARRY KNOP speak regarding alleged racial discrimination in Oakland and spoke of the "inaction of the federal government in Selma, Alabama."

SAVIO and KNOP called for a sit-in in the office of the United States Attorney CECIL F. POOLE at the Federal Office Building, San Francisco. SAVIO stated that the "FBI does nothing except take notes and the agents have become a group of stenographers."

SAVIO announced that cars would leave the campus area to travel to the Federal Office Building at San Francisco beginning at 2:00 PM. He stated that the group would visit CECIL F. POOLE in the Federal Building and ask him to:

- 1. Insure federal protection for demonstrators at the Jack London Square next Friday night.
- 2. Request the FBI to investigate the arrest of five CORE members in last Friday's demonstrations in Oakland.
- 3. To protest the government's failure to aid voter registration in Selma, Alabama.

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SAVIO claimed that Title 18, United States Code, made it possible for the Special Agents of the FBI to make arrests without a warrant when they observed a violation of the law.

SAVIO claimed that this action was not taken in Selma, Alabama, because the FBI Director J. EDGAR HOOVER refuses to protect constitutional rights.

JACK WEINBERG then took the microphone and told the assembled group that the Oakland Police Department did everything possible to harrass demonstrators noting that he, WEINBERG, received two tickets last Friday night. WEINBERG urged everyone present to join the demonstration at the Federal Building immediately following the rally.


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

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On February 11, 1965, a rally was observed by the writer at the University of California ASUC Student Plaza from about 12:00 noon to 1:10 PM. This rally was for the purpose of hearing PAUL GOODMAN, Sociologist, speak on the "free university."

GOODMAN generally advocated abolishment of all laws and restraint of campus activities. At the close of the speech, STEPHEN WEISSMAN representing the Graduate Coordinating Council and DENNIS MOSGOFIAN representing the May Second Movement made special pleas for "as many as possible" to join in a march to Selective Service Headquarters, 2199 Bancroft Way, Berkeley.

· MOSGOFIAN stated the purpose of the march was to oppose current U. S. policy in Viet Nam.

Approximately 250 - 300 persons were observed as they assembled at the Telegraph Avenue entrance to the University of California at approximately 1:15 PM. The group then paraded west on Bancroft Way to the Selective Service Headquarters, stopped briefly and then proceeded west on Bancroft Way to Shattuck Avenue (main street in downtown Berkeley.)

The demonstrators paraded four abreast in the middle of Shattuck Avenue north to Center Street, made a U-turn and went south on Shattuck Avenue to Bancroft Way, east on Bancroft Way to Fulton Street, where they staged a protest demonstration on the sidewalk at the corner of Bancroft Way and Fulton Street in front of the Selective Service Headquarters until approximately 2:10.PM.

MOSGOFIAN was observed to mount a street-side mail box and address the demonstrators requesting that all males of draft age sign a declaration which states ALL INFORMATION CONTAINED



On February 11, 1965, at about 2:00 p.m., a demonstration against U. S. policy in Viet Nam was held at Selective Service Headquarters, Local Boards 46-48, 2199 Bancroft Way, Berkeley, California. This demonstration was sponsored by the May 2nd Movement.

, Local Boards 46-48, advised on February 12, 1965, that DENIS MOSGOFIAN and EDWARD ROSENFELD entered the Selective Service Headquarters during the February 11, 1965, demonstration and presented a large scroll signed by 94 demonstrators. The scroll was a roll of white shelf paper with the following written in bold blue letters:

"A Declaration

"We, the undersigned are young Americans of draft age.

"We are opposed to United States military intervention in the war in South Viet Nam. United States participation in that war is for suppression of the Vietnamese struggle for self-determination and national independence.

"WE HEREWITH, STATE OUR REFUSAL TO FIGHT AGAINST THE PEOPLE OF VIETNAM."



"They defied the law and invited arrest. The prosecution asks each be found guilty on all counts," Coakley said.

The students are charged with trespass, failure to disperse from an unlawful assembly and resisting arrest.

Buxbaum replied that the prosecution had insufficient evidence to prove its case.

"The evidence will show that the conduct was motivated by high principles; negating criminality," he said.

Buxbaum said that the conduct of the students was a petition against grievanges and was therefore protected by the Constitution. He said trat the statutes under which they were tried were of doubtful legality.



Inquiries into Savio's absence from today's court session in the trial of University of California Free Speech Movement demonstrators revealed Savio was at the U.S. Army Induction Center in Oakland.

Defense attorneys said Savio had been excused from courtitoday because he had been ordered by his draft board to show up for a pre-induction physical.

Like other 22-year-old single men who are not in school and not employed in industries vital to U.S. defense, Savio is a likely candidate for the draft.

Generally, if a man takes a pre-induction physical examination and is found physically acceptable by the Army, he then is eligible for the next draft call unless he qualifies for a deferment.



Mario Savio, firebrand of the University of California's Berkeley campus, yesterday told a student rally that he is quitting the Free Speech to protest disciplinary meas-Movement.

"Good-by and good luck," he told about 1500 students gathered in front of Sproul Hall, where he led the student sit-in last December 3.

Savio's announcement took the students completely by surprise.

When the meaning of what he had said became clear, applause for him steadily built up to an ovation. Savio said he was quitting because he ny longer could "keep up with the undemocratic ly ruled out another mass sit-

In a bitter prelude to his announcement, Savio said he was fed up with the university's violation of "the spirit of December 8"-the day the Academic Senate voted to support much of the FSM's program for freedom of political advocacy.

