SUBJECT MADE NO ADMISSIONS. LABORATORY IDENTIFIED MC COY'S HANDWRITING ON NOTE UTILIZED BY HIJACKER TO INSTRUCT FLIGHT CREW. WITNESS ON HIJACKED AIRCRAFT WAS IDENTIFIED SUBJECT'S PHOTOGRAPHS.

ALL OFFICES SHOULD CONTINUE LOGICAL INVESTIGATION INCLUDING THAT SET FORTH IN SALT LAKE CITY TELETYPE APRIL EIGHT LAST TO DEVELOP ADDITIONAL EVIDENCE LINKING MC COY TO OFFENSE. INTENSIFY EFFORTS TO DETERMINE IF HE HAD ASSOCIATES. SALT LAKE CITY IMMEDIATELY FURNISH PHOTOGRAPHS OF SUBJECT TO INTERESTED OFFICES.

Facts of complaint
C advised that he is a pilot for Western Airlines in Los Angeles. He stated that he had information that was probably a long shot as to the identity of the captioned UNSUB. He explained that he had read the LA Times description of the hijacker as received from the pilot of the hijacked aircraft which also described the hijacker as an expert pilot and skydiver. C stated that he knew an individual who was almost a perfect match for the suspect. This individual, [Redacted], had been a civilian helicopter pilot with the ~~XXXX~~ C at Ft. Walters, Mineral Wells, Texas, which is the US Army Primary Helicopter Training School. C stated that this was in 1966 and that he had last seen ~~XXX~~ [Redacted] in 1966 at Ft. Rucker, Ala. C stated that he thought that [Redacted] may have flown for Air America since then and that he was possibly in Southern California about a year ago. C stated that he received most of his information about [Redacted] from a friend, [Redacted] Wells, Texas.

C added that he has a group photo of all instructors at FT. Walters taken in 1966 which contains photo of [Redacted] However, in this photo, [Redacted] is wearing sunglasses and the picture is quite small. C stated that if FBI wished to see photo it would be left in his mail drawer at the Western AL Dispatch and Crew Control, in an envelope marked for the FBI. (AT LAX)

C stated that he is scheduled to pilot a flight to Minneapolis, Minn., 4/9/72, departing at 8:00 AM, where he will lay over until 4/10/72 departing for return to LA at about 5:00PM. Following return to LA, C stated that he is taking a vacation in London, England, for two weeks.

SEARCH IMMEDIATELY BEGUN BY PREVIOUSLY ALERTED AGENTS WITH POLICE AGENCIES ARRIVING IN LIMITED FORCE APPROXIMATELY THIRTY MINUTES LATER AS AVAILABLE LIMITED FORCE HAD BEEN ENGAGED ON OTHER DUTY AT PRECISE TIME OF JUMP. PILOT'S ACCOUNT

Hijacker Dropped 'Beeper' Chutes as Possible Decoys

BY JOHN KUMBULA

The pilot of the hijacked United Air Lines jetliner said Saturday that the skyjacker dropped two beeper-equipped parachutes over Nevada, apparently in an attempt to throw off chase planes.

Capt. Jerry Hearn, 44, told a Los Angeles International Airport news conference the unidentified skyjacker may have used his own parachute to make the 14,000-foot leap over Provo, Utah.

Hearn and four of his five-member crew met with newsmen at an airport lounge after their return from Salt Lake City.

The pilot, who has 17 years of commercial flying experience, said the skyjacker appeared to have an "excellent knowledge of flying and jumping procedures . . . had some knowledge of planes and may have been a pilot."

Had Own Flight Plan

The skyjacker prepared his own flight plan, which he gave the crew to follow on the trip from San Francisco to Utah. The plane, originally on a flight from Newark, N.J., to Los Angeles, had been taken over by the pistol and hand grenade-wielding hijacker over Colorado and diverted to San Francisco, where the passengers were released in exchange for \$500,000 and four parachutes.

Hearn said the man also appeared to be familiar with the Utah terrain over which he jumped and disappeared with the \$500,000.

He said the skyjacker had specifically requested them to fly 14,000 feet above the ground and told them what ground speed to fly.

Pursuing planes were about three miles behind Friday night as the hijacked craft flew over Nevada and the skyjacker let the two bugged parachutes out. Throwing the chutes out might have been a decoy intended to put pursuing planes off the trail, Hearn said, and might also have led to erroneous reports that the hijacker had jumped over Nevada.

Hearn said copilot Ken Bradley of San Diego spotted the skyjacker still on the plane after the two parachutes had been released. Hearn frantically directed the pursuing planes to let

Hijack Suspect Held; \$500,000 Still Missing

**Ex-Helicopter Pilot and
Amateur Skydiver Seized
at Home in Provo, Utah**

Exclusive to The Times from a Staff Writer.

PROVO, Utah—An amateur skydiver and law enforcement student was arrested Sunday at his home here on suspicion of hijacking an airliner Friday and bailing out with \$500,000 cash ransom.

Richard Floyd McCoy Jr., 29, a former Vietnam helicopter pilot now a junior at Brigham Young University, was taken into custody by FBI agents who acted in part on the basis of clues furnished by his best friend and his sister-in-law.

The \$500,000 paid as ransom for 91 persons aboard a United Air Lines jet hijacked Friday on a flight from Denver to Los Angeles was still officially missing.

But FBI agents who searched McCoy's home and rooted through a compost heap in the backyard seized three big boxes, a small box and two brown suitcases they said contained "evidence" in the case. They took the boxes to their headquarters in Salt Lake City.

Asked if the boxes contained the missing ransom, agents in Provo said, "No comment."

McCoy was arraigned before U.S. Magistrate A.M. Farrow in Salt Lake City. He was charged with air piracy and interfering with a flight crew during a commercial flight, which could carry a death sentence.

Held Without Bail

He was ordered held without bail, and a preliminary hearing was set for April 17 at Salt Lake City.

McCoy appeared calm throughout the arrest and arraignment procedure.

When newsmen asked if he had any comment, he said, "Well, it's embarrassing, let's face it."

FBI agents refused to discuss the case or disclose the nature of clues which led them to McCoy after one of the biggest land and air searches in recent history.

Other sources, however, revealed that it was McCoy's best friend and his sister-in-law who cast suspicion in his direction.

The best friend was identified as Utah Highway Patrolman Robert Van Ieperen, who said McCoy had

them know the hijacker was ~~not~~ aboard.

The pilot said the hijacker ordered in San Francisco that his luggage in the baggage compartment be brought to him inside the plane's passenger compartment. Hearn said there might have been a parachute in the luggage.

On the flight to Salt Lake City, the crew was forced to stay in the cockpit. The gunman had the rest of the plane to himself.

Hearn said he never saw the man, who never came to the cockpit.

"There was practically no verbal communication with him. About 99% of his communication was in written messages," Hearn said.

Diane Surdam, 24, a stewardess for 4½ years, was the go-between who carried messages from the skyjacker to the pilot. She said she got the first message about five minutes after the plane had left Denver Friday afternoon.

Sent 10 Notes

She said about 10 notes were sent to the captain altogether. Most of them were neatly typewritten but some were handprinted and improvised to suit the situation.

She said the skyjacker wore gloves all the time he was on the plane. At the time he hijacked the plane, she said, he wore a false moustache and a wig. Before he bailed out through a rear door he had changed his appearance, she said. He had an oxygen mask on his face and a towel over his head.

The notes to the pilot told what he wanted, what had to be done and the consequences if his instructions were not followed, she said.

The notes he first presented indicated that destruction of the plane, the hijacker and everybody else would follow if his instructions were not followed," Mrs. Surdam said.

"I was excited and went right to the captain with the instructions. It is my duty to follow instruc-

tions, not to question them," she said.

Before he bailed out, the skyjacker demanded and got back all the correspondence he had sent to the pilot.

"He didn't leave anything on the plane," Hearn said.

"He seemed calm and methodical. He knew what he was doing but sometimes he got a little upset when things weren't moving the way he wanted," Mrs. Surdam said.

When he jumped, the man carried the \$500,000 with him in two medium-sized flight bags which weighed about 20 pounds each.

The pilot said he was "95% sure" the skyjacker jumped near Provo be-

cause about then there was a change in the plane's pressurization level indicating a door had been opened.

Hearn said publication of other successful hijackings may have been responsible for what happened to the UAL plane.

"Publicizing (these hijackings) makes it possible for others to analyze them and to repeat them," he said.

Meanwhile, a UAL spokesman declined comment on a published report that the hijacker may have intentionally left a manila envelope containing his weapons and typewritten notes at an airport counter to escape detection when he boarded the plane.

The unconfirmed report said the airline paged the owner of the envelope after passengers had been seated on the plane and the hijacker picked it up and returned to the plane without being checked.

Strain Of Hijack Evident

They walked off the plane at Los Angeles International Airport tired, some dazed, a few carrying cocktails after a hijacker delayed them several hours in San Francisco en route from New Jersey to Los Angeles.

Most showed the strain of being held on the plane 3½ hours at San Francisco Airport under the watch of the swarthy hijacker armed with a hand grenade and pistol.

Mike Lucoff, Tarzana, seemed the least affected by the harrowing ordeal. He was met by his wife, Jane, and three children. They had spent the long hours napping at the airport here.

"It was quite an exciting event," Lucoff said. "It definitely was well planned. It all started 10 minutes out of Denver."

Lucoff said it appeared the moustachioed hijacker wore a black wig.

Francis Appell, 40, Torrance, said he was sitting directly in front of the hijacker.

"He (the hijacker) said absolutely nothing. A stewardess told me to move up front (after the hijacking was announced) and I ran like ~~_____~~"

Mrs. Alva Mosley, of 3837 Cherrywood Ave., a teacher at Ford Boulevard School in East Los Angeles, was returning from an international teachers conference in Denver.

She disputed reports that the hijacker had pre-written instructions for the pilot. "I saw him writing each time he gave a stewardess a note to carry forward to the pilot," she said.

"He (the hijacker) knew the plane well. Most people were calm. He never said a word, but the pilot told us he had several hand grenades and we should not talk back to him," Mrs. Mosley, who was embraced warmly by her husband when she debarked here, said.

David Quinn, a contract supervisor for Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, returning with another JPL employe, Bill Henry, complained mostly about lack of air-conditioning during the long wait on the ground in San Francisco.

Shortly after leaving Denver, Quinn said, he became suspicious when the pilot announced he was experiencing mechanical trouble.

"The hijacker was definitely clever. We all thought we'd be held aboard the plane since he had everything so well planned."

Sixty-three of the original 86 persons aboard the plane were ferried here on another United Air Lines plane shortly before midnight. All agreed it was a long day.

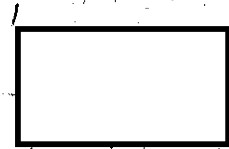

"casually" discussed air-
plane hijacking with him
and with several other
persons not long ago.

Van Ieperen said he
might not have remem-
bered the discussion, but
McCoy's sister-in-law had
telephoned him twice —
while the hijacking was
actually in progress — to
ask "if McCoy was on a
mission of some sort."

And about 15 minutes
after the hijacker had par-
achuted from the airliner,
Van Ieperen said the
woman called back and
told him she was "scared
to death" because McCoy
had tried to get her to help
him "on a hijacking."

A third clue was a note,
handwritten by the hijack-
er and concealed by stew-
ardess Diane Surdam, 24,
when the man asked that
all specimens of his hand-
writing be returned to
him.

The hijacker had used
pre-typed and improvised
notes to communicate his
instructions to pilot Jerry
Hearn, 44, through Mrs.
Surdam. He wore gloves
and wanted all the notes
back before he left the
plane, but Mrs. Surdam
kept one.

A spokesman at Brig-
ham Young University
said, FBI men had begun
checking McCoy's records
there Saturday, less than
24 hours after the hijack-
ing. Other sources said his
Army records had been
checked for specimens of
his handwriting and print-
ing.

McCoy had served two
tours of duty in Vietnam.

—one with Special Forces
in 1964 and one as a heli-
copter pilot in 1967.

He first enrolled at the
university in 1961 but
dropped out to join the
army. He reenrolled on a
full-time basis last spring
and university authorities
said his grade record was
a good one.

Kris Peters, 20, who sat
next to McCoy in a police
administration class last
semester, said his ambi-
tion was "to make his dent
on the world by uncover-
ing organized crime."

"All last semester," she
said, "he was very upset
with the Mafia."

Kent Talbot, 16, of Pro-
vo, said McCoy taught
Sunday school at a Mor-
mon church for a month
last year and "all he ever
talked about was sin. He
would ask us what last
week's lesson was about—
and we'd always say,
'Sin.'"

McCoy's father, retired
Army M/Sgt. Richard F.
McCoy Sr., 52, of Raleigh,
N.C., stoutly maintained
his son's innocence, saying
"such a thing would not be
consistent with the teach-
ings of the church. I have
to consider him innocent. I
have to stand by him."

Later, however, he said,
"I just don't know—war
does funny things to peo-
ple sometimes."

In Provo, McCoy's slen-
der, blonde wife, Karen,
was in seclusion in their
home. Their two children,
Chante, 5, and Richard, 2,
were not seen.

Van Ieperen said McCoy
had been discussing sky-
diving with him and sev-
eral other persons weeks
ago when the conversation
turned to the similar para-
chute-escape carried out
with apparent success five
months ago by a man call-
ing himself "D. B. Cooper"
who collected \$200,000
from Northwest Airlines
and then bailed out over
the state of Washington.

He said McCoy be-
lieved it "would be possi-
ble for someone to hijack a
plane by taking his own
parachute along" instead
of using those equipped
with beeper units, which
tripped up a similar at-
tempt.

Van Ieperen said McCoy
said at that time if he
were to hijack an airplane
he would ask for "about
\$500,000" in ransom.

Hijacker Was Cool, Passengers Report

Just get me to the church on time, thought Louis Ogden. "I was mad because I was afraid I wasn't going to get to my son's wedding."

Ogden was on the Los Angeles-bound Boeing 727 hijacked Friday afternoon, and he was diverted along with 88 other United Airlines passengers—to San Francisco International Airport.

But he was safe. And he seemed likely to make the wedding.

Dr. Harry Huffaker, a Honolulu dentist, was homeward bound from a Colorado ski vacation with a friend, Miss Sandra Wilkinson, 25, a stewardess on holiday.

Few of their fellow passengers, they said, seemed aware of the odd courier service they were watching. "I knew there was a hijacking about 15 minutes after we took off (from Denver)," Miss Wilkinson said, "because of the stewardesses running back and forth."

They were carrying

messages, typed out in advance, between the hijacker's seat near the rear of the plane and the pilots' flight deck.

Miss Wilkinson called the gunman "real composed," and said he never threatened the passengers "or even talked to them."

Mickey Luckoff, sales manager of a San Francisco radio station, thought for a time that "two or three" hijackers were in command of the plane.

He got the impression because of the steady stream of hand-carried messages being taken to the cockpit by the stewardesses.

A Los Angeles schoolteacher, Mrs. Alma Moseley, never saw the hijacker, but she had to respect his decorum and organizational skill.

Mrs. Moseley said the gunman allowed passengers to use the rear restrooms, one at a time. Was she frightened? "No." But, she added, "they asked us not to look back at him—and I didn't."

FBI Won't Confirm Report

PROVO, Utah — Police authorities here said today they have the "name" of a "suspect" in the \$500,000 parachute-hijacking of United Air Lines jet liner diverted from its Denver-Los Angeles flight.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation in Salt Lake City, in charge of the probe of yesterday's hijacking, refused to confirm the report, saying "we're trying to reach the Provo chief to see what he has in mind."

Provo Chief Jesse Evans told newsmen: "We have a suspect . . . there is a lead in the case."

First reports that an arrest was made apparently were in error as Provo police spokesmen said they have the name of the man whom they suspect was involved but that no one was in custody.

A ground and air posse of more than 200 men were scouring the mountains and canyons near here and set up road blocks in their search for the man who bailed out of the jet liner with \$500,000.

All 88 passengers and one stewardess from the New Jersey-to-Los Angeles Boeing 727 jet, were allowed to get off the commandeered craft at San Francisco last night where it was diverted on the last leg of the flight from Denver to Los Angeles.

The swarthy hijacker wearing mirrored dark glasses and carrying a pistol and hand grenade, then ordered the medium-range plane on a northeasterly flight with the pilot, co-pilot, engineer and two stewardesses aboard after four parachutes were loaded aboard along with two suitcases crammed with the ransom money in small bills.

Less than a half hour after takeoff, it was reported the hijacker jumped over Wilson Creek, Nev., near Ely in eastern Nevada. But apparently he dumped out one of the chutes as a diversionary tactic to mislead two Air Force F-106 jet chase planes.

The jetliner then steered a more northerly course toward Provo and the skyjacker jumped near Provo Airport.

Authorities here said the search is concentrating on two areas. One is Lake Utah a half-mile west of Provo Airport. The other is 20 miles north of here in rugged mountain country west of Lehigh where a woman resident reported seeing a parachute descend.

State, county, federal and city

lawmen in Utah and Juab Counties set up roadblocks as others searched the hills. Air Force planes dropped flares to illuminate dark canyons. The UAL jetliner continued to Salt Lake City where it landed and the pilot was debriefed along with co-pilot, Jerry Hearn, of Culver City, of K.R. Bradley and engineer K.W. Owen, and the two stewardesses.

