Attached refers to efforts by New York Times writer, [redacted] to get information from SA [redacted] [redacted] WFO, concerning a national security electronic surveillance (on Charles E. Radford) operated for The White House in 1971 and 1972.

WFO, in accordance with security measures exercised at the time, has nothing in its files concerning the electronic surveillance in question. Only a very limited number of persons, on an absolutely need-to-know basis, were privy to the matter, and only 3 or 4 Headquarters officials were aware of the matter. Records relating to it are maintained in INTD under sole control of Inspector T.J. Smith.

Due to the extremely sensitive nature of this matter and the fact that it will obviously be the subject of investigation by both the Congress and the Watergate Special Prosecution Force, we should decline to discuss the matter with [redacted] or other newsmen.

As a matter of interest, the [redacted] article would tend to indicate that the electronic surveillance on Radford was related to the matter of the Pentagon spying on Dr. Henry Kissinger. Insofar as the FBI was concerned there was absolutely no connection between the two matters.

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Legal Counsel to E. S. Miller memorandum 3/20/74 captioned as above, pointed out probability of the Rodino Committee requesting broad access to FBI files and data relative to the impeachment investigation. Memo also recommended that matter be reviewed and that conference be arranged with [redacted] and the Deputy Attorney General to discuss policy to be followed by the FBI. Suggestion was also made that Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski be made aware of the problem.

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From the standpoint of Intelligence Division, requests for information by the Rodino Committee will likely involve several very sensitive areas of our operations and we feel that it is essential that some basic ground rules be established to preclude the public disclosure of data to the detriment of national security or national interest.

For example, the so-called [redacted]

(U) [redacted] Such information could seriously affect conduct of foreign affairs. (C)

Yet, this report, and the data relating to it, will surely be of great interest to the impeachment investigation.

Another example is the file relating to the 17 wiretaps placed for the White House between 5/69 and 2/71 on newsmen and White House aides. Here the issue of current litigation and possibility of future litigation is involved. If this file is aired in a public forum, the Government stands to lose millions of dollars in damage suits and there will certainly be serious invasion of privacy of concerned individuals. 65-75108-

In the case of this file, disclosure by the Rodino Committee could hamper investigations by the Special Prosecutor.

The same applies to the file relating to wiretaps placed relative to the so-called "Pentagon Spy Case," which involved a Navy Yeoman, Charles E. Radford II, misappropriating classified documents and possibly leaking them to columnist Jack Anderson.

There are likely to be other areas of interest to the Rodino Committee which involve FBI use of electronic surveillances or other sensitive techniques, and we should be prepared well in advance of any requests to properly respond. A request, for example, concerning FBI use of surreptitious entry would have to be dealt with on the basis of the fact the FBI has no records of surreptitious entries.

We should expect the entire gamut of possible requests relating to national security-type investigations and techniques since the use or mis-use of such techniques on behalf of or on instructions of the White House will certainly constitute some grounds or basis for accusation for illegal acts by the President. And notwithstanding the right of the Rodino Committee to explore all such accusations and possibilities, the effect of public disclosures in many instances could have serious consequences on our ability to fulfill national security responsibilities.

OBSERVATIONS:

Intelligence Division agrees with necessity of conference between Bureau representatives and the Deputy Attorney General. Intelligence Division also agrees with suggestion that the Special Prosecutor be advised of need to develop and establish a necessary policy and that he be invited to participate in discussions.

Intelligence Division stands ready to assist in or take part in necessary discussions.

ACTION:

That this be forwarded to Legal Counsel in response to his memorandum of reference.

Moorer Knew Yeoman Claims

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP) — A former military aide to President Richard M. Nixon has claimed he was handling confidential White House documents in the admiral's Pentagon office.

In a series of interviews, Radford acknowledged that among the documents he handled were copies of Henry A. Kissinger's personal papers to President Nixon, and his secretaries' notes. He said he was working for Nixon's national security adviser, is now secretary of state.

Radford was interviewed Saturday with Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., chairman of the Armed Services Committee. The senator asked him to describe the documents he handled during his time in the White House.

"It was a perfect thing," he said. "I had everybody's confidence."

During those months Radford was a stenographer clerk on the military liaison unit inside the White House. His function was to facilitate the coordination of papers between the National Security Council and Moorer, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

In previously published interviews, Radford has stated that his superior officers on the military liaison unit, Rear Adm. Randolph C. Robinson and Rear Adm. Robert G. Walander, both urged him to take the material covertly.

Asked about Moorer's personal involvement, Radford said that at least four officers assigned to Moorer's office received the documents during his activities in late 1970 and throughout 1971. Those documents, he said, were "sanitized" — that is, all identifying marks were clipped off and the material pasted on a white sheet of paper.

