SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

EARL A. FIGIDS states JAMES ROE was a student of his at Commercial Aviation Field at Tulea, Oklahoma, and at no time did he ever hear JAMES ROE mention flying to California and making an attempt to assist his brother in making an escape. States JAMES ROE is not capable of flying an airplane or a seaplane. R.U.C.

DETAILS:

On the night of August 16, 1938, HARL A. FIELDS, Lieutenant in the 320th Observation Squadron, Brooks Field, Texas, O.R.C. at Brooks Field temporarily on maneuvers but who resides at Sapulpa. Oklas. stated that when he owned a commercial flying field at Tulsa, Oklahoma, that JAMES ROE known to him as JIMAY ROE and a brother of RAIPH ROE, was a student at his school: that JAMES ROE was a student at his school and completed approximately 15 hours flying time when JAMES ROE was arrested for counterfeit labels on illegal whiskey and was sentenced to 2 years imprisonment at Leavenworth Penitentiary; that he found JAMES ROE to be a pretty good boy and that after JAMES ROE was released from Leavenworth on parole that he at one time acted as best friend to him and assisted JAMES in securing the position he now holds with the International Supply Company. He stated that after RALPH ROE and THEODORE COLE were reported to have made their escape from Alcatron that he talked to JAMES ROE about RAIPH ROE and that JAMES ROE stated that in his opinion BALPH ROE AND COLE never made the mainland and were drowned in this attempt and insofar as he. JAMES FOE, was concerned about RALPH that he hoped that RALPH had been/droyned. MRL FIELOS stated further that in his opinion it was absurd to

to suspect that JAMES ROE assisted or attempted to assist his brother RAIPH ROE and COLE in their escape and insofar as JAMES ROE flying to California to assist his brother in his escape from Alcatraz, it was out of the question due to the fact that JAMES himself could not pilot an airplane or a semplane, and due to the further fact that he knew JAMES financial condition at the time of the escape was such that if he so desired to assist in this escape by having someone else fly an airplane or semplane to aid the two subjects in the escape, it would have been out of question.

MR. FIELDS stated further that after JAMES HOE was released from the penitentiary he first went to Wink, Texas, and then to Hobbs, New Mexico. He stated further that knowing JAMES as he did, he did not feel that JAMES would turn his brother RALPH in to the Government, but he was positive that he would not eid or assist him or harbor him in any way as he had spoken quite often about RALPH being such a disgrace to the family. He stated that JAMES had told him that RALPH first went wrong when he began to run with an outley by the name of BIRDWELL, who was killed at Boley, Oklahoma, and with the RAY TERRELL banch in Chlahoma. He stated that JAMES first wife's given mans was EAL, but that her last name was not known to him; that his present wife, whose given name is WANDA, worked for a Jewish merchant at Hobbs, N.M.

MR. FIELDS stated that he was now in the automobile supply business at 10 N. Water Street, Sapulpa, Oklehoma, and that he would be glad at any time to cooperate with the Government in this matter and should he obtain any information of value to the Government that he would be glad to notify the Oklahoma Field Office.

DETAILS:

AT CATHLAMET, WASHINGTON:

Agent located C. W. GARRISON, also known as CHARLES W. GARRISON, at his small ranch on Puget Island located in the middle of the Columbia River. MR. GARRISON informed Agent that he has not owned a car since 1924 when he had a model T Ford. He stated that he has not been in Oregon for several years and when he was there the only place he lived was in Forest Grove, Oregon. He admitted that he had lived in Rochester, Washington but that he had left there in 1935. He stated that he has never been called JACK and that he had never lived in Pinehurst, Oregon.

Agent reviewed the report of Special Agent H. A. KING, Portland, Oregon dated 1/8/38 which is the report first setting out the lead to locate GARRISON. It is noted in that report that the lead is to locate and interview C. A. GARRISON, owner of a 1930 Buick Coupe, 1937 Oregon license 215-750, at Rochester, Washington Somewhere along the line the names C. A. GARRISON and C. W. GARRISON have been

Reference is had to your letter of June 21, 1938 (Bureau file 76-2686) which refers to the memorandum prepared by Special Agent in Charge M. E. Gurnea concerning his observations as a result of having participated in the investigation of the escape of subjects from the United States Penitentiary at Alcatraz Island.

I have considered this matter very thoroughly, as has Special Agent A. E. Farland, who is well acquainted with conditions at Alcatraz Island, and I do not consider the suggestion of placing yound equipment in the shop at Alcatraz as practical inasmuch as electric machines are running in the shop all day long during the time that convicts are there, and the noise created by them would preclude listening equipment being of any value.

Unless advised to the contrary by the Bureau, no effort will be made to put into practice this suggestion made by Special Agent in Charge Gurnea.

Mr. BERT FOREMAN. Chief of Police at Vallejo, California, having informed Special Agent in Charge N.J.L. PIEPER that he had some information which he believed might be of value in instant case, and requesting that an Agent interview him for the details, Agent HAMMACK contacted Chief FOREMAN and he advised that one TED COWARDS, 363 Woodrow Avenue, Vallejo, whom he considered reliable, advised him that he was driving home in his automobile on Thursday, February 17, 1938, and at about 8:30 P.M. saw a man walking along the Benicia Road; that Edwards, believing the man to be someone he knew, picked him up and then discovered that he was not the person anticipated; that he asked him where he lived and what his name was. The man then stated that he lived in the 300 block on Woodrow Avenue in Vallejo and that his name was IVAN KEENER. EDWARDS reported that KEENER appeared nervous and that as he conversed with him KEENER stated that he was wanted for stealing a radio and did not know what to do about it; that if he wanted to talk he could say plenty. KEENER stated that he had been working in CCC Camps in Wisconsin, Washington, and Oregon. He then proceeded to Vell Mr. EDWARDS that one Mr. MORGAN, owner of the Topeka Hotel, First and McDonald Avenues, Richmond, is married to an aunt of "PRETTY BOY" FLOYD and that he was covering up for subjects COLE and ROE and was secretly sending out food to them.

Chief FOREMAN advised Agent HAMMACK that several attempts were made to locate KEENER on Woodrow Avenue in Vallejo but that the house at which he lived, if in fact he did, had never been located.

At Richmond, California.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents F. R. HALMACK and R. E. LETHERT:

Agents LETHERT and HAMMACK under pretense of locating KEENER for the purpose of getting information on another matter, located M. L. MORGAN and his wife, EVELYN MORGAN, at 320 First Street in Richmond. The MORGANS formerly operated the Topeka Hotel at 90 McDonald Avenue in Richmond. MORGAN stated that during October or November, 1937, IVAN KEENER came to his place at 320 First Street and stated that he would act as handy man for him if MORGAN would give him his room and board; that as he, MORGAN, was engaged in reclaiming old buildings, renovating them and converting them into rooming houses, he agreed to let KEENER have his room and board for his services; that gradually due to KEENER'S work he came to repose considerable confidence in him, and finally allowed him to more or

less manage the Topeka rooms at 90 McDonald Avenue. MORGAN stated that while EVELYN MORGAN was in the hospital KEENER succeeded in stealing about \$500 worth of bed linen, furniture, a radio, etc., from the Topeka rooms and later when questioned about the matter claimed that MORGAN owed it to him for his services; that finally KEENER claimed that MORGAN and his wife had assaulted him and had them arrested; that, however, the charges against him and his wife were dismissed; that he last saw KEENER about the middle of February but that in March, 1938, he received a claim for compensation under Social Security Act. No. 348-01-6421 for IVAN KEENER from the Department of Employment for the State of California; that at that time KEENER was living at 349 East Queen Street, inglewood, California.

MORGAN further stated that after KEENER left old letters were found which indicate that KEENER has a cousin CALVINGKEENER living at 2622 Partridge, Los Angeles, California, and that his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. WALTERKEENER, reside at Prairie City, III. MORGAN stated that from the way KEENER talked he feels that he is a little abnormal mentally, and Mrs. EVELYN MORGAN stated that from remarks passed by him she believes that KEENER is abnormal sexually.

The following description of KEHNER was furnished by the MORGANS:

Age 27
Height 5' 10"
Weight 145 - 150
Hair Dark brown
Eyes Blue green
Teeth Two front u

Two front upper teeth on each side broken off

and discolored

Forehead High

Inspector HARRY DONNELLY of the Richmond Police Dept. was contacted and stated that he recalls KEENER very well; that KEENER was in some trouble with the MORGANS who accused him of stealing their property as outlined above; that, however, KEENER was never fingerprinted nor photographed by the Richmond Police Department, and he has no idea as to KEENER'S location at this time. He further stated that the reputation of the MORGANS is that of being "dead beats" and that while KEENER may have a queer turn of mind. the MORGANS are just as bad.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent W. G. THARP:

At Santa Rosa, California.

Oh June 24, 1938, Special Agent W. G. THARP contacted Mr. HARRY D. NORTON at the Standard Drug Company, 507 4th Street, at which time he advised that right after the first of the year or about ten days or two weeks after COLE and ROE escaped from Alcatraz, at about 8:30 l.M. he had observed two men talking on the street in front of his store; that shortly thereafter the shorter of the two came in, at which time he inquired regarding the location of a tailor shop at which he and his friend could have a suit repaired. NORTON advised that he observed immediately that there was something about this man which caused him to feel that he had seen him previously but that he was not certain about it at that time; that he advised this person, who was the shorter of the two men, that he did not know of any tailor shop that was open at just that time and that in view of this fact, he asked him if he had to have the suit repaired at once, whereupon he was advised that it was necessary.

Mr. NORTON stated that at this time the larger of the two men, whom he later identified as ROE, came in, at which timehe said, "What's the matter with this fellow? Doesn't he know anything?" NORTON advised that he became quite nervous at this and that he told them that he would telephone JOHN FETERSON, an old Swede, who maintains the tailor shop next door to his drug store upstairs but that when he started for the telephone, the fellow identified as ROE advised that they had already been there, whereupon both of the men left in a great hurry.

Mr. NORTON advised that a few minutes after these parties had left his establishment, it dawned on him that he had seen their photographs in the San Francisco Examiner and that they were the convicts who had escaped from Alcatraz. He said that he did not immediately report this to the police inasmuch as on two or three occasions, ha has reported petty offenses to them and that he felt that he might be making a nuisance of himself and that he discussed the matter with his wife and a day or two later he mentioned the incident to Sergeant LARRY WALKER of the Santa Rosa Police Department, who had more or less talked him out of the idea that it could have been ROE and COLE. He stated, however,

that he subsequently mentioned the matter to Mr. SCHINDLER, Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue of Santa Rosa, through whom the information was conveyed to this office.

Mr. NORTON was carefully questioned regarding his identification of these two persons. He described the first man who entered the store and whom he later identified as COLE as:

> Height 51 4" Weight 130 Build Chunky Hair Dark Nose Short, turned back Dress Gray trousers, dark sweater, bare-headed

He described the second person whom he later identified as ROE as:

> 5' 10" Height Build Slender Weight 150 Hair Dark blond Nationality Scandinavian Complexion Light

Dress Bare-headed, manner of dress not certain

Mr. NORTON examined several photographs exhibited to him by Agent, at which time he immediately identified the photographs of ROE and COIE as the two individuals who had been in his store. He stated that he was quite positive that they were the individuals.

It was observed that Mr. NORTON was apparently a high-class and intelligent type of business man. He was rather impressive without being talkative. In an effort to determine his reliability, Deputy Sheriff WILLIAM E. COOK of the Santa Rosa Sheriff's Office was questioned regarding Mr. NORTON, at which time Deputy Sheriff COOK advised that Mr. NORTON was absolutely reliable and that he could be depended upon in all circumstances.

Inquiry was also made of Mr. JOHN PETERSON, 509 4th Street, who maintains a tailor shop one floor above the Standard Drug Company, above referred to. Mr. PETERSON advised that he

has resided in Santa Rosa for 25 years and upon being carefully questioned, he further advised that he had no recollection whatsoever of anyone calling at his establishment to have any repairs made who could possibly fit the descriptions of subjects in instant case.

Mr. NORTON was requested to immediately notify the San Francisco Field Office in the event he again sees the individuals referred to above.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. R. McCULIOCH July 22, 1938, with reference to the report of Special Agent DANIEL CURRIE, Jr., dated at Seattle, Washington, 1/7/33:

At Grass Valley, California.

At the Grass Valley Post Office it was learned from RONALD PASCAL, General Delivery Clerk, that E. F. BOVEE resided somewhere on Deer Creek near that town, where he was paining gold.

On Deer Creek numerous inquiries elicited the information that BOVEE had returned to the State of Washington.

RONALD PASCAL was again contacted at the Post Office, at which time he located a forwarding address of Grand Coulee, Washington. for BOVEE. dated June 25, 1938.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent H. K. JOHNSON with reference to the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, 2/15/38, and report of Special Agent C. H. OLSON, San Francisco, 1/3/38:

At Stockton, California.

Reference is made to page 21, Report of Special Agent C. H. OLSON, San Francisco, dated 1/3/38, which reflects that a confidential informant of the Call-Bulletin at San Francisco had informed that "DUTCHT HILL, a gambler at Stockton, California, and one WONG, Chinese Mayor, at Stockton, had assisted subjects to escape from Alcatraz and that COLE was being secreted by Chinese at Stockton.

Special Agent H. K. JOHNSON contacted Detective Sergeant JOE HARBERT and Detective ELMER THORP, Stockton Police Department. Both are well acquainted with "DUTCH" HILL and "BILLY" WONG, influential Chinese leader and reputed Chinese mayor, and both detectives unhesitatingly scoffed at information involving HILL and WONG in instant case. While HILL has underworld contacts, both he and WONG are used as confidential informants of the Stockton Police Department. Both HARBERT and THORP suggested that the confidential informant had probably lost money in gambling at Stockton and therefore, since HILL and WONG have gambling establishments at Stockton, was trying to embarrass HILL and WONG.

HARBERT and THORP have reliably informed and assisted Agent in the past and their judgment is considered valuable. They both stated that they would make cautious inquiries and observations and inform the San Francisco Division of any positive information.

It is believed advisable to again contact E. T. CLESON, City Editor, Call-Bulletin, for the name of the informant and any additional information since now the informant has had time to conduct any private investigation he has been making. If the informant were FRANK LEE, it would appear highly probable that he fabricated the information as a grudge since LEE has done so before. LEE is a known pervert who has lost money at San Francisco and Stockton and complained to authorities at Stockton.

It is believed inadvisable to contact either HILL or WONG at Stockton since they both would very probably give no information if they were involved.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent H. I. BOBBITT and Special Agent K. P. PETTIJOHN, the latter reporting:

At San Francisco, California.

Particular reference is made to the report of Special Agent C. G. CAMPBELL dated at Seattle, Washington, 7/12/38, in which a lead is set out for the San Francisco Field Division to contact Mrs. VIR-GINIAM EVY, aunt of MARYON DARLING, at 44-A Woodward Ssreet. Mrs. LEVY was interviewed at the above address and appeared to be a woman of about 55 years of age. She stated that she was a widow and had lived alone at this address for about 12 years with the exception of

about 14 months several years ago when her brother, EMIL TRAYSA, had lived with her. She stated that she was the aunt of MARYON DARLING and that when in San Francisco MARYON always visited with her, but never remained over night; that the last such visit was in April when MARYON was in San Francisco with the Al. G. Barnes Circus.

Mrs. LEVY stated that she had never known any of MARYON DARLING'S boy friends but that MARYON sometimes spoke to her about them. She could not recall ever having heard MARYON mention an individual named O'BRIEN and stated that none of MARYON'S boy friends had ever visited her house with MARYON. She was shown photographs of subjects ROE and COLE and stated that neither resembled anyone known to her; however, that the photograph of RALPH ROE seemed slightly familiar. She could not recall where she may have seen anyone who resembled RALPH ROE but stated that it must have been in the neighborhood. She stated positively that no one answering either the description of ROE or COLE had ever even so much as visited with her at the above address.

Agnets were allowed to look through Mrs. IEVY'S apartment and it would not appear, from the limited space she rents, that she could have anyone living with her. Her small apartment is very littered with books and articles, and it was noted that all the books pertained to religion. She seemed deeply religious and talked much regarding religion during the interview. She stated that if subjects had ever been in the neighborhood the man who lived across the street at 45 Broadway would probably have seen them inasmuch as he is on the street much of the time.

MIKE CULIER, 45 Broadway, was located stending in front of this address and when shown photographs of subjects ROE and COLE stated that they did not resemble anyone that he had seen in the neighborhood. Mr. CULLER speaks English with great difficulty and could hardly be understood. He stated that he did not know VIRGINIA LEVY other than by sight, but that he had never noticed any strangers, or anyone else going into her apartment. He stated that MIKE RINCE, the watchman of the Airway Cleaners, 42 Woodward, also lived in the neighborhood, and as he was on 24 hour duty he would be familiar with any strangers in the neighborhood.

MIKE PRINCE was located at the Airway Cleaners and when shown photographs of subjects ROE and COIE he immediately recognized them as being the escapees from Alcatraz Island. He stated that he was quite positive he had never seen them in the neighborhood. He

was questioned relative to VIRGINIA LEVY and stated that he knew her real well; that she was an elderly and eccentric woman, but quite harmless. He stated that she lived alone and that he had never seen her have any visitors. Mr. PRINCE further stated that if any transients lived in that neighborhood, it would most likely be at the Armory Apartments, which are across the street from the Airway Cleaners at 37 Woodward. He advised that Mrs. ELIZABETH O'BRIEN, who runs the Armory Apartments, was a very reliable person and knew her tenants well.

Mrs. There was located and interviewed and upon being shown photographs of subjects ROE and COLE stated that she was quite positive that they had never been in her apartment house.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. R. McCULLOCH:

At Sacramento, California.

DAVE SILLS, Rio Linde, California, who has furnished this office with many groundless leads in the past, while giving information relative to his latest MATTNAP suspect, advised that he had recently met a man in Redding, California, whose name was believed to be BLACK. This man, who was allegedly from Oklahoma, informed SILIS that he had heard that subjects ROE and COLE had successfully escaped from Alcatraz and the Bay, had gone to Fort Bragg, Cal., and then to Redding, where they had stayed a short time. They were said by BLACK to be now in the vicinity of Visalia, California, where relatives of ROE reside. COLE was said to be employing the name "SULLIVAN".

SILIS, who was very vague in his information, did not know where BLACK had obtained his information or where he might now be located.

Leads are being set out in an endeavor to check the information furnished by DAVE SILIS of Rio Linde, California.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. R. McCULLOCH:

At Auburn, California.

While Agent McCULLOCH was interviewing A. W. HINTON, E. Placer Street, in connection with another matter, Mr. HINTON stated that some months ago, shortly after the Alcatraz escape of ROE and COLE, and before the heavy snow was in the mountains, he had occasion to see two men in a cabin in a remote section of Nevada County. who, he was absolutely certain, were subjects, whose photographs he had lately seen. HINTON stated that the cabin was for several months inaccessible because of snow, and might still be. However, if Agent would return later he would guide Agent to this cabin. At the time of this interview he was recovering from an illness and stated that he could not possibly show Agent this cabin, and he refused to give a description of how it could be reached. He was very mysterious and declined to say how he had happened to see these men, and refused to give any other information than that set out above, saying simply that he would prefer to give no more information at that time but would "Tell all" if the men were apprehended. HINTON, an elderly man, was confined to his bed at the time of the interview. He was quite deaf, and the interview was difficult.

Sheriff EIMER GUM advised Agent McCULLOCH that he knew HINTON and that he believed the man to be mentally sound.

A review of the San Francisco Field Office file in this case reflects the following information not previously set forth in report form:

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R. E. LETHERT:

At San Francisco, California.

At 12:30 P.M., 3/30/38, Captain BURNHAM of the United States Coast Guard, called this office to advise that they had just recovered the body of a man from the Bay who was dressed only in shorts and socks and it was believed he may be one of the subjects in instant case.

At the Coroner's Office, that afternoon, it was determined that this man was positively identified by CHARLES H. CARKER, 21 Park Hill Avenue, San Francisco, California, as DAVID DALE CRAIK, 25 years of age, whose home was at 1808 Octavia Street, San Francisco, California.

Although the body was partly eaten away and the features not discernible, the identification was made by a ring worn on the dead man's finger.

Mr. PAUL C. GREEN of the Coroner's Office, informed Agent that this man had fallen overboard from a vessel about four weeks ago.

On 3/28/38 Mr. JOHN JAMES ROCHE, employed by the North-western Pacific Railway, as carpenter, residence 702 Vallejo Street, telephone Douglas 6945, came to the San Francisco Division Office, and furnished the following information:

That on March 26, 1938, as he was coming from Sausalito to San Francisco on the ferry boat "San Francisco", at 5 P.M., while lying on a settee, he overheard a conversation between a woman, whom he stated the man called EVELYN, and a man named MORRIS; that during the conversation EVELYN said to MORRIS: "How are TED and RALPH getting on?" MORRIS said "TED is O.K., but RALPH was not so hot." EVELYN said she didn't know what to think of COIE.

Mr. ROCHE further stated that this woman goes to Tiburon very often; that he has seen her there often lately; that when she arrives at Tiburon, a row boat comes to meet her from a launch, which is laying in the river, and that she is taken to the location of the cabin cruiser, and after she is taken aboard, the launch generally heads up the river toward Raton Pass; that he has noticed this launch off-shore on several occasions; that as a rule the row boat picks this woman up at the Northwestern slip.

Mr. ROCHE described this launch or cabin cruiser as being one about thirty or thirty-five feet long, with a square back, wide hull, and brown super-structure. He was unable to give the name of the launch, or the number, stating that it was lying too far off shore to get this information; that upon arriving in San Francisco at the ferry slip, EVELYN and MORRIS were met by two men, who were driving a brand new, black-colored Chevrolet automobile, with no license plates. The car had a blue and white sticker on the right front windshield, and the right rear fender was dented.

The two men who were in the car waiting were sitting in the front seat, and upon EVELYN and MORRIS coming to the car, these two men got out, and went in the rear seat, and Morris drove the car off towards Broadway, when he lost track of them. Mr. ROCHE describes the woman whom he states answered the name of EVELYN, as follows:

Age About 23 or 25 years.

Height 5' 6 or 7"

Weight 120 to 125 1bs.

Hair Dirty blonde.

Eyes Blue.

Eyeglasses Wore rimless glasses

Mr. ROCHE stated that EVELYN carried a purse with the initials "E.B." on same.

The man whom he calls MORRIS he described as follows:

Age 28 to 30 years
Height 5' 6 or 7"
Weight 160 or 165 lbs.
Hair Light brown.
Eyes Blue.
Complexion Ruddy.
Build Medium

The two men who picked EVELYN and MORRIS up at the Ferry, he described as follows:

No. 1 Age About 30 years. Height 5' 6" Weight 170 lbs.

No. 2 Weight About 150 lbs.
Height 6'.
Build Slim.

Mr. ROCHE stated that in the event he had occasion to notice this woman again going to the launch, or getting in the row boat, he would immediately notify the San Francisco Division Office, and in the event he obtained any other information, he would also notify this office.

He was instructed to call the San Francisco Division Office in the event he obtained any information of value concerning this case.

The following investigation has been conducted relative to automobiles passing into the State of California from Oregon on either December 16th or December 17, 1937:

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. R. McCULIOCH:

At Clarksburg, California.

It was ascertained that MABEL H. MERINGER, to whom 1937 California license No. 1E303 was issued for a 1935 model Plymouth Coupe, is the wife of L. MERINGER, prominent rancher in that community.

At the L. HERINGER ranch near Clarksburg, Mr. HERINGER, upon being contacted by Agent McCULLOCH, advised that the automobile in question had been driven by his son, LESTER HAHERINGER to Corvallis, Oregon, where he had attended Oregon State College during the fall of 1937. Shortly before Christmas his son had returned to Clarksburg for the holidays, and no doubt crossed the Oregon line on one of the days in question. Mr. HERINGER stated that LESTER is presently attending the University of California at Davis, California.

At Davis, California.

LESTER HERINGER was located at 223 University Street, at which time he advised Agent McCULLOCH, as had his father, concerning his having entered California during the period in question. He stated that he had been living in Corvallis, Oregon, prior to returning to California and that he had been in Portland, Oregon, but once in his life, that being early in the fall of 1937 when he attended a football game in that city.

LESTER HERINGER was noted to be described as follows:

Age 20
Height 5' 8"

At Wheatland, California.

It was ascertained by Special Agent J. R. McCULIOCH from E. E. RODDON, Box D, that he had traded in his 1919 model Hudson touring, which bore 1937 California plates No. A-6864, early in the fall of 1937 to Hammon Bros. Garage in Wheatland.

At Hammon Bros. Garage, Agent McCULLOCH learned that the Hudson obtained from RODDON had been sold in approximately November to one ED WITCHENELLI who was said to be an auto wrecker in Rose-ville, California. Inquiry at the Hammon Bros. Garage elicited the information that so far as was known, the 1937 license plates were on the car when sold to MITCHENELLI.

At Roseville, California.

Agent McCULLOCH learned from R. K. BONNEY, auto wrecker, that ED MITCHENELLI bad wrecked the car in question at MITCHENELLI'S farm near Lincoln, California.

At Lincoln, California.

ED MITCHENELLI, upon being located, advised Special Agent J. R. McCULLOCH that he could not recall whether or not the 1919 Hudson obtained by him in Wheatland had carried 1937 license plates at the time he bought it from Hammon Bros. as he had never driven the car but had towed it to his farm and wrecked it. A careful search was made of MITCHENELLI'S wrecking yard without the location of the license in question.

MITCHENELLI stated that he had sold most of the car as junk, including the frames to which the licenses would have been attached if still on the car, to R. Rosenburg, corner 17th and R. Streets, Sacramento, California.

MITCHENELLI had in his possession the certificates of registration for the car in question, which registration showed the car to have been issued 1937 California license No. A-6864. The records of the California Motor Vehicle Department had reflected the car to still be in RODDON'S possession as MITCHENELLI had not sent in the necessary papers to the Vehicle Department, he stating that he had not believed it necessary so long as he was junking the car.

At Sacramento, California.

A. COLDBIATT, Buyer, at the R. ROSENBERG junk yard, 17th and R. Streets, advised that there was no possible way in which it could be ascertained whether or not license plates were attached to parts of old cars which were bought as junk by that concern, inasmuch as the dealings are on a cash basis and furthermore the junk is described in tons or pounds of whatever type of metal it might be, there being no reason to note the number of license plates which might be attached to some of the parts of old cars.

Mr. GOLDBLATT advised Agent McCULLOCH that metal purchased during December had been sold the Bethlehem Steel Company in San Francisco.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent T. F. WILSON:

Reference is made to the list of autos which entered California from Oregon on 12/15 and 16/37 as disclosed by the records of the border checking stations furnished to the San Francisco Office. Particular reference is made to a 1936 model Chevrolet Town Sedan, Motor No. 319123, Serial 6GA 12-13636, 1937 California license 2G-8481, registered/to the Super Mold Corporation of California, 420 N. Sacramento St., Lodi, California, which car is reported to have entered California from Portland, Oregon, on 12/16/37 via the Redwood Highway with one passenger (apparently the driver).

At Lodi, California

On 4/8/38 Mr. MERLIN W. DRUQUER, Officer Manager, Super Mold Corporation of California, 420 North Sacramento Street, advised that one of their salesmen named AMTEL F. PROUTY had been the driver and only passenger in instant car on the date in question, when it was checked by the border station in connection with its entry in to California from Oregon. He went on to state that Mr. PROUTY'S home is in Oakland, California, and that the latter is a fully reliable person enjoying an excellent reputation both with their company and everywhere else so far as he knows; that Mr. PROUTY has been continuously in their employ since 1931 or 1932.

Interview with Mr. L. W. DARDEN, sales manager of said company, confirmed the information previously obtained from Mr. DRUQUER regarding Mr. PROUTY. He also stated he considers the latter one of the better salesmen of the company. His territory ex-

tends from Bakersfield, California, north to the Oregon line and includes that portion of Oregon as far north as Grants Pass, Medford and Klamath Falls; that at the time in question he was covering the same territory and would have had no occasion to go further north in the State of Oregon than the aforementioned three towns unless he had been specifically instructed to do so for a special purpose and the company's records covering that time do not indicate that he was given any such assignment, but instead reflect that he was working in Grants Pass, Oregon, on 12/15/37. Mr. DARDEN exhibited the company's records in this regard to Agent so that Agent himself might see that that had been the case.

Mr. PROUTY, who by chance happened to be at the Lodi office of the company at the time of Agent's inquiry, was himself interviewed.

He advised that his residence is 3875 Ruby Street, Oakland, California. With reference to his entry in California on the occasion in question, he advised he had been proceeding south to his home in Oakland after having been in the three towns of Klamath Falls, Medford and Grants Pass, Oregon, and working his territory in that section; that the day and night of 12/15/37 he had spent in Grants Pass, leaving there the following day for Eureka, California. He also stated that the last time he had been in Portland, Oregon, was in the early summer 1937, during either June or July, and that he had not then, or at any other time, purchased copies of either of the booklets in question.

While interviewing Mr. PROUTY it was observed that his description is dissimilar to that previously reported for the purchaser of the booklets involved.

In view of the information obtained by this interview Mr. PROUTY is being definitely eliminated as a suspect for said purchaser.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent T. FITZHUCH WILSON:

Reference is made to the list of automobiles entering California from the State of Oregon, on December 15 and 16, 1937, as disclosed by the records of the California Checking Stations, and furnished by Special Agent J. R. McCULIOCH of this office. Particular reference is made to a 1927 Studebaker Dictator Sedan, Motor

No. 59389, serial No. 1403438, 1937 California license No. 25 5154, registered to BILL CLAMONS, Route 2, Box 320, care of W. M. FRAZER, Merced, California, as sole owner (CLAMONS' address on 11/9/37 was indicated to be Davis Camp, Brentwood, Contra Costa County, Calif.) which was checked at the Hornbrook, California, Station on December 16, 1937, and reported to be entering California with only one passenger.

At Brentwood, California.

Inquiry on January 28, 1938, of CHARLIE BARKLEY, Constable, 9th Township, Contra Costa County, disclosed that BILL CLEMONS (not CLAMONS) is an Oklahoman, who came to Brentwood about four or five years ago. Constable BARKLEY considers him to be one of the better class of Oklahomans, and to be fairly reliable. He indicated that he works as a general laborer locally. Further, that O. R. DAVIS, owner of DAVIS' Log Cabin Grocery and Auto Camp, where CLEMONS is reported to reside, is believed to be thoroughly reliable.

Mr. DAVIS stated that the CLEMONS family had been residing at his auto court for the past two or three years; that they were poor, hard-working, honest people, and he believed thoroughly reliable. There are three brothers, JOE, BERT and BILL. The former two, he stated, were married, but BILL is single. Further, that BILL is the one who owns the Studebaker Sedan mentioned earlier herein, and Mr. DAVIS recalled that sometime during the past fall BILL had driven his (own) mother and father, who also lived at the auto court at that time, up to some place in Oregon, to spend the winter with a relative of the CLEMONS' family there, BILL returning to Brentwood from said trip shortly before Christmas; that after his return he had stayed at the auto camp for a few days, and then had proceeded south somewhere in the vicinity of Merced, California, it is believed, where he was to obtain a job as a farm laborer.

Mr. DAVIS likewise indicated that although BILL CLEMONS was no longer at the auto camp, his brother, BERT, and the latter's family, were still residing there.

Mr. and Mrs. BERT CLEMONS advised that BILL'S present address is care of ... M. FRAZER, Route 2, Box 320, Merced, California. (This latter address is the same as that which was shown

for BILL CLAMONS by the records of the California State Division of Motor Vehicles, at Sacramento, at the time the ownership of instant car was transferred to him on 8/28/37, as indicated earlier herein.) BILL is employed at this place as a farm laborer.

BERT confirmed the fact that BILL was the one who had taken their parents, Mr. and Mrs. LEM and LUCY CLEMONS, in this car up to Oregon during the past fall. He advised that BILL had taken them there to spend the winter with their uncle, Mr. MARSENE BAUSMAN, Route 2, Box 518, Grants Pass, Oregon; that BILL and the parents had left Brentwood, California, 11/10/37; had gone direct, so BILL stated, to BAUSMAN'S farm at Grants Pass, Oregon, and that BILL had remained on the farm there until he came south again, which had been the Sunday immediately preceding Christmas, that is December 19, 1937.

Both Mr. and Mrs. BERT CLEMONS were reasonably certain BILL had not made a trip to the City of Portland while he was in the State of Oregon during this period, and furthermore, even if he had done so, he would hardly have had occasion to purchase any of the books in question, since he can read and write only with difficulty, his education having been limited to the third grade in grammar school.

Mrs. BERT CLEMONS exhibited a recent postcard they had received from BILL, and it was readily apparent the handwriting was that of an almost wholly illiterate person. Furthermore, the description of BILL CLEMONS was furnished by Mr. and Mrs. BERT CLEMONS, and it did not correspond to that reported for the purchaser of the booklets in question, hence BILL CLEMONS is being definitely eliminated as being identical with said purchaser, in view of the wholly negative character of the foregoing investigation, and no lead will be set out for the Los Angeles Office to have him interviewed.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent W. G. THARP:

At San Rafael, California.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, Los Angeles, California, 1/8/38, in which it was stated that the Los Angeles Examiner dated December 26, 1937, carried an article to the effect that Coast Guardsmen and Marine lookouts were watching for a 14-foot sailing skiff. It was determined that this skiff had

been reported stolen by Sheriff WALTER B. SELIMER of San Rafael, California, and it was presumed that this boat could have been used by subjects in making their escape from Alcatraz inasmuch as it was alleged to have been stolen from Sausalito, which is a short distance from Alcatraz Penitentiary.

On June 18, 1938, Agent THARP interviewed Sheriff WALTER B. SELLMER. Identification Officer H. PETER WOLFORD, and Undersheriff FRANK KELLY concerning the all points teletype which they had sent out regarding the theft of instant skiff. They stated that they were unable to recall the name of the party who had reported the loss of instant skiff to them. They conducted a careful search of their records and were unable to find any reference whatsoever to the report of the loss of instant boat. They advised that a further search would be conducted for the record regarding this loss, and on June 21st, they were again contacted by Agent THARP. They advised that they had sent out an all points teletype which stated in substance that a 14-foot skiff equipped for sailing, which boat was heavily built with a heavy center board, with 50 pounds of lead built in, the sternboard cut out V-shaped to accommodate an outboard motor, painted green on the bottom, white on the sides, with green decking, and with the front part of the boat decked over and covered with canvas; that it had a 4-foot gunwale, coaming aft from the deck, with sheets for two in the stern; that it was two years old and valued at \$100; that instant boat was stolen from its mooring in Sausalito sometime between Sunday, December 19, and Thursday, December 23, 1937. They advised, however, that they did not know the name of the owner of instant skiff. They indicated that they might possibly have received the stolen report from the Sausalito Police Department.

Agent interviewed Mr. TONY QUADORS, Chief of Police of Sausalito, California, on June 22, 1938, at which time he advised that he did not have any recollection concerning instant skiff; that to the best of his knowledge he had not reported it to the Sheriff's Office. He further advised, after checking his records, that he had no report covering the loss of a boat of this description. He stated that there were so many boats of this type in the harbor of Sausalito that it would be practically impossible to notice one missing unless it had been brought specifically to his attention. He promised, however, that he would make a careful check of the waterfront of Sausalito in order to make an identification of the owner of said boat, and in the event Agent would contact him at a later date he would furnish what information he had developed.

On July 29, 1938, Agent THARP again interviewed Chief QUADORS who stated he had been unable to develop any information concerning instant skiff. He stated he had contacted all of the yacht clubs, boat houses, fishermen and ferry operators in that locality with negative results. He suggested to Agent THARP that Mr. DICK LEWIS, proprietor of Madden Boat House, might be able to furnish information or make some helpful suggestion concerning the owner of instant skiff.

Agent THARP contacted Mr. LEWIS at the Madden Boat House in Sausalito, who advised that he did not believe that instant skiff could be traced inasmuch as it was not the type that would be registered. He suggested that he was perhaps in closer contact with the skiff owners in that locality than anyone else and that he had not heard of a boat of this description being lost.

At San Francisco, California.

Agent THARP also contacted Lieut. Commander R. S. PATCH, Chief of Staff, United States Customs Service, 201 Customs House, who is in charge of the United States Coast Guard and Marine Lookouts in the Bay Area. Mr. RILEY in his office checked the records of losses reported to the United States Coast Guard and advised that instant skiff had not been reported lost or stolen to them, although this is the general and usual procedure in this locality when a boat disappears.

Inasmuch as Agent THARP was unable to obtain any trace of instant skiff, no further investigation is being conducted along this line. Sheriff SELIMER and the Chief of Police at Sausalito advised that they would keep their eyes open for instant skiff and in the event they had any inquiries concerning same, they would contact the San Francisco Field Office.

At 349 E. Queen Street, Inglewood, California, will locate IVAN KEENER and question him relative to his statements that Mrs. EVELYN MORGAN, 320 First Street, Richmond, California, was supposed to be a contact for subjects. (See pages 2 and 3 of this report.)

At Visalia, California, will conduct appropriate investigation to determine if subjects are in that vicinity as alleged by DAVE SILIS of Rio Linde, California. Will bear in mind that subjects have relatives in this vicinity and that subject COLE is supposedly using the name "SULLIVAN". (See page 9 of this report.)

THE SAN FRANCISCO FIELD OFFICE

At San Francisco, California, will contact Mr. E. T. GIEESON, City Editor of the Call-Bulletin for additional information regarding the informant who reported that "DUTCH" HILL and one WONG of Stockton, California, had assisted in subjects' escape. Will also endeavor to learn the identity of the informant of Mr. GIEESON in order that this informant may be interviewed. (See page 21, report of Special Agent C. H. OISON, dated at San Francisco, Cal. 1/3/38, and page 7 of this report.)

At Auburn, California, will contact A. W. HINTON, E. Placer Street, in an effort to locate and interview the two individuals he saw in the mountains near Auburn and whom he believes to be identical with subjects. (See page 10 of this report.)

Therefore the Bureau desires that you immediately contact Mr. Hoche and exhibit the photographs of Bert and Derming to him for the purpose of ascertaining whether the two individuals he observed on the ferry boat "San Francisco" on March 26, 1938, are identical with those fugitives. In the event Br. Roche indicates that the photographs of Bort and Denning are likenesses of the individuals he observed on that forry boat an immediate effort should be made to locate them in order to definitely determine whether they are in fact fucitives Denning and Bert.

The setention of the San Francisco Office is directed to the fact that the period for which made of the reference report fails to refleich that certain investigation reported in that report was conducted on Narch 28 and 30, 1938, whereas the

crossed into California sometime that afternoon, and that evening they stayed in Yreka, California and arrived in San Francisco on December 16th, 1938. MR. and MRS. WILLIAM ERICKSON informed Agent that they did not stop at the United States Mydrographic Bureau in Portland, Oregon and that they did not obtain any maps or tidal charts of San Francisco Bay at any time. MR. ERICKSON, his wife and two daughters live at the above mentioned address and he farms at that location.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent W. F. Wood, Portland, Oregon dated April 25, 1938, which on page 3, reflects that he interviewed MR. ARTHUR LACOGGIN concerning the ownership of 1938 license plates 299-336 for a 1930 Pontiac Sedan, motor number 682086. MR. COGGIN denied at that time that he had driven this particular car to California in December, 1937, but admitted that he had gone to California in his 1935 Model Ford Sedan, which carries 1938 Oregon license plates number 300-313. A letter was addressed to the office of the Secretary of State, Salem, Oregon by the Portland Field Office requesting information as to the date of issuance of a 1936 Oregon license plates number 299-336, which letter also advised that these license plates were supposed to have been issued for a 1930 Pontiac Sedan, motor number 682086. Subsequently, under date of June 29, 1938, the Secretary of State's office at Salem, Oregon advised the Portland Field Office by letter that there was no license plates with as high a number as 299-336 issued in the state of Oregon for the year 1936, but that their records indicated registration of a 1930 Pontiac Sedan, lagtor number 682986, under a 1938 license number 299-336, which was issued on January 22, 1938 in the name of the California-Oregon Box and Lumber Company, 139 Granite Street, Ashland, Oregon. The Certificate of Title number 427532 covering this automobile, was issued on February 14, 1930 in the name of the CALIFORNIA OREGON BOX and LUMBER COMPANY, subject to a lien of \$603.00 dated February 10, 1930 in favor of the Commercial Finance Corporation, Medford, Oregon.

In view of the fact that 1938 Oregon license plates number 299-336 were actually issued to the California-Oregon Box and Lumber Company, of which MR. ARTHUR L. COGGIN is the owner, it appears that an error was made by the person making a record of this particular license number at the Oregon-California boundary when the automobile crossed into California and there is no way of ascertaining the correct license of the car which passed over the boundary at that time.

he was insane, and that he possessed a psychopathic personality. On March 2, 1938 he was re-admitted to the Dayton State Hospital, and his case was diagnosed as C.P.S., competent, which signifies Constitutional Psychopathic State, criminalism.

On April 5, 1938 he was transferred to the Veterans Administration Facility at Dayton, Ohio for domiciliary care, from which he was dropped the following day for a disciplinary reason.

For the information of the Peoria office, the following letter was received by warden J. A. JOHNSON at Alcatraz Penitentiary from DWIGHT OTIS PUGH, Veterans Hospital, Dayton, Ohio:

"Veterans Hospital Dayton, Ohio April 2, 1938

"For the Dept. of Justice Dear Sir:

"As regards TED COLE and RALPH ROE who lammed from the rock the following may be of interest:

"I did time with them in Leavenworth. TED was doing half a century for a snatch, while RALPH was shaking 99 - due out in year 2001 on a national bank job.

"If you'd watch Miss BILLE BROWN, Sawpulpa, Oklahoma, you might find something. At present I can't recall her street address but you can get it.

"I understood that FRANKIE LAKE, TERRY DRUGGAN, RALPH CAPONE, COLLETTI, SAM and JACK CUSAH and FRANKINITTI and HYMIE ZEVINS were figuring something on Johnson's hotel, Alcatraz. I believe the Rock is due for some hot fireworks - in a fog - and the cable to Oakland, and Lieut. NELSON.

"As soon as I am out of here and get back to Chi, if I learn anything of real value, I'll let you know.

It is further desired that this report contain, in alphabetical order, the names of the informants which are now being used or have heretofore been used by the Fureau in this case, as well as a statement indicating the results produced by each informant. In those instances where the name of the informant is being kept confidential, the symbols by which those informants are designated in investigative reports should be used.

Inquiry at Farmers & Mechanics National Bank, Westminster, Md., reflects that RICHARD R. HARMEL opened an account on Oct. 16, 1937 with a check drawn in that name in the amount of \$200., drawn on the Colonial Trust Company, Wilmington, Delaware, and payable to cash. Indicated several days thereafter, two checks on this Westminster bank cashed at Logan, West Va., possibly in amounts of \$10. and \$50., payable to a MISS HARMEL. Data as to these checks not in possession of bank, as same returned to Federal Reserve Bank, Richmond, Va., marked "No such account". Deputy Sheriff W. C. COAKLEY, with headquarters at Westminster, Md., not located for interview at this time. RICHARD R. HARMEL is identical with WILLIAM PHILLIP KEMP, with aliases, who was sentenced on May 2, 1938 to 6 years in the State Penitentiary at Richmond, Va.

DETAILS: AT WESTMINSTER, MARYLAND

In the absence of bank officials, interview was had with MR. CHARLES P. GEIMAN, Paying and Receiving Teller of the Farmers & Mechanics National Bank.

MR. GEIMAN definitely recalled the person known as RICHARD R. HARMEL, and in this connection, he displayed to Agent a receipt to the bank signed by Officer J. J. CASSIDY of the Maryland State Police, Baltimore, Maryland, with reference to Check #101, dated October 16, 1937, on the Colonial Trust Company, Wilmington, Delaware, in the amount of \$200., signed by RICHARD R. HARMEL, and payable to the order of cash. This particular check, returned by the Delaware bank, is in the possession of State Police Officer CASSIDY.

Mr. GEIMAN recalled that HARMEL opened an account at the bank with the above described check on October 16, 1937. It was stated that the Farmers & Mechanics National Bank shortly thereafter communicated with the Colonial Trust Company, and ascertained that there was no such account for this individual. Several days later, two checks were received at the bank through regular channels, from the Federal Reserve Bank, Richmond, Virginia, both of which were drawn by RICHARD R. HARMEL on the Westminster bank, and were payable to a MISS HARMEL, it being indicated that the checks had been cashed by MISS HARMEL at a bank in Logan, West Virginia.

MR. GETMAN advised in this connection, that his bank does not have possession of these checks, as the same were returned to the Federal Reserve Bank, at Richmond, Virginia, with the notation, "No such account", inasmuch as at the time of the arrival of these checks, information had previously been received from Delaware reflecting that there was no account for anyone by the name of HARMEL at that bank. MR. GETMAN advised that it is his recollection that one of these two particular checks was in the amount of \$\pi 10.\$, and he believed the other was in the sum of \$\pi 50.\$ or possibly \$\pi 100.

AT SYKESVILLE, MARYLAND

MR. LDWARD GRIMES, clerk in the Post Office, advised

that Deputy Sheriff W. C. COAKLEY did not reside in that town but covered Sykesville from the county seat at Westminster, Maryland. It was stated that Deputy Sheriff COAKLEY resided at Oaklind Mills Road, about six miles from Sykesville. It was stated that in the event he could not be located at his home, he could possibly be reached through the Sheriff's Office at Westminster, Maryland.

An endeavor was made to locate Deputy Sheriff COAKLEY at his home on Cakland Mills Road, but no one was at home at the time. For possible future reference in locating this individual at his home, the same is reached by proceeding to Eldersburg, Maryland, and taking the Liberty Heights Road, proceeding toward Baltimore, and about three miles east of Eldersburg, turn left on the Oakland Mills Road, and Deputy Sheriff COAKLEY'S house is the sixth one on the left around a sharp bend in the road about one mile above the intersection.

For information purposes, it is to be stated that RICH-ARD R. HARMEL is identical with WILLIAM PHILLIP KEMP, with aliases, who is presently serving a sentence of six years in the State Penitentiary at Richmond, Virginia, KEMP being the subject of Washington Field Division file #26-4613, Richmond office of origin. KEMP has indulged in numerous fraudulent activities in the States of Virginia and Maryland, and it is indicated that the State of Maryland has filed eleven detainers against this individual.

Maryland State Police Officer J. J. CASSIDY has conducted intensive investigation with reference to the activities of this individual in Maryland, and Officer CASSIDY has in his possession all facts relating to the activities of HARMEL with respect to the checks cashed at Logan, West Virginia.

An endeavor was made to interview Officer CASSIDY at the headquarters of the State Police in Baltimore, but it was ascertained that Officer CASSIDY was out of town at that particular time.

At WASHINGTON, D. C., will interview JAMES WASSILA

when he contacts this office. If VASSILA fails to call within a reasonable time, a follow up contact should be had with MRS. L. J. SHEPHERD of 1612 - G Street, S.E., in an effort to contact him.

At WESTMINSTER, MARYLAND, will endeavor to locate and interview Deputy Sheriff W. C. COAKLEY, and in the event he cannot be located there, efforts should be made to interview him at his home on Oakland Mills Road. Deputy Sheriff COAKLEY should be questioned as to any information he may have pertaining to this matter.

At <u>BALTIMORE</u>, <u>MARYLAND</u>, will contact Maryland State Police Officer J. J. CASSIDY, and ascertain from him pertinent information as to his investigation concerning the checks drawn by KEMP under the name of RICHARD R. HARNEL at the Farmers & Mechanics National Bank, Westminster, Maryland.

DETAILS:

HARRY MCDONALD, Deputy U. S. Marshal, Kansas City, Missouri, advised Special Agent H. L. SCOTT that WALTER BEAVERS, a convict at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, on mail fraud charges, indicated to him that he had some information regarding the RALPH ROE - THEODORE COLE escape. Mr. MCDONALD stated that apparently BEAVERS had urged some other convicts, who had returned to Leavenworth from Alcatraz, to discuss this matter. A lead is being set out to contact WALTER BEAVERS at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas.

Chief of Detectives RUEL WOMMACK, Springfield, Missouri, advised the Kansas City Office, by telephone, that one of his officers had obtained information to the effect that the wife of either COLE or ROE was living at a second-rate hotel at Springfield, but that there was no indication that she was in contact with either of the escapes. Chief of Detectives WOMMACK stated he was watching the activities of this woman and would advise the Kansas City Office if anything of interest develops.

Special Agent R. F. NEWKIRK conducted investigation at Springfield, Missouri, with regard to the above montioned information. Officer FRANK DEBAKER advised Agent NEWKIRK that he was assigned to a beat which includes the Grand Hotel, 220 North Campbell Street, Springfield, Missouri; that about the middle of May, 1938, he was sitting in a restaurant near the Grand Hotel and one of the witnesses had pointed out to him a blonde woman and had told him this woman was the wife of one COLE, an escape from Alcatraz; that this woman had recently come to Springfield from Alpina, Arkansas, and that COLE had been reported seen in Alpina a short time ago. He further advised that this blonde woman was going by the name of MARIE WINN, and is staying at the Grand Hotel, and is frequently seen in the company of Mrs. PHOEBE (YANCEY, who operates this hotel. DEBAKER stated this woman is accompanied by a boy about 12 years of age, and, as far as he knows, this woman does not work, but she is possibly practicing prostitution. DEBAKER stated he would endeavor to learn more concerning this woman, and would also keep close watch on the Grand Hotel for anyone resembling ROE or COLE.

Agent NEWKIRK subsequently contacted Officer DEBAKER for any further information. DEBAKER stated he had kept a close watch on the Grand Hotel, but had observed no one resembling either the photographs of ROE or COLE at this hotel. DEBAKER'S informant, the waitress in the restaurant, has recently gone to Alpina, Arkansas, and has promised DEBAKER she would endeaver to ascertain at that place some information as to ROE and COLE. DEBAKER stated that MARIE WINN, who was the wife of COLE, is still living at the Grand Hotel in Springfield, Missouri.

The teletype from the El Paso Office, dated January 21, 1938, advised of a mail tracing addressed to Mrs. JAMES ROE with return address

of L. MACMAHON, Room #207, Convention Hotel, 327 West 12th Street, Kansas City, Missouri. A letter from the El Paso Office, dated May 31, 1938, contained information regarding the tracing of a letter addressed to Mrs. JAMES ROE, Hobbs, New Mexico, containing the return address of RAMCMAHON, Convention Hotel, Room #207, Kansas City, Missouri. In previous investigation regarding these tracings, an informant was developed at the Convention Hotel by the name of Mrs. J. H. WNORTON, who is manager of this hotel. She advised that LILLIAN MACMAHON had been a close friend of WANDA STUCKEY, the paramour of JAMES ROE. No open contact was made with Miss MACMAHON at that time, as Mrs. NORTON did not think such advisable and agreed to communicate any information regarding this case to this office. However, it has been learned that Mrs. NORTON has recently died. The writer and Special Agent A. M. REILLY contacted Miss LILLIAN MACMAHON, Room #202, Convention Hotel. She advised that she had formerly resided in Room #207 of the Convention Hotel. She stated that she was well acquainted with one WANDA STUCKEY, who had previously lived at the Convention Hotel. Miss MACMAHON said that she had met JAMES ROE on one occasion and that was just after he was roleased from Leavenworth Penitentiary: that ROE had then come to Kansas City, Missouri, and romained for a couple of days, and had left, taking WANDA STUCKEY with him. Miss MACMAHON claims that sho has written WANDA STUCKEY only one time and that was shortly after WANDA had left Kansas City; that she had addressed the letter to Wink, Texas. She denied that she knew that WANDA STUCKEY and JAMES ROE were living in Hobbs, New Mexico, and claimed that she had never corresponded with them at that place. She stated that she has never met RALPH ROE, nor has she ever met THEODORE COLE. She said she read of the escape of these two men from Alcatraz and wondered at the time if RALPH ROE was any relation to JAMES ROE. She stated that WANDA STUCKEY had written her one time but had not mentioned anything in regard to the escape of these prisoners. She stated she had no information which might bo of assistance to this Bureau, but promised cooperation in case she learned of any information. She was advised that any information she gave, which resulted in the apprehension of these fugitives, would result in componsation to her. She was given the address and telephone number of the Kansas City Office. Miss MAÇMAHON further advised that she had recently learned from one TILLIE BURGARD, a manicurist at the barber shop of the Sexton Hotel, and who lives at the Drake Hotel, that WANDA STUCKEY was on her way to Kansas City, Missouri; that TILLIE BURGARD had told her she had recently received a card from WANDA, saying she would be in Kansas City approximately August 15, 1938.

It is noted in the letter from the El Paso Office to the Kansas City Office, dated February 8, 1938, that a letter was addressed to Mrs. JAMES ROE, Hobbs, New Mexico, with return address of the Sexton Hotel, Kansas City, Missouri. A letter, dated February 25, 1938, from the El Paso Office advised of a tracing of a letter addressed to Mrs. JAMES ROE, Hobbs, New Moxico, with the return address of The Drake, Room #118, Kansas City, Missouri.

The writer and Special Agent A. M. REILLY interviewed Miss IRENE "TILLIE" BURGARD, manicurist at the barber shop at the Sexton Hotel. She advised that she lived at the Drake Hotel; that she is a good friend of WANDA STUCKEY, and has written WANDA STUCKEY under the name of Mrs. JAMES ROE, Hobbs, New Mexico, on several occasions, giving her return address as both the Drake Hotel and the Sexton Hotel. Miss BURGARD stated that she knew JAMES ROE, brother of RALPH ROE, before JAMES ROE was sentenced to the Leavenworth Penitentiary. She said, however, that she had not seen JAMES ROE since he had been released from Leavenworth. She claims that she has nover met RALPH ROE or THEODORE COLE; that she, however, had learned from the nowspapers that these two persons had escaped from Alcatraz Penitentiary. She stated that in one letter which WANDA STUCKEY had written to her, WANDA had mentioned the fact that Agents of this Bureau had been contacting her and JAMES ROE; that they, however, did not know anything with regard to RALPH ROE and COLE and it was their opinion that those two fugitives had been drowned. Miss BURGARD said that she had recently received a card from WANDA STUCKEY, saying that she and JAMES ROE would be in Kansas City, Missouri, for a couple of days around August 15, 1938, and that they wanted to see her. Miss BURGARD advised that when WANDA STUCKEY and JAMES ROE appeared in Kansas City, she would immediately contact the writer. She further stated that if she obtained any information with regard to the fugitives in this case, she would be glad to cooperate by giving this information to the Burcau. She was advised that she would be compensated for any efforts made on her part, which resulted in the apprehension of ROE and COLE, if this information was turned over to this Bureau.

From a roview of instant file, it is noted that one FLINT C. BRANNON, a recent release from the Leavenworth Penitentiary, was used as an informant in this case. It is further noted that BRANNON stated that one DAN HARLESS, 2529 Gillham Road, Kansas City, Missouri, is alleged to be a close friend of JAMES and RALPH ROE. Investigation by this office resulted in loarning that HARLESS was reporting to the Probation Officer at Kansas City, Missouri. Agent contacted the Probation Officer at Kansas City, Missouri, and was advised that DAN HARLESS was transforred in June. 1938, to the supervision of JOSEPH Y. CHENEY, Post Office Box #1305, Tampa, Florida; that at the time HARLESS went to Florida, he gave his temporary address/as 459 Northwest Sixth Street, Miami, Florida, telephone #2-7932. At that/time, HARLESS stated he was playing in a band. A recent notation on the records of the Probation Officer in regard to this case states that HARLESS is permanently residing at Lakeland, Florida; that he has a cousin, ROY F. DODD, Route #2, Box #261, Lakeland, Florida. A lead is being set out for the Miami Office to interview HARLESS to ascertain any information he might have with regard to RALPH ROE.

A letter from the San Francisco Office to the Oklahoma City Office, with a copy designated for the Kansas City Office, dated April 29, 1938, sets out the correspondents of BOB PRINGLE, an immate of Alcatraz Penitentiary. It has been alleged that PRINGLE was a good friend of ROE

and COIE. Included in this list of correspondents is one CHARLES BRENDON BOOTH, listed as a friend, with address of 526 Ridge Street, Kansas City, Missouri. From investigation, the writer learned that BOOTH, while in Kansas City, was manager of the Volunteers of America, located in the Ridge Building, telephone - Victor 5829. It was learned, however, that BOOTH had moved to California about six months ago and his present address is given as 420 Cotton Exchange Building, Los Angeles, California. The Los Angeles Office is being requested to interview BOOTH to determine if he has any knowledge with reference to the fugitives in this case.

The report of Special Agent W. L. LISTERMAN, Kansas City, Missouri, dated 12-28-37, on page 12, gives a list of visitors to JAMES ROE, while he was incarcerated in the Joavenworth Penitentiary. This list reflects that JUNIUS YATES and JAMES RAYLOR, both agents of the Alcohol Tax Unit, visited JAMES ROE at Leavenworth, Kansas, on June 16 and 17, 1936. Agent contacted Mr. JUNIUS YATES, Alcohol Tax Unit Agent, Kansas City, Missouri. Mr. YATES advised that he had no recollection of JAMES ROE and did not recall visiting him at Leavenworth Penitentiary in June of 1936. He stated that it was possible that he and Mr. GAYLOR visited ROE in an attempt to get some information from him, but that evidently their efforts were without success, inasmuch as he did not recall such interview. He advised that Mr. GAYLOR is at the present time traveling in Oklahoma; that his headquarters, however, were in Kansas City, Missouri, and that, as soon as Mr. GAYLOR returns, he would have him get in touch with the writer to determine whether he could recall the visit to JAMES ROE at the Leavenworth Penitentiary in June of 1936.