He also expressed disappointment with a growing gap between the leadership of the FSM and the students themselves.

"Any kind of insurrection institutional allainst tyranny . . . if not organized by you (the students) is not worth organizing," he told the crowd.

The 22-year-old former philosophy major has not been a regular student at Berkeley since last fall's crisis.

Savio said he had been thinking about quitting "for a long time" and there is "absolutely no chance" he will reconsider.

"This wasn't a Kerr-type resignation," he said.

University President Clark Kerr announced his own resignation last month and then withdrew it after receiving a vote of confidence from the Board of Regents.

Savio prefaced his resignation with another harangue against the Regents "and their catalogue of obscenities.

The ostensible purpose of the rally was to discuss what action the FSM should take ures meted out against four students who bandied about a four-letter word on campus.



He explained his fears that the FSM was becoming undemocratic.

Savio waved to the stunned crowd and slowly walked, perspiring, to a tree by the side of the Sproul Hall steps and sat down.

Someone shouted, "He can't mean it." But Savio said he did.

He made it clear that his decision was final and irrevocable. He felt that as a non-student he should not have to bear the burden of organizing further student protests.

Savio said he felt the FSM should be reorganized on more democratic lines.

A bitter split in the FSM ranks preceded Savio's with drawal. Most of Savio's top lieutenants in the movement last semester have since dropped out to concentrate on their studies, and one of the principal leaders, Art Goldberg, has been dismissed from the campus

For the information of the Mansas City Division, San Francisco, on October 29, 1964, advised the New York Office that on October 1 and 2, 1964, massive student demonstrations were staged at the University of California, Berkeley, in protest of University policies in connection with off-campus political activity, solicitation of funds for off-campus organizations and solicitation of membership for off-campus groups. These demonstrations reached massive proportions and centered around a "captured" police vehicle with a prisoner inside the automobile. MARIO SAVIO was the leader and main spokesman for this group of students who used the top of the police vehicle for a speaking platform. 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History Professor Kenneth Stampp told the crowd "The report was a disappointment, and reflects one of the problems that confront state universities."

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(Editor's note: The following is the text of a letter by Mario Savio received late yesterday by the Daily Califorinan. Tuesday Savio stepped down as one of the leaders of the Free Speech Movement.)

To the Berkeley Students and Faculty:

I had believed that I said yesterday only one thing which could have been misinterpreted. My saying "goodbye" could have been taken to mean that I would not re-enroll or that I was leaving the city.

I don't feel bound to either course of action. For now, I am ceasing all direct participation in the movement for student rights on this campus—a fortiori in any role of leadership.

This does not preclude, however, my participation in campus political activity at sometime in the future.

People of some influence and of varying degrees of responsibility liave tried to find reasons behind reasons for my "resignation."

The Examiner suggests a change in my draft status; Mr. J. A. R. Editor, of the Daily Californian hints that I was part of a discredited faction which was urging "direct action," but which has now been defeated by the forces of moderation both in the leadership and on campus generally; the Gazette has it that I was part of a discredited faction which was urging moderation, but which has now been defeated by the forces for "direct action."

Oh well.

The reasons I gave in what I still believe was a relatively clear speech may well be too simple for some journalistic minds to comprehend:

The campus must organize itself.

If the student rights movement at Berkeley must inevitably fail without my leadership, then it were best that it fail.

I should do a great disservice to our community if I were to make myself indispensable; and in recent weeks I have become very nearly indispensable.

But I am confident that this community is entirely capable of erganizing itself into the powerful trades union form of organization which this "knowledge factory" calls for.

Concerning the recent cases of alleged obscenity: despite the attempts to label us "degenerates" this semester—remember, it was "anarchists" last fall—the truth is that even members of the Faculty Forum now recognize the importance of our demand for due process in these cases and share our shock at punishments which seem to bear







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Savio Says Letters Cifted From Files

By TOM KNOX

Former FSM leader Mario Savio yesterday testified two letters were taken from the files of University President Clark Kent last October without Kerrs knowledge.

The letters were taken from the files "by someone in President Kerr's office," Savio admitted under cross-examination. He said he could not remember the person's name.

Published in part in the Nov. 5 "Daily Californian," the two letters were addressed to the Regents and dealt with campus regulations on political activity.

One of the letters, bearing the typewritten name of Kerr, but not signed by him, proposed a change in rules to prohibit on-campus retruitment of students for unlawful off-campus action.

Kerr immediately repudiated the contents of the letter adding it was never submitted to the Regents.

In spite of the repudiation, the letter became the basis of FSM charges of administration bad faith.

Deputy District Attorney Lowell Jensen's cross-examination also delved into the source of FSM funds.

Savio testified money came "from funds collected at tables wherever political rules allowed tables to be set up. Also it railies."

Savio also told the court no attorneys were "retained" by the FSM prior to the Dec. 3 sit-in at Sproul Hall. Several lawyers did act as "advisors" however, he added.

Savio will resume the stand in cross-examination tomorrow.



MARIO SAVIO appeared at the Berkeley Resident Agency at 4:05 pm in connection with the investigation of an extortion case wherein SAVIO is the victim of threatening letters. SAVIO was accompanied by ALEXANDER HOFFMAN. SAVIO made a remark when entering the Resident Agency, "So this is the Federal Bureau of Inquisition". SAVIO was immediately advised that he was in the Berkeley Resident Agency of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and interviewing Agents identified themselves as Special Agents of the FBI. SAVIO was advised that the FBI is in possession of letters which threaten him with physical harm and that the interview was in connection with this extortion case.