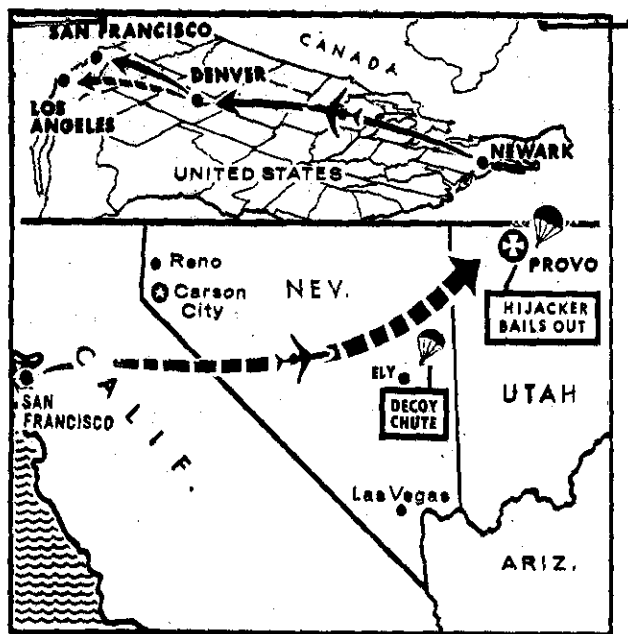
Roadblocks were set up on Interstate 15 running through Provo 35 miles south of Salt Lake, as well as most other major roads in the area.

The dapper skyjacker apparently boarded the three-engine plane in Denver and initiated his hijack 10 minutes after take-off ordering the plane to San Francisco.

There he demanded \$500,000 ransom in small bills along with four parachutes—two main parachutes and two reserve parachutes indicating to lawmen initially there were at least two hijackers aboard. That assumption proved false, but passengers and authorities said the suspect appeared familiar with skydiving.

Capt. Hearn, a 17-year veteran with UAL, refused to disclose speed and altitude of the plane when the skyjacker, who bought a ticket in the name of "T. Johnson," jumped.

Hearn said at a press conference in Salt Lake City today that revealing such information gives others ideas. "Every time they read about something like this, the plans get more sophisticated," Capt. Hearn said.

parachutes and \$500,000, all law enforcement agencies in the State of Utah were notified, as well as the National Guard and Hill Air Force Base who were requested to furnish helicopters and other aircraft as needed since subject's destination was unknown at that time. At approximately 8:22 PM, information was received that the aircraft was headed for the Coaldale marker in Nevada. Subject was described as a white male, approximately 25, 5' 5", 145 to 160 pounds, with dark complexion. The plane's direction was followed through contact with the Air Traffic Control Center at Salt Lake City until it was believed subject bailed out of the plane near the Provo, Utah, airport, where a continuous search was made throughout the night by local police agencies and all available FBI Agents.

Investigation conducted by the Salt Lake City Division and auxiliary Offices not pertinent to this case is not being included in this report but maintained as part of the file.

A detailed map is being prepared showing the jump area of the subject and will be included in the next report.

No leads are being set forth in this report for auxiliary Offices in view of the fact that they have been requested by the most expeditious means. Auxiliary Offices have been requested to furnish reports in this case covering their investigation.

Due to the splendid cooperation demonstrated by all law enforcement agencies in the State of Utah, as well as Hill Air Force Base and the Utah National Guard, a letter of appreciation was sent to the head of each of these agencies.

[REDACTED], Director of Brigham Young University (BYU) Health Center, BYU, Provo, Utah, advised April 11, 1972, that subject MC COY had recently been treated at that health center regarding a leg condition and that he was treated by [REDACTED]. He stated that because of numerous lawsuits in the medical profession and because of skepticism of college students regarding confidentiality of medical records, he has taken a rigid stand against releasing information in medical records without the consent of the patient or a subpoena. He stated he would dismiss any doctor who would release such information. He advised that to his knowledge, subject had never been treated for any mental abnormality, but hinted subject might have had some problem of that type. He was non-specific but gave the impression subject might have had an emotional problem.

[REDACTED], BYU Health Center, advised April 11, 1972, that he had seen subject twice during about the past month in regard to his leg, and that subject was to have returned a third time but did not so return, thus indicating to [REDACTED] that his leg must not have been too bad. [REDACTED] stated that he was unable to give any information without a subpoena or consent of the subject.

Synopsis:

RICHARD FLOYD MC COY, JR., white male American, date of birth 12/7/42, Kinston, North Carolina, was arrested at Provo, Utah, 4/9/72, after being charged in a complaint at Salt Lake City, Utah, on 4/9/72, with violation of Section 1472(i)(1), Title 49, USC, Aircraft Piracy, and Section 1472(j), Title 49, USC, Interfering With Flight Attendant. Subject identified through handwriting and fingerprint examinations as well as witness identification as individual who boarded United Air Lines (UAL) Flight 855, a Boeing 727, from Newark, New Jersey, to Los Angeles, California, at Denver, Colorado, a normal stop. Approximately 15 to 20 minutes after take-off, subject was observed to be holding a hand grenade and a gun, and this occurred while the plane was in flight approximately 15 miles north of Aspen, Colorado. Chief Stewardess was first furnished a note to deliver to the pilot which was believed to have stated "grenade pin pulled" and "pistol". She was then furnished an envelope which she was instructed to deliver to the pilot, which envelope contained a number of pages of flight instructions and demands, which included that the plane be diverted to San Francisco where UAL was to have \$500,000 in cash and four parachutes available. Envelope also contained one hand grenade pin and a bullet. Instructions requested that pilot return all notes to the hijacker. Aircraft landed in San Francisco at approximately 4:20 PM where passengers' bags were immediately removed from the plane and subject ordered two male persons aboard the plane to depart and obtain the \$500,000 and the parachutes and return to the aircraft. After the two flight bags and parachutes were put aboard, subject ordered his luggage be brought from the baggage compartment. Stewardess was then furnished a note ordering all passengers

to deplane, and later ordered one stewardess to leave. Stewardess was then handed a note to be delivered to the pilot ordering him to take off immediately. Time estimated at approximately 7:40 PM. Subject instructed the pilot, through flight plans furnished in envelope, to fly at 16,000 feet at approximately 180 knots, and several changes were ordered in plans. Just prior to approaching Provo, Utah, subject was observed by stewardess to be wearing a light olive military style flight suit as well as an oxygen mask. Subject believed to have bailed out near the Provo, Utah, airport. On 4/9/72, a search warrant was obtained for subject's residence at 360 South 200 East, Provo, and "\$499,970" was recovered, along with additional items which included a hand grenade which was inert, a .45 caliber automatic, a black helmet and parachute. Subject arraigned before U. S. Magistrate, Salt Lake City, Utah, 4/9/72, at which time he requested a court-appointed attorney, and was remanded to the custody of the U. S. Marshal on the recommendation of no bail. Subject confined in Salt Lake County Jail, Salt Lake City. Facts are being presented to FGJ, Salt Lake City, 4/14/72. Description set forth, as well as background information. SUICIDAL TENDENCIES.

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DETAILS:

PREDICATION

This investigation was predicated upon a telephone call received by SAC RUSSELL P. CALAME, at approximately 3:45 p.m., April 7, 1972, from [redacted] Supervisor, Federal Aviation Agency Control, telephone number 521-[redacted] who advised that there had been a hijacking of United Air Lines Flight 855, a Boeing 727, enroute from Newark, New Jersey, to Los Angeles, California, via Denver, Colorado. He advised the hijacker had declared himself near Grand Junction, Colorado, and instructed the plane to be diverted to San Francisco, California. [redacted] advised the plane was now flying at 31,000 feet, and his information was received from the Denver Air Control Center at 3:21 p.m. He advised that at 3:38 p.m., the plane was going to 39,000 feet and was 25 miles south of Price, Utah. b7C

Upon receiving this information, the Salt Lake City Division immediately put into effect its hijacking plan.

INVESTIGATION AND INTERVIEWS
AT AIRPORT

SA [redacted] was in the Salt Lake City International Airport tower with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Supervisor being [redacted] and Operator [redacted]. On the tower radar, the hijacked jet aircraft could be observed entering the lower sector of the Salt Lake City tower radar.

At 11:11 - 11:12 P.M., April 7, 1972, a radio transmission was overheard being received from the pilot of the hijacked aircraft, which indicated that the crew of the aircraft believed the hijacker may have departed from the airplane. A radar plot indicated that the possible departure of the unknown subject from the aircraft could have occurred in the immediate vicinity of the Provo, Utah, Airport at approximately 11:11 - 11:12 P.M.

At 11:27 P.M., the pilot of the aircraft indicated information was received through radio broadcast monitoring that it had been confirmed that the hijacker had left the aircraft and the aircraft was returning to land at the Salt Lake City Airport.

[redacted] was requested to and subsequently did make arrangements for the landing of the aircraft at the Salt Lake City Airport and its immediate abandonment at the end of the runway for search procedures and evacuation of the crew in view of any possibility of injury or explosion. Ambulance and fire equipment were alerted and on standby to proceed to the vicinity of the aircraft for emergency procedure. The crew of the aircraft were to be delivered directly after evacuation to the FAA Offices at the Airport under complete security for interview by Bureau Agents.

He advised that after completion of the initial interview of the crew members by FBI Agents, he, in accordance with United Air Lines policy, was going to permit the crew members to have a brief and limited conference with news officials.

b7C [redacted] United Airlines, advised that he was in command of United Airlines Flight 855 that had originated in New Jersey, and he had taken over at Denver, Colorado, for a flight to Los Angeles, California.

[redacted] stated shortly after take-off from Denver and approximately 15 miles north of Aspen, Colorado, he became aware that some difficulty existed concerning one passenger. Shortly thereafter he was furnished a two page single spaced typewritten letter containing instructions which he had first thought was a bomb threat and later realized that his aircraft was being hijacked.

b7C [redacted] advised that [redacted] who was apparently called [redacted] by the hijacker, was utilized by the hijacker as a messenger for his instructions from the passenger cabin to the cockpit on numerous occasions. [redacted] advised that the hijacker's instructions were extremely explicit, and in the vicinity of Hanksville, Utah, he requested the Federal Aviation Agency make a change of course which would allow him to land at San Francisco International Airport. This course change was granted and he proceeded to San Francisco International Airport, the hijacker having furnished instructions as to landing and parking at Runway 19 left and further specific instructions as to the fueling of the aircraft and the distance that all vehicles should be kept from the aircraft.

b7C [redacted] stated that upon refueling and obtaining the \$500,000 in ransom and removal of passengers from the aircraft, he again became air-borne, at which time the hijacker apparently lowered the rear stairway. The hijacker's instructions were to fly at 16,000 feet elevation and to maintain an air speed of 180 knots which is approximately 200 miles per hour. [redacted] stated the hijacker indicated several course changes en route and the instructions contained specific times that these course changes should be flown. [redacted] advised that in changing course in the vicinity of the Provo, Utah, Airport, where the hijacker had indicated the next leg should be to Price, Utah, he felt that the hijacker had bailed out.

[redacted] advised he believed that in the first message he received there was possibly a cartridge shell in the envelope with the instructions and a hand grenade pin.

[redacted] stated he and his [redacted] spent approximately nine hours [redacted] aircraft with the exception of a short break at the San Francisco International Airport when he was able to utilize the lavatory immediately adjacent to the cockpit. [redacted]

[redacted] stated in view of this confinement he never did see the hijacker.

[redacted] stated that there was every indication the hijacker was armed with a hand grenade and pistol, and he had also threatened to use plastic explosives at one point.

[redacted] stated he was aware that through conversation with a U. S. Coast Guard chase plane that apparently two parachutes had been thrown from his aircraft in the vicinity of Tonopah, Nevada.

He stated that the only indication of the use of the steps to exit the rear of the aircraft [redacted]

[redacted] employed by United Airlines, was interviewed at Salt Lake City International Airport.

[redacted] advised that the flight on which he [redacted] originated in New Jersey as United Airlines Flight 855, and he boarded as crew at Denver, Colorado.

[redacted] advised that approximately 15 miles north of Aspen, Colorado, he became aware that there was some difficulty and originally thought that a bomb threat had been received. [redacted]

[redacted] since the hijacker apparently preferred to have as little contact with other personnel in the cabin as possible.

[redacted] advised the original two page letter was in an envelope and this envelope also contained the safety pin from a hand grenade.

[redacted] stated that [redacted] who is employed by United Airlines and based at Los Angeles, California, where Flight 855 was due to terminate, was "deadheading" and was sitting in the passenger compartment and apparently was aware of the hijacker's presence.

[redacted] stated that upon receiving instructions from the hijacker, a course change was obtained in the area of Hanksville, Utah, and a more northerly course was assumed, which would take the flight to the San Francisco International Airport as instructed by the hijacker.

[redacted] stated the hijacker was very explicit in all of his instructions and in fact indicated that at San Francisco International Airport runway 19 left should be

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utilized, and [redacted] stated he felt the hijacker definitely knew the airport. The hijacker further instructed (1) a fuel truck with six hours fuel and two men on the truck should be available, (2) all vehicles should be parked one hundred feet from the nose of the aircraft on the left side, and (3) he wanted a prisoner who was being returned to the State of California to be left in the seat that he was in. b7C

[redacted] stated that [redacted] confirmed that the hijacker had a pistol that had a clip in it and returned to the hijacker the hand grenade pin. [redacted] had further indicated to [redacted] that the hijacker had stated he had plastic explosives on board the aircraft. b7C

Upon refueling and leaving San Francisco International Airport specific instructions were received indicating the altitude and air speed to be followed, and essentially the altitude was 16,000 feet and the air speed was 180 knots, which is approximately 200 miles per hour or 3 miles per minute.

[redacted] stated that the rear stairway had been lowered apparently immediately after take-off and communications generally were bad due to the open rear door, and in addition to this it was necessary to be on oxygen approximately one and one-half hours, at which time it appeared that the hijacker had jumped in the vicinity of the Provo, Utah, Airport.

b7C [redacted] stated that the numerous instructions received from the hijacker contained course changes on at least two occasions, and one note indicated that if a chase plane was seen, the hijacker would set a charge which would detonate after he had jumped and before the plane could be landed.

[redacted] stated that the notes indicated generally a terminology of "we this" or "we that" which gave the impression that there were definitely more than one individual involved.

[redacted] stated that the typewritten notes generally were single spaced and some had been typed over and were very difficult to read due to the detail contained.

[redacted] stated it was his impression that the hijacker was possibly a private pilot and was acquainted with flying point to point as would a small plane pilot. He stated that the evening was very clear and lights of various towns were visible en route from San Francisco, California, to the Provo, Utah, area.

[redacted] recalled that in the next to the last note received from the hijacker it stated that "if anyone turned around it was a long fall without a chute."

[redacted] stated an attempt was made to look into the passenger compartment under the cockpit door where there was approximately one-fourth inch space; however, all lights had been extinguished and the door to the lavatory immediately behind the cockpit was open, obstructing the view to the rear.

[redacted] stated that from the time the flight began in Denver, Colorado, until landing at Salt Lake City International Airport [redacted]

[redacted] utilizing the lavatory immediately adjacent to the cockpit briefly on one occasion. [redacted] he had no opportunity to see the hijacker.

[redacted] was interviewed in an upstairs room under the control of United Air Lines, at the Salt Lake City International Airport. The time the interview began was 12:00 midnight.

[redacted] described himself as being [redacted] on United Air Lines Flight 855 from Denver which had been hijacked and diverted to Salt Lake City, Utah. He stated he resided at [redacted] California, [redacted] telephone number 805 [redacted].

b7C

Concerning the activities on the day in question, [redacted] advised he and other members of the flight crew left Los Angeles, California, at 7:00 a.m., Flight 460, United Air Lines, traveled to Sacramento, California; Salt Lake City, Utah; and Denver, Colorado, arriving Denver approximately 12:33 p.m. He advised he and other members of the crew had one hour and fifteen minutes ground time in Denver, and they spent most of this time in the flight office at the terminal.

There was nothing significant which happened during this period which would indicate any later hijacking activities. [redacted] advised at about 2:10 p.m., he went to the flight office of United Air Lines with the other members of the crew to handle some administrative details of the flight. About 2:10 to 2:15 p.m., he boarded Flight 855 prior to departure. He advised there were three [redacted]

[redacted] and [redacted] advised that when he got onto the plane, [redacted] was already aboard and [redacted]. He stated there may have been two or three passengers already aboard the aircraft, in the passenger compartment.

He stated that as he came aboard, the three girls went to the rear of the plane and he went to the cockpit to handle "check-off". He advised also that he then got out of the plane and checked certain items on the outside of the plane and noticed nothing significant.

