


On November 4, 1975, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished the North American Operations Bulletins dated August 15, 1975; August 27, 1975; October 29, 1975; and October 30, 1975; printed by the NCLC. (S) (U)

The income received on August 14, 1975, was \$1,800, excluding money received from a ~~DICK GREGORY~~ ~~ZEKE BOYD~~ appearance. The NCLC claimed that this figure was 1/3 below its minimum weekly operating expenses. (S) (U)

The August 27, 1975, Operations Bulletin indicated that income on August 26, 1975, was \$2,214, including \$381 in dues. Their expenses due for that week included \$3,000 to Western Union International, \$1,000 to Western Union, \$160 for air freight, \$300 to the Latin American Labor Committee, \$350 to United Parcel Service (UPS), \$100 to Intelligence Press, and \$350 for other debts, for a total of \$5,860. (S) (U)

Early the following week the NCLC had to pay \$2,000 for the National Office Rent, \$2,000 for minimum field payments, including the Detroit phone and rent of \$3,000. Stipends must be paid \$1,500. The total of \$15,000 must be paid out by the following Wednesday. (S) (U)

The October 29, 1975, Operations Bulletin indicated that total income was \$2,745 and sales of "New Solidarity," the official newspaper of the NCLC, totaled 4,881. It went on to state that the emergency payment on the "European AVD line" and other factors on October 28, 1975, caused the NCLC Headquarters to be completely without funds. According to the Bulletin, LEASCO must be paid. (S) (U)

single members and various combinations of cast members. FONDA appeared only in supporting roles during songs and skits.

The show ended at approximately 9:45 p.m., apparently ahead of schedule due to loss of audience with FONDA announcing a rap session would be held from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. November 29, 1971, at Yap Park, with all members of the Free Theater Associates available. FONDA verbally expressed support for the anti-military publications and organizations in the area.

The November 29, 1971, performance of the Free Theater Associates show began at 7:15 p.m. at Yap Park. At the show's peak, there were approximately 700 to 800 people consisting primarily of Philippino students with the remainder young Caucasians who appeared to be members of the Air Force or dependents. The show basically assumed the same format and content of that of the previous evening.

III. PUBLIC STATEMENTS

The following is a transcript of JANE FONDA's appearance on the DICK CAVETT Television Show on March 26, 1971:

Dick Cavett:

We got in the subject of coffeehouses, Donald Sutherland was here but here is a break...

I'm curious with some of the kind of reactions, I know some of the reactions you've gotten, but what do you want these shows to do?

Jane Fonda:

You're talking about the United States Servicemen's Fund, the GI shows?

Dick Cavett:

Yes.

What do you want them to do....well what we are saying is we know that the vast amount of soldiers are opposed to the war and many of them are actively organizing against the war, there is what is called the GI Movement, it's a.....and we're not telling the soldiers anything that they don't know. We're not saying be opposed to the war, or be opposed to being used as scrap laborer or riot control. We are saying we know how you feel and we support you. And that really is what we are doing, and it is terribly moving to watch, you know we weren't talking to soldiers that were movement heavies or anything like that. You know they came in a little dubious, they sat there, a marvelous rock group called "Swamp Dog" played a song called God Bless America for What, and Barbara Dane a folk singer who has been involved in the GI Movement for a long time sang

a song called "GI Insubordination" and some beautiful song, a poem, sung by North Vietnamese women while they sewed the uniforms of the soldiers and I mean that's a heavy thing to lay on the GIs and Dick Gregory did his act. And our part of the show was really a cabaret series of black outs saterizing the Government and the military policies. You got the sense when the soldiers left that when the time comes, when they make a decision about what they are going to do, that they will not be alone that it is a collective struggle and a struggle that has been going on for many years, well you know, active duty soldiers on every United States military base around the world are organizing and oppossing the war.

Dick Cavett:

Are you tolerant people although sympathetic that the war should be ended as soon as possible are not necessarily sympathetic to this if they see as a demoralizing of soldiers or seeing it as to attack a symptom really a way to end the wars, with a capital W, would be to do a show for Congress. I would think rather than for the soldiers that are stuck at Fort Bragg.

Jane Fonda:

We could do other things for Congress....

Dick Cavett:

You have^a show prepared?

Jane Fonda:

Nixon anyway....

Dick Cavett:

You know what I mean, doing the devils advocate or the devil for the moment.....

Jane Fonda:

Again I want to emphasize the fact that it was very clear after the show that there is no question of demoralizing them. They are demoralized. The morale in the Army is nil.

On May 16, 1973, WF T-1 advised that the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) was to hold a demonstration at Washington, D. C. (WDC), on June 16, 1973, to protest the bombing of Cambodia and to protest the alleged wide spread discontent over the United States Government's handling of domestic matters. The demonstration was to be in the form of a march from the Watergate Complex, 2500 - 2700 Virginia Avenue, N. W., WDC, to the United States Department of Justice, 9th and Pennsylvania Avenue, N. W., WDC. The march, which was to begin at 1:00 p.m., on June 16, 1973, was to pass the United States Department of State, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the White House. The source stated that the speakers as of that date were to be ex-defendants of the Pentagon Papers trial Anthony Russo and Daniel Ellsberg.

The People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) has been publicly described as being headquartered at 156 5th Avenue, New York, New York, and as consisting of over 100 organizations which are using massive civil disobedience to combat racism, poverty, repression and war. The Communist Party, USA, is a member organization of PCPJ.

On May 29, 1973, WF T-2 advised that PCPJ had filed a notice to demonstrate with the National Capital Parks, 1100 Ohio Drive, S. W., WDC, on May 22, 1973, which reflected that the demonstration would be held on June 16, 1973, for the purpose of calling attention to the oppression in Southeast Asia and in the United States. The notice was filed by [redacted] who listed the total maximum number of participants to be 1,000 persons and the sites of the demonstration as the Watergate Complex, the Department of State, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Office of Management and Budget, the White House, the Department of Labor, the Internal Revenue Service and the Department of Justice. Those persons to be in charge of the marshals for the demonstration were listed

is to demand an immediate secession of fighting in Vietnam and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina.

43/ On June 16, 1973, WF T-3 advised that the group of demonstrators departed the Kennedy Center shortly after 1:00 p.m., that date and began its march to the Department of State. The source stated that Anthony Russo was the main speaker at the Kennedy Center, and that about ten persons had been trained to act as marshals during the demonstration. Later that date, the source estimated the size of the crowd to be 1,000 even though the tourists made the crowd really appear larger.

On June 16, 1973, WF T-1 advised that at the Watergate Complex, Paul Mayer was the master of ceremonies while Anthony Russo and Arthur Kinoy were the speakers. Paul Mayer is associated with PCPJ and Arthur Kinoy is associated with the National Lawyers Guild (NLG). D.C.

The National Lawyers Guild (NLG) is a communist front organization of lawyers and law students dedicated to Communist Party, USA, and new left ideals for radical change of the social, economic, and judicial systems in the United States. D.C.

