DETAILS:

The writer proceeded to Stroud, Oklahoma for the purpose of locating and interviewing Mrs. Pauline Cornett, the sister of subject Cole. Chief of Police A. C. Van Sickle, Stroud, was contacted and he stated he knows both R. B. "Rebel" Cornett and his wife, Pauline, as well as subject Cole, and Cole's stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cole, the latter two having formerly resided in Stroud, Oklahoma before moving to California; that "Rebel" Cornett and family reside on a farm six miles and a half southeast of Stroud, not far from the Sac & Fox Indian Agency; that the nearest neighbor to Cornett is a negro farmer named John Shaw, who lives across the road near the mail box of Cornett and about 400 yards from Cornett's house; that Shaw has never been in any trouble but there are very few people in that neighborhood who can be trusted; that about one fourth mile from Cornett lives a man named Bud Rainey, who has a bad reputation and has been known to be friendly with criminals.

Chief of Police Van Sickle further stated that "Rebel" Cornett at one time furnished him with information concerning the location of Theodore Cole which resulted in the arrest of Cole on a charge of auto theft, and he believes that Cornett would not be friendly with subject Cole but does not know the attitude of Mrs. Cornett.

Chief Van Sickle also said that Mrs. Fred Cole is a "hell cat" and after her son, subject Cole, was convicted for kidnaping J. A. Rutherford of Cushing, Oklahoma, she tried to get "Rebel" Cornett to kill Rutherford and because he refused to do so, she caused his wife, her daughter, to leave Cornett for about a four months period; that one day Cornett met Mrs. Cole and his wife on the street in Stroud and Mrs. Cole called Cornett a yellow belly S-- of a B--- and Cornett gave her, Mrs. Cole, an awful beating and took his wife home. Mrs. Cole endeavored to get him, Van Sickle, to arrest Cornett, which he would not do unless she obtained a warrant but Mrs. Cole refused to do this.

The cooperation of Mr. Van Sickle was requested and he, with Night Chief of Police Robert Murphy, accompanied the writer to the vicinity of the home of "Rebel" Cornett. Before proceeding to the home of "Rebel" Cornett, John Shaw, negro farmer, was contacted. He said he had been at the home of the Cornett family on December 21st and had talked with them about the escape of Theodore Cole and the Cornetts claimed they knew nothing about Cole and were wondering whether he had managed to escape to the mainland. John Shaw said he saw nothing around the home of

Cornett that would indicate any word had been received from Theodore Cole. The cooperation of John Shaw was requested and he agreed that in the event he obtained any information that would indicate Cole had come to the Cornett home, or that they had received any word from him, he would immediately communicate with Chief of Police Van Sickle at Stroud, who accordingly would furnish such information promptly to the Oklahoma City Division. John Shaw said he did not wish to become involved in any trouble with the Cornetts or Theodore Cole and desires that his name, as well as any information he may furnish concerning the Cornetts or Theodore Cole, be kept confidential and never mentioned to them or any of their relatives as they might cause him trouble; that the community in which he lives is such that some of his other neighbors might also cause him trouble if it were known that he was furnishing information concerning violations of law to officers.

Agent accompanied by Chief of Police Van Sickle and Night Chief of Police Robert Murphy proceeded to the home of R. B. "Rebel" Cornett and family, parking our car in the yard a short distance from the house, Chief of Police Van Sickle proceeding to the front door and the writer covering the back door of the house. As Chief Van Sickle knocked on the front door and called to Cornett that he was Chief of Police Van Sickle from Stroud, "Rebel" Cornett came outside, stating that he had just put down his .20 gauge shotgun after he learned the identity of the caller; that the reason he had the shotgun in his hand when the car drove into the yard while it was dark was because he was afraid it might be Theodore Cole coming to his home and he intended to give him the proper reception with his .20 gauge shotgun; that he felt subject Cole was very bitter toward him and if he ever came to his home it would be for the purpose of doing him or his family some bodily harm and he intends to protect himself and family.

"Rebel" Cornett stated that he and his wife are not in sympathy with Cole; that he believes Cole, if he comes to the neighborhood in which he, Cornett, resides, will not come to his home but will likely go to the home of his, Cornett's, neighbor, Bud Rainey, who lives about half a mile from Cornett. He stated that should subject Cole come to the vicinity of where he, Cornett, lives, it will only be for the purpose of trying to kill him or his wife, Mrs. Cornett; that subject Cole's mother, Mrs. Fred Cole, would only be too glad to hear of his, Cornett's, death, and Mrs. Cole has caused him lots of trouble; that shortly after subject Cole was convicted for kidnaping J. A. Rutherford of Cushing, Oklahoma, Mrs. Fred Cole, who at that time was residing in Stroud. Oklahoma, came to him and endeavored to persuade him to go to Cushing and kill J. A. Rutherford, which he refused to do; that as a result of his refusal Mrs. Cole caused his wife, Mrs. Cornett, to leave him and go to Mrs. Cole's home; that Mrs. Cornett, who is Mrs. Cole's daughter, stayed away from her home about four months and finally came back to her home after he, Cornett, had a fight with Mrs. Cole on the street in Stroud.

R. B. Cornett and his wife, Pauline, both stated they will not furnish any assistance to Theodore Cole and promised to cooperate with the Government in aiding in the apprehension of subject Cole, stating that any information they received concerning Cole or his whereabouts they would furnish to Chief of Police Van Sickle at Stroud, who would in turn transmit same to the Oklahoma City Division.

R. B. "Rebel" Cornett stated that Bud Rainey bears a very bad reputation and has in the past been friendly with persons of criminal character; that the wife of Bud Rainey was formerly one of the Bohannon family residing near Drumright, Oklahoma; that the Bohannon boys are all criminals, some of whom are now serving sentences in the penitentiary; that a couple of days ago Bud Rainey told him, Cornett, that about two weeks ago a man named Dick Barr or Dick Broyles, with an unknown Chicago man, stopped overnight at his, Rainey's, home and left the following day for California, these persons having an automobile, which Rainey claimed was a \$3000.00 car and two machine guns; that Rainey told him, Cornett, that these men said they were going to "open" Alcatraz and then go to South America and in thirty or sixty days come to Oklahoma and kill J. A. Rutherford of Cushing, Oklahoma, whom Cole kidnaped. Cornett said Broyles is said to be an associate of the Bohannon boys who reside near Drumright.

Cornett and his wife assured the writer and Chief of Police Van Sickle that they would cooperate in every way possible with the Government in causing the apprehension of subject Cole. The Federal Statute relative to harboring was explained to both Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Cornett.

In an endeavor to identify Dick Broyles or Dick Barr, Special Agent in Charge C. W. Stein communicated telephonically with Paul Field, Record Clerk of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAlester. Mr. Field advised they had no record at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary on Dick Broyles; that they have a record on a Dick Barr but he is still confined in the penitentiary and therefore could not possibly have been the person referred to by R. Be Cornett. Mr. Field said they have a record of one Joe Harris, alias Dick Warker, FBI-161517, who was arrested as Joe Harris and received at the Oklahoma State Reformatory, Granite, Oklahoma, on July 3, 1928, their number 6698, charge larceny of auto, sentenced ten years; that he escaped November 21, 1928 and was apprehended and returned January 5, 1929 and on January 20, 1930 was transferred to the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAlester, their number 21391. Mr. Field also said their records reflect Joe Harris as Dick Barker, age 29 in 1933, was arrested by the Muskogee Police Department, their number 2310-C, for investigation and given hours; that on October 9, 1933 Dick Barker was arrested by the Muskogee Police Department on a charge of being a fugitive and was released to Troy, Nebraska on a charge of bank robbery and was received at the Nebraska State Penitentiary, Lincoln, Nebraska, December 19, 1933 as Joe Harris, #11789, charge bank robbery, sentenced ten years.

Paul Field further stated that any friends of Arthur "Doc" Barker are also friends of Ralph Roe; that they have no record at the Okla. State Penitentiary on Bud Rainey; that Julius Bohannon is now incarcerated in the Okla. State Penitentiary serving life sentence.

Mr. Field also said that from the best information he can obtain at the penitentiary Dick Barker's associates in the robbery of the bank at Troy, Nebraska were Charley Dodson, now deceased: Charley Cottner, who received a sentence of 20 years; and Bob Trollinger, who received a sentence of 20 years: that a friend and associate of members of this mob is Rufus Hodge, an ex-Deputy Sheriff from Sequoyah County, Okla.; that Hodge is well known to Deputy Sheriff Bert Cotton, Sallisaw, Oklahoma. Mr. Field also said that another friend of members of this mob is Henry Campbell, who was arrested by the Muskogee Police Department August 29, 1933 and released; that Henry Campbell served a sentence in the Arkansas State Penitentiary at Little Rock, being received there April 13, 1922 on a charge of burglary, sentenced four years. #19199. Mr. Field said that other friends of members of this mob are Frank Gullett and his wife, Johnnie, who both hung around Muskogee, Oklahoma: that Johnnie Gullett is a known prostitute and is Muskogee PD #2183. The fingerprints of Frank Gullett at the time he was arrested by the Muskogee PD were taken but were never forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Mr. Paul Field also informed Special Agent in Charge Stein that the records of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary do not reflect a record on Don Ebrey: that OSP #27274 was assigned to Merritt W. Crouch, who was received at the penitentiary January 29, 1933 on sentence of one year for attempted burglary, from Pottawatomie County, and discharged from that institution October 1, 1933, his FBI number being 628823.

Mr. Field also said that Bob Peterson, who operates a filling station near the town of Harrah, Oklahoma, is a known hangout for criminals; that Chief of Police Budd at Shawnee, Okla. can furnish considerable information about subjects Cole and Roe.

Special Agent F. S. Smith of the Oklahoma City Division advised that Bob Peterson at one time tipped off Wilbur Underhill to the fact that Joe Anderson, an officer of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, was using a certain person as informant in endeavoring to trap Underhill, resulting in the failure of Anderson's efforts to apprehend Wilbur Underhill. Special Agent Smith further stated that he is personally acquainted with Ralph Roe, who at the time Wilbur Underhill was killed by Agents of the Oklahoma City Division and posse near Shawnee, Oklahoma, was in the same house with Underhill, and was wounded and later prosecuted for harboring Underhill.

On December 22, 1937 teletype was received from the San Francisco Division setting out that Don Ebrey, Oklahoma State Penitentiary #27274, had furnished information to San Francisco newspapers claiming he was a cellmate of subject Cole eight months in Oklahoma State Penitentiary in 1931; that Joe Harris, an immate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, was also a yard buddy of Cole and that Joe Harris, whom he had seen in San Francisco recently, had mentioned that he, Harris, had seen Cole and Roe preceding two nights and they were headed east. The teletype further said that Ebrey expressed the opinion

that if both subjects are alive, they will probably go to Oklahoma and possibly contact the following persons: Lloyd Dillard, friend of Roe in Oklahoma City; Clyde Underhill, brother of Wilbur Underhill, Main & First Streets, Tulsa; Bobby Bridges, Tulsa, Oklahoma; Harry Newton and brother, given name unknown, also Tulsa.

The teletype states that suggested possible hideouts in Oklahoma for subjects are the Majestic Hotel, operated by Jimmie Hood at Oklahoma City, and the Lindy Hotel operated by Max Molton at Muskogee, Oklahoma. The teletype also stated that no check has yet been made of Ebrey but according to reliable sources he is said to have been in San Francisco at least one month; however, the reliability of Ebrey may be questioned as he was endeavoring to sell his story to newspapers but was turned down; that further effort will be made to contact Ebrey, who will attempt to recontact and "finger" Harris.

At the request of Mr. Gurney, who is in charge of the special assignment of this case at Sen Francisco, the Bureau and the Sen Francisco office on December 22, 1937 were furnished a teletype summary of all information developed by the Oklahoma City Division.

The following investigation was conducted at Tulsa, Oklahoma by Special Agenty W. E. Hopton on December 21, 1937.

Through a check of the Tulsa city directories it was ascertained that Guy Waughn resides at 528 West 44th Avenue, South. Mrs. Guy Vaughn upon interview at this address advised that her brother, Fred Cole, is the stepfather of Ted Cole, and that Fred Cole to her knowledge presently resides with his wife, Esther Cole, the mother of Ted Cole, at Woodlake, California. Mrs. Vaughn said she had not seen Ted Cole since he was thirteen or fourteen years old, at which time he had broken his leg as the result of a fall. She stated that none of the family except Esther Cole has any use whatsoever for Ted Cole; that Esther Cole is the only one who would give Ted any assistance. Mrs. Vaughn further stated that subject Cole has a grandmother, whose name is Mrs. Brace, and she resides at Stroud, Oklahoma; that Mrs. Brace is Mrs. Fred Cole's mother and the last information she had a sister of Esther Cole was living with Mrs. Brace at Stroud, Oklahoma.

Mrs. Vaughn introduced Agent to her mother, Mrs. Alice Cole, who is also the mother of Fred Cole. She said that she had not seen Theodore Cole for about ten years, at which time he came to her house at Bruner's Station on the Sand Springs Road; that after staying several days she ordered him to leave her home. Mrs. Cole likewise stated that no one in the family except Esther Cole would lend any assistance to Theodore Cole. Mrs. Alice Cole was under the impression that the first name of Mrs. Brace is Nettic and that Mrs. Brace was quite a business woman when she was younger, and had some oil interests. Both Mrs. Vaughn and Mrs. Alice Cole stated they are quite certain Ted Cole will not come to their home for the

reason that he does not know their address and also because he would know that they would turn him in to the officers. In this connection, they stated that should they receive any information which would assist in this case, they would immediately furnish same to the resident agent at Tulsa, Oklahoma. Both Mrs. Vaughn and Mrs. Alice Cole gave every indication of being sincere and cooperative.

Deputy Sheriff John Evans and Deputy Sheriff Tony Benson, Tulsa, Oklahoma, informed Special Agent W. E. Hopton that subject Cole is well known to them and stated that Cole's best contact in Tulsa is one Morris Quinn, who, according to their latest information, is in the employ of the Bailey Undertaking Company, 12th & Boulder Streets, Tulsa. They further advised that when Cole was in Tulsa he would always hang around 6th and Peoria Streets and associated with Quinn.

Special Agent Hopton at Tulsa examined the records in the office of the United States Probation Officer in that city and same reflect that James W. Roe was conditionally released from the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas on July 27, 1937, and that he is to report until June 17, 1938; that on September 23, 1937 his case was transferred to U.S. Probation officer Henry C. Clifton, Federal Building, El Paso, Texas, for the reason that Roe stated he had received employment with the International Supply Company at Wink, Texas, and desired to establish his residence at that place. Pertinent portions of the file of the United States Probation Officer on James W. Roe were forwarded to the Probation Officer at El Paso. The records also reflect that James W. Rowe gave his address in Tulsa, Oklahoma as 818 South Atlanta Avenue, and Rowe, while in Tulsa, associated with Earl A. Fields, 818 South Atlanta, an aviator at Collyer Airport.

Teletype was received from the Los Angeles Division advising that subject Cole attended school at Tulsa and Sapulpa, Oklahoma, also for a few months attended school at Eureka, Arkansas, when he was seven years of age; that Theodore Cole's wife was Marie Wynne, whose parents reside at Alpina Pass, Arkansas, and she was reported to be there about five years ago; that she has a son named Billy Wayne Cole, age about nine years. Also teletype was received from the Los Angeles Division advising that the grandmother of subject Cole is Mrs. Nettie Brace and his aunts are Mrs. William Collins and Mrs. Fannie Baughman; that his uncle is Ernest Brace, and all of them reside at Stroud, Oklahoma (not Strand, Oklahoma)

The Oklahoma City Division will conduct investigation at Stroud, Oklahoma interviewing the relatives of subject Cole in the near future.

On December 23rd Special Agent in Charge C. W. Stein telephonically advised the Little Rock Division of the information received concerning the parents of the former wife of Cole residing at Alpina Pass, Arkansas and requested that investigation be conducted to locate Cole's former wife and to obtain all pertinent information concerning Cole which might assist in locating and causing his apprehension.

For the information of the Omaha Division, which has not received previous copies of reports, descriptions of subjects Roe and Cole as obtained from the files of the Oklahoma City Division are as follows:

THE LITTLE ROCK DIVISION

At Alpina Pass, Arkansas is requested to conduct appropriate investigation as requested telephonically to locate and interview Marie Wynne, former wife of subject Cole, and to obtain all information available which might assist in locating and causing the apprehension of Cole.

THE OMAHA DIVISION

At Lincoln, Nebraska will conduct appropriate investigation at the Nebraska State Penitentiary, checking the record of Joe Harris, #11789, obtaining date of release, list of correspondents and visitors, late photograph and description and furnish same to the San Francisco and Oklahoma City divisions, as requested in telegram from the Oklahoma City division, 12-22-37.

THE OKLAHOMA CITY DIVISION

At Drumright, Oklahoma will interview the Chief of Police and obtain all information he may be able to furnish relative to the identity of Dick Broyles or Dick Barr, an associate of the Bohannon boys.

At Muskogee, Oklahoma will conduct appropriat investigation through contact with the Muskogee Police Department relative to the Lindy Hotel operated by Max Wolton at Muskogee, and arrange with the Police for proper coverage in the event subjects should show up there.

At Iklahoma City will contact the Oklahoma City Police Department and conduct appropriate inquiry relative to the Majestic Hotel operated by Jimmie Hood, which is a süggested possible hideout for subjects, and will arrange with the Oklahoma City Police Department to properly keep this place under observation in the event subjects should show up there:

At Oklahoma City will also conduct appropriate investigation relative to Lloyd Dillard, reported friend of Roe.

At Tulsa, Oklahoma will contact the Police Department and ascertain the present whereabouts of Clyde Underhill, Bobby Bridges and Harry Newton, and arrange with the Tulsa Police Department for proper observation of these persons in the event subjects Roe and Cole might contact them. Clyde Underhill, Bobby Bridges and Harry Newton should be interviewed for any information they may be able to furnish and they should be advised of the Federal Statute relative to harboring.

At Tulsa, Oklahoma will contact Earl Alfields, 818 South Atlanta, and Morris Quinn, employed by the Bailey Undertaking Company at 12th & Boulder Streets, for any information which they may be able to furnish which may be of assistance in locating subjects.

At Stroud, Oklahoma will interview Mrs. Netti Brace, grandmother of subject Cole; Mrs. William Collins and Mrs. FannieBaughman, aunts of subject Cole; and Ernest Brace, uncle of Cole, and obtain from them any information of value which may assist in locating and causing the apprehension of subjects.

At Stroud will interview in detail Bud Rainey, who resides six and one-half miles south and east of Stroud, in the vicinity of the residence of R. B. "Rebel" Cornett, and endeavor to secure from him information he is purported to have furnished to Cornett relative to one Dick Barr or Broyles, and an unknown Chicago man, having gone to California for the purpose of "opening" Alcatraz; also obtain any information Rainey may be able to furnish relative to subjects. Mr. Rainey will be advised of the Federal Statute relative to harboring.

At Chickasha, Oklahoma will locate and interview the Parnell boys, who are reported to be close friends of Ralph Roe and Elmer Timan, and obtain any information they may be able to furnish which may assist in locating and apprehending subjects. The Parnell boys should be advised of the Federal Statute relative to harboring. The information pertaining to the acquaintanceship of Roe with the Parnell boys is set out in the report of reference.

At Shawnee, Oklahoma will contact Chief of Police F. A Budd and obtain from him all information he may possess concerning Cole and Roe and their associates.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Investigation at Winslow, Flagstaff, Prescott, and Phoenix, Arizona, fails to disclose information concerning present whereabouts of MARIE BLACKWELL, former correspondent of Subject ROE. Her home is believed to be Ardmore, Oklahoma. Informant at Phoenix, Arizona, alleges one LETHA JONES, whose parents reside at Depew, Oklahoma, and who is now paramour of LYLE CALLAND, Phoenix, is Subject Roe's wife and mother of Roe's daughter, now deceased. Telegraphic and Mail covers placed on Letha Jones at Phoenix and Oklahoma City and San Francisco Divisions requested by teletype to verify information concerning her.

Report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, 12/17/37; teletype message from Los Angeles Division dated 12/18/37.

DETAILS:

Upon receipt of the reference teletype message the writer on 12/18/37, by telephone, communicated with ROBERT BORN, Undersheriff, Prescott, Arizona, who advised that former Chief of Police Wyatt is no longer located in Prescott and that Deputy Sheriff Ruffner was presently absent from the city. Mr. Born advised that he did not know MARIE BLACKWELL but that he would endeavor to locate her through his contacts and would also make discreet inqury to ascertain if she was known to the police department and that he would immediately advise telegraphically if information of value was obtained.

On 12/20/37 inquiry was made of J. T. STEVENS, Postmaster, H. O. WHEELER, Chief of Police, and DICK HARTIEY, Deputy Sheriff, all of Winslow, Arizona, each one advising that he did not recall MARIE TACKWELL as a former resident of Winslow and they had no information concerning her present whereabouts.

R. C. KAUFMAN, President, 1st National Bank, Winslow Arizona, advised that he has charge of the renting of the premises known as the Arizona Hotel and which, during a short time during 1934, were rented to one BETTY CRADDOCK; that according to his recollection a woman named MARIE BLACKWEIL operated this place for Betty Craddock for a short time during 1934; and that additional information concerning these parties could probably be secured through All Kleindienst.

AL KLEINDIENST, manager of the Winslow Credit Association, Winslow, Arizona, advised that he recalled that while BETTY CRADDOCK was operating the Arizona Hotel in Winslow about 1934, she had associated with her one MARIE BLACKWELL, a girl known as FRANCOILE COLLINS, and Betty's sister, LILLIAN who was drowned while residing at Winslow; that according to his recollection, Marie Blackwell was also Betty's sister and it is believed that all these parties came from Ardmore, Oklahoma or vicinity.

Inquiry for Clint C. Blair, former Chief of Police at Winslow disclosed that he is now on a trip to Missouri and the date of his return is uncertain.

By telephone Mr. Kleindienst ascertained through JACK HYNES and W. W. WARD, two Santa Fe Railway employees at Winslow, that BETTY CRADDOCK passed through Winslow during the summer of 1937 in a big Packard car and at that time advised that she was living at Amarillo, Texas, where her husband (name unknown) was operating a night club. They added, however, that they understand she has since left Amarillo and they have no information concerning her present whereabouts.

While the writer was passing through Flagstaff, Arizona, inquiry was made of Chief of Police James Wright and Sheriff Art Vandevier, both of whom advised that Betty Gaddock and Marie Blackwell are unknown to them and apparently have not been located in Flagstaff in recent years.

Inquiry of CAIL I CARDNER, postmaster, WILLIAM FITZGERALD, Chief of Police, Sheriff ROBERT ROBBINS, and all members of the police and sheriff's forces, as well as the retail credit bureau at Prescott, Arizona, failed to disclose any information concerning Marie Blackwell. The officers mentioned, particularly Chief of Police Fitzgerald, contacted their various sources of information in the underworld at Prescott but could find no one who knew Marie Blackwell.

Near midnight on 12/18/37, VIC BYRNES, 633 West Washington, Phoenix, Arizona, telephonically advised the Phoenix Division office that he is the local representative for Covered Wagon Auto Trailors; that he is originally from Tulsa, Oklahoma, and well acquainted with the State of Oklahoma; that he had just read of the escape of Subjects from prison and desired to advise that one IETHA JONES, Phoenix, Arizona, frequently came around his place of business during the past summer and often boasted that she was Subject ROE'S wife; that in substantiation of her statements she showed Byrnes a letter from a brother of Roe, residing somewhere in Texas; that this letter blamed her for being the cause of Subject Roe's wrong doing and also informed her that her daughter, age 6 or 7, by Subject Roe had just died. Mr. Byrnes further stated that he has not seen Letha Jones since Subjects' escape, all of her talking having been done during the past summer.

Byrnes also stated that one of his ex-salesmen, LYLE GALLAND, is now practically living with LETHA JONES and that Mr. Byrnes has frequently contacted them in an endeavor to collect a \$60 mortgage which he holds on Galland's 1930 Packard car; that Letha Jones' parents reside in Oklahoma, but he did not know the exact location. Byrnes further stated that the house in which Letha Jones is presently residing is a ramshackle two story brick house and that she resides in room number three on the second floor and that house is at 8th Street and East Madison.

With the view to confirming the above and securing additional information, if possible, Agent W. R. Ramsey located Vic Byrnes at the sales rooms of the Covered Wagon Auto Trailors, 633 West Washington on Sunday morning, 12/19/37, where it was determined that he also resides in a room in the rear. Byrnes was questioned in detail and confirmed the information previously furnished. It was determined, however, that Byrnes had on that morning visited Letha Jones and that she was living with Lyle Galland in a trailer in the rear at 801 East Madison Street; that Letha Jones' parents were Dr. and Mrs. J. L. Wharton of Depew, Oklahoma; that Byrnes had mentioned to Letha Jones that he had seen in the papers that her "old man" had escaped and she had remarked in substance, "It makes no difference to me, I was through with him long ago."

In view of the fact that the Phoenix Division office has had no previous information indicating that Subject Roe had a wife or former wife, a teletype message was dispatched to the Oklahoma and San Francisco Divisions furnishing in substance all the information received from Mr. Byrnes and requesting that these offices advise the Phoenix Division office whether they had any information indicating any relationship or connection between Letha Jones and Subject Roe. It was deemed advisable to defer interview with Letha Jones until receipt of information requested from the offices mentioned However, through Mr. F. Of Burbridge, manager, Postal Telegraph Co., and Mr. T. G. WOODS, manager of the Western Union Telegraph Company, both of Phoenix, Arizona, a cover was placed on any incoming or outgoing telegrams for Letha Jones, 801 East Madison. Burbridge and Woods stated they would give this matter close attention and would immediately advise the Phoenix office if any information was obtained.

Through Mrs. Duncan, Office of Superintendent of Mails, Post Office, Phoenix, Arizona, the writer requested a 30 day mail cover on all mail received by Letha Jones, 801 E. Madison Street, Phoenix, for a period of 30 days. The importance of this matter was impressed on Mrs. Duncan and she stated she would give this matter her personal attention.

Inquiry disclosed that the regular carrier covering 801 East Madison Street is present confined to his home by illness and the substitute carrier was not available for interview.

near McDowell Street, Phoenix, Arizona, advised that while residing at Winslow about the latter part of 1934 or the early part of 1935 he knew Marie Blackwell, Betty Craddock, and two or three other girls associated with them in the operation of the Arizona Hotel, which really was nothing more than a high classed sporting house; that he has neither seen nor heard from any of these parties in the last two or three years and that he knows nothing concerning their present whereabouts or means for locating them aside from the fact that they were believed to be from Ardmore, Oklahoma, and the father of FRANCOILE COLLINGS is understood to be a former peace officer at Ardmore. Mr. Rhodes also said that, according to his present recollection, Betty Carddock was married at one time to a man who operated an undertaking business at Ardmore and that later she was married to EDDIE CARPENTER, a bar tender for Gomez, the well known distiller at Juarez, Mexico, Carpenter having been killed in an automobile accident at El Paso in the Fall of 1936.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

SAN FRANCISCO DIVISION

At San Francisco, California, is requested to advise whether available information at that place

indicates Subject Roe corresponded with Letha Jones, Phoenix, Arizona, or whether there is any information indicating any relationship between them as mentioned in teletype message from the Phoenix office on 12/20/37.

OKLAHOMA CITY DIVISION

At Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, is requested to refer to the teletype message from the Phoenix office on

12/20/37 and advise whether there is any information indicating any connection or relationship between Letha Jones, Phoenix, Arizona, and Subject Roe as mentioned in such message.

At Ardmore, Oklahoma, it is suggested that efforts be made to locate Marie Blackwell, former

correspondent of Subject Roe, by appropriate inquiry through local peace officers or similar sources, all parties interviewed in Arizona being of the opinion that Marie Blackwell and her associates, Betty Craddock and Francoile Collins, were from Ardmore as above mentioned. The parties interviewed were unable to furnish any substantial description of Marie Blackwell aside from the fact that she is a

woman about 38 or 40 years of age and reported to have made a lot of money in some boom oil town in 6klahoma.

RHOENIX DIVISION

At Phoenix, Arizona, will report results of covers placed on mail and telegrams to Letha Jones, 801 East Madison Street, and upon receipt of information requested from the San Francisco and Oklahoma City Divisions will thoroughly interview her to determine any information she may possibly have regarding Subject Roe.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAM

RE: RALPH ROE; THEODORE COLE; Escaped Federal Prisoners.

Mr. Hanson called from Los Angeles and stated with reference to the surveillance which agents from his office have been maintaining were continued.

On the home of Cole's parents at Woodlake, California, it has been learned that Cole's parents are leaving this morning for Lindsay, California, to visit some friends, proceeding from there to Los Angeles where they will visit their daughter at Bell, California, over the Christmas holiday. The daughter's home at Bell is being kept under surveillance by agents from the Los Angeles Office. Mr. Hanson stated in view of this trip, he believes the surveillance at Woodlake can be discontinued.

He was advised it will be all right to discontinue this surveillance but the family should be kept under surveillance en route to Lindsay as they might meet Cole en route. Mr. Hanson said he does not believe such a surveillance would be beneficial inasmuch as the family has been interviewed by agents and Cole's step-father has indicated he will not tolerate Cole. You will recall that Cole's step-father on a previous occasion when Cole escaped from the state penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, turned Cole into the authorities. Mr. Hanson stated that Mr. Pieper has learned through an informant

it is desirable to keep the family under surveillance until such time as Cole appears somewhere else. Mr. Hanson accordingly will keep the family under surveillance on this trip.

Mr. Hanson stated he received information from Mr. Pieper that the Sheriff at Merced, California, advises relatives of Cole live in that vicinity and accordingly, Mr. Hanson is sending an agent to Merced to check the relatives there. He will also continue the surveillance on the home at Bell, California.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

On November 30, 1934, Theodore Cole, better known as Ted Cole, escaped from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, by placing himself in a laundry bag and being thrown on a laundry truck, out thus riding out of the Penitentiary, later jumping off the truck and effecting his escape. On October 22, 1929, Cole was received at the State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, to be executed, a death sentence having been imposed upon him in Tulsa County, Oklahoma, for robbery with firearms, although no one was killed in the robbery. The Appellate Court modified this sentence and it was reduced to fifteen years. This is the sentence which he was serving at the time of his escape.

Several days after his escape, on the afternoon of December

5, 1934, J. A. Rutherford, age 48, a citizen residing near Cushing, Oklahoma, was in the town of Cushing with his automobile and was preparing to go home after attending to some business in that city. Rutherford was approached by Ted Cole, who asked him if he lived in the country, to which Rutherford replied that he did, indicating the direction from Cushing in which he resided, and Ted Cole, who approached him, told Rutherford he lived in the same direction but some distance farther and asked Rutherford for a ride. Rutherford agreed to give him a lift and invited him into the car. Rutherford and Ted Cole had proceeded but a short distance when Cole drew a pistol and told Rutherford that he wanted the car and that he had to have it. Cole told Rutherford that he had to make a trip and that if he made any resistance, Rutherford would be killed. From Cushing, Oklahoma, Rutherford was forced to drive Ted Cole to Springfield, Illinois, in Rutherford's automobile where Cole left the car and released Rutherford. During the course of this trip Cole threatened Rutherford many times to take his life and thereby putting him in great fear of his life. After being released, Rutherford informed his people in Cushing, Oklahoma, of his plight and that he was returning home. The affair was reported upon his arrival to the Sheriff's office at Stillwater, Oklahoma, and Rutherford immediately identified his abductor as Theodore Cole. Investigation was instituted by this Bureau and Cole was arrested on January 9, 1935, at Dallas, Texas, by the Dallas, Texas Police Department. A complaint was filed on January 7, 1935, at Oklahoma City charging Cole with instant kidnaping. Cole was subsequently removed to Oklahoma City and on March 1, 1935, an indictment was returned against him in the Mestern District of Oklahoma charging him with the kidnaping of Rutherford and subsequent interstate transportation of him in interstate

On May 20, 1935, at Guthrie, Oklahoma, Cole entered a plea of guilty to the above indictment and on the same date was sentenced by the U.S. District Court, Guthrie, Oklahoma, to serve 50 years in a Federal Penitentiary to be designated by the Attorney General.

Cole is a white person, age 22 in 1937, an American citizen, unmarried, by occupation is a tailor, has a limited education and has a mother and two sisters living. The condition of his home life was bad; his reputation in the community in which he resided was bad. He is reputed to be moronic, victous and a killer. While serving the sentence from which he escaped in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, he killed a fellow convict and was awaiting prosecution for murder in the county in which the state penitentiary is located when he escaped from this institution. Several times when he was incarcerated in the Oklahoma County Jail awaiting trial on the kidnaping charges, he attempted to escape. He sawed several bars of his cell on several occasions and has boasted on numerous occasions that he would effect his escape.

On October 9, 1936, Hugh Butcher was released from the Alcatraz Penitentiary and according to the rumors at that time Butcher was given the names of friends of certain prisoners remaining there and that by identifying himself as having come from Alcatraz he would be able to secure certain bonds which the prisoners had cached; that the bonds could be turned into money and with part of the proceeds he or other of their friends could arrange to get firearms, ammunition and necessary boat to enable them to get firearms landed on Alcatraz to be used then or subsequently in an escape plot. In Butcher's clothing at the time he was released the Alcatraz prison authorities found a scrap of paper on which was printed "Lee Vacobs Miami Oklahoma. His old man is a doctor. Everyone knows him. Tell him who sent you."
On the reverse side was the following - "Jess Hill Lakewood California c/o Ted Coles mother". The prison authorities were informed that Lee Jacobs referred to in this note is a narcotic peddler operating as a fence used by Doc Barker and formerly served a term in the State Penitentiary of Oklahoma, and that his present connections and activities may be worthy of investigating by the Bureau. prison authorities were also informed that the Jess Hill referred to is Floyd Hill, who served a term in McAlester, Oklahoma, when Theodore Cole was there and that Cole's relatives lived not in Lakewood but in Woodlake, California. This information was investigated by the Bureau without substantiating any plot to release the prisoners at Alcatraz ' to date.

Memo for the Director December 16, 1937. -3-According to the files of the Identification Division, Theodore Cole in addition to the foregoing, has the following criminal record: He was arrested on January 31, 1927, by the Tulsa, Oklahoma Police Department for burglary and he was turned over to the County Humane Officer. On August 27, 1929, Cole was arrested by the State Police, Little Rock, Arkansas, charged with burglary and grand larceny. He was sentenced to 2 years but was released to the Sheriff at Tulsa, Oklahomafor trial on the robbery charge, the sentence of which he was serving at the time of his escape. Unsupported by fingerprint cards are notations on the criminal records indicating that he was arrested several times for grand larceny and burglary; was paroled three times, and was arrested at Tulsa, Oklahoma in 1924, given 2 years at Pauls Valley, paroled. MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: RALPH ROE; THEODORE COLE; Escaped Federal Prisoners.

Mr. Stein called from Oklahoma City requesting that Special Agents Bryce and Hurt be instructed to return to the Oklahoma City Office in view of the numerous leads in the above entitled matter, and the numerous contacts and friends of the escapes at Oklahoma City. Mr. Stein indicated that sooner or later the escapes will come to Oklahoma City. He referred to his teletype to the Bureau advising that two individuals appeared at Stroud, Oklahoma, about two weeks ago, where Cole's sister resides and are reported to have had two machine guns with them, were driving a large car and allegedly said they were going to Alcatraz to open it up. men also indicated they were going to kill Rutherford, victim of a kidnaping case. Mr. Stein advised that Cole's mother-in-law apparently urged Cole to kill Rutherford, which he refused to do, and thereafter she caused trouble between Cole and his wife, who was her daughter. Mr. Stein indicated that this family is antagonistic towards Cole and Agents who went to the home for the purpose of interviews were met with shotguns. Mr. Stein indicated that Hurt is particularly valuable due to the contacts he has made in the underworld at Oklahoma City when serving on the police force there.

He was informed that Bryce and Hurt are now on a special assignment at Pensacola, Florida, in the Hugh Gant Case, but will be returned to the Oklahoma City Office as soon as possible, which should be within a few days.

Mr. Stein indicated he is arranging to pick up an individual today who is supposed to have talked to the above mentioned individuals and who is friendly toward Cole. He said that one of the men who appeared at Stroud is apparently Dick Barkes, who was arrested at Muskogee, Oklahoma, October 9, 1933 for bank robbery. He was received at the Nebraska State Penitentiary as Joe Harris #11789 on December 9, 1933. He indicated he has requested the Omaha Office to secure full information on this man from the penitentiary. I told him to secure his photograph in order to be sent to the San Francisco and Portland Offices, since Stein indicated that Barkes has been released.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Ralph Roe first came to the attention of the Federal Bureau Wiferen Mr. Schill'er Investigation in connection with the investigation to locate Wilbur Underhill, who it will be recalled on Memorial Day, 1933, with ten Mr. Tracy other desperados, escaped from the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, in one of the most spectacular prison breaks that helemiss Gandy ever been accomplished. The leader of this group was Harvey Bailey, a Bailey, master criminal of the Southwest, and his first aid was Wilbur Underhill, who, because of his depredations, was known as the "Tri-State Terror". The other escapes included such notorious criminals as Bob Brady, Jim Clark and Ed Davis. The escaping convicts kidnaped the warden, commandeered fast automobiles and headed for the hills of Eastern Oklahoma where they knew they would secure protection. Underhill, a desperate criminal and wanton killer, insisted on killing the warden before they released him because the warden had kept him in solitary confinement, but Harvey Bailey prevented him from committing this murder. It was during Underhill's reign as a bank robber and highwayman in Southwestern Missouri, Southeastern Kansas and Northeastern Oklahoma, that he was given the name which followed him to his grave, the "Tri-State Terror".

Underhill latermarried his childhood sweetheart, Hazel/Hudson, nee/Jarrett, near Colgate, Oklahoma, under his true name. His wife was a member of the Oklahoma Jarrett family of bank robbers. Two of her brothers were sentenced to McAlester State Penitentiary for life.

On December 30, 1933, Wilbur Underhill, who was under indictment at Kansas City, Missouri, charging him with conspiracy to deliver a Federal prisoner, was located in a house at 606 West Dewey Street in Shawnee, Oklahoma. Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation proceeded immediately to that address, and with the aid of deputy sheriffs and officers of the Oklahoma City Police Department, raided the premises at 606 West Dewey Street in Shawnee, Oklahoma. Upon arriving at the rear of the house, Underhill was observed near one of the back windows in a brightly lighted room. He was commanded to raise



his hands and hesitating for only a moment, suddenly whirled to get his Luger pistol. Tear gas was fired into the house and under the fire of the Agents, Underhill fell to the floor. At about this time further shots were fired from the side window of the house and the officers in front and in the rear again opened fire.

While Underhill continued to fire at the officers, Ralph Roe, who was in the front bedroom with Eva Mae Nichols, fired at the officers through the front window. After the firing had ceased it was discovered that Underhill had escaped from the house and had taken refuge in a secondhand furniture store a few blocks away. He was taken into custody and because of the serious wounds, was immediately removed to the Shawnee Municipal Hospital. On January 6, 1934, he was removed from the hospital to the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, where he died on that date from wounds received while resisting arrest.

Subsequent investigation disclosed that the premises at 606 West Dewey Street, Shawnee, Oklahoma, had been sublet by the rentor to Ralph Roe, who with Eva Mae Nichols, a beauty operator, was occupying the premises on the night of December 29, 1933, when Underhill and his wife, Hazel Hudson Underhill, arrived. During the battle with the Agents and police officers, Ralph Roe and Eva Mae Nichols were wounded and taken to the Shawnee Municipal Hospital. Roe's injuries consisted of a wound in the arm and another in his shoulder. On the morning of December 31, 1933, the Nichols woman succumbed to the wounds she had received.

On January 24, 1934, a complaint was filed before a United States Commissioner at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, charging Ralph Roe and one Elmer A. Inman with conspiracy to harbor Underhill and at a hearing held on February 8, 1934, Roe was held for action of the Federal Grand Jury. He was subsequently sentenced in the United States District Court at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, to serve a six months suspended sentence.

While Ralph Roe was being held in the County Jail at Guthrie, Oklahoma, pending disposition of the harboring charges, an inspector from the U. S. Bureau of Prisons advised the Oklahoma City office that Ralph Roe had made a complaint to the effect he had been mistreated by the county authorities. The investigation by the Inspector disclosed that Roe's claims in this respect were without merit and he learned that Roe was an obstreperous and recalcitrant prisoner. There was also some

indication that certain individuals had attempted to deliver Roe from the County Jail. Several saws were found outside of the jail window. There was no definite indication that the saws had been delivered for Ralph Roe. However, in view of the fact that one Lon Johnson and Sleepy Johnson were associated with Ralph Roe in harboring Wilbur Underhill and since Lon Johnson had visited his brother, Sleepy Johnson at the jail, it was believed that he may have delivered the saws to his brother. A prisoner later saw the saws and delivered them to the jailer. There was no definite indication that these saws had actually been delivered for the use of Ralph Roe.

Ralph Roe with one Jack Lloyd was arrested by the Sheriff from Tishomingo, Oklahoma at Mansville, Oklahoma, on July 25, 1934, and were identified as the individuals who had abandoned a 1933 Chevrolet Coach which was stolen from the owner at Bonham, Texas, on July 22, 1934. Lloyd and Roe were both returned to Bonham, Texas, to face state charges of burglary and auto theft. Both subjects were released on bonds of \$1,400.00 from the Bonham Texas Jail on September 4, 1934. During the time that Jack Lloyd and Ralph Roe were confined in jail at Bonham, Texas, they were frequently visited by Wilbur Underhill's widow, and it appears she was instrumental in securing their release on bond. In view of the fact that these individuals were subsequently sentenced in connection with a bank robbery charge, they were not prosecuted in Federal Court for the theft of the automobile which they transported from Bonham, Texas, to Mansville, Oklahoma.

On September 10, 1954, two armed men who were subsequently identified as Ralph Roe and Jack Lloyd, entered the Farmers National Bank of Sulphur, Oklahoma and ordered the two employees who here in the bank at the time to lie on the floor in their respective cages. The bandits threatened the bank clerks repeatedly, stating they would kill them if they made any false moves. While Jack Lloyd covered the bank employees, Ralph Roe went to the rear of the tellers' cages the gathered the loot, which he placed in what appeared to be a sugar sack. After obtaining \$3206.46 of the bank funds, Jack Lloyd ordered one of the bank employees out into the lobby of the bank and through a side door keeping him covered with a pistol all of this time. He then forced this employee to the entrance of an adjacent building about forty feet from the bank where the bank employee was ordered to proceed upstairs. The bandits made their escape in a Ford V-8 automobile.

The bheriff at Antlers, Oklahoma, received information to the effect that two men heavily armed had visited a tourist camp near Antlers. He went to the cabins and there took into custody Ralph Roe, Jack Eloyd and one Dick Coffin, who was with them at the time. When Roe and Lloyd were arrested, they had in their possession two nickel-plated revolvers, a 30-30 Winchester rifle, a 25-20 Winchester rifle, and a 12 gauge Remington Automatic shotgun. They were returned to Sulphur, Oklahoma, where they were positively identified as the bandits who had robbed the Farmers National Bank at Sulphur, Oklahoma. On October 6, 1934, a complaint was filed before the U.S. Commissioner at Muskogee, Oklahoma, charging both subjects with violation of the National Bank Robbery Act. Their bonds at that time were set at \$100,000.00 each. Coffrin was released since he was not wanted in connection with the Sulphur, Oklahoma bank robbery or any other known crime. The investigation by Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, disclosed that Ralph Roe had made several trips to Kansas, Oklahoma and other adjoining states, at which time he had been accompanied by a woman who was subsequently identified as the wife of Wilbur Underhill. He obviously was quite friendly with this woman and she was instrumental in securing bonds for both Lloyd and Roe when they were released from the Bonham Texas Jail. On October 31, 1934, a Federal Grand Jury at Muskogee, Oklahoma, returned an indictment charging Roe and Lloyd with violation of the Federal Bank Robbery Act, at which time the Presiding Judge of the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Oklahoma ruled that the charges against the subjects were not bailable and that the Commissioner's bond of \$100,000.00 be revoked.

On January 18, 1935, a jury returned a verdict of guilty against both subjects in Federal Court at Muskogee, Oklahoma, and on that date Jack Lloyd was sentenced to serve 20 years on the first count of the indictment, 25 years on the second count, and 99 years on the third count, said sentences to run concurrently. Ralph Roe was sentenced to serve 20 years on the first count of the indictment, 25 years on the second count and 99 years on the third count, all sentences to run concurrently.

On January 19, 1935, Ralph Roe was received at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas to serve his 99 year sentence for bank robbery and ôn October 26, 1935, he was received at the United States Penitentiary, Alcatraz Island on transfer from the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, to complete the service of his ninety-nine year sentence.

During the investigation of the bank robbery, Agents interviewed one Ray Tang Hall, a narcotic violator at Chickasha, Oklahoma, and he admitted that Ralph Roe and Jack Lloyd had frequented his tourist camp at Seminole, Oklahoma, on September 9 or 10, 1934. He stated that Roe and Lloyd were at that time in Hazel Underwood's black Chevrolet Coupe. They called for some clothing which they had left at his camp and remained only about thirty minutes. This is a further indication of the association of subject Roe with the wife of the deceased bank robber, Wilbur Underhill.

Subsequent investigation disclosed that Raymond Roe, a brother of Ralph Roe, who was residing at 1828 North Monroe Street, Hutchinson, Kansas, had endeavored to persuade his brother to go straight and to secure a position in order that he could earn an honest living. However, Ralph Roe informed him that this would be impossible since being an ex-convict, he had no way of making a living. Raymond Roe agreed to purchase an automobile for his brother, Ralph, if Ralph would agree to stop associating with the questionable characters, who no doubt were responsible for part of his criminal acts. He purchased this automobile for Ralph Roe at Hutchinson, Kansas on September 27, 1934 and he stated that Ralph Roe was accompanied by a woman known as Hazel Hudson. However, Raymond Roe had noticed in a detective magazine a photograph of Hazel Jarrett, who, it will be recalled, was the wife of Wilbur Underhill and he positively identified this woman as the companion of his brother.

Ralph Roe in 1937 was 31 years of age. He is an American citizen and a native of the state of Oklahoma. He never married. His father is John Roe of Duncan, Oklahoma, and his mother is deceased. He was reported to be by occupation a steamfitter. He had only a grammar school education and it appears that his home life was undesirable. His known criminal record dates back to April 28, 1923 when he was arrested by the Police Department at Pomona, California, under the name of Paul Sullivan on a charge of robbery. He was later released to the Constable at Pomona, California. From September, 1924 to December 30, 1933, this individual has a record of six arrests, consisting of charges ranging from grand larceny to robbery of firearms. He was considered a notorious and dangerous individual.

Jack Lloyd was an American-born individual and in 1937 was 33 years of age. He was married and a native of Carter County, Oklahoma. His occupation was barber and blacksmith. He is reported

to have had one child. His father is deceased and his mother in 1935 was residing in Ardmore, Oklahoma. He also had only a grammer school education. He had a long criminal record, his first arrest of record being on November 24, 1919, when he was arrested by the State Police at McAlester, Oklahoma, on a charge of burglary and sentenced to a sentence of 7 years.

Attached hereto is a complete record of subject Ralph Roe, with aliases, as reflected by the files of the Identification Division of the Bureau.

GALATAS, Alcatraz No. 331; FRANK B. MELLOY, Alcatraz No. 330; FRANK WILLIAMS, with aliases, Alcatraz No. 308; HUBERT ALLEN FARMER, Alcatraz No. 332; ALFRED M. LOOMIS, with aliases, Alcatraz No. 187; AMDREW W. DAVIS, Alcatraz No. 311; JACK SIEMAN, with aliases, Alcatraz No. 177; CHARLES R. KRUG, with aliases, Alcatraz No. 72; ROBERT BRADFORD MOXON, Alcatraz No. 36.

RICHARD T. GALATAS, Alcatraz No. 551, was released from Alcatraz on transfer to the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, September 25, 1937, and it was anticipated he would be released from Leavenworth October 1, 1937. All records as to visitors, correspondence, etc., were transferred to Leavenworth for GALATAS.

FRANK B. MULLOY, Alcatraz No. 330, was released from Alcatraz on transfer to the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kancas, September 25, 1937, and it was anticipated he would be released from Leavenworth October 1st, 1937. The records concerning MULLOY have been transferred to Leavenworth.







Mr. Pieper subsequently called and stated a press teletype was sent from Sacramento, California, to the Sheriff's office at Santa Rosa, California, at the end of which appeared the question "Did you hear they found the two men?" He indicated this was a gag on the part of the press since the Sheriff's office was supposed to answer back "no" at which time that office would be advised the men had been found on an island where they had survived for eight days on goat's milk, indicating they had the Warden's "goat".

This will confirm my telephonic conversation with Mr. Tamm of the Bureau on December 23, 1937. This office received a telephone call from Special Agent in Charge Chapmon Fletcher, at which time, he, Mr. Fletcher stated that Mr. Tamm had communicated with him and requested that efforts be made to ascertain the manner in which C. Floyd Huff became the parole adviser of Richard Galatas. Mr. Fletcher stated that he was advising the Bureau of the results of the investigation in the Little Rock Territory and requested that the Kansas City Office contact the Probation Officer for the Western District of Missouri, as well as the Parole Officer at the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

Inquiry of the Probation Officer failed to produce any information of value. Mr. N. R. Timmons, Parole Officer at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, advised by telephone that the files of his office reflected receipt by the Warden at Leavenworth, and also the Warden at Alcatraz, of several communications from C. Floyd Huff written on behalf of Galatas. Timmons stated that he received a letter dated April 20, 1936, from Huff, which urged the parole of Galatas, and in this letter, Huff volunteered to be the parole adviser for Galatas in the event the parole was effected. It is noted that this letter is dated prior to the transfer of Galatas to Alcatraz from Leavenworth. Timmons said that Galatas was again received at Leavenworth from Alcatraz approximately a month before the date of his conditional release, and that a

cording to departmental regulations, it is incumbent upon him as a parole officer to make every effort to obtain a parole adviser for individuals about to be released conditionally. Mr. Timmons said that in view of the interest manifested by Mr. Huff on behalf of Galatas, as reflected in his file, that the necessary forms were submitted to Mr. Huff to be executed and returned. These forms were executed by Mr. Huff, and upon their receipt, Mr. Timmons forwarded them to the Parole Office in Washington, D.C. Mr. Timmons said that he does not personally pass upon the qualifications of parole advisers, but that usually the submission of the name and the executed forms is tantamount to acceptance.

I desire to bring to your attention a situation which I believe may result in serious mortification and embarrassment to the Department unless immediate steps are taken to correct it.

You will recall that Richard Galatas, notorious confidence man. was sentenced to a term of two years imprisonment and a fine of \$10,000 on January 5, 1935, for his participation in the Kansas City Massacre. Galatas served his sentence in Federal penal institutions and I have just learned that the parole adviser designated for Richard Galatas prior to his release from Federal custody was C. Floyd Huff, who you will recall was formerly United States Commissioner at Hot Springs, Arkansas. I have been advised that M. R. Timmons. Parole Officer at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, was advised by Huff on April 20, 1936. that he, Buff, would serve as parole adviser for Galatas in the event Galatas was paroled. Galatas was not paroled but was released upon a conditional release, but C. Floyd Huff was designated by Mr. Timmons in the form submitted by him to Washington as parole adviser to Galatas and Huff served in this capacity. I do not believe it is necessary to again inform you of the vary unsavory reputation of C. Floyd Huff or of his notorious association with criminals frequenting Hot Springs, Arkansas.

It appears that neither M. R. Timmons, Parole Officer at the Leavenworth Penitentiary, nor the Parole Board made any check to ascertain whether the parole adviser designated for Calatas was a responsible person and obviously Huff was unfitted for this position because of his past activities.

I do not know whether the procedure followed in this case in so far as a lack of check upon the part of the Parole Officer and the Parole Board into the identity of the parole adviser for a released convict is typical of all cases, but I wanted to bring this particular situation to your attention for two purposes; first, have the parole adviser for Galatas changed if Huff is still serving in this capacity, and second, to suggest that the system of selecting and approving parole advisers be revised so as to provide for a comprehensive check of the identity and qualifications of parole advisors prior to their designation as such.

RE: Escape of Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole from Alcatraz

Mr. Stein called from Oklahoma City advising that Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Cornett, who reside at Stroud, Oklahoma, have been interviewed. You will recall that Mrs. Cornett is the sister of Cole. Mr. and Mrs. Cornett stated that when Cole escaped from the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, on November 30, 1934, Cole went to Childress, Texas, and was harbored there by John and Ruth Barker, who are distant relatives of Cole's stepfather Fred Cole. Cole was protected by the Barkers for four or five days. It has also been ascertained that John Barker sent money to Cole when the latter was at McAlester, and Mrs. Cornett states she believes Cole would go to Childress.

Mr. Stein stated that he had called ir. Blake at Dallas with the idea of possibly maintaining a surveillance on the Barker home, if these individuals are still at Childress. Blake advised Stein that they are there but he, Blake, does not have sufficient men to maintain a surveillance.

I told Mr. Stein to call Blake and have him make a discreet check to ascertain if Cole and Roe might be at the Barker place, thereafter maintaining an appropriate surveillance. Mr. Stein was informed that Blake has eight agents which should be sufficient manpower to make this surveillance. However, if Blake does not have sufficient men, I told Stein to have him call the Bureau.







Had a room in a good hotel will go to our haven soon, went to Okla. yesterday to get what we need The mayor here we were sorry he could not turn the keys of his city over to us. A good rest is great. Had one real off day. We are not noticed here at all there is such a stir. The big shot is a great guy. Tell all the boys we do not want to bother them and if they do us we are afraid there wives and poor children will weep. A good friend is a great pal. We did not want to stay in a US escape proof prison.



J. J. Jones, 3444 Magnolia Street, New Orleans, advised that he was a porter on the Tourist Sleeper of the Sunset Limited which left San Francisco at 8:10 PM on Tuesday, December 21, 1937. This train arrived at Glendale, California at 7:43 AM on December 22, 1937. Jones

Newspaper photographs of Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole were exhibited to Jones, who, upon examination of same, stated that the photograph of Cole resembled an individual who boarded the Sunset Limited at San Francisco on December 21, 1937, and that this individual occupied entire Section #4 of the Tourist Sleeper. Jones related that the above mentioned individual retired as soon as he boarded the train and did not arise until 7:00 AM on December 22, 1937, and got off the train at Glendale, California at 7:43 AM on December 22, 1937.

Jones furnished the following description of the individual who occupied Section #4 of the Tourist Sleeper:

It was further determined from Jones that an individual resembling the photograph of Ralph Roe occupied Upper Berth #5 of the same car, but that this individual did not get off the train at Glendale, California; he was of the opinion that this man left the train at Los Angeles, California. Jones informed that these two individuals did not appear to be traveling together; that they did not stay together at any time; nor did he notice them talking to each other at any time.

It should be noted that Jones appears to be a rather intelligent negro. Jones was not positive of his identification of the photographs of subjects, but was rather convinced that the photograph of Cole closely resembled that of the above mentioned individual who occupied Section #4 of the said Tourist Sleeper.

The above facts were furnished by telegraph to the Los Angeles Field Division on December 25, 1937.

ESCAPED FEDERAL PRISONERS

On December 22, 1937 Special Agent Myron E. Gurnea and I, having made arrangements with Warden J. A. Johnston at Alcatraz, proceeded to the Island at the earliest possible opportunity to view and examine the scene of escape and to interrogate guards and persons making examination immediately at the time of the escape.

A\map of the Island was procured and photostatic copies have been made of the entire island in two sections, which was necessary because of our photostatic equipment, and enlargements have been made covering the particular point of escape and points of specific interest in this investigation, all of which are being forwarded herewith so that the details of this letter can be more clearly understood by the Bureau. We are also forwarding. under separate cover, a map of the San Francisc o Entrance, prepared by the United States Department of Commerce. future references to maps and locations will be made in accordance with the maps to enable the Bureau to ascertain definitely to which reference is being made. There are also being forwarded herewith two newspaper photographs which are self-explanatory, and which may help the Bureau in visualizing the scene.

At the writing of this letter photographs of the scene itself are not available and arrangements have been made whereby we will take photographs at the first opportunity, which at the present time appears to be Sunday, December 26th. Immediately upon completion of these photographs they will be forwarded to the Bureau also for assistance in visualizing the scene.

Special Agent Gurnea, Special Agent Farland and myself were in conference with the Warden from approximately 4:20 P. M. until 5:00 P. M., Agent Gurnea and I asking numerous questions in the interim when we were waiting to go down to view the actual scene. The questioning was based upon the possible theories that aid may have been given in the form of communications and implements, and through the medium of food stuffs, supplies, laundry and civilian contacts.

With regard to communications, the Warden explained that every precaution was taken to prevent any type of communication reaching an inmate directly; that all mail was censored and that all incoming stuffs are examined minutely by prison officials or personnel, not being touched by prisoners, for the specific purpose of searching and shaking down for possible incoming communications.

with regard to food stuffs and supplies, upon questioning it was brought out that food stuffs were contracted upon a three months' basis and special purchase items were made from time to time. The correspondence dealing with contracts, bids, billings, et cetera, and in fact all clerical work on the Island, is handled by official personnel and not prisoners. It was also brought out that the prisoners could in no way tell definitely who was going to handle particular food stuffs over a period of time, and they could not ascertain that certain shipments would be coming to the Island from any particular company.