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b7C He advised at this time the passengers came aboard and that during this period he returned to the cockpit with the other two male members of the flight crew. [redacted] recalled that following passenger loading, they received clearance to start the engines; however, the loading door remained open. He advised that they were ready to leave as the passenger agent came to the loading door with an envelope in his hand. He waved the envelope into the passenger compartment and announced that the envelope had been left behind in the boarding room. The passenger agent asked to whom the envelope belonged, and there was no response.

b7C [redacted] advised that he was observing this through the open cockpit door when he noted a passenger step out of the restroom on the right hand side of the plane looking forward and waved his hand as though he was acknowledging ownership of the envelope. [redacted] advised that [redacted] then went to the passenger agent and indicated that a man in the back was responding. She went to the individual, and he told her that the envelope was his. [redacted] then returned to the passenger agent, got the envelope and took it back to the individual. [redacted] advised he does not recall what immediately followed, but he did see the man go back into the restroom.

b7C He advised the outside door was then closed and the plane started to taxi. At this time one of the girls came to him and said that the man was still in the restroom. [redacted] advised that [redacted] overhearing this report, told her to go back and tell the man to sit down. She then went to the rear and later called on the intercom to report that she had knocked on the door with no response. [redacted] advised that the [redacted] to go back and check, which he did.

b7C [redacted] knocked heavily on the door and within a very few minutes the man came out of the restroom and said "I'm alright." [redacted] told the man he could not stay in the restroom during the takeoff, and the man came out and took a seat in the rear on the right side of the aisle.

b7C [redacted] advised that as he had seen the individual before and now noticed him leaving the restroom, he did notice some difference in the man's appearance but did not pay any particular attention. He did not note the significance of the change. He stated he went back to the cockpit and turned to [redacted] and asked her to ask the man what was in the envelope. [redacted] made the inquiry and returned with the report that the man had said "just papers". He stated that he then related to [redacted] all that had happened, and the plane had taken off.

b7C [redacted] stated that the takeoff was a normal climb and the plane rose to over 3,000 feet and went on cruise power. He advised that about 20 minutes after the takeoff, [redacted] came and advised him that the man had returned to the restroom. He advised shortly thereafter, two passengers came forward to one of the stewardesses to report that they had seen a man in the back with a gun; and they were seated toward the front of the plane. [redacted] then came to the cockpit and indicated that one of the passengers had said he had observed a man in the back of the plane with a grenade and suggested they had better do something about it. [redacted] advised a discussion among the crew then took place; and they finally asked [redacted] out of Los Angeles who was "dead heading" on the flight, to go back to the restroom and check for anything out of the ordinary.

b7C [redacted] did go back and observed the restroom, but found nothing. He then came to the cockpit and reported his findings. About this time they were starting their descent into Grand Junction, Colorado. At this time the Captain asked [redacted] to go back and give the area another check, which he did; and this check was also negative. [redacted] then asked [redacted] to go back and sit next to the unknown passenger who reportedly had the gun. After being there only a few minutes, [redacted] came back to the cockpit and reported he had observed something between the individual's legs which the individual was attempting to cover up.

b7C [redacted] stated that at this time the man pulled a gun and held it on [redacted] and gave him an envelope saying, "Give this envelope to the girl and have her take it to the captain." He advised that [redacted] brought the envelope to the cockpit. [redacted] advised that the elevation was about 14,000 feet; and they announced that they were landing at Grand Junction, Colorado, with a hydraulic failure so as not to alarm the passengers. [redacted] advised that they then called the ground, advised they were landing and asked for law enforcement assistance on the ground.

b7C [redacted] advised that at this time they opened the envelope and noted it was a two page note typed on what appeared to be an electric typewriter. He advised the note made demands and set out instructions that they could keep the note for approximately 30 minutes and then the subject wanted the note back. [redacted] stated the note had been in an envelope marked "hijack instructions". [redacted] recalled that the note told them where to go, San Francisco, California; when to arrive and what to do after takeoff. He advised that [redacted] then wrote a note to the subject that they would go to San Francisco, but that it would be necessary to refuel.

b7C [redacted] advised that passengers were not informed of the activities on board. Before landing at Grand Junction, Colorado, the First Officer announced that Grand Junction could not handle the necessary repairs; and it would be necessary to go to San Francisco, California. The plane then traveled to San Francisco, California, arriving there at 4:15 p.m. [redacted] advised there were no contacts during this period, and the flight was uneventful. [redacted] advised that after landing, [redacted] brought up another envelope which contained instructions as to what to do while on the ground, where to go, how much fuel, where the fuel truck would be parked and how many fuelers would be allowed to handle the fuel, how to unload the baggage and where and limiting the number of baggage handlers to three. The note told of the money demands, parachutes and was in great detail.

b7C [redacted] advised that instructions of the hijacker were radioed into dispatch, and they sat on the ground for approximately three hours fifteen minutes with the passengers aboard while the plane was fueling and the bags unloaded. [redacted] advised the hijacker instructed that the stairs be brought to the front of the plane, and then [redacted] brought in an envelope with more instructions. He advised one of the instructions was to send the passenger from Seat 14B to the cockpit. It was also noted there was a baggage stub in the envelope. This baggage stub was Number 61-32-3, United Air Lines, Denver to Los Angeles.

b7C [redacted] later came to the cockpit to say that the subject wanted to get someone to help the man in Seat 19B bring parachutes, a suitcase and money aboard. [redacted] said the two men then left the plane and brought the items aboard and took them to the rear where the subject was located. He stated he then observed the man check the suitcases for contents. When satisfied, he sent the two men out to get a checked piece of baggage. [redacted] was then told to let everyone off; and she made the announcement, and all deplaned. One stewardess [redacted] also left the aircraft. Five crew members remained which were the five previously described. [redacted] then brought up another note instructing that they taxi to the active runway and take off. They should head east and climb to 14,000 feet. He advised the cabin was to be unpressurized. He stated that when the plane was airborne [redacted] brought another letter which said "Stay at 14,000 and be over Coaldale in 30 minutes. Further instructions to follow." [redacted] advised there were also some warnings about not allowing chase planes.

[] advised they went to Tonapah, Nevada, and later Coaldale as instructed. He stated that as they were traveling, the subject kept demanding to know ground speeds, flight speeds, wind speeds, altimeter settings and sky conditions. He also advised he wanted to be notified "5 minutes before crossing each VOR station." [] advised that they then began to receive cards which looked like flight plans instructing that they go to Wilson Creek and Milford, Utah. b7C He asked for further information on settings, etc. [] advised that about Milford, Utah, the subject opened the aft entry door and let down the aft air stair. He advised that the subject then covered the peep hole in the cockpit door so that it was not possible to observe into the passenger compartment.

[] advised that before the plane arrived at Milford, subject sent the girls into the cockpit with the other crew members; but he, [] was able to observe subject in the passenger compartment due to a slight crack in the door. [] advised he observed the subject put on a jumpsuit and helmet as well as a parachute. He advised b7C that subject put on the parachute as though he was very well schooled in this maneuver. [] advised that the subject wore the chute a long time before the actual jump and after getting himself ready, the subject turned out the lights in the passenger compartment so he could observe the ground. He advised the subject could be seen moving around in the back as he had a flashlight in his hand which he turned on periodically when he wished to make certain observations.

[] advised that on one occasion the subject could not get the intercom to work, and he came to the cockpit door and opened it slightly. He asked for information on wind position and altitude. He indicated that the plane was to be flown to Fairfield, Utah, and that he was to be notified five minutes before arriving over Fairfield. He then advised b7C that [] was to pick up a new flight plan which he had placed on the first row on the right side of the passenger compartment on the seat. [] advised that [] entered the passenger compartment, found the plan, but apparently could not observe the subject due to the darkness. The plan said "Go to Fairfield, Utah, Price and Grand Junction." [] advised he did not see the subject again, but when in the Provo area felt a surge. At this time they concluded the subject had gone.

[] advised that he then went to get the next instructions, and the subject was gone. He advised he did b7C not recall anything further concerning the activity except all of the notes had been returned, that it was obvious to him that the subject knew the airplane and area well. He

advised he did not feel that he could make a positive identification of the subject should he see him at a later time. According to [redacted] the subject is described as follows:

b7C [redacted] advised he could not provide further color data regarding subject's clothing.

b7C

[redacted] advised subject was observed putting on a green jumpsuit and black helmet which had a white mark on the back of the helmet. Subject also had on black gloves when he jumped and possibly boots.

[redacted] pressed the view that subject's voice was higher than normal pitch or disguised.

[redacted] Telephone [redacted] Encino, California, was advised of the identity of Special Agent [redacted] by exhibiting to her credentials. [redacted] advised that she spends a considerable amount of time at her parents' home located at [redacted] Telephone [redacted] Tarzana, California, and can usually be reached there if not at her apartment at Encino, California.

[redacted] advised that she has been employed as [redacted] by United Air Lines since July 3, 1968. [redacted] was an [redacted] aboard United Air Lines Flight 855 and began her trip on this flight at Denver, Colorado, April 7, 1972. [redacted] stated this flight was scheduled to depart Denver, Colorado, at 2:25 P.M., April 7, 1972, and was scheduled for a nonstop flight to Los Angeles, California. [redacted] stated that the usual boarding procedure was being followed when she first noticed subject boarding and he caught her eye inasmuch as he was flashily dressed. The subject went to the back of the aircraft and sat on an aisle seat. During the boarding procedure, a passenger agent entered the airplane and announced that someone had left a manila envelope in the boarding area. The subject left the airplane and apparently was the one who left the envelope as he returned to the plane and his seat with the envelope.

[redacted] stated the subject then went to the blue room (restroom), locked the door and stayed for quite a length of time. [redacted] stated this was reported to the second officer and the officer had to come back and open the door and she recalled hearing the second officer ask the subject what he had in the envelope and he remarked, "Just papers".

[redacted] stated that after the aircraft became air-borne, she began her services for the passengers. At this time, she recalled that several men, whom she considered businessmen, told her that the subject had taken a grenade

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out of a blue case and then she immediately informed the crew members of this incident. She stated that she continued her services for other passengers and that one or two other businessmen approached her and advised her that the subject now had a gun. She states these passengers were sitting in the same row with the subject now had a gun. She stated these passengers were sitting in the same row with the subject and that he had told them to leave that row of seats, which she recalled as the second row from the last row of seats on the right side of the plane. These seats were numbered D, E and F.

b7C [redacted] stated that she believed the subject allowed a woman and a boy to remain on one side of the aisle of this row and that he then moved to the aisle seat. She stated at this time she believed the subject had put on a wig and possibly had been wearing a wig for sometime before he removed the other passengers from his row.

b7C [redacted] stated that she continued her services to the other passengers and that the subject had some time prior to this called [redacted] one of the other stewardesses, and seemingly was giving her written notes that she was carrying to the cockpit. [redacted] whispered to [redacted] on one of her early trips to the cockpit that the subject would not speak and that he was only writing notes or making gestures to her.

[redacted] stated that she recalled when the information was reported to the pilot that the subject had a grenade, the pilot announced that the airplane had developed mechanical trouble and would make a landing at Grand Junction.

[redacted] stated that she never did see a grenade; however, she did see a gun which she described as having a square-type barrel as she was able to look at it from a side view.

b7C [redacted] stated that [redacted] was now carrying all the communications from the subject to the pilot and that she believes the pilot made an announcement that there had been another change in plans and that the airplane was not going to land at Grand Junction. [redacted] stated she believed the pilot made this announcement after he had been advised that the subject had a gun.

b7C [redacted] stated she recalled seeing a portion of a note that [redacted] was carrying to the cockpit and hastily showed it to her. She stated she recalled the words "pistol - hand grenade - pin pulled" and that these words were typed on an envelope.

[redacted] stated that she recalled having glimpses of other notes that [redacted] was carrying from the subject to the cockpit and that these other notes were typewritten and some were in printing or handwriting.

b7C [redacted] stated that her assignment in the aircraft [redacted] was in the coach cabin and that she spent most of her time in this area which was the same area where the subject was seated. She recalled that he wore gloves all of the time and that she believed he put these gloves on after he had given his first instructions to [redacted]

[redacted] stated that she continued her services to the other passengers in the airplane and that [redacted] time was now being spent carrying notes from the subject to the cockpit.

[redacted] stated that when the plane landed at San Francisco, the subject told her to turn off all the lights in the airplane and to go into the cockpit. [redacted] stated that while in the cockpit, she recalls reading a note that gave instructions to return all the other notes that he had written.

b7C [redacted] stated that during the San Francisco stop, all three of the stewardesses on the plane had to sit on the back row with the subject during the landing of the plane. She stated the subject told a person that she now knew to be a prisoner to get the money and the parachutes and to bring them back to him.

[redacted] stated that the last time she saw the subject was when he asked her to open the airplane door to the stairs. [redacted] stated that this indicated to her the subject was acquainted with this type of airplane as the

door to the stairs is sealed by pressure if closed and when in flight. She stated that when she left the rear area of the airplane after she had opened the pressure door that if the door had been closed again, the subject would have to have closed it.

b7C

[redacted] stated that during the time she was opening the door, the parachutes that had been brought to subject had to be moved in order for her to open the door.

She stated that she did not recall seeing the subject talk to anyone at any time other than to [redacted] and that she did not observe him smoking, eating or drinking at any time. [redacted] stated that when all the airline personnel were in the cockpit after being en route from San Francisco that subject had to come to the cockpit door and shout into it for [redacted] to come outside for him to give her another note. She stated the PA system was not working properly in the airplane at this time.

b7C

[redacted] stated that she did not know at what area the subject left the plane; however, the crew members felt a pressure change and that she was with some of the other employees who went back to the rear of the airplane and the stairwell, and after looking around thoroughly could no longer see the subject.

[redacted] stated that she also recalled that the subject carried aboard a blue navy-colored bag that had red piping and he may have possibly carried another bag with him.

She was the [redacted] on UAL scheduled Flight 855 from Denver, Colorado to Los Angeles, California on April 7, 1972. The flight originated at Denver and departed at approximately 2:35 PM. Prior to the departure of the flight a UAL employee brought a large manilla envelope aboard the aircraft and inquired of the passengers as to its ownership. She stated [redacted] stated she located a male passenger who claimed to be the owner. [redacted] then delivered the envelope to that individual who was seated in seat 20D located in the last row on the left side of the aircraft. This passenger eventually was the person responsible for hijacking the UAL aircraft.

b7C

[redacted] stated that after the individual had received the envelope he went into the right rear rest room. She then notified the Captain who advised [redacted] to have the man return to his seat for take off. [redacted] stated she knocked three or four times on the restroom door and asked the man to return to his seat for take off. The individual refused to return to his seat and [redacted] then notified the Captain. The Second Officer then went to the rest room and was successful in having the individual return to his seat.

b7C

[redacted] did not observe the individual prior to his entering the restroom.

[redacted] related that this individual departed the rest room with a suitcase and the manilla envelope. She asked the individual what was in the envelope to which he replied "Just papers".

b7C

Approximately 15 to 20 minutes after take off a passenger from the rear of the plane went to [redacted] and stated "the man in the rear of the plane has a handgrenade".

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b7C

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[redacted] immediately advised the Pilot who in turn notified the passengers through the public address system that the aircraft would be landing at Grand Junction, Colorado due to a hydraulic problem.

b7C

A short time later two passengers advised [redacted] that a passenger in the rear had a gun who had given them a note for [redacted] to give to the Pilot. [redacted] believed this note to have read "grenade pin pulled, pistol".

[redacted] stated an off-duty UAL pilot, whom she did not know, then came forward and provided her with an envelope and stated she was to deliver it to the Pilot. This envelope contained a number of pages of flight instructions and demands which included in part that the plane be diverted to San Francisco where UAL was to have \$500,000.00 in cash and four parachutes available. The envelope also contained one handgrenade pin and a bullet.

The instructions required the Pilot to return all notes to the hijacker. The Pilot advised [redacted] to request the hijacker allow the Pilot to retain the instructions until such time as they were no longer needed as the instructions were too extensive to memorize. The hijacker indicated he was agreeable to this by nodding his head to [redacted]. In addition to nodding his head the hijacker shook his hand containing the handgrenade in a clenched fist style towards [redacted].

b7C

[redacted] stated the aircraft landed in San Francisco at approximately 4:20 PM where the passenger baggage was immediately removed from the plane. After the passenger baggage was unloaded onto the airstrip the hijacker ordered that a Federal prisoner aboard the airplane and a UAL employee leave the airplane to obtain the \$500,000.00 and the parachutes and return them to the aircraft. [redacted] stated the prisoner and UAL employee returned to the aircraft with two flight bags supposedly containing the money and three parachutes, one of which appeared to have opened.

The hijacker also ordered that his luggage from the baggage compartment be brought to him aboard the plane. She described the hijacker's suitcase as medium size and had a large black and green plaid pattern.

b7C She stated subsequent to the baggage being removed and the ransom money and parachutes being delivered, the hijacker gave a note to [redacted] ordering all of the passengers to deplane, stating the stewardesses were to remain aboard. After the passengers had deplaned the hijacker told [redacted] [redacted] she could also leave. The hijacker then handed [redacted] a note to deliver to the pilot ordering the pilot to take off immediately. She estimated the time of take off at approximately 6:30 PM. [redacted] stated she retained this particular note and had put it in her purse.

b7C Approximately 10 minutes after take off at San Francisco the hijacker told [redacted] and [redacted] to go forward and sit directly behind the bulkhead where they remained until approximately 30 minutes prior to the hijacker jumping from the aircraft. At that time the hijacker came forward to the bulkhead and told [redacted] and [redacted] to turn off all the lights in the cabin and then go into the cockpit with the crew.

b7C At this time [redacted] stated the hijacker was dressed in a light olive military style flight suit, a gas mask on his face and a white towel over his head.

A short time prior to the time that it was believed by the crew that the hijacker jumped from the aircraft he provided a note to the pilot containing additional flight instructions which directed the crew to pick up additional notes containing other instructions at various intervals. These notes had been placed on various seats in the cabin of the aircraft.

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b7C Subsequent to [redacted] picking up the second note the crew felt a movement in the aircraft which they believed to have been made by the hijacker when he bailed out of the plane. [redacted] stated their position at that time was in the Provo, Utah, area.

b7C After the movement of the plane was felt [redacted] departed the cockpit and went to the cabin to pick up the additional set of instructions. When she returned to the cockpit she informed the Pilot she could not observe the hijacker in the aircraft. The pilot then instructed [redacted] to return to the area of the second note on the pretense she could not locate it in an attempt to make another observation of the cabin for the hijacker. [redacted] stated she then walked to the rear of the aircraft and determined the hijacker was not in the plane.

The cabin lights were then turned on and a search of the cabin area began by the crew.

b7C [redacted] stated that the Pilot then turned the aircraft towards the Salt Lake City International Airport where they landed.

[redacted] provided the following description of the hijacker:

Because it was reported the hijacker took a drink using a paper cup from the forward water fountain, the contents of the forward waste container was collected.

[redacted] stated that MC COY is a Brigham Young University (BYU) student, is a sky diver, who jumps out of the Alta Airport in Salt Lake City, Utah, on a regular basis. He is a Vietnam veteran, and has served two years in Vietnam; one year of which was as a helicopter pilot.

Approximately three weeks to one month ago, [redacted] and MC COY had a conversation concerning a hijacking of an airplane that had recently taken place. In the discussion of this hijacking, MC COY stated that it would be possible for someone to hijack a plane and get away with it provided he did certain things. One of the things that would be necessary for this person to do would be to have extra parachutes in the plane that could be thrown out while in flight to confuse people. The parachutes would be examined for beepers, and the dummy parachutes would contain the beepers. MC COY also stated that in the recent hijacking, the hijackers did not demand enough money, and that if he were to do it, he would demand at least \$500,000.00.

