TEN DAYS OF PROTEST AND RESISTANCE, APRIL 21 - 30, 1968

A "Calendar of April Actions Against the War In Vietnam" published by the Washington Mobilization Committee to and the War in Vietnam (WMC) states that ten days of protest against the war in Vietnam has been called by the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) for April 20 - 30, 1968. It is stated the object of this protest is to expose and denounce campus complicity with the war in Vietnam.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, has advised that the WMC is the Washington, D. C. (WDC) office of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (NMC).

The NMC was formerly known as the Spring Mobilization Committee (SMC).

The SMC is described in the publication entitled "Communist Origin and Manipulation of Vietnam Week (April 8-15, 1967)," a report by the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives. On page 53, the report states in part, "Communists are playing dominant roles in both the Student Mobilization Committee and the Spring Mobilization Committee."

A characterization of the SDS is attached.

A flyer distributed by the Washington Student Mobilization Committee (WSMC), 3 Thomas Circle, WDC, states the Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam of New York, New York, is calling for an International Student-Faculty Strike Against the War in Vietnam, Racial Oppression and the Draft on April 26, 1968.

On April 15, 1968, a second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, reported that the newly formed Washington Black Anti-War Anti-Draft Union (WBAWADU) has joined the WSMC for the April 26, 1968, student strike in WDC.

According to this source Howard University, WDC, students and "black" high school students will meet at Bannaker Field, a playground near Howard University, at 10 a.m. April 26, 1968, and then march to DuPont Circle, WDC, to join with white college students being organized by WSMC. Following a rally at DuPont Circle the entire group will march to the WDC head-quarters of the Selective Service System, 916 G Street, N.W., for a demonstration.

This source advised that planners for the activity on April 26, 1968, expect 5,000 students to participate.

On April 16, 1968, Captain United States Park Police, WDC, reported that on that date the WMC, 3 Thomas Circle, WDC, was issued a permit to hold an International Day of Protest Against the War in Vietnam at Franklin Park, 14th and K Streets, N.W., from 11:30 a.m., until 4:30 p.m., on April 27, 1968.

On April 18, 1968, a third source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished a flyer being distributed by the WMC concerning the proposed activity on April 27, 1968. According to this flyer the participants will march to the WDC headquarters of the Selective Service System, 916 G Street, N.W., after assembling at Franklin Park, and then return to the park at 1 p.m. for a rally. This flyer also lists the individuals scheduled to speak at the rally, and a list of fifteen sponsoring organizations.

An article appearing in the February 19, 1968, issue of "The Washington Post and Times Herald" nowspaper, WDC, identifies Professor Howard Zinn as a member of the NMC. This article states he travelled to North Vietnam in January and February, 1968, as a representative of the NMC to act as an intermediary in the release of three captive United States pilots held by the North Vietnamese. According to this article Professor Zinn was critical of the United States Government's handling of the prisoners following their release.

A fourth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, has identified Jan Bailey as a member of the current staff of the WDC office of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC).

One of the sponsoring organizations shown on the above flyer is "CHOICE," an abbreviation for the Capitol Hill Organized Individuals for a Civilian Environment.

A characterization of the Young Socialist Alliance, also listed as a sponsoring organization, is attached.

On April 18, 1963, the second source reported that while demonstrating at 916 G Street, N.W., on April 27, 1968, the WMC would like to carry and then release balloons labeled "Peace Now," but has no plans for the burning of draft cards at that location. This source also reported that the WMC would like to have 1,500 participants, but does not expect that large a crowd.

On April 18, 1968, the third source mentioned reported that the WMC has approximately 10,000 pieces of literature to distribute during their activity on April 28, 1968. The source also reported that as of that date the WMC had not obtained a permit from the Metropolitan Police Department to march from Franklin Park to 916 G Street, N.W., and return on April 28, 1968.

On April 17, 1968, Inspector A. D. Beye, United States Park Police, WDC, advised that on that date Richard Anthony Barrett,

Speaker, America's Victory Force, Post Office Box 3333, Jackson, Mississippi was issued a permit to hold a prayer meeting at noon on April 22, 1968, at the Sylvan Theatre, Washington Monument Grounds, WDC, and to then lay a wreath at the Monument. Barrett informed the Park Police that his planned activity is in support of the war in Vietnam, and that he expects about 800 participants.

APPENDIX

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anti-communist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

The May, 1960, issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), page 1, column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a mational organization entitled "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication US.

The above issue, page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognized the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles, and that the supporters of the YS have come into basic political solidarity with the SWP on the principles of revolutionary socialism.

On March 10, 1967, a source advised that the YSA was formed during 1957, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The source further advised that the YSA has recently become more open about admitting that it is the youth group of the SWP and that an SWP representative has publicily stated that the YSA is the SWP's youth group.

The headquarters of the YSA are located in Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.