On June 21, 1973, WF T-5 advised that at the Department of State mock "tiger cages" were set up with persons inside representing Saigon political prisoners. The same source advised that at the Bureau of Indian Affairs and at the Office of Management and Budget no speakers appeared. The same source also advised that Dick Gregory, publicly known comedian, spoke to the crowd at the Ellipse shortly after 2:00 p.m. Gregory stated that the white people were responsible for the Watergate scandal and that the only black person involved was the janitor. Following his speech, a Cambodian national from the University of the State of New York named Sokhong Hing spoke to the crowd about the "tiger cages" and abuse to Vietcong prisoners. Following the speeches at the Ellipse, the group began its march to the Department of Justice and upon arrival at the Internal Revenue Service Building, the group witnessed a theatre group depicting President Nixon as a money grabber asking for everyone's money. Upon arrival at the Justice Department, the group was welcomed.

PEOPLES COALITION FOR PEACE AND JUSTICE (PCPJ)

by Dr. Benjamin Spock, a noted baby doctor and anti-war activist. Spock stated that President Nixon is responsible for the Watergate scandal as well as the killing in Vietnam. The source stated that the demonstration ended at approximately 4:00 p.m., without incident or arrests.

On June 22, 1973, WF T-1 advised that representatives of the following groups were observed during the demonstration: PCPJ; Vietnam Veterans Against the War; Communist Party, USA; National Welfare Right Organization; Young Workers Liberation League; and Youth International Party.

The Youth International Party (YIP), also known as Yippies, is a loosely knit, anti-establishment, revolutionary youth organization formed in New York City in January, 1968.

The Young Workers Liberation League (YWLL) is a front organization of the Communist Party, USA, (CPUSA). It was formed as a Marxist-Leninist youth group in February, 1970.

An article entitled "Anti-Nixon Marchers Differ on Issues" which appeared in the June 17, 1973, issue of the Washington Post, a daily WDC newspaper, described the demonstration as "... it was a grab-bag, catch-all protest encompassing issues ranging from Watergate to welfare, Southeast Asia to Wounded Knee, D. C. statehood to tax reform and domestic program cutbacks."

On June 16, 1973, a representative of the Metropolitan Police Department, WDC, advised that the size of the crowd ranged from about 1,000 to 1,200 persons and that the size of the crowd appeared larger at times due to heave number of tourists that were visiting the locations at which parts of the demonstration were held.

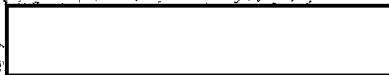

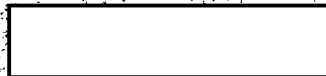

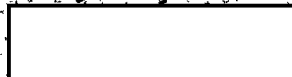

On April 11, 1972, Special Agents of the FBI observed the aforementioned demonstration and obtained leaflets handed out by the demonstrators which advertised the forthcoming April 22 demonstration at San Francisco's Golden Gate Park. The leaflets described the purpose of the demonstration as being three-fold:

- 1) Immediate end to United States aggression in Indo-China and support of the 7 point program for peace proposed by the Provisional Revolutionary Government (Viet Cong);
- 2) An end to United States interference in internal affairs of any country;
- 3) An end to United States domestic policies of political, economic, racial and sexist repression.

In addition, the leaflets advertised the following individuals as prospective speakers:

CALIF { Dick Gregory, a nationally known Black comedian, and civil rights activist;

David Dellinger, a nationally known anti-war spokesman;

Robert Sheer, a spokesman for the National Peace Action Coalition; and

Angela Davis, a nationally known Black Panther, who is currently being tried by the State of California in connection with the murder of a State judge. Davis is scheduled to speak via a live telephone hookup if the State Court prohibits her actual appearance at the April 22 demonstration.

The National Peace Action Coalition was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor

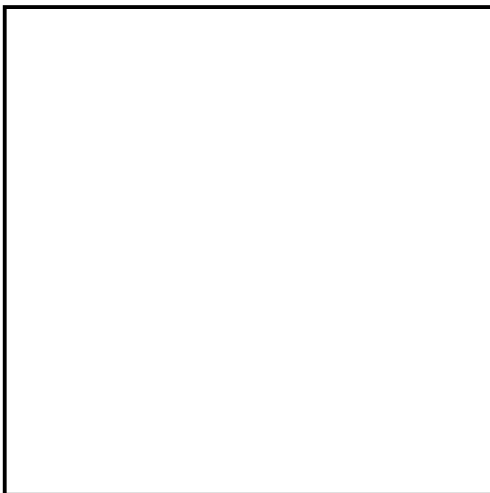

* Committee for the Seven Points is a group of organizations which endorses and urges others to accept the seven points of the so-called Provisional Revolutionary Governments (Viet Cong) Peace Plan for Vietnam.

On April 7, 1972, SF T-2 orally advised that local members of the Communist Party, USA would take no stand in the activities planned for April 22, 1972, because the second session of the Northern California District Communist Party Convention was scheduled to be held during the period April 21 - 23, 1972, and that the local members of the Party would devote their time and energies to their convention.

This source advised that the noon rally was to be sponsored by the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ).

The PCPJ has described itself as being headquartered at 1029 Vermont Avenue, N. W., Washington, D. C., and as consisting of over 100 organizations which are using massive civil disobedience to combat racism, poverty, repression, and war.

President Nixon for the escalation of the Vietnam war and demanded that a date be set for total withdrawal of all U. S. forces from Vietnam.

At 1:36 p.m., a telephone call was transmitted to Kezar Stadium from Madame Binh, negotiator for the Viet Cong in Paris. The general text of her speech to the crowd was the denunciation of President Nixon and his Vietnam policy.

At 1:55 p.m., Delia Alvarez, sister of Everett Alvarez, the first American pilot captured by the North Vietnamese, delivered a speech concerning the alleged oppression of the Chicanos in the United States and read a short message from her imprisoned brother.

At 2:08 p.m., Hank Reichman, Coordinator for the Bay Area April 22 Coalition, spoke on the purpose of the Coalition. He also denounced President Nixon and urged the crowd to support the anti-war movement. He then restated the three demands of the April 22 Coalition, which have been previously stated.

At 2:15 p.m., Fernando Chavez, son of Caesar Chavez, of the United Farm Workers Union, spoke to the demonstrators and condemned the Vietnam war and President Nixon and then urged support for the United Farm Workers Union in its efforts to unionize farm workers.

At 2:24 p.m., Dick Gregory, a nationally known black comedian civil rights activist, addressed the crowd. He called for a nationwide boycott of the money interests in the country in order to quickly end the Vietnam war. He specifically named General Motors, Sears and Roebuck, Standard Oil, and the poultry industry as likely targets to be boycotted. Gregory also took the opportunity to tell the crowd April 22, 1972, would mark the first anniversary of his abstention from solid food as he has been subsisting the past year on a liquid diet.

