

MICHAEL WHITNEY STRAIGHT Editor, "New Republic"

Michael Whitney Straight was born on September 1, 1916, in Southampten, New York. During the period 1932 to 1938, he attended the London School of Economics and Cambridge University, both in England. In 1938, he returned to the University, both in England. In 1938, he returned to the United States and held positions in the Department of State and the Department of the Interior. He resigned from Government service in 1941 and became the Washington correspondent for the Service in 1941 and became the Washington correspondent for the "New Republic." In June, 1943, he became editor of the above magazine. Mr. Straight served in the United States Army Air Force from 1943 to 1945. (100-61929-49)

Allegedly, while attending Cambridge University, Managery Michael Straight was a supporter of the Communist Party in England, was in contact and associated with individuals active in the Communist Party youth movement at Cambridge University, and made several trips to the U.S.S.R. An associate during that period described Michael Straight as a "liberal" and advised that in his opinion Straight was not a member of the Communist Party or under Communist Party discipline while at Cambridge University. In the past, Michael Straight has acted as a sponsor, speaker, or has participated in activities of organizations designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450, such as the American Peace Mobilization, the North American Spanish Aid Committee, the Washington Bookshop Association, and the Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy. Mr. Straight has also had similar associations with organizations cited by national or state legislative committees, such as the American Committee in Aid of Chinese Industrial Cooperatives and the Institute of Pacific Relations. In October, 1946, Mr. Straight hired Henry Wallace as the editor of "New Republic." He opposed Wallace's third-party movement and particularly Wallace's acceptance of communist support. Wallace resigned from the "New Republic" in April, 1948.

In referenced letter of July 7, 1950, the Bureau advised furnished information that it was reported that for the last few years (prior to 1945) ALES had been working with FIELD, who was in contact with other members of the group. This letter further pointed out that the FIELD mentioned could possibly be NOEL FIELD and that NOEL FIELD had been abroad, first with the League of Nations and subsequently with the Unitarian Service Committee most of the time since 1937.

On April 11, 1950, Mr. FORRIST DAVIS was interviewed by Special Agent SEYMOR DR TO PHILLIPS at his residence, 2346 Massachusetts Avenue W.W., Washington, P.C. in connection with another investigation. At this time Wr. PAVIS stated that "BILL BELLITT" had advised him that when he was our ambassador at Paris, France about 1939 the premier of France (Mr. DAVIS could not recall the premier's name) had advised him (Mr. BULLITT) that the Department of State had two brothers named HISS who were soviet agents. Mr. DAVIS stated that Mr. BULLITT had advised him the premier had advised that this information had come to his attention in connection with a report of the French Surete. The above information was set out on page 22 and 23 of the report of Special Agent HOWARD FLETCHER, JR. wade at Washington Field on October 28, 1950 in this case. Bureau referenced letter of November 25, 1950, pointed out that Mr. "ILLIAM BULLITT was interviewed and that the results were set out in the report of Special Agent F ANCIS D. O'RIEN dated October 7, 1949 at Boston entitled "J. DAVID "HITTAKER CHARBERS. was.; Perjury; Espionage - R: Internal Jecurity - R." At the time of this interview as set out in the above referred to report, Mr. BULLITT did not set out the source of the information he had received regarding the HISS brothers. Mr. BULLITT did approximate the time that he was furnished this information as being around 1939. The New York Times of December 28, 1949 on page 18, column 2, carried an article pertaining to the second ALGER MISS trial. This article reported that on December 27 ALGOR MISS had identified a friendly letter that he had written on May 7, 1948 to NOEL MELD who had been identified earlier in the HTSS Perjury trial as a leader

This article in the Times also related that the Hiss letter suggested that Fr. FIELD write to MICHAEL STRAIGHT of the New Republic.

The Bureau is requested, through its established sources in Paris, France, to determine if the French Sureto have any information in addition to that in their files which would prove that ALGER MISS or "the MISS brothers" were connected with soviet agents in that country and especially to secure any information which would show that the MICTES were in contact with MOEL FIELD during the few years prior to 1965.

The Bureau is also requested to authorize the New York Office to interview Mrs. FREDURICK A. MUSHLICK, 46 Walworth Avenue, Scarsdale, New York, who is the former wife of LAUDINGE DUGGAH. Then Mrs. MUTHLICK was interviewed on October 24, 1950 in connection with the case entitled "UNKNOTH SUBJECT was. Al, Albert (SOVIE); Esplorage - R", she advised that she and LAURENCE TUGGAN, her former husband, and the FIELDS were very closely acquainted in 1933 when they lived in the same house in "ashington, D.C. It is felt that inasmuch as Mrs. MRHIICK was formerly closely associated with the FT LDS and that Mr. MOSL FIELD had used LAUTHINGE TUCCAN in 1948 as a means through which to reach ALGUG MISS that she could possibly furnish valuable information in proving or disproving the fact that ALGER HISS and possibly his brother, DOMALD HISS, were in contact with NOEL WILLD in the years preceding 1945 when NOEL MILLD was in Europa. Then such interview has been authorized, the New York Office is requested to interview Mrs. MEMLICK to establish the degree of association or communication between ALGER HESS and WOLL FIDED after he went overseas around 1937.

The information deted 9/15/45, starts off with some unknown statement relating to the Communist Party (CP). Nothing much can be gleaned from this fragmentary reference other than it suggests the possibility that a connection existed between DAN's intelligence work and the CP. In WFO letter dated 7/8/65, the possibility was pointed out that the relationship between the MGB and DAN was predicated on his recruitment and operation through the CP Apparatus. MICHAEL STRAIGHT was cited as an example of this type of recruitment and operation.

The information reflects that DAN returned from the Army to Washington at the beginning of 1945, that something enknown occurred and in agreement was made (presumably with DAN) about continuing the work on the collection of intelligence in Angland. Although there is a possibility that DAN was discharged from the Army in early 1945, no such conclusion is justified on the available facts, and DAN could have remained in the Army after his return to Washington. In consideration of the fact that the information dealt with the US and England, it can ressonably be inferred that DAN was serving or had served in either the British or American Army. In view of DAN's return to Washington, D.C., from the Army, it appears likely that he served in the American Army, it appears likely that he served in the American Army. However, the fact that this information was directed to the MAD in London, and the words "continuing the work" were used might indicate otherwise.

In suspary it can be stated that DAN had served or was serving in either the British or American Army, that he had previously been in Mashington, D.C., and that he had returned to the latter city in early 1945. The statement concerning the agreement to continue the work on the collection of intelligence in England probably indicates that DAN had previously furnished intelligence on England, obtained either by reason of some position DAN had occupied in England or the US, or because DAN has some important contact or contacts in England or the US, who could furnish him this type of information. On the other hand, it is not beyond the

realm of messibility that this statement merely means that the MGB had been receiving intelligence information from DAN in the US, and that he had agreed to furnish similar information while he was in England. In other words, that the MGB would continue to edilect intelligence information from DAN while he was in England.

MICHAEL TRAIGHT advised in interviews that he had emlisted in the USIF Enlisted Reserve Corps on 11/24/42, and remained in that service until 1986. However, verious issues of "Whots Whe in America", reflect that he corved as a pilot in the "AAF in 1943-1945. It, therefore, does not appear that STRAIGHT was discharged from the Army Air Force in early 1945. However, he could early have served as a pilot until early 1945, and then could have returned to Washington, D.C., in some type of administrative capacity for the Air Corps, possibly even as a liaison officer with the British Lir Force. This appears to be a distinct possibility since it is known that he had impertant contacts in both England and the US. This will become quite clear in information which will be subsequently set out concerning his brother, WHITMEY VILLAR STRAIGHT, and the rest of his family. The question is WHETMEY HICHAEL STRAIGHT has told us the complete story of his involvement in explonage. There are indications that he may not have done so. He has told us of his explenage contacts up to the nutuum of 1942, or shortly before he entered the AAF. He mentioned no explonage contacts while he was in service. He stated that in 1946, after leaving the Air Force, he visited angland where he saw ANTHONY BLUNT and GUY BURGESS, He elaimed to have told these individuals that he had grown up and was completely distillusioned with the Communist movement. He advised that both BLUNT and BURGESS were hostile and tense. It is noted that BURGESS was known to STRAIGHT as a Soviet

agent. The reason for this meeting and the question of the initiated it, remain unanswered. It appears likely that Communism was not the only topic of conversation at this meeting and that possibly MINET and BURGESS tried to reactiviste STRAIGHT in Soviet Intelligence operations.

This Committee was organized in May, 1946, by ALBERT KINSTEIN to help arouse the world to the dangers of atomic weapons, and to call for international control of atomic energy. Among precipent sembors of this Gommittee were Prof. HANS A. RETHE, Dr. SPARD U. COMPON, Prof. LEO T. SZILARD and Prof. HANGLO C. URRY. If this Gommittee had been formed prior to 9/15/45, this information might be quite significant. However, it still may indicate that MICHARL STRAIGHT was acquainted with one or more of the Committee members and that the MGS was considering the exploitation of this relationship.

It is obvious from the remaining information that DAN either was in England as of 9/15/45, or it was contemplated that he would go to England. It is noted that there is no indication that the intended meeting took place, or when it was scheduled to take place after 9/15/45. At is known that the RIS has on equations set up meetings more than air mention in advance. NICHAEL STRILLER has admitted visiting England squation in 1946. This could have been when the proposed

the original meeting was postponed. If plans for the meeting
were changed, it is not illogical to assume that a meeting
between STRAIGHT and the Soviet agents ELUNT and BURGESS was
substituted. The original suggestions for sending ALAN with
DAN, presumably to the meet, appears to have been a highly
unusual procedure for the MUB. However, it might be understandable
for Moscow to resonant having BLUNT, or possibly BURGESS,
accompany STRAIGHT to the proposed meeting. It is, therefore,
conceivable that ALAN could be identical with BLUNT or BURGESS.

Previous consideration has been given to the possibility that DAN mentioned on 9/15/45, was identical with "DAN" mentioned in information dated 5/24/43. However, by letter dated 5/20/56, the Bureau advised that the source had come to believe that the word "DAN" in the information dated 6/24/43, did not refer to an individual, but rather to seasthing concerning a characteristic of an airplane. While honoring the surces belief, it should be noted that the information dated 6/24/43, may take on added significants if MICHAEL STRAIGHT is considered a suspect. The 1943 information concerned the development and production of aircraft in the US and Angland. An unintelligible reference to "DAN" was immediately followed by a description of the English Merlin (Rolls Royce) engine.

In twder to cast this matter in its true perspective, the following information is being set out concerning the STRAIGHT family. In the first place, it is an important and influential family which has roots in both the US and England. MICHAEL's mother was a sister of HARRY PAYNE WHITNEY and is a millionairess in her own right. Her first husband, WILLARD STRAIGHT, died during World War I. They had three children. WHITNEY VILLARD STRAIGHT was born in 1912, MICHAEL WHITNEY STRAIGHT in 1915, and BEATRICE STRAIGHT COCKSON date of birth unknown.