SAVIO was asked why Mr. HOFFMAN accompanied him and SAVIO stated "ALEX is just a friend". After asking HOFFMAN if he was representing SAVIO as an attorney, HOFFMAN stated he was "here to help MARIO". After three direct questions regarding the status of HOFFMAN and his reason for accompanying SAVIO, HOFFMAN stated "I am MARIO's attorney and I am here to advise or help him in any way I can".

A careful explanation was made to SAVIO and HOFFMAN regarding FBI jursidiction and responsibility in the extortion matter.

SAVIO was then advised that the FBI could not vouch for the confidential matter of information if a third party is present and therefore, preferred not to discuss this matter in the presence of Mr. HOFFMAN.

SAVIO stated he would "trust ALEX with his life" and was willing to tell HOFFMAN anything. SAVIO was advised that this was his privilege, however, we preferred not to discuss the matter in the presence of a third party.

SAVIO declined to cooperate in the interview and was intent on bringing extraneous matters into the interview. SAVIO opined that he could furnish no information. HOFFMAN stated to SAVIO "I think we should respect the policy presented by these Agents and terminate the interview". The interviewing Agents agreed with this conclusion and respectively suggested to SAVIO that we would appreciate his help in this extortion case and would attempt in every way to determine the identity of the person or persons who prepared and mailed the threatening letters.

As SAVIO and HOFFMAN were leaving the Resident Agency, SAVIO made a rather feeble apology for his contemptuous language" upon his arrival at the Resident Agency.



FSM Leader Testifies

Savio Recalls October Days

By TOM KNOX

Mario Savio relived the frantic October days of the police car sitaround yesterday, as he took the stand in the trial of himself and his fellow Sproul Hall sit-ins.

A noon rally had been planned the day non-student Jack Weinberg was arrested by campus police for soliciting funds against University regulations, Savio told the court, and consequently numerous students were in the area.

Lavio described the student reaction to the arrest: "Some moved to sit in front of the police car, others behind it, and others to the sides."

Both he and ASUC President Charlie Powell spoke from the top of the auto, Savio remembered.

Following the speeches, "We went to the dean's office . . . and from there to see the Chancellor," the FSM leader recalled.

"Charlie Powell said he was trying to use the good offices of his presidency to bring the Chancellor and demonstrators together," Sayio testified.

At the meeting with then Chancellor Strong, Savio told the court, "I then explained we wanted charges against suspended students dropped, we wanted Jack released, and we wanted to enter into negotiations on the subject of student political rights."

"What was Chancellor Strong's

reaction," the defense counsel asked.

"'No,'" replied Savio.

On Oct. 2, student leaders of the incipient FSM met with President Kerr and Chancellor Strong in the President's office at University Hall. At that time, Savio testified, Kerr proposed a four point plan.

• students cease the unlawful demonstration and free the automobile.

• a faculty-student-administration committee would be set up to consider the problem of political expression.

• an Academic Senate committee would consider the cases of students under University discipline.

• Jack Weinberg would be released on his own recognizance and the University would not press charges.

Objection to Kerr's first point, Savio said he had insisted it applied only to the present demonstration and not be restrictive of any future demonstrations which might be unlawful.

Strong and Kerr then left the room and FSM leaders pondered the offer, Savio said.

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

BERKELEY — Municipal Judge Rupert Crittenden will try again Tiesday to refer Mario Savio and other convicted University of California sit-in demonstrators to the probation department for pre-sentence reports.

Savio, 22, his wife, the former Suzanne Goldberg, 26, and several others scheduled to make personal court appearances Friday for referral were absent. The Savios reportedly were in New York and short of travel money.

Judge Crittenden ordered bench warrants with \$550 bail for absentees Mona Hutchin, 19, Edward J. Rosenfeld, 25, and Wendel C. Brunner, 19, to be issued Tuesday. Defense attorneys said Miss Hutchin was attending a school in New York and Brunner was in the south for the Congress of Racial Equality.

With two more convictions Friday, 634 demonstrators have been found guilty of trespassing in Sproul Hall Dec. 3. Of these, 516 also are guilty of resisting arrest.

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

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

Approximately 500 persons heard ROBERT KAUFMAN, JOSE NUN, visiting Professor of Political Science from Argentina, SEYMOUR BENJAMIN CHATMAN, Professor of Spanish, University of California, PAUL JACOBS and others condemn the United States "invasion" of Santo Domingo and attack United States foreign policy. JBMES PETRAS was the master of ceremonies of this rally. Following the rally, which was held on the steps of Sproul Hall, University of California, approximately 300 persons marched behind a simulated coffin which had been covered with black crepe paper. This coffin was carried to the local Selective Service Board 46 - 48, 2199 Bancroft Way, Berkeley, and placed on the counter inside the Social Security Office.


During the demonstration at Selective Service Headquarters, the crowd of demonstrators swelled into the street and local police officers were called to the scene to keep traffic lanes open. The coffin bore a sign, "we mourn the Dominican dead fighting for self-determination" While the demonstration was being carried on at the Local Draft Board, DENIS MOSGOFIAN and RICHARD ROMAN mounted a United States street mail box and urged the crowd to continue their protest against United States foreign policy. ROMAN bitterly, verbally attacked a Berkeley Police Officer, who was photographing the demonstrators. The demonstrators them formed a football type huddle on the sidewalk and began to burn what they alleged were draft cards.