The letter from the El Paso Office to the Kansas City Office, dated April 6, 1938, was with regard to two mail tracings addressed to Mrs. JAMES ROE, with the return address of A. SHELFO, 629 Harrison Street, Kansas City, Missouri. Agent contacted Mr. and Mrs. ANTHONY SHELFO, 629 Harrison Street, and Mrs. SHELFO stated that she was a good friend of WANDA STUCKEY, who is now living with JAMES ROE. She advised that WANDA STUCKEY had previously resided with her at 629 Harrison Street and had received mail at that address. She stated that she and WANDA corresponded with each other frequently, and that she received a letter recently from WANDA stating that she was on her way to Kansas City, Missouri, and would visit her upon her arrival. Mrs. SHELFO stated that she had often heard WANDA speak of JAMES ROE, but that she had never met him. She further denied ever having met RALPH ROE or THEODORE COLE, but did state that she had read of the escape from Alcatraz of ROE and COLE. She stated that WANDA STUCKEY had never mentioned anything in her letters regarding this escape and that she had no information regarding these persons. She stated that she would not, under any circumstances, attempt to got any information from her friend regarding ROE and COLE and that she did not want to get mixed up in this matter for any consideration. She was advised of the harboring statuto, and both she and Mr. SHELFO stated that, under no circumstances, would they harbor or assist these fugitives; that they had no reason to believe the fugitives

would ever contact them. Mrs. SHELFO promised that, when WANDA STUCKEY arrived in Kansas City, she would have her call the writer.

On August 20, 1938, WANDA STUCKEY telephoned the writer from the home of ANTHONY SHELFO and advised that she and JAMES ROE had just arrived in Kansas City, Missouri. She stated that she would have JAMES ROE come to the Kansas City Office, for purpose of interview.

JAMES ROE came to the Kansas City Office and stated that he was on his vacation for ten days; that he was going from Kansas City, Missouri, to Hays, Kansas, to visit his brother, RAYMOND ROE; that from there he intonded to drive on a sight-seeing trip through Colorado, and that he was then going to Odessa, Texas. He stated he was still working for the same company, The International Supply Company; however, he had been transferred by this company from Hobbs, New Mexico, to Odessa, Texas; that his address now would be The International Supply Company, Box #1478, Odessa, Texas. JAMES ROE stated that his employers do not know he is an ex-convict or that he is a brother of RALPH ROE. He requested that this office not notify his omployers and that, if contact is desired with him, that Agonts come to the office and ask for him, without rovealing their identity. ROE stated that he had no idea where his brother, RALPH ROE, is located; that he believes both RALPH ROE and THEODORE COLE drowned in their attempt to oscape from Alcatraz Prison; that he has no information or anything which might indicate that his brother is alive. JAMES ROE frankly stated that he did not know whether, if he ascertained any information, he would turn the same over to this Bureau, but he did state that he would do nothing to hinder the Bureau in its investigation. He was warned regarding the harboring statute and stated that, under no circumstances, would be harbor or assist RALPH ROE; that he had a good job at the present time and was making good and he intended to go straight; that he did not intend to do anything which would in any way jeopardize his job. He claimed that he and his brother, RAIPH ROE, had never been closely associated since they were kids.

A review of the file in the Kansas City Office was made for the purpose of determining any leads which should be covered in this territory. In this connection, reference is here made to the report of Special Agent M. E. GURNEA, San Francisco, California, dated 12-28-37, on page 12 of which there is set out a list of prisoners at Leavenworth, Kansas, who had been transferred from Alcatraz and who it was desired be interviewed. Several of these prisoners have been interviewed and leads will be set out for the remainder to be interviewed.

The report of Special Agent W. L. LISTERMAN, Kansas City, Missouri, dated 12-28-37, reflects an interview with Mrs. RUBY DAVIS LAMBERSON/ANKRUM, 214 East Seventh Street, Joplin, Missouri, who is a sister of VOLNEY, DAVIS. The file reflects that Mrs. ANKRUM'S name was discovered in some of the effects of the fugitives in this case after their escape. In this report, it is noted that Mrs. ANKRUM denied knowing COLE and ROE and stated that she had had no contact with them. She gave the

name and address of her parents as Mr. and Mrs. R. E. DAVIS, Route #2, Neosho, Missouri. It is believed desirable for the parents of VOLNEY DAVIS to be interviewed in connection with this case.

The report of Special Agent D. R. MORLEY, Little Rock, Arkansas, dated 1-4-38, reflects an interview with one Mrs. MARIE COLE, wife of THEODORE COLE, at Alpena Pass, Arkansas. This report reflects that MARIE COLE is alleged to have been a prostitute at various times at Springfield and Joplin, Missouri, and at Pittsburg, Kansas. The report also reflects that MARIE COLE has a sister, Mrs. JOHN (NORINE) SCHULTZ, who resides at 204 East Seventh Street, Pittsburg, Kansas. The report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, dated 12-17-37, gave as the former address of THEODORE COLE, Pittsburg, Kansas. However, subsequent investigation by this office revealed no one in that city who was acquainted with COLE or who know him to have resided in Pittsburg, Kansas. A lead is being set out for the sister-in-law of COLE to be interviewed at Pittsburg, Kansas.

The report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, Los Angeles, California, dated 1-8-38, reflects that a mail cover was placed on the home of Mrs. VIOLET DAWSON, 6238 differed Avenue, Bell, California, who is a half-sister of Subject COLE. As a result of this mail cover, a tracing was received addressed to Mr. and Mrs. G. L. DAWSON, on December 28, 1937, with return address of C. L. MULLER, Liberal, Kansas. Mr. LULLER will be interviewed for any information he might have portinent to this investigation.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE LOS ANGELES OFFICE at Los Angeles, California, will intorviow Mr. CHARLES BRENDON BOOTH, 420 Cotton Exchange Building. BOOTH is listed on the correspondence records of Alcatraz Penitentiary as being a friend of BOB PRINGLE. PRINGLE is alleged to have been a close friend of COLE and ROE at Alcatraz.

THE MIAMI OFFICE at Tampa, Florida, will contact Mr. JOSEPH Y. CHENEY, Post Office Box #1305, who is a Probation Officer and has supervision of DAN HARLESS. Will ascertain the address of DAN HARLESS and interview him, as it is alleged that HARLESS is a close friend of RALPH ROE.

THE EL PASO OFFICE will note the change of address of JAMES ROE from Hobbs, New Mexico, to Box #1478, Odessa, Texas.

* THE KANSAS CITY OFFICE at Leavenworth, Kansas, at the U. S. Penitentiary, will attempt to identify JACK O'BRIEN as a former convict in that institution, with a view to locating him for interview relative to his statement to MARYON DARLING that he has been in contact with Subjects since their escape from Alcatraz. It is not necessary to check on AUBREY UNCEL, inasmuch as it has been learned that UNCEL is presently at Alcatraz and has been interviewed by the San Francisco Office. (Report of Special Agent C. G. CAMPBELL, Seattle, Washington, dated 7-12-38.)

At Liberal, Kansas, will interview C. L. LULLER for any information he might have regarding this case, it being noted that he was corresponding with Mr. and Mrs. G. L. DAWSON of Bell, California, in December of 1937. Mrs. DAWSON is a half-sister of fugitive COLE.

At Hays, Kansas, will continue to maintain contact with RAYMOND ROE, brother of RALPH ROE. RAYMOND ROE may be reached by telephone at Hays, Kansas, #155.

At Neosho, Missouri, will interview Mr. and Mrs. R. E. DAVIS, Route #2, the parents of VOLNEY DAVIS. It will be noted that VOLNEY DAVIS is presently at Alcatraz and, after the escape of the fugitives in this case, there was found in some of their effects the name and address of VOLNEY DAVIS' sister, who is living at Joplin, Missouri.

At Kansas City, Missouri, will interview Mr. JAMES GAYLOR of the Alcohol Tax Unit with reference to his visits to see JAMES ROE at the Leavenworth Penitentiary on June 16 and 17, 1936. He should be interviewed to determine if he has any information which might be of value to the investigation looking towards the apprehension of JAMES ROE'S brother, RALPH ROE.

At Springfield, Missouri, will continue contact with Officer FRANK DEBAKER, Police Department, who is watching MARIE WINN, the wife of Subject COLE. MARIE WINN is living at the Grand Hotel, Springfield, Missouri, and is alleged to be practicing prostitution.

the highway in front of Thompson's home; that he first saw the car late Friday afternoon about 5:00 P.M. and thought someone had broken down and had gone to get help; that on the following Sunday he noted the car was still at the same place. He notified the Sheriff at Florence, Arizona, and Deputy Sheriff SAM WEST-WAN care out and examined the car and then had THOMPSON take the car to his home for safe keeping. The car remained at his place until the following Sunday when a highway Fatrolman came out from Mesa and not the car.

THOMPSON stated the car had a Wingfield supercharger head and two carbureters, one of which was a Wingfield; that the car had blown a cylinder gasket and all the oil was gone; that sometime later while THOMPSON was in the Ford Garage and Sales Room at Mosa, a man employed at that place was talking to Thompson about the car and stated that the parties driving this car had stopped at that garage one afternoon to get some work done, but did not want to wait.

Thompson further stated that the car had no license tags and had five wire wheels with big tires which were too big for the fender wells. In the car was found a sailor's suit and sailor's cap; two bathing suits; shirt or blouse of another sailor suit; bout half of a paper sack of black beans (estimated at about 2) pounds); five or six slices of bread; two pieces bacon rind about one inch wide and four or five inches long; one quart-can and one-pint can of black paint from Montgomery ward & Company, and an old greasy brown or tan shirt, the paint and shirt being at Thompson's home at the present time.

battery; that the officers seemed unable to find any numbers on the car, but stated they had ways to bring out the numbers. INCLIFON questioned all parties in the immediate vicinity of the place where the car was abandoned, but found no one who knew anything about the car, except EDDIE/DEMART who resides at the county line on highway 80; DEMART advised he saw the car about 5:00 P.M. Friday, but saw no one around it at that time; that early Saturday morning, he saw a young fellow get out of the car and walk down the road as though he was a hitch-hiker who had slept there over night. In his inquiries, THOMPSON heard through some one that that party (name not recalled had seen a gasoline can in the ditch a short distance from the place where the car was abandoned, but did not bother it as it was assumed the can belonged with the car.

Inquiry of MARRY MODER, Mational Auto Theft Euroau, Phoenix, Arizona, disclosed he had no information concerning recovery of may car fitting description of the car mentioned by TABAPDON.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent 6. V. DIERCT on August 24, 1938:

Agent contacted W. W. COCHRAN, Deputy Chariff at Florence, Arizona, who advised that he did not believe there was any connection between the abandonment of the car left on W. S. Highway 80, two miles west of Apache Junction, which was reported by GEONCE 5. THO PSON. He stated that previous dealings which the Sheriff's Office had with THOMPSON indicated that THOMPSON was a rather keen negro, but had the felling of wanting to get into the limelight, and that at the time this car was abandoned, investigation was made by the Cheriff's Office and no connection was indicated between the abandonment of the car and the instant case.

Deputy Sheriff COCHRAN stated that shortly after the car was abandoned, the highway Fatrol recovered the car, and he did not know to whom it belonged.

Re: ROE AND COLE

SAC Fletcher called from Oklahoma City regarding developments in the above entitled case. Mr. Fletcher advised that an informant, J. B. Atkinson, had contacted him shortly after his arrival in Oklahoma City, and had informed Mr. Fletcher that he, Atkinson, was a friend of Hazel /Underhill who he said is now living in Corpus Christi, Texas.

Mr. Fletcher stated that investigation has revealed that Atkinson had been living with a woman in Kaw City, Oklahoma; that, in order to get away from this woman, Atkinson requested the agents to take him to the Oklahoma City Office under pretext of holding him for investigation; that this request was, of course, denied; that Atkinson appeared at the Oklahoma City Office two or three days ago at which time he advised that he had been successful in leaving the woman at Kaw City, and was then on his way to Texas and Mexico. Mr. Fletcher advised that at the time of his last visit, Atkinson asked that he be advanced \$75 for the expenses of this trip, explaining to Mr. Fletcher that he planned to contact Hazel Underhill in Corpus Christi while he is there. Upon being advised by SAC Fletcher that authorization for the payment of this money would have to be secured from Washington, Atkinson indicated that he would not wait, and that he would use his own money. Mr. Fletcher did inform Atkinson, however, that the Bureau would be willing to pay a reasonable sum of money for information relative to the whereabouts of Roe and Cole.

RECORDED CONTRACTOR IN Mr. Fletcher stated that, during his conversation with Atkinson, the latter mentioned that he intends to take a gun into Mexico and inquired as to what would happen if he is arrested with it in his possession. I was advised that SAC Fletcher made it clear to Atkinson that the Bureau would not protect him in the event he breaks the law. Mr. Fletcherstated that he fears Atkinson will get himself into trouble sometime during this trip, and he wanted the Bureau to be familiar with the circumstances in the event he does so.

I pointed out to SAC Fletcher that the Bureau will furnish no money to Atkinson to embark upon any "fishing expeditions", but that if he gets any valuable information from this informant the Bureau will authorize him to pay for it. RECORDED & INDEXE

SAC Fletcher further advised that Jake Sims telephoned him yesterday reporting that an informant of his named Ray Hall, nicknamed "Tangle Eyes", had recently made a trip to Texas to contact Hazel Underhill, COPIES DESTREY Expears that Hall told Sims, who is the Chief of Police of Seminol

Oklahoma, that several months ago Hazel Underhill was supposed to have received an unsigned postal card postmarked at Englewood Station, Chicago, which stated that the writer would see her in a few days. Hall told Chief Sims that Hazel Underhill had indicated to him, Hall, that this message was in the handwriting of Roe, but he had never showed up.

Ray Hall has the idea that HerbXFarmer now in Dallas, Texas, has more information regarding Roe and Cole than any other person. Mr. Fletcher stated that Chief Sims is going to bring Hall to the residence of Agent Frank Smith for an interview with the latter; and that Chief Sims' presence is necessary because of the fact that Hall will talk to Smith only through Sims.

I stated that since Hall wants an agent to accompany him to Dallas to talk with Herb Farmer, and in the event the information furnished to Agent Smith proves of value, SAC Fletcher is authorized to instruct Agent Smith to proceed to Dallas, notifying SAC Conroy when he enters the Dallas Division, but not disclosing the purpose of the trip.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS: LEE G. CLINTON, former prison guard at Alcatraz, has no definite information on this case. JACK SIEMAN, Alcatraz 177-AZ, supposed to be in Vancouver, B.C.; attempt to locate him there being made. Seattle file reviewed for all outstanding leads in Seattle Division. Certain Washington cars passing through Oregon-California lines December 15 and 16, 1937 not yet checked. Copies of all reports should be furnished San Francisco Office.

Report of Special Agent M. E. GURNEA, San Francisco, dated 12/28/37. Portland letter to Seattle dated 12/23/37. Bureau telegram dated 12/23/37.

On July 19, 1938, the following memorandum was submitted by Special Agent (A) A. J. ZIMMERMAN:

"On or about the tenth of June 1938, writer visited the Federal Prison Camp, Fort Lewis, Washington, and while there on other official matters became acquainted with one IEE GYCLINTON, who stated that he had formerly been a guard at Alcatraz Prison, but that he had been transferred to the above mentioned camp subsequent to the escape of the above named prisoners.

"CLINTON made inquiry as to the whereabouts of certain of the agents with whom he had worked just prior to the escape and discussed the matter briefly. At one time, he mentioned that there was undoubtedly a leak at the prison, as it was thought that it was fool proof. However, when agent pressed him for detailed information concerning his conclusion, he stated that it was merely his belief, and that he did not have any definite proof of same. However, there is attached a

letter which was addressed to the Seattle Field Office and which is submitted to you for any action that you deem necessary."

The letter referred to states that MR. CLINTON has some information that may be of value to this Bureau. Pursuant thereto, agent contacted MR. CLINTON at Tillicum, Washington and it was learned from him that the information which he had did not pertain to this case but to another case under investigation by the Seattle Office.

At Seattle, Washington.

Inspector J. H. ZUMMALT of the immigration Division at Seattle informed agent that their files reflect that JACK SIEMAN was last supposed to be in Vancouver, B. C.; that in August, 1937, they had a letter from Detective PLUMMER of the Vancouver, B.C. Police Department asking for information of associates of SIEMAN, as they believed that SIEMAN and his associates were involved in robbing book makers in British Columbia. A letter is being written to the Police Department in British Columbia in order to ascertain if SIEMAN is there, and if so, he will be interviewed as a released prisoner from Alcatraz to see if he may have any knowledge pertaining to the plans that were formulated on the island relative to instant break.

A review of the Seattle file reflects that the owners of the following Washington license numbered cars which passed over the Oregon-California line on December 15 or 16, 1937, have not been located and interviewed. This list was obtained by checking over the list of cars which had been enclosed with the referenced Portland letter of December 23, 1937. On this list, other agents had marked certain license numbers as having been checked. Agent assumed that these were correct, and only checked to see that those numbers which were not marked checked on this list had not been investigated.

Information as to the names of these automobile owners and in some instances the type and make of car, was obtained from the Washington automobile license directory published by the Motor List Company, Inc. of Washington.

The review of the file reflects that inquiry for C. A. GARRISON at Rochester, Washington, as shown in the report of Special Agent DUANE L. TRAYNOR dated at Seattle, washington, August 17, 1938, was not made but that inquiry was made only for a C. W. GARRISON as reflected in the report of Special Agent LEO J. WALCOM, Seattle, Washington, dated February 12, 1938, being serial 39 of the Seattle file. A lead is therefore being set out for Rochester, Washington, to see if C. A. GARRISON can be located there.

This owner should be interviewed relative to the occupants of that car when it crossed the Oregon-California line either December 15 or 16, 1937, and they should be interrogated as to their possession of any tidal and current charts of San Francisco Bay and the Pacific Ocean, which they may have purchased in Oregon and taken through the California-Oregon line.

At Yakima, will interview the following people relative to any information they may have of the tidal and current charts of Sen Francisco Bay and the Pacific Ocean which were purchased in Portland and which may have been taken through the California-Oregon line December 15 or 16, 1937, as these individuals all had cars registered in their names which were supposed to have gone through the California-Oregon line December 15 or 16, 1937. Information should be developed from each of these individuals as to their general reputation and standing in their community and a description obtained.

On September 4, 1938, J. B. ATKINSON called the Oklahoma City Division and requested that an Agent contact him on the morning of September 6, 1938, at Kaw, Oklahoma under the pretext of questioning him concerning some alleged violation.

On September 6, 1938, Agent HOOD attempted to locate ATKINSON without success. However, it was determined that ATKINSON had been acting as foreman on the ranch of GUSSIE THOMPSON, a widow, for about nine years and, according to rumors, they have been living together. ATKINSON had previously asked that he not be questioned concerning ROE and COLE in the presence of MRS. THOMPSON or any other person, and it was thought that it was for this reason he requested that he be contacted under the pretext of being investigated.

Agent HOOD finally located ATKINSON and MRS. THOMPSON together and, according to his request, they were advised that Agent desired to question ATKINSON concerning a violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act. Agent and ATKINSON drove to a side road near KAW where ATKINSON stated that he planned to leave for Corpus Christi, Texas immediately in order to contact HAZEL UNDERHILL as he had a definite appointment to meet her Monday, September 12, 1938. He also stated that he planned to go into Old Mexico near Monterrey in an effort to determine if ROE and COLE were in that vicinity, stating that he had received information that ROE and COLE had crossed the border near Monterrey. He also said that he had numerous contacts in the Rio Grande Valley near McAllen, Texas and Monterrey, Mexico and could definitely determine if they had been in that vicinity. He had also heard that Roe had contacted JEAN DAVIS, wife of ED DAVIS, presently an inmate at Alcatraz. He refused to divulge the source of his information but considered it reliable. He did not think that Subjects had been in contact with HAZEL UNDERHILL and was sure that she would give him any information she possessed, stating he thought he was her best friend. ATKINSON did not possess any further information than that furnished Agent FRANK SMITH.

ATKINSON asked that the Bureau furnish him with \$75.00 to make this trip and when advised that it would require Bureau authority he stated that he would make the trip on his own money as he had to get to Corpus Christi immediately to keep his appointment with HAZEL UNDERHILL.

ATKINSON then stated that it would be necessary for Agent to act as if he, ATKINSON, had been arrested in order that he could get away from MRS. THOMPSON without arousing her suspicions during the two or three weeks he might be in Texas. Agent advised him that the Bureau would not be a party to such procedure after talking with Special Agent in Charge FLETCHER. ATKINSON said that he was sure that MRS. THOMPSON would not try to locate him and he could not think of any way in which he might be able to get away from MRS. THOMPSON. When Agent again refused to do as he desired, he stated that he would walk off or tell her that he wanted to get away on account of the alleged violation, as he planned to dissolve partnership agreements with MRS. THOMPSON. He stated that he would advise Agent if and when he left.

From the conversation with ATKINSCN, it appeared as if he was merely wanting to get away from MRS. THOMPSON for a personal escapade and wished the Bureau to furnish him with money as well as a way of getting away from MRS. THOMPSON without arousing her suspicions as to the real reason for his departure. It will be noted that information received from JGEXGHORMLEY indicates that ATKINSON formerly lived along the border where he was engaged in smuggling activities and it is possible that he contemplates some criminal activity while he is gone.

On September 8, 1938, ATKINSON called at this office where he was interviewed by HOOD and SMITH, at which time he stated that he merely walked off from MRS. THOMPSON without revealing his reasons. He stated that he would leave Oklahoma City by train on the afternoon of the 8th or 9th of September and would proceed to Corpus Christi where he expected contacting HAZEL UNDERHILL for information. He was requested to maintain contact with the San Antonio office but said that he did not desire to do this as he would rather keep Agents HOOD and SMITH advised of developments by letter. He then mentioned that he expected to go to McAllen, Texas and Monterrey, Mexico, stating that he expected to take a gun across the border and requested information if the Bureau would assist him if he should get into trouble. He was advised by both Agents SMITH and HOOD that the Bureau would not assist him if he engaged in any criminal

activity, however minor, and that if he did get into any trouble that he need not call upon the Bureau or any Agent for assistance. He then stated that he understood this and that he would not do anything of a criminal nature. It was also explained to him that he could not hope for any reimbursement from the Bureau unless he furnished the information that would lead to the apprehension of Subjects.

On September 8, 1938, JAKENSIMS, Chief of Police, Seminole, Oklahoma, called at the Oklahoma City Office, where he reported to Special Agents SMITH and HOOD concerning the activities of RAY "TANGLE-EYES" HALL, an informant who recently made a trip to Texas to contact HAZEL UNDERHILL. HALL is an informant of SIMS. SIMS stated that HALL told him that several months ago HAZEL UNDERHILL received an unsigned postcard, postmarked Englewood Station, Chicago, which stated that the writer would see her within a few days. HAZEL told HALL that this card was in the handwriting of ROE. However, she told HALL that no one had shown up and she had never heard from ROE. It is HALL's idea that HERB XFARMER can furnish more information than any other person and that FARMER is presently in Dallas, Texas. SIMS thinks that HALL will contact FARMER and can get some information. SIMS will bring HALL to FRANK SMITH's home on Sunday, September 11, 1938, for interview. SIMS desires to go with HALL and an Agent, preferably AGENT SMITH, to Dallas to see FARMER. He stated that HALL would not report to any person other than SMITH or HOOD and then through SIMS.

According to SIMS, FARMER told HALL that BATES and KELLY arranged the escape and then made arrangements for ROE and COLE to cool off with their friends in Chicago until they could aid BATES and KELLY in their escape in the same manner.

It is reported for the attention of the Investigative Unit that although two examiners reached a conclusion of non-identity, the third examiner reported that he was unable to reach any conclusion following a comparison of the specimen listed below and received in the laboratory on August 12, 1938 from the Butte Field Division:

76-2686-444 Q24. Hotel registration sheet of hotel in Victor, Idaho, bearing the signature "Delhs 10erms, Roseau, Minnesota", under date of December 22, 1937.

Mr. Miller, the #1 examiner, and Mr. Major, associate examiner, report that the handwriting on specimen Q24 is not identical with the known writing of Subject Ralph Roe, whose writing has previously been listed as specimen Kl.

Mr. Conrad, additional associate examiner, reports that he is unable to reach a conclusion following this comparison because of the Limited amount of writing present.

In accordance with existing instructions no report on this examination has been furnished directly to the field and the information is being referred to the Investigative Unit for its action and in order that it may submit such information to the field as may be considered desirable.

Miss EVELYN HOADOCK, Post OfficeClerk, advised that she has no record of any DWIGHT OTIS PUGH residing in Westville, Illinois. She advised that JOHN WATSON resided on Rural Houte #1, Westville, Illinois.

Upon inquiring at the home of JOHN WATSON, it was learned that he was out of town; however, it was learned that Mrs. IDA ALLEN, the mother of PUGH, was residing there temporarily. Mrs. ALLEN stated that her son, DWIGHT, was staying with her at the WATSON home from about June 1 to September 1, 1938, leaving on the latter date for parts unknown. She stated that her son is a wanderer and she does not know where he went, nor when he will return. She stated that there is not much likelihood of his writing to her or any of the relatives, as that has never been his custom. She stated that he goes off on unexplained trips alone for as many as five years at a time, and then shows up unexpectedly.

After a lapse of a week's time, Agent again interviewed Mrs. ALLEN, this time at 914 North Collett Street, Danville, Illinois. She stated that she was staying there with a nephew, JOHN G. STEWART, but that she expected to leave that place in a short time to join her son, ORVILLE PUGH, when the latter finds employment in Chicago, Illinois. At the time of instant interview, she stated that she does not know where ORVILLE is living in Chicago, Illinois, as he had moved from his former residence and has not notified her where he may be reached.

She stated that when she returns to Chicago, she will write to JOHN WATSON, Westville, Illinois, and to JOHN G. STEWART, Danville, Illinois, advising them of her Chicago address.

Mrs. ALLEN could not suggest the name of any relative or friend with whom DWIGHT OTIS PUGH might correspond, but suggested that he will probably show up in a Veterans' Hospital somewhere in the United States before long.

It is being left to the discretion of the office of origin to consider placing a "stop notice" in the appropriate office of the Veterans' Administration so that it will be known if PUGH is confined at any Veterans' institution, in order that he may be interviewed there.

It is noted that on August 25, 1938, WILLIAM RYAN, United States Marshal, Danville, Illinois, advised reporting Agent that he learned from ROBERT MEADE, Deputy Sheriff of Vermilion County, that there were two or three strange men staying with a man named HALLIE COLE, in the country near Oakwood, Illinois, suggesting that, possibly, one of them may be THEODORE COLE, fugitive. Marshal RYAN had no cause to believe that COLE or ROE might be staying with HALLIE COLE, other than the identity of the surname "COLE".

Agent interviewed Deputy Sheriff ROBERT MEADE, who advised that he had learned from RICHARD SEYMOUR, Oakview, Illinois, that two strangers using the name of COLE were staying at the home of HALLIE COLE. MEADE had no further information, being unable to furnish descriptions or any other pertinent data.

AT OAKWOOD, ILLINOIS

Agent, accompanied by Constable IRA PETERS, of Oakwood, Illinois, interviewed RICHARD SEYMOUR and exhibited to him photographs of COIE and ROE. However, he could not identify them. He stated that the "strangers" about whom he had remarked casually are a couple of young men who look like HALLIE COLE; further, that he had paid them no

attention, and could not furnish any description of them, other than that they were young. He stated that, as far as he knows, the young men might be HALLIE COLE's sons.

Agent interviewed HALLIE COLE, Rural Route #1, who advised that he had no strangers associating with him. Agent exhibited to COLE photographs of COLE and ROE, and he stated that he has never seen anyone looking like either of the fugitives. He stated that he has two grown sons, aged 24 and 25, who might be referred to by SEYMOUR.

Constable PETERS verified the fact that COLE has two grown sons, and stated that HALLIE COLE is a person of excellent reputation, not the kind who would harbor criminals.

Review of the file in instant case reflects that neither COLE nor ROE has any relatives known to live in or near Cakwood, Illinois.

It appears that there is no basis for any suspicion that COLE and ROE are in or near Cakwood, Illinois; consequently, no further investigation was made.

Agent R. T. Hood called me from Oklahoma City with reference to the letter from the Oklahoma City Office sent to the Bureau under date of September 18 which was in connection with the contact had with Chief of Police Jake Sims, of Seminole, Oklahoma, in regard to "Tangle Eyes" Hall. I was advised that Hall was again located late yesterday at Seminole where Hall advised as follows:

Ky.

Hall stated that he is a very good friend of Ralph Roe, being a former cell-mate of his, and would not, under any circumstances, put the finger on Roe. However, Hall did to endeavor to determine definitely whether or not Roe and Cole made their escape from Alcatraz. Hall was of the opinion that these men are alive in this country; that he has no direct information; but that he talked to one Mickey Carrie who was advised by Herb Farmer, that it was the latter's opinion that the escape was planned by Bailey and Bates and that Bates and Kelly arranged for these men a place of refuge where they could cool off.

Hall indicated that he believes the escape was successful, but stated that the one person who can furnish us with information as to whether they did in fact escape is Hazel Underhill. I pointed out that we have received similar information from other sources. Mr. Hood stated that Hall alleges he is a very good friend of Hazel Underhill and has helped her on/number of occasions in the past; and that Hall is agreeable to contacting Hazel Underhill for the purpose of obtaining definite information that they did make good their escape.

I was advised that the last definite information relative to the whereabouts of Hazel Underhill indicated that she was at Levelland, Texas; but that D. B. Atkinson, an individual who has been endeavoring to get on the informant payroll, came into the office with some very indefinite information which indicated that he had contacted Hazel Underhill at Corpus Christi, Texas? Mr. Hood was instructed to find out exactly where this woman is before permitting Hall to leave Seminole in an effort to contact her.

I was further advised that Informant Hall is a known outlaw, having had contacts with Roe and others, and that Hall refuses to work except through Chief Sims. I told Agent Hood that Chief Sims should not be permitted to accompany Hall and Agent Smith when they proceed to interview Hazel Underhill, due to the fact that the Bureau would be embarrassed in the event a major crime occurs in Seminole and the chief, not being there, explains that he was out of town doing some work for us. I suggested that, in view of Hall's attitude, Hall report directly to Chief Sims while down there or wait until he returns where he will be interviewed by an agent in Sims presence. Mr. Hood said he would see that this is done as directed and will keep the Bureau advised.

Reference is made to my letter dated September 9, 1938, regarding the activities of J. B. ATKINSON, who stated he was proceeding to Corpus Christi, Texas in an effort to contact HAZEL KUNDERHILL for information concerning instant case.

On September 17, 1938, J. B. ATKINSON called at this office where he was interviewed by Special Agent RALPH T. HOOD. At that time ATKINSON stated that he had contacted HAZEL UNDERHILL but had been unable to obtain any definite information concerning Subjects, stating he did not have any opportunity to talk at length with her and was afraid to ask her any direct questions regarding instant case. However, he stated that during conversations had with HAZEL UNDERHILL she informed him that she and JEAN MAVIS, wife of ED DAVIS, presently an inmate at San Quentin, had been in contact with ROE and COLE but she did not furnish him any information as to where such contact was had. HAZEL UNDERHILL also advised ATKINSON that ROE had obtained and sold the bonds alleged to have been in the possession of his brother, RAYMOND ROE, in Kansas, but that ROE did not furnish her with any of the proceeds from this sale. She also advised ATKINSON that ROE and COLE had been jumped by the law in the East but she did not elucidate on this.

ATKINSON stated that in his opinion ROE and COLE made their escape from Alcatraz and are presently hiding somewhere in the East but he had no idea as to where they might be located.

ATKINSON further advised Agent HOOD that he did not proceed to Old Mexico in order to verify his information that ROE and COLE had crossed the border as the person he hoped to contact, but whose name he would not furnish, was not in that vicinity at this time.

ATKINSON was very reticent concerning his contact with HAZEL UNDERHILL and he did not appear to desire to furnish eny information concerning the same. He stated he was proceeding to Kaw, Oklahoma, but that he thought that if he had sufficient time to contact and hang around HAZEL UNDERHILL he would be able to obtain definite information from her regarding the present whereabouts of Subject.

He was questioned as to the manner in which he would do this, whereupon he stated that he could only hope to obtain information by being around HAZEL UNDERHILL with the expectation that she would talk freely. He stated he would never specifically ask her anything regarding ROE and COEE. He also stated that before he could do this it would be necessary for the Government to pay his expenses to Texas, as well as pay his expenses during the time he was in contact with her. However, he said that he would attempt to obtain a job, and if his job did not interfere with his associations w ith HAZEL UNDERHILL he would not expect further remuneration from this Bureau. He was very doubtful as to the amount of money required to meet his expenses in such a matter but finally stated he thought \$35,000 a week would be right.

During this interview, as in other interviews with ATKINSON, he did not appear to be wholly reliable. It is doubtful if the information furnished by him is true though it will be noted that he is alleged to be a very close confident of HAZEL UNDERHILL. As noted in previous correspondence regarding ATKINSON, information has been obtained that he formerly engaged in smuggling activities on the Mexican border and from his conversation, as reported in reference letter, it appears that he would like to return to the Mexican border for personal reasons.

No further contact will be had with ATKINSON regarding his plan to associate with HAZEL UNDERHILL while being paid by the Bureau until advised by you.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Two unknown individuals stopped at Delta, Colo., about 8-15-38 under suspicious circumstances, thought by Mrs. T. JYREARDON to be THEODORE COLE and RALPH ROE, butupon being shown photographs of COLE and ROE, Mrs. REARDON stated they were not the same individuals.

DETAILS:

On August 2, 1938, the United States Marshal at Denver, Colorado, requested the Denver Office to send photographs of THEODORE COLE and RALPH ROE to Sheriff RAY R. LOCKHART, and on the same date copies of the Identification Orders issued by the Bureau on these two fugitives were mailed to the Sheriff.

AT DELTA, COLORADO:

In the absence of Sheriff LOCKHART, who was in Denver on September 7, 1938, Undersheriff E. A. PITTSER was interviewed in regard to this matter and advised that about August 15, 1938, a man came to the home of Mrs. T. J. REARDON on Dodge Street near the corner of Fifth Avenue and asked to rent & room. The next night another man joined them and the only thing they told Mrs. REARDON was that one of them was from Los Angeles, California, and that the other was from San Francisco, California. Because of this fact, Mrs. REARDON became suspicious and telephoned the Sheriff's Office at 3:00 o'clock one Sunday morning, but when officers arrived at her house, the men had disappeared and were never again seen. Mrs. REARDON explained that they had brought no baggage and had cashed some checks which later proved to be good checks and had also paid their rent in full.

Undersheriff PITTSER put out pickups on the men with all surrounding sheriffs, with negative results. He advised that upon receipt of the pictures of COLE and ROE, they were exhibited to Mrs. REARDON, who failed to identify them. He explained that she thought the men at her house might be the two fugitives from Alcatraz Prison as both were from California.

In addition, Mrs. REARDON was shown all photographs at the Sheriff's Office, including recent identification orders and wanted circulars of the Bureau, but could not identify the two men.

One of the men was supposed to have worked at the local canning factory, but LLOYD WILHELM, an official, could not identify him.

These men did not give any names to Mrs. REARDON, and their names are unknown to Undersheriff PITTSER. HE also advised that Mrs. REARDON was not capable of furnishing any descriptions of the men.

In conclusion, Undersheriff PITTSER stated they had definitely been eliminated as being identical with THEODORE COIE or RALPH ROE.



Reference is made to the report of Special Agent E. F. EMRICH, dated at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma September 24, 1938 in the above-entitled case.

Your attention is invited to the information contained in this report to the effect that one JACK "FATS" MILES, an ex-convict from Leavenworth Penitentiary, is presently engaged in smuggling in narcotics from old Mexico into the United States.

Through a Mr. GEORGE H. SMITH, formerly undersheriff at Fort Smith, Arkansas and presently engaged in certain undercover investigations at Tulsa, Oklahoma, it was learned that MILES had visited Tulsa, Oklahoma for the purpose of consummating a transaction with ORVILLE THOMAS, a known bootlegger in that city, and one CLARENCE SMITH who operates a tourist camp just west of Sand Springs, Oklahoma, whereby a large number of cans of morphine would be smuggled in from old Mexico and delivered to SMITH at his camp. It might be mentioned that SMITH is believed to handle approximately fifteen cans of morphine each week, and MTLES was making an arrangement with him whereby he would deliver to him a large order of that narcotic in the near future. It was further learned through GEORGE H. SMITH that MILES allegedly is able to purchase these cans of morphine from old Mexico for approximately \$16.00 per can and that he receives delivery at a point about ten miles north of Roswell, New Mexico, this being the place that MILES uses as his headquarters for these activities.

As Mr. SMITH mentioned to this Agent that he has not very much confidence in Narcotic Agent HAROLD WHITELY at Tulsa, Oklahoma or ROY BRIDGESS at Oklahoma City, he will not turn this information over to them or assist them in developing same, and he requested that he would prefer that this Division not take any action in referring the information to either of these Marcotic Agents. He stated, however, he would have absolutely no objection if this Bureau would turn over the substance of the information to Mr. ANSLINGER of the Narcotic Bureau in

The exact date could not be remembered by MRS. THOMASON, however, she thought it was on or about August 5, 1938. Having purchased a True Detective Magazine only a few days previous, she noticed the "Line Up" section which shows COLE'S picture and gives his description. She stated that she saw a person who fit the description given, and paid particular attention to the scars and facial characteristics. This person was seen loafing around the streets in Odessa and a few days later, when Mrs. THOMASON desired to make a closer observation of this person, she could not locate him.

On or about August 11, 1938, Mrs. THOMASON was in Midland, Texas, on business and while passing the Scharbauer Hotel in Midland, she saw this same person watching the construction work being done on the new First National Bank Building, which is adjoining the Scharbauer Hotel. At this time she endeavored to get close to him in order to see the scars more plainly and as she did so, this person noticed her close observation and left the scene very hurriedly. This was the last time the person resembling COLE was seen by MRS. THOMASON. She stated that this person was dressed in a light colored shirt, dark treusers, light colored dress hat, and brown shoes and socks. He was also weareing a white gauze bandage over his right eye which in the opinion of Mrs. THOMASON looked like he had an infection and was having it treated by a physician.

Mrs. THOMASON was interviewed again on 8-29-38 at which time she stated that she had not seen or heard enymore about the person resembling COLE. She was requested to notify the Sheriff's Office immediately if this person is seen again in Odessa and she stated that she would do this. The Sheriff's Office was notified concerning what MRS. THOMASON said and Sheriff REEDER WEED stated that, in the event he receives any information concerning this person, he would investigate the matter promptly, and notify the El Paso Office.

JAMES ROE, presently employed by the International Supply Company, stated, that on 8-21-38 he was in Hayes, Kansas, and visited his brother RAY, at which time the subject of RALPH'S escape was discussed. JAMES ROE stated that neither he nor RAY have had any information concerning RALPH since the report came out that he escaped. He did not know whether the escape was successful or not stating that he doubted very much that RALPH would get in touch with any of his relatives in the event he was successful in escaping because there was nothing that they could do from him except possibly send him some money and JAMES did not think RALPH would get money that way if he needed any.

When asked whether he would co-operate with the Bureau in the event any information was received regarding RALPH, JAMES stated that he did not wish to say one way or the other because he did not know how he would feel in the event he did hear from his brother, and that he doubted very much that he would say enything about it.

JAMES ROE, requested in the eyent further interviews are held with him, that the Agent will contact him while he is alone. This for the reason that he is trying to go "straight" and any mention of his past record to any of his fellow employees will result in his losing his present position which is bookkeeper for the above concern. This request was also made by JOHNERRICE, clerk at the Wink, Texas, office of the International Supply Company, who get him the present job.

AT MIDLAND, TEXAS

Agent interviewed the following doctors with negative results:

DR. WILLIAM M. SMITH, Thomas Bldg.,
DR. JOHN B. THOMAS, Thomas Bldg.,
DR. JAMES M. DEVERRUX, Thomas Bldg.,
DR. JAMES H. CHAPPLE, Petroleum Bldg.,
DR. L. WAIDO LEGGETT, Petroleum Bldg.,
DR. ANDREW J. COOPER, First National Bank Bldg.

In the absence of DR. MORGAN. Agent interviewed Miss ELIZABETH WOLCOTT, nurse, who stated that she had never seen anyone resembling COLE in the Doctor's office. DR. W. E. RYAN was also out of town and Miss ETHEL LONG, nurse, stated that no one resembling COLE had been treated by DR. RYAN for any illness whatseever.

DR. TOM C. BOBO, Petroleum Bldg., stated that he remembered seeing a person wearing a white gauze bandage over his right eye, and to the best of his recollection this party was watching the work being done around the new First National Bank Building on or about 8-25-28. He stated however, that he would not care to say that the person he saw resembled COLE in any way. DR. BOBO referred Agent to DR. W. G. WHITEHOUSE who stated that the only injury he had treated on anyone who resembled somewhat subject COLE was a young man by the name of H. L. LINER who hurt his back while working on the construction of the new National Bank Building. This case was handled by him on 6-14-38. DR. WHITEHOUSE further stated that in his opinion nothing was wrong with LINER, who later went to DR. ANDREW J. COOPER for treatment. It is to be noted that DR. COOPER stated that no one resembling COLE had been treated by him in the past six months, which was as far back as he could remember.

Inquiry made at the R. F. BALL CONSTRUCTION CO., temporary office located beside the new First National Bank Building, resulted in W. H. BOUTHWELL, foremen, searching his records concerning HOWAND LEGGLINER. SOUTHWELL remembered LINER and stated that C. J. J. LACKSON, waterboy, was well acquainted with LINER and could give

LINER'S present location. JACKSON was sent by SOUTHWELL to locate LINER and Agent observed and questioned LINER who can be definitely eliminated as he does not resemble COLE, having no scars whatsoever on his face or leg, and having brown eyes whereas COLE has blue eyes and a noticeable scar beside the right eye.

JOHN L. CREIG, timekeeper, and TED SLOAN, assistant timekeeper for the R. F. Ball Construction Company were requested to be on the lookout for anyone resembling COLE, particularly if that party was wearing a bandage over his right eye, and they stated that they would notify Sheriff A. C. FRANCIS at once if seen. Sheriff FRANCIS stated that he would investigate any calls he received regarding the sight of any person resembling COLE and that he would notify the El Paso Office immediately.

IRA FRATT, Senior Interviewer, and GORDON MONDAY, clerk, Texas State Employment Service stated that they had not seen anyone resembling COLE come into their office applying for a job, FRATT stated that it is the custom for all companies to eventually have their employees registered at the above office and in the event anyone resembling COLE appears there, the Sheriff will be notified at once,

It is to be noted that a photograph of COLE was shown to all persons interviewed and none stated definitely that they had seen anyone who strongly resembled COLE.

AT WINK, TEXAS

JOHN PRICE, clerk, International Supply Company stated that he had not heard JAMES ROE say anything about his brother RALPH. PRICE has never heard whether the escape was successful or not. He doubted in his own mind very much that it was successful. He stated that JAMES ROE was recommended by him for the position of bookkeeper with his company, and due to trouble having been caused by fellow employees who knew about JAMES past record, JAMES had been transferred from Hobbs, N.M. to Odessa, Texas.

This phase of the investigation is based upon a telegram received by this office from Chief of Police JOHN WOOTTEN, Les Vegas, N.M. on 9-12-38, advising he had a good lead on escapes from Alcatraz. Telephonic inquiry was made at the Las Vegas Pelice Department by Special Agent in Charge R. J. UNTREINER, in the absence of Chief WOOTTEN, no information was available as to the nature of the information that WOOTTEN possessed.

AT LAS VEGAS, NEW MEXICO

Agent interviewed Chief of Police JOHN WOOTTEN who advised that he had recently received information from RAYMOND WILLARD, operator of the Casino Saloon in Las Vegas that a dressmaker named SADIE DYE had "popped off", while at the Casino; that she was passing letters between letters

between MRS. CECIL NOEL of Cherryvale, New Mexico and RAIPH ROE.

Note should be made of the fact that MRS. NOEL was recently interviewed by the writer at Cherryvale, New Mexico, at which time she indicated that she had not corresponded with RAEPH ROE since his incarceration at Alcatraz and had no information that he was successful in his attempted escape from that penitentiary. WOOTTEN further advised that a man who formerly operated the Versity confectionery in Las Vegas was supposed to have been the intermediary for correspondence, between RAIPH ROE and MRS. NOEL, prior to MRS. DYE being used.

Agent and Police Chief WOOTTEN interviewed RAYMOND WILLARD, Casino Salogn, who advised that "TOMMIE" THOMPSON formerly was employed by a MK. MOSS, who operated the Versity Confectionery at Las Vegas, N.M. until three or four months ago. THOMPSON is quite a heavy drinker and on more that one occasion, when intoxicated, he had informed MRS. VELMA McCLEOD, wife of the operator of The Chief Filling Station, that MRS. CECIL NOEL had been receiving mail at the Post Office box of MR. MOSS of the Varsity Confectionery, but had later become suspicious of MRS. MOSS and had then begun receiving mail through MRS. SADIE DYE, a dressmaker. Mrs. McCLEODstated that "TOMMIE" indicated that MRS. NOEL possibly was in communication with RALPH ROE or THEODORE COLE, it bear ing known at Las Vegas that she was the former wife of one of these convicts. MRS. McCLEOD stated that she understood from "TOMMIE" that MRS. NOEL gained MRS. DYE'S good will by having nine or ten dresses made by MRS. DYE. Photographs of COLE and ROE were exhibited to MRS. McCLEOD, but she was unable to identify either photograph as being the Mkeness of any person she had ever seen. Chief WOOTTEN stated that he was Indentification Orders on both COLE and ROE but he had not seen anyone answering their descriptions in Las Vegas.

CARL DEUTSORMAN, Optic Publishing Co., who handles the rental of 521 Douglas St., where Mrs. DYE resides, advised that Mrs. DYE had been residing at that address for several months. Mr. DEUTSCHMAN stated that he was of the opinion that Mrs. DYE was entirely responsible and trustworthy.

Mrs. SADIE DYE. 2nd. Floor, 521 Douglas St., was interviewed by Agent and Chief of Police WOOTTEN. She stated that she formerly lived in Oklahoma City. Okla., and came to Las Vegas early this year on a visit and later decided to settle in this city. She was shown photographs of COLE and ROE and she stated that she had never seen either of these men. She stated that she was only casually acquainted with Mrs. CECIL NOEL and had never received any correspondence for this woman. She stated that she was farly well acquainted with Mr. and Mrs. MOSS, when they operated the Varsity Confectionery, which was located immediately across the street from Mrs. DYE'S residence. She was at the Varsity Confectionery one day and was introduced to MRS. NOEL, who stated that she then had some dress material in her car. Mrs. NOEL

came to Mrs. DYE'S place and had a fitting and Mrs. NOEL stated that she had nine or ten other dresses she intended Mrs. DYE to make. Mrs. DYE stated that MRS. NOEL came back during the week for enother fitting and obtained the finished dress later the same week. These were the only occasion that Mrs. DYE saw Mrs. NOEL, who did not return to have the other dresses made. Mrs. DYE stated that she knew nothing of Mrs. NOEL'S personal history and again emphasized that she was never received any mail for MRS. NOEL and had never been approached by MRS. NOEL to do so. Mrs. DYE stated that "TOMMIE" THOMPSON, who formerly worked for MRS. MOSS was now operating a pool hall at Gate City, New Mexico. She believed that "TOMMIE" would provide any information he might have in instant matter. Mrs. DYE was informed of the fugitive status of COLE and ROE and that they were wagted by the Federal Government.

Agent was informed by Chief of Police WOOTTEN that PAT O'MALLEY, of the Charles O'Malley Electrical Store was well acquainted with Mr. and Mrs. CECIL NOEL and also was entirely reliable. He stated that MOSS left Las Vegas about three months ago, owing numerous bills, but that O'Malley might know where MOSS was presently located.

PAT O'MALLEY, Charles O'Malley Electrical Store, was interviewed and stated that he was acquainted with Mr. and Mrs. T. D. MOSS and with Mr. and Mrs. CECIL NOBL, but had no information of any mail that Mrs. NOEL had been receiving through MES. MOSS or MRS. DYE, the dressmaker. He stated that he had never had seen anyone similar to the photographs of COLE and ROE, which photographs were shown to O'MALLEY. He stated that he did not knew the present whereabouts of T. D. MOSS, but suggested that PAUL WELTY, driver for the Asloaf Bakery be contacted for information concerning MOSS.

PAUL WELTY, AsLeaf Bakery, was interviewed in the presence of Police Chief WCCTTEN and he stated that he had no information that MRS. NOWL ever received any correspondence through Mr. er Mrs. NOWL or MRS. SADIE DYE. He was shown photographs of COLE and ROE, which he was unable to identify as any persons he had ever seems. He stated that he believed that MOSS returned to Pampa, Texas, when he and his wife left Les Vegas and indicated that probably MOSS could be located through a brother who lives at 341 East or West Terguson St., Pempa, Texas.

Through FRANK. J. WESNER, Postmaster at Las Vegas, a thirty day cover on all first class mail, addressed Mr. or Mrs. CECIL NOWL, at Post Office Box 613 was placed. T. D. MOSS and wife left a forwarding address from Bex 929 to 620 Russell St. Pampa, Texas, on 5-18-38.

MR. WESNER advised, however, that the mail which had been forwarded to MOSS at Pampa, had been returned.

During Agent's inquiry he was advised by the different persons interprised, that "TOMMIE" THOMPSON was a rather harmless drunkard, who probably would provide any information he might possess concerning instant matters

WALTER KOLBE, mail carrier, who delivers mail to Mrs. SADIE DYE and to the address fermerly occupied by the Versity Confectionery, stated that Mrs. MOSS did not receive any mail at their confectionery when they were in Las Vegas, as they used their post office box. He could not recall that Mrs. CECIL NOWL ever received mail at Mrs. BYETS residence. He had a hazy recollection of having delivered a piece of mail for Mrs. NOWL in the past two months but could not recall the circumstances or address where he had delivered the letter.

AT CATE CITY, NEW MEXICO

O. M. "TOMME" THOMPSON, manager of the only peol hall in twon stated that he was acquainted with T. D. MOSS at Pampa, Texas, prior to their coming to Las Vegas, N.M.; that he managed the Versity Confectionery on a commission basis, while MUSS sold candy on the road, THOMPSON stated that he received practically no money from MOSS during the three months he worked for him and finally became disgusted and quit in the latter part of May, 1938. He stated that MOSS married a sister of MRS. CECIL NGEL but these two wemen were not particularly friendly; that he was able to get elong with Mrs. NOEL, but decided that this woman was a rather fast person, who liked mens the stated that she would come into the confectionery in the afternoon, even when she and her husband, were living in has Vegas and would bring in her mail and read it in one of the booths. She purchased a box of letter paper, which she kept at the confectionery and would write letters at the confectionery. THOMPSON stated that during March, 1938, MOSS made a trip to Rempa, Texas, and on his return, he told THOMPSON that MRS. NOEL was the former wife of one of the convicts who was reported to have escaped out of Alcatraz. THOMPSON attempted to ascertain. from whom MRS. NOEL was receiving and also tried to see, on different occasions, to whom she was addressing letters, but never got an opportunity to see them. The thought came to him that possibly she was corresponding with her fore mer husband, but he had no definite information, other than that noted above. He recalled that MRS. NOEL was quite friendly with Mrs. VELMAN CCLEOD for awhile. One day when Mrs. NOEL was writing a letter in one of the booths of the confectionery, he saw Mrs. McChEOD pass the store, Knowing that Mrs. NOEL always was envious to see Mrs. McCLEOD, he mentioned to Mrs. NOEL that MRS. McCLEOD had just passed and asked her if she wanted him to call to her, but she indicated that she did not want to see Mrs. McCLEOD at that time.

THOMPSON stated a few things like the above aroused his suspicion that MRS. NOEL was corresponding with her former husband, he stated he was absolutely certain that MRS. NOEL was not receiving mail through the Post Office box of Mr. and Mrs. MOSS, as he had a key to the box and generally received the mail from the Post Office, as MOSS was generally on the road.

When asked whether he had any information that Mrs. SADIE DYE had ever acted as en intermediary in receiving mail for Mrs. NOFIL, THOMPSON stated that he had no information in this regard. He then volunteered the infermation that he probably knew how this stery arose, as he was in Mrs. DYE'S company one time, when she mentioned that she received mail for some married women in Las Vegas, who were carrying on affairs with men, unknown to their husbands. There was no indication, however, that Mrs. DYE ever received mail for Mrs. NOW. THOMPSON recalled that he was present when Mrs. DYE was introduced to Mrs. NOEL, this being at the Varsity Confectionery. He recalled that MRS. NOKL had mentioned that she was having a hard time getting her dresses made by the seamstress she was then using and she mentioned to Mrs. DYE that she had about nine or ten dresses she intended having made. THOMPSON stated that he left Las Vegas about a week after Mrs. NOEL met Mrs. DYE, but expressed the opinion that he did not think that these women were not especially friendly and were acquainted only in a business way.

THOMPSON stated that Mrs. NOEL was close mouthed and had never intimated that she was the former wife of RALPH ROE. The stated that he was not in Las Vegas, when Mrs. MOSS left and cannot state where they might be presently located. Photographs of COLE and ROE were shown to THOMPSON, but he was unable to identify same as any persons he had ever seen around Las Vegas or in the company of Mrs. NOEL. THOMPSON was provided the address and telephone number of the KI Paso Office and he stated he would immediately communicate with that office should he obtain any information concerning subjects.

In view of the statement made by Mrs. SADIE DYE to O. M. THOMPSON that she acts as an intermediary in correspondence between certain has Vegas women and their men friends, a cover is being placed upon all mail received by her.

YNOPSIS OF FACTS:

JACK BREEDLOVE, an ex-convict and fellow prisoner with fugitive COLE at Oklahoma State Penitentiary, advised Tulsa Police Dept. he saw fugitive COLE in a car with ORVILLE THOMAS, a known bootlegger in that city. Investigation through an informant developed that the man with THOMAS was one JACK "FATS MILES, H DOYNOOD COUM OF TUgitive COLE, who is presently alleged to be engaged in narcotic activities around Roswell, N. M.

On September 16, 1938, Chief of Detectives BURG HUGHES of the Tulsa Police Department, Tulsa, Oklahoma, exhibited to this Agent a confidential report submitted to him by Officer LEO CRAINGER of his department. It was noted in this report that an informant of this officer had alleged he saw fugitive COLE in an automobile being driven by one ORVILLEYTHOMAS, a known bootlegger in that vicinity.

Accordingly this Agent contacted Officer LEO GRAINGER of the Tulsa Police Department who advised that on the night previous one JACK BREEDLOVE, an ex-convict who is now going streight, had contacted him and advised that on the afternoon previous he had seen a man seated in a car driven by ORVILLE THOMAS whom he immediately recognized as fugitive COLE. He indicated that the car was pulling out of an alley near the home of FRANK McMILLAN, a Tulse Police Officer, who was formerly

on the Narcotic Squad in that city and who resided at 612 West Third Street. GRAINGER mentioned that BREEDLOVE was well acquainted with ORVILLE THOMAS and stopped and talked to him for a few minutes during which time the man whom he recognized as COLE pulled his hat down over his eyes and kept looking in the other direction. According to CRAINGER. BREEDLOVE made no effort to speak to the man whom he believed was COLE, but claimed to have known him very well in view of the fact that they served time together in McAlester Penitentiary. Officer GRAINGER mentioned that BREEDLOVE felt positive of his identification in this respect. He advised that the car in which THOMAS and this individual were riding was a late model Pontiac Coupe. bearing what EREEULOVE believed to be 1938 Oklahoma commercial tags, the license number of which was 798-987, which number was believed to be incorrect as the commercial tag numbers in this state do not reach such a high BREEDLOVE advised GRAINGER that the car upon pulling out of the alley headed west on Third Street.

Officer GRAINGER further advised that he had heard numerous rumors to the effect that COLE was in that vicinity and was supposed to be associated with the dope racket, but to date, he had received no rumors which were sufficiently definite to enable any checking. He mentioned that ORVILLE THOMAS who has always associated with the criminal element in town is believed by him to be presently mixed up in handling dope in that city. It was his opinion that the car in heading west on Third Street was going to the tourist camp operated by one CLARENCE SMITH just beyond Sand Springs, Oklahoma, stating that this tourist camp bears a very bad reputation and in the past has been the known stopping place of such criminals as KARPIS and BARKER. Officer GRAINGER advised that he has an informant whom he will place in CLARENCE SMITH'S tourist camp for the purpose of definitely determining whether or not ORVILLE THOMAS and this individual have made any contact there and will thereupon advise this Bureau.

On the following day this Agent recontected Officer GRAINGER, at which time he stated that his informant had gone to SMITH'S tourist camp and substantially verified his hunch that ORVILLE THOMAS and his companion, who was identified as COLE, had been visiting there. He informant while at the tourist camp had seen ORVILLE THOMAS drive up in a Pontiac Coupe with Texas license, the number of which he could not obtain, and THOMAS was at the time accompanied by a man named JACK "FATS" MILES, an ex-convict and close boyhood friend of fugitive COLE. It was learned through this informant that the purpose for their visit was to consummate a transaction concerning the obtaining of two hundred cans of morphine which were to be brought in from old Mexico. Officer GRAINGER advised that his informant referred to herein was acquainted with this Agent and had requested that this Agent personally contact him with regard to the matter.

Upon contacting Officer CRAINGER'S informant it was learned that he is Mr. GEORGE H. SMITH, former undersheriff from Fort Smith. Arkansas, who is presently working in Tulsa in connection with some undercover work and had been previously contacted by this Agent in regard to the HAMILTON and WALTERS case. SMITH indicated at the time that upon receiving the information from Officer GRAINGER he had proceeded to the tourist camp of CLARENCE SMITH and engaged him in conversation with regard to a certain ex-convict from Arizona whom he knew to be well acquainted with SMITH. During the course of this conversation he saw a late model Chevrolet or Pontiac Coupe drive up and recognized ORVILLE THOMAS to be seated in this car. At the outset, the driver of the car greatly resembled fugitive COLE with the exception that his hair appeared a bit lighter and his face a little heavier. Through subsequent conversation with SMITE, it was developed that this men was actually JACK "FATS" MILES, an ex-convict and boyhood friend of fugitive COLE. According to the information he received from SMITH, "FATS" MILES has been staying in and around Texas and New Mexico and is engaged in smuggling nercotics into this country from old Mexico.

He stated that while he could not get a good look at the car, he noticed that it bore Texas plates rather than commercial tags as BREEDLOVE had previously stated. According to SMITH, MILES is undoubtedly the man who was seen several days before in the car with THOMAS and who was identified by BREEDLOVE as being fugitive COLE. SMITH mentioned that from his personal knowledge of MILES, he knows he has served a term in Leavenworth Penitentiary on a liquor charge and feels that in view of his boyhood acquaintence with fugitive COLE, he would make an excellent contact for the latter should he have effected his escape from Alcatraz. He stated that if COLE were presently in contact with MILES and associated with him in smuggling narcotics from old Mexico, fugitive COLE would undoubtedly be handling the old Mexico angle.