It is also suggested that the NFO cheek US passport records on MICHARL STRAIGHT, the Visa Division of the State Department an VMITHEY STRAIGHT and any other pertinent records which might disclose information concerning departures of MICHARL STRAIGHT from the US and arrivals of WHITHEY STRAIGHT in the US from 1943 through 1946.

A review of the military record of MICHAEL STRAIGHT reflects that from 11/24/44 to 9/20/45, he was assigned to various Army Air Force bases in Nebraska, Ohio, South Dakota, and Texas. There is no indication that he was in Washington, DC, in early 1945. He was not relieved from active duty until 10/28/45, and as of 9/20/45, five days after information dated 9/15/45, he completed his service at Randolph Field, Texas, prior to going on terminal leave and/or travel time duty status. Based on the most logical interpretation of material, it does not appear that MICHAEL STRAIGHT is identical with the subject.

ReBulet suggests LOUIS DOLIVET as a possible suspect for the subject. A review of NY files reflects that LOUIS DOLIVET served in the US Army from 10/8/43 to 11/23/43. There is no indication that he served in the US Army in 1944-45. In addition, his service in the Army was of such short duration that there would appear to be little reason for the MGB to comment about it. While he is known to have been in Washington, DC, on 1/11/45, he was residing in NY at that time. It appears that DOLIVET had gone to Washington, DC, for the purpose of contacting the State Department regarding a visa and also, possibly, to see the French Ambassador. There is also no indication in NYO files that DOLIVET had lived in Washington, DC, prior to 1945. While it is true that DOLIVET

contemplated attending the General Assembly of the UNO in London in January, 1946, there is nothing in NYO files reflecting that he actually made the trip. The information concerning the proposed trip was received on 12/26/45, and there is no indication that DOLIVET had contemplated making the trip as early as 9/15/45.

The Bureau appreciates the analysis prepared by your office and set forth in referenced letter of the possibility that Louis Dolivet might be identical with the unknown subject. From this analysis, it appears unlikely that Dolivet could be identical with the unknown subject. In addition, the military record of Michael Straight tends to eliminate him as a possibility for the unknown subject, aka Dan.

In your letter dated 7/12/68, you also discussed that Whitney Straight, brother of Michael Straight, might have been involved in Soviet espionage. You should advise if the files of your office contain any further information on Whitney Straight which might be of interest to this case.

WFO should submit its analysis of the possibility of Dolivet being identical with the unknown subject along with the results of the investigation requested by the New York Office in its letter dated July 12. 1968.

This case was reopened on the basis of suggestion that MICHAEL UHITNEY STRAIGHT might be identical with unknown subject DAN, elthough no facts were given by the Agency to support this proposal (S)

Review of all references to MICHAEL STRAIGHT in WFO failed to disclose any persuasive points of identification. The Saint Louis letter outlining the military service record of MICHAEL STRAIGHT appears to eliminate this suspect completely.

With regard to WHINEY WILLARD STRAIGHT, it is felt the reasoning set forth in suggesting him as a suspect is too tenuous to justify any investigation. Nothing factual was found in WFO references reviewed to qualify WHITNEY STRAIGHT as a logical suspect for DAN, and it is not believed he should be so considered on the basis of projected conclusions based on presumed or possible premises.

In the same context, it is deemed sheer speculation that the intelligence furnished by DAN involved the atomic bomb, and it is almost inconceivable that MICHAEL STRAIGHT was the source if this were true. The participation of STRAIGHT in 2 - Bureau

A review has been made of Bureau files in accordance with your suggestion for information pertaining to Michael Whitney Straight and his older brother Whitney Willard Straight and no information was noted which would be of assistance to this investigation.

Relet points out the possibility that Whitney Straight was at least of interest to the Soviets or could possibly have been involved in Soviet intelligence work. Relet points out that Whitney Straight served in the Royal Air Force during World War II and was shot down. In addition to having been shot down, it is also known that Whitney Straight escaped from a German prison camp and successfully returned to England during the War. Inasmuch as this escape may have been reported in the newspaper, you should check the records of "The New York Times" in order to determine if there is any information about the whereabouts of the Straight brothers during the time pertinent to this case.

Another individual who cannot be overlooked as a possible suspect for Dan is Louis Dolivet, former husband of Beatrice Straight, sister of Michael and Whitney Straight. Dolivet is a Romanian by birth and was connected with both the Communist Party and Soviet intelligence in Europe before he came to the United States in the late 1930s or early 1940s. He married Beatrice Straight 2/21/42 at Des Moines, Iowa, and through this marriage he became editor of the "Free World" which was later changed to the "United Nations World." This magazine was financed mainly by the Straight family. Dolivet served in the U. S. Army from 10/8 until 11/23/43 and, as was pointed out in relet, he was in Washington, D. C., on 1/11/45. These items compare favorably with the information known about Dan.

With regard to the fact that the MGB Moscow did not want to have the importance of the intelligence disclosed to Dan and that Dan had probably guessed about the importance of it, the Bureau agrees with your suggestion that this could possibly relate to the atomic bomb. If, however, Dolivet is considered as a suspect, this could possibly pertain to the sources which he had developed as an editor of a magazine dealing with the United Nations as well as the connections he had made through his marriage to a woman of high social position. As an example of this, it is noted in the report of Special Agent Thomas G. Spencer made at New York 9/26/50 in the case entitled "Louis Dolivet, IS-R and FR" on page 71, information is included about Dolivet's attempts to establish a United Nations journal and the fact that he was attempting to interest Nelson Rockefeller and John Hay Whitney (later U.S. Ambassador to England) in this venture.

Also in connection with the fact that Dan was going to England sometime after 9/15/45, you are referred again to the report of Special Agent Spencer which has on page 38 information that Dolivet was leaving the United States to travel to London as a special correspondent for the meeting of the General Assembly of the United Nations Organization. This meeting was scheduled to begin 1/10/46. This could possibly refer to the contact to be made in England mentioned by

New York and WFO should review references in their files to Dolivet and submit comments concerning the possibility that he might be identical with unknown subject Dan.

Review of MICHAEL STRAIGHT's book, "Make This the Last War" (Wilson Library Bulletin; November, 1943). When 10 years of age, MICHAEL STRAIGHT was sent to Dartington Hall, Totnes, England, where he presumably joined his brother, WHITNEY STRAIGHT", "now a squadron leader in the RAF". While at Trinity College, Cambridge, MICHAEL STRAIGHT was the first American to become president of Cambridge Union. He took a "triple-first" in economics, and became a Parliamentary candidate on the Labor Party ticket. He set up the Washington Chapter of the "Fight for Freedom Committee" and served for awhile as Vice Chairman. "At present he is serving in the Army."

Article in "New York Sun", 2/15/44, "New York RAF Commodore WHITNEY WILLARD STRAIGHT is Doing Brilliant Job in British Air Service". A reporter spoke to STRAIGHT in his headquarters in the Middle East where STRAIGHT was building up RAF Air Express Service to Cairo. STRAIGHT mentioned he had gone to the Lincoln School (in the U.S.) with DAVID, NELSON, WINTHROP and LAWRENCE ROCKEFELLER. His six year old daughter, CAMILLA, was staying in New York with his sister Mrs. BEATRICE DOLLVET, and his wife was in London. He was described as a millionaire who put his money into flying. He formed the Straight Corporation with offices in London and built a chain of ultra-modern airports throughout Britain. He is "now" one of the chief props of Air Chief Marshal Sir FREDERICK BOWHILL'S RAF Transport Command. This organization was developed in March, 1943, out of the war-born ferry command which brought bombers and flying boats across the Atlantic from Canada, STRAIGHT was one of the first men selected by BUMHILL when

he formed his new organization. STRAIGHT stated, "Before I knew it I was promoted from Wing Commander to Air Commodore and sent to the Middle East to develop the job". STRAIGHT was described as being a big man in British Empire nir communications.

Article in "Herald Tribune", 4/15/46, entitled "Who's Who at the Forum". MICHAEL STRAIGHT was described as a pilot of a Flying Fortress in the Army Air Force during the war. Mention was made of the fact that he returned to the U.S. from England in 1937.

Subsequent articles reflect the following:

WITNEY STRAIGHT described as Vice Chairman of the Board of the British European Airways Corps (8/9/46); MICHAEL STRAIGHT, Chairman of the Nassau Independent Voters Association (9/12/46); BRUCE BLIVEN and MICHAEL STRAIGHT designated as editors of "The New Republic" (11/13/46); WHITNEY STRAIGHT described as Deputy Chairman of British European Airways (1/14/47); HENRY WALLACE at home of MICHAEL STRAIGHT, publisher of "The New Republic" (2/28/47); WHITNEY STRAIGHT, Chief Executive of BOAC (11/15/48); WHITNEY STRAIGHT, Managing Director of BOAC (7/23/48); MICHAEL STRAIGHT, editor of "The New Republic" (11/29/49); LORD RENNELL replaces WHITNEY STRAIGHT at BOAC. STRAIGHT, who had been with BOAC since 1949, recently joined the Board of Rolls-Royce (11/1/55).

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lichael Whitney Straight was interviewed June 6, 1966, by a representative of the Federal Eureau of Investigation, and queried concerning his recollections of Pericans who attended Combridge University and were involved in communicated by Covict Intelligence.

Straight recalled he attended Cambridge University from 1934 to 1937, and was domiciled at Trinity College. Etraight advised at that time he had become almost completely Drivish and had no special relationships with any Emericans. He explained further that in addition to the fact most of his associates were British the Emericans at Cambridge were mostly graduate students and their brief tenure reduced the association of meeting them and developing lasting friendships.

The list of eighty-five Americans who are known to have attended Cambridge University between the years 1930-1934, were displayed to Straight. This listing includes twenty individuals who were desiciled at Irlnity College and two who lived at Irlnity Hall, however, it is noted the above period just preceded the time when straight was an undergraduate at the university. Straight advised he could not identify anyone from the list of Americans described above as an acquaintance, or as known to him during his student days. He said efter coming to the United States he thinks he may have met Cuterbridge Horsey while both were employed at the Department of State. If so, it was a very casual acquaintance.

University he had known Lorie Tarshis, an Imerican, who was a graduate student in economics. Traight recorded by was

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also studying economics and they were nutual admirers of the late economist Lord John Haynard Heynes. Stringht stated he knew Tarshis as a communist sympathizer and believes Tarshis may have attended Trinity College and may have been a member of the Trinity communist study group, or cell, as it was known. Straight did not know where Tarshis came from and could furnish no biographical data concerning him. He concluded stating he thought perhaps Tarshis was a genuine, honest larxist economist.