At 2:32 p.m., Fania Davis Jordan, sister of Angela Davis, spoke to the crowd and admitted being a member of the Communist Party and presented the crowd with greetings from

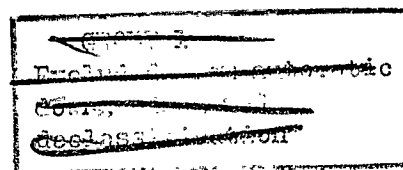

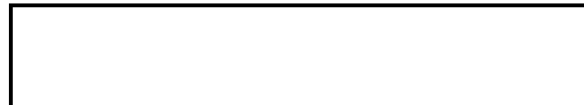

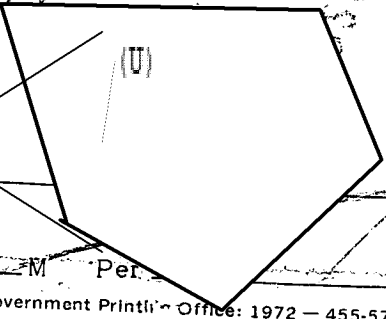

to the article, the Commissions Program is intended to give recognition to those who have made outstanding contributions to bettering human relations in Decatur.

An article on Page 3, entitled "Community Getting Together" sites the policy of separation of church and politics as being "a monkey on the back of the black community". According to the article, the church has been the greatest exponent of black power in America down through the years, and the article says, "The belief that politics has no place in the church, keeping us ignorant of the political gain, we are constantly kept ignorant in the power of running our cities, states in the nation."

An article on Page 4, entitled "Did You Know" decries the economic position regarding the employment of blacks in this country.

An article on Page 8, entitled "How U.S. Monopoly Profits From Apartheid", by TONY THOMAS, is written with a detrimental point of view toward the alleged complicity of U.S. firms in South Africa with the Apartheid System of segregation and white minority rule that dominates that country. The article sites numbers of corporations, amount of money allegedly invested by these corporations, and other figures regarding this matter.

An article on Page 12, entitled "Blacks Used In Syphilis Experiment" is written about an alleged Muslim report on blacks who were allegedly used for a syphilis experimentation in the State of Alabama over a period of several years.

It is noted "The Voice Of The Black Community" have now began publishing a paper entitled "The Voice Of The Black Community", Springfield Edition, (Springfield, Illinois), and "The Voice Of The Black Community", Bloomington-Normal Edition, (Bloomington, Illinois). These editions come out with the normal issue of "The Voice Of The Black Community", and copies are being

forwarded to the Bureau along with the regular edition of "The Voice Of The Black Community". A review of these editions did not reveal items of extremist intelligence interest.

The Volume III, Issue 3, dated Monday, 11/27/72, of "The Voice Of The Black Community" contained an article on Page 6, entitled "Gordan Is Guest Speaker" regarding an alleged appearance by VERNON E. GORDAN, Executive Director of the National Urban League, is a guest speaker for the 46th Annual dinner meeting of the Springfield Urban League on 12/7/72 at the "Holiday Inn East", Springfield, Illinois.

An article in Section 2, Page 8, entitled "Did White Invaders Settle In Uninhabited Areas Of South Africa" by JOHN LAURENCE, is an article written about the white-black position in Africa regarding the ownership of the land, the employment of black workers in the mines of South Africa, and other matters.

An article in Section 3, Page 1, entitled "Student Assaulted By Teacher, Mother Files Charges" was regarding an alleged assault in Bloomington, Illinois, of a black student by a teacher in connection with the alleged striking of the student by the teacher.

Neither edition of "The Voice Of The Black Community" contained any articles of an anti-semitic nature.

Vol. III, No. 8, Wednesday, February 14, 1973, "The Voice of the Black Community" contains an article on page one entitled "Comedian Not So Funny Both Blacks & Whites Shook Up" which was written regarding a speech given by comedian DICK GREGORY in Decatur, Illinois, during the Decatur Human Relations Commission annual award dinner. GREGORY praised the young people of America. According to the article, he was critical of the white society in America that "oppress us".

An ~~article~~ on page 5, Section 3, entitled ~~"Kitty Hawk Sailor Acquitted, Others Still Face Trial"~~ written by ~~MARILEE~~ *NO/DE* ~~SAVAGE~~ revealed that as of 1/26/73 six of 24 black sailors charged with riot and assault aboard the carrier "Kitty Hawk" last October had been brought before courts-martial in San Diego. Five were handed stiff fines, loss of rank, and discharged; one, ARNOLD PETTY, was acquitted. The article revealed additional plans for trials of others charged in this matter.

[redacted] on November 13, 1971, advised on the evening of August 27, 1971, she was listening to a local radio station which has the numbers KCUR-FM. She usually listens to this station as they play music, and on this particular evening, this was the case. The normal program was interrupted and a speaker, the name of which she did not recall, was introduced by a student at the University of Missouri at Kansas City. This individual then began a speech which in her opinion indicated he was definitely against the form of Government now in operation in the United States. She therefore became quite alarmed and as a result decided to tape this speech. At the conclusion of his speech, the name of which she never did hear, she decided to mail this tape to the FBI since this speech appeared to be the highlights of a three day black political convention held in August sometime, in Boston, Massachusetts. ✓

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The following is a synopsis of the three speeches on this tape: ✓

The first speaker, whose name is not audible, indicates the African man must create a political structure. "This can only be done through a black independent political party like the Democrats and Republicans." "You must create a political party to get power." "You can get power this way or go and shoot President Nixon." If you decide to go and shoot President Nixon, the speaker indicates he will be present, but indicates the best course of action is through political power. To have political power, the blacks must run blacks for all elective offices. ✓

The second speaker, whose name also is inaudible, indicates those in attendance can solve their problems by becoming involved in politics. "This is how the blacks straightened out the South." "Whites are mean and will continue to be mean until the meanness is run out of them through political action."

A female voice indicates the next speaker will be [redacted] After several inaudible words an individual begins speaking who possibly is [redacted] This person indicates, "There are five black power houses in Alabama, four sheriffs and one probate judge." This speaker also indicates that those in attendance at this convention, which he indicates as possibly being held in Boston, are serious about the black problem they should come to Mobile, Alabama, on August 13, 14 and 15, for the Southern Black Cause. He indicates Dick Gregory, to help the cause, will be there. This speaker also indicates a need for more black politicians "so the papers can be shuffled to help the blacks and not the whites."

This tape ends by a female voice saying, "This is 89.3 on your FM dial, KCUR-FM serving greater Kansas City, Missouri."

On December 13, 1971, KC T-1, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised only one edition of the newspaper entitled "News CAP" has been published. The second edition has not yet been published but will be by a firm in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the name of which is unknown to him at this time.

Source further advised that no editions of this paper were sold in the Kansas City area, but the first edition was mailed to the delegates who attended the convention of the Congress of African Peoples in Atlanta, Georgia, in September 1970.