At the time of this conversation SMITH advised this Agent that he had a friend who was very close to both ORVILLE THOMAS and "FATS" MILES and he felt positive that through him he could indirectly obtain information as to whether fugitive COLE was presently associated with MILES in his narcotic activities. Accordingly SMITH subsequently advised this Agent that through this source he had determined that "FATS" MILES has not been contacted by COLE nor does he have any information as to whether fugitive COLE was successful in effecting his escape from Alcatraz. It was further learned that MILES is presently making his headquarters for his narcotic activities in the vicinity of Roswell, New Mexico.

In view of the above information, no further action is being taken in regard to this possible identification of COLE in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Copies of this report are, however, being forwarded to the El Paso Division for its information and with the request that appropriate investigation be conducted to determine whether fugitive COLE might be in contact with MILES in and around Roswell. New Mexico.

A smooth finished photograph of fugitive ROE was shown to Deputy Sheriff O'LEARY by the writer, at which time he stated that it resembled closely a man whom he had seen in a saloon at Bancroft and Cherry Streets, Toledo, Ohio. O'LEARY stated that this saloon is operated by CHARLES HAMAKER and is known as Charlie's Playground. O'LEARY, continuing, stated that he often stops in there for drinks and that on about the 20th of August, 1938, he was there when he noticed a person who was a stranger to him and that when he turned around to look at him, this stranger also was turning around to look at him, O'LEARY, and that this aroused his suspicion.

He stated that the bartender on duty at that time was known to him only as "JOE THE BEEF," and that this stranger, whom O'LEARY claims to resemble ROE, appeared to be friendly with the bartender. O'LEARY stated that he has been in Charlie's Playground several times since but that he has never noticed this person whom he thought to be identical with ROE.

O'LEARY described this man, whom he thought to resemble the photograph of ROE, as follows:

Upon further questioning of O'LEARY, it was learned that he had been drinking that day but he emphatically stated that he was not in a drunken condition and was passing this information on to this Bureau for whatever action this office desired to take.

STEVE WILKE, bartender at Charlie's Playground, was interviewed, at which time agent desired to know the whereabouts of "JOE THE BEEF." WILKE stated that "JOE THE BEEF" had been involved in an automobile accident around the latter part of June 1938 and that as a result of this accident, "JOE THE BEEF" has a stiff leg and has not been able to tend bar since. WILKE stated that he knows that "JOE THE BEEF" has not tended bar since July 1st, inasmuch as he was hired at that time to take the place of "JOE THE BEEF."

The photograph of RALPH ROE was shown to WILKE, at which time he stated that he did not know anyone who resembled the photograph of ROE, and that he is positive he knows no one who frequents Charlie's Playground who does resemble the photograph.

WILKE was advised of the fugitive status of ROE, at which time he stated that should he notice anyone who resembled ROE, he would immediately communicate with the writer.

CHARLES HAMAKER, proprietor of Charlie's Playground, was contacted, at which time he viewed the photograph of ROE but he could not identify it as being any person he knew or any person who frequented his tavern. HAMAKER was advised of the Harboring Statute and the process outstanding for fugitive ROE, as well as fugitive COLE, at which time he stated that should he see any person resembling the photograph of ROE, he would communicate with the writer, the home telephone number of whom was left for his information and convenience.

Special Agent W. J. BUCHANAN of this Division Office was approached by JOHN ED FRANKLIN, U. S. Probation Officer for the Eastern District of Oklahoma, at Muskogee, and Mr. FRANKLIN advised he had received a telephone call from JAKE SIMS. Chief of Police at Seminole, requesting that RAY "TANGLE EYES", who was presently living at Seminole and is on probation, reporting monthly to Mr. FRANKLIN, accompany him, SIMS, to Odessa, Texas for two or three days. Mr. FRANKLIN advised that it was the policy of the Parole Board not to grant any parolee permission to leave the state to do any undercover work, or be associated with any persons with a criminal record, and that he was going to communicate with the Parole Board at Washington, D. C. and ask that this permission be granted inasmuch as was not going to do any undercover work or put anyone on the spot for the officers.

The following day Mr. FRANKLIN advised that he had received a telegram from the Acting Parole Officer advising that he could grant permission to leave the district provided he did no undercover work. Mr. FRANKLIN informed Agent BUCHANAN that he was going to notify by letter that he would grant him permission to leave the state of Oklahoma for a period of three or four days to accompany Chief SIMS to Odessa, Texas.

Each of those interviewed advised that they had no information concerning any plan that ROE and COLE had to escape from Alcatraz and although interviewed at length, no information of value to this investigation could be secured from any of them.

CARL ZARTER, in charge of the records of the institution, endeavored to identify from records and his recollection and knowledge of prisoners, anyone who would answer to or could be identified as JACK O'BRIEN, referred to in the report of Special Agent C. G. CAMPBELL, Seattle, Washington, dated 7-12-38. While it is extremely doubtful if , JOHN O'BRIEN, former inmate No. 46886, or JAMES EDWARD O'BRIEN, former inmate No. 40410 could be the JACK O'BRIEN in question, the picture, with description data of each of these individuals was secured and is being attached to the Seattle office copies of this report. No attempt will be made to locate either of these individuals for the purpose of interview, but their pictures are being forwarded to the Seattle office in order, if desired, they may be exhibited to MARYON DARLING for identification purposes. The records of the penitentiary would indicate the possibility that each of these individuals is in prison, JOHN O'BRIEN probably being in the State Prison at Joliet, Illinois, and JAMES EDWARD O'BRIEN probably being in the State Reformatory at Mansfield, Ohio. This is not definitely known.

Dr. O. W. SPROUSE was located at Sulphur. Oklahoma! and he advised the boy, who was referred to as JACK O'BRIEN, was reared by one BILL WARREN of Davis, Oklahoma. He was of the opinion that O'BRIEN was not a relative of the WARREN family, but had merely been taken out of sympathy. He advised the boy became sick in 1920, and had come to him for hospitalization; that he treated the youth, and kept him. treating him as a son for almost a year. He advised that O'BRIEN was struck with the spirit of the wanderlust; that he had run away two or three times that year, and he had always made the proper arrangements to have him returned. He stated that the last time he had seen O'BRIEN. was in the forepart of 1937, when he arrived in Sulphur, Oklahoma traveling with a woman who he claimed was his wife. This the doctor doubted to be a fact. He described O'BRIEN as being strictly a dumb-bell. He advised that at the time he was in the grade school at Sulphur his marks averaged about 25 to 30 per cent. He stated that two or three months ago he received a wire from 0'BRIEN from the State of Washington! He could not remember the exact town. At that time O'BRIEN asked him for \$50.00. He stated he did not answer the wire. Dr. SPROUSE stated that O'BRIEN would possibly wire him again for money in the near future. The doctor stated he had sent him money on one or two occasions, but the past three or four requests had been turned down. He agreed to cooperate with the Bureau in the location of O'BRIEN, whom he referred to as ALVIN TIGNOR, and this is probably his correct name. Dr. SPROUSE was furnished with the address and telephone number of the Oklahoma City Office, and was requested to furnish this office with any information he received concerning O'BRIEN.

BILL WARREN was contacted at Davis, Oklahoma and he stated he had reared O'BRIEN from the time he was about five years old. He stated that O'BRIEN's mother had died and his father was a worthless individual whose location was not known; that he had reared him out of sympathy. He advised that the boy's correct name is ALVINTIGNOR, and they call him "HUCK". He advised that his wife received a Mother's Day card from O'BRIEN, and that they get a letter on rare occasions. He does not receive demands for money from O'BRIEN, and this is probably due to the fact that he is a man of very moderate means, and is presently employed by the W.P.A. He said he desired to cooperate with the Bureau in the location of O'BRIEN for the purpose of interview, and stated he would call the Oklahoma City office if he received any information. The telephone number of the Oklahoma City office was accordingly given to him.

At Ardmore, Oklahoma inquiry was made at the Sheriff's office, Police Department and Post Office, and the current city and telephone directories were searched for the purpose of locating one JESS DARR, but same met with negative results.

The following investigation was conducted by reporting agent:

At Tulsa, Oklahoma.

In connection with the case of JOE McCANN, with aliases, FUGITIVE, I.I.B. #70; MARGARET JONES, with aliases - Victim, White Slave Traffic Act, Okla. City file 31-3249, Agent had occasion to interview a Mr. J. M. SOOTER, fireman employed at the West Tulsa Fire Station, 1217 West 12th Street. Several days later, on September 13, 1938, Mr. SOOTER contacted Agent at the office in the Federal Building in Tulsa by telephone and advised he had some information which might prove interesting to the Bureau. Mr. SOOTER would not elaborate further over the telephone but stated that the subject of his conversation pertained to a man whom the Bureau was very anxious to apprehend. Accordingly, Mr. SOOTER was contacted personally by Agent, at which time he gave the following information:

He stated that he is acquainted with two sisters by the name of Mrs. D. ELYHENDRICKS and Miss ADELINE DUNN, both of whom live at 1414 West 18th Street. He stated that several days ago, during a conversation with Mrs. HENDRICKS, the latter told him of an incident that had happened last winter, upon which occasion her sister, ADELINE, employed as a manicurist in a local barber shop, had come home in a very nervous condition and had told her she believed she had seen TED COLE at the barber shop that afternoon. Mr. SOOTER advised that Mrs. HENDRICKS had mentioned this incident to him in a casual conversation but that due to the fact of the notoriety surrounding COLE's escape from Alcatraz, he, SOOTER, had been interested and had questioned Mrs. HENDRICKS further. He stated that according to Mrs. HENDRICKS ADELINE had come in that night and advised her that she, ADELINE, had that afternoon been manicuring the nails of one PERRY COLLINS, who was employed at the Ideal Barber Shop as a barber, where ADELINE also worked: that a man had come in the shop, who apparently knew COLLINS and COLLINS had immediately gotten up to give him a shave; that after the man had left the barber shop COLLINS had returned to the table to have his manicure completed, but seemed in a very nervous condition and quite upset, and finally told ADELINE that the man he had just

shaved was TED COLE, and for her to keep quiet about the incident. Mr. SOOTER stated he had never talked to ADELINE concerning this matter, but that he regarded her as a reliable girl, who would probably remember the facts as they had come to her, and he suggested that ADELINE be contacted in order to determine whether there was any truth in the matter. He further advised that he was merely passing this information along to Agent inasmuch as he felt it would be interesting to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He requested, however, that his name not be mentioned as being the source of information.

Mrs. D. E. HENDRICKS was accordingly interviewed at her home, 1414 West 18th Street, at which time she gave substantially the same information as had SOOTER. Mrs. HENDRICKS could not definitely place the time last winter ADELINE had informed her of the incident but stated that she believed it was probably during cold weather, February or March. She further advised that she had no further information other than what her sister had told her at that time, and that it had been so long ago she would not be positive as to exactly what her sister had said. She advised that her sister ADELINE is presently employed as a manicurist at the Scott Barber Shop, 607 South Main Street. She requested, however, that ADELINE not be contacted at the shop, but suggested that Agent return and interview her at her home that evening.

Accompanied by Special Agent E. F. EMRICH, Agent returned the same evening, at which time Miss ADELINE DUNN was interviewed and gave the following information. She stated that during the winter of 1938 or early spring she was employed as manicurist at the Ideal Barber Shop at No. 3 East 3rd Street, and one of the barbers at the shop was a man by the name of PERRY COLLINS, with whom she became more or less well acquainted. She recalled that one afternoon while she was giving COLLINS a manicure, he had looked up suddenly as a man had entered the shop, and immediately COLLINS had seemed to be upset; that COLLINS had gotten up and waited on the customer, giving him a shave, and the two had apparently been acquainted_with_each_other.__After-the-customer-had-left the shop COLLINS returned to her manicure table but still seemed to be in a very nervous state of mind. Upon his return to the table COLLINS had said something to the effect that the man he had just waited on was TED COLE, who had some months before escaped from Alcatraz, and COLLINS had advised her to keep her mouth shut concerning it. Miss DUNN further advised that she had never seen the customer return to the shop since that time, nor had she discussed the matter further with PERRY COLLINS; that, however, since there had been a great deal of notoriety about that time over the escape of COLE from Alcatraz, it made her extremely nervous to think that the man had actually been in the shop that day, and she

recalled that she had mentioned the incident to her sister, Mrs. D. E. HENDRICKS, with whom she lived, upon her going home that evening. Miss DUNN described the customer as being a man about 5' 5 or 6" in height, and weighing about 150 pounds. She stated that she had merely glanced up at the time he came into the shop that day and had taken no particular notice of him during the time he was getting his shave. However, she stated that the thing she recalled most about the man was that his hair was almost white, and that even his eyebrows and eyelashes were extremely light in color. She said he appeared to be about 40 years old. She stated she doubted if she would recognize the man again if she saw him unless it would be because of his white hair and eyelashes.

A number of photographs of the Bureau's fugitives, among whom were photographs of RALPH ROE and THEODORE COLE, were exhibited to Miss DUNN, but she failed to identify any of them as resembling the man she saw come into the barber shop.

At the Ideal Barber Shop, 3 East Third Street, Agent made discreet inquiries regarding PERRY COLLINS. It was learned that COLLINS is employed as a barber there but was on his vacation, although he was expected to be back the following morning. Accordingly, on the following morning Agent contacted COLLINS at the Ideal Barber Shop, at which time COLLINS accompanied Agent to the office of the resident agent in the Federal Building in Tulsa, where he was interviewed, at which interview Special Agent E. F. EMRICH was also present. COLLINS stated that he had been employed as barber at the Ideal Barber Shop for some time, and after some recollection he recalled the incident concerning which ADELINE DUNN had been previously interviewed. CCLLINS placed the time at about the latter part of February or March, 1938, and stated that a map, known to him as "WHITEY KBURNETT, alias KThree Fingered Whitey", whom he knew as an ex-convict, had come into the shop in order to get a shave and that as BURNETT had left the shop someone had remarked that he resembled TED COLE. COLLINS advised that he had never known TED COLE and as far as he knew had never seen COLE, but that at that particular time-there had been a great deal of notoriety concerning COLE's escape from Alcatraz. He stated that he could not remember whether it was one of the employees of the shop or one of the patrons who had made the remark concerning BURNETT's resemblance to COLE. COLLINS accounted for his nervousness on that occasion by saying that he, himself, had formerly done time at Leavenworth Penitentiary from 1929 to 1932, having been sent up on a whiskey charge, and that it was at Leavenworth that he became acquainted with "WHITEY" BURNETT; that since his release from Leavenworth he, COLLINS. had been attempting to earn an honest living and had made every effort

to keep his former prison record a thing of the past and unknown to his friends and customers; that naturally when BURNETT entered the shop he became fearful that he would say something which might make known his, COLLINS!, prison sentence.

THE

COLLINS denied that he had ever told ADELINE DUNN that the man he had just shaved was TED COLE; that he may have remarked to her that someone in the shop thought there was a resemblance between BURNETT and COLE. He stated that undoubtedly Miss DUNN had misconstrued his remarks as being an assertion on his part that the individual had been TED COLE. However, COLLINS stated that he could positively say that the man had not been COLE inasmuch as BURNETT was well known to him and that he, COLLINS, had never seen COLE in his life. He further stated that he had no knowledge as to the present whereabouts of BURNETT.

It should be stated that COLLINS gave the impression of telling the absolute truth about the matter, and that discreet inquiries made at the Ideal Barber Shop subsequent thereto have indicated that COLLINS is well thought of and has a great many gentlemen customers. It was further ascertained that COLLINS former prison sentence is generally unknown among his acquaintances and fellowworkers.

He stated that what he did was wrong, however, now that it is all over he knows he was not mentally right when he committed the crime. That during the period he was in Leavenworth he attempted to be a good prisoner, to learn searthing, and make things as agreeable as possible, realizing he was not a criminal at heart. That he made the acquaintance of very few of the immates at Leavenworth.

He advised he does not recall any individuals by the name of R/LPH or J/MCS/ROE, and certainly such individuals were not emong his acquaintances or good friends. He stated that while he was in Leavenworth he played ball with some of the boys and there was a pitcher by the name of ROE, however, he is not certain of this, and if this were so, he merely know this individual casually.

It appeared from the interview with HARLESS that he is making an honest effort to rehabilitate himself, and that he would have told the truth if he were an actual acquaintance of RMLPH or JAMES ROE.

Details: AT SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA.

With reference to Bureau letter dated January 31, 1938, concerning VIESER CLAS (some letters missing) additional investigation was conducted by Special Agent L. H. RICHMOND. It is noted that previous investigation has been performed in an effort to locate someone bearing a name similar to VIESER CLAS living in the vicinity of 230½ Duncan Street, San Francisco. Results of this investigation are contained in the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, dated January 12, 1938. Subsequent to the submission of this report, the Bureau advised in its letter of January 31, 1938, that it was highly probable that another digit appeared in front of the 230½ Duncan Street.

A check of the city maps and directories indicated that Duncan Street continued from the 100 block through the 1200 block and, therefore, it would be possible to have a number of $1230\frac{1}{2}$.

In this connection, Agent proceeded to that portion of Duncan Street which should be the 1200 block, and it was ascertained that this portion of the street is nothing more than a narrow dirt road proceeding over Twin Peaks, the mountainous portion of the city of San Francisco, upon which there are no houses. The last numbered house is in the 900 block. Inquiries were made at all houses located in the 800 and 900 blocks, and no one had heard of any individual named VIESER or VIEFER CLAS or any similar name. All persons interviewed advised that there is no continuation of Duncan Street.

Inquiry was made of the Postman who carries mail on Duncan Street in this vicinity, as well as the adjoining streets, and he likewise was unable to furnish any information indicating the presence of VIESER CLAS in that neighborhood. He also said that there was no continuation or any possibility of any number appearing on Duncan Street which would be higher than 900.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated September 3, 1938, which states that the descriptions of the individuals furnished by JOHN JAMES ROCHE, whom he allegedly heard talking about "RALPH" and "TED",

bear a close resemblance to the descriptions of MAURICE DENNING and EVELYN BERT, MAURICE DENNING being the fugitive and subject of I. O. #1254 and wanted in connection with the robbery of the Security National Bank of Superior, Nebraska.

AT SAN RAFAEL, CALIFORNIA.

In accordance with the instructions contained in Bureau letter dated September 3, 1938, reporting Agent contacted JOHN JAMES ROCHE at the carpenter shop of the North Western Pacific Railroad, located in the 100 block on B Street, San Rafael, where he is employed. Upon being shown the pictures of MAURICE DENNING and EVELYN BERT, ROCHE said that he believes these were the individuals he overheard talking about TED and RALPH on a ferry boat running between San Francisco and Sausalito, Calif., on March 26, 1938. ROCHE was again closely questioned concerning the activities of these individuals and advised that during March, 1938, he was residing at 702 Vallejo Street, San Francisco, and was doing repair work on a pier owned by the North Western Pacific Railroad Company at Tiburon, Calif; that it was necessary for him to commute to his work daily and that he regularly left San Francisco on the Sausalito ferry at 6:45 A. M. Upon arriving at Sausalito, he would board a Pacific Greyhound bus at 7:18 A. M. and proceed to Tiburon on the bus, the distance from Sausalito to Tiburon being approximately ten miles. He would get off the bus at the foot of the pier on which he was working and all the other passengers for Tiburon would alight at the same place. He said that nearly every day during the month of March he noted a woman passenger on the ferry boat and also on the bus, who left the bus at Tiburon and immediately upon arrival, she would proceed to the end of the pier and wave a handkerchief, which would signal a cabin cruiser some distance off shore, This cabin cruiser would proceed to a point approximately 200 yards from the end of the pier, where it would cut off its motor and send a dory into shore; that this woman would get in the dory and be rowed to the cabin cruiser. Upon her getting into the cabin cruiser, it would then proceed into Racoon Straits and northward into an arm of San Francisco Bay.

ROCHE said that this woman bore a strong resemblance to the photograph of EVELYN BERT. He said that occasionally the woman would return on the same bus from Tiburon to Sausalito and board the same ferry from Sausalito to San Francisco in the afternoon. He said that this bus left Tiburon at 3:37 P. M. and made connections with the ferry at Sausalito at approximately 4:15 P. M. He stated that it was on the return trip on March 26, 1938, that he overheard the conversations between the woman he identifies as EVELYN BERT and the man he identifies as MAURICE DENNING. He said that on three or four occasions the man accompanied the woman on the return trip but that he never did see the man accompany her from San Francisco to Tiburon.

At the time this information was originally furnished to the San Francisco office by ROCHE, he was asked to determine, if possible, the name and number of the cabin cruiser. When asked if he ever did ascertain this, he said that the cabin cruiser never came close enough to shore to make out the name or number and, therefore, he was unable to get that information. ROCHE said that his work terminated at that particular point approximately one week after he had notified the San Francisco office of the above occurrences and that he has not been to Tiburon since that time. ROCHE was certain that he could identify the boat if he should again see it.

AT TIBURON, CALIFORNIA.

ROCHE accompanied Agent to the vicinity of Tiburon, where all cabin cruisers anchored in that vicinity were inspected, and ROCHE said that none of these boats was identical with the boat he had in mind. He said that the boat which was used in the transportation of this woman had a white hull, with no stripings of any kind, that the upper structure was brown and was built clear to the point of the bow, there being no forward deck on the boat at all. The rear end of the boat, he said, was square. At the time ROCHE and Agent were observing the boats in the vicinity of Tiburon, it was noted that there were approximately 100 cabin cruisers anchored in the vicinity of the Corinthian Yacht Club, which almost immediately adjoins the North Western Pacific pier.

In an effort to verify the statements of ROCHE, investigation was conducted by the reporting Agent in the vicinity of Sausalito and Tiburon. A check was made of the Pacific Greyhound Bus records, and it was ascertained that the drivers on the 7:18 A. M. run from Sausalito to Tiburon during the month of March, 1938, were ROY BOWMAN and ROBERT STEDMAN.

ROY BOWMAN, upon interview, advised that his address is Tiburon, California, and that he has been a driver for the Pacific Greyhound Company for a number of years. He said that during March, 1938, he was driving the 7:18 A. M. run from Sausalito to Tiburon on Wednesday and Thursday of each week. He stated that the passengers on this trip are mostly employees of the North Western Pacific Railroad Company who are proceeding to Tiburon to work in the shops which are located at that point and that he knows most of them by their first names. He said that it would be an unusual occasion when a woman would board this particular bus and he believes that he would certainly have noticed an unaccompanied woman making this trip. He was shown the picture of EVELYN BERT and said that he was certain he had never seen this woman and was more certain, that this woman had never ridden on the 7:18 A. M. run. He recalled ROCHE, the carpenter, as having been a passenger almost daily for a month during the spring of 1938.

ROBERT STEDMAN, Tiburon, California, also a driver for the

Pacific Greyhound Company, was interviewed, and he said that he has been driving the 7:18 A. M. run for over a year, and that he makes this trip rive days a week, driving every day except Wednesday and Thursday. He said that he is well acquainted with all of the passengers who usually ride this bus, inasmuch as they are employees of the North Western Pacific and are daily commuters to San Francisco. He said that the bus is always full and, therefore, it is necessary for him to keep close check on the passengers, looking for available space, and that he, therefore, observes all of the passengers each day. He said that it is unusual for any women to be on this bus and he certainly would have noticed any woman who rode on this trip for several days. He was shown the picture of EVELYN BERT and said that he had never seen the woman and was especially certain that she had never ridden on the 7:18 A. M. ous which he was driving.

ROY STEDMAN also advised that each time he takes the 7:18 run in the morning, he also drives the bus on its return from Tiburon to Sausalito at 3:37 P. M. and that he is certain that EVELYN BERT has never been a passenger on the return trip at any time when he was driving the bus.

At the shops of the North Western Pacific Railroad Company, inquiry was made for the commuters who arrive in Tiburon on the 7:18 A. M. bus from Sausalito, and several of these employees were interviewed and shown pictures of EVELYN BERT and MAURICE DENNING. They were unable to identify these photographs as anyone who had ever been a passenger on that bus or as being photographs of any persons they knew.

JOSEPH BABEC, 630 Geary Street, San Francisco, who is a machinist's helper in the shops of the North Western Pacific Railroad Company, said that he has been riding this bus for six years and that it is only on rare occasions that a woman makes this trip. He said that the only women who regularly make the trip were employed as school teachers in Tiburon during the school year of 1937-1938 and that neither one of them at all resembled EVELYN BERT. He stated that these women were not regular passengers. BABEC said that he would have noticed the destination of any strange woman on the bus, because it would be unusual, and that if she had proceeded out on the pier, he would have watched her to see what she was going to do. He said that he never did see a woman alight from the bus and walk out on the pier.

General inquiry was made in Tiburon and among those interviewed was R. L. HOOPER, who is manager of a saloon located on the bay shore, immediately overlooking the place where the cabin cruiser was supposed to have been anchored prior to the time the signal was given and from which saloon it would be possible to view the boat approaching the pier. MR. HOOPER said that he ordinarily opens his establishment at 7:15 A. M., which is 25 minutes prior to the arrival of the Sausalito bus.

He said that he is certain that he would have looked out the window to observe any motor boat which was traveling in the bay at that time of the morning. He said that he did not recall any boat having been anchored in the bay in that vicinity or any boat which proceeded to the vicinity of the pier to pick up a passenger.

MRS. CHARLES C. CHAPMAN, wife of the Postmaster at Tiburon, whose general store contains the post office in the rear, which overlooks the bay, was interviewed. She said that at 7:35 A. M., the arrival time for the bus at Tiburon, she is always working in front of the rear window sorting mail and is in a position to observe any boat traffic in the bay. She said it is unusual for any motor boat to be moving at that time of day and that she certainly would have noticed a boat approaching the pier and her curiosity would have caused her to watch the movements of such a boat. She said that she has not seen, in her many years on the bay, any cabin cruiser which picked up a passenger in the vicinity of the pier.

MR. EDWARD DUNN, Steward at the Corinthian Yacht Club, was interviewed, and he said that during March, 1938, he was not employed as steward at the yacht club but was living in Tiburon. He had a room in a house which overlooked the bay. He said that he was unemployed at that time and usually arose at approximately 7 o'clock and looked over the bay for a half hour or so before he dressed. He said that he would have noticed a boat lying in the bay and would have paid particular attention if this boat had picked up a passenger in the vicinity of the North Western Pacific pier. He said that any such activity over an extended period of time would have caused all sorts of gossip in the small town of Tiburon, and it would have been entirely impossible for such activity to have gone unnoticed. DUNN stated that the steward at the yacht club during March is presently residing in San Francisco, where he is reported to be ill. His present address is unknown to DUNN.

In view of the above investigation it appears that JOHN ROCHE has probably furnished imaginery information. It is noted that when ROCHE was interviewed about this matter, he produced a notebook in which the descriptions as previously furnished to this office were written in red pencil. He was unable of his own recollection to furnish the descriptions of the individuals he had previously reported. He said that he had written down these descriptions in his notebook at the time he overheard the conversation previously referred to between these individuals. It is believed possible that ROCHE might have copied the descriptions or have taken similar descriptions from a wanted circular or from a detective magazine concerning DENNING and BERT.

It is also noted that the information furnished by ROCHE was to the effect that the initials "E.B." appeared on the woman's pocketbook. It is believed highly improbable that EVELYN BERT, knowing that she is a fugitive, would carry a pocketbook bearing her initials.

ROCHE stated that during the week beginning September 19, 1938, he will be working on the pier at Sausalito and be in a position to observe the incoming and outgoing ferry boats. He said that if he noticed the woman believed to be EVELYN BERT or the man he believed to be MAURICE DENNING riding as passengers on any of these ferry boats, he would immediately communicate with the San Francisco office by telephone. In the event it is desired to communicate with ROCHE at a later date, his present ridress is 103 B Street, San Rafael. California.

AT SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent A. E. FARLAND at Alcatraz Island. Reference is made to Bureau letter dated June 25, 1938, with which was transmitted a copy of a letter aderessed to Department of Justice, Washington, D. C., and written by R. S. PRINGLE, inmate #405. Upon interview, PRINGLE said that while confined in the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, he met a convict named NEEKS, who was serving a sentence on a liquor charge from Brownsville, Texas; that he became friendly with WEEKS and WEEKS asked PRINGLE if he did not desire to make some money upon his release from the penitentiary. PRINGLE informed him that he had just started a 15 year sentence and desired to go straight when he had served his time. According to PRINGLE, the conversation with WEEKS ran to kidnaping but WEEKS mentioned no names and if WEEKS did contemplate a kidnaping upon his release, which was then scheduled for sometime early in 1937, PRINGLE had no information concerning the intended victim or WEEKS! proposed accomplices.

PRINGLE said that he knew an individual named HARDROCK in San Antonio, Texas, who might be able to furnish information concerning ROE in the event PRINGLE contacted him. PRINGLE Said that he felt he could locate ROE in the event he were on the outside. Agent FARLAND is of the point on that PRINGLE is merely trying to effect some sort of a permanent or temporary release and that PRINGLE has no information of value concerning where ROE might be found, if he is alive.

Later during the interview PRINGLE informed Agent FARLAND that the only knowledge he had of ROE and COLE since their escape was obtained from prison gossip and grapevine. This information was to the effect that both ROE and COLE at the time of their escape had one 3-gallon sealed can which was to act as a live preserver. PRINGLE said that more of the convicts intended to go at the time of the escape but believed that there had been a rumble to the warden's office and were afraid to leave. PRINGLE said that a convict by the name of VOSS was spotting or acting as a lookout for ROE and COLE. PRINGLE also has heard that COLE had \$5000 planted some place on the outside and that he would be able to get this money and lie low for a considerable period of time if he effected his escape. PRINGLE said that the last group of convicts who arrived in Alcatraz had spread the word around that ROE and COLE had made their es-

cape good, and when asked upon what this information was based, he said that these convicts had said that ROE and COLE had been spotted in St. Louis, Mo., and that their fingerprints had been obtained from a hideout there and positively identified. It is noted that at one time ROE and COLE were reported as having been in St. Louis and investigation was conjucted by the St. Louis and Peoria offices in this connection without establishing the presence of ROE and COLE in that city.

PRINGLE was pressed for further information, particularly relative to the letter stating that he wanted to talk to someone about one escape case, but he was unable to furnish anything concrete.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent C. F. LANMAN, New York City, dated August 18, 1938. Agent FARLAND rechecked the records at Alcatraz Penitentiary and found that the correspondence records maintained indicated that the address for MRS. SARAH BEST, MR. BARNETT BEST, AND ETTA BEST was shown as 2435 Galleo Place, New York City; however, the envelopes contained in the actual correspondence records were searched, and it was found that a clerical error had been made in copying this address as indicated on a letter to inmate ALBERT BEST and bearing the return of MRS. S. BEST, which return address was shown as 3425 Gates Place, Bronx, New York City, Apartment 3K.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated February 3, 1938, which contains a lead to interview a guard named ROWAN at Alcatraz Penitentiary. It was ascertained by Agent FARLAND that this guard's full name is JOHN FRANCIS ROWAN and that he has been transferred from Alcatraz to Terminal Island, San Pedro, Calif. A lead is being set out for the Los Angeles office to interview ROWAN.

In accordance with the request contained in letter from the Oklahoma City office dated January 17, 1938, which requested that the dates upon which ROE and COLE were assigned to duty in the blacksmith and mat shops be obtained, a check of the records of Alcatraz Penitentiary revealed that COLE was assigned to the blacksmith shop on August 8, 1937. His prior assignment was on the labor crew, to which he was assigned on April 6, 1937. There are no other notations concerning his work assignments. As to ROE it was found that he was assigned to the mat shop on April 16, 1937, and previously had been assigned to the kitchen detail on July 27, 1936. There were no other notations showing work assignments for ROE.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent C. G. CAMP-PELL, Seattle, dated July 12, 1938, relative to which Agent FARLAND secretained through record clerk WALTER DORINGTON, Alcatraz Penitentiary, that no one named JACK O'BRIEN, with the alias of SPROUSE, had ever been assigned to the prison at Alcatraz. This name was entirely unfamiliar to

MR. DORINGTON.

AUBREY UNCEL, inmate #265, Alcatraz Penitentiary, was interviewed by Agent FARLAND, and UNCEL said that he had never heard of JACK J'BRIEN and had never heard of any individual named SPROUSE. He does not know, nor has he ever heard of any individual named MARYON DARLING.

INCEL said that he does not write to anyone, and a check of his correspondence records shows that he has not written a letter since his confinement to Alcatraz on October 26, 1935.

The following investigation was performed by Special Agent J. R. McCULLOCH on February 4, 1938:

AT GRASS VALLEY, CALIFORNIA.

At the Partridge Hotel Apartments, 205 Auburn St., it was ascertained from E. R. LANNING that he is the owner of 1937 model Buick sedan, 1937 California license #7D8387, and that in such automobile he and his wife had taken a pleasure trip early in December. They had visited friends in Weiser, Idaho, for several days, staying at the J. W. BECKHAM home in Weiser on the night of December 14, 1937. On December 15th they had started to Grass Valley, Calif., and had travelled through Burns, Bend, and Klamath Falls, Oregon, crossing the state line on the same day and spending the night of Dec. 15 at Weed. Calif., at the Log Cabin Hotel. LANNING stated that he and his wife had not been near Portland on this trip and knew nothing concerning the purchase of any hooklet on tides at that city.

LANNING is described as follows:

Age 38 61 Height Build Medium heavy Hair Blond Eyes Blue Complexion Ruddy Marital status Married · Occupation Mechanic. Golden Center Mine Residence Grass Valley, Calif., formerly San Bruno, Calif., and Weiser,

Former Chief of Police JOHN FONTZ of Grass Valley advised that he knows LANNING to be a man of integrity and character.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent C. R. McCULLOCH on February 21, 1938:

Idaho.

AT SACRAMENTO, CALIFORNIA.

At Box 5777, Route #1, MRS. W. R. MOODY advised that her son, JACK MOODY, had late in December, 1937, driven the 1934 Ford Tudor, license #1A9113, belonging to his father, W. R. MOODY, to Portland, Oreg., returning to Sacramento after a few days in Portland.

JACK MOODY was located at the Tronsdale Realty Company, 1016 J Street, at which time he advised that for the past four years he has been employed in Portland by the Pacific Manifolding and Book Company. He had visited his parents in Sacramento early in December, 1937, and had then returned to Portland in his father's car. He had left Portland on what he recalled as being December 15, 1937, accompanied by one MERWIN SMITH, a boy named BREUNER and BREUNER'S girl friend, the latter three intending to visit in San Francisco during the holidays. He stated that on what he recalled as December 16, 1937, they had crossed the state line and had been checked at the Hornbrook, Calif., checking station. He advised that he had made no purchases of any booklet on tides, in Portland, and that as far as he knew, neither had any of the occupants of his car. He stated that all these people were young, being in their twention, and that they resided in Portland, BREUNER'S father operating a service station on Burnside Street for a GEORGE THOMSON who operates a parking lot and service station at Park and Stark Streets in Portland.

JACK MOODY was noted to be about 27 years of age, 5'8" tall, weighing 140 pounds, with brown eyes and black hair.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent T. FITZHUGH WILSON:

AT SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA.

At about 9:15 A. M., May 20, 1938, a telephone call was received from Chief of Police QUINN'S office, San Francisco Police Department, to the effect that a body had been seen floating in the bay near Fier 28.

Agent was promptly sent to investigate same and upon arrival at the pier learned that the body had been taken to the city morgue. An examination of the body at the morgue, together with Inspector LOUIS MEYER, of the Missing Persons Bureau, San Francisco Police Department, and the deputies coroner who were present, disclosed definitely that said body was not identical with either ROE or COLE. In the records of the San Francisco Police Department, this body for the present is being referred to as JOHN DOE Number 28.

Inspector MEYER stated they expected to photograph the body and also to fingerprint same, in the event the fingers could be restored to such extent as to permit fingerprinting. It was his estimation that the body had not been in the water more than four or five days. The means

by which this body was definitely eliminated as not being identical with ROE or COLE was through an examination of its teeth in comparison with the dental charts of said fugitives.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent T. G. SPENCER on August 30, 1938:

A newspaper article appearing in the San Francisco Chronicle on or about July 7, 1938, indicated that JOHN GOOLDY, 2623 Mission St., San Francisco, had seen subjects on December 16, 1937, somewhere on the road between Redding and Dunsmuir, Calif., while he, JOHN, and his father, CHARLES W. GOOLDY, were enroute from San Francisco to Weed, Calif., and that upon seeing the story of the escape of subjects in the newspapers on December 17, 1937, he went immediately to the Justice of the Peace at Weed, and that to this date no investigation had been made of the matter.

AT WEED, CALIFORNIA.

Judge J. P. BRADLEY, Justice of the Peace, stated he recalled CHARLES GOOLDY and his son, JOHN, coming to his office about two weeks after the escape of subjects and reporting they had seen ROE and COLE the night of December 16, 1937 on highway 99 between Redding and Dunsmuir, Calif., and that they had attempted to run them, the GOOLDYS, off the highway. BRADLEY further stated that CHARLES GOOLDY stated he saw ROE and COLE the morning of December 16, 1937, landing in a small boat at Oakland, Calif. BRADLEY stated the GOOLDYS were unable to give a deceription of the men, nor could they give the make or license number of the car that attempted to run them off the road. BRADLEY further stated that he did not even make a memo of the incident as he believed the GOOLDYS' story to be a "romantic tale".

BRADLEY stated that CHARLES GOOLDY was presently living in a trailer just outside of town; that he did a few odd painting jobs around Teed and that he had the reputation of being a little "crazy", especially on the subject of the Alcatraz escape.

CHARLES GOOLDY was located just east of Weed at the edge of town and related to Agent an incoherent story of having seen ROE and COLE in a speed boat pass under the bow of the ferry on which he and his son were crossing from San Francisco to Oakland, and later seeing this speed boat land near Oakland. He further stated he was positive this incident occurred on the morning of December 16, 1937, and further that on the same night he and his son were almost forced off the road by these same men on highway 99 between Redding and Dunsmir, Calif.

GOOLDY was unable to give any description of the men he believed to be ROE and COLE or a description of the automobile which allegedly attempted to run him off the highway or to furnish the license number of the car. He stated that his son, JOHN, was "somewhere in San Francisco" but that he was positive he could not add anything to the facts already related. No effort was made to contact JOHN GOOLDY.

AT DORRIS, CALIFORNIA.

ARCHIE SMITH, whose address is c/o GEORGE DORAN, was contacted by Special Agent T. G. SPENCER on August 25, 1938, and he stated that he is presently employed as a timber cutter and loader at the Associated Sox Company, Dorris, Calif. SMITH further stated that he came to the Associated Box Company in August of 1934 and has his own cabin at the Company's camp and pays the Associated Box Company a yearly lease fee for the ground and has lived in this cabin from August, 1934, to the present time and is employed by the Associated Box Company during the cutting season.

SMITH stated that he was the owner of a 1929 Chevrolet coupe in 1937, having purchased same from FRED HOWARD in the springed 1937. SMITH further stated that he was familiar with the Tidal Current charts of San Francisco Bay, as he was a former fireman on the "Rose City", a passenger steamer out of Portland to San Francisco; that he had never purchased a copy of these charts and further stated that the last time he was in Portland was in 1925. SMITH stated that he went to Dorris, Calif., once every week during the winter of 1937, his purpose being to get his unemployment insurance money from the California State Employment Service; that in returning to the camp from Dorris he passed through the quarantine station just outside of Dorris.

GEORGE DORAN, Supt. of the Associated Box Company Camp, stated that he had known SMITH since the latter was employed with the company and further stated that SMITH was never away from the camp for more than a day and a night at a time and that on these occasions SMITH and his partner usually went into town and got drunk. DORAN stated that, except for SMITH'S occasional sprees, he, SMITH, was reliable, truthful, honest, and good workman. DORAN further stated that it would not be possible for SMITH to be away from camp long enough, to make a trip to Portland without 10 CRAN's knowing it.

AT DUNSMUIR, CALIFORNIA.

At the California State Employment Service, HOWARD WAY, Clerk, produced the record card of ARCHIE SMITH, timberfaller, Associated Box Company Camp, Dorris, Calif., which disclosed an entry dated December 16, 1937, at Dorris, Calif., noting interview of SMITH by a representative of that service on that date. WAY stated that during 1937 a representative of the California State Employment Service went to Dorris once each week; that he could not tell who the representative was but that SMITH was interviewed by a representative on December 16, 1937.

A description of SMITH obtained from Agent's personal observation and interview with him, follows:

AT SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA.

On September 23, 1938, Warden J. A. JOHNSTON, Alcatraz Penitentiary, communicated by telephone with the San Francisco office and stated that on that date he had received a letter from JOHN ROE MACE, Troutdale, Oregon, c/o ART BURNS, which letter indicated that he believed he had encountered ROE and COLE and desired Warden JOHNSTON to send him photographs and descriptions of these individuals. Warden JOHNSON stated that he would forward this letter to the San Francisco office.

A request for investigation at Troutdale, Oregon, will be made to the Portland office.

In accordance with the instructions contained in Bureau letter dated September 3, 1938, a review of the file in the San Francisco office cas been made, and the results of all investigative activity conducted prior to this time in the San Francisco district have now been reported.

Reference is made to the letter addressed to the San Francisco Field Office by SHERLER E. L. WILLIAMS, Ukiah, California, dated August 4, 1938, in which he advised that it had been reported to his office by HAROLL CHANEY of the Big Oaks Camp, Ukiah that a man he believed to be subject COLE was working as a dish washer at the Eel River Cafe in Garberville, California.

AT UKIAH, CALIFORNIA.

On September 13, 1938, the following investigation was conducted by Special Agent W. G. THARP:

UNDERSHERIFF B. G. BROADLUS advised that his office had no further information concerning suspect and that HAROLD CHANEY, who had furnished him with this information originally, had left town about two weeks ago, without advising what his address would be. BROADDUS indicated, however, that so far as he knew, this suspect was probably still at Garberville where he was alleged to be employed.

AT GARBERVILLE, CALIFORNIA.

On September 14, 1938, Special Agent THARP interviewed MISS STELLA THOMAS, Assistant Postmaster to whom photographs of subjects in this case were exhibited. She stated that she is on duty at the post office window at Carberville at all times, but to her knowledge, she has no recollection of having seen either of subjects in this case. She stated that the Eel River Cafe was operated by MR. AND MRS. T. A. VANDERVOORT, both of whom were very respectable people.

At the Eel River Cafe, Agent THARF contacted MR. J. A. VANDERVOORT to whom photographs of subjects in this case were exhibited particularly the photograph of subject COLE. VANDERVOORT advised that he had only one employee who had not been with him for a period of a year or more and who might possible be the man to whom agent had reference. He stated that this party was ELMOND A. BRIGGS who, he understood, came from Marshfield, Oregon.

Agent observed BRIGGS at work in the cafe during the course of his interview with MR. VANDERVOORT, at which time it was observed that he did not resemble COLE except that he had rather large openings in his nostrils which somewhat resembled the photograph of COLE which was widely published in the West Coast newspapers.

Agent openly interviewed EDMOND AA BRIGGS who advised that his home is at Marshfield, Oregon; that he is married and that his wife WILMA LOWE BRIGGS resides at Marshfield, Oregon. He stated that he was

born at New Meadows, Idaho on October 5, 1910; that he had been employed in said cafe since June 24, 1938, having previously resided at Eureka, California.

He stated that his father, WARREN I. BRIGGS, resides at Marshfield, Oregon and that the whereabouts of his mother, MRS. JESSIE HEWKINS, is unknown. He also advised that he has a brother, DONALD T. BRIGGS with the Manning Coffee Company in San Francisco, California.

The following description of BRIGGS was obtained by observation and interrogation:

In view of the appearance of suspect BRIGGS and the fact that he is six feet tall, it was not believed that he was identical with subject COLE, in view of which fact no further investigation was conducted and no further leads are being set out with reference thereto.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS

LOS ANGELES OFFICE

AT SAN PEDRO, CALIF., at Terminal Island, will interview Guard JOHN FRANCIS ROWAN, who was formerly assigned to Alcatraz Penitentiary. For the information of the Los Angeles office, Junior Officer WALTER F. PETERSON has advised that ROWAN at the time he was employed at Alcatraz had the confidence of the convicts. ROWAN should be interviewed for any information which he might have concerning the escape of ROE and COLE.

NEW YORK CITY OFFICE

AT NEW YORK CITY, will carry out the leads set forth in the report of Special Agent M. S. GURNEA, dated December 28, 1937, at San Francisco, it being noted that the correct address for MRS. SARAH BEST, BARNETT BEST, and ETTA BEST is 3425 Gates Place, Bronx, Apt., #3K.

PORTLAND OFFICE

AT TROUTDALE, OREGON, will interview JOHN ROE MACE, c/o ART BURNS, and secure from him any information he possesses concerning ROE and COLE. It is noted that MACE forwarded a letter to Warden JOHNSTON, requesting the descriptions and photographs of ROE and COLE.





In the absence of an agent near Odessa, Texas, the assistance of Captain EUGENE WELLS, F.B.I., National Police Academy graduate, who is in charge of the Texas. Highway Patrol covering Odessa, Texas, was secured.

He reported his investigation shows that HAZEL UNDERHILL and another girl stayed at the above address in Odessa for a week in July, 1938, but that their whereabouts are now unknown, and that the identity of the other girl is unknown.

Captain WELLS stated that he had made inquiry at 111 West Olive Street, Odessa, Texas, where he was informed that a person described as a "red head" and a "brunette" had occupied a cabin for approximately one week during July, subsequent to which they moved to an unknown destination.

AT ODESSA, TEXAS:

MRS. C. McENTYRE, Service Representative; Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, searched her records under UNDERHILL and CONNOR with negative results.

JAMES T. SMITH, Assistant Postmaster, checked the forwarding records at the Post Office, which showed that on August 22, 1938, a MRS. H. T. CLAYTON, 2346 South Quanah St., West Tulsa, Oklahoma, requested that a money order mailed to HAZEL CONNER, General Delivery, Odessa, Texas, be forwarded to her at General Delivery, Refugio, Texas. Also mentioned in the letter was one LAYONA CONNER, who was thought to be with HAZEL CONNER. Inquiry made at the General Delivery window resulted in negative information as to anyone who remembered giving mail for HAZEL CONNER of HAZEL UNDERHILL.

MRS. VIRGIE GIBSON, Gibson Cottages, informed Agent that two girls, one dark complexioned, the other a "tough looking red-head", had rented one of her cottages for one week about the second week in July, 1938. Her attention was drawn to these girls because of the fact that they remained outpractically all evening and had different, unknown men visit them at all hours of the night. The girls did not register when they rented the cabin, and MRS. GIBSON only knew that one was called HAZEL (the dark complexioned one) and the other MARGARET. She never heard the last names of these two girls. Nothing was known as to what kind of work they did while they were in Odessa, Texas. The day they left, which date was not exactly known, but guessed to be about the 10th or 15th of July, 1938, MRS. GIBSON went down to the cottage to clean it up, and outside of the door she found, and later destroyed, a card addressed to MARGARET, sent by CHAPLIE BRANNON,

Hobbs, New Mexico, on which was written something to the effect that BRANNON would be seeing them in Hobbs, New Mexico soon. This information was remembered by MRS. GIBSON, however, the last name of the addressee appearing on the card was forgotten. It is to be noted that, as mentioned above, no mail was remembered by the clerks at the Post Office to have been sent to a CONNOR or UNDERHILL, care of General Delivery. BRANNON was known to be a carpenter by MRS. GIBSON, and he stayed at her cottages for several weeks, having dated MARGARET while he was there.

MRS. ESTELLE KIMBALL, Gibson Cottages, who occupies a trailer-house, stated that the girls had informed her that they came to Odessa, Texas from East Texas. MRS. KIMBALL could not remember the description of the dark complexioned girl, however, the following description was given of the "red-headed girl":-

Name: MARGARET (last name unknown)

Age: 35 years Height: 5'2" Weight: 130;lbs.

Eyes: Thought to be blue.

Hair: Reddish blond.

Complexion: Fair Build: Stocky.

The above described girl and CHARLIE BRANNON were friends while they were at the camp. MRS. KIMBALL verified the statements of MRS. GIBSON as regards the late hours kept by the girls, and also their company. No further information concerning the two was known to MRS. KIMBALL.

DICK CHAPMAN, Police Department, stated that he knew both HAZEL CONNOR and MARVIN CONNOR, personally, and that the last time he saw them was about three months ago. He did not remember where it was, but stated that it might have been Monahans, because that is where he knew them. The HAZEL CONNOR referred to by CHAPMAN is not identical, to the wife of BOB CONNOR, former operator of the LaFonda Club at Odessa, Texas. It will be noted later that a person answering the same description as that of HAZEL CONNOR was being treated by a DR. McKISSICK, DDS., under the pretense of being the wife of BOB CONNOR.

LELAND F. PARKER, Investigator, Texas State Employment Service, checked his records for UNDERHILL, CONNOR and CONNER, with negative results.

DR. JAMES T. McKISSICK, D.D.S., stated that he was treating a woman who left him under the impression that she was BOB COMMOR'S wife, but that she left about three months ago, before he had completed the work on her teeth.

He described her as:

Name: HAZEL CONNOR
Age: 30 to 35 years

Weight: 125 lbs.
Height: 5 feet.
Hair: Red
Eyes: Gray

Build: Short and stocky

Complexion: Fair Color: White Sex: Female

Dress: Generally in black.
Nationality: Possibly part French.

Inquiry was made at the Sheriff's office of FISCHER POLLARD, regarding MARVIN CONNOR, however, due to the lack of complete cooperation of that agency, no mention was made of HAZEL UNDERHILL or HAZEL CONNOR. No formation was given concerning MARVIN CONNOR.

AT HOBBS, NEW MEXICO:

SAM GRAY, Postmaster, searched his records and made inquiry among the Postal employees concerning HAZEL UNDERHILL and HAZEL COMNOR, with negative results.

CONNIE CONNOR, New Mexico State Highway Patrolman, and Sam Young, Chief of Police, gave negative information regarding UNDERHILL.

Accompanied by CONNIE CONNOR, Agent eventually located CHARLES BRANNAN through LONNIE ELAM, Elam Lumber Company, who stated that BRANNAN formerly worked as a lath man through his company. ELAM stated that he knew BRANNAN only a short time and could not give any information regarding his character and family life, except that BRANNAN is married and has a child.

CHARLES BRANNAN informed Agent that he was in Odessa, Texas, for about three months, having gone there shortly after school left out in June, 1938 at which time he started working on the High School in Odessa, Texas, as a 12th man. About the first of July his daughter became very ill and had to be taken to the Northwest Hospital in Amarillo, Texas, which resulted in his leaving Odessa, Texas frequently, in order to visit his daughter in the hospital. He admitted living in the Gibson Cottages at the time the above mentioned girls lived there, however, he positively denied any personal association or acquaintance with them. The only incident which he remembered in connection with the two girls was that one night an intoxicated person, thought to be an elderly man, drove up in an automobile and began annoying

the occupants of the Cottages with inquiries regarding the location of "MARGARET". He remembered the owner of the Cottages waking him and requesting him to be ready for an emergency in the event any trouble was had with the man. BRANNAN was informed of the fact that a card was found outside of the girls' cabin, but he insisted that he did not send the card, adding that he was not in Hobbs, New Mexico, around July 15, 1938. He returned to Hobbs, New Mexico about August 15, 1938, which fact was substantieted from the records of the Retail Merchants Association, PAUL S. BROWN, Manager, checking the records. When asked about having had dates with "MARGARET", he insisted that he knew no one by that name or by the name of HAZEL, while living at the Cottages. He also stated that he had to work hard and save his money so that his daughter, æge eighteen, could receive hospitalization, and furthermore, his reputation would substantiate the fact that he did "not run around with other women". No one could be found in Hobbs, New Mexico, who could give any information regarding his reputation, except that he was a hard worker.

Reference telegrams from the Oklahoma City Office, dated September 29, 1938, instructed that investigation to locate HAZEL UNDERWOOD be discontinued.

Reference report of Special Agent Z. J. VANLANDINGHAM, Kansas City, September 7, 1938, sets out a lead for the El Paso Office to note the change of address of JAMES ROE from Hobbs, New Mexico, to Box 1478, Odesse, Texas.

This new address was noted and, by letter of September 12, 1938, the Postmaster at Odessa was requested to place a mail cover on the mail of that address until further notice. Addresses and mail tracings received as a result are being forwarded to the Oklahoma City office by letter.

He does not know anything about the purchasing of tidal and current charts of San Francisco Bay and Pacific Ocean and states that he went through Portland, Oregon, at 8:00 o'clock in the morning, not stopping at any place in Portland. He advised that he had been in the road construction business in Tacoma since 1923 and that he is the owner of the Walker Construction Company.

From Agent's personal observation, WALKER is described as follows:

At Seattle, Washington

Agent attempted to contact MR. RODGER/HILIMAN at his home at 3720 Fuhrmen Avenue but he was not at home at the time Agent called. At Agent's request his wife had him call at the Seattle Field Office where he was interviewed. He advised that he purchased the oil screw LONA LEE in San Francisco in December of 1937. He purchased this boat through a broker named GEORGE PITT. The boat formerly belonged to a MISS SATERFIELD and he believed that the boat was seized by the Government and sold at a Marshal's sale. He admitted that he was in a hurry to leave San Francisco and San Francisco Bay, the reason for this hurry being that he wanted to be in Seattle with his family for Christmas. He stated that when he left San Francisco there was some doubt in his mind whether he would be able to be in Seattle and he planned to stop at Astoria and take a bus to Seattle if he could not be there in time by going by boat. He stated that the boat arrived in Seattle on December 24.

This boat was purchased by him to be used in the fishing business. When he found that it would be impossible for him to use the boat in that business and still live in Seattle he sold the boat. He advised that also on this boat there were two others besides himself forming the crew. One individual was named HEDRICKS, who is a licensed engineer and used to live in Seattle. He thinks that HEDRICKS at the present time is in Alaska. The other individual he knew as "SHORTY" and believes that his last name was NELSON but he is not sure of this. He does not know anything about SHORTY'S whereabouts at the present time. He was also unable to furnish HEDRICK'S first name.

He stated that the only moving of the ship while it was in San Francisco Bay was from the Madden Shipyards at Sausalito to the Shell Oil Company and back. He stated that while in California he and the members of his crew lived at the best hotel in Sausalito, the name of which he does not remember. He saw nothing of the escapees and knows nothing about their escape.

It is noted that MR. HILIMAN is at the present time in the used car business in Seattle. He does not have a lot of his own but locates used cars and sells them to used car dealers.

He stated that he had previously been approached by some Government official in connection with this trip in that they thought he might have something to do with taking oil from San Francisco and smuggling it somewhere else. It would seem, therefore, that the Customs Officials in San Francisco have been unduly alarmed over the departure of the IONA LEE from San Francisco and have reported it to two or three different sources so that its departure might be investigated. However, it is being left to the discretion of the San Francisco Field Office as to whether a further check of the story as told by MR. HILIMAN should be made. If this check is desired the San Francisco Office should obtain the shipping articles of the IONA LEE and secure the names of the crew members so that they may be located and interviewed.

At Rochester, Washington

MR. PEYTON B. HOOVER, Postmaster, advised that he knew no one by the name of C. A. GARRISON; that there was no one living in that community so far as he knew by the name of C. A. or JACK GARRISON; however, he would make inquiry of the Rural Route carrier to see if it was possible that this individual lived on a rural route there. The Seattle Field Office later received a card from MR. HOOVER in which he stated that GARRISON was not known to the rural route carrier. A lead is therefore being set out to the Portland Field Office to again check at Ashand, Oregon, to determine the whereabouts of C. A. GARRISON.

The Seattle Field Office is in receipt of a letter from Chief Constable W. W. FOSTER of Vancouver, B. C., in which he advises that JACK SIEMAN, formerly Alcatraz #177A2, is now living at the Castle Hotel in Vancouver, B. C. and is believed making his living as a professional gambler.

Mr. Fletcher said that his previous information was that Farmer was operating a liquor house near Dallas, Texas. Therefore, Neal's information should be checked to ascertain if he is giving the Bureau "the run around".

This lead was for the purpose of interviewing D. W. LONGACRE. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent in Charge H. E. ANDERSEN, Butte, Montana, dated January 13, 1938, particularly to Page 6 thereof, wherein it is stated that information had been received from Sheriff FRANK KENNEDY at Weiser, Idaho, on September 21, 1937, to the effect that D. W. LONGACRE had left Weiser, Idaho, and had requested his mail to be forwarded to him at Brookings, Oregon. A teletype was forwarded from the Butte Field Division to the Portland Office on December 31, 1937, requesting investigation of LONGACRE at Brookings, Oregon.

did not know where MARIE COLE stayed when she was in Springfield, Missouri and also that he was not acquainted with THEODORE COLE, husband of MARIE COLE. The photograph of THEODORE COLE was exhibited to Mr. HARRIS and he stated that insofar as he could recall, he had never seen this man. Mr. HARRIS advised that his niece, CARMEL HARRIS, who also worked in this restaurant, was well acquainted with MARIE COLE and could possibly furnish information concerning her.

CARNEL HARRIS was interviewed at the restaurant and advised that she has known MARIE COLE for a number of years and had gone to grade school with her. Miss HARRIS stated that she was never on particularly intimate terms with MARIE COLE, indemuch as MARIE was a prostitute and she did not want to have anything to do with anyone of that character, but that whenever MARTE COLE was in Springfield, she usually ate at this restaurant. Miss HARRIS stated that MARIE COLE had never mentioned THEODORE COLE to her and that she had not questioned her concerning him, but that MARIE had at one time mentioned to her the fact that she had been merried when she was sixteen years of age. Miss HARRIS stated that MARIE COLE talked freely to her and that the next time MARIE was in the restaurant, she would casually inquire of her as to THEODORE COLE and advise the writer as to any information she might obtain. The photograph of THEODORE COLE was exhibited to Miss HARRIS, who advised that this person was unfamiliar to her.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

The KANSAS CITY FIELD DIVISION at Springfield, Missouri, will keep in contact with CARMEL HARRIS for any information she may be able to ascertain from MARIE COLE.