[redacted] stated that at approximately 9:30 P.M., on the night of April 7, 1972, MC COY's [redacted] name unknown, who lived with MC COY and [redacted] called [redacted] and wanted to know where MC COY was. She wanted to know if MC COY was on a mission of some sort.

He was advised of his rights and presented with a waiver of rights form which he executed.

MC COY claimed he had nothing to do with the hijacking and that he was home at 360 South 200 East, Provo, Utah, with his wife on the evening of April 7, 1972. He argued his privacy was being invaded by having to answer questions regarding his activities and said it was no ones business where he was the previous evening.

MC COY was advised that he fit the description of the hijacker's description and was also a qualified pilot and parachutist. He repeated he did not commit the hijacking but did state that he went out to dinner returning home between 11:00 and 11:30 PM.

MC COY was advised that it was reported that his [redacted] was looking for him on the evening of April 7, 1972 and could not find him and that [redacted] had left home at 8:00 PM and that he had not returned home until approximately 1:30 AM on April 8, 1972. MC COY denied that any of the above events occurred. b7C

Additionally MC COY was told he was reported to have talked about how to successfully hijack a plane whereupon he claimed everyone talked about it and it was nothing unusual.

MC COY advised that he would graduate from Brigham Young University (BYU) at Provo, Utah in August of 1972 and received a degree in law enforcement which he would use to obtain a job with the police department to fly helicopters. In view of his education he warned he was well aware of interrogation tactics and could not be intimidated.

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It is noted that MC COY was located and the interview commenced at the Army Operations Center, Salt Lake City International Airport, Salt Lake City, Utah. After being approached and the foregoing information furnished, MC COY was asked whether he had an automobile, to which he replied that he had a 1969 Volkswagen, which was parked behind a hangar in the vicinity of the Army Operations Office. The Agents and MC COY proceeded to the vicinity of the automobile where it was requested that permission be granted to search his automobile. He was told that Agents had no right to search his automobile unless he so consented. MC COY noted that he was limping as he had injured his right ankle in a skiing accident with a Brigham Young University ski class two to three weeks ago; however, he declined to give the name of the instructor or information relating to the injury other than to state it had been treated and he had been put in an ankle cast at that time by a doctor at the Brigham Young University Health Clinic, Provo, Utah. MC COY reached over to the desk and picked up the Waiver of Rights Form which he proceeded to look at and throw down on the table. He was again asked if he understood his rights and he said he did, having been a law enforcement student at Brigham Young University. The information that he declined to sign the Waiver was written upon it at this time, at which time MC COY picked up the form and read it and again tossed it down on the table.

MC COY refused to comment concerning the hijacking, and while waiting notification and the arrival of the U. S. Magistrate at his office, received and talked with his wife via telephone and called her again. He was continually apprised of his rights, of the availability of the telephone at any time he might desire so that he could employ an attorney. He reiterated on several occasions that he would await his hearing before the U. S. Magistrate. He declined to discuss the details of the hijacking, after participation or any information as to the whereabouts of the money.

The interview was terminated at 8:00 A.M., at which time he left the office in the custody of SA [redacted] and SAC RUSSELL P. CALAME.

A plastic sack containing approximately 40 pounds of currency in various denominations was turned over to the reporting Agent by Special Agent in Charge RUSSELL P. CALAME.

Present at this time was Special Agent [redacted] [redacted] This money was taken to the Agents' room and Special Agents [redacted] and [redacted] were called in to assist in the fine counting of the currency bundles.

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In the process of removing the currency from the plastic bag, a hand grenade was discovered at the bottom of the bag. Also located at the bottom of the bag was a clip containing .45 caliber cartridges.

Special Agent in Charge CALAME took immediate possession of the hand grenade and cartridges, and placed these items in the gun vault.

The first rough count indicated approximately \$501,000 in currency. This estimate was based on the number of whole complete bundles, and an estimate of the number of loose currency bundle straps. These currency bundle straps were in a highly mutilated condition and no attempt was made at this time to piece these straps together in order to preserve the straps for possible fingerprint identification.

A 1969 Volkswagen, motor number 119177108, bearing 1972 North Carolina license L5007, was the subject of a search behind the residence at 360 South 2nd East, Provo, Utah. This search was based on a search warrant issued by the United States District Court, A. M. FERRO, Magistrate, April 9, 1972, at Salt Lake City, Utah. The search commenced at 2:15 p.m. and continued until 4:00 p.m. During the period of the search the following things were noted:

The vehicle was a dark green Volkswagen with a sun roof. The mileage at the time of the inspection was 61861. It was noted the vehicle had a Duro-glass lined rear window, and it bore four 155 X 15 X A's Michelin radial tires. The rear window bore a Brigham Young University (BYU) Security Office parking permit number P2320, issued March 23, 1972. It also bore BYU parking permit B14244 which was due to expire May 31, 1972.

It was noted in inspection of the interior of the vehicle a portion of the Salt Lake City, Utah, Tribune newspaper, dated April 8, 1972, was located on a tray directly under the glove box. This newspaper was opened to page two and had been folded to reveal the story of a hijacked airplane from Denver, Colorado, in which the hijacker was believed to have jumped in the Provo, Utah, area, with \$500,000. This item was retained.

There was also a note in the tray under the glove box indicating RICHARD FLOYD McCOY, JR., has a bank account with the Provo, Utah, Branch of Walker Bank, account number 1243-0018-4117-6670.

Also located was an invoice from the BYU Health Center, dated March 21, 1972, indicating McCOY, student number 068365, had been admitted to the Health Center at 5:10 p.m., on March 21, 1972; and he had been checked by who X-rayed McCOY's right ankle.

A notation was found in the vehicle that McCOY had attended the Army Helicopter School at Fort Rucker, Alabama, date not shown.

A white piece of paper with the note "[redacted]". A second note was found indicating "[redacted]". Papers were located in the vehicle which indicated the Volkswagen was registered to RICHARD FLOYD McCOY, JR., address given as 861 Wimbleton Drive, Raleigh, North Carolina. Also there was a portion of a claim check dated February 18, 1972, from Pascoe Clothiers and Tailors, city not shown. This claim check was for a jacket and showed the name McCOY.

Located and removed from behind the driver's seat on the floor was a cloth bag containing a flight helmet. This item was identified and removed from the vehicle.

Soil samples were also obtained from the floor of the vehicle on the driver's side, from the door jam of the vehicle on the driver's side and from the underside of the fender on the front left portion of the vehicle.

There was nothing further of evidentiary value found in the Volkswagen.

[redacted] was interviewed at the residence of [redacted]. She was advised that she was being interviewed concerning her knowledge of a hijacking of a United Airlines passenger plane en route from Denver, Colorado, to Los Angeles, California, on April 7, 1972. She advised she was aware that her [redacted] RICHARD F. MC COY, JR., had been arrested after being charged with hijacking. [redacted] was advised that she was not being interviewed as a suspect in the hijacking, however, if at any time she wished to terminate the interview, she could do so if she desired.

She advised that RICHARD F. MC COY, JR. is married to [redacted] and [redacted] has been [redacted] at the residence located at 360 South 200 East, Provo, Utah, for about one year.

[redacted] advised she was not surprised when RICHARD MC COY was arrested for the hijacking because he had discussed with her on previous occasions his possible participation in a hijacking. She stated that after the hijacking committed by an individual using the name [redacted] which occurred in the fall of 1971, in the Western part of the United States, RICHARD MC COY had discussed this matter at length in her presence and had analysed that hijacking, commenting that if he had committed that hijacking, he would never have been caught because the FBI was not prepared for that case and that since that time the airlines have utilized "beepers" on the parachutes and have taken other steps to discourage hijackings.

For some time after the [redacted] hijacking, RICHARD MC COY discussed with her a hypothetical hijacking plan including improvements from the COOPER hijacking; such as (1) he indicated he would ask for one-half million dollars, (2) he would utilize his own parachute instead to avoid the use of "beepers," (3) he would not be observed by the pilot or anyone in the cockpit, (4) he would not spend any of the hijack loot for many years because it would be "marked" with a substance that would be visible by use of an ultraviolet

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light, and (5) he would not spend any of the money for many years because he believed he could not be prosecuted after seven years after the crime had been committed.

b7C [redacted] recalled that RICHARD had discussed in general terms a plan for hijacking a plane with a friend of his, [redacted] who works for the Utah Highway Patrol and works with RICHARD MC COY in a unit of the Utah National Guard in Salt Lake City, Utah. She stated she has been present when they have discussed the hypothetical hijacking, and it is her opinion that the conversations were a result of recent news items concerning hijackings, that they talked in general terms concerning this but did not appear to have been planning an actual hijacking.

b7C [redacted] advised she does not recall specifically when and where these discussions were held, but she does recall the two having discussed a hypothetical hijacking in her presence.

[redacted] advised she recalls that about one month ago RICHARD while discussing hijackings advised that he had a "fool proof" hijacking plan and that if she would assist him in the plan he would pay her \$50,000. She stated that he advised her that her participation would consist of picking him up after he parachuted from the plane. [redacted]

b7C [redacted] advised that she was uncertain as to how serious RICHARD was at this time but that she advised that she did not wish to participate in the plan. She stated that at this time he indicated he would hijack a plane from California and parachute from the plane somewhere in Nevada. She stated he did not elaborate on this plan and she did not inquire further into his plan because she did not consider at any time participating in such a venture. She had asked RICHARD what would happen if they got caught, and he stated he felt his plan was "fool proof" but that if he should be caught he would shoot himself rather than be taken into custody. This proposal made by RICHARD was in the presence of RICHARD's [redacted] who indicated that if he was serious she did not "want any part of such a scheme."

With respect to the parachuting activities [redacted] [redacted] as a hobby, [redacted] was asked if she recalled specifically seeing any equipment in their home. She pointed out that about April 4, 1972, she recalled that RICHARD was in his room with the door shut and as she attempted to enter the room RICHARD appeared to be reluctant to let her in. When he finally consented to let her in, she observed that he had a black helicopter type helmet which he had just finished painting black. She recalled having seen this helmet before when it was green in color. RICHARD displayed the helmet to her and asked her what she thought of the color. She recalled that she had no opinion and nothing more was said concerning this matter.

[redacted] was asked if RICHARD had recently had a cast on one of his legs, and she indicated that he had about two to three weeks ago incurred a skiing injury which necessitated a cast being placed on one of his legs from the knee downward. She stated it was a walking cast which he wore for about two weeks, and on either Wednesday, April 5, or Thursday, April 6, she noticed that RICHARD had had the cast removed.

[redacted] was asked if she had knowledge that RICHARD had ever used a hairpiece or fake mustache, and she indicated that she believed he had a hairpiece about the color of his light brown hair that he rarely wore. She stated that he had worn a full brushy mustache until April 6, 1972, when she noticed that he had shaven the mustache off on that date.

With regard to [redacted] activities on Friday, April 7, 1972, she stated that she arose early and left the MC COY residence at about 6:30 a.m. for her job at the Village Inn Restaurant in Provo where she is a waitress. She stated that when she left she assumed that RICHARD and [redacted] were in bed and that they were not up when she arose. She stated she remained at work and did not return to the residence that day until about 3:30 or 4:00 p.m. She stated that neither Mr. or Mrs. MC COY were home at that time and she believed he was at a National Guard meeting because the

previous evening he had advised her he had guard duty on Friday. She stated that [redacted] arrived home from work between 4:00 and 5:00 p.m. and that she [redacted] [redacted] later went out for supper. [redacted] stated that after supper she returned to [redacted] [redacted] She stated she did not wish to comment concerning the whereabouts of [redacted] [redacted] during the evening of April 7, 1972.

b7C [redacted] stated that some time during the evening she heard a news broadcast that a plane had been hijacked and the hijacker was possibly in the Utah area. Her immediate reaction was that RICHARD was involved since he was not home at the time and in view of his having discussed the possibility of participating in a hijacking.

[redacted] advised that about 11:20 p.m. she received a telephone call [redacted] [redacted]. She stated [redacted] indicated concern that RICHARD might have been involved in the hijacking, and she also expressed similar concern. She advised [redacted] that RICHARD had not returned to his residence. She stated that about twenty minutes later [redacted] again telephoned her, and she again advised him that [redacted] had not yet returned.

[redacted] advised that about 12:15 a.m. on Saturday, April 8, 1972, RICHARD MC COY arrived at his residence alone. She stated he was dressed in a suit and had nothing with him except a cup containing a soft drink. She stated she immediately accused RICHARD of his involvement in the hijacking, and he denied he had been involved. [redacted] [redacted] was asked if [redacted] was home at the time, and she stated she did not wish to comment concerning [redacted] [redacted] activities during the night of April 7, 1972. She stated she retired for the night.

[redacted] advised that on Saturday, April 8, 1972, she became aware that RICHARD MC COY was considered a suspect in the hijacking in that Agents of the FBI had appeared at the MC COY residence making inquiries concerning RICHARD.

[redacted] advised that she was aware that RICHARD had been interviewed in Salt Lake City by FBI Agents at the FBI Office. She stated she traveled with [redacted] to Salt Lake City to pick RICHARD up at the FBI Office. During the afternoon of April 8, 1972, after RICHARD left the FBI Office in the Federal Building, he returned to Provo accompanied by his wife, their children and [redacted].

[redacted] stated that immediately upon departing from the Federal Building in Salt Lake City, RICHARD severely reprimanded her for having commented to [redacted] that she suspected that he was involved in the hijacking since he had not returned home the night of the incident. He stated "that loud mouthed [redacted] had notified the FBI" that he suspected he was involved. Upon leaving the Federal Building, prior to returning to Provo, they drove to the National Guard Armory adjacent to the Salt Lake City Airport and RICHARD inquired as to the whereabouts of [redacted]. Upon learning that [redacted] was aboard a helicopter, RICHARD by radio within her hearing told [redacted] "thanks a lot loud mouth," to which [redacted] answered "I don't know what you're talking about." RICHARD then stated "you know what I mean, loud mouth," and [redacted] answered "negative." [redacted] stated that RICHARD later learned that [redacted] was piloting a plane accompanied by U. S. Senator FRANK MOSS.

Upon returning to the MC COY residence at Provo, [redacted] questioned RICHARD concerning his involvement in the hijacking and RICHARD admitted to her that he alone committed the hijacking. He stated to her in the presence of [redacted] that if [redacted] kept "her mouth shut" she would be set, but that "if you say anything to anyone, I will shoot you." She stated that he did not elaborate concerning the hijacking, except he mentioned that he had parachuted out of the plane with a parachute with a "beeper." She stated that he also said that if he could burn the money that he had received from the hijacking, he would do so because he was now so concerned. She stated RICHARD did not indicate where he landed after he parachuted from the plane, and he did not tell her where the money was located.

[redacted] was asked if RICHARD had a handgun of any type and she stated that he did have a black handgun. From her description of a square type barrel rather than a round or pipe type barrel and by diagrams she described the handgun as an automatic type.

When asked why [redacted] might have been involved in the hijacking, if in fact he was involved, she stated that she feels that one reason he might have considered the hijacking was because of the challenge of it, and he was the type of person that wanted to excel in things and would ask for an amount more than anyone had ever asked for. She stated he and his wife have been having marital problems and these problems have involved financial problems.

By communication dated April 8, 1972, the San Francisco Office of the FBI advised that [redacted] furnished the following information voluntarily after having been advised of the personal and official identity of the interviewing Special Agent, as well as after having been advised of his constitutional rights: b7C

[redacted] advised that during 1970, he was serving time for escape at the Deuel Vocational Institute, Tracy, California. On October 6, 1971, he walked away from the above facility. He stated that on April 7, 1972, he was in the process of being extradicted from Denver, Colorado, back to Los Angeles, California, where he was to be reassigned to a correctional facility in California. b7C

[redacted] said that at approximately 2:30 PM, April 7, 1972, he, in the custody of [redacted] Department of Corrections, State of California, boarded a United Air Lines flight in Denver, Colorado, enroute to Los Angeles. He said he and [redacted] were seated in Row [redacted] in the tourist section of the airplane on the left hand side. He advised he and [redacted] and a wheelchair passenger boarded the aircraft before any of the other passengers, and that after all the other passengers had boarded the plane, a stewardess, over the public address system, asked if anyone had lost a manila envelope, at which time a male passenger who was located in the rest room stepped out of the rest room momentarily and advised the stewardess the envelope belonged to him. At that time, the envelope was handed to this individual and he returned to the rest room. b7C

As the plane was getting ready to leave the airport, one of the stewardesses went back to the rest room to ask the above-mentioned individual to come out of the rest room and return to his seat. It appeared the passenger was reluctant to leave the rest room. At that time, a male employee on the airplane came back to the rest room and was successful in getting the above individual to leave the rest room and take his seat, which was in Row 20 on the right side of the plane next to the window. A short time later, the plane became airborne. At that time, [redacted] observed the previously mentioned individual b7C

acting nervously and appearing to be playing with his coat as if he might have a gun underneath it. He said he alerted [redacted] to this individual's activities.

b7C A short time later, according to [redacted] a gray haired man with a mustache, believed to be an airlines employee, came back to the area where this individual, who was subsequently known to be the hijacker, was seated. He engaged the hijacker in conversation, at which time the hijacker motioned with his finger for the gray haired man to return to the front of the plane. A short time later, a male voice announced over the public address system that due to mechanical difficulties with the hydraulic system, the plane would be landing in Grand Junction, Colorado.

[redacted] said he continued to observe the hijacker who would periodically ring the service bell, at which times different stewardesses would come back to the hijacker and be furnished notes by him. He estimated this occurred eight or ten times. Eventually the pilot announced that the plane would not be going to Los Angeles as scheduled but would be going to San Francisco.

b7C [redacted] stated that a short distance out of San Francisco, the pilot announced that the plane would not be going to the normal unloading area as all areas were being utilized. He stated that the plane, after landing, was parked in a position away from the airline terminal. A short time later, a stewardess came back to the area where he and [redacted] were seated and requested that [redacted] as well as the other passenger seated in Row [redacted] move to the front of the plane. She also made this request of a woman and young child seated directly behind [redacted]

b7C Throughout this activity, [redacted] observed the hijacker seated across from him holding a hand granade with the pin removed. After the people around him had been moved to the front of the plane, the hijacker took a seat directly behind [redacted] in Row [redacted]. A short time later, he handed over the back of the seat a note which said "Go up and see the captain". [redacted] said he went up to the front of the plane, at which time the captain advised him he was the one who would get the money.