The CAP, headquartered in Boston, Massachusetts, was founded as a black separatist organization in Atlanta, Georgia, in September 1970, at the fourth annual gathering of advocates of black power in the United States. CAP's basic goal is the global expression of black nationalism through the promotion of Pan-Africanism. CAP seeks the creation of a political force capable of seizing power from the existing political force through massive programs of disruption, violence, if necessary, and the establishment of independent black institutions.

"'African Liberation Day' read the Black letters printed on a large white banner measuring four-by-two feet, which was being carried in the front ranks of the marchers who went on and on down State Street past groups of Black men here, groups of Black women there, and several groups of Black children and youth watching, playing, and sometimes clapping as the marchers went by."

The Nation of Islam is an all-black nationwide organization headquartered at Muhammad's Temple 2, 7351 South Stony Island Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, under the guidance of Elijah Muhammad, self-styled "Messenger of Allah" and only divinely appointed leader of the black race in the United States. Its purpose is separation of the black man from the "devil" (white race) through establishment of a black nation. The International African Prisoner of War Solidarity Day Committee (IAPWSDC) was organized in Atlanta, Georgia, on December 15, 1972, at a meeting attended by representatives of the Republic of New Africa (RNA), Black Panther Party - Cleaver Faction (BPP-CF), and several other black extremist groups. The announced purpose of the IAPWSDC was to form a committee to organize a Solidarity Day for all African prisoners, thereby demonstrating support for all current and past Africans taken as "prisoners as a result of the USA's war against humanity and in commemoration of those Africans who have been slain as a consequence of this same lawlessness".

The RNA was founded in Detroit, Michigan, in March, 1968. Its purpose is to establish an independent black nation within the United States, demanding the States of Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, and South Carolina, and \$10,000 per black citizen for reparations. The RNA, a violence-prone, black extremist, separatist organization, is now headquartered in New Orleans, Louisiana.

The BPP is a black extremist organization started in Oakland, California, in December, 1966. It has advocated the use of guns and guerrilla tactics to bring about the overthrow of the United States Government.

On April 9, 1973, Springfield confidential source two, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised the IAPWSDC was held in Jackson the weekend of March 30-31, 1973. Source two stated that several nationally known black leaders spoke during this conference.

Source two advised that Reverend Charles Enlow Koen, ^{MISS,} UFC, Cairo, Illinois; Dick Gregory, black comedian and civil rights activist who endorses civil disturbances and militant type action by Negroes; and Reverend Ben Chavis of Wilmington, North Carolina, were three of the individuals who spoke and ^{MISS,} that their speeches seemed to evoke the most response from those attending. Their speeches seemed to be of a more violent nature than the other speeches given.

Source two stated that Gregory talked of the fact that while Black Panthers were killed in Chicago, Illinois, and while black women and children are dying from hunger in the United States, President Richard M. Nixon and white radicals continue to live.

According to source two, the speeches of Reverend Koen and Reverend Chavis complemented each other. They both implied that black people should not be afraid to pick up the gun and go into the streets.

Source two said that Reverend Ben Chavis and his aide [redacted] were very active during the conference and had several confrontations with Chokwe Lumumba, Minister of Justice of the RNA. Source two stated it was not clear whether Chavis was trying to take leadership of the conference away from Lumumba or whether he and his followers wanted to be the ones to provoke a violent confrontation with authorities.

According to source two, one of the confrontations between Chavis and Lumumba came when the City of Jackson failed to issue a parade permit to the demonstrators. Chavis wanted to march anyway, but Lumumba was firmly against it. Chavis stated the group may not be able to march, but what would be wrong with everyone "strolling" on the sidewalk. Someone told Lumumba about this, and he told Chavis that there would be no stroll.

Source two explained that he observed actions on two occasions designed to cause confrontations with local authorities. The first was when a group of men led by [redacted] wanted police protection at the church where the speeches and rally were being held, in order to get the majority of policemen on one side of town to lead them into some kind of a trap, possibly an ambush. Concerning this same event, Lumumba stated to a group of men from Ohio that "we will deal only with the police chief, and if he doesn't respond, we will deal with him later".

The second action occurred when Ben Chavis decided that a group would have a party at their motel. This party would be unknown to Lumumba, and only people who would be extremely loud would be invited. Someone told Lumumba about the proposed party.

On this Solidarity Day thousands of Blacks will gather at the site of the infamous attack by the FBI and the Jackson police on the RNA-11 in a mass show of solidarity for all Africans persons past and present taken prisoner as a result of the U.S. war against humanity. Solidarity Day will also be in commemoration of those Africans who have been slain as a consequence of this same lawlessness and it will be a tool to arouse mass resistance against the current reign of repressive terror and acts of genocide.

U.S. repression against African freedom fighters on this continent and abroad is rapidly accelerating. We all know about the cases of political persecution reported widely in the news media: George Jackson, the RNA-11, Private Billy Dean Smith, Angela Davis.

But are we all aware of the extent to which the present U.S. administration is prepared to go to crush our struggle for liberation? Do we know there are thousands of incidents of political arrest and persecution which receive no publicity, thousands of incidents of harassment of persons in our community which go unreported? These incidents are part of the continuing war that the U.S. government carries on against the black community.

Irreparable damage is being inflicted daily on our homes, while mothers and fathers are forced to see their sons and daughters hunted and dragged off to prisons, sometimes to life sentences and torture. These brothers and sisters are prisoners of war.



Since they are prepared to give their all for us, we must respond through a commitment to work consistently for their release and our collective liberation.

And it is important at this stage to realize that our efforts to protect and free our prisoners of war cannot proceed as they have in the past. Till now we have tended to rally to the aid of outstanding brothers and sisters on a one-by-one basis. We have had some victories working in this manner but stepped up repression requires that we broaden our organization now to defend many prisoners, while not depleting the manpower and resources we need to continue the struggle.



Being international in scope, this day of Solidarity will dramatize the plight of Africans seized and/or killed in the arena of struggle on the African Continent, in Asia and Latin America.

Representatives of international embassies as well as prominent national figures such as Julian Bond, John Conyers, Congressman Ron Dellums, Imamu Baraka, Mayor Richard Hatcher, Congressman Charles Diggs, Huey P. Newton, Angela Davis and several others are expected to participate in Preliminary Solidarity Day rallies which will take place in virtually every state before the 30th of March 1973.

Organizing and preparation for the Solidarity Day is being handled by the National African Solidarity Day Committee. To participate in these organizing efforts as individuals or in groups or for further information please contact the National African Prisoner of War Solidarity Day Committee, 128 1/2 N. Gallatin, Jackson, Miss. 39201.

The African Prisoners of War Solidarity Committee evolved out of the recognition of this need for a national, united political prisoner defense network. As its first project, the Committee has called an International Solidarity Day for African Prisoners of War on March 31, 1973 in Jackson, Mississippi.