Warden Johnston was closely questioned relative to this matter due to the fact that it would be possible for confederates on the outside to smuggle information or implements through to the prisoners in food containers, if they knew the source. Questioned as to food containers and the place of storing food on the Island, the Warden pointed out that food was kept in the remotest possible place from the prisoners, namely, in a store house above the dock itself, reached only by elevator from the dock. From this source of supply the necessary supplies are taken to the kitchen as they are needed. He explained that everything was not shaken down in the kitchen itself. The only handling done of the

material going into the store house by prisoners is by one or two prison dockmen who do not have an opportunity to open any of the cases or containers; these prisoners merely truck the material from the boat to the elevator where it is then cared for by official employees.

When the food stuff is taken to the kitchen it is very cautiously placed in a cage-like entrance which permits a shake-down by the guard obtaining the same for kitchen use. Any canned stuffs are removed from their original containers and put into prison receptacles. Vegetables are scrutinized for the possibility that they might contain implements or messages. Vegetables being shipped in sacks, such as potatoes, cabbage, et cetera, are removed from the original containers in the store house and placed in other similar containers prior to the time they are sent to the kitchen. Upon arrival at the cage-like entrance to the kitchen itself the guard delivering the food stuff again removes the vegetables from the sacks and dumps them into metal bin-like carriers, prior to the time they are actually placed in the kitchen. During this transfer the guard again closely observes the vegetables for the purpose of preventing any notes or implements being taken to the prisoners through that medium.

The laundry that is brought upon the Island to be handled in the prison laundry is dumped on the docks in tied bags. A prisoner hands a tied bag to a guard at a shake-down table where the guard cuts the string and dumps the laundry, searches the bag and then handles each piece of laundry, to determine whether it contains implements or messages and upon satisfying himself the particular piece contains no implements or communications, he then hands the same to a prisoner who places it in a receptacle which is taken to the laundry. The Warden explained that it is again shaken down in the laundry before going through the laundering process.

It was ascertained that the contact of visitors with the prisoners is very closely scrutinized and guarded; the prisoner having a visitor has a guard next to him on his side of a partition, speaking through an aperture in the dividing wall, and the visitor having a guard present on his side of the wall during the entire conversation. It

is physically impossible for a message to be handed to a prisoner from a visitor during conversations. No recordings are made of these conversations; however an amplifying system is used to enable the guards to overhear every word said.

At this time report was received from the guard that the count had been made and we proceeded to the building marked #82 on the map, which is the building from which the men escaped. Present during this portion of the investigation were the Warden, his Secretary, Mr. Miller, the Deputy Warden, several guards, including Mr. Joseph B. Steere, who was in charge of the detail from which these men escaped.

It will be noted from the map of building #82 that it consists of 6 rooms. For the purpose of this investigation the paint shop can be eliminated from further consideration as it is entirely separated, both by a partition and by the fact that it is not under the supervision of Guard Steere. This letter deals particularly with activities and observations noted in what is designated the "mat shop", which includes 3 rooms, of which two are used for actual work, the other being used for the storage of tires. These three rooms have closing doorways inside with two outside door exits. This section of Building #82 is divided from the blacksmith shop by a solid wall, the only entrance being from the outside.

The blacksmith shop is divided into two rooms, the smaller being the one from which the prisoners escaped and which is used for the storage of metals, there being one work bench under the window of escape. This room designated "B" on the map has an inside entrance to the main room of the blacksmith shop, marked "A", wherein is placed the tool racks, forges, anvils, et cetera. Room B also has an outside exit leading to the yard. This exit is covered with a marquee, as indicated on the map. COLE was the janitor and helper in the blacksmith shop, having free movement between Rooms A and B and allowed to handle any tools in the performance of his duties.

Directly beneath the window of escape, which is marked #2, is found a work bench with a vice attached thereto for the purpose of cutting metals in the form of shafting, angle iron, and similar meterial with hack saws.

The escaped prisoner ROE was employed in the mat shop in Room D. It will be noted that there is an entrance from D to C, C being a room having a similar outside doorway as room B. This is being pointed out specifically at this time because it would have been possible for ROE to watch STEERE, the guard, come into the entrance of room E and then slip out the doorway of room C into the doorway of room B, without the guard noting his absence, this movement being under the marquee and not observable from a guard on the towers.

It should be mentioned at this point that Mr. STEERE, in charge of the mat shop and blacksmith shop, had under his supervision twenty-six men in Rooms C, D and E, and six men in Rooms A and B. The names of the prisoners employed in these rooms are set out hereafter:

The duties of Mr. Steere were not only to observe the men but to supervise their work and give them advice as to blue prints and details concerning their individual jobs.

Upon inspection of the window through which the escape was made it was found that two laterals had been sawed, this being at Point #2, leaving a space with inside measurements of 17^{Lm} x 8-3/4". Our observation of the window did not disclose any marks of the saw due to the fact that they had been welded, painted and puttied immediately after the escape. The Warden stated, however, that it appeared the cutting had been done with a hack saw and that the cuts had been very rough. It was also observed before the repairs had been made that the laterals had not been completely sawed through at one time but that an unsawed portion had been left about as big around as an eight penny nail which was broken off at the time of the escape and was noted because it was not rusty as was the rest of the window where the sawing had taken place.

It was pointed out, however, that this metal would rust overnight. The height of this window from the floor was 5^{\bullet} 6^{n} , directly over a work bench which was used for preparing dies. The Warden explained that sometimes one or two men worked in the room but that there was no definite detail at that bench.

Interrogated as to the proper name of the window, the Warden stated it was known as "detention sash". The description of detention sash is as follows: each individual pane is 5-1/4" x 8-3/4". The metal sash itself is composed of "T" iron, the flat portion being toward the inside and the shank of the "T" extending toward the outside of the window. This iron is approximately 1/4" thick and the top of the "T" and the shank are about 1-1/2" in width.

Numerous panes were missing, some of them left open, others with removable board coverings which was explained as necessary in order to provide proper ventilation. The glass in these windows was considered to be puttied in a specially good manner by the prison authorities and this type of detention sash and window covers the entire portion of that side of the building which faces the Bay with a height of $5\frac{1}{2}$ feet to the ceiling. The particular portion being cut was in the immediate lower right hand corner of the composite window. It was stated that one piece of metal frame was found on the inside and one piece of metal frame on the outside, directly below the window.

Mr. Steere stated that COLE could have worked on the window without him having seen him but that he made the rounds every half hour, not at regular times but at least once every half hour. It will be noted that we were advised two of the three panes of glass in the aperture of escape had already been broken out and that missing glass from this portion of the window would have excited no attention. It was also brought out that there are night patrols which are not periodical but which are made in an effort to find contraband in the shops, this detail making part of its routine the tapping of window The last time it was recalled this particular room had been tapped was approximately 12 days before the escape. It was stated that the cut portion of the window frame could have been covered with the putty from the windows themselves because it is of a heavy type of putty.

Inquiry was made as to whether or not any tools were missing and it was reported to us that no tools were missing except the 24" Stillson wrench which was found. The hack sawswhich are used in the shop are charged out to the prisoners and returned to Mr. Steere. It was admitted that a prisoner might have one for a legitimate reason and still be able to use it for purposes of making an effort to escape. Steere did not remember COLE specifically asking for a hack saw at any time but explained that COLE, being the janitor and helper, could handle any tools. It is the opinion of Agent Gurnea and myself that consideration should be given to the fact that since hack saws are constantly used at this scene of escape the possibility of them having been smuggled in might be eliminated since it would serve no purpose.

Steere was unable to state who had used hack saws on the day of escape and also stated there had never been any missing and that when a blade is broken the pieces must be returned to him; also that a limited supply of such material is maintained in the blacksmith shop itself.

Upon specific inquiry by me, Warden Johnston admitted a piece of metal about 6 inches long had been found under a cabinet directly next to the work bench, under the window of escape, immediately after the escape. This bit of metal was of ordinary 1/4" thick steel which could have been picked up anywhere in the shops but which showed signs of having been ground. It is suggested that consideration be given to the fact that it may be this bit of steel might have been maintained as a weapon by the escaped prisoners, and because of its unfinished state might indicate that the time of escape was not prearranged but executed on the spur of the moment.

Due to the fact that five-gallon cans are used in the machine shop from time to time, a five-gallon can was taken measuring 9-7/16" x 13-3/4", in an effort to put it through the aperture which could not be done unless the can had been battered. This point not being overlooked, we are seeking in our searches any type of battered red can of the type used in this particular shop.

Photographs of these points mentioned heretofore will be obtained and forwarded to the Bureau.

We then examined the ledge directly below the window on the outside, which was a 5° 6° drop, and discovered no evidence of value there; the next drop taken by the prisoners was to a steep graded catwalk running down from the level of the yard at the outside corner of Room B to the edge of the bank on the outside of Room D, and nothing of value was ascertained along this route.

Between this walk and the shoreline itself there is a wire mesh fence $10\frac{1}{2}$ feet in height, which is equipped with an additional $4\frac{1}{2}$ feet of barbed wire, thus

making it impossible for anyone to jump into the water from the walk. This fence is a continuation of similar fencing which protects the entire work area and continues on around the end of the Island behind Building #82 with which we are concerned.

At the corner of Room D the walk heretofore mentioned turns and follows the building line to the position indicated by arrow #1 at which place there is a gate secured by a padlock which enables the throwing of refuse into the Bay from the mat shop. This refuse consists of old automobile casings which have been punched for the purpose of manufacturing mats. It was observed at this time that due to the angle of the heavy wire fence it would be very difficult for a guard in Tower 36, indicated by arrow #3, to observe a person between Building #82 and the fence, due to the angle. It would be possible, of course, for a guard in that tower to observe any individual between the building and that fence if he were looking directly at that point; however a movement at that position would not attract his attention.

It was also observed that the gate through the wire fence located behind Building #82 cannot be observed from the windows of the mat shop or blacksmith shop due to the fact that the first floor in the mat shop is a solid wall containing no windows whatsoever.

When the guards and the Warden were questioned as to the knowledge either ROE or COLE may have had as to the physical properties of this gate, they advised that only trusted prisoners were permitted to go to that gate and at that time were accompanied by a guard, these visits being made for the purpose of discarding the old casings. The Warden stated that at no time had COLE or ROE made one of these trips due to the fact that they always suspected them of being individuals who would take any chance to make their escape.

This information would indicate that either COLE or ROE had discussed this matter fully with other prisoners who had assisted in disposing of the refuse. Special Agent Farland today advised he had received information that COLE had, shortly before 11:00 A. M., on December sixteenth, proceeded to the furniture factory, which is immediately above

with inmate FRANCIS HARPER, #283-AZ. It is believed possible that HARPER is the prisoner who advised ROE and COLE of the physical properties of the scene of escape. This matter will be fully checked, however, in an effort to ascertain definitely the nature of the conversation had between HARPER and COLE, and also as to the method employed by COLE which enabled him to proceed from the blacksmith shop to the furniture factory.

Immediately outside of this fence is strung several strands of barbed wire for the purpose of making it difficult for a person to break away from the guard and dive through the fence while throwing tire casings over. There is, however, a large opening between the strands of the wire purposely left to enable the tires to be thrown into the water.

Immediately below this opening, at a distance of approximately ten feet, there is a ledge which has caught many of the old casings and where they still remain. From this ledge it is then approximately ten feet into the water itself; thus it would be easy for a prisoner to jump from the gate to the first ledge, alighting on the tires, and then into the water, if he so desired. There is, however, an additional ledge running diagonally from the first ledge to the water's edge which would make it possible for the prisoner to follow this ledge down to a point approximately within two or three feet from the water.

At this point of the investigation, consideration was given the visibility of this point from the various guard towers. There is a guard stationed on the roof of Building #82, whose duty it is to patrol the entire walls of that building. It will also be noted on the map that there is a guard tower, designated as 37, on the opposite corner of the building from the position of the gate. It is impossible for guards from any of the other towers to observe the water line at this point on the Island. Therefore, it is easily realized that due to the length of the patrol of the guard on this building, it would be a coincidence if he were to be at that position of the building observing that particular point of the Island when a prisoner made his escape through the gate.

Directly opposite this gate, at a distance of approximately 200 yards, is located one of the marker buoys for the Island, which serve as a dead line for private craft. Approximately 100 yards beyond this buoy or 300 yards from the Island itself is a bell buoy, indicated on the large map of San Francisco Bay, which is being forwarded under separate cover.

As it was suggested that the escape was possibly effected through previous arrangements made between the prisoners and the operator of a boat, to have the boat tied up to the bell buoy in the fog, the prisoners to swim to the buoy where they would be picked up by the boat. If this plan were carried out the bell buoy would, of course, serve as a constant indicator of direction regardless of the density of the fog, and would provide a convenient meeting place. Because of these facts, Warden Johnston and the guards were closely questioned as to the visibility at the exact time of escape; we were advised, however, by one guard that he had particularly noticed it was possible for him to observe the bell buoy on that occasion, which would make it impossible for a boat to have tied to the buoy without having been observed.

It will be noted that the initial information given this office by employees on the Island was to the effect that it was a heavy "pea soup" fog and that visibility was practically zero. The receipt of this initial information, together with the condition of the fog in San Francisco and on other portions of the Bay, led us to believe that that was probably the case; however, our subsequent inquiry has developed that although the fog at times was of that density due to the peculiar condition of air currents around the Island the "pea soup" density lay in a bank beyond 300 yards and the guards were able to see at least to the 200 yard markers most of the time, and at this particular time, as set out above, to the bell buoy, which is 300 yards distant.

These facts also nullify the original theory, as expressed by the press, that it was impossible for the guards on the towers to observe the movements of the men on the Island. Warden Johnston pointed out that if that had been the condition the men would not have been moved at 1:00 P. M. from the cell

blocks to the work shops since that contingency is considered at all times on the Island, and on the morning of escape the men were not placed in the work shop until 45 minutes after schedule due to fog conditions.

When considering the possibility of the men swimming from the Island to the bell buoy, all persons interviewed on the Island stated it was their belief it was impossible for any individual to swim in that current. They stated that the water was specially rough and that the current appeared to be a "mill race". Information has later been developed from lighthouse keepers and other observers that the current in the Bay at the time of escape was perhaps the strongest that has existed during this year. A lighthouse keeper made the observation that it would have been impossible for a small boat, and particularly for a row boat, to have proceeded against the current in the vicinity of the Island, or in the area between the Island and the Golden Gate, which would have put a boat in a position to pick up the men as they swam from the Island to a specified point.

Consideration has also been given to the possibility of these men attaching themselves to a piece of drift wood going by the Island. All observers, such as lighthouse keepers and Coast Guard men, advise that if this had been done it would have been impossible for the individuals to have propelled the drift wood to the shore line in the current that existed at that time and that they would have been carried out through the Golden Gate to the open sea.

In so far as the elapsed time is concerned during the interim between the actual time of escape and the beginning of the boat patrol, Warden Johnston and the guards advised that power boats were patrolling the water adjoining that area of the Island within ten to fifteen minutes after the escape had been discovered. In further discussing the time element, Mr. Steere advised that he distinctly remembers checking the men into the shop at 1:00 P. M. and is of the opinion - however he is not positive - that he observed COLE and ROE during the interim between 1:00 and the 1:30 check up. He bases his opinion on the fact that he distinctly remembers having entered the blackmith shop during that time and believes that had these men escaped prior to that second visit he would have observed all was not in order.

Mr. Steere seems very truthful in this matter and gives the impression he is attempting to give a straight story without coloring it or covering up in any manner. Thus, if it is assumed the escape was made immediately after 1:00 P. M. these men could have possibly been in the water forty to forty-five minutes prior to the time boats were actually patrolling that area. Warden Johnston advised that upon arrival of the boats they immediately started circling that entire area, widening their circles on each trip and particularly following the ebb tide which would be in the direction the men would have been carried if they were swimming or holding onto a piece of drift wood.

Upon return to the mat shop the tire casings which are used for the construction of mats were closely examined at which time Warden Johnston advised that upon arrival of a shipment of tire casings on the Island, each casing is inspected by a guard for any boots or patches on the tires, and if any are found they are removed to preclude possibility of notes or implements being concealed therein.

Warden Johnston was also questioned as to the possibility of inner tubes remaining in any of these casings when they are sent to the mat shop. He stated that due to the inspection given these tires on the dock it would be impossible for an inner tube to be taken to the mat shop through this medium. He was then questioned as to the possibility of prisoners on the Island stealing and concealing an inner tube which had been or was being used on one of the automobiles on the Island. The Warden stated it would be impossible for a prisoner to obtain any of these tubes due to the fact that the prisoners do not have access to any of the store houses, this material being handled only by the guards.

As previously stated it is the opinion of both Special Agent Gurnea and myself that no consideration need by given the possibility of hack saw blades having been smuggled onto the Island, or the manufacture of such implements by the prisoners thereon, due to the fact that this escape was no doubt effected by the use of a hack saw legitimately in the hands of the persons using it.

Warden Johnston also advised that it is almost impossible to obtain any information whatever from the prisoners on the Island relative to the escape due to the fact that any

prisoner observed talking to a guard would be immediately placed under suspicion by the other prisoners. He stated they had received "rumbles", however, from one or two of the prisoners to the effect that bubbles had come up following the time the prisoners had escaped. The Warden advised he did not place a great amount of credence to this story as the prisoners giving the information were not in a position to observe the point of the Island where the escape was made.

During this entire investigation Warden Johnston has continued to be very friendly and cooperative and is apparently being of every possible assistance.



I telephoned SAC Pieper, at San Francisco, and inquired as to the progress in the investigation of the escape from Alcatras. Mr. Pieper stated that there have been no important developments; that they are running down every lead; that the cooperation from all sources has been very good. Mr. Pieper stated that Agent Farland was still on the Island; that he picks up news from the prisoners every day; that the feeling among the prisoners now is that the men did not get away.

Agent Gurnes was also in the office and I talked to him.

Agent Gurnes stated that a list of all prisoners who had been transferred from Alcatras had been compiled, also a list of all released prisoners who may have had some contact with Ros and Cole; that all these men would be interviewed; that all visitors and all persons to whom letters were addressed would also be interviewed. Mr. Gurnes stated that when a letter is received by the Warden it is immediately sent to the Bureau; that several of these, undoubtedly crank letters, had been sent to the Laboratory for examination.

I stated that if there was nothing that required special sttention Mr. Gurnea could resuse his leave. Mr. Gurnea stated that hir. requesting that the Omaha Office be advised as to between what numerals on the License Plate a dash should appear, inasmuch as this designates the county which issued the license plate.

Agent interviewed Joe Bredenberg, County Treasurer, Wahoo, Nebraska, who advised that 1937 Nebraska License Plates 6-485 were issued on December 23rd, 1936, to David Magnuson, a farmer who resides five miles northwest of Mead, Nebraska, for a 1936 Chevrolet Seden, Motor Number 5524933. Mr. Bredenberg advised that Mr. Magnuson is a fairly well to do farmer and highly respected in the vicinity in which he resides, and has never been involved in any kind of tmuble.

Mr. Magnuson was located on his farm and it was observed his Chevrolet Sedan was parked in the farmyard, and 1937 Nebraska Tags 6-485 were attached to the car. Mr. Magnuson advised that he had never been in the State of Oregon and the last time he had been out of the State of Nebraska, which was on a short trip with his family in Colorado, was in October, 1936.

It was obvious that Mr. Magmuson had not been in Oregon and he was not questioned any further in reference to instant matter.

Deputy Treasurer W. J. Wells, West Point, Nebraska, exhibited to Agent 1937 Certificate of Registration 24-5687, which indicated that Nebraska 1937 License Plates Number 24-2339, had been issued to Dorothy Honn, West Point, Nebraska, for a 1937 Model Ford Tudor, Motor Number 3715052. Mr. Wells examined his records and advised that no driver's license had been issued to Miss Ronn. There was submitted as a basis for securing the Certificate of Registration, a Bill of Sale Notarized on September 21st, 1937, by Clarice the Barnum, West Point, which reflects that the Ford was bought new from the J. D. Beck Ford Agency at West Point. Mr. Wells advised Agent that Mrs. Barnum is the wife of Charles My Barnum, who is a salesman and the Manager of the J. D. Beck Ford Agency at West Point.

Postmaster Richard H. Schwedhelm, West Point, Nebraska, advised that his records for five years past failed to reflect that Miss Dorothy Ronn had ever received mail through the Post Office or on a rural route.

Charles M. Barnum was located at the J. D. Beck Ford Agency, and he exhibited his records to Agent. Mr. Barnum advised that on September 21st, 1937, William E. Meyer, a farmer who resides five miles northeast of Scribner, Nebraska, purchased the Ford Tudor as de-

scribed above, from him, and gave his personal check in the amount of \$661.00, drawn on a bank in Hooper, Nebraska, for this car. Mr. Barnum advised he is well acquainted with Mr. Meyer, who buys a new automobile from him each year. Mr. Meyer advised that he was buying this car for a friend of his named Dorothy Ronn, who is unknown to Mn. Barnum, Mr. Barnum advising that he did not see Dorothy Ronn at any time during the negotiation of the sale; however, Mr. Meyer explained that he met this lady at Knightsen, California, and that she was visiting at his home with her sister and the latter's husband, and requested him to buy a car in her name; therefore, Mr. Barnum permitted Mr. Meyer to sign the name of Miss Ronn to all papers in connection with the sale of the car, including the bill of sale which was used to secure the 1937 Nebraska License Plates.

Mr. Barmum advised that a few weeks after he sold this car, he received a letter from Miss Ronn, who gave her address as General Delivery, Kansas City, Missouri, in which she advised that something had gone wrong with the car and she was put to the expense of approximately \$10.00 in repairing it, and she indicated that he should reimburse her; however, he did not answer her letter, as the car was in good mechanical shape when it left the shop and she did not give sufficient details to enable him to ascertain specifically what was wrong with the car. Mr. Barmum has disposed of this letter and has not heard from Miss Ronn since.

Postmaster A. Ristow, Scribner, Nebraska, advised that William E. Mayer, who is approximately thirty-five years of age, and George F. Mayer, an older brother, both of whom are bachelors, reside with their mother on a farm located five miles northeast of Scribner; that this family has a good reputation, none has ever been involved in trouble and that these people are life long residents of Scribner. George Mayer, according to Mr. Ristow, is a Director of the Farmers Elevator Company at Scribner, and the local County Fair Association.

Mr. Ristow further stated that William Meyer is a person who likes to room around the country and during the past several years he has made frequent trips to California, where, he understands, William Meyer has worked for various farmers; that there are many people formerly red ding in the vicinity of Scribner, of German descent, who have settled on farms near Stockton and Knightsen, California.

Agent interviewed George F. Meyer on his farm near Scribner, Nebraska, and he advised that his brother, William Meyer, was confined in bed earlier in the day, believed to have a touch of influenze, but he believed Agent could interview him, providing the interview did not cover too long a period.

William E. Meyer was interviewed and advised that in June and July, 1937, he drove to Knightsen, California, and secured employment with a number of farmers, attending to the irrigation canals running through the farms; that in August, 1937, he secured employment on a farm near Stockton, California. He does not recall the name of his employer. He advised that one day while working, Dorothy Honn and her sister Gertrude and the latter's husband, whose surname he has forgotten, drove up in an automobile and engaged him in conversation. He learned that Dorothy Honn was a trained nurse and had dome nursing in Stockton and Knightsen. She lived with her sister and the latter's husband in a suburb at an address which Mr. Meyer claimed he could not recall, partly because he was not feeling very well, and further, he advised that although he knows the residence, he at no time knew the name of the street on which Miss Honn resided.

Mr. Meyer advised that Dorothy Honn is 25 years of age; height, 5 feet 5 inches; weighs 115 pounds; hair, brown; complexion, light. Her sister, Gertrude, is 35 years of age; height, 5 feet 6 inches; weight, 120 pounds; brown hair; medium complexion. The latter's husband is about 45 years of age; height, 5 feet 8 inches; weight, 155 pounds; hair, dark brown.

Mr. Meyer, who was rather indefinite in his information, advised that shortly after visiting the Ronns at their home in Stockton. he returned to Scribner on or about September 1st, 1937, and a few weeks thereafter Miss Bonn wrote him from Stockton, advising that she and her sister and the latter's husband were going to Ohio and would stop off at Fremont, Nebraska. They were traveling by bus. Mr. Meyer met these individuals at Fremont and drove them to his home and they remained throughout the day of September 21st, 1937. Miss Dorothy Ronn requested Mr. Meyer to buy her a car, as she could save considerable money by buying it in Nebraska rather than in California, and also avoid paying the California sales tax. Mr. Meyer edvised that although he did not know these individuals very well and claimed to know practically nothing of their past history, he took \$661.00 from Miss Ronn and bought for her a Ford Tudor Sedam, described above, from the J. D. Beck Ford Agency at West Point, driving it to Scribner, where he turned it over to Miss Ronn. Miss Ronn and her sister and the latter's husband departed, saying they were going to Ohio to a small town, the town's name not being recalled by Mr. Meyer, at which place Gertrude's husband expected to receive treatment for hemorrhoids, following which they intended to travel through Wisconsin and Montana, thence to Oregon, and return to Stockton.

Mr. Meyer was certain that Dorothy Ronn could be located by investigation at Knightsen and Stockton, California, through the Nurses Associations. He advised that as far as he knew these people were reputable, but as he did not learn much about them, he could not furnish anything further commerciant their whereabouts.

Agent questioned Mr. Meyer whether he had received any communications from Miss Ronn since she visited him, and he replied in the negative. He stated he had expected to receive a card during the Christmas Holidays but none had come; however, if he hears from her he will advise the Omaha Field Office. Agent continued questioning Mr. Meyer, believing that he had further information, but his brother, George F. Meyer, several times interrupted the commercation with remarks to the effect that he believed his brother was getting tired and would have to retire for the night because of his illness.

A teletype message was forwarded to the San Francisco Field Office on December 28th, 1937, in which was incorporated pertinent information oncerning the possible whereabouts of Miss Dorothy Ronn, with the request that she be located and interviewed.

Mr. Pieper stated that the weather was clear and that there were no new developments.





AT MARS, PENNSYLVANIA

HOWARD FIKE, an orchard employee on the Treesdale Farms. Mars, Pennsylvania, advised that he is an old acquaintance of LESLIE MOON and has known him for the past six years. He stated that Leslie Moon was the owner of a 1935 Ford Coupe automobile, bearing 1937 Pennsylvania license 62 P 5. He stated the Ford automobile was painted black on the body and fenders and was equipped with wire wheels. He advised that Moon worked for the Treesdale Farms for three or four years prior to July, 1937, as an orchard employee, specializing in apple raising, and that during the first part of July, 1937, Leslie Moon had left in his Ford automobile for a tour of the western part of the United States. He stated Moon had told him he was going to drive to the Yakima Valley in the State of Washington, in order to seek employment at some orchard in order to acquire tmore experience in raising apples, and that when he left Moon advised he had no definite plans as to when he would return.

Fike stated that he did not hear of Moon thereafter until some time in August, 1937, when a letter was sent to the Treesdale Farms by Moon stating that he was working in some pear orchard in the State of Utah, and that no correspondence had been received from him since that time. Fike stated Leslie Moon was a diligent worker while employed at the Treesdale Farms, and that he never heard of any trouble Moon was involved in. He stated Moon was employed as a foreman on the Treesdale Farms and was reliable and trustworthy in every respect. Fike stated that about December 1, 1937, Paul Flick, who lives at Mars, Pennsylvania, and who was employed by the Treesdale Farms at Mars, Pennsylvania, for the past four years and Bob Johnson who resides in Petersville, Pennsylvania, and who was employed as an orchard hand at the Number 10 Farm of the Treesdale Farms, Conoquenessing, Pennsylvania, and whose father is foreman of the Number 10 Farm, left Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to meet Leslie Moon somewhere in the State of Oregon during the month of December, 1937.

Fike stated he was well acquainted with both Johnson and Flick and he had discussed the plans of the boys before they left to meet Leslie Moon. He advised the boys intended to drive with Leslie Moon from Oregon through the states of California, Texas, Lousiana, Florida, North Carolina, and return to Pennsylvania, some time in March of 1938. He advised that he had not received any correspondence from Johnson or Flick since their departure on a Greyhound bus from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, for the State of Oregon.

Fike stated Moon had told him he had some relatives in Beverly Hills, Los Angeles, California, where he planned to stay when he got there.

However, Fike was unable to give the name of Moon's relatives.

Fike advised that before Moon left on his trip, he drove his automobile from the Treesdale Farms to the home of his parents who reside somewhere in Eastern Shore, West Virginia, from which point he commenced his trip. Fike advised that both Johnson and Flick had excellent reputations in the community were reliable and trustworthy and to his knowledge they had not been involved in any difficulties with the law.

ROBERT MEAL, an employee and orchard hand at the Treesdale Farms, who was present during the interview with Fike, stated he came to the Treesdale Farms in June, 1937, and he could corroborate the information given by Fike inasmuch as he had contacted all the boys.



HENRY FLICK, father of Paul Flick, whose Post Office address is Box 409 Mars, Pennsylvania, and who is employed as insurance salesman for the Garden Life Insurance Company, advised that Paul Flick was his son and he, together, with his friend Bob Johnson, about December 1, 1937, had left via Greyhound Bus Lines from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, for Hood River, Oregon, where they were to meet Leslie Moon about December 15, 1937, from which point they were to proceed along the coast into California. He stated that on December 24, 1937, the day upon which he was interviewed by the writer, he had received a letter from his son advising that he, Johnson, and Moon were staying at the Harvey Touring Camps in Santa Rosa, California until Monday, December 27, 1937, from which point they intended to drive to Los Angeles, California.

A teletype containing a summary of the above information was sent to the San Francisco Field Division requesting it to locate the above mentioned men for an interview. It is to be noted that the description of Moon, Flick, and Johnson does not correspond or approach the description of the unknown Subject who is being investigated in this case as the person who purchased booklets mentioned in reference teletype dated December 24, 1937.

DETAILS

On receipt of request from the Bureau that an immediate surveillance be placed on the home of MR. AND LRS. FRED COLE at Wood-lake, California, which request was received on December 17, 1937, the writer, accompanied by Special Agent H. A. SMITH, proceeded by automobile to Visalia, California, where these Agents met Special Agent A. D. HORN. Due to the fact that there was a dense fog prevailing in the neighborhood on the evening of December 17th which made it impossible to locate the home of the Coles on this evening, Agents remained in Visalia and proceeded to Woodlake, California, located sixteen miles from Visalia, on the morning of December 18, 1937.

AT LOODLAKE, CALIFORNIA

On December 18, 1937, the writer contacted MISS EDITH DN, postmaster at Woodlake, California, and secured information from her as to the location of the COIE farm, which farm is located approximately a mile and a half south and one mile east of Woodlake. Miss Day advised that numerous newspaper reporters had been present in Woodlake and had interviewed the Coles on the preceding day. It was also noted from newspapers that considerable information relative to the Coles had been published and also a story had appeared in the papers to the effect that Agents were present in Woodlake and maintaining a surveillance on the Cole home, this item having been published before the arrival of Agents at Woodlake.

Immediately upon the arrival of Agents at Modlake it was apparent that their identity was known, and also the reason for their presence in the town. For this reason, no attempt at secrecy was made. It might be stated that Woodlake is a small farming community of perhaps five hundred persons.

Agents proceeded to the COLE home, arriving there at 8:30 a.m., at which time MRS. COLE was home alone, although a neighbor, BERT USHY, was seen to be leaving the Cole home. Usry was interviewed by Special Agent H. A. Smith who did not identify himself, and it was ascertained from Mr. Usry that he was present at the Cole home for the

purpose of delivering some mincement for his wife and that there was no one in the Cole home at the time other than Mrs. Cole.

MRS. FRED (ESTHER) COLE was interviewed by the writer and Special Agent A. D. HORN, and advised that she had absolutely no information concerning the escape of her son or his present whereabouts other than what she had obtained from newspaper reporters who had interviewed her. It was noted at this time that Mrs. Cole was in an extremely upset condition and sobbed continuously throughout her interview. She advised that newspaper reporters had called at the Cole home at one a. m. on that morning and that they had taken flashlight pictures of her and that she had had very little sleep throughout the night.

MRS. COLE stated that she had last seen her son in July, 1937, at which time she had visited him at Alcatraz Prison, and that she had visited him on one previous occasion earlier in 1937. She also stated that she wrote a letter to her son every Monday but that she had received very few replies to these letters, and that the last she had heard from her son was approximately two months previous at which time he had written a short letter. She stated that THEODORE COLE had been very uncommunicative in his letters and had furnished her with no information as to his activities at the prison, and that he had given absolutely no indication of any intention to escape.

would attempt to contact her, and that the only information that Theodore had as to her location was the fact that she was getting her mail at Woodlake, California. She stated that she had never explained to her son just where the farm was located.

obtained from Postmaster DAY to the effect that MRS. COLE was an extremely religious woman and regarded in the community as being of an honest and conscientious type. This fact was evidenced during the interview with MRS. COLE, at which time she advised Agents that she regretted very much that her son had turned out to be a bad boy and that she had done everything in her power to make a Christian of him and that she felt in her heart that he was dead. Mrs. Cole also stated that it was her wish that her son were dead, but that if he were alive she was of the opinion that it would be better for him to surrender himself to the authorities, and that should he contact hor she would advise him to this effect.

A search was made of the COLE home and the surrounding buildings, but no evidence of the presence of Fugitive COIE was discovered. The Cole farm is located on land which is very flat and was formerly a river bottom. The nearest neighboring farm is approximately five hundred yards from the Cole farm and is in a position such that an adequate surveillance of the Cole farm could not be maintained from this place. After observing the terrain, it was the opinion of Agents that the only possible position from which to maintain a plant on the Cole farm was in the Cole home or in one of the two small buildings near the house. MRS. COIE was questioned by the writer as to her reaction should it be necessary for Agents to remain in her home. She stated that she had no facilities to accommodate Agents but that if it was necessary for them to remain in the home that she preferred that the matter be discussed with her husband. Since Mrs. Cole was extremely upset at the time the interview was concluded as rapidly as possible and Agents proceeded to Woodlake, California, for the purpose of interviewing FRED COLE, who was reported to be employed at the Texaco filling station in that town.

MR. FRED COIE stated that the only information he had concerning the recent activities of Subject COLE was such information as he had received from the newspaper reporters. He advised that neither he nor his wife read the newspapers and that they had no desire to gain information in this manner. He advised that he had visited Subject COIE in July, 1937, but that he had not seen him since. Mr. Cole stated that although Fugitive COLE was not his own son, he had considered him as such and had done everything in his power to assist Subject COLE; that during Subject's trouble in Oklahoma he, Fred Cole, had spent approximately twenty-five hundred dollars to save him from execution on a murder charge. Mr. Cole stated that on the occasion on which TEL COIE had escaped from McAlester Ponitentiary in Oklahoma he had come to the Cole home and contacted Fred Cole, who was then running a filling station at Stroud, Oklahoma, and that he had advised TED at this time that he should surrender himself to the authorities and serve out his sentence; that he, Fred Cole, had then left the filling station to contact the chief of police in Stroud for the purpose of surrendering TED COLE to him, but that on returning to the filling station with the chief of police they found that TED COIE had left. Mr. Cole stated that in the event that Subject COLE should make an appearance in Woodlake, California, he would immediately contact Agents and would also assist them in any way possible in the location of the fugitives.

MR. COIE was questioned as to the possibility of Agents maintaining a surveillance from the Cole home, and advised that such a procedure would be agreeable to him except for the fact that his wife

had been in an extremely nervous condition for some period of time and because of recent occurrences was, in his opinion, on the verge of a nervous breakdown, and that for this reason he preferred that some other arrangements be made inasmuch as he feared that igents: presence at the Cole home would result in serious effects on his write.

The provisions of the Federal harboring statute were explained to both MR. AND MRS. FRED COLE and they were cautioned against doing anything to jeopardize themselves.

Also present at the filling station during the interview with Fred Cole was a small boy, SATACRAIKS, seventeen years of age, whom Mr. Cole stated was living at their home for a short period of time. This boy is not related to the Coles, but is the con of a friend of the family who lives at Clovis, California, who left the boy at the Cole home for a short period of time while he made a trip. Mr. Cole stated that this boy was unknown to Subject Cole, and advised that the boy would be present with the Cole family at all times. This boy was interviewed and stated that he knew nothing about the case other than what gossip he had picked up in Woodlake. On the subsequent trip made by the Coles to Bell, California, this boy accompanied them to Tulare, California, where he left the Coles. Fred Cole later stated that the Cranks boy was visiting his uncle and aunt at Tulare.

The writer then contacted Special Agent in Charge J. H. HANSON and advised him of the developments at Moodlake, California, and was later instructed by Mr. Hanson, who had meanwhile contacted the Bureau, that it was not desired that an attempt be made to establish a plant at the Cole home under the present conditions, but that arrangements should be made to cover the situation in some other manner.

Accordingly, contacts were made with Congtable R. C.
BROWN and Deputy Constable TOM ARCHER, who advised that they had
already contacted the Coles and the neighbors and believed that they
had established contacts such that they would be informed immediately
should Fugitive COIE make an appearance in Woodlake, California. It
might be stated here, however, that both Constable Brown and Deputy
Archer, while promising their cooperation, did not give the impression
of even average ability or alertness, and for this reason it was
doubted that a great deal of reliance could be placed in them. Information was also obtained from various citizens in Woodlake to the effect
that both Archer and Brown were prone to give out all information that
came to them, and Agents were advised not to confide in these men to
any great extent.

On the afternoon of December 18, 1937, both IRS. COIE and FRED COIE were again interviewed and information as to the relatives and possible contacts of Subject COIE was obtained. However, much of this information is mere duplication of what has already been reported in this case and also later in this report, and for that reason is not being set out here.

IRS. COLE was particularly interviewed as to any possible contacts that her son might have, but was unable to furnish Agents with any definite information. She stated that her son had been, in her opinion, more or less of a "lonely" boy and had made few friends in school or elsewhere; that he was considered by his associates in school as a "sissy" and that it was neighborhood gossip that THD spent most of his time at home with his mother. She stated that THD was born in Pittsburg, Kansas, but that shortly after his birth she had moved to Tulsa, Oklahoma, and that THD had gone to school in that city, finishing the eighth grade except for one year during which he attended school in Euroka, Arkansas, when he was seven years old, and that he had also gone to school at the Atlantic School in Bell, California, for two or three months in 1929. She stated that TED COLE had no close friends in any of these cities to her knowledge.

trouble until after his marriage to MARIE WINNE; that he was married when he was nineteen years old, and that it was shortly after his marriage that he became involved in a robbery in Tulsa, Oklahoma, for which robbery he was later convicted and sentenced to the State Penitentiery. Mrs. Cole stated that in her opinion her son was not guilty of this offense, and that she and also other persons who were acquainted with TED felt that he had not received a fair trial or a just sentence in this case, and that she felt that his subsequent wrongist sentence in the fact that he had been thus unfairly dealt with in the first instance. Mrs. Cole stated that she did not think that there was anything inherently wrong with her son, but that he was more or less the viction of circumstances.

It might be stated that interviews with Mrs. Cole were unsatisfactory and very difficult, and that throughout these interviews she interspersed quotations from the Bible and various religious teachings to clarify her feelings toward her son, stating that she felt that he was predestined from his birth to be unfortunate.

While MRS. COIE appears to be sympathetic toward her son and of the opinion that he has suffered injustice, it should be stated that she advised Agents on numerous occasions during interviews with

her that she would not be guided by any person feelings that she might have which would be in conflict with her religious beliefs, and that she firmly believed that she must tell nothing but the truth and that for this reason she would furnish Agents with any information that she might receive, and cooperate in every way possible.

FRED COIE, when interviewed on numerous later occasions, also promised his fullest cooperation and advised Agents that he would furnish any information that he might receive that would be at all helpful in the location and apprehension of Subject Cole; that he would keep Agents posted as to all of his movements and the movements of his wife, and that Agents should feel free to contact him at any time for any reason whatever. It should also be stated that FRED COIE is presently receiving Veterans compensation from the Government, and that for this reason he has an additional incentive to cooperate with Agents. Mr. Cole impressed the writer and Agents Smith and Horn as being absolutely reliable and honest, and it is the writer's opinion that Mr. Cole will cooperate to the fullest extent with the Bureau.

During the period from December 18th to December 22nd, 1937, while Agents remained in Moodlake, California, numerous contacts were made at the Cole home and at the filling station where Mr. Cole was employed at various times of the day and night, and during the day the Cole home was also observed from a distance.

On December 20, 1937, FRED COLE advised that the man by whom he was employed at the filling station had sold out his interest in the station and that for that reason he, Fred Cole, would be no longer employed at the station but would be at home at the Cole farm.

Arrangements were made with Postmaster EDITH DAY to cover both incoming and outgoing mail of the Coles, and Miss Day advised on December 18th that a letter had been received that day postmarked Stroud, Oklahoma, on 12-15-37 at 6 p. m. Miss Day also advised on December 19th that a letter had been received by the Coles bearing the return address of 6238 Gifford Avenue, Bell, California.

of both of these letters immediately after their arrival, and stated that the first letter was from his wife's mother in Stroud, Oklahoma, and that the second letter was from his wife's daughter in Bell, California, and that each of the letters was merely offering condolences and contained no information as to the present whereabouts

of Fugitive Cole.

During Agents: stay in Modelake, various rumors were circulated as to the presence of Subject COLE in the vicinity, which rumors when checked proved to be without foundation in fact and were evidently based on the fact that Agents were present in the town.

Deputy Constable ARCHER on one occasion advised the writer that he had been talking with a man who had just driven to Woodlake from Omaha, Nebracka, and was supposed to have seen Subject COIE on the road. However, Archer was unable to state who this man was or whore he had seen Cole. In effort was made to locate this individual at Woodlake but no information as to his identity could be obtained.

On another occasion ARCHER stated that he had been conversing with a local farmer who stated that he knew where COIE was located, and that he had information to the effect that RAIPH ROE was presently in Shawnee, Oklahoma. However, Archer was unable to give any facts as to the basis for this man's information. He at first refused to furnish the man's name, but later stated that the person who had furnished him with this information was C. J. JACKSON.

Agents contacted C. J. JACKSON who advised that he had no information as to the location of either of the fugitives in this case other than what he had heard as gossip around Woodlake; that on that morning, December 21, 1937, he had been talking with a friend of his who advised him that he had seen Subject Cole. Jackson refused to give the name of this friend, stating that he had promised to keep the information confidential, but that he would again contact this man and see what further information he could obtain. Shortly after the interview with Jackson he was observed in conversation with a disreputable looking individual on the street in Woodlake. Immediately at the conclusion of this conversation the writer again interviewed Jackson and questioned him as to whether this was the man who had furnished provious information as to the location of these fugitives, and Jackson stated that it was and that this man had just told him that he had seen Subject COIE that morning and that he knew where Subject Cole was hiding. Jackson stated that this man's name was IEE but that he did not know his first name. At this time Jackson was fautioned against circulating information concerning this case, whether true or untrue, and promised that should be receive any further information or rumors he would immediately contact Agent.

furnished information to Jackson, was then interviewed by the writer and Special Agent H. A. Smith and denied that he had told engone that he had seen Subject COIE, and stated that the only information he had was gossip which he had picked up in the poolhall at Woodlake, and that on the previous Sunday morning, December 19, 1937, he had been in the poolhall and had talked with ROYAIE HART who had stated that he had seen Subject COIE and that he knew where Cole was presently hiding. Lee stated, however, that at the time of this conversation Hart was intexicated and that for this reason he doubted whether Hart had actually seen Cole. Lee was also cautioned against circulating information and promised that in the future should he overhear any remarks concerning Cole's whereabouts he would furnish same to Agents.

IR. ROY IE HART was interviewed at his farm, which is located approximately a mile south and one-half mile east of Woodlake and is almost directly across the Saint John's River from the Fred Colo farm. Hart, who appeared to Agents to be of low mentality, and who admitted that he was drunk most of the time but was sober at the time of this interview, stated that he had made no remarks to the effect that he had seen Subject COLE at any time, but did admit that he may have made statements while he was intoxicated which were misinterpreted. Hart stated that on Saturday morning, December 18th, at about 7 o'clock when he went out to his form to milk his cow he had been accosted by a stranger dressed in a pair of overalls, which individual inquired of him as to the location of the Cole farm. Hart stated that he told this men that the farm was located directly across the river and that the stranger had then questioned him as to whether he could swim across the river and Hart advised that it was possible to wade across the river. Hart said that the stranger then left in the general direction of the Cole farm, and that he did not know where he had eventually gone.

HART was shown photographs of the Subjects but was unable to identify either of them as the stranger that he had seen. He described this person as being about 5, 9, tall, slender in build, dark hair, wearing overalls and a dark shirt.

Although HTRT was vigorously interviewed with regard to this stranger, he could furnish no further information, but refused to admit that the stranger was the product of his imagination. Hart stated that he may have made some remarks at Woodlake concerning this stranger and had been misunderstood to mean that he had definitely seen TED COIL. He stated that he would not know either of the fugitives if he saw them, and that he had no information as to their present location. Hart was also cautioned against circulating rumors

concerning the fugitives and promised that in the future he would refrain from saying anything about this case to anyone other than Agents.

Although Hart's story as to the stranger supposed to have been seen by him on Saturday morning seemed unreliable, all possible efforts were made to ascertain whether or not it was true.

MR. BERT USRY who was present at the Cole home at the time Agents arrived at 8:30 Saturday morning, advised that he had been at the Cole home for approximately twenty minutes or half an hour prior to Agents arrival, and that during this time he was sure that no one was present at the Cole farm other than himself and Mrs. Cole, and that he had seen no stranger in the neighborhood on that morning.

Other neighbors were interviewed, as will be reported later in this report, and each of them also stated that they had seen no stranger in the neighborhood between 7 a. m. and 8:30 a. m. on Saturday, although they were all outside doing chores at this time and it was daylight so that any of these persons could have observed such a stranger had one crossed the river to the Cole farm.

Both MR. AND MRS. COIE were again vigorously interviewed as to the possibility that TED COIE or anyone else could have been at their home on Saturday morning prior to Agents' visit, and both firmly denied that any person had called there. In this connection it might be noted that during the original interviews with both Mr. and Mrs. Cole they, of their own/initiative, stated that they felt that TED COIE had most likely drowned, and each of them separately made inquiries of the writer as to the possibility of their securing the body of COIE in the event that it was recovered. These inquiries were made in a most sincere manner, and it is believed that the inquiries were honest and without a desire to mislead.

It will be observed that had a stranger such as was described by Hart left the Hart farm around 7 o'clock Saturday morning and proceeded across the river to the Cole farm, it would have been necessary for him to have traveled this distance of approximately one-half mile on foot and again left the Cole farm prior to 8 o'clock the same morning, at which time Bert Usry arrived at the Cole farm. Due to the improbability of such an

occurrence, and also due to the character and reputation of Royale Hart, it is believed that his story concerning the stranger was merely concected by him for the purpose of arousing gossip in Woodlake and thereby attaching some importance to himself.

MR. ED YORK, whose farm is located approximately one-half mile west of the Cole farm, was interviewed and stated that he had absolutely no information as to the presence of either of the fugitives in the community, and that the only knowledge that he had that the Coles had a son in Alcatraz was such as he had obtained from the newspapers since the escape. He advised that he had been contacted by local officers and had promised them his cooperation, and that he would also cooperate with Agents in furnishing any information he might obtain. He advised that he had observed nothing which would be of interest in the instant investigation. Mr. York appeared to be a very ignorant type of person, and while he promised his cooperation it is doubtful whether he can be of much assistance.

MR. GEORGE W. ASHEVILLE, whose farm is located approximately five hundred yards east of the Cole farm, stated that he had no information of interest and that his only information concerning TED COLE or RAIPH ROE was such as he had obtained from the newspapers, and that he had not previously known that the Coles had a son in Alcatraz. Mr. Asheville appeared to be an intelligent and level-headed individual and promised his absolute cooperation. Mr. Asheville also advised that he would make it a point to observe the Cole farm during the day and would furnish Agents with any information that he might obtain.

MRS. GEORGE ASHEVILLE was interviewed by Agent Smith and appeared reluctant to discuss the instant case with Agent. She stated that she felt very sorry for Mrs. Cole, and realized that Mrs. Cole was placed in a very embarrassing and sad predicament because of her son. Because of Mrs. Asheville's attitude, it is doubtful whether she would cooperate in furnishing any information, although she stated that she would do so.

MR. HERT USRY, who lives in a small shack located approximately three hundred yards north of the Asheville farm, furnished information as previously indicated, but in addition to this stated that he had nothing which would be of interest in the instant investigation. Mr. Usry advised that the first indication he had of the fact that the Coles had a son in Alcatraz Prison was received by him on his visit to the Cole farm on the morning of

December 18, 1937. Mr. Usry appeared to be an honest and cooperative individual, and stated that he would furnish ligents with any information he might obtain.

MRS. BERT USRY was also interviewed, and while she appeared to be an honest and conscientious woman, she also showed evidence of sympathy for Mrs. Cole and refused to state whether or not she would furnish any information should she obtain same, but did say that in the event that she obtained any information she would, of course, furnish it to her husband, and that she would be guided by his decision as to whether or not it should be furnished to the authorities.

As previously stated, all of these neighbors have been contacted by the local law-enforcement officers, who have in turn promised to furnish this Bureau with any information they might obtain. The address and telephone number of the Los Angeles Field Division was left with each of the persons contacted, and they were also advised of the provisions of the Federal harboring statute.

On the afternoon of December 21, 1937, FRED COIE advised the writer that he and his wife were contemplating a trip to Bell, California, for the purpose of spending the holidays with their daughter, and asked for Agent's advice as to whether they should make this trip. Mr. Cole was advised that it was not the Bureau's desire to interfere in any way with the activities of eithor himself or his wife, and that they should make any trips that they cared to so long as they advised Agents of the fact that they were making such trips. Mr. Cole then stated that he and his wife would leave Moodlake on the afternoon of December S2nd and would proceed to/Lindsay, California, where they would visit MR. and LRS. GEORGE MORRIS, spending the night there, and that they would proceed to Bell, California, on the following day. This information was furnished to Special Agent in Charge Hanson by telephone, and the writer was advised that arrangements should be made to cover the Coles during their trip.

Also on the afternoon of December 22nd Special Agent in Charge Hanson advised the writer by telephone that information had been received to the effect that TED COLE had relatives at Merced, California, and instructed Special Agent A. D. HORN to proceed to Merced and contact Sheriff Cornell at that city and conduct such other investigation as might be necessary.

Agent HORN proceeded to Merced and the following investigation is reported by him:

AT MERCED, CALIFORNIA

on December 22, 1937, Sheriff N. L. CORNEIL advised that JERRY MATTINSTER, Livingston, California, had contacted Chief of Police HORACE CHLBERT, who stated he has known Finster for 15 years and that he is quite reliable and a reputable citizen, and himself and furnished the following information:

Finster's niece married BET McDANIEL in Oklahoma and is presently residing with him on Finster's ranch about four miles from Liwingston, California. Ben McDaniel is an uncle of TED COLE and a brother of his mother, Mrs. Fred Cole, at Woodlake, California. They have several children, among them being Verne. Roy and Keith McDaniel, all under thirty years of age, all bad boys and outlaws. (Verne was arrested on October 24, 1937, and is presently confined in the Merced County Jail for drunk driving. Sheriff Cornell furnished Agent with a copy of the criminal record of Verne which is copied hereinafter.) AX McDaniel, a cousin of the McDaniel boys and a second-hand car dealer, lives in Oakland. Roy and Keith left home in their little Willys automobile, which has a big box on the back, last Thursday or Friday, and returned in the early morning hours Monday, December 20, 1937. They were supposed to have visited their cousin in Oakland, California. Roy or Keith was a member of an outlaw gang in Oklahoma and killed a negroe

Sheriff Cornell stated that Finster is working with Ben McDaniel and one of his boys and has the confidence of the McDaniel family and is an excellent contact and informant; that he is a personal friend of Horace Gilbert, Chief of Police, Livingston, and will cooperate fully; that he is planning on taking a jug of wine and going out to the McDaniel home over Christmas and endeavor to find out some information concerning Ted Cole; that Finster can be contacted through Chief Gilbert.

Sheriff Cornell stated that Finster also related other information concerning the McDaniel and Cole families which left no doubt in his mind that Finster was relating the truth; that Finster had stated that one of the sons of Ben McDaniel, Allan McDaniel, is working for Sears and Roebuck Co., Nobleville, Indiana.

The above information was immediately telephoned to Special Agent in Charge Hanson at the Los Angeles Division, and with his approval an appointment was made by Sheriff Cornell with Chief Gilbert for an interview with Finster on this same evening.

In the meantime, in company with Sheriff Cornell, Agent interviewed MISS DORAGHIMER, waitress at the Boses We Eat. Cafe, who advised that on the evening of December 20k 1937, two men, one wearing dark glasses and a little taller than the other, who was about 5° 8° tall, came into the cafe and ordered pie and coffee; that they appeared nervous and in a hurry; that she only noticed them because the shorter fellow had a noticeable scar about 2° long extending up his right cheek from the corner of his mouth; that the man wearing glasses asked how far it was from San Francisco and she told them; that, however, they entered a coupe and apparently proceeded out of Merced toward Los Angeles. Agent exhibited the photographs of Ted Cole and Ralph Roe to Miss Shimer but she was unable to identify eithers.

AT LIVINGSTON, CALIFORNIA

Chief of Police Horace Gilbert, Sheriff N. I. Cornell and Deputy Sheriff Morse, that he was from Indiana but had resided in California for the last 49 years; that he owns the ranch in which Ben McDaniel and his family have resided during the last two years; that prior to coming to California, McDaniel and his family resided that prior to coming to California, McDaniel and his family resided in the Salt River Valley, believed to be near Phoenix, Arizona, for about six months; that he believes prior to that they hived at Tulsa, Oklahoma, where Ben McDaniel had been engaged in looking after ranches for a banking company, but drank so much that he lost the job and took up horse trading.

Finster stated that ANNA FINSTER his niece and the daughter of his brother, John Finster; age 82, who resides with his wife at Fellows, California, but who formerly had a ranch in Oklahoma near the Red River, married Ben McDaniel and lived at Tulsa, Oklahoma, with him where they had six boys and two girls who were raised with and grew up with Ted Cole; that Ben McDaniel who were raised with and grew up with Ted Cole; that Ben McDaniel is a brother to Mrs. Fred Cole, Ted Cole's mother, at Woodlake, is a brother to Mrs. Fred Cole, Ted Cole's mother, at Woodlake, California; that he has a sister in Oklahoma, name and address California; that he, Finster, believes that he also has a brother unknown; that he, Finster, believes that he also has a brother living in Oakland with R. McDaniel, a second-hand car dealer, and nephew of Ben McDaniel.

Finster claimed that he was positive that Ben McDaniel is a brother of Mrs. Fred Cole; that he has often heard Ben remark about receiving correspondence from his sister Mrs. Cole at Woodlake and Visalia, California; that his niece, Mrs. Ben McDaniel, is of the same religion, which is very peculiar, as Mrs. Fred Cole and he has heard her speak of her sister—in—law, Mrs. Fred Cole at Woodlake, California, numerous times during the last two years; that in July, 1937, she and her daughter, who is about 18 years old, visited Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cole for about a week at Woodlake, California.

Finster stated that although he has known that Mrs. Fred Cole is a sister to Ben McDaniel for about a year and a half, he never knew until last Sunday that she was the mother of Ted Cole; that last Sunday, Ben McDaniel, while partially intoxicated, told him this fact and related the above facts relative to his boys being raised with Ted Cole in Tulsa and boasted that he had known Ted Cole since he was a baby; that Fred Cole is both uncle and stepfather to Ted Cole inasmuch as he married Ted Cole's mother after her first husband, his brother, died. Finster also stated that Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cole visited the McDaniels at Livingston, California, about a year or so ago.

Finster stated that the religion of his niece and Mrs. Fred Cole is very peculiar in that they themselves inflict some sort of punishment on a wrongdoer in their family, but consistently, according to their belief, try to prevent the law, which term they all apply to all officers, from arresting or punishing them.

Finster further stated that Ben McDaniel is a peculiar individual; that he is a drunkard, against all law and order, and proud of the criminal exploits of his sons; that on occasions when he has been intoxicated he has boasted that Verne McDaniel, a man named Thompson and Ted Cole did bank robbing and killing in Oklahoma; that he related how on one occasion these three got into a fight at a dance and a negro got his face cut from ear to ear, a feat that Verne, his son, has to account for; that about a year or so ago Ben McDaniel while under the influence of liquor, a year or so ago Ben McDaniel while under the influence of liquor, whom "the Law" had been after for two years for robbery and murder.

He stated that Ben McDaniel and his boys are all a hard lot and that the boys often get into fierce fights among themselves. In this connection, Deputy Sheriff Morse advised

that several months ago he was called out to settle a fight between Verne and one of his brothers whom Verne hurt quite badly.

Finster stated that he has always been for law and order and does not approve of such things as Ben McDaniel boasts of and as goes on in the McDaniel family; that he has no use for the family and would like to get rid of them; that, however, he is quite friendly with Ben and the boys and has the confidence of Ben McDaniel; that after Ben had told him about Ted Cole's kinship and that Ted Cole was smart and that he knew he got across the water to shore all right and that after he learned about the trip of Roy and Keith and that they came back home during the night in the early morning hours, that he had his suspicions and came to Chief Gilbert and Sheriff Cornell and related the above information.