He said he was also given a baggage claim receipt, number 612333, and that the hijacker requested that a large blue piece of luggage be brought back onto the plane.

At that point, [redacted] and an airlines employee left the plane, retrieved two briefcases, one black and one tan, and a couple of other items believed to be parachutes. They boarded the plane and took the above items to the rest room in the rear of the plane. He and the airlines employee then returned back outside the plane, retrieved the large blue piece of luggage, which was approximately three and one-half feet by three feet, as well as a couple of other pieces of equipment believed to be additional parachutes, and also took these items to the rear of the plane. They then returned to the captain's cabin. A few moments later, he and all the other passengers were allowed to leave the aircraft.

[redacted] said he did not know the hijacker and does not recall ever having seen him before. He did not notice any other individuals whom he believed to be involved in the hijacking.

He described the hijacker as a white male, 34 to 35 years, five feet eight inches to five feet nine inches, 165 to 170 pounds, medium build, wearing a dark wig which came to the eyebrow level and also combed back around over his ears. He was wearing mirror-type sunglasses, dark pants and a dark colored jacket. He was also wearing a fake mustache, had sideburns down to the middle of his face curving toward the mouth about one inch and was squared off. [redacted] believed this individual's hair to be dark brown; stated he was wearing gloves, golf type, black in color, which were open on top with a snap.

May, 1967, was shown as the date of manufacture of the parachute. The parachute, which is in a packed condition, is approximately 8 inches by 16 inches by 6 inches in size and the cover is olive green in color.

The passenger replied that he was familiar with these types of flares as he had used them in Vietnam, and, according to [redacted] the passenger then explained to him how these type of flares were dropped from aircraft utilizing small parachutes.

[redacted] stated that they drove for a few more minutes in silence, and that when they neared 300 South Street in Provo, that his passenger told him to turn west on 300 South, and then told him to turn left again at a street, which number [redacted] could not recall. [redacted] could recall, however, that he pulled over to the curb at the third house south on 300 South on the west side of the street and let his passenger out, at which time the passenger thanked him and put a \$5 bill on the dashboard of his vehicle and told him that that would handle his gas and time. [redacted] stated he cannot recall whether or not a car was parked in front of the residence, whether there was a post lamp in front of the residence, or even if the passenger, in fact, went into the house, as he drove away as soon as the individual got out of the vehicle, and he, [redacted] never looked back.

[redacted] stated that he recognized all of the photographs of RICHARD FLOYD MC COY on Monday, April 10, 1972, specifically the photographs on the front pages of the Monday morning Salt Lake Tribune and the Monday evening Provo Daily Herald. He stated that the individual depicted as MC COY in these photographs was positively the same individual that he drove from the Hi-Spot Drive-in in Springville to the residence south of 300 South Street in Provo. In addition, [redacted] was exhibited a polaroid photograph of an individual dressed in a military fatigue-type uniform bearing the name MC COY on the

right side of his chest, which individual was standing against a cinder block wall, and [redacted] stated that this individual also was the same person to whom he had given the ride. b7C

[redacted] advised that this individual was dressed in dark pants and wearing what appeared to be older dirty shoes and a dark coat, color unrecalled. He stated that the individual's hair had been neat and that he had no mustache or glasses.

The binding did not re- b7C lease on the toe portion, but the heel portion of the binding did release. It appeared to be a natural fall rather than a deliberate type of fall and MC COY seemed to experience a genuine pain from the injury which was sustained to his leg.

MC COY said for about during the first five minutes following the injury that he thought his leg was probably broken, but a few minutes later he indicated it was probably not broken; then again the pain seemed to increase and he still thought it might have been broken.

MC COY was taken to the Health Center at BYU by a female ski instructor, name unknown.

The next night, MC COY called [redacted] as [redacted] had instructed him to do, and reported on his condition. MC COY said an X-ray had been taken and his leg had not been broken but had been sprained. About three b7C days later, MC COY came to [redacted] office and his leg was in a cast. MC COY said he was to keep his leg in a cast for about four days. [redacted] has not seen MC COY since that time.

[redacted] seemed to always drive his own car, a Volkswagen, rather than going by bus with the class on their b7C ski trips.

He advised that he is acquainted with RICHARD MC COY, who is a student at Brigham Young University and who is also a member of the Utah National Guard. He advised that MC COY is a pilot and can fly both helicopters and small planes and is an experienced skydiver.

He advised that MC COY has never discussed with him the hijacking of any airplanes, but he has been in groups; namely, the Alta Jump Club which meets at the airport in Sandy, Utah, in which they have jointly discussed the mistakes that individuals have made in trying to hijack previous planes.

He advised that he does not feel that MC COY would be a good suspect in this case in view of the fact that approximately three weeks ago, MC COY broke his ankle and has his right foot in a cast. He advised that the last time he talked with MC COY was the past Wednesday and that he went over on Thursday evening to MC COY's residence which is in Provo, Utah, and noticed that his car was in the driveway, but MC COY was not at home. He advised that he has had no contact with MC COY since that time and that MC COY has definitely never discussed with him the possibility of hijacking an airplane and attempting to get money out of the airlines.

Prior to [redacted] leaving on this trip, McCOY had asked to borrow his skis and he told McCOY he could use them; however, McCOY did not borrow them and when at his house McCOY advised [redacted] he had rented a pair of skis and had broken his ankle. He stated McCOY was wearing a cast and he wondered why he wanted the parachute but McCOY stated he and a friend were going to jump and he, [redacted] assumed McCOY was going to pilot the plane which he is capable of doing. b7C

McCOY asked him how much money it would take for him to commit a crime and after they got up in the millions he told McCOY he would not be interested in committing a crime at any price. He advised that McCOY did not say how much it would take to cause him to commit a crime.

[redacted] stated after giving this considerable thought he now believes, even though he and McCOY were good friends, that since he would not be interested in committing a crime at any cost this was probably the reason McCOY never discussed it with him.

Utah Searchers Find No Trace of Jet Hijacker

Provo Police Chief Says There's Suspect in Case, FBI Won't Confirm It

BY CHARLES HILLINGER

PROVO, Utah—A massive search for a hijacker who parachuted from a jetliner with \$500,000 was suspended here Saturday amid conflicting reports there was a suspect in the case.

"There is a lead in the case . . . It involves a suspect," said Jesse Evans, police chief of this town of 55,000. He refused to elaborate.

While not categorically denying the police chief's cryptic comment, Russell Calame, special agent in charge of the FBI's Salt Lake City office, said only: "There is no suspect in custody."

Calame, whose agency is directing the manhunt, said the search was being shifted to "other areas," which he refused to identify.

But the state highway patrol revealed late Saturday that the FBI had a house in Provo staked out. "They have a suspect in mind," a highway patrol officer said, "but they may just be fishing in the dark."

In Los Angeles, Charles Novak, regional public relations manager for United Air Lines, said the crew of the hijacked plane Saturday was asked to examine photographs of "a number of men" provided by the FBI. He said he did not know if they identified any of the men in the pictures.

All Roadblocks Lifted

State and local police lifted all roadblocks around Provo at mid-morning, search flights had ended by afternoon and two carloads of FBI agents had returned to their headquarters in Salt Lake City before dusk.

Despite the confusion, there was general agreement among federal, state, county and local law enforcement officers and Air Force helicopter pilots that Saturday's search over the marshy lake area near Provo had drawn a blank.

There was some speculation that information about a possible suspect might have been obtained by investigators working elsewhere but this could not be confirmed.

"We found no human footprints and no signs of anything but there," Provo's police chief told newsmen.

And Blain Wilson, a Utah Highway Patrol trooper, commented: "Everybody feels it's a hopeless situation. The guy had any number of

ways of getting out of here. He could have walked out easily by now."

The search area is ringed by snow-capped mountains 10,000 feet high that straddle a long, flat, relatively barren valley 35 miles long and two to five miles wide which runs into Utah Lake. The valley has few trees and no utility lines, which would have made it an excellent drop zone for a parachutist worried about getting snagged during a nighttime descent.

Minutes after the pilot of the commandeered United Air Lines Boeing 727 reported the hijacker had hailed out east of Provo, scores of law enforcement men swarmed into the area.

Beeper Signals

Two helicopters from Hill Air Force Base, 70 miles to the north, were dispatched to drop flares over the suspected drop area. The arrival of the choppers so soon after the rise to one police report that a "mystery helicopter" might have whisked the skyjacker away.

Police also reported beeper signals had been picked up from a mudflat about eight miles east of Provo. The signals were believed transmitted from an electronic device planted in each of the parachutes demanded by the hijacker in San Francisco Friday afternoon.

But the parachute and the beeper device were not found Saturday and the mystery was further compounded by UAL pilot Jerry Hearn, who said the hijacker might have made the 14,000-foot leap from the plane in his own parachute.

Hearn told a news conference in Los Angeles that the skyjacker seemed to have excellent knowledge of flying and jumping and might have been a pilot.

Travel Problems

The Utah Highway Patrol, the local sheriff's department and Provo police set up roadblocks on all highways. Cars traveling north to Salt Lake City or south to Las Vegas were closely screened. All slender males 5 foot 7 inch—the description of the hijacker — were questioned and their luggage searched.

The roadblocks and searches created a problem for thousands of travelers heading to Salt Lake City for the annual conference of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Highway patrol officers said the tieup of travelers was a factor in removing the roadblocks.

The blockade was called off at 9:30 a.m.

While the manhunt was under way in Utah, the FBI and the Army continued their search in southern Washington for "D. B. Cooper," the man who parachuted from a hijacked jetliner last Thanksgiving eve with \$200,000 in extortion money. The search for Cooper was suspended March 12 and resumed Friday, the same day "T. Johnson" carried out his \$500,000 hijacking plot under strikingly similar circumstances.

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Parachutes Over Utah; Frees 90 in S.F. After Money Is Paid

A hijacker, armed with a pistol and a hand grenade, commandeered a United Air Lines jetliner Friday, collected \$500,000—the largest ransom ever paid in an American sky-jacking—and then parachuted from the plane over Provo, Utah.

The hijacker, described as mustached with a dark complexion, took over the Boeing 727 a few minutes after it left Denver for Los Angeles. He listed himself as A. T. Johnson.

He forced the plane to fly to San Francisco, where he obtained \$500,000 in small denominations and

four parachutes in return for the release of 89 passengers and a stewardess.

The plane took off 3½ hours later, tracked by two U.S. Air Force F-106 Delta Daggers, and flew 600 miles east to Provo, where the hijacker bailed out of a rear compartment door.

Federal, state and local law enforcement officers swarmed into the freezing, mountainous jump area to launch a search for the man. Roadblocks were posted at all major highways. His parachutes had been equipped with beeper devices by authorities.

Radio signals from the hijacker's parachute — bugged with a concealed transmitter — were picked up early today in a mudflat between Provo airport and Utah Lake.

The tension-filled extortion plot was reminiscent of that of the infamous "D. B. Cooper," who extorted \$200,000 and parachuted from a hijacked Northwest Airlines jet into a rugged area of the state of Washington last Thanksgiving eve. He was never apprehended.

Passengers released from the hijacked plane in San Francisco described the hijacker as a caucasian man in his late 20's. He was wearing tinted glasses.

The hijacker took over the airliner a few minutes after it left Denver on

flight 885 to Los Angeles. The flight had originated in Newark, N.J.

Air Force Lt. Robert E. Mittendorf, 25, said the hijacker had been sitting next to two men in the rear of the plane.

Mittendorf said the hijacker "pulled a gun on one of them and gave the other man a note," apparently the first of many delivered to the pilot. Other passengers and a stewardess said the man also carried a hand grenade.

Sandra Wilkinson, 25, a UAL stewardess who was returning from a Colorado ski vacation as a passenger aboard the plane, said the hijacker relayed his instructions to the pilot with pretyped notes which he took from a manila envelope and gave to a stewardess.

She said most of the passengers were unaware of the hijacking until the plane landed in San Francisco and the captain announced, "We have some people aboard who want some money from the airline."

A UAL spokesman, Mardy Leaver, said there was "no panic on the part of the passengers . . . all seemed relatively cool."

He described the hijacker doing the negotiating as "very terse, very specific and very businesslike."

The plane taxied to a remote runway by the San Francisco Bay and for the next three hours the hijacker relayed his elaborately detailed pre-typed instructions for refueling, removing the baggage and loading the ransom and the parachutes.

A convict in custody of a correctional officer aboard the plane became a pawn in the ransom. The convict, William R. Coggin, 21, of Sacramento, was being transported to San Quentin Prison.

'See Captain'

"A half hour after landing," Coggin said later, "the hijacker handed me a note saying 'Go see the captain.'"

Coggin said the captain, G. D. Hearn of Culver City, told him he was to go outside and bring in the ransom money—packed in two suitcases and left outside the aircraft.

Deputy sheriffs, sky marshals and FBI agents formed a distant perimeter around the jet, which sat on a north-south runway with its nose pointed toward the terminal and its tail toward San Francisco Bay.

FBI sharpshooters with high-powered rifles fitted with telescopic sights took up positions on the roof of the UAL maintenance building.

After the money and parachutes were loaded aboard the plane, the passengers and one stewardess were allowed to disembark. Sixty-six passengers immediately were interviewed by FBI agents and then flown to Los Angeles.

Because of Coggin's role in the exchange, United Air Lines had believed for a time that two or three hijackers were involved in the caper.

Easterly Course

After Coggin and the other passengers were released, the plane took off and headed on an easterly course.

One hour out of San Francisco, the pilot opened a door at the rear of the plane presumably to permit the hijacker to bail out.

FBI agents and airline officials mistakenly announced that the man had parachuted east of Tonopah, Nev., about 300 miles north of Las Vegas. They later corrected the report, saying they misunderstood a message radioed by the pilot.

At approximately 10:10 p.m., radar observers in Utah plotted a course change. The jet, which had been heading north

toward Salt Lake City, veered east.

Utah State Highway Patrol trooper Bob Van Iep-eren said the heading would take the craft over the Provo, Utah, area, a region of "some rugged mountains and flat desert."

Seven minutes after the course change, the pilot radioed that the hijacker had bailed out.

About 70 sheriff's and highway patrol cars converged on the area, about nine miles southeast of Provo airport. Military and civilian helicopters were rushed into the jump area and the FBI set up a command post in Provo.

A Utah highway patrolman said much of the area is rugged and blanketed by snow but "there are good roads where a person

could go," he added, naming U.S. 50 and State 6.

Temperatures were expected to drop below freezing overnight.

In Denver, a United spokesman said the airline had used the Federal Aviation Administration profile of characteristics of potential hijackers, but reportedly employed no other special security precautions for passengers boarding there.

In addition to the pilot, the other five crew members aboard the plane after it left San Francisco also are from Southern California.

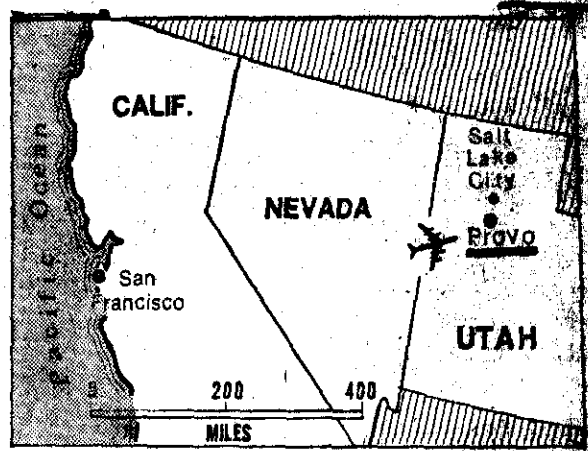

Chutist seized in \$500,000 hijack

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — FBI agents arrested an amateur skydiver and law enforcement student Sunday for the hijacking of an airliner in which \$500,000 was paid to ransom a United Air Lines jet's 91 passengers.

The FBI would not say if the ransom had been recovered.

The suspect, Richard Floyd McCoy Jr., 29, a combat helicopter pilot in Vietnam who once taught Sunday school for the Mormon Church, was arrested as he prepared to leave home for a Sunday drill with his National Guard unit.

FBI agents dug up the yard of McCoy's modest

brown brick home without finding the half-million dollars in cash which the hijacker picked up in San Francisco last Friday before he bailed out of the airliner near Provo.

However, they seized three big boxes, a small box and two brown suitcases they said "contain evidence" from the home and

took it to Salt Lake City FBI headquarters.

Agents in Provo later answered "no comment" when asked if the ransom money had been recovered.

McCoy, married and the father of two, was arraigned before a U.S. magistrate and held on charges

of air piracy, which could bring a death sentence.

The FBI complaint said McCoy told Utah Highway Patrolman Robert Van Ieperen three weeks ago that it "would be possible for someone to hijack a plane by taking his own parachute along." He also told the patrolman that "if he were to hijack a plane he would ask for half a million bucks."

The FBI said it had compared the hijacker's notes with Army records signed by McCoy and found the handwriting "identical." A passenger aboard the jet who sat near the hijacker identified a picture of McCoy as the man who commandeered the plane after it took off from Denver on a scheduled flight from Newark, N.J., to Los Angeles.

The skyjacker jumped from the rear of the Boeing 727 near Provo about 11:30 p.m. Friday. A massive search for the

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muddy fields there failed to find any trace of him.

McCoy told the U.S. magistrate he had no income except his \$240 a month GI benefits and what he earned with the National Guard. The only comment he would make to reporters as he was taken before the magistrate was: "It's embarrassing, let's face it."