At the center of the crowd of approximately 300 milling persons, an unidentified individual began to count audibly as individuals presented draft cards for burning. Number 30 was the last number heard by the observing Agent.



Savio and Wife rdered to Jail

Free .Speech leader-spokesman Mario Savio received a fourmonth jail sentence for his participation in the mass Sproul Hall sit-in last fall.

Savio, 2, received the stiff jail term when he rejected Berkeley-Albany Municipal Judge Rupert Crittenden's probationary terms banning unlawful "sit-ins, lie-ins, walk-ins, or stand-ins.'

Scheduled today in court was the sentencing of some 48 defendants who pleaded "no contest" for the Sproul Hall demonstration, the first to be judged with this plea.

The FSM leader's wife, Susanne Goldberg, was given a 45-day jail sentence. She too, refused to accept probation.

The petition asks the Court to release the defendants on their own recognizance, with the professors as character references.

Named on the petition so far are defendants Susanne Savio. Kate Coleman, David Kolodney, Lynn Hollander and Roberta Gregory.







Two men, two symbols, crossed paths on the University of California's perkeley campus this week.

Arriving was Dr. Roger W. Heyns from Ann Arbor, Mich., ready to tackle his new chancellor's job Oct. 1.

Leaving was Mario Savio, the rebel student leader, who drew a 120-day jail term for trespassing and resisting arrest during the civil strife stirred up by the free-speech movement last December.

To many onlookers, Dr. Heyns is an affable symbol of a hopeful new era in the tumultuous times of one of the world's great universities.

Likewise, many observers hopefully view Mr. Savio's sentencing as the complete and final erasure on a university blackboard crowded for months with controversial writing.

Warm endorsements are being heaped on the University of Michigan man by Dr. Clark Kerr, UC president, and by spokesmen for the regents, faculty, alumni, and student government. Dr. Heyns has served as the University of Michigan's vice-president for academic affairs since 1962.

This takes in just about everyone here except the 773 students now being sentenced in bunches by the court for disturbing the peace and resisting arrest during last winter's Sproul Hall sit-in.

campaign was largely successful. Mr. Savio's remander to jail doesn't belie that.

Now the administrative focus is seen to be on needed teaching reform. Dr. Kerr says Dr. Heyns fills the bill because he is considered an outstanding and experienced leader from another great state university and he is said to be the chief architect of Michigan's new residential college system, a plan being given a wider role in California's statewide university program.

Faculty study

(Under the residential college scheme, several highly self-contained colleges are established on a single large university campus.)

The need for educational reform is further highlighted in a recent study by 10 Berkeley professors. They urge that:

- Undergraduates be given lighter course loads, simplified grading, professional advising, less restrictive degree programs, more distinguished professors to teach their courses, and more coherent general education courses.
- Graduate students be offered "reasonable programs" that will let them obtain doctors degrees in three to four years (versus up to eight now), be protected from overwork as teaching assistants, and be accepted by the faculty as "respected junior partners."

These suggestions by the select committee on education at Berkeley are due for some tough evaluation. In this, Dr. Heyns presumably will have a part to play.

"With American politics in the hands of the morally and intellectually bankrupt, rebellion is a positive duty," he said.

"If the court means to prescribe how we act politically, it sets itself squarely against the noblest of our heritage,"




An unidentified person with a mike was announcing from the steps of Sproul Hall that a rally protesting jail sentences, bonds and probation handed down by Judge CRITTENDEN against students arrested in the Sproul Hall sit-in had just been concluded, and that the persons attending the rally were now marching to the courtroom. He stated that all interested persons were urged to immediately join the protesters at the court in the vicinity of Grove and Center Streets, Berkeley. The rally commenced at the Civic Center Park, which is across the street from the Veterans Memorial Building where the court was supposedly in session, and the general theme was an attack on President JOHNSON, United States foreign policy and United States intervention in Vietnam, as well as denouncing Judge CRITTENDEN for the sentences which he had handed down to convicted students.

MARIO SAVIO spoke and outlined plans for more demonstrations against the court and made an appeal for bail money. SAVIO stated that in October another Vietnam Teach-In will be held at the University of California, after which civil disobedience will occur against United States intervention in Vietnam. He suggested that the Vietnam Day Committee organize a defense committee for the purpose of defending those who will be arrested at that time.



Savios Going Abroad

Mario and Suzanne Savio are planning to go to England in "the very near future", according to friends, to give the former spokesman of the Free Speech Movement a chance to find himself.

Both are under sentence for their leadership roles in the FSM demonstrations at the University of California last Fall — he for four months and she for 45 days in the Alameda County Jail.

Both are out on appeal and have posted a total of \$1,650 bond. It is expected that the appeals will travel to higher courts than the Berkeley-Albany Court of Municipal Judge Rupert Crittenden where they were sentenced and that it may be anywhere from six to 18 months before the Savios' next court appearance may be required.

The couple would return to Berkeley in time for future legal action, friends reported. Friends say Savio will study and Suzanne will work in England, but the British Counsulate in San Francisco said neither had applied for work permits or visas, both needed for entry into the country. Reports were that the Savios have obtained passports, however, from U.S. government offices in New York

Savio was a philosophy major at UC when he dropped out due to the full-time demonstrations. He had planned to eturn to UC to study mathematics or physics, but is now indecided about what he wants o do.