* At Pittsburg, Kansas, will interview Mrs. JOHN (NORINE) SCHULTZ, 204 East Seventh Street, bearing in mind that Mrs. SCHULTZ is a sister-in-law of THEODORE COLE. It is also noted that COLE at one time is alleged to have lived in Pittsburg, Kensas, and that his wife, MARIE COLE, is alleged to have practiced prostitution in Pittsburg, Kansas.

^{*} At Liberal, Kansas, will interview C. L. LUILLER

for any information he might have regarding this case, it being noted that he was corresponding with Mr. and Mrs. G. L. DAWSON of Bell, California, in December of 1937. Mrs. DAWSON is a half-sister of fugitive COLE.

At Hays, Kansas, will continue to maintain contact with RAYMOND ROE, brother of RALPH ROE. RAYMOND ROE may be reached by telephone at Hays, Kansas, #155.

* At Neosho, Missouri, will interview Mr. and Mrs. R. E. DAVIS, Route #2, the parents of Volney DAVIS. It will be noted that VOLNEY DAVIS is presently at Alcatraz and, after the escape of the fugitives in this case, there was found in some of their effects the name and address of VOLNEY DAVIS' sister, who is living at Joplin, Missouri.

* At Kansas City, Missouri, will interview Mr. JAMES CAYLOR of the Alcohol Tax Unit with reference to his visits to see JAMES ROE at the Leavenworth Penitentiary on June 16 and 17, 1936. He should be interviewed to determine if he has any information which might be of value to the investigation looking towards the apprehension of JAMES ROE'S brother, RALPH ROE.

GEORGE S. THOMPSON, colored Spanish War Veteran, who resides two miles west of Apache Junction on U. S. Highway 80, and who receives his mail at 37 South Second Street, Phoenix, Arizona, was interviewed in the office of the Resident Agent, Room 4, Post Office Building, Phoenix, and stated that about ten days before he wrote to Warden JOHNSTON at Alcatraz, and about four or five days after subjects' escape, a new black-colored model A Ford Roadster was abandoned at the edge of the highway in front of THOMPSON'S home; that he first saw the car late Friday afternoon about 5:00 o'clock and thought someone had broken down and had gone to get help; that on the following Sunday he noted the car was still at the same place. He notified the Sheriff at Florence, Arizona, and Deputy Sheriff SAM WESTERMAN came out and examined the car and then had THOMPSON take the car to his home for safe keeping. The car remained at his place until the following Sunday, when a highway patrolman came out from Mesa and got the car.

THOMPSON stated that the car had a Winfield Super-Charger head and two carburetors, one of which was a Winfield; that the car had blown a cylinder gas-ket and all the oil was gone; that some time later, while THOMPSON was in the Ford Garage & Sales Room at Mes, Arizona, a man employed at that place was talking to him about the car and stated that the parties driving this car had stopped at that garage one afternoon to get some work done but did not want to wait.

THOMPSON further stated that the car had no license tags and had five wire wheels with big tires which were too big for the fender wells. In the car was found a sailor's suit and sailor's cap, two bathing suits, shirt or blouse of another sailor suit, about half of a paper sack of black beans (estimated at about two and one-half pounds), five or six slices of bread, two pieces of bacon rind about one inch wide and four or five inches long, one quart can and one pint can of black paint from Montgomery Ward & Company, and an old greasy brown or tan shirt, the paint and shirt being at THOMPSON'S home at the present time.

THOMPSON further stated that the car had an extra good battery; that the officers seemed unable to find any numbers on the car but stated they had ways to bring out the numbers. THOMPSON questioned all parties in the immediate vicinity of the place where the car was abandoned but found no one who knew anything about the car, except EDDIE DEHART, who resides at the county line on Highway 80. DEHART advised that he saw the car at about 5:00 P. M., Friday, but saw no one around it at that time; that early Saturday morning he saw a young fellow get out of the car and walk down the road as though he was a hitchhiker who had slept there overnight. In his inquiries, THOMPSON heard through someone that that party (name not recalled) had seen a gasoline can in the ditch a short distance from the place where the car was abandoned but did not bother it as it was assumed the can belonged with the car.

Inquiry of HARRY HOOPER, National Automobile Theft Bureau, Phoenix, disclosed he had no information concerning the recovery of any car fitting the description of the car mentioned by THOMPSON.

Reference is made to letter from the Oklahoma City Division dated February 15, 1938 (L. A. Serial 125), wherein it is noted that JAMES HUGH BUTCHER, Alcatraz #287, who was given a conditional release on October 9, 1936, had a note in his possession reading as follows: "JESS/HILL, Lakewood, Calif., c/o TED/COLE'S mother."

The file reflects no investigation conducted with regard to JESS HILL, although a FIOYDWHILL was mentioned in report of Special Agent A. D. Horn, Ios Angeles, dated February 12, 1938. A lead is being set out to recontact MR. & MRS. FRED COLE at Lakewood, California, in this regard. They previously had been questioned regarding BUTCHER, but up to December 31, 1937, he had not contacted them. With reference to Ios Angeles letter to Kansas City dated December 31, 1937, BUTCHER was later interviewed by agents of the Bureau.

Reference is made to the investigation regarding SEEDELL "SLEEPY"
JOHNSON, who, it was reported by informant "N" of the Oklahoma City Division,
was going to Bakersfield, California, from Seminole, Oklahoma, to help ROE
escape. JOHNSON was a former associate of WILBURTUNDERHILL and RAIPH ROE. It
was later reported that JOHNSON went to Waddell, Arizona, but investigation to
locate him there was negative.

In the report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, Oklahoma City, dated February 21, 1938 (L. A. Serial 135), the informant stated that SEEDELL JOHNSON had been in Los Angeles, California, and that he had been in jail in Bakersfield, California, but that he expected to go to Phoenix, Arizona, where his mother and brother, LON JOHNSON, were residing. The report states that WILBUR UNDERHILL was harbored and protected at the home of "SLEEPY" and LON JOHNSON, and at the home of their mother, MRS A JOHNSON, who was at that time residing near Oklahoma City. It was reported that "SLEEPY" JOHNSON visited the house in which UNDERHILL and ROE were secreted just a short time before their apprehension. The following description of SEEDELL JOHNSON was obtained:-

Name SEEDELL "SLEEPY" JOHNSON 29 (1938) Age Height 6 feet Weight 139 lbs. Hair Medium brown Eyes Hazel Complexion Medium Scars and marks Scar at extreme right forehead in hair; Irregular burn scar at elbow, front.

The file did not reflect that a criminal record on this individual has ever been obtained from the Bureau, and same is being requested by the Los Angeles office.

Reference is made to Oklahoma City letter to the Bureau dated March 1938, wherein informant "N" stated that an oil field worker, a personal friend of hers, had recently returned from Bakersfield, California, and advised her that the JOHNSON family was residing one and one-half miles northwest of Bakersfield. This oil field worker is reported to have stated that from conversation with the JOHNSONS he believed ROE and COIE were still in circulation. She advised that her informant had indicated that the JOHNSON boys were very busy and were making repeated trips from Bakersfield but that they did not disclose to him the purpose of these trips or the racket in which they were engaged. It was the intention of the informant to come to Bakersfield to help locate the JOHNSON family, but later developments made this impossible. Later information from the Oklahoma City office, as reflected in Okahoma City letter to the Bureau dated March 15, 1938 (L. A. Serial 146), indicated that this informant "N" was probably not reliable and that she now had information that the JOHNSON boys were in Kansas City and would be in Seminole, Oklahoma, in a few days. Further information has not been received. However, in view of the information regarding the JOHNSON boys and their association with RALPH ROE and other criminals, it is believed desirable to endeavor to locate them at Bakersfield. California. if possible.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent C. O. Hurt, Oklahoma City, dated June 17, 1938 (L. A.Serial 163), which shows an additional contact with the informant, who apparently was MRS. RUTH CRAWFORD. She advised that she had not had any more information from "SLEEPY" or LON JOHNSON, but that she had heard from her husband, W. C. CRAWFORD, Courtland, California, that LAWRENCE JOHNSON, a brother of LON and "SLEEPY" JOHNSON, had killed a man in California. She advised that her husband, however, had departed from Courtland. Courtland is in Sacramento County in the San Francisco Division territory.

Attention is called to reference report of Special Agent R. N. Pranke, Ios Angeles, dated June 10, 1938 (L. A. Serial 162), which indicates that the police records at Bakersfield, California, were checked for any arrest concerning SEEDELL JOHNSON, with negative results. It was believed possible that JOHNSON was arrested for drunkenness and therefore not fingerprinted.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent W. E. Listerman, Kansas City, dated January 24, 1938 (L. A. Serial 119), wherein is set out a correspondence list of ROSS W_MOORE, U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, #39319, who had served time at Alcatraz with the subjects in this case, and who finally was transferred to Leavenworth and released from there on November 21, 1937, and furnished transportation to Los Angeles, California. His correspondence list indicates the following relatives and other correspondents:-

MRS. ESTHER MOORE, wife, 2407 Meadowvale Avenue, Los Angeles, California.

CORLEY HEARD, friend, 928 Grand Vista, Los Angeles, California.
MRS. GOLDMAN, friend, 145 North Broadway, Los Angeles, California.

The file reflected that RUTH ESTHER MOORE, wife of ROSS W. MOORE, formerly gave her address as 2103 L Street, Bakersfield, California, but that address apparently is a Negro house of prostitution. MOORE is described as follows:-

ROSS W. MOORE Name 57 years Age Height 51 9" Weight 155 lbs. Build Medium Hair Grey Eyes Blue Ruddy Complexion Scars & marks

Rag cut scar palm left hand; tattoo, initials "D-7" outside left hand.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent Carl J. Martin, Buffalo, New York, dated February 9, 1938 (L. A. Serial 122), wherein it is stated that a confidential informant of a police officer in Buffalo had advised him that persons who were believed to have been related to subject THEODORE COLE formerly resided in Buffalo, and moved to 1240 Havenhurst, Hollywood, California. The names of these parties were furnished as EDWARD and BENJAMIN PISTELL or FITTESEL, and were supposed to be father and son. The post office records in Buffalo reflected a forwarding address for VIOLAPISTELL, dated November 9, 1935, indicating a change of address to 1240 Havenhurst, Hollywood, California.

A lead is being set out to determine whether these individuals are related to TED COLE. A lead is also being set out to reinterview WILLIAM B. MCCLURE, Bell Auto Top Shop, 6234 Gifford, Bell, California, who is situated next door to COLE'S half-sister, MISS VIOIA DAWSON, 6238 Gifford Avenue, Bell.

Reference is made to letter from the Oklahoma City Division dated January 17, 1938 (Serial 114), regarding CHARLES C. HAMBLEN. The name of this individual was mentioned in connection with the checking of the automobiles going through the California Border Checking Station about the date of the instant escape. Investigation in North Dakota reflected that HAMBLEN is presently

receiving mail at 5568 East Cage (Gage) Street, Bell, California, care of MH. GEORGE CONEVEST. The office of origin suggested that in view of the fact that COLE'S half sister also resides in Bell, California, investigation should be conducted to ascertain if there is any possible connection.

In the same letter is mentioned ANDREW SAMPSON and LORRAINE HOLLAND who also drove through the California Border Checking Station about the date of the escape. In report of Special Agent R. P. Kramer, Los Angeles, dated January 8, 1938 (Serial 101), on page 9, it is stated that SAMPSON could be reached at 7000 Sherman Way, Bell, California. The office of origin also requested investigation for this reason.

Reference is also made to the above mentioned report of Special Agent Kramer wherein, on page 2, the Postmaster at Woodlake, California, EDITH DAY, stated that she suspected that MRS. FRED COLE was dispatching her mail from some other point, inasmuch as she had deposited no mail in the Woodlake Post Office. In view of this, when MRS. COLE is interviewed she should be questioned in this regard, as she may have an alternate mailing address.

Leads are being set out to generally reinterview ESTHER COLE, the mother of TED COLE, and FRED COLE, the stepfather of TED COLE but no blood relation. In this connection, they should be questioned regarding JIM and RUTH BARKER of Childress, Texas, as TED COLE sent JIM BARKER money while BARKER was incarcerated in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, and BARKER in turn harbored COLE after his escape from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary in 1934. BARKER is reported to be a relative of COLE.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent R. N. Pranke, Ios Angeles, dated December 22, 1937 (Serial 24), wherein on page 2 it is reported that a prostitute by the name of MARIEABIACKWELL, who was then residing at Winslow, Arizona, corresponded with RAIPH ROE while he was incarcerated at Muskogee, Oklahoma. Subsequent investigation failed to locate this individual, and the Bureau is being requested to search its criminal indexes, in view of the occupation of the woman, for any possible trace of her in order that she may be interviewed with regard to ROE.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent R. P. Kramer, Los Angeles, dated December 27, 1937 (Serial 64), wherein on page 22 is set out an interview with MRS. JAMES (FAE) ROE, who is a sister—in—law of RALPH ROE, having married JAMES ROE from whom she presently is separated. She resides at 58 St. Joseph Street, Arcadia, California, and a mail cover has been maintained on her address. She received a postcard on August 10, 1938, from Palos, Texas, signed CATHERINE, reading: "Almost got lit in Villa Acuna. Ha Ha. Had lots of fun. Plenty hot though. Love, CATHERINE. P.S. Guess we'll see BLACKIE next week." Another postcard dated August 13, 1938, postmarked Colorado Springs, Colorado, reads as

follows: "Awful tired but have seen it all, even Villa Acuna Mex. Enjoyed our stay in Carlsbad. Stayed in Pueblo Colo last nite. On our way for Okla & Ark to-morrow", signed "CATHERINE."

A letter was also received by MRS. FAE ROE from MRS. C. P. KERENISY (?), 312 Jamestowne (?), Tulsa, Oklahoma. However, it is pointed out that FAE ROE claims she had seen RAIPH ROE only on one occasion, and that she disliked him.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent M. E. Gurnea, San Francisco, dated December 28, 1937 (Serial 81), wherein a lead is set out for the Los Angeles office to check the arrest of RAIPH ROE at Pomona, California, on April 28, 1923. The file reflects that this has not been done; therefore, a lead is being set out herein.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent H. A. King, Portland, dated January 8, 1938 (Serial 109), wherein a lead is set out for the Los Angeles office to interview E. D. MANIEISON, 6419 Tenth Street, Ios Angeles, owner of 1938 Ford Coupe bearing 1938 Oregon license 50035. This investigation is in connection with the cars passing through the California Border Checking Station at about the time of the instant escape. A lead is being set out herein to interview this party, inasmuch as the file does not reflect that same has been done.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent Daniel Currie, Jr., Seattle, dated January 7, 1938 (Serial 110), setting out leads for the Los Angeles office, to conduct investigation with regard to DR. REGINALD FISHLEIGH and MR. WELLS WINN; also to contact HAROLD KRAIGER, 4946 Sullivan Drive, Los Angeles; at Long Beach, California, to interview WILLIAM TERGONING through HUGH M. WIHOMRSON, 1023 East First Street; at San Diego, California, to interview HARRY TO REDICK, 4476 Oregon Street; and at San Pedro, California, to contact FRANK BARCOTT, JR., 325 West 15th Street. These leads were all set out to contact these individuals to determine whether they were the individuals purchasing the tides booklet at Portland, Oregon, just prior to the date of instant escape.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent Daniel Currie, Jr., Seattle, dated January 21, 1938 (Serial 116). Leads are there set out to interview ADELAIDE PICKLES and FRED JW WOODS at Pasadena, California; MRS. ROBERT C. PHILLIPSON at La Jolla, California; VICTOR LA OVERTON at Long Beach, California; and ROBERT E BOGGS at Los Angeles. These contacts are also in regard to the tides charts purchased at Portland, Oregon.

Attention is called to the letter from the San Francisco Division dated January 6, 1938, wherein are listed the license numbers of automobiles which entered California from Oregon on December 15 and 16, 1937, and the individuals to whom these licenses are registered in the Los Angeles Division. A lead is being set out to contact these individuals for purposes of making inquiry regarding the purchase of tides charts at Portland, Oregon.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent R. P. Kramer, Los Angeles, dated January 8, 1938, which contains undeveloped leads for the Los Angeles Division. The leads which have not been covered in this report are being set out herein.

Reference is made to page 21 of the above report of Agent Kramer regarding JOEAROBERTS, Douglas Airplane Plant, Santa Monica, California, who was a correspondent of JOSEPH WARDE, U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas. Investigation at the Douglas Aircraft Corporation, Santa Monica, failed to locate this individual.

CHARLES BRENDON/BOOTH was interviewed at the offices of the Volunteers of America, 420 Cotton Exchange Building, Ios Angeles, California. He advised that the name of BOB PRINGLE merely recalled a name or "case" which he handled while in Kansas City. He was unable to recall any other details but advised that if PRINGLE was incarcerated in Leavenworth Penitentiary he probably was paroled to the Volunteers of America, and the Kansas City files of that organization would reveal further information. He was unable to add anything further to the above. The Kansas City Division is being requested to check these records.

Reference is made to report of Special Agent K. P. Pettijohn, San Francisco, dated August 22, 1938, concerning information furnished by one DAVE SILIS, Rio Linde, California, to the effect that subjects ROE and COLE presently were in the vicinity of Visalia, California. The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent Daniel Currie, Jr., at Visalia, California, on September 13, 1938:-

Sheriff S. B. SHERMAN, Tulare County Sheriff's Office, Visalia, upon being contacted, advised that he had seen no one in the vicinity who resembled subjects, nor could he recall having heard any rumor regarding the subjects.

Accompanied by Sheriff SHERMAN, MR. J. C. YORK of Woodlake, California, a neighbor of MRS. FRED COLE, mother of subject COLE, was interviewed, at which time MR. YORK stated he had seen nothing whatsoever indicating that fugitives were residing at the COLE ranch. At this time MR. YORK stated he was quite positive that both subjects had been drowned.

MR. YORK promised that he would immediately notify the Los Angeles Field Division in the event he saw anyone around the COLE residence who he thought in any way resembled either of the subjects, whose photographs were exhibited to him.

MRS. FRED COLE, Woodlake, California, upon interview, stated that she had nothing whatsoever to add to information previously furnished, and that she still remains of the opinion that her son, subject COLE, is dead.

MRS. COLE stated that in her correspondence with other members of the family, the name of the subject is never mentioned, and she would not, therefore, have any idea as to their opinions.

Postmaster NATHAN LEVY, Visalia Post Office, exhibited photographs of subjects to General Delivery Clerks and other employees in the Post Office, subsequent to which time he advised that in the opinion of his employees neither of the subjects had been in the vicinity of Visalia. Postmaster LEVY advised at this time that his clerks were particularly interested in the Identification Orders sent out by this Bureau, and it is his thought that they would readily identify anyone who resembled the subjects.

Constable R. R. ABBOTT, Visalia, California, and Officer JACK BROWN of the Visalia Police Department, stated that they had not seen or heard anything which would indicate that subjects were in the vicinity of Visalia.

Constable G. E. TRULL of Lindsay, California, was interviewed at the Tulare County Court House, Visalia, at which time he stated that he had worked with Bureau agents in connection with a plant maintained on the home of MRS.

MORRIS, an aunt of subject COLE, and that by virtue of that fact he was not only familiar with their descriptions but also their contacts in Tulare County. Constable TRULL stated that he had seen MRS. MORRIS on frequent occasions, both at her home and down town in Lindsay, and at no time had he received any indication that she was in contact with subject COLE. Furthermore, Constable TRULL pointed out that one MRS. MORRIS, was an informant who was keeping very close watch of the parties contacting MRS. MORRIS, and this informant had recently advised him that he had noted nothing suspicious.

The following investigation was conducted at McFarland, California, under date of September 15, 1938, by Special Agent Daniel Currie, Jr.:-

Deputy Sheriff J. E. DEIANEY advised that the informant aforementioned in the report of Special Agent R. N. Pranke, Ios Angeles, dated June 10, 1938, who had recently stated to him that he had information concerning subjects in this case, also subjects! families, had not yet returned to McFarland, California, but that it was expected he would be in McFarland within the next thirty days.

On September 1st, 1938, W. A. ADAMS, Acting Captain, Fire Department, 1715 West Florence Avenue, telephoned the Los Angeles Division and advised SAC HANSON that he had some information concerning Fugitives RALPH ROE adTHEODORE COIE.

He was interviewed by Special Agent 4. D. HORN and advised that he resides at 525 West 118th St., telephone Pleasant 7053; that his home is in an isolated and thinly populated district; that on August 16, 1938, the date he recalls as it was the day his father died, he got up around 6:30 A. M., and he and his family saw a car parked across the street; that this car was a 1937 brown Oldsmobile Sedan bearing Michigan license, mumber of which he took down and believes he has in his house somewhere, but to date has been unable to find it; that his wife and daughter, age 19 years, also saw the car and the three of them suspected that the car possibly had been stolen and abandoned there. He advised that after breakfast at about 7:30 A. Me, he went over to the car and saw a man lying in the front seat sleeping; that he yelled at the man, but he did not move; that he went around to the other side and knocked on the window; that the man woke up and immediately put his right hand beneath his coat as if he were going to draw a gun; that he, ADAMS, asked the man if he were sick and he rolled the window glass down and asked him what he said; that he. ADAMS, repeated his question, to which the man answered, "No" and then asked what time it was; that during the conversation that followed the man advised he had just arrived in town the night before, had gone to see some friends who could not accommodate him, and then drove out there to sleep the balance of the night; that he had just come from Cleveland, Ohio, and times were pretty tough there; that ADAMS asked him how he came to come out to California and the man replied he had heard a lot about Yosemite; that he talked about having driven across the deserte ADAMS stated that the car was very dusty and the man was apparently badly in need of sleep; that the man said he came through Daggett and San Bernardino, California, and asked the way to Tia Juana, Mexico: that the man took deep breaths and remarked several timesthat it was sure fine to get out in the wide open spaces ADAMS stated that as he walked around the car he noticed the license plates were scratched and marred considerably close to the screws with which they were fastened on. He stated that on this date he was reading the Official Detective Story Magazine dated March 30, 1938, and saw the photograph of RALPH ROE, which he immediately recognized. He advised that he is as positive in the identification of the photograph of RALPH ROE and this man who was asleep in the above described car as he can be. He statedthat the man looked just like the photograph appeare ing in the magazine and on I. O. No. 1472, which was exhibited to him by Agent, but thinner. He stated that he looks more like the I. O. photograph than he looks like the photograph of Oklahoma Police Departs ment No. 15589, also exhibited to him by Agent.

ADAMS stated that this man was alone and had a small black rectangular suitcase on the back seat; that after the above conversation he, ADAMS, started walking back to the house and the man drove away, going south on Figueros Street.

ADAMS stated he would telephone the Los Angeles Division and advise the license number on the car if he can possibly find same.

COLE should be vigorously interviewed in regard to any alternate mailing address she may have in view of the information set out above received from the Postmaster to the effect that MRS. COLE had been depositing no mail there.

AT BAKERSFIELD, CALIFORNIA, will endeavor to develop additional information regarding SEEDELL "SLEEPY" JOHNSON, who is reported to be residing with his mother and brother, LON JOHNSON, one and a half miles northwest of Bakersfield.

AT IOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA, will conduct investigation in regard to ROSS W. MOORE, whose wife's address was 2407 Meadowvale, Ios Angeles. Other correspondents are set out on Page 5 of this report. MOORE was an inmate at Alcatraz at the same time as ROE and COIE.

AT IOS ANGELES, will locate EDWARD and BENJAMIN PISTELL, 1240 Haven-hurst, Hollywood, to ascertain if they are related to TED COIE. See Page 5 of this report.

AT LOS ANGELES, will interview E. D. DANIEISON, 6419 Tenth Street, and question him with regard to the purchase of any tide charts at Portland.

Will conduct investigation in the Los Angeles district regarding the cars listed in letter from the San Francisco Division dated January 6, 1938 (Serial 99), in regard to the purchase of any tide charts.

AT BELL, CALIFORNIA, will interview WILLIAM B. McCLURE, Bell Auto Top Shop, 6234 Gifford, for any observations he may have made of the residence of VIOLA DAWSON, half sister of TED COLE. Will reinterview VIOLA DAWSON, 6238 Gifford Avenue, for any information she may have received regarding TED COLE.

AT BELL, will conduct investigation regarding CHARLES C. HAMBLEN, 5568 East Cage (Gage) Street, Bell, for any connection between him and TED COLE'S sister. See Page 5 of this report.

Will determine whether ANDREW SAMPSON and LORRAINE HOLLAND have any connection with TED COLE'S half sister. See Page 6 of this report.

AT IOS ANGELES, will determine whether PAUL STULGES, 413 East Seventh Street, is identical with subject COLE.

presented the letter which he stated was in response to the message above referred to, which letter is hereinafter set out:

"Sorry I didn't get your word before I left here.
Got your word 0. K. that you left here. At this
time you couldn't make no deal on cattle in Mexico.
But in three or four weeks the prices will be better.
The folks have been in Arkansas and Illinois for the
past two or three weeks. You should be able to find
out about those places from the people you know. You
know where the farm is in the valley. I am going
back to Mexico in a day or two. Would like to talk
to you, could tell you more about the places than I
can write. The weather is pretty hot here at this
time _______looking to hear from you or see you
soon."

stated that his interpretation of the above letter is that ROE and COLE were absent from that country when he was there and had been gone for two or three weeks; that they had been in Illinois and Arkansas and would be back in three or four weeks and that the farm mentioned was an isolated place where UNDERHILL, ROE, et al stayed and received protection while UNDERHILL (deceased) was avoiding the law; that the reference to the weather being hot indicated the law was giving the writer trouble.

Both the writer and Agent HOFFMAN questioned in an endeavor to have him divulge some information of a definite nature. However, he remained evasive and noncommittal on all issues and impressed both Agents that his line of endeavor is a premeditated scheme to "chisel" them and obtain a liberal donation for his expenses from the Government.

Reference Bureau letter dated Sentember 27, 1938, however, advised that the Bureau did not desire that be furnished any further money to act as an informant in this case, but that he should be informed in the event he furnished information to an Agent of this Bureau resulting in the apprehension of either ROE or COLE, he would be paid a sum of money.

On October 6, 1938, the writer and Special Agent RALPH T. HOOD contacted at his home in at which time he stated he did not possess any further information concerning ROE and COLE other than that previously furnished. He was advised that the Bureau could not furnish him any money to make a trip to Texas at this time to contact HAZEL UNDERHILL, but that should he furnish any information to an Agent

of this Bureau resulting in the apprehension of either ROE or COLE, he would be paid a suitable amount of money. Informed Agents that he planned to leave in the immediate future as he was breaking his partnership arrangements with Mrs. GUSSIE THOMPSON and he expected to proceed to southern Texas in an effort to obtain employment. He further informed Agents that if he proceeded to Texas, he would attempt to discover some information concerning the whereabouts of ROE and COLE and should he obtain seme, would immediately communicate with the writer or Agent HOOD. However, he intimated that unless he was furnished some money by the Bureau that he would make no effort to obtain such information.

Referring to letter of reference dated September 24, 1938 to the Bureau with particular reference to informant mentioned therein, that informant will hereafter be referred to as informant No. 13 for reference purposes.

After contact with confidential informant, as reflected in a letter from this office to the Bureau dated September 24, 1938, who hereinafter will be referred to as informant No. 13 concerning an attempt by this informant to contact HAZEL UNDERHILL in an effort to obtain information, the Dallas and El Paso Divisions were requested to check at Levelland and Odessa, Texas in an effort to obtain the definite whereabouts of HAZEL UNDERHILL. By teletype dated September 28, 1938, the Dallas Office advised that HAZEL UNDERHILL could possibly be located at Refugio, Texas. This information was furnished to the San Antonio Office who advised by telegram dated October 1, 1938 that HAZEL UNDERHILL was residing at Refugio, Texas with O. C. HALES, Field Superintendent, Morgan Oil Company, where

HAZEL UNDERHILL was reported to reside in a cottage just north of the school and to be receiving mail General Delivery, Refugio, Texas.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent RALPH T. HOOD and the writer:

AT SEMINOLE, OKLAHOMA

On October 3, 1938, these Agents were advised through Chief of Police JAKE SIMS that he had received information to the effect that HAZEL UNDERHILL had recently been and was probably then at Seminole, Oklahoma; that her ex-husband, CONNORS, lives in Seminole at the home of a man named JOE HENDERSON; that informant 13 had received information from a man who stated that his wife sew HAZEL UNDERHILL at the home of JOE HENDERSON on September 28, 1938.

JAKE SIMS stated that he, on receiving this information, visited the premises of the HENDERSON home under a proper pretext and did not observe either HAZEL UNDERHILL or CONNORS on the premises; that he did observe a 1956 Buick Sedan, bearing 1938 Oklahoma license 527-217. He advised that he had checked the records of the Motor Vehicle Division concerning this automobile and discovered same registered to C. A. MOBLEY, Kaw City, Oklahoma.

Contact was made with Informent 13 who confirmed statements of Chief SIMS. He further advised that he was talking with a friend, an oil field worker, who claimed that both he and his wife personally know HAZEL UNDERHILL; that this friend voluntarily told him that his wife saw HAZEL UNDERHILL at the home of JOE HENDERSON, at which place CONNORS, her ex-husband, resides, stating that she personally knows HAZEL UNDERHILL and that there was no question as to her being there on September 28, 1938.

At the suggestion of these Agents, Informant 13 promised to recontact his source of information with respect to HAZEL UNDERHILL'S being in that vicinity. He later reported that he did recontact this oil field worker who again reiterated his previous statement concerning his wife's seeing HAZEL UNDERHILL; that he subsequently talked to this informant's wife who reiterated her previous statement that she had seen HAZEL UNDERHILL on September 28th at the home of JOE HENDERSON.

Informant 13 stated that he visited and talked with JOE HENDERSON at his home, but did not observe anyone else on the premises; that HENDERSON mentioned that CONNORS was away. Informant 13 stated that he told HENDERSON that he was very anxious to get in touch with HAZEL UNDERHILL as he had some important information for her; that HENDERSON stated that he did not know the address of HAZEL UNDERHILL, but that CONNORS had received a letter from his young daughter about a month ago in which she told him they were moving and for him not to reply until he received another letter.

Informant 13 stated that he is reasonably sure that in the event HAZEL appeared again at JOE HENDERSON'S that she would receive the information that he desired to talk with her and she would unquestionably get in touch with him. Informant 13 stated that it would not be advisable for him to drop in on HAZEL UNDERHILL at her present address without being prepared to tell her how he ascertained it; that before making a trip to see her, he would endequor through his various sources of information to obtain such information so that he would be prepared to meet her without creating suspicion, stating that he was ready to

make a trip to see her as soon as he had accomplished this.

JAKE SIMS, Chief of Police, Seminole, Oklahoma, further advised that the wife of Informent 13 from whom he is separated confidentially informed his, SIM'S, wife that a man named PIERSON operates a bootlegging resort on 23d Street, approximately twenty miles east of Oklahoma City; that some time about three months ago, a bootlegger came to PIERSON'S place to make a delivery of whiskey about midnight and that PIERSON was engaged in conversation with a man sitting in an automobile; that after PIERSON finished his conversation with this man in the car, the man drove away; that PIERSON then approached the bootlegger and remarked, "You couldn't guess in a thousand years who I was talking to," stating that the man he was talking to was the most wanted man in the United States, that it was RALPH ROE.

SIMS stated that he knows PIERSON and had previously handled him for violation of the law, and it was possible that PIERSON would talk with him in this connection and that he would make it his business to contact PIERSON at the earliest possible time and andeavor to obtain some information in connection with this report.

On October 4, 1938, Chief of Police JAKE SIMS appeared at the Oklahoma City Office accompanied by Mr. E. F. BOYDSTON and conferred with Agents SMITH and HOOD, advising them that Mr. BOYDSTON had some material information concerning COLE. Mr. BOYDSTON is a contractor and rig builder with general offices at Seminole, Oklahoma and is reputed to be a reputable citizen. Mr. BOYDSTON stated that his company contracts rig building for the Wilcox Oil Company who control the leases in the vicinity of Stroud, Oklahoma situated near the Sac-Fox Indian Agency; that the WILCOX company holds a lease on property which is owned by Mrs. LUCKISAYLOR, which property is under a farming lease to REBEL COHNETT, a brother-in-law of subject COLE. Mr. BOYDSTON stated that some dispute recently arose between employees of the Wilcox Company and CORNETT with respect to demages in running a line into his property which resulted in CORNETT'S having knocked one of the employees in the head with a hammer on September 27, 1938.

Mr. BOYDSTON stated that he was in the field office of the Wilcox Company on that date and heard a discussion between Mr. BALLEW, the field clerk, and a roustabout working for the Wilcox Company, in which the roustabout mentioned TED COLE'S being at the hoem of CORNETT;

that he heard Mr. BALLEW remark, "I thought he was drowned," to which the roustabout answered, "Drowned hell, he is alive and has either been over there or is over there at CORNETT'S."

On October 5, 1938, Special Agent HOOD and the writer, accompanied by Mr. BOYDSTON, proceeded to the Wilcox lease headquarters situated near the farm occupied by CORNETT, the brother-in-law of COLE. There they conferred with Mr. C. J. BALLEW, office clerk, who was introduced by Mr. BOYDSTON. Mr. BALLEW stated that he recalled having a conversation with a roustabout by the name of PAUL CURRY who is employed by the Wilcox Company; that he did not recall CURRY'S having stated that he had seen COLE, but did infer from his conversation that COLE had been in that vicinity. He stated that CURRY was a responsible citizen and that he felt he would tell the truth.

Subsequently contact was made with PAUL CURRY found employed on the Wilcox lease. Mr. CURRY stated that he lives at Stroud. Oklahoma and has been in that vicinity for many years and is personally acquainted with TED COLE. CORNETT and CORNETT'S wife who is a sister of COLE, and all of the other relatives of COLE who reside in that country; that he frequently visited at the home of CORNETT and had been there several times since COLE'S escape; that on each occasion he has discussed COLE with CORNETT and his wife, both of whom are not very communicative in that respect. He stated that Mrs. CORNETT on one occasion told him that CORNETT would not permit COLE to come on the place; that he questioned Mrs. CORNETT with respect to COLE'S escape and asked her if she really thought that he made it; that while she was reluctant to answer this question definitely, she finally stated that she thought he did. He stated that he had never been able to obtain any definite information in regard to COLE'S having been in that vicinity since his escape.

PAUL CURRY promised his full cooperation stating he would frequent the home of CORNETT and other relatives of COLE and would endeavor to lead them out concerning COLE and that on receipt of any information received, he would communicate same to the Oklahoma City Division office. He was furnished Special Agent in Charge FLETCHER'S name and address, Division location, Post Office box and telephone number.

Agents made contact with FRANK RILEY, farm boss for the WILCOX Company, who stated that he was told by PARD PHILLIPS, an employee of the Wilcox Company some time last spring that he, PHILLIPS,

in company with a woman, visited a bootlegging joint operated one-half mile north of that farm, and there they saw a stranger whom the woman recognized as TED COLE. Through RILEY, contact was made with PARD PHILLIPS who stated he and Mrs. TOM MASSEY sometime last spring went into a place one-half mile north of the CORNETT farm operated by a man named BAXTER. There they observed a man tall and slender whom Mrs. MASSEY stated she recognized as TED COLE; that she had lived in that section and was acquainted with him. PHILLIPS stated that Mrs. MASSEY is a sister of the wife of ABE HOLLAND who is also an employee of the Wilcox Company and that she resided at Drumright, Oklahoma.

Contact was made with ABB HOLLAND who stated that he recalled the incident of Mrs. MASSEY'S seeing a man at BAXTER'S place whom she stated was COLE. HOLLAND stated that she could be located through her husband, TOM MASSEY, an employee of the Nuwey Grocery Company, Drumright, Oklahoma.

At Drumright, Oklahoma, Agents SMITH and HOOD located and interviewed Mrs. MASSEY who was first approached in a very cautious and discreet manner concerning acquaintances in and knowledge of the vicinity of Stroud, Oklahoma. She did not appear to be familiar with the names of COLE'S relatives or their location, and appeared never to have heard of TED COLE or his escapades. When confronted with the information received from PHILLIPS, she admitted knowing PHILLIPS and having been with him at her sister's home, but emphatically denied having been to BAXTER'S place or having seen a stranger or to having told anyone that she saw TED COLE, stating that she did not know COLE and would have had no reason for making any such statement.

On October 5, 1938, Agents HOOD and SMITH conferred with Mr. VAN SICKLE, Chief of Police, at Stroud, Oklahoma who has been very cooperative with this Bureau in connection with this case. Mr. VAN SICKLE stated that he has been in constant touch with several sources of information in the vicinity of COLE'S relatives' homes; that he has been unable to obtain any information to indicate that COLE has either been in that vicinity or they have received any information concerning him; that he feels certain in the event he does come there that he will receive the information immediately. He stated that he has several informants who are in constant touch with and observing the CORNETT home whom he considers reliable, and through whom he feels that he will eventually obtain information of anything that may develop there.

AT BARTLESVILLE, OKLAHOMA

On October 5, 1938, Special Agents HOOD and SMITH made contact with Informant "Z" whose identity has previously been furnished to the Bureau. This informant stated that he has received no information since he was previously interviewed and expressed as his belief that subjects COLE and ROE made good their escape from Alcatraz. He stated that while he has no definite proof of this fact and has not seen either of them, from information he has previously obtained and furnished these Agents that he feels certain that they made their escape.

He agreed to proceed to Joplin, Missouri and again contact sources of information there in an effort to obtain something of interest. On October 10, 1938, Agents SMITH and HOOD again contacted this informant and he was furnished the necessary funds and stated that he would proceed to Joplin, Missouri and would communicate with the Oklahoma City Office from that point on October 11, 1938. He stated that he would probably remain there two or three days in the interest of making desired contacts. He stated that it was his information that HERB FARMER had recently left Joplin, Missouri and gone away in the interest of making some quick money and was expected to return with probably fifteen or twenty thousand dollars. Informant suggested the probability that FARMER was going away to make money with ROE and COLE. He stated further that he had heard through the underworld source at Joplin that ROE and COLE had made some money since their escape.

With reference to Informant Z's promising to go to Joplin, Missouri in the interest of recontacting sources of information, on October 12th the following telegram was received from him:

"HAVE TALKED TO M C NOTHING DEFINITE H JUST GOT IN FROM SALTLAKE WILL TALK TO HIM TOMORROW AND WILL WIRE YOU MY FINDINGS"

The initials M C referred to in the above telegram have reference unquestionably to MICKEY CAREY whom informant Z mentioned as a source of information. The letter H no doubt has reference to HERBERT FARMER.

In view of previous information that HERB FARMER was operating a liquor store at Dallas, Texas, and in view of the information in the telegram that he had just gotten in from Salt Lake City, some doubt arose as to the fair dealings of Informant Z. Therefore, authority was

requested from the Bureau by telephone on October 12, 1938 to check through the Kansas City Office to determine if HERB FARMER was actually at Joplin as stated by informent. Under date of October 12, 1938, the Kansas City Office was telephonically requested to check at Joplin to determine the present whereabouts of FARMER. On that date, the Kansas City Office advised by telegram that HERB FARMER was then in Joplin and had been there right along; that he had appeared in court October 11, 1938 at Neosho, Missouri on a gembling charge.

Subsequently on October 12th the following telegram was received from Informant "Z", Joplin, Missouri:

"NOTHING IMPORTANT AT THIS TIME WILL LEAVE FOR HOME TONIGHT"

KENNETH BROWN, Assistant Postmaster at Monterey, stated that their records show that Mrs. M. T. PETTYJOHN, Mrs. RUTH/NOR-TON and RUTH HOWARD, all of whom are believed to be identical, are receiving mail at Box 172, Monterey, California. Mr. KENNETH BROWN stated that he did not have any forwarding address for Mrs. M. T. PETTYJOHN but knew that she called occasionally at the Monterey Post Office; that she appeared to be a sporting type of woman, was driving a new gray Buick Seden. He stated that he knew her by sight; that she was 5° 5°, blonde, about 30 years old, had gold teeth, and was well dressed.

Examination of the contents of Box 172 disclosed a package from Mrs. BAILT HARDY, Route 2, San Saba, Texas, addressed to RUTH HOWARD. Mr. BROWN stated that the next time RUTH HOWARD, who was apparently Mrs. M. T. PETTYJOHN, called for mail he would endeavor to obtain her local address.

Examination of the application for this box shows that it is in the name of RUTH NORTON, beauty parlor operator, Pajaro Beauty Parlor, Appleton Hotel, Watsonville, California, which was apparently her former address. Since Mrs. M. T. PETTYJOHN is reported to be a beauty parlor operator by profession, Agent contacted by telephone all of the beauty parlors in Monterey, California, inquiring for Mrs. PETTYJOHN, RUTH HOWARD and RUTH NORTON, with negative results.

On October 11, 1938, Assistant Postmaster KENNETH BROWN advised the San Francisco Office by letter that he had obtained the address of RUTH HOWARD, which is 851 Ocean Avenue, Monterey; that this is the address of a house of prostitution in that city.

As at the time of his first interview by Agent, was rather mysterious about his information and stated that when he was well, he would gladly show Agent where he believed subjects to have been but that until that time he did not wish to give any additional information. |

| It was pointed out to that as he is apparently ill most of the time, there is a possibility that he would never be able to guide Agent to the alleged hideout of subjects and it was believed advisable that he give Agent any information he might have to obviate the possibility of this perhaps valuable information being lost forever in the event anything should happen to |
| After some persuasion, advised as follows: He stated that although he did not recall the exact date during what he believed to have been probably during the latter part of January, 1938, he had been standing on the street in Grass Valley, California, talking with a miner whose name he claimed not to now recall. He advised that during this conversation an individual was seen to pass along the opposite side of the street and the man with whom he was talking had remarked to "that man over there is RALPH ROE, the Alcatraz escape". This man had further advised that ROE was living in a settlement of houses adjoining the Zeibright Mine in Bear Valley not far from Nevada City, Calif. It was impression that his informant had known ROE years before and that he was certain of ROE'S identity and further had seen him since his escape on some occasion earlier than the one when he pointed the supposed ROE out to |
| examine photographs of ROE and COLE in local newspapers and that he was positive that the man seen by him was, in fact, Subject ROE. He advised that on a still later date a few weeks after this time when he had first seen the man whom he believes to be ROE, he had again been in Grass Valley and had seen this same man; that he had at that time even closer scrutinized the man and that he is certain he is identical with Subject ROE. |
| advised that he had never seen anyone whom he believed to be Subject COLE and that if he had previously caused Agent to receive the impression that COLE was with the man whom he believed to be ROE, it was simply because he, had perhaps assumed that the two men were together. |
| advised that the second time he had seen the suspect in Grass Valley that individual had had a motorcycle in his possession, make and license number unknown. He could give no exact description of |

his suspect, other than to say that he looked identical with the photograph

of Subject ROE, especially the profile view. He advised that on the second occasion he had seen this man in Grass Valley, he had been wearing a new, brown zipper jacket.

AT THE ZEIBRIGHT MINE.

At the Zeibright Mine near Nevada City on the bighway between that town and Emigrant Cap in Bear Valley, B. GENITCHING, time-keeper and bookkeeper, upon being interviewed, advised that he had held that position at the mine since the fall of 1937 and that during that time no one had been employed there whom he believed to in any way resemble Subjects ROE or COLE, whose photographs were displayed to him. He stated that although there are approximately 150 men employed in that mine, that as timekeeper he has occasion to at least have a speaking acquaintance with all employees and that he is certain if either subject had been employed at the mine, he would recall them from their photographs.

KITCHING advised, however, that if either of the men had been at the mine "rustling", that is seeking work, they might have been at the mine a day or two and not have contacted him, although LEWIS M. SABAN, mine foremen; HERBERT JOHNSON, whift boss, or ARTHUR SWANSON, superintendent of the mine, might possibly have been contacted by these men and he, KITCHING, not have known of it.

ARTHUR SWANSON, superintendent of the Zeibright Mine, was interviewed, at which time he was given photographs of Subjects ROE and COLE and CLAUD POWERS, I. O. #1379, to examine. He stated that he was certain neither POWERS nor COLE had been in that vicinity but that the photograph of ROE looked strangely familiar to him. He stated he could not remember whether this individual had asked him for work, whether he had seen him at the mine, or elsewhere, but that he felt reasonably sure that he had, in fact, seen this man someplace.

LEWIS M. SABAN, mine foreman, who was questioned and was mentioned by both KITCHING and SWANSON as having a very good memory, was also shown the three photographs above mentioned. He definitely eliminated the photographs of POWERS and COLE but stated that he was practically certain that an individual who, if not ROE, certainly resembled him very much had been at the mine sometime during the winter of 1937-38. He advised that he could not remember this man's having worked at the mine, he could not remember the man's name or anything about him but stated that he felt sure he had seen him and that in all probability the man had appeared at the mine, asked for work, been unable to obtain same and had gone on his way.

GEORGE GRIFFITH, mine electrician, and HOMER WEAL, both separately examined the three photographs above mentioned and both selected

the photograph of ROE as an individual whom they felt sure they had seen somewhere. They were both certain that he had not worked at the mine but they seemed to feel that they had perhaps seen him in that vicinity.

Near the mine is a small settlement of 8 or 10 shacks, in which some of the married miners live with their families. It was in this settlement, according to informant, that ROE was supposed to have lived.

WILLIAM BELISLE, miner named by SWANSON and KITCHING as a reliable individual living in that settlement, upon examination of the photographs, stated that none of the three men appeared familiar to him. When asked specifically as to ROE, he stated he felt certain he had never seen that man; furthermore, he was certain no one resembling him had lived or visited in any of the shacks near the mine. BELISLE felt sure that if anyone had stayed there for any langth of time at all, he would have known of it.

HAROLD HUTCHINSON, who operates the recreation hall at the mine, was also shown the photographs in question. From these three photographs he too selected the picture of ROE as being vaguely familiar to him but he could not state where he had seen this man.

HERBERT JOHNSON, shift boss, was also interviewed. JOHNSON stated that he was certain that none of the three men appearing in the photographs had ever worked for him and that he had never seen any of them at the mine or elsewhere.

All individuals at the mine interviewed, as set out hereinabove, were questioned concerning any of the men working there who had owned or operated metorcycles. It was learned that two or three of the men owned motorcycles but that they had been at the mine for a considerable length of time and that none of them in any way resembled Subjects ROE or COLE and that they were entirely above suspcion.

LEWIS SABAN, upon reinterview, was unable to recall anything additional after considerable thought on the matter, other than that he seemed to have some recollection of a "rustler" having been once brought to the mine by a Ford salesman from Grass Valley, Calif., name of this salesman unknown, and that it was his recollection that possibly this salesman had brought the man whom he believed to resemble ROE so very much to the mine.

SABAN, SWANSON and KITCHING all stated that they would make appropriate inquiry from time to time and endeavor to recall where they had seen the individual believed by them to possibly be Subject ROE. An

examination of the employment cards of all men at the Zeibright Mine for the last several years was carefully made by SWANSON, KITCHING and SABAN in Agent's presence. The individual for whom each card was issued was recalled by one of the three men, none of these miners being possibly identical with Subject ROE. SWANSON advised that he was certain that ROE, had he been at the mine at all, could not possibly have been there during the months of February and March, during which time the mine was snowed in and no one came in or out; consequently, everyone became rather well acquainted. He further advised that for the last few months the Murchie ine at Nevada City had been handling the employment of miners at the Zeibright Mine, both mines being owned by the same company, and it was possible that FRED SCHECKT, head timekeeper at the Murchie Mine, might possible recall ROE had he appeared there for work. Agent was assured that the San Francisco office would be immediately notified should any information of value be gained from any source.

AT NEVADA CITY, CALIFORNIA

the three photographs previously mentioned, selected the photograph of Subject ROE as being someone once seen by him. As had all the individuals at the Zeibright Mine who had partially identified ROE'S photograph and as had informant, SCHECKT stated that the profile view of ROE was the one which seemed to "click" in his mind as being a likeness of someone once seen by him. SCHECKT checked all timesheets for the Murchie and Zeibright Mines from December, 1937, until the spring of 1938 and was unable to find any man for whom he could not account and eliminate as being Subject ROE.

At the Nevada City Post Office LLOYD HISCOX, general delivery clerk, upon being displayed the three photographs, also selected the photograph of Subject ROE as being someone he had once seen, he too selecting the profile view, as had everyone else interviewed. He was very vague and did not believe this man had ever called at that Post Office for mail but simply felt he had once seen him someplace.

Chief of Police W. G. ROBSON; Nevada County Sheriff CARL TOBIASSEN; and Depaties Sheriff BILL WOOD and CARL LARSON were contacted and the photographs were displayed to them, without any identification being made.

AT GRASS VALLEY, CALIFORNIA

The photographs were also displayed to Chief of Police BEN JENKINS and Officer WILLIAM SPROUL of the Grass Valley Police Department, and to General Delivery Clerk RONALD PASCAL, without identification.

At the Helbach Motor Company, Grass Valley Ford dealer, inquiry was made concerning any salesman who had taken a trip to the Zeibright Mine during the winter or early spring of 1938. Numerous salesmen there were interviewed, but none of them stated they had been at that tmine since prior to the winter of 1937-38, inasmuch as the mine officials had stated they did not wish salesmen to appear there. The three photographs previously mentioned were displayed to each of these salesmen, and the photograph of only ROE was partially identified by one of them.

The thought having occurred that perhaps this partial identification was made by the men previously mentioned herein due to their having seen ROE'S photograph previously at some time, they were asked whether it might be they were making the identification from having seen the photograph and so believed that they had, in fact, seen the man at one time. However, the response from these men was that such was not the case; that they had no recollection of having seen ROE'S photograph, other then perhaps having glanced at it in the newspapers and at the same time they had seen COLE'S picture and the photograph of COLE displayed to them by Agent did not cause them to feel that they had seen anyone in that

AT AUBURN, CALIFORNIA

was again interviewed in an attempt to gain from him the name of the individual with whom he had been in conversation in Grass Valley and who pointed out to him the individual believed to be ROE. _____stated at that time that his informant had simply been a miner with whom he had happened to be talking on the street; that although he had known the individual's name, he could, allegedly, not now recall it but would attempt to do so and if he were unable to do so, at the next time he was able to be up and about, he would go to Grass Valley and make inquiry in an attempt to learn this person sidentity in order that this person might be appropriately interviewed by Agent. It was suggested to THat Agent accompany him to Grass Valley at the time of his inquiry. stated that upon his gaining sufficient health to go, he would notify Agent in the event he did not previously learn his informant's name and that in the event he did recall the identity of his informant, he would immediately notify the San Francisco office.

AT NEWCASTLE, CALIFORNIA

With reference to letter of reference, MRS. W. MEDELEY was contacted at her ranch near Newcastle, at which time she advised that her son, WARREN H. MADELEY, was not then at home, he being in Berkeley, California, attending the University. She stated that she recalled his

having written the Bureau concerning instant case and that he had written after he had been on a skiing expedition in the vicinity of Soda Springs, Calif., reportedly having come across something which caused him to believe that it might have some connection with the instant case. MRS. MADELEY stated that she has since become convinced that her son's information was of no value and that she did not desire that he be interviewed. She stated that although at the time she had felt this information was of value, she had since forgotten just what it was. It was readily seen that MRS. MADELEY did not wish her son to be interviewed and did not wish to give his address in Berkeley in order that he might be contacted, she stating that it would be a waste of time for him to be seen and that she did not wish the "bother" to be taken.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent LOUIS D. WINE, with reference to the lead in the reference report of Special Agent HAWKINS:

AT ALMA, CALIFORNIA

MRS. BESSIE WHEELER, Postmaster, stated that there are no hotels in that locality, which consists of a Post Office, general store and several small cottages; that she has lived there for many years and that there is no Alma Hotel located there and, in fact, no hotel whatever in that community. She stated that she knows practically everyone receiving mail there; that there are about 200, including the patrons of the post office boxes at that Post Office. She stated that she has no recollection or record of HUBERT SMITH, JAMES B. HALL or JOHN F. BENDER. She stated that during the current summer there were a large number of transients and laborers employed on a highway project running through this msmall community; that these men received their mail at general delivery. She stated that during the year 1936 this man may have been at one of the mountain resorts during the tourist season, but she is positive there is no Alma Hotel operating in that vicinity at the present time.

Similar inquiries were made of GEORGE OSMER, Assistant Post-master, with negative results.

The following investigation at Levelland and Whiteface, Texas, was predicated upon a telephone call received by Special Agent in Charge E. E. CONROY on September 27, 1938, from the Oklahoma City Office, requesting investigation concerning the present whereabouts of HAZEL UNDERHILL:

Mr. H. H. MANN, Postmaster at Levelland, Texas, was contacted on September 28, 1938, and he furnished the forwarding addresses of the following persons from Levelland, Texas, to Odessa, Texas, the forwarding date being May 9, 1938: MARVIN CONNOR, HAZEL CONNOR, JUANITA CONNOR, JEAN DAVIS, EDWARD DAVIS, LOMA DAVIS, and LAVANA HUDSON. Mr. Mann advised that he

had not received any inquiries concerning the mail of the above parties since they gave him their forwarding addresses; that, so far as he knows, they are in Odessa, Texas.

Dr. C. R. JOHNSTON at Levelland, Texas, was contacted and he advised that he is the doctor who treated MARVIN CONNOR in March last; that he believed the CONNOR and the DAVIS families moved to Odessa, Texas. He stated that they were very good friends to O. C. HALES, production foremen of E. E. Fogelson Company; that HALES showed a personal interest in MARVIN CONNOR. Dr. JOHNSTON advised that he believes HALES left Levelland with the CONNOR family for Odessa, Texas; that it was apparently JUANITA CONNOR whom HALES was interested in; that JUANITA CONNOR is a very beautiful girl. Dr. JOHNSTON further advised that at the time MARVIN CONNOR was hurt, there were some telegrams sent to some of the relatives of the CONNORS and he believes HALES sent them, or at least paid for them.

Dr. JOHNSTON stated that in an effort to locate the CONNOR family and assist the Government, in any manner, he would ascertain which nurse was a sweetheart of MARVIN CONNOR; that MARVIN CONNOR became friendly with this nurse while he was in the hospital at Lubbock, Texas, as a result of his injury. Dr. JOHNSTON stated that he was personally acquainted with most of the nurses in Lubbock, and that he believes he can find out which one was a friend to CONNOR, and through her, ascertain the whereabouts of HAZEL CONNOR. A franked envelope was left with Dr. JOHNSTON for the purpose of advising the Dallas Office, in the event he secures any information.

At the Western Union in Levelland, Texas, Mrs. HILL was contacted, and she advised that she was forbidden to give out such information; that Agent would have to contact the supervisor at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, for the authority to see any wires in that office. Mrs. HILL was requested to ascertain if she had copies of any wires sent by any of the above named parties, and if so, Agent would then obtain the necessary permission to examine same. While Mrs. HILL was looking through all the wires sent during the Month of March, 1938, the writer could easily see the places to which the wires were directed and the signatures of the senders. It was noted that none were sent in the name of CONNOR, DAVIS, or UNDERHILL, or signed by any of the above persons or by HALES. Mrs. HILL was thanked and advised that authority would not be necessary.

Mr. ELLIS, operator of the apartment in which the CONNORS lived in Levelland, Texas, advised that when the CONNORS left Levelland, Texas, in May, 1938, they told her that they were moving to Monahans, Texas; that O. C. HALES, a sweetheart of JUANITA CONNOR, moved them in a pickup truck and a large automobile. He advised that they were people of the common class; that the CONNOR and the DAVIS families lived in the same apartment. Mrs. ELLIS advised that of HAZEL CONNOR; that HAZEL CONNOR'S last husband was named HUDSON; that Mrs. DAVIS had two children, and that

Mrs. CONNOR had three children.

Mr. L. L. DRUMHELLER, Station Agent, and Western Union operator at Whiteface, Texas, was contacted. He advised that he knew the CONNOR and the DAVIS families when they lived in Whiteface, Texas. Mr. DRUMHELLER examined all wires sent during the Month of March, 1938, and found only one mentioning the DAVIS or the CONNOR NAME. This was a wire addressed to JEAN DAVIS or EDNA FIELDS at Whiteface, Texas, dated April 18, 1938. Instant wire read as follows:

"CHARLIE R. BYRD IN COOK HOSPITAL AT MONAHANS NOT EXPECTED TO LIVE", signed LUKE RUSSELL.

Mr. DRUMHELLER advised that this was the only wire sent or received by any of the above mentioned persons, as he was personally acquainted with them all.

Agent was introduced to Mr. C. M. ANDERSON. present production foreman for E. E. Fogelson Company at Whiteface, Texas, who. upon interview, advised that he was given the job formerly held by 0. C. HALES: that HALES was believed to have been fired for some unknown reason and was last known to be in Refugio. Texas. His reason for knowing that O. C. HALES was in Refugio, Texas, on or about August 25 is that he received a copy of a letter directed to O. C. HALES at Refugio. Texas, from the Fogelson Company office, 1409, Second National Bank Building, Houston, Texas; that the letter was signed by S. D. MAKWELL, the person in charge of that company's office at Houston, Texas; that S. D. MAXWELL is a personal friend of O. C. HALES, and if contacted, will have to be interviewed under pretext. ANDERSON stated that he has talked to MAXWEIL and is confident he would not give any information as to the whereabouts of O. C. HALES if it was thought the information would injure HALES in any way. Mr. ANDERSON stated that O. C. HALES and JUANITA CONNOR were sweethearts and lived together: that HAZEL CONNOR lived with them; that he believes HALES is afraid of JUANITA and her mother.

Mrs ANDERSON stated that he is almost positive that HALES now lives in Refugio, Texas, and is living with JUANITA CONNOR and HAZEL CONNOR. He based his reason for thinking so on a letter received by him from O. C. HALES in the handwriting of JUANITA CONNOR and signed by O. C. HALES, postmarked Corpus Christi, Texas, stating that he was moving to Refugio, Texas, to operate a pulling unit of his own. ANDERSON telephonically communicated with his office at Odessa, Texas, and later advised the writer that MARVIN CONNOR was not working in Odessa, Texas, or for the E. E. Fogelson Company; that he was let out at the same time O. C. HALES was discharged; that he thought MARVIN CONNOR was with a Medicine Show, and that HAZEL and JUANITA CONNOR were with O. C. HALES at Refugio, Texas.

Mr. ANDERSON further stated that MARVIN CONNOR was working at Penwell, Texas, and not at Odessa, Texas. Penwell is about 12 miles west of Odessa, Texas; that O. C. HALES has a brother operating a Shell Filling Station at Penwell, Texas, named C. P. HALES; that this

brother is a rather nice person, but ANDERSON does not know if he would furnish any information concerning the whereabouts of O. C. HALES. ANDERSON advised that the Shell Station operated by C. P. HALES is next door to the Well Cafe; that this Station was formerly operated by Kerns Gafford.