Finster urgently requested that his name be not mentioned in any way in connection with this matter and that the source of this information be kept strictly confidential because if any of the McDaniel family knew he was furnishing the above information they might kill him.

He agreed to go through with his plan to get Ben McDaniel and possibly the boys drunk on Christmas and endeavor to find out information about Ted Cole; he agreed to contact Chief Gilbert or Sheriff Cornell as soon as possible after he obtained any information. He stated that a day or so ago Ben McDaniel had asked him what he was going to do Christmas and invited him over to the ranch; that he has not been to the ranch since Roy and Keith got back from their trip.

Chief Gilbert and Sheriff Cornell stated that a TRUMAN MEDANIEL had got into a fight with Verne McDaniel a few months ago and had also passed a bad check. Finster stated that Truman McDaniel is another relative believed to be a nephew of Ben McDaniel.

Finster described the ranch as a building built on the ground, four rooms and a pantry, a small water house with a tank on top, a garage and a chicken house, with the buildings surrounded with vineyards and a lawn and a few flower trees in front of the house.

He stated that the persons now residing at the ranch are as follows: Ben and his wife, four boys and two girls.

It was deemed inadvisable to interview Verno McDaniel in the Merced County Jail for fear he might get word to the family.

In connection with the above investigation, Sheriff Cornell stated that although he realized that the Eureau would handle the investigation in this matter in this county as it deemed best, that he would appreciate very much to be allowed to cooperate and assist in the investigation and that such credit as might be due to his office be given in view of the fact that he will be up for re-election in the near future.

The criminal record of VERNE McDANIEL, as received from the Bureau dated November 3, 1937, FBI #245682, is as follows:

AT WOODLAKE, CALIFORNIA

MR. AND MRS. FRED COLE were subsequently interviewed and stated that they had no relatives named McDANLEIS living at Livingston, California, and that fugitive COLE had no relatives or associates in that neighborhood. Mrs. Cole explained that IIr. and Mrs. McDaniels were members of the Church of The First Born of which church the Coles are also members, and that it is the practice of members of this church to address each other as "brother" and "sister" and that for this reason the Coles and McDaniels referred to each other as brothers and sisters, and this evidently is the reason for the misapprehension as to the relationship between the Cole and McDaniels femilies. Mrs. Cole stated that she had been casually acquainted with Mr. and Mrs. McDaniels in Oklahoma previous to their coming to California, and that since their arrival in California the two families have visited each other and have associated with each other in the church, but that there is absolutely no relationship between them, and that TED COIE is not known personally to any members of the McDaniels family, and that so far as she knows Subject Cole is not even acquainted with the fact that the McDaniels are residing in California.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R. N. PRANKE on December 22, 1937:

AT BELL, CALIFORNIA

In accordance with instructions received from Special Agent in Charge JOHN H. HANSON, Agent Pranke reinterviewed MRS. GOLA (VIOLET) DAWSON, 6238 Gifford, Avenue, half-sister of Subject COLE, in an effort to ascertain whether she has any relatives by the name of McDANIEIS, at which time she stated that to her knowledge she has none and never knew anyone by this name, but did know a lady named MRS. CLADYS MANIEIS who, with her husband, runs a dairy at Woodlake, California. Mrs. Dawson further stated that to her knowledge Mrs. Daniels has no children. At this interview with Mrs. Dawson her husband was not at home, she stating that he went to a Christmas festival with two of the smaller children.

Agent Pranke also questioned her concerning her knowledge of anyone named FLOYD HILL at Woodlake, California, and she stated that she did not know anyone by that name but did know a MRS. HILL who is an officer of the Presbyterian Church at Woodlake, and that she believes this Mrs. Hill has several small children, but no grown sons.

Dawson concerning cousing of Subject COLE, at which time she advised that MRS. WILLIAM (ALTA) COLLINS, an aunt of Subject Cole, has two sons, named JOHN and LESTER, both of whom lived with their parents; at Stroud, Oklahoma; that MRS. FANNIE BAUGHMAN, aunt of Subject Cole, has four living children, they being MRS. TIM (JENNIE MEITT, who lives near Stroud, Oklahoma; MRS. RAIPH (MAY) FAYNE, who lives near or at Roseville, California, and MARGARET and CLARA, whose whereabouts Mrs. Dawson did not know but believed that Clara was now married. Mrs. Dawson further stated that a fifth child was Mabel, now deceased. Mrs. Dawson also advised that ERNEST ABACE, uncle of Subject Cole, has three children, they being MELVIN, JAUNITA and VESTAL, all single and living with their parents at Stroud, Oklahoma.

Mrs. Dawson also advised that her mother, ESTHER COIE, has another sister named LILLIE HRACE who died about two years ago at Stroud, Oklahoma; that Lillie was married twice and Mrs. Dawson believes that both of her husbands are dead and that the first husband was named WACKILHENEY (phonetic); that as a result of these

two marriages, Lillie had three children, they being MRS. BILL (LOTTIE) CROVES, who lives in Stroud, Oklahoma; THEIMA, married, name unknown, who lives somewhere in or near Oklahoma City, Okla., and LEE, who is believed to live at Stroud also.

Mrs. Dawson further advised that her mother also had a brother named FRED BRACE, now deceased, who had a son named CHARLES BRACE who, to her knowledge, was last working for Montgomery & Ward in Amerillo, Texas; that Fred Brace's wife was named DONA, but she remarried and is presently living in or near Sapulpa, Oklahoma.

At this time Mrs. Dawson was unable to recall the names of any other relatives of Subject Cole, but stated that she thought her mother had several other brothers and sisters all of whom died while quite young.

She also advised that Subject COLE's wife's name was MARIE, who lived at Alpena Pass, Arkansas.

At this time Mrs. Dawson was also asked whether she knew if Subject COLE had been in trouble in Bell, California, concerning bad checks, and she advised that to her knowledge he had not been in any trouble as he was only about fifteen years old at that time and was going to grade school.

It may be stated that she appeared very cooperative and stated that if she should receive any information concerning the whereabouts of Subject COLE she would immediately get in touch with the Los Angeles Field Division.

A telegram was sent to the San Francisco Field Division advising them of the name and address of MRS. RAIPH PAYNE, cousin of Subject Cole. The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R. N. PRANKE on December 20, 1937:

AT BELL, CALIFORNIA

Inasmuch as a twenty-four-hour plant was being maintained at 62482 Gifford Avenue in order that the home of MRS. VIOLET DAWSON could be kept under surveillance, the matter of advising WILLARD BY STEELE, Chief of Police, Bell, California, home telephone IA 7094, was discussed with Special Agent in Charge John H. Hanson, at which time it was deemed advisable to notify Chief Steele of this surveillance inasmuch as he has always been very cooperative with the Los Angeles Field Division in the past.

Accordingly, Special Agents R. N. PRANKE and F. M. STONE interviewed Chief Steele at which time he was told of the plant, and upon being advised that Subject COIE formerly lived on Acacia Street during 1928 or 1929 he stated that he believed he remembered COIE being in Bell at that time, and upon being shown Cole's photograph he was more positive of this, as Chief Steele advised that he, Steele, lived at that time on Scelina Street, which adjoins Acacia Street, the latter being only a block long. He further advised that he believed his department at that time had a bad check warrant for this lad named Cole, but was not positive of/it, and upon checking his old records was unable to find any record of any warrant.

Chief Steele called into his office his two night officers, CHARLES BY WHITE and H. PAPPIEN, who were shown photographs of Subjects and were instructed by Chief Steele to be on the lookout for them at Bell. It may be stated they were not told of the plant being maintained, but were merely advised by Chief Steele that Subjects may appear in Bell at some time or other.

Chief Steele was given photostatic copies of photographs of Subjects with descriptions, and stated that he also would keep a constant lookout for Subjects in Bell.

Chief Steele promised to keep the above information confidential and stated that the same would not be given out to anyone. At that time he also extended the services of his department to the Los Angeles Field Division should the occasion arise in Bell as a result of the plant being maintained there.

On December 22, 1937, the writer and Agent Smith left Woodlake, California, and followed MR. AND MRS. COIE in their automobile to Lindsay, California, where the Coles were observed to drive to the home of MR. AND MRS. GEORGE MORRIS, located on Elm Avenue, just outside of Lindsay, at which home they spent the night. No one was seen to contact the Coles during this time other than the immediate members of the Morris family.

On December 23, 1937, the Coles left Lindsay at 7:30 a.m. and were followed by Agent Smith and the writer to Bell, California, where they drove to the home of their daughter, VIOLET DAWSON, at 6238 Gifford Avenue. They made no contacts with anyone during this trip, and immediately upon arriving at the Dawson home were under surveillance from the plant being maintained by the Los Angeles office on this home.

The Coles advised the writer previous to their departure from Woodlake, California, that they intended to remain at the Dawson home for a period of three or four days and would communicate with the los Angeles office and advise as to the date of their return to Woodlake.

AT ARCADIA, CALIFORNIA

MRS. JAMES (FAE) ROE, who had previously been located by Agents in Arcadia, was interviewed by the writer and Special Agent H. A. Smith on December 23, 1937, at which time she stated that she had been married to JAMES ROE since 1930; that she had met James Roe in 1927 at Tulsa, Oklahoma, at which time Roe was bootlegging whiskey and that Roe was arrested and sent to Leavenworth Penitentiary from which place he was released in 1930; that at the time she met him in Kansas City, Kansas, where they were married. She stated that they lived together for approximately four years, but that Roe was again arrested in Wichita, Kansas, in 1934 for bootlegging and was sentenced to Leavenworth Penitentiary, from which penitentiary he was again released in July, 1937. She stated that she had visited her husband at Leavenworth in 1935, but had not seen him since that time. She stated that she presently intended to get a divorce from her husband; that she had received one letter from him since his release in July, which letter was mailed from Tulsa, Oklahoma, but that she had no idea as to his present location and suggested that his location might be secured from the probation officer at Tulsa, to whom her husband was conditionally released.

FAE ROE stated that she was herself under probation having been arrested with her husband in 1934; that her probation would expire in April 1938; that she felt that her present embarrassment was due to her husband and his family; that she did not feel obligated to them in any way and would cooperate with Agents in any manner possible in locating fugitive RALPH ROE, but that she had no information of value in connection with this fugitive. She stated that she had only seen Ralph Roe on one occasion, in 1933, when he visited with her and her husband in Wichita, Kansas, for a period of two weeks; that she disliked Ralph from the first time she saw him and that she would not hesitate to furnish information that she might obtain concerning him. She advised that Ralph Roe had no further contact with her since his visit at Wichita, and that he did not know her present whereabouts, and that even if he did know where she was she did not feel that he would contact her.

MRS. ROE was thoroughly interviewed as to any possible information she might have as to contacts of either RALPH ROE or her husband, and advised that she could furnish no information of this nature. She stated that she was not acquainted with the other members of the Roe family, but did know RAYMOND ROE, her brother—in-law, whom she believed to be a very fine man and who was supposed to be working in the oil fields in Kansas, although she did not know his address.

With respect to her husband's flying ability, Mrs. Roe stated that he had taken flying lessons in Tulsa but had not finished his course and that she did not feel that he was a competent aviator although he had made a few short flights by himself.

With respect to her own relatives, MRS. ROE advised that they are as follows:

Father and Mother e Mr. and Mrs. T. W. BLACKBURN, Route 5, Apache, Oklahoma;

Sister - MRS. NANNO HRATTON, Hobert, Oklahoma;

Brother - WAYNE BLACKBURN, Hobert, Oklahoma;

Brother, KAY BLACKBURN, Route 2, Gotebo, Oklas;

Sister - MRS. HAZEL SMITH, Arcadia, California.

The Federal harboring statutes were explained to Mrs. Roe, and she promised that in the event that she learned anything that could possibly be of assistance in connection with the instant investigation she would furnish seme to the los Angeles office.

AT LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

On the night of December 22, 1937, Detective-Lieutenant HURST of the Los Angeles Police Department called Special Agent in Charge Hanson on the phone and stated that his mother who had arrived on the Sunset Limited from Oakland, Calif. that morning had seen THEODORE COLE on the train.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent THOMAS M. MULHERIN:

MRS. E. G. HURST. 1431 McCadden Place, Los Angeles, California (phone Glendale 2965), mother of Detective-Lieutenant Hurst, stated that she was on the first section of the Sunset Limited of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, which left Oakland on the night of December 21, 1937. Mrs. Hurst stated that she was unable to obtain a berth until she arrived at San Jose, California, at which time she secured Lower 14 on the tourist sleeper, the only tourist sleeper on the train. She stated that after performing her toilet in the morning and about 7 a. m. she returned to the tourist sleeper and found most of the berths still up so that she had to occupy a seat with another woman and a man. She stated that she sat next to the woman while the man occupied the opposite seat and she had an opportunity to observe him very closely. She stated that she was struck by the marked resemblance to THEODORE COLE whose photograph she had observed in the newspapers recently. She described this man as follows:

> Middle twenties Age: 5 feet 8 inches Height:

145 pounds Weight

Turned up nose, very pale, Facial characteristics: dark hair, dark eyes

None observed Scarst

Shell rimmed with dark frame Glasses: Brown suit, shirt and tie; all Attire:

appeared new

Slender. very erect. Build:

It will be noted that Mrs. Hurst states that the man she saw had dark eyes, while those of COIE are described as blue; and also that she observed no scars, while COIE is stated to have two scars on his face.

Mrs. Hurst stated that after noticing the resemblance of the man on the train to Cole, he arose to go to the mens' room. She stated that she also immediately arose so that she could observe his height and found that he was approximately one inch taller than she, and that he would therefore be five feet eight inches.

Mrs. Hurst stated that the woman who sat next to her, who did not appear to be with COLE, and she, Mrs. Hurst, endeavored to start a conversation by making general remarks, but that the man said that he was very deaf and asked them to write their questions on a pad which he proffered. Mrs. Hurst said that while he stated he was deaf he apparently was quite conscious of the whistle of the train and also every time anyone walked in the aisle near them he would look up quickly and observe them. Mrs. Hurst also said that the man appeared to be very much engressed in several newspapers which he had with him and apparently did not wish to encourage any efforts at conversation.

Mrs. Hurst was shown a group of photographs taken from the Los Angeles bank robbery album to which were added a full front photograph of COIE bearing the notation "Dallas 13324 1 7 35" and also a front and side view of COIE bearing similar notations. She unhesitatingly selected the full front photograph of COIE as having been that of the man she saw and stated that the photograph showing the front and side view of COIE resembled very much that of the man she saw, although she was not positive of this last identification.

Mrs. Hurst said that the man who resembled Cole got off the train at Glendale, California. She said she did not notice whether or not he had any baggage. Mrs. Hurst got off the train at Los Angeles. She said that she told no one of the incident except her son, Detective-Lieutenant Hurst, who referred the matter to the Los Angeles Bureau office.

A. E. DEIBERT, Chief Clerk, Pullman Company, 526 Central Avenue, Los Angeles, stated that the Sunset Limited which left San Francisco at 8 p. m. on the night of December 21, 1937, carried one tourist sleeper in the first section, the second having no tourist sleeper. This tourist sleeper was numbered 4146. The Pullman conductor was A. Marclark, 3109 Chaucer Street, Los Angeles, and the Pullman porter on the tourist sleeper was J. J. JONES, address unknown, the latter continuing with the train and was due to arrive in New Orleans on the night of December 23, 1937. Mr. Deibert stated that the reservation list showing information as to the names of the passengers occupying berths on the tourist sleeper would be in the San Francisco office of the Pullman Company.

A telegram was sent to the New Orleans Bureau Office asking that J. J. Jones, porter, be interviewed upon his arrival in New Orleans to ascertain if he could identify photographs of COIE as being those of a man who had been on his train on the night of December 21 and the morning of December 22, and, if so, determine what space he occupied so that an effort could be made to identify him through the passenger list. On receipt of advice from the New Orleans office that JONES had identified the Subject as occupying Section 4 and Upper 5 in this car, the San Francisco office was telegraphically requested to secure from the Pullman Company in San Francisco all possible information concerning the passengers in these berths.

ALBERT M. CLARK, 3109 Chaucer Street, Los Angeles, stated that he was the Fullman conductor on the first section of the Sunset Limited of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company leaving San Francisco on the night of December 21, 1937. He stated that he remembered Mrs. Hurst who obtained a reservation for Lower 14 on the tourist sleeper at San Mose, California. After examining photographs of THEODORE COLE he said that he felt certain that COLE did not have a reservation on his train. Clark stated that he had an unusually good memory for faces which enabled him to determine immediately when a passenger from whom he had not previously obtained a ticket got on the train, and he felt that because of the dilated nostrils of COLE he would have remembered him if he had been on the train.

Clark said that the Sunset Limited leaving San Francisco on the night of December 21 would not arrive in New Orelans until the night of December 24, and that the name of the Pullman porter on the tourist sleeper was J. J. JACKSON instead

of J. J. JONES. However, as it was felt that the New Orleans office would have no difficulty in ascertaining similar information, no modifying telegram was sent to that office.

JOHN C, NEISON, dispatcher of the Yellow Cab Co., 100 N. Brand Ave., Glendale, California, telephonically advised that the following six cab drivers were assigned to the Glendale station on the morning of December 22 and every other morning:

The following investigation was conducted jointly by Special Agents THOMAS M. MULHERIN and JOHN H. ROCHE:

WESLEY HEMMINGER, starter for the Yellow Cab Co., Glendale Southern Pacific Station, stated that the information given above by Nelson as to the cab drivers assigned to the Glendale station was correct, except that in addition CARL KUHUNS, who drove a limousine for the Yellow Cab Co., might also possibly pick up a passenger at that station. Hemminger stated that the Yellow Cab Co. had an exclusive franchise for the station and no other company or independent was permitted to operate automobiles for hire from that station. Hemminger was shown photographs of COLE but failed to make any identification of them.

All the cab drivers above listed and Carl Kuhuns were interviewed early the morning of December 24th. All were interviewed at the Glendale station except Norwood Overman, who was interviewed at his home at 201 S. Central Ave., Glendale. In addition, another extra driver, PANY AIRLEY, was interviewed. All stated that they could not identify the photographs of COLE as being those of any person who had ever been a passenger in their cabs.

In addition to the cab drivers, six red cap porters bearing the numbers 6, 15, 43, 84, 92 and 101 were interviewed and

all stated that they had not seen anyone resembling the photographs of THEODORE COIE.

Special Agent O'CONNELL of the Southern Pacific Railroad, who is assigned to the Glendale station, was interviewed and shown the photographs of COIE and RAIPH ROE, but he said that he had no recollection of seeing anyone answering their descriptions at the Glendale Southern Pacific Station.

The following memorandum was prepared by Special Agent R. N. PRINKE on December 24, 1937:

In connection with the plant being maintained at 6248 Gifford Avenue, Boll, California, it may be stated that the same was commenced on Saturday morning, December 18, 1937, by Special Agents FRED FINLEY and J. C. SLOANE, who were assisted by Special Agents PRANKE and F. M. STONE. This plant was maintained twenty-four hours a day and is so being maintained at the present time in accordance with Bureau instructions. On December 21st Agents Finley and Sloane were relieved by Agents A. R. MILLER and W. V. TOMLINSON.

It may be stated that a log is being kept of the activities of the DAMSON family, but up to the present time no information of value has been received, nor have any strangers answering Subjects' descriptions been noted in the Dawson premises.

Special Agent in Charge JOHN H. HANSON has made appropriate arrangements with the telephone company whereby a phone will be installed in the Leonard Stempfli home.

In reference to the mail cover that was placed on the mail of the Dawson family, the postmaster at Bell, California, telephonically advised Special Agent Pranke that on December 18, 1937, a typewritten letter was delivered to GOLA DAWSON, the same being postmarked at the Arcade Annex Station in Los Angeles at 12 o'clock noon, December 17th, and that this letter did not contain any return address.

Mr. Blake stated this individual has entree into the Barker home since the Barkers reside with an elderly individual about 70 years of ago and the informant has occasion to talk to the old man. Mr. Blake suggested removing Coulter from the house and engaging the services of the informant.

I told him to do this, instructing the informant to report to the Dallas Office should anything develop.

Agents F. S. Smith, C. O. Hurt, B. T. Carter, L. E. Kingman and the writer.

Special Agent F. S. Smith and the writer contacted Chief of Police A. C. VanSickle at Stroud, Oklahoma on December 24th, 1937 and Mr. VanSickle stated he had just received information from R. B. "Rebel" Cornett, brother-in-law of subject Cole. to the effect that at the time Theodore Cole escaped from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, in the fall of 1934, and prior to the commission of the crime for which he was sentenced to the Federal Penitentiary, Cole went direct to Childress, Texas to the home of Jim and Ruth Barker, who are relatives of Fred Cole, subject Cole's stepfather, and whose residence is situated on the corner of the block, five blocks east of the roundhouse in Childress; that at that time Ted Cole stayed at their residence five days after his escape from the State Penitantiary and then proceeded north to the home of Cornett, who at that time was residing west of Stroud, where he stayed one night, and then went north to Cushing, Oklahoma where he kidnaped J. A. Rutherford.

Chief of Police VanSickle stated that Cornett informed him that if Ted Cole was successful in escaping from the penitentiary at Alcatraz Island, he would without doubt proceed direct to the home of Jim and Ruth Barker at Childress, Texas for they would harbor him and furnish him aid and assistance, as they, the Barkers, sent Ted Cole small amounts of money while he was confined in the State Penitentiary prior to his escape in the fall of 1934.

Chief of Police VanSickle stated that Mr. and Mrs. William Collins, relatives of Ted Cole, who formerly resided in Stroud, left there about September, 1937 and their present whereabouts is unknown; that the Collinses usually follow carnivals and fairs around over the country, operating lunch stands with same. Chief VanSickle stated he would endeavor to secure, through some of the townspeople, the present location of the Collins family.

Agent Smith and the writer proceeded to the home of R. B. "Rebel" Cornett in an effort to personally interview him. Mrs. Cornett stated her husband had not returned from Stroud at the time of Agents' visit. She stated that she and Theodore Cole have no relatives in Texas; that Fred Cole has some relatives somewhere in Texas, exact location unknown to her, whose names are Barker. She denied any knowledge that the Barkers had ever furnished any assistance to Theodore Cole.

An effort was made by Special Agent Smith and the writer to locate allison "Bud" Raney, Route 2, Stroud, but he was not at his home when Agents called.

On December 24th, 1937 on instructions of SAC C. W. Stein, the writer contacted the Dallas office telephonically and informed Special Agent H. T. Arterberry of that office of the information concerning Jim and Ruth Barker, and requested that appropriate investigation be conducted.

On December 27th, 1937 SAC C. W. Stein telephonically contacted SAC F. J. Blake of the Dallas office at which time Mr. Blake advised the Dallas office had not yet openly interviewed Jim and Ruth Barker at Childress, Texas. SAC Blake was requested not to conduct an open interview with the Barkers as the Bureau might wish to have the home of the Barkers kept under surveillance. After the conversation with the Dallas office, upon telephonically contacting the Bureau (Mr. Tamm), SAC Stein was instructed to inform the Dallas office by telephone that open interview should not be conducted with Jim and Ruth Barker and that the Bureau instructed the Dallas office to place the residence of Ruth and Jim Barker under surveillance. This information was immediately furnished the Dallas office by SAC Stein telephonically.

On December 24th, 1937 Special Agent B. T. Carter conducted the following investigation at Muskogee, Oklahoma with reference to Dick Barker, as mentioned in the last paragraph on page four of the reference report of Special Agent Murphy dated December 23d, 1937.

Captain Jess Adair and Captain Claud Woods of the Muskogee Police Department, advised a York, Nebraska bank was robbed by four Oklahoma men named Charles Dobson, half-breed Cherokee Indian, Charley Cotner, half-breed Cherokee Indian, Bob Nollinger and Dick Barker; that the first three men were convicted on robbery of this bank and received sentences of 20 years each in the Nebraska State Penitentiary, and Dick Barker was also convicted of robbery of the bank and received a sentence of ten years in the Nebraska State Penitentiary because he turned State's witness; that Dodson died a year or so ago while incarcerated in the Nebraska State Penitentiary and Cotner, Nollinger and Barker are said to be presently confined in the State Penitentiary at Lincoln, serving their sentences.

Captain Adair stated he is well acquainted with these men and their associates as they had lived for a number of years in the community in which he resided in Sequoyah, County; that Barker was associated with a man named Rufus "Ruff" Hodge, a former Deputy Sheriff; that Hodge runs around with men of disreputable character, and he can probably be located around Vian, Oklahoma and Undersheriff Bert Cotton at Sallisaw, Oklahoma would know the whereabouts of Hodge and Hodge's associates.

Captain Adair also stated that on August 29th, 1933 his department

arrestedDick Barker with Harry Campbell, Frank Gullet and his wife Johnnie Gullet at the Lindy Hotel, 308 South Third, Muskogee; that the Lindy Hotel was formerly a rendezvous for crooks but that the Police Department had raided that hotel so many times that Captain Adair believed it was closed up altogether, and that the Palace Hotel at the corner of Main and West Okmulgee Streets has taken its place as a hangout for shady characters.

The records of the Muskogee Police Department reflect that the true name of Dick Barker is Joe Harris, OSPen. #2139. These records also reflect that Frank Gullet was fingerprinted by the Muskogee Police Department but that the prints were never forwarded to Washington, D. C. The arrest card shows he was arrested August 29th, 1933 on a charge of investigation and released. This card gave his residence as Muskogee, birthplace Arkansas, his age as 26 years, height 5' 8 3/4", complexion ruddy, black hair, weight 170 pounds, grey eyes.

The arrest card of Johnnie Gullet, the wife of Frank Gullet, gives her age as 28, height 5' 3 7/8", hair brown, eyes hazel, weight 125 pounds, occupation prostitution, huskogee PD #2183.

Captain Adair advised that Max Molton, who formerly operated the Lindy Hotel has not been around Muskogee for about two years; that although his department had arrested Molton on several occasions, they had never fingerprinted him, but he believed that the Tulsa Police Department arrested Molton about two years ago on a charge of theft of pipe.

Chief of Police Ed Corbin, and Captain Adair of the Muskogee Police Department advised Special Agent Carter that they never handled Ted Cole, but have had Ralph Roe confined in the Muskogee Jail as a Federal prisoner charged with bank robbery. Both Chief Corbin and Captain Adair stated they would have the members of the Muskogee Police Department keep a close lookout for subjects Roe and Cole, and that if any information is obtained that might assist in locating them, same will be furnished the Oklahoma City office.

On December 26th, 1937 Special Agent F. S. Smith and the writer located Allison "Bud" Raney near the farm where he resides on Route 2, Stroud, Oklahoma and he accompanied Agents to the Oklahoma City office where he was interviewed by SAC Stein, Agent Smith and the writer and made the following signed statement:

*Oklahoma City, Okla. Dec. 26, 1937

*I, Allison Raney, make the following free and voluntary statement

to C. W. Stein, Special Agent in Charge, and F. S. Smith and J. V. Murphy, Special Agents, Federal Bureau of Investigation. I make this statement without any threats or promises of immunity from prosecution, and any statement I may make can be used against me if I am prosecuted.

"My name is Allison Raney, age 41 years. I am married and have six children. My wife and family reside with me on a farm and my residence address is Route 2, Box 117, Stroud, Oklahoma.

"After Theodore Cole and Ralph Roe escaped from Alcatraz penitentiary I was at Rebel Cornett home, which is on a farm a short distance from my farm, and the conversation came up about Ted Cole. Mrs. Cornett said that Virgil "Dick" Broyles was a good friend of Ted Cole and if Dick Broyles was out of the penitentiary he might get together with Theodore Cole. As Rebel Cornett was telling me things which I thought were lies, so I thought I would tell them a big lie so I told Rebel Cornett and his wife that about two weeks before our conversation Dick Broyles and a big tough looking man came to my home in a big car that looked like it cost about \$3000.00 and they left and I was glad when they left, and I said that may be Dick Broyles and that man with him had something to do with helping Ted Cole and Roe to escape and if Dick Broyles was with Ted Cole they might go down to South America.

*I did not tell Rebel Cornett that Dick Broyles and the man with him had machine guns, but said they looked like they might be armed.

"I do not know Ted Cole, but I do know Fred Cole, step-father of Ted Cole, and have known Fred Cole about five years and he used to live in Strout, Oklahoma and he is now somewhere in California. I am not personally acquainted with Mrs. Fred Cole, mother of Ted.

"When I told Rebel Cornett and his wife the story about Dick Broyles and the man with him, I knew it was a lie because I know that Dick Broyles is in the Oklahoma Penitentiary, and the reason I told such a story to Rebel Cornett was because I believed he was telling me lies and I wanted to match lies with him.

"If Ted Cole ever comes to my place I certainly will report it to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and assist in helping apprehend him. Ted Cole has never been to my home and I don't think I would know him if he came there unless he told me his name.

*I have read the above statement of four pages and this one, and it is true and correct to best of my memory.

The following investigation was made by Special Agent L. E. Kingman at Henryetta, Oklahoma on December 26th, 1937.

Telephonic communication had been previously had with Arthur Hughes, member of the Police Department, who stated he knew of no such person as Orris O. Dean. Mr. Hughes made efforts to locate such a person and reported negative results. Agent Kingman contacted members of the Police Department and other sources of information at Henryetta and checked all persons in that vicinity named Dean and ascertained that none of these families had any relative named Orris 0. Dean.

Acting on the possibility that the surname of this individual, as reflected in the teletype received from the Denver office on December 25, 1937, might be in error, postal records were checked for similar names and with the assistance of Sam Gray, Assistant Postmaster, it was ascertained that an individual by the name of

Orris O. Been had formerly been a patron of the Henryetta Post Office, and that he was the nephew of one Roscoe Been, former Deputy Sheriff, who is presently selling Oldsmobile and Chevrolet cars as a malesman. Sam Gray and Frank George, Postmaster, both stated there were several persons by the name of Been in the vicinity of Henryetta, none of whom had ever been in any trouble with the law and who bore fair reputations.

Mr. Gray furnished some highly confidential information to the effect that Orris O. Been and his wife, Stella Mackeen, during October, 1937, had purchased at the Henryetta Post Office three Government bonds and had paid \$1875.00 for same. These bonds are described as follows:

\$1000 denomination, Number M384440C \$1000 denomination, Number M384441C \$500 denomination, Number D281330C

These are the type of bonds which will mature in ten years to a total value of \$2500. At the time he purchased these bonds Orris O. Been gave the address of Route 1, Box 2550, and Mr. Gray stated that this is the mailing address of Roscoe Been.

Using the pretext that a search was being made on the West Coast for a stolen Oldsmobile Sedan and that a car of similar description had been checked through a Port of Entry into California recently, Agent contacted Roscoe Been who stated that Orris O. Been was his nephew, who for nine years had been employed by the National Circulation Company at New York City and was handling crews of magazine salesmen and that his territory covered the whole United States. He stated that he had recently heard from Orris O. Been from Portland, Oregon and that in the letter Orris had stated that he would be in Los Angeles, California on December 23d, 1937 and could receive mail at General Delivery at Los Angeles, and would be there probably a week. Roscoe Been stated he and his wife had sent a Christmas package to Orris O. Been at General Delivery, Los Angeles.

Roscoe Been stated he did not know where Orris had purchased the 1937 Oldsmobile Sedan which he was now driving but that he hadmade two visits to Henryetta during the past year in this car and that it bore Wyoming license plates. He stated that the last visit was in September of this year.

Roscoe Been stated further that Orris had been married for about two years and that his wife and sister were presently traveling with him and that when traveling from one state to another he should have had three or four cars in the party and that Orris was supposed to have now, in addition to the Oldsmobile, a 1936 Chevrolet Sedan, 1938 Chevrolet Sedan and a Plymouth Sedan. He stated that Orris Been would be through Henryetta again sometime in January.

He described Orris Been as being 27 or 28 years of age; six feet tall, 175 pounds, dark brown hair, dark eyes, round face, clean cut appearance, slightly bald in front.

A teletype message was dispatched to the Los Angeles office on December 27th, 1937 requesting that they attempt to locate Orris O. Been at Los Angeles.

Chief of Police F. A. Budd, Shawnee, Oklahana was contacted by Special Agent F. S. Smith and the writer on December 24th, 1937. Mr. Budd stated he is acquainted with Ralph Roe, having been a member of a posse at the time Roe was shot in the home of Wilbur Underhill, Shawnee, and that his information concerning Roe's associates is of a general nature, such as his relatives at Duncan, Oklahoma and his former associates, who were Hazel Underhill, the wife of the deceased Wilbur Underhill, who is now said to be in Tulsa, Oklahoma, Elmer Inman, who is now confined in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary. Roe has at various times associated with others, but Chief Budd stated he has no information concerning any of Roe's close associates or contacts in or around Shawnee. Chief of Police Budd stated that J. A. Rutherford, who was kidnaped by Theodore Cole, for which offense Cole was sentenced to the Federal Penitentiary at Alcatraz Island, is now residing at Shawnee at 333 North Florence, Telephone 1418. Chief Budd stated he would talk to Mr. Rutherford and advise him to keep close lookout for Theodore Cole.

Reference is made to the interview with Dr. J. L. Wharton, Depew, Oklahoma, stepfather of Letha Jones of Phoenix, as set forth in the reference report of Agent Murphy, dated December 22d, 1937. At the time Dr. Wharton was interviewed he stated he would make inquiry and endeavor to secure additional information, as well as the correct address of Letha Jones in Phoenix.

A letter was subsequently received from Dr. Wharton of Depew in which he advised that he had talked to the nightpolice officer, Jerry Hazlet of Depew, and Hazlet stated he had seen Ralph Roe in Depew three or four years ago. Dr. Wharton stated in his letter that the Roe boy and another boy visited a family named Payne in Depew; that he, Dr. Wharton, knew of these people by the name of Payne, but did not know them well; that they were underworld characters and are no longer living there; that Letha Jones lived with the Paynes while they resided in Depew.

The Phoenix office is being requested to conduct open interview with Letha Jones and obtain any information she may be able to furnish concerning her association with Ralph Roe or Ted Cole and obtain any information which might be of assistance in locating them. Night police officer Jerry Hazlet at Depew will be interviewed by the Oklahoma City office.

On December 28th, 1937 Special Agent F. S. Smith interviewed Elmer Inman, inmate of the Oklahoma Penitentiary, McAlester. Inman stated he is personally acquainted with Ralph Roe and was associated with him in many burglaries. Inman stated he knows Roe's associates and habits, and in his opinion Roe is woman crazy and will seek the association of some female at the first opportunity; that Roe has a very close woman friend named Dixid Hamilton, the daughter of a railroad engineer, who resides at Denison, Texas and is well known there; that she will give Ralph Roe aid and assistance, financial and otherwise. Dixie Hamilton is evidently the person referred to by Sheriff Bose Johnson, Sulphur, Oklahoma as the girl friend of Ralph Roe, referred to in undeveloped lead to the Dallas office set out in the report of reference of Agent Murphy, dated December 22, 1937.

Elmer Inman further stated that Bertie Pruitt, a woman who lives in Ardmore, Oklahoma and owns and operates a ranch near Ardmore, has in the past harbored and protected Ralph Roe, Wilbur Underhill, himself and others, and it is Inman's opinion that if Roe is successful in reaching Oklahoma, he will immediately get in touch with Bertie Pruitt and seek aid and assistance from her.

Chief of Police Jake Sims at Seminole, Oklahoma was interviewed by Special Agent F. S. Smith on December 28th, 1937 and advised that an informant of his, named had

The informant of Jake Sims, named was contacted by Agent Smith, at which time he again stated he had several months ago seen letters in the possession of which were from Roe that he does not know present address in Seminole but he promised to locate her and will endeavor to obtain from her some of the letters she received from Roe, as well as to endeavor to obtain from her any information she will furnish concerning Ralph Roe.	,

Chief of Police Jake Sims advised Special Agent Smith that he would keep in touch with his informant and when information is received from him, he will imediately furnish same to the Oklahoma City office telephonically.

Special Agent C. O. Hurt on December 27th, 1937 contacted Hazel Underhill, owner and operator of Ham's Tavern, 2608 West 41st Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma and she advised that she maintains living quarters in the rear of the tavern and occupies same with her son, Marvin Connor, age 22, and her daughter, Juanita Connor, age 20. Hazel

said she and Ralph Roe were not on the best terms at the time Roe was sentenced to Leavenworth Penitentiary, however Roe did write her three or four letters from Leavenworth after his incarceration. These letters were mailed to her at Ada, Oklahoma and she stated she answered two or three of the letters and n the last letter advised Roe not to write to her any more as she realized Roe could not be of any assistance to her, which prompted her to notify him to quit writing. Hazel stated she is positive Roe does not know she moved to Tulsa, and has no way of finding out her address unless it would be through someone she has seen since she has been living in Tulsa. She also stated that Roe would not contact her at any address unless it would be to try to obtain some money; that her tavern business has been so bad for the past several months that she can hardly support herself and children and therefore would not have any money for Roe or anyone else. She stated that Roe has a brother named Jimmie Roe, whose address is unknown to her, but she believes this brother would assist Roe in any way he could; that he also has numerous other relatives and friends, who reside around Seminole, Ada and Duncan, Oklahoma. She believes Roe could obtain all the assistance he wants from either of the above-mentioned towns.

Hazel Underhill also said Roe had a girl friend, whose name she did not recall, whom he intended to marry about the time he went to the penitentiary; that Roe was crazy about this girl and no doubt would contact her if he returns to Oklahoma. Hazel stated this girl is the daughter of a wealthy farmer who lives near Denison, Texas and that the girl is now working in an office for someone in Denison. She described the girl as age 20 to 25 years, shender build, red hair. Hazel also said Roe was very friendly with the sister of Eva Nichols (deceased) at Seminole, Oklahoma; that this woman does not use the name of Nichols but is well known at Seminole as the sister of Eva. Reference' report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, dated December 22d, 1937 reflects an interview with Jake Sims, Chief of Police at Seminole, wherein Mr. Sims furnished information concerning the sister of Eva Nichols, who is known as Lena Stewart, and who is now said to be in Russell, Kansas. In the report of Special Agent Murphy dated December 22d, 1937 an undeveloped lead was set out for the Kansas City office to locate and thoroughly interview Lena Stewart at Russell, Kansas.

Hazel Underhill also said she had lost touch with the Underhill family after the death of Wilbur, due to the fact that Underhill's sister from Joplin, Missouri came to Oklahoma City and accused her of having a lot of money that Wilbur left to her, and wanted her to divide this money among relatives of Wilbur Underhill. Hazel said she told this sister Wilbur did not leave her any money

and that the sister hired a lawyer at Norman, Oklahoma and threatened her with a lawsuit if she did not divide the money and automobiles Wilbur left; that she refused to give the sister either of the cars left to her by Wilbur, and that the only money Wilbur left that she knew of was on his person at the time he was killed. She said she does not know how much money he had as she was not given any of the money which was taken from Wilbur's body by the arresting officers. Hazel said Wilbur had no brothers living in Tulsa and that the only brothers she is acquainted with are Clyde Underhill and the one recently released from the Kansas State Penitentiary, and to her knowledge neither of these brothers were acquainted with Roe. She advised that Clyde Underhill resides in Joplin, Missouri. Hazel was requested to communicate with Resident Special Agent W. E. Hopton at Tilsa in the event she hears anything from Roe, and she stated she would rather not do this, but did promise to communicate with Special Agent Hurt by long distance telephone collect, and she was furnished with the office telephone number and the residence telephone number of Special Agent Hurt.

Hazel Underhill also advised that she had never known Ted Cole and had only heard of him through newspaper publicity, however she was advised that there is a Federal process outstanding against both Cole and Roe, as well as being advised of the Harboring Statute, and she stated she was familiar with this Statute.

J. D. Bills, Captain of the Detective Squad, Tulsa Police Department was interviewed by Special Agent W. E. Hopton and Special Agent Hurt, and stated he is very well acquainted with Morris Quinn, who was released from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary about six months ago; that Quinnis presently in the undertaking business with his brother-in-law, Harold Bailey at 12th and Boulder in Tulsa. Captain Bills stated Quinn is very unreliable and would not cooperate with any law enforcement agency. Captain Bills said he would assign scout car officers working in the vicinity of 12th and Boulder to watch the Bailey-Quinn Funeral Home for suspicious persons seen around this place. Captain Bills stated it would not be advisable to openly interview Quinn as nothing could be gained from such interview.

It was ascertained that Mr. Collier of the Collier Airport east of Tulsa, is not connected with the Municipal Airport. Mr. Collier on interview advised that Fark Field was never employed by him, but Field did store his plane with him some during the summer of 1937; that Field is now flying for the Lofflan Brothers Drilling Company at Fort Worth, Texas; that the home office of this company is in the Philtower Building in Tulsa, and that they would have his correct mailing address.

At the Lofflan Brothers Dilling Company home office in the Philtower

Building, Tulsa, it was ascertained that Fields is employed by this company as a flyer at Fort Worth, Texas and receives his mail through the Lofflan Brothers Drilling Company office, Box 915, Texas and Pacific Passenger Building, Fort Worth.

Captain Bills made a search of the Identification Bureau records of the Tulsa Police Department but was unable to find a record of a Harry Newton. However Captain Bills said Newton was known to him and that he left Tulsa soon after his brothers, Joe and Jess, were arrested for the robbery of the Medford, Oklahoma bank, and has not returned. Captain Bills also made a search for a record of Robert Bridges, which was found to be Tulsa PD #9307, FBI-620642, who was sentenced to serve five years in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, in 1936.

At Drumright, Oklahoma Special Agent C. O. Hurt contacted Jack Ary, Chief of Police, who advised that Virgil Dick Broyles was sentenced to the State Penitentiary in 1929 from Creek County, Oklahoma to serve a sentence of 15 years for rape, and that his penitentiary number is 21659, and to the best of his knowledge, Broyles is still incarcerated.

Chief Ary also advised that after the death of Roy Brannon, the balance of his family moved to somewhere near Bristow, Oklahoma and to the best of his knowledge, still reside at this place.

In view of the fact that Dick Barker, true name Joe Harris, is still confined in the Nebraska State Penitentiary, and was interviewed by an Agent of the Omaha office and would furnish no information concerning Roe and Cole, and that fact that Allison Raney states his story to R. B. Cornett concerning Dick Broyles and a man from Chicago is a pure fabrication, no further consideration will be given to Joe Harris or Dick Broyles.

On December 23d, 1937 the San Antonio office advised the Oklahoma City office by telegram that Roy E. Roe alias R. A. Belmar was released from the Texas State Penitentiary December 18th, 1936 and received at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, as Roy Rowe, #35509 on February 9th, 1937. It was ascertained by telephonic conversation with T. M. Fields, Record Clerk at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary that Roy Rowe, #35509, was received at the State Penitentiary on February 9th, 1937 to serve a sentence of 7 years for larceny of an automobile, and is still in that institution; that he lists as brothers, Ralph Rowe, Duncan, Oklahoma, and James Rowe, Kansas City, Missouri. The Bureau was informed on December 23d, 1937 that Roy Roe, brother of subject Ralph Roe, is presently confined in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary. On December 23d, 1937 the San Antonio and San Francisco offices were advised that Roy Roe, brother of Ralph Roe, is presently incarcerated in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary. Therefore no further consideration will be given to Roy Roe as a possible contact of Ralph Roe in view of the fact that

Roy is at the present time confined in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary and was at the time of the escape of Ralph Roe.

A review of the file on this matter in the Oklahoma City office does not indicate that the correspondence records of Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth have been checked. A lead is being set out for the Kansas City office to ascertain the names and addresses of the correspondents of Ralph Roe and Ted Cole while they were incarcerated in the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth.

For the information of the El Paso, Phoenix and Little Rock offices, there are attached to copies of this report indicated for those offices, one photograph each of Theodore Cole and Ralph Roe, with descriptive data thereon.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE DALLAS FIELD OFFICE at Denison, Texas will conduct appropriate investigation concerning Dixie Hamilton, who is stated to be a close friend of Ralph Roe. If deemed advisable she should be thoroughly interviewed concerning Ralph Roe and his associates and if interviewed she should be informed of the Federal Harboring Statute. With reference to the girl friend of Ralph Roe in Denison, mentioned by Hazel Underhill during her interview, it should be ascertained whether or not this girl friend is the same as Dixie Hamilton.

At Childress, Texas will maintain surveillance of the home of Jim and Ruth Barker in accordance with telephonic instructions from the Bureau as telephonically relayed to the Dallas office by the Oklahoma City office.

At Fort Worth, Texas will locate and interitew Earl/Fields through the Lofflan Drilling Company in the Texas Pacific Passenger Building, for any information he may be able to furnish which may be of assistance in locating subjects. He should be questioned as to whether while James Roe was associated with him in Tulsa, James Roe ever mentioned to him the possibility of flying to California and freeing his brother from Alcatraz Island through the use of airplane or seaplane.

THE PHOENIX FIELD OFFICE at Phoenix will thoroughly interview Letha Jones, 801 West Madison Street relative to her knowledge and association with Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole, particularly while she was residing with the Payne family in Depew, Oklahoma. Will ascertain the present whereabouts of the Payne family with whom Letha Jones formerly resided in Depew. Letha Jones should be informed of the Federal Harboring Statute.

THE KANSAS CITY FIELD OFFICE at Leavenworth, Kansas will at the U.S. Penitentiary check the correspondence records of Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole and obtain a list of their correspondents, setting forth names and addresses, and relationship if any.

THE OKLAHOMA CITY FIELD OFFICE at Saminole will maintain contact with Chief of Police Jake Sims and obtain from him any information he may secure from his informant Brown relative to Billie Brown, a female friend of Ralph Roe, and if deemed advisable, will thoroughly interview Billie Brown concerning her association with Roe, and secure any information she may be able to furnish which may be of assistance in locating subjects.

At Stroud will interview Mrs. Nettie Frace, grandmother of subject Cole, who resides on a farm southeast of Stroud. Mrs. Fannie Baughman, the daughter of Mrs. Brace, is said to reside with her and is said to be mentally unbalanced and has been for a number of years.

Will interview Ernest Brace, who resides on a farm about one mile from the home of Mrs. Nettie Brace. He is an uncle of Ted Cole and should be advised of the Federal Harboring Statute.

At Depew, will interview Jerry Hazlet, night police officer for any information he may be able to furnish regarding Roe and Cole.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Raymond Roe, Hays, Kansas, has not heard from Ralph Roe in over three months. Present whereabouts of James W. Roe and Roy Roe, brothers, unknown to Raymond Roe. Mrs. Ruby Ankrum, Joplin, Missouri, sister of Volney Davis, states Herbert Farmer the only release from Alcatraz who has contacted her; does not know Roe and Cole. Investigation at Pittsburg, Kansas, to develop former address of Cole negative. Peace officers at Pittsburg, Kansas, Joplin and Springfield, Missouri, furnished descriptive data. James W. Roe, brother of Ralph Roe, received U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, 6-21-35, charge - Internal Revenue Act, released conditionally 7-28-37 to Probation Officer, Tulsa, Oklahoma; believed now residing with paramour Wanda Stukey at Hobbs, New Mexico. Richard Tallman Galatas released conditionally U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, 11-1-37, to Probation Officer, Little Rock, Arkansas.

DETAILS:

At 6:30 P.M., December 18, 1937, Mr. E. A. Tamm of the Bureau telephonically stated that he desired to know the whereabouts of Frank B. (Fritz) Mulloy, convicted in the KANMO case, and particularly whether Mulloy had been in Kansas City recently. Special Agents J. M. O'Leary and D. R. Scruggs conducted this investigation and ascertained that Frank Mulloy is operating a joint in the 3700 block on Main Street. These Agents observed him at that place and ascertained through U. S. Marshal Dillingham and Deputy U. S. Marshal Robert Pulliam that Mulloy had been in town continuously for the past several days. The Bureau was advised by teletype of this investigation.

Upon receipt of the teletype of reference from the Portland Office on December 19, 1937, Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley telephonically communicated with Mr. E. H. Eckholdt, Secretary to the Warden, U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, relative to the correspondents and relatives of Richard Tallman Galatas, which information was furnished by teletype to the Portland Office on the same date and will be set forth more in detail hereinafter.

At Hays, Kansas.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. M. O'Leary:

Raymond Roe, who is employed as District Foreman for the Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Company at Hays, Kansas, advised that the Roe family originally came from Duncan, Oklahoma; that his father and mother are deceased; that he has no sisters living; that he and his oldest brother, Roy W. Roe, enlisted in the U. S. Army together at the outbreak of the World War; that the family has been separated since that time; that, in addition to himself and James W. Roe, the family consisted of Ralph and Roy Roe.

Raymond Roe advised that his brother, James W. Roe, was released from the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, during July, 1937, and that he had heard that James W. Roe had come to Hays, Kansas, during August, 1937, but that he did not see him, due to the fact that he, Raymond, and his wife were on their vacation and absent from Hays. Raymond Roe continued by stating that he had heard from James W. Roe in September, 1937, at which time James advised that he was working for the Continental Supply Company at Big Springs, Texas.

Concerning Roy Roe, Raymond advised that Roy had been released from the ponitentiary at Huntsville, Texas, in February, 1937, and that Roy was with him in Hays, Kansas, from February until March, 1937; that Roy left Hays in March, 1937, and he had heard that he was in Houston, Texas, although he did not know what he was doing. Raymond stated that his neighbors in Hays had informed him that one of his brothers had been in Hays while he was away on his vacation and he believes from the description furnished by the neighbors that it was Roy Roe who had stopped at Hays.

Raymond Roe advised that all of his brothers were continually getting in trouble and that he wanted them to stay away from him as he had a responsible job with the Halliburton Company; that he had been with this company for four years and was presently in charge of the Hays district; that the activities of his brothers were liable to be embarrassing to him and that if they stayed away from Hays he would be well satisfied. He claimed that he was not close to any of his brothers and that they hardly seemed to be related to him; that he had had little to do with any of them since before the World War. Raymond stated that he had received one letter from Ralph Ros during the past six months and that this letter was received about three months prior to the interview. Raymond Roe stated that he had told Ralph that he was to write to him when he wanted money for magazines and other similar articles; that he had given Ralph money to subscribe to magazines but when Ralph wrote last he did not ask for money and he assumed that he was not going to subscribe for the magazines any longer.

Raymond Roe advised that the following relatives, all residing at Duncan, Oklahoma, might possibly be contacted by Falph Roe:

Mrs. Willis Bonner - aunt John Hickey - uncle Mrs. S. E. Legg - cousin

Raymond Roe further advised that he believed that, if Ralph Roe returned to the state of Oklahoma, he would most likely go to Ardmore or vicinity, as he had heard Ralph speak of Ardmore and knew that he had friends there, although he did not know the identity of these friends.

Raymond Roe further advised Agont that in August, 1957, he and his wife took a trip in his personally owned automobile and drove out to the west coast and that they spent some time in Los

Angeles and then drove to San Francisco, where they planned on visiting Ralph Roe at Alcatraz; that they spent a day or so in San Francisco and that they spoke to a city policeman concerning visiting privileges at Alcatraz and, when the officer told them that there would be considerable formality to be complied with, they decided that they would not visit Ralph and shortly thereafter left San Francisco and drove back to Hays, Kansas. Raymond Roe stated that he believed that he and his wife arrived back in Hays, Kansas, about August 20, 1937.

Raymond Roe expressed the opinion that he thought that Ralph's sentence of 99 years was rather severe but that he believed that Ralph did have a chance of getting out after serving a term of years; that he believed that Ralph would be much better off back at Alcatraz than he would be on the outside, where he might kill some officer or be killed himself. Raymond Roe stated that for this reason he would cooperate with the Bureau and, in the event he received any communication from Ralph, he would immediately contact the Kansas City Field Division and advise them of the information.

A summary of the foregoing investigation was transmitted by teletype message to the San Francisco, San Antonio, and Dallas Offices on December 22, 1937, requesting that the Dallas and San Antonio Offices conduct appropriate investigation relative to James Roe and Roy Roe.

At Joplin, Missouri.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent C. J. Endres:

The current city directory reflects that Raymond Q. and Ruby J. Ankrum operate a cafe at 214 East Seventh Street and reside at 502 Pennsylvania Avenue. The directory also reflects that Mrs. Myrtla Annes operates the rooming house at 502 Pennsylvania Avenue.

Walter E. Grammer, Prooper, Missouri Highway Patrol, advised that Raymond and Ruby Ankrum and Mrs. Myrtle Annes were unknown to him, but that S. A. Wilson, 514 Pennsylvania Avenue, is a personal friend of his. Agent and Trooper Grammer contacted S. A. Wilson, who stated that the Ankrums were unknown to him. He further advised that Mrs. Annes does not operate the rooming house, having moved about two months ago. Agent and Trooper Grammer observed a doctor enter the residence located at 502 Pennsylvania Avenue and ascertained through the license number on his car that he was Dr.

J. O. Marbrough, 1930 Bird Street. At the office of Dr. Marbrough, it was ascertained that he was attending a Mrs. McIntire on a confinement case; that he had made two calls at the address and that the operator of the rooming house was unknown to him.

Joe Thorpe, operator of the Marathon Service Station, located west of the case operated by the Ankrums, stated that he has known Raymond Ankrum for about five years and does not believe that he has been in any trouble during that time; that he has also known Ruby Ankrum for about two or three years but did not know her name before her marriage to Raymond Q. Ankrum. He stated that they reside at 219 East Seventh Street, across from the case. Informant believed that Ruby Ankrum came from Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Mrs. Margaret Roche, 219 East Seventh Street, was interviewed by Agent and Trooper Grammer. She stated that she has operated the house at 219 and also the house at 217 East Seventh Street for the past two years. Mrs. Roche was requested to name her tenants but the Ankrums were not mentioned. She was then asked if she was acquainted with Raymond and Ruby Ankrum and she stated that they resided at her place from about January, 1936, to December, 1936, and were presently residing at 715 Pennsylvania Avenue. She further advised that during the year Mr. and Mrs. Ankrum resided at her rooming house they had no visitors except Mrs. Ankrum's parents and one sister of Mrs. Ankrum. She further advised that Mrs. Ankrum was formerly Mrs. Ruby Davis Lamberson before her marriage to Raymond Q. Ankrum. She also advised that Mrs. Ankrum had stated that she had a brother in the penitentiary. Informant further advised that Raymond Q. Ankrum was a long-time resident of Joplin, Missouri, and that they had no automobile.

At the Joplin Retail Credit Association, Mrs. McNatt advised that Raymond and Ruby Ankrum had no previous credit rating prior to 1936. Through telephonic contects, Mrs. McNatt ascertained that Mrs. Ruby Ankrum was formerly Ruby Lamberson; that she had resided at Tulsa, Oklahoma, prior to coming to Joplin, Missouri. There were no newspaper clippings or other information in the file concerning Ruby Lamberson.

Mrs. Ruby Davis Lamberson Ankrum was interviewed at the cafe, located at 214 East Seventh Street, by Agent. She advised that she is the sister of Volney Pavis, who is now incarcerated at Alcatraz Island. She further advised she left Tulsa, Oklahoma, in December, 1935, for the reason that it was commonly known that she is the sister of Volney Davis; that she had operated an apartment house at Tulsa, Oklahoma; further, that she purchased the cafe at 214 East Seventh

Street, Joplin, Missouri, in November, 1935, and took possession on December 9, 1935; that she operated the cafe until January, 1936, when she married Raymond Q. Ankrum, and that she and her husband have been operating the cafe since that time; that her husband has no criminal record and was advised of the fact that Volney Davis is her brother prior to their marriage. Mrs. Ankrum advised that she left and divorced her former husband, Glenglamberson, for the reason that he is an habitual drunkard; that he presently resides in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and can be located through his aunts, Sue Adams and Blanche Bunche, 105 North Zunis Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma. Mrs. Ankrum further advised that she does not know whether her ex-husband is acquainted with Theodore Cole or Ralph Roe, but stated that he is not on good terms with her due to the fact that she obtained custody of the children at the time of their divorce. She further advised that Glen Lamberson is not reliable, when drinking.

Mrs. Ruby Ankrum stated that Theodore Cole and Ralph Roe are not known to her and she doubts that they were known by Volney Davis prior to his incarceration at Alcatraz Island, for the reason that they are much younger than Volney. She further advised that she recalls reading of Theodore Cole in a Tulsa, Oklahoma, newspaper at the time he was apprehended and associated him with the newspaper item on his escape.

With reference to having been contacted by former inmates of Alcatraz Island, Mrs. Ankrum advised that Herb/Farmer contacted her at the cafe about one week after he returned from Alcatraz; that he informed her that Volney Davis was in good health but did not mention that Volney had requested him to contact her and did not mention Cole or Roe. She said that no other former associates of Volney Davis have contacted her and she does not believe that Volney would send ex-convicts to her because he had never involved his family in his criminal activities. She does not believe that Volney would send escaped convicts to her for the purpose of harboring them and she added that she would not involve herself or her husband in harboring criminals, due to the fact that she does not want to become involved in a scandal on account of her twelve-year-old son and eightyear-old daughter. She further stated that she receives letters from Volney on rare occasions, as Volney writes to all members of the family. She stated that she last heard from Volney in November, 1937, but that he made no mention of Cole or Roe. Mrs. Ankrum further advised that her husband, Raymond Q. Ankrum, her brothers-in-law, John Harness and L. B. Hoffman, have never met Volney Davis.