The Republic of New Africa and the National Black political Council are the chief sponsors, and The Pan-African Congress, U.S.A., the Cairo United Front, C.O.R.E., Congress of African People and several other national and local political organizations have been invited to participate in this Solidarity Day.

The National Black Political Council (The council of the Black National Convention) does in itself represent every major Black political organization in North America. Representatives from other African governments are also being asked to participate.

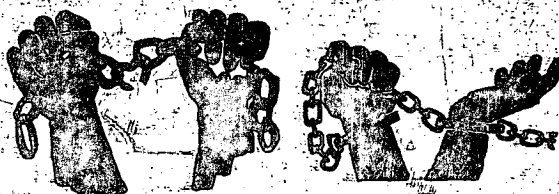

BREAK THE CHAINS



Black Prisoners, White Law

BY ROBERT CHRISTIAN

The FIRST BLACK PRISONERS in America were the Africans brought to these shores in chains in 1619. Like our brothers in prison today and like ourselves those African ancestors were victims of the political, economic and military rapacity of white America. Slave camps, reservations and concentration camps, bars, chains and leg irons, Alcatraz, Cummings and Sing Sing, these are the real monuments of America, more so than Monticello or the Statue of Liberty. They are monuments of a legal inequity which has its roots in the basic laws of the United States and which still endures.



The Constitution was an apartheid document that guaranteed the continuance of slavery and racism as permanent institutions and perpetuated them as cultural realities. Despite the elimination by law of slavery and discrimination, we are still the victims of that racism sanctioned and encouraged by the Constitution.

Most important, the black community outside of bars must never divorce itself from the black community within bars. Freedom is a false illusion in this society; prison is a reality. Black prisoners must be supported by the community during their incarceration, and after they are released.

For the black prisoner is the most vulnerable member of our community - in a naked way he is directly at the mercy of the white power structure. It is also apparent that the black prisoner is one of the most valuable members of our community, as well as the organization, the discipline, the fraternity that black men have developed within prison to survive must be developed by us outside the prison if we are to survive.

We must employ all means necessary to protect and support black people within prison walls. We are all prisoners and our unwavering task must be the achievement of organization, unity and total liberation.

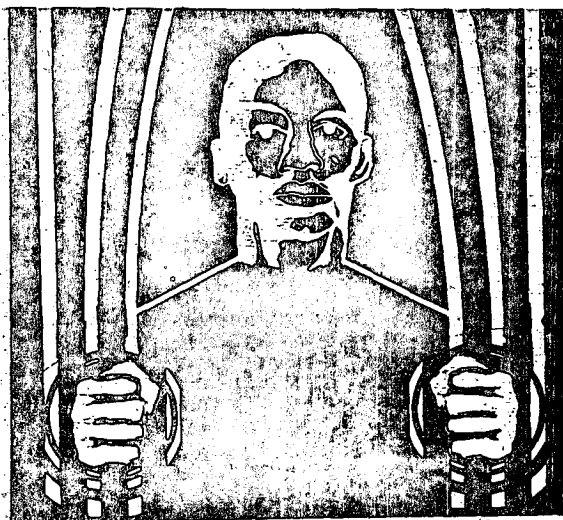
ALL BLACK PRISONERS, therefore, are political prisoners, for their condition derives from the political inequity of black people in America. A black prisoner's crime may or may not have been a political action against the state, but the state's action against him is always political. This knowledge, intuitively known and sometimes transcribed into political terms, exists within every black prisoner. It is of course obvious that mugging, theft, pimping and shooting dope are not themselves political actions, particularly when the victims are not other black people. To maintain that all black offenders are by their actions politically correct is a dangerous romanticism. Black anti-social behavior must be seen in and of its own terms and corrected for the enhancement of the black community. But it must be understood that the majority of black offenses have their roots in the political and economic deprivation of black Americans by the Anglo-American state, and that these are the primary causes and motivations of black crime. The individual offender and his black community must achieve this primary understanding and unite for our mutual protection and self-determination.

HOW DO WE SUPPORT OUR P.O.W.'S

THIS QUESTION IS THE MOST FREQUENTLY ASKED AND PERHAPS THE MOST IMPORTANT ONE FOR US, THE BLACK COMMUNITY. TO ENTERTAIN WE SHOULD DEAL WITH THIS QUESTION IN THE BROADEST MANNER SINCE WE UNDERSTAND THAT THE PEOPLE WE ADDRESS OURSELVES TO RANGE FROM THOSE WHO WILL DO JUST ENOUGH TO KEEP FROM DOING NOTHING AND THOSE WHO WILL GIVE ALL THEIR TIME AND THEIR LIVES.

TO BEGIN WITH, WE MUST ADDRESS OURSELVES TO THE ONE WAY WE CAN ALL SUPPORT OUR P.O.W. AND THAT IS WITH PHYSICAL SUPPORT. THIS ENTAILS COMING OUT TO RALLIES, (ALL OF THEM IF YOU CAN) COMING OUT TO DEMONSTRATIONS, AND COMING DOWN TO THE COURTROOMS. THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT BECAUSE WHEN A BROTHER IS BUSTED FOR SOME 'POLITICAL ACT' FOR THE FIRST WEEK OR SO THE FERVOR AMONG THE PEOPLE IS HIGH AND THE COURT ROOM IS JAMMED. BUT AFTER THAT FIRST WEEK OR TWO YOU HARDLY SEE ANYONE IN COURT TO SUPPORT THE BROTHER BUT HIS IMMEDIATE FAMILY AND THAT'S BULLSHIT! THIS ONLY TELLS THE RACIST JUDGE THAT HE CAN DEAL WITH OUR BROTHER OR SISTER IN ANY MANNER. IT SEEMS THAT THE BROTHER OR SISTER NO LONGER HAS THE SUPPORT OF THE PEOPLE. ALSO WE SHOULD MAKE IT OUR BUSINESS TO ATTEND EVERY COMMUNITY HEARING THAT WE HEAR ABOUT. AS WE INCREASE THE UNITY IN THE BLACK COMMUNITY WE WILL BE SEEING MORE OF HEARINGS, TRIBUNALS AND PEOPLE'S COURTS SO THAT WE CAN BE ABOUT COMBATING POLICE TERROR AND THEIR BLATANT MURDER OF OUR BROTHERS AND SISTERS.

HOW ABOUT MONEY FOR OUR POW'S

THIS IS AN AREA THAT MOST OF US KNOW ONLY TOO WELL. OUR PEOPLE WILL GIVE MONEY ACCORDING TO THEIR LEVEL OF CONSCIOUSNESS AND THE AMOUNT OF RESOURCES THAT THEY HAVE. OF COURSE THIS DOES NOT ALWAYS GO HAND IN HAND. IN FACT WITH THE MORE RESOURCES THAT ONE HAS THE LOWER HIS LEVEL OF CONSCIOUSNESS. HOWEVER, IT HAS BEEN PROVEN THAT THE POORER YOU ARE IN THIS COUNTRY (AS YOU ARE ALREADY BLACK) THE MORE APT YOU ARE TO RECEIVE THE OVERT BLUNT END OF THE OPPRESSORS' STICK.