The suspect, who has thin brown hair, sideburns and blue eyes, spoke softly answering the magistrate's questions. He asked for a court-appointed attorney. A hearing was set for April 19.

McCoy was described by persons who knew him as quiet and reserved. A fellow student in his police administration class at Brigham Young University said he "wanted to make his dent on the world by uncovering organized crime."

A pupil in his Sunday school class said "all he ever talked about was sin."

A casual conversation with patrolman Van Ieperen about skyjacking, and the concern of his sister-in-law over his absence from home last Friday evening turned suspicion on McCoy, according to the FBI.

Van Ieperen said McCoy talked about how a successful hijack could be pulled off. Last Friday, when the hijack drama was unfolding over the Western skies and in San Francisco, McCoy's sister-in-law telephoned the patrolman, saying McCoy was not home and she was "scared to death" because he had tried to enlist her in a hijacking scheme.

BILL DAUSE, instructor at a skydiving center near Salt Lake City, said McCoy was "a very nice guy, quiet and likeable." He said he was not a very good parachutist.

McCoy was accused of hijacking the United plane over Colorado Friday and forcing it to land in San Francisco. The hijacker, who was carrying two guns, a grenade and plastic explosives, allowed the passengers to leave the plane after the airline paid \$500,000 ransom. Then he forced the pilot to fly over Provo where he bailed out.

McCoy was wearing Army fatigues when arrested at his home near the BYU campus.

A native of Raleigh, N.C., McCoy has been a student off and on for the past 10 years and is currently enrolled full-time at BYU.

THE FBI affidavit disclosed new details of the sky drama. It said one of a dozen or more notes the hijacker sent the plane crew threatened that if he saw any chase planes he would set a plastic explosive to blow up the plane after he jumped.

Another note said that if either of the stewardesses or anybody in the plane crew watched him in the cabin "it would be a long fall without a parachute."

Air Force planes did follow the jetliner, and the co-pilot watched the hijacker don a jump suit before leaping.

The passenger who identified the picture of McCoy as the hijacker was William R. Coggin, 21, a California state prisoner being returned to California by a guard. He was used by the hijacker to carry the ransom money and four military parachutes aboard the plane in San Francisco.

THE BLINDS were drawn in the McCoy home Sunday. The children were playing outside in the morning, but were taken indoors when newsmen arrived.

"He was a real kind person," said Mrs. Cluff's husband, Norm.

Amateur Skydiver Is Arrested

Special to The Herald-Examiner

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah — Federal Bureau of Investigation agents have recovered \$449,970, a parachute, a helmet and a pistol from the home of Richard F.

McCoy Jr., 29, a Vietnam veteran jailed in the \$500,000 ransom hijacking of a United Airlines jetliner, it was reported today. An FBI spokesman said the money and other items were un-

covered yesterday during a search of the premises of McCoy at 360 S. 200 E. St., Provo, Utah.

The money was found "in a cardboard box" at the home, according to the FBI.

The cardboard box containing the money, and pistol were turned over to Magistrate A.M. Ferro in Salt Lake City.

FBI agents spent most of yesterday searching in and around the Provo house and were observed taking out a large cardboard box and two black suitcases.

The FBI submitted a list of things uncovered from the home to the U.S. Magistrate which they said included:

- A pistol, holster and clothing, which were in the box with the money.

- A green military-type flight suit with two aerial flare cartridges in the pockets, and a second flight suit.

- A blue and white parachute with red trim and a black parachute harness.

- Two helmets, one crash-type, and one military jump style.

- Two electric typewriters and a brown striped sport coat.

- One green military canvas bag.

McCoy, once a combat helicopter pilot in Vietnam and an amateur skydiver, was arrested at the house without incident early yesterday.

He was charged with air piracy in the hijack of a United Airlines 727 jetliner over Colorado Friday. The jet was commandeered to San Francisco after the skyjacker demanded \$500,000 as ransom for the 91 persons aboard.

McCoy, majoring in law enforcement at Brigham Young University, was seized at his modern, brown brick home as he was preparing to leave for Sunday drill with his National Guard unit.

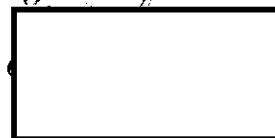

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FBI agents searched the home and dug up the back yard looking for the \$500,000 in cash which the hijacker picked up in San Francisco before he bailed out of the United Air Lines jet near Provo.

After digging through a compost pile in the back yard, the agents left the home, saying the ransom had not been found and "the search is still on" for it.

McCoy was arraigned before a U.S. magistrate and held on air piracy charges, which could bring a death sentence.

He was described by persons who knew him as a quiet, reserved person. A fellow-student in his police administration class at Brigham Young University said he "wanted to make his dent on the world by uncovering organized crime."

A casual conversation with a friend about skyjacking, and the concern of his sister-in-law over his absence from home last Friday evening turned suspicion on McCoy, according to the FBI.

The friend, a Utah highway patrolman, said McCoy talked about how a successful hijack could be pulled off. Last Friday, when the hijack drama was unfolding over the western skies and in San Francisco, McCoy's sister-in-law telephoned the same patrolman saying McCoy was not home and she was "scared to death" because he had tried to enlist her in a hijacking scheme.

During his brief appearance before U.S. Magistrate Ferro,

McCoy was quiet and appeared calm. His only remark to newsmen as he faced the charges of pulling off the biggest airline ransom hijack in history was: "It's embarrassing, let's face it."

The suspect is married and the father of two.

The FBI affidavit disclosed new details of the sky drama. It said one of a dozen or more notes the hijacker sent the plane crew threatened that if he saw any chase planes he would set a plastic explosive to blow up the plane after he jumped.

Another note said that if either of the stewardesses or anybody in the plane crew watched him in the cabin "it would be a long fall without a parachute."

Learning this, the hijacker released the flight's 85 passengers and demanded the maps and weather information for a

flight toward Miami, saying he personally would pick up the material at the bottom of the ramp.

All but \$30 of \$500,000 Hijack Ransom Found

FBI Agents Recover \$499,970, Gun and Parachute at Suspect's Home in Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—All but 30 of the half-million dollars paid to the hijacker of a United Air Lines 727 jet has been recovered, the FBI told a U.S. magistrate Monday.

The FBI said it found the \$499,970, a gun and parachute at the home of Richard Floyd McCoy Jr., 29, of Provo, Utah. McCoy has been charged with air piracy in the Friday hijacking.

A cardboard box containing the money, a blue and white parachute, a pistol with holster and other items was presented as evidence obtained from warrants used in a search of McCoy's rented home in a neatly kept Provo neighborhood. Among the items taken but not listed was a

fake hand grenade, the FBI said.

Agents spent most of Sunday afternoon searching the brick house and digging in the yard and were seen taking a large cardboard box and two black suitcases from the premises.

FBI officials in Washington refused to allow comment on the recovered money, but it was learned that it took agents most of Sunday night to count the \$499,970 and that the FBI was required to present a list of evidence to the magistrate before making a public statement.

The box weighed an estimated 40 pounds and contained more than 7,000 bills.

the hijacker bailed out over Provo late Friday night and agents centered their search for clues in a small area about four miles west of McCoy's home. The FBI said Monday the hijacker landed in an area five minutes by car from the McCoy residence.

McCoy, an amateur skydiver, was described by his parachute instructor as being only mildly expert at the sport and he had never jumped at night.

The FBI has not disclosed how it believes the hijacker slipped out of the grassy area near the Provo airport and Utah Lake where agents and hundreds of state and local lawmen concentrated their search. The area was sealed off almost immediately after the crew radioed about the bailout.

McCoy, a Vietnam veteran, a Utah National Guard helicopter pilot and former Mormon Sunday school teacher, was arrested Sunday morning as he was preparing to leave for weekend military drills.

A close friend, Robert Van Ispere, a Utah Highway patrolman and guard buddy whose statements to the FBI were reported to have led agents to McCoy, said Sunday McCoy had been at guard drills all day Saturday.

United Air Lines President Edward E. Carlson expressed satisfaction Monday with the speedy capture of the suspect. He said, "United Air Lines is grateful for the efficient work of the Federal Bureau of Investigation." He also praised the "cool-headed and efficient conduct" of crew members during "the difficult situation."

McCoy, a 29-year-old helicopter pilot and skydiving enthusiast, appeared before U.S. Dist. Judge Willis W. Ritter, who ordered him to stand trial beginning June 26.

McCoy was arrested at his home in Provo, Utah, two days after a skyjacker took \$500,000 and bailed out near there. He is charged with air piracy and faces a maximum penalty of death.

Jury Convicts Utah Hijacker

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Richard Floyd McCoy, a Vietnam veteran and former Sunday school teacher, was found guilty Thursday night of air piracy in the hijacking of a United Air Lines jet from which he parachuted with \$500,000 ransom money.

The six-man, six-woman U.S. District Court jury delivered its verdict shortly before midnight.

McCoy, a 29-year-old law enforcement student at Utah's Brigham Young University, could receive 20 years to life in prison.

McCoy's wife, Karen, broke into tears when the verdict was read. McCoy appeared calm.

No defense testimony disputed facts laid out in nearly four days by more than 30 prosecution witnesses and 50 pieces of evidence.

Prosecution witnesses linked McCoy to the April 7 hijacking of the United Air Lines flight from Denver to Los Angeles. The plane was diverted to San Francisco and returned to Utah, where the hijacker bailed out over Provo.

The plane's passengers were let off the plane at San Francisco. McCoy was arrested at his home two days after the hijacking.

Skyjacker Gets 45 Years in Prison

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—

Former Green Beret Richard P. McCoy Jr., 29, was sentenced to 45 years in federal prison Monday for hijacking a jetliner and parachuting with \$500,000 ransom.

Sentence was imposed by U.S. District Judge Willis Ritter after a jury convicted McCoy two weeks ago on one count of air piracy. The judge made no comment on the case.

In a plea for clemency, McCoy noted that as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam he was decorated for heroism. "I hope you take consideration of my past record," he told the court.

The FBI said he hijacked a United Air Lines jetliner on April 7 while it was on a flight from Chicago to San Francisco. Agents said he jumped from the plane while it was over Provo, Utah, where he lived.

McCoy was taken into custody at his home two days after the hijacking, and just about all of the ransom was recovered.

The defendant was a Mormon Sunday school teacher and a police science major at Brigham Young University in Provo.

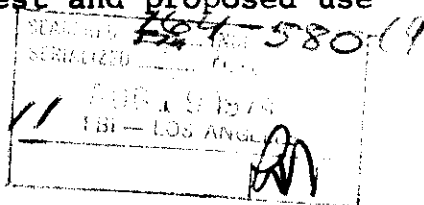

Bail-Out Skyjacker Takes to**Garbage Truck for Prison Escape**

LEWISBURG, Pa. (AP) — A convicted skyjacker who once bailed out of a jetliner with \$500,000, and three other inmates escaped from a maximum security prison on Saturday by crashing a garbage truck through a gate.

The four were still at large Saturday night.

Police said they were armed with an automatic pistol and possibly knives.

The convicted skyjacker, Richard F. McCoy Jr., is a former Mormon Sunday school teacher who entered Brigham Young University as a law enforcement major after he finished a tour of duty as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam.

McCoy was sentenced to 45 years for air piracy after he was convicted in the April 1972 hijacking of a United Airlines jet. The Boeing 727 was commandeered by a man with a hand grenade after the jet stopped in Denver on a Newark-to-Los Angeles flight.

The plane was diverted to San Francisco where the money and parachutes were delivered and the passengers were allowed to leave. The plane took off on a zigzag course over the Northwest and the hijacker bailed near Provo, Utah.

Three days later, McCoy was arrested in the Provo bungalow where he lived with his wife and two children.

Skyjacker Hunted In Swamp

COVE CITY, N.C. (UPI) — An escaped sky-jacker is believed hiding in a snake-infested swamp near Cove City, and the mayor — who is a distant cousin of the fugitive — thinks police will have a hard time catching him.

“It’s like throwing a rabbit into a briar patch — it’s like home to him,” said Cove City Mayor Charles McCoy. “Most of the FBI seem to think he’s already out of the area. I’d bet my pants on it. I might lose them, but I bet I wouldn’t.”

McCoy said fugitive Richard Floyd McCoy, a fourth or fifth cousin and a convicted airline hijacker who crashed out of the federal penitentiary in Lewisburg, Pa., last Saturday with three other convicts in a garbage truck, had roamed the thickly wooded swamp since boyhood.

McCoy said his fugitive cousin knew the swamp so well “he could tell you which way the water runs in which ditch or stream.”

As a boy, the mayor said McCoy “used to go into the swamps with his brother just to see who could catch the most snakes barehanded and pop their heads off.”

The mayor said he did not know why McCoy, 31, came to the area except that “his wife and two children live here and his mother lives here and his father in Raleigh.”

McCoy, the fugitive, was convicted two years ago of hijacking a United Air Lines jetliner and parachuting into the night over the Utah mountains with a ransom of \$500,000, which was later recovered. He drew a 45-year prison term.

Hijacker Dies a Mystery Man

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — Richard Floyd McCoy, a war hero, Sunday school teacher and airline hijacker—probably will remain a mystery forever to those who knew him in Provo, Utah.

McCoy was shot to death by FBI agents in a Saturday night gunfight here.

As a 29-year-old Brigham Young University student in 1972, McCoy hijacked a United Air Lines jet on a Newark-to-Los Angeles flight and bailed out with \$500,000 over his hometown of Provo.

Agents said McCoy had used a grenade to commandeer the plane after a stop at Denver. The plane was diverted to San Francisco, where the \$500,000 ransom was paid, passengers were allowed to leave the plane and parachutes were put aboard. The pilot then was ordered to fly a zigzag course over the Northwest, and McCoy bailed out.

He was arrested three days later and all but \$30 of the money was recovered.

McCoy and three other prisoners escaped Aug. 10 from the federal prison at Lewisburg, Pa., where he was serving a 45-year sentence for air piracy. FBI agents said he was also wanted in connection with a North Carolina bank robbery a few days after the escape.

Those in Provo who knew him in 1972 reacted with disbelief after he was arrested on the air piracy charge.

"He is a real kind person," North Cluff, a neighbor, told newsmen then.

Cluff's wife, Jessica, agreed: "I can't believe he would do such a thing."

A handful of acquaintances, most of them from the McCoy's ward in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, comforted McCoy's wife, Karen, throughout the day following his arrest.

McCoy, father of two children, had served twice in Vietnam as a Green Beret and was studying law enforcement at BYU at the time of the hijacking. His arrest baffled the conservative church campus.

Some students criticized the news media for playing up the fact that McCoy was a BYU student and a Mormon.

Students in a Sunday school class that he once taught described him as kind. "He was so sociable—such a nice person," Norma Morgan, a neighbor and member of the McCoy's church ward, said.

At his trial, only four witnesses appeared in his defense. Each said they had known the slim, slightly balding McCoy four years before in Germany when he was president of a church congregation of about 40 members.

A former Mormon mission president in Germany, Elder Orville Gunther of American Fork, Utah, characterized McCoy as "highly regarded for his honesty . . . known as peaceful and nonviolent."

McCoy, 31, was shot to death Saturday in Virginia Beach when he pulled a gun and began firing after agents had identified themselves, the FBI said.

Arrested in the same quiet, middle-class neighborhood was Melvin Dale Walker, 34, who was in the FBI's 10-most-wanted list and one of the men who escaped from prison with McCoy.

John Coneys, a spokesman for the FBI, said that McCoy had been killed as he entered a house that he and Walker had rented near the Virginia Beach oceanfront.

Coneys said the federal agents and local men had had the house staked out for two days after receiving a tip that the two men occasionally stayed there.

McCoy and Walker arrived at the house about 11:30 p.m. Saturday, unaware that FBI agents were inside, Coneys said. McCoy went to the front door and Walker drove away from the house to survey the neighborhood.

"McCoy opened the front door and at that point an agent inside identified himself and told him to hold it and then to come in," Coneys said.

"After about a split second he pulled his revolver. He got one shot off and the agent returned fire. It blasted him right out the front door."

Coneys said McCoy's shot hit a wall inside the house. Before he was able to fire again he was struck by a single shotgun blast.

Walker was driving back to the house but took off at high speed when he heard the shooting, Coneys said.

"Two units pulled him over at gunpoint," Coneys said. "He had two loaded weapons in the car, but he chose to surrender."

Agents said an arsenal of rifles and pistols was found at the house.

Escaped Skyjacker Killed in FBI Raid

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — FBI agents raided a home in a quiet middle class neighborhood late Saturday night, captured one of the nation's 10 most-wanted criminals and killed a prison escapee who two years ago skyjacked an airliner and bailed out with \$500,000 over the Utah desert.

The skyjacker, Richard Floyd McCoy, 31, was shot and killed when he pulled a gun and began firing after agents identified themselves, the FBI said.

Arrested was Melvin Dale Walker, 35, who was on the agency's 10-most-wanted list and had escaped with McCoy from the federal prison at Lewisburg, Pa., in August.

FBI spokesman John Coneys said McCoy, a former Mormon Sunday school teacher who served as a Green Beret in Vietnam, was killed as he entered a house he and Walker had rented near the Virginia Beach oceanfront.

Coneys said the federal agents and Virginia Beach police had had the house staked out for two days after receiving a tip that the two men were occasionally staying there.

McCoy had attended Brigham Young University as a law enforcement major. The former Green Beret, who flew a helicopter in Vietnam, was sentenced to 45 years in prison for the April 1972 skyjacking of a United Air Lines jetliner.

Agents said McCoy used a grenade to commandeer the plane, on a flight from Newark, N.J., to Los Angeles, after a stop in Denver. The plane was diverted to San Francisco where \$500,000 in ransom was paid, passengers were allowed to leave the plane and parachutes were placed on board. The pilot was then ordered to fly a zigzag course over the Northwest and McCoy bailed out near Provo, Utah.