Raymond Q. Ankrum was interviewed and stated that he does not know Volney Davis, Ralph Roe, or Theodore Cole; that he has lived in Joplin, Misseuri, since 1917 and has no criminal record; that he has been employed as a cook by the Connor Hotel for five years, by the Rex Cafe for five years, and has done odd jobs in Joplin and vicinity. He stated that his wife informed him that she is a brother of Volney Davis but that he is attempting to raise her children as law abiding citizens and will not allow a known criminal to patronize his cafe. He advised that he does not handle beer or cigarettes in his cafe as he believes that thieves would attempt to sell him stolen cigarettes and would be more inclined to patronize his cafe if he had beer.

Police Department reflects none.

Mrs. Ruby Ankrum advised that she would be willing to advise Bureau Agents if Theodore Cole or Ralph Roe made an effort to contact her at Joplin, Missouri. Her husband also made the same statement and, therefore, the address and telephone number of the Kansas City Office were left with them for the purpose of advising when and if Roe and Cole attempt to contact them.

Records of the Joplin, Missouri, Police Department were examined in an effort to locate a criminal record for Ruby or Raymond Ankrum, without success. Members of the Joplin Police Department and Chief of Detectives Ed Portley were not advised as to the nature of the inquiry.

Descriptions of Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole were left

with members of the Missouri Highway Patrol at Joplin, Missouri, who stated that they would be apprehended, if located in Joplin, and the Kansas City Office immediately notified.

At Pittsburg, Kansas.

Reference report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, Oklahoma City, dated 12-17-37, indicates that Theodore Cole, in 1929, made the statement that he resided at Pittsburg, Kansas. The following persons and places were contacted in an effort to ascertain the residence and associates of Cole when he resided in Pittsburg, Kansas, but these inquiries proved fruitless:

It is also noted that Sergeant Thomas Stowers, Pittsburg, Kansas, Police Department, made telephonic contacts with the older tailors in Pittsburg in an effort to ascertain whether Theodore Cole was employed as a tailor. These contacts proved to be unsuccessful and no information concerning Cole was received.

At Springfield, Missouri.

Descriptions of Theodore Cole and Ralph Roe were furnished to the Springfield, Missouri, Police Department and the Missouri Highway Patrol. Neither agency had any information concerning Subjects.

City Detective Lester Scott advised Agent that K W T O and K G B X, the local radio broadcasting stations, had announced over the radio that Mrs. Theodore Cole would be interviewed over the radio on December 20, 1937, at 12:30 P.M., but that the broadcast

was not made. Mr. Scott ascertained from the News Departments of the radio stations that arrangements were made for Mrs. Theodore Cole to come to Springfield, Missouri, on the mentioned date, but that she did not arrive in Springfield. Mr. Scott was informed that Mrs. Theodore Cole had not remarried since her husband was committed to Alcatraz Island and that she is presently residing with relatives (names unknown to the broadcasting stations) at Alpena Pass, Arkansas.

At Leavenworth, Kansas.

The following investigation was conducted by the reporting Agent:

At the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, through the cooperation of Mr. E. H. Eckholdt, Secretary to the Warden, the file on James W. Roe, brother of Ralph Roe, was examined. This file reflects that James W. Roe, with aliases, was received at the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, on June 21, 1935, on a charge of violating an Internal Revenue law and the counterfeiting of revenue stamps from the Northern District of Oklahoma at Tulsa, Oklahoma, to serve a sentence of three years, his maximum term to expire on June 17, 1938. However, he was released conditionally on July 28, 1937, after being allowed 252 days good time and is supposed to be reporting to Mr. J. Reamall, Probation Officer, Federal Building, Tulsa, Oklahoma.

By way of family history, this file reflects that James W. Roe was born January 22, 1900, at Excelsior Springs, Missouri, where the family lived until James was about 12 years of age, when they moved to Duncan, Oklahoma, he later going to Amarillo, Texas, when he was about fifteen or sixteen years of age. It appears that he enlisted in the U. S. Army on February 18, 1917, at Amarillo, Texas, and was discharged at Camp Pike, Arkansas, on January 20, 1920, as a Private, Fifth Field Signal Battalion. The file also reflects that on July 3, 1930, he was married to Babe Blackburne and, so far as education is concerned, he has had two years high school attendence, a bookkeeping course in an unnamed commercial school, and an apprenticeship course in aviation and mechanics, he apparently thereafter being employed at some unknown place as an aviation mechanic.

The file reflects the following relatives of James W.

With respect to John W. Roe, father of James W. Roe, the file contains a telegram, dated June 22, 1936, from Duncan, Oklahoma, signed Raymond, reading as follows:

"DAD PASSED AWAY SUNDAY FUNERAL FOUR OCLOCK TUESDAY LETTER FOLLOWS"

James W. Roe sent the following reply to his brother, Raymond, on the same date, signed Jim:

"SORRY CANT ATTEND FUNERAL WIRE FAE CARE OF D WELACKBURN GOTEBO OKLAHOMA"

The file reflects the following list of correspondents of James W. Roe, while confined in the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas:

With respect to the listing of Mrs. W. H. Stukey as

the sister of James Roe, the file contains a notation, under date of September 24, 1935, that James Roe had three visits with Mrs. Stukey, claiming her to be his sister, these visits being on July 29, 1935, August 19, 1935, and September 6, 1935; that after investigation by the penitentiary officials, who determined that James Roe had no sisters whatsoever, on the above date all visiting privileges were forfeited and were not again restored until July 2, 1936.

In connection with an application for parole, submitted by James W. Roe, which was later denied, the file revealed that his parole plan was to drive a truck on a job which Louis Moretsky obtained for him in Detroit, Michigan, suggesting Louis Moretsky as his parole adviser and listing the name of his contemplated employer under the plan as Bernard Bleshein or Blostine, Vice-President, United Fish Dist., Inc., 2517 Hasting Street, Detroit, Michigan.

The Leavenworth file on James W. Roe also reflected that his last legal residence at the time of incarceration was 1515 South Frisco Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma, and that a former address was 1003 South Main Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma, which is apparently a barber shop, managed by some relative of Fac Ros.

It is believed significant to note that the penitentiary file contains a letter addressed to the Director of the Bureau of Prisons by the Assistant Commissioner of the Alcohol Tax Unit, apparently in the nature of a parole report, which states in part that when James W. Roe was arrested in the case he owned a cabin located on the Yake of the Ozarks in Burton County, Missouri, valued at \$500.00, as well as personal property in the same amount. There is no such county in the state of Missouri and it might be advisable for the office of origin to verify this information through the local office of the Alcohol Tax Unit in Oklahoma or to ascertain if the same was levied upon in connection with any umpaid fines prior to any investigation being conducted by the Kansas City Office.

The following description of James W. Roe, #47123, together with a number of photographs, was obtained from the file at the penitentiary:

The file on James W. Roe also reflects that on 6-26-20 Roe, as L. S. Evans, #17314, was received at the State Penitentiary, Little Rock, Arkansas, to serve a two year sentence for grand larceny and was released on 3-28-22, and that on 7-24-24, as James Roe, was received at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, under #21514, to serve a three year sentence for Dyer Act violation, being released on 11-13-26; that on 2-11-28 he was again received at the U. S.

Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, as James Evans, under #29363, to serve a two year sentence for probation violation and was released on 10-19-29.

The file at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, on Richard Tallman Galatas, #46085, reflects that he was received on 1-15-35 to begin a two year sentence for conspiracy and \$10,000.00 fine, but subsequently was temporarily released pending hearing of an appeal; that he was released conditionally on November 1, 1937, and furnished transportation to Hot Springs, Arkansas, he being required to report to John Reeves, Federal Probation Officer, Federal Building, Little Rock, Arkansas, his parole adviser being listed as C. Floyd Huff, Jr., Hot Springs, Arkansas. The file also shows that employment was offered to him by Walter Warrigan, owner of the Carrigan - Stephens Mens! Wear Store, 258 Central Avenue, Hot Springs, Arkansas, in the capacity of solicitor and collector, at \$25.00 per week.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent D. R. Scruggs:

At 1216 Broadway, the address of the Commonwealth Hotel, Agent contacted Mr. Ellis, manager, who advised that one Wanda Stukey had never lived at that address but had received mail there about a year ago and that it was his understanding that she, at that time, was living at the Convention Hotel, 327 West 12th Street.

Telephonic inquiry at the Convention Hotel resulted in the information from the clerk that Wanda Stukey was not in. Agent then advised the clerk that he had some mail which had come to the Commonwealth Hotel and desired to ascertain her forwarding address, whereupon the clerk at the Convention Hotel stated he would send for it, but he was informed that the hotel rules would not permit such an arrangement.

Mr. Bell, Post Office Inspector, after a search of the records, advised that there was no forwarding address for Wanda Stukey.

Accompanied by Detective Lieutenant Lou Myers of the Kansas City Police Department, Agent contacted Mrs. J. H. Norton, manager of the Convention Hotel, who advised that she knew Wanda Stukey and that Stukey had lived at the Convention Hotel for some time, but that during July of 1937, Wanda Stukey had brought with her to the hotel a man named James Roe, who had just been released from the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas. Mrs. Norton continued that Stukey and Roe had lived at the Convention Hotel as man and wife for approximately two months and had left for an unknown destination in the state of Texas. Upon further inquiry, Mrs. Norton related that there was a girl living in room #204, who corresponded

with Wanda Stukey, but she deemed it most inadvisable to contact her openly. While Agent overheard the conversation through the switchboard, Mrs. Norton conversed with the girl in room #204 for the ostensible purpose of sending Wanda Stukey a Christmas card and thereby obtaining the address of Wanda Stukey as Post Office Drawer M, Hobbs, New Mexico.

On December 20, 1937, a summary of the information obtained from the records at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, was transmitted to the Bureau, Oklahoma City, Los Angeles, and San Francisco Offices by conference teletype, suggesting that the Oklahoma City Office verify through the Probation Officer at Tulsa, Oklahoma, the address of James Roe and thereafter advise the El Paso Office accordingly.

Photographs and the following descriptive data pertaining to Fugitive Subjects Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole were obtained from the records of the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas:

THE LOS ANGELES OFFICE at Arcadia, California, will contact Mrs. Fac Roe, wife of James W. Roe, and other members of her family, at 15 East Colorado Boulevard, for information concerning the present whereabouts of James W. Roe, as well as for the purpose of obtaining any information they may have or the names of relatives or associates who may have information concerning Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole.







The writer, accompanied by U.S. Marshal J. R. Wright, Fort Worth, Texas, interviewed Mrs. O. D. Stevens at her home four miles from Arlington, Texas.

She advised that she had read newspaper accounts of the escape of Cole and Roe from Alcatraz Prison, but that she had no reason to believe that either of these men would attempt to communicate with her. Mrs. Stevens was advised of the Harboring Statute and she stated she was aware of this law and that she would not want to become involved in any way in this matter, as she had had enough trouble, and that if Roe and Cole should contact her in amy way, she would immediately notify the officials in Fort Worth. The writer requested Mrs. Stevens to notify the Dallas Bureau Office, and she said she would.

Mr. L. G. Collet, Postmaster, Handley, Texas, advised that Mrs. O. D. Stevens sends mail at Handley but receives her mail at Arlington, Texas. A 30 day cover was placed on 1st and 2nd class mail of Mrs. Stevens sent from the pest office at Handley, Texas.

Broadway, concerning the identity of the owners of Wisconsin license plates 605-995 and 693-309. Review of the registration book for 1937 licenses revealed that 605-995 is listed under the name of W. L. Morris, Rice Lake, Wisconsin, Rural Route #1; and 693-309 is listed under the name of O. A. Goffin, Radisson, Wisconsin, the former for a 1937 Dodge Touring Sedan, motor #5139817, and the latter for a 1937 Chevrolet Master Sedan, motor #1099257.

Telephonic inquiry of S. J. McShane, Postmaster at Rice Lake, Wisconsin, revealed that W. L. Morris is presently believed to be in Oregon and that his mail forwarding address is 519 West Main Street, Cottage Grove, Oregon. This information was forwarded at once by teletype to the Portland Division.

Telephonic inquiry of Postmaster Rynda, Radisson, Wisconsin, revealed that O. A. Goffin has been visiting in Oregon for several weeks and intended to return on or about Christmas day; that he is a garage owner in Radisson.

AT RICE LAKE, WISCONSIN:

S. J. McShane, Postmaster, advised that he does not know W. L. Morris, nor do any of the Post Office employees; that he secured his information concerning this man from Louis Mark, Rural mail carrier at the Rice Lake Post Office on Route #1.

Louis Wark was interviewed and he stated that he has known W. L. Morris for about three years; that Morris has been a farmer in the vicinity of Campia, Wisconsin, most of this time; that Morris is reputed to be a man who can not be trusted to keep his word but has not, to Mark's knowledge, ever been arrested; that he acquired his reputation through various business deals in which he made false representations and took unfair advantages whenever the opportunity offered. Mark advised that Albert Hansen, a lumber dealer in Campia might be able to give more information concerning Morris as he, Marks, was not familiar with Morris family or affairs and knew him only slightly as one of the people on Rural Route #1; that the only thing he knew about Morris was his forwarding address at 519 West Main Street, Cottage Grove, Oregon.

Albert Hansen, 202 West Messenger Street, advised that he is a lumber dealer in Campia and has known W. L. Morris for about ten or twelve years; that Morris is a person who cannot be trusted in business deals if he gets a chance to take advantage of someone; that to his knowledge has no criminal record, nor has he ever heard of Morris having been arrested or involved in any way in law violations; that he does not know where Morris lived prior to the time he came to Campia but he thinks it was on a farm near watertown, Wisconsin, at a place called Johnson Creek; that he knows Morris as "Bill"; that the latter left a number of unpaid bills in Campia when he left for Oregon; that, to his knowledge, Morris has no relatives in Oregon and it came as a surprise to hear that Morris had gone there sometime during the month of September, 1937.

Frank Brynes, 120 Douglas Street, a deputy sheriff in Rice Lake for the past seven years was interviewed and he stated that he has known Morris for the past eight or nine years and knows that Morris has the reputation as being a difficult person to do business with as he is supposed to be dishonest whenever it will gain him any profit; that Morris has no criminal record and has never been arrested; that he does not know where Morris lived before coming to Campia and Rice Lake about twelve years ago; that John Froemming, a farmer near Campia knows Morris and has had business dealings with him so may be able to give information of value in determining Morris past record and reputation.

John Froemming, Campia, advised that Morris rented during the year 1935 a farm of his and that subsequently Morris tried to secure the profits from the place by one means or another; that, however, Morris was never arrested for this; that he does not know where Morris lived before he came to Campia; that Morris is married and has three or four children.

At the Rice Lake Auto Company, Charles W. Barney, salesman, was interviewed and he advised that Morris purchased a 1937 Dodge Sedan there during March, 1937; that subsequently Morris drove this car to Oregon and that after some time he was located there at Cottage Grove and the car was repossessed for the Chippewa Valley Security Company, Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, which company was financing the purchase of the car for Morris; that about \$700.00 was unpaid on the purchase price; that this car was repossessed about the middle of November; that the car is being returned to Wisconsin from Oregon by a friend of Mr. Dorsey, manager of the Chippewa Valley Security Company.

AT RADISSON, WISCONSIN:

Postmaster Rynda advised on interview that he had known O. A. Goffin for about twenty years; that Goffin has been in the garage business

in Radisson for that length of time and prior to that was a restaurant owner in Birchwood, Wisconsin; that he bears a good reputation and is a married man with one son, Robert, who is in the garage business with his father; that the Goffins have been visiting in Oregon at Mrs. Goffin's father's home for the past two or three months and returned to Radisson December 26, 1937.

Cashier Lebeau, Chippewa Valley Bank, was interviewed and he stated that he has known O. A. Goffin for about twenty-five years; that Goffin is a reputable, hard-working man and has been in the garage business for about twenty years in Radisson; that he is married and has one son, Robert, who is in the business with his father; that Goffin has never been in any trouble of any kind in respect to law violations; that he and his family have been in Oregon for the past two or three months visiting Mrs. Goffin's father, who was formerly in the garage business in Radisson.

Orrin As Coffin was interviewed and he advised that he returned to Radisson on December 26, instant, from a three and a half months visit to Oregon; that he went there with his wife, his son, Robert and his wife, and his grandson; that they visited at the home of his wife's father, Oliver C. Sabin, Route #2, Box #303, Medford, Oregon; that his father-in-law left Radisson in 1924 and has lived at Medford since that time and owns as small fruit farm there.

Mr. Goffin further advised that he and his family left Radisson on September 12, 1937, and arrived at Medford on September 20, 1937; that during the last week in September they visited in Seattle at the home of his wife's sister and that on this trip they passed through Portland, Oregon; that this is the only time they were in Portland and that they did not buy any maps of any kind while on the trip; that they visited his nephew, Bobby Rindt at Yreka, California and also Jack Kermott at Upland, California, during the first week in October; that he telegraphed home that he intended to start back on December 15 and received an immediate reply from Mr. Dorsey of the Chippewa Valley Security Company, Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, requesting him to go to Cottage Grove and bring back a car which was stored there at the Woodin Motor Company: that this car has been repossessed from a W. L. Morris, who had purchased it through the finance company of which Mr. Dorsey is manager: that he did go to Cottage Grove and secure this car, a Dodge Sedan bearing 1937 Wisconsin plates #605-995; that his son, Robert, drove this car on the return trip; that they went south through Oregon and California, crossing the state line on December 16, on which date they were stopped for inspection at a pest control station at Yreka, California, and then continued on south through San Francisco and then

turned east and crossed the state line into Arizona on December 16, where they were once more stopped for inspection. Mr. Goffin, by referring to a map to refresh his memory, advised that this point was at Topock, Arizona; that in the car with him and his wife was their small grandson and in the other car were his son and daughter=in-law; that at Yreka he is not sure if his grandson was in the car with him and his wife or in the other.

Mr. Goffin further stated that he is not sure when the Morris car was repossessed but that there was a \$7.50 storage bill against it at the Woodin Motor Company in Cottage Grove, so it must have been there in storage for at least two weeks prior to December 15, when he secured it pursuant to the request from Mr. Dorsey.

A description of Mr. Goffin is as follows, secured by Agent through questioning and observation at the time of the interview:

Reference is made to instructions of Mr. Tamm that an explanation be made as to why there had been a delay in forwarding the photographs of the subjects to the Bureau.

Please be advised that at the time of the Alcatraz break I was out of the city, Special Agent Joseph E. Thornton was acting, and he has made the following explanation to me:

Agent Thornton advises with regard to these photographs that Warden Johnston told him he would have photographs of the subjects available as soon as possible and that he might expect them on December sixteenth on the 5:40 P. M. boat and arrangements were made for an Agent to meet this boat and get these photographs; however Agent Thornton was telephonically advised that the Warden had been unable to get them off on the 5:40 boat and that they would arrive at approximately 6:40 P. M. An Agent met that boat which was late and did not get in until approximately 7:00 P. M.

At this time there were forwarded three photographs of each fugitive and due to the fact that Agent Thornton had been telephonically instructed to give the widest possible publicity of the matter, providing it met with the approval of the Warden, these photographs were given to newspaper reporters in the city. Arrangements were made for additional photographs to be furnished the San Francisco Office on December seventeenth. The additional photographs were received at approximately 6:00 P. M., December 17, 1937.

Agent Thornton advises me he did not realize the photographs of these two fugitives were not on file in the Identification Division of the Bureau inasmuch as they were Federal prisoners and confined in Alcatraz, and although the subject of Identification Orders was mentioned in telephone conversations with the Bureau, having in mind the fact that these photographs we received from Alcatraz were the same as those in the Bureau files, it was not thought necessary to send them at that time.

In view of the subsequent developments, it appears the photographs should have been sent to the Bureau immediately upon receipt at this office; however it appears that in view of the desire for immediate publicity, looking to the location of these men in the Bay Area, it was highly desirable to have these photographs disseminated to the newspapers as there was a great possibility of apprehending the fugitives in the Bay Area if they had perpetrated their escape.

In the future on any major case of this kind this error will not occur as I can understand the Bureau's position and my only comments regarding the failure to forward them by Special Agent Thornton are that he was endeavoring to do everything he could looking to their possible apprehension in this district.

File of the Flewelling Motor Sales reflects that since 6-7-37, Mr. Porter has resided at Heathman Hotels, Portland, Oregon, and apparently had his son from Chicago secure the car and drive it to Oregon; that Porter is employed by Chrysler Corporation and engages in installation of factory accounting systems at distribution points; that at Portland, Oregon, he was making an audit and installation at the Roy Burnett Motors, the Shipley Motors and then at Tarola's (Plymouth and Chrysler dealers). Porter not known at La Porte, Indiana, other than because of above purchase.

DETAILS:

Subsequent to the receipt of the reference teletype message, Special Agent in Charge Reinecke communicated by telephone with the writer at South Bend, Indiana, and furnished pertinent information contained therein, advising that 1937 Indiana license plates #711043 were issued to James William Porter, 115 West Way Street, La Porte, Indiana, for a 1937 Dodge coupe, motor #D5-203393, according to information received from the Indiana State Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

AT LA PORTE, INDIANA.

At the La Porte, Indiana, Police Department, Detective James Payton advised that there was no Way Street in that city and an examination of the 1936 city directory confirmed this; also that no James William Porter was listed. An examination of the La Porte County passenger automobile list for 1937 showed that license #711043 was issued to James William Porter, 1115 Lincolnway, La Porte, Indiana, for the above described Dodge coupe.

At the Flewelling Motor Sales (Dodge and Plymouth dealers), 1115 Lincolnway, Mr. R. P. Bixler, manager, checked his files and advised that on April 8, 1937, J. W. Porter, 7731 Burnham Street, Chicago, Illinois, by letter placed an order for a Dodge Coupe to be ready for delivery not later than June 5, 1937. In this letter Mr. Porter said that he was planning on taking his two children for a rather extensive tour and wished to be on the way after his son graduated from high school on June 6, 1937.

A letter written to Porter on May 29, and one on June 7, 1937 both advised that the car was ready for delivery. A letter dated June 7, 1937 was received by the company from Porter on stationery of the Heathman Hotels, Park at Salmon-Broadway at Salmon, Portland, Oregon, in which Porter said that it was impossible for him to be in La Porte or Chicago to get the car; that his firm had sent him to Portland to make an audit and installation of the Roy Burnett Motors and after that he had the Shipley Motors (Dodge and Plymouth dealers) and then Tarola's (Plymouth and Chrysler dealers in Portland). In this letter Porter asked that the necessary papers be sent him for signing and that he would have his son pick up the car, and also suggested that the company secure Indiana license plates for the car "so that it might be registered in your district"; also that a conditional sales contract for eighteen months period be made out. He further stated in this letter that his son could be notified that the car was ready for delivery at 7731 Burnham Street, Chicago, Illinois.

The company sent Porter the contract for the car and addressed the communication to Porter at the Heathman Hotels, Portland, Oregon on June 10, 1937. The car as described in the contract is a 1937 Dodge, rumble seat coupe, motor #D5-203393, serial #4709235, painted sheet metal color, price \$930.50, down-payment \$310.50.

Porter sent the company a letter dated June 19, 1937 from the Heathman Hotels in Portland, Oregon, enclosing the signed agreement and stating that the company should notify James Porter, 7731 Burnham Street, Chicago, Illinois, when the car was ready. He also stated that he would be at the Roy Burnett Motors (DeSoto and Plymouth dealers) in Portland installing the Chrysler factory accounting system. James Porter was notified by letter dated June 23, 1937, that the car was ready and on June 24, 1937, according to the records of the Flewelling Motor Sales, the car was delivered to James Porter, presumably the son of James William Porter, at La Porte, Indiana,

Mr. Bixler further advised that he did not know Porter and made inquiry of several employees with negative results. He stated that Mr. Sewell Flewelling who is president of the company possibly carried on the entire deal with Porter, and was the only one at that establishment who was acquainted with him; that Mr. Flewelling was then visiting various relatives in the State of Arkansas, but could be reached within a reasonable length of time at the home of Velma Schaffer, 503 Arkansas Avenue, Russelville, Arkansas. Mr. Bixler finally advised that the time payments on the above car are now being made to the Commercial Credit Corporation with home offices in Fort Wayne, Indiana, which company is financing \$630.00 and is not known to have a branch office in La Porte.

At the automobile license branch office located in the Masonic Temple Building in La Porte, it was ascertained that 1937 Indiana license plates #711043 were issued at that place on July 2, 1937, and that the application for title reflected that the car was purchased on June 30, 1937; that an individual who secures an Indiana license plate for an automobile is supposed to and presumably does live in the State of Indiana.

The above information was telephoned to the Indianapolis Office by the writer at La Porte, Indiana, on the same day when secured, namely, December 24, 1937.

For the information of the Chicago Office to which

copies of this report are being directed, the following is stated: The reference teletype message advised that an unknown person at Portland, Oregon, on December 15, 1937, purchased a Department of Commerce booklet entitled "Current Tables Pacific Coast 1938" and a U. S. Hydrographic Service booklet entitled "Current Chart of San Francisco Bay". Investigation is being conducted with regard to the unknown person who purchased the above booklets because of the possibility that that person may have been implicated in instant case. Also all automobiles passing through California checking stations from Oregon at the Oregon-California border on December 15 and 16, 1937, have been checked by license numbers and one of such cars was that described hereinbefore, and the purpose of the investigation reflected in this report is to determine the reliability, reputation, destination and business of individual driving the above car, in which there was one passenger, from Oregon to California.

The description of the unknown person securing the above mentioned booklets is as follows:

While talking to Mr. Pieper at SanFrancisco, he advised it will be practically impossible to do much searching on the water today as there is a heavy dense fog.

Reference was made to the allegation from Los Angeles that a man identified as Roe is working in a restaurant there, and I told Mr. Pieper to see that the Los Angeles Office follows out this lead.

Concerning the information about the delay in the submission of the photographs, Mr. Pieper stated he has directed a letter to the Bureau relative thereto by air mail special delivery.

At this time, I informed Mr. Pieper of the request made by the Director, Bureau of Prisons, for an investigation of Henry T. Davis, Walter F. Peterson, Claud E. Billingsley and James V. Halsted, who are employees at the Alcatraz Penitentiary. These four men are the men referred to by Mr. Pieper in a letter to the Bureau on this matter. Mr. Pieper was also advised that the Director, Bureau of Prisons, desires that investigation be made of anyone at the penitentiary at whom suspicion is cast, regardless of the personnel involved. Mr. Pieper was accordingly instructed to investigate the activities of the above named men, thereafter investigating anyone else whose activities are under suspicion. PECOSATO



release from that institution. He will be discharged in June, 1938. He is now reporting to the U. S. Probation Officer at El Paso, Texas. He originally obtained employment with the International Supply at Wink, Texas, and is now stationed at Hobbs as a temporary relief man. He expects to obtain a position as Manager of one of the stores which the company contemplates opening after January 1, 1938, but can always be located through Mr. Clifton or through Mr. John Price of the International Supply at Wink, Texas.

James Roe stated that the first time he knew of his brother's escape was when he read of it in the newspapers and that he believes his brother drowned in the attempted escape. He said that he last saw Ralph in the penitentiary at Leavenworth but merely spoke to him as Ralph was segregated from the other prisoners until his transfer to Alcatraz; that since Ralph was transferred to the island he had never corresponded with him and never heard from him in any way, or anything about him.

He said that his brother, Raymond of Hays, Kansas, had intended visiting Ralph and after arriving at Wink he, James, wrote Raymond, and asked about Ralph but never received an answer.

James Roe stated that he was in Hobbs at the time of Ralph's escape and had worked continuously during the month of December; that he had not lost any time from his work and the only time he was absent from Hobbs was on Christmas Eve when he and Mr. Frice drove to El Paso, where they spent the night at the Camp Grande Tourist Camp. He stated he called to see Mr. Clifton the following morning but was unable to locate him and they then returned to Hobbs and Mr. Price returned to Wink.

Roe was questioned concerning the information received by the Kansas City office that he was an airplane pilot. He stated that he was not a licensed pilot but was interested in aviation and had approximately 70 hours flying time to his credit; that he has not flown any since his release from the penitentiary and knows no one in Hobbs that has a ship. He said that Joe Roberts, Douglas Aircraft Company, Santa Monica, Calif., is the name of a person given to him as a possible source of employment and he, therefore, entered his name on his correspondence list so he could write to him. However, he stated he never wrote to Roberts.

With reference to his other correspondents, he stated that L. More sky is a friend and employed by the Ford Motor Company in Detroit, Michigan; Mark tane is a friend and has relatives in Kansas City, Mo., but is not related to "Spike" Lane whom he knows; John rice of Russell, Kansas, is the John Price now stationed at Wink, Texas, and manager of the International Supply Company store there. None of these correspondents, he stated, is related to him.

James Roe stated that he never associated with Ralph's crowd and therefore knows none of his contacts. He said that Ralph's crowd were killers, etc., and that was too strong for him. He did recall, however, that on one occasion Ralph spoke of two girl friends, one called Clara Bell and the other he believed was Hazel. He said he knew neither of these two women and does not know if Hazel is identical with Hazel Underhill. He believes that at one time Hazel and Ralph were at Raymond's house for about one hour and Margaret, Raymond's wife, disliked Hazel very much and thought she was an Indian girl.

He said that the only close relatives of Ralph are Raymond, Roy (another brother) and himself, as both their father and mother are dead. Their step-mother, he said, is supposed to be in Oklahoma somewhere and he does not know where Roy is.

Roe stated he is separated from his wife and presumes she is still in California but he does not correspond with her; that he is now living with Wanda Stukey and they plan to obtain divorces and get married as soon as he receives his discharge.

He stated further that Raymond is the only member of his family or relative that knows where he is located and he therefore feels sure that Ralph, if alive, will not contact him and would not do so even if he knew where he was located as he would know that the authorities would be watching his brothers.

James Roe stated that although Ralph is his brother he will not harbor or assist him. He frankly stated that he would not notify local officers if Ralph should appear in Hobbs, but that he would not let him in his house or assist him and would notify the El Paso office by telephone.

Roe accompanied the writer to the Hoteling Apartments where he resides with Wanda Stukey. She was interviewed but could add nothing to the statements made by Roe. She too stated that James had been in Hobbs continuously during the month of December except for the trip to El Paso. Wanda stated she has been separated from her husband for five or six years, has a son 14 years of age that is now with his grandmother.

Both Wanda and James Roe were advised separately and jointly as to the harboring statute. Roe and Wanda Stukey are now residing in an apartment located adjacent to the Hoteling Store in Hobbs. The apartment has only one double bed and accommodates only two people. They have a black cocker spaniel dog with them.

Mrs. George Moteling advised that James Roe and his wife moved into this apartment on December 1, 1937, and have occupied it continuously since that time; that they have had no visitors, are good tenants and keep to themselves. Mrs. Hoteling was not advised of Agent's identity as James Roe advised that no one in Hobbs knew that he was an ex-convict or related to Ralph Roe.

Through Postmaster Langford at Hobbs it was ascertained that Postoffice Box M is assigned to the International Supply Company. A cover was placed on all mail received by Roe and Wanda Stukey through this box, which cover is to be maintained indefinitely and until Roe leaves Hobbs.

Inquiry at the Post office, Gas Company, Light Company, and the Retail Credit Association disclosed no information concerning Otis Swan. Neither was he known to Sheriff W. Kerley, Deputy Sheriff D. B. Witcher, Cattle Inspector Shannon, or members of the Police Department questioned by Sheriff Kerley. At the Retail Credit Association it was ascertained that the Manager was formerly


employed by the Gas Company at Saminole, Okla., and is personally acquainted with Jake Sims, Chief of Police, and Otis Swan. He described Otis Swan as a young, dark complexioned man and said that if Swan were in Hobbs he would know it, but that he was not here. He stated further that he knew by sight a girl called Clara Belle that formerly worked at a Beauty Parlor in Seminole but did not know that she was married to Otis Sims and had not seen her in Hobbs.

James Roe and Wanda Stukey were questioned concerning Clara Belle and Otis Swan and they stated they did not know Swan and only knew of Clara Belle through Ralph. Roe stated if Swan was working in the oil fields he could locate him and promised to make inquiries and advise the El Paso office if successful in locating him.

Deputy Sheriff D. B. Witcher was given two Identification Orders on both Ralph Roe and subject Cole and was shown the residence of James Roe and advised as to his place of employment. He promised to appropriately cover the matter in Hobbs.

James Roe's statement concerning his efforts to visit Mr. Clifton in El Paso on Christmas Day were verified by Mr. Clifton who found a note from Roe left at his office. This note, together with the envelope that contained the Christmas Card sent to Clifton by James Roe, are now in the El Paso file of this case.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DESCRIPTION

RE: Escape of Theodore Cole and Ralph Roe from Alcatraz.

Mr. Pieper advised there are no developments in this case. He advised the shore line is being patrolled by boat daily but as yet nothing of value has been found. He indicated an agent is not on the boat as there is no special search being made in the water, but the boat is going along the shore and it would be a waste of personnel to have an agent on board.

With reference to the report submitted in this matter, I referred to the statement of the truck driver at Mill Valley relative to having been hailed by two strangers and asked Mr. Pieper if we can develop anything further on this line. He indicated he does not believe so as this has been fairly well covered. He indicated the statement obtained from an individual who said he believed he heard a speed boat on the afternoon of the escape, has been disproved by another individual who was in a position to have heard the boat and did not.

He indicated the relations with the Warden at Alcatraz are very friendly and the Warden is turning over everything he gets to Agent Farland.

Mr. Pieper stated he believes Farland should remain on the island now. The Warden has indicated there are four individuals, two guards and two civilian employees, under suspicion and stated that agents can investigate them, interrogate or take any other action they desire.

Mr. Pieper said he has submitted a letter to the Bureau covering this and pointing out it is not advisable to investigate these four men now as this would lead to the investigation of the entire personnel at Alcatraz. He indicated that the prisoners will not talk as they are afraid to talk in the presence of other prisoners.

Mr. Pieper indicated it was decided that it would be a good idea to have the photographs taken at Alcatraz developed there in order that there would be no possible question as to the negatives, with the result that half of the photographs were ruined. He indicated that Agent Wood developed the remainder of the photographs himself and they turned out perfectly. Agents will take more photographs today at Alcatraz.

With reference to my call to Mr. Fletcher at Little Rock instructing him to check the probation officer's file on Galatas and to forward all pertinent data to the Bureau, since the Bureau contemplates submitting a memorandum to the Department pointing out that Huff is not a reputable person to whom a man should be paroled, Mr. Brantley called from Kansas City advising that in accordance with a telephonic request from Mr. Fletcher, he had contacted Mr. Timmons, the Parole Officer at Leavenworth. Timmons advised his files reflect that several communications were received there in behalf of Galatas, several being addressed to the Warden at Leavenworth and several to the Warden at Alcatraz. He said he received a letter dated April 20, 1936, from Huff urging the parole of Galatas and in this letter Huff volunteered to be the parole adviser. Mr. Brantley indicated this was before Galatas was transferred to Alcatraz. Timmons further stated that Galatas was received back at Leavenworth about a month before the date of his conditional release, and according to Departmental regulations, it is incumbent upon Timmons, as parole officer, to make every effort he can to obtain a parole adviser for individuals about to be released conditionally. Timmons said in view of the interest manifested by Huff, as reflected by the file, the necessary forms were sent by him, Timmons, to Huff to be executed and returned. These forms were then signed by the state officer to whom the prisoner is to be paroled, which official must attest to the good character of the individual who is to be a parole adviser. indicated the forms were then sent to the parole officer at Washington. Timmons stated he does not pass upon the qualifications of the parole adviser but the submission of a name by him in the executed forms is usually equivalent to accompany endexed

Mr. Brantley indicated there is some discussion to the effect that conditionally released priscners do not require parole advisers, but is not certain of the latest Departmental rulings on this question.

DETAILS OF ESCAPE

At 1 p.m., on December 16, 1937, six prisoners, including Subject COLE, were returned from the Mess Hall to the blacksmith shop by Junior Officer JOE B. STEERE. At the same time twenty-six other prisoners, including Subject ROE, were returned from the Mess Hall by Junior Officer STEERE to the mat shop, which adjoins the blacksmith shop. Officer STEERE advised that he counted these prisoners when bringing them through the gate, into the yard, and again checked them when they actually entered their places of employment. This is the usual routine when bringing prisoners from the Mess Hall to the shops, and affords a double check, and precludes the possibility of prisoners leaving the line unobserved when marching to work.

After checking these prisoners into their shops, Junior Officer STEERE returned and observed the prisoners working between 1 and 1:30 p.m., but although he is of the opinion that Subjects ROE and COLE were there at that time, he states that he cannot be positive of this fact.

As the prison rules require that Junior Officers and Guards in charge of work details check their prisoners every half-hour, Officer STEERE again checked these men at 1:30, at which time he observed that the Subjects were missing. He immediately notified the Warden's Office, and a search was then conducted. This search revealed that three panes of glass in the detention sash of the blacksmith shop had been removed. This detention sash consists of steel frames made of "T" iron, which is approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ " across the top of the "T", the shank being of similar width, and $\frac{1}{4}$ " in thickness. The sash is so constructed that each individual pane of glass is $5\frac{1}{4}$ " by 8 3/4". By removing two sections of the steel frame, and three panes of glass, an aperture of approximately $17\frac{1}{2}$ " x 8 3/4" was created.

Closer examination of the sash revealed that it had been cut with an instrument, which was apparently a hack-saw. Warden JOHNSTON and Officer STEERE advised that hack-saws are only used in the blacksmith shop, and are charged out to the men working therein. As Officer STEERE is required to continuously inspect five rooms, it is logical to believe that Subject COIE used a hack-saw which was charged to the blacksmith shop to saw the detention sash at such times as Officer STEERE was inspecting the other rooms, particularly those in the adjoining mat shop.

This window faces the northwest corner of the Island, and is immediately above the water-line. There is, however, a fourteen foot

heavy iron-mesh fence on the edge of the cliff, to prevent prisoners from running to the edge of the Island, and diving into the Bay. Between the window where the escape was made, and the iron fence, there is a steel cat walk, which leads to a lower level at the rear of the mat shop, and was used for the purpose of throwing remnants of the automobile tire casings into the Bay after the good portions had been removed for use in the construction of mats. At the termination of the cat-walk is a small iron gate in the fence, which could be opened for throwing the tires over the cliff. Examination of this gate following the escape revealed that the Subjects had taken with them a large Stilson wrench, for the purpose of twisting the padlock off the gate. This wrench was found at the gate with the broken padlock.

After opening the gate it was then possible for the prisoners to jump to a ledge a few feet below the gate, which is covered with automobile tires, and then to either jump directly into the Bay, or to follow a natural ledge which leads down to within a very few feet of the water-line.

An investigation revealed that guards were searching this portion of the Island, and that the prison launch was in the Bay immediately opposite this point, within ten or fifteen minutes following the time the escape was discovered. It will be observed that it would be impossible for the Subjects to have proceeded any great distance along the shoreline without having been observed by a guard on one of the towers. Even though the guard on the roof of the building which contains the mat shop and the blacksmith shop could have observed these prisoners escaping through the gate, it would have been a coincidence, in view of the fact that it is necessary for him to patrol the entire roof of the building, which is rather extensive.

An examination of the shore-line where these men apparently entered the water, failed to reveal that any articles of clothing had been discarded. They were wearing prison work-suits at the time of escape.

Coast guard boats were also notified of the escape, and the entire surrounding waters of the Island were thoroughly patrolled. It will be noted, however, that on the day of escape there was a heavy fog, and visibility ranged between two and three hundred yards. There was also an exceptionally strong current running in the vicinity of the Island at that time, caused by an exceedingly high tide. The current was accelerated by flood waters from the rivers, caused by heavy rains in the valley. Light-house keepers and Coast Guardsmen estimate that the

current at the time of escape had a speed of approximately six knots per hour.

It has also been suggested that it would have been impossible for a swifter to proceed in any other direction than the general direction of the current at that time. Coast Guardsmen and light-house keepers also advise that it would have been almost impossible for a row-boat to have been propelled against that current, and suggested that unless a motor boat was rather powerful, it could not have proceeded up-stream.

The temperature of the water was below normal, which was caused by melting snow in the mountains, which added to the flooded waters. The Bay had an unusual amount of drift wood in it at that time, which had been carried down by the rivers and floated from the mud flats. A check with experienced marine observers in the Bay revealed, however, that had the Subjects attached themselves to any floating object, it would have been impossible for them to have propelled it to shore against the current, but would have been carried to sea at least ten miles from the Island. As this was a flooded ebb tide, the returning tide would have returned them only approximately six miles.

Investigation to date has not revealed any evidence that would indicate that these men are either drowned, or at liberty.

Other General Weather Conditions Noted on 12/16/37

The temperature on 12/16/37 was fifty-two degrees. No wind was observed at noon on 12/16/37.

WIND

B. TREXIER, Junior Meteorologist, from the United States Weather Bureau records, reported that there was a five-mile-an-hour East wind blowing between 12:00 M and 1:00 p.m., on 12/16/37, and a four-mile-an-hour wind between 1:00 p.m., and 2:00 p.m., on this date, but that this slight wind was not enough to disturb the fog which lay over San Francisco.

SURROUNDING LIGHTHOUSE WEATHER OBSERVATIONS

Mr. O. LY JEWRINE, Assistant Superintendent of Lighthouses, Customs House, San Francisco, California, was requested to obtain information from all lighthouse-keepers in the vicinity of Alcatraz Island. Following this request Mr. JENKINS submitted the following reports:

BONITA POINT: "The fog conditions at this station on December 16, 1937 were as follows:

12 midnight to 1:05 p.m., dense. 4:40 a.m., to 7:20 p.m., dense.

"Fog backed off shore from 1:05 a.m., to 4:40 a.m. All lights in inner bay, and in the gate visible between these hours. During the afternoon from about 1 to 5 p.m., the fog cleared on our side a little, but was dense outside in the channel and inner bay."

ANGEL ISLAND LIGHT STATION: "Visibility at Point Blunt, Point Stuart, Angel Island Light Station from 10 a.m., to 4 p.m., not more than 50 to 100 feet at any time. At Point Blunt the signal was sounded from 4:05 a.m., to 7:50 p.m., and again sounded from 11:40 p.m., to midnight. At Point Stuart the signal sounded from 5:40 a.m., until 7:10 p.m., and at Point Knox, Angel Island Light Station, the signal began at 5:40 a.m., and ended at 7:10 p.m."

YERBA BUENA LICHT STATION: "Fog set in at 3:50 a.m., continuing the entire day, and through the following day, December 17th, until 12:35 p.m. No time during the 32 hours was visibility exceeding 500 yards, and from 8 a.m., until sundown it was so dense that the tower 100 yards from the quarters could not be seen.

"Frequently during the night the lights on Pier 6 of the bridge could be seen, but very dim."

LIME POINT LIGHT STATION, Fort Baker, California: "I wish to say that this station's fog signal was in operation from 4:40 a.m., until 7:20 p.m. Visibility until 7 p.m., was 0, as it was the heaviest fog of the scason."

MILE ROCK LIGHT HOUSE: "On December 16th the fog came in at 4:50 a.m., and lifted at 7:50 p.m. No condition of fog and visibility distance at 1:30 p.m., was recorded."

SOUTHH/MPTON SHOALS: "December 16th fog came in at 3:05 a.m., and lifted 7:05 p.m. 1:30 steady fog. Visibility at this time 200 feet."

LCATRAZ LIGHTHOUSE: "Fog signal started at 4:05 a.m. Wind S.S.E. light. Fog settling in thick. Visibility poor. 6 a.m., Fog continues, visibility poor. Wind dropping to calm at 10 a.m. Fog continues from noon on. 1:30 p.m., visibility poor, calm. 2:30 p.m., fog settling, calm. 3 p.m. fog dense. No visibility. From 4 p.m., on fog dissipated gradually until 7:15 p.m. Berkeley shore and gate in the clear. Signal shut down at 7:15 p.m."

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

ALL FIELD DIVISIONS: It is requested that all Field Divisions review the lists of released and transferred prisoners, and institute an immediate investigation to enable their location and interview. These interviews should deal particularly with any knowledge that they may have pertaining to plans which were formulated on the Island relative to this break.

ALL FIELD DIVISIONS are also requested to review the list of visitors and correspondents of prisoners on the Island, as set out herein, and arrange for their immediate interview.

THE LOS ANGELES FIELD DIVISION, at Pomona, California, will investigate the arrest of Subject ROE in that city, on 4/28/23, for any information that may be of assistance in locating this Subject.

THE OKIMHOMA CITY FIELD DIVISION at Enid, Granite, McAlester, Shawnee, Oklahoma City, Muskogee, and Tulsa, Oklahoma, will investigate the previous arrests of Subjects ROE and COLE, for any information that may be of assistance in conducting this investigation.

THE DALLAS FIELD DIVISION at Bonham, Texas, will conduct a similar investigation in so far as Subject ROE is concerned.

Waupun, Wisconsin. He stated that he had been married to JANETTE CALLAND in Phoenix, Arizona, several years ago, but that he had been separated from her for the period of over the past year; that he did not know her present whereabout but when last he had heard of her she was located at 2220 East Van Buren Street. He advised that although separated from her he had not secured a divorce.

GALLAND stated that he had first come to Arizona for his health and that he had worked for a considerable period of time for the Covered Wagon Auto Trailer Company, his superior being VIC BIRNES, who it is recalled is the origins informant who furnished the information that LETHA JONES was supposedly the wife of Subject ROE.

He advised that while working for BYRNES he had been employed as a salesman for the Covered Wagon Trailers. He stated that during the latter part of August of this year he had met LETHA JONES in the Seventh Avenue Restaurant in Phoenix and that following this meeting he had started going with her and shortly afterwards had begun to live with her as man and wife in his trailer which had been parked at 801 West Madison Street. He stated that LETHA received small sums of money from her parents from time to time and that inasmuch as he had been out of work they had had practically nothing to live on. He advised that when he first met LETHA JONES, Vic Byrnes had told him that her husband was doing a long sentence in Alcatraz, but he states that Byrnes did not mention the name of her husband at that time. He advised that upon receiving this information from Byrne he had asked LETHA about this statement of Byrnes, making inquiry of her as to who her husband was and where he was located, and that Letha had replied that her husband was named WILLIAM JONES; that she had been separated from him for several years, and that she did not know where he was then located, but that as far as she knew they had never been divorced.

He advised that following this he had made no further inquiries of her concerning her husband and that she had never at any time intimated to him that her husband was incarcerated in Alcatraz or any other penitentiary, nor that she had ever lived with anyone who had been or was so incarcerated.

GALLAND recalled that after reading in the newspaper about the escape from Alcatraz of RALPH ROE and THEODORE COLE that Byrnes had been present at their trailer, when LETHA JONES may have made the statement, when drinking, that she had a girl friend in Oklahoma who was Roe's sweetheart. Galland stated positively that to his best recollection Letha had never made the statement that she was Roe's wife, nor had she indicated this in any way either to him or to Byrnes as far as he knew.

GALLAND stated that he recalled that VIC BYRNES had visited LETHA JONES and himself at their trailer on Sunday, December 19, 1937, at which time some mention had been made by Byrnes of Ralph Roe's having escaped from Alcatraz, but he stated that at the time Letha Jones and he were interested in opening a package which had just been received from Letha Jones' parents, Dr. and Mrs. J. L. Wharton of Depew, Oklahoma, and he did not pay any attention to the remark at the time and does not recall any reply made by Letha.

GALIAND likewise stated that he recalled that during the last summer on one occasion LETHA had received a letter from a friend from Oklahoma or Texas, advising her of the death of a little girl, but he stated that he did not believe that this girl was Letha's daughter and that Letha had never shown him the letter nor commented on it other than to say that a little girl friend of hers in Oklahoma had died. He stated that she had never made the statement that she, herself, had any children, by Roe or by any other individual, and that he believed her in this regard.

with her regarding other men she had gone with, and he found that she had gone with one E. L. PATRICK, who is now incarcerated in the Arizona State Penitentiary at Florence, but other than atrick he had been unable to secure any other information in this regard.

GALLAND maintained throughout detailed questioning that the above

occasions were the only incidents of any kind or nature whatever where the Alcatraz escape of Subject Roe had ever been mentioned and affirmed it as his conviction that LETHA JONES had no relation whatever to RALPH ROE.

GALIAND was advised of the Federal harboring statute and he promised that in the event he should secure any information regarding Roe or any information indicating that Letha Jones knew Roe, that he would immediately communicate with the Phoenix Office.

Following the above interview with Galkand, Agent interviewed
LETHA JONES at the trailer in which she and LYLE GAKLAND are presently living at

22 South 9th Avenue. Letha advised that she was born February 22, 1915, at Metchen, Oklahoma, her father's name being Olin Campbell and mother, Georgia Campbell. She stated that her mother had married Dr. J. L. Wharton of Depew, Oklahoma, subsequent to the death of her father, Olin Campbell. She advised that she had presently residing in Oklahoma, and a half brother, William Wharton, who is now dead. She advised that she had married one WILLIAM HOLLY JONES at Bristow, Oklahoma, in 1934. She stated that they had never been able to get along and that they had been separated at Bristow.

they had never been able to get along and that they had been separated at Bristow about a month after they were married. She stated that she had never been divorced from Jones as far as she knew, and that she has not seen or heard from him since about a month or two after her marriage to him in 1934.

LETHA JONES stated that when she had been residing in Ketchen, Oklahoma, with her parents prior to her marriage, she had become acquainted with one AIMEE AYNE, who was an operator in the Rowland Beauty Shop in Bristow, Oklahoma. She estimated that it was in approximately 1931 that she first met Aimee Payne as a result of going to the beauty shop for treatments in Bristow. She advised that shortly after WILBUR UNDERHILL had been killed by Federal Agents at Shawnee, Oklahoma, that Aimee Payne had come to her residence and advised that she, Aimee, was going to Seminole, Oklahoma. She stated that Aimee at this time advised her that she was engaged to an Oklahoma boy named RALPH ROE; that Ralph

ROE had been associated with Wilbur Underhill and thatshe did not desire to have two pictures of Roe in her possession in the event that she should be questioned. She stated that Aimee, therefore, turned over to her two pictures of Ralph Roe both of which pictures showed him in a regular business suit and with a hat on. She advised that a few days after Aimee had left these pictures with her that Aimee had returned to her residence in a car in the evening and had returned a dress which she, Letha, had loaned to her. She advised that at this time Aimee had told her that "my sweetheart, Ralph, is out in the car." Letha stated that she got a glimpse of this individual in the car, but that as it was dark she would be unable to furnish a description of him, but understood that this individual was Ralph Roe.

She stated that Aimee then left and advised that she was going to Oklahoma City and that about a week after this she received information from one "Clack" Dickens that Aimee Payne had died in Oklahoma City. She stated that she had gone to Aimee Payne's funeral in Stroud, Oklahoma.

LETHA JONES stated that she had kept the pictures of Ralph Roe in her purse or handbag and that they had been in her purse or handbag when she had gone to McPherson, Kansas, to work in a barbeque stand known as "Andy's Pig Stand", which was operated by Andy Favlo and was located on South Main Street in McPherson, Kansas. She stated that while at this place her purse had been stolen containing the pictures and about \$25.00 in money, and that she had never recovered either the purse or the money.

LETHA JONES advised that prior to the time that she came to Depew, Oklahoma, she had taken care of a small child named Norma Jean Hobbs, inasmuch as Norma Jean lived with Mand and Ed Hobbs directly across the street from her grandmother, Mrs. Doods Pavis, in Ketchen, Oklahoma. She stated that she had become so attached to the little girl that other persons had often referred to Norma Jean Hobbs as her, Letha Jones', little girl, but that as a matter of fact she was no relation to the girl. She stated that she had seen Norma Jean Hobbs in 1931 at Ketchen, Oklahoma, when Norma Jean had been only four or five wears old and that during the past summer she had received a letter from Gladys filom from Ketchen, Oklahoma, wherein she had advised her that Norma Jean Hobbs had died. She admitted that she may have made the statement at that time that, "My little girl has died", but that as stated above, the girl was not actually her child. also stated that she recalled that during the summer of 1937, while she had been drinking in Phoenix with Vic Byrnes and Lyle Galland, she made the statement that she knew a girl in Oklahoma who was a sweetheart of Ralph Roe. She admitted that it was possible that while drunk she might have said that she, Letha Jones, was acquainted with Ralph Roe, but she advised she did not believe she had made such a statement, as the only information she had with regard to Ralph Roe was as a result of Aimee Payne's having advised her that she, Aimee Payne, was the sweetheart of Ralph Roe. She stated that if she made such a statement, she believed that it was that she had told Byrnes that she knew a girl who had a boyfriend in Alcatraz for 99 years. She advised that she had read in the papers that Ralph Roe had been incarcerated in Alcatraz and it had been her belief that the sentence was for 99 years.

She identified a photograph of Roe from a group of pictures shown to her and stated that the photograph of Roe was similar to the photographs which Aimes Payne had given to her to keep, telling her that it was her sweetheart, Ralph Roe, but she stated that this was the only way she would be able to identify the photograph of Roe, inasmuch as she had never seen him other than at a distance and in the dark.

LETHA JONES recalled that on Sunday, December 19, 1937, VIC BYRNES had called at the trailer where she and Lyle Galland were living in connection with collecting a payment due on Galland's car, and that at the time she and Galland were interested in opening a package which had been received from her parents at Depew, Oklahoma. She recalled that Byrnes had made some reference to the fact of Roe's escape from Alcatraz, and she stated that she might have made some reply such as it didn't make any difference to her, but that she did not recall the detail of any such conversation or statement made at that time.

LETHA JONES stated that the only other information she had ever received with regard to Ralph Roe when in Oklahoma was that she remembers reading at one time of Ralph Roe's apprehension following the robbery of a bank at Muskogee, Oklahoma, or that the paper had stated that Ralph Roe had been apprehended in Muskogee, Oklahoma. She stated that she understood that he had been taken to the county jail in Oklahoma City because at that time, which she believed was sometime in 1934 or 1935, she had gone to Seminole, Oklahoma, on a short visit and had stayed at the Sun Rooms. She advised that while at the Sun Rooms she had been drinking and had met a man known as "Tangle Eyes" Hall, who apparently was nicknamed "Tangle Eyes" because of the fact his eyes were crossed. She stated that this individual had made some remark while they had been drinking together at the Sun Rooms about going to Oklahoma City to take some clothes to Ralph Roe, who was supposedly incarcerated in the county jail at Oklahoma City. She stated that she had only stayed at the Sun Rooms for a couple of days and that she had never again seen "Tangle Eyes" Hall. She described "Tangle Eyes" as follows:

LETHA JONES readily admitted that she had gone with E. L. PATRICK in Phoenix on several occasions prior to meeting Lyle Balland and that Patrick is now incarcerated in the Arizona State Penitentiary at Florence.

LETHA JONES was advised of the fugitive status of both Ralph Roe and Theodore Cole and of the provisions of the Federal harboring statute. She continuously maintained that she had no information with reference to the escape of Ralph Roe nor with regard to his associates other than as related hereinabove. She continuously stated that she had never been married to him and that the only statements she had ever made at any time regarding Ralph Roe that she recalled were that she knew a girl (meaning Aimee Payne) who had been Ralph Roe's sweetheart. It should be stated that Letha Jones also admitted that she had been living with Lyle Galland since August, 1937, in Phoenix in his trailer and she confirmed the manner of their meeting as related above by Galland. It should also be stated that she voluntarily mentioned the name of VIC BYRNES and that this name was not suggested to her, indicating that Byrnes had furnished any information to this office. Letha Jones promised her cooperation and that in the event she should receive any information concerning Ralph Roe or Theodore Cole, she would advise the Phoenix Division Office immediately.

It should also be stated in connection with the above interviews that no opportunity was afforded Lyle Galland and Letha Jones to compare their statements at the time of these interviews.

It should be stated that Lyle Galland and Letha Jones are apparently health seekers and are living in what appears to be the utmost poverty in the trailer in the vacant lot in the rear and adjacent to 22 South 9th Avenue. Althoug it does not appear from the above or from the information developed in Oklahoma City, as noted in the report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy dated at Oklahoma City, December 23, 1937, that Letha Jones ever actually knew or associated with Halph Roe, the mail cover previously placed with regard to her will be continued for the period originally requested and any information which may be received as a result thereof will be immediately transmitted to the interested offices.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: Escape of Theodore Cole and Ralph Roe from Alcatraz

Mr. Hanson called from Los Angeles and asked if it is necessary to continue the two surveillances being maintained by his office on Cole's parents at Woodlake, California, and on Cole's sister at Bell, California.

He was advised these surveillances should be continued for a few more days inasmuch as the bodies of the men should be washed in to shore within nine days from their escape, according to information received by the Bureau.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: Escape of Theodore Cole and Ralph Roe from Alcatraz

With reference to the letter from the San Francisco Office forwarding blue prints relative to the escape from Alcatraz, I inquired of \mathbb{G}_r . Pieper at San Francisco if he does not believe the five gallon cans could keep the fugitives afloat. He was advised the laboratory has been requested to check the buoyancy of such a can.

Mr. Pieper indicated even if the fugitives could have bound several cans together, they would not have been able to control them in the heavy seas. He indicated that all the cans are punctured and quite battered before being discarded. It was suggested that the subjects might have soldered the cans in the blacksmith's shop and Mr. Pieper said this is not likely as the guard's attention would have been called to such an unusual operation.