THE YEOMAN said, however, that he did not sanitize documents intended for Moorer's attention. "He got them with all the markings," Radford said.

Furthermore, Radford said, he was always encouraged by his superior officers to believe that Moorer was grateful for his efforts. He quoted Robinson, who was killed in Southeast Asia in 1972, as telling him repeatedly that "Adm. Moorer was pleased with the information. I always got feedback."

RADFORD acknowledged that he is in an awkward position of an enlisted man challenging the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. But he said he has much more specific information about Moorer's involvement than he would tell the Senate.

Senators told newsmen Saturday that Radford was subpoenaed to appear before the full Armed Services Committee Feb. 14.

The Moorer Affair 32

Secretary of State Kissinger and Admiral Thomas Moorer, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, in the Senate Armed Services Committee, portray the military system in the White House present a completely disturbing picture of civilian weakness and actual confusion at the highest levels of the government.

From the outset of this discreditable affair, Admiral Moorer has given explanations and denials that are not only false but also actually misleading. Confused in his mind, Moorer did not receive many of the batches of documents that he was supposed to have received from the White House. He was told by Mr. Kissinger's White House office by a Navy clerk and sent to Admiral Moorer over a period of many months.

These documents were not superfluous copies or of no interest because they contained no new information. Admiral Moorer received an "eyes only" report prepared by Mr. Kissinger on his first talk with Chinese Premier Chou En-lai and intended solely for the President. The Admiral also received documents that informed him of many details of the secret Paris peace talks with the North Vietnamese that were not provided to him by normal channels.

After President Nixon learned in December, 1971, of this spying, Admiral Moorer's liaison office at the White House was abolished and its staff, including the light-fingered clerk, transferred. But no disciplinary action was taken and a few months later, President Nixon reappointed Admiral Moorer for another two-year term as Chairman of the Joint Chiefs.

The President's line of reasoning remains undisclosed. All that is clear is that he reappointed Admiral Moorer even though the latter had used underlings to spy upon him. When a President condones such improper and insubordinate behavior on the part of the highest uniformed officer, then civilian control of the military becomes more shadow than substance.

Although the truth is gradually becoming known, Secretary Kissinger and Admiral Moorer even at this late date are less than candid. The Admiral minimizes the spying as the work of an "over-exuberant" clerk and "just an exchange within the organization." Even worse, he appears to have been willing in 1971 to make the clerk a scapegoat and prosecute him alone. That is scarcely how responsibility should run in a military chain of command.

For his part, Secretary Kissinger is also giving explanations. He says he thought the documents were trying to get brownie points with the President, and he suspected that they were not really his. He says, especially, that they were not really anything to which they need to pay particular attention. Such explanations are implausible. Young men, no matter how eager, do not steal documents from the President of the United States and pass them to admirals unless they are encouraged and prodded by someone much higher in rank. It is too late now for doubletalk and dissimulation. It is time for everyone involved in this matter to tell the truth, the whole truth.

The New York Times and Washington Post featured articles in their 2/26/73, issues, concerning a Time Magazine story in the issue coming out 2/26/73, which accuses the FBI of having tapped the telephones three years ago of six or seven reporters and a number of White House aides in connection with leaks from Administration aides. The article related that Acting Director L. Patrick Gray III continued the taps for 14 1/2 months before the U.S. Supreme Court overruled the wiretap policy in June.

No record is known to exist in the files of the FBI concerning the wiretapping of telephones of reporters and White House aides as described in these news articles. Some hearsay knowledge does exist, however, that some newsmen and individuals connected with the White House were the subject of electronic surveillances during a period from probably early 1969 until sometime in 1971. The White House, concerned over the number of serious leaks of highly sensitive information to various news sources, instructed through the Attorney General that certain specified individuals, including newsmen of one kind or another, should be covered by electronic surveillance in an effort to identify the source of the leak.

This project was very tightly held in the FBI and only a very few persons were even remotely aware of it. The project was personally handled by Former Assistant to the Director William C. Sullivan, and even though he was not to utilize any Agent personnel not absolutely essential to the project, he had SA Bernie A. Wells review the tapes and logs and dictate summaries for use of the White House. Only one secretary was used to take dictation, [redacted]. At least two Agents in the Washington Field Office had to know of the project, since the installation and monitoring had to be done in the field. These would have been Supervisor [redacted] and the Agent who handled technical matters in WFO.