McCoy, who is married and the father of two children, was arrested three days later at his rented Provo bungalow and all but \$30 of the ransom money was recovered.

[redacted] stated that he was the U. S. Coast Guard pilot who piloted the Coast Guard C-130 chase plane which followed the United Air Lines (UAL) 727 which was hijacked. [redacted] advised he is stationed at the U. S. Coast Guard Air Station, San Francisco International Airport.

[redacted] advised that once the hijacked UAL plane was off the ground, the initial part of his mission to follow the hijacked plane went very smoothly. He stated that the "first bit of action" occurred 55 miles west of Wilson Creek, Nevada. [redacted] furnished the following latitude and longitude bearings: latitude 38° 10 minutes north, longitude 115° 25 minutes west. [redacted] advised that at this time the UAL hijacked plane was flying at 14,000 feet and maintaining speed of 180 knots ground speed, or 110 knots air speed. He advised that at the latitude and longitude given, he and his co-pilot heard what they thought to be two beppers. He advised that it was his opinion that there were two beppers because of the unusual echo effect that he and his co-pilot heard. [redacted] advised that his co-pilot on this flight was [redacted], who he stated is also assigned to the U. S. Coast Guard Air Station, San Francisco International Airport.

[redacted] advised that when the beppers were first heard, he immediately contacted the UAL hijacked plane by radio and asked if they wished for him to illuminate the area. C-130 which was following him did a very quick check of the area where the beppers were heard, but was unable to make any visual contact.

[redacted] stated the remainder of the flight went very smoothly until they were approximately four to ten miles South by Southeast from Provo, Utah. [redacted] advised that at this time the Captain aboard the UAL hijacked plane advised he thought he felt a bump, indicating to [redacted] that possibly the hijacker had jumped. [redacted] stated that they immediately by radio notified their radio operations of the location and maintained contact with the UAL hijacked plane. [redacted] advised that from his position, he was unable to have any visual contact with the hijacker if he had jumped, as all the lights in the rear part of the hijacked aircraft had been turned off by the hijacker.

[redacted] advised that it was his opinion that the hijacker had some experience in aviation. He qualified this statement by saying that the hijacker was experienced in certain areas of aviation, but was totally unexperienced in other areas. [redacted] advised that an example of this was that the skyjacker was tracking the position of the UAL hijacked plane by basing his calculations on the fact that he was having the hijacked plane maintain a speed of 180 knots ground speed. [redacted] advised that this meant that the hijacked UAL plane had to maintain an air speed of 110 knots. [redacted] stated that the critical speed for the UAL hijacked 727 is 140 knots air speed, but the Captain advised that the hijacker was extremely lucky in that most of the time on the flight they were being pushed along by a 50 knot tailwind, and it was for this reason that the UAL 727 was able to meet the specifications on speed without stalling. [redacted] advised that without the tailwind, it would have been impossible for the UAL plane to operate as the hijacker requested.

[redacted] advised that it was also his opinion the hijacker was somewhat knowledgeable about parachutes. He said he based this opinion on the fact that the hijacker requested sport chutes rather than any regular kind of parachute.

b7C [redacted] stated that this was important inasmuch as a sport chute could be steered by the individual wearing it and would give the individual a great deal of control as to landing area. [redacted] advised that at the altitude they were flying, approximately 17,500 feet, it was such a clear night that they could see ground definition with no lights at all. [redacted] explained this as meaning that they could tell at the altitude mentioned if they were flying over mountains, level ground, semi-hilly ground, etc.

b7C [redacted] advised that at the location where the hijacker actually jumped from the plane, his impact area would be approximately half-way between two small airports. [redacted] advised he obtained this information from looking at his map in his aircraft. He stated that his map indicated that there was a small airport approximately ten miles north from where the impact area would have been, and that there was another small airport approximately ten miles south of where the impact area would have been. [redacted] further stated that another factor he considered was that approximately four or five miles to the west of the impact area there was a lake which could have been to some benefit to the hijacker.

b7C [redacted] further stated that he considered it to be of prime importance that the hijacker asked for a wrist altimeter rather than an altimeter which is attached directly to the parachute. [redacted] explained this by saying that if your altimeter was attached to your parachute and you were attempting to steer your parachute to a given location for impact, you would have a very difficult time observing it, whereas if it were on your wrist, it would be quite easy to see. [redacted] stated that, also, it should be mentioned that most wrist altimeters, in fact 99 per cent of all wrist altimeters, have luminous dials so that the hijacker would be able to read his altimeter in the middle of the night.

b7C [redacted] stated that from the actions of the hijacker and from the type of equipment and the general operations of the hijacker, he would not be surprised if the hijacker had a private or commercial license. He stated that

b7C this license would probably be for piloting a small one engine aircraft or a small two engine aircraft. He stated he based this opinion on the fact that the hijacker, as mentioned earlier, had been able to check his location by basing his navigation on a speed of 110 air knots. [redacted] advised that this is fairly close to the speed of the small one engine or two engine airplanes that he mentioned earlier. [redacted] also advised that it was his opinion that the hijacker had some experience with skydiving. He stated he based this opinion on the type of equipment that the skyjacker explicitly asked for.

A swarthy hijacker waving a gun and a hand grenade commandeered a United Airlines jetliner yesterday and collected the largest ransom ever paid in a U.S. skyjacking — half a million dollars.

The bespectacled, mustached hijacker took over the Boeing 727 jetliner a few minutes after it left Denver for Los Angeles yesterday afternoon.

He forced it to fly to San Francisco, where \$500,000 and several parachutes were loaded aboard and the passengers allowed to disembark.

The plane took off 3½ hours later and flew north over the snowy Sierra Nevada.

Shortly after 8 p.m., the big plane with two U.S. Coast Guard jets tracking it, began making wide, sweeping counter-clockwise orbits over portions of Nevada and Utah.

All Nevada law enforcement agencies and rural airports were put on alert.

The plane's 400-mile orbit took it over Tonopah, eastern Nevada and portions of Utah near Salt Lake City.

At 8:45 p.m. one parachute, apparently a decoy, was released over Sunnyside, Nev., halfway between Ely and Pioche in the northeast part of the state. A second decoy chute was reported dropped over Provo, Utah.

Both parachutes were rigged with beepers. One of the two Coast Guard planes tracked the first chute to the ground while the second stayed with the ~~hijacked~~ airliner.

For a time authorities on the ground and passengers on the plane thought there was more than one hijacker. The gunman used a prisoner who was traveling on the plane with a guard as an unwilling accomplice and had him pick up the ransom while the plane was on the ground.

The hijacker pressed a pistol to the head of Capt. Gerry D. Hearn as the 727 jet, United Airlines Flight 855, was high over western Colorado en route from Denver to Los Angeles with 95 persons aboard.

Ordered to San Francisco, the plane landed at 4:15 p.m., where it was taxied to a remote runway bordering San Francisco Bay.

For the next 3½ hours, it was put through a minutely detailed procedure, in which the ransom and parachutes were loaded on, baggage taken off, and 89 passengers and one stewardess allowed to disembark.

Then, with Hearn, First Officer K. R. Bradley, Second Officer K. W. Owen and Stewardesses D. M. Surdam, D. K. Sugimoto and M. N. Yewby aboard, the plane took off at 7:50 p.m. and headed northeast over the snowy Sierra Nevada.

It had six hours of fuel.

The California Highway Patrol told its officers throughout northern California to be on the alert for "flares and parachutes." Two supersonic F104 jets were ordered from Hamilton Air Force Base to shadow the jetliner.

Mickey Luckoff, sales manager of KGO Radio Station in San Francisco and one of the passengers, said the hijacker was about 5 feet 10 inches tall, weighed 160 to 170 pounds and was wearing a dark suit, black leather gloves, and apparently a wig.

"He acted very strangely when he first got on the plane," Luckoff said. "He locked himself in the men's room and a stewardess had to unlock the door and get him out."

Luckoff said the hijacker had planned the incident so carefully and had the crewmen so well organized in taking care of some of its aspects that it sometimes appeared that there were more than one. United Air Lines also believed for a time that "two or three" hijackers were involved.

The whole operation in San Francisco was carried on under a tight blanket of secrecy clamped on by the Federal Aviation Agency and the FBI. The FAA issued a statement to newsmen in Washington warning that it was against the law to monitor and publish air-to-ground conversation.

Sandra Wilkinson, 25, a UAL stewardess who was traveling as a passenger on her company pass, said the hijacker was cool and composed throughout. He relayed his orders to the captain by handing notes to a Stewardess. Hearn then radioed them to the airport tower.

They were so detailed that at one point, when a motorized ramp was brought up so that the ransom could be retrieved, the hijacker ordered it to advance to within 100 yards of the plane and stop so that he could make sure there was only "one ramp and one man."

The hijacking followed the procedure laid down by "D. B. Cooper," the daring bandit who pioneered parachuting extortion last Thanksgiving Eve by vanishing over Washington State from a hijacked Northwest Airlines plane with \$200,000. He has never been found.

Like "Cooper," Friday's hijacker chose a Boeing 727, the only large airliner with the type of rear door from which a parachutist can easily bail out.

AIR PIRATE SUSPECT CAPTURED IN PROVO

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP) — A law enforcement student and skydiving enthusiast who said he was a Green Beret and helicopter pilot while in Vietnam was arrested Sunday and charged with the \$500,000 extortion-parachute hijacking of a United Air Lines 727 jet on Friday.

The FBI said the money had not been recovered.

Richard Floyd McCoy Jr., 29, a Brigham Young University student active in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints

(Mormon), was arrested at his home, a neat, brown brick bungalow in Provo, Utah.

McCoy, the father of two, said he had been preparing for drill with his Army National Guard unit when arrested and appeared for his arraignment before U.S. Magistrate A.M. Ferro in military fatigues.

McCoy, who said he served two tours in Vietnam and was a Green Beret, changed into a grey suit and tie.

McCoy was held without bail on

charges of air piracy and interfering with flight crewmen. The maximum penalty is death. A preliminary hearing was set for April 19.

The FBI refused to comment on whether the parachutes and weapons involved in the hijack had been found.

McCoy is accused of commandeering a United flight from Newark, N.J., to Los Angeles shortly after it made a scheduled stop in Denver.

The plane was diverted to San Francisco where it remained on the ground for three hours while four parachutes and the \$500,000 was delivered. Then, the passengers were let off and the plane began a zigzag flight over the Northwest. The hijacker bailed out over Provo, a community of 75,000, and the plane went on to land at Salt Lake City.

The complaint against McCoy said the FBI was led to him by a highway patrolman, Robert Van Ieperen.

Ieperen knew McCoy, according to the complaint and heard him talk about the possibility of hijacking an airplane. Ieperen was quoted by the complaint as saying McCoy told him he would demand \$500,000 if he were a hijacker.

McCoy remained solemn through his arraignment, but chatted with FBI agents about his experiences in Vietnam before the session began.

He told the magistrate that his only source of income was \$243 from the GI bill, then added, "But I'm sure that will be terminated now."

McCoy is listed in the BYU student directory as a law enforcement major.

Bill Dause, instructor at the Alta Skydiving Center, said McCoy had had 30 jumps, but had never logged a night jump.

The hijacker bailed out of the jetliner over Provo in southern Utah's lake and mountain country shortly before midnight.

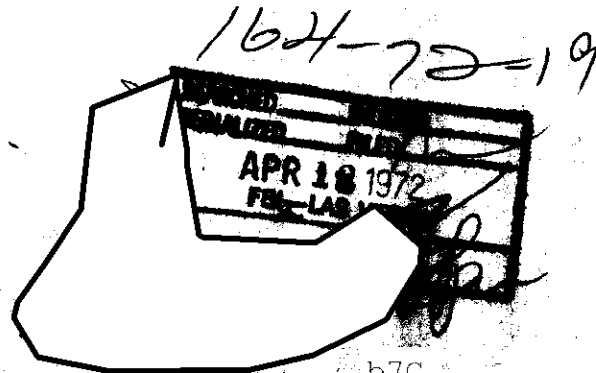

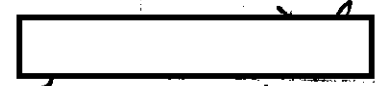

On the evening of April 7, 1972, he observed a white light appearing intermittently on and off in the sky to the northwest of this mine shack which appeared to be possibly in and out of a dark cloud. Subsequently a few seconds later he saw another group of lights flashing near by and his best estimate that now is that there were at least four or three lights in all that were separated laterally by as much as 2000 feet and appeared to have no vertical or horizontal movement which could readily be discerned.

He watched these lights for what he estimated to be a maximum of five minutes and subsequently looked away. When he thought of them again and looked back they were no longer in view and he is unable to determine in his own mind a plausible explanation for same unless they were possibly weather balloons of some sort.

He initially thought the lights might belong to an aircraft but they did not move properly for such identification and there was no sound or any other distinguishing characteristics in connection therewith.

[redacted] stated that he dismissed the incident from his mind initially until the following day when a ranger in that area informed them of the hijacking and he then believed that conceivably the lights he had observed had some bearing on the hijacking occurrence.

At 8:28 A.M., SAC CALAME, Salt Lake City, called concerning captioned matter. He stated that charges against Bank Americard of MC COY indicated a charge ticket in Las Vegas on 11/25/71. The ticket is illegible in the most part. The only thing discernible after one short word which appears to have five letters is what appears to be the word "Thrust" He stated this may be an oil company ticket since the address is on Las Vegas _____ (not discernible).

The latest theory concerning MC COY'S connection with instant case is that they feel he could have driven to Las Vegas, taken an airplane to Portland, committed the hijacking, flown back to Las Vegas and then returned by automobile to Salt Lake City on 11/25/71. He said subject's sister-in-law has stated he was in Salt Lake City on 11/25/71, but she places the time only between the hours of 2:00 and 6:00 P.M.

Salt Lake City asked that we ascertain which airlines MC COY might have used for a trip to Portland and then request the headquarters of these airlines to check manifests on the 24th and 25th for the known names and aliases of MC COY. RICHARD FLOYD MC COY, JR., white male American, date of birth 12/7/42, Kinston, North Carolina, was arrested at Provo, Utah, 4/9/72, after being charged in a complaint at Salt Lake City, Utah, on 4/9/72, with violation of Section 1472(i)(1), Title 49, USC, Aircraft Piracy, and Section 1472(j), Title 49, USC, Interfering With Flight Attendant. Subject identified through handwriting and fingerprint examinations as well as witness identification as individual who boarded United Air Lines (UAL) Flight 855, a Boeing 727, from Newark, New Jersey, to Los Angeles, California, at Denver, Colorado, a normal stop. Approximately 15 to 20 minutes after take-off, subject was observed to be holding a hand grenade and a gun, and this occurred while the plane was in flight approximately 15 miles north of Aspen, Colorado. Chief Stewardess was first furnished a note to deliver to the pilot which was believed to have stated "grenade pin pulled" and "pistol". She was then furnished an envelope which she was instructed to deliver to the pilot, which envelope contained a number of pages of flight instructions and demands, which included that the plane be diverted to San Francisco where UAL was to have \$500,000 in cash and four parachutes available. Envelope also contained one hand grenade pin and a bullet. Instructions requested that pilot return all notes to the hijacker. Aircraft landed in San Francisco at approximately 4:20 PM where passengers' bags were immediately removed from the plane and subject ordered two male persons aboard the plane to depart and obtain the \$500,000 and the parachutes and return to the aircraft. After the two flight bags and parachutes were put aboard, subject ordered his luggage be brought from the baggage compartment. Stewardess was then furnished a note ordering all passengers

to deplane, and later ordered one stewardess to leave. Stewardess was then handed a note to be delivered to the pilot ordering him to take off immediately. Time estimated at approximately 7:40 PM. Subject instructed the pilot, through flight plans furnished in envelope, to fly at 16,000 feet at approximately 180 knots, and several changes were ordered in plans. Just prior to approaching Provo, Utah, subject was observed by stewardess to be wearing a light olive military style flight suit as well as an oxygen mask. Subject believed to have bailed out near the Provo, Utah, airport. On 4/9/72, a search warrant was obtained for subject's residence at 360 South 200 East, Provo, and "\$499,970" was recovered, along with additional items which included a hand grenade which was inert, a .45 caliber automatic, a black helmet and parachute. Subject arraigned before U. S. Magistrate, Salt Lake City, Utah, 4/9/72, at which time he requested a court-appointed attorney, and was remanded to the custody of the U. S. PREDICATION

This investigation was predicated upon a telephone call received by SAC RUSSELL P. CALAME, at approximately 3:45 p.m., April 7, 1972, from [redacted] Federal Aviation Agency Control, telephone number 521-8272, who advised that there had been a hijacking of United Air Lines Flight 855, a Boeing 727, enroute from Newark, New Jersey, to Los Angeles, California, via Denver, Colorado. He advised the hijacker had declared himself near Grand Junction, Colorado, and instructed the plane to be diverted to San Francisco, California. [redacted] advised the plane was now flying at 31,000 feet, and his information was received from the Denver Air Control Center at 3:21 p.m. He advised that at 3:38 p.m., the plane was going to 39,000 feet and was 25 miles south of Price, Utah.

At 11:11 - 11:12 P.M., April 7, 1972, a radio transmission was overheard being received from the pilot of the hijacked aircraft, which indicated that the crew of the aircraft believed the hijacker may have departed from the airplane. A radar plot indicated that the possible departure of the unknown subject from the aircraft could have occurred in the immediate vicinity of the Provo, Utah, Airport at approximately 11:11 - 11:12 P.M.

At 11:27 P.M., the pilot of the aircraft indicated information was received through radio broadcast monitoring that it had been confirmed that the hijacker had left the aircraft and the aircraft was returning to land at the Salt Lake City Airport.

b7C [redacted] was requested to and subsequently did make arrangements for the landing of the aircraft at the Salt Lake City Airport and its immediate abandonment at the end of the runway for search procedures and evacuation of the crew in view of any possibility of injury or explosion. Ambulance and fire equipment were alerted and on standby to proceed to the vicinity of the aircraft for emergency procedure. The crew of the aircraft were to be delivered directly after evacuation to the FAA Offices at the Airport under complete security for interview by Bureau Agents.