I have at hand your letter of January 3, 1938, in which you advise me that on the night of the escaps of two inmates from Alcatraz Island, Mr. VanTine, the Manager of your Mashington Bureau, communicated with my office requesting the photographs, and was informed that they were not available. It is further noted that the pictures were secured by your service on the Pacific Coast, after some delay, and then transmitted to points about the country by your Soundphoto system.

I am very glad that you wrote me about this matter because no representative of this Eureau was in a position to make available these photographs when requested. The reason for this is that the two men referred to were immates of Alcatraz Island, which is a Federal Fonal institution, under the direct supervision of the Federal Bureau of Prisons, and I am precluded from releasing the photographs of any immates of Federal penitentiaries. Such photographs can only be released by the Director of the Federal Bureau of Prisons. In all instances in which this Bureau has direct jurisdiction we endeavor to make available the photographs of the subjects just as soon as possible because I agree with you that the more widely such photographs are circulated, the greater possibility there is of the persons whose photographs they are, being promptly discovered and thereby apprehended.



The envelope listed as specimen 42, is made of plain white paper containing no watermark and measuring approximately 5 1/3 by 64 inches.

The questioned letter listed as specimen q8 is handprinted with a coft penall in a mixture of upper and lower case letters on a sheet of ruled white tablet paper which contains he matermark and measures approximately 5.0 by 7.8 inches. The paper is ruled with nineteen blue-green lines on the front spaced at an average distance of 0.548 inches apart, the first appearing approximately 1 1/3 inches from the top of the page, and the reverse side centains twenty-two such lines. Specimens we and 45 are similar to specimen 45 with respect to the paper. The envelope listed as specimen QC is made of plain white paper containing no waterwark and measuring approximately 5.2 by 5.5 inches.

In confirmation of the telephonic report made by Mr. Quinn Tenm of the Technical Laboratory to Special Agent in Charge M. J. L. Pieper of the San Francisco Field Division on December 51, 1987, it was noted subsequent to the silver nitrate treatment for fingerprints that an address was developed on the reverse side of the envelope listed so specimen wh. This eddress create "Mr. and Mrs. Vieser Clas-- and Family, 230; Dancon St., San Francisco, Calif.". The characters which are underlined were not sufficiently clear to definitely establish their identity. This address could not be seen perpre treatment with allver nitrate.

It is possible that this address was placed on specimen 42 because it was placed next to an envelope containing this address written in ink, either in the possession of the person who wrote specimen 42, or the address on specimen 42 was transferred thereon from another cavelope during the course of its handling in the mails. Such a transference of the address from one envelope to the other does not include all of the elements present in the ink but only such constituents as for instance hydrochloric soid which reacts chemically with silver nitrate to form a dark coloration.

The script writing appearing on specimens 1 and 48 was compared with the signatures appearing on fingerprint cards of Theodore Cole, I. C. \$1471, and Ralph Ros, I. O. \$1478, but no conclusion was reached because of the limited assume of known handwriting available for comparison. The handprinting appearing on specimens 45, 46, 45 and 46, could of course not be compared with the saript writing appearing on specimens 41 and 48 or with the signatures appearing on the fingerprint cards of these two individuals. In this connection the file was searched for additional known handwriting of these two individuals but none was found.

A report on the fingerprint examination will be submitted separately.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, dated at Oklahoma City December 22, 1937, wherein on page ten an interview with Jake Sims, Chief of Police, Seminole, Oklahoma, is related. It will be noted that Chief of Police Sims stated that Ray "Tang" Hall, an informant of his, who is now confined in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, while residing at Seminole prior to his conviction, kept him, Sims, informed of the activities of various criminals for the reason that every known criminal who came to Seminole got in touch with Hall; that if Hall was "on the ground," and Ralph Roe succeeded in escaping from Alcatraz alive, Roe would contact Hall at some time or other, and Hall would inform him, Sims.

It will also be noted from the report of Special Agent W. R. Ramsey, dated at Phoenix December 29, 1937, that Hall was very close to Roe, as indicated by interview with Lethe Tones, who stated that while she was in Seminole in 1934 or 1935 she made the acquaintance of a man by the name of "Tangle Eyes" Hall, and during a drinking party with Hall he informed her he was going to Oklahoma City to take some clothes to Ralph Roe, who was then confined in the County Jail at Oklahoma City.

Chief of Police Sims has indicated that he is willing to proceed to Leavenworth, Kansas for the purpose of interviewing Hall at the United States Penitentiary to secure any information Hall might be able to furnish

The identification records of the Oklahoma City Police Department reflect that Raymond Henry Hall, FBI-366642, was received at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, on November 20, 1934, irmate #6347, to serve a sentence of five years for violation of the Harrison Narcotic Act. The criminal record and description of Raymond Henry Hall indicates that he is the same person referred to by Chief of Police Sims as his informant, Ray "Tang" Hall.

In view of the fact that Raymond Henry Hall, alias Ray "Tang" Hall, has served the greater part of his five year sentence, the Bureau is requested to consider the advisibility of having Raymond Henry Hall transferred from the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas to the United States Penitentiary at Alcatraz, if agreeable to Hall, for the purpose of having Hall secure information from inmates of Alcatraz Penitentiary concerning the escape of Subjects Roe and Cole. The only thing that can possibly be offered Hall for such services would be the promise of an early parole or conditional release and a suitable monetary reward.

It is not known at this time whether Hall would agree to such a transfer and to act as an informant for the Government; however, it is believed, from information furnished by Chief of Police Sims, that if anyone could get Hall to agree to such a proposition, which would likely be of value to this Bureau and the Bureau of Prisons, Sims could get Hall to cooperate. In view of the fact that Special Agent Frank S. Smith has the confidence of Chief of Police Sims, Seminole, Oklahoma, it is requested that the Bureau authorize the Oklahoma City Division to have Agent Smith drive Chief of Police Sims from Seminole to Leavenworth for the purpose of Sims interviewing his informant, Raymond Henry Hall and ascertaining whether he will entertain the proposition of a transfer from the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth to the United States Penitentiary at Alcatraz for the purpose of acting as an informant. Sims has the utmost confidence in his Informant Hall, and states Hall will furnish him any information he can secure concerning Roe and Cole,

but he does not believe that Hall would furnish an Agent of this Bureau information that he, Sims, can obtain from him.

It will be noted that these reports contain information as to the possible connection of one Floyd Hill with subject Cole in a contemplated escape from Alcatraz Frison.

During the investigation of the instant case subject Cole's mother and stepfather, Mr and Mrs Fred W.Cole, have been contacted on numerous occasions by agents of this office in connection with a surveillance being maintained on their home. When first questioned concerning their knowledge of Floyd Hill and Hugh Eutcher, these individuals stated that they were not acquainted with Hill and did not remember ever having heard of Eutcher, although Mrs Cole stated that she recalled that Floyd Hill had been in the Oklahoma State Prison with her son Ted. Cole

On December 31, 1937, Fred Colé stated that he had that day received a card from Floyd Hill which card was sent from Leavenworth Prison. Fred Cole showed this card to agents and it was noted that the card was an ordinary Christmas card and bore the following handwritten notation: "Please don't worry, Nother, I think he is safe." This card was signed by Floyd Hill. After receiving this information agents again questioned Mrs Cole concerning her knowledge of Floyd Hill and were informed by her that Hill had been a very close friend of Thesdore Tole while they were confined together in the prison at McAllister and that the two boys had made a pen set and sent it to her for a Christmas present several years age. She denied, however, that she had communicated with Floyd Hill, although it was pointed out to her that the card bore her correct address in Woodlake, California, which address she did not have at the time that her son was incarcerated with Floyd Hill. Neither Mr nor Mrs Cole could offer any explanation as to how Hill obtained this address.

You are further suthorized to conduct such investigation as may be indicated of any other esployees stationed at the United States Ponitontiary, Aleatres Island, California. The Bureau should, however, be telegraphically educated of the cames of any other employees in-|vestigated, of oir our that case which indicate the advisability of such investigations, and of all developments in connection therewith.

Dear Sir:

Please be advised that in a conference with Warden Johnston in which he freely discussed the subject of the possible guards or employees that might be suspected of being implicated in the escape of COLE and ROE, the following information was furnished by the Warden to me:

He stated that he had given serious consideration to the integrity and reliability of the men and that the following were the only ones regarding whom he could even think of anything which would indicate they might be involved. They are as follows:

Junior Officer HARRY T. DAVIS, entered on duty April 1, 1937, resides at 2603 Hyde Street, San Francisco. Basis for suggesting DAVIS was that he was a new man and had to be cautioned about familiarity with prisoners.

Junior Officer WALTER E . PETERSON, entered on duty September 3, 1935, address 2605 Hyde St., San Francisco. Basis for questioning PETERSON was that he had heard that PETERSON might be a contact who would unknowingly get some information out to TOM BANKS, purported proprietor of the Hollyhock Night Club, Minneapolis, Minnesota. He stated further that PETERSON was in bad financial straits and that also was a matter which in his mind could not be overlooked at a time such as this. RECORDED

Then there are two laundry employees, CLAUDE E. BILLINGSLEY, who entered on duty September 16, 1935 and resides at 1229 Chestnut Street, San Francisco; and JAMES V. HALSTEAD, who entered on duty September 9, 1935 and resides at 255 Dorland, San Francisco, California. These men are considered doubtful employees because of the need to caution them for familiarity with prisoners.

I realize that the information I am setting out in this letter is fragmentary. I made no immediate effort to go into detail with the Warden when he proffered this information because I felt that the matter should be called to your attention before I made intensive inquiry, since it involved the possible investigation of employees of another Bureau of the Department.

Warden Johnston told me that because of the seriousness of this escape from Alcatraz, he thought we should
know of any doubts in his mind and that he invited us to vigorously question these men and even stated that we could pick
them up if we wanted to specifically for questioning.

I have made no effort to interrogate these men or to evidence in any way that an investigation would be conducted of the personnel of the Island, because I felt that if we begin questioning any men, we certainly will have to question a number of individuals and check on their backgrounds, who may have in any way been connected with these prisoners or near the vicinity where the escape was perpetrated.

I shall take no action following this up until specifically advised by you as to what course you desire meto take regarding the interrogation of any questioned employees or investigation concerning them.

I would like to point out to you that the publicity concerning the escape has died down and the papers are looking for some matter with which to again play the story of the escape, and in the beginning there was possible intimation

that investigation might be conducted as to the reliability and integrity of the guards which has not been mentioned since, and although I am confident that no publicity will emanate from any source under our control, yet possibly an employee who is questioned who may feel himself unjustifiably suspected, may make some statement which will cause the press to immediately make a story out of the fact that the "G-Men" are now investigating the Island personnel. I believe that this should be considered before a decision is made.

could not be positive, he felt sure that he had seen LaVoy around the house.

Mrs. Mancy Jones, wife of Earl Jones, confirmed the information given by her husband and stated to the time that it was her recollection she was in the city of Seattle on the 15th of the month and that she obtained a ride home with Mr. and Mrs. EaVoy.

These parties were again contacted the next day, at which time Mrs. Jones stated that she definitely recalled that on the morning of December 13th she had talked to LaVoy and that on the 14th Mrs. LaVoy had requested the person delivering eggs in that neighborhood to take her to town. Upon leaving, Mr. LaVoy came over to the store and said "Goodbye" to his wife and remained at the store for a few moments discussing the general questions of the neighborhood. Mrs. Jones further advised that as she recalled, LaVoy assisted her husbend in unloading the produce which she had obtained from Seattle markets on the afternoon of December 16, 1957. She could not, however, definitely place LaVoy at home on the 15th of the month although it was her opinion that he was. With respect to her statement the preceding day that she had obtained a ride home with Mr. and Mrs. LaVoy from Seattle, Mashington, she advised this trip had occurred the preceding Mednesday, December 8, 1957.

Mr. Jones, upon his return to the store, stated that his wife had mentioned to him the evening before the trip of Mrs. LaVoy to Seattle on the 14th and the fact that LaVoy had come over to the store to say "Goodbye" to her, which incident he definitely recalled. Mr. Jones also confirmed the information given as to the assistance rendered by LaVoy in unloading the produce brought from Seattle on the 16th of December.

In. If crant, who runs a service station at this point, advised that while he believed IaVoy was around his home during the week of the 15th or December, he was not in a position to advise specifically as to the dates on which he noticed him.

Mrs. R. Ellington, who obtains her milk from the LeVoys, and customarily goes to their place to get same, stated that quite often she would obtain her milk each day for a period of over a week without seeing Mr. or Mrs. LeVoy, as the milk was placed in a shed from which she took same. She was not in a position to specifically state whether Mr. Levoy was around his hope on the 14th, 15th or 16th of the month.

Mr. Indrew Swanston advised that he was positive LaVoy was at home around noon of the 16th of December as he recalled that he came down to his place from the garage about 11:00 m. M. to obtain some eggs. In this connection, Mr. Swanston produced a memorandum book which reflected the sale of eggs to Mr. LaVoy on that date. With reference to the preceding days, Mr. Swanston stated that he had no definite recollection of

observing Mr. Lavoy around his home.

Mrs. L. Bush informed that I'r. LaVoy had dropped in at their home a couple of times during the week of December 12th but that she could not undertake to advice specifically as to the dates of the visits. It was her recollection that Mr. LaVoy was around home during the week, but upon inquiry she could not advise definitely as to the dates on which she observed him working in his yard.

Fictures of Richard Galatas submitted by the Fortland Field Office were shown to each of the above parties but they could not identify any of the visitors to LaVoy's home as resembling this party.

Ir. William Cupitt, a retired Seattle firemen who presently resides at Des Moines, Washington, advised that during the past several months he had been laid up with neuritis and had not been able to get around the neighborhood. For that reason Mr. Cupitt was not familiar with recent happenings and could not be of assistance.

At Conttle, Unshington

On the evening of Docomber 18, 1937 Special Agent in Charge C. C. Spears, Fortland Field Office, telephonically advised Special Agent in Charge R. C. Suran that on December 15, 1937 an unknown individual appeared at the United States Lightship Service, Portland, Oregon and requested information concerning a tide book, with particular interest in the tides in San Francisco Bay. Inquiry was made concerning the two currents said to run in the vicinity of Alcatraz Island. He was furnished with certain information and also advised as to where he could purchase a tide book. Mr. Spears further stated that they had been unable to determine whether this individual had purchased a tide book, but the officials at the United States Tide Service had tentatively identified the individual as Dick Galatas who had made the inquiries. Mr. Spears called attention to the fact that Galatas was recently released from Ilcatraz Fenitentiary.

If. Igears further advised that the Director had instructed that the airport at Seattle, Lashington be checked for two or three trips prior to December 15, 1937 to determine the identity of the passenger who may have made a trip to Fortland, Oregon or San Francisco, California. Special Agent T. S. Ferguson ascertained from the officials of the United Airlines at Boeing Field, King County, Lashington, that the following persons were passengers to the aforementioned cities on December 12, 13, 14 and 15, 1937.

At the New Mashington Hotel, Mr. Barl Redlin and Mr. Robert Bernard, clerks, were interviewed concerning the identity of Dr. V. G. Du Fuy. It will be noted in this connection that the last name of this party, as set forth in the communication of December 22 of the Seattle Field Office to the Fortland Office, is spelled Du Fry. This spelling was stated to be correct by informants at the United Airlines; however, Mr. Redlin produced the records which reflected that the correct spelling is as first given.

According to the hotel records, Dr. Du Puy stayed at the New Mashington Hotel from December 10 to December 12 with one L. L. Kraft. At the time the Doctor had requested that a draft in the amount of \$200.00 on a bank which was unknown to Mr. Redlin and Mr. Bernard, be cashed. In lieu of accepting a draft in that amount Mr. Redlin advised that the Doctor was permitted to leave the hotel with the understanding that he would remit for the amount of his bill.

Through the telephone calls made by these parties it was ascertained that they communicated with one Dankkraft, 1518 King Street. Upon being interviewed Mr./Kraft stated that he had heard of Dr. Du Puy through his brother, L. L. Kraft, but that he was not femiliar with him nor his past activities. It was his understanding that the Doctor had been working in Alaska.

In the latter connection it is desired to point out that upon registering at the New Wachington Motel, Dr. Du Puy stated that he was from Iniak. Alaska and gave his address as Inglewood, California.

Subsequently, Mr. M. Thatcher, Assistant Manager, New Mashington Motel, contacted the reporting agent by telephone and advised that he had further information concerning this party. At the hotel, Mr. Thatcher produced a communication from Dr. V. G. Du Fuy dated December 20, 1937 with a return address 608 Mast Redondo, Inglewood, California, in which the Doctor enclosed a remittence covering his account and requested that certain articles left at the hotel be forwarded promptly as he was leaving for South America on January 1, 1938. Information as to the address of the Doctor was submitted to the Los Angeles Field Office by teletype

on December 23, 1937 with the request that they conduct appropriate investigation to determine the identity of this party.

Mr. J. L. Spaeth, Standard Oil Company, 9th Floor, Exchange Building, informed that J. A. Blanchard was District Sales Manager for that company and worked out of their office in San Francisco, California. Mr. Spaeth stated that Blanchard had been with the company, to his knowledge, for a period of fifteen to twenty years.

Mr. Marl Redlin, clerk at the New Mashington Hotel, was likewise contacted as to the identity of Fric Felch. The stayed at the hotel from December 8 to December 12. The registration card signed by Welch reflected that his home was in Bergen, Morway. No further information concerning this party was available at the hotel. Mr. Redlin stated that Wolch did not appear to have any definite business connections although a few people had come to see him. He described Wolch as being 160 pounds in weight, 5' 8" in height, ruddy complexioned, and as having a definite Swedish accent, blond hair and blue eyes. From the telephone calls made by this party it was ascertained that he communicated with one H. B. Friele, 457 22nd Avenue North. Mrs Friele, upon being interviewed, stated that welch was known to her through her husband and that she had met him while he was here on a trip, during which time he stayed about four days. She stated that she knew that his home was in Bergen, Norway and that it was her understanding that he was connected with the International F int Company.

Dr. R. ... Mullarky, 420 Stimson Building, was contacted and he informed that he had taken the trip to Can Francisco on December 12th, 1937. Dr. Mullarky, upon being shown the pictures of Galatas, was unable to identify him as one of his fellow passengers. Furthermore, the Doctor stated that he had had no occasion to contact the United States Lightship Corvice at Fortland.

In. C. J'AHolahan, clerk, Gowman Motel, advised that Sen Fish had stopped at the hotel from December 2 to December 12 and that on the registration card he gave his home as Leverly Hills, California. Mr. Molahan stated that Fish customarily stopped at the hotel a couple of times a year; that it was his understanding that he had some "tie-up" with the moving picture industry. Mr. Holahan described Fish as being 40 years to 50 years of age, 5' 10" in height, weight approximately 190 pounds, dark complexion, dressed neatly and appeared to be Jewish.

Mr. P. W. Bass was interviewed at the Imerican Can Company, Vine and Elliott Streets, where it was ascertained that he was employed as district lithograph mechanic. Mr. Bass stated that he had made the trip to Can Truncisco due to sickness in the family and that as a result of same he had paid very little attention to his fellow passengers. For clast reason he would not undertake to advise whether any of his fellow passengers resembled Galatas.

Mr. L. Fritzinger, Clerk, Camlin Hotel, advised that Robert Gordon and A. J. McCabe had stayed there from December 2 to December 13 and that upon leaving, McCabe had given a forwarding address of the Yellow Cab Company, Los Angeles, California. Mr. Fritzinger informed that he was not familiar with the business connections of these two parties but they appeared to be associated in a mutaul enterprise. He further informed that the two men had stayed at the hotel about three years ago at the time they were indicted in Los Angeles for a violation which he thought concerned the sale of stock and they were subsequently removed to that point. The description of Mr. McCabe as obtained from Mr. Fritzinger, and also of Robert Gordon, as obtained from same source, follows:

H. E. True, Deputy Auditor, King County, advised that Robert A. Morris was the Chief Deputy County Auditor for King County and that he had served in that capacity for approximately six weeks; prior to that time Mr. True stated that Morris had been associated with Spaulding and Company. With reference to the airplane trip, True stated that Morris was out of the city last week and that he understood he went by plane for the purpose of refereeing some sort of basketball or football game. In this latter connection he stated that Morris spent a great deal of his time acting in the capacity of a referee.

Miss Helen Dean, Secretary, The Imperial Candy Company, 800 Western Avenue, stated that Robert Wilson was in the city of Seattle during the week of December 12th; that he had left by plane for Portland, where he is the owner and operator of Sweetarts, Incorporated, 328 N. E. Failing Street, Portland. Miss Dean stated that Mr. Wilson was back and forth between Portland and Seattle quite often and that he customarily used the plane for his trips.

At the Sherman Clay Company, 1624 4th Avenue, it was ascertained that D. G. McCormack is the General Manager of the company, which has

stores in Fortland, Seattle, San Francisco, Sacramento and other points on the Facific Coast. A picture of Mr. McCormack was shown to agent, from which it was noted that he had no resemblance what-soever to Galatas. Furthermore, it was stated at the time that Mr. McCorrack had been with the company for approximately four years and that due to the localities of their stores he frequently had occasion to make trips to various parts of the Mest.

Mr. W. M. Thitcomb, according to information given by liss M. Olund, the secretary who at the time was located in Room 809 of the Securities Building, stated that he was the assistant manager of the mortgage loan department of the New York Life Insurance Company and that to her knowledge had been affiliated with the company for a number of lears. Lies Olund advised that at the time of the interview Mr. Whitcomb was in Tacoma, Mashington on company business and that in that connection he quite frequently had occasion to travel.

Mr. Carl Holbrook, clerk, Olympic Hotel, advised that Henry A. White had stayed at that hotel from Docember 5 to December 7, from December 9 to December 14 and also from Rovember 30 to December 2. Mr. Holbrook, however, was not familiar with Mr. Thite's business affiliations. Missl. Paddock, cashier at the Olympic Hotel, checked her records, from which she ascertained that Mr. White's home was either 5127 or 3127 North East 19th Avenue, Fortland, Oregon. Missled that White had been coming to the hotel since 1932 although she could not advise as to his business affiliations. Weither Miss Faddock nor Mr. Molbrook felt that they could undertake to describe white with any degree of accurateness.

Miss C. Simon, secretary to Mr. E. B. Leber, 4134 Arcade Building, stated that Mr. Jeber was the national secretary of the International Moodworkers' Union of America. She further advised that Mr. Leber had had occasion to travel to Fortland, Oregon either on December 13th or December 14th.

Miss II. Movely, secretary, New Universal Fictures, 2401 Second Iwenue, stated that C. M. Jacoby was the traveling auditor for the company and that he had served in that capacity for over seven years. The further savised that, as suggested by his title, he had occasion to make frequent trips and that to her knowledge he quite often used the plane. In this connection she advised that Mr. Jacoby had left for Fortland about the middle of last week, or the week of December 18th, 1937.

Miss Mr. Gray, secretary to Mr. Robert D. Seeley, who, she stated, was president of the Puget Sound Associated Mills Company, stated that he had been affiliated with that organization for over ten years. This interview was consumented at the offices of the Tuget Sound Associated Mills Company, Room 1010, 1411 Fourth Avenue Building. Miss Gray could not advise as to the reason for Mr. Seeley's trip to Fortland but she

stated that it was her understanding that it was a business trip.

Fig. 7. J. McKenzie has offices at the Sears Roebuck Company, Scattle, Jashington and upon being interviewed stated that he was a buyer for the company and served in that capacity for several years. In addition the advised that he had been with the company over a period of fifteen years. In McKenzie informed that his trip to Fortland was of a business nature and that he did not have occasion to make any visit to the United States Lightship Jervice. Upon being shown the picture of Calatas he was unable to identify this party as a fellow passenger.

In. M. M. Gould, Jr., who is with the firm of Gould & Gould, Inc., Insurance Drokers, 925 Dexter Horton Duilding, likewise informed that his trip to Portland during the week of December 14th was in furtherance of his business and that on that occasion he had not contacted the United States Lightship Service. Mr. Gould was unable to identify any of his follow passengers as resembling Golatas.

Ar. James M. McConchey of the firm of Berrow, Wade and Buthric, Accountants and Auditors, Room 527 Henry Building, stated that Mr. Clear W. Collins was in the city during the week of Dedember 12th, at which time he had stayed at the Mashington Athletic Club as his, Mr. McConchey's guest. Mr. McConchey stated further that Collins' trip to Deattle was occasioned by virtue of his activities as president of the American Institute of Accountants. In addition to serving as president of that institution, Mr. McConchey further informed that Collins was also a member of the faculty of the University of Denver. Mr. McConchey advised that Collins had left by plane for Foise, Idaho on the 14th or 15th of December.

Fr. McGill, Pierce County Airport, Tacoma, Jashington, was contacted and he advised that on a trip to Fortland on December 14th. on N. F. Olson had boarded the plane at Tacoma. He stated that ir. Olson's phono number was Broadway 1155. At the telephone company it was ascertained that this number served the Coast Sash and Door Company, 1002 East F Street, Tacoma , Washington. At that company Mr. W. Olson stated that he had left Tacoma last week for Jan Francisco but that the plane had been stopped at an emergency field in Fortland and that he had been required to take the train the remainder of the journey. Mr. Olson stated that he thought that the agent for the airlines company at Tacoma had misundorstood him in taking his name as "M. B. Olsen". ir. Olson stated that he had had no occasion to stop in Fortland other than to get the train on to Scattle. He further informed that he could not identify any of his fellow passengers as resembling Calatas, and on the contrary he felt quite positive that they were not identical with him.

Hiss Dorothy Green was interviewed at the office of the vice-president and treasurer of the General Insurance Company of A arica in the General Insurance Building, 45th and Brooklyn, and she stated at the time that Ralph H. Baldwin served in the aforementioned capacity

and that he had been connected with the company for approximately ten years. She stated that ir. Saldwin's recent trip to San Francisco had been in connection with company business.

- Loc O. Cox, 702 Lloyd Building, Scattle, Washington, upon interview, presented a card which reflected that he was District Manager of the Morge Division of the Borg Marner Corporation and that he had so served for a period of five years. He advised that his trip by plane to Portland on December 14th had been in connection with his business and that at the time he had not had any occasion to contact the officers of the U.S. Lightship Service. Mr. Cox likewise was unable to identify Calatas as being a fellow passenger on the plane.
- Mr. L. R. Ence, Assistant Manager, Coon Chicken Inn, stated that M. L. Grahen was the owner of the im and had been operating the business over a period of seven years. He stated that Mr. Grahem had made a trip to Fortland during the last week but that he was not aware as to its purpose. In this connection it is desired to point out that Mr. Grahem was also a passenger from Scattle to Fortland on December 15th.
- At the Unshington Athletic Club, Miss Schostek advised that P. A. Musgrave is a match-maker for wrestling bouts in Scattle and that Vincent Lopez was a prostler. Miss Schostek stated that it was her recollection that Musgrave and Lopez had gone to Fortland on the preceding Jednesday.
- In. D. Medlin, Clerk, Olympic Hotel and Mics Faddock, Cashier, were unable to furnish information concerning M. M. Moore other than to state that upon registering he had given his home as Algin, Oregon.
- Mr. R. A. Berkefield, 404 National Bank of Commerce Building, advised that M. S. McGrath had stayed at the Mashington Athletic Club as his guest. He further informed that Mr. McGrath was District Manager for Sudden and Christianson and that he had been with the company since about 1925. Ar. Berkefield stated that Mr. McGrath's business offices were located in Fortland.
- F. M. Monruan, a number of Local 435, sign Fainters' Union, Labor Temple, advised that N. P. Nelson is Business Agent for the Sign Fainters' Local Union 428, with offices in 408 Labor Temple, Fortland, Oregon. Mr. Monruan stated that Welson had served in that capacity for several years and further, with reference to the trip on December 15th by plane, he informed that he had taken Kelson to the airport.
- Mr. E. H. Kendall, Fresident, Arrow Transportation Company, Richard Highlands, advised that Jack Cilpatrick was their shop superintendent at their plant, 8826 North Bast Killingsworth, Portland, Crocon. Mr. Kendall stated that Cilpatrick had been to Scattle on company business and that his return by plane was similarly caused.
- Mr. E. A. Izeltine, Clerk, Olympic Hotel, stated that R. R. Kleinschnidt was a Leatheric Forfuse salessan working for A. R. Squibb and Convany, Hotel Drugists. Mr. Azeltine stated that Kleinschnidt

gave his home address as the Olympic Hotel, Seattle, and that on each occasion than he loft the city he furnished an itinerary of his trip. Exeltingfurther stated that he had known Kleinschmidt for powerslycars.

Is the Olympic Lotel, through Miss L. Faddock, Cashier, it was ascertained that J. C. Huntington was affiliated with an organization known as alore Game Birds of America, Incorporated. Miss Faddock could not provide any additional information concerning this party.

Fr. C. Mitchell, Machington State Come Copertment, 1900 Deith Tower building, advised that while he was familiar with the organization Fore Camp Birds of Imerica, Inc., which he understood was backed by various wealthy persons in the East who were nationally prominent, he could not give any specific information concerning J. C. Muntington. and suggested in that connection that Mr. R. Stewart be contacted. Mr. Stewart, 815 East Tille Street, showed certain literature issued by that organization which reflected that its main office is 500 5th Livenue, New York City. He edvised, however, that he was not acquainted with Mr. Muntington and suggested that if anyone in the city knew him that person would be Cliff Horrison, Uports Editor of the Star, a Leattle newspaper. In. Morrison advised that J. C. Huntington had contacted him during his recent stay in the city with reference to the organization of a state unit of the aforementioned corporation, which matter bad been placed under may a couple of years before. . ir. / brrison stated that in discussing the plan, Funtington was thoroughly convergent with the organization and work which had already been done and with the correspondence which he had had with the organization during the year.

It is desired to point out that each person interviewed was whom the pictures of Richard Celatas in order to identify either the personant or fellow passengers on the plane trips. This showing, however, failed to produce affirmative results.

Mr. Roy C. Matterson, U. S. Lamigration Service, furnithed the master list of the U. S. Department of Labor, covering passengers corried from Vancouver, B. C. on December 15th and 15th, 1937. The first mentioned list reflects that Ir. Obn Viser, ape 70, male, an increase citizen, whose destination was Downey, California, was a passenger. The second list reflects that John M. Combs, age 45, male, U. S. Citizen, whose destination is New York, and Clifford Urquhart, age 49, male, Canadian citizen, whose destination was Chicago, Illinois for a period of two weeks, were passengers. Both of these lists were signed by Afred P. Smith, who was subsequently contacted, at which time he advised that he could not provide any additional information. With respect to the age of Obn Viser, he stated that this was obtained prior to the time that the plane arrived at Seattle and it was his thought that while it might be absolutely correct, it would probably reflect the age of the passenger as indicated by his appearance.

As no information was available concerning J. C. Myers and L. A. Elsener, the Chicago Field Office was requested to obtain their addresses from the airline tickets held by the main office of the United Airlines at Chicago. This information was communicated promptly to the Seattle Field Office and reflected that J. C. Myers gave an address at the Fortland Motel, Fortland, Cregon, and L. A. Elsener as the Chicago Bridge and Iron Morks, 526 Rialto Building, San Francisco, California. This information was communicated to the Portland and San Francisco Field Offices in order that the appropriate investigation could be conducted.

Upon contacting Mr. McCabe, the whereabouts of Robert Gordon should be ascertained. With respect to each party it is desired that specific attention be given to whether they might have been the persons convacting the United States Lightchip Service at Portland, Oregon on December 15, as set forth in the report of S. A. C. Spears, Portland, Oregon, 12-22-37, a copy of which is furnished to the Los Angeles Office.

The Los angeles Field Office, at Downey, California, will conduct investigation to determine the identity of Oba Viser and ascertain information similar to that above requested.

THE SAN FRANCISCO FIELD OFFICE, at San Francisco, California, will conduct the investigation requested in the telegram of the Seattle Field Office, dated 12-24-37 re L. A. Elsener.

THE FORTH TO LIMED OFFICE, at Fortland, Oregon, will conduct the investigation requested in the telegram of the Seattle Field Office dated 12-24-37 re J. C. Myers.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

ESCAPE FROM ALCATRAZ RE:

Mr. Bennett, Director, Bureau of Prisons, called and asked for the latest information with reference to the escape of Cole and Roe from Alcatraz. He was advised that so far all the leads have been washed up relative to identifications of these men on the west coast. I told him the latest information I have is his memorandum requesting that the four employees at Alcatraz be interviewed, which the San Francisco Office has been requested to do. I told him the San Francisco Office would be telephonically contacted tomorrow to ascertain the latest progress in this search.

Mr. Bennett stated he believes Cole and Roe committed suicide. He indicated Cole is a moron and is incapable of thinking out a plan to escape and while Roe is more than average in intelligence, there is nothing to indicate that he had outside help.

I assured Mr. Bennett that the Bureau is checking every possible lead and has assigned a large force of men to this case.

would be a signal to Cole as to the time and date he could expect Ployd to help him. Butcher advised that he had no further conversation with Ted Cole relative to this matter, and the help that Cole wanted Ployd to render was in his epinion to get a best into Alcetras Island; that Cole did not say what kind of help he wanted Ployd to give him and that Cole did not say anything about guns and assumition. Butcher stated that he did not know who Cole referred to when he mentioned Floyd, and also that he destroyed the note in question a short time after receiving it.

Butcher further stated that a short time efter the above conversation with Cole, a prisoner by the mass of Roy Johnson approached him end asked him to contact some Yriends of the prisoners, who were supposed to live in Miami. Butcher stated that last Jenuary there was a general strike at Alestras in which he did not participate and as a result he incurred the ensity of several of the prisoners who took part in the strike; that because of this ensity he listened to the propositions of Ted Cole and Roy Johnson, and led them to believe that he would do as they had asked him to do, feeling that by so doing he would not get into any trouble with them and that when he was released he would forget all about what they had asked him to do; that he never had any intention of cerrying out the requests of Cole and Johnson, and that in his opinion after Johnson had put the note in his

told them that he, Butcher, was intending to aid some of the prisoners to escape and that if they would search him they would find a note in his pocket and in this way try to win the favor of the officials and some good time.

It would appear from this information that Cole probably expected his mother to assist him, and it is also evident that every effort should be made to ostablish the Agientity of "Floyd," who, it has been indicated, is possibly Floyd Bill, United States Penitentiery, Leevenworth, Kenses, No. 49762. It has, however, never been definitely established that Floyd Hill is the individual knosn as "Floyd."

John and Ruth Barker located Childress, Texas. Investigation reflects Roe and Cole have not been to Barker's residence. Appropriate contacts made in neighborhood and with law enforcement and postal officials. Surveillance maintained during period of investigation entirely without results.

DETAILS:

Based upon a telephone call from the Oklahoma City Office, December 24, 1937, that Theodore Cole's brother-in-law at Stroud, Oklahoma, had informed that he had relatives by the name of Barker at Childress, Texas, Special Agent in Charge F. J. Blake, called Sheriff J. D. Moore of Childress, Texas, by telephone on the morning of December 27, 1937, and was advised by Sheriff Moore that he was acquainted with John and Ruth Barker, who reside in Childress. Agent immediately proceeded to Childress, Texas, and, with the assistance of Sheriff Moore, made an inspection in the vicinity of the Barker residence and determined that it was located at 710 Avenue B, N.W., Childress, Texas, which is approximately three blocks from the Fort Worth & Denver City Railroad roundhouse. It was further determined that the Barkers live with Charlie Peterson, a retired Fort Worth & Denver City Railroad employee, who is approximately 75 years of age and who enjoys a good reputation in Childress; also that Barker is employed as a janitor at the Wood's Pool Hall, 129 Commerce St., Childress, Texas.

The house where the Barkers reside is on the corner of Avenue B and 8th Street, and is undoubtedly the house referred to in the communication from

Oklahoma City Office, in smuch as the Barkers have resided with Peterson for a considerable period of time. Discreet observation made about these premises at intervals of approximately thirty minutes from early morning until late night from December 27 until December 29 resulted in no information of value to this investigation other than that Barker was observed returning to his home the morning of December 28, at which time he appeared to have been drinking, and at other times Peterson was observed in one room of the house.

Inasmuch as this particular location is in a relatively poor section of Childress, considerable difficulty was encountered in securing a reliable informant in the immediate vicinity. Postmaster J. A. Hilborn, Childress, Texas, was very cooperative and queried Letter Carrier Lee, who serves that district. He secured the names of people residing in the immediate vicinity, and in a conference with Sheriff Moore, it was concluded that Jack Taylor, who is the roundhouse foreman for the Fort Worth & Denver City Railroad at Childress, Texas, and who resides at 802 Avenue B, N.W., was the only possible person in the immediate vicinity who might be trusted. Sheriff Moore stated that Taylor had no criminal record, but that the majority of the other people in the vicinity had been arrested, convicted, or were persons of questionable character, or entirely unknown to him.

Postmaster Hilborn further advised that he had on his own volition ordered a cover placed on the mail of the Barkers, and in the event any matter came in which should be given attention, he would immediately report same.

In Company with Sheriff Moore, agent contacted Mr. Taylor at his place of employment, and on viewing the pictures of Roe and Cole, he stated that the photograph of Cole was very familiar and that he had at some time in the past undoubtedly seen that individual; further than that he could not give any information. He stated that he is well acquainted with John and Ruth Barker and that he has known Charlie Peterson for approximately fifty years and is a very good friend of his. Taylor stated that he frequently visits the Peterson residence and only recently saw the doctor enter the Peterson home, and believing that Charlie was ill, he called and talked with Charlie and learned that ing that Charlie was ill. Taylor stated that he went through the house and into the Barker's room and talked with Mrs. Barker and knows that she was ill. He advised that he saw no other individuals about the house at that time and has not seen any strangers about the house in the past month.

Mr. Taylor stated that Peterson is a law-abiding citizen, but that he is quite friendly with the Barkers, and Taylor doubts if it would be advisable to contact him, as he doubted that Peterson would be of assistance in the case; further, that he is an extremely old man, and the Barkers could bring individuals into the house without Peterson's ever knowing it.

Mr. Taylor stated that he did not desire his name to be mentioned in connection with the case, but that in the event he could secure any information, he would immediately call Sheriff Moore in order that appropriate action might be taken. He further advised that he would talk to his wife, and without disclosing the exact purpose, have her advise him in the event any individuals were seen at the Peterson home who do not belong there.

Through a check of the telephone directory and a call to Information, it was determined that the Barkers and Peterson have no telephone; and by personal observation and inquiry, it was likewise determined that they do not have an automobile. It is the opinion of Sheriff Moore that Barker makes very little money in his present employment; that he drinks comparatively heavily; and that Peterson, possibly related distantly to them by marriage, is furnishing them their home, in order to have the premises kept up, and he is probably also feeding them.

Sheriff Moore advised that he had no recollection whatever of ever having seen Subject Cole or Subject Roe about the City of Childress, and that he is in a position to pass the Barker residence as often as he sees fit, as it is well known that some bootleggers live in the vicinity and he is frequently going to those places. He stated that at every possible opportunity he would make observations about the Barker residence to determine if any strangers were there. In connection with this matter, it might be stated that Sheriff Moore is known to the Dallas Office as an efficient and honest officer, and his complete cooperation may be assured.

Highway Patrolman George C. Pearce, who has worked at Childress for a number of months, resides at 107 Sixth Street, N.W., which is approximately two blocks from the Barker residence. He was shown photographs of Roe and Cole and stated they were unknown to him. He stated that he probably passed the Barker residence as many as ten times a day, and that in the future he would he would make observations to determine if any strangers came to the house. In this connection both he and Sheriff Moore were cautioned as to the characters of these individuals and advised to notify the Dallas Field Division immediately in the event any persons of their descriptions showed up at the Barker residence. Both promised to comply with this request.

With reference to establishing a plant on the residence of the Barkers, as previously indicated, this house is located in a bad section of Childress, and it would be practically impossible to maintain a successful plant where the house could be observed, inasmuch as the usual residents are known to each other in that vicinity. Owing to the Pack of appropriate contacts dureing the period of this investigation, the observations about the premises were made from a moving automobile.

The facts above stated with reference to the contact with Jack Taylor were telephonically communicated to Mr. Tamm of the Bureau on December 29, 1937, who authorized the arrangement at Childress.

In connection with the other leads set out for Childress, they had not been received at the time the investigation was conducted.

Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, on November 1, 1937, and presently resides at 18 Dell Street, Hot Springs, Arkansas.





At the auto license bureau, King County Court House, Besttley, Mashington it was ascertained that the aforementioned plates were issued to John R. Malsh, 526 Mission Street, c/o Holeproof Hosiery Company, San Francisco, California.

A Packard sedan carrying 1938 Hashington license plates #A 40-165 was registered as entering Dunsmuir, California, Station #7 on December 15, 1937. In the list submitted with the letter of reference, the plates were designated as being issued during 1937. It was determined that 1937 plates by that number were issued against an Oldsmobile sedan to Nathan H. Dassel, 1519-12th Avenue. Subsequently at the above designated office in the King County Court House, it was determined that the 1938 plates, number A 40-165 were issued for a Packard sadan to G. B. Cederholm, Colman Building, Sesttle, Washington. At the Colman Building, Mr. A. W. Wittig, Secretary and General Manager, Shepphard Point Packing Company, Room 627 advised that Mr. Cederholm was superintendent of both of their plants in Aleska. That about the 14th of December he left for his annual trip to California stopping first at San Francisco. It was stated that several of his backelor friends maintain a home at 736 Ashbury Street. San Francisco, and that they would have knowledge of the hotel at which he was stopping. Mr. Wittig suggested that Coderholm would proceed to San Diego but could give no information as to where he night stay.

It is requested that investigation be conducted to determine the identity of John R. Welsh; and that inquiry be made of both Felsh and Cederholm whether either purchased the tide and current booklets mentioned in the letter of reference.

DETAILS:

AT ROGERS, ARKANSAS

Prior to the receipt of other information relative to Cole's acquaintances at Alpena Pass, Arkansas, Chief of Police Pat Reddick and Officer Frank Jacobs of the Rogers Police Department advised Agent that the wife of Theodore Cole is a prostitute known as "Alpena Marie". These officers stated that Marie Cole had been arrested for drunkenness on one occasion, but was not

fingerprinted. They also advised that she spends much of her time in Joplin and Springfield, Missouri, as well as at Alpena Pass, Arkansas,

AT HARRISON, ARKANSAS

Sheriff Ernest Rogers and Arkansas State Police Officer Owen Fudge related that immediately after press reports appeared of the escape of Theodore Cole from Alcatraz Penitentiary, they had begun to conduct intermittent surveillance at the home of Mrs. Marie Cole, Alpena Pass, Arkansas, and had established as a source of information one Ed White, a neighbor of Mrs. Marie Cole. According to Sheriff Rogers, white is himself a petty criminal and as he is looking to Sheriff Rogers for favors, it is believed advisable to contact White only through Rogers, Bogers alse advised that a former Deputy Sheriff, Jim Centers, resides in Alpena Pass and is on the lookout for the appearance of Theodore Cole. These officers verified previous information to the effect that Mrs. Cole foll ws the profession of prostitution at intervals; that she is known as "Alpena Marie", and that she spends considerable time in Springfield and Joplin, Misseuri, and in Pittsburg, Kansas; these efficers will immediately communicate with the Little Rock Field Division in the event they receive any information or rumors concerning Theodore Cole. Neither Sheriff Rogers or Officer Fudge has ever heard of a place known as Trails Inn or Trails End, Arkansas.

In company with Deputy Sheriff Hugh A. Young of Harrison, Arkansas, the following investigation was made at Alpena Pass, Arkansas. Postmaster Mary C. Porter advised that Mrs. Marie Cole, also known as Marie/Wynne, resides with her son, Billie Cole, and her widowed mother, Mrs. J. D. Wynne, in Alpena Pass, Arkansas; they have no street or box address, and all mail is received through General Delivery. The postmaster stated that Mrs. Cole spent considerable time in Joplin, Missouri, Harrison, Arkansas, and Pittsburg, Kansas. A mail cover was placed on all mail received at the residence of Marie Cole on December 28, 1937. A letter is being directed to Mary C. Porter confirming the placing of the above cover. Miss Porter was furnished the telephone number of the Little Rock Field Division and agreed to telephonically

communicate any information which appeared to be of importance in connection with this case. Miss Porter further advised that apparently Mrs. J. D. Wynne and her deceased husband, J. D. Wynne, parents of Marie Wynne Cole, were people of average means and were fairly well regarded in the community and their general reputation was good.

It was observed that the house occupied by Mrs. Marie Cole and her mother is approximately two-tenths of a mile West of the Alpena Pass post office on the South side of Highway # 62. The house is a one story structure of bright yellow stucco. The writer and Deputy Sheriff Young observed the house for sometime and inasmuch as there appeared to be no activity the occupants were contacted.

Mrs. Marie Cole advised that she first met Theodore Cole in February 1929 at which time Cole's parents were operating a small cafe at Alpena Pass. At this time Theodore Cole was seventeen years of age, and Marie Wynne Cole was sixteen. After a courtship of only three weeks Marie married Theodore Cole over the objections of her parents; this marriage took place at Harrison, Arkansas, on March 16, 1929. Immediately thereafter the couple took a wedding trip to Stroud, Oklahema, where they visited Theodore Cole's grandmother who is now deceased. Thereafter they returned to Alpena Pass, Arkansas, and in August, 1929, Marie Cole left her husband and returned to her parent's home. Shortly thereafter Theedere Cole went to Oklahoma, stole an automobile and came back in it to Alpena Pass where he called on his estranged wife; shortly thereafter Cole was apprehended in possession of this stolen automobile and was given a term in the Arkansas State Penitentiary, While incarcerated in the Arkansas State Penitentiary, late in the year 1929 Mrs. Cole saw Theodore Cole for the last time to date. She stated that officers while passing through Alpena Pass allowed Theodore Vole to visit her for a few minutes.

Mrs. Marie Cole further advised she corresponded regularly with Theodore Cole during his incarceration in the Arkansas State Penitentiary, and while he was in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAbster, Oklahoma.

Relative to the death sentence given to Coke in connection with the Oklahoma case, Marie Cole related that it is her understanding the reason for this death sentencewas that Theodore Cole stabbed a cell mate to death while awaiting

trial on charges of robbery. In was born to Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Cole. This child, who has never been seen by Theodore Cole, is named is presently and has at all times resided with since his birth. Mrs. Cole advised that she had not heard directly from Theodore Cole since he was removed from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAlester; that approximately three years ago she had a letter from the warden of the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, requesting certain personal data. This, according to Mrs. Cole, was the last indirect information concerning her husband she had received until she read of his escape from the Alcatraz Penitentiary. Mrs. Cole stated that she divorced Theodore Cole several years ago, and she stated she had incurred the animosity of her ex-husband when she refused to circulate a petition to have him freed from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary. Mrs. Esther/Cole, mother of the fugitive, came to Mrs. Marie Cole and requested her to circulate a petition for Cole's release from the McAlester Penitentiary, and also to go with her to the Governor of Oklahoma in an effort to secure Cole's release. When Marie Cole declined to do this, Mrs. Esther Cole became highly infuriated, and thereafter Mrs. Marie Cole had no further correspondence with Ted Cole. Concerning contacts which might be made by subject Cole, Mrs. Cole related that she and her immediate family are the only persons outside of Cole's relatives whom he might contact that are known to her. She related that Theodore's mother, Mrs. Esther Cole, presently residing in Los Angeles, California, or vicinity, is the most likely contact of the escape. She also related that Mrs. Violet Dawson, a sister of Theodore Cole, who resides in Huntington Park, California, is a possible contact, and that Cole is reported to have a sister residing in Stroud, Oklahoma, her name being unknown to Mrs. Cole. Mrs. Cole advised that due to the fact that she associated directly with her ex-husband for only approximately six months, and the fact that she had not taken any particular interest in his family, she knew little concerning his relatives or his connections.

Concerning her own family Mrs. Cole related that she resides with her mother. Mrs. J. D. Wynne, her niece, Lavon Jenkins, and that they are the only occupants of this house at Alpena Pass, Arkansas. She stated that at the present time her sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. H. E. (Bes) Vail of Saint Louis, Misseuri, were visiting in her home. She stated she also has a sister,

Mrs. John (Norine) Schultz, who resides at 204 East 7th Street, Pittsburg, Kansas. Agent jointly interviewed Mrs. Marie Cole, Lavon Jenkins, Mrs. J. D. Wynne and Mrs. and Mrs. H. E. Vail; none of the other persons could add anything of value to the information furnished by Mrs. Cole. Each of them was advised of the provisions and penalties of the harboring statute; each of them stated they understood thoroughly the meaning thereof, and each agreed to cooperate with the Federal Bureau of Investigation in its efforts to effect the apprehension of Theodore Cole. All of these persons, including Mrs. Marie Cole, expressed a very definite fear of Cole, and it is believed that fear would be the enly cause for their not cooperating in the apprehension of Cole.

Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Vail are both employed by the Walk Easy Shoe Company of Saint Louis, Missouri, and they spend their entire time traveling for this agency, having no more permanent address than the Walk Easy Shoe Company, Saint Louis, Missouri, and are presently enroute to Florida, and they will cover that state for their concern during this winter. It was noted that Vail is driving a 1938 Plymouth Tudor Sedan, black in color, with Kansas 1937 license plates # 4-481.

Mrs. Cole was furnished the address and telephone number of the Little Rock Field Division with the request that she communicate immediately any information or rumors concerning her former husband; this, she and each member of her family agreed to do.

On Highway # 62 in the vicinity of Alpena
Pass, Arkansas, Agent several times noted an old model Pontiac
or Oldsmobile Sedan, occupied by three men bearing California
1937 license plates # 8 L 5239. Due to a heavy fog and the
fact that Agent was alone in the car only a very limited
opportunity of observing these three individuals presented
itself. This was the only automobile with foreign licenses
other than that of Vail which was observed in the vicinity
of Alpena Pass, Arkansas.

AT EUREKA SPRINGS, ARKANSAS

Chief of Police Dan Martin, Eureka Springs Pelice Department, advised that he is well acquainted with Theodore

Cole, having assisted in this individuals apprehension near Dureka Springs in 1929, subsequent to which Cole was sentenced to the Arkansas State Penitentiary. Chief Martin advised that he would immediately communicate with the Little Rock Field Division in the event he receives any information. Martin is also well acquainted with Mrs. Marie Cole as "Alpena Marie" and stated that he would observe any activities of hers in the vicinity of Eureka Springs.

A check of the postal guide, atlas, all available maps, and with Paul Baker, Arkansas State Highway Department, Harrison, Arkansas, and Cline Watson, Federal Land Bank, both of the latter two gentlemen being engaged in traveling through fifteen counties between Faulkner County and Boone County, Arkansas, disclosed no information concerning a Trails Inn or Trails End, either as a post office, road house, or in any other connection.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. P. Barber at Hot Springs, Arkansas:

It was ascertained from Mr. S. A. Kemp, Postmaster, that Mr. and Mrs. Paul/Patton live in the first house on the right hand side of the highway, South of the Oaklawn Race Track in Hot Springs. Mr. Kemp was unable to furnish any definite information concerning Mr. Patton or his wife, other than informing that Paul Patton had resided at Hot Springs, Arkansas, most of his life, and was employed by his cousin, a contractor, part of the time. He stated that as far as he knew Mr. Patton bore a good reputation but that he was in financial difficulties, and felt that there was some possibility he might offer shelter to criminals for money.

Mr. Kemp advised that Fred Wix, the operator of an Esso Gasoline Service Station, located directly across the highway from the Patten home bore a very good reputation and might be contacted for the purpose of soliciting his cooperation in maintaining a surveillence of the Patton home.

Mr. Wix, upon interview, advised that Patton's wife was presently spending the Christmas vacation with her relatives at Ardmore and Mansville, Oklahoma, having driven there with a wealthy woman by the name of Mrs. Jones, who

ownes a summer home on Lake Hamilton, which is located near Hot Springs, Arkansas. He further informed that Mr. Petten was employed by his cousin, Ernest Patton, a contractor, from time to time. He stated that he did not believe Patton had any steady source of income, and that he was in finincial difficulties at the present time. He also informed that Patton was presently keeping several race track followers at his home. Upon viewing the pictures of subjects as contained on their identification orders, he was unable to recognize them as being anyone whom he might have seen about the Patton home during the past several weeks. Mr. Wix was furnished with a copy of the identification order of each of these subjects, and his cooperation was secured to immediately communicate with the Little Rock Office in the event he observed any one at the Patton home who might answer the description of these subjects.

It was ascertained through an interview with Faul Patton at his home that he was not aware of the fact that his wife was acquainted with subject Ralph Roe; stating that his wife, if she was acquainted with this individual, had never confided that fact to him. He informed that his wife is presently spending the Christmas vacation with her parents at Mansville, Oklahoma. He informed that she had accompanied Mrs. Avery Jones to Ada, Oklahoma, in her, Mrs. Jones, automobile, and that she would return to her home shortly after January 1, 1938. Mr. Patton was furnished with copies of identification orders of both of these subjects and assured Agent that he would immediately communicate with the Little Rock Office in the event either of these individuals appeared at his home. He was also advised of the harboring statute relative to the harboring of fugitives.

Mr. Patton also advised that he would immediately communicate with the Little Rock Office by telephone upon the return of his wife from Mansville, Oklahoma, in order that she might be interviewed upon her arrival to obtain any information she might possess regarding subject Ralph Roc. Immediate steps will be made to interview Mrs. Patton upon her return to Hot Springs, Arkansas, and a lead is not being set forth for the Oklahoma City Office to locate and interview her at Mansville, Oklahoma, in view of the information to the effect that her return is expected to Hot Springs in the immediate future.

It was ascertained from the Automobile License Division, Department of Revenue, State Capitol Building, Little Rock, Arkansas, that 1937 Arkansas license plate # 58480 was issued to Mrs. E. B. (Calatus, 18 Dell Street, Hot Springs, Arkansas, for a 1935 Plymouth automobile.

It is noted that apparently the name Galatus is misspelled, and as a matter of fact it should be Galatas, as 18 Dell Street is the address of Richard Galatas.

The Galatas home has been under almost constant surveillance up through December 30, 1937, and it was noted that neither Mr. or Mrs. Galatas have returned to their home to date, nor could any information be developed through discreet inquiry in the neighborhood as to their exact whereabouts. Steps will be made to establish a confidential informant in the vicinity of the Galatas home in order that this office may be advised as to the activities of these individuals, and to also be immediately notified if any strangers appeared at the Galatas home who might resemble the subjects of this case.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE SAN FRANCISCO OFFICE will theck California 1937 license plates # 8 L 5239, in an endeavor to ascertain if these plates may have been used by the subjects of this case.

THE LITTIE ROCK OFFICE will report the result of a mail cover on the home of Mrs. Marie Cole, Alena Pass, Arkansas.

At Hot Springs, Arkansas, will immediately interview Mrs. Paul Patton upon receiving word that she has returned from Mansville, Oklahoma, in accordance with the lead set forth in the report of reference of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, Oklahoma City, dated December 22, 931.

At Hot Springs, Arkansas, will mentain a discreet surveillance of the Galatas home, 18 Del Street, and will also endeavor to obtain the cooperation of ome informant in that vicinity to maintain a surveillance of tat home and immediately notify the Little Rock Office of deviopements there in accordance with information set forth ithis report.

Mrs. Haskell Rannals, nee Bessio Ninchester, Donison, Texas, states that she has not seen nor heard of RALPH ROE since before his removal from Leavenworth to Alcatraz; that he has destroyed all letters and blotographs of Roe. Christmas card signed "Ralph" addressed to Miss Dixic Winchester, 902 M. Day Street, Denison, Texas, bearing uncanceled 1-1/2¢ postage stamp, received by her mother but not delivered to Mrs. Haskell Rannals, but given to Chief of Police Denison, Texas, who turned same over to Agent and same is being forwarded to Bureau for comparison.

The writer, accompanied by Assistant Chief of Police Paul Borom, Denison, Texas Police Department, conducted investigation at the home of Mrs. Dixie Winchester, 902 W. Day Street, Denison, Texas.

Mrs. Vinebaster advised that her daughter Bessie is now married to Mr. Hackell Mannals, an orchestra leader at Sherman, Towns, having married September 16, 1957. Mrs. Winebester auvised that RAPH ROE, during year 1933 and, as she recalled, a part of 1934 frequently called upon her daughter at her home; that RAPH ROE was madly in love with her daughter Bessie and was very desirous of marrying her but that they did not marry

because RALFH ROT was sent to the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas in the meantime.

Mrs. Winchester further advised that RALPH FOR gave two large autographed photographs of himself to her daughter Bessie, which she kept on the dresser in her room until about the first of Separaber 1937, when she destroyed them, upon her, Mrs. Uinchester's, advice, along with approximately 200 letters which she had received at various times from ROL, including the period of his confinement in the United States Penitontiary at Leavenworth. Mrs. Winchester advised that she had assisted her daughter in going through her trunks and locating all letters, cards and photographs of RILPH ROL in order that they wight be destroyed before her marriage to Hackell Runnels, which occurred at Sherman, Texas, September 16, 1937.

Mrs. Winchester advised that on the morning of December 23, 1937, the mail carrier, P. C. May, handed her the morning mail, which included approximately one dozen letvers and Christmas cards; that on examination, she found one of the cards addressed to Miss Dixie Winchester, 902 . Day St., Demison, Texas, bearing a 1-1/2 cent postage stamp, which had not been cancelled and the letter had not been postage stamp, which envelope was not scaled and that she observed that it contained a small Christmas card with the signature of "Ralph" appearing thereon. Mrs. Winchester stated that she had noted the handwriting of RALPH ROL on his photographs which he had given to her daughter and that the signature of "Ralph" appearing on this Christmas card gave her a thrill because she noted a striking similarity.