WE CANNOT FINANCE OUR REVOLUTION WHILE INVESTING IN THE WHITE BOY'S VALUE SYSTEM. WE MUST CREATE NEW VALUES AS WE HAVE FOUND NEW AVENUES TO CHANNEL OUR MONIES, ONE BEING THE PRISONER OF WAR MOVEMENT.

TO BREAK THIS DOWN NO ONE HAS TO DROP TO THE POVERTY LEVEL OF EXISTENCE. BUT INSTEAD OF BUYING THAT NEW FULL LENGTH MAXI LEATHER WITH THE FUR COLLAR, HOW ABOUT JUST BUYING A COAT. YOU KNOW A SIMPLE COAT, NOTHING OUT OF STYLE BUT JUST A COAT. INSTEAD OF THOSE NEW HIGH HEEL SHOES (FOR MEN) HOW ABOUT JUST A GOOD WARM PAIR OF BOOTS OR PLAIN SHOES. PERHAPS THAT IS A LITTLE FAR BUT LET ME SAY THIS. INSTEAD OF THAT CADILLAC, HOW ABOUT JUST A CAR? A GOOD RUNNING CAR. WHAT WE'RE SAYING IS THAT MAYBE, JUST MAYBE ALL THESE BROTHERS AND SISTERS WOULDN'T BE PRISONERS OF WAR NOW. HAD WE DEVELOPED A DIFFERENT RELATIONSHIP TOWARDS ALL THESE MATERIALISTIC GOODS THAT U.S.A. HAS IN ORDER TO CHATTEL US.

GETTING OUT INFORMATION

THIS IS SOMETHING THAT EVEN THE POOREST OF US CAN DO. IT TAKES NO MONEY, IT TAKES JUST A LITTLE TIME. WHAT'S BEING SAID HERE IS ABOUT SPREADING THE WORD. GETTING OUT ON THE CORNER HANDING OUT LEAFLETS AND NEWSLETTERS. IF YOU CAN'T DEAL WITH THE STREET, THEN HOW ABOUT WHERE YOU WORK OR GO TO SCHOOL, OR MAYBE AT YOUR CHURCH.

WHAT WE MUST DO IS SATURATE THE BLACK COMMUNITY WITH THE TRUTH AS TO WHAT REALLY WENT DOWN AND WHAT'S REALLY GOING DOWN. WE MUST BEGIN TO DEVELOP ALTERNATIVE COMMUNICATIONS OTHER THAN THOSE LYING JACK LEGOFF'S AND BILL BONDS (SOUNDS FAMILIAR, IT HAS BEEN SAID 1000 TIMES BEFORE). WE MUST GET ACROSS TO THE PEOPLE JUST BECAUSE THESE CRACKERS SAY IT, IT DON'T MAKE IT RIGHT.

EVERY BLOCK CLUB OR COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION SHOULD HAVE A MIMEOGRAPH MACHINE AND A TYPEWRITER.

Life Imprisonment In Mississippi

JACKSON, MISS. Hekima Ana, first of the Republic of New Africa (RNA) citizens to face trial here, has been convicted of first-degree murder and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Ten other RNA citizens including New African President Imari Obadele, still are awaiting trial on charges which include murder and levying war against the state of Mississippi.

The charges stem from last August 18 when a small army of FBI agents and Jackson police attacked RNA headquarters. In the resulting shootout, police Lieutenant William L. Skinner was killed, and one policeman and one FBI agent were wounded.

It took seven days and two nights of court sessions, and special venire lists of 700 men and women, to get a jury in the case. Most of the prospective jurors indicated that they would send Ana to the gas chamber without hearing any evidence.

Rev. R. J. Van Der Veen of the Netherlands observed the trial for the World Council of Churches Commission to Combat Racism. He commented to reporters that, from what he had seen so far in the United States, overt racism has been replaced by a subtler variety. "But as we see it this case," he said, "it isn't always possible for oppressors to stick to subtle forms."

During the selection proceedings, the prosecution used six of seven peremptory challenges to eliminate qualified blacks from the jury. Finally a jury of six white men, five white women, and one black man was chosen, with one white man as an alternate.

At one point Judge Russell D. Moore III kept court in session until 2:45 A.M., the longest day of court in the memory

of veteran observers here. Defense attorneys repeatedly objected that they could not properly represent the defendant when they were so tired, but the judge persisted.

During the trial, the courtroom was often packed with observers, most of them black students. Anticipating this, the court had ordered elaborate security measures put into effect. One spectator said, "It like being arrested, just to get into the courtroom."

Each spectator was required to furnish positive identification, which was recorded. Next, each person was photographed, both on film and on videotape. Finally, each person was searched three times.

The first search was a metal detecting doorway which the spectators had to walk through. Next a more sensitive manual metal detector was run over the person. And finally there was an old-fashioned frisk by one of the bailiffs.

The prosecution's case against Ana was based on circumstantial evidence. An FBI fingerprint expert from Washington, D.C. testified that a palm print taken from a rifle matched Ana's. Another FBI witness, a ballistics expert, testified that the bullet which killed Lt. Skinner "could have been fired from the rifle" but admitted that it was impossible to be certain.

FBI agents testified that statements admitting guilt were made "voluntarily" by RNA citizens. A defense witness, Ms. Susie Plummer, refuted this, testifying that she saw an officer kicking an RNA citizen while interrogating him at the curb in front of her house.

Police testified that they had evacuated neighbors before raiding RNA headquarters, but could not recall who had been moved to safety. Nine neighbors called as defense witnesses testified that no one had evacuated them, and that they were awakened by gunfire.

The biggest surprise came when the defense called Ms. Christina Lundberg to the witness stand. She is a young white schoolteacher who lives around the corner from the scene of the shootout.

Lundberg testified that after being awakened by sounds of gunfire on the morning of August 18 she set up a tape

Hekima Ana, RNA Citizen



Hekima Ana (a.k.a. Thomas Edward Norman) was born August 21, 1944, in Charlotte, N.C. He spent his childhood first in a three-room shotgun shack in the Charlotte ghetto, then in a housing project, then in the country. His mother worked in a black snackshop at the local bus station, as a waitress, for \$18 a week.

As a young boy, Brother Hekima recalls, he and his friends often hung around a Charlotte golf course where they would run out and grab a player's ball, then run back in the woods to hide. Later they would sell the balls at the club house; they also made money by selling pop bottles, shining shoes and selling Jet. He says: "We were always looking down, hoping to find a penny or maybe a nickel. Very little of this money went to buy candy, popcorn, or to go to the movies. It went into the family budget to buy food and other things."