Mr. ANDERSON further advised that he is well acquainted with the CONNOR and the DAVIS families; that he did not want to have anything to do with them, and requested that his name not be mentioned to anyone in conducting any investigation in this matter concerning the above information or the following.

ANDERSON stated that JEAN DAVIS is the sister of ED DAVIS, who, he believes, was electrocuted for the murder of the warden in the Memorial Day massagre in the San Quentin Prison in California several years ago; that JEAN DAVIS is the sister of O. C. HALES, and he is sure that the writer is aware as to the identity of HAZEL CONNOR; further, that the above circumstances are not known to very many people.

Mr. ANDERSON stated that he would conduct an investigation and, if possible, ascertain the exact location of HALES and the CONNORS and advise the Dallas Office. A franked envelope was left with Mr. ANDERSON for this purpose.

Mr. CHARLES McCONAL, store proprietor, Loop, Texas, was contacted on September 29, 1938, and he advised that he did not know the name of the boy driving the truck which delivered a load of coal to him in December, 1937. Mr. McCONAL furnished the writer the address of the Dawson Coal Company, Lubbock, Texas, from whom he buys his coal.

At the Dawson Coal Company, Lubbock, Texas, Mr. B. L. WILLIAMS was interviewed, and he stated that TRUMAN JONES, an ex-employee of that company, was the driver of the truck which delivered a load of coal to Mr. McCONAL at Loop, Texas, in December, 1937; that JONES has since left the employ of that company and his present whereabouts are unknown to them. He advised that they have attempted to contact JONES several times subsequent to his departure from Lubbock to straighten out some accounts with various merchants in the vicinity of Lubbock, Texas.

When questioned relative to the statement made by JONES to Mr. R. R. MANTOOTH, mentioned in reference report of Special Agent D. P. SULLIVAN, WILLIAMS advised that he had received this information from JONES, and he related the following story:

While TRUMAN JONES was in Idalou, Texas, at the filling station of Mr. F. C. DAY, two men drove into the station in a new model Chevrolet sedan loaded with guns, and they were apparently excited and attracted the attention of the station attendants and caused the story to get out that they were probably escaped prisoners from some penitentiary in California. Mr. WILLIAMS stated that during the

drive from Lubbock, Texas, to Loop, Texas, he merely told Mr. MANTOOTH about what JONES had told him; that Mr. MANTOOTH must have misunderstood him if he said that he, WILLIAMS, had noticed the two men in the filling station at Idalou. Texas.

At Idalou, Texas, on October 8, 1938, Mr. F. C. DAY and his family were contacted, and they advised that they remembered two men driving into the filling station and buying some gasoline and that while there they bought some cheese and crackers and drank sodawater. Whikexthera, While there one of the men stated to their young that he would like to kidnap her: that it was purely a joke and they kidded her the entire time they were there. Mrs. F. C. DAY advised that she was present on that date and waited on the two men. The only thing she noticed about these men was that they were rather in a hurry to get through eating and leave, as they stated they were driving to Oklahoma City. Mrs. DAY stated that this was about a week subsequent to the time that RAIDH ROE and THEODORE COLE supposedly escaped from Alcatraz Prison neap San Francisco, California. Mrs. DAY and her 7. were both present at the filling station the day the two men arrived there. They were shown the pictures of ROE and COLE, and both immediately stated they were not identical with the men who were at the filling station. Further. they stated that these men did not in any way resemble the Subjects in this case. They advised that if they were shown pictures of the two men who came to the filling station, they could immediately identify them. BETTY JO DAY stated that the dark complexioned one had a mustache. Mrs. DAY advised that one did have a mustache and that the mustache was at least three months old.

Mrs. F. C. DAY and her advised that no one else was present at the filling station during the time the two men in question were there; that she is acquainted with the drivers of the Dawson Coal Company in Lubbock, Texas, and that she is positive neither WILLIAMS nor JONES was present during the time the two men were at the station. When asked how JONES could have obtained the information and conveyed such information to Mr. R. R. MANTOOTH, Mrs. DAY advised that the boys must have overheard their conversation about the two men being in the filling station, because during that time there was quite a discussion around the filling stations and cafes about the escape of the Subjects in this case from Alcatraz.

Mr. and Mrs. TOM MARTIN at Borger, Texas, were interviewed on October 11, 1938, at their barber shop, 228-A North Main Street, and both advised that they had not seen or heard of RAIPH ROE in eight years. They stated that the last time they saw him was in 1930, at which time he kept company with a lady barber of Mrs. MARTIN by the name of MARY DARBY. Mrs. MARTIN advised that RAIPH ROE was very friendly with MARY DARBY and was constantly in her company, even while she was on duty in the barber shop. Mrs. MARTIN stated that MARY DARBY is presently married and lives in Freer, Texas. Mr. TOM MARTIN advised that he barely remembers RAIPH ROE but remembers his keeping company with MARY DARBY, a barber of his wife's, in Borger, Texas, in 1930.

Mr. and Mrs. MARTIN advised that PETE NEWBERRY and his wife do not live in Borger, Texas at this time. They now live somewhere in California. Mrs. MARTIN advised that PETE NEWBERRY is her brother-in-law, and that she will attempt to obtain from his mother his correct address and will furnish same to the local Chief of Police, W. H. BATES, Borger, who will in turn furnish it to the Dallas Office.

Neither Mr. nor Mrs. MARTIN was aware that the RAIPH ROE known to them in Borger, Texas, in 1930, was the same person who escaped from Alcatraz. In discussing RAIPH ROE, Mrs. MARTIN advised that she was willing to assist in any way possible in the location of RAIPH ROE, as she did not care for him, because he was of the outlaw type. Noticing that Mrs. MARTIN had a dislike for RAIPH ROE, Agent advised her that ROE is the person who escaped from Alcatraz, and she immediately advised that she would direct a letter to her sister, through her mother, and obtain the correct address of PETE NEWBERRY, in order that he might be interviewed for any knowledge of the whereabouts of the Subjects in this case.

A letter was received by the Dallas Office on October 17, 1938, from W. H. BATES, Chief of Police, Borger, Texas, advising that Mrs. TOM MARTIN had furnished the present correct address of PETE NEWBERRY, which is 215 East Arbutus Street, Compton, California,

The photograph of RAIPH ROE was exhibited to Mr. and Mrs. MARTIN, who immediately stated that this photograph was identical with the RAIPH ROY ROE whom they knew in Borger, Texas, in 1930; that he was known to them as BLACKIE ROE.

He further stated that, when he and BRIDGES were in Leavenworth Penitentiary together, BRIDGES showed him a picture of BILLIE BROWN and from that picture he furnished what he considered to be a description of BILLIE BROWN, as follows:

Age Height About 25

Height Complexion Short and heavy set.

· Light.

Agent questioned relative to the information he had furnished United States Marshal WILLIAM RYAN at Danville, Illinois, about a month previously. said he couldn't remember anything about that and guessed that there could not have been anything to it.

It is noted that, at the time Agent interviewed he hinted on several occasions that he was quite hungry and Agent inferred that he might have deliberately made up a false story for the purpose of obtaining petty funds from a Government Agent.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE OKLAHOMA FIELD OFFICE, at Sapulpa, Oklahoma, will attempt to locate BILLIE BROWN, supposedly staying in the 100 block of South Fourth Street, Sapulpa, Oklahoma, and question her relative to her knowledge of the activities of Fugitives COLE and ROE, also with reference to her possession of any property once stolen by either COLE or ROE.

At McAlester, Oklahoma, will ascertain if BOB BRIDGES is still at McAlester Penitentiary, questionning him about COLE and ROE, also about the alleged possession by BILLIE BROWN of stolen goods formerly held by RALPH ROE.

It is suggested that the records of the McAlester Penitentiary be checked to determine if BILLIE BROWN has either visited or written to BOB BRIDGES.

Berryville, Arkansas. Mrs. SCHULTZ said she did not ask MARIE where she obtained this information, inasmuch as she is not interested in COLE or any of his activities.

Mrs. SCHULTZ is a divorced woman and gives the impression of being an honest, hard working individual, who is doing her best to support her family. She requested that if MARIE COLE were interviewed no mention be made of her name or the fact that she furnished the information set out above.

Mrs. SCHUIT Z insists she saw COIE only on one occasion and that was in 1928 at Kansas City, Missouri, immediately after COLE'S marriage to her sister MARIE. She added that MARIE only lived with COLE for a few months after which they separated and she doubts it very much whether MARIE cares what happens to THEODORE or whether he again ever contacts her. She said she has never heard MARIE say a kind word in his behalf since her separation from him in 1929.

F. N. JACKSON, clerk, U. S. Post Office, Neosho, Missouri, advised that the records of that Post Office show that R. L. DAVIS and family formerly lived on Rural Route #2 and that they left a forwarding address at the Post Office on 12-20-36 as follows:

RODNEY L. DAVIS, MILDRED DAVIS, AMANDA DAVIS 520 South Walnut Street, Bristow, Oklahoma

JACKSON said DAVIS had since been seen around town. He could not state for sure whether the family had returned from Oklahoma and were again living near Neosho. He said TOMMY HASTINGS, the carrier on that route, was not available for interview.

Deputy Sheriff RADLAFF advised he had not seen DAVIS around lately and suggested the writer contact JESS SAXTON, a former Deputy Sheriff, who knows where the DAVIS farm is located and will be able to direct Agent there.

JESS SAXTON, Baker's Studio, advised he had been to the Davis farm about four years ago and said he believed he could direct the writer there. SAXTON, however, could not locate this property and advised that he would contact HASTINGS, the carier on that route, and definitely learn the location of the DAVIS property so that he will be able to direct the writer there at a subsequent date.

A few days later the writer contacted HASTINGS and WALDO HATLER. The latter owns the farm adjoining the DAVIS property. They advised that DAVIS traded this farm to a doctor from Tulsa, Oklahoma, during March of this year and left for Oklahoma with his family about a month later. HATLER described DAVIS as an "old devil" who was constantly causing trouble with all of the farmers living in the vicinity of his farm. He said he doubts whether DAVIS would tell anyone anything even if it was for his own good.

With regard to reference teletype, BEN M. WAN HOOK was located and interviewed at the New Vinita Hotel, Vinita, Oklahoma, and when VAN HOOK was contacted at the door of his hotel room it was noted by the writer that there were two young girls, about eighteen years of age, in his room; that all were drinking whisky and were considerably intoxicated. VAN HOOK was interviewed in the coffee shop of the hotel where he furnished the following information.

VAN HOOK advised he has known MARIE COLE for approximately ten years and that for the past several years she has stayed with him in a hotel room whenever he has stayed at Eureka Springs or Alpena Pass, Arkansas. He explained that on 10-5-38 he stopped at the Mason Park Hotel, Eureka Springs, called up MARIE COLE, told her he was in town and said she came up to his room to stay with him for the night, bringing with her a quantity of liquor. He continued that during the evening she became very intoxicated and started talking about her former husband, THEODORE COLE, saying that she saw him at Pittsburg, Kansas, five weeks ago and that she will see him again shortly. He said she also told him that ROE and COLE had been together on several occasions since their escape from Alcatraz. but believe it advisable to stay apart and away from each other as much as possible. Further, that she saw COIE in Pittsburg during the period aforementioned at which time she was in a hospital there for an appendicitis operation. He said she told him Dr. C. B. NEWMAN of Pittsburg performed the appendectomy.

VAN HOOK continued that he became interested in her conversation and began to "pump" her for further information regarding her contact with her husband and said he asked her how she maintained contact with him without the G-men finding out about it. He said she replied that COLE sends mail to her in care of a friend at Alpena Pass and that this friend then delivers the mail to her and she maintains contact with him in the same manner.

VAN HOOK says that a local general store merchant at Alpena Pass named FRED WHITTAKER has been having immoral relations

with MARIE for several years and has been very friendly towards here He also advised that a girl, name not known, who lives directly in the back of WHITTAKER'S store or in back of MARIE'S mother's house and who works for the WPA is also a close friend of MARIE and that both of them go out "sporting" together. He said he believes it is one of these two persons who receives MARIE'S mail from COLE and delivers it to her, if MARIE'S story is at all true.

VAN HOOK said he had heard rumors at Alpena Pass that MARIE was friendly with a restaurant owner in Joplin, Missouri, by the name of CURLY, who, he believes, would help her contact COLE, if necessary, and that if interviewed this man might be able to furnish some information regarding this case.

VAN HOOK was then questioned regarding the information contained in the teletype that MARIE COIE made the statement to him she would receive a check from COLE in the near future. VAN HOOK answered that the night of the aforementioned party at the Mason Park Hotel MARIE COLE left his room during the night with his wallet and all of his money. He said that when he awoke the next morning and found his wallet gone he immediately went to MARIE'S residence and asked her for his pocketbook and for his money. He said that she offered the excuse that she was nearly broke and needed the money until she received a check from COLE which would be forthcoming in the mails within a few days.

VAN HOOK was trying to impress upon the writer that MARIE COLE became intoxicated to such a degree that she began talking about her husband and telling secrets that she ordinarly would not have done had she been sober. However, it appears from VAN HOOK'S story, since MARIE COLE left during the night with his money and pocketbook, that VAN HOOK was the one who had too much to drink and passed out instead of MARIE COLE.

At the conclusion of this interview VAN HOOK, who was intoxicated to some considerable extent, asked the writer if there was any way he could obtain a special FBI commission whereby he would be able to track down instant fugitives and take them into custody without any further expense to the Government.

VAN HOOK was advised that this could not be done and in view of his condition no further interview was had with him.

GROVER ROBBINS, Joplin, Missouri, local patrolman, who is acquainted with most of the restaurant owners and bar operators, advised that the person referred to was evidently CURLY POSTEM, 1502 Main Street. He said CURLY at one time owned and operated a combination bar and restaurant at Joplin, has a previous criminal record and is in contact with all bigtime gangsters in the West. ROBBINS, who has worked with the writer before and is known to be reliable, stated in his opinion it would not be advisable to interview POSTEM for any information, inasmuch as he could not be trusted and he certainly would not tell the truth.

ROBBINS said there is no present restaurant operator in Joplin, Missouri, named CURLY and that the only one who has operated in the past by that name is POSTEM.

Dr. C. B. NEWMAN, $617\frac{1}{2}$ North Broadway, Pittsburg, Kansas, upon interview, advised that he examined MARIE COLE, wife of THEODORE COLE, at Pittsburg, Kansas, on 9-9-38 for a life insurance policy. He said that he did not operate on her at any time but did recall a statement made by her in her application form for insurance that she had been operated on for appendicitis in Harrisonville, Arkansas, about nine months ago. Dr. NEWMAN said he had never seen this woman before and could furnish no further information regarding her.

Mrs. NORA SCHULTZ of Pittsburg, Kansas, was again interviewed regarding the information furnished by VAN HOOK but no information of value was obtained.

Ring Leaders Are Shot Down As They Pound Vainly On Patent Glass

In the first installment of a thrilling, factual narrative, based on careful observations during 49 months imprisonment on Alcatraz Island, P. F. Reed, counterfeiter, told yesterday of the murder of Royal Cline.



He stated that he is now employed as Menager of the International Supply Company, Odessa, Texas, and that he wanted to know if it was necessary for our agents to be continually making inquiries concerning him in Odesse, and giving out information concerning him and his past criminal record, which interferes with his work and reputation.

Who stated that he was trying to go straight, end resented such inter-

The was asked if he would cooperate with this Euroau in an effort to esception whether his brother, RALFH ROB, were alive or dead. He stated that he would give us information if he ascertained that he was dead, but that he rould not if he obtained any other information, stating "You know how it is." And "You wouldn't tell if you were in my place, would you?"

It was evident that the purpose of his visit was to benefit himself. and not to give any assistance to the Bureau. He was advised that the investigation being conducted by this Bureau was for the purpose of locating his brother, and not for the purpose of injuring him or his reputation in eny way, but that no punches could be pulled in order to make it easier on him. He was advised that it would be necessary for us to conduct our investigation, and that the investigation would be conducted until we either located RALPH ROE, or ascertained that he was deed, and that if he desired to bring the investigation to an end, the best thing to do would be to furnish this office with any information he received which would assist it in bringing it to a logical conclusion

During the course of this interview, he stated to me that he had not heard from his brother, RALFH ROE, and did not think that he was successful in making his escape.

Mail cover placed on mail of FRANK WHITAKER, FRED WHITAKER and MARIE COLE at Alpena, Arkansas,

Teletype from Little Rock Field Division to Bureau and Kansas City Field Division, dated October 8, 1938 and telegram from Bureau dated October 10, 1938.

This report is based upon information received from Chief of Police DAN MARTIN of Eureka Springs, Arkansas, who telephonically communicated with the Little Rock Field Division on October 7, 1938, advising that he

believed he had some information of value in connection with instant case

Agent immediately proceeded to Eureka Springs, Arkansas where contact was had with Chief of Police MARTIN, who advised as follows:

On the night of October 5, 1938, MARIE COLE, wife of fugitive COLE, came to Eureka Springs, Arkansas with a traveling salesman from Missouri, and that they were riding in this salesman's

automobile at the time; that they went to the Basin Park Hotel in Eureka Springs, and both of them got quite drunk. The salesman become noisy and flourished a gun around the hotel, and the same was taken from him by Chief of Police MARTH, and the salesman was advised to go to his room and not cause any further disturbance. He went to his room with MARTH COLE and was not arrested by the police.

The following morning, this calesman came to Chief MARTIN and atabed that MARIE COLE had stayed in the room with him at the hotel for part of the night and had left him, taking a considerable amount of money from him. Chief MARTIN advised the salesman there was nothing that he could do about the matter but told the salesman he knew MRIE COLE am advised him where MARIE COLE could be located at Alpena, Arkansas. At this time the Chief of Police advised the salesmen that MARIE COLE was the wife of TED COLE, the convict who had escaped from Alcatrac Femitentiery. The salesman, whose rame was subsequently ascertained to be BEN M. VAN HCOK, then went to Alpena, Arkensas to see MARIE COLE about getting his money back. He returned to Eureka Springs, Arkansas later in the day, at which time he again contacted Chief of Police MARTIN and stated that he had seen MARIE COLE, and that he had gotten his money back from ber, with the threat of having her arrested. After getting his money back, he and MARIE had a few more drinks at Alpena, and according to VAN ECOK, MARIE got quite drunk and VAN HOOK questioned her concerning her husband, and she stated to him that she had seen TED COLE in Pittoburgh, Kenous approximately five weeks prior thereto, and that she corresponded with him regularly through a party named WHITAKER in Alpena, Arkaneas. In this connection, VAN HOOK stated that when he and MARIE were driving through Alpens, MARIE waved to a man standing on the street in front of a store, at which time this man waved back to her, and when VAN ROOM asked MARIE who this man was, she stated that his name was WHITAKER.

MARIE CCLE is also reported to have told VAN HCOK that she is expecting some money from COLE within the next week or ten days, and that after receiving this money, she was going back to visit him, although she did not state where he was staying at the present time. She also told VAN HOOK that she had seen subject RCE on three different occasions since his escape from Alcatraz Penitentiary, but that RCE and COLE were not presently together when MARIE first care to Alpena with VAN HOOK; FURTHER, that when VAN HOOK was in Alpena with MARIE COLE, there was some girl from Berryville, Arkensas along with them, but this girl left early in the evening, and her name was not known to VAN HOOK nor to Chief of Folice MARTIN.

Mr. HOLER Molaughlin, Manager of the Basin Park Hotel, Eureka Springs, Arkansac, when interviewed, stated that he knew BEN M. VAN HOOK, and that Mr. VAN HOOK had often stayed at the hotel and lived in Carthage, Missouri; that he thought that VAN HOOK was a salesman for the Fermick Syrup Company at that place. He stated that VAN HOOK is a married man, and as far as he knows has a good reputation, but on the particular night mentioned above, he got mixed up with MARIE COLE and was quite drunk and took MARIE COLE to his room; that later that evening MARIE COLE came down stairs and after sleeping in the lobby for a while left the hotel, apparently to catch a bus back to her home in Alpena. He stated that the following morning, VAN HOOK claimed to him that MARIE COLE stole some money from him while she was in his room at the hotel.

The above information was furnished to the Bureau and to the Kansas City Field Division by teletype on October 8, 1938, and the Kansas City Field Division was requested to contact VAN HOOK for complete information as to what MARIE COLE had told him at Alpena.

Upon receipt of the telegram from the Bureau requesting that a mail cover be placed on COLE'S wife, and that arrangements be made to cover her activities, Agent proceeded to Alpena, Arkansas and interviewed MARY C. PORTER, Postmistress at that place. She advised that there were two WHITAKERS in Alpena, Arkansas who ran stores, namely - F.ED WHITAKER, who operates a grocery store, and FRANK WHITAKER who operates a hardware store. Mail covers were placed on the mail of both of these individuals as well as on the mail of MARIE COLE for a period of 50 days, commencing on October 12, 1938.

Agent then contacted Mrs. J. H. GREER, a next-door neighbor of MARIE COLE, who has been previously interviewed in connection with this case. She stated that she has noticed no unusual activity on the part of MARIE COLE, and that although there are numerous men, apparently traveling valenmen, who visit at MARIE'S house, she was unable to say who the men were; that she has observed men calling on MARIE, and that MARIE would leave with the men for a day or two at a time, but that it was impossible to keep track of all her movements. She stated, that about two weeks ago, MARIE told her that she had gene to Joplin, Missouri and to Pittsburgh, Kansas, and Mrs. GREER knew the letter to be true as she had seen a postcard from MARIE, postmarked at Joplin, Missouri on Cetober 3, 1938. She further stated that MARIE has a sister by the name of NORA SCHULTZ who lives across the street from the Post Office in Pittsburgh, Kansas, and it is possible that MARIE has visited this sister.

Mrs. GREER further stated that on these various trips which MARIE takes, she does not take her little boy with her, and she is personally of the opinion that MARIE is not in contact with her husband, if TED COLE is still alive, as MARIE and her mother are both deathly afraid of COLE, and furthermore, MARIE has no more feeling toward him. She stated that MARIE has been collaborating on a story of TED COLE'S life with some newspaper man in Little Rock, Arkansas, and consequently often mentions his name to Mrs. GREER, but that she has never said anything which would indicate that she has seen COLE in recent years.

Mrs. GREER stated that she usually knows when MARIE CORE leaves Alpena, Arkansas for any considerable period of time, as MARIE always tells her when she is going, and she (Mrs. Greer) again promised her fullest cooperation with the Little Rock Field Division and promised to notify this office when next MARIE is planning to go to either Kansas or Missouri. She also advised that MARIE is fairly well acquainted with a truck driver for the CROCHER MEAT COMPANY at Joplin, Missouri, as she has observed a truck of this company parked in Front of MARIE'S home on several occasions, and on the last trip that MARIE took north, she returned to Alpena, in the Crocher Meat Company truck.

At the time of the above interview with Mrs. GREER, Agent observed MARIE COLE sitting on the front porch of her home in Alpena, Arkenson.

Special Agent F. G. McGeary on September 6, 1938, interviewed MR. LAUREL JAMES when he appeared at the Portland Field Office. He stated that he had just recently returned from Alaska where he makes his home at Anchorage. He advised that about the middle of December, 1937 he drove his 1929 Ford Coupe, which carried 1937 Oregon license plates at that time (number unknown) to Crescent City, California via the Coast Highway from Oregon. He advised that his father and he left The Dalles, Oregon, in this car and came to Portland, Oregon and subsequently proceeded to Astoria and down the Oregon Coast Highway south to Port Orford where his father stayed to visit with friends. MR. LAUREL JAMES stated that he continued on intending first to go to San Luis Obispo, California to visit his brother but due to heavy rains at that particular time he decided to give up that trip and stop at Crescent City, California where he visited an Aunt and Uncle whose names are HARRY and ETTAMDAYTON who operate a shoe repair shop on Main Street at Crescent City, California.

He advised that he did not purchase any title charts of San Francisco Bay Area while in Portland, Oregon, and was not south of Crescent City, California during December, 1937. He stated that he returned to Eugene, Oregon and spent Christmas day in that city. He advised that he was the only one in his car when he passed over the Oregon-California boundry.

The following is the description of MR. LAUREL JAMES as obtained through observation and questioning:

Special Agent K. D. Deaderick and the writer conducted investigation at Troutdale, Oregon in reference to a letter from JOHN ROE MACE, addressed to the Warden of Alcatraz, Alcatraz Island. MACE upon interview advised that he recently came to Oregon from the vicinity of Watsonville, California; that at Watsonville he was acquainted with one HASCOMB PURDIN; that since coming to Oregon he was reading a detective magazine about the escape from Alcatraz and noted a marked resemblance between PURDIN and RAIPH ROE. He stated that he had called this matter to the attention of his

wife, who also noted some resemblance and for that reason he had written to the Warden, United States Penitentiary at Alcatraz. MACE was asked to describe PURDIN before he was shown photographs of subjects and described this individual approximately as subject ROE is described. He stated, however, that he met PURDIN in about September, 1937 or prior thereto and that he was positive that he met PURDIN several months prior to December 16, 1937.

Accordingly it appears impossible that PURDIN and ROE could be identical.

MACE readily picked out photographs of ROE as resembling PURDIN. MRS. MACE was also interviewed and was not nearly as certain in her identification or in her description. MACE advised that PURDIN was doing took for contractors near Watsonville, working for a party by the name of JOE THAKER. Inasmuch as MACE knew PURDIN a considerable time prior to the escape it is not believed that further investigation in this matter is necessary.

H. A. McCUNE, 221 S. W. Front Avenue, Portland, advised that he was the registered owner of a 1934 DeSoto Sedan, bearing Oregon 1938 license 128-252. He stated upon interview that he did not make a trip to California before Christmas, 1937 and did not loan his car to anyone to make a trip to California. It would appear, therefore that the wrong license number was recorded by the California checking station. McCUNE in no way answers the description of the unknown individual who purchased maps and charts in Portland on December 15, 1937.

A review of the Portland file discloses that efforts were made to locate MR. DEE SCOTT, 2334 S. E. 26th Avenue, Portland, who was the owner of 1934 Ford Sedan, motor number 18-747920, Oregon license number 133-175; that SCOTT had never been interviewed. Through his father, who resides at 3343 S. E. 9th Avenue, Portland, Agent ascertained that DEE SCOTT was presently residing at 1419 West 10th Street, Los Angeles, California. It is possible that this is North 10th Street inasmuch as the letter which MR. SCOTT displayed to Agent did not indicate clearly whether the address was North or West. A further review of the file indicates there are no outstanding leads in the Portland Division at the present time.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated November 4, 1938, (76-2686), regarding the above matter.

The report of Special Agent N. J. Alaga, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, dated August 30, 1938, reflects efforts to locate MR. J. ROBILLARD of KENOSHA, WISCONSIN, for interview. Since that time MRS. ROBILLARD has been contacted on September 8 and 12, 1938, in an unsuccessful attempt to locate MR. ROBILLARD.

It appears that MR. ROBILLARD, according to information furnished by/his wife, is a travelling salesman working for himself, does not have a definite itinerary, travels all over the United States, and she, MRS. ROBILLARD, does not know when he will be home, or just where he will be at / any given time. She agreed some time ago to immediately communicate with this office just when and where her husband can be contacted. It was thought that he would be in KENOSHA for Labor Day, however, contact with her at that time reflected that he did not return to Kenosha. MR. ROBILLARD knows definitely that this Bureau desires to contact him for further details relative to his letter. However, he is apparently avoiding any contact. One more effort will be made to contact him through his wife at Kenosha, in the near future, and if this is unsuccessful, I do not believe it desirable to continue the efforts any further, since the information MR. ROBILLARD has, as shown in his letter to the Bureau, is of very doubtful value at this time, and undoubtedly investigation has been conducted at BARNETT, MISSOURI, long ago.

Your attention is called to a newspaper article which appeared recently in the Sen Francisco Examiner, allegedly prepared by P. F. Reed, recently released from Alcatras Penitentiary, concerning the escape of Subjects Roe and Cole.

It is noted from this article that Reed reports information relative to the escape of Subjects Cole and Ros, which is at variance with the facts reported in the Bureau file. It is particularly noted that according to Reed the subjects left the mat shop at the prison at 1:03 p. m. and that their escape was not discovered by Guard Steers until he made his 2:30 p. m. check. On the basis of these facts, it would appear that the subjects were missing for one hour and twenty-seven simutes before their escape was known, whereas information in the Bureau's possession is that the escape was discovered approximately forty-five minutes after it occurred. It is desired that this matter be carefully checked by your office to ascertain that the information in the Bureau's possession is correct.

It is also desired that you thoroughly investigate the other details of the escape reported by Reed to determine whether there is any basis in fact for them.

though such plans had been promulgated because he was in for such a short time in Alcatraz and they might have known that he would not have participated in any escape which might have been planned. MR. SIEMAN stated the only information he had relative to the escape of subjects from Alcatraz was the accounts which he had read in the newspapers. However, he said he firmly believed that they would not have been able to have reached the mainland if they attempted to swin the distance from Alcatraz Island to the mainland.

From a review of the Bureau file, it appears that Mr. Fred Cole of Woodlake, California, the stepfather of Subject Theodore Cole, has been entirely cooperative with Agents from your office during the investigation conducted in this case. It is also noted that Special Agent A. D. Horn of your office has in the past contacted Mr. Cole on several occasions.

It is desired that you instruct Agent Horn to again contact Mr. Fred Cole and question him to obtain any knowledge which he may have obtained to indicate that Subject Cole is alive. This interview should, of course, be conducted discreetly so that Mrs. Fred Cole would have no knowledge of it and the cooperation of Mr. Cole should be solicited in an attempt to establish the single fact that Theodore Cole is alive. In the event Fred Cole furnishes information to prove that Theodore Cole has been known to be alive since his escape from Alcatraz, his cooperation should then be requested to assist the Bureau in locating this fugitive. It is suggested, however, that this surpose not be made known to Fred Cole until a discreet attempt is made to determine the fact that the fugitive is alive.

It is requested that you arrange for this interview at an early date and that you advise the Bureau promptly of the results.

He declared that while there, CHAPLA told ROE to look the apartment over as it would be a good place to lay up for a while, there being plenty of room to store away provisions enough to last for several months; and that ROE had mentioned while there that he had to drive about 400 or 500 miles that night, but did not mention where he was going. He stated that ROE stayed for only about fifteen minutes. It was about two a. m. when he arrived and that he drove off in what KOVATS believed was a large automobile, as he merely heard it pull away without seeing it. He further stated that CHAPLA had told him that he had met this man in prison and that this man had just come out of the army. KOVATS recalled making a remark to CHAPLA in answer to some statement he had made while ROE was present concerning his getting a job, which was to the effect that the only job he could get would be on a rock pile and that ROE upon hearing this remark appeared surprised, glared at KOVATS and appeared to tighten his hold on something that he had in his pocket.

KOVATS stated that on the same night and after ROE's departure. CHAPLA proved himself to be a "queer" and attempted to commit an unnatural and immoral act upon him and for this reason he commanded him to leave the apartment and has had nothing to do with him since. He stated that he feels certain that the RALPH ROE that had been to his apartment is the same as the RALPH ROE that is wanted by the F. B. I. as an Escaped Federal Prisoner, as he observed a picture of RALPH ROE in the Official Detective Magazine soom after the departure of this man from his apartment and that it looked like the same person. He stated that the man that was in his apartment was about thirty years of age, about six feet tall, grey eyes, dark brown hair, red face, and was very well built. He stated that he noticed this man had a scar about the size of a twenty-five cent piece on the back of his left had between the base of his thumb and the first finger and that he also had a tattoo on the back of his left hand.

KOVATS further related that he frequently reads the detective magazines and that at the same time that he noticed the photograph of RALPH ROE, he also saw the photograph of THEODORE COLE and recognized this picture as that of a man that had been to his barber shop earlier in the spring for a shave;

that he appeared to be with several other men who occupied two large automobiles, one of which he believed circled the block while this man was being shaved. He stated that this man talked little and that he has not seen him since. He described him as about twenty-five to thirty years of age, one hundred and forty pounds, five feet, ten inches, light hair, thin face, a scar on his right cheek and that his lower lip was heart shaped, coming to a point in the center.

He stated that since seeing these men whom he believes are ROE and COLE he has been very much worried, particularly concerning ROE, as he is afraid that he might be charged with harboring a criminal. He related that he reported the matter to the local police and to the Secret Service but that nothing had resulted from it. HE revealed that he has dreamed considerably about the time that the man whom he believes to be RALPH ROE came to his apartment and that frequently the picture of ROE comes up before him together with that of Mr. Hoover and that he is fearful of some criminal activity being charged to him.

It should be stated that prior to actually contacting KOVATS, effort was made to interview him at his address listed in the latest city directory (1121 Turner Street N.W.) at which address the writer received information that KOVATS had moved from there several months ago; that he was a restless individual and did not remain in any place very long. It should also be stated that the person did not impress the writer as one in whom much confidence should be placed and that it is very likely that his description of the man whom he stated was introduced to him as RALPH ROE had been,at least in part, colored by his observations of the photograph of RALPH ROE appearing in Detective Magazines.

and he stated that early last spring, soon after he had been paroled from Jackson prison, he had been in Grand Rapids and while them had met KOVATS and had gone to his apartment to stay for a few days. He stated that he remained there about one week and recalled that he had brought a visitor to the apartment one night and had introduced him to KOVATS, but that he does not now recall the name of the man. He stated that this man was about twenty-eight years of age, five feet eleven inches, medium build, had light hair, and that at that time he was wearing a sailor's uniform. CHAPLA declared that he was positive that this man's name was not ROE and that he had never known anyone by that name and that man, whom he believed he had met while

drinking beer in a restaurant on Leonard Street, was the only man that he had brought to KOVAT'S apartment during the time he had remained there. Photographs of RALPH ROE were exhibited to him but he declared that he had never seen this man.

He is presently employed by the KENOSHA AUTO TRANSPORT COMPANY, she advised, and would be going back and forth between KENOSHA and INDIANAPOLIS, in each of which cities the KENOSHA AUTO TRANSPORT COMPANY has KAT service stations and restaurants. However, she anticipated that he would be more easily located at INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, and suggested that he be contacted there. She believes that the Indianapolis K A T service station and restaurant is named "K A T's KITTENS" and is at 9000 East Washington in Indianapolis.

MRS ROBILLARD stated that although MR ROBILLARD had been in KENOSHA and in MILWAUKEE since Agent's last call at the Robillard residence on September 12, and she had urged him to call at the Milwaukee Office while in Milwaukee, he had failed to do so, saying that he had intended to, but it had been impossible due to the press of business.

After HILL'S discharge from McAlester he did visit COLE'S home and met his mother which was before COLL'S mother moved to California. HILL also said that he did correspond with her after she moved to California and up until the time of his arrest on the present charge.

The information above set out is from MR. SHUTTLEWORTH as obtained by him at Leavenworth shortly after COLE'S disappearance from Alcotras.

In view of the letter being sent out wherein it appears that HILL is trying to direct his aunt to communicate with TED COLE'S mother in Boodleke, California, this information is being furnished you in order that MRS. COLE can be interviewed relative to her acquaintance with FLOYD A. HILL, in an endeavor to develop any information which would indicate a reason for FLOYD'S endeavoring to contact MRS. COLE.



Reference is made to Bureau letter dated November 12, 1938 (Bureau file 76-2686) in which it is stated that the Bureau has noted discrepancies between the information contained in investigative reports submitted by this office and the statements made in articles appearing in the San Francisco Examiner, allegedly prepared by P. F. Reed, recently released from Alcatraz Penitentiary, concerning the escape of Subjects ROE and COLE.

For the information of the Bureau, the information reported by this office at the time of the escape was obtained and reported as obtained from the officials at Alcatraz Penitentiary. At the time of the escape it was the policy of the prison officials to make a check up each half hour. Since the time of the escape this has been lessened to 15 minutes.

Based on other erroneous statements made by Reed in his articles, dealing not only with the Rocol escape, but with other matters occurring in Alcatraz Penitentiary, it is my impression that REED has merely second or third-handed information, and this information has been written in such a manner that it will act as a circularization stimulant for the newspapers, sacrificing accuracy for readers interest.

In accordance with your instructions, efforts will be made to locate Mr. REED and interview him concerning any first hand know-ledge he may have of the escape.

Miss BUCIANI said that her brother whose name she declined to reveal, is a lieutenant of Police in the San Francisco Police Department, and that she is willing to cooperate with the officers at all times. She stated that Lrs. PETTYJOHI would not disclose any information whatever and would bear watching, but there is no indication so far as she knows that hirs. PRITYJOHN has any contacts with the underworld or knows anything about the whoreabouts of COLE and RCE.

The file on SCHMERVILLE indicates that he was known as KNUD 7. SCIMERVILLE, alias JOHN SULLIVAN, alias JOSEPH SULLIVAN, alias J. MITCHELL, alias J. STONE, alias JAMES STONE, alias U. H. RYHED, FOI #72,152. It also disclosed that SOMMERVILLE served time in the Oklehoma State Reformatory on April 8, 1922 for one year for possession of narcotics.

From the criminal record in the file of the Pomona Police Department it appears that SOMERVILLE apparently went to San Quentin Penitentiary on this charge, while ROE apparently went free. A lead is being set out to check with the Los Angeles Juvenile Court authorities on this matter also.

Attention is called to the fact that SOMMERVILLE and ROE both used the name SULLIVAN, and probably were friendly enough to be passing as brothers. The Bureau ic, therefore, being requested to furnish the complete criminal record on SOMMERVILLE.

AT WOODLAKE, CALIFORNIA:

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent DAMIEL CURRIE, JR., with reference to Bureau letter to the Memphis Office dated September 2, 1938, regarding a communication received from Mr. A. B., TUÇKER, houte 1, Box 221, Woodlake, California.

ALBERT B. TUCKER, Route 1, Box 221, advised that his communication to the Burcau, dosignating that he had information as to the whereabouts of subject COLE, arose from the fact that his distor ALICE HUGGINS had returned from Nachville, Tennessee, around the first part of September, 1936, and that after her return she and ALBERT TUCKER were looking at certain detective magazines, when ALICE HUGGINS spoke up and said, referring to the picture of subject COLE, that she know that man.

According to AIBERT TUCKER, while in Mashville, Tonnessee, his sister had gone out on several occasions with one JESSE SINKS, 1121 Second Avenue, North, Mashvillo, Tennossee, and that it was this party whom his cister believed to be identical with subject COLL. Mr. TUCKER was unable to furnish additional information concerning JESSE SINKS.

Mr. TUCKER related that his sister was presently acting as housekeeper for Mr. FETER ANCHEM, Houte 1, Box 55, Sanger, California.

AT INGLEWOOD, CALIFORNIA:

An attempt was made to locate IVAN WALLER REMIER at 349 East Quoen Street, in view of the fact that he had made a statement that MRS. EVELYN MORGAN, 320 First Street, Richmond, California, was a contact for subjects. Investigation on this information had been negative, and it was desired to reinterview KEFNER to determine the basis of his statement.

MRS. ALICE PAULINER, managor of the Sentinel Apartment Hotel at 349 East Quean Street, stated there was no one by that name residing there at the present time, and her records do not disclose that KEENER had ever resided there; however, it was accordanced that 351 East Queen Street is the address of the California Division of Employment Service.

MR. W. L. BIANCHARD, manager of this service, checked his records and advised that KEEMER had given the address of 349 East Queen Street. The file also disclosed that KEEMER had not been in the office since March 1, 1938, and on May 26, 1938, a letter had gone out to him in regard to employment, but had been returned unclaimed. Therefore, the only address they had was 349 East Queen Street.

The file disclosed that KREMER has a brother CALVIN KEEMER, and the city directory reflects that CALVIN KREMER resides at 2624 Partridge Avenue, Los Angeles, and is listed as a cabinet maker.

DETAILS:

NARRATIVE OF ESCAPE

On December 16th, 1937 at 1:00 PM, six prisoners including COLE, were returned from the mess hall of Alcatraz Prison to the black-smith shop by Junior Officer JOSEPH B. STEERE. At the same time 26 prisoners, including subject ROE, were returned from the mess hall by Junior Officer STEERE to the mat shop which adjoins the blacksmith shop. Officer STEERE has stated that he counted these prisoners when bringing them through the gate into the yard and again checked them when they actually entered their places of employment. This is the usual routine when bringing prisoners from the mess hall to the shops and affords a double check precluding the possibility of prisoners leaving the lines unobserved when marching to work. After checking these prisoners into their shops STEERE returned and observed the prisoners working between 1:00 and 1:30 P.M. and although he is of the opinion that ROE and COLE were there at the time, he states he can not be positive of that fact.

As the prison rules require that junior officers and guards in charge of work details check their prisoners every thirty minutes, STEERE again checked his prisoners at 1:30 P.H. at which time he discovered that ROE and COLE were missing. He immediately notified the Warden's office and an immediate search was conducted. The search revealed that three panes of glass in the detention sash of a window in the blacksmith shop had been removed. This detention sash consists of a steel frame made of "T" iron which is approximately 12 inches across the top of the "T", the shank being of similar width and 1 inch in thickness. The sash is so-constructed that each individual pane of glass is $5\frac{1}{4}$ inches by $8\frac{3}{4}$ inches. By removing two sections of the steel frame and three panes of glass an aperture of approximately $17\frac{1}{2}$ inches by $8\frac{3}{4}$ inches was created. Closer examination of the sash revealed that it had been cut with some instrument, apparently a hack saw. Warden J. A. JOHNSTON and Officer STEERE advised that hack saws are used only in the blacksmith shop and are charged out to the men working therein. As Officer STEERE is required to continually inspect five rooms, it is logical to believe that subject COLE used a hack saw which was charged to the blacksmith shop, to saw the detention sash at such times as Officer STEERE was inspecting the other rooms, particularly those in the adjoining mat shop.

The window faces the northwest corner of the Island and is immediately above the waterline. There is however, a 14 foot, heavy, iron-mesh

fence on the edge of the cliff to prevent prisoners from running to the edge of the Island and diving into the Bay. Between the window where the escape was made and the wire fence, there is a steel catwalk which leads to a lower level at the rear of the mat shop and was used for the purpose of throwing the remnants of the automobile tire casings into the Bay after the good portions had been removed for use in the construction of mats. At the termination of the catwalk is a small gate in the fence which could be opened. Examination of this gate showed that the subjects had used a large Stillson wrench in twisting the padlock on the gate. This wrench was found at the gate with the broken padlock. After opening the gate it was possible for the prisoners to jump to a ledge a few feet below and then to either jump into the Bay or to follow a natural ledge which leads to within a few feet of the waterline.

An examination of the shoreline where subjects apparently entered the water failed to reveal that any erticles of clothing had been discarded. They were wearing prison made suits at the time of their escape.

Within ten or fifteen minutes after the escape was discovered, guards were searching this portion of the Island and the prison launch was in the Bay immediately opposite this point. Coast Guard boats were also notified of the escape and the surrounding waters of the Island were thoroughly patrolled. However on the day of the escape there was a heavy fog and visibility ranged from 200 to 300 yards. There was also an exceptionally strong current running in the vicinity of the Island, caused by a very high tide, the current being accelerated by flood waters from the rivers, as there had been heavy rains in the valley. Lighthouse keepers and Coast Guardsmen estimate that the current at the time of the escape had a speed of approximately six knots per hour. They also advised that it would have been almost impossible for a rowboat to have been propolled against the current and suggested that unless a motorboat was rather powerful it could not have proceeded against the current. The temperature was below normal due to the melting snow in the mountains which also added to the flooded waters. The Bay had an unusual amount of driftwood at the time, but marine observers estimated that if subjects had attached themselves to driftwood they would have been carried to sea at least ten miles from the Island. As this was a flooded ebbtide, the returning tide would have returned them only approximately six miles.

On the afternoon of December 15th, 1937, the day prior to the escape, an unknown individual made inquiry in Portland, Oregon regarding tides and currents in the San Francisco Bay in the Vicinity of Alcatraz Is-

land, and on the same date purchased a U. S. Department of Commerce booklet entitled "Current Tables Pacific Coast". He also purchased another publication issued by the U. S. Hydrograph Service entitled "Tide Current Chart of San Francisco Bay". To date no information has been developed as to the identity of this individual or the manner in which he may have been traveling. However a check has been, and is being made of all passengers leaving Portland by airplane, as well as owners of automobiles passing through checking stations into California. The following is the best description of this individual obtainable from the keepers of the Lighthouse Service:

This individual plainly indicated that he was not a nautical man as he asked for information as to how to read the table. It is suggested that where investigation is conducted regarding any person who would answer the above description that photographs be obtained, if possible, and that they be forwarded to the Portland Office for presentation to the persons seeing this unknown party.

PERSONAL HISTORY AND RELATIVES OF SUBJECTS

RALPH ROE with aliases: PAUL SULLIVAN, JACK SULLIVAN, J. O. SULLIVAN, JACK McCARTY, RAYMOND ROE, RAYMOND ROWE, J. H. REYNOLDS, RALPH ROWE - FUGITIVE, I.O. #1472.

RALPH ROE has the reputation of being a thief, a burglar, a bank robber and a desperate criminal. He was convicted at Muskogee, Oklahoma on January 18th, 1935 with JACK LLOYD, his associate, for the robbery of the Farmers National Bank, Sulphur, Oklahoma, and ROE was sentenced to

serve a term of 99 years in the United States Penitentiary. This is the sentence which he was serving at the time of his escape. One DICK COFFRIN, who has been interviewed in this case, was also arrested with ROE and LLOYD but was released on the charge of bank robbery. Prior to the arrest and conviction of ROE on the bank robbery charge, he was convicted on several occasions and served penitentiary sentences as will be shown on his criminal record set forth on I.O. #1472.

ROE while engaged in criminal activities in Oklahoma and the southwest was the known associate of several well known criminals and gangsters and was with WILBUR UNDERHILL, desperate criminal, at the time UNDERHILL was apprehended and wounded, from which wounds he died at Shawnee, Oklahoma. ROE was also wounded at this time and his paramour of the moment was killed. After the death of UNDERHILL, ROE began associating with HAZEL UNDERHILL and she would probably be his first contact if his escape was successful. He bears the reputation of being weak on the subject of women and whisky and has had numbrous paramours. Several of his former associates have advised that if he was successful in his escape that he would not hide in an isolated place for a long period of time, but would desire to be with women companions and do considerable drinking, probably with his former women associates.

With reference to his family, ROE's mother has been deceased for several years, while his father, JOHN, died at Duncan, Oklahoma during 1936. ROE was raised in the vicinity of Duncan. He has three brothers, only one of them being in the State of Oklahoma at the present time, ROY ROE, who is an immate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester. He has two other brothers, RAYMOND and JAMES and further information is sct out below regarding these brothers. He had one sister, ALPHA, who is deceased. The families of his father and mother reside in the vicinity of Excelsior Springs, Missouri but ROE has never had any connection with these relatives. He has other relatives in the vicinity of Duncan who enjoy good reputations and who are willing to assist in this investigation. Each of his relatives will be recontacted for information. Included in the list of relatives furnished by ROE to prison authorities are the names of WANDA STUKEY and MARIE BLACKWELL, listed as being his sisters. However, subsequent investigation reveals that these persons are not related to him but their names are so listed in order that he might correspond with them. WANDA STUKEY is presently residing with JAMES ROE as his common law wife while MARIE BLACKWELL alias MARIE BLACKBURN is now residing at Ardmore, Oklahoma. The following is a list of ROE's relatives:

BONNER, MRS. WILLIS, maternal aunt, Duncan, Oklahoma. Mrs. BONNER presently resides with her daughter, Mrs. S. E. LEGG. Direct contact has not been had with Mrs. BONNER although her daughter was inter-

viewed and assured of their desire to cooperate as reflected in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY dated at Oklahoma City, December 22d, 1938, Page 5.

ESTICE, MRS. ELIZABETH, relationship not given, Excelsior Springs, Missouri. She was interviewed as reflected in the report of Special Agent H. W. SAVAGE, Kansas City, dated April 11th, 1938, stating that she last saw ROE when he visited in Excelsior Springs with his mother when he was six or seven years of age.

HICKEY, JOHN, RFD, Duncan, Oklahoma. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated February 3d, 1938 which reflects an interview with HICKEY, who enjoys a good reputation. He stated he had practically raised subject ROE since infancy but he doubted that ROE would contact him as he had some trouble with ROE shortly prior to his arrest for bank robbery and subsequent confinement in the United States Penitentiary. Other relatives have advised that this difficulty arose when ROE stole money from the HICKEY home. HICKEY assured Agent of his desire to cooperate and it is believed that should he receive any information he would immediately contact this office. He was unable to furnish any information regarding possible contacts of ROE. HICKEY is an uncle of ROE.

LEGG, MRS. S. E., cousin, Duncan, Oklahoma. She enjoys an excellent reputation and it is believed she will furnish any information she may receive regarding her cousin, ROE. Contact has been had with her husband as shown in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 22d, 1937 and she will be interviewed for full information.

MARCH, MRS. EVA, cousin, Duncan, Oklahoma. She is County Clerk of Stephens County, Oklahoma and bears an excellent reputation. She has been interviewed, at which time she furnished information regarding the personal history and antecedents of ROE, although she was unable to furnish any information regarding his criminal associates. She expressed her willingness to cooperate in this matter and it is believed she would immediately furnish any information she might receive to this office. (See report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 22d, 1937). She did not know anyone who possessed any information regarding the escape of ROE as she had discussed same with relatives in Duncan and she did not think ROE would contact any of his relatives other than his brother.

ROE, MRS. ETHEL, relationship not given, Excelsior Springs, Missouri. She was interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent H. W. SAVAGE, Kansas City, April 11th, 1938 but stated she has not seen

subject ROE since he was a small child and that she could not be of any assistance in giving any information concerning his probable whereabouts.

ROE, JAMES, brother, Odessa, Texas. JAMES ROE is a conditional releasee from the U.S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth and is presently working for the International Supply Company at Odessa. Upon his release from prison he began living with WANDA STUKEY, a friend of RALPH ROE and they have since lived as man and wife. His former wife, FAE ROE, presently resides in Araadia, California. They have not been divorced.

He has been interviewed on several occasions. When interviewed, as reflected in the report of Special Agent B. L. DAMRON, El Paso, dated December 20th, 1937 he admitted he had served two terms in the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth for "bootlegging." He denied any knowledge of the escape until he read of the same in the newspapers. He stated he had been working at Hobbs, New Mexico during December, 1937, being away from Hobbs on one occasion when he went to El Paso on Christmas Day. This has been verified. He also stated he would not assist his brother but would not furnish any information concerning this investigation. He said he had never associated with subject ROE's friends as they were "killers".

that WANDA STUKEY wrote LILLIAN MACMAHON a short time after the escape saying that JAMES ROE was in San Francisco for a few days. However, the informant did not see this letter. When confronted with this information JAMES ROE emphatically denied that he had been in California or that he had received any information relative to subject ROE. At this time documents were checked which verified that he was employed at Hobbs from December 16th, 1937 to February 1st, 1938 with the exception of the period from December 23d, 1937 to December 26th, 1937 inclusive, at which time he was in El Paso, also verified, and a visit to Wink, Texas on January 22d and 23d, 1938 which was verified. Mail covers placed on his mail have been unproductive of any information of value.

JAMES ROE was interviewed with negative results as reflected in the report of Special Agent V. J. VANLANDINGHAM, Kansas City, dated September 7th, 1938.

Information was also received that ROE was a capable aviator, but interview with EARL A. FIELDS has reflected that FIELDS did not think JAMES ROE was capable of flying an airplane or seaplane. (See report of Special Agent C. R. DAVIS, San Antonio, dated August 19th, 1938.)

JAMES ROE was allegedly contacted by informant reflected by the report of Special Agent H. T. ARTERBERRY, Dallas, April 20th, 1938, but information furnished by BRANNON is not considered to be true. BRANNON reported that JAMES ROE informed him that about two months after this escape a man purporting to be TED COLE contacted him at Hobbs, New Mexico and delivered a note signed "R. R.", purporting to be from RALPH ROE, requesting \$300.00; that JAMES ROE gave \$300 to this unknown individual; that he has not seen or heard from this party since that time; that at this time the individual advised him that he and ROE became separated after they hit the water and that he had not seen RALPH again; that if he, JAMES, heard from RALPH, to have him contact RAY GILES, Oklahoma City.

Investigation has been conducted regarding friends and associates of JAMES RCE with negative results. Investigation regarding him should be continual and efforts should be made to develop some informant who would be in a position to know the activities of ROE and who would advise the El Paso Office should there be any contact made.

Attention is also directed to the letter from El Paso to this office dated November 5th, 1938 which reflects that JAMES ROE called at the El Paso Office and complained regarding investigations being made as to him. He denied having heard from RALPH ROE and did not think that subject ROE was successful in his escape. He was advised that instant investigation would be conducted until RALPH ROE was located or it was definitely ascertained that he was dead.

ROE, MRS. JALES (FAE), sister-in-law, Arcadia, California. She has been scparated from her husband for scmetime but they are not divorced, but such action is contemplated. The report of Special Agent R. H. PRANKE, dated at Los Angeles, December 22d, 1937, page 11, reveals that surveillance was conducted and that a mail cover was placed on Mrs. FAE ROE with negative regults. The report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, Los Angeles, dated Becember 27th, 1937, page 22, reflects an interview with her but she furnished no information of value. It is thought that further investigation should be conducted regarding FAE ROE, and that an effort be made to have someone in the immediate vicinity of her home or place of employment act as an informant, as it is believed that she would harbor or assist subject ROE.

ROE, RAYMOND, brother, Box 242, Hays, Kansas. RAYMOND ROE, who is cmployed as district foreman for the Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Company, is alleged to possess a good reputation. He has been interviewed as reflected in the report of Special Agent W. L. LISTERMAN, Kansas City, dated December 28th, 1937, page 2, at which time he furnished some information regarding his brothers and stated he would furnish any information he might receive regarding the whereabouts of his

brother, the subject. He admitted that during August, 1937 he and his wife made a trip to San Francisco but denied that he saw subject ROE.

Mrs. RAYMOND ROE was interviewed in the absence of her husband, as disclosed by the report of Special Agent W. L. LISTERMAN, Kansas City, dated January 24th, 1938, page 15, but she stated they had received no information regarding the escape. The report of Special Agent D. P. SULLIVAN, El Paso, dated September 22d, 1938 wherein an interview with JAMES ROE is reported, reflects on page 2 that JAMES ROE stated he had visited RAYMOND ROE on August 21st, 1938; that they discussed subject's escape but that neither of them had received any information since the report was printed that he had escaped.

ROE, ROY, brother, presently an immate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma. ROY ROE was received at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary on February 9th, 1937 and was incarcorated before and after this escape. He has not been interviewed regarding possible contacts of his brother, and same will be done. His correspondence will also be checked and he will be interviewed for information as to the identity and whereabouts of DAVID DALLAS, an ex-convict friend. (See report of Special Agent C. R. DAVIS, San Antonio, dated July 23d, 1938.)

SISK, MRS. ELMER, aunt, RFD, Excelsior Springs, Missouri. She advised an Agent she had not seen subject ROE since he visited Excelsior Springs with his mother when he was six or seven years of age, and that since that time she had received no correspondence or other infor-

THEODORE COLE, a native of Kansas, bears the reputation of being a killer. He is moronic and vicious. He was convicted in Federal Court at Guthrie, Oklahoma on May 20th, 1935 on charges of kidnaping and was sentenced to serve 50 years in a U. S. Penitentiary. On October 22d, 1929 he was received at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, under sentence of death, upon a charge of robbery, but same was commuted to 15 years. However, he escaped from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary. Very little is known of his family life, although it is known that for some years he resided with his family in the vicinity of Stroud, Oklahoma. Some of his former associates have stated that they did not think that COLE would remain with ROE for any length of time if their escape was a success as COLE would not stand for ROE drinking and playing around with They also advised that COLE, if successful, would not mingle with the public but would be able to stand isolation until he had "cooled off". He did not associate with women companions to the same extent as ROE and he did not associate with criminal gangs as did ROE. Most of his criminal associates are presently confined in some penitentiary, some of his closest friends having been developed while he was also an inmate.

With reference to the COLE family, he has been much closer to his immediate family and relatives than ROE. His stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. FRED COLE reside at Woodlake, California, while a sister, Mrs. VIOLA DAWSON resides at Bell, California. About 1928 or 1929 he resided with his parents at Alpena Pass, Arkansas where he married MARIE WYNNE, who has since divorced him. He has one child, BILLY WYNNE COLE, who resides with COLE's former wife. He also has numerous relatives in Oklahoma and a complete list is set forth below.

BAUGHMAN, IRS. FANNIE, aunt, RFD#2, Stroud, Oklahoma. She is reported to be residing with her mother, the grandmother of subject COLE, and is also recorted to be mentally unbalanced. She has four daughters, two of them, names MRS. RALPH PAYNE and MRS. JEAN HYATT, being mentioned below, while she has two other daughters, CLARA and MARGARET.

Mrs. RALPH PAYNE when interviewed was unable to furnish the last names of these two sisters, but they reside in the vicinity of Stroud, Oklahoma. These relatives will be interviewed for information.

BRACE, ERNEST, uncle, RFD, Stroud, Oklahoma. Efforts to interview BRACE have been unsuccessful. VIOLA DAWSON, sister of subject, advised ERNEST BRACE has three children, MELVIN, JUANITA and VESTAL, all single and living with their parents. (See report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, Los Angeles, December 21st, 1937.)

BRACE, CHARIES, cousin, Amarillo, Texas. Mrs. VIOLA DAWSON when interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER dated at Los Angeles December 21st, 1937, page 19, stated that her mother had a brother, FRED BRACE, who was deceased, and that he had a son CHARLES who, to her knowledge, was last working for Montgomery-Ward at Amarillo. His mother, DONA, has remarried, her married name being unknown, and is living near Sapulpa, Oklahoma. A definite address will be determined for these relatives and leads will then be set out to interview them.

BRACE, MRS. NETTIE, maternal grandmother, RFD, Stroud, Oklahoma. She is reported to reside with her daughter, Mrs. FANNIE BAUCHMAN but efforts to interview her have been unsuccessful. She will be interviewed for full information as to subject's relatives and associates and their present addresses.