A period abroad — in the classic American tradition — may help him return with fresh perspectives on where he will fit in this society according to friends.

Mrs. Savio has completed her master's degree in philosophy at UC and has been working toward her doctorate. She is now a mother-to-be.


This case has been kept open to determine result of Subject's pending trial in Berkeley Municipal Court. SAVIO was recently convicted on charges resulting from the Free Speech Movement sit-in demonstrations at UC, Berkeley, on 12/3/64. SAVIO was fined and sentenced to 4 months in the Alameda County Jail. His case was appealed and Judge RUPERT CRITTENDEN set bail at \$550. Bail was posted by SAVIO and his appeal is pending.

In view of the fact that the appeals in the Free Speech Movement cases may drag through the courts for several months, it is not deemed necessary to keep SAVIO's case pending during the period of appeal. A summary report was prepared on SAVIO in March, 1965. No other leads are outstanding.

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

The files of the Passport Office, United States Department of State, reviewed by a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on June 24, 1965, contained the following information:

Mario Robert Savio was issued passport F343587 on June 17, 1965, at New York, New York, for proposed two years' travel to England, Italy and France for the purpose of study. In his application dated June 15, 1965, at New York, New York, he stated that he intended to depart in September 1965. This passport was valid for three years' travel to all countries except Albania, Cuba and those portions of China, Korea and Viet Nam under communist control.

Mario Savio stated that he was born on December 8, 1942, at New York City. He gave his permanent residence as 2127 Blake, Berkeley, California. He listed his father as Joseph Savio, born August 28, 1919, in Italy and his mother as Dora E. Berretti, born December 23, 1916, at New York City. He stated that he was last married on May 23, 1965, to Suzanne Marilyn Goldberg, who was born on June 6, 1939, at Brooklyn, New York. In the event of death or accident he requested that Joseph Savio, his father, be notified at 1216 East Northridge Avenue, Glendora, California. The following description appeared in his file:


On September 14, 1965, it was learned through a suitable pretext by an Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that Mario and Suzanne Savio left Berkeley, California, about September 7, 1965, to travel to New York where they boarded an Italian ship to travel to Italy and then to England. The Savios plan to stay in England for six months to one year.

The Free Speech Movement (FSM) was an organization formed at UC, Berkeley, by a group of students and others to protest UC rules and regulations pertaining particularly to recruitment of members, solicitation of funds and distribution of literature for "off-campus" type political organizations. The FSM gained national recognition beginning in September, 1964, when a group of several thousand captured a police vehicle on the UC campus with a prisoner inside the automobile on October 2, 1964. Demonstrations then continued almost daily until a massive sit-in took place in the administration building at UC, Berkeley, on December 2 and 3, 1964, which resulted in the arrest of about 780 persons. Most of these individuals have been convicted in Berkeley Municipal Court of trespassing and resisting arrest and most cases are currently pending appeals.

Mario Savio was convicted in Municipal Court, Berkeley, California, on June 28, 1965, for resisting arrest and trespessing a result of his arrest in connection with the FSM sit-in December 2 and 3, 1964. Mario Savio was sentenced to 120 days in jail and one year probation. Mario Savio is currently on bail pending appeal.

Suzanne Savio was also convicted of trespassing and resisting arrest and is currently out on bail pending appeal.

Mario Savio was the leading spokesman and leader of the FSM and his wife, Suzanne Goldberg, was extremely active in the FSM. A source advised periodically between September, 1964 and February, 1965, that Mario Savio and Suzanne Goldberg Savio were seen in close conversation with Bettina Aptheker and Robert Paul Kaufman, both active in the FSM.



Mario Savio resigned from his position of leadership in the FSM at a UC rally on April 26, 1965. He gave his reason for his withdrawal from the FSM as "fear that I would become an indispensable part of the FSM" and stated that it appeared the movement would be unable to carry on without him.

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

Service Headquarters, 2199 Bancroft Way, Berkeley, California. He signed a "declaration" at this rally of his "refusal to fight against the people of Viet Nam".

Mario Savio led a rally at UC, Berkeley, on February 15, 1965, at which time he called for a sit-in at the office of U. S. Attorney Cecil F. Poole at the Federal Office Building in San Francisco to protest "the Government's failure to aid voter registration in Selma, Alabama". He stated, "that the FBI does nothing except take notes and the Agents have become a group of stenographers."



Mario Savio participated in a demonstration at Selective Service Headquarters, Berkeley, California, on May 5, 1965, protesting U. S. policy in Santo Domingo.

Mario Savio spoke at the Viet Nam Day "teach-in" at UC, Berkeley, on May 21-22, 1965.

Mario Savio spoke at a rally on August 20, 1965, at the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union Hall in San Francisco. This rally was held for the purpose of raising

funds for the Berkeley FSM defendants who are presently out on bail pending appeal. At this rally, Mario Savio verbally attacked the "Establishment", which according to him includes UC, many community groups, the Governor of the State of California, and the President of the United States.

COMMUNIST INFILTRATION OF THE FIRST UNITARIAN CHURCH OF LOS ANGELES

A source advised on April 29, 1964, that the premises of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles have been utilized for meetings by Communist Party nembers and sympathizers over a period of years. Speakers and lecturers at the church frequently espouse Communist causes or follow the Communist Party line. Communist front group literature is distributed at the church. The church is used by some Communist Party members for "mass concentration" work.

This same infiltration extends to adjuncts of the church such as the Unitarian Public Forum and the Unitarian Fellowship for Social Justice.

STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN has been minister of the church since 1948.

Reverend STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN is described in the Fourth Report, Un-American Activities Committee in California, 1948, page 115, as a very active "Communist fronter" and connected with numerous "Communist front organizations and activities."

Membership in the First Unitarian Church does not of itself connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.

A source advised on April 12, 1963, that the W.E.B. DuBois Youth Club - Berkeley Chapter, was originated in October 1962, principally through the efforts of MATHEW HALLINAN.

This same source advised in October 1963, that MATHEW HALLINAN was elected as Chairman and Communist Party (CP) Youth Commission Representative of the Berkeley CP On-Campus Youth Club during September 1963.

A second source advised that a leaflet distributed by the Porkeley DuBois Club in Spetember 1964, reflected the name of that organization to be the "W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America - Berkeley Branch."

This same leaflet, under the heading "The DuBois Clubs of America" reads as follows: "The Berkeley DuBois Club is a part of a nation-wide socialist youth organization founded in June of this year. It attempts to bring together those action-oriented youth who consider socialism to be a visible alternative to the ills of this society."

As of April 23, 1965, the Berkeley W.E.B. DuBois Club was registered with the University of California as an "off-campos' membership organization. As such, it could present lectures on campus with prior University permission and was allowed to met up and maintain a literature table on campus.

A source has advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party (CP), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates to this meeting were cautioned against the germ of anti-Soviet and anti-CP ideologies. These delegates were also told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second conference of over 20 persons met in Chicago on December 28-29, 1963, for the purpose of initiating a "call" to the new youth organization and planning for a founding convention to be held in June 1964.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. The aims of this organization, as set forth in the preamble to the constitution, are, "It is our belief that this nation can best solve its problems in an atmosphere of peaceful coexistence, complete disarmament and true freedom for all peoples of the world, and that these solutions will be reached mainly through the united efforts of all democratic elements in our coontry, composed essentially of the working people allied in the unity of Negroes and other minorities with whites. We further fully recognize that the greatest threat to American democracy comes from the racist and right wing forces in coalition with the most reactionary sections of the economic power structure, using the tool of anti-Communism to divide and destroy the unified struggle of the working people. As young people in the forces struggling for democracy, we shall actively strive to defeat these reactionary and neo-facist elements and to achieve complete freedom and democracy for all Americans, thus enabling each individual to freely choose and build the society he would wish to live in. Through these struggles we feel the American people will realize the viability of the socialist alternative."



The constitution further states that this new organization shall be a membership organization open to individuals, or if five or more people so desire a chapter can be formed which shall in turn be guided by the policies and principles of the parent organization.

The second source advised in April 1965 that the head-quarters of the organization continues to be located at 1853 1/2 McAllister Street, San Francisco, California.

Both sources have advised that at the founding convention two officers were elected:

PHILIP CHAPIN DAVIS - President

CARL ELLENGER BLOICE - Publications Chairman

A third source has advised that on October 26, 1962, PHILIP DAVIS attended a CP recruiting class held at 1579 Scenic Avenue, Berkeley, California.

A fourth source has advised that CARL BLOICE, reporter for the "People's World" newspaper, was, on April 3, 1964, elected to the newly organized San Francisco Coufity Committee of the CP.

The "People's World" is a west coast communist newspaper published weekly in San Francisco, California.

# ILLS OF SOCIETY

He was as vague about personal events of the past year as he was specific about such issues as leftist politics, educational reform, public leadership and the ills of society.

His bushy hair is even bushier now, but he no longer affects the fleece-lined rancher's coat that was an inevitable part of his rebel costume during the mass sit-ins, mass arrests and mass trials of the Free Speech Movement of 1964-65

So far he has remained in seclusion, a theorist instead of the activist leader who became a symbol of extremist discontent among the nation's new generation.

### HALF-SERIOUS

He won't make public appearances even for causes he supports, but a goodly number of University of California students continue to regard him, in the half-serious words of one FSM veteran. as "Mario, our Savio."

It is a role that Savio says he detests. He blames the newspapers.

"To focus on personalities rather than on issues is to obscure the issues and encourage the least democratic sen-

timents of the public," he

Unless public leaders live outside the limelight, Savio worries, they are tempted "into confusing their personal destinies with their political role — and therefore into using the political arena (-) to act out solutions to their personal psychological quirks."

A desire to prevent becoming a dictator was the reason given by Savio in April of G 1965 when he abruptly quit the FSM.

In May he married another FSM leader, Suzanne Gold-

In July he was sentenced to four months in jail for leading the Sproul Hall sit-in of Dec. 2-3, 1964, in which 773 demonstrators were arrested. At the same time, UC had granted most FSM demands.

He left with Suzanne in September for England, where he enrolled as a physics student at St. Catherine's College of Oxford University. He dropped out four weeks later "for reasons only peripherally connected with education." He wouldn't give the reasons.

In February the Savios returned to the United States C for a long visit with his parents in New York City. They decided to return to the Bay Area in May, and with them is Steffan Savio, 7 months. Their sit-in appeals are still in the courts

He described as incorrect an earlier report that he has re-applied for admission to UC, where he would be a 24year-old junior. He may reapply next year, he said, and then again, maybe he won't.

When informed that his readmission is opposed by Max | Rafferty, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Savio just smiled.

Answers included the following comments:

ON FATHERHOOD:

"Becoming a father doesn't make me less angry at how society harms growing children through their families, but it makes me much more sensitive to how very difficult it is to avoid hurting one's children in some way-just by being a parent. 