It might be mentioned here that I're. Dixie Winchester's daughter, Bessie, now Mrs. Haskell Rannels, is also known as Dixie Winchester.

Mrs. Winchester turned this communication over to Assistant Chief of Police Paul Borum, who is a close friend of the Winchester family, with the express request that he never let Bessie Mennals see the envelope showing that same had been addressed to her but that the Christums card, which is signed "Ralph" might be shown to her, provided she be advised that the card was secured elsewhere.

Mrs. Haskell Rannals was interviewed at the home of her mother laster in the day and was shown the above mentioned Christmas card bearing the signature of "Relph" and she advised that the signature in her judgment was that of RAPH ROD. Mrs. Rannals verified the information as given by her mother, Mrs. Winchester, advising that RAPH ROD paid her court covering several months during year 1933 and 1934; that she received many letters from him, perticularly after he was sent to the Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Ransau.

Mrs. Rannals advised that while RALPH ROE was keeping company with her that he often spoke of Bertie Pruitt, who resides near Ardmore, Oklahoma; that Bertie Pruitt had visited RALPH ROE at her home in Denison, Texas, one evening; that ROE had often told her that Bertie Pruitt was a good friend and that her home was a good place to "cool off in". Mrs. Rannals further advised that ROE often requested that should she ever want to get in touch with him immediately at any time or place and did not know his whereabouts for her to communicate with the closest friend he ever had and legal advisor in all of his troubles, W. F. Smalley, an attorney and some kind of a Senator who resided in Shawnee, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Rannals further stated that, in her opinion, after hearing ROE brag on Mr. Smalley, that should he ever come to the State of Oklahoma, that this friend W. F. Smalley would be the first man that he would contact.

Mrs. Rannals made further search of her personal belongings, at the suggestion of her husband, in an effort to locate some photograph, card or letter which she might have received from him but she was unable to find anything.

Accompanied by Assistant Chief of Police Paul Borum, Mr. P. C. May, mail carrier serving 902 W. Day Street, was interviewed and he advised that he had been a mail carrier in Denison, Texas for the past 35 years; that he is at a loss to understand how the letter addressed to Miss Dixie Winchester was delivered on the morning of December 28, 1937, without having been postmarked or stamped canceled, unless said letter, when passing through the stamping machine, failed to be postmarked. Mr. May advised that no one handed him this letter in person while he was on his route, nor at any other time; that had they done so, he would have carried the same to the Post Office for cancellation; that not to have done so would have been a violation of the postal laws and regulations.

Mr. Paul Borum advised that he was of the opinion that some rival underworld character in Denison had mailed instant letter to Dixie Winchester as a prank or spite work; that Mrs. Rannals' husband Haskell Rannals is an orchestra leader in Denison, Texas, serving radio stations and night clubs in the vicinity of Sherman and Denison, Texas, as well as Durant, Oklahoma. Mr. Borum advised that he had had Mrs. Rannals in the city jail at Denison a time or two for insanity hearings; that there is no doubt in his mind but that at times she is insane; that Mrs. Rannals has lived a very wold life in former years and that this form of insanity may have been caused from drinking and other dissipation. Mr. Borum stated that Mrs. Winchester had advised him a number of times recently that she desired his assistance in helping her daughter to go straight and lead a quiet life; that she appeared to be happily married at the present time and that she wanted no underworld characters to contact her daughter ever again and that she would assist him in every way possible to apprehend anyone who might make an effort to contact her daughter.


Mr. Borm advised that he had every reason to believe that him. Minchester was sincere in this statement; that he was personally acquainted with PAIPH ROL and in former years had seen him associating with him. Regarding the first of the above mentioned license numbers, it has been determined through the Motor Vehicle Registration Bureau at Bismarck, North Dakota that 1937 North Dakota license plates #138648 were issued to Louis A. Johnson of Luverne, North Dakota.

Miss Louise A. Hanson, Postmistress of Luverne, has advised by letter that Mr. Johnson is presently receiving his mail at 116 South 7th Street, Santa Paula, California. It was further determined that the above license number was issued to Mr. Johnson for a 1938 Pontiac coach, motor #6-415736.

Regarding the second of the above listed license numbers, North Dakota #93243, it has been learned through the Motor Vehicle Registration Bureau at Bismarck, North Dakota that this license was issued to Mr. Charles C. Hamblem of Steele, North Dakota for a 1935 Ford Tudor Coach, motor #1412806.

The Postmaster at Steele, North Dakota has advised that Mr. Hamblem presently receives mail at 5568 East Gage Street, Bell, California, in care of Mr. George Conebest.

The third of the above-mentioned license numbers, North Dakota #135356, was, through the Motor Vehicle Registration Bureau at Bismarck, North Dakota, determined to have been issued to Mr. Myron J. Fuller of Hope, North Dakota for 1934 Studebaker Coupe. Mr. Fuller was contacted telephonically by Special Agent in Charge Werner Hanni and stated that he was the owner of the above mentioned automobile which bore 1937 license #135356; that this car, bearing the above plates, was presently in Hope and had never been out of the State of North Dakota. Mr. Fuller advised that he was in the real estate business at Hope, North Dakota and had been so occupied for some time. By teletype message of December 29, 1937, the Portland office was requested to recheck this license number.

As to South Dakota license #27-3107, it has been determined through the Motor Vehicle Registration Bureau at Pierre, South Dakota that this license was issued to Mr. E. C. McFadden, formerly of Gregory, South Dakota. Telephonic inquiry at the Sheriff's office for Gregory County, South Dakota determined the fact that the above license number was issued to Mr. McFadden for an Oldsmobile Tudor Coach; that Mr. McFadden and his family left South Dakota about a month prior to the inquiry with the intention of spending the winter in the State of California; that Mr. McFadden is a property owner in Gregory, South Dakota and enjoys an excellent reputation.

Postmaster Wm. J. Gassen of Gregory, South Dakota advised that the present address of Mr. McFadden is 10410 Tellfair Street, Pacoima, California.

As to Couth Dallota license [19-3354, it was determined through the Notor Vehicle Degistration Durona at Fierre, South Daketa that this license was issued to Dr. Tooten H. Folkestad of Bristol, South Daketa.

The writer, at Nebeter, South Dakots, interviewed Theriff n. O. Johnson who advised that he was well acquainted with Fr. Folkestad; that recently Folkestad had married a vidow from the vicinity of Holmquist, South Dakota and that the two of them had gone to California to spend the vinter. Nr. Johnson advised that Folkestad is a retired former, bearing a very excellent reputation, and is a man of considerable financial means; that his wife also had considerable money; that Fr. Folkestad had several children by a previous marriage but that they are all now living on the West Coast; that Fr. Folkestad's wife has a son by a previous marriage living north of Holmquist, South Dakota; that this son's name is also Holmquist; that either Fr. Holmquist or the post-master at Bristol could furnish the present address of Folkestad.

Tr. Fercy Molmquist was interviewed at his farm home, one and one-half miles north of Molmquist, South Dikota, and advised that he was a step-son of Tosten M. Polkestad; that his nother and step-father had left Touth Dikota on Movember 18th, 1937, intending to drive leisurely wast to the State of California where they intended to remain for the winter; that they were now residing in California at 723 Orrizaba Avenue, Long Beach, California. From Holmquist could furnish no further information regarding the trip made by his mother and step-father, other than that they intended to step several days in different terms enroute and that he thought they had probably stepped at Portland, Oregon for about three or four days. Fro Molmquist was unable to furnish the dates upon which his mother and step-father had stepped at Fortland.

Reference teletype message from the Euffale Division to the Abordoon Division dated December 25, 1937 also relates to the investigation to determine if any of the persons passing into the State of California from Orogon on December 15th or 16th had purchased in Portland on either of those dates the Department of Cosmorco booklet "Current Tables Facific Coast, 1938" and the U. S. Hydrographic Service booklet "Tidal Current Chart of Can Francisco Bay". Among the automobiles listed as passing into California from Oregon on the above dutes was one bearing 1937 New York license number 938512, carrying five passengers. Investigation by the Buffalo Field Division indicated that the above license was issued to Amarck Sampson who has, during the past for surmers, lived at Drewerton, New York where he has been engaged in working on lake tugs in New York State: that Sampson was formerly from Mebster, South Baketa and was probably traveling with Edwin Holden and Solma Holden, both of whom were from the vicinity of Webster, South Dakota, and that they were probably visiting Florence Carlson, 21st and Hoffman Streets, Mugenc, Oregon. Reference teletype further indicated that the above license number was issued for a 1938 Chevrolet seden, notor number 1215489, but that this car had been turned back to the dealer for a 1937 model seden which Jampson had proviously traded to the dealer; that it was quite possible that Sampson had traded for still another car at Lebston, South Dakota.

Shoriff H. O. Johnson of Wobster, South Dahota adviced upon interview that he did not know Andrew Campson and did not believe that Sampson had eyor lived in or near Webster but that Sampson had evidently at one time recoived mail through the Lobstor postoffice. The Sheriff produced several letters grow one Partin Johnson, Station C. Box 10, Brooklyn, How York, in which Martin Johnson requested Sheriff Johnson to attempt to collect some money from Indrew Sumbson which Sumpson supposedly owed Martin Johnson. Martin Johnson stubed in his lotters that he had advanced Andrew Sempson about \$250.00 as a payment on a Chevrolot automobile. Sheriff Johnson advised that he had done nothing as yet to collect this money, inasmuch as he had never been able to locate Andrew Jampson; that he thought if Sampson lived anythere in the vicinity of Nebster Le probably received mail through the Fierpont, South Dakota postoffice. Sheriff Johnson was questioned as to any knowledge he might have as to Selma and Edwin Folden who are reported to be traveling with Andrew Sampson. We adviced that although he had heard of these two persons he did not know them personally but that from the information he had received, they were both of good reputation. He advised that it was his understanding that they were the children of Hels Holden who lives on a form about fourteen rules northwest of Holmquist, South Dakote.

At the Webster, South Lake to posteoffice Agent interviewed live T. J. Delaney, postmaster, who advised that he did not know Andrew Sampson but was of the belief that Sampson and his family both received sail through the Pierpont posteoffice. He stated that the belief family had formarly received mail through the Webster posteoffice but did not do so at present and that he does not know where they now receive their mail; that he does, however, have a notation in his records, which notation was made October 5, 1937, to the eiffect that in the future any mail for Selma/Holden was to be forwarded to 1308 South Browne Street, Spokana, washington.

At Fiorport, South Dakota, Visc Olga Otio, postuictress, was interviewed and advised that she did not know either the Sampson or the Wolden families and that her records did not disclose that either family received mail through the Fiorport postouffice.

Fritton, South Dakota, adviced upon interview that he had, during the last three years, sold Andrew Sempson three different Chevrolet automobiles and that he was presently carrying an account of Sampson's; that he had heard that Sampson was presently in the west but that he did not know where he could be reached; that he did not expect to hear from him, inasmuch as the account of Sampson was on a six month and year basis and that the first payment would not be due for several months yet. After reviewing the record of Sampson's account, in Thorp advised that the last automobile purchased by Sampson was a 1938 Chevrolet Doluxe Town redan, noter (1220310, cerial (21M101452; that this car was purchased November 9, 1937; that at the wine of the purchase Sampson gave as his address care be Shillips, Preserton, New York. For Thorp further advised that he know very little of Sampson or his family but had heard that Sampson was a good friend of Hawkin Wolland of rear Fierpont, South Dakota; that Sampson's father was dead

and that his mother made her home with Navkin Holland.

At Pierpont, South Dakota it was determined that Haukin Holland resided in the country about twolve miles northeast of Fierpont. On reaching this farm, Agent found no one at home and it was impossible to reach the farm later because of snew-blocked reads.

At the farm of Mr. Wels Holden, located between Fierpont and Holmquist, South Daketh, Mr. Holden advised that he knew all the parties previously mentioned, namely, Andrew Sampson, Solma and Edmund Holden (not Edwin Holden); that Solma and Edmund were his niece and nephew; that they had left for the West in Sampson's car about Thankegiving time, together with Clifford Treamswein and Melvin Holden, son of Mels Holden; that the party had first gone to the State of California where Helvin had remained with his aunt, Anna Gunderson, 1286 North Serrameneta, Facadena, California; that the remaining four had gone to Gregon to visit but that it was his understanding that the entire group were now back in California and were now living at the above address of Anna Gunderson, or could be located through inquiry at that address.

By teletype of December 29, 1937, the Los Angeles Division was furnished the names and addresses of Andrew Tempson and Fosten H. Folkestad and requested to make an appropriate check of these individuals to determine if either of them purchased the booklets mentioned proviously in this report.

UNDIVELOPED LEADS:

THE LOS ANGRESS FIRED DIVISION at SANTA FAULA, CALIFORNIA will interview fro Louis Johnson at 116 South 7th Street to determine whether he or any of the party who entered the State of California with him on either December 16 or 17, 1937 had on either of those dates purchased booklets in Fortland, Cregon relative to Tides and Currents along the Facific Coast and in the San Francisco Bay.

At Mell, California will interview Charles C. Eamblem at 5568 Bast Gage Street, who may be reached at that address through Fr. Scorge Concept, and make inquiry similar to that noted above.

Will at Faccina, California interview Mr. E. C. McFaddon at 10410 Tellfair Street for similar purpose.

At Long Beach, California will interview Ur. Toston H. Folkestad, 723 Crrizaba Avenue to determine whether he or any of his party purchased any of the booklets mentioned above.

At Fasadona, California will, at 1286 North Corramonota Stroot, locate and interview Andrew Sampson to determine whether he or any of the party with him purchased any of the above described booklets at Fortland, Gregon on either December 15 or 16, 1937.

THE FORTIAND FINED DIVIDION will recheck 1937 North Dakota license number 135356, which license was supposed to have been carried on a car passing into the State of California from Gregon on either December 15 or 16, 1937. This license was issued to Fr. Tyron J. uller of Hope, North Dakota for a 1934 Studebaker Coupe. In Paller states that neither he, the car, nor the license have been out of the State of North Dakota.

that she had first met ALKEE PAYNE, as previously stated, when Aimse Payne was connected with the Rowland Beauty Parlor at Bristow, Oklahoma; that she, Letha Jones, had then been living at Depew, Oklahora, which is only a short distance from Bristow; that as a result of her acquaintence with Aimse, she had later become acquainted with Aimse's parents, BRUCE FAYNE, and Mrs. CORA PANTS. She stated, in addition, that Aimee Payne had a brother, DEAN/PAYME, and wife, who had at one time resided with the parents but whose present whereabouts she did not know. She advised that when she had last heard, Mrs. Core Payne was keeping house for her daughter, AIMA, and Alma's husband, whose name she did not recall. She stated that ALMA PRYNE or her husband was a teacher at the Hickory Grove School about eight miles south of Depew, Oklahoma, and that Mrs. Payne, her daughter, and sonin-law resides in the teacherage at the Hickory Crove School. She stated that she believes that the Post Office through which they received their mail was the Milfay, Oklahoma, Post Office. She advised that she understood that Bruce Payne had separated from Mrs. Payne, and she did not know Bruce Payne's present whereabouts.

Mrs. Litha Jones advised that in addition to contacts she had had with AIMEE PAYME at the beauty parlor, that one MANCE PERRY, who was a very close friend of hers, when she had gone to school in Oklahoma, had later morried SANFCRD HENRY, who was a cousin of Aimee Payne and that following their marriage, they had resided with Aimee Payne's grandmother, Mrs. Henry (first name unknown) at Milfay, Oklahoma, and that as a result, she had become more friendly with the Paynes through this association.

IMPHA JOYES admitted that because she had not gotten along with her stepfather, Dr. J. L. Wharton, in Depew, Oklahoma, she had on one occasion resided with the Payne family several years ago when they had resided at Depew, Oklahoma. She stated that this was only for a period of about one month, however, and that she had then returned to her stepfather's home.

had been confused as to the exact time when AIMED PAYNE had given her the photographs of RALMH ROE when previously interviewed, but that she now recalled further detail with reference to the incident, as well as the time when the incident occurred. She stated that it was now her best recollection that Aimee Payne had contacted her in Depwe, Oklahoma, sometime in November of 1933 and had advised her that she needed money and had requested her, Letha Jones, to contact one CRIE/TURNBULL, who was a land owner at Depew, and Cypsy Corner, Oklahoma. Letha stated that Aimee Payne had been "playing around" with Orie Turnbull and that as a result she was able to secure (50)

from Orie Turnbull for Aimee Payne. 





Other investigation made as result of information furnished pertaining to a recovered raft, suspicious persons, and clothing recovered, produced negative results.

DUTAILS:

The following interview was conducted by Special Agent (A) H. E. MYERROW, in the office of the Probation Officer, in the Federal Building, Can Francisco, on December 22, 1937:

Fr. J. T. WATT of Martin's Beach, seven miles south of Helf Moon Bay, delled at the Frobation Office, and gave Agent INVESCON the following information:

On December 21, 1997 as Ir. UMFT was returning to Martin's Beach from a point south thereof, he noticed two men at a dictance beside the road, but gave the incident little thought. Later, however, these men came to Mr. WATT'S place, which is called Martin's Beach, and bought sandwiches and a bottle of wine. Mr. WATT brought the empty bottle with him, and delivered same to Agent MYRREON for possible fingerprint analysis.

Agent MYERSON borrowed three photographs from the Probation Office files, and placed with them the photographs of Subjects ROE and COLE, and handed all five pictures to LT. LATT, with the request that he examine them and state whether or not any of them resembled the men who stopped at his place. Mr. LATT stated that one of the men bore a slight resemblence to Subject ROE, but stated he would stand about 5'7', as he, WATT, is 5'8", and both men were shorter than he.

He was unable to identify the photograph of COLE as resembling either of the men.

Nr. MATT was also asked by Agent MYLREON if he had noticed any sears on his visitors, but he stated he had not. He stated they were dressed rather roughly; that only one did any talking, but spoke pleasently. He stated after making inquiry of him as to how to leave Martin's Beach, they proceeded in a southerly direction on foot.

The wine bottle which Mr. WATT delivered to Agent MYARSON was processed for fingerprints, there being found a great number of smudges and a few particles of fingerprints from which no classification can be made.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent L. D. WINE and Special Agent (A) M. B. MYMRSON:

At San Rafael, California

On December 24, 1957 while interviewing Sheriff WALTER B. SELLER, of Marin County, Mr. SELLER advised Agents that one J. L. KOBINSON, 14 Spring Grove Avenue, San Rafael, telephone 2141, had reported to him that he, ROBINSON, had overheard a fisherman and his wife talking, and that the wife had stated that in her opinion the escape of the Subjects in this case was pre-arranged as to time and place, and also heard the woman state that, in her opinion, probably \$250,000.00 in cash was hidden someplace in Marin County, but the escapes believed the spot to be watched, and would not approach it for the time being.

At Agents' request Sheriff SELIMER telephoned to Mr. ROBINSON, and asked him to call at the Sheriff's Office, which he did. At this time Agents interviewed Mr. ROBINSON, and after some hesitation he stated that the fisherman and his wife wore Mr. and Mrs. "S.MEDE" WESTGAARD, the wife's first name being TURIMA. He stated he has known TURIMA WESTGAARD for approximately rive years, and that she is a girl who "has been knocked around a little". He informed Agents that Mrs. WESTGAARD was now married for at least the second time, and indicated that she was a girl of extremely loose morals.

Mrs. WESTGAARD'S statements were the result of speculation, theory, and conjecture, and did not believe that they were founded on fact.

He advised Agents that, in his opinion, no one except a person with whom she was acquimted, or one roughly dressed as a fisherman, could gather any information from this. WESTGAMED, and even her friends would be unsuccessful along this line, unless they "broke a bottle of beer or a bottle of whisky with her".

At Agent's suggestion Mr. ROBINSON promised to call upon the WESTGAARDS from time to time, and endeavor to ascertain what, if any further facts or information Mrs. WESTGAARD has relative to the instant escape, and advise Sheriff SELIMER of the results.

In the event this occurs, Sheriff SELIMER will, of course, advise the San Francisco Office immediately.

Pursuant to telegram received from the Los Angeles Office, dated December 26, 1937, Special Agent W. F. WOOD and Special Agent (A) M. B. MYERSON proceeded to the Southern Pacific Depot, and there interviewed Special Agent R. J. GUILFOYLE, a Special Agent for the Southern Pacific.

Mr. GUILFOYLE communicated with the Pullman reservation room of the Railroad Company, and from them ascertained that Pullman tickets Nos. 2505 and 9489 were issued for the upper and lower tourists' berths, respectively, on tourists' sleeper No. 4146, which was part of the Sunset Limited, first section, leaving San Francisco the night of December 21, 1937, at 8 p.m.

He also ascertained that one HERMAN KEIFEL, a clerk in the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, in the Southern Pacific Railroad Company passenger ticket office, at 95 Market Street, had written the tickets. As to upper berth No. 5, in the same car, the only information available in the Southern Pacific reservation room was that one W. J. FLEENOR, a Passenger Agent for the Southern Pacific had sold this space to one GOLDBECK, and that Mr. GOLDBECK was en route from San Francisco, California, to San Antonio, Texas.

On December 27, 1937 Agent MYERSON interviewed Mr. FIEE-NOR, who stated that it is his duty to meet incoming boats, and board them by launch before they reach the dock, and solicit tickets on the Southern Pacific to the passengers. In this manner he stated he boarded the Dollar Steamship Line boat "President Taft", which had just returned from Manila, P.I., Honolulu, etc., and that immediately after the boat docked he encountered Mr. E. O. GOLDBECK, a passenger on the boat, whose name was found by Agent MYERSON on the passenger list.

Mr. FIEENOR advised Agent MYERSON that he desired a lower tourist berth from San Francisco to San Antonio, on the Sunset Limited, leaving San Francisco December 21, 1937 at 8 p.m., but was immediately advised that no lowers were available, but he could be furnished with an upper. Mr. GOLD-BECK'S name was placed on the chart along with Mr. FLEENOR'S name, and a search of the records at the Southern Pacific offices disclosed that the berth was actually purchased by Mr. GOLDBECK later on that day, and that the sum of \$6.00 was paid by him for the use of the same from San Francisco to San Antonio.

Mr. FLEENOR advised that he had a very distinct recollection of the appearance of Mr. GOLDBECK, and that he was a man about fifty years old, 5'8" tall, would weigh about 150 to 160 pounds, medium build, with hair graying at the temples.

It will be noted from the reference telegram that the occupant of upper 5 in the car mentioned, resembled
Subject ROE. It will further be noted that Mr. GOLDBECK had just
arrived on December 21st from a point at least five days distant,
indicating Honolulu, T.H., or possibly a more distant point. It
will also be noted that Mr. GOLDBECK originally indicated to Mr.
FIEENOR that he desired passage to San Antonio, and that such
transportation was actually purchased by him, eliminating any possibility that GOLDBECK did not call for his ticket, and someone
else purchased the space.

As to Section No. 4 in the same car, it will be noted that reference telegram indicates this entire section was occupied by one person, who resembled Subject COIE. Mr. FLEENOR advised Agent that two persons apparently occupied this space, and that pullman ticket No. 9489 was sold on December 13, 1937 for lower 4 in the tourists' car, and that pullman ticket No. 2505 was sold on December 20, 1937 for the upper berth.

Mr. FIEENOR, from the records available, was able to advise Agent that the lower berth was sold to a man named STUART, located at 625 Market Street, San Francisco, and that the upper berth was sold to a person named BOISSALIER, through the "Ask Mr. Foster Travel Service", Stewart Hotel, San Francisco.

At 625 Larkot Street Agent determined that one CHARLES R. STUART is head of the advertising agency bearing his name, and that he has been located in San Francisco, and in Los Angelos, in that business, for over lifteen years.

Mics SOFHIM JACOBSEN, employed in Lir. STUART'S office, advised that on December 13, 1937 she had made the reservation for Mr. STUART to leave on December 21st, via the Sunsot Limited, and obtained for him a lower borth in a tourists' car. She showed Agent where payment had been made for a round trip ticket to Los Aegeles and return on that date. She further advised that Mr. STUART was still in Los Angeles, and would very likely not return until after the first of the year.

Dies JACOBSEN exhibited to Agent a periodical called "The Benkamerican", in which an article appears by CHARLES R. STUART, entitled "Liars". At the top of this article is shown a photograph of Mr. STUART, which shows him to be a man well past middle age, with gray or white hair. Miss JACOBSEN explained to Agent that Mr. STUART was about fifty-one or fifty-two years old, had gray hair, and from her description of him it was seen that he bore no resemblance to either of the Subjects in this case.

Reference telegram indicates that the occupant of lower 4 left the train at Glendale, and this was explained by hiss JACOBERS then she advised that Mr. STUART had owned a home in Glendale, California for a great many years, and upont considerable time there.

At the "Ask Mr. Foster Travel Service", Jterrit Motel, Can Francisco, it was found that upper 4 in the car mentioned was reserved by a person by the name of MOISSALIM, on December 20, 1937, to be used on December 21st, and that this person had occupied Room 739 at the Stevart Motel.

From Mr. KLWMLTH DILMART, Assistant Manager of the hotel, it was learned that hiss WILMA BOISENITH occupied room 729 from December 18, 1937 until December 21st.

It will be noted from the foregoing that the identities of the occupants of upper and lower borths 4,

and upper 5 have been definitely ascertained, and that they are doubtless not the Subjects in this case.

At 4:15 p.m., on December 26, 1937, the San Francisco Division was advised telephonically by KENNETH FOSTER, Officer in Charge, United States Coast Guard, Golden Gate Station, that a body had been located at Land's End, which point is where the San Francisco Bay empties into the Pacific Ocean, FOSTER informing that he had already notified Warden JOHNSTON of the Alcatraz Penitentiary.

Telephonical efforts were made to contact Special Agent in Charge PIEPER and Special Agent GURNEA, who were at Alcatraz at the time the information was originally received. Agent JOHNSON ascertained that the information was already in possession of Special Agent in Charge PIEPER, and Special Agent GURNEA, and that these two individuals were proceeding to the point where the body had been found.

Agents MYERSON, WILSON, and OLSON proceeded from the San Francisco Division, equipped with a fingerprint set and flood lights, and upon their arrival they found that Special Agent in Charge PIEPER, and Special Agents GURNEA and WOOD were there. The body was that of a deceased man, and had been recovered from the Bay by the United States Coast Guard men, and was lying at the side of a road.

An examination of the body was made by Special Agent GURNEA, and it was determined the deceased person did not fit the description of either ROE or COLE.

Agents MYERSON and OISON were instructed to accompany the body to the Coroner's Office, and obtain fingerprints, and a copy of the Coroner's report. A copy of the Coroner's report was obtained, and is maintained in the San Francisco Division file.

A copy of the fingerprints of this deceased person was obtained, and is being forwarded to the Bureau by separate letter.

From the above records, the following information and description were obtained:

ATTACHNETICS. United States Coast Guard, informed that at approximately 3:30 p.m., A. DITTER, 956 Sacramento Street, and VIARAPS, 250 Scott Street, both of San Francisco, California, and advised the United States Coast Guard Sub-Station, located on Land's And, that there was a body wedged under some rocks near the choreline, and as a result of this information, accompanied by WILLIAT COE and GEORGE FIRTCER of the Coast Curred, they had proceeded to the place where the body was, and had recovered it; that upon recovering the body, they had immediately notified the Marden at the Alcatraz Penitentiary, and then had telephonically advised the San Francisco Division; that no one was allowed to touch the body until after Agents from the Federal Europa of Investigation had made necessary investigation.

On December 25, 1957 at 5:05 p.m., Mr. LANG, of the "San Francisco Examiner", advised the San Francisco Division that a body had been seen floating between Piors 36 and 38, by two boys. As a result of this information, Agents H. R. JOHNSON and V. I. PARRY were instructed to immediately proceed to Piors 36 and 38, with a fingerprint kit, rubber cloves, and other necessary equipment. They were later joined by other Agents, and Special Agent in Charge PLAPER was notified of the developments in instant case, as well as Special Agent GUNTEN.

Arrangements were also made to immediately notify the Eureau in the event the body turned out to be that of either COLD or ROM.

The following is taken from a memorandum of Special Agent H. K. JOHNSON:

"The writer and Special Agent V. I. FARRY immediately proceeded in Bureau Mudson to Fier 36, and et the where southeast of the Pier not JOHN MILL. about twelve years of age, 839 Kingston Avenue, Oakland, California, and his friend, JMN LILAN, about cloven years of age, 805 Shasta, Yuba City, California. HILL stated that about one and a half hours before he saw a body floating about twenty feet from the wharf between Fiers 34 and 36. HILL corrected this by saying between Fiers 32 and 34, with which statement ITIAN agreed. HILL and MILAN then notified the watchman at Pier 28. HILL and MILAN noted a hat end came on the edge of the tharf about thirty feet to the left of the spot where they first saw the body. The hat and care were dry, were taken by the vatchman who was subsequently ascertained to have turned over the hat and came to Police.

"W. A. MALTERS, Special Police Officer, American Hawaiian Steamship Company, Pier 28, confirmed the statements of HILL and MILAN, stating however that he had not seen the body.

"At this time Southern District of Cruising Police car arrived with officers INSTER EROCKS and JOS-IN TATED, who, with Agents, began observing nearby waters for the body. Agents telephonically requested flood lights from the office. Agent PARRY boarded Can Francisco Bay Police Boat 'D.A. Unite', and the boat began a search. Agent W. F. WOOD arrived from the office with a flood light, and with this light the writer located the body under Fior 36. The body was drawn out of the water by San Francisco Folice, and with the assistance of Agents who had arrived from the office. Shortly after the departure of reporters and spectators, the Alcatraz Island launch 'McDowell', commanded by L. G. CLINTON, Junior Officer, arrived at the scene, following telephonic advice to

the Jan Francisco Office, and in turn Mardon J. A. JOHNSTON of Alcatraz, of developments.

With the body, Agents FARRY and JOHNSON accomposited STLARD I. ROSLERGERS in an ambulance to the Farbor Lagrancy Hospital.

"With the consent of RONIBERS was conducted examination in Agents' precence, the following information was developed:

"J. M. WOOLWORTH, Clerk, Golden Eagle Hotel, telephonically advised Agent JOHNSON that JAMES LESTER, was presently registered in room 105 at the hotel, that he was a man about 60 years of age, who was crippled, using crutches; that LESTER was friendly with PATRICK BARRY, Undertaker, office telephone Valencia 1136, residence phone Bayview 4612.

"The Bureau was advised in substance as to the above information by teletype at 8 p.m., 12/25/37."

The fingerprints of JAMES LESTER were taken by Special Agent PARRY, and are being forwarded to the Bureau by separate letter.

The following investigation was made by Special Agent DUANE L. TRAYNOR, on December 23, 1937, at San Francisco:

"On December 20, 1937 Mr. C. SUTHER-LAND, 2421 Post Street, advised Special Agent J. E. THORNTON telephonically, that a married couple, Mr. and Mrs. ROSE left one of his rooms on Wednesday, December 15, 1937, without advising him as to their leaving, or as to their future whereabouts. He stated that in cleaning up the apartment which they had occupied, he had found a visiting card made out in the name of HOLLAND, which he believed was an Alcatraz visiting card. Mr. SUTHERLAND was advised that an Agent would contact him.

"Agent contacted Mr. SUTHERLAND at the above address. He stated that his register showed that a Mr. and Mrs. J. ROSE had registered at his place on September 13, 1937, and had remained until December 15, 1937; that they left without saying anything to him, and although they had paid their room rent in advance, they had left the room in rather bad shape. He exhibited what appeared to be the top

half of a visiting permit to some penitantiary. On the top of the permit appeared 3.0. 15H 7-37 and just below that was printed the word NAME, followed by the name 'ALLIN' written in pencil, then the printed word NO. and the written numbers '56684'. Below that was the printed instructions governing the conduct of visitors in visiting prisoners. This piece of gaper is being retained in a separate envelope for the file, but is not being checked out any further for it cannot be a permit to Alcatraz Frison, since the prisoner's number is too large for that prison. It is believed that it probably applies to San Quentin Fenitentiary, inasmuch as the letters 5.0. appear on the top thereof.

ious other identifying data on Mr. ROSE, which had been left in the room. He stated that Mr. ROSE held himself out to be an artist, and seemed to be frequenting with a sporting crowd. While it was not deemed advisable to check this out any further in view of the fact that it has no connection with this case, a description was obtained by Agent of both Mr. ROSE and Mrs. ROSE.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent T. P. GARAGHY, on Documber 24, 1937:

"A letter of introduction was obtained from Assistant United States Attorney A. J. ZIMPOLI to In. A. HARBIA, moneger of JOH DI MAGGIO'S CROFTO, Wichermen's where, who is reported to be very influential with the Fishermen's Unions. A. FARTWA introduced Agent to ALKAIDER D'ANCELO, manager of the Crab and Salmon Fishermen's Protective Association, Fishermen's Wharf, who stated that there are over 300 boats engaged in crab and salmon fishing, the members of the crews or the boats all belong to the Association; that all rembers of the Association have been requested to tatch out for the bodies of Subjects COII and ROD, and ero doing so; that he will request the members of the Association, if they find the bodies of Subjects COLI and ROE, or either of them, to irrediately call the Can Francisco Field Division, and give it first and exclusive information of the finding. The address and telephone number of the Field Division was furnished D'ANGELO. It was explained to D'ANGELO that the Bureau was interested in first and exclusive information for the reason that Subjects may have had some writing or other objects in their possession indicating who, if anyone, aided in their escape. It was further explained to D'ANGLIO that the person or persons furnishing such invormation would not be losing anything by his cooperation. D'ANGLIO promised full cooperation.

THIS LIM ZUCCOMI, Secretary to TRANK ALLINO, Business Manager of the Deep Sea Purse Seine Vishermen's Union, 2797 Taylor Street, phone Ordany 4561, adviced that DRAIL ALIANO was out, and his return was uncertain. It was explained to hiss

ZUCCONI that the Europu desired first and exclusive information of the finding of the bodies of Subjects COLD and ROD for the same reason assigned to D'ANGERO, and she was informed that the person or persons furnishing such first and exclusive information would not lose enviling in the transaction.

"Miss ZUCCONI advised that she would immediately contact as many fishermen, members of the Union, as possible, and advise them of the desires of the Burcau in the matter, and promised full cooperation for the Union."

The following information was obtained by Special Agent W_{\bullet} F. WOOD, on December 21, 1937:

"Captain GEORGE DESTEFREY, Depot Keeper, U.S. Light House Service at Goat Island, made the following suggestion concerning a possible method of escape from Alcatraz.

"Captain JEFFRM pointed out that there is a bell buoy located about 300 yards West of the North end of Alcatraz Island, which is in the path of the ebb tide. A person to escape would swim out into the fog from the West side of the Island, and drift with the tide and be guided in swimming by the bell on the buoy which rings even in a small rip tide. If you assume that outside aid of a boat is to be given it would likewise be a simple matter to head above the Island until you struck the obbing current and drift with the current until you could pick up the sound of the bell on the buoy, which would guide you to where the convicts could wait.

"By this method the element of perfect timing would be eliminated as if either the summers or the boat reached the buoy they would simply wait for the arrival of the other. The investigation brought out the fact that visibility was limited to about 200 yards. The buoy being 100 yards farther could not be seen from the Island at 1:30 p.m., on 12/16/57, so that persons at the buoy would be concealed until

the for listed. The further fact that the buoy marks a dengerous reef would tend to prevent a searching boat from taking a chance on the reef marked by this buoy.

"Assuming the men the worked in the machine shop had greasy hands they might leave definite fingergrint works on the buoy. It is possible that the rescue boat would, in attempting a landing, carry away on it the black and red maint resulting from burning into the buoy and the buoy could be marked with the paint from the boat.

"Captain JANAN stated that the particular buoy in question is to be taken up December 22, 1937, and examination of this buoy might contain evidence that it was a step taken by the convicts in effecting their escape."

As a result of the above information, Agent 1000D, on December 23, 1907, conducted the following investigation:

The following telephonical information was received by Special Agent in Charge PIEER, at 10:50 a.m., on December 22, 1937, from Agent A. A. MARIAND, this information originally having been received by Marden JOHNSTON at Alcatraz Penitentiary from Major HOY, retired Army Officer, residing at 400 - 28th Avenue, San Francisco, telephone Evergreen 1394, who called the Marden to state that in view of the publicity about missing prisoners HOM and CONE, and the importance of checking every bit of information, he desired to report that

he had just heard from his nather-in-law, A. H. WIKERS, residence 7450 Geory Street, Apartment 6, Major MOY stating that on the afternoon of Doco ber 16, 1957, about 3:15 p.m., he, with Mr. WIKERS, was walking near Land's End, and can three rough looking men, two of them might answer the description of the missing men, and thile he thought nothing of it at the time, he now feels that he should report this matter for whatever value it may be in instant investigation, and as a result of this information, special Agent T. FITZHUMI WILSON conducted the following investigation on December 24, 1937:

The following information was received by Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, on December 21, 1937:

"Inspector ROSE, of the San Francisco Police Department telephonically advised on the above date that a Mr. WOODRUFF, initials and address unknown, telephoned the Police Department, and stated that two men had been reported to be occupying a boathouse in Belvedere Cove for the last several days, and they had not been noticed there before the Alcatraz escape.

"He advised that he had not taken the message himself, and the person who had, had not signed it, but that he was assigning the matter to Inspector ENGLER with a note that he had referred the matter to the FBI.

"Since WOODRUFF'S first name, address, and telephone number are not known, it was suggested that the Agent who investigated this lead contact the Sheriff at San Rafael, California, as he would undoubtedly know who WOODRUFF was, since Belvedere is such a small town.

On December 24, 1937 the following investigation was conducted by Special Agents LOUIS D. WINE and M. B. MYERSON:

"Special Agents L. D. WINE and M. B. MYERSON interviewed Sheriff WALTER B. SEILMER, San Rafael, California, relative to two individuals who were reported seen occupying a boathouse in Belvedere Cove for several days prior to the escape, but disappeared immediately thereafter. This report was originally made by one WOODRUFF, and Agent MYERSON telephonically ascertained from Sheriff SELLMER several days previously that the Sheriff was endeavoring to ascertain the identity of WOODRUFF; that there was one WOODRUFF in San Rafael, who, upon interview, denied he made the report, and another WOODRUFF in Belvedere, who could not be contacted at the time.

"Sheriff SEIIMER now advises that he has learned that the WOODRUFF in Belvedere made the report, and can be reached through Belvedere phone 16; that he, SEIIMER, has learned that the owner of the houseboat on which the two individuals were seen prior to the escape had returned to the boat last week-end, and upon his arrival there he found no intruders; that this owner customarily visits the boat every week-end, and there has been no sign of the two individuals since the escape.

"Sheriff SELIMER advised that WOODRUFF had not approached close enough to the two individuals to notice their appearance, and that he knows of no one else who might be able to identify the men as Subjects, if they saw photographs of the latter."

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents M. B. MYERSON and L. D. WINE, on December 24, 1937:

"Special Agents M. B. MYERSON and L. D. WINE interviewed Sheriff WALTER B. SELIMER, at San Rafael, California, regarding the latter's report that a Mrs. J. F. GREIG, who resides in back of the Tamalpais High School, Laverne Avenue, Mill Valley, California, had given him the following information: Ir. one Mrs. ILEGAL VINLY, the live in Mrs. GRAIG'S vicinity, were away from their bowe, and left their two small children, eight and nine years old, respectively, alone in the house. Some time between tive and six p.m., on said date, the boys came home, and interrupted two individuals who appeared to be rangacking the house for food-stuffs, but who left without obtaining anything. Later in the night, however, Sheriff CHITTH advised, two individuals are believed to have entered the RHODIS none, in that locality, where they were successful, and ande away with some food. This letter epicode occurred about 1:30 a.m., December 20, 1957.

"Sherlif Jalking advised that the HANAY boys vere interviewed by him, and were shown photographs of Subjects, but did not identify them as the two intruders when they saw."

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. E. FAFLAID, on December 27, 1937:

"Shortly after 9 o'clock this morning (December 27, 1937) Jarden JOHELON was called by phone by Colonel COLA, of Fort LeDowell, Angel Island, who informed by that his guard had picked up articles of clothing, tires, etc.

"This Agent, accompanied by Junior Officer STARE, went to Angel Island in the Alcatraz Island launch, and when there reported to Colorel Colo. From there we went to the guardhouse, where they had five or six used tires which had been found on the beach, together with a blue senge cost which had seen much use, and a woolen cap used by a longehoreman or sailor; the cap had ear-flaps on it. Officer STERE examined them and they were found not to be anything from Alcatraz Agent and Junior Officer STERE returned to Alcatraz Island, erriving there at 10:45 a.m."

On Localber 25, 1957 Special Agent INLESON and Special Agent OLSON were instructed to maintain a look-out from Golden Gate Bridge, over the Son Francisco Bry, for the surpose of observing anything that could appear to be a body floating on the Later, or that had been washed up around the choroline in this vicinity.

During the time this look-out was being raintained, it was determined that the current going under the bridge travels at a very rapid rate of speed; that there is considerable traffic under the bridge, as well as pedestrian traffic on the top of the bridge; that the Golden Gate Bridge is also patrolled by the California State Highway Folice, who maintain a sub-station at the Bridge, and any succious actions of any individual on the bridge, or any object observed floating on the vator, is immediately reported to them, and after this, if the object is in the vator, and appears to be a human body, the California State Highway Fatrol immediately notify the Coast Guard.

This matter was discussed with Special Agent GUMANA, who authorized the discontinuance of the look-out on December 27, 1937.

A letter addressed to "Marden Johnson, Aleatraz Island, Frisco, California", postmarked Denver, Colorado, December 23 - 8 a.m., 37, was received by Warden JOHNDFOLL. This letter contained a note reading as follows:

"Tut - Tut, goo-bye, give my love to the boys

T. Cole#

Upon receipt of the letter and note by the San Francisco Division, it was immediately placed in a cellophane envelope, and forwarded to the Bureau for necessary examination, to determine if there is any letent fingerprints on either the note or letter, which may be either ROE'S or COLE'S fingerprints. This letter had also been handled by warden JOHL-TON, and copies of his lingerprints are being obtained and forwarded to the Bureau, for elimination purposes.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent F. R. HMINGK, on December 30, 1987:

"At about 2:30 p.m., on this date, E. T. GLEESON, city editor of the 'San Francisco Call - Bulletin' called Special Agent J. E. THORN-TON, and requested that he send an Agent to GLEE-SON'S office immediately. He refused to divulge his information by telephone, but stated that it was in reference to the Alcatraz fugitives.

"Agent HAMMACK proceeded to the Call - Bulletin office, and there interviewed E. T. GLEESON, City Editor, and LEE ETTELSON, managing editor. Mr. GLEESON advised that an informant

description of either truck or gasoline launch was not available. Continuing, GLEESON stated that his informant advised him that upon arrival in Stockton, DUTCH HILL, who runs a gambling house there, arranged with one WONG (reported to be mayor of Stockton Chinatown), to have Chinese hide and harbor THEODORE COLE, and that such arrangements were made, and COLE is presently being secreted by Chinese in Stockton.

"Further, GLEESON advised that his informant has stated that WONG has arranged with a third party to purchase through a San Francisco pawn shop a .45 caliber automatic for COLE'S use, and in the event that the party is unable to purchase the automatic in San Francisco, efforts will be made to do so in Reno. Nevada.

rGIEESON and ETTELSON refused to divulge the name of their informant, stating that they wished him to make his own private investigation, and further that in the event there is any truth to the report, contact with the informant by either newspaper men or Agents, would tip the matter off.

"GIEESON stated that he believed that the informant was sincere, and on several prior occasions when he has furnished information, it has been found to be good.

"MFILMI requested that in the event there is anything to the report, that his newspaper be permitted to have photographs and reporters on hand then a pickup is made. Agent provised him nothing, nor furnished any information, being agreeably surprised that the newsmen did not try to pump Agent."

The above information is too vague to turrant further investigation.

HITE METERS GROVES, Room 2, Balzac Hotel, 354 Columbus Avenue, San Francisco, telephonically contacted Special Agent J. B. THORNTON, on December 24, 1957, and advised that an Italian friend or his, those name he declined to give, had informed him that he had seen COLE at Leavenworth and Lombard Streets, at 3 p.m., Honday, December 19th, at which time COLE was evering blue overalls, a regged white skirt, and a scall cap. CROVES was requested to furnish the name of his informant, but declined to do so. He requested that an Agent contact him, and as no Agent was available at the time, GROVES was requested to come to the San Francisco Office, where he was interviewed by Special Agent C.H. OLSON.

GROVIS stated that he is single, a component by occupation, and at one time was employed as a Deputy Shoritf under Shoriff FRAM BANAMY, Alamada County, Calthand, Colifornia, for a period of seven years; that for the mast thirty-one years he has been residing in and bround North Boach; that he speaks Italian and French, and has nany contacts among the Italians. He stated that in a casual convergation with CHARLES EGGCINO, proprietor of the Balilla Seer Gardens. 420 Columbus Avenue. You Francisco. telephone Expreed: 6007, MOGCEANO and informed him that on December 19, 1937, thile writing for his daughter at the intersection of Lory-morth and Lonbord Streets, he had observed an individual dressed in new overalls that concerned too large, and who was wearing a dirty thite chirt; that some photographs appearing in the local newspapers had been noted by BCCCIMO, and BCCCIMO had made a positive identification of this individual as being identical with Fugitive COLL. He stated ECCCINO had described COM's mose carticularly.

Agent asked GROVIS how DICGIANO described COIM as to age, height, weight, etc., and GROVIS was unable to answer, stating ICGGIANO had rade a positive identification, and he was sure COIM had been seen by ECCCLANO.

CROVES described WARLIN as about sixty-five years or age, and stated he resided in the vicinity of Leavenworth and Lembard Streets.

On Docember 28, 1937 BOGGIANO was interviewed by Agent OISON at his place of business. BOGGIANO stabed that he resides with his vife and family in an apart ent at 2245 Leavenworth Street; that on December 19, 1937, at 2 p.m., he was writing on the corner of Leavenworth and Lemberd Streets, for a taxi, and at the time he observed an individual standing on the southwest corner, with a piece of paper in his hands, that he was twirling. He stated at first he thought the individual was going to mail a letter in a rail box nearby, but had determined that it was only a piece of paper this individual was holding in his hands.

He stated he was ingressed with the whiteness of the man's hands, and also the whiteness of his face, indicating to him that this individual had been in the rates for a considerable length of time.

Me stated the individual was approximately 5.6" in height, weight in the neighborhood of 145 to 150 pounds, and in his opinion would be described as stout; that this individual was in the neighborhood of thirty-rive to forty years of age, and had either dark brown or black hair. To stated the san was dressed in blue overalls, which were new, and was wearing a white shirt that was dirty, and had on a brown but which appeared to be too small, and was wearing black low-cut shoes.

he stated that the individual agreered to his to be that of the holo type, and dld not belong in the vicinity of Leevenworth and Lorbard Streets, as this section of San Francisco is composed or apartment houses only. He stated be did not observe any scars or other marks on the individual's face; that upon arriving at his place of business he observed photographs of COLI and HOL in the local nearpaper, and noted that the mose of COLI rescabled the mose of the individual he had seen standing on the street, and after further studying the photograph, he was certain the individual he had seen was COLI.

ECCGINO advised he had not reported this matter to envone other than discussing it with CROVES, but that since that date he has maintained a look-out for this individual, but has not seen him since. He stated in the event he does,

he will irradiately contact the Lan Francisco Office, the telephone number of which was left with ECGCLINO.

It is also mentioned that CROVES stated subsequent to his telephonical conversation with Ament THOMNICM, he had made a search around the various joints located in the section of town referred to as North Beach, but had been unable to locate any individual rescabling COID. GROVES was also furnished with the telephone number of the ten Trancisco Office, and GROVES advised if he located envoye rescribling COID, he would intendit tely contact the office.

Agent ascertained that this section of town is composed of apartment house buildings, Leavenmorth Street running in a north and south direction, and is located on a hill, from which point Alcatraz Island can be observed.

In the event any further internation in received from either CROVES or BOCGLANO, it will be given introducte attention.

On December 18, 1937 Special Agent in Charge FT.F.R was telephonically contacted by hr. LILIS, of Alcatraz Fonitentiary, who edvised that they had heard from the Trans-Radio Frees that a life raft had been picked up which was capable of carrying two persons in the Bay, near the Golden Cate Bridge, by the fishing boat "Jefferson"; that this raft had been towed to the foot of Leavencorth Street, and it was MILIS' impression that it was part of the hulk of a boat burned in a recent fire off Belyedere Island.

Distriction, of the backland "Tribune", furnished the case information to Special Agent in Charge Pister, with the addition that the Captain's mad of the best "Tefferson" was JOS of STANASA, 100 Ellington Street, I'm Francisco, and that the postoons were missing on one side, and that the life raft was now is the Hall of Justice Carage. Subsequent to this information Inspector JOHN MICHER, of the Son Francisco Tolice Department, was telephonically contacted, and furnished Special Agent in Charge FL.F.H. Ith the same information, and advised that the Folice Department was elecking the raft for the purpose of determining where it may have been lost, but that their investigation had not been completed in detail; that the raft was at the Cap Francisco Tolice Department, and could be looked over by an Agent, and an December 19, 1907 Openial Agent J. M. McCalloth conducted the Tellowing investigation:

Inspector JOHN ENGLER, San Francisco Police Department, advised that he had ascertained that the 'raft' was part of a large rowboat which was believed to have been one of three such boats lost during a fire at the Union Fish Company at Belvedere, California, approximately a month ago. He stated that he had been advised by the Chief of Police at Sausalito that three boats had been lost, and that in these boats were round metal pontoons rather than square pontoons as is sometimes the case.

"ENGLER advised that the manager of the Union Fish Company resided in Oakland, and that his name was unknown, but that he would be contacted Monday, at which time it would be arranged that he call at the police station in order that he attempt to positively identify the 'raft' as being from one of these lost boats.

"ENGIER stated that the 'raft' had been found in the bay about 200 yards from the Yacht Harbor by one JEFFERSON of the Standard Fish Company, SASE ESPIN-OSA being Captain of the boat which happened on to the 'raft'.

"ENGIER'S information in regard to the finding of the raft had been gained from one CHICO, Manager of the Standard Fisheries.

"Agent McCULLOCH examined the raft in the basement of the Hall of Justice, and it was noted that it is approximately $7\frac{1}{2}$ ' x 5' and is very apparently the inside of a large rowboat or lifeboat, the crossboard apparently being the seat of the boat. The boards are substantially bound together with nuts and bolts, and the pontoon which remains is secured in like manner. It positively could not have been the work of Subjects in this case. The raft is considered capable of supporting the weight of the two men had they happened upon it while swimming.

"In regard to the raft probably being a part of the lost boats from the fire at the Union Fish Company, it was noted that the end of one of the boards, approximately 10" in length and 4" across, had been destroyed by fire.

"The boards were also badly battered as if they had been afloat for sometime. On the under side of the crossboard was noted a circular spot of gray paint, the center not being painted, being designed in such a manner that a square resembling the figure one (1) was formed. It is believed that this might be a means of identifying the so-called 'raft'."

On December 24, 1937 Special Agents M. B. MYER-SON and L. D. WINE also examined the raft, and conducted the following investigation:

"Inspectors ENGLER and PAGE, of the San Francisco Police Department were unable to furnish Agents with any definite information regarding the raft, and advised that the official of the Union Fish Company, who was supposed to call and identify the raft last Monday, failed to appear. The officers stated that in their opinion the raft had no significance in instant case.

"The officers having stated that the Chief of Police at Sausalito had some information regarding the raft, Agents WINE and MYERSON proceeded to Sausalito, where they interviewed Chief of Police TONY QUADROS. He stated that he had made an effort to get in touch with the manager of the Union Fish Company, but had been unsuccessful. However, in Agent's presence, the Chief telephoned to the Union Fish Company, got one BUDDY LEE on the telephone, and turned the telephone over to Agent WINE. LEE stated that he was the manager of the Union Fish Company.

"Agent WINE informed LEE that he had information that the Union Fish Company had lost three life boats about a month or six weeks ago in a fire at the Union Fish Company's docks, and that he was of the opinion that the raft found was from one of these life boats. IEE advised, however, that his company had not lost any life boats, and he did not have any knowledge of the origin of the raft.

"The 'raft' in question which was further minutely examined by Agents WINE and MYERSON, is not
a 'raft', but part of an old life boat which had been
burned, excepting parts of the wooden gunwales and
two metal cylinders which had been used as watertight compartments. All bolts and metal fittings were
badly rusted, and corroded, indicating it was not
of recent construction. There are no marks or other
characteristics on this wreckage through which it
may be identified, and no way of determining its
origin."

Active investigation is being continued in this case. No undeveloped leads are being set out in this report.





There is enclosed with a copy of this communication designated for the Technical Suboratory, a water glass which was obtained by Special Agent J. R. McCULLOCH from the J. B. HERSCHLER home in Muir Woods Matienal Monument Grounds, near Mill Valley, Galifornia. According to Mr. and Mrs. HERSCHLER, it is believed that the burglar who entered their home on December 19, 1937, hapdled this glass and when the glass was dusted by Agent McCULLOCH, some latent prints appeared.

Wine made inquiry at Watsonville, and learned from Postmaster Harry Bridgewater that Mrs. RUIE PETTYIOHN, receiving mail at Box 492, Watsonville, on Movember 29, 1937 left am order to have her mail forwarded to Box 361, Ballinger, Texas.

Investigation at Watsonville indicated that Mrs. Pettyjohn used the names RUTH/MORTIN, RUTH/HOWARD and RUTH PETTYJOHN and received mail under all of these names. She is known to have operated a house of prostitution in Watsonville, and recently attended a beauty college and may be operating such a shop at Ballinger. The description of Mrs. Pettyjohn is as follows: About 31, height 5, 8, bobbed hair, blue eyes, nasal voice, hooked nose.

As requested in reference report, Mrs. Pettyjohn should be located and interviewed, and this matter should receive expeditious attention.

### DETAILS:

On December 26, 1937, it was observed by the agents on duty at the plant being maintained on the home of VIOLET DAWSON at Bell, California, at which place MR. & MRS. FRED COLE were visiting over the holidays, that the Coles were departing in their automobile. Upon the receipt of this information at the Los Angeles office, Special Agent H. A. Smith and the writer proceeded immediately to Woodlake, California, arriving in that city at 9:30 P. M. the same date. A surveillance of the Cole residence, located two and one-half miles southeast of Woodlake, California, was maintained from this time until instructions were received from Special Agent in Charge J. H. Hanson on the afternoon of December 31, 1937, to discontinue the surveillance.

During this period of surveillance, agents contacted numerous persons in the vicinity of Woodkake, California, and in the city itself, but due to the fact that no direct information as to the presence of either of the fugitives in that vicinity was obtained, the names of these individuals are not being set out in this report.

During the period of surveillance mentioned above, daily contacts were made with both Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cole, who throughout this period reiterated their original promises to cooperate with the Bureau in the apprehension of the fugitives.

On December 28, 1937, during an interview with Postmaster EDITH DAY, Woodlake, the writer was told by Miss Day that she suspected that MRS. FRED COLE was dispatching her mail from some other point, inasmuch as she had deposited no mail in the Woodlake Post Office since the instant escape, whereas prior to this date Mrs. Cole had posted considerable mail. On this same date, Mrs. Cole was observed by agents to depart in the Cole automobile and was followed by agents to Exeter, California, where she did some shopping. Inasmuch as agents were known to Mrs. Cole, it was impossible to maintain close contact with her, and it was not definitely established as to whether or not she visited the post office there. However, immediately after Mrs. Cole's departure from Exter, agents contacted Postmaster W. M. McCLEAREN, who made a search of the outgoing mail which was in the drop box at that time and advised that there was no mail addressed to any persons or cities which would indicate that same was mailed by Mrs. Fred Cole.

Postmaster McClearen was advised as to Mrs. Cole's connection with the instant case and was requested to watch both incoming and outgoing mail for possible letters addressed to or sent by Mrs. Cole, and he was furnished with the names and addresses of Mrs. Cole's relatives to assist in this procedure.

A search was also made by Postmaster McClearen of the box rentals, and he advised that there was no box rented to Mrs. Fred Cole, and that due to the very large number of General Delivery patrons he was unable to state as to whether Mrs. Fred Cole was receiving mail through General Delivery at the Post Office, but that he would be on the alert for any mail received for her in the future.

On December 31, 1937, it was ascertained from Postmaster Day at Wood-lake, California, that the Coles had received what appeared to be a greeting card enclosed in an envelope addressed to Mrs. and Mr. Cole at Box 215, Woodlake, California, bearing the return address B ox 7, Leavenworth, Kansas, and postmarked Leavenworth, Kansas, December 27, 1937. Tracings were made of this piece of mail. Later, in an interview with FRED COLE, he volunteered the information that they had that day received a greeting card from FLOYD HILL at Leavenworth Penitentiary, and exhibited this card to agents and delivered it to the writer, stating that he did not wish to keep it and was willing to furnish it for any value it might have in the investigation.

It was noted that this card was a regular Christmas greeting card and bore the handwriting notation: "Please don't worry Mother, I think he is safe." This card was signed by FLOYD A HILL. The card and envelope were both subjected to heat but no evidence of secret writing was observed. This card is being maintained in the Los Angeles file until such time as it may be pertinent in the investigation.