COLE, MRS. ALICE, step-grandmother, 528 West 44th Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma. She resides with her daughter, Mrs. GUY VAUGHAN and was interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 23d, 1937, page 6. She advised she had not seen subject COLE for ten years and she did not think that any of his relatives would assist him other than Mrs. FRED COLE. She did not think that subject COLE would contact her as he did not know her whereabouts.

COLE, Mr. and Mrs. FRED, stepfather and mother, Woodlake, California.

Immediately upon the escape of subjects, surveillance was maintained at the home of these individuals with negative results. Their home is 2½ miles from Woodlake. Upon interview they denied any knowledge of the contemplated escape or any information as to the present whereabouts of COLE. (See report of Special Agent R. N. PRANKE, Los Angeles, December 22d, 1937). This surveillance was continued and they were again interviewed as disclosed by the report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, Los Angeles, December 27th, 1937. Mrs. COLE stated she had seen subject twice since 1937, the last time being in July; that she wrote to him every Monday but received only a few replies, and that COLE had given absolutely no indication of any intention to escape. Although they assured Agent of their desire to cooperate in this matter, it is not be-

lieved that they will furnish any information should they receive same. Arrangements have been made with several of their neighbors who have maintained watch on their home and these informants should be recontacted at periodic intervals for information. Mail covers on the mail of Mr. and Mrs. COLE have not been productive of any information and it may be that they are using an alternate mailing address.

Reference is made also to the report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER dated at Los Angeles, January 8th, 1938 which reflects that Mr. and Mrs. COLE were interviewed concerning their connection with HUCH BUTCHER and FLOYD HILL, with negative results. Attention is called to the review of the information concerning BUTCHER and HILL set forth hereinafter in this report. Further investigation will be conducted concerning this matter.

Mrs. COLE was interviewed with negative results as reported in the report of Special Agent R. H. SIMONS, Los Angeles, dated October 12th, 1938.

COLE, MRS. MARIE WYNNE alias "ALPENA MARIE", ex-wife, Alpena Pass, Arkansas. She and COLE were married in 1929 after a courtship of three weeks, and they did not live together after August, 1929. They have one child, BILLIE, born in 1930, residing with his mother, and she states that subject COLE has never seen his son. She is a prostitute and plies her trade in various parts of Arkansas, Missouri and Kansas. She has been interviewed as shown in the reports of Special Agents D. R. MORLEY and P. A. PRATT, Little Rock, dated January 4th, 1938 and April 1st, 1938 respectively. She, as well as her mother, Mrs. J. D. WYNNE, denies that they had any information to indicate that subject is alive. However she expressed a willingness to act as an informant in this case for a sum of moncy. Investigation is being conducted at the present time by the Kansas City and Little Rock Offices concerning her, in view of the fact that she has made statements that she saw COLE at Pittsburgh, Kansas and has been in communication with him. Results of this investigation to this date are shown in the reports of Special Agents R. F. NEWKIRK and E. H. KRIEGER, Kansas City, dated October 14th, 1938 and October 26th, 1938 respectively, and the report of Special Agent W. F. WHITELY, Little Rock, dated November 3d, 1938.

COLLINS, MRS. WILLIAM, aunt, whereabouts unknown. She formerly resided at Stroud, Oklahoma but left about September, 1937. She and her family follow carnivals and fairs, operating lunch stands, and their present whereabouts are unknown. In view of this fact and because they disappeared a short time before instant escape, efforts will be made immediately at Stroud, Oklahoma, their former home, to determine their present whereabouts in order that they may be contacted. She has two sons,

JOHN and LESTER who reside with her. Chief of Police VANSICKLE, Stroud, Oklahoma has attempted to obtain information as to her whereabouts without success.

CORNETT, Mrs. R. B. (PAULINE), sister, RFD, Stroud, Oklahoma. R.B. (REBEL) CORNETT, subject COLE's brother-in-law, was arrested in Dallas with this subject. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, Oklahoma City, dated December 23d, 1937 wherein information was received to the effect that CORNETT had at one time furnished information to officers which led to the apprehension of COLE: that CORNETT himself would not be friendly with COLE; that shortly after the arrest of COLE for the kidnaping for which he was serving instant sentence, Mrs. FRED COLE tried to get CORNETT to kill J.A. RUTHERFORD, the victim, and upon his refusal, she forced Mrs. CORNETT to leave her husband. About four months later CORNETT met Hrs. COLE on the streets of Stroud and after whipping her, he took his wife home. When Agents proceeded to the CORNETT home to interview Mrs. CORNETT, he had a shotgun, stating he was afraid it was subject COLE, for if COLE ever came to his home, it would be to kill him, CORNETT on account of his trouble with Mrs. COLE. Both Mr. and Mrs. CORNETT expressed a willingness to cooperate in this matter and furnished information concerning COLE's former associates and contacts. However, they each stated that they had not received any information regarding the escape or the probable whereabouts of subjects.

Mrs. CORNETT was again interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 29th, 1937 but she had no additional information.

colored, an informant, has watched their home to see if COLE appears. On December 21st, 1937 he was at the home of the CORNETTS at which time they claimed they knew nothing about COLE and wondered if he had managed to successfully escape. Chief of Police VANSICKLE has also been watching for the appearance of COLE in that vicinity. Further contact will be had with Mr. and Mrs. CORNETT.

DAWSON, MRS. G.I. (VIOLA or VIOLET), half-sister, 6238 Gifford Street, Bell, California. The report of Special Agent R.N. PRANKE, Los Angeles, dated December 22d, 1937, pages 3 to 8 inclusive, reveals that a surveillance was maintained on the DAWSON home with negative results. An interview was had with Mrs. DAWSON, as shown in the report referred to, at which time she stated she last visited COLE during June or July, 1937 and had received no information regarding the escape or his probable whereabouts. She furnished information concerning his personal history and relatives, but was unable to furnish the names of any contacts. She was of the opinion that if successful, COLE would probably contact his mother and full sister, PAULINE CORNETT. She agreed to

cooperate in this matter and the Agents interviewing her were of the opinion that she would do so. She was re-interviewed, as shown in the report of Special Agent R. P. KRALER dated at Los Angeles, December 27, 1937, page 19, at which time she furnished further information regarding subject COLE's relatives and reiterated that she would cooperate in this investigation. The report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, Los Angeles, dated January 8th, 1938 reflects that she was again interviewed with negative results.

Neighbors have been watching the DATSON home at the request of the Los Angeles Office and as a result information was received that an old man driving a Pontiac Sedan bearing Washington license A-105925, visited the DAWSON home. Investigation is being requested of the Scattle Office to check the identity of the owner of this license.

GROVES, MRS. WILLIAM (LOTTH), cousin, Stroud, Oklahoma. Information furnished by Mrs. VIOLA DANSON reflects that Mrs. GROVES is the daughter of LILLIE BRACE, maternal aunt of subject COLE, who is deceased. She has a sister, THELMA, last name unknown, and a brother LEE, whereabouts unknown. Addresses of these cousins should be ascertained in order that they may be interviewed and Mrs. GROVES will be contacted for any information she may possess.

HYATT, Mrs. TIM (JEAN), cousin, Sapulpa, Oklahoma. She is the daughter of Mrs. FANNIE BAUGHMAN and has not been interviewed, but same will be done in the near future.

PAYNE, MRS. RALPH (ALTA MAE), cousin, Penryn, California. She is the daughter of Mrs. FANNIE BAUGHMAN and was interviewed as reported in the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, February 25th, 1938, with negative results. However she furnished the names of relatives and appeared willing to cooperate.

VAUGHAN, MRS. GUY, 528 West 44th, Tulsa, Oklahoma, step-aunt. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 23d, 1937, page 6, which reflects an interview with Mrs. VAUGHAN. She stated she had not seen subject since he was about 13 years of age and consequently could furnish no information regarding him. She was of the opinion that ESTHER COLE, subject COLE's mother, would be the only relative who would assist him. She appears willing to cooperate and further contact will be had with her.

The attention of all offices is directed to the letter from the Bureau to all offices dated May 9th, 1938 calling attention to the fact that the photograph appearing on I.O. #1472 does not portray a true likeness of ROE and that his photograph taken by the Oklahoma City Police Department, #15589, same being furnished to each office, was a true likeness of ROE.

The medical record and dental chart of ROE were obtained at Alcatraz Prison and are in the files of the San Francisco Office. Information contained therein as reflected in the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, dated December 21st, 1938, page 11, is as follows:

The medical and dental chart of COLE were obtained at the Alcatraz Prison and are in the files of the San Francisco Office. Information contained therein (see report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, December 21st, 1937, page 11) discloses that he has a scar 12 inches long on the left thigh, which was healed; that he was $65\frac{3}{4}$ " tall, weighed 125 pounds and was underweight. Teeth #18 and #31 were missing and he had cavities in teeth #3, #17 and #30.

COLE's criminal record can be found on I.O. #1471.

INFORMANTS

It is thought that if any success if achieved during this investigation to determine if the escape was successful, and if successful the whereabouts of subjects, that this must be done through confidential informants and sources of information. While subjects operated in the southwestern states before their incarceration, information has been received from the informants, as set forth below, that due to their contacts made in various penitentiaries, especially at Alcatraz Prison, subjects have developed contacts with the underworld in the various cities of the United States, and if successful in their escape could hope for a place of asylum with former criminal associates and contacts of present and former inmates of Alcatraz Prison. It is logical to assume that this would be true.

In view of this, it is requested that each office contact its confidential informants and sources of information connected with the underworld and criminal element in an effort to determine if there have been any rumors

regarding this escape or the presence of either of subjects in that vicinity.

In connection with this matter, attention is directed to the teletype from the Bureau to all offices dated December 23d, 1937, advising that the Bureau would pay a reasonable sum to any informant who furnished information to a Bureau representative which resulted in the location of these fugitives. No publicity was to be given to this offer.

Confidential informants have been developed in connection with this case and information obtained from each of them is as follows. Under no circumstances should the names of any of these informants be divulged to any sources.



(Also referred to as INFORMANT "N") Informant "R" is a confidential informant of Seminole, Oklahoma and was reported to be very friendly with the JOHNSON boys, formerly of that vicinity who were close associates of WILBUR UNDERHILL and RALPH ROE, and who harbored UNDERHILL. She claimed to have known ROE before his incarceration. She advised Agents that SEEDALL "SLEEPY" JOHNSON was in Seminole during September, 1937 at which time his constant conversation was about RALPH ROE who, he claimed, would escape from Alcatraz Island. It was determined that the JOHNSON family were residing at Phoenix, Arizona and informant "R" planned to visit in Phoenix and arrangements were made with her that she should contact the JOHNSONS for information regarding this escape. (See report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, February 21st, 1938.)

Attention is also called to page 9 of the report of Special Agent R. T. HOOD, Oklahoma City, April 28th, 1938 in which it reflects that this informant advised Agent F. S. SMITH that a friend of the JOHNSON family,

She left Seminole in order to contact the JOHNSONS but did not proceed father than Dallas. Upon her return she stated she had received information from one BERT WYLIE that "SLEEPY" JOHNSON wanted her to communicate with him at Telephone #3-6481, Kansas City. However it was later determined that there was no such telephone number in Kansas City. In view of the failure of this informant to carry out the plans agreed upon, it is doubtful if she is reliable, however further contact will be had with her and the present whereabouts of the JOHNSON boys will be obtained.

INFORMANT "13", Seminole, Oklahorn. Information has been previously furnished the Bureau regarding the background of this informant who is a conditional releasee from the U. S. Ponitentiary, Leavenworth. Upon his release from the U. S. Penitentiary where he had been confined for violation of the HARRISON Narcotic Act, "13" returned to Semihole and at the request of JAKE SINS he made a trip, allegedly to contact HAZEL UNDERHILL. Attention is called to the letter from this office to the Bureau dated September 9th, 1938, page 3, showing JAKE SIES advised that upon the return of this informant after contacting HAZIL UNDERHILL, he stated that she had received a postcard postmarked Englewood Station, Chicago, which stated that the writer would see her within a few days; that HAZEL UNDERHILL told him the card was in the handwriting of ROE, but that no one had shown up. Informant was of the opinion that HERBERT ALLEN FARLER possessed information concerning subjects, saying he had received information that FARICER was in Dallas. This information is at variance with information furnished by the informant when personally interviewed, as shown below, but the variance may be due to the information being reported by SIMS.

Reference is also made to the letter to the Bureau from this office dated September 24th, 1938 reflecting an interview with this informant. He stated he had been a close friend and associate of ROE for many years and was a cellmate of ROE at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester. He advised he would not attempt to discover any information as to their whereabouts, but that due to his friendship for and confidence in JAKE SIMS, he would aid the Burcau in determining whether subjects were successful in their escape and if successful, he would get definite proof. He further advised that he had talked with one HICKEY CAREY, a friend and business associate of HIRBIRT ALLEN FARITR, ex-Alcatraz, and gathered from their conversation that subjects got away; that CAREY undoubtedly received his information from FARITR, whose theory was that BAILEY and BATES, kidnapers of CHARLES URSCHEL, promoted the escape and promised subjects they would be taken care of until they had "cooled off". He stated that a certain party, withholding the name, received a postcard from Chicago sometime after the escape, making inquiry as to the location of HAZEL UNDERHILL, indicating that they were anxious to locate her and

This informant is that it was thought that this card was from ROE. of the opinion that HAZEL UNDERHILL should have more information than any other person regarding ROE, and that if she possessed any information he could get it as he had helped her on numerous occasions and she knew of his friendship for ROE and had confided in him in the past. Arrangements were made with him in order that he would contact HAZEL UNDERHILL for information. However before he could proceed to Texas to contact her, information was received that she had been in Seminole. Further contact was had with this informant as revealed in the report of Special Agent F. S. SMITH, dated October 15th, 1938, page 3, at Oklahoma City. was unable to locate her and he did not think it advisable to drop in on HAZEL UNDERHILL at her present address in Texas without being prepared to tell her how he ascertained her address, and he would not contact her unless he could avoid suspicion. He will contact her at the earliest practicable time.

It should be noted that all arrangements have been made with this informant through JAKE SIIS and he has expressed a willingness to assist in this matter only because of the suggestion of SIMS. It is extremely doubtful whether he would furnish any information other than through SIMS. Contact is being maintained with Informant "13" through JAKE SIMS who considers him reliable and who is of the opinion that should the informant receive any information he would furnish it to him, SIMS, who has been very cooperative in this investigation.

Informant "13" is of the opinion that subjects escaped and are alive, saying that while COLE is dangerous and brainless, ROE is of a thoroughly different type, being very conservative. He did not think that ROE would have jumped into the Bay without what he considered better than a fifty-fifty chance to be successful.

INFORMANT "Z", Bartlesville, Oklahoma. This informant has a wide acquaintance with the underworld in Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas, Texas and Oklahoma and knows ROE and his associates. He has in the past furnished valuable information to Special Agent F. S. SMITH.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent F. S. SMITH, Oklahoma City, April 1st, 1938 wherein is reported an interview with him. He advised Agent that he was talking with a man whose identity he would not furnish but whom he considered reliable, and when "Z" stated he thought subjects had drowned, the unknown individual said he knew positively that ROE and COLE had escaped; that they were both furnished clothing and finances after they escaped and are o.k. He agreed to contact a friend for more information.

Attention is also called to the report of Special Agent F. S. SHITH

dated at Oklahoma City April 12th, 1938, reflecting that "Z" telephonically communicated with Agent from Joplin, Missouri, stating that "the little fellow" who escaped out there "was here recently and contacted the big deaf fellow who was involved in the Kansas City massacre. The deaf fellow told me that while he know the little fellow, he could not afford for him to hang around and told him he had his troubles and did not want any more and had him leave." He also said that the party previously referred to as giving him the original information was in Texas for a few days. The "big deaf fellow" referred to is HERBIRT ALLIN FARMER.

"Z" was again interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent R.T. HOOD, April 28th, 1938, Oklahoma City, page 6, at which time he stated that subjects received assistance from an ex-convict brother of ROE, referring undoubtedly to JAMES ROE, in the escape; that the escape was effected with an oil barrel and paddles; that both subjects had been taking strenuous exercise for a long period, using an automobile casing for that purpose; that after escaping, the ex-convict brother of ROE furnished them with a car and either accompanied them or preceded them to Joplin where contact was had with HERBERT FARMER and another man whose identity "Z" would not divulge; that FARMER probably helped subjects and undoubtedly knew their whereabouts. He advised that ROE and COLE planned to proceed to Fort Smith, Arkansas from Joplin to make contact with a connection of RUSSELL COOPER, presently confined. "Z" also said that one MICKEY CAREY, an associate of FARMER, probably knew the whereabouts of subjects.

Reference is also made to the report of Special Agent L. E. KINGMAN, Oklahoma City, August 6th, 1938 concerning an interview with "Z", who stated he had received information from one ROY G. WILLIAMS, a whisky runner, that subjects had been in the vicinity of Longview, Texas. Investigation conducted by the Dallas office has failed to substantiate this information.

Informant "Z" was last contacted as shown in the report of Special Agent F. S. SMITH, Oklahoma City, October 15th, 1937, but he had received no further information than that previously furnished Agents. He agreed to proceed to Joplin to contact his source of information and on October 12th, 1938 he telegraphed from that place as follows:

"HAVE TALKED TO MC NOTHING DEFINITE H JUST GOT IN FROM SALT LAKE WILL TALK TO HIM TOMORROW AND WILL WIRE YOU MY FINDINGS."

The initials "MC" refer to MICKEY CAREY and the letter "H" no doubt refers to HERBERT ALLEN FARLER. However, some information had been re-

ceived that FARIER was operating a liquor store in Dallas, and as "Z" stated he had just returned from Salt Lake, the Kansas City Office was requested to determine if FARIER was actually in Joplin as stated by informant. On the same date the Kansas City Office advised that FARIER was then in Joplin and had been there right along; that he had appeared in Court at Neosho on October 11th, 1938 on a gambling charge. On "c-tober 12th, 1938 another telegram was received from "Z" stating there was nothing important and that he was returning to his home.


Further contact will be had with "Z" and efforts will be made to verify his information in order that it may be learned if he is reliable. However, attention is called to the information furnished by Informant "13" regarding FARMER.

She was formerly a contact She informed some attorney, for name unknown, that ROE and COLE had made a successful escape with both inside and outside help. She was interviewed as shown on page 4 of the repert of Special Agent C. O. HURT, Oklahoma City, dated February 14th, 1938 whereupon she stated she did not know either of subjects, although she formerly associated with many well known criminals and expected to marry BRUCE BRADY, a big time criminal. She admitted she had "popped off" to an attorney in Oklahoma City about the escape, but that she did not possess any information concerning same. She is an informant of SMITH LEAHY, Deputy United States Marshal, Pawhuska, and agreed to cooperate in this investigation. She will be contacted through LEAHY to determine if she has received any information regarding subjects, and if not, she will be requested to contact BRUCE BRADY and other criminal associates of subject for information. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 22d, 1937, b7D nage 7. concerning this informant, who is the informant of and who was thought to possess some information regarding activities in that vicinity. He was contacted by LATH-ROP and stated he was not well acquainted with ROE but would make inquiry, and in the event he secured any information he would furnish same to LA-THROP who agreed to immediately advise this office. However, no further advice has been received and LATHROP will be requested to contact for information.

Reference is also made to the report of SAC E. P. GUINANE, Oklahoma City, dated April 5th, 1938 wherein is reported further information received from RICHARDSON after he had attempted to locate HAZEL UNDERHILL at Monahans, Texas; that he advised he had run across an ex-convict whom he knew and he informed him he had seen COLE, referring to him as "the little fellow", at Brownsville, Texas about April 1st, 1938. However RICHARDSON stated

that the ex-convict was partially drunk and could have been "talking wild." He later contacted the ex-convict while sober but his statements varied from his previous assertions. (See report of Special Agent R. T. HOOD, Oklahoma City, April 28th, 1938.) RICHARDSON was unable to locate HAZEL UNDERHILL or to obtain any information regarding her whereabouts and returned to Oklahoma City. However attention is called to letter of this office to the Bureau dated May 25th, 1938, which discloses RICHARDSON had contacted HAZEL UNDERHILL who advised him that she believed subjects had made their escape but intimated she had no information whatsoever. She also stated she was marrying a respectable citizen at Levelland, Texas and did not want any further association with criminals. It will be noted however that this marriage has not taken place.

has communicated with this office recently, stating he has received no information regarding ROE and COLE. It is believed that should he receive such information he would immediately furnish same to this office. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 23d, 1937, whose name was furnished by Chief of Police VANconcerning SICKLE as being the most reliable person living in the vicinity of the CORNETT home. He talked with the CORNETTS on December 21st, 1938 but they did not appear to possess any information regarding the escape or COLE's probable whereabouts. He agreed to watch the CORNETT home, saying that if he received any information he would communicate with VANSICKLE. ever he has not furnished any information although he has been contacted Further contact will be had with SHAW. by VANSICKLE on several occasions.

is an informant of of the Tulsa Police Department; is a former Undersheriff of Fort Smith, Arkansas. He is also acting as an informant for the Narcotics Bureau.



BAILEY, "SLIK", address unknown. Mrs. CECIL NOEL, formerly Mrs. JACK LLOYD when interviewed, as shown in the report of Special Agent

D. P. SULLIVAN, El Paso, August 8th, 1938, mentioned the name of BAHLEY as being a good friend and contact of ROE. She stated that BAILEY was sentenced to the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth as the result of some robbery, for a term of about 7 or 9 years, about the time ROE and LLOYD were sentenced. BAILEY has never been identified or interviewed. Leads are being set forth for the Kansas City Office to determine his identity in the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, while this office will attempt to locate and identify BAILEY through informants and other persons interviewed, who were close associates of ROE and COLE.

BARKER, RUTH and JIM, 710 Avenue B, Childress, Texas. Their names were furnished as possible contacts of COLE by City Marshal VANSICKLE of Stroud, Oklahoma, who stated they had formerly harbored COLE. Surveillance was maintained over the BARKER's home and a mail cover was placed, but such efforts proved negative. (See report of Special Agent R. C. COULTER, Dallas, January 4th, 1938.) The Los Angeles Office was requested to interview FRED and ESTHER COLE regarding the BARKERS by letter dated January 17th, 1938 but same has not been done. BARKER admitted a friendship for COLE when interviewed as shown in the report of

Special Agent R. C. COULTER, dated at Dallas, March 8th, 1938, but denied he had received any information regarding the escape of COLE since the escape. Further contact will be had with the BARKERS.

BISHOP, HOMER, attorney, Seminole, Oklahoma. BISHOP possesses an unsavory reputation and is alleged to have been ROE's attorney prior to his incarceration. It is not thought that BISHOP will be cooperative but Sheriff BOSE JOHNSON, Sulphur, Oklahoma is of the opinion that BISHOP will furnish information to him if he possesses same. It is also thought that he would furnish information to JAKE SINS, Chief of Police, Seminole, Oklahoma, and these officers will be requested to make an immediate contact with BISHOP in an effort to obtain information. from him.

BLACKBURN, MARIE alias MARY BROWN, MARIE BLACKWILL, "BABE" BLACKBURN, 709 "E" Street, S.E., Ardmore, Oklahoma. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 17th, 1937, page 2, which reflects that MARIE BLACKBURN was corresponding with ROE while he was confined in the Maskogee County Jail, at which time she was residing at Winslow, Arizona. Efforts to locate her at Winslow and Prescott, Arizona were unsuccessful but it was determined that a she formerly operated a house of prostitution at Winslow about 1935.

The files of the U. S. Ponitentiary, Loavenworth, reflect that JAMES ROE was allegedly married to "BABE" BLACKBURN in 1930 (See report of Special Agent W. L. LISTERMAN, Kansas City, December 28th, 1937, page 10). It is thought he furnished this information in order that she might correspond with him. It is thought that "BABE" BLACKBURN is identical with MARIE BLACKBURN.

It will be noted in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, February 3d, 1938, page 5, that she is employed as a hostess at the Pajarillo Club at Ardmore. She is alleged to have many connections with bank robbers and other criminals and has the reputation of never "squealing" on anyone. Upon interview she stated she met ROE through JACK LLOYD and that she associated with him until he was sentenced to the penitentiary and that she corresponded with him thereafter, and up until he was transferred to Alcatraz Island. She also stated she was in love with ROE and doubted if he would communicate with her but she expressed a willingness to cooperate in this matter to avoid possible harboring charges.

Attention is called to the report of SAC E. P. GUINANE, Oklahoma City, dated May 26th, 1938, page 4, which discloses that Sheriff RANDOLPH of Ardmore, Oklahoma, who is well acquainted with MARIE BLACKBURN, at the request of this office contacted her but was advised that she did not

possess any information regarding ROE's whereabouts and had not seen him. RANDOLPH and Deputy Sheriff JIM LATHROP, who have been very cooperative in this matter, are of the opinion that she would furnish them information if ROE returned to the vicinity or communicated with her. They will immediately forward any information received to this office.

Further contact will be had with MARIE BLACKBURN by this office.

BOYD, COTTON, Alpena Pass, Arkansas. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent P. A. PRATT, Little Rock, April 1st, 1938, covering investigation at Alpena Pass, Arkansas, the home of COLE's former wife and child. Particular attention is called to page 5 which reveals that the possibility of COLE contacting one COTTON BOYD, a salesman for Pontiac automobiles, should be borne in mind in connection with further investigation at that place, as he is alleged to be well acquainted with COLE. No further information has been obtained in this matter and leads are being set out for the Little Rock office in connection therewith.

BRADY, BRUCE, A. B. COOPER, private detective, Oklahoma City, furnished the name of BRADY as being formerly associated with the ROE-UNDER-HILL gang. BRADY was alleged to have been an inmate of the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth at the time of the escape, but has been released. He may have been released prior to the escape as information furnished by the Probation Office, Oklahoma City, revealed that he could have been released on October 20th, 1937. BRADY is probably under the supervision of JOHN ED FRANKLIN, U. S. Probation Officer, Muskogee, Oklahoma and should be located for interview. It should be determined prior to interview whether he was released at the time of instant escape.


BRADY, LEONA, 710 South Shartel, Oklahoma City. Her name was mentioned as a possible contact in the report of Special Agent C. O. HURT, Oklahoma City, February 14th, 1938 but she has not been interviewed and same will be done immediately. She is the daughter of C. M. DEFER, 710 South Shartel, Oklahoma City, who is probably on relief, and she is Oklahoma City PD #15581.

BRIDGES, BOBBIE, Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma. DON EBREY, ex-OSP #27274, furnished the name of BRIDGES as a friend and possible contact of ROE (See report of Special Agent J. L. THORNTON, San Francisco, December 23d, 1937). However information furnished by EBREY regarding activities of subjects after instant escape was found to be fictitious and admitted to be so by EBREY. However, it is thought that investigation should be conducted regarding BRIDGES who should be interviewed and leads are being set forth for that purpose. His name was also furnished by

COFFRIN, DICK, Atwater, California. Attention is called to the report of Special Agent R. N. PRANKE, Los Angeles, June 10th, 1938, wherein on page 6 is reported an interview with COFFRIN, who stated he met JACK LLOYD while they were inmates of the U.S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth; that he did not see LLOYD after their release until the morning they were arrested, at which time ROE accompanied LLOYD, who asked COFFRIN

to go hunting with him. However, this was the only time he saw ROE and he stated he was unable to furnish any information regarding his associates and contacts. (See report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 17th, 1937.)

DARR, JESS, Oklahoma City. DARR is a bootlegger of Oklahoma City and Ardmore, Oklahoma who formerly associated with and worked with well known criminals in Oklahoma. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent C. O. HURT, Oklahoma City, February 15th, 1938 setting forth an interview with CORDON TROOP, Oklahema State Penitentiary trusty who related that COLE visited him at the prison camp in an effort to TROOP is known as an habitual liar and the statement apcontact DARR. peared to be fabulous and without foundation. However, the Burcau has requested that DARR be located and interviewed. Investigation at Ardmore where DARR formerly operated revealed he had moved to Oklahoma City. On October 28th, 1938 inquiry at the Police Department, Oklahomn City, revealed that DARR's whereabouts were unknown. He will be located and interviewed regarding the statements by TROOP, for information he may possess regarding this case. He was formerly an inmate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester.

DAVIS, MRS. ED (JEAN), Odessa or Monahans, Texas. She is the wife of ED DAVIS, presently an inmate of San Quentin under death sentence, and she is very close friend and associate of HAZEL UNDERHILL. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. T. HOOD, Oklahoma City, April 28th, 1938 wherein information obtained from Informant is reference flected regarding JEAN DAVIS and HAZEL UNDERHILL. (See Informant is report). Attention is also called to the information furnished by informant to the effect that ROE was in contact with JEAN DAVIS (See informant, this report.) The El Paso office is being requested in this report to conduct full investigation to determine if she is in contact with subjects.

DILLARD, LLOYD, Oklahoma City. His name was furnished as a friend and possible contact of ROE by DON EBREY, ex-OSP. #27274. (See report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, December 23d, 1937). Although information furnished by EBREY regarding activities of subjects after their escape was found to be fictitious and admitted to be so by EBREY, it is thought that DILLARD should be contacted and interviewed for information.

EDELIN, MRS. KEITH (MINNIE), Pampa, Texas. She is the sister of Mrs. CECIL NOEL, formerly Mrs. JACK LLOYD, and was interviewed as is disclosed by the report of Special Agent R. C. COULTER, Dallas, dated January 28th, 1938. She admitted she is a correspondent of JACK LLOYD presently in Alcatraz, and her former Brother-in-law, but denied knowing either of the subjects. However she had heard that ROE was very

friendly with HAZEL UNDERHILL. Mrs. EDELIN stated she hoped that subjects made their escape and that they would never be apprehended and she stated further that she would not furnish any information should she receive same. However she advised that her husband thought differently in the matter and since he has not been interviewed, it is thought that he should be contacted regarding subjects. He is alleged to bear a good reputation and has been employed by the Gulf Oil Corporation for a number of years.

EVERSOLE, JEWEL (BUDDY), Bonham, Texas. A. L. CHAFFIN, former sheriff,
Bonham, furnished information to the effect that after RCE and
JACK LLOYD were arrested at that place, EVERSOLE visited them and
tried to assist them in making bond, but before bond was made ROE and
LLOYD escaped. It was thought that EVERSOLE assisted them in the escape. (See report of Special Agent H. T. ARTERBERRY, Dallas, March 17th,
1938.) EVERSOLE, who formerly resided at Seminole, Oklahoma was never
contacted and while a definite address was not obtained at the time,
leads are being set forth for the Dallas Office to attempt to locate
EVERSOLE at Bonham for interview. Inquiry will be made by this office
at Seminole to determine if he is presently in that vicinity.

FARMER, HERBERT ALIEN, Joplin, Missouri. FARMER is a former inmate of Alcatraz Prison, #332-AZ, being sentenced for his connection with the Kansas City massacre. He was released from Alcatraz on September 4th, 1937. Mrs. RUBY ANKRUM, ex-wife of VOLNEY DAVIS, present Alcatraz, informed Agent as reflected in the report of Special Agent W. L. LISTERMAN, Kansas City, December 28th, 1937 that FARMER was the only former inmate of Alcatraz who had contacted her, and that he did not mention either of subjects. In connection with this, attention is also called to the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, December 20th, 1937, page 3, which reflects that a small piece of paper was found in an eyeglass case belonging to ROE, with the numbers 214 E 7 and the word "Ruby" thereon. This is the address of Mrs. RUBY ANKRUM.

Reference is also made to the report of Special Agent W. L. LISTERMAN, Kansas City, January 24th, 1938 wherein an interview with FARMER is reported. He admitted he knew ROE and COLE but denied he had any information regarding their escape or their whereabouts since the escape. It is doubtful if FARMER would furnish any information even if he should receive same.

FARIER's photograph was presented to witnesses at Portland, Oregon but was not identified as the person purchasing the tidal charts.

Attention is also called to information received from Informants "13" and "Z" contained herein, who are of the opinion that FARMER has in-

formation regarding their escape; that subjects would contact him and that there is some indication that subjects have already been in communication with him. However it will be noted that information furnished by Informant "13" reflected that FARMER was operating a liquor store in Dallas whereas investigation has revealed that he has remained in Joplin.

W. M. BEAVERS, U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, when interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent H. L. SCOTT, Kansas City, September 26th, 1938, stated that it would be well to check FARMER as he had heard his name mentioned in penitentiary conversation with the name of someone from Oklahoma.

Efforts should be made by the Kansas City Office to develop an informant who would be in a position to maintain a watch on FARLER and his activities in order that the Bureau will know should ROE or COLE contact him or should he assist them in any manner.

FERNANDEZ, HAL, ex-Alcatraz #39-AZ, Anchorage, Alaska. The report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, December 21st, 1937, page 9 lists FERNANDEZ with others as being very friendly with subjects while they were in Alcatraz. He was received at Alcatraz on August 11th, 1934 and discharged on July 9th, 1936 at which time he was furnished transportation to Anchorage. Leads are being set forth for the Scattle Office to interview FERNANDEZ at Anchorage as indications point to plans for an escape having been formulated long before the escape was effected. It should be borne in mind that if the escape was successful, subjects might have contacted FERNANDEZ.

FINE, MATTIE, HARDY SOLOMAN'S Cafe, 215 West Main, Ardmore, Oklahoma. She is alleged to have been a former sweetheart of ROE. She was interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent J. VL. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 22d, 1937, at which time she stated she kept company with ROE during the summer of 1935 but had no information as to his probable where bouts or contacts. She expressed a desire to cooperate in this matter and will be contacted again for information.

Agent H. T. ARTIRBERRY, Dallas dated April 20th, 1938, page 2, covering an interview with an informant who was supposed to contact JAMES ROE, reflects that claimed that JAMES ROE advised him that some man purporting to be THEODORE COLE contacted him a short time after the escape, and that he gave the man \$300.00 to be forwarded to RALPH ROE; that this individual told JAMES ROE that if he heard from his brother, RALPH, to have him get in touch with RAY GILES at the above address. It is very doubtful if any information furnished by was correct but investigation will be conducted to develop

all information regarding GILES and the possibility of him being a contact for subjects.

COUKER, FRANK, #156-AZ. GOUKER was an employee of the mat shop at the time of the escape. The report of Special Agent W. B. MYERSON, San Francisco, January 17th, 1938, page 31, reflects that JOSEPH B. STEERE, Junior Officer, Alcatraz, mentioned that of all the men in the shop, GOUKER was the most reliable; that he had but a short time to serve and that he had furnished some information to STEERE about the escape. It is suggested that the San Francisco Office determine if GOUKER has been released and if so, leads should be set out to locate and interview him regarding the escape. If it is learned that he is still an inmate and will be released soon, it is suggested that arrangements be made in order that he may be interviewed upon his release.

"HARDROCK", San Antonio, Texas. R. S. PRINGLE, present Alcatraz, #405—AZ, when interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent L. H. RICHMOND, San Francisco, September 29th, 1938, stated that an individual named "HARDROCK" at San Antonio might be able to furnish him, PRINGLE, with information regarding this case. This information may not be reliable but it is thought that the San Antonio Office should make some effort to identify this person ith the underowrld at that place and if successful and decmed appropriate, he should be interviewed.

HARLESS, DAN, Route 2, Box 258A, Lakeland, Florida. The name of HARLESS as a contact and friend of JAMES and RALPH ROE was furnished by At that time HARLESS resided at 2529 Gilham Road, Kansas City and he is a releasee from the U.S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth. He was interviewed as reflected in the report of Special Agent R. E. SMITH, Miami, dated September 21st, 1938 at which time he denied being acquainted with either JAMES or RALPH ROE.

HENRY, SANFORD ("SANDY"), Oklahoma City and Edmond, Oklahoma. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent W. R. RAMSEY, Phoenix, dated January 5th, 1938, page 2, wherein information was furnished by LETHA JONES that one NANCY PERRY had married SANFORD HENRY, a cousin of AIMEE PAYME. J. B. HASLETT, night marshal at Depew, Oklahoma advised however that HENRY formerly associated with the PAYMES and was

a good friend of RALPH ROE; that HASLETT was presently residing in Oklahoma City and working in the Edmond, Oklahoma oil field. HAS-LETT and his wife will be located and interviewed if preliminary investigation discloses that subjects have not been in contact with him.

HILL, BOBBY LON, 3321 Burton Street, Fort Worth, Texas. She is the wife of FLOYD HILL, present Leavenworth inmate who was a former cellmate and close friend of COLE, and who may be identical with JES? HILL whose name appeared on the piece of paper found on HUGH BUTCHER, as shown hereinafter in this report. Her husband has been a friend and correspondent of ESTHER COLE, subject's mother. It is thought that she should be interviewed for any information she may possess regarding subject.

HOOD, JIMMIE, Tulsa, Oklahoma. HOOD formerly operated the Majestic Hotel, Oklahoma City, which was suggested as a probable hideout by DON EBREY whose information has been proven to be fictitious. Inquiry at the Oklahoma City Police Department on October 28th, 1938 revealed that JIMMIF. HOOD had been away from Oklahoma City for several years and had not been connected with the Majestic Hotel for at least five or six years. No further investigation will be conducted regarding this matter.

INMAN, ELMER, Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma. INMAN is a very close friend of ROE, but was an inmate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary prior to and since the escape of subjects. He was interviewed as reflected in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 22d, 1937 with negative results although he appeared to be willing to cooperate. It is thought that he may have gained some information of value from other inmates of that penitentiary and a lead is being set forth to re-interview him. When interviewed he stated that ROE was "woman crazy" and would associate with some woman at the first opportunity, if successful in his escape.

JARRETT, BUSTER, Oklahoma City. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent C. O. HURT, Oklahoma City dated February 15th, 1938 regarding information furnished by GORDON TROOP, a trusy at Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, who related a fabulous story that COLE had visited him at a prison camp requesting information as to the whereabouts of JLSS DARR. He also advised that later JARRETT was alleged to have returned in the same automobile driven by COLE and made further inquiry about DARR. TROOP's statements were undoubtedly erroneous. JARRETT was interviewed as reflected by the report of Special Agent F. S. SMITH, Oklahoma City, February 5th, 1938, at the Oklahoma City Police Department, at which time he denied possessing any information regarding subjects, although he admitted he knew each of them. JARRETT is the brother of HAZEL UNDERHILL, one of the closest friends of ROE.

Information was obtained from one C. O. WHITSON, Seminole, Oklahoma that one EARL CRUZ, Carter Oil Company, during the fall of 1937 heard one JOHNSON, an ex-convict of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, say that he was leaving Seminole for California to help ROE escape from Alcatraz. Efforts to locate CRUZ have been unsuccessful but further efforts will be made to interview him. It was thought by local officers that this JOHNSON was identifial with SEEDALL JOHNSON who harbored WILBUR UNDERHILL and ROE and who visited the house in which they were hiding shortly before their apprehension. Informant "R" stated that SEEDALL JOHNSON moved from Seminole to Borger, Texas during 1937 but was injured and sent to Phoenix, Arizona for hospitalization; that he returned to Seminole about September, 1937; that his constant conversation was about RALPH ROE who, he stated, would escape from Alcatraz Prison as he had a lot of friends who would help him. She also advised that about September, 1937 JOHNSON's mother and brother, ALONZO moved from Seminole to Bakersfield, California and that SEEDALL had been in jail at that place but that the JOHNSON family had since moved to Phoenix.

Informant "R" expected to visit W. C. "BILL" CRAWFORD who lived near the JOHNSONS and arrangements were made with her that she would attempt to obtain information from them. (See report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY dated at Oklahoma City February 21st, 1938, pages 4 and 5).

The photographs of SEEDALL and ALONZO JOHNSON and W. C. CRAWFORD were exhibited to witnesses at Portland, Oregon, who saw the unknown party purchase tidal charts, but no identification was effected. (See report of Special Agent H. A. KING, Portland, March 14th, 1938, page 6.)

Before the departure of Informant "R" she advised that a friend of hers and the JOHNSON family, whose name she refused to disclose, had returned from BAKERSFIELD to Seminole, reporting that conversation with the JOHNSON family indicated that ROE and COLE had made their escape and that the JOHNSON boys were making numerous trips from Bakersfield. Informant "R" departed for Phoenix but returned before arriving and explained that one BERT WYLIE informed her that "SLEEPY" JOHNSON and LON JOHNSON were in Kansas City and wanted her to communicate with them. (See Informant "R".) This information is undoubtedly erroneous. (See report of Special Agent R. T. HOOD, Oklahoma City, April 28th, 1938, pages 9 to 11, inclusive.)

Investigation as reflected in the report of Special Agent W. E. MIL-LER dated March 21st, 1938 at Los Angeles revealed that it was believed that SEEDALL and ION JOHNSON and W. C. CRAWFORD had been in the vicinity of Phoenix but had departed and their whereabouts were unknown.

The records of the Bureau of Identification, Bakersfield, California failed to reveal an arrest of "SIEEPY" JOHNSON. He may have been arrested for drunkenness and consequently not fingerprinted.

Informant also was reinterviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent C. O. HURT, Oklahoma City, June 17th, 1938 at which time she stated she had heard through W. C. "BILL" CRAWFORD that LAWRENCE JOHNSON had killed a man in California. She exhibited a card from CRAWFORD mailed from Portland dated June 2d, 1938, advising that he was leaving for Idaho and would communicate with her.

An immediate and complete investigation should be conducted to determine the whereabouts of the JOHNSON boys in an effort to determine their activities during the period of the escape. Leads are being set forth for interested offices. This office will immediately contact informant "R" in an effort to determine their present whereabouts. Further efforts will be made to locate one CRUZ in order that he may be interviewed regarding the alleged statements made by one JOHNSON that he was going to assist ROE to escape.

LEAMAN, WILLIAM F., ex-Alcatraz #274-AZ. LEAMAN is mentioned as being very friendly with subjects at Alcatraz, as shown on page 10 of the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, December 21st, 1937. He also worked with them while an inmate. He was sentenced at Los Angeles January 18th, 1935 and was transferred to the U. S. Industrial Reformatory at Chillicothe, Ohio from Alcatraz on July 6th, 1937. The report of Special Agent G. H. TREADWELL, Cincinnati, dated February 18th, 1938 reveals that LEAMAN was released from that institution on July 22d, 1937 and subsequent investigation failed to locate him. His brother, ROBERT LEAMAN, Circleville, Ohio was interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent L. A. OBENSHAIN, dated at Cincinnati, May 12th, 1938 with negative results. Leads are being set out to re-interview ROBERT LEAMAN for information in order that his brother may be located and interviewed.

and COLE had crossed the border into Old Mexico. Appropriate investigation should be conducted with reference to this matter to determine if same is true.

LYONS, Mrs. CORBETT, formerly Mrs. ERNEST TAYLOR. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent D. A. BRYCE, Oklahoma City, June 18th, 1938 which reveals that ROE and JACK LLOYD were apprehended at the home of Mrs. TAYLOR. She resided at Antlers, Oklahoma until about January 1st, 1937 when she was ordered to leave that county. She left no forwarding address and her present whereabouts are unknown.

MOLTON, MAX, formerly at Muskogee, Oklahoma. MOLTON's name was suggested as a possible contact of subjects by DON EBREY whose information has been found to be fictitious. A report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 29th, 1937, page 4, reveals that MOLTON, who formerly operated the Lindy Hotel at Muskogee, had not been around Muskogee for approximately two years, and that his whereabouts were unknown. No further investigation will be conducted with reference to this matter.

NEWTON, HARRY, Tulsa, Oklahoma. NEWTON's name was furnished as a possible contact by DON EBREY who later admitted that his information regarding the activities of subjects after their escape was fictitious. However it is thought that NEWTON should be located and interviewed. The report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 29th, 1937, page 12, discloses that NEWTON had departed from Tulsa for an unknown destination and had not returned. NEWTON is known to Captain BILE of the Tulsa Police Department, who will be recontacted for information regarding NEWTON's whereabouts in order that he may be interviewed.

NOEL, MRS. CECIL formerly Mrs. JACK LLOYD nee INEZ SHEETS, Las Vegas, New Mexico. She is the divorced wife of JACK LLOYD, present Alcatraz #264-AZ, who is reported to be the closest friend of ROE, and who was employed in the blacksmith shop at the time of instant excape. ROE and LLOYD were convicted together for the robbery of the Farmers National Bank of Sulphur, Oklahoma, being sentenced to Alcatraz. Mrs. NOEL was interviewed, according to the report of Special Agent D. P. SULLIVAN, El Paso, August 8th, 1938 at which time she denied she had seen or heard of ROE since his conviction and stating she had not heard from LLOYD for about three years. She furnished the name of HAZEL UNDERHILL and "SLIM" BAILEY, a convict at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth as being friends of ROE. However the report of Special Agent D. P. SULLIVAN dated at El Paso, September 22d, 1938 reveals that information had been received that she was possibly communicating with ROE, who was erroneously feported to be her former husband, through T. D. MOSS and Mrs. SADIE DYE. Investigation is being conducted at this time by the

El Paso Office concerning this information.

PARNELL BOYS, Chickasha, Oklahoma. They are alleged to be close friends of ROE and ELMER INMAN, according to JAKE SIMS, Chief of Police, Seminole, Oklahoma, but have not been located for interview. Leads are being set forth in this report to conduct investigation concerning their identity and the possibility of them having been contacted by subjects. (See report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 22d, 1937, page 10.).

PATTON, Mrs. PAUL nee EMILY SHEETS, Hot Springs, Arkansas. It is reported that ROE formerly associated with her. She is the sister of Mrs. CECIL NOEL, formerly wife of JACK LLOYD, who was employed in the blacksmith shop at Alcatraz at the time of the escape. (See report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 22d, 1937, page 6). Mrs. PATTON was interviewed, as disclosed in the report of Special Agent ALMAN P. BARBER, Little Rock, dated January 13th, 1938 at which time she denied any close acquaintance with ROE or his associates other than MATTIE FINE and JACK LLOYD. Her mother, Mrs. LELIA SHEETS was interviewed, as shown in the report of Special Agent MURPHY noted above, and Mrs. CECIL NOEL was interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent D. B. SULLIVAN, El Paso, dated August 8th, 1938. Another sister, Mrs. MINNIE EDELIN has been interviewed with negative results as shown in the report of Special Agent R. C. COULTER, Dallas, dated January 28th, 1938.

-LETHA JONES, Phoenix, Arizona, a former paramour of ROE, informed Agents as reflected in the report of Special Agent W. R. RAMSEY, dated at Phoenix; January 5th, 1938, that she was formerly very friendly with the PAYNE family and that AIMEE PAYNE, now deceased, was very friendly with ROE.

VERNE McDANIEL, Merced, California, informed Agents he formerly knew ROE and COLE and that ROE associated with AIMEE PAYNE, deceased, daughter of BRUCE PAYNE; that J. B. PAYNE, her brother, was an inmate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester; that the PAYNES were a lawless bunch and were the best contacts that ROE had in Oklahoma. (Sce report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, Los Angeles, dated January 8th, 1938.)

The report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, February 21st, 1938, page 3, reveals that COLE formerly lived in the vicinity of Stroud, Oklahoma and often visited with the PAYNE family living at Depew, Oklahoma at that time; that J. B. PAYNE was formerly an inmate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary and presently resided at Bristow, Oklahoma; that J. B. was a former pal of COLE; that AIMEE PAYNE, now deceased, was a girl friend of COLE; that the PAYNES were also very friendly with ROE. This information was furnished by J. M. HASLETT, night marshal at Depew, who stated that the PAYNES presently reside around Milfay, but he did not think it worthwhile to interview them. However, Agents attempted to conduct investigation at Milfay regarding the PAYNES but were unable to reach the vicinity due to the impassibility of the roads. Immediate investigation will be conducted with reference to each member of the PAYNE family. Information regarding the PAYNE family was also furnished by LETHA JONES as shown by the report of Special Agent W. E. MILLER, Phoenix, dated December 23d, 1937.

PETERSON, BOB, Harrah, Oklahoma. The report of Special Agent J. V.

IMERPHY, Oklahoma City, December 23d, 1937, page 5, reflects that
PETERSON, who operates a filling station and bootlegging establishment near Harrah, formerly assisted UNDERHILL and ROE. Information
was recently received as shown in the report of Special Agent F. S.

SITTH dated at Oklahoma City, October 15th, 1938 through an informant
of
Oklahoma, that ROE has been in
contact with PETERSON. Investigation is being conducted by this office
regarding PETERSON through informants, as it is not thought advisable
to contact him direct.

PIERCE, AMIN, Idabel, Oklahoma. PIERCE, #312-AZ was released from Alcatraz on June 24th, 1937 (See report of Special Agent M. E. GURNEA, San Francisco, December 28th, 1938). He stated upon interview as revealed in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated February 3d, 1938, that he did not know ROE and was not acquainted with COLE except slightly, and that he possessed no information regarding them or their escape. He was contacted by BRYAN CONWAY, exalcatraz, as reflected in the letter to the Burcau from this office dated May 17th, 1938, but information received by CONWAY has doubtful value. PIERCE has been used by this office as an informant on other matters and is presently awaiting trial for violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act. It is reported that PIERCE is a contact for all well known criminals in the hill country of southeast Oklahoma. Further contact will be had with PIERCE, but he should be contacted only by Special Agent CLARINCE O. HURT of this office.

POULAS, JAMES alias JIMRIE THE GREEK. The name of POULAS as a possible friend and contact was furnished by the Associate Warden, U. S. Hospital for Defective Delinquents, Springfield, Missouri who was informed by HAYS VANGORDER that POULAS was friendly with COLE and ROE, and that he promised them he would arrange for their escape upon his

release (See report of Special Agent H. J. LYNCH, Kansas City, dated March 9th, 1938, page 2). Investigation conducted by the San Francisco Office has reflected that POULAS, #172-AZ was deported to Greece on July 18th, 1936. (See report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, Sanfrancisco dated April 2d, 1938.)

PRUITT, LOUISE BYRD alias "BIRDIE", 1220 C Street, N.E., Ardmore, Oklahoma. She is a well known contact of big time criminals and is known to have assisted ROE prior to his incarceration. The report of Special Agent J. V. HURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 17th, 1937 reflects that she was interviewed, at which time she expressed a willingness to cooperate, but furnished no information of value. However, she stated she did not think ROE would contact her as he was alleged to owe . her money. Local officers do not believe that she would furnish any information should she receive same. A cover was placed on her mail but same was not productive of any information of value. While she resides in Ardmore, she owns a large ranch near that city and has allowed convicts to work for her. ELMER INMAN, an inmate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, who was a close associate, was interviewed as shown in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahom: City, December 29th, 1937 and advised that Mrs. PRUITT had harbored ROT and others in the past and if successful in escaping, ROE would undoubtedly seek aid and assitance from her. Attention is also called to the report of Special Agent H. T. ARTERBERRY, Dallas, dated January 4th, 1938 wherein Mrs. HASKELL RANNALS, Denison, Texas, a former girl friend of ROE, advised that "BIRDIE" PRUITT had contacted ROE at Denison at one time and that after her departure ROL advised her that she was a good friend and that her home was a good place to "cool off in".

Further investigation will be conducted to determine if either of the subjects have been in contact with her after which she should be interviewed for information, especially in regard to possible contacts of ROE.

QUINN, MORRIS, Bailey Undertaking Company, Tulsa. QUINN's name was furnished by the Sheriff's Office, Tulsa as being the best contact for COLE in Tulsa (See report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 28d, 1938). Investigation will be conducted immediately with reference to QUINN as being a contact for subjects.

RAINEY, ALLISON ("BUD"), Stroud, Oklahoma. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, December 25th, 1937, pages 2 and 3, concerning RAINEY, who resides near the home of R. B. CORNETT, CORNETT's brother-in-law. RAINEY has a bad reputation and is known to be friendly with criminals. R. B. CORNETT was of the opinion that COLE would not contact him but would contact RAINEY. RAINEY had informed CORNETT that about two weeks before the escape two

men were at his place on their way to California to "open" Alcatraz and then were going to South America.

Attention is also called to the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 29th, 1938 wherein on page 4 an interview with RAINEY is reported. He admitted he made such statements to CORNETT, but that those statements were lies. He denied knowing THEODORE COLE although he admitted knowing FRED COLE and he expressed a willingness to cooperate. Further investigation and interview will be conducted with RAINEY.

RANNALS, MRS. HASKELL nee BESSIE WINCHESTER, Denison, Texas. She is
the former paramour of ROE, but upon interview as reflected in,
the report of Special Agent H. T. ARTERBERRY, Dallas, January 4th,
1938 she stated she had not seen or heard of ROE since before his removal
from Leavenworth to Alcatraz. However, she received a Christmas card
signed "Ralph" addressed to "Mrs. DIXIE WINCHESTER". In her opinion the
signature was that of subject ROE. "DIXIE" is a nickname of Mrs. RANNALS.
She furnished some information regarding ROE's contacts and should be
re-interviewed for further information.

SHEETS, Mrs. LELA, Mannsville, Oklahoma. She is the mother of Mrs.

PAUL PATTON, Mrs. CECIL NOEL and Mrs. MINNIE EDELIN and was interviewed with negative results, as shown in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated December 22d, 1937. She said she knew very little about ROE except that he was very friendly with HAZEL UNDERHILL and associated with JACK LLOYD, her former son-in-law. Investigation is being conducted by the El Paso Office regarding her daughter, Mrs. CECIL NOEL (See report of Special Agent D. P. SULLIVAN, El Paso, dated September 22d, 1938). Further contact with Mrs. SHEETS at this time is not considered advisable.

SMALLEY, W. F., attorney, Shawmee, Oklahoma. Mrs. HASKELL RANNALS, a former paramour of ROE, advised that ROE once told her that should she ever want to get in touch with him immediately at any time or place, and did not know his whereabouts, to contact SMALLEY, the closest friend he ever had, and his legal advisor. SMALLEY is known to the writer as a politician and one who does not enjoy a good reputation among members of the Bar. Appropriate attention will be given this information.

SMITH, MACK, ex-Alcatraz, #44-AZ. Attention is called to the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, dated December 21st, 1937, page 10, which lists SMITH as being friendly with subjects at Alcatraz. SMITH was transferred to Alcatraz on August 11th, 1934, returned to McNeil's Island on November 20th, 1936 and was supposedly released on December 17th, 1936. Information obtained at Alcatraz indi-

dicated that a deteiner was placed against SMITH at McNeil's Island by the U. S. Marshal, Tacoma, Washington. Allead if being set forth for the Seattle Office to locate and interview SMITH.

STEWART, LENA, formerly of Seminole, Oklahoma. She is a former paramour of ROE, whose name was furnished by JAKE SIMS, Chief of Police, Seminole, Oklahoma, who stated she was a sister of EMMA MAE NICHOLS, who was killed by the posse at Shawnee, Oklahoma when UNDTRHILL was killed, and ROE apprehended. SIMS is of the opinion that ROE would contact LENA and that she would assist him. The report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, December 22d, 1937, Oklahoma City, revealed that she was alleged to be living with an oil driller, name unknown, at Russell, Kansas, and stayed around the O.K. Dance Hall. Investigation at Russell failed to reveal any information regarding this contact or any place known as the O. K. Dance Hall. SIMS was again contacted, as shown in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated February 21st, 1938, but had no further information. LENA STEWART will be located through SIMS, at which time proper investigation will be conducted.

STRITTMATTER, HANS, 838 Bridgeway Boulevard, Sausalito, California.

Warden J. A. JOHNSDN of Alcatraz furnished the name of STRITTMATTER
as a possible contact for fugitives. He was interviewed with negative results, stating that he did not know either of subjects, but he would be glad to cooperate in this matter. (See report of Special Agent
J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, December 20th, 1937.) The reason for naming him was not given by Warden JOHNSTON and it is suggested that the San Francisco Office recontact STRITTMATTER to determine if he has learned anything since last interviewed.

STUKEY, WANDA, Odessa, Texas. She was formerly friendly with ROE and upon the release of JAMES ROE from the U.S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, she began living with him as his common law wife. She has been contacted on numerous occasions as reflected in this report under JAMES ROE.

SWAN, CIARA BELL, Seminole, Oklahoma. She allegedly was the sweetheart of ELMER IMMAN and a close friend of ROE. She formerly worked as a beauty operator in Seminole and was reported by JAKE SILS, Seminole to be at Hobbs, New Mexico with her husband, OTIS. The El Paso Office has conducted extensive investigation at Hobbs to locate her as shown in the reports of Special Agents B. L. DAMRON, December 20th, 1937 and E. C. DORRIS, February 8th, 1938 and February 23d, 1938 at El Paso with negative results. Leads are being set out to conduct investigation at Seminole in order to determine her present whereabouts so that she may be interviewed.

TURNBULL, ORIE, Depew, Oklahoma. It is not known definitely that TURNBULL

is an associate or contact of either COIE or ROE. However, LETHA JONES advised that TURNBULL was a close friend of AIMEE PAYNE (See report of Special Agent W. R. RAMSEY, Phoenix, dated January 5th, 1938). Efforts to locate TURNBULL for interview, as disclosed in the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated February 21st, 1938 were unsuccessful. It will be noted that COLE formerly resided at Stroud, Oklahoma which is not far from Depow. TURNBULL will be interviewed for information he may possess which would be of assistance in this matter.

TURNER, GEORGE, Tulsa, Oklahoma. TURNER's name was furnished by GEORGE CARVER, Alcohol Tax Unit, as being a good contact of ROE, as TURNER was in the U. S. Pcnitentiary, Leavenworth with ROE and has been a known contact of outstanding criminals at various times in the past. TURNER has been doing recovery work for various finance companies in Tulsa and has been contacted by Agents of this office. Upon interview, as reflected on page 3 of the report of Special Agent J. V. MURPHY, Oklahoma City, dated February 3d, 1938, he stated he was well acquainted with ROE and JAMES ROE; that he had talked to JAMES ROE since the escape but the escape was not mentioned. He expressed a desire to cooperate in instant investigation. However, G. L. HOLBERT, Deputy United States Marshal, Tulsa, furnished information that an informant, name not disclosed, who is a good friend of Mr. and Mrs. TURNER had indicated that subject ROE had contacted TURNER since the escape. It may be that this informant was mistaken and that contact was had with JAMES TURNER was also contacted as reflected in the report of Special Agent R. T. HOOD, dated April 28th, 1938 at Oklahoma. Contact will be maintained with him in connection with this case.