"This helps me to regard with greater sympathy those whom I consider political enemies because they, too, were little children at one time and are not less victims of an ill society."

# ON VIETNAM:

"The war is only the most excruciating instance of what's wrong with society.'

### ON THE DRAFT:

"My view is summed up by that button you can get on the campus."

(The button, on sale for 35 cents, says: "War Is Good Business-Invest Your Son.")

"It's clear that if investment in war production were to be ended rapidly and soon, the U.S. economy would be, at least over the short run, crippled."

### ON CIVIL RIGHTS:

"It's become very clear that the techniques of the past are not going to win for Negroes the kind of gains projected now. . .

'Picketing the Seawolf in Jack London Square isn't really going to get many jobs for Negroes. What's important now is to gain political power for Negroes.'

# ON FRUSTRATION OF RADICAL THINKERS:

"It happens (a reference to a question about some student radicals who become so hopeless about change that they become helpless). It must be seen in the context of a society which has so structured its institutions as to make dissent entirely irrelevant."

# ON POLITICAL PARTIES:

"Of the two, the less impervious to progressive political ideas, the Democratic Party, is in no sense committed to a political program that is publicly discussed.

"In California, large numbers of people have no place to go.

"The Republican Party can be moved more easily to the right, as was demonstrated by Goldwater and Reagan, than the Democratic Party can be moved left."

### ON COMMUNISM:

"The reason that FSM spokesmen were consciously determined not to discuss the Communist issue was because it was clearly irrelevant to the civil liberties questions involved and would have served only to make all the easier an attempt by the press to deal with the most sensational issues. ...

"It's bad to be an unthinking anti-Communist, as many of our countrymen are. It's also bad to be an unthinking anti-anti-Communist, to refrain on all occasions from criticizing Communists. I think they should be treated like Republicans and Democrats."

# "I See Savio...'

Mario Savio, who no longer engages in the politics of protest, will meet with members of the Continuity for New Politics this Saturday to engage in what?

According to David Kolodny of the CNP Steering Committee, Savio, Kolodny, Carl Bloice, Bob Avakian, and Benson Brown will select a panel to present various alternatives for the November Congressional election to a general membership meeting July 30.

The panel will present arguments for a writ - in campaign, running an Independent Candidate, or doing nothing on the election, to the all-day meeting. Then the meeting will break into groups "to hammer out proposals. There will be aplenary session and a vote will be taken," Kolodny said. The meeting will begin 10 am. July 30.

An earlier general meeting, Wednesday July 27, will discuss peace action, the Oakland Schools, Jobart, and the proposed Statewide convention of political radicals in September.

Place of both meetings has not, at BARB presstime, been decided.

The young man who led the nation's most convulsive student revolt is disappointed today in the protest tactics of the past, the marches and demonstrations aimed at irousing moral indignation.

Power, he said, is more effective.

Savio disclosed his aspirations and theories in his only interview in the two months since he returned with wife and baby boy to become "permanent residents of the Bay Area."

# ILLS OF SOCIETY

He was as vague about personal events of the past year as he was specific about such issues as leftist politics. edicational reform, public leadership and the ills of society.

His bushy hair is even bushier now, but he no longer affects the fleece-lined rancher's coat that was an inevitable part of his rebel costume during the mass sit-ins, mass arrests and mass trials of the Free Speech Movement of 1964-65

So far he has remained in speciusion, a theorist instead of the activist leader who be come a symbol of extremist discontent among the nation's new generation.

### HALF-SERIOUS

He won't make public appearances even for causes he supports, but a goodly number of University of California students continue to regard him, in the half-serious words of one FSM veterah, as "Mario, our Savio."

It is a role that Savio sals he detests. He blames the newspapers.

"To focus on personalities rather than on issues is to obscure the issues and encourage the least democratic sens

timents of the public," he said.

Unless public leaders even outside the limelight, Savio worries, they are temped "into confusing their personal destinies with their political role — and therefore into using the political arena to act out solutions to their personal psychological quirks."

A desire to prevent becoming a dictator was the reason given by Savio in April of 1965 when he abruptly quithe FSM.

In May he married another FSM leader, Suzanne Gold-

In July he was sentenced to four months in jail for leading the Sproul Hall sit-in of Dec. 2-3, 1964, in which 773 demonstrators were arrested. At the same time, UC had granted most FSM demands.

He left with Suzanne in September for England, where he enrolled as a physics student at St. Catherine's College of Oxford University. He dropped out four weeks later "for reasons only peripherally connected with education." He wouldn't give the reasons.

He described as incorrect an earlier report that he has re-applied for admission to UC, where he would be a 24 year-old junior. He may reapply next year, he said, and then again, maybe he won't.

# His Status Now

Mario Savio was never officially penalized by University of California authorities for his role in the Free Speech Movement of late 1964, although he never returned to his classes.

He was registered as a junior in September, but before he could file a study list—a necessary registration step-he was put on suspension by then-Chancellor Edward Strong on Sept. 30. Savio's suspension, one of eight following the first sit-in Sept. 30, was later changed to

aprobation on recome mendation of President Clark Kerr, with the consent of the UC Board

of Regents.

Subsequent disciplinary action against Savio and other FSM leaders led to the mass Sproul Hall sit-in of Dec. 2. Five days later, Kerr granted amnesty to them because of the sitin arrests.