It should be stated here that during previous interviews, both MR. & MRS. FRED COLE had been questioned by the writer as to their knowledge of FLOYD HILL and HUGH BUTCHER, it being recalled that investigation in the case entitled "HUGH BUTCHER, with aliases; UNKNOWN SUBJECTS - Alleged Plot of Inmates of Alcatraz Prison to Escape", had developed that one HUGH BUTCHER, upon his release from Alcatraz, was found to be in possession of several notes indicating that he was to contact MRS. FRED COLE at Woodlake, California, and request her to get in touch with "FLOYD". During these original interviews, FRED COLE stated that he had no knowledge of a FLOYD HILL, or anyone else having a name similar to this. MRS. FRED COLE stated that she recalled a FLOYD HILL but was unable to definitely place him.

After being shown the above mentioned greeting card, MRS. FRED COIE was vigorously interviewed as to her connection with FLOYD HILL. She appeared very unresponsive to questioning about same but reluctantly admitted that she knew Floyd Hill had been incarcerated with her son, THEODORE COLE, in the McAlester Penitentiary, and had also served time with Theodore Cole in Leavenworth Penitentiary, and that during these periods FLOYD HILL and her son had become great

friends, and that they had manufactured a fountain-pen set which they had sent to her for a Christmas present some years ago. She stated that she had received two or three letters from FLOYD HILL, who seemed to accept her as a mother. She stated, however, that she had never communicated with Floyd Hill directly, although she had sent greetings to him in letters addressed to her son.

When it was pointed out to Mrs. Cole that at the time Floyd Hill and her son were incarcerated together her address was different from her present address, Mrs. Cole was unable to account for the fact that Hill did have her correct address in Woodlake, California, stating that she had not furnished it to him and had no knowledge as to how he had obtained it.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Cole were again vigorously interviewed as to any visits they may have had from released prisoners from Alcatraz, and both denied that they had ever received any such visits or that they had any knowledge of HUCH BUTCHER. Mrs. Cole also stated that since her son had been confined in Alcatraz he had made no mention to her of FLOYD HILL.

The above information was furnished to the Kansas City Division by letter on December 31, 1937, with the request that FLOYD HILL be interviewed at Leavenworth Penitentiary.

Upon receiving instructions from Special Agent in Charge Hanson that the surveillance of the Cole home was to be discontinued, arrangements were made with the following individuals in Woodlake, California, so that any information obtained by them would be forwarded to the Los Angeles Division:-

R. C. BROWN, Constable;
TOM ARCHER, Deputy Constable;
MISS EDITH DAY, Postmaster;
WALTER STAMMAN, filling station operator;
MR. LEON BIMAT, groceryman;
MRS. LEON BIMAT, restaurant keeper;
DENNIS VIION, druggist;
LORNEY FAME, barber;
C. J. MCKSON, farmer;
BERT USRY, farmer and neighbor of the Coles;
GEORGENASHVILLE, farmer and neighbor of the Coles;
JOENNORK, farmer and neighbor of the Coles;

The address and telephone number of the Los Angeles Division were left with each of these individuals, together with the telep hone numbers of Special Agent in Charge Hanson and Special Agent H. A. Smith. Arrangements were made at the local telephone office to cover all telephone calls and telegrams received or sent by the Coles. A mail cover also has been placed on the mail addressed to and mailed by the Coles.

MR. FRED COLE, who had previously promised his full cooperation, was also contacted by Agents and re-affirmed his original promise to cooperate. The Federal Harboring Statute was again explained to Mr. Cole, and he was also advised of the fact that the Bureau would pay a reasonable sum for any information furnished to this office as to the whereabouts of either of the fugitives.

With the completion of these arrangements, the surveillance on the COLE home was discontinued at 4:30 P. M., December 31, 1937.

The following memorandum was submitted by Special Agent R. N. Pranke:

AT BELL, CALIFORNIA:

A twenty-four hour plant was maintained at the home of LEONARD STAMP-FLI, 62482 Gifford Avenue, Bell, California, where Agents of the Los Angeles Field Division watched the home of Mrs. VIOLET DAWSON, 6238 Gifford Avenue, half-sister of Subject COLE, from December 18 to 31st, 1937, inclusive, at which time the plant was discontinued upon instructions received from SAC JOHN H. HANSON. This plant was maintained by Special Agents Pranke, Stone, Miller and Tomlinson and a complete log was kept of the activities of Mr. and Mrs. DAWSON, which log is being retained in the Los Angeles Field Division file.

It may be stated that no information of value was received at all and it was particularly noted that the DAWSONS retired early at night and had no company at all except Mrs. DAWSON's mother who visited them during Chiratemas time. Mr. and Mrs. LEONARD STAMPFLI were given identification orders and promised to keep a surveillance of the DAWSON home, which they stated could only be done during the evening and over the weekend inasmuch as they both work during the day. They were given the telephone number and address of the Los Angeles Field Division and promised to communicate immediately with it should they obtain any information value.

LOUIS S. STIVERS, mail carrier, advised Agent on December 31, 1937, that he was keeping a constant surveillance on the DAWSON home, but had no information of value to report. He was also given identification orders for Subjects and promised his utmost dooperation in the future.

LEE BOREN, Postmaster, Bell, California, advised Agent Pranke on December 31, 1937, that he had instructed Mr. STIVERS to pay particular attention to the DAWSON home and stated that this would be done in the future. He also stated that as a result of the mail cover previously placed by the Los Angeles office he had to report that they did not receive much mail at all except a few Christmas cards, which he noted to be from the following parties:

AMEY GIBSON at West Point, California; Aunt LAURA at Hennessey, Oklahoma; MR. and MRS. HAROLD DAWSON, Lindsay, California; sympathy card from Mrs. W. P. KCRUMLEY, Woodlake, California; AUNT LAURA at Lindsay, California; card from "RAY" at Monterey Park, California.

At the time of Agent's interview with Mr. BOREN he stated that his office had just received a letter which was to be delivered to the DAWSON family and the same was shown to Agent and it was noted that it was addressed to Mr. and Mrs. G. L. DAWSON, being postmarked at Liberal, Kansas, December 28, 1937, at 7:30 P. M., and bore the return address of C. L. LULLER, Liberal, Kansas.

Inasmuch as the plant was discontinued it was deemed advisable to conduct further inquiries among other neighbors and have them watch the DAW-Mr. BOREN previously advised Agent Pranke that WILLIAM B. Mc-SON home. ELURE, whose home address is 6224 Gifford Avenue, telephone Lafayette 4735. and who operates the Bell Auto Top Shop at 6234 Gifford, which is immediately north of the DAWSON home was a reliable business man and could be trusted. Therefore, Mr. Pranke personally contacted Mr. McCLURE and had him come to his office at the Postoffice Building, at which time the facts relative to Subject's escape were discussed with Mr. McCLURE and he was told the relationship existing between Mrs. DAWSON and Subject COLE. McCLURE stated he has known the DAWSON family for approximately a year, this being the time they have lived at their present address, but that he is not personally acquainted with them. He was given identifications orders on the Subjects and he promised his utmost cooperation and stated that during the day he is continuously either in his shop or in the back yard and has an excellent view of both front and rear views of the DAWSON home. He further advised that should he receive any information at all he would immediately notify the Los Angeles Field Division.

WILLARD B. STEELE, Chief of Police, Bell, California, was reinterviewed by Agent Pranke, at which time he was advised that the plant was being
discontinued. He was, therefore, requested to instruct his officers to pay
particular attention to the DAWSON home for any individuals who may be Subjects
and he stated that he would give the Los Angeles Field Division his utmost
cooperation and he, himself, personally would pay particular attention to
the DAWSON home. The Chief advised that he had identification orders on Subjects, which he had shown to his men and he was also given a standup and head
photograph of Subject COLE, the same being taken at the time of COLE's arrest
at Dallas, Texas.

MRS. VIOLET DAWSON, 6238 Gifford Avenue, Bell, California, was again interviewed by Agent Pranke on December 31, after all of the above contacts were made and she stated she had no additional information concerning Subject COLE. She further advised that her mother and step-father visited

them during the Christmas holidays, at which time her mother expressed the firm opinion that Subject COLE was dead as she stated that her mother had that feeling. Mrs. DAWSON reiterated that she would cooperate with the Los Angeles Field Division.

Photographs of Subjects also have been placed in the Los Angeles bank robbery album.

On December 17, 1937, Special Agent in Charge Hapson received a telephone call from an individual giving the name of ITALK N. FORTH, who stated that he had been confined in a military prison at Alcatraz Island and had later been transfered by the military authorities to the Department of Justice and had been incarcerated in Alcatraz as No. 305. This individual stated that he had worked with subjects Cole on the dock and had been approached by Cole with plans for an escape, and was requested to contact someone on the outside for aid. Porter stated that he had already furnished this information to the San Francisco Division office. He also advised that he was catisfied that both of the subjects were still on the Island.

Forter stated that while he was confined at Alcatraz the chief topic of conversation among the prisoners was the possibility of escape, and that he had had conversations with subject CCID as to plans for such an escape; that Cole had planned to secure a five-foot length of garden hose and conceal himself under the dock, breathing through the garden hose, and later, under cover of darkness, make his getaway to the mainland. Porter stated that he could be reached through the Federal Probation Office and that his present address was 108 North Adams Street, Glendale, California.

This information was immediately communicated to the San Francisco Division by Special Agent in Charge Hanson by telephone.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. D. Lorn on December 27, 1937, at Glendale, California.

C. A. STURDAVANT, employed by the War Department, 103 North Adams Street, Glendale, California, advised that FLANK M. FORTER, his mother and brother rented a room at that address and stayed for one week, leaving on Dec. 18, 1937, with no forwarding address. Agent Norm ascertained that Forter left no forwarding address at the Glendale Fost Office and that the Glendale Police Department had no other address for Porter.

It was also ascertained telephonically from the Mederal Probation Ciffice that the last address that office had for POLTER was 108 North Adams Street, Glendele, California, and that Porter was not due to report again until January 1, 1938; and that MR. SHIVELY, the Probation Cifficer handling the case, was out of town until after January 1, 1938.

With reference to individuals in California entering from Crogon on December 15 and 16, 1937, and in connection with the investigation as to the purchase of Department of Connerce charts in Fortland, Cregon, the following investigation has been conducted.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent (A) J. C. Sloane, Los Angeles, on December 29, 1937:-

- MR. W. D. NIELSON, telephone DRexel 0065, 457 Bonnie Brae, the La Grace Apartments, Ios Angeles, advised that his brother, J. M. WIELSON, Marysville, Kansas, was not presently visiting him, nor was he with Mrs. Nielson's father, F. ZYBACH, at Long Beach, California.
- A. S. NIEISON further advised that his brother and family have been in Cornelius, Oregon, for some time, and that they stopped here and spent a few days with him on their way back home. Mr. Nielson advised that his brother left Los Angeles by automobile about 4:00 P. M. on the evening of December 21, 1937. He was not in a position to give any information regarding his brother's activities while in Cornelius, and he did not know whether his brother had been in Portland, Oregon, on December 15, 1937.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. D. Horn at Fresno, California, on January 2, 1938:-

EARL VIVIAN NICHOLSON, 2516 Washington Street, Fresno, California, advised that he has rented an apartment and is moving to 1317 "P" Street tomorrow, January 3, 1938; that he has a home at Box 2004, Route 8, Portland, Ore., where he has lived for seven years; that he was working as a dancing instructor; that he and his wife came to California to visit FRANK H. SMITH and his wife who reside at the Washington Street address, and that he is planning on building and operating an auto camp at Fresno.

Mr. Nicholson professed no knowledge concerning the purchase of Department of Commerce booklets or charts, and stated that he made no inquiries in Portland concerning currents or tides in the San Francisco region. Nicholson is described as being about 45 years of age, 5 feet 7 inches tall, 160 pounds, brown hair, partly grey, blue eyes, and stout build.

With reference to teletype from Aberdeen Division, dated December 29, 1937, Special Agent (A) E. P. Hair conducted the following investigation on December 30, 1937, January 3 and 4, 1938:

TOSTEN H. FOLKESTAD was interviewed at 723 Orizaba Ave., Long Beach, California. With him at the time of the interview were his wife, a son of his wife's, ALLAN LYHOLAQUIST, and the wife of the latter. All of these persons were on the automobile trip taken recently. FOLKESTAD advised that they had left their home in South Dakota on Nevember 19, 1937; that they had visited in Portland, Oregon for three or four days and while there visited JIMCHASE at 1927 S.E. 35th Place. From there they went to Silverton, Oregon where they spent four or five days and then proceeded to Long Beach, California, arriving on Saturday, December 18, 1937. They checked back and found that they had been in Silverton from December 9th to December 14th and therefore were not in Portland around December 15th Since they proceeded directly from Silverton to Long Beach. All of these people stated that they did not make any inquiry regarding Pacific Coast current tables or any pamphlets regarding tides in the San Francisco Bay; that they have no interest whatsoever in any subject or similar subjects.

FOLKESTAD advised that he is well-acquainted with ANDREW SALPSON and the other persons who were in SALPSON'S automobile on their recent trip. He said that they had not made the entire trip together, but they had met SALPSON and his party in Silverton, Oregon and they had proceeded to Long Beach together. FOLKESTAD said that he felt positive that SALPSON and the people in his party had not made any inquiry regarding the ocean currents or tides. He said that he did not know the exact address of these people but thought they could be located through ALNA GUNDARSON in Pasadena.

Agent communicated with ANNA GUNDERSON, 1236 No. Sierra Bonita, Pasadena, by telephone and she advised that SAFESON and the other people with him called at her house occasionally but she did not know their exact address. She stated that she would ascertain their address when she saw them next. Agent later ascertained that they could be reached at 7000 Sherman Way, Bell, Califernia. At this address, Agent found MRS. A. H. GARLNER who said that she was a friend of SAFESON'S and that they called at her house frequently while on their visit to California and she said

that they had discussed with MR. FOIKESTAD of Long Beach the matter regarding which Agent made inquiry. She said that all of these people mentioned that they had not made any such inquiries regarding tides or currents although they had passed through Portland but had stopped there only long enough to eat lunch. She advised, in addition to the people mentioned in the teletype of reference, that LORRAINE HOLLAND, a niece of SAMPSON'S, had accompanied them.

MRS. GARDNER said that SAMPSON had mentioned getting in touch with Agent after learning that inquiry was being made, but had decided that inasmuch as he had no information regarding the matter he would not have to do so. Agent informed her that under the circumstances he did not believe that it would be necessary for SAMPSON to personally be interviewed or communicate with the los Angeles Division.

Investigation with regard to DR. W. REGINALD FISHLEIGH and WELLS GWINN, mentioned in reference letter from the Seattle Division dated December 31, 1937, has so far been unsuccessful in locating either of these persons.

VIRGIL LONG, 9536 San Carlos Avenue, South Gate, Calif., was interviewed on the evening of December 28, 1937, regarding the article in the newspapers reporting that a man believed to be RALPH ROE had been given a ride by Long from Oxnard to Los Angeles.

Long advised Special Agent (A) E. P. Hair that on Wednesday, December 22, 1937, he was making his usual early morning round-trip from Los Angeles to Santa Barbara for the B. & R. Transportation Company in a Chevrolet truck, and about 10:30 A. M. on his return he stopped at Pete's Restaurant in Oxnard, California, for something to eat. He was reading a newspaper, and while there he was asked for a ride to Santa Monica, Calif., by a man, and he agreed. The man, after getting to Santa Monica, decided he would continue on into Los Angeles, first stating that his folks lived near the point where First and Second Streets come together, but deciding to get off the truck at Pico and Sawtelle in Los Angeles, as he had a friend in that vicinity. This was about 12:30 or 1:00 P. M. the same day.

Long later ascertained that this man had asked another person in Pete's Restaurant in Oxnard for a lift, and had been refused, and this person told a waiter that he believed the man might be one of the fugitives from Alcatraz. The waiter was JIM KERRICK, son of a former Oxnard chief of police, and he tried to have the Highway Patrol stop the truck en route, but they were unable to do so. Long was shown the pictures in a newspaper, and he thought the man who had accompanied him bore some resemblance to ROE.

Long stated that the suspect carried a large grip, which was of grey metal, and was quite heavy. He spoke with anaccent and said he had been in this country for six years, coming from H ungary. Long thought the accent was like that of a Swede. The man did not mention his name but they talked about various things of the trip, and he said that he was from Klamath Falls, Oregon, and was going to spend the holidays in Los Angeles. He wore a button which he said was for a Klamath Falls Taxi Drivers' Union.

When this individual got off the truck at Pico and Sawtelle, in answer to a kidding remark about a girl, the man said it was a male friend. Long does not know which way he went and has not seen him since. Long, after furnishing a description of the man, which does not fit Roe, was shown several pictures including those of Roe and Cole. He looked at them and said that none of them was a picture of the man he had given a ride. He then was shown the pictures on the Identification Orders, and he said the picture of Roe thereon was probably the picture he had seen in the paper, and he thought it bore some resemblance, but the other picture of Roe shown him by agent, which was much more clear, was said by Long not to be the man. The description of this unknown person, as given by Long, is as follows:-

Age 26 to 28 years
H eight 5' 8"
Weight 170 to 175 lbs.
Build Fairly heavy
Eyes Possibly blue
Hair Brown, parted on left

Dress

Peculiarities Described as odd individual, chiefly because of thin face, sunken cheeks, and long narrow chin, which seemed

twisted to one side.

No hat; black wool trousers with small red stripe; jacket of lumber-jack type; clothing fairly clean and neat.

Nationality Claims to be Hungarian.
Speech Spoke with accent.

Informant stated that he did not expect to see the man again, but that if he does he will notify the Los Angeles Bureau office.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. D. Horn on December 31, 1937, at Merced, California.

In company with Deputy Sheriff M. M. MORSE, Agent Horn interviewed VERNE McDANIEL, Merced County Jail. He advised that neither his father nor his mother, MR. & MRS. BEN McDANIEL, Livingston, California, is related to TED COLE or his family; that, however, Ben McDaniel and his wife are acquainted with Ted Cole's family at Woodlake, California, and knew them in Oklahoma; that, however, he, Verne McDaniel, never knew Ted Cole although he and Ted Cole were confined at the same reformatory, the Granite Reformatory, but at different times; that TED COLE was released before he was sent there; that he did a two and one-half year stretch there, and when he was released Ted Cole was in the McAlester Penitentiary.

At Livingston, Calif., BEN McDANIEL was interviewed by Agent Horn in company with Deputy Sheriff M. M. Morse, and he repeated the information given above by his son, VERNE McDANIEL. In addition, he stated that he knew TED COLE when the latter was wearing knee breeches in Oklahoma, but just knew him as one of the boys who hung on the rails while they were herding cattle to ship them or to dip them for ticks; that he learned to know Ted Cole among the other boys because he had known his mother and her family, the BRACES, for about twenty years, although not intimately; that he is acquainted with NETTIE BRACE, ERNEST BRACE, and the feeble-minded sister, all presently living at Stroud, Oklahoma. He advised that he knew Fred Cole in Oklahoma because he had known his wife, and that they went to the same church.

Ben McDaniel also advised that he knew of RALPH ROE in Oklahoma and that the latter associated with WIIBUR INDERHILL before the latter was killed. He stated that Ralph Roe went with AMY PAYNE (deceased), daughter of BRUCE PAYNE, then living at Depew, Oklahoma; that Bruce's son, J. B. PAYNE is in the McAlester Penitentiary for robbery of the Payden, Oklahoma, bank; that "WHITEY" PAYNE, Bruce's brother, was killed at Tulsa, Okla., in a gambling brawl, and another brother of Bruce was killed in a roadhouse near Bristow, Oklahoma; that JESS PAYNE shot a fellow in Stroud, Oklahoma, in 1925 or 1926 and was living at Drumright, Oklahoma, when last known; that Bruce has a son whose name is not known to him; that the Baynes are a lawless bunch and that they are the best contacts RALPH ROE has in Oklahoma. He advised Agent Horn as a tip to watch the Paynes in order to catch Roe if he is alive.

McDaniel stated that it is being reported in the vicinity of Livingston that TED COTE is his nephew, and that he does not know who started the report but that it is not true; that he is not related to the Coles in any way. The Harboring Statute was explained to Ben McDaniel, but he stated that he was already aware of it; that he did not want anything to do with either COIE or ROE, and that if he obtained any information about either he would give it to Sheriff CORNELL.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. D. Horn on December 30, 1937, at Los Banos, California.

While Agent Horn was exhibiting the photographs of RALPH ROE and TED COLE to C. L. MARTIN, night police officer, Los Banos, he advised that the build of Cole in the full-length photograph resembled a man who worked at the Liberty Cafe scrubbing floors and washing dishes from midnight to about 2:30 A. M. during the night of December 29, 1937. He further advised that this fellow and another fellow first appeared in Los Banos about 10:30 P. M. after the arrival of a freight train.

ALLAN FAY SIMMONS RILEY, whom Agent was investigating in another matter, advised that he had drunk a cup of coffee in the Liberty Cafe while the man mentioned by Officer Martin was scrubbing the floor. Agent Horn exhibited the photographs of Roe and Cole to Riley and hepicked out the photograph of Roe and advised that the man who was working in the Liberty Cafe resembled that photograph.

MANUEL LEMA, night operator of the Liberty Cafe, was contacted by Agent Horn in company with Constable LEWIS HULEN. Agent Horn spread various photographs of Roe and Cole on the table, and before the agent could open the conversation Lema immediately picked out the photograph of RALPH ROE and stated emphatically that that man worked for him for about two hours and a half the previous night. He stated that about 12:00 midnight the man came in and said that he was hungry, and asked if he could not wash the dishes; that he, Lema, told him that if he washed the dishes and scrubbed the floor he would give him a meal and fifty cents; that the man was a good worker, and after he had finished he told him he could get a room with the Chinaman, but he replied that his partner had a bedroll and that they were staying in the jungles at the third cabin from the road where there were three cabins in a row; that just prior to going to work, this man had gone outside the restaurant and had spoken to a man who was apparently his partner, and whom Lema did not see.

Lema described this man as about 30 years old, 5 feet 7 or 8 inches, 160 pounds, brown hair, one and one-half inch scar about the hairline on his right forehead, and dressed in a dark grey suit. Questioned as to whether he noticed anything on the back of the man's left hand, Lema stated that while the man was washing dishes he noticed something blue which he thought to be a ring on the back of his little finger on his left hand. He advised that when he paid the man the fifty cents, the man asked him if he could return the next night and work, and that Lema told him he could; that the man then said that if he were in town he would return. Lema stated that while this man was in the cafe, Officers C. L. MARTIN and JOSEPH DEGREGORI were the only persons he could remember being in the cafe.

Agent Horn then asked Lema if he knew whose photographs exhibited were, and he said he did not. The agent then exhibited the identification orders on Roe and Cole to Lema, and he became excited and again identified the photograph of Roe, stating that he was sure and that he had a "hunch" that the man who worked for him the previous night was Roe, although he admitted that he was not very good at identifying faces.

Agent Horn again questioned Lema concerning the description of the man, and he stated that he was six feet tall and that the scar was just above his right eyebrow instead of at the hairline.

Officer JOSEPH DeGREGORI was interviewed at his home, and after viewing the photographs of Cole and Roe could not identify either, stating that he did not pay any particular attention to the man while he was working in the cafe. He did pick out the full-length photograph of TED COLE as resembling the build of the man. He stated that the man, in his estimation, was not six feet tall and was about 5 feet 8 inches tall. He stated that he saw the man again alone about 7:00 A. M. When he was turning out the lights on the street; that the man came walking by and he recognized him as the man who had worked in the cafe, and they exchanged a good-morning greeting.

Officer MARTIN was again contacted and advised that he could not make any identification; that he did not pay any particular attention to the man, and that MANUEL IEMA was the only one who had spoken with the man while in the cafe and had been there with him for about two and a half hours, during which time he and Officer DeGregori had gone in and out of the cafe. Martin stated that when he first saw the two men about 10:30 P. M., they were walking from the railroad tracks where the freight train had just pulled in, and that they asked him for a bed in the jail; that the night was very foggy, wet and cold, but that he had no room in the jail; that he again saw the two men, one of whom he recognized as the man who had worked in the Liberty Cafe, walking toward the railroad tracks about 2:30 A. M. when a freight train was preparing to pull out.

In company with Officer Martin, California State Highway Patrolman BCB JCHNSCN and Deputy Constables JACK STEVES and RICHARD PEART, agent interviewed the occupants of all cabins and dugouts in the "jungles", all groups gathered around campfires and all occupants of box-cars on the railroad tracks, but failed to locate fugitives or the man who had worked at the Liberty Cafe and his companion. In company with Officers Martin and DeGregori, the agent maintained a surveillance of the Liberty Cafe until 1:00 A. M., but the man did not reappear for work. The surveillance was continued throughout the night by Officers Martin and DeGregori while they were on duty, without result.

Reference is made to telegram from the San Francisco Division regarding the possibility that fugitive RALPH ROE might be at Planada, California. The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. D. Horn on December 31, 1937:-

N. L. CORNELL, Sheriff, Merced, California, exhibited to the agent a letter from RUBY E. WILSON, postmaster, Planada, California, dated December 28, 1937, which advised that there is a man stopping at the Planada Hotel fitting the general description of RALPH ROE; that this man drove up in an old car across the street from the Post Office about a week previous in company with a smaller man who did not get out of the car; that this man ran across the street and mailed two cards, one to Long Beach, California, and the other to Oklahoma; that the car and driver disappeared and has not been seen since, but that the tall man with a scar on his face is believed to be working in the kitchen of the Planada Hotel for his meals; that the few times he has come to the Post Office he acted suspiciously and hid his face. Cornell advised that he sent Deputy Sheriff M. M. MORSE to investigate. Morse advised Agent Horn that he had viewed the man referred to by Miss Wilson from a short distance and ascertained that he did not resemble Roe.

In company with Deputy Sheriff Morse, Agent Horn interviewed Postmaster RUBY E. WILSON, Planada, California, who could furnish no additional information, except that the following parcels of mail are awaiting delivery to this man:-

Letter postmarked Tulsa, Okla., Dec. 15, 1937, addressed to MR. ROY KOSEBOROUGH, General Delivery, Planada, Calif.; no return address;

Letter postmarked Los Angeles, Calif., Dec.23, 1937, addressed to ROY ROSEBORUGE, General Delivery, Planada, Calif., return address Maud Squires, 212 N. Grand Ave., Los Angeles.

Miss Wilson also advised that this man had recently mailed a postcard asking for money to MRS.EVERTANDREW, 1061 Chestnut Avenue, Long Beach, Calif., and signed his name ROY ECHNEIDER.

At the Planada Hotel, C. B. SCHLIEPER, Manager, advised that the only guest or recent arrival is RAYMOND SCHNEIDER who recently came from Long Beach, Calif., to visit him; that Schneider is from Perkins County, Nebraska, and that he, Schieper, has known him and his parents since he was a very small boy; that he is about twenty-two years of age and is a good boy from a good family; that the only other persons in the house besides two permanent guests, who have been with him for a long time, are his wife and his son, age twenty; that Schneider had hitch-hiked to Planada.

RAYMOND SCHNEIDER'S fingerprints were compared by the agent with those of Cole and Roe and were found not to be identical. He verified the information furnished by Schlieper and stated that he had mailed five postcards, all to his relatives in Long Beach, but denied mailing any cards or other correspondence to Tulsa, Oklahoma, or receiving any mail from Tulsa. He advised that he hitch-hiked into Planada, Calif., and walked the last few miles; that he had no companion and that ROY ROSEBOROUGH or ROSEBORUGE is unknown to him. He also advised that he knows no one in Los Angeles, California, and that MAUD SQUIRES is unknown to him.

The following investigation was performed by Special Agent G. J. Ross On December 24, 1937, a telephone call was received from HARRY EVANS of the San Pedro Detective Detail of the Los Angeles Police Department, who advised that Officer POWERS of the San Pedro Police, had received information to the effect that two men had been picked up by a fishing boat near San Francisco about December 20 or 21. Detective Lieutenant EVANS was reporting this information inasmuch as it appeared to him that they might possibly be the men who had escaped from Alcatraz. It was ascertained that Officer POWERS had obtained his information from one RALPH FOSTER of 2636 Denison Avenue.

MR. FOSTER was personally contacted by the writer on December 26, and stated that the boat which had picked the men up was a fishing boat sailing under the name of "Betsey Ross," which fished for the Franco-Italian Packing Company, having offices and factory at the fish wharf in San Pedro.

At the Franco-Italian Packing Company, the writer made arrangements with MR. HOGANE, Assistant Secretary, to be called at the time the "Betsey Ross" came in with a fish load in order that its crew could be interviewed with reference to the men who had been picked up, it having been previously ascertained that it had left San Pedro on a fishing trip. On December 28, 1937, the writer was advised that the "Betsey Ross" was at San Pedro, and proceeded there, at which place its crew was interviewed.

The captain of this vessel is JOHN BRAJCICH. Others on the vessel who were interviewed were PETE SICOLOVICH and a GEORGE DANIELOVICH. These men advised that on Wednesday, December 20, while returning to San Pedro, they had found three men clinging to a buoy just off Santa Monica, California, instead of being near San Francisco as the original report indicated. They stated that the men were JOHN DESPRENTZ, ALLE BORG, and EARD CADMEN, all of Santa Monica, who had been out on a fishing trip; that shortly after picking these men up they came across their little skiff which had gotten away from them; and further that the skiff was provided with fishing equipment bearing out the statement which these men had made that they were out on a little fishing trip from Santa Monica. They described SPRENTZ as being blonde, about 24 years of age, and 5' ll"; CADMEN as being a very small man approximately 38 or 40 years of age; and BORG as being a young man about 20 years of age of German descent.

In view of this development, it is believed that these men are eliminated from further consideration in this case.

Under date of December 25, 1937, the Peoria Division requested that the Los Angeles Office conduct an appropriate investigation with regard to a 1937 Ford Coach bearing Illinois license No. 1563794 issued to DONALD E. WILLMAN, Bloomington, Illinois, which had passed through California checking station from Oregon on December 15 or 16, this investigation to be conducted with a view to determining whether or not this individual could have been the one who made the inquiry at Portland and requested information regarding the tides at San Francisco Bay. It was ascertained that the owner of this car is Ensign DONALD E. WILLMAN assigned to the S. S. Maryland which, at that time, was located in the Long Beach Harbor. Ensign WILLMAN was contacted telephonically by the Los Angeles Office and it was determined from him that his Ford Coach had been driven from Bremerton, Washington, to Long Beach, California, by a seaman named WILLIAMSON, having departed from Bremerton December 14, and arriving at Los Angeles December 23.

Agent interviewed HARRY A WILLIAMSON, a commain assigned to the S. S. Maryland, who stated that in fact he left Bremerton at 7:20 A.M. on December 15 and proceeded to Los Angeles, and that at no time did he stop at Portland, Oregon, en route; and he stated definitely that he did not make any inquiries or purchase any booklets there with regard to tides in San Francisco Bay. He stated that in fact he routed his trip so that he did not have to pass through the main part of Portland, Oregon. WILLIAMSON is described as being 37 years, born May 26, 1900, 51 AO", and dark complexioned. He was described by Commander HOWARD J WELBROOK, the executive officer on the S. S. Maryland, as being a young man of excellent character and one of the finest members of his crew.

The Los Angeles Examiner on December 26, 1937, carried an article to the effect that Coast Guardsmen and Marine lookouts in the San Pedro Police Department were watching for a 14-foot sailing skiff, stating that it had been reported to Sheriff WALTER B. SELLMER of San Pedro as having been stolen from its moorings some time between Sunday, December 19, and Friday, December 24. Inquiry at San Pedro, California, revealed that this was a typographical error in the newspaper and that the theft of this boat had taken place at San Raphael, California, and had been the subject of an all-points bulletin from that place. It was determined at that time that a check had been made by the Coast Guards and the Police at San Pedro with negative results as to the whereabouts of this skiff.

Reference is made to teletype from the San Francisco Division to the Los Angeles Division, 6:25 P.M. December 27, 1937, re: NAMEN PAYNE. The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. D. MOAN on Lecember 28 and 29, 1937:

M. E. TRUITT, Retail Merchants Credit Association, Subway Terminal Building, was unable to identify any record of MALEN PAYNE or AUTH L./YOUNG, in whose name, it was ascertained by Agent, the telephone "Albany 0970" at 5957 Benner Street, is listed.

By observation, Agent ascertained that the house at this address is an old, run-down residence, and that the neighborhood is very poor. An old model coupe, California license 8 C 286, was in the garage.

B. E. LANDIS, Manager, Bureau of Power & Light, 5531 Worth Figueroa Street, advised that the light and water is listed in the name of A. S. PAYNE for this residence, and that the original application, signed by MRS. A. S. PAYNE, was filed on October 10, 1930, and the water and light has been in the same name since that date; that the application shows A.S. PAYNE as a steel worker, not regularly employed, last address Independence, Missouri.

At the Security-First National Bank, C. G. TILTON, Assistant Manager, produced closed Savings Accounts as follows:

Account in the name of IRS. A. S. PAYM, above address, opened June 10, 1933, closed September 19, 1933; occupation nousewife; former bank account Kansas City, Missouri; birthplace Missouri; mother's maiden name ROTH ALES.

Joint account, A. S. and MILEN E. PAYNE, opened June 5, 1934, closed Cotober 25, 1934, above address; occupation Ascot Speedway.

Account in the name of MISS MUTH YOUNG, above address; opened March 2, 1935, closed November 25, 1935; birthplace Missouri; Lother's maiden name SHEGWOOD.

E. J. LOWRY, Carrier, Highland Park Post Office, advised that MRS. PAYNE and several children lived at 5957 Benner Street, but he has not seen the man around the premises; that there have been no strange men there in the last week, and that the only man he sees there is a man named WARD, who is a son-in-law of MRS. PAYNE and resided at 5927 Benner Street; that he delivers mail to HELEN PAYNE from Alcatraz, and mail from San Quentin to a neighbor across the street; that he does not consider the family or the neighbors reliable.

No additional information was obtained from the Southern California Gas Company with the exception that A.S. PAYNE is AMMIE SAPAYNE.

On December 29, 1937 the above information was transmitted to the San Francisco Division by telegram, and telegram received on the same date requesting an interview with HELEN PAYNE.

Accordingly, HEIEN PAYNE was interviewed by Special Agent LISH WHITSON and Agent. She stated that her son, HENRY O. YOUNG, was sent to McNeil Island and later transferred to Alcatraz and has been confined since 1934; that he formerly served a term in Deer Lodge Penitentiary, Montana, and Walla Walla Penitentiary in Washington; that upon the release of WILLIAM BOYD from Alcatraz, the latter came to her, stating he had a message from her son, but had no message except the harsh treatment given to the prisoners in Alcatraz. Further dealings between WILLIAM BOYD and MRS. HEIEN PAYNE are being reported by Agent WHITSON in the case entitled, "KARL CLARK STRAIN, with aliases - FUGITIVE; IMPERSONATION", Los Angeles file 47-1250.

MRS. PAYNE advised that she married A. S. PAYNE about eight years ago in Kansas City, Missouri, and that they moved to California in 1930; that he is now employed as foreman of the Atlantic Speedway, Atlantic and Bandini Avenues, Los Angeles; that she has four children, HENRY O. YOUNG in Alcatraz, DAVID YOUNG in a C.C.C. Camp near Pasadena, California, RUTH L. YOUNG, who is now married to a man named KERN and resides at 117 North Avenue 55, and NAOMI PAYNE, who is married to ROBERT LAWARD; that MR. KERN works for the Cudahy

Packing Company, and his wife RUTH works for McKesson Wholesale Company, Los Angeles; that ROBERT WARD is a musician and is employed by the W.P.A.; that they have a three-month-old child.

She stated that A. S. PAYNE, her husband, is now visiting his relatives in Kansas City, and that he had six children by a former marriage, most of whom are married and living in Kansas City; that his son BILLY PAYNE is in a C.C.C. Camp near Saugus, California.

MRS. PAYNE stated that neither her husband nor any of her relatives other than her son DAVID and her two daughters and their husbands know about the confinement of HENRY YOUNG in Alcatraz, or his past criminal record; that they have carefully kept this information from her husband and his children, and also from her other relatives.

MRS. NAOMI WARD, 5927 Benner Street, was also interviewed by Agents. The Harboring Statute was explained to both MRS. PAYNE and MRS. WARD, and the address and telephone number of the Los Angeles Division was left with them. They promised faithfully to advise the Los Angeles Division any information received concerning the fugitives in this case and WILLIAM BOYD (KARL CLARK STRAIN), and it is believed from their attitude during the interview that they will cooperate.

Interview with MRS. RUTH KERN, 117 North Avenue 55, will also be conducted.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. N. FRANKE, Los Angeles, dated December 22, 1937, regarding JOB BOBERTS, Douglas Aircraft Plant, Santa Monica, California, correspondent of JAMES WARDE, Leavenworth Penitentiary.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. D. HCRN, Los Angeles:

In response to a telephone call from Special Agent in Charge J. H. HANSON, MR. E. K. MERRITT, Director of Industrial Relations, Douglas Aircraft Company, Inc., Santa Monica, advised by letter dated December 23, 1937, that a search of the records in the Personnel Department indicated only the following persons having names or initials which might fit JOE ROBERTS:

FRANCIS JOSEPH ROBERTS, 2506 - 28th Street, Santa Monica, California Employed 9-5-34 (new working) Age 44 Born at Lake Charles, Louisiana

JOHN J ROBERTS, Telephone: Pleasant 6412 314 West 69th Street, Los Angeles, California Employment ended 6-8-37 Age 30, Married Born in South America

JOHN H. ROBERTS, 1342 Toberman Street, Los Angeles, California Presently employed Age 27, single Born in Kansas

On December 28, 1937, JOHN J. ROBERTS, 314 West 69th Street, Los Angeles, advised Agent that he was born in South America, but has been in the United States since 1922; that he worked for two years in Detroit, but has been in California continuously since 1926 and is presently employed by the North American Aviation Corporation, Glendale; that he is Spanish—American nationality, and that he had his Spanish name changed to JOHN J. ROBERTS. He professed no knowledge of JAMES ROE,

and denied correspondence with any individual in Leavenworth Penitentiary.

JOHN H. ROBERTS,  $1342\frac{1}{2}$  Toberman Street, Los Angeles, telephoned Agent at the Los Angeles Division in response to a message left at his residence on December 29, 1937, and advised that he does not know JAMES W. ROE and has never corresponded with anyone in Leavenworth Penitentiary.

Both of the above men had no knowledge of the JOE ROBERTS supposed to have been employed at the Douglas Aircraft Company.

MRS. FRANCIS JOSEPH ROBERTS, 2506 - 28th Street, Santa Monica, California, advised, in the absence of her husband who was not available for interview, that her husband is employed in Department 20, Douglas Aircraft Corporation, and that they have been in California for five years; that prior to that time her husband was in the Navy for 14 years and they resided in Washington, D. C.; that she had no knowledge of JAMES BCE, and no knowledge that her husband corresponded with anyone in Leavenworth Penitentiary.

FRANCIS JOSEPH ROBERTS will be interviewed in person by an Agent from the Los Angeles Division.

E. K. MERRITT furnished Agent on December 27, 1937, a complete list of individuals named ROBERTS who have been and are now employed by the Douglas Aircraft Corporation. This list is being retained in the Los Angeles Division file, but no extensive investigation is being conducted to interview each of these persons inasmuch as there are about thirty in all, none of whom have names or initials fitting "JOE ROBERTS" other than those furnished above by E. K. MERRITT.

Reference is made to Page 12 of the report of Special Agent R. N. Pranke, Los Angeles, dated December 22, 1937, reflecting that C. W. BUTCHER left a forwarding address from Woodlake, California, to 327 South Kenmore Ave., Los Angeles, California. In this connection, the following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. D. Horn.

It was ascertained that the apartment at 327 South Kenmore Avenue, Los Angeles, is a new building, and it was learned from MRS. J. I HOUGHTON, the manager, that she and her husband have resided there since September 1, 1937, and that prior to their coming to that address the apartment was managed by two sisters who had moved to the southeast corner of Third Street and St. Andrews Place, Los Angeles. It was learned telephonically from the Post Office Inspector's office at Los Angeles that C. W. BUTCHER had left no forwarding address from 327 South Kenmore Avenue.

MRS. C. STRECK and MRS. MARGARET VARNHOLT, sisters, 302 South St. Andrews Place, Los Angeles, advised agent that IARRY BUTCHER, age about 35 years, had resided with them at 327 South Kenmore for about a year but had moved to Pasadena, California, where he is employed as an upholsterer; that Larry referred to his brother as "CHET"; that Chet was supposed to operate a restaurant somewhere on South Main Street in Los Angeles. These ladies also informed Agent Horn that IARRY BUTCHER'S address and employment are unknown to them, but that he keeps company with the daughter of R. J. CASNER, 124 West Colorado Street, Pasadena, California, telephone Terrace 1708.

By calling the above number in Pasadena, Agent Horn learned that IARRY BUTCHER was out of town but would return from Oregon on Monday, January 3, 1938; that his residence and place of employment are unknown, and that his brother operated a restaurant somewhere on Santee Street in Los Angeles. Further investigation will be conducted to locate C. W. Butcher through his brother, Larry Butcher.

While of Tulare, California, Agent H. A. Smith and the writer attempted to locate BILL CARTER, who was reported to be acquainted with C. W. BUTCHER. Efforts to locate Carter, however, were unsuccessful, although inquiries were made at the Post Office and at the Tulare Police Department.

In accordance with Bureau regulations, one copy of the smooth photographs of each of the fugitives which were received by the Los Angeles office from the Bureau is being forwarded to each of the following persons:-

MISS EDITH DAY, Postmaster, Woodlake, Calif.; R. C. BROWN, Constable, Woodlake, Calif.; LEE BOREN, Postmaster, Bell, Calif., and WILLARD B. STEELE, Chief of Police, Bell, Calif. As a result of the mail covers placed on the mail of MR. & MRS. DAWSON at Bell, California, and MR. & MRS. FRED COLE at Woodlake, California, and MRS. FAE ROE, Arcadia, California, a number of mail tracings have been received by the Los Angeles office. These mail tracings are being forwarded to the office of origin in this case with copies of this report for appropriate attention by that office.

name as a sister she became exceedingly emotional and wept, and then stated that she had a brother of whom the family had not heard for some four or five years and did not know what had become of him. She stated that his name was Fred Carpenter, that he was a World War veteran and had been gaseed while in the Arry and that the family had rado rather extensive efforts for the past three or four years to obtain some trace of him, especially in view of the fact that her mother became exceedingly ill approximately one year ago and died at her home, but they had been unable to locate him or determine where he may have been over the period of the past four or five years. She further stated that when other veterans were being paid on their adjusted service certificates the family wrote to the Veterans Adminictration and were informed that Fred Carpenter had made no claim of any sort against the government. She stated that he had a shrappel wound in one of his arms and also a wound in one kidney, she did not know which arm or kidney. She stated they were unable to locate him during her mother's illness or at the time of her death in 1935 in Indianapolis. She further stated that she has no brother or sister in Shelbyville, Indiana, but that her brother Dallas Carpenter now lives with her in Indianapolis. She has another brother Raymond Carpenter presumably employed in the police department at Evenston. Illinois.

Mrs. Duschmann begged for information as to how she might be able to contact Fred Carpenter and agent stated that he did not know his address but stated that it might possibly be obtained through the federal probation officer at Columbus, Chio, to whom Fred Carpenter had been instructed to report after his discharge from Alcatraz.

In view of the fact that she did not know the whereabouts of Fred Carpenter he has not, of course, written her any letters from Alcatraz and therefore has not mentioned to her the name of Ralph Ree or Theodore Cole. She promised agent she would inform agent if he mentioned these percens.

Subsequently Dallas Carpenter telephoned agent and stated that he is employed in one of the State departments and did not desire that he be embarrassed by information going to his superiors or associates concerning his brother. However, he desired any information agent could give him concerning his brother and gave agent substantially the same information as had been given by his sister, which was negative. He likewise was informed that if any information is received by him or his sister concerning Roe or Cole he and she should immediately inform the Indianapolis office of the bureau and he was likewise informed of the penalties for harboring. He promised to inform the Indianapolis office of any subsequent information he might receive.





Nobbs on a tour through the northwest for the Porte Publishing Company; that as he recalls they were in Portland, Oregon, from about December 8th to December 14th, and that they were in Wyreka, California (phonetic) on the night of December 15, 1937, and stayed at the Wyreka Inn: that they thereafter proceeded to San Francisco, California, that he proceeded from San Francisco to Salt Lake City by train, and that E.W. Nobbs drove on to his home in Los Angeles, California. described Nobbs as a man in his fifties, about 5ft. 6in., in height, and that he weighed approximately 165 lbs. that they had purchased any charts or other booklets, or tables concerning tidal currents in San Francisco Bay .

On December 27, 1937, copy of a teletype from the Los Angeles Field Division, directed to the San Francisco and Portland Field Divisions was received by mail, advising that Nobbs

A teletype from the Butte Field Division dated December 24th, advised that Chevrolet Coupe, containing two passengers, bearing Montana license 2422, passed through the checking station on the California-Oregon border on December 15th or 16th; that this car was registered to William McRae of Miles City, Montana; that McRae of Miles City, Montana, is reliable, and has been employed for years as a janitor in a grade school, and had been on a vacation trip with his wife through the northwest, and that he was presently reported visiting relatives at 668 - 24th Street, Ogden, Utah.

#### AT OCDEN, UTAH.

Agent interviewed William McRae at 668 - 24th Street, Ogden, Utah, on the afternoon of December 25, 1937, at which time Mr. McRae stated that he and his wife were in Portland, Oregon, on December 12th and 13th; that they were in Roseburg, Oregon, on the night of the 14th, where they stayed at a tourist camp; that they were in Red Bluff, California, on the night of the 15th, where they stayed at the Riverside Tourist Camp; that they were in Winnemucca, Nevada, on the night of December 16th, also stopping at tourist cabins, and arrived in Ogden, Utah, on December 17th. Mr. McRae stated he did not purchase any booklets while in Portland concerning tidal currents or charts of San Francisco Bay. Mr. McRae stated that he is 58 years old, and has resided in Miles City, Montana, for approximately 42 years. He further advised that he was 6ft. 12in. in height; that he weighed 190 lbs., and it was observed that he had blue eyes, brown hair, thin on top, and that he was very lame in his right leg. He further stated that after the holidays he was returning to Miles City, Montana.

On December 25, 1937, Resident Agent R.J. Abbaticchio Jr., Reno, Nevada, telegraphically advised the Salt Lake City office that 1937 Nevada license plates T 8621 were registered to Holland and Prida, Winnemucca, Nevada, for 1937 Chevrolet pick-up truck, motor No. K 1023451; that the Sheriff at Winnemucca had advised that Lawrence Folland and Gillarida are reputable sheep dealers, and that Holland, who resides in Reno, Nevada, is also the owner of the Holland Livestock Company of Ogden, Utah.

Holland was interviewed at Reno, Nevada, by Resident Agent Abbaticchio, and advised that instant truck was driven by Gill Prida and son John Prida to the Zukerman Ranch, 10 miles south of Klamath Falls, Oregon, in October, and driven to Red Bluff, Malifornia, by Gill Prida about December 16th, when moved sheep to ranch 15 miles west of Red Bluff. Holland further advised that the passenger in the car was probably a sheep herder. Holland also stated that Gill Prida and the truck are presently located in care of Turners Groceberia, Red Bluff, California, Turner being the son-in-law of Prida.

Upon receipt of this information, a teletype was immediately directed to the San Francisco Field Division, requesting that Prida be immediately interviewed.

station is closed at 11 P. M. each day and does not open until the following morning at 7 A. M. They were both shown several photographs including that of Richard Tallman Galatas but they could neither identify Galatas as having ever passed through that station to their knowledge. Neither could either of these men remember ever having seen a book relative to tides in the San Francisco/pass through that station either recently or at any time. Agent exhibited to these persons a copy of TIDAL CURRENT CHARTS - SAN FRANCISCO BAY" and CURRENT TABLES PACIFIC COAST", but they did not recall having seen any person with either or both of these books recently and stated that they did not believe that they had ever seen either of these books before.

Agent made a transcription of all the records at this station reflecting all cars going south through this station from 6 P. M. on 12-15-37 to 10 A. M. on 12-16-37 and same is attached hereto.

Agent called at the Quarantine station located 7 miles north of Hornbrook, California and it was there ascertained that the following persons work at this quarantine station and that it is open all the time; that all care including California cars going into California from the North are stopped and checked. Those who operate this station are:

E. Evans
Ed Francis
George Kipp
Fred Fred Trunkfield
Bart Blesh

Relative to December 15 and 16, 1937, the above persons worked as follows:

Evens: 15th - 1 P. M. to 9 P. M.

Francis: 15th - 3 P. M. to 11 P. M.

Kipp: 15th - 11 P. M. to 7 A. M. 16th

Perry: 16th - 8 A. M. to 4 P. M.

Trunkfield: 15th and 16th - 7 A. M. to 5 P. M.

Blesh: 15th and 16th - 6 A. M. to 2 P. M.

Agent interviewed all these persons and exhibited to them photograph of Galatas without effecting any identification. Copies of Tidal Current Charts of San Francisco Bay and Current Tables Pacific Coast were exhibited individually to these persons but none of them remembered having seen such books pass through this station.

Agents made a transcript of all cars passing through this station from 6 P. M. on the 15th of December to 9 A. M. on the 16th of December and copy of same is attached hereto.

At Dorris, California, Agents interviewed Mr. H. J. English who is in charge of this quarantine station and he advised that he was on duty on the 16th of December from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M.; that Mr. William E. Hughes was on duty from midnight of the 15th to 8 A. M. on the 16th and that Herman Johns was on duty from 4 P. M. of the 15th to midnight. Photograph of Galatas was exhibited to Mr. English and Mr. Johns without effecting any identification, also exhibited to these two gentlemen were Tidal Current Charts of San Francisco Bay, and Current Tables Pacific Coast, but they stated they had never seen either of these books pass through this station.

A transcript of all cars, including California cars, passing through this station from 6 P. M. on the 15th to 9 A. M. on the 16th was made and is attached hereto.

Mr. English advised that Mr. Wm. E. Hughes is on vacation and will not return to duty until January 9, 1938; that he can be located at Chico, California through the Postoffice as he is known there.

Relative to the quarantine station at Alturas, California Agent discussed the possibility of a person passing through there on either December 15th or 16th and both Mr. Fahy and Wilson at Bunsmuir advised that their reports showed that this station did no business on either of these dates as the road was closed due to floods. This information was verified by Sgt. McKinnon of the Oregon State Police at Klamath Falls who advised that he was at Lakeview, Oregon on December 14th holding a training school for members of the O. S. P. and that the following day, the 15th he was unable to get out of there as the roads were all flooded and bridges were out and that he is positive that the road into California through Alturas was impassable on the 15th and 16th of December.

Agent while at Klamath Falls, endeavored to telephone to the quarantine station at Alturas but was not successful in getting through due to some trouble on the lines between these two towns.

AT SMITH RIVER, CALIFORNIA:

Agent McCain ascertained at the California State Quarantine

Station located at Smith River that the following were on duty checking cars during the period indicated.

Lloyd Franford, 4 PM to Midnight December 15, 1937 A. S. Johnson, Midnight to 8 AM December 16, 1937 Lloyd Franford, 8 AM to 4 PM December 16, 1937

A transcript of the list of cars passing through this station from 6 PM 12-15-37 to 9 AM 12-16-37 was obtained.

The picture of Richard Calatas was exhibited to A. S. Johnson who stated that the picture seemed to resemble someone he has seen. He could not recall whether it was someone he had known in the past, but stated that he felt sure it did not resemble anyone he has seen recently. The copies of "Tidal Current Charts, San Francisco Bay" and "Current Tables Pacific Coast" were exhibited to Johnson but he stated that he did not recall having seen a copy of either in the cars or baggage of persons checked through the station.

Agent was advised that Lloyd Cranford went on vacation December 18, 1937 for a period of 30 days, and had furnished his address while absent as c/o W. R. Quick, Winterhaven, California. Mr. Quick is employed at the Fort Yuma Quarantine Station near Winterhaven.

AT REDWOOD HIGHWAY CHECKING STATION, CALIFORNIA:

The above station is located on U. S. Highway No. 199, six miles south of O'Brien, Oregon. Agent McCain ascertained at the above checking station that the following men were on duty at the station during the period noted:

Clyde Bowman, 4 PM to Midnight December 15, 1937

Jack E. Van Lee, Midnight to 8 AM December 16, 1937

J. E. Bimmons 8 AM to 4 PM December 16, 1937

A transcript of the record of cars passing through this station from 6 PM December 15, 1937 to 9 AM December 16, 1937 was obtained.

The picture of Richard Galatas was exhibited to Clyde Bowman and J. E. Simmons, but they could not recall having checked anyone through the station who resembled the picture. The copies of "Tidal Current Charts, San Francisco Bay" and "Current Tables Pacific Coast" were exhibited to Bowman and Simmons, but they could not recall ever

having seen similar copies in the cars or baggage of persons checked through the station.

Agent was advised that Jack E. Van Zee is now on a 30 day vacation and is not expected to return to work at the checking station until after the middle of January 1938. Mr. Van Zee's address while on leave is 604 Elm Street, Woodland, California.

Lists of license plates were prepared and forwarded to respective offices in order that a rapid check could be made to determine whether the owners of any automobiles passing through the California checking stations were the parties who purchased the Tidal Current Charts, San Francisco Bay, or the Current Tables of the Pacific Coast for 1938 at Portland, Oregon on December 15, 1937. The writer of this report obtained a list of names and addresses of owners from Mr. Campbell of the Auto License Bureau, Portland, Oregon, it being noted that there are approximately 125 Automobiles with Oregon licenses passing through the various California Checking stations. Steps have been taken to interview the owners of each of the automobiles and the following owners have been contacted by Agents of the Portland Office, and it has been determined either by personal interview with the said owners or by interview with close relatives or acquaintances that they were not in Portland on December 15, 1937 and could not have purchased the charts in question. In one or two instances where the parties were in Portland, it was determined that they left prior to December 15, 1937

Memoranda are in the file detailing investigation concerning each of the above described automobiles and license plates.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent F. G. McGeary at Ashland, Oregon:

Reference is made to one, C. A. Carrison, c/o Pinehurst, Ashland, Oregon, to whom a 1930 Buick Coupe, Motor #2589268 is registered by 1937 Oregon license #215 750, At Ashland, Agent inquired of Mr. J. H. Fuller, Postmaster, the address of C. A. Garrison and was advised that he had lived at Pinehurst, Oregon which is on a mail route out of Ashland, Oregon but he believed Mr. Garrison had moved from there. He exhibited to Agent a letter addressed to "C. A. Garrison, c/o Pinehurst, Ashland, Oregon" which had been returned to the Ashland pestoffice marked "Not Here". This letter was from the Klamath Falls Branch of the First National Bank of Portland and was postmarked December 24, 1937. Mr. Fuller suggested that Agent call Mr. C. W. DeCarlow, at Pinehurst, Oregon whom he thought might know Carrison's present address. Subsequently, Agent by long distance telephone talked to Mrs. Myrtle Patterson at the Pinehurst Inn, Pinehurst, Oregon due to Mr. De Carlow being unable to hear over the phone. Mrs. Patterson informed Agent that Jack Karrison whom she believed identical with C. A. Garrison had moved to Rochester. Washington about two months ago. She did not know his address there nor what business he was engaged in. She stated that he had a 1930 Buick Coupe when he lived in Pinehurst. She/further stated that Jack Garrison has a brother-in-law named George Mangerin living in Pinehurst Oregon but he was not at home at that time. Mrs. Patterson advised that she would find out if possible the street address of Jack Garrison in Rochester, Washington, and would be glad to give such information if trouble was experienced in locating Mr. Garrison at Rochester, Washington.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent E. V. McCain at Klamath Falls, Oregon:

1937 Oregon Ticense #287 954 was issued to Archie Emith, P.O. Box 13, Klamath Falls, Oregon for a 1929 Chevrolet Coupe.

Miss Helen Spiker, Directory Clerk, Klamath Falls Post Office, advised Agent that Fred Howard, who operates a used car lot in Klamath Falls,

is the renter of P. O. Box 13. Upon interview, Fred Howard advised Agent that he had sold the 1929 Bhevrolet Coupe to Archie Smith during the spring of 1937; that Archie Smith is a timber faller and was employed at the time near Dorris, California. He stated that Archie Smith, in order to obtain the registration certificate and certificate of title for his car, gave the address of P. O. Box 13. Howard stated that he had not seen Archie Smith for approximately a month, but that he had completed payments on the car, and to his knowledge, Archie Smith was probably still at Dorris, California.

Oregon license #292 322 was issued to Mrs. Ethel Tucker, Chiloquin, Oregon, for 1937 Oldsmobile Sedan.

Earl Bradfield, Justice of the Peace, Chiloquin, Oregon, advised Agent that Mrs. Ethel Tucker and her husband Joe Tucker who had been working as a butcher at Chiloquin, Oregon, recently moved to Medford, Oregon. Earl Bradfield ascertained for Agent that Mrs. Ethel Tucker is now residing at 21 Germessie Street, Medford, Oregon.