UNDERHILL, CLYDE, Joplin, Missouri. UNDERHILL'S name was furnished as a possible contact by DON EBREY, but EBREY afterwards admitted that information furnished by him regarding the activities of subjects after the escape was fictitious. (See report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, dated December 23d, 1937.) HAZEL UNDERHILL has since advised that CLYDE UNDERHILL now resides at Joplin, Missouri. In view of the fact that he is a brother of WILBUR UNDERHILL, deceased, a close friend and associate of ROE, leads are being set out for the Kansas City Office to conduct appropriate investigation regarding UNDERHILL and the possibility that he may be in contact with subjects.

UNDERHILL, HAZEL with aliases: HAZEL HUDSON, HAZEL CONNORS, Refugio,
. Texas. She is probably the closest friend of ROE and undoubtedly
would be one of the first persons that he would contact. She is
the former wife of WILBUR UNDERHILL, deceased, notorious Oklahoma outlaw, and after the death of her husband, she and ROE became close associates. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. V. HURPHY,

Oklahoma City, December 29th, 1937 therein is reported an interview with her on page 9, but she furnished no information of value. About February 10th, 1938 she moved from Tulsa to Monahans, Texas and she presently resides at Refugio with her son, MARVIN CONNORS, who works for O. C. HAIES, son-in-law of HAZEL UNDERHILL. She is very friendly with contact JEAN DAVIS (See Mrs. ED DAVIS, contact, this report).

This office will maintain contact with informants and sources of information who are in a position to know of HAZEL UNDERHILL's activities. It is suggested that the San Antonio Office take proper steps to develop sources of information who will be in a position to report her activities. Direct interview with her should be dependent upon the basic investigation conducted.

WILLIAMS, JACK T., U.S.Penitentiary, Leavenworth. WILLIAMS' name was furnished as a contact of RALPH and JAMES ROE by who stated that WILLIAMS' family, now residing at 25 East 7th, San Angelo, Texas, were well known to the ROE brothers. Leads are being set forth for the Dallas and Kansas City Offices to contact WILLIAMS and members of his family for information.

YOUD, A. and TEDDY, El Paso, Texas. (See GOULD, A. and TEDDY, contacts, this report.)

GENERAL REVIEW

A general review of the file in this case reveals that there have been numerous situations which have not been investigated or in which the investigation has not been brought to a logical conclusion, in addition to those previously mentioned in this report.

In the case entitled "JAMES HUGH BUTCHER with aliases; UNKNOWN SUBJECTS - Miscellaneous (Investigation of Alleged Plot for Inmates of Alcatraz Prison to Escape", in which Oklahoma City was the office of origin, it is hoted that on October 9th, 1936 BUTCHER, register #267-AZ was conditionally released from Alcatraz. Just before his release a rumor was heard to the effect that he was either going to act or that other prisoners were trying to persuade him to act for them, making contact and accomplishing certain things, as follows:

BUTCHER was to be given the names of certain friends of certain prisoners

and by identifying himself as coming from Alcatraz, he would be able to secure certain bonds which the prisoners had cached, and which he was to turn into money. With these proceeds he or their other friends could arrange for firearms and a boat for the escape of the prisoners.

Warden J. A. JOHNSTON expressed himself as being inclined to believe that the prisoner telling the story was trying to implicate BUTCHER in order to gain favor of prison officials. However, in BUTCHER's clothing was found a scrap of paper on which was printed "LEE JACOBS, Miami, Oklahoma. His old man is a doctor. Everyone knows him. Tell him who sent you." On the reverse side of the paper was the following: "JESS HILL, Lakewood, California, c/o TED COLE's mother."

JOHNSTON also informed that IEE JACOBS referred to in the note was a narcotic peddler operating as a fence for "DOC" BARKER, #268-AZ, and that JACOBS was a former inmate of Leavenworth and the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester. JESS HILL was reported to be FLOYD HILL, a fellow prisoner of COLE at McAlester. It will be noted that COLE's mother resides at Woodlake rather than Lakewood, California.

The report of Special Agent L. E. KINGMAN dated at Oklahoma City, November 7th, 1936 in that file, revealed that LEE JACOBS, an incurable addict, returned to his home in Miami, Oklahoma on August 15th, 1936 from the U. S. Narcotic Farm, Lexington, Kentucky. He was not known to be a contact of the underworld and it was shown that there was no indication that he had been contacted by BUTCHER. JACOBS had been arrested on several occasions for narcotic violation and for grand larceny.

The report of Special Agent H. W. COSTELLO, Louisville, November 13th, 1936 revealed that BUTCHER had been residing with his family at East Bernstadt, Kentucky. He was interviewed, at which time he stated that about one week before his release from Alcatraz, TED COLE gave him a note upon which was printed the address of COLE's mother, supposed to be at Lakewood, California, and the name of "FLOYD"; that at the time he received the note COLE asked him to write his mother and ask her to contact FLOYD to ask him to get COLE some help and to also tell his mother to write COLE mentioning senething about meeting his sister at a certain time and date, which would be a signal to COLE as to the time and date he could expect FLOYD to help him. BUTCHIR stated further that he destroyed the note a short time after he received it, and that he did not know who COLE referred to when he mentioned "FLOYD."

BUTCHER also advised that a short time after the conversation with COIE, ROY JOHNSON, a prisoner, asked him to contact friends of some of the prisoners who were supposed to live in Miami, Oklahoma but JOHNSON did not tell him the names of the prisoners or their friends; that JOHNSON asked him to contact some person in Miami, Oklahoma who would tell him

where some stolen bonds were hidden, and that he should sell these bonds for the purpose of getting a boat so that JOHNSON could make his escape; that at the time, JOHNSON stuck a note in his pocket, asking him to memorize the contents, stating he would explain the proposition later and further. However, BUTCHER was searched by guards and the note taken from him before he could read it. He thought JOHNSON had reported the matter to prison officials so that he, JOHNSON could win f vor with the officials.

BUTCHER also advised that "DOC" BARKER had never made a proposition to him. He denied knowing LEE JACOBS, JESS HILL, JEAN or FLOYD HILL.

It will be noted that BUTCHER stated he destroyed the paper given him by COIE and did not read the paper furnished by JOHNSON, while the facts disclose that the information furnished by COIE on the note was on the reverse side of the note containing information regarding LEE JACOBS. It is not thought that BUTCHER has furnished all the information he possesses concerning this matter.

The report of Special Agent J. C. LAWLER dated at Los Angeles, November 17th, 1936 revealed that Mr. and Mrs. FRED COLE, parents of subject COLE, were residing at Woodlake, California with their daughter, VIOLA DAWSON. JESS HILL, FLOYD HILL, LEE JACOBS and HUGH BUTCHER were unknown at Woodlake. No effort was made to interview the COLE family regarding this incident.

LEE JACOBS upon interview as reflected in the report of Special Agent B. TOM CARTER, Oklahoma City, July 27th, 1937, denied any knowledge of the alleged plot and any acquaintance with inmates of Alcatraz although he admitted he had seen COLE on several occasions while they were both inmates of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester.

The criminal record of FLOYD HILL revealed he had used the alias of JESS O'DELL.

There has been but very little investigation in instant case regarding this matter although the file reflects that COLE expected his mother to help him in making an escape. BUTCHER and JACOBS have not been interviewed since the inception of this investigation and leads are being set forth to make a full and complete investigation concerning the various phases of this incident.

The following investigation has been conducted regarding this situation in instant case.

Report: of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, Los Angeles, dated January 3th, 1938 page 3, reveals that Mr. and Mrs. FR D COLE when first questioned

concerning their knowledge of BUTCHER and HILL, stated they were not acquainted with HILL and had never heard of BUTCHER. However Mrs. COLE did recall a FLOYD HILL but was unable to definitely place him. However on December 31st, 1937 FRED COLE stated he had received a card that day from FLOYD HILL which was sent from the Leavenworth Penitentiary. It was noted that the card was an ordinary Christmas card and bore the following handwritten notation "Please don't worry Mother. I think he is safe, " and was signed "FLOYD A. HILL". Mrs. COLE was again questioned concerning her knowledge of HILL, stating that HILL had been a very close friend of THECOOPE COLE while they were inmates of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester. She denied that she had ever communicated with HILL although it was shown that the card addressed to her bore her correct address, although it was different from her address at the time her son was incarcerated with HILL, Neither Mr. nor MRS. COLE could offer any explanation as to how HILL obtained this address. They both denied that they had been contacted by HUCH BUTCHER or any other prisoner from Alcatraz or that they had had any prior indication of the plans their son had as to an escape.

A report of Special Agent W. L. LISTERMAN, Kansas City, dated January 24th, 1938, pages 3 to 6, inclusive, reveals that HILL was received at the U.S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth on October 26th, 1936 for burglary of a Post Office under sentence of eight years. His mail sheet reflected that he had not corresponded with any relatives of ROE or COLE.

HILL, upon interview stated he had received a letter from Mrs. FRED COLE while he, HILL, was at Fort Worth, Texas before his incarceration, but that he had not communicated with her after his confinement except to send her the Christmas card to cheer her. However he undoubtedly had the card mailed without the knowledge or consent of prison officials. HILL admitted he helped COLE escape from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary and expressed an opinion that COLE knew that he, HILL was confined at Leavenworth and had waited for him to be transfered to Alcatraz, but when he was not transfered, COLE teamed up with ROE, and that they probably got away without any assistance. He also said that in his opinion ROE and COLE, it successful in their escape, would not stay together for more than 60 days as COLE would not tolerate ROE's drunkenness or desire for women. HILL denied any acquaintance or knowledge regarding BUTCHER.

The report of Special Agent M. B. HYERSON, San Francisco, dated January 17th, 1938, page 54, revealed that ROY JOHNSON, #287-AZ was still on Alcatraz Island. Junior Officer RYCHNER advised that one JOHNSON, #289-AZ appeared to have a close friendship with both ROE and COLE during the short time he was on outside detail although it appeared to have been broken up due to the transfer of the parties to different occupations.

By tolegram dated December 17th, 1937 the Bureau advised that BUT-CHER had been incarcerated in the U.S. Penitentiary, Atlanta and that his sentence would expire on October 1st, 1938.

Attention is called to the fact that information has been received from several sources that ROE had a large amount of bonds, and that he and HAZEL UNDERHILL had recovered the bonds from RAYMOND ROE, subject ROE's brother, after his escape and that same had been sold. This should be noticed in connection with that phase of the investigation. (See informants

Investigation at Miami, Oklahoma revealed that LEE JACOBS was in Miami at the time of the escape as well as immediately before and after the escape.

Reference is made to the reports of Special Agents C. O. HURT and D. A. BRYCE, Oklahoma City, dated June 11th, 1938 and June 18th, 1938 respectively concerning one KENNETH RAY, Picher, Oklahoma. RAY advised that information obtained from one "RED" PHELPS who operated a garage in Picher, indicated that fugitives ROE and COIE had been staying around Kansas City and had visited at the Cole Wrecking Yard in Picher during the first part of May, 1938 while enroute to Chicago; further that they were traveling in a 1937 Chevrolet Sedan bearing Kansas license plates, and intended to drive through Picher again within a few weeks, on their way to Mexico. RAY was unable to corroborate or obtain further information concerning this matter from PHELPS. Investigation at Picher developed that an informant of one JOE ANDERSON, a private investigator, was apparently fabricating this information to gain the confidence of RAY, and thus obtain information as to a dynamiting which occurred in Picher.

LEONARD COLE, owner of the wrecking yard, denies any relationship to or knowledge of these fugitives.

In view of subsequent developments and information furnished by informants, it is believed that in order to further check the possible authenticity of the above information, direct contact should be had with "RED" PHILPS in Picher to obtain the source or basis of the information he furnished to RAY. This information can be readily ascertained through Deputy Sheriff JOE HOBSO!, Miami.

vised A. B. COOPER, a private detective of Oklahoma City, that subjects made a successful escape with both inside and outside help.

has not been interviewed and same will be done after confact is first had with Mr. COOPER for any other information she may obtain and furnish him.

Numerous officers in Oklahoma have personal knowledge of ROE and COLE and they have been of material assistance in this investigation. However some of these officers have not been contacted for some time. Leads are being set forth in this report to contact those local officers who have been of assistance in the past to determine if they have received any information regarding subjects, and to request that they make further efforts to contact their informants who might possess information regarding this escape.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. P. KRALER, Los Angeles, January 8th, 1938 setting forth information concerning various individuals who would be contacted. However leads were not set out for that purpose and no further effort has been made regarding those individuals. They are as follows:

RUTH KERN, 117 North Avenue, Los Angeles.

She is a sister of HENRY YOUNG, #244AZ and visited him at Alcatraz. Page
20 of the above report reflects that
interview will be had with Mrs. KERN
but same has not been done.

FRANCIS JOSEPH ROBERTS, 2506 28th Street,
Santa Monica, California. Page 22 of
the above report reflects that ROBERTS
will be interviewed in person to determine if he was identical with JOE ROBERTS,
a correspondent of JAMES ROE. This has
not been done and direct interview should
be had with him.

LARRY BUTCHER, Telephone #1708, Pasadena, California. It should be noted on page 23 of the above report that it is reflected that interview would be had with BUTCHER relative to C. W. BUTCHER, who formerly resided at Bell, California. This has not been done and in contacting BUTCHER, information contained herein regarding JAMES HUGH BUTCHER should be noted.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent C. H. OLSON, San Francisco, dated January 3d, 1938, page 3 regarding J. L. ROBINSON, 14 Spring Grove, San Rafael, California. ROBINSON furnished information concerning advice received from Mr. and Mrs. "SWEDE" WESTER-GAARD which ROBINSON thought to be unfounded. However this information was relative to the escape as well as to certain funds which were alleged to be hidden in Marion, California. ROBINSON agreed to further discuss the matter with the VESTERGAARDS but he has not been recontacted and same should be done.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent C. H. OLSON, San Francisco, dated January 3d, 1938, page 11, regarding a visiting card frund at 2421 Post Street, which bore the name "HOLLAND" and also the name "ALLEN" followed by the number "56684". Two occupants, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. ROSE, apparently hurriedly left the apartment on December 15th, 1937 which was immediately prior to the escape. thought that investigation should be conducted at San Quentin to ascertain if there is an inmate named ALLEN or HOLLAND and if so whether there is any possible connection with J. L. ROSE or LAWRENCE HALL mentioned in the teletype from Salt Lake City to San Francisco dated December 25th, 1937. Attention is also made to the report of Special Agent R. P. KRAMER, dated January 8th, 1938 at Los Angeles, wherein it appears that ANDREW SAMPSON and LORRAINE HOLLAND, a niece of SAMPSON, have friends at Bell, California. ANDREW SAMPSON is the owner of 1937 New York license #958-512 which passed through one of the checking stations on the California-Oregon line on or about the date of the escape. Investigation has determined that this license has been transferred to various automobiles from time to time and it appears that they have friends at Boll, California which is the residence of Mrs. VIOLA DAWSON.

It is requested that a complete investigation be conducted regarding this matter.

Reference is also made to the report of Special Agent KENNETH T. PETTY-JOHN, dated at Aberdeen January 4th, 1938 which reveals that CHARLIS C. HAMBIEN of Steele, North Dakota, who was receiving mail c/o GEORGE CONEVEST, 5568 East Cage Street, Iell, California, was the owner of 1937 North Dakota license #932-436 which passed through the checking station into California about the date of the escape. In vies of the fact that VIOLA DAVSON, sister of COLE, resides in Bell, the Los Angeles Office is being requested to conduct proper investigation to ascertain if there is any connection between HALBLEN and the COLE family.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, dated December 20th, 1937, page 7, regarding information furnished by AL BERRY concerning LEE MACK, a female, in connection with this investigation. Further reference is made to the report of Special

Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, February 25th, 1938 page 27, which reflects that a further investigation at San Francisco had failed to locate AL BERRY and LEE MACK, but that additional investigation would be made as suggested in Burcau letter dated December 30th, 1937. This has not been done and this situation should be carried to a logical conclusion.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. E. THORNTON, San Francisco, dated February 25th, 1933, page 27, which reflects that LOUIS FAUGUNDAS, ex-Alcatraz, #16-AZ had been released from Alcatraz on January 28th, 1933 at the expiration of his minimum term. This report reflects that alerd was being set forth to locate and interview FAUGUNDAS through his sister, ROSD FAUGUNDAS, 2603 21st Avenue, San Francisco. This has not been done and the request of this office as made by letter to the San Francisco Office dated January 17th, 1938 should be carried out.

Further reference is made to the report of Agent THORNTON dated February 25th, 1938, page 27, reflecting that FRANK ANDERSON, ex-Alcatraz, #167-AZ, was released from Alcatraz on January 26th, 1938 and a lead was being set forth to locate him through his sister, Hrs. H. HAYWARD, 2461 Fulton Street, San Francisco. The lad was not set forth and he has not been located. The San Francisco Office is being requested to locate and interview ANDERSON for any information he may possess regarding this escape.

Attention is called to the report of Special Agent M. J. LYNCH, Kansas City, dated March 9th, 1938 wherein on page 4 is reflected information furnished by Deputy Wardon SHUTTLEWORTH of the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, to the effect that an informant at Leavenworth informed him that "DOC" BARKER planned the escape but that subjects did not wait for him; that JACK LLOYD greased the bodies of the subjects while inmates FRANCIS WATERS, colored and VOSS and SHITH, first names unknown, engaged the other inmates in conversation while subjects were making their preparations and during the actual escape; that inmate REVERDEAUX, $#342-A^{Z}$; is said to have seen the prisoners in the water. SHUTTLEWORTH also stated that he had furnished this information by letter to the Warden at Alcatraz. Leads are being set out for the San Francisco Office to conduct appropriate investigation concerning this matter and for the Kansas City Office to have SHUTTLEWORTH recontact his informant for any additional information he may have learned. REVERDEAUX is probably identical with JEFFERSON ROUBIDEAUX, an employee of the mat shop at Alcatraz while VOSS is undoubtedly JOHN WOSS, #403-AZ. FRANCIS WATERS is register #64-AZ.

During the time that informant was attempting to locate HAZEL UNDERHILL he went to Levelland, Texas where HAZEL had been living. He received information from her former neighbors that a person driving

by at the time, formerly stayed with the UNDERHILL family. RICHARD—SON obtained the number of this car, same being a 1938 Oklahoma license #285-639, and a check at the Motor Vehicle Division of the Oklahoma Tax Commission revealed this license was issued to C. H. CUMMINGS of Drumright, Oklahoma. This incident occurred about May 15th, 1938. Investigation will be conducted by this office to determine the possible connection of CUMMINGS and HAZEL UNDERHILL.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. N. PRANKE, dated at Los Angeles, June 10th, 1938, page 3, which sets forth information furnished by one McCLURE who had promised to watch the home of VIOLA DAT'SON at Bell, California. McCLURE stated that on March 2d, 1938 an old man, about 45 or 50 years of age, visited the DAWSON family at which time he was driving a greyish colored Pontiac Scdan bearing Washington license A-105925. McCLURE did not know whether the plates were 1937 or 1938, but he was sure that this man did not resemble either of the subjects. However it is thought advisable to determine the identity of this individual in order that investigation may be conducted to determine his connection with the DAV'SON family and so that he may be interviewed. The incident at Portland regarding the tidal charts, previously referred to in this report, should be borne in mind while conducting this investigation. Leads are being set forth for the Seattle Office to determine the identity of the persons to whom these license plates, both for 1937 and 1938, were issued and to then conduct appropriate investigation.

Attention is called to the report of Special Agent L. E. KINGMAN, Oklahoma City, August 6th, 1938 which reflects that Informant "Z" stated that ROY G. WILLIAMS, liquor runner, had informed him that he had been advised that subjects had been in the vicinity of Longview, Texas. Investigation has been conducted by the Dallas Office in the vicinity of Longview regarding subjects but same has proved negative. Informant "Z" should be questioned concerning the whereabouts of WILLIAMS in order that he may be interviewed.

As a result of a mail cover placed on the mail of JAMES ROE at Odessa, Texas, letters have been received bearing the following return addresses:

Box 298, Wink, Texas dated 10-12-38; Box 1422, Dublin, Texas dated 10-16-38; Box 2171, Tulsa, Oklahoma, dated 9-30-38.

Also as a result of a mail cover placed on the mail of Mrs. SADIE DYE, Las Vegas, New Mexico, mail was received bearing the return address of 908 East 15th Street, Oklahoma City. Investigation should be conducted by the El Paso and Oklahoma City Offices to determine the identity and probable connection of the individuals using these post office boxes and street numbers.

During the first part of November, 1938 while on annual leave, Miss MAXINE SHAFFER, stenographer of the Oklahoma City Office was advised by FLOYD TEMPLE, bookkeeper for the Patrick and Tyrell Drilling Company, 517 Cotton Exchange Building, Houston, Texas, that ABE BAILEY a driller for that company, who was formerly a resident of Duncan, Oklahoma, the home of RALPH ROE, advised him that a woman at Duncan, who BAILEY had known during his lifetime, told him that she fed RALPH ROE sometime during February or March, 1938. RAYMOND ROE, the brother of RALPH ROE, has in the past worked for the Patrick and Tyrell Drilling Company. Leads are being set forth for the San Antonio Office to locate BAILEY through TEMPLE in order that the name of the woman may be ascertained.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent M. E. GURNEA, dated at San Francisco, December 28th, 1937, setting forth information concerning various inmates of Alcatraz Prison and their visitors and correspondents. This report, which was furnished to interested offices requested that all visitors and correspondents mentioned therein be contacted for information which might be of assistance in this investigation. Much of this has not been done and leads are being set out hereinafter for the interested offices to complete the leads as suggested by the report of Special Agent GURNEA.

The report of Special Agent M. B. MYERSON, San Francisco, dated January 17th, 1938 reflects an interview with JOSEPH SINGLETON, Superintendent of Laundry, Alcatraz, at which time (See pages 16 and 17) he mentioned that a prisoner, ANDY, last name unknown, had furnished him some information concerning a prison strike. It was suggested to SINGLETON that he endeavor what ANDY might know about this escapé. He agreed to do so but has not been re-contacted for that purpose.

Agent F. S. SMITH on November 21, 1938 was advised by JAMES KEATON, former inmate of the Oklahoma State Penitentiary that HARRY SLEDGE, formerly serving 25 years at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary but now a parolee living at Duncan, Oklahoma, is a lifelong friend of RALPH ROE and was raised with him at Duncan. He stated SLEDGE would likely be a contact of ROE if the latter were successful in escaping. (CONTACT).

A review of the information contained herein would reveal that information has been received from several sources to the effect that subjects did make their escape and have contacted friends and former associates. It should be noted that advice from sources that do not appear to have any connection is very much alike in regard to the persons alleged to have been contacted by the subjects. Particular attention is called to the information furnished by Informants "13" and "Z" regarding the possibility of subjects having contacted HERBERT ALLEN FARMER, HAZEL UNDERHILL and Mrs. JEAN DAVIS. Attention is also called to the information from different and apparently unrelated sources that ROE had access to a large amount of bonds as soon as he escaped.

Each and every investigation regarding any rumor or other information that ROE and COLE were successful in their escape should be thoroughly investigated and brought to a logical conclusion. Also any investigation with reference to this case should not be affected by any pre-conceived opinion that subjects were not successful in their escape and appropriate and expeditious attention should be accorded to all leads and information obtained regarding this investigation.

While it may be the opinion of some that subjects were unsuccessful in making their escape, there does not appear to be any conclusive basis or reason for such an opinion and investigative effort with respect to all leads should be thoroughly pursued and carried to a definite and logical conclusion in every instance.

It is also suggested and requested that all offices which have been making any direct interview or contact with any known or probable contact, first conduct appropriate investigation to determine whether subjects have been in contact with them. If there is any indication that any person has been in contact or communication with either of the subjects, direct interview should not be had until such information is eliminated or proven true.

Photographs of subjects should never be presented to witnesses alone but should be exhibited with other photographs in order that an identification would be more certain.

It is also requested that each office bring up all leads for that particular office when submitting reports where there has been a period of 30 days since the date of the last report submitted.

Each office should determine if the photographs of ROE and COLE are presently incorporated in the bank robbery album of that office, and if not, these photographs should be included therein.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:



MARIE COLE stated that she was in Pittsburg, Kansas, in October, 1938, at which time she visited her mister; that she has not been in Bronson, Missouri, for the past two or three months, but that she goes to Joplin, Missouri, or Springfield, Missouri, almost every weekend. WARIE COLE stated that she had seen in the Springfield, Joplin, Missouri, or Little Rock, Arkansas, newspaper an article to the effect that COLE had slept in the harn of PHILIP BOYD, ex-deputy sheriff at Perryville, Arkansas; however, she seriously doubts this rumor as she understood that BOYD just wanted to get his name in the paper. MARIE COLE stated that whenever she sees a certain newspaper reporter in Joplin, Missouri, he always asks her when she last heard from COIE and that she always jokingly replies she has just heard from him and has just received a letter from him, however, she is only kidding and the newspaper reporter knows it. MARIE COLE stated that in her opinion Subject COLE is dead, as she is confident that if he were alive she would have heard from him and he would have come. back to get their son. In this connection MARIE GOLE stated that last week her son was missing and she thought that Subject COIE had kidnaped hims that she had searched for him, and was about ready to notify the Arkansas State Police when the boy was located at a friend's home in Alpena Pase, Arkansas. MARIE COLE states that she has no love for subject COLE; has not seen him since 1929, and would gladly supply information as to his location if she knew he was alive and where he was. MARIE COLE stated she had never heard any rumors to the effect that COLE was in Bronson, Missouri, or Pittsburg, Kansas; further that she dranks but does not become so intoxicated that she talks about personal matters. Particularly, she stated she did not think she would talk about Subject COLE in the event she became intoxicated as she does not care to talk any more about the man than she has to. MARIE COLE stated that in the event she obtained any information she would promptly notify the Little Rock Field Division.

Mrs. ESSIE HARRIS was located about ten miles from Harrison, Arkansas, on Route # 4. Mrs. HARRIS informed that she had written the Bureau in July of this yearinasmuch as she had observed apphotograph of Subject COLE in the

Official Detective Story Magazine, May 30, 1938; inasmuch as this article had not listed MARIE COLE as a correspondent of Subject COLE she thought the Bureau would desire this information. Mrs. HARRIS stated she had lived in Alpena Pass, Arkansas, two doors from MARIE COLE'S home about two months ago and she had lived at this address for about six months during which time ED B. HARRIS had operated a pool hall in Alpena Pass. Mrs. HARRIS advised she had never seen or known COLE or ROE; FURTHER that she does not think MARIE COIE cares for Subject COIE and in fact is afraid of him for fear he might come back and kidnap their son. Mrs. HARRIS stated that this information was obtained from MARIE .COIE during the time COIE was incarcerated in the Penitentiary. Mrs. HARRIS further stated that she has not talked to MARIE COLE since COLE escaped. Mrs. HARRIS stated she desired very much to obtain any reward offered for the apprehension of Subject COLE.

On November 21, 1938, the Little Rock Field Division received another letter from Mrs. HARRIS, dated November 19, 1938, Harrison, Arkansas, in which Mrs. HARRIS stated if she obtained any information she would communicate with the Little Rock Field Office.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent Earl Hirsh, dated at Atlanta, Georgia, on December 10, 1938, in which it is noted information is set forth that the Atlanta Penitentiary file relative to James U. Butcher was observed by Special Agent Hirsh and was found to be very bulky but apparently had much more pertinent information than was set forth in his report.

Regardless of the fact that an undeveloped lead is set forth in the report for the Louisville office to interview William Butcher to secure information relative to the location of James U. Butcher, the Bureau is unable to understand why Special Agent Hirsh did not review the Atlanta Penitentiary file relative to James U. Butcher and secure such information as might be of value in the investigation of this case. It is desired that this be done immediately and that an appropriate report be submitted.

My dear Chief:

A letter has been received from Mr. Gregorio B & Cuevas. 1024 San Marcelino, Malate, Manila, Philippine Islands, advising he has observed an individual in Manila who he believes may possibly be identical with Theodore Cole, a fugitive whose apprehension is desired by this Bureau.

For your information, Theodore Cole, together with Ralph Roe, escaped from the United States Penitentiary, Alcatras Island, California, on December 16, 1937. Two copies of Identification Order No. 1471, issued by this Bureau relative to Theodore Cole, and two copies of Identification Order No. 1472, issued relative to Ralph Roe, are being furnished to you herewith.

REPORT- 12-15-38 ROCOL. The information operator at the Bell Telephone Company, Pampa. Texas, advised T. D. MOSS had his telephone disconnected in July and did not have it reinstalled. W. W. McDONAID, Superintendent of Mails, Pampa, Texas, advised the records of that office reflected a forwarding address placed on July 8, 1938, for general delivery, Shamrock, Texas. In accordance with request, photographs of RALPH ROE and THEODORE COLE were delivered to Chief of Police W. H. BATES at Borger, Texas. Mr. and Mrs. T. D. MOSS, Post Office Box 492, Shamrock, Texas, were located at a small filling station and beer joint about four miles north of Shamrock, Texas Highway 83 which they are operating, and upon interview advised they barely knew Mrs. CECIL NOEL: that while they were in Las Vegas, New Mexico, Mrs. NOEL would come into their place of business and make her purchases and leave; that she was rather friendly with Mrs. MOSS' sister, Mrs. BUCK NOEL, but not Mrs. MOSS. Mr. and Mrs. MOSS stated that they did not know she was the ex-wife of ROE: that they did not know her at all until she married CECIL NOEL; that they observed that she was aloof and was non-committal and non-communicative with them. They were of the opinion that Mrs. CECIL NOEL would tell her husband anything; that she handles the money and is boss. Mrs. MOSS stated her sister now lives at Pampa, Texas and can be located through her fatherin-law J. L. NOEL who lives on Francis Street in Pampa, Texas. Mr. and Mrs. MOSS stated they never did see Mrs. CECIL NOEL write a letter to anyone, nor did they have any idea when she received her mail and under what name. At 2107 Twenty First Street, Lubbock, Texas, Mr. J. C. DAVIS, owner of the Texas Floral Company, was contacted and advised he has owned and operated the above floral company at this address for a number of years. Mr. DAVIE stated he did not know a letter had been written to anyone at Odessa, Texas. He searched his records and failed to find that any mail had been directed to anyone at that place. He questioned his secretary who advised that she did not write anyone at Odessa, Texas; further that no mail had been sent out of that office for anyone at Odessa. Mr. W. C. WALL, gardener, and landscape expert, for the above floral company, advised that he had no knowledge as to who could have written a letter to Odessa, Texas, using 2107 21st Street as a return address. Both Mr. DAVIS and Mr. WALL advised that they would discreetly ascertain if any of their employees or helpers could have written such a letter. They edvised that the help they are using are college boys, who are working to help them through school, but they would endeavor to ascertain if they know anyone in Odessa, Texas. # 2 #

ROCOL. Mr. DON REEDER, Chief of Police, and a National Police graduate, and Mr. BILL MABRY, Assistant Chief of Police, Lubbook, Texas. stated that both Mr. DAVIS and Mr. WALL are men of good reputation, and any statement they may make could be depended upon as being the truth. Mr. DAVIS and Mr. WALL were again contacted and they advised that they had questioned each one of their employees in such a manner that no one suspected an investigation. No one appeared to have any acquaintances in Odessa, Texas. It was the opinion of Mr. DAVIS and Mr. WALL that if any one of their employees had knowledge of this letter he would not hesitate to say so. These men advised that in the event they obtain any information relative to letter being mailed to anyone in Odessa, Texas, they would immediately communicate with the Dallas office. They also stated they would instruct their secretary to watch all incoming mail for any addressed to any employee or any one not employed by them at this address, and in the event a letter is received bearing odessa, Texas, postmark, they will immediately make a note of all information appearing on the envelope and communicate with the Dellas office. Both DAVIS and WAIL were furnished with the names of the persons to whom the instant letter was addressed at Odessa, Texas. The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent E. C. DORRIS: Mr. MARTIN KOONSMAN, agent for the National Automobile Theft Bureau advised agent that he was recently in Odessa, Texas, and had occasion to talk with a woman who was being held at this place for ear theft. 

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. E. A. TANK

In accordance with your instructions, I called SAC Fletcher at Oklahoma City relative to plans for cooperating b7D in obtaining information from with who is incarcerated in Leavenworth Penitentiary and is presumed to have information relative to the whereabouts of Ralph Roe. I informed Mr. Fletcher it was your desire that Special Agent Frank Smith not accompany as the Bureau felt arrangements could be made so Agents from the Kansas City office could handle this situation at Leavenworth Penitentiary. I also advised Mr. Fletcher the Bureau would prefer that the arrangements in this matter be made so A. B. Cooper would not accompany to the Penitentiary, but pointed out to Mr. Fletcher the Bureau realized that this woman was actually an informant of Cooper's and that, of course, we would have to conform ourselves somewhat to her wishes. SAC Fletcher stated it was his opinion and also Agent Smith's opinion that Cooper was entirely reliable, that he had formerly been connected with the Burns Detective Agency, and that he had assisted the Kokla City office in the solution of a bank case. Mr. Fletcher said that the present arrangements were for and Cooper to go to Kansas City on Monday and that would then go alone to Leavenworth Penitentiary, contact her husband, attempt to arrange with him for an Agent to interview him and in the event he did not agree to this, attempt to arrange for Cooper to interview him. I ENCL. T RECORDED & INDEXED/ SAC Fletcher advised that he would determin Jegerakbutiah célikéstigation b7D arrangements were finally made for and that he would advise the Bureau and the Kansas City coffice 37 immediately so arrangements could be made by the Kansas City office upon her arrival in Kansası Gibepantmetrensalisir E to contact make such plans as possible to interview her husband at the Leavenworth Penitentiary or at least to obtain the information which she secures from her husband.

SAC Fletcher advised that last night there had been a Government owned automobile stolen in Oklahoma City and that his office had opened a case for Theft of Government Property. He requested authority from the Bureau to make a broadcast over the State Highway Patrol Radio System relative to this automobile. Mr. Fletcher stated that he was not entirely clear as to the necessity of securing authority for a broadcast of this type and I advised him that the Bureau desired that before making any sort of broadcast, the field office secure prior authority from the Bureau. I told him that in this particular instance, he should go ahead and make the broadcast unless I advised him to the contrary. I then called you and advised of the authority given for this broadcast.

In the development of a lead at the Oklahoma City Office Special Agent FRANK S. SMITH contacted A. B. COOPER, private detective at Oklahoma · City, and received information to the effect that Fugitives ROE and COLE had effected their escape. Mr. COOPER stated that his informant was of STEPHEN WELCH, Oklahoma City Police Department #8735, now serving five years in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas on counterfeiting and confidence charges.

A STEPHEN WELCH and were formerly close associates of RALPH ROE, and at one time made his bond in connection with harboring charges arising out of the WILBER UNDERHILL case. makes regular visits to the Leavenworth Penitentiary to see her husband, and she is presently employed by J. FOREST McCUTCHEON, an attorney with offices in the First National Bank Building, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. She is regarded in Oklahoma City as being a good contact for the underworld and particularly confidence men. She has assisted Mr. COOPER in the past on matters, and has been found reliable by him.

Special Agent FRANK S. SMITH personally talked to and she stated that on a recent visit to he told her that ROE and COLE actually made their escape, and that ROE was then in Chiego. She stated that she did not know the source of her husband's information, but he apparently had good sources of information for the reason that he asked her to watch the newspapers on some counterfeiting matters breaking in Denver, and that evening she picked up a newspaper in Kansas City, Missouri in which she notices an article about the arrest of individuals named by her husband at Denver on counterfeiting charges.

This women advised Mr. KOONSMAN that O'PRIFN goes by the name of "JACK", and "SAILOR", and she quoted O'BRIMN as saying "I helped those boys make their escape from Alcatraz". O'BRIMN is further alleged to have told the woman that he had contacted both ROE and COLE since their escape from Alcatraz, and further, that he is an ex-convict, and is considered dangerous.

AT ODESSA, TEXAS:

Through Deputy Sheriff STELL HILL, it was ascertained that EVA RUTH TALLAFERRO was probably the woman referred to in the above mentioned thephonic conversation, and EVA RUTH was interviewed in the presence of HILL.

She advised that she is eighteen years of age, and has been married on one occasion to a ROBE MATSON of Carlabad, New Mexico; that her mother, MRS. C. B. TALIAFERO now resides at Alamogordo, New Mexico, with EVA RUTH'S grandmother, MRS. J. J. GOSSETT. She stated that she first met JACK O'ERIEN (uses name of JACK CAMPERIC on his Social Security card) when he was at Carlabad with a carnival about a year ago; that she associated there with him for about a week, but that he left Carlabad with the carnival and she did not see him again until she accidentally met him at Crane, Texas in October, 1938. EVA RUTH stated that following this meeting she lived at Crane, Texas, with O'ERIEN as his wife for about a week and a half; that it was during this time that he mentioned ROE and COLE.

EVA MUTH was closely questioned as to how the conversation regarding ROE and COLE crose between herself and O'BRIEN, and she advised that commission was the type of individual who was always bragging about his misdeeds, and after she had lived with him about two or three days, he attempted to persuade her to hustle for him.

According to EVA RUTH, arrangements were the she was to make arrangements to fill a date with a man whose identity she claimed not to know, and that while she was filling this date, O'BRIEN would "roll" the man for his money. EVA RUTH stated that she positively refused to hustle for O'BRIEN, or have any part in the badger game which he was trying to perpetrate, and O'BRIEN got onerry and started telling her what a tough character he was.

O'ERIEN at this time told EVA RUTH that he had been in some undesignated penitentiary on three occasions, and that he was presently wanted by the Police Departments of various cities in the United States. He also alleged at this time that he was the man who made it possible for ROE and COLE to escape from Alcatraz. EVA RUTH stated that nothing more was said about ROE and COLE, inasmuch as these statements were made during the argument as to whether she should prostitute herself for O'ERIEN'S benefit, and that, knowing that O'ERIEN was a liar and a braggart, she paid no particular attention to these statements; that, however, a few days subsequent to the above occurrence, O'ERIEN received a latter from Los Angeles, signed by a "MARION", the contents of which indicated that MARION had been questioned about ROE and COLE, as well as O'ERIEN. This letter also alleged that MARION had been watched by Federal officers, and shadowed for a period of a week.

In this connection, particular reference is made to report of Special Agent C. G. CANTENIL, Seattle, "ashington, July 12, 1938, reflecting an interview with MARYON JEANETTE DARLING, wherein it is indicated that the DARLING woman was an associate of one JACK O'ERIEN, It appears probable that the letter referred to by EVA RUTH TALIATER was received by O'ERIEN from the DARLING woman.

EVA RUTH was closely questioned in an effort to ascertain the full name of MARION, who addressed the letter to O'BRIEN, but she was unable to recall the full name signed to this letter, and advised that O'BRIEN told her that this girl was a former sweetheart, who wented to marry him; that she had recently returned to Los Angeles from the State of Washington, to begin work on a new picture.

EVA RUTH advised that O'ERIMN worked at Crane, Texas, for a very few days, with some road construction company, and during the time he worked there, he always said that as soon as he got enough money he was going to return to Los Angeles, Californie to see the DARLING Woman.

EVA RUTH further edvised that shortly after the quarrel about her hustling, she left O'BRIEN and came to Odessa. Texas, where she stayed for several days; that she had, however, promised O'BRIEN that she would return to Crane at some future date, and inform him as to whether she intended to live with him, and possibly prostitute herself for him; that for this reason she had borrowed an automobile and proceeded to Crane, Texas, to see D'BRIEN, and had been agrested at Crane and charged with the theft of this car.

She advised that according to her last information, O'ERIEN is at Crane, Texas, and if he had left that point, she did not know where he could be found, other than that he always expressed the desire to return to Los Angeles.

EVA RUTH was unable to identify the photographs of Subjects as being anyone who associated with O'BRIEN during the time she was associated with him.

Following is description of O'BRIEN as furnished by EVA RUTH TALLAFERO:

Age: 23 years.

Height: 5 feet.

Weight: 160 lbs.

Build: Slender.

With reference to report of Special Agent RAIPH T. HOOD, dated December 2, 1938, Oklehoma City, the following effort was made to locate MRS. ED. (JEAN) DAVIS:

Mr. J. T. SMITH, Assistant Postmaster, after checking his records, advised that the DAVIS woman was not receiving mail at Odessa, Texas.

MISS EVANS, Retail Merchants Association, after a search of her records, advised that she had no information whatever about MPS. ED (JEAN) DAVIS. MISS EVANS, at Agent's request, called all the local honky-tonks, in an effort to see if a woman of that name was working for such places, without being informed as to the nature of this investigation, or as to the connection of the various individuals contacted. MISS EVANS, on Agent's request, telephonically communicated with JAMES FOE, brother of Subject, under the guise of obtaining credit information from him, and requested that he furnish all the information in his possession as to MPS. ED (JEAN) DAVIS. HOE stated to MISS EVANS that he was acquainted with an ED DAVIS, and that probably this ED DAVIS.

wife was named JEAN, but that he had no information as to the present location of either ED or JEAN DAVIS.

City Officer DICK CHAPMAN advised that he was well acquainted with the habitues of the local dence hells and honky-tonks, but that he did not recell any woman by the name of TRAY DAVIS eround Odessa, Texas.

Officer CHAPMAN made casual inquiry among practically all the taxi drivers at Odessa, Texas, and without locating any information concerning this girl.

Officer CHAPMAN also advised that he was acquainted with JAMES FOE, brother of Subject ROE, and that he would assist Agent in developing a confidential informant close to this individual, and requested that he be contacted in this connection when next Agent is in Odessa, Texas.

W. A. FIELDS, City Police Department, Odessa, Texas, advised that he had been Chief of Police at Monahans, Texas until a few months ago, and that while at Monahans, he was acquainted with JEAN DAVIS, who worked at the Permain Club for a short time; that since this time JEAN DAVIS came to Odessa, Texas, and worked at various honky-tonks for about two weeks, and left Odessa during the latter part of October, 1938; that JEAN DAVIS left Odessa, Texas to go to Centralia, Illinois, where she expected towork for one BOB CONNOR as a taxi dancer; that five other taxi dancers accompanied JEAN DAVIS from Odessa at this time. This information was verified by Mr. STEELE HILL another deputy at the Ector County Courthouse, Odessa, Texas, and other deputies who were present during the interview with Mr. FIELDS.

MR. FIELDS furnished the following description of JEAN DAVIS, and insamuch as it is not positively known that this is the JEAN DAVIS referred to in the report of Special Agent MCCD, this description is being set out for the benefit of the Oklahoma City Office:

Age: 22 to 25 years.

AT CRANE, TEXAS:

MR. J. T. BUTLER, Clerk Crane Post Office, advised that he had no record or recollection of envone by the name of JACK OFERIEN or JACK CAMPBELL receiving mail at Crane, Texas, and that he had no forwarding address for anyone under these names.

Mr. BUTIER was unable to identify the photographs of Subjects as being anyone whom he had seen at Crene, Texas.

CHIEF OF POLICE, DUDE THOMPSON, edvised that he knew JACK O'PRION as "SAILOR JACK" and this individual had stayed around Crene, Texas for about two end a half weeks, during the latter part of September, or or the first part of October, 1938; that O'BRIEN at that time was living with two boys known to the Chief by their last name only, as the "WOOTEN" boys.

Chief THONDSON stated that all of these individuals left Crane, Texas, about a month ago, and that he had been interested in keeping track of them, but had not been to determine their destination at the time they left CRANE. MR. THOMPSON further advised that O'BRIEN had told such tall tales to various citizens of Crans, Texas, during the time he lived at that point, that he, THOMPSON, had endeavored to ascertain if O'BRIEN was wanted any place in the United States, and he was unable to ascertain that O'BRIEN was wanted; however, he had come to the conclusion that O'BRIEN was a liar and a braggart.

Chief THOMPSON stated that he had ascertained, however, that O'BRIEN had been employed by a local construction Company under the name of JACK CAMPBELL, and due to all this individual's activities, he had kept close watch on him at Crane, Texas; that, however, he is positive that O'BRIEN never associated with anyone answering the description, or appearing identical with the photographs of the subjects of this case.

R. E. WATSON, Watson's Cafe, was interviewed in the presence of Chief THOMPSON and he advised that JACK O'BRIEN had eaten prectically all of his meals at that place, and that O'BRIEN was continually brazging about his association with big-time criminals, and about his past criminal record; that he, WATSON, at first believed that O'BRIEN was a very tough character, but later decided that O'BRIEN was merely a brazgert.

WATSON stated that O'BRIEN had left Crene, Texas, sometime tefore without disclosing his destination; that, however, O'BRIEN had worked for the Frown and Root Construction Company as JACK CAMPBELL, and it had been necessary for Mr. WATSON to attach O'BRIEN'S check at that place in order to secure payment for the meals which O'BRIEN had exten in his cafe.

MR. WATSON is unable to identify photographs of Subject as any individuals he saw associating with C'ERIEN at Orane, Texas.

KMINETH MONTGOMERY, Brown & Root Construction Company, advised that "SAILOR JACK" C'BRIEN had been employed by this Company on road construction work from October 5 to October 6, 1938, inclusive; that he recelled O'ERIEN as a braggart and as being appearantly a roving type of individual; that O'ERIEN left Crane, Texas some weeks before the time of this investigation, giving no indication as to his present destination.

MR. MONTOOMERY was unable to identify photographs of Subjects as being any individuals who associated with Oferial at Crame, Texas,

In company with Chief THOMPSON, Agent made inquiry among numerous loiterers around Grane, Texas, all of whom were acquainted with JACK O'BRIEN, but none of whom were able to give any information concerning O'BRIEN'S present location. In this manner it was escentained, however, that O'BRIEN resided in a small shack with two boys named "WOODEN" at Grane, Texas, and this shack was located on the edge of Grane. At this place MRS. WOCTEN (no relation to the WOOTEN boys, who lived with O'BRIEN), who is the nearest neighbor to the shack where O'BRIEN and two other boys lived, advised that she recalled O'BRIEN and two other boys living in this shack from sometime after themiddle of September until the first part of October; that, however, she did not associate with these individuals, and neither did her husband, and that she was unable to give any information concerning O'BRIEN'S present location. MRS. WATSON was unable to identify photographs of Subjects as being any individuals who associated with O'BRIEN at Grane, Texas.

HOOD, dated Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, December 2, 1938; from her description as set out in this report.

THE FEORIA DIVISION OFFICE:

AT CENTRALIA, ILLINOIS, is requested to endeavor to locate Mrs. ED (JEAN) DAVIS and conduct investigation regarding her, as requested by the El Paso Office in the reference report of Special Agent HOOD.

It should be noted that JEAN DAVIS is believed to be presently working as a text dancer for BOB CONNER at Centralia, Illinois.

THE STATULE DIVISION OFFICE: Is requested to refer to the report of Special Agent G. C. CAMPERL, dated July 12, 1938, and endeavor to escertain through MARYON TEAMETTE DARLING, the present location of JACK O'ERGEN, in order that this individual may be vigorously interviewed regarding the allegations he has made to various people concerning the escape of the subjects.

THE PL PASO DIVISION OFFICE:

AT ODESSA. TEXAS: Will in the near future contact City Officer DICK CHAFMAN, and through him develop a confidential informant who is in a position to obtain information of value in this case from TAKES ROE.

Inquiry was made in the neighborhood of 3624 General Pershing Street, and it was learned that no one by the name of MRS. M. J. GILLIES lived at that address, and it was possible that she lived with MR. CACNOIATTI, who operated a pants factory on Girod Street in New Orleans. However, inquiry was made through MR. CHURCH, Manager of W. P. A. projects, New Orleans, and it was learned that EDWARD JOHN FILLIES is now employed on W. P. A. Project #104, and could be located at 3624 General Pershing Street; since it had been learned that no one by the name of GILLIES resided at that address, MR. CHURCH was unable to furnish any other address except W. P. A. Project #104 and stated he would get in touch with GILLIES by 'phone if necessary. However, Agent made inquiries through MR. CAGNOIATTI on Girod Street, who operates a pants factory there, and it was learned that EDWARD JOHN GILLIES is his brother-in-law, and he would contact GILLIES and have him come to the New Orleans Division Office for interview.

In an interview with EDWARD JOHN GILLIES, 609 Iberville St., New Orleans, the writer was informed that he, GILLIES, had served approximately 18 years in the Federal penitentiary, both at Leavenworth and Alcatraz; that he was transferred from Leavenworth to Alcatraz in 1935, because he had been in so long he had been considered almost a trusty by the officials at

both Leavenworth and Alcatraz; that his duties were to clean up the beach and assist in the gardening at Alcatraz. He stated that he did not mingle with the other convicts since he felt that association with them might tend to hurt his progress in obtaining a parole, which he has now obtained. He stated that he recalls RAIPH ROE and TED COIE from their pictures, but did not recall them by name. He stated that he had read of their escape in the papers and felt that if they had not drowned, it was a miracle. He stated that he had never heard anyone discuss any practical means of escape while an immate at Alcatraz, since he did not associate with any of the convicts for the purpose as mentioned above. With reference to any escapes, he had heard some individuals there state that it was almost impossible to escape, and that some were resigned to the fact that escape was very impractical. He further stated that it is doubtful whether anyone who had a plan of escape would discuss it with persons other than those who intended to participate. With reference to escaping from the island. GILLES stated that it might have been possible that these individuals could have obtained some inner tubes and taken the valve stems off the tubes and passed by the teletownhmachine (stool pigeon boxes), later get glue from the print shop and an extra patch from another inner tube and inflate same and use the tubes to buoy them in the water. He further stated that the only place possible for anyone to make any progress in the water for any distance would be on the Oakland side of the island, where the docks are located; that it was possible ROE and COLE had gotten to the docks and had swum out to the buoy since the water at that point is slack for approximately 300 yards, and that in a heavy fog they would not be noticed and that arrangements for a boat to meet them near the buoy on the open side could have been made and the possibility of escape good.

GILLES stated that if he obtained any information which would assist in this case, he would readily furnish it to the New Orleans Office, but stated that although he had served a long time for his crime that previous to his incarceration he had no criminal record, and that his grew out of an escapade of a soldier overseas, and that he did not consider himself a thief and did not have any sympathy for hardened criminals. GILLES appeared to be very sincere in his statements.

Reference is made to your letter of December 7, 1938 calling attention to the report of Special Agent R. H. SIMONS, Los Angeles, dated November 28, 1938, which pertained to one JESSE SINES of Nashville, Tennessee, who was regarded as being identical with subject COLE.

You will note that the investigation pertaining to SINKS was based upon a copy of a letter dated September 2, 1938 directed to the Memphis Division by the Bureau, with a copy to the Los Angeles Division, transmitting to both offices copies of a letter from A. B. TUCKER, Route 1, Box 221, Woodlake, California, suggesting JESSE SINES, 1121 Second Avenue N., Mashville, Tennessee, as a suspect in this case.

The Bureau's letter referred to above does not indicate copies of the letter or enclosure for either the Oklahoma City or San Francisco Divisions. However, under date of September 24, 1938 a report was submitted by Special Agent C. O. PICKARD of the Memphis Division indicating that JESSE SINKS, 1121 Second Ave. N., Nashville, Temmessee, had been interviewed and that a fingerprint comparison revealed definitely that he was not subject COLE. Your office hes a copy of that report, but the San Francisco Division did not receive a copy.

Consequently, in view of the fact that SINKS has been definitely eliminated as being identical with subject COLE, it is unnecessary for ALICE MUGGINS of Sanger, California, to be interviewed. I regret that the report of Special Agent SIMONS did not more clearly explain this situation.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

A. W. HINTON, Auburn, California, informant, determined mentally unbalanced. Electrical Marysville, California, gives information of possible value. ALEKOOG, Folsom Number 13166 states he has no information regarding instant case.

DETAILS:

AT AUBURN, CALIFORNIA.

A. W. HINTON was re-interviewed at his home on East Placer Street at which time he stated that he had been able to ascertain that subjects ROE and COLE were in the vicinity of Auburn, California. HINTON, who was confined to his bed as he has been upon the occasion of each previous interview, stated he was not able to take agent to the place where he knew these men to be in hiding. Upon all previous occasions, HINTON has been quite mysterious as to the sources of his information so upon this occasion he was pressed considerably to divulge how he gained certain information. After considerable bickering, HINTON

proceeded to explain his method of detection. He stated that every individual in the world has his own individual "frequency" similar to the manner in which everyone has different fingerprints; that every person acts as his own battery and that HINTON has a machine which he is able to tune in on every person deceased or living and advise as to their whereabouts. He stated that the only catch to this process is that he must have something from the person whom he is endeavoring to locate such as a fingerprint, sputum from a sealed envelope or something of that nature. He stated there was no doubt in his mind but that he could locate the body of ROY! ISCH in twenty four hours; that as a matter of fact he had recently written the Sheriff's Office in Reno, Nevede, inquiring to whether or not there is a reward offered for the recovery of FRISCH'S ody. He stated he had known long before the Bureau knew, actually where the ...VINE boy's body would be would be had been able to ascertain the day, our and place where AMELIA . RHART had drowned. He stated that he tuned his machine in on the individuals whom he sought and that he could then walk a straight line from his machine to the person. However, one fallacy with his machine was that he did not know where on this straight line the person would be found, whether it might be 100 miles or 100 yards, therefore it was necessary for him to shoot one line towards this person and then walk a considerable distance and shoot another line which would be towards this person and thus the person would be located by triangulation,

After considerable persuasion, HINTON produced his machine from a closet in his room which seemed to be a board covered with dials and various gadgets. It being obvious that HINTON is mentally unbelanced, no further attention is being paid to the information which he has given the San Francisco Field Office. Concerning the individual whom he had previously advised he had been talking with in Grass Valley, California, who had told him that enother person seen in that town was RALPH ROE, he stated he had not the slightest idea how to find this person and that as a matter of fact his machine was the only method which should ever be employed and that it was upon the working of his machine that he had originally decided that ROE was in the vicinity of Grass Valley rather than upon what anyone had told him.

AT MARYSVILLE, CALIFORNIA.

Chief of Police DORRILL LaFORTUNE, while being contacted upon other official business, advised that he had recently been told by ED REILEY, Marysville Fire Chief that he believed he might have information of possible value concerning instant case.

ED REILEY, upon being interviewed, stated that on September 27, 1938, he had been in the Southern Pacific Railroad Station in Salt Lake City about 11.25 P.M. waiting for a train; that while there he had become engaged

in conversation with four soldiers, three of whom were obviously new recruits judging from their uniforms and their general demenor. The fourth men was in civilian clothes but advised that he had, that day, enlisted with the other three men at Fort Douglas, Utah and that they were leaving for Vancouver Barracks, Vancouver, Washington, where they were assigned to duty.

REILEY stated that somehow during the conversation the subject of the escape of ROE and COLE from Alcatraz had come up and the soldierwho was in civilian clothes had "hopped off" considerably, stating that he knew plenty about the case; that he did not feel free to say what he knew and had then made some evasive remark about "money talks" indicating to REILEY that there had been some plot whereby ROE and COLE had escaped from Alcatraz as a result of the payment of money to someone.

RETLEY stated his suspicions had been aroused by the statements and actions of this man and so had asked him no further questions, fearing that the man, in turn, might become suspicious of him.

RELEY further stated that he recalled this individual to have been about thirty five years of age, of medium height, blond hair and fair complexion. He was unable to give any additional description on this man but did recall that this individual had stated that hehad served a previous enlistment in the army; that he was a sign painter by trade and as business was bad, he had decided to re-enlist in the army.

It was REILEY'S recollection that this individual had the four railroad tickets for all four of the soldiers and appeared to more or less be "riding herd" upon the new recruits.

AT REPRESA. CALIFORNIA.

AL SKOOC, Alcatraz Number 225, released from that penitentiary on June 14, 1937, and received on the same date at Folsom Penitentiary, as ALBERT CHARLESCOENNIS, with alieses: RAW PETERSON, ALBERT WINFIELD SKOOG, Folsom Number 13166, was interviewed by agent at Folsom Penitentiary. SKOOG, who has been in Folsom for six months prior to the escape of ROE and COLE, stated that he had no information whatsoever concerning instant break other than he had heard there had been such a break from Alestraz. He stated he had known both ROE and COLE only to speak to while at Alcatraz and had always understood that they were all right; that is, that they were considered O.K. among the other convicts and not of the type who would "rat" on enyone. In that connection, SKOOG stated although he had no information concerning any proposed plot or any other information of possible value concerning this break, he would certainly not give such

information to any officer in the event he did have such information; that he was absolutely not a stool pigeon, and although he knew nothing concerning the break he would be the last person in the world to advise of it, if he did have such information.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

WASHINGTON, will endeavor to locate and appropriately interview the soldier referred to herein by ED REILEY bearing in mind that this man re-enlisted late in September, 1938, at Fort Douglas, Utah, is said to have been a former sign painter and is described about thirty five years of age, medium height and a blond.

WILLIAM COLLINS, his wife, ALTA (sister of MRS. FRED COLE) and his two sons, LESTER, age 23; and JOHN, age 21, came from Circle Back, Texas, and have resided with FRED COLE since Japaary, 1938. Fingerprints of LESTER and JOHN POLLINS obtained and ascertained to be not identical with those of fugitives.

AT WOODLAKE, CALIFORNIA:

MISS EDITH DAY, Postmaster, advised that although she had been watching the mail coming to the COLE family and keeping her ears open, she had obtained no information concerning TED COLE. She atated that FRED COLE is still residing in the same place on his farm about three miles from Woodlake; that WILLIAM COLLINS and his wife, who is a sister to MRS. FRED COLE, and his two sons, ages about 21 and 23 years, who bears considerable resemblance to TED COLE, have lived at the COLE farm for about a year. Agent ascertained that someone had already called for the COLE mail.

opie 61 Inasmuch as it was desired to interview FRED COLE discreetly and without the knowledge of his wife, Agent learned by discreet inquiry that FRED COLE was not employed in the town of Woodlake. Since this investigation was conducted on Saturday afternoon and since it is the custom of farmers to come into town and shop on Saturday afternoons, a surveillance was maintained during the afternoon until dusk in the hope of contacting FRED COLE but he was not observed in town by Agent. Thereafter, at about dusk, Agent drove by the COLE residence and observed three cars there, one of which was a new model Ford pickup truck.

As a last resort, in an effort to contact FRED COLE without the knowledge of the other members of his family, Agent contacted R. C. BROWN, Constable, to get FRED COLE to accompany him away from the COLE farm under pretext so that Agent might interview him. Constable BROWN learned that FRED COLE had previously left in the pickup truck to go to a neighboring farm to which BROWN directed Agent. FRED COLE, who was alone, was contacted by Agent as he was leaving the neighbors farm and interviewed after dark about a mile from his home.