Straight also recalled another American who ettended Carbridge University in 1935 or 1936, who was a rember of the communist cell at one of the colleges. Straight could not retetter which college and said it could have been Trinity College, Trinkty Ball or possibly another. This young ran was the son of an addiral, however, straight could not recall the name at first. He finally said he believed the surname right be Howard. Straight stated this young can was a shy, mild mannered individual, of good appearance and pleasant disposition. Straight said he did not know him well and thought he may have met him at a fraction meeting or perhaps some party or other get together of the communist oriented students. straight said he felt this young can had been "drawn/in" while a student and was not a dedicated communist. Straight further 'Howard" as a nice lad and said he was described about five feet eight inches in height, with black heir.

Straight further advised that Bernard /. H. Boox was a Critish student at Carbridge University From about 1933 to 1936, who later became an American citizen and attended Tale University. How was a member of the student commist organization and was domiciled at St. Johns College. Straight said he is certain Boox lost interest in the communist cause about 1938 or 1939, and gave it no Further thought. He recalled Boox had served in the war and after receiving brief officer's training was dropped behind the lines in France and was injured. He returned to the United States where he was discharged and reentered Yale University. Straight advised from is presently living in Cashington, D.C., and is director of the Center for Helenic Studies.

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Straight also recalled Henry Hyde as an American student at Cambridge University (1933-1936) when he know. He advised Hyde was not connected with the communist revenent in any way and was not apparently interested in political matters. Straight said Hyde belonged to the Pitt Club which was an innocuous social "luncheon club?" Ltraight said Hyde is now residing in New York City and is engaged in stock brokerage business.

Straight further recollected there was a Casadian by the name of Nerbert Torman who attended Cambridge University when he was there and who for a year or two, about 1935-1936, was a member of one of the communist cells. This can was a graduate student and was preparing for a career in diplomacy at the time. He later served in the Canadian Foreign Ministry and achieved rank of Minister. Straight advised he did not know Mornan well and knew nothing of his beckground. He stated Mornan had committed suicide eight or ten years ago by jurping out of a window in Montreal, or perhaps "trawa, Canada. Straight advised he had related the information just above to a member of the British Intelligence Service about four or five years ago during interview in Pashington, D.C.

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NATIONAL COMMITTEE ON ATOMIC INFORMATION

According to on November 16, 1945, a group of 60 organizations met for the first meeting of the National Committee on Atomic Information as a result of telegrams sent to various national organizations by a group headed by MICHAEL STRAIGHT of the publication "The New Republic". The Acting Chairman of this Committee meeting, which was held at Washington, D. C., was the Reverend FRANCIS MCPEEK, prominent in local Washington, D. C. church circles. Reverend McPEEK named a Steering Committee to work out plans for setting up the National Committee on Atomic Information.

The second Committee meeting was held in Washington, D. C., on December 18, 1945, and it formally set up the National Committee on Atomic Information and appointed <u>DANIEL MELCHER</u> as Director. At this meeting the officers and the Executive Committee were formally installed. The functions and the duties of the National Committee on Atomic Information, according to its own interpretation, is "a clearing house established by 60 national organizations to provide a medium through which they can cooperate with the atom scientists and their colleagues for public understanding of scientific facts of atomic energy and their implication for society."

JACKSON was born September 10, 1896, at Colorado Springs, Colorado, was educated at Amherst College, Columbia University and Harvard University. He is presently employed as a Director of the National Farmers, Union, Tashington, D. C.

ROBERT K. LAMB, Member of the Executive Committee

The indices of the ashington Field Division reflect that ROBERT K. LAMB of the United Steelworkers of America, CIO, is known to Confidential Informant C-299, whose identity is known to the Bureau, to be personally acquainted with Communists. However, no definite information has been secured reflecting his membership in any subversive organizations.

MICHAEL STRAIGHT, Member of the Executive Committee

The indices of the 'ashington Field Division reflect that MICHAEL STRAIGHT, son of Mr. and Mrs. "ILLARD D. STRAIGHT, was formerly employed at the Department of State as a Division Assistant in the Division of European Affairs. His name appears on the active indices as of January, 1942, of the American Peace Mobilization and the North American Spanish Relief Commisses. He is approximately 29 years of age, He was educated at Cambridge University. His notice, the present

Dr. CONDON is known to be an associate of NATHAN GREGORY SILVERN'STER, principal subject in the case entitled "GREGORY; ESPIONAGE-R". The report of Special Agent LAMBERT G. ZANDER, dated March 11, 1946, at "ashington, D. C., entitled "GREGORY; ESPIONAGE-R" reflects that on February 4, 1946, a surveillance on NATHAN GREGORY SILVERNASTER reflected that SILVERNASTER and his wife were observed to visit at the home of Dr. and Mrs. CONDON and the four of them were also observed to attend a dinner sponsored by the AMERICAN SOCIETY FOR RUSSIAN RELIEF.

By letter dated March 27, 1946, the Bureau advised that information had been received from a highly confidential source reflecting that Dr. CONDON was considered as "nothing more or less than an espionage agent in disguise."

Another individual suspected by Informant as being a member of the Communist Party is MAX YERGAN. A review of the indices of the "ashington Field Division reflects that this individual was the subject of an Internal Security-R investigation by the New York Field Division in 1944. The report of Special Agent HOTARD 7. LITTLE, dated November 24, 1944, at New York City, entitled "DR. MAX YERGAN, with aliases; INTERNAL SECURITY-R, REFER 5-IS" reflects that YERGAN is an American negro and was born July 19, 1894, in Raleigh, North Carolina. He is the Executive Director of the Council on African Affairs, President of the National Negro Congress, Treasurer and Director of the "People's Voice", a pro-Communist Harley newspaper.

Dr. YERGAN's activities include his being an organizer and trustee of the JEFFERSON SCHOOL FOR SOCIAL SCIENCE, a Communist school in New York City, and Chairman of the Poard of the GEORGE TASHINGTON CIRVER SCHOOL of Harlem, New York. YERGAN is also reported to be a secret member of the Communist Party and is believed to have been sent by the Party to India and Africa in 1940. He is a known guest writer for the DAILY "ORKER and is also known to have visited LOUIS BRANSTEN, prominent Communist Party member in San Francisco and EARL BRO DER, former President of the Communist Party.

LOUIS DOLIVET, heretofore mentioned, is also another individual active in the affairs of the National Committee on Atomic Information, according to _____. The report of Special Agent JOHN N. DORAN, dated July 5, 1945, at New York City, entitled "LOUIS DOLIVET, with aliases; INTERNAL SECURITY-R: REGISTRATION ACT" reflects that he was born

in France of Roumanian origin and became a naturalized French citizen in 1937. He was alleged to be a member of the Swiss Communist Party but no substantiation has been obtained regarding this allegation. He entered the United States on January 9, 1941, and married the sister of MICHAEL STRAIGHT, heretofore mentioned. DOLIVET is International Director of the magazine entitled "Free World".

JAMES R. NEWMAN, Program Analyst of the Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion, is interested in the National Committee on Atomic Information, according to Informan NEWMAN was born in New York City of Czechoslovakian parentage and is a graduate of Columbia University Law School.

The Bureau has advised that it has received information from a highly confidential source reflecting that NEWMAN is noted for his pro-Soviet leanings. It is alleged that he has access to material flowing directly to the White House and is intimately acquainted with NATHAN GRECORY SILVERMASTER, subject of a case entitle "GRECORY; ESPIONAGE-R". NETHAN is currently under investigation by the Washington Field Division.

AERBERT MARKS is another individual suspected by as having Communist tendencies and who is active in the affairs of the National Committee on Atomic Information. The informant has advised that MARKS is employed in the Office of Information; United States Department of State, and was placed in charge of the distribution of a report concerning atomic energy prepared by Assistant Secretary of State DEAN ACHISON. This report was definitely not favorable to the Communist line and the informant observed MARKS was reluctant to give the report wide distribution and did not do so until Congress forced him to circularize the report in paper-bound copies.

The informant advised that members of the National Committee on Atomic Information are in daily contact with MARKS.

The Bureau by letter dated March 27, 1946, has advised that a highly confidential source has stated that HERBERT MARKS is noted for his pro-Soviet leanings. MARKS is currently under investigation by the Washington Field Division.



RON

MICHAEL WHITMEY Dear Mr. President:

We respectfully urge you to grant an amnesty commuting the sentences of the sixteen men and women now in prison under the Smith Act (Alien Registration Act of 1940) to time already served, and to use your influence to secure the postponement of trials in the 180 cases presently awaiting Trial Court or Appeals Court decisions under

Those who present this petition are in fundamental disagreement with the philosophy of the Communist Party and with essential elements in its program and are motivated in their present action by their attachment to the democratic way of life and the desire maintain and strengthen it.

We call attention to Supreme Court Justice Black's description of the character of the Smith Act and the trial of Communist Party leaders under it in his dissenting opinion when appeal from the convictions under it was before the Supreme Court:

"At the outset I want to emphasize what the crime involved in this case is and what it is not. These petitioners are not charged with an attempt to overthrow the government, They were not charged with non-verbal acts of any kind designed to overthrow the government. They were not even charged with saying or writing anything designed to overthrow the government.

"The charge was that they agreed to assemble and talk and publish certain ideas at

"... The indictment is that they conspired to organize the Communist Party and to use speech or newspapers and other publications in the future to teach and aflyocate the forcible overthrow of the government."

Recently the Supreme Court itself, by agreeing to review the California prosecutions, has recognized the appropriateness of a "second look" at the act.

Among the sixteen for whom we are requesting a Christmas amnesty are elderly and ill persons. The indictments and convictions in these cases were carried through in a period of the "cold war" and in an atmosphere often marked by hysteria. Fortunately, in recent months conditions have changed for the better and there is a noticeable trend to reaffirm the basic democratic traditions of our country.

It is our conviction that your aquiescence in our request would serve to give further impetus to this healthy trend, would give proof of our confidence in democratic institutions, would encourage and inspire our friends throughout the world and win new friends. Thus, we believe, it would also contribute toward peace in the world about which you are so deeply concerned and would be in line with the policy you set forth through Secretary of State Dulles on Nov. 18, 1955;

"I know that no setback, no obstacle to progress will ever deter this Government and our people from the great effort to establish a just and durable peace."

Straight, aged 52, is the wealthy socialite who is related to the Whitney family through his mother. He is the former editor of the "New Republic."

On 8/19/69 the White House was furnished the results of a name check conducted by the Crime Records Division, a tickler of which is attached. Straight has been involved with communist front organizations in the past and has admitted same to us during interviews in 1963.

The case has been ordered separately to the field for immediate attention and the field has been instructed to conduct no neighborhood investigation concerning Straight without Bureau approval. You will be advised of any unusual developments.

His loyalty is unquestionable and no information of a derogatory nature concerning him has come to Mr. MYERS' attention, nor does Mr. MYERS have any knowledge of the appointee having any objectionable habits. Without question, Mr. MYERS recommended the appointee for a position of responsibility and trust.