With reference to the report of Special Agent F. C. Wood, Milwaukee, dated 12-30-37, and Milwaukee teletype of December 24, 1937 pertaining to one W. L. Morris of Rice Lake, Wisconsin, it is noted that the Milwaukee Office has already eliminated the automobile registered to this individual, namely 1937 Dodge Seden bearing Wisconsin license 605-995. The writer was unable to contact Morris at Cottage Grove, Oregon, upon making investigation at that point, but did contact Mrs. Morris who stated that the Dodge Sedan formerly belonging to her husband had been repossessed and left at the Ford Motor Co. in Cottage Grove operated by a Mr. Wilson.

Mr. Wilson ascertained for Agent from his records that this automobile was released December 15, 1937 and although his records did not definitely disclose the name, it was apparently released to a representative of the Chippewa Valley Security Co;, Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin.

with reference to Buffelo teletype of December 25, 1937

pertaining to the writer contacted Mrs. Florence Carlson, corner of 21st and Hoffman, Rural Route 4, near Eugene, Oregon. Mrs. Carlson advised that she had recently received a visit from and another party whose name she could not recall; that the parties were all quite young and had departed a week or two previously for an unknown destination; that she

had not heard from the since leaving, but was of the opinion that if they went to California they would not go to Portland prior to making the trip to California. Mrs. Carlson was unable to state the exact date on which the had departed. From her description of these parties, however, it does not appear that any of them could have been the unknown party who purchased the charts at Portland, Oregon.

With reference to the report of Special Agent J. E. Jones, Indianapolis, Indiana, dated 12-31-37 and Indianapolis teletype of December 24, 1937, Agent ascertained from the Roy Surnett Motor Co. Portland, Oregon that Mr. J. W. Porter is presently residing at 2100 Diviserado St., San Francisco, California. The exact date of Mr. Porter's departure for California was not ascertained. An appropriate lead is being set forth for the San Francisco Office to interview him.

1938 Oregon license #50035 was ascertained to be issued to Mr. E. Di Danielson, whose address is Marion Hotel, Salem, Oregon, for a 1937 Ford Coupe, motor #18-3633677.

At the Marion Hotel, in Salem, Agent was advised that Danielson is known as a transient who occasionally stops at this hotel; that the only forwarding address available was the Roosevelt Hotel, Portland, Oregon.

At the Roosevelt Hotel, Agent was advised that Danielson left a forwarding address about December 13th last to 6419 10th Street, Los Angeles, California. An appropriate lead is being set forth for the Los Angeles Office to interview Danielson.

1937 Ore on license 245 506 was ascertained to have been issued to Lee T. Samuels, General Delivery, Albany, Oregon, for a 1928 Ford Coupe Motor number A-289776; that this car with one passenger passed through the Hornbrook Station December 16th.

D. H. Paterson, Assistant Postmaster, Albany, Oregon, advised Agent that the Albany Postoffice had received a post card from Samuels at California giving his forwarding address as 1436 California Street, Apartment number 7, San Francisco, California. An appropriate lead is herewith set forth to the San Francisco Office.

A number of parties have been interviewed who stated definitely that they had not been to California recently, and it is believed that the 1938 license was the one recorded at the checking stations although Agents Deaderick and McCain advised that it was impossible in most

instances to distinguish between 1937 and 1938 licenses. It will therefore be necessary to recheck the numbers of these license plates at Salem, Oregon.

Agent has shown a number of "K" photographs to witnesses at Fortland, Oregon, the "K" photographs representing individuals who answered the description of the unknown party who purchased the charts and tables at Portland. No identification however, has been effected. All the parties still state that the photographs of Richard T. Galatas more nearly resemble the unknown party than any photographs they have seen to date.

The Portland Field Division is continuing investigation of this case in an effort to identify the unknown individual, and an additional report will be submitted at an early date.

#### UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE SAN FRANCISCO FIELD OFFICE, at San Francisco, will locate Lee T. Samuels, 1436 California Street, Apartment Number 7, and ascertain whether he was the party who purchased the tidal charts and tables at Portland on December 15th, it being noted that this party owned 1928 Ford Coupe, Oregon license 245506.

At San Francisco, will contact J. W. Porter, 2100 Diviserado Street, in accordance with the lead set out in the report of Special Agent J. E. Jones, Indianapolis, dated 12-31-37.

The San Francisco Office at Dorris, California, will contact Archie Smith owner of 1929 Chevrolet Coupe, 1937 Oregon license 287 954.

The Los Angeles Office at Los Angeles, will interview E. D. Danielson, 6419 10th Street, Los Angeles, owner of 1938 Ford Coupe bearing 1938 Oregon license 50035.

He stated that so far as MBBER is concerned, he is confident that MBBER does not now have any contacts with former inmates at Alcatraz, nor other criminals; that WEBER is married to a very fine young girl, of whom he is extremely fond, and his only desire is to find steady employment, and be able to make a living.

WALTERS was asked for what offense he was incarcerated in Alcatraz, but refused to state. However, it was later learned that the offense was that of sodomy.

After some hesitation, MALTERS finally asked Agent's theory on the escape. He was advised that in Agent's opinion, if escapes had assistance, they might have succeeded, but he did not believe their escape was successful, if they had none. Agent brought up the question of the fog, indicating that that was favorable to the escapes in one way, but unfavorable in another, as they could not see the direction in which they were swimming. At this point, however, MALTERS stated it could have

been turned to further advantage by the inmates, due to the fact that the boats traveled slower in fogs then they did in clear weather. He also stated that the men at Alcetraz, after being there for several years, know the ferry boat schedule to the minute. MALTERS added that while he was not volunteering any information yet, as long as he had come to the San Trancisco Office, he might as well tell us that if we had contacted him a day or two after the escape, he might have been able to tell us exactly where the prisoners were.

buddies in Alcatraz, and COLE was always anxious to learn things about the Island, outside of the prison yard; that he, WALTERS, was very familiar with every rock and cave on the Island, and he kept COLE advised; that COLE at first did not work in the machine shop, but later requested that he be transferred there, and after sometime he was so transferred, WALTERS stating that COLE must have figured out that the machine shop would be the best place from which to escape, and as it turned out, he finally succeeded.

He said that he knew for years that COLE planned an escape, but was surprised he waited as long as he did. He indicated to this Agent that he knew COLE'S plans for escape, and where he intended to stay after the escape, but that he would not disclose this information unless he would benefit thereby.

Agent explained to MALTERS that it was very important to him, Agent, to ascertain whether or not the Subjects in this case were alive or dead. It was explained further to MALTERS that the possible method of escape, or possible place of abode of the escapes for a day or two after the escape, was of no value, unless it could be proven positively that the Subjects herein were alive. He replied that he was afraid this could not be proven from his information; that COLT and ROE would never leave a fingerprint anyplace.

He was assured that he would be compensated for any information of value, but refused to disclose anything without having some definite assurance that he would be paid.

At this point Agent invited Special Agent in Charge N. J. L. FINDER to hear WALTERS' story, and Mr. PINDER

assured WALTERS in the same manner that this Agent had, that the Bureau would compensate him, or anyone else, for any information of value in this case, but insisted that the Bureau must first establish that the facts given were true. At this point WALTERS stated there was no use of continuing the interview, and prepared to leave the San Francisco Office.

Agent felt that WALTERS in truth had no information of value, and that he was merely feeling around for a hand-out.

From Probation Officer EBNER Agent learned that the informant in this case, was a notorious liar, and that WALTERS was similarly inclined. He stated that WALTERS was undependable; that he, EBNER, had found WALTERS several positions, but that he usually resigned without cause, and the Probation Department has now decided they would not assist him farther. Ir. EENER further stated that WALTERS, although on parole until 1941, was very irregular in his visits to the Probation Office, and caused that office considerable difficulty.

Agent escorted WALTERS out of the San Francisco Office, and invited him to return at will, and failing to find this Agent in, to inquire for Special Agent in Charge PLEPER. Contact may be maintained with WALTERS through Mr. EBNER, who will be in a position to reach him at any time desired, and has offered his full cooperation in this case.

Under date of January 6, 1938 Agent interviewed GEORGE WEBER, 871 Hayes Street, San Francisco. His general appearance and conduct was very favorable, and it is not believed that he has had any contacts with former prisoners at Alcatraz, nor that he desires the companionship of any notorious characters. It is also believed that he is very earnest in his desire to obtain steady employment, and conduct himself as a law-abiding citizen from now on.

The following, in substance, was gathered from the interview of WEBER:

Was interviewed on January 6, 1938. He stated that he is married, and resides with his wife at said address. He advised that he was released from Alcatraz on an Army charge in March, 1936, and was sent to McNeil's Island, remained there about one week, and then received a Presidential pardon. He advised that he had served at Alcatraz about 27 months. While there, he stated that he worked in the kitchen most of the time.

Asked whether he knew COLE and ROE, he stated that he could not remember them from their names. Agent exhibited their pictures, and he thereupon said he remembered seeing both of them; that he believed he worked in the laundry, and has worked with COLE in the laundry, but is not sure; that he remembers talking to COLE in the yard a few times during baseball games, but says he never talked to ROE; that COLE was a disagreeable sort, and was difficult to get along with, even in ball games; that he was a sorehead, and most of the men left him alone.

He also said that ROE played ball a few times.

WEBER said he has never seen another person off the Island except ERVIE WALTERS, and he does not want to meet any others. He said he knew LIMAS, and was acquainted with his family before his sentence, and when on the Island, he told LIMAS that when he got out to look up WEBER'S family; that he, WEBER, saw LIMAS' sister on the street, and she told him that LIMAS was in jail, so WEBER and WALTERS went up to see him.

WEBER said that a fellow by the name of LARRY, last name unknown, was paroled from Alcatraz, and later was picked up in Los Angeles, and sent to San Quentin, where he is now incarcerated; says LARRY wrote a story for the San Francisco "Examiner" called "Life on the Rock", or something like that; said that LARRY might know something, because he mixed with everyone on the Island.

WEBER stated that, in his opinion, there is no one at Alcatraz who would carry messages or is dishonest, so far as those he knows are concerned.

MEBER advised that for the past six weeks, he has been working for the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation, Ltd., on the S.S. "Malola", name now changed to the S.S. "Matsonia". He is now laid off for a couple of weeks, but

expects to return soon. He showed evidence of this employment in the form of his identification card, check stubs, etc.

It will be noted from the foregoing that WIBBR had absolutely nothing of value to offer relative to the escape of Subjects ROE and COLE. As to WALTERS, it appears that it was his intention to advance the theory that Subjects could have "caught on" to one of the ferries traveling across the bay. Agent pursued this matter in his interview of JOSEFH B. STEERE, Junior Officer at Alcatraz, in charge of the machine and mat shops, in which both ROE and COLE worked.

impossible for any person to "catch a ride" on a ferry boat; that one of the side-wheel variety of ferry boats would have ground a person to pieces; that the other type is propelled by screw propellers, one on the front of the boat, and one on the rear, and that if any person approached one of these boats, the suction from the rear would draw him into the propeller and "would make mince-meat out of him".

It therefore appears that there is no merit to MALTERS' suggestion, and further, that since he is out of work, he was trying to sell a theory. It is believed that if there was any foundation to his story that he knew COLE'S plans, he would have been glad to sell his information, as he had nothing to lose if his story was proven to be unfounded.

who advised that the Director of Prisons had submitted a memorandum to the Director of the Bureau setting out that Warden JOHNSTON of Alcatraz had suggested that the following men be investigated to determine whether or not they had any possible connection with the escape of Subjects ROE and COIE:

Junior Officer HENRY TO DAVIS

Junior Officer WALTER F. PETERSEN

Laundry Worker CLAUDE E. BILLINGSLEY

Laundry Worker JAMES V. HALSTEAD.

Bureau letter dated January 3, 1938 confirmed the above telephone conversation, and also enclosed a copy of the memorandum of Director of Prisons JALES V. BEANETT to the Director.

Pursuant to the foregoing, Special Agent W. F. WOOD proceeded to the Retailers' Credit Association, 15 Stockton Street, San Francisco, and from Mr. A. J. GREENBERG obtained credit information relative to the foregoing individuals.

As to HENRY T. DAVIS, he entered duty at Alcatraz on April 1, 1937. He resides at 2603 Eyde Street, San Francisco, telephone Gr. 1711. Mr. GREENBERG stated that on Movember 1, 1937 the Credit Association had an inquiry concerning Mr. DAVIS from the American Trust Company of San Francisco, who reported that DAVIS had furnished Montgomery Ward as a reference. The credit file contained no further information relative to Mr. DAVIS.

At the Civil Service Cormission, Federal Office Building, San Francisco, Agent conferred with Lr. HARRY T. KRANZ, Manager of the 12th Civil Service District, and informed Mr. KRANZ that he was desirous of obtaining the benefit of the contents of the investigative files of the Civil Service Commission relative to the two guards and two laundry workers abovementioned. Mr. KRANZ stated that he would furnish the substance of these files to Agent, but in instances where information of a derogatory nature had been given by some person, that name would be withheld.

Mr. KRANZ then assigned this Agent to Mr. J. S. HOWE, Field Civil Service Examiner, who informed Agent that he was able to locate the investigative files for Hessrs. DAVIS, BILLINGSLEY, and HALSTEAD, but that the file pertaining to FATARSEN was not at San Francisco.

The file relative to HENRY T. DAVIS, in substance, contained the following:

"DAVIS was born in San Antonio, Texas, on February 27, 1908. In 1923, he completed his eighth grade of schooling at Electra, Texas. In 1929 he graduated from the Electra High School. From April, 1927 to June, 1928, he was under U.S. Army enlistment, Wichita Falls, Texas, sent to Dallas, Texas., then to Kelley Field, Texas, for two months' training; transferred to March Field with 70th Service Squadron in the Air Service; was a ground man mechanic and blacksmith; honorably discharged by purchase as 6th c. Specialist. Had two months' permanent guard duty. Returned to Electra to complete high schooling.

"From Jan. 1929 to Jun. 1931, employed at Electra, Tex., in parents' grocery store while attending high school. Also worked as laborer in oil fields. From Jul. 1931 to Nov. 1932, assisted father, H. W. DAVIS, in operating an 80-acre ranch at Mt. Burg, Ark. From Nov. 1922, to Dec. 1934, he hauled freight, express and concrete in his privately-owned truck, making \$125 per month. From Dec. 1934 to Feb. 1935, employed in oil fields around Electra and Montague, Tex. In March, 1935, at Donna, Tex., employed as engineer's helper and truck driver; from Jan. to June, 1936, was a derrickman for an oil company at Monahans, Tex. From Aug. 1936 to Mar. 1937, was a refinery helper at Electra, and a yard hand, making from \$120 to \$150 per month.

"DAVIS was married on Aug. 8, 1932 to PARTHENA BOWDEN at Mt. Burg, Tex. They have a daughter 3 yrs. old.

"Assets congist of 80 acres of land, clear, valued at \$200.00, at Feyetteville, Ark. Has furniture, valued at \$125. He has a 1934 Plymouth Sedan, on which he owes \$125. In addition to this \$125.00,

he owes \$35 to Montgomery-Ward & Co. at Electra, and \$37 to a drug store in Electra. His wife has a few bills and that is all. He was never sued nor in bankruptcy. Took an occasional drink, but not for the past five years. Never used narcotics. Does not gamble and never did. Has no hobbies.

"ARRESTS: In 1924 for speeding, and fined \$10.80. which father paid. In 1929 and 1930 for drinking and raising a disturbance at a dance at Vernon. Tex.. and spent night in jail. Denies he was drunk. Father paid rine of \$12.80. In 1930 in Iowa Park, Texas, was picked up on the charge of a girl that he had tried to make her drink Sloane's Liniment in an effort to make her disclose the whereabouts of her sister's diamond ring. He denied the charge, and it was later dismissed. He was represented by Attorney O. E. NEISON, Michita Falls, Tex. In 1931, was picked up in Fayetteville, Ark., on suspicion of being one LONG, who was wanted for bank robbery; held overnight in jail, until father arrived and proved identity of DAVIS.

"DAVIS is  $6\frac{1}{2}$ " tall, weighs 180 pounds. He had gonorrhea when 16, but now reported completely cured. Claims he was not living with the woman. While in army, became homesick and went ANOL, for which placed in guardhouse for 30 days and fined \$10.

"The following general comments are as reported by the Field Civil Service Examiner, San Francisco:

"On the few months that DAVIS spent in this locality, the Examiner found his record good. Reported to have been 'kind of a wild fellow' at Electra, and had a few fights, but was supposed to have straightened up during the last few years. Justice of the Peace at Electra said it was definitely proved that the boy was not involved in the case where the girl charged him with forcing her to drink Liniment in an effort to get information out of her, and the case was dropped. DAVIS is reported to have paid off a debt which his father incurred for lumber, doing so by applying one-half of an \$18.00 a week salary until entirely liquidated. The boy is said to be a hard worker, and well liked. The Examiner was very much impressed with him."

On January 4, 1938 Mr. DAVIS was interviewed by Special Agent WOOD, and this Agent, and in substance gave the following information:

He is twenty-eight years old, and was born at Electra, Texas. His father and mother now reside with him, and his father, Hanry WOODS DAVIS, is a Spanish - American War Veteran, receiving a monthly pension or \$60.00.

Questioned about his financial position, he stated that he received a salary of \$\frac{1}{2}55.00\$ per month, and that he had bills amounting to between \$\frac{4}00\$ and \$\frac{1}{2}500\$, one-half of which were about two years old, and were not pressing; that they had been incurred in Electra, Texas, his home, and his creditors were persons with whom he and his family had been acquainted for many years, and knew that he would pay them as soon as he was able. He pays \$25.00 per month on rent, \$20.00 per month on a loan to the Postal Credit Union, Inc., 1307 Harrison Street, Oakland, and \$15.00 monthly on three mercantile accounts. He owes either two or three payments on his Plymouth automobile.

Asked if any of the guards at Alcatraz had shown any particular interest in him on his arrival there, he stated that guards JOE STEPSON and ROYAL CLINE did so, as they were also from Texas; that he had mingled with these two men

in San Francisco a few times, and had also joined them in seeing motion pictures, and other mild forms of amusement.

DAVIS stated that Thursdays, up to the time of the escape, were his days off, and consequently he was off duty and in San Francisco at the time of the escape on December 16th; that he spent the entire day up to 2:30 p.m., with his wife in downtown San Francisco; that about four or five p.m., on that day, he entered a neighborhood grocery store, and a customer informed him that there had been an escape at Alcatraz; that he did not believe this story, and went out and purchased two newspapers, which confirmed the news to him; that he thereupon telephoned to Alcatraz, and asked if he was wanted, and was informed that he would be advised if he was needed. He stated that his first reaction to the news was that he was completely "flabbergasted".

DAVIS stated he had seen both ROE and COLE a good many times; that he knew they both worked in the machine shop and blacksmith shop; that he saw these men about every morning and evening, as they were checked in and out, when it was his duty to watch the "line"; that on Saturdays and Sundays he was "on the vall", and saw them; that due to the fact that he had heard that Subject COLE was an escape artist, he paid more attention to him than any of the others, particularly during the recent strike, as he had heard that COLE had been active in a former strike prior to the time DAVIS was employed at Alcatraz, and for the further reason that he was informed that COLE had killed a guard in another prison.

Asked if any of the prisoners attempted to become familiar with him, or conversed with him regarding matters not connected with Alcatraz, DAVIS stated that one PARKER, an inmate believed to be number 336, had asked him shortly after his arrival if he had any folks who had been killed in the school explosion in New London, Texas; also that since Capone worked in the prison yard, he, too, often spoke to DAVIS, but usually just to say "hello", or "good morning", or passing some other pleasantry.

He stated that while some of the immates were more quiet than others, the greatest number of them were at all times polite to him, and never asked him for a favor.

DAVIS advised that the prisoners get baseball reports, and other sporting news either by the same being posted in the prison, or through other sources, such as the guards, or the two houseboys, also immates, who clean up the Warden's house; that he knew the immates got this news, as he would hear them discuss scores of games already played, or offering to bet on others; that the houseboys had opportunities to communicate with the prisoners during meal times, although talking is not permitted during meals. However, he advised that these boys eat ahead of other prisoners, and finish their meals within a few minutes after the remaining immates enter the mess hall.

He further stated that these houseboys, in his opinion, communicated with prisoners in the cell block, located across and above them, although talking is not permitted in the cell blocks. He stated that, in his opinion, almost everyone in the prison has developed the art of talking with his hands; that this is not permitted, and when caught the prisoner loses some of his privileges for a period of time.

He further stated that, in his opinion, a limited amount of information could be obtained by the inmates from prisoners who assist at the dock, and that news that comes in over the various radios on the Island also gets around.

As to any special characteristics noticed in connection with ROE and COLE, DAVIS stated that he was more or less impressed by COLE, because the latter acted sort of "slinky", in other words "as a coyote among wolves"; that in spite of the general impression that COLE is pretty tough, he thinks he is yellow, and not particularly dangerous. He said that neither ROE nor COLE were ever in any fights since he has been in Alcatraz, although upon arriving he found COLE working on the inside labor crew, which is an indication that he had disobeyed some rule, as this crew is made up largely of "heels", or men who cannot get along with others, and are separated from them.

He stated that so far as he knows, ROE has never been on the inside labor crew.

On recreation days, Saturdays and Sundays, guards are able to view almost the entire body of inmates in the yard, and DAVIS advised that he had never noticed COLE and ROE getting churmy, either between themselves, or with others. He said that COLE was not friendly with anyone, but would talk to those on his crew to some extent; that there are no restrictions on conversations while the prisonere are in the yard, or at work, and that the only conversations permitted in the cells is that in connection with the prisoners ordering writing paper, tobacco, and magazines.

DAVIS advised that at one o'clock p.m., every day, the dock crew leaves the plumbing shop, and goes through a gate to the dock; that this gate is opened by a tower guard. by means of pressing a button; that as the dock crew goes through the gate, they are "fanned", or searched by a guard; that this usually takes several minutes, upon completion of which the tower guard again presses a button, and the gate is closed; that the tower guard, whose duty it is to open and close this gate, is also under instructions to closely watch the dock crew go through the gate; that this tower guard's position is on top of the building from which the escape was effected; that by reason of this duty, the tower guard's back is toward the place where the escape was effected. (Special Agent WOOD who has been on Alcatraz Island, and taken numerous photographs of the place of escape, and surrounding buildings, and guard towers, advised this Agent that it is possible for inmates who are working in the blacksmith shop. to perceive the movements of the guard on top of their building, and another guard in a tower a short distance away. It therefore appears that someone in the blacksmith shop watched the guard in the tower on top of the machine shop building, and as soon as they saw his back turned, signaled in some manner to the Subjects, who then made their break for escape.)

(It will be remembered that the Subjects herein were reported present at the one p.m. count, but missing at the 1:30 count.)

Upon returning to Alcatraz Friday morning, December 17th, DAVIS was placed on the morning watch, but that evening was changed to the evening watch, his hours being from approximately 4:10 p.m., to 11:50 p.m., and has been on this watch ever since. He advised, therefore, that he has

been unable to view the prisoners during the day, as they are returned to their cells about 4 p.m., daily, and he cannot relate what, in his opinion, their reactions to the escape have been.

On said date of December 17th, DAVIS advises the fog was still quite heavy, and as is presently the practice, the prisoners are kept locked in the cell block during foggy weather. He said, however, that there were rumblings of nervous tension among the prisoners, being caused largely, in his opinion, by their uncertainty as to what happened to Subjects ROE and COIE, that is, whether or not they succeeded in their escape; that it appeared to him to be more of an indication of expectancy, or anxiety and doubt.

DAVIS advised that he has not been to a dance since his arrival in San Francisco; that he takes a drink only rarely; that he does not like beer, and never drinks it; that about his only form of amusement recently has been to patronize a motion picture theatre.

He stated that he had approximately 45.00 deposited in the Fostal Credit Union, Inc., and that this deposit was necessary in order for the depositor to have the privilege of borrowing; that a guard by the name of BOB BAKER is the Alcatraz representative of the Fostal Credit, and makes an attempt to get all of the guards on the Island to join.

DAVIS stated that Junior Officer WALTER F.
PRITERSEN, whose history will be given later in this report, approached him recently, and asked that he, DAVIS, be a cosigner on a loan for \$150.00, which PETERSEN desired to negotiate at the Postal Credit, and that he, DAVIS, agreed, but was later informed that the Postal Credit rejected the loan because DAVIS was already a borrower. He stated that PETERSEN informed him he needed the money for Christmas expenses, and also desired to take up a few bills which he owed, and arrange so that he could make one monthly payment to the association, instead of several payments to various merchants.

DAVIS advised that on Alcatraz Island are apartments and bachelor quarters for most of the guards and their families, and others living on the Island; that there

are supposed to be about sixty families on the Island now, consisting of the Warden, Doctors, guards, etc.; that the bachelor quarters are cleaned by the bachelors themselves, although the halls and shower baths are cleaned by one of the dock crew, who has a guard with him at all times, and that the apartments and everything in connection therewith are cleaned by the occupants, the only connection the convicts have with cleaning those premises being that they empty out the garbage, the latter being dumped in the ocean, while papers and other matter are burned; that when garbage is removed, there are two convicts and one guard, the latter watching the convicts' actions closely.

DAVIS advised that, in his opinion, the civilian employees on the Island are much closer to the inmates than the guards; that the civilian employees must, of necessity, instruct the inmates in all of their work, and converse with the convicts through the day; that he believes civilian employees are located in the laundry, the tailor shop, and the cleaning plant, with the possible exception of the Warden's staff, about which he knows little.

He stated that, in his opinion, all of the guards and civilian employees on the Island are honest and faithful to their duties. To date he stated that he had noticed no noticeable changes in the attitudes of the guards, and that among them there was not one whom he would not trust with his financial or other personal affairs.

This Agent and Special Agent W. F. WOOD feel that DAVIS is honest in his efforts, and intentions; that he told a straightforward story of everything he knew, and withheld nothing. He did not hesitate over any replies, spoke freely, and without reservation, frankly admitted his arrests, obligations, and events during a rather colorful career for a man of his age (28), and gave Agents every reason to believe in his truthfulness.

WALTER F. PETERSEN, Junior Officer, entered duty at Alcatraz on September 3, 1935; residence 2605 Hyde Street, San Francisco; phone GRaystone 1370. From Mr. A. J. GREENBERG, Contact Man, Retailers Credit Association, 15 Stockton Street, San Francisco, Special Agent W. F. WOOD obtained the following information: PETERSEN was divorced from BETTY LOU PETERSEN on December 10, 1936 on the grounds of her complaint alleging cruelty. They were married in Wisconsin in 1931 and separated on July 10, 1936. In an interview with the Credit Association in August, 1937, PETERSEN stated he had two dependent children by a previous marriage who were living with him at this time. He also reported he is not required to pay alimony and further that he was formerly employed as a guard at the State Penitentiary, Waupun, Wisconsin. CREDIT HISTORY (1) A department store in San Francisco in 1936 refused to allow PETERSEN to make further charges to his account because he was too slow in making payments. The name of the store was not available. (2) Bank #1 reported making a loan to PETERSEN in January, 1937, and that he was paying on the loan as agreed; the amount of the loan and name of the bank were not furnished. (3) A finance company at San Francisco reported a loan to PETERSEN in June, 1936. The amount of this loan as of November 1, 1937 was \$31.00. (4) Personal loan company #1. This company reported a loan to PETERSEN in May, 1937, of \$69.00, which was the amount due November 1, 1937, and which would indicate he had borrowed twice from this same company. (5) Bank #2. This bank reported a loan of \$72.00 to PETERSEN in July, 1937. (6) Personal loan company #2. This loan company reported a loan of \$103.00 to PETERSEN in November, 1937. It will be noted that all of the loans obtained, with the one exception, were from different loan companies and different banks; it was pointed out to Agent WOOD by Mr. GREENBERG - 11 -

of the Credit Association that the rate of interest at the bank where PETERSEN first borrowed would be considerably lower than at the personal loan companies and that anyone who could borrow from a bank would be foolish to go to a personal loan company where a larger rate of interest was demanded. It was, therefore, Mr. GREENBERG'S opinion that PETERSEN was getting rather desperate when he began putting himself under obligation to personal loan companies. Mr. GREENBERG estimated that PETERSEN would probably owe between \$40 and \$50 a month on the above described obligations.

Mr. GREENBERG further pointed out that in his opinion the money was not borrowed for the purpose of purchasing goods and merchandise which would indicate it was used on outside obligations of a personal nature. Mr. GREENBERG further advised Agent WOOD that in the event any noticeable decrease occurred in the payment of the aforementioned obligations, he would immediately advise the San Francisco Office.

At the office of the Civil Service Commission, Federal Office Building, San Francisco, Mr. J. S. HOWE, Field Civil Service Examiner, advised this Agent that the Civil Service investigative file on PETERSEN was not available. Mr. HOWE had no information regarding PETERSEN.

Under date of January 4, 1938 WALTER F. PETER-SEN was interviewed by this Agent and Special Agent WOOD and in substance gave the following information:

He stated he was born in the town of Maple Grove, Wisconsin, on May 9, 1895; that he completed 8 grades of school at that place in 1909 and from then until August, 1926, he assisted his father on the latter's farm, except for a few summers when he worked at logging camps and for a period of time when he and his brother operated a tractor for themselves. He then worked for the Wisconsin State Reformatory for a few months as a guard at Green Bay, Wisconsin; from there he went to Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin, and worked for the Parkinson Farms as herdsman and assistant manager until August 17, 1931. He was then employed as guard at the Wisconsin State Prison at Waupun and remained there until August 17, 1935. He commenced working at Alcatraz on September 3, 1935.

PETERSEN advised that he is now living with his two children, both boys 15 and 13 years old. He stated he was first married on December 29, 1922 and his wife by this marriage died on

February 28, 1931; that he again married in December, 1931, lived with his wife until July, 1936, and divorce proceedings were commenced by her in January, 1937, which will become effective this month. He stated he discussed his marital affairs with Warden JOHNSTON at Alcatraz and the Warden suggested it would be best if divorce proceedings were brought by his wife rather than by him; that his wife, BETTY LOU PETERSEN, was running around with other men and after they separated she wrote to him on several occasions signing her name as "BETTY JEROME" the surname being that of her last paramour, and that letters from her were postmarked Reno, Nevada, and other points outside of California.

petersen stated when he first came to California in September, 1935, he had outstanding obligations amounting to approximately \$2,000.00 and that these were now reduced to a sum close to \$500.00; that this reduction was made possible by a close system of budgeting and the fact that his oldest son earned approximately \$25.00 a month by working after school in a grocery store. He stated that \$90.00 per month was set aside out of his salary to apply on outstanding accounts and that these accounts, according to the best of his recollection, stand at this time as follows:

These were all PETERSEN could remember and most of them are in approximate figures only. He stated that he believed he would be entirely out of debt in approximately eight months. He further stated he paid \$20.00 per month for rent, \$2.00 for telephone service and \$5.00 for gas and light, and that these were his only regular monthly bills.

PETERSEN stated he had never been arrested in his life; that while ha and his brother were operating a tractor and threshing machine business he became ill and was out of work over a year; that their business suffered and bills could not be paid and his brother went through bankruptcy; that he, WALTER F.

PETERSEN, obtained work which paid him \$90.00 per month and in spite of the fact that he continued to pay off bills as fast as he could he too was ferced to go through bankruptcy, which he did either in 1932 or 1933; that at this time he was employed as a guard at Waupun and discussed his financial condition with the Warden who recommended that he go through bankruptcy. He stated that in spite of the fact that he was relieved of all his obligations he revertheless paid out several hundred dollars later to some of his creditors.

petersen advised he was off duty in San Francisco on the day of the escape, December 16, 1937; that he did not know of the escape until approximately 2:30 P. M. when he came out of Weinstein's Store in San Francisco and noticed the newspaper headlines; that he immediately telephoned to Alcatraz and was instructed to proceed to Fishermen's Wharf in San Francisco and help check the fishing boats, which he did, working until well past 11:00 P. M. He stated that on the day prior to the escape, December 15th, he was on duty at Alcatraz from 4:00 P. M. to midnight, which is after the men are in the cell block; that at this time he was stationed on the dock tower; that at this position he is not able to observe or hear any rumblings on the part of the men and that he has not actually been among the men for a number of months as there are only a few prisoners at the dock.

PETERSEN stated he is permitted to talk to the prisoners at the dock but does not make a practice of it; that some of the men are more talkative than others; that he has always maintained silence with the prisoners as that was the way he was taught. He advised that during the first year at Alcatraz he was on duty in the cell block and naturally conversed with inmates who requested such articles as writing paper and magazines, which is the only type of conversation permitted; however he stated that no prisoner has ever asked him a favor of any kind and that they have never even asked him a "border line" question, such as "news from the outside"; that he is not the type prisoners warm up to especially as some of them were formerly incarcerated in the prison at Waupun, Wisconsin at the time when PETERSEN was employed there as a guard and that this news has spread throughout Alcatraz.

Asked how messages could be gotten out of Alcatraz PETERSEN stated they could be taken by men about to be released and also dishonest employees; asked if he knew anyone who by reason of his disposition might be inclined to overstep due to a sympathetic nature, he stated the question was hard to answer. He was thereupon assured that all information obtained from him by

Agents would be maintained in the strictest confidence but all he had to offer in this connection was that in his opinion some of the guards talked too freely with the prisoners although he might be prejudiced due to his prior training which taught him to be very strict and uncommunicative. He stated he had in mind no one in particular who would be more liberal minded than he although he knows there are some because when he was stationed in the cell block he saw papers in the cells that should not have been there but he is unable to state who was responsible.

PETERSEN said that about three or four weeks before the escape he was on the detail that want around the prison and hammered the bars on windows to test them for any imperfections, cut, et cetera, and tried out those on the window through which the escape was effected; that he has been trained to note any difference in the sound of a hammer upon a weakened joint or imperfect piece of metal such as one which had been partially cut through with a saw and he is confident the bars on that particular window were sound at that time; that if he saw had been used on them previously it had barely made an impression as his test proved its soundness. These tests he stated occur after the prisoners are returned to the cell block and the prisoners are unaware of the practice.

He stated he never saw any saw filings beneath the windows inside the building but that if they had fallen outside they would have blown away as a strong wind blows on that side of the building continuously.

PETERSEN called attention to the fact that only one guard was in charge of about 32 men in which group the two escapes were included and that these men worked in 5 different rooms, which he stated was too much for one man to watch. He also criticized the fact that the guard on top of the blacksmith shop building had to turn his back to the wall where the escape occurred in order to watch the dock crew go through the gate each day at approximately 1:00 P. M., which took him away from a position he had from which he could observe any activities on the outside of the building. PETERSEN indicated that at this time additional precautions are taken, particularly on foggy days to guard against a repitition of the escape, a guard being placed outside of the building during fogs.

PETERSEN advised that he knows ROE and COLE on sight and that he is acquainted with all of the Alcatraz inmates on sight; however that these two men have never worked for him. He agreed that men in the crew on which ROE and COLE worked must have known of the plans for escape and also must have seen it perpetrated.

PETERSEN stated he had a brother, PETER A.

PETERSEN, who worked at the Wisconsin State Prison and that he has a cousin, JOHN JENSEN, who lives in Bellingham, Washington. These, he stated, are his closest relatives. He stated he was not in the service during the War and belongs to no lodges or fraternities.

PETERSEN advised that for about a year he was stationed on the boat that travels between Fort McDowell and Alcatraz and from time to time would find articles in the leundry, such as packages of cigarettes, razor blades, and sometimes single loaded or unloaded shells, but does not think these had any significance.

Asked if he knew anyone on Alcatraz who had the confidence of the inmates he replied he could give the name of one ROWAN but added that for some weeks prior to the escape and a week or two subsequent thereto ROWAN was away from Alcatraz due to a broken leg.

From his experience PETERSEN stated that in his opinion the best way to get any information about the escape from the inmates was to let the matter drag along quietly for awhile and at the proper time have a man like the Deputy Warden try and get the information from them.

PETERSEN reported the following as a peculiar occurrence: On a Saturday sometime prior to the escape one of the laundry foremen, JAMES V. HALSTEAD (whose history will be given later in this report) asked to be relieved in order to satch an early boat to San Francisco and PETERSON was instructed to let him through the gate; that when HALSTEAD approached the gate and saw PETERSON he changed his mind and decided to leave at the regular time. Later PETERSON stated HALSTEAD telephoned to Lieutenant MADIGAN and wanted to know why MADIGAN had sent PETERSEN to let him out whereas it is usually SINGLETON who performs this duty. PETERSEN was at a loss to figure out what difference it could possibly make who let the man out.

In conclusion PETERSEN stated that the civilian employees are much more friendly with the prisoners than the guards and must of necessity carry on conversation with the inmates in order to instruct them in their work.

PETERSEN informed Agents he was taught his business under a man known as one of the hardest task masters in prison history, one Warden TAFT; that all of the guards under TAFT obeyed his orders to the letter and these orders permitted no liberties to prisoners, no conversation with them, and demanded the strictest discipline.

PETERSEN impressed Agents as being the type of man such a Warden would demand; he is not very well educated, speaks rather roughly, but in an honest and straightforward manner which does not leave much room for doubt. It is believed he knows nothing of the escape and nothing more than he has told Agents.

## CLAUDE E. BILLINGSLEY

Special Agent WOOD obtained the following information regarding BILLINGSLEY from the Retailers' Credit Association, San Francisco:

Prior to his employment at Alcatraz, BILLING-SLEY was a laundry foreman at the Christian Science Sanitarium, 2700 - 18th Avenue, San Francisco, at which place he was reported as "well regarded". BILLINGSLEY'S salary while there was \$150.00 per month. In May, 1931, two firms in Hollister, California, reported accounts with BILLINGSLEY, one for a radio, and one for some furniture, both of which were subsequently paid satisfactorily.

References given for these accounts were Dr. J. H. WEST, 60 Vincente Street, San Francisco; the Peoples Finance and Trust Company, Hollister, California, and the Black and Cooper Furniture Company, Hollister.

On January 3, 1958 this Agent obtained from Mr. J. S. HOWE, Field Civil Service Examiner, San Francisco, the following information concerning BILLINGSLEY, the same representing the substance of the Civil Service investigative file:

BILLINGSLEY was born in Portervillo, California, on November 13, 1898. He completed his eighth grade of schooling in 1912, and from then to 1915 was at home and unemployed.

From September, 1915 to June, 1918, he was a fireman with the Southern Facific Railroad, and resigned to enlist in the Army. From July to December, 1918, he was in the U.S. Army at Camp Levis, Washington, and Camp Fremont, California, and was later discharged. From December, 1918 to July, 1919 he worked as Assistant Superintendent of the Empire Laundry, owned by his father, salary 530.00 per week. From August to December, 1919, he was again employed as a railroad fireman with the Southern Pacific. From December, 1919 to June, 1922, he was again employed as Assistant Superintendent of the Empire Laundry. From June to December, 1922, he was a switchman for the Southern Pacific Railroad, and was dismissed over an accident, but claims through no fault of his.

From December, 1922 to August, 1928 he was Superintendent of the Empire Laundry, but the Laundry was disposed of at that time due to the death of his father. From August, 1928 to January, 1929, he was unemployed. From January, 1929 to December, 1930, he was engineer, washerman, and wringerman in a small laundry at Hollister, California, from which position he resigned. From February, 1951 to June, 1933, he was Superintendent of the laundry operated by the Christian Science Sanitarium, San Francisco; from January, 1933 to March, 1935, he was unemployed, and resided with his mother at San Jose; from March, 1935 to September, 1935, he was doing a general laundry work with the Garden City Laundry at San Jose.

at San Jose in 1919, and they still live together but have no children. His only asset is a car for which he paid \$750.00, but still owes \$440.00 on it, which he is paying off at the rate of \$30.00 per month. He has no bank account, no other debts, takes an occasional glass of beer; never uses intoxicants to excess; does not gamble and never did; hobbies consist of keeping up his mother's summer home at Boulder Creek, California.

From 1933 to 19.5 he lived at 1515 Martin Avenue, San Jose. He gave the following as references:

C. I. SOUTHGATE, Proprietor, Troy Laundry, San Jose, California. EDSCH WILLIAMS, Proprietor, Empire Laundry, San Jose, California. AL SANDAHL, Proprietor, Temple Laundry, San Jose, California. MRS. M. A. BAKKER, Housekeeper, Christian Science Sanitarium, 2700 18th Avenue, San Francisco, California. ANTHONY ACQUACEPACE, Proprietor, Hollister Steam Laundry, Hollister, California.

The following general comments are as reported by the Civil Service Examiner, San Francisco:

This man, with his father-in-law, formerly owned two laundries in San Jose, California, but they were later sold. The purchaser of the laundries said that BILLINGSLEY was honest, dependable, and in good standing; that he met his financial obligations promptly. From the owner of an Associated Oil Station, who has known BILLINGSLEY for eight years, it was learned that he paid his accounts promptly. Neighbors all spoke very highly of him. He was said to have been in the laundry business all or his life, and also to be one of the best laundry men in the locality. The owner of the Troy Laundry has known him for 20

years, and stated that he has a fine wife, no children, and that their home life is ideal; that he does not use liquor, and never has.

At the Christian Science Sanitarium, it was ascertained from the Manager and Assistant Manager that they recommended ETLLINGSLEY highly, stated his entire service with them was more than satisfactory. A laundry supply company in San Francisco advises they had traded with BILLINGSLEY for 15 years, and that he was a responsible man in every way, with no bad habits, of pleasing personality, and they had no hesitancy in recommending him.

Under date of January 5, 1938 BILLINGSTMY was interviewed at the San Francisco Office by this Agent, and Special Agent W. F. LOOD, and in substance stated as follows:

He is now in charge of the Distributing Department in the laundry, and has nine men under him now, although he has had as many as fourteen. He is in contact with the prisoners all day long, and tells them what to do. He has been employed at Alcatraz since September, 1935, but in the Distributing end only for the past six or seven months.

Asked if he noticed any tension arong the men prior to December 16, 1937, the day of the escape, he stated that he did not. Neither did he notice that anyone, by his actions, was trying to get into his favor. Nothing was said by the men prior to the escape that gave him any inkling that they knew what was going to happen, but since then, he thinks there is more of a feeling of doubt in the minds of his men that the escapes got away; that nevertheless, there appears to be a sort of happy feeling among them over the fact that the men actually made their escape; that for a few days after the escape, there were such comments in the Distributing Department as "Gone with the Tide", and "Gone with the fog"; that his interpretation of these remarks is that the men actually made their escape, and are not dead. He said that he could think of no remark that he overheard that might indicate some signal was given by the escapes to indicate that they made it; that he heard no remark that might have had a double meaning.

BILLINGSLEY advised that he first knew of the escape about 2:20 p.m., on December 16th; that he had gone down to

the basement to see his Superintendent, and came back in a minute or two to see his men looking out of the windows on the third floor of the laundry, where his Department is located, towards the blacksmith shop building, where the escape occurred; that there were a number of men and boats visible; that although there were windows on the other side of the laundry, yet most of his men went to the correct side, and perhaps a few drifted over to the wrong side, which might indicate that they knew where the escape would occur, although he doubts that any specific time was known; that the men continued to drift over to the windows for a period of 25 to 30 minutes, following which they remained continuously at their work.

BILLINGSLEY stated that there was no indication of a feeling of anticipation on the part of the men just prior to the escape; that he could not connect any of their actions to the escape; that he could not find out anything about the escape at all, although he did not ask any questions; that the men did not seem to know who escaped or where they went, indicating that they did not mow who was going to make the break; that the men were asking one another numerous questions, which continued until supper time; that when he saw them next, which was the next day, they appeared to have found out who escaped.

He explained that the laundry crew goes in to supper in a group, but that in his opinion they are scated in the order of their location in the cell block; that conversation continued throu hout the next day, December 17th, with the names of the escapes frequently mentioned.

BILLINGSLEY said that he had never been approached by the men on matters of a questionable nature; thet all questions put to him have appeared to be simple, and not with a double meaning; that the only thing slightly irregular was the request of one GLORGE THO PSON, an inmate, that BILLINGSLEY telephone his sister in San Francisco, and advise her that he would not be able to write for a while, but this was sometime prior to the escape; that THOLPSON mentioned the fact that his mother was ill, and BILLINGSLEY knew that THOMPSON had violated some rule which took away his letter-writing privilege, (Agent interviewed THOLTSON'S sister about ten days ago, and she informed Agent that she had lost both of her parents since THOLPSON'S incorceration, her mother within the past several months) but that he, BILLINGSLEY, refused to grant THOMPSON'S request. In this connection BILLINGSLEY stated that he did not know whether or not the prison authorities notified an inmate's family when his writing privilege was taken from him.

BILLINGSTEY stated that he never saw anything that indicated the prisoners were sending messages, or trying to send them, through the laundry or any other way; that he is quite sure that TEOMPSON did not approach any one else to deliver his message.

He stated that last week there was some talk going around about another strike going to occur, and this always creates a scare; that Mr. SINCIMPON, his Superintendent, mentioned it, and appeared quite concerned and immediately sent word up to the Deputy Lardon, and the latter, he believes, stated that he already had heard the rumor; at least, SINGIMTON told BILLINGSLEY that he had reported it.

Concerning SINGLETON, BILLINGSLEY stated that he was very well liked by the men; that he is a jolly fellow, an elderly man who had been quite an athlete in his youth, and he has a way with the men. SINGLETON is a civilian employee, in charge of the entire laundry. However, BILLINGSLEY stated that the men do not treat SINGLETON any differently than they do him, and in his opinion, the men treat all civilian employees alike.

BILLINGSIEY stated that in his opinion, there was no one in his department that could be classed as an underdog; says, however, that there are cliques, and they do not always mix with other cliques, but no one in particular appears to be picked on; that no inmate has ever come to him with any complaint about another person, guard, civilian, or inmate. BILLINGSIEY pointed out that the inmates are permitted to talk in his Department as much as they like, and if the work is slow, they often sit down and talk, and even walk to other departments within the laundry for this same purpose; that there is no "Silence" system in the laundry.

BILLINGSHEY said that news on the Island gets around, as his men have told him of happenings on Alcatraz that he did not know about, for instance, the episode of Capone's stabbing; that news might also get around by means of the inmates over-hearing civilian employees' conversations. He said that he is often asked about such things as the results of sporting events, prize fights, etc., and he tells them, when the news is of the character that is usually posted in the prison, that is, news that the men are entitled to; that at times, when the men have had certain information before he learned of it, and he has asked them how they got it, they would laugh at him, but do not answer.

BILLINGSLEY stated that he soes home every night; that he has never had a suspicious telephone or telegraph message delivered to him. nor has his wife. He mentioned, however, that one JACK BERTAN, a former inmate, was in his crew when he first went to Alcatraz; that BER AN was a very friendly sort. a man of polished manners, likeable personality, and far from the criminal type; that he, BILLINGSLEY, had once told the men that he spent every available moment of his spare time on his mother's summer home at Boulder Creek, California, and when BERMAN was released, he wrote to BILLINGSLEY'S mother at that place, and told her how her son was progressing on the island, and how well he, FERTAN, liked him. He stated that he should perhaps not have discussed a personal matter of this kind before the inmates, but he was then new in the prison, and would not do it again. He also stated that he had been severely censured by the Deputy Warden for permitting an inmate to shine his shoes, but this was also early in the period of his work on Alcatraz, and would not be repeated.

on sight, but they had never worked for him; that he never spoke to either of them. Asked if he could think of any way to make an escape from the Island, he said he knew of none. Asked how he would go about getting an urgent message to the mainland, he answered that it would have to be through a guard or civilian employee, although he believes that every one that he has ever come in contact with is honest, and would not carry messages. The civilian employees, he stated, would be the best bet, as they have closer contacts with the men.

BILLINGSTEY advised that he and his wife reside at 1229 Chestnut Street, San Francisco, and can be reached through their landlady's telephone number, which is under the name of BOTTOMS.

Agent WOOD endeavored to get BILLINGSLEY to take a message to one of the inmates that he, WOOD, had met several years ago, in order to see what BILLINGSLEY'S reaction to it would be. BILLINGSLEY stated that he could not take the message, even though it appeared harmless enough, because it was against the rules; that he might consent upon specific approval by the Warden, but did not recommend it if the inmate might in some way connect the name of WOOD with the Department of Justice, in which event the word would get around Alcatraz that BILLINGSLEY was in touch with Agents of this Eureau.

Agents were very favorably impressed with BILLING-SLEY. He appears thoroughly honest, and told a straight forward story, without hesitation on any point. Although he appears a very friendly sort, he nevertheless impressed Agents with the idea that he is very anxious to keep his job, and do good work. He stated that he enjoyed the work, and got along well with the men.

There was nothing in BILLINGSLEY'S record or interview that indicated any complicity on his part in the escape or knowledge thereof.

### JAMES V. HALSTEAD

The following information was obtained from the Retailers' Credit Association, San Francisco, by Special Agent W. F. WOOD.

HAISTEAD, prior to his employment at Alcatraz, held various positions with the New Method Laundry, 467 Sanchez Street, San Francisco, and his services there were "very satisfactory - highly regarded". The records of the Assocation show that Mr. HAISTEAD had accounts with a department store and a men's and women's store in 1934 and 1935, and that his rating at these stores was "Satisfactory".

Under date of January 3, 1938 this Agent was furnished the substance of HAISTEAD'S investigative file at the Civil Service Bureau, by Field Civil Service Examiner J. S. HOWE, the same being taken from the report made by C. L. COOMES, Field Civil Service Examiner, San Francisco:

HAISTEAD was born in San Francisco on March 19, 1910. In 1924 he corpleted his grade school education in San Francisco, and in 1924 and 1925 he attended high school, but did not graduate. During 1925 and 1926 he worked for the Caladyne Radio Company, San Francisco, as repairman and delivery man, for 12.00 per week. From May to December, 1926, he went on a trip through the States of California and Oregon, picking fruit and working in canneries. From December, 1926 to March, 1927 he was employed as office boy in several places. From March, 1927 to September, 1935 he was employed by the New Method Laundry, San

Francisco, starting as apprentice laundryman, and working up through all Departments until promoted to Second Class Superintendent at \$20.00 per week.

HAISTEAD was married on August 15, 1931, at Reno, Nevada, to DIANA RICKANBACKER, of San Francisco. This is his first and only marriage. He has two children, three and sixteen months, respectively. He owns furniture valued at \$\tilde{2}5.00\$. He has a small savings account in the Bank of America, Castro and Market Branch, also a small savings account in the Hibernia Savings and Loan Association, 18th and Castro, San Francisco. He owes a small clothing bill at Sears, Roebuck & Company, and his wife has small bills. He has never been sued, and never any judgments against him. Drinks an occasional glass of beer, but has had no hard liquor in the past two years, and very seldom used it before that. He does not gamble. His hobbies are fishing, reading fiction, history, and his family. He has never been arrested. He received one traffic tag, but paid no fine, as it was fixed up. He has never been fired from a job.

HALSTEAD is 5'7" tall, and weighs 147 pounds. Since 1950 he has always lived in San Francisco, and at 295 Dorland Street. He gave as references the following:

The following general comments were obtained from Examiner HOLE of the Civil Service Bureau, and were taken from that Bureau's investigative file:

recommended him very highly; said he carried out his orders cheerfully, never caused any trouble, and was not even an occasional drinker; that he did not gamble, and has handled sums of money totaling \$300.00 to \$400.00 a week, but there had never been a shortage in his accounts. Other employees at the New Method Laundry also spoke highly of him. Local merchants and others with whom HALSTHAD did business were interviewed, and all commented that he was a good, steady family man; that he paid his bills promptly. Generally, he is regarded as a good, steady

hard-working boy of reasonably clean habits, thoroughly honest, dependable, and trustworthy. He was favorably recommended for the position sought at Alcatraz.

Under date of January 6, 1938 Lr. HAISTEAD was interviewed at the San Francisco Office by this Agent, and Special Agent WOOD, and in substance stated as follows:

HAISTEAD stated that he resides at 295 Dorland Street, San Francisco, and has for some years; that he went to work at Alcatraz in September, 1935, as a laundry helper, and receives the sum of \$1,680.00 per annum in salary. He is married and has two children, six and four years, respectively. He has completed grade school, and has had two years of high school. Both of his parents are living, but they are separated, his father residing in Los Angeles, and his mother in San Francisco. He is a member of the Catholic Church, is athletically inclined, particularly towards handball and boxing. He belongs to no lodges or fraternities, and will be 28 years of age in March, 1938. He is a renter, and owns no property, nor do his parents own property. He stated that he just barely got by on his salary, although the only account he owed was one of about 15.00 on furniture. He stated that he had no bank account, but his wife carried a small Christmas savings account.

HAISTEAD advised that he was on duty on December 16, 1937, at the time of the escape; that he first heard about it at approximately 2:00 p.m.; that he works in a more or less isolated position in a cage in the laundry, and received the information from a foreman, who in turn learned about it from one of the guards. He stated that he did not notice anything about the attitude of the men just prior to the escape that would indicate something of that nature was brewing; that after the news got out, there was a lot of talk by a few here and there; that there is only one window in his department from which one may have a view of the outside, but it fronts on the yard, and not towards the place of escape; that only one of his men was looking out of that window; that the door to the larger laundry room was closed, but quite a few men on the outside were visible looking out of windows.

HALSTEAD stated that he had six men under him, but as previously stated, they are off by themselves; that these men are not very talkative, and scarcely congenial, but if he were to be pleasant with them, they would doubtless go a step father in their confidences with him, although he would rather not have anything to do with them. He stated that they have on numerous

occasions made comments to him about news items, asking him to disclose to them what he had seen in the papers concerning such things as baseball scores and political matters, but he has not divulged anything that was prohibited; that if he over-stepped the bounds of propriety once he would be placed in an embarrassing position from then on in declining to repeat.

"They are going to write another book called 'Gone with the Fog'", but he does not know the identity of the speaker, and stated there were several around at the time, and he pretended not to be interested; that he tried to show that he did not appreciate the humor; that he has often wondered what the prisoners thought of the escape, and has heard patches of conversation here and there, but largely pays no attention; that the inmates jabber like monkeys all day long, but there is nothing he has ever heard that he can connect up with the escape. He said he had heard at least one inmate say "I hope they made it", but has never heard anything to indicate that they actually made it.

HALSTEAD said he had never been reprimanded for talking out of turn, but has been called up to the Deputy Marden's office twice - once because one of his men was caught smoking, and the other time was questioned as to whether he was bringing any information in. Asked what was behind this, he stated that an inmate who normally works in another department had finished his work and come up to HALSTEAD'S department, and a guard reported it, it appearing that the man might have come up for information, or was returning a favor at the hands of HALSTEAD.

It was mentioned to HAISTEAD that Agents thought it strange that a civilian employee could be in contact with the prisoners day after day, and still not learn anything about the principal topic of conversation (the escape), to which he replied that the machines make a lot of noise at all times, and he does hear a lot of things, but they have no significance. He said he had never noticed anything irregular about the markings on the laundry; that the laundry is "shaken down" before it comes to his department, and he is positive that something of that nature would be discovered before it reached him. He stated, however, that he had been "on his toes" continually, and has never seen anything of a suspicious nature in his department.

HALSTEAD said that all of the men with whom he has worked were willing to be friendly with the possible exception of

a lew who like to be off by themselves; that besides, there are always a few "nuts" around. One "nut", he says, is No. 345, one MURPHY, who is about forty years old, and "as nutty as a fruit cake". HAISTEAD said he does not think MURPHY would have much to talk about.

HAISTEAD said that no one over there had ever come to him with information; that occasionally the men have fights, and the offenders are thrown in "the hole", normally for about three days.

MALSTMAD said that on the night of escape, all of the civilian workers went down to the tailor shop and watched the uniforms and suits, and from there they walked over to the place of escape. He said he heard a rumor the next day that one of the escapes "did not get 100 feet"; that this came to him from a foreman, and he thinks the foreman got it from another, so he doesn't know the source, although he believes the remark was made in order to forestall a search for the escapes.

HATSTEAD said they are so strict in Alcatraz that a man must not even wear a smile or happy expression on his face; that he has taught himself not to smile much, but wishes the civilian employees could mingle more with the inmates, which, in his opinion, might cause some of them to "open up".

Regarding PLTERSEN'S remarks about him asking for relief one Saturday, in order that he could make an early boat, he says that this never did occur; that every time he has asked to be relieved early, he has taken his leave; that he has never been searched since he has been there, and consequently it is possible for a civilian employee to leave Alcatraz with a pocket full of messages; that when he leaves, Superintendent SINGLIFON merely flags the tower guard the causes the gate to open, and he leaves in that manner; that normally, on every evening, he stops and plays pinochle until the boat is ready to leave, but when he gets off early, he goes right to the boat and boards it. After thinking over this matter for some time, he recalled that some time in August, after he had received permission to leave early one day, he was called back by the Warden, who told him that he understood HAISTMAD was interested in writing, and the Warden cautioned him against writing anything about the Island; that he assured the Warden he would not; that this information was given the Warden by the Chaplain, with whom he talked on numerous occasions; that this caused him to miss his boat, and he then took the boat that he would normally have taken by leaving at the regular time.

The substance of the foregoing was transmitted to the Bureau by teletype on January 7, 1938, and in said teletype authority was requested to interview and investigate DOUGLAS ROBERTSON, a guard, reported to be heavily in debt, and also to have been negligent in the escape of a prisoner in his charge at a Penitentiary where he previously worked; JOSEPH SINGLETON, Superintendent of the laundry, reported to have taken messages off the Island for inmates, and JAMES ALLIAN, Guard, reported to have been friendly with Subjects COLE and ROE.