Brother Hekima had finished elementary school with good grades and good recommendations, but high school was hard. "When you can't read, school can be quite a task," he says. "If it wasn't for sports, I would have hung it up."

He was good at athletics and by his senior year found himself in leadership roles. His basketball team reached the state finals that year. "We lost," he says, "but we had a good excuse. One of our star players had been shot to death only weeks before."

He accepted an athletic scholarship at North Carolina College in Durham, one of 15 such offers he received, and "struggled through" four years, he says. After graduation, he joined Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA), worked in Chicago and says he "learned in 13 months what college had failed to give me in four years."

In 1967, he moved to Milwaukee to attend graduate school, and continued community work. He was living there when he visited Jackson in August, 1971, and was arrested in the shoot-out.

He had become a New African citizen in 1968 while attending a conference at Howard University. In 1970, he led the nation for three months while elections were being held; when Imari A. Obadele was elected president, Brother Hekima was elected vice president of the Midwest region.

reorder at her front window to record the incident. After the District Attorney's objection was overruled by Judge Moore, the cassette was entered into evidence and played for the jury. Included in the recording were the sounds of tear gas guns being fired, and bullhorn announcements to the occupants of RNA headquarters.

FBI agent Lester L. Amann testified that after the RNA citizens had been advised of their rights, their shirts and shoes were removed. But he insisted that the statements they made were "voluntary."

One of the bullhorn messages called upon the occupants to surrender. "Sy Lee" or else "We'll burn him out if we have to." No one named Sy Lee was in the house.

On cross examination, Assistant District Attorney Tom Royals asked Ms. Lundberg if she thought that police were doing something wrong, and if they had been intimidating individuals. She answered "Yes" to both questions. He demanded to know how they were intimidating people. "By a massive show of arms," she said.

Hekima Ana and his wife, Timu Sana, both took the witness stand and testified that they were awakened by one of the other RNA citizens just before the shooting began, and that they feared for their lives. Defense attorneys argued that he fired in self defense.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty, but failed to agree on the death penalty. That made the life sentence automatic. Before sentencing, Judge Moore asked Ana if he wished to make a statement. "I am not guilty," Hekima said, "and all of us here know it."

Ms. Olivia McClure, Hekima Ana's mother who was in court throughout the trial. After the verdict, she said, "I don't think he got a fair trial. The trial should have been moved from Jackson. Hekima

couldn't get a fair trial here because the jury had already made up their minds. Some of them slept during the trial."

"Of course the news coverage of the events leading up to the trial was heavily prejudiced," she said. "Sure I know the history of injustice for black people in the past, but I had hoped that just this once justice would prevail."

She continued, "I wonder if people realize that what happened to the RNA citizens could happen to them. I guess we never think how repressive our society is becoming until it actually happens to us. I don't understand how people who claim to believe in freedom, equality and justice can sit around and watch this mockery."

A few people, mostly young, attended this trial almost every day. Others helped in different ways. But aside from a few who spoke out, most people have

In reporting the RNA trial, the *Kudzu*, Jackson underground newspaper published by young white people, noted that just a few weeks previously an all-white jury in Federal Court had returned a verdict of acquittal in a damage suit against 50 state patrolmen and Jackson city police.

The plaintiffs were wounded students and families of two slain students who were victims of the 200-round barrage of ammunition fire at unarmed Jackson State College students in May, 1970. The *Kudzu* said: "The lawmen are free, Hekima Ana is in jail... the racist nature of the Mississippi and federal courts is all too obvious."

remained silent. It is because these people have not spoken out that this sort of injustice continues to prevail. It has happened to others; it is happening to my son, and it will happen again."

Spirits Still High At Texarkana

(By Staff Correspondent)

TEXARKANA, Tex.—Prison officials have temporarily crushed the rebellion that shook the federal prison here in April, but they have not crushed the spirit of the men.

Walter Collins, who has been locked in isolation since April 14, wrote from the prison in late May:

"The men are in good spirits and committed to fighting the repression even

SCEF Names 1972 Officers

NEW MARKET, Tenn.—Modjeska Simkins, leader in the black liberation movement in South Carolina, has been elected president of the Southern Conference Educational Fund (SCEF).

She succeeds the Rev. Fred L. Shuttlesworth, formerly of Birmingham, Ala., who is now pastor of a church in Cincinnati. Shuttlesworth was elected a vice-president of SCEF.

Other vice-presidents elected at SCEF's board meeting here were State Rep. Julian Bond, Atlanta, Ga.; Jan Phillips, Palmira, Tenn.; and Virginia Collins, New Orleans, La.

Other officers chosen were Mary Britting, Atlanta, secretary; Frederick Hicks, Louisville, treasurer; and Laurie Grupper, Louisville, assistant treasurer.

Mrs. Simkins was one of the founders of the Southern Conference when it was formed in Birmingham in 1938. She has been a vice-president of the organization for many years.

The SCEF board voted to make it a priority to push for the broadest kind of anti-war coalitions throughout the South in the next few months. These coalitions should include and be led by basic sections of the population—black people, workers, unemployed, poor, women, and students.

Collins Letters on Revolt

"On the protest: 'My keepers created the situation that made it necessary for prisoners in their keeping to revolt. Prisoners peacefully assembled and presented their grievances and in return they got not an attempt to resolve these grievances, but a mass lock-up and mass repression of the men whom they chose to be their spokesmen. We are being punished because the rulers of this institution are unwilling to admit that their rehabilitation programs and corrective policies are failures. Men who refuse to end injustice and oppression are the men who make revolution. Thus, my keepers create their own demise; so be it.'

"On his speech to the prisoners during the rebellion: 'I said that we are not criminals but rebellious victims of society... poor, miseducated, abused, much abused, angry men who were nurtured in a racist criminal society. We need not correction but control over the economic system which affects our lives. We must

if transferred. The knowledge that forces beyond the wall are moving in our behalf has kept men in the population together and struggling on the level that they can."

The rebellion, which was reported briefly in last month's *Patriot*, was peaceful and orderly. It took the form of a dining hall boycott and work stoppage, supported by 90 percent of the 500 prisoners. The demands were for simple human rights such as better library facilities, meaningful study programs, uncensored mail. The action united black, chicano, and white prisoners.

Prison officials broke the protest by quick arrests. Prisoners charged that some were dragged down long corridors with a chain around their necks, some were beaten with flashlights and baton handles and sprayed with mace. By late May, all but three of the men charged with being "agitators"—Collins and two others—had been moved to other prisons. Many had lost their "good time," some as much as 150 days.

Collins, SCEF organizer who has been imprisoned here since December, 1970 for draft refusal, served as the chief escapee. He says he did not organize the protest but was elected to an eight-man negotiating committee and made a speech at a meeting of prisoners putting their grievances in economic and political context. (Excerpts from that speech and letters describing the prison situation appear below.)