Mrs. GLENNON MATTHIESON, Business Manager of the "New Republic", advised SA's OWENS and BURGESS as follows on September 4, 1969:

C. area. Mr. STRAIGHT has maintained this residence for over the past He also had an estate in Virginia and maintains a residence on Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts. from an extremely wealthy background and travels extensively. He was associated with the publication, "New Republic", which his family funded for many years. Mr. STRAIGHT was associated with this publication from approximately 1940 to 1954. originally served as the editor of this magazine but later merely wrote articles for it occasionally. Since 1954, he has served on the boards of various organizations but has been writing novels and has not been employed by any outside He has been serving as President of the William C. Whitney Foundation, New York City, New York, which his family founded, and which concerns itself with the arts, having made many grants in the fields of music, dance, theater, and painting.

He is an officer of several corporations, one of which publishes the magazine "Antiques." He was a National Chairman of the American Veterans Committee, Chairman of the Board Amnesty International of the U.S., Vice-Chairman of the National Repertors Theater, a board member of the Washington

Theater Club, and co-Chairman of the Washington Chapter of the Legal Defense Fund of the NAACP. He is a resident of the District of Columbia and a home owner on Martha's Vineyard, where he is president of the Vineyard Conservation Society.

He was one of a panel of three judges who picked "2001: A Space Odyssey" to be the U.S. entry in the Moscow Film Festival in July, 1969; it won a special award. As an advisor to the U.S. delegation, he attended the festival and flew with the film to the capitols of Eastern Europe, where it was shown in a series of special showings during the Apollo 11 Flight.

One of his writings is "Carrington", his first novel, which was published in 1960. Some of his other works included "A Very Small Remnant", which was published in 1964. His father was WILLARD STRAIGHT, born in Oswego, New York in 1882 and who died in 1917. His mother is DOROTHY WHITNEY, born in Washington, D. C. in 1888 and who was living as of 1958 in South Devon, England.

Appointee married BELINDA CROMPTON STRAIGHT on September 15, 1940. She was born August 15, 1920 at Rye,

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New York.

He listed his occupation as "writer", and gave his mailing address as 1244 19th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C.

Appointee indicated that he planned to leave New York City on October 22, 1958 for a two-week trip to Great Britain for business and family reasons.

In response to the questions appearing on his passport application, "Are you now or have you ever been a member of the Communist Pafty?" appointee answered "No" to each question.

His file reflects that passport number 414645 was issued to him on June 17, 1954 for a two-week trip to Great Britain to handle business as a trustee for the family trust whose situs was both in the United States and Great Britain.

A passport renewal was issued on April 30, 1952 for passport number 289550 (which was previously issued on May 31, 1950) for a one month trip to visit England and France. At the time this passport was renewed his occupation was listed as Editor of the "New Republic", 40 East 49th Street, New York City, New York. This passport was renewed from April 30, 1952 until May 30, 1954.

The passport number 62275 was issued on Anril 19, 1946 for a one month trip to visit England. This passport was renewed on May 27, 1949 for two years. At the time he obtained his renewal passport, series number 2474, appointee indicated he would take a seven-week pleasure trip to visit England, France, Switzerland, and Italy.

The passport number 147418 was issued on September 18, 1934 for travel to England and other countries for one year as a student. According to information in the file, the appointee

was to leave New York City on September 20, 1934. On September 18, 1934 this passport was renewed for two years and at that time the appointee's legal residence was listed as 1172 Park Avenue, New York City, New York. Appointee registered with the American Consul at Plymouth, England on August 26, 1936. At that time he stated he resided at Dartington Hall, Totnes, Devon, England, where he was residing temporarily with relatives.

Passport number 55 dated July 7, 1930 was issued by the American Consul at Plymouth, England for travel to Switzerland, France, Germany, Italy, and was also for return to the United States. Appointee related on his passport application that he resided in the United States from April until the end of May, 1926, and from June, 1926 until approximately July, 1930 when he lived at Totnes, Devon, England residing there temporarily with his mother. The following investigation was conducted by SA HASKELL L. BROYLES at the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C., on September 5, 1969, and obtained from Book Review Digests concerning books which have been written by Mr. MICHAEL WHITNEY STRAIGHT.

- 1. "Make This The Last War"; the future of the United States by Mr. WHITNEY consists of 417 pages, published in 1943 by Harcourt. It was reviewed by DOROTHA DAWSON, Library Journal, Wilson Library Bulletin for January, 1944. Mr. STRAIGHT deals with the advantages that flow funited Nations collaboration. He calls for a Federated Europe, pivot of a of a federated world, but holds that unless there is a fundamental change in the social structure of Europe there will be no basis for European Federation. His outline of a social change is sweeping and concrete. Generally speaking, he is a 145 percent New Dealer who would retain war-time emergency measures long after the war ends. He apprently is not afraid of the bad effect which the omnipresent governments wightly exercise on human rights and individual freedom.
- 2. "Trial by Television" by MICHAEL WHITNEY STRAIGHT, Editor of "The New Republic" has written a vivid and pentrating beak about the Army Mc Carthy Hearings. For 15 chapters, Mr. STRAIGHT's book is mainly good color reporting and interpretation not neutral, of course, but with a forthright, unconcealed Grusading Partisanship. Senator MC CARTHY's friends will not like the book. In the final chapter, however, Mr. STRAIGHT goes deep into the causes of Mc Carthyism, which far antedate the Junior Senator from Wisconsin. Here he is eloquent and distrubing.
- 3. "Carrington"; a novel of the West by MICHAEL WHITENY STRAIGHT, published in 1960 by Knopf and contained 374 pages. The Book Review Digest contains several reviews of this book by Mr. STRAIGHT and are summarized as follows:

The novel deals with the ambush and massacre of 81 men under the command of Lietenant Colonel W. J. FETTERMAN



The story is baseddon actual fact and told by a real historical figure, Major EDWARD WYNKOOP, a Calvaryman who in 1864 negotiated peace with the Cheyennes.

On September 3, 1969, Mr. JOHN QUAST, 4525 Greenspring Road, Alexandria, Virginia, advised that he has been in the employ of the STRAIGHT family for about 40 years, and has worked directly for the appointee perhaps 25 to 30 years. He stated he is presently the caretaker for the property owned by the appointee at 3600 Greenspring Road, Alexandria. He explained that the appointee, the appointee's family, and his wife all resided on the estate up until early 1964, when Mr. STRAIGHT purchased the home on N Street in Georgetown area of Washington, D.C., from the former owner, Mrs. JACQUELINE KENNEDY, and took up residence there. At that time, the STRAIGHTs leased their property on Greenspring Road and have not lived there since then.

He further stated that he understands that Mr. and Mrs. STRAIGHT are now separated and contemplating getting a divorce, if not already done so. He added, however, that any bills he receives in connection with the estate, he merely forwards on to Mr. STRAIGHT at the N Street address in Georgetown.

He further stated that as far as he is concerned, both Mr. and Mrs. STRAIGHT are exceedingly fine individuals and wonderful employers. They have always been very considerage and kind to him, they give him the instructions they wished followed in connection with the estate and then leave him alone to carry out these instructions. He vouched for the appointee's character, associates, reputation, and loyalty and highly recommended him for a position of trust and confidence.

On September 5, 1969, Mr. LEWIS E. KIMBALL, Jr., Head Master, Potomac School, 1345 Potomac School Road, McLean, Virginia, advised he has been associated with the appointee for at least five years or longer. He explained that Mr. STRAIGHT up until a year ago, was a member of the Board of Trustees of the school and also Mr. STRAIGHT's children, at one time or another, attended the school as students. Currently, Mr. STRAIGHT's youngest child, DOROTHY, is a sixth grade student at the school. He described Mr. STRAIGHT as "top flight". In this interview Mr. Straight furnished detailed information concerning his communist activities and contacts with the Russian espionage apparatus during the late 1930's and 1940's. Mr. Straight is President of the William C. Whitney Foundation, New York, New York, and is a noted author. He is also engaged on a full-time basis as trustee in charge of his family's estate. Mr. Straight is currently described as being anticommunist

Mr. Straight's former brother-in-law, Louis Dolivet, has been described by reliable informants as being an active international communist agent in early 1930. Since Louis Dolivet's arrival in the United States in 1939, he is not known to have engaged in espionage or communist activities. He is described as pro-American and anti-Soviet; however, other informants are of the opinion that Louis Dolivet is an inactive, but highly placed, Soviet agent. Mr. Straight's sister, as of September, 1950, was reportedly separated from Louis Dolivet and she since married an actor by the name of Peter Cookson.

Mr. Straight advised the FBI in 1967 that his daughter, Susan Romilly Straight, while attending Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, in 1966 was associated with a group of students which was affiliated in general with the Students for a Democratic Society.



This summary memorandum covers the period since December, 1950. Mr. Straight was born on September 1, 1916, in Southampton, New York.

Employment

Mr. Straight continues to serve as President, William C. Whitney Foundation, New York, New York. He continued to serve as a contributing editor to the magazine "New Republic," New York, New York, until approximately 1956. The "New Republic" is self-described as "A Journal of Opinion."

Mr. Straight is also engaged on a full-time basis as trustee in charge of his family's estate.

In addition to the aforementioned employments, Mr. Straight has written several books. These books are described as being primarily historical novels.

He is now or has been a member of numerous social, civic, and professional organizations. He is now serving or has served in the past on the governing boards of some of these organizations. Among these organizations are the American Veterans Committee, the Amnesty International of the United States of America, the National Parks Association, the Washington Theater Club, and the Washington, D. C., chapter of the Legal Defense Fund of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, all Washington, D. C.

Marital Status

Mr. Straight and the former Belinda Crompton were married on September 10, 1939. The records of Washoe County Court, Reno, Nevada, disclose Belinda Crompton Straight was granted a divorce from Mr. Straight on August 27, 1969, on the grounds of incompatibility. The records contain no information of a derogatory nature.

Mrs. Belinda C. Straight, Washington, D. C., advised she obtained a divorce from Mr. Straight in Reno, Nevada, in August, 1969, on the grounds of incompatibility. Mrs. Straight stated that prior to the Spring of 1969, she and Mr. Straight and their five children maintained a residence at 3017 N Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C. She added she has since moved to 4707 Fulton Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C., and Mr. Straight is currently occupying his summer home located in Chilmark, Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts.

Mrs. Straight advised she would vouch for Mr. Straight's character, associates, reputation, and loyalty. She stated she would recommend him most highly for a position of trust and responsibility.

Mr. Straight and his son, David, reside on State Road, Chilmark, Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts. When in Washington, D. C., Mr. Straight resides at The Watergate Hotel, 2650 Virginia Avenue, Northwest, Washington, D. C. Mr. Straight also maintains an estate located on Green Spring Road, Alexandria, Virginia.

Military Service

He continued to serve in the United States Army Officers' Reserve Corps, inactive service, until April 1, 1953, when his appointment as a second lieutenant was terminated by reason of declination of an indefinite term. His service record is clear.