FRED COIE was very cordial and gave Agent a hearty, friendly greeting. He expressed appreciation that Agent had not called at the farm and upset his wife who he stated had been very nervous and upset for several months after the escape and the subsequent excitement and investigation but who has nowrecovered to a great extent and resigned herself to the death of her son. He stated that she now seldow mentions him.

members of their family and relatives have received any word from TED COIE or any proof that he is alive; that he spoke the truth and that he had played square with the Agents of the Bureau from the very start and would continue to do so; that they believe TED COIE is certainly dead or he would have contacted some member of the family or sent word to them somehow.

COLE stated that in January, 1938, WILLIAM COLLINS, his wife ALTA (Sister of MRS. FRED COLE and aunt of TED COLE) and his two sons, LESTER, age 23 and JOHN, age 21, came out from Circle Back, Texas, and had been residing with him since at his farm in their house trailer; that because of the presence of the boys, who are slightly younger than TED COLE but bear a family resemblance, at his home he had expected an Agent of the Bureau there long before;

that the COLLINS family helped him with his farming and helped him harvest 1200 bushels of potatees which he sold for one dollar per bushel; that the boys are musicians and have been playing at dances; that LESTER plays the fiddle and JOHNNIE the guitar and banjo; that they were playing on this Saturday night at the Happy Go Incky Dance Hall at Tulare, California; that they are now employed during the week at the Woodlake Packing House.

Considerable other conversation was had with FRED COLE during which he advised that he had been re-examined by the Government physicians about four months ago during which he refused to submit to a spinal puncture; that as a result of this examination his pension from the Government had been discontinued; that, however, he expects to get it back. He advised that he has been working pretty steadily lately as a carpenter constructing houses and buildings in and around Woodlake; that he himself expects to build a house in Woodlake on one of the three lots which he owns there and therefore will probably be living in the town of Woodlake after the first of the year. During this conversation, which was friendly, frank and apparently sincere, Agent questioned FRED COLE several times regarding TED COLE and he stated that he had received no information whatever concerning whether he is dead or alive or where he might be. He asked Agent whether the Bureau had any indication whether TED COIE was alive and he was advised that Agent had no knowledge of what information the Bureau had except that reports were received from time to time that TED COLE and RALPH ROE had been seen in different places.

FRED COLE went back to his farm for the purpose of bringing WILLIAM COLLINS for interview by Agent but on his return advised that COLLINS and his wife had gone out for the evening, probably to the dance where their sons were playing at Tulare.

AT TULARE, CALIFORNIA:

A surveillance was maintained by Agent at the Happy Go
Lucky Dance Hall for the purpose of contacting WILLIAM COLLINS and
his two sons. No one who might be WILLIAM COLLINS was observed
in the dance hall and at the first opportunity which was the intermission about 12:45 AM, Agent contacted LESTER COLLINS who advised
that neither his father nor his brother was at the dance that night.
An appointment was made with LESTER COLLINS and his brother and his
father the following day at noon at the Woodlake Packing House as he
advised he and his brother would be working there Sunday till noon.

IESTER COLLINS stated that he was raised around Stroud, Oklahoma, and knew TED COLE quite well when they were kids; that during the past year, while he has been residing at the COLE home they have not received any word from him to his knowledge; that TED COLE has not visited there or sent word by anyone and he is sure that neither his father, FRED COLE, or MRS. FRED COLE knows whether TED COLE is alive or dead or has any information concerning his location.

On the following day the fingerprints of LESTER and JOHN COLLINS were obtained on personal identification cards and determined not to be identical with those of fugitives. WILLIAM COLLINS did not appear for interview and LESTER COLLINS advised that he was working at home.

This investigation is predicated upon information furnished to Special Agent DUANE L. TRAYNOR, of the San Francisco office while in Sacramento, Calif., on March 18, 1938, by MRS. ETHEL CHOUGAS, Route 1, Box 21, Colfax, Calif. MRS. CHOUGAS informed Agent TRAYNOR at the office of the U. S. Attorney in Sacramento that in February 1938 she had been traveling near Stockton, California, was out of work and was hitchhiking; that in a small town outside of Stockton, Calif., two men and a woman picked her up in a truck and allowed her to stay with them for about a week at their mountain camp. Later, after her return to Colfax, she had noted from the pictures of ROE and COME appearing in the True Detective Magazine that the two men who had picked her up and with whom she had lived for a week were identical with ROE and COLE and that these two men were known to her as "TED" and "RAIPH". She described these individuals as follows:

Agent TRAINOR exhibited photographs to MRS. CHOUGAS, and she immediately picked out those of COLE and ROE as the individuals known to her. MRS. CHOUGAS gave the following directions in order that the place where she had lived with these two men might be located: "Isave San Andreas on the dirt road leading to Mountain Ranch going through that town and following the road leading to the town of Railroad Flat. At a point about five miles before reaching Railroad Flat, you would run into three separate camps, which would all be close together. The first one would consist of a tent on the left hand side of the road then a short distance and there would be a tent on the right side of the road and then a little further would be a third tent on the left hand side and an old homemade trailer house which had been taken off the wheels. This trailer house faces the tent which is white. It is in this third one that subjects are located. The tent is boarded around the bottom and has a dirt floor."

She added that at the time she knew subjects, they were making an honest living, chopping wood.

The above information is contained in San Francisco file 76-290-537.

On December 15, 1938, Agent, accompanied by Deputy Sheriff HOWARD COLLINS of the Sheriff's Office at San Andreas, Calaveras, County, California, drove the road to Railroad Flat via Mountain Ranch, as described by MRS. CHOUGAS, without obtaining any information from any individuals that subjects had possibly been in that vicinity. Mountain Ranch consists of a store and a

few houses and Railroad Flat consists of a general store in which is located the Post Office, with a few farmers houses nearby. There are only scattered farms throughout this part of the country. On this trip approximately 20 farmers and other individuals were interviewed by Deputy Sheriff COLLINS and Agent, all of whom were shown photographs of subjects. Deputy Sheriff COLLINS advised that there are a number of woodcutters in this part of the country and a large number of miners and prospectors but that if any individuals lived for any length of time at the place described by MRS. CHOUGAS, same would have been known to various farmers living nearby. None of the individuals interviewed had ever seen subjects or heard of them.

Agent and Deputy Sheriff COLLINS were unable to locate the place where ROE and COLE were supposed to have lived, and Deputy Sheriff COLLINS, who passes over this road at least twice each week during the year, stated that he had never noted any tents or camps as described by MRS. CHOUGAS.

It may be stated that the country covered is sparsely settled but that there are farmers' cabins approximately two or three miles apart along this road, all of whom were interviewed and exhibited photographs of subjects, but, as stated, with negative results.

She stated that she makes a habit of visiting each month at Leavenworth; that about one month after the escape of RALPH ROE and THEODORE COLE from Alcatraz and while visiting they began talking about the escape of ROE and COLE states that she was arguing that ROE and COLE did not escape but were probably drowned, but that after considerable argument STEPHEN WEICH became highly incensed and told her flatly that he knew they had escaped but at this time would not tell her anything further. She further related that about three months after the escape of ROE and COLE, and while she was again visiting at Leavenworth, that they again began discussing ROE and COLE and at this time WEICH again stated that he knew that both ROE and COLE had escaped safely and that RALPH ROE was then in Chicago said that this was all the information she had obtained concerning ROE and COLE from but said that she was willing to endeavor to obtain further information from him and give this information to this Bureau on the possibility that by obtaining the information she could obtain some consideration for in getting him pardoned or parcled. She was informed that we could not promise her anything as far as a pardon or parcle was concerned, but that if she obtained the |

On 12-20-38 Mr. COOPER again brought to the office and she stated that she had a long visit with and again brought up the subject of ROE and COLE but particularly RALPH ROE, in view of the fact that her husband and RALPH ROE were well acquainted, but she stated she did not believe THEODORE COLE. During the interview on 12-20-38 with stated, he was not inclined to talk about ROE and COLE, so she informed him that she had been discussing the possibility of giving information to the Government through A. B. COOPER, who is well acquainted with STEPHEN WELCH, and that she also told WELCH that she had met the writer, but did not tell him that she had discussed the ROE-COEE case at all but told WEICH that she felt that she could rely on the writer doing something for them as far as getting him released from the penitentiary. She said that WEICH told her that he would not be a snitch" for anything and got into an argument with her concerning this, but later on in the conversation WELCH told her that he knew that ROE and COLE had made good their escape because BRUCE BRADY, brother of BOB BRADY, had told BUCK MARTINDALE, who is also now in Leavenworth, that he, BRUCE BRADY, had seen RALPH ROE since the escape, stated that WELCH would not give her any further information, but stated to her that he would find RALPH ROE himself if he wanted to. purposely gave her the names of BRUCE BRADY and BUCK MARTINDALE as having information concerning ROE and COLE but did so in a manner which would indicate that he had given it inadvertently and had not given it as an informant or a "snitch." With regard to BRUCE BRADY, Mr. COOPER stated that BRADY is now supposed to be around Ada, Oklahoma, and is either on conditional release or parole from Leavenworth Penitentiary. stated that WELCH had indicated to her that BUCK MARTINDALE is in Leavenworth Penitentiary at the present time and that he had previously been in Leavenworth and was either sent up on another charge or had been out on parole and had been returned as a parole violator, but was in Leavenworth Penitentiary at the present time. stated that she would continue to endeavor to get information from her husband and believed that after he had some further time to think the matter over that he would probably give her some additional information. Reference is made to your letter to the Bureau dated January 6, 1939, in which you state that the Chief of the lowe State Bureau of Investigation had informed you as to the receipt of a letter from a police officer of the Mason City, lowe, Police Department. This letter indicated that the letter police officer had an informant who knew the whereacouts of an individual who is alleged to have escaped from Alcatraz Island three or four years ago and that the apprehension of this escaped prisoner sould clear up a bank robbery in the State of lowe as well as a murder case in either Morth or South Dekota.

It is noted you have requested the Sureau to advise whether any record is contained in its flies relative to the escape of a prisone. From Alcatrax three or four years ago. For your information, Alcatrax Island became a Federal Penitentiary on July 1, 1934, and the jurisdiction of prisoners confined there since that date has been under the Bureau of Prisons of the Dejartment of Justice. If any escapes had been effected, the Bureau undoubtedly would have been advised and would be conducting investigation at the present time, but as you are aware, the Ros and Cole escape is the only case involving an escape from Alcatraz presently being investigated by the Bureau.

It is therefore suggested that you endeavor to obtain additional information regarding this matter from the Chief of the lowe State Bureau of Investigation as further inquiries may disclose additional information which will be of assistance in this matter.

This informant is alleged to have stated that the apprehension of this escaped prisoner will clear up a bank robbery in the state of Iowa as well as solve a nurder case in one of the Dakotas.

"DOC" NEBERGALL has no further information at the moment but desired to know whether a prisoner had escaped from Alcatraz three or four years ago. The name of the alleged fugitive is unknown at this time and no description is available other than that the escaped prisoner has only one eye.

It is requested that the Bureau and San Francisco advise as soon as possible whether there is any record of a prisoner's escape from Alcatraz three or four years ago.

In making further inquiries relative to the above the case entitled RALPH ROE, with alias, Fugitive; I. 0. #1472, Et Al; escaped Federal prisoner, in which the San Francisco office is the origin, will be borne in mind.

DETAILS:

At 7244 Prairie Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, Agent attempted to interview MRS. MAE CAPONE, wife of Federal prisoner ALPHONSE CAPONE, ALBERT CAPONE, his brother, and MRS. THERESA CAPONE, his mother, without success. A woman in the building who would not open the door advised that a message could be left for the family who were not at home and this was, accordingly, done, a message being left to have some member of the family call reporting agent at the Chicago field division.

On the same day MR. RALPH CAPONE, brother of Federal prisoner, ALPHONSE CAPONE, telephoned the Chicago field division and an appointment was made with him for an interview at the office of the Waukesha Waters, Inc., 116 West Hubbard Street, Chicago, at which place he is employed as the president of the corporation. He advised that he is a brother of Federal prisoner ALPHONSE CAPONE and that while he himself had not visited

his brother at the Federal penitentiary at Alcatraz Island, almost every other member of the family had visited him there at one time or another since he has been incarcerated therein. He stated that he knows it to be a fact that his mother, MRS. THERESA CAPONE, his brother, ALMERT CAPONE, and his sister-in-law, MRS. MAE CAPONE, had never been in a position to learn of any plans that might ever have been made by subjects ROE and COLE to escape from Alcatraz Island. RALPH CAPONE stated that he has been informed that every time that a member of the family visited ALPHONSE CAPONE at the penitentiary they talked of nothing but personal family matters and that under the regulations of the penitentlary there can be no discussions whatever of anything that goes on at the penitentiary. He stated that MRS. MAE CAPONE told him upon returning from Alcatraz Island after visiting her husband there shortly after he had been stabbed, that when she asked ALPHONSE how he did get stabbed the prisoner held his finger up to his lips and indicated to her that he was forbidden to discuss the matter at all. RALPH CAPONE stated that as a matter of fact he knows his brother incurred the enmity of prisoners at both of the Federal penitentiaries in which he was incarcerated because of the fact that various prisoners expected ALPHONSE CAPONE to finance plans for escapes from the penitentiaries and that he would not listen to any such schemes and would not have any part in them. RALPH CAPONE stated that generally it would have been impossible for any of ALPHONSE CAPONE'S relatives to have secured any information concerning any plans that might have been made by ROE or COLE to escape from Alcatraz Island.

RALPH CAPONE indicated to Agent that he was speaking for his mother, brother and sister-in-law and that he did not desire that they be interviewed, in view of which fact no further attempt will be made to contact the relatives mentioned in the reference report.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent RALPH T. HOOD, dated at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, December 2, 1938, which sets out an undeveloped lead at Las Vegas, New Mexico, to ascertain whether CECIL MROKL and MRS. SADIE DYE are in contact with ROE, and to interview them if necessary, and to report the results of the mail cover on the mail of Mr. and Mrs. CECIL NOWL, and MRS. SADIE DYE at that point.

The attention of the Oklahoma City Office is directed to Page 5 and subsequent pages of the report of Special Agent D. P. SULLIVAN, dated at El Paso, Texas, September 22, 1938, in which an interview with MRS. DYR is reported in which she disclaims ever heving received any mail from MRS. MOH, and slee denied any information concerning ROF and COLE, and in which she Stated has was only casually acquainted with MRS. CECIL MOEL, who was alleged to have been the person in communication with ROK, or that she was thought to have been in communication with him.

The subsequent investigation, it will be noted, reflects the source of the story that MRS. NOEL was communicating with ROE. The report of Special Agent D. P. SULLIVAN, dated El Paso, Texas, August 8, 1938, sets out an interview had with Mrs. CECIL MOEL, in which she states that she has not seen or heard of ROE for several years, and reflects that her former husband, JACK ILOYD, did not even know that she had re-married until about three years after her marriage to her present husband, CECIL MOEL.

In view of the above facts, and the general information that there was no foundation for the story thatMFS, NOML or DYE was in communication with ROE, as explained by O. M. "TOMNIEW THOMPSON, in the report of Special Agent SULLIVAN, El Paso, Texas, dated September 22, 1938, page 7, there appears to be no reason for the re-interview of MFS. DYE and MRS. NOML at this time, and the lead is being disregarded.

Regarding the lead for the El Paso Office to report the results of the cover on the mail of MRS. NOWL and MRS. DYE, Postmaster FRANK WESNER of Las Vegas, New Mexico, has from time to time forwarded tracings to this office which have, in turn, been forwarded to your office, by latters dated October 7,10,11,14,19,22,25 and 31, November 3,8,9,15,26,30, and December 15,19, 1938.

Mrs. QUINN, in Oklahoma City; that both she and Mrs. DYE'S daughter

correspond with Mrs. SaDIE DTE at Les Vegas. She was discreetly questioned concerning HOE and CHLE and if they were known to her. Mrs. DYE, or Mrs. DYE'S daughter. She stated that she had never heard of RGE or COLE and knew of an correspondence passing concerning them. She stated that both Mrs. DIE and her daughter are excellent people. She was shown photographs of RGE and COLE which she falled to respend to. Mrs. DIES and to be a substantially reliable woman.

Referring to leads is reference report regarding RAT GILES. 300 East 6th Street. Agent escentiated that the above address is an epartment house and the present management has only been in charge thirty days; that Mrs. R. P. be located through the Police or Sheriff's Office.

C. O. HURT:

On December 6, 1938, ANN PIERCE was interviewed at the City Federal Jail, Muskoges, Oklahoma. He stated that he had never met ROE and COLE until after he was sent to Alcatrat; that while there he never had much contact with ROE, but did work some with COLE; however, that he never heard ROE or COLE talk about making a break. He stated that most all the boys on the "Rock" have hopes of being released sometime, but none of them ever talked about breaking in his presence; that he believes it would have been impossible for the boys to have made a successful escape unless they had transportation when they left; that he doubts seriously if a prisoner could row a boat to the shoreline on either side, and he believes the boys were weeked out through the Golden Gate.

PIERCE said the only person who has talked with him about ROE and COLE is an ex-convict whose name he does not retail, but who served time with him; that this individual came to his home northeast of Idebel. Oklahoma last summer from Georgia. He stated that this fellow stayed at his home four days; that he was drught when he arrived and never sobered up while he was there; that during the visit the fallow did ask him if he ever heard from COLE and ROE. He stated the visitor claimed to have a bus ticket and was abroute to the Terms oil fields; that he finally loaded this fellow on a bus and sent him on his way and has heard nothing from him since.

PIERCE said he believes if COLE and HOE had made a successful escape they would have returned to Oklehoma, and he would probably have heard of them. He elso states he knew of no one that would know anything about COLE and HOE since their assens.

the Oklahoma City Office and conferred with Special Agent RALPH T. MOD on December 23, 1938, advising him that he had obtained no new information relative to ROE and COLE, but that he would continue his efforts in the interest of securing information.

With the assistance of Sheriff IENOX, his informant JAMES a large scale farmer and oil well owner was contacted at his farm located about 25 miles northwest of Okmulgee, Post Office address Beggs, Oklahoma, at which time Mr. ADAMS stated that about six weeks ago he was fishing on the Illinois River near Eldon, Oklahoma and that his party purchased some moonshine whisky from an unnamed. individual who had been contacted in behalf of his party by a local farmer. Mr. ADAMS stated that during the past year he had made a trip to California and endeavored to visit Alcatraz Island and had received information at that time that visitors were not permitted at the Island; that he recalled certain conversation concerning the escape of fugitives ROE and COLE; that he was convinced that no one could escape from the Island. He stated that in talking to this unknown bootlegger he mentioned his trip to California and had remarked concerning the impossibility of escape, at which time the bootlegger spoke up and stated that ROE and COLE had been successful in making their escape and were at that time cutting logs in the woods in the Cookson Hills; that this was apparently a well known fact; that no one showed any interest for the reason that no reward had been offered. Mr. ADAMS stated he could not furnish the name of this bootlegger but that he would be in a position to secure same and for this purpose would make a trip, ostensibly for fishing purposes to the Illinois River Copy to Mr. Tamur

River and would learn the name of this bootlegger.

He stated he believed although through his friends, he would make it possible for Bureau Agents to secure any information in possession of this individual concerning ROE and COLE. He was advised that the writer would personally be glad to pay his expenses to determine the identity of this individual.

It does not appear that Mr. ADAMS expects any reward for his information since he reported the same to Sherif LENOX for the reason that he is a good friend of Sheriff LENOX and is a law-abiding citizen and he hoped his information would prove of value to Sheriff LENOX. Sheriff LENOX likewise, as a law enforcement officer states he does not accept rewards for his work and his only interest in reporting the matter is to assist the Bureau.

It is expected that Mr. ADAMS will proceed to Eldon, Oklahoma within the next ten days or two weeks and any information he receives will be transmitted promptly to this office through Sheriff LENOX. This matter will be closely followed and the Bureau will be advised fully concerning any developments. Mr. ADAMS has expressed a desire that his name not be connected with this matter in any manner.

December 13, 1938. It should be noted that MIKE BEST is a known gambler and racketeer but that information furnished by him in connection with the Frikid case has been found to be reliable, although it is doubtful that he would furnish any information which would be harmful to any of his friends or associates. He presently resides at the Widemere Hotel, New York City, and advised that if telephone contact is made with him there he will make himself available for interview at any time with our Bureau Agents.

Upon being advised by the writer that the purpose of the interview was to develop information concerning the escape from Alcatraz of instant subjects, MIKE BEST declared that he had read about it in the newspapers but was not acquainted with either of the subjects and had never discussed the escape with his brother ALBERT. He declared that it was his belief that ALBERT knew nothing concerning this escape as he felt that ALBERT would undoubtedly have told him about it had he had any such knowledge. He stated that ALBERT was more of the confidence type of criminal and made it a practice to avoid the more dangerous type of desperado such as instant subjects.

He stated that his brother ALBERT had been released under \$500 bond by the San Francisco authorities soon after his release to them by the federal authorities, and that after spending a few months in New York City, ALBERT had left for Germany with his wife. He stated that ALBERT had jumped the \$500 bond which he, MIKE, had posted for him as he was afraid that additional detainers would be placed against him and there was a possibility of his being compelled to serve some additional sentence. It was his understanding that in addition to the San Francisco authorities, some of the other Middle Atlantic States where ALBERT had perpetrated some frauds were looking for him, ALBERT, and for this reason ALBERT decided to leave the United States.

He declared that some 3 or 4 years ago ALBERT'S son, WILLIAM, who was then about 4 years of age, had been returned to Germany to the home of Mrs. ALBERT BEST'S parents by his, MIKE'S, sister, DR. HENRIETTE EISBENBERG. He stated that ALBERT'S wife, ROSE, whom he had married in Germany, had also been

convicted for the same offense for which ALBERT was serving time in Alcatraz and upon such conviction had been sentenced to serve a year at a Woman's Reformatory, possibly Jessups, Maryland. He declared that he did not know the maiden name of ALBERT'S wife but understood that his sister, Mrs. EISBENBERG, was well acquainted with the family and had received some correspondence from ALBERT BEST and his wife in Germany.

He stated further that ALBERT'S first wife was generally known as ROSE, although her true first name might possibly be Theda. He declared that he did not know whether ALBERT and his wife had obtained passports under their true name or from what port or city they had left for Europe, but was certain that they had departed some time in September as they had left hurriedly from New York Vity a few weeks before his mother's death which occurred in September 1938.

He declared that he had two sisters, Mrs. HENRIETTE EISBENBERG and Mrs. ANNA VEVINE and that the ETTA BEST listed by ALBERT in the Alcatraz Prison records as a sister was undoubtedly his, MIKE'S, first wife. He stated that Mrs. LEVINE, Mrs. EISBENBERG and his father BARNETT BEST resided together in an apartment at 28-40 Sedgwick Avenue, Bronx, New York, and that his first wife Mrs. ETTA BEST occupied another apartment in the same building. He stated that Mrs. LEVINE had not been very friendly with ALBERT and his father had little use for him, but that Mrs. HENRIETTE EISBENBERG was rather attached to ALBERT. He stated that he would arrange to have his father and sister call at the New York office, and upon being specifically advised by the writer of the warrants outstanding against instant subjects and of the penalties for harboring same, WIKE BEST declared that he knew nothing about either of the subjects and if he obtained any information concerning them, he would immediately communicate same to the New York Field office.

Mrs. HENRIETTE EISBENBERG and her father BARNETT BEST, residing at 26-40 Sedgwick Avenue, Bronx, telephone Kingsbridge 6-2465, called at the New York Field office and on being questioned, both advised that they knew nothing concerning the escape of either of instant subjects. BARNETT BEST stated that his son ALBERT had never discussed the case with him, and the sister, Mrs. EISBENBERG, declared that she had not seen ALBERT since his imprisonment at Alcatraz and advised that he had never mentioned anything about the escape in any communication she had received from him.

She stated that the last time she saw her brother ALBERT was about 7 years ago when he visited at Paris, France, but that she had received a communication from him while in Czechoslovakia about September 18, 1938 in which he asked her to telephone to him at Berlin, Germany, as he was in some difficulty. She stated that the telephone number was set out in this telegram which she had destroyed, but she believed that it was the telephone at the Rothers' residence and stated that she decided not to telephone to him as it was rather expensive. Instead she directed a letter to him asking him to explain his difficulties, but she had never received any answer. She declared further that despite the hardships under which Jewish persons are laboring in Germany at the present time, she had no doubt that her brother ALBERT was still residing there as his wife THEDA ROSE ROTHER was in a family way in August 1938 and they were expecting a heir about February 1939. She stated that she obtained this information concerning the condition of her sister-in-law from her brother MIKE.

She declared that prior to the time ALBERT and his wife left New York they had been residing in an apartment at 171st Street on the west side in New York City, the exact address of which neither she nor any member of the family knew. She stated further that it was her understanding that ALBERT and his wife obtained passports under their true names - that, is, BEST - as he had so informed his father, although no member of the family had actually seen either of these passports.

She declared that ALBERT had not been employed except for a few days while in New York City and lived on money furnished him by his father and brother MIKE. She declared that ALBERT and his wife departed rather suddenly after cashing

b6 b7C a check for \$125 in the grocery store where her mother had been accustomed to dealing for years, which check was returned marked "No account in the bank" and was made good by her father. She declared that the family resented this because if ALBERT had actually needed the money they would have been able to furnish him with same and her mother particularly was hurt to think that her credit and reputation in the neighborhood would be so impaired by ALBERT'S conduct. She stated that she and the rest of the family believed that the paralytic stroke which caused her mother's death on September 4, 1938 was due to worry over ALBERT.

BARNETT BEST, ALBERT'S father, a rather elderly man afflicted with the palsy, substantiated the information furnished by his daughter, Mrs. HENRIETTE EISBENBERG and both he and Mrs. EISBENBERG, be being informed of the warrants outstanding against instant subjects and upon being advised of the penalties for harboring said subjects, stated that they knew nothing concerning instant escape and were not acquainted with either of the subjects.

In view of the fact that the BEST family apparently had no knowledge concerning instant escape, it was not considered necessary to interview Mrs. LEVINE or Mrs. ETTA BEST.

He did not know where she is living at the present time, but referred Agent to one ALBERTANNILIAMS, a waitress in the Lyons Music Hell, as being a friend of MARYON'S and one who might know where she is presently located.

MRS. WILLIAMS advised that she has not seen or heard of MARYON DARLING for quite sometime. She stated, however, that not so long ago she took a trip to California and some one had given her the address of MARYON as being at Long Beach, California, where she was supposed to have married a sailor and be residing there. She did not know the name of the sailor and thought that she might possibly have MARYON'S address among her personal belongings at home.

Agent contacted her on several occasions and finally secured the information from her that she did not have MARYON'S address. However, she thinks MARYON'S mother will know where she can be located.

Previous reports in this case reflect that MARYON'S mother is named JEANETTE DARLING and lives at 1711 West 23rd in Los Angeles.

For the information of the Los Angeles Office, MARYON DARLING became acquainted with one JACK/O'BRIEN alias SPROUSE in Los Angeles, California in the early part of 1938. At that time O'BRIEN was employed by the Al G. Bernes Circus as an usher. She joined up with the circus and O'BRIEN and she became very close friends. Upon O'BRIENS discharge from the circus in Tacoma late in May, 1937, she resigned her position with the circus at Seattle, Washington on meeting O'BRIEN at Seattle. She lived with him for sometime and he is supposed to have told her that he was an ex-convict and a three time loser, even though now only 22 years of age.

He is alleged to have served time in a reformatory, name unknown, U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, and Alcatraz Island, San Francisco, California. One of these penitentiary sentences was for auto theft and another for armed robbery of a filling station, supposedly perpetrated by O'BRIEN and subjects of instant case at Dellas. Texas.

O'BRIEN was supposed to have told DARLING that after leaving San Francisco with the Al G. Barnes Circus, he had contacted both ROE and COLE while they were living at the city and that they were living right under the mose of the Police there.

Recently O'ERIEN, under the name of SATIOR JACK O'ERIEN, has boasted to EVA RUTH TALIAFERRO that he had helped subjects escape from Alcatraz. At the time of making this boast, O'ERIEN was intimate with MISS TALIAFERRO at Odessa, Texas.

It is now desired that information be secured from JEANETTE DARLING as to the present whereabouts of O'BRIEN so that he may be thoroughly and vigorously interviewed regarding allegations he has made to various people concerning the escape of subjects.

COAKLEY advised that KEMP had appeared at Westminster in October 1937 using the name of RICHARD R. HARMEL at which time he represented himself to be an official of the Dupont Company of Wilmington, Delaware and in this capacity had contacted MR. EDWARD CASE, local real estate man advising that the Dupont Company contemplated opening a branch office at Westminster. Gaining the confidence of NR. CASE, the latter introduced KEMP as HARMEL to officers of the Farmers and Mechanics National Bank as well as the officers of the Westminster Union Trust Company, culminating in KEMP opening accounts at both these institutions. According to MR. CASE these accounts were opened at each bank in the amount of \$25 each representing checks drawn by HARMEL on the Colonial Trust Company of Wilmington, Delaware.

MR. COAKLEY advised that upon several checks being presented for payment at the Farmers and Mechanics National Bank cashed at Logan. West Virginia by a MISS HARNEL, the bank had refused payment on these checks because of the fact that it had been ascertained that KEMP as HARMEL in fact had no account at the Delaware bank. MR. COAKLEY in his then capacity of Deputy Sheriff proceeded to Logan, W. Va. and there interviewed MISS HELEN SKRENS at her home, it being ascertained that she was the individual who had cashed the checks at the Legan bank. MISS SKEENS at that time advised MR. COAKLEY that shortly before she had left Huntington, W. Va. with a girl named WRIGHT and one TEX REDNESS of logan. W. Va., and that the three of them proceeded to Washington, D. C. where MISS SKEENS and the WRIGHT girl hustled for a short while. In connection with the several checks cashed by her and displayed to her. MISS SKEENS denied having written these checks and advised that the same were drawn to her favor as MISS HARMEL and furnished her by TEX REDNESS. MR. COAKLEY could not locate REDNESS for interview at that time but on a later trip had contacted REDNESS who operates a "joint" at logan. REDNESS at that time emphatically denied knowing anything whatsoever concerning the checks. On another interview at that time with MISS SKEENS she advised that upon leaving Washington, D. C. with the WRIGHT girl and TEX REDNESS for Logen, W. Va. she had met one RICHARD R. HARMEL on the train and she left the train with HARMEL at Staunton, Virginia. She stated that at Staunton, HARMEL had Turnished his check book on the Westminster, Md. bank and had also drawn several checks in her favor. In this connection, MR. COAKLEY advised that he obtained specimens of the handwriting of HELEN SKEENS and it was noted at a glance that she had obviously written these checks making herself as MISS HELEN HARMEL, payee. MR. COAKLEY advised that he does not believe that the SKEENS girl was picked up at Logan in connection with this offense.

MR. COAKLEY further informed that upon ascertaining that WILLIAM PHILLIP KEMP was in custody of the State Police of Virginia he interviewed KEMP prior to the latter's incarceration in the State Penitentiary, and KEMP first denied knowing the SKEENS woman, but upon being displayed the check book he advised that he, in fact had furnished the same to HELEN SKEENS for the purpose of temporarily preserving the same. KEMP at that time substantiated the fact that he had met HELEN SKEENS and another woman and a man on a train en route from Washington and that the SKEENS girl got off the train with him at Staunton, Va. but later on that day proceeded to her home in Logan, W. Va.

MR. COAKLEY advised that the father of HELEN SKEENS is a minister of the gospel at logan and her parents are apparently respectable people. Other than the information furnished above, MR. COAKLEY advised he could furnish no further details in this matter.

As stated in reference report of the writer, WILLIAM PHILLIP KEMP is the subject of considerable investigation pertaining to violations of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, the Richmond Office being office of origin. Various reports emanating from the Richmond Field Division in connection with this perticular case reflected that KEMP is an exceedingly shrewd individual who is altogether promiscuous with the truth. It is indicated in this perticular case that KEMP will make any and all statements that might possibly further his own interests, and it is not believed that a great deal of credence can be placed on any statement made by this individual.

AT BALTIMORE, MARYLAND

It was ascertained on the date of the above interview that Maryland State Police Officer J. J. CASSIDY was away from the State on subpoena for several days. It is believed that interview with Officer CASSIDY would be repetition in this matter, as pertinent details with reference to matters relating to KEMP as HARMEL at Westminster, Maryland were investigated personally by former Deputy Sheriff W. C. COAKLEY. In view of the fact that Officer CASSIDY conducted no personal investigation at Logan, W. Va., this officer will not be interviewed unless advice to the contrary is received from the office of origin.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

philadelphia police officials, detectives, Federal officers and others conversant with philadelphia underworld state never heard any rumors concerning alcatraz jail break. Former Philadelphia confidential informent in Furdress case in March, 1938 told of one MCRRIS MUSHATRACHMER called the "Judge", a former New York racketeer who then resided at the Picadilly Hotel, New York, being a well known fixer and known to have made a specialty of engineering jail breaks. TRACHMER, in a general way, answers description of unknown man who, en day prior to jail break, made inquiry at portland, ore, concerning tides, current, etc. at Alcatraz.

Report of Special Agent Ralph T. Hood, Oklahoma City, Okla. 12-2-38.

DETAILS:

On December 21, 1938 Agent interviewed captain james p. Ryan of the Philadelphia Detective Bureau, possibly the best informed police officer in Philadelphia as to underworld conditions. He said he could not recall any Philadelphia criminal ever having been an inmate of Alcatraz; that he never heard anything mentioned in the underworld relative to instant escape.

Agent consulted Detective Andrew McClure in Charge of the Pennsylvania State Criminal Registration Bureau for the Philadelphia Detective Bureau, which Bureau does not maintain a general index of registrants. McClure said

about 6 months ago a man did register whose record indicated he had served time at Alcatraz; that the man said he had been a former soldier; he was tall, well built and intelligent. He talked interestingly for about one hour concerning Alcatraz; he told of man who actually breke.

Latraz but was caught and that the prison authorities promised him is freelow if he told how he effected his escape but he refused and he is still in Alcatraz. McClure could not recall the registrant's name but did recall that between the time of his release from Alcatraz and his registering at Philadelphia. that he had served a sentence in one of the Western prisons. McClure said that if he found the registrant's card he will notify this office and should anyone else register with his Bureau whose record indicates their having served a sentence at Alcatraz, he will immediately call this office on the telephone so that an Agent can interview that registrant.

other minor detective officials were also interviewed namely.
Lieutenant Barton Cormley and Chief Clerk James Daugherty both of whom are well acquainted with the underworld and information emanating from the underworld. They also said they could not recall any Philadelphia criminal who had ever been an inmate of Alcatras.

Agent interviewed Mr. Thomas Collins, Chief of the Identification Division of the Eastern State Penitentiary, who has been there for many years informed he could not recall any inmates of his institution having served at Alcatras.

The Federal Parole Officer at Philadelphia said his records do net indicate any parolee ever having served at Alcatras.

Agent made discreet inquiries from a number of well known gamblers, horserace men, politicians, etc. many of whom live on the fringe of the underworld. None could recall ever hearing any talk in the underworld concerning instant escape. Agent exhibited subjects photographs to those persons whom he could trust but none could identify them. Pages three and four of the report of reference tells of an unknewn individual who, on the afternoon of December 15, 1937, the day prior to the escape, made inquiries in portland, Ore, regarding tides, and currents in San Francisco Eay and the vicinity of Alcatraz Island and describes that individual as follows:

This individual plainly indicated that he was not a nautical men as he asked for information as to how to read the table. It is suggested that where investigation is conducted regarding any person who would answer the above description that photographs be obtained, if possible, and that they be forwarded to the portland Office for presentation to the persons seeing this unknown party.

Attention is called to a personal and confidential letter from the Philadelphia Division to the New York Division dated March 30, 1938 in the Furdress file, Philadelphia File 60-302 in which a confidential informant then working through the philadelphia and New York pivisions spoke of his having met and talked with in Philadelphia one MORRIS MUSH TRACHMER, said to be a well known fixer and an old time Albany, New York Racketeer known as the Wjudgew and who then lived at the Picadilly Hotel, New York City. The confidential informant said, at the time, that TRACHMER holds the respect of the Furdress gang and that they all seem to fear him: that TRACHMER is known to have fixed many cases and that he made a specialty of arranging jail deliveries and that TRACHMER bragged about his accomplishment. The confidential informant described him as follows:

causing considerable trouble but known to be a good fellow and later pays for the

TRACHMER's description generally compares with that of the above mentioned individual who appeared in portland the day prior to instant escape. No doubt TRACHIER is well known to the New York Division through the Furdress case.

The New York Field Division at New York, N.Y. Suggest UNDEVELOPED LEAD: obtain photograph of TRACHMER said to have resided at the Picadilly Hotel, New York City on or about March 30, 1938 and forward same to the Portland, Ore. Office for identification purposes.



At a filling station and restaurant going by the name of Kat's Kitten Service Station, on State road number 40, approximately nine miles east of the center of Indianapolis, at what would be number nine thousand East Washington Street, if the houses were numbered that distance from town, agent found JOSEPH ROBILLARD, a traveling representative of the Kenosha Auto Transportation Company, Kenosha, Wisconsin. ROBILLARD stated that he was only temporarily at that address in view of the fact that transports of his company are serviced at that particular service station and certain bookkeeping for the company is done there.

ROBILLARD stated that in February, 1938, he was on a collection trip for his company in Missouri and neighboring States. On February 14, 1938, he had been to Barnett, Missouri, and was proceeding out of Barnett and had reached Eldon. Missouri, when he had tire trouble. He stated that this was approximately 6:00 P.M., February 14, 1938. He stopped at a filling station, the name of which he does not remember, in Eldon, Missouri, to have a tire repaired and gasoline put in his car. He remembered that it was raining on that particular evening. He stated that he went across the street, directly opposite the filling station, and into a restaurant to get something to eat. While seated at the table waiting for the meal to be prepared, he was reading a newspaper. He noticed a man come into the restaurant. This fellow asked the proprietor or the men on duty at that time, concerning the time buses would leave for Topeka. Mr. ROBILLARD himself was going to Topeka and the conversation attracted his attention. He looked up at the man and, at first, thought of inviting the man to ride with him to Topeka, but did not like his looks and did not do so. The proprietor informed the man that the bus for Topeka did not stop at Eldon, but that the men would have to go to Versailles to catch the bus for Topeka.

He states that this men was not wearing a hat or cap. He had a cheap dark overcoat, a little more than knee length. He believes the man would weigh about 180 pounds and would be about five feet eight or nine inches in height.

About a week later when he saw the picture of ROE, he states he immediately recognized it as being the likeness of the man he had seen in the restaurant at Eldon, Missouri. He does not know the name of the proprietor of the restaurant or the name of the restaurant. He states that the restaurant has a sort of log cabin front. The man was in the restaurant

approximately five minutes and did not say where he was going or where he had come from. No one was with Mr. ROBILLARD while he was in the restaurant, and he believes no one else was eating in the place at the time. He believes there were two waitresses in the restaurant. He believes the restaurant is on highway number 54. He did not know the name of the filling station in Eldon at which he stopped, but stated that his office had a receipt for the money he paid to said filling station which receipt would be attached to his February, 1938, expense account. He promised to obtain said receipt and forward it to the Indianapolis office.

Subsequently, the receipt was received and the name signed to it appears to be "G. W. DUZEN". The signature is not well written, and, therefore, the receipt will be forwarded with copies of this report to the Kansas City office to assist that office in locating the filling station and thereby locating the restaurant where Mr. ROBILLARD believes he saw fugitive ROE.

Likenesses of the fugitive subjects have been placed in the bank robbery album of the Indianapolis office.

Agent contacted Officer PATRICK McLAUGHLIN of the vice squad. Indianapolis police department, who stated that he had never heard the name of either fugitive mentioned by any underworld characters of Indianapolis, Indiana.

It should be pointed out that approximately October, 1938, houses of prostitution were closed in Indianapolis, Indiana, and have not since been reopened.

McLAUGHLIN promised to inform the Indianapolis office should he, at any time, receive any information concerning the fugitive subjects.

Agent DAVIS contacted FELIPE CANTU, Chief of Police at Rio Rico, Mexico and was advised that GUADALUPE (LUPE) ESCAVARA did own what was known as the Seinrrise (Merry) Saloon at Rio Rico for several years but that ESCAVARA died there about five months ago. CANTU stated that LUPE had numerous American friends and when shown the photographs of subjects ROE and COLE CAWTU stated that he had never seen either of these men around

The death of ESCAVARA was also verified by T. M. DOWIS, Immigration Inspector on the American side of the Ric Grande River on the International Bridge crossing into Rico. It was also further verified by R. L. LYCWS, Customs Inspector located at the same bridge. The photographs of both subjects were shown to Mr. DOWIS and Mr. LYCWS but neither could identify either of these photographs as parties having been seen by them going to Ric Rice.

Mrs. BILLIE W. SOREY, Postmaster at Refugie, Texas, advised that Mrs. HAZEL CONNERS received a typewritten letter, return address J. T. KELLY, attorney-et-law, Odessa, Texas; that Mrs. CONNERS also received letters at regular intervals with no return address from Lenspah, Oklahoma.

Agent reviewed all of the files in this office pertaining to ROBERT L. (BOB X PRINGIE and was unable to find any of his associates or co-defendents using the name of "HARDROCK."

Agent also contacted Captein W. A. HARVEY, Chief of Detectives and other detectives on the Automobile Theft Detail, Homicide Squad, Con-Man and Bad Cheek Details, and Chief of Police O. W. KIEDAY, the Sheriff and Deputy Sheriffs and various underworld contacts without ascertaining of any individual known to them by the name of "HARDROCK." Without more definite information as to who "HARDROCK" might be this effice will be unable to least him and secure his correct name.

This office is leaving to the discretion of the office of origin as to whether or not R. L. PRINGIE, Alcatrez #465-42, should be again interviewed in order to secure some background as to who "HARD-BOCK" might and have his identity established.

REPORT- 2-1-39 ROLCOL.

Mrs. BUCK NOEL, 219 West Adams Street, Borger, Texas, was interviewed, and advised that she did not see or know that Mrs. CECIL NOEL had ever written a letter to anyone, nor that she had ever received mail under an alias, but that she had been told by her sister who resides in Las Vegas. New Merico. or some one not remembered. that Mrs. CECIL NOEL was receiving mail from some unknown berson. She advised that she did not know until recently that her former husband was one of the men who escaped from Alcatraz: further she could not swear to it now. She stated that she had noticed a change in Mrs. CECIL NOEL since the escape of the two men from Alcatraz. She had also heard that when ROE went to the penitentiary he told Mrs. CECIL NOEL that if he ever escaped he was going to kill her. This, she stated, may be the cause of the change in Mrs. CECIL NOEL. She stated that warm NORL comes to Borger, Texas, for supplies for the company for which he works and every trip his wife comes with him and complains all the time she is there, because she had to come. Mrs. BUCK NOEL stated that this would lead her to believe that she does not know whether ROE escaped or not, and is afraid that if he did escape he will kill her if he should find her alone. Mrs. BUCK NOKL advised that Mrs. CECIL NOKL often visits a good friend of hers who now lives in the same neighborhood where Mrs. CECIL NOEL lived while she was living in Oklahoma, and believes during the time she was living with ROE. She said it was her belief that they were neighbors before she and ROE married and further that she is a relative of ROE. She believes the name is STOVALL and that she lives with Mrs. CECIL NOEL'S parents now live in Oklahoma.

Chief of Police W. H. BATES, Borger, Texas, advised the writer that he wrote a letter to the warden at Alcatraz to obtain photographs of ROE and COLE for the purpose of completing his file. The writer furnished Chief BATES with photograph of ROE and COLE.

Mr. and Mrs. T. D. MOSS, P. O. Box 492, were located at their beer joint four miles north of Shamrock, Texas, and advised they knew very little of SADIE DYE, other than she is a dressmaker and lived across the street from them at Las Vegas, New Mexice. They advised that she lived upstairs. They stated that it was their belief that she was a friend of Mrs. CECIL NOEL, but did not know whether they were close friends. Mr. and Mrs. MOSS stated that they read the story in the true detective magazine of the escape of ROE and COLE since last contacted by agent, but had not heard anything to indicate that they did escape.

R. B. PHEPPS, Clerk for the Gulf Oil Corporation, Pampa, Texas, advised KEITH ROELIN was employed by that company and is presently located on the C. L. DIAL lease, southeast of Stinnet, Texas, about 6 miles.

At the C. L. DIAL lease, 7 miles southeast of Stinnet, Texas, agent was informed by Mrs. MARY EDELIN, sister-in-law of KEITH EDELIN, that he finished pulling some casing on a well there near the camp and had gone back to his home at Pampa, Texas, for the weekend; further he would probably return the first part of the following week as he would be employed near Stinnet, Texas, indefinitely.

Mr. PHEPPS further advised that when KEITH EDELIN is not working on a well out in the field that he can be located at his home which is in the camp on the Gulf MERTEN lease, located approximately 5 miles southeast of the city of Pampa, Texas.

BARBARA DAVIS O'GWINN, 901 Sixth Street, Port Arthur, Texas, advised, upon interview, that she was divorced from her husband A. W. DAVIS in August, 1937; that she lived with DAVIS for approximately six months subsequent to his release from Alcatraz, but at no time did he discuss his prison life with her, nor did he ever mention the name of RALPH ROE or THEODORE COLE, consequently she was unable to furnish any information of value to this investigation.

Department, advised the writer that around Christmas time, 1938, he returned LESLIE ELWIN DOWNING, alias Ray Carlton, and DOROTHY GWYNNE from Tulsa, Oklahoma, to Denver to face charges filed against them in Denver, Colorado. Sergeant COOK stated that enroute to Denver, DOWNING passed the remark that he had seen Fugitive ROE in the Cookson Hills in Oklahoma during the fall of 1938. COOK stated that he did not question DOWNING concerning this remark but passed on the information to this office.

Accompanied by Sergeant COOK, Agent interviewed LESLIE ELWIN DOWNING at the Denver County Jail where he is awaiting trial on a fraudulent check charge. DOWNING stated that he was a four-time loser, having served time in the Florida State Penitentiary, the Texas State Penitentiary, and two terms in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary; that he intended after completing his time on the charge on which he is being held in Denver, to go straight. He stated that he was willing to assist the Bureau in locating Fugitives ROE and COLE if his identity remained unknown as he feared that he would probably be killed by gangsters if he were known to have cooperated with law enforcement officers.

DOWNING said he left Denver during the latter part of August 1938 and went to Tulsa, Oklahoma and other parts of Oklahoma; that during the latter part of September 1938 he went up to Antlers, Oklahoma which - he stated - was in the Cookson Hills; that he went out on the highway about four and one-half to five miles north of Antlers to meet another party whose name he stated he did not care to divulge; that he met this party who was accompanied by a person who he states was RALPH ROE. DOWNING stated he was positive that it was ROE because he was acquainted with ROE as he had been connected with the same gang that ROE went with back in 1934. Agent questioned DOWNING closely as to the type of car, clothing and other details concerning ROE and his companion, but DOWNING stated he did not recall the type of car he was in but only that he was well dressed, repeatedly refusing to reveal the identity of the companion with ROE with whom DOWNING had made an appointment to meet. He stated the reason he was going to meet this individual was that they planned to pull a safe job some place in Oklahoma but that their plans fell through. DOWNING stated that he did not see COLE but he was positive that ROE was in contact with COLE.

DOWNING stated that he was attempting to make the \$1,000 bond and had put up as security his automobile which was valued at approximately \$120.00. He stated that should he make bond, he would be willing to go to Oklahoma and work with an Agent of the Oklahoma City Field Office in locating ROE and COLE. DOWNING stated he was sure that he could lo-

sate ROE and COLE in the Cookson Hills but that it might take him some twelve to fifteen days to do so and that he would have to work there alone. However, he said he would be willing to report to a designated Bureau Agent at any designated point.

Sergeant COOK indicated that if it were believed desirable to use DOWNING in the locating of ROE and COLE, that it could be proably arranged so that he would be released on bond. He also - in Agent's presence - told DOWNING that if he should turn up information that led to the apprehension of ROE and COLE, that he (COOK) would see that DOWNING's present charge in Denver was quashed or at least that he received a minimum sentence.

On February 1, 1939 Agent again interviewed LESLIE DOWNING and DOWNING advised at this time that he did not believe that he was going to be able to get out on bond; that although he had sufficient money to pay for the premium on the bond, that he would not have sufficient collateral.

Agent asked DOWNING who ROE and COLE's associates were and he stated that OLLIE MELTON, who was presently serving time in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAllister, Oklahoma, was a close friend of ROE and COLE; also that JOE WARD, who is presently senying time at Alcatraz, was a close friend. He further stated that ROY THORNTON and AUSTIMOWENS, who were Oklahoma outlaws and are now dead, had been very close associates of ROE and COLE in the past. He further stated that RAYADOUGLAS, who was presently serving time at McAllister, Oklahoma is another associate of ROE and COIE; that in his opinion RAY DOUGLAS might possibly give information concerning these Fugitives. He further furnished the names of CLAUDE BEAVERS, BILLKANDERSON and other immates of Moallister who were acquainted with Fugitives, but stated he did not believe these individuals would furnish any information concerning ROE and COLE. DOWNING further stated that RAY TERRELL, who is presently living in Oklahoma City and was formerly a notorious Oklahoma hoodlum, knew ROE and COLE well. It was DOWNING's opinion that TERRELL is presently an informant of the Oklahoma City Office as he stated it was rumored in the underworld that TERRELL is "ratting" and for that reason DOWNING stated that he believed TERRELL would not be able to go into the Cookson Hills or any place looking for ROE and COLE, and further that the criminals who frequent these places know TERRELL is cooperating with the law enforcement officials. DOWNING stated that he has never in the past given any information to law enforcement authorities and for that reason, they would not suspect him if he made inquiries trying to locate ROE and COLE. He further stated that he did not expect any compensation for his efforts to locate rugitives unless he did furnish information which caused their apprehension and then, of course, he said he would expect to be paid for his services. Agent advised him that he would be rewarded accordingly for information that he furnished which would lead to the apprehension of Fugitives but no definite amount was stated.

On February 2, 1939 Sergeant COOK advised that he had talked with DOWNING again and that the latter had stated that he did not
believe he was going to be able to make bond and for that reason unless he was going to be given an opportunity to be released on his
personal recognizance or a low bond in order to assist the Bureau in
lecating Fugitives, he desired to enter a plea of guilty to the instant charge in Denver in order that he might begin serving his sentence. A letter is being directed to the Oklahoma City Office requesting them to advise this office their desire in this matter.

DOWNING also stated, in the interview with him, that he was well acquainted with NELL TRAXLER of Verden, Oklahoma, who is the wife of "PETE" TRAXLER, Oklahoma outlaw and with whom IRVING CHARLES CHAPMAN, Fugitive, I.O. 1456, escaped. DOWNING stated he was not acquainted with Fugitive CHAPMAN but that he was of the firm belief that CHAPMAN was frequenting NELL TRAXLER's home; that NELL TRAXLER was known among the underworld to harbor Fugitives. She is, according to DOWNING, the postmistress at Verden, Oklahoma, and had rooms above the Post Office where she gives refuge to Fugitives from the law. He further stated that Verden is a small town and has no law enforcement whatsoever except a town marshal; that this town marshal was very close to NELL TRAXLER and for that reason he believed that information would not be received from him if CHAPMAN visited NELL TRAXLER. DOWNING said he felt sure that he could talk to NELL TRAXLER and obtain information concerning CHAPMAN from her.

LESLIE DOWNING further advised that he was acquainted with RUSSELL KENNITH DOWNING, with aliases, Fugitive, I.O. 1452, Conditional Release Violator. He stated that RUSSELL DOWNING is no relation of his although the Tulsa Police when they arrested him for the Denver Police gave him the third degree accusing him of being related to RUSSELL DOWNING was in contact with a fellow called "GREASE PAWN" or GREASE BOWL" who worked for some oil company at Tulsa, Oklahoma. He stated that this individual was well known to the Tulsa Police authorities as he had served time in

the Tulsa County Jail on several occasions although he did not believe he had served any penitentiary time. He described "GREASE PAWN" as:

Age - 20 to 22 Height - 6' 2" Weight - 145 pounds Complexion - Dark Hair - Dark

He further stated that this individual used Attorney JOHN WARD in Tulsa when he was in trouble. DOWNING's best recollection was that within the last few years "GREASE PAWN" had beaten a stolen car rap. DOWNING further stated that he had seen RUSSELL DOWNING in the fall of 1938 in the Globe Clething Store located on Main and Second or Third Avenue in Tulsa, Oklahoma. DOWNING stated that RUSSELL DOWNING also frequented King's Place which was a roadhouse located between Tulsa and Sapulpa, Oklahoma; that he is also acquainted with a fellow by the name of "RED" who is a cook at the Coney Island restaurant located at Fourth and Main Street.

DOWNING was sure that RUSSELL DOWNING is in Tulsa at the present time and spends most of his time at the Coney Island restaurant referred to above, further that he could be apprehended if the individuals named by him and mentioned previously in this report were watched; however, that it would be useless to interview them as they were all unreliable. He further stated that DOROTHY GWYNNE, who was returned with him from Tulsa, Oklahoma, could furnish information concerning RUSSELL DOWNING and also possibly concerning Fugitives ROE and COLE.

A separate report is being dictated containing the information concerning RUSSELL Bowning for the file maintained on RUSSELL KENNITH DOWNING in the Denver Office, file #73-77.

The criminal record of LESLIE ELWIN DOWNING, alias Ray Carlton, alias Ray Carson, alias E. Dawson, FBI-104,013, was secured at the Denver Police Department and is follows:

DOROTHY GWYNNE was interviewed at the Denver General Hospital where she is presently confined. It may be stated that DOROTHY GWYNNE was recently convicted on an armed robbery charge in Denver and sentenced from four to ten years in the State Penitentiary at Canon City, Celorado. At the time of this robbery she was accompanied by her husband, ROBERT GWYNNE, and HARRY LEOPOLD. ROBERT GWYNNE was killed on December 4, 1938 by Denver Detectives when he resisted arrest. HARRY LEOPOLD is presently awaiting trial on a first degree murder charge, having killed a cafe owner in Denver in a robbery. DOROTHY GWYNNE is reported by Denver Detectives to have considerable information concerning Oklahoma hoodlums.

DOROTHY GWYNNE admitted that she was acquainted with Fugitives ROE and COLE. She said that she went to school with TED COLE in Tulsa and that she also used to date him. She stated further that she was well acquainted with RALPH ROE; that she went with him for four years beginning when she was 17 years of age and was engaged to marry him. However, she stated she broke off the engagement because of his violent temper. She stated that her first husband was FRED SMITH who is presently serving time in McAlester; that FRED SMITH is also a close acquaintance of COLE and ROE. Agent asked MRS. GWYNNE if she knew whether or not ROE and COLE were presently alive and she stated that she heard that they were; that they were successful in their escape from Alcatras; when she was pressed as to where she obtained this information she stated she learned it from sources she could not recall in Tulsa.

DOROTHY GWYNNE stated that in July 1938 she had seen TED COLE's brother, KENNETH COLE, in Tulsa and had played poker with him. She said KENNETH COLE was a gambler and had formerly lived in Claremost, Oklahoma, but was now in Tulsa. Agent asked MRS. GWYNNE whether or not she knew if Fugitives had been in contact with KENNETH COLE and she answered, "I suppose they have; that would naturally be the first place they would go." However, she denied that she had any definite information. It was noted

throughout the interview that DOROTHY GWYNNE hesitated in answering any direct questions and would plead ignorance, but information could only be obtained by engaging her in a general conversation and she would reveal certain facts, apparently unknowingly.

DOROTHY GWYNNE stated that around Thanksgiving 1938 her mother, MRS. MAY THOMPSON, 705 North Madison Street, Tulsa, told her that two unknown men called at their house in Tulsa and asked for her, (DOROTHY). MRS. GWYNNE stated she was not there at the time and her mother told her these two individuals appeared to be extremely anxious to locate her, DOROTHY GWYNNE, and asked MRS. THOMPSON if there was some way in which she could immediately get in touch with DOROTHY. She stated that her mother told these two men that they could call around later and DOROTHY would probably be home, but that they said they had to leave immediately and could not wait. DOROTHY stated that her mother told her that these two men were driving a large black sedan and it was her opinion that these two men were probably COLE and ROE, although they did not leave their names or any other information with ther mother.

DOROTHY GWYNNE further stated that when she was being returned from Tulsa to Denver, she was removed part of the way by NOPHALLSTURGEON, a Tulsa, Oklahoma, Police officer; that STURGEON formerly lived at her mother's house years ago and she was well acquainted with him. She stated that STURGEON talked to her about RUSSELL DOWNING whom the Tulsa Police Department is very anxious to locate. She said that she told STURGEON that she had seen DOWNING on the streets on several occasions and knew he was in Tulsa. She stated that she also told STURGEON that she knew a place where the motor numbers of stolen cars were being changed but declined to give him this information. She also declined to give this information to the writer. She stated that STURGEON felt very badly that she was leaving Tulsa, as he felt that she could be a very good informant of his in locating persons wanted by their department.

Agent questioned MRS. GWYNNE about RUSSELL DOWNING, I.O. Fugitive 1452, and she stated DOWNING was in Tulsa although she did not know exactly where he could be found. She said he was friendly with FRANK and TREY DANIEIS and TEDYBROWN who were all well-known Tulsa hoodlums. DOROTHY GWYNNE intimated that she could probably do the Bureau some good if she were on her feet again but that she could not give them any help as long as she was in jail.

In accordance with reference report the photographs of Fugitives were shown to other informants of the Denver Field Division without effecting an identification. The photographs were also given to Detectives HOMARD FAYRUM and FRED ZARNOW of the Denver Police Department who showed them to their informants without effecting an identification.

THE OKIAHOMA CITY FIELD DIVISION, at OKIAHOMA CITY, OKLAHOMA, will review the facts, as related by LESLIE DOWNING and DOROTHY GWYNNE, and suggest to this office further line of inquiry of these two individuals, if it is believed from the information reported that they passess certain information concerning the Fugitives of instant case.

THE DENVER FIELD DIVISION, at DENVER, COLORADO, upon receipt of information from the Oklahoma City Field Division will re-interview LESLIE DOWNING and DOROTHY GWYNNE.