Since the project was so sensitive, all records relating to it, and which would identify the persons who were covered by electronic surveillance, were maintained in the personal custody of William C. Sullivan. Following his departure from the FBI, a search was made in an effort to locate these records, but they were not found. Subsequently, former SA Bernie A. Wells, who had taken a job with the Department of Justice and who was then associated with former Assistant Attorney General Bob Mardian, revealed that Mardian was in possession of the records relating to this sensitive project.

Sullivan was confronted concerning the records and he referred all questions concerning the records to the Attorney General. Mr. Hoover contacted the Attorney General concerning the records and the Attorney General said they had been turned over to Mr. Ehrlichman at the White House. Mr. Mardian was also contacted and he claimed that he had destroyed the records. It was subsequently determined that Sullivan apparently had given the records in a sealed package to former Assistant Director C.D. Brennan with instructions to turn them over to Mardian. Brennan said that he had no knowledge of the records, nor that they were in the package delivered to Mardian. Brennan was almost certainly aware of the existence of the project, since something of that magnitude could not possibly be kept completely secret. For one thing, Wells, who was handling the actual work, worked in Division Five, and had to spend a great deal of time in Sullivan's office on something that was obviously not within the scope of Division Five's day-to-day activity. Wells, though discreet to a point, was also not discreet to the point that it was easy to put two and two together if one was inclined to do so.

Insofar as the allegation that these taps continued on after Mr. Gray took over as Acting Director, a different set of circumstances exist. No newsmen were involved. On 12/22/71, the Attorney General personally contacted Mr. W. Mark Felt and instructed him that a wiretap be immediately instituted on Charles Edward Radford II, a Navy Yeoman assigned to the Joint Chiefs of Staff and who was responsible for frequent contact with the White House and National Security Council. The Attorney General explained that these instructions had come directly from President Nixon following a Jack Anderson column 11/18/71, which disclosed conversations between the President and Mr. Henry Kissinger and between Dr. Kissinger and other high level officials at the White House. Radford, who was a member of the same church as Anderson (Mormon) was the primary suspect of the leak to Anderson.

After clearing the matter with Mr. Hoover, Mr. Felt instructed that a wiretap be instituted on Radford, and this was done 12/22/71. Subsequently, after the wiretap disclosed that Radford was confiding in various persons concerning the fact he was a suspect in the leak of information to Anderson, the Attorney General instructed that a wiretap be instituted on [redacted] a close associated of Radford. The fact that our records had disclosed that [redacted]

Later, on 1/14/72, a wiretap was instituted, again on the personal instructions of the Attorney General, on Georgianna M. Prince, an employee of the State Department who was also close to Radford and to [redacted]. She had also served in Embassies abroad. (U)

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After a Navy investigation established that Radford was acquainted with Jack Anderson, and a polygraph examination indicated some unaccounted-for relations with Anderson, the Navy decided to transfer Radford to the West Coast. This was done rather suddenly and he ended up in Portland, Oregon at the home of [redacted]. The Attorney General again instructed that coverage be instituted of Radford [redacted]. [redacted] After several days the Navy sent Radford to the Naval Reserve Training Center, Salem, Oregon, and the Attorney General instructed that coverage be afforded Radford at the Naval Reserve Training Center, and at his private residence when he moved in and got a phone. Coverage was instituted at the NRTC 2/7/72, and at Radford's home on 2/15/72. (U)

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The taps on [redacted] and Prince were discontinued on 2/17/72. The taps on [redacted] and the NRTC were discontinued on 4/11/72. The tap on Radford was discontinued at 9:00 AM on 6/20/72, following the Supreme Court decision in the Keith Case. It was not discontinued until 6/20/72, as the other cases had been on 6/19/72, since we were awaiting instructions from the White House. (U)

Although we have a careful record of the various stages of the coverage of Charles Edward Radford II, we have no written instructions or authorizations from either the Attorney General or the White House concerning the matter. Our records have been kept completely isolated from other FBI records, and there are no indices whatsoever relating to this project. The number of wiretaps involved in the project (only one wiretap project) was integrated into the total of wiretaps when such totals were used publicly by Mr. Hoover. This was at the specific instruction of Mr. Hoover.

At the time the Radford project was started in December, 1971, no other White House-requested electronic surveillance projects were in existence in the FBI. There is little likelihood that anyone connected with the previous projects, such as Sullivan, Wells, Brennan, [redacted] had any information whatsoever concerning the Radford project. Only Messrs. Hoover, Tolson, Felt, E.S. Miller, and T.J. Smith in the FBI knew of the Radford project. Reports, typed on unmarked bond as blind memoranda not identifying the FBI in any way, were sent to Mr. John D. Ehrlichman (Eyes Only) at the White House in double-sealed envelopes by Liaison. We know, however, that they were initially handled by one of Ehrlichman's [redacted] (who was known as [redacted] in the White House). Copies of all such reports were also furnished to the Attorney General (Eyes Only) in double-sealed envelopes, and delivered to the Attorney General's personal secretary by T.J. Smith in every instance. Copies of reports to the ATTORNEY General were not delivered to the present Attorney General.