Interviews

June A. Willenz, National Executive Chairman, American Veterans Committee, Washington, D. C., advised she was first associated with Mr. Straight over twenty years ago during the initial organization of the American Veterans Committee. She stated she has had frequent contact with Mr. Straight through the ensuing years. Mrs. Willenz related Mr. Straight served as National Chairman of the American Veterans Committee from 1952 to 1954 and is presently serving as a member of the National Board of Directors of this organization. She stated Mr. Straight is a remarkable individual who has demonstrated decided leadership ability and will make "a magnificent addition to any administration."




She described him as being strongly anticommunist. She explained by stating a number of years ago communist elements attempted on a number of occasions to take over the American Veterans Committee. She advised Mr. Straight was primarily responsible for thwarting the attempts by the communist elements to take over this organization. Mrs. Willenz described Mr. Straight as a man of knowledge and devotion who is completely trustworthy and dependable. She said Mr. Straight's character, associates, and loyalty are above reproach. Mrs. Willenz concluded by stating she feels Mr. Straight is an exemplary person and she would recommend him without any qualification for a position of trust and responsibility.

Harriett K. Evison, New York, New York, advised she has known Mr. Straight and members of his family for approximately thirty-seven years. She related she formerly worked for Mr. Straight's mother as a social secretary and subsequently she was employed as an assistant secretary-treasurer, William C. Whitney Foundation, New York, New York. Mrs. Evison described Mr. Straight as being top-notch in every respect. She advised Mr. Straight is well respected in professional and social circles and is noted for his authorship of historical novels. Mrs. Evison stated she would recommend Mr. Straight and his family without any hesitation regarding their character, reputation, loyalty, and She stated she felt Mr. Straight would be a valuable asset to the Federal Government and would highly recommend him for a position of trust and confidence.

Ernest W. Kulka, M.D., New York, New York, interviewed in Vinalhaven, Maine, advised he has been closely associated with Mr. Straight and his family for at least thirty years. He stated Mr. Straight is engaged in writing novels and is also President of the William C. Whitney Foundation, New York, New York, which is a philanthropic foundation founded by Mr. Straight's family. Dr. Kulka described Mr. Straight as being an extremely intelligent and capable individual. He stated Mr. Straight's honesty, integrity, loyalty, character, and associates have always been above reproach. He stated he would highly recommend Mr. Straight for a position of trust and responsibility with the United States Government.

Alice Winchester, Editor, "Antiques," New York, New York, advised the "Antiques" magazine has been owned by the Straight family since about 1930. She stated she has been associated with



Mr. Straight for about thirty years, relating that the "Antiques" magazine and the "New Republic" magazine formerly shared the same office space in New York, New York. Miss Winchester said Mr. Straight and his family are regarded as exceptionally nice people. She described Mr. Straight as a capable, intelligent, competent, and responsible individual who is definitely a patriotic American. She advised she would highly recommend Mr. Straight for a position of trust and responsibility.

Milton C. Rose, Senior Partner, Mudge, Rose, Guthrie, and Alexander, law firm, New York, New York, advised the William C. Whitney Foundation is a client of this law firm. He stated the William C. Whitney Foundation is a charitable organization created by Mr. Straight's parents in memory of his grandfather, William C. Whitney. Mr. Rose related Mr. Straight has served as President of this foundation since its inception in 1937.

Mr. Rose advised Mr. Straight devotes his time primarily to writing novels and handling his duties as trustee in charge of his family's estate. He described Mr. Straight as being an extremely capable person of unusual ability. He stated Mr. Straight is an imaginative, original thinker who is engaged in various philanthropic enterprises. He said Mr. Straight has always exhibited an interest in the fine arts and is a collector of paintings and sculptures. Mr. Rose concluded by stating Mr. Straight's and his family's reputation, character, associates, and loyalty are above reproach. He said he would highly recommend Mr. Straight for a position of trust and responsibility with the United States Government.

Jacob K. Javits, United States Senator from New York, interviewed in Washington, D. C., advised he has known Mr. Straight for many years and considers him to be a personal friend. He stated he has attended many social and public functions with Mr. Straight in both New York, New York, and Washington, D. C. Senator Javits described Mr. Straight as an intelligent and capable person who is interested in the arts. He said Mr. Straight is an excellent writer and is completely loyal to the United States. He related Mr. Straight is anticommunist and has used his influence to thwart the communist movement. He said he would give Mr. Straight his highest personal recommendation for a position of trust and responsibility with the Federal Government.

Charles E. Goodell, United States Senator from New York, interviewed in Washington, D. C., advised he knows Mr. Straight primarily by reputation. He stated he is aware of Mr. Straight's writing and knows Mr. Straight enjoys an excellent reputation. Senator Goodell related he believes Mr. Straight is completely loyal to the United States and he would recommend him for a position of trust.

Twenty-two additional persons, consisting of social acquaintances, co-workers, neighbors, and professional associates were interviewed. They furnished favorable comments concerning Mr. Straight's character, reputation, loyalty, morals, ability, and associates. Persons well acquainted with him stated he is a dependable, trustworthy, and intelligent person. He was recommended for a position of trust and confidence. Persons acquainted with the other members of Mr. Straight's family advised they are all reputable individuals.

Information has been received from the appropriate law enforcement agencies in the continental United States indicating their files contain no information concerning Mr. Straight or his close relatives, except the following:

The records of the Fairfax County Police Department, Fairfax, Virginia, disclose Mr. Straight's former wife, Belinda C. Straight, on March 27, 1964, was charged with a traffic violation (failure to obey highway sign). She elected to forfeit collateral in the amount of \$22.75. On April 25, 1964, she was charged with a traffic violation (speeding) and she elected to forfeit collateral in the amount of \$17.75.

The records of the Fairfax County Police Department, Fairfax, Virginia, also disclose Mr. Straight's daughter, Susan R. Straight, on December 22, 1965, was charged with a traffic violation (failure to obey traffic officer). She elected to forfeit collateral in the amount of \$22.75.

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Passport Record

The records of the Passport Office, Department of State, Washington, D. C., disclose Mr. Straight has been issued several passports since 1930 for travel to Europe for the purposes of study, pleasure, and business. The last passport was issued on July 18, 1967, for a proposed three-week business and pleasure trip to Europe. The records contain no additional pertinent information.

Miscellaneous

Information Concerning Mr. Straight

The December 6, 1952, issue of the "Times-Herald," a Washington, D. C., newspaper, reported that Michael Straight, president of the William C. Whitney Foundation, was questioned before a special committee of the United States House of Representatives investigating tax-exempt foundations. According to the article, Mr. Straight was questioned concerning \$19,000 in grants by the Foundation which were made to organizations "cited as subversive or communist fronts. Straight contended that none of these organizations was known to be a communist front at the time grants were given and said they were cut off when so listed."

In 1955, "Michael Straight, Publisher, The 'New Republic,'" was listed as a signer of "A Petition to the President of the United States on Amnesty for Smith Act Victims and Postponement of Trials."

Since 1963, Mr. Straight has been contacted by the FBI on a number of occasions and he has furnished information concerning his association with communist groups in England and his contacts with a Russian espionage apparatus after his return to the United States. These activities occurred during the late 1930's and the early 1940's. The enclosed communication sets forth the results of a June 18, 1963, interview with Mr. Straight.

Information Concerning Daughter, Susan Romilly Straight

Mr. Straight, in 1967, advised his daughter, Susan Romilly Straight, while attending Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, in 1966, had associated with a group of students which was affiliated in general with the Students for a Democratic Society.

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The Students for a Democratic Society is a pro-Marxist and anarchistic organization which has been deeply involved in campus revolts and anti-Vietnam demonstrations in the United States.

Mr. Straight's daughter, Susan, was one of three persons observed on September 19, 1967, placing handbills on cars located in the parking lot of the Pentagon Building, Arlington, Virginia. The handbills carried the wording, "Exorcise the Pentagon, 10/21-22," also an artist's drawing of a figure of a female and the words "Martin Carey - Artist." On instructions of the United States Attorney's Office, Alexandria, Virginia, these individuals were released by the Pentagon Building Police Department.

The name Sue Straight was included on a list of those in attendance at the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, Administrative Committee Meeting, which was held on October 7, 1967, in New York, New York.

Information Concerning Former Brother-in-law, Louis Dolivet

Mr. Straight's sister, Beatrice, married Louis Dolivet on February 21, 1941, and as of September, 1950, they reportedly were separated. In about 1966, Mr. Straight's sister married Peter Cookson.

Informants, who have furnished reliable information in the past, advised that in early 1930 Louis Dolivet was an active international communist agent in Europe. He was allegedly active in several communist front organizations in France and Switzerland Louis Dolivet was reportedly a close associate of Willie Muenzenberg, an admitted Soviet agent in Europe, who was reportedly assassinated by the communists Since his arrival in the United States in 1939, Louis Dolivet is not known to have engaged in espionage activities or communist subversive activities. His employers recommended

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him as being pro-American, and anti-Soviet. Other informants are of the opinion that Louis Dolivet is an inactive, but highly placed, Soviet Agent

Informants, who have furnished reliable information in the past and who are acquainted with some phases of communist activity in the Washington, D. C., New York, New York, and Massachusetts areas, were contacted and they advised they were unable to furnish any additional pertinent information concerning Mr. Straight or members of his family.

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MICHAEL WHITNEY STRAIGHT

Straight was interviewed on June 18, 1983, at Washington, D.C., by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and furnished the information set forth hereafter.

Straight advised he was born September 1, 1916 at Southampton, Long Island, New York. His father, Willard Straight, died two years later and he was taken to England where he was raised and educated. His mother was occupied with various interests and also remarried a few years following the death of his father. Straight said in effect his early life was that of an orphan although he suffered from no lack of material things.

Straight stated he entered Cambridge University in the fall of 1934 and was domiciled at Trinity College. He said he developed a warm and lasting friendship with John Cornford, two years his senior, whom he described as a brilliant student and confirmed Communist. Straight stated Cornford was killed in action in late 1936 during the Spanish Civil War while fighting for the Loyalist cause and he had been the one who broke the news to his parents in 1937 when the death became known. Straight said the loss of his friend had a profound affect upon him.

Straight related during his second year at Cambridge he joined a student Communist group in the university which numbered perhaps twenty-five members. He said to his knowledge the members did not carry Communist Party cards, or pay regular party dues, and were not formally affiliated with the British Communist Party. Straight said they did hold meetings, contribute to the Party and its front organizations, and participate in demonstrations. Straight said the group was headed by John Cornford, above, and James Klugmann, also a brilliant student and edicated Communist, who later served the British Government during World War II and was in liaison between Great Britain and the Yugoslavs. Straight advised other student

members of the Communist group readily recalled were Brian Simon, of Birmingham, England (son of Sir Ernest Simon, Governor of British Broadcasting Company), J. M. Ever, a graduate student somewhat older than Straight, Leslie Humphreys, Leo Long, and Hugh Gordon, a roommate of Straight at Trinity College.