Before the end of the semester, Savio was permitted to withdraw from UC as of Sept. 30. He had not attended classes for three-months.

# His Opinions

Mario Savio offered opinions on a full range of questions during a lengthy interview with Examiner writer, Lynn Ludlow.

Answers included the following comments:

ON TATHERHOOD:

"Becoming a father doesn't make me less angry at how society harms growing children through their families, but it makes me much more sensitive to how very difficult it is to avoid hurting one's children in some way-just by being a parent.

This helps me to regard with greater sympathy those whom I consider political enemies because they, too, were little children at one time and are not less victims of an ill society."

ON VIETNAM:

"The war is only the most excruciating instance of what's wrong with society."

ON THE DRAFT:

"My view is summed up by that button you can get on the campus."

(The button, on sale for 35 cents, says: "War Is Good Business-Invest Your Son.")

"It's clear that if investment in war production were to be ended rapidly and soon, the U.S. economy would be, at least over the short run, crippled."

ON CIVIL RIGHTS:

"It's become very clear that the techniques of the past are not going to win for Negroes the kind of gains projected now ....

"Picketing the Seawolf in Jack London Square isn't really going to get many jobs for Negroes. What's important now is to gain political power for Negroes."

ON FRUSTRATION OF RADICAL THINKERS:

'It happens (a reference to a question about some student radicals who become so hopeless about change that they become helpless). It must be seen in the context of a society which has so structured its institutions as to make dissent entirely irrelevant."

ON POLITICAL PARTIES:

"Of the two, the less impervious to progressive political ideas, the Demogratic Party, is in no sense committed to a political program that is publicly discussed

"In California, large numbers of people have no place to go.

"The Republican Party can be moved more easily to the right, as was demonstrated by Goldwater and Reagan, than the Democratic Party can be moved

ON COMMUNISM:

"The reason that FSM spokesmen were consciously determined not to discuss the Communist issue was because it was clearly irrelevant to the civil liberties questions involved and would have served only to make all the easier an attempt by the press to deal with the most sensational issues. . . .

"It's bad to be an unthinking anti-Communist, as many of our countrymen are. It's also bad to be an ur thinking anti-anti-Communist, to refrain on all occ sions from criticizing Communists. I think they shou he treated like Republicans and Democrats?

# Says No To Savio

Mario Savio, once the silver-tongued orator of the University of California student Free Speech Movement was denied readmission as a student at the Berkeley campus yesterday—but only on a technicality.

University officials, who previously had denied receiving an application for readmission from the 23-year-old firebrand, declared that Savio simply applied too late.

Savio's application, sald Fretter, was not received until last Friday, a full week after the final deadline.

He may still apply until November 1 for admission to the winter quarter, which begins January 3.

He would be a junior in physics.

Savio, who became the unofficial spokesman of the free Speech Movement of 1964-65 on campus, spent most of the past year in England, where he attended Oxford University.

Prior to leaving, hs married the former Suzanne Goldberg, another Free Steech leader they have an eight-month-old son, Steffah.

Since his return to Berkeley Savio has shied from the spotlight, working as bartender at the Steppenwolf on San Pablo, a tayern popular with UC students.



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# M. Savio's Application Turned Down

The University of Californal here has informed Mario Savio, a leader in the Free Speech Movement disturbances in the fall of 1964, that his application for re - admission for the fall quarter was not approved because it was submitted after the deadline.

Dean William B. Fretter of the College of Letters and Siences advised Savio by letter of his decision.

The college, part of the UC Berkeley campus, has been denying re - admission requests since Aug. 5 except to students whose "late application is due to causes beyond the student's control."

The official deadline for undergraduate admissions was last June 15, with exceptions being made on an individual basis through Aug. 5. Savio failed to file application until Aug. 12.

Processing of admissions for the fall quarter indicates that the Berkeley campus will be at or near its planned enrollment peak of 27,500 graduate and undergraduate students.

Savio will have to reapply if ne wants to be considered for admission to UC for the winter quarter. (Indicate page, nome of newspaper, city and state.)

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Savio May Return in Fall

Maria Savio, former leader of the Free Speech Movement at Berkeley in 1964, has applied for readmission to the University.

After spending last year at Oxford University in England, Savio, his wife, the former Suzanne Goldberg, and their eight-monthold son, Steffan, returned to the Bay Area a few months ago.

Mrs. Savio confirmed that Savio intends to file for admission to the fall quarter, for which he is late. The deadline was July 15 for returning students. A University spokesman said that after that date applications are handled on an individual basis.

University spokesmen say Savio's application will be handled as that of any other student.

Savio was one of more than 700 persons arrested in the Dec. 2, 1964, sit in at Sproul Hall. His case and those of 570 others are being appealed.

In other action on the Free Speech Movement Front, as the Wire Services might say, Jacqueline Goldberg, the sister of Art Goldberg, and along with him a much publicized member of the Free Speech Movement leadership, last week petitioned Berkeley Judge Floyd Talbot for release from two years probation and a \$400 fine. Her attorney, Stanley Gold, said that she was unable to teach at Illinois public schools while on probation. She has paid her fine and completed half her probation.

Talbot denied her request and said that she could teach in Illinois private schools until the end of her probation. She went to the University of Chicago this past year to get a teaching credential.

Two others convicted for the sit-ins withdrew their Superior court appeals last week. Sander Fuchs, who faces concurrent 30day county jail terms for trespassing and resisting arrest, and Mar-

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jorie Wennerberg, facing a fine of \$276.

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
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