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As a matter of pertinence, our coverage during the Radford project did in fact reveal a rather close and somewhat surreptitious relationship between Radford and Jack Anderson.

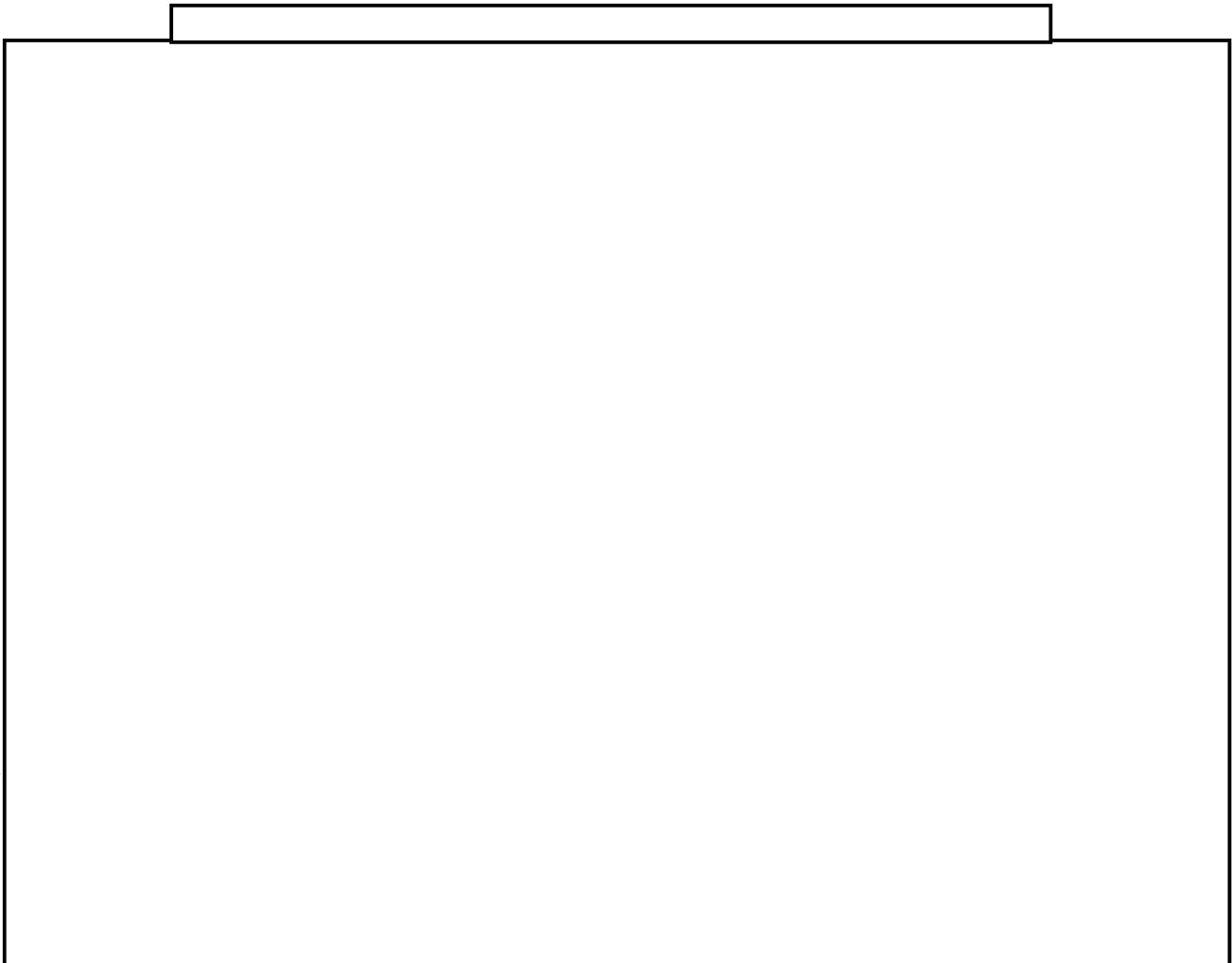

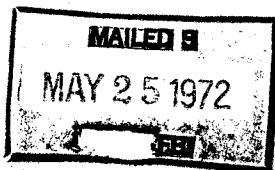