Straight stated during his second year at Cambridge he was also admitted to the well known secret "Conversazione Society" (The Apostles), which he described as an absient discussion society which was "non-conformist" but not political and was somewhat similar in character to a secret fraternity in the United States. This organization held meetings weekly at which papers were presented and various political and cultural topics were discussed. Straight said although the society was not political he later learned there were Communist Party (CP) members in the organization such as Guv de Moncy Burgess and Professor Anthony Blunt but pointed out the membership also included many distinguished persons such as Lord Bertrand Russell and Lord John Maynard Keynes.

Straight advised through his associations in the "Conversazione Society" he had come into contact with Guy Burgess and Professor Anthony Blunt, mentioned above. Straight mentioned he had also met Burgess through his brother, Whitney Willard Straight who was well acquainted with Burgess although he did not know how they met. Straight said his brother was an automobile racing enthusiast and did not know of any common interests with Burgess. Straight described Burgess as brilliant and interesting but stated he was physically repulsive, unkempt in appearance, a drunkard, a notorious and promiscuous homosexual and a known Communist.

Straight described Professor Anthony Blunt as a young professor of languages perhaps five or six years his senior, and stated Blunt was also well known as a confirmed homosexual. Straight said Blunt resided at Cambridge University and taught the French language. Blunt was even then an expert in the field of fine art and today is regarded as a leading expert in this field. For the past ten years or so Blust has been Director of the Courtauld Institute, a well known gallery of art founded by Samuel Courtauld, Blunt is also "Keeper of the Queens Pictures," including the Richmond Park Collection and now bears the knighted title Sir Anthony Blunt.

Straight related that sometime after the death of John Cornford became known, Professor Blunt invited him to a meeting and Straight visited Blunt in his University quarters. Blunt told Straight that he and an associate had been watching him and informed Straight that the death of Cornford had focused attention on Straight. It was pointed out by Blunt that Cornford made the suppeme sacrifice and Blunt suggested that Straight should also make some comparable sacrifice. Straight said he did have a sense of guilt that he had not fought in Spain as well as deep sorrow over the death of Straight said Blunt requested that he discontinue his work in the Communist movement in England and turn to work in the international field. Blunt said the Third International wanted a man in Morgan and Company to obtain economic reports and requested Straight to proceed to the United States on this mission. Straight said he protested vigorously stating he was not cut out to be a banker and was not interested. He said he told Blunt that his family was in England, and pointed out that he had aided the cause by contributions to the "Daily Worker" and other party interests and would continue to do so. Straight stated that some three weeks elapsed and then Blunt informed him that his protests had been rejected and he should proceed to the United States. Straight said he left England by ship but was still protesting and he addressed a letter to Blunt from aboard ship again pointing out that he felt his contributions to the Party and "Daily Worker" were sufficient.

Referring to the unidentified associate of Blunt, Straight recalled that Blunt had mentioned that his friend was not working in the Government but was working against the Germans. Straight said he had the feeling that Guy Burgess was the individual associated with or directing Blunt and stated he inquired whether Burgess was this individual. He said Blunt declined to give him a straight answer.

Straight advised before departing England, Blunt indicated he would be contacted and requested some token from him for the purpose of identification. He said he gave Blunt a small blue ink drawing of his sweetheart, now Mrs. Straight, which Blunt tore in half, returning one half to him and retaining the other half. Straight said later in the interview there may have also been an oral parole arranged but he could not remember its terms.


Humphreys and Leo Long, both students at Cambridge University, he suspected that Anthony Blunt may have attempted recruitment of these young men for underground work. Straight stated Humphreys was his classmate and close friend, and said Humphreys was near collapse as result of his experience with Blunt. Straight described Humphreys as a young dilettante and said he was a member of the student Communist cell or group.

In connection with the contributions mentioned above, Straight recalled he had made unsolicited gifts of each to the "Daily Worker" and also directly to Harry Pollitt, then Secretary of the British Communist Party. Straight described Pollitt as a true English working class figure and a fine fellow, and said he got along well with Pollitt.

Straight stated he had met Pollitt in the summer or autumn of 1936 and had probably been introduced to him by Bill Campbell, Editor of the "Daily Worker." Straight recalled his first contribution to the Worker stating in 1936 he walked in "cold" and contacted Campbell. He told Campbell he was a member of the student Communist group and wanted to help. Campbell was first mildly interested and then astonished when Straight contributed the sum of approximately \$2,000. Straight explained these gifts also were the result of his feeling of guilt because he had plenty of money and saw many people lacking bare necessities.

Straight mentioned that he had participated in the Student's March on May Day 1936 and this fact was brought to the attention of John Maynard Keynes by Lord Simon, a Government official who indicated darkly if this conduct continued it might prevent Straight from obtaining British citizenship. Straight said Lord Keynes had advised him that he told Lord Simon that this was merely a student indiscretion and should not be held seriously against him.

Straight advised in August, 1936, he had taken part in a student tour to Russia. The trip was organized by John Madge, fellow student, and Communist, whose brother, Charles Madge, was also a Communist, and later poet and sociologist. Straight advised the tour was financed through sale of tickets to the students and mentioned free passage was awarded to each student who sold four tickets for the tour. Straight saidthe.




trip began by ship to Leningrad and included visits to Moscow and the Ukraine cities of Kharkov and Kiev. Straight stated he was shaken by his observations on this trip and related his experience included observing railroad guards shoot at boys who were "riding the rails." He said he was shocked at such wanton exuelty and believes this was the beginning of his ultimate disillusionment.

Straight mentioned that Professor Blunt had accompanied the student tour to Russia. Straight said when he first became acquainted with Blunt he was unaware Blunt had any Communist connections and recalled only that Blunt was "mildly Marxist" in his writing on art and art history.

Straight advised in July, 1937, he came to the United States following graduation from Cambridge the previous month and resided at the apartment residence of his mother and stepfather at 1172 Park Avenue, New York City, since his mother had returned to England.

In the late Summer of 1937, he made a tour of the Middle West chauffeuring Roger Baldwin, head of the American Civil Liberties Union on a speaking tour. They were accompanied by John Simonds, English student, also from Cambridge University, who was later killed in World War II. The tour ended about September 10, 1937, and Straight recalled having celebrated his twenty-first birthday, September 1, 1937, at St. Louis, Missouri.

Straight stated he looked around for a job and recalled contacting Edward Stettinius of United States Steel in this connection. He related sometime between October, 1937, and March, 1938, and probably in December, 1937, he received a phone call at his home from an unknown man who identified himself as Michael Green. This man seemed embarimessed and apologized for delay in contacting Straight. Although Straight could not recall any further conversation of this initial telephone contact, he is certain he sensed immediately it had originated with Anthony Blunt and made arrangements with Green for personal meeting which was consummated.




Straight stated he could not now recall what method of identification was used by Green to identify himself as the person Blunt had indicated would contact him. He did not remember whether or not Green was in possession of the torn half of the ink drawing previously mentioned nor could he recall whether a parole was used but subsequently said he thought there may have been a verbal parole.

Straight stated he had a couple such meetings with Green during this period in New York City and recalled on one occasion walking through Central Park and visiting the park zoo during the stroll. Straight said in these early meetings Green made no demands or proposals but endeavored to study and appraise him and appeared to have prepared topics and lines of conversation to test his thoughts and points of view and to shope his mind. On his part, Straight said he was agreeable and understanding and supposed that Green trusted him but did not regard Straight as a dedicated communist. Straight mentioned he told Green about his friendship with two White Russians, Sergei Vassiliev and his wife Tamara Daykarhanova, both professional drama teachers, and said Green was annoyed. Straight said Green also expressed displeasure about his friendship with Roger Baldwin.

Straight said in March or April, 1938, he came to Washington, D. C., and resided at 1718 H Street, N. W., in a bachelor apartment next door to the Metropolitan Club. He was interested in government employment and first considered connection with the National Resources Planning Board. He recalled making a trip to a settlement in West Virginia and said Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, whom he knew, was present. Shortly thereafter through the assistance of Mrs. Roosevelt, he was given an assignment, without salary, under Herbert Feis, Economic Advisor, Department of State who is currently with the Institute of Advanced Studies, Princeton University. The assignment was to prepare a report "The Economic Consequences of European Rearmament." Straight said his office consisted of a small group and included Roy Veatch, Leroy Stinebower, and Fred Livesay, now deceased.

H Street, N. W., and in Summer of 1939 moved to 1025 Connecticut Avenue, N. W., where he lived with Roy Veatch, Beverly

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Bowie, an editor of National Geographic magazine, since deceased, and briefly one Walter, last name not recalled, who was with the Foreign Policy Association. About July, 1939, he took over a house jointly with Roy Veatch and wife at 2811 Dumberton Avenue, N. W., and in September, 1939, he was married to Belinda Compton. Straight said he and his wife lived at Hay Adams House for a month and then moved to 109 Prince Street, Alexandria, Virginia.

Straight advised his first connection with Department of State in 1938 was not conventional employment and he was not under strict discipline and therefore was in and out of the office and the city to some extent during this period. He said he is sure he had advised Michael Green of his plans and sometime after his arrival in Washington, Green called him by phone and thereafter they had three or four meetings at intervals of approximately one month. Straight mentioned Green had never furnished him with his address or telephone number but recalled at some time, probably prior to the time Green absented himself for a lengthy period, Green informed him that if he should find it necessary to contact Green he could accomplish this by communicating with Alexander Koral. Straight said Green furnished him with the address of Koral which was in Brooklyn, New York, but could not remember the Straight said he had never had occasion to contact Koral and had never seen or heard from him. Several photographs of Koral and his wife Helen Koral were displayed to Straight who was unable to identify either as anyone he had ever seen.

Straight recalled having two luncheon meetings with Green. On one such occasion they had lunch at a small restaurant on Pennsylvania Avenue, N. W., between 19th and 20th Streets, on another they ate at a place near the Ontario Theatre, 1700 Columbia Road, N. W. Straight said they discussed topics of current interest and he may have furnished Green with memoranda which he prepared from public material and his personal knowledge.

report "Economic Consequences of European Rearmament" which he prepared for Cordell Hull and which occupied his time until December, 1938, was based entirely or almost entirely on public source material.

Straight said he recalled another meeting with Green which occurred in the evening. He said he and Green drove around during this meeting and on this occasion he gave Green two official State Department documents and let Green out of the car somewhere in the area bounded by 12th Street and Connecticut Avenue, H. W., and Florida Avenue and K Street, N. W., so he could have copies made. Straight subsequently picked Green up by arrangement. Straight described the documents as unimportant and not highly classified, and stated he did not have access to any highly classified material. Straight described one of the documents as a memorandum of perhaps two pages on International Trade and dealing with The other document was a mimeographed trade with Italy. pamphlet, described by Straight as a "Political Summary," possibly on the subject of conditions in Europe, and apparently prepared for the information of Foreign Service personnel. It was based mostly on public source material. Straight had nothing to do with preparation of these documents. He said they were not for public consumption and may have borne classification "Confidential," but he was not certain.