Officials placed Collins in isolation from the other prisoners in "isolation" and threatened to charge him with mutiny. He and 12 others are preparing to file suit against the U.S. Bureau of Prisons and Texarkana officials. They ask that you:

Write to Norman Carlson, director, Bureau of Prisons, Washington, D.C. Ask that the demands of the prisoners be granted and that all charges be dropped. Send a copy of your letter to Warden J.L.M. Connett, Federal Correctional Institution, Texarkana, Tex. 75701.

(Also Walter Collins is eligible for parole this summer, and his hearing will be in late June. Even if you have written before, write again to the U.S. Justice Department, Washington, D.C., and demand that his five-year sentence be reduced to time served.)

"Come to a solution to our problems in prison through attacks on the governmental and social agencies and apparatus of this country—not merely on the bankrupt policies of individual men. Thus the demands we make upon the administration of this prison are demands upon America."

"On the other prisoners: 'I cannot even describe in words what I feel at this time for the concern, camaraderie and support of my fellow convicts. Race has gone back into the Pandora's box out of which it came; brotherhood and revolution have succeeded it.'"

"On the other prisoners who were locked in 'isolation': 'In the fleeting but beautiful moment of our collective stand against the inhumanity and viciousness of this prison I came to know these people as brothers, human beings, confused and much abused, but yearning to end their confusion, their abuse, yearning to be free. I want them to know that that moment can grow into a lifetime if they would act to make it so. I stand ready to undertake with them the dangerous, painful path toward brotherhood and a democratic America.'

"On the charges against him: 'My crime is making a speech whose truths were both overpowering and indisputable. My offense was saying publicly and in words that all could understand that the problems of this prison, the problems of prisoners are the problems of America; racism and capitalism. My offense is being

In Louisville Panthers Are Jailed

(By Staff Correspondent)

LOUISVILLE, KY.—Four members of the Black Panther Party and three supporters were jailed here in late May and held under bonds totalling \$430,000.

The charge was armed robbery against six men and a charge of "aiding and abetting" against the one woman who was jailed.

However, Louisville Party members and many others in both the black and white communities said the charges are a frame-up.

"It's the annual summer sweep of militants 'to keep the city cool,'" said one speaker at a recent protest rally. One summer recently two black leaders were held most of the summer on arson charges, of which a jury later acquitted them. Another year the famous Black Six arrests occurred early in the summer, and the charges were dismissed two years later.

The robbery in question allegedly took place at a tourist home in Louisville's black community. The Panthers charge that they are actually victims of a reprisal because of their militant program to rid the black community of drugs and drug pushers.

The local Panther chapter was just formed here this spring—an outgrowth of the Black Committee for Self-Defense which organized last fall. The Black Committee started an intensive campaign against drugs, which has been carried on by the Panthers in recent months; the offices of the organization were visited repeatedly by police, and shots were fired into their window in February.

The arrests were made by city police without warrants but carrying submachine guns and shotguns as well as pistols. The Panthers were not told they were under arrest until they were in police cars.

The Louisville Civil Liberties Union condemned the circumstances of the arrest and publicly raised the question as to whether the real reason was the political beliefs of the Panthers.

black, politically conscious, morally responsible and articulate in a racist, criminal society and a prison that reflects this society, where black is a dangerous color, political blackness is a threat. My offense is having won the respect and support of the overwhelming majority of prisoners in this prison, regardless of race or political belief."

"On the official attempt to isolate him from other prisoners: 'My keepers have given up on telling people not to talk to me when I am on the yard or passing through the corridors. Their admonishments go unheeded, and unless my keepers are prepared to lock up a large portion of the population they cannot stop prisoners from inquiring as to what they should do.'

"On the future: 'Everybody is wondering where do we go from here? There is no question in my mind. We can only go to victory. We can only continue to battle against the injustices of the prison system and the injustices of the society. The masses here have been heard, the racial barriers have been broken, the struggle for right and justice is on, and those who create injustice and push repression and racism are on the defensive.'

RICHARD CLAXTON GREGORY, aka
Dick Gregory, ARL

GREGORY is a Negro male, age 35, born 10/12/32, in St. Louis, Missouri. He is a nationally-known entertainer, author, lecturer, civil rights activist.

For months prior to 4/68, GREGORY had announced plans to disrupt the Democratic National Convention (DNC) in Chicago, 8/26-29/68, by such means as inviting hordes of protestors who would swarm over the Amphitheatre, where the convention would be held. GREGORY said the DNC would be held only over his dead body unless "they" met his terms, which were primarily in the civil rights field. Then in 4/68, GREGORY announced cancellation of his plans to protest at the DNC, because of disturbances and emotionalism following murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

Thereafter, GREGORY was in jail in Olympia, Washington, from 6/7/68, to 7/16/68, for illegal fishing.

During the DNC, GREGORY spoke to the demonstrators in Grant Park on 8/28/68; and 8/29/68 he led a march of demonstrators from the Park, south in the general direction of the Amphitheatre, where the DNC was in session. He maintained he had invited the demonstrators to his home and had a right to proceed, despite police orders to stop at 18th and Michigan Avenue. He was arrested, along with a number of others, at 18th and Michigan for failure to obey a police order. The arrest was peaceful but during the confrontation between the marchers and police at 18th Street, there was considerable disorder and the National Guard used tear gas on the crowd to disperse it.

GREGORY resides at 1451 East 55th Street, Chicago. He is an independent candidate for President of the United States. Early in September, 1968, he traveled to Paris and met with representatives of the North Vietnamese peace delegation.

During the course of these investigations, all offices, where indicated, should be alert to additional violations and initiate ARL cases. Bear in mind in all cases where subject resides other than in Illinois, basis for prosecution will rest within that division. Those offices having individuals who traveled to Chicago for the DNC who are logical subjects in ARL investigations should open such cases advising the Bureau and Chicago.

Concerning copies, in connection with CR or ARL investigations, each auxiliary office should submit five copies to the Bureau, two copies for Chicago, plus an additional two copies for the USA at Chicago. All offices should also be alert to any other dissemination required by the Bureau such as if a subject is employed by the Federal Government or is in an alien status, extra copies should be designated to the Bureau for possible dissemination.

Concerning investigation relating to GREGORY, it is noted that prior to the DNC, GREGORY made a nation wide tour speaking on various college campuses, at which he called for individuals to come to Chicago during the DNC for the purpose of participating in demonstrations. Although GREGORY subsequently, prior to the convention, stated he did not personally intend to lead any demonstrations in Chicago because of his fear of possible injury to participants, GREGORY did participate in demonstrations which occurred in Chicago during the DNC and was arrested by the Chicago PD on 8/29/68, at 18th and Michigan, when a large group staged a march out of Grant Park heading in the general direction of the Amphitheatre, where the DNC was in session.

Each office should review their indices relative to GREGORY and where GREGORY appeared in your territory, appropriate investigations should be conducted to develop witnesses relating to possible ARL violation.