Straight recalled another meeting with Green in Washington, D. C., during which they had dinner at a restaurant located near the Union Depot and believed to have been Childs Restaurant. Straight remembered Russia had just attacked Finland (November 30, 1939) and said Green was upset about this. He also recalled that some newsworthy speech had been delivered by Otto Kussinen.

Straight advised he had left his voluntary employment at the Department of State in early 1939. He said he told Michael Green about this and the latter was dissatisfied but was mollified when Straight told Green he might get a job at the War Department, which story Straight invented.

Shortly after leaving the State Department, Straight made the acquaintance of Thomas Gardner Corcoran, well known New Dealer, who arranged for him to be employed at the Department of Interior where he wrote non-classified speeches for members of the Cabinet in connection with the coming presidential election. Straight said he recalled meeting with Green on one occasion while with Department of Interior and remembered preparing a memorandum for Green concerning the Nazi - Soviet

pact. In this memorandum, Straight said he argued that the Russians might feel they were compelled to make the pact for their military protection, but if they extended its application to the "International" it would mean that communists all over the world would oppose the Allied Powers. He said he urged the Soviets not to undermine the war efforts of France and Great Britain.

Straight said he remained at the Department of Interior until early Summer 1940 and spent the late summer with his family on a ranch in Wyoming. He returned to Washington, D. C., and on August 27, 1940, at the personal offer of a position by James Dunn, he was appointed Division Assistant, Division of European Affairs, Department of State, remaining in this position until May 21, 1941. Straight stated he did not hear from Green during this entire employment and observed he had not wanted Green to know about it.

Straight stated after leaving the Department of State in May, 1941, he moved to his family home at Westbury, New York, and noted that he did not hear from Green again until Autumn, 1942, shortly before he enlisted in the United States Army Air Corps. Straight said he had not seen Green for two years and had no idea where Green had been or what he was doing. Straight said Green called him and he met Green at the Jamaica, New York, railroad station and drove him around for an hour or more. He did not recall that Green made any requests or suggestions, but merely ascertained what Straight was doing and they engaged in discussion. Straight said he must have seen Green on another occasion about this time since he was certain about the dinner meeting with Helen Green at Longchamps restaurant, although he cannot fix the time, and is very certain Helen was introduced as the wife of Green, and that they comported themselves as a happily married couple. Straight also said it was his clear. impression that Helen Green had the full confidence of her husband and he believed Green had told him to be at ease since she could be trusted completely.

Straight advised in connection with his last meetings with Green he informed Green that he was going into the Air Corps and declared it was understood between them that there was no further advantage in their relationship and that it was at an end. Straight stated firmly from the time of these last meetings he never saw or heard from Green

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Snor was he ever approached by anyone purporting to represent the communist underground or Soviet intelligence.

Straight stated he had written a book entitled "Hake This The Last War" which was published toward the end of 1942 by Harcourt and Brace. Straight said the essence of the book was that the Soviets had to stop paying lip service to democracy or another great war was inevitable. Straight mentioned that he had discussed this with Maxim Litvinoff, then Soviet Ambassador to the United States, and said he prepared a memorandum for Michael Green summarizing the substance of his book.

Straight recollected in connection with his book that the publisher had given a "book party" to which Earl Browder, head of the Communist Party, USA, was invited by the publisher. Straight said he was introduced to Browder, whom he had not met before, but engaged in no serious conversation. Straight recalled that Green had wanted him to meet his wife, and had also desired that he meet Earl Browder whom Green described as a fine fellow.

Straight described Michael Green as about 35-40 years in 1937, 5 feet 10 inches, 170 pounds, hair black, thick, coarse and wiry, average complexion, average dress, pleasant disposition with sense of humor. Straight said Green spoke good English but he was not a native American and Straight believed him to be Russian. Straight recalled Green had discussed getting established in some small business, possibly insurance, and solicited his suggestions. Straight thought perhaps the cities of Baltimore and Philadephia were mentioned, and the thought occurred that maybe Green came from Philadephia. Straight said he never knew where Green lived or where he may have been employed and could furnish name of no person who knew Green, other than Alexander Koral.

Straight furnished description of Helen Green advising he saw her on the single occasion in the dimly lit dining room of Longchamps and he did not obtain a complete description. His best recollection is that she was about 35-40 years of age when he met her, very tall, possibly 5 feet 10 inches, light or blonde hair, nice appearance but not

beautiful, very quiet, definitely American but not Southerner. He said she was not from New York but could be from the Midwest.

Photograph of William Grienke was displayed to Straight who immediately and positively identified the picture as that of the man he had known as Michael Green.

A confidential source, of known reliability, who is a former Soviet Intelligence Officer, identified photograph of William Grienke as one Akhmerov, first name not recalled, whom he first knew, in Moscow in 1931 as a worker in the Sixth Division of the Foreign Department of the Soviet State Security Organization, which division covered intelligence operations in the Near East and Far East. Grienke entered the United States on a fraudulent passport in August, 1935, using the identity of a child who had died one month after birth in New York. In connection with the application upon which this fraudulent passport issued, Alexander Koral executed the affidavit of identifying witness, stating that he had known Grienke for about fifteen years

Straight further related that during a period of absence of Green, and probably during 1939-1940, he had received a visit in Washington, D. C., from a young man who indicated in some way that he came from Michael Green. Straight said he had lunch with this man on Pennsylvania Avenue, N. W., around 19th or 20th Street, and recalled the man had three or four written questions which he thought concerned Cabinet shifts and other political questions, and which were rather stupid. Straight said he declined to cooperate with the man and never saw him again. He described the man as "about 24-25 years, 5 feet 10 inches, plump, American, from New York, Jewish."

Straight also stated during the period 1940-1942, during absence of Green, he was contacted by a man who called him in New York and made appointment. He met this person for half hour over a drink. This unknown man also informed Straight that in the absence of Green he wanted to ask a few questions. Straight said he declined to cooperate with this man. Straight described the man as about 30 years of age, 5 feet 10 inches, fair complexion, foreign accent, English not good. Straight had the impression that the man might be a Czech although he could not recall sound basis for this opinion. Straight did not feel the man was a professional intelligence Officer.

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Washington meeting with Michael Green and in the Summer, 1938, he received a phone call at work in the Department of State from an individual who identified himself as Solomon and said he worked for the Treasury Department. Straight could not recall whether Solomon was the first or last name of this man but stated he could identify the man and would recognize the full name if it were shown to him among a list of names. Straight said he did not believe Solomon visited his office but met him briefly for lunch and had recollection of walking with Solomon along Pennsylvania in front of the White House.

Straight advised Solomon informed him that someone had referred Straight to him as a Communist in the Department of State. Solomon told Straight not to be concerned but to "lay low" and promised that he would be contacted. Straight inferred there was a CP group in the State Department. Straight said he inquired if the individual who referred him to Solomon was Donald Stephens and Solomon intimated it was without specifically stating this was true. Straight described Donald Stephens as an old time radical who was a friend of his mother since the 1920's, and a friend of Mrs. Roosevelt. He said Stephens was a non-conformist who believed in free love and abstained from use of meat or liquor. Straight said he did not regard Stephens as a Communist.

Straight said he endeavored to inform Solomon that he had the wrong man and that he was merely a liberal minded economist and student of John Maynard Keynes. Straight said Solomon did not mention any associates or principal and made no reference to Earl Browder or his own affiliation with the CP. Straight stated he never saw Solomon again and never heard from him.

Straight described Solomon as apparently a bit older than himself (then 22 years), slender, "typically Jewish." Photographs of Solomon Aaron Lischinsky and Solomon Adler were displayed to Straight who immediately identified pictures of Adler and then recalled the full name from newspaper publicity in connection with the espionage revelations of Elizabeth Bentley.

Straight recalled he told Green about his contact with Solomon and Green did not appear concerned and merely laughed. (He said Green did not caution or admonish him concerning Solomon; Straight was unable to make any conclusion whether Green and Adler were associated or even acquainted and did not interpret the reactions of Green as suggesting either.

COMIDENTIAL

Whitaker Chambers, deceased, an admitted communist, and courier in Soviet espionage operations, identified Solomon Adler, also known as Schlomer Adler, as an employee of the Treasury Department who furnished reports of a financial nature to Chambers' Soviet principal.

Elizabeth Terrill Bentley, an admitted communist, and courier in Soviet espionage operations, identified Adler as an active member of a Soviet espionage group, active in Washington, D. C., prior to 1944. She further identified him as a dues paying member of the Communist Party.

Adler, a naturalized citizen, departed the United States in May, 1950, for England and was expatriated on December 14, 1953.

Further concerning Guy Burgess, Straight advised Burgess was a known Communist and had been a member of the Communist group at Cambridge University, preceding Straight as a student by couple of years. Straight advised about 1934 or 1935, Burgess ostensibly broke with the Communists, and began circulating with all types of people including Nazi government officials. Straight said it subsequently became clear to him that Burgess had been recruited and had gone underground.

He recalled that after graduation from Cambridge, Burgess worked for the British Broadcasting Company. Straight again said although Professor Blunt never specifically admitted it to him, Straight, was convinced in his own mind that Burgess was behind Blunt's recruitment of Straight.

Straight recalled that Burgess came to the United States in about 1940, called him in Washington, D. C., and they had lunch together at Little Garden Tea House. He said during lunch Burgess made the statement "I am completely out of touch with my friends, could you put me in touch?" Straight interpreted this to mean that Burgess was out of touch with "Green's counterparts" in England and thinking that Straight was still cooperating and would be able to arrange for Burgess to be recontacted. Straight said he merely accepted this statement made no comment and changed the subject.

Straight commented he could have furnished the name of Alexander Koral but did not do so. He said that Burgess had supper at Straight's house that night, but Straight recalled the evening as one of tenseness and said he was very unpleasant to Burgess on this occasion. Straight said he did not report his meeting Burgess to any authorities and did not believe he told Green about it either.

Straight said he next saw Burgess in England in about 1946, when he went to England on personal business. At this time, Straight attended a meeting of "Conversazione Society" at which Burgess spoke. He said Burgess and Professor Blunt expressed a desire to talk to him and they met in a club where Burgess was a member. He said Burgess and Blunt asked him how he stood and according to Straight a bitter argument ensued, Straight expressing his complete distilusionment with everything Russian and Communist.

Straight recalled that on this trip to England he had met with Harry Pollitt, British Communist leader, and discussed the American proposal to share atomic energy which he thought was a generous and magnificent gesture which could be used in the furtherance of peace. He said he had first contacted Margot Heinemann, who had been the girl friend of his friend John Cornford, and who was then highly placed in the British Communist Party, and Heinemann suggested he discuss the matter with Pollitt.

Straight recalled that in early 1947 he was in England and was associated with Henry A. Wallace who was deeply involved in the peace effort. One day while walking into Parliament he accidentally ran into Burgess who invited him to lunch and they had luncheon at the Savoy. Burgess told Straight he was working as secretary of Hector MacNeill, member of the British Parliament, and an important man in foreign affairs. Straight said during the luncheon he told Burgess that America was approaching the feeling of complete frustration with the Soviets and the latter were inviting a terrible clash. Burgess inquired if he could impart this to his friends and Straight said he could. Straight inferred Burgess had reference to Soviet principals.

Straight related that in 1951 or 1952 he had visited the British Embassy in Washington, D. C., and as he emerged from the Embassy he ran into Burgess who turned and rode downtown with Straight.

Burgess wanted to borrow a car but Straight said he turned down the request of Burgess. Straight said Burgess informed that he was connected with the British Embassy and engaged in some special work not identified further. Straight said Burgess seemed different, whether by design or otherwise, and recalled Burgess discussed the recovery efforts of the European countries and favored American aid to further this recovery. Straight said he told Burgess he should resign from service with the British government and if he did not do so within three months he would report him to the British authorities. Shortly thereafter, Burgess did leave the British government and fled to Russia. Straight said he had no specific information to what caused Burgess to defect and flee.

Straight related that his brother, Whitney Straight, is Executive Vice President of Rolls Royce and during a visit to Moscow, Russia, about February, 1963, he had talked with Burgess who appeared glad to see Whitney and sent Michael his best regards. Straight explained the meeting came about at a press conference at which inquiry was made whether any of the British present knew Burgess and when Whitney indicated he did know Burgess the latter appeared almost immediately. Straight advised Burgess and his brother discussed general matters and recalled nothing of intelligence significance.

Straight was asked why he had not reported Burgess and the other matters to FBI and said he had considered doing so on many occasions but was afraid. He said he was mindful of the experiences of Whitaker Chambers and Elizabeth Bentley and could not bear the publicity of hearings and trials, with resultant injury to his wife and five children. Straight said on two or three occasions he tried to force himself to visit the British Embassy and did so once. He said he went to the British Information Service and indicated he knew Guy Burgess and the unknown man on duty told him there were many witnesses who knew Burgess and did not pursue the matter so Straight departed without relating any pertinent facts. Straight said he is glad now that he has divulged the information and is willing to answer any questions to the best of his ability.

In connection with the above, Straight stated in about 1940 he had informed his wife of the facts reported herein up to that date, and in 1948 Belinda Straight had furnished the names of

Anthony Blunt and Guy Burgess to her analyst Dr. Jennie Welderhall, wife of FNU Hall, an official of the British Embassy at Washington, D.C., as two individuals engaged in underground Communist activity; in order that the information could be passed on to Mr. Hall and the British government.

Straight was asked if, during his early residence in Washington, D. C., he recalled ever having become a member of or contributed to any Communist front organization, and was specifically asked concerning the American Peace Mobilization (APM) and the Washington Committee for Democratic (WCDA) Action. He said he has no recollection of being a member of these or any other similar organization, but stated it is possible he had contributed to such an organization in the event he had been asked to do so. Concerning the Washington Book Shop Association (WBA), Straight said he recalled going to their office, located, as he recalled on 17th Street and signing some sort of agreement whereby he received a reduced rate on books.

The APM, WCDA and the WBA have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States, pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Mrs. Straight stated that prior to the Spring of 1969, she and Mr. Straight and their five children maintained a residence at 3017 N Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C. She added she has since moved to 4707 Fulton Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C., and Mr. Straight is currently occupying his summer home located in Chilmark, Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts.

Mrs. Straight advised she would vouch for Mr. Straight's character, associates, reputation, and loyalty. She stated she would recommendation most highly for a position of trust and responsibility.

Mr. Straight and his son, David, reside on State Road, Chilmark, Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts. When in Washington, D. Military Service

She stated Mr. Straight is a remarkable individual who has demonstrated decided leadership ability and will make "a magnificent addition to any administration."





She described him as being strongly anticommunist. She complained by stating a number of years ago communist elements attempted on a number of occasions to take over the American Veterans Committee. She advised Mr. Straight was primarily responsible for thwarting the attempts by the communist elements to take over this organization. Mrs. Willenz described Mr. Straight as a man of knowledge and devotion who is completely trustworthy and dependable. She said Mr. Straight's character, associates, and loyalty are above reproach. Mrs. Willenz concluded by stating she feels Mr. Straight is an exemplary person and she would recommend him without any qualification for a position of trust and responsibility.

Harriett K. Evison, New York, New York, advised she has known Mr. Straight and members of his family for approximately thirty-seven years. She related she formerly worked for Mr. Straight's mother as a social secretary and subsequently she was employed as an assistant secretary-treasurer. William C. Whitney Foundation, New York, New York. Mrs. Erican described Mr. Straight as being top-notchinneeveryreespect. Sishesaadding Straightias a philanthropist and concerned primarily with helping people and has given large sums of money to needy organizations. She advised Mr. Straight is well respected in professional and social circles and is noted for his authorship of historical novels. Mrs. Evison stated she would recommend Mr. Straight and his family without any hesitation regarding their character, reputation, loyalty, and She stated she felt Mr. Straight would be a valuable associates. asset to the Federal Government and would highly recommend him for a position of trust and confidence.

Ernest W. Kulka, M.D., New York, New York, interviewed in Vinalhaven, Maine, advised he has been closely associated with Mr. Straight and his family for at least thirty years. He stated Mr. Straight is engaged in writing novels and is also President of the William C. Whitney Foundation, New York, New York, which is a philanthropic foundation founded by Mr. Straight's family. Dr. Kulka described Mr. Straight as being an extremely intelligent and capable individual. He stated Mr. Straight's honesty, integrity, loyalty, character, and associates have always been above reproach. He stated he would highly recommend Mr. Straight for a position of trust and responsibility with the United States Government.

Alice Winchester, Editor, "Antiques," New York, New York, advised the "Antiques" magazine has been owned by the Straight family since about 1930. She stated she has been associated with

Whitney Foundation, was questioned before a special committee of the United States House of Representatives investigating tax-exempt foundations. According to the article, Mr. Straight was questioned concerning \$19,000 in grants by the Foundation which were made to organizations "cited as subversive or Communist fronts. Straight contended that none of these organizations was known to be a Communist front at the time grants were given and said they were out off when so listed."

In 1955, "Makbaal Satzaight, Pachisher, "The 'New Republic," was listed as a signer of "A Petition to the President of the United States on Amnesty for Smith Act Victims and Postponement of Trials."

Since 1963, Mr. Straight has been contacted by the FBI on a number of eccasions and he has furnished information concerning his association with communist groups in England and his contacts with a Russian espionage apparatus after his return to the United States. These activities occurred during the late 1930's and the early 1940's. The enclosed communication sets forth the results of a June 18, 1963, interview with Mr. Straight 100-6/929-64

Information Concerning Daughter, Susan Romilly Straight

Mr. Straight, in 1967, advised his daughter, Susan Romilly Straight, while attending Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, in 1966, had associated with a group of students which was affiliated in general with the Students for a Democratic Society.

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The Students for a Democratic Society is a pro-Marxist and anarchistic organization which has been deeply involved in campus revolts and anti-Vietnam demonstrations in the United States.

Mr. Straight's daughter, Susan, was one of three persons observed on September 19, 1967, placing handbills on cars located in the parking lot of the Pentagon Building, Arlington, Virginia. The handbills carried the wording, "Exercise the Pentagon, 10/21-22," also an artist's drawing of a figure of a female and the words "Martin Carey - Artist." On instructions of the United States Attorney's Office, Alexandria, Virginia, these individuals were released by the Pentagon Building Police Department.

The name Sue Straight was included on a list of those in attendance at the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, Administrative Committee Meeting, which was held on October 7, 1967, in New York, New York.

Information Concerning Former Brother-in-law, Louis Dolivet

Mr. Straight's sister, Beatrice, married Louis Dolivet on February 21, 1941, and as of September, 1950, they reportedly were separated. In about 1966, Mr. Straight's sister married Peter Cookson.

Information in the past, advised that in early 1930 Louis Dolivet was an active international Communist agent in Europe. He was placedly active in several Communisted organizations in France and Switzerland. Louis Dolivet was reportedly a close associate of Willie Muenzenberg, an admitted Soviet agent in Europe, who was reportedly assassinated by the Communists. 

Egil "Bud" Krogh called me from John Ehrlichman's office at the White House on 9/17/69. He made reference to captioned individual and stated he thought this individual had formerly been employed by the FBI. He added that, while he had read the special inquiry report submitted to the White House 9/10/69, he nevertheless thought that if this individual had been employed by the FBI a further look could be given to appointing this man to the position of Deputy Chairman of the National Council on the Arts.

After checking I called Krogh back and told him that this individual was never employed by the FBI. I stated that a number of administrations had sought to employ this man and, as a matter of fact, Bobby Kennedy had sent this man over to the FBI in June of 1963 to be interviewed relative to his questionable background. I stated we did interview Straight at that time; however, under no circumstances had we ever hired him. Kennedy's effort in sending this man over to the FBI was merely an attempt to get this man's record straightened out.

Krogh stated that under the circumstances he planned to recommend to Ehrlichman that this man not be hired.

Our Special Inquiry report of 9/10/69, backed up by Bureau files, reflects an investigation from 1941 to 1943 based on this individual's reported Communist Party activities. He was editor and publisher of the "New Republic," following World War II. This magazine was founded by his father and mother. Although he allegedly denounced communism after World War II, he was still regarded as an extreme liberal. He had a number of relationships with Guy Burgess, the English Foreign Office employee who defected to the Russians. Files do not reflect any employment of Straight on the part of the Kennedy administration.

Leonard Garment, Special Consultant to the President, called at my office this morning regarding captioned individual and indicated the White House is still considering the question of whether or not Straight should be appointed to the position of Deputy Chairman of the National Council on the Arts.

My memorandum dated 9-18-69, attached, shows that the White House previously contacted me regarding Straight indicating they thought Straight had been employed by the FBI. They were told he was never employed by the FBI and that the first time we talked to this individual was in June, 1963, when Bobby Kennedy sent him to the FBI to be interviewed relative to his questionable background.

Garment stated he was entirely familiar with Straight's background but said Straight had told them that since 1963 he had cooperated fully with the FBI. I told Garment we had contacted Straight a number of times since his original admissions to us in 1963 regarding his Communist Party activities and his contacts with a Russian espionage apparatus. He was told that these contacts were for the purpose of filling out information regarding his admissions. Further, Straight did contact us on one occasion in 1969 to advise that he contemplated a short trip to Russia and he was concerned he might be contacted by the KGB in view of his past activities with the Soviets. On this occasion, he expressed a willingness to take any course of action suggested to him, but we told him we had no instructions with regard to his conduct in the USSR. He subsequently told us his trip was uneventful.

Garment advised that Peter M. Flanagan, Assistant to the President, had discussed Straight's possible appointment with Senators Karl E. Mundt (R. - South Dakota) and Gordon L. Enclosure REC-23