[redacted] United Airlines, advised that he was in command of United Airlines Flight 855 that had originated in New Jersey, and he had taken over at Denver, Colorado, for a flight to Los Angeles, California.

[redacted] stated shortly after take-off from Denver and approximately 15 miles north of Aspen, Colorado, he became aware that some difficulty existed concerning one passenger. Shortly thereafter he was furnished a two page single spaced typewritten letter containing instructions which he had first thought was a bomb threat and later realized that his aircraft was being hijacked.

b7C

[redacted] advised that Stewardess [redacted] who was apparently called [redacted] by the hijacker, was utilized by the hijacker as a messenger for his instructions from the passenger cabin to the cockpit on numerous occasions. Captain [redacted] advised that the hijacker's instructions were extremely explicit, and in the vicinity of Hanksville, Utah, he requested the Federal Aviation Agency make a change of course which would allow him to land at San Francisco International Airport. This course change was granted and he proceeded to San Francisco International Airport, the hijacker having furnished instructions as to landing and parking at Runway 19 left and further specific instructions as to the fueling of the aircraft and the distance that all vehicles should be kept from the aircraft.

b7C

[redacted] stated that upon refueling and obtaining the \$500,000 in ransom and removal of passengers from the aircraft, he again became air-borne, at which time the hijacker apparently lowered the rear stairway. The hijacker's instructions were to fly at 16,000 feet elevation and to maintain an air speed of 180 knots which is approximately 200 miles per hour. [redacted] stated the hijacker indicated several course changes en route and the instructions contained specific times that these course changes should be flown. [redacted] advised that in changing course in the vicinity of the Provo, Utah, Airport, where the hijacker had indicated the next leg should be to Price, Utah, he felt that the hijacker had bailed out.

b7C [redacted] advised he believed that in the first message he received there was possibly a cartridge shell in the envelope with the instructions and a hand grenade pin.

b7C [redacted] stated he and his [redacted] spent approximately nine hours in the cockpit of the aircraft with the exception of a short break at the San Francisco International Airport when he was able to utilize the lavatory immediately adjacent to the cockpit. [redacted] stated in view of this confinement he never did see the hijacker.

b7C [redacted] stated that there was every indication the hijacker was armed with a hand grenade and pistol, and he had also threatened to use plastic explosives at one point.

b7C [redacted] stated he was aware that through conversation with a U. S. Coast Guard chase plane that apparently two parachutes had been thrown from his aircraft in the vicinity of Tonopah, Nevada.

b7C [redacted] United Air Lines, was telephonically reinterviewed at the Holiday Inn, Salt Lake City, to obtain additional specifics, at which time he advised that the steps to the aircraft were lowered over Nevada apparently in the vicinity between Tonopah and Wilson Creek by the hijacker. He stated that the only indication of the use of the steps to exit the rear of the aircraft is a red light which comes on in the pilot's compartment and indicates that the steps are extended. He advised that the extending of the steps is determined, if the aircraft is in the air, and limited by the stream of air.

He advised that it was believed by him and the crew that the subject exited just immediately prior to his radio call so stating this fact on the night of April 7, 1972, because a change in pressure was felt in the aircraft, and while it could not be certain that the exit was at this precise time, he was fairly certain in his own mind that this was the exit time of the hijacker.

[redacted] employed by United Airlines, was interviewed at Salt Lake City International Airport. b7C

[redacted] advised that the flight on which he was copilot, or sometimes called first officer, originated in New Jersey as United Airlines Flight 855, and he boarded as crew at Denver, Colorado. b7C

[redacted] advised that approximately 15 miles north of Aspen, Colorado, he became aware that there was some difficulty and originally thought that a bomb threat had been received. A two page single spaced typewritten letter had been received in the cockpit by [redacted]. He believed the message had been passed to the Captain by Stewardess [redacted] and that subsequent instructions from the hijacker were also brought forward to the Captain by [redacted] since the hijacker apparently preferred to have as little contact with other personnel in the cabin as possible. b7C

[redacted] advised the original two page letter was in an envelope and this envelope also contained the safety pin from a hand grenade. b7C

[redacted] stated that [redacted] who is employed by United Airlines and based at Los Angeles, California, where Flight 855 was due to terminate, was "deadheading" and was sitting in the passenger compartment and apparently was aware of the hijacker's presence. b7C

[redacted] stated that upon receiving instructions from the hijacker, a course change was obtained in the area of Hanksville, Utah, and a more northerly course was assumed, which would take the flight to the San Francisco International Airport as instructed by the hijacker. b7C

[redacted] stated the hijacker was very explicit in all of his instructions and in fact indicated that at San Francisco International Airport runway 19 left should be b7C

b7C [redacted] utilized, and [redacted] stated he felt the hijacker definitely knew the airport. The hijacker further instructed (1) a fuel truck with six hours fuel and two men on the truck should be available, (2) all vehicles should be parked one hundred feet from the nose of the aircraft on the left side, and (3) he wanted a prisoner who was being returned to the State of California to be left in the seat that he was in.

b7C [redacted] stated that Stewardess [redacted] confirmed that the hijacker had a pistol that had a clip in it and returned to the hijacker the hand grenade pin. Stewardess [redacted] had further indicated to [redacted] that the hijacker had stated he had plastic explosives on board the aircraft.

Upon refueling and leaving San Francisco International Airport specific instructions were received indicating the altitude and air speed to be followed, and essentially the altitude was 16,000 feet and the air speed was 180 knots, which is approximately 200 miles per hour or 3 miles per minute.

b7C [redacted] stated that the rear stairway had been lowered apparently immediately after take-off and communications generally were bad due to the open rear door, and in addition to this it was necessary to be on oxygen approximately one and one-half hours, at which time it appeared that the hijacker had jumped in the vicinity of the Provo, Utah, Airport.

b7C [redacted] stated that the numerous instructions received from the hijacker contained course changes on at least two occasions, and one note indicated that if a chase plane was seen, the hijacker would set a charge which would detonate after he had jumped and before the plane could be landed.

b7C [redacted] stated that the notes indicated generally a terminology of "we this" or "we that" which gave the impression that there were definitely more than one individual involved.

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b7C

[redacted] stated that the typewritten notes generally were single spaced and some had been typed over and were very difficult to read due to the detail contained.

b7C

[redacted] stated it was his impression that the hijacker was possibly a private pilot and was acquainted with flying point to point as would a small plane pilot. He stated that the evening was very clear and lights of various towns were visible en route from San Francisco, California, to the Provo, Utah, area.

b7C

[redacted] recalled that in the next to the last note received from the hijacker it stated that "if anyone turned around it was a long fall without a chute."

b7C

[redacted] stated an attempt was made to look into the passenger compartment under the cockpit door where there was approximately one-fourth inch space; however, all lights had been extinguished and the door to the lavatory immediately behind the cockpit was open, obstructing the view to the rear.

b7C

[redacted] stated that from the time the flight began in Denver, Colorado, until landing at Salt Lake City International Airport he and [redacted] had been in the cockpit approximately nine hours with the exception of utilizing the lavatory immediately adjacent to the cockpit briefly on one occasion. Due to this confinement, he had no opportunity to see the hijacker.

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b7C

[redacted] was interviewed in an upstairs room under the control of United Air Lines, at the Salt Lake City International Airport. The time the interview began was 12:00 midnight.

b7C

[redacted] described himself as being the [redacted] on United Air Lines Flight 855 from Denver which had been hijacked and diverted to Salt Lake City, Utah. He stated he resided at [redacted] Thousand Oaks, California, [redacted] telephone number 805-[redacted].

Concerning the activities on the day in question, [redacted] advised he and other members of the flight crew left Los Angeles, California, at 7:00 a.m., Flight 460, United Air Lines, traveled to Sacramento, California; Salt Lake City, Utah; and Denver, Colorado, arriving Denver approximately 12:33 p.m. He advised he and other members of the crew had one hour and fifteen minutes ground time in Denver, and they spent most of this time in the flight office at the terminal.

There was nothing significant which happened during this period which would indicate any later hijacking activities. [redacted] advised at about 2:10 p.m., he went to the flight office of United Air Lines with the other members of the crew to handle some administrative details of the flight. About 2:10 to 2:15 p.m., he boarded Flight 855 prior to departure. He advised there were three stewardesses, [redacted] and [redacted] and [redacted] and First Officer [redacted] advised that when he got onto the plane, [redacted] was already aboard and in the cockpit. He stated there may have been two or three passengers already aboard the aircraft, in the passenger compartment.

He stated that as he came aboard, the three girls went to the rear of the plane and he went to the cockpit to handle "check-off". He advised also that he then got out of the plane and checked certain items on the outside of the plane and noticed nothing significant.

He advised at this time the passengers came aboard and that during this period he returned to the cockpit with the other two male members of the flight crew. [redacted] recalled that following passenger loading, they received clearance to start the engines; however, the loading door remained open. He advised that they were ready to leave as the passenger agent came to the loading door with an envelope in his hand. He waved the envelope into the passenger compartment and announced that the envelope had been left behind in the boarding room. The passenger agent asked to whom the envelope belonged, and there was no response. b7C

[redacted] advised that he was observing this through the open cockpit door when he noted a passenger step out of the restroom on the right hand side of the plane looking forward and waved his hand as though he was acknowledging ownership of the envelope. [redacted] advised that [redacted] then went to the passenger agent and indicated that a man in the back was responding. She went to the individual, and he told her that the envelope was his. [redacted] then returned to the passenger agent, got the envelope and took it back to the individual. [redacted] advised he does not recall what immediately followed, but he did see the man go back into the restroom. b7C

He advised the outside door was then closed and the plane started to taxi. At this time one of the girls came to him and said that the man was still in the restroom. [redacted] advised that the Captain, overhearing this report, told her to go back and tell the man to sit down. She then went to the rear and later called on the intercom to report that she had knocked on the door with no response. [redacted] advised that the Captain then asked him to go back and check, which he did. b7C

[redacted] advised he knocked heavily on the door and within a very few minutes the man came out of the restroom and said "I'm alright." [redacted] told the man he could not stay in the restroom during the takeoff, and the man came out and took a seat in the rear on the right side of the aisle. b7C

[redacted] advised that as he had seen the individual before and now noticed him leaving the restroom, he did notice some difference in the man's appearance but did not pay any particular attention. He did not note the significance of the change. He stated he went back to the cockpit and turned to [redacted] and asked her to ask the man what was in the envelope. [redacted] made the inquiry and returned with the report that the man had said "just papers". He stated that he then related to [redacted] all that had happened, and the plane had taken off. b7C

[redacted] stated that the takeoff was a normal climb and the plane rose to over 3,000 feet and went on cruise power. He advised that about 20 minutes after the takeoff, [redacted] came and advised him that the man had returned to the restroom. He advised shortly thereafter, two passengers came forward to one of the stewardesses to report that they had seen a man in the back with a gun; and they were seated toward the front of the plane. [redacted] then came to the cockpit and indicated that one of the passengers had said he had observed a man in the back of the plane with a grenade and suggested they had better do something about it. [redacted] advised a discussion among the crew then took place; and they finally asked [redacted], who is a pilot out of Los Angeles who was "dead heading" on the flight, to go back to the restroom and check for anything out of the ordinary.

b7C

[redacted] did go back and observed the restroom, but found nothing. He then came to the cockpit and reported his findings. About this time they were starting their descent into Grand Junction, Colorado. At this time the Captain asked [redacted] to go back and give the area another check, which he did; and this check was also negative. [redacted] then asked [redacted] to go back and sit next to the unknown passenger who reportedly had the gun. After being there only a few minutes, [redacted] came back to the cockpit and reported he had observed something between the individual's legs which the individual was attempting to cover up.

b7C

[redacted] stated that at this time the man pulled a gun and held it on [redacted] and gave him an envelope saying, "Give this envelope to the girl and have her take it to the captain." He advised that [redacted] brought the envelope to the cockpit. [redacted] advised that the elevation was about 14,000 feet; and they announced that they were landing at Grand Junction, Colorado, with a hydraulic failure so as not to alarm the passengers. [redacted] advised that they then called the ground, advised they were landing and asked for law enforcement assistance on the ground.

b7C

[redacted] advised that at this time they opened the envelope and noted it was a two page note typed on what appeared to be an electric typewriter. He advised the note made demands and set out instructions that they could keep the note for approximately 30 minutes and then the subject wanted the note back. [redacted] stated the note had been in an envelope marked "hijack instructions". [redacted] recalled that the note told them where to go, San Francisco, California; when to arrive and what to do after takeoff. He advised that [redacted] then wrote a note to the subject that they would go to San Francisco, but that it would be necessary to refuel.

b7C

b7C

[] advised that passengers were not informed of the activities on board. Before landing at Grand Junction, Colorado, the First Officer announced that Grand Junction could not handle the necessary repairs; and it would be necessary to go to San Francisco, California. The plane then traveled to San Francisco, California, arriving there at 4:15 p.m. [] advised there were no contacts during this period, and the flight was uneventful. [] advised that after landing, [] brought up another envelope which contained instructions as to what to do while on the ground, where to go, how much fuel, where the fuel truck would be parked and how many fuelers would be allowed to handle the fuel, how to unload the baggage and where and limiting the number of baggage handlers to three. The note told of the money demands, parachutes and was in great detail.

b7C

[] advised that instructions of the hijacker were radioed into dispatch, and they sat on the ground for approximately three hours fifteen minutes with the passengers aboard while the plane was fueling and the bags unloaded. [] advised the hijacker instructed that the stairs be brought to the front of the plane, and then [] brought in an envelope with more instructions. He advised one of the instructions was to send the passenger from Seat 14B to the cockpit. It was also noted there was a baggage stub in the envelope. This baggage stub was Number 61-32-3, United Air Lines, Denver to Los Angeles.

b7C

[] later came to the cockpit to say that the subject wanted to get someone to help the man in Seat [] bring parachutes, a suitcase and money aboard. [] said the two men then left the plane and brought the items aboard and took them to the rear where the subject was located. He stated he then observed the man check the suitcases for contents. When satisfied, he sent the two men out to get a checked piece of baggage. [] was then told to let everyone off; and she made the announcement, and all deplaned. One stewardess, [] also left the aircraft. Five crew members remained which were the five previously described. [] then brought up another note instructing that they taxi to the active runway and take off. They should head east and climb to 14,000 feet. He advised the cabin was to be unpressurized. He stated that when the plane was airborne [] brought another letter which said "Stay at 14,000 and be over Coaldale in 30 minutes. Further instructions to follow." [] advised there were also some warnings about not allowing chase planes.

b7C

b7C

b7C [redacted] advised they went to Tonapah, Nevada, and later Coaldale as instructed. He stated that as they were traveling, the subject kept demanding to know ground speeds, flight speeds, wind speeds, altimeter settings and sky conditions. He also advised he wanted to be notified "5 minutes before crossing each VOR station." [redacted] advised that they then began to receive cards which looked like flight plans instructing that they go to Wilson Creek and Milford, Utah. He asked for further information on settings, etc. [redacted] advised that about Milford, Utah, the subject opened the aft entry door and let down the aft air stair. He advised that the subject then covered the peep hole in the cockpit door so that it was not possible to observe into the passenger compartment.

b7C [redacted] advised that before the plane arrived at Milford, subject sent the girls into the cockpit with the other crew members; but he, [redacted] was able to observe subject in the passenger compartment due to a slight crack in the door. [redacted] advised he observed the subject put on a jumpsuit and helmet as well as a parachute. He advised that subject put on the parachute as though he was very well schooled in this maneuver. [redacted] advised that the subject wore the chute a long time before the actual jump and after getting himself ready, the subject turned out the lights in the passenger compartment so he could observe the ground. He advised the subject could be seen moving around in the back as he had a flashlight in his hand which he turned on periodically when he wished to make certain observations.

b7C [redacted] advised that on one occasion the subject could not get the intercom to work, and he came to the cockpit door and opened it slightly. He asked for information on wind position and altitude. He indicated that the plane was to be flown to Fairfield, Utah, and that he was to be notified five minutes before arriving over Fairfield. He then advised that [redacted] was to pick up a new flight plan which he had placed on the first row on the right side of the passenger compartment on the seat. [redacted] advised that [redacted] entered the passenger compartment, found the plan, but apparently could not observe the subject due to the darkness. The plan said "Go to Fairfield, Utah, Price and Grand Junction." [redacted] advised he did not see the subject again, but when in the Provo area felt a surge. At this time they concluded the subject had gone.

b7C [redacted] advised that he then went to get the next instructions, and the subject was gone. He advised he did not recall anything further concerning the activity except all of the notes had been returned, that it was obvious to him that the subject knew the airplane and area well. He

b7C advised he did not feel that he could make a positive identification of the subject should he see him at a later time. According to [redacted] the subject is described as follows:

b7C [redacted] advised subject was observed putting on a green jumpsuit and black helmet which had a white mark on the back of the helmet. Subject also had on black gloves when he jumped and possibly boots.

[redacted] expressed the view that subject's voice was higher than normal pitch or disguised.

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b7C

[redacted] No. [redacted] Telephone [redacted] Encino, California, was advised of the identity of Special Agent [redacted] by exhibiting to her credentials. [redacted] advised that she spends a considerable amount of time at her parents' home located at [redacted] Telephone [redacted] Tarzana, California, and can usually be reached there if not at her apartment at Encino, California.

b7C

[redacted] advised that she has been employed as a stewardess by United Air Lines since July 3, 1968. [redacted] was an airline stewardess aboard United Air Lines Flight 855 and began her trip on this flight at Denver, Colorado, April 7, 1972. [redacted] stated this flight was scheduled to depart Denver, Colorado, at 2:25 P.M., April 7, 1972, and was scheduled for a nonstop flight to Los Angeles, California. [redacted] stated that the usual boarding procedure was being followed when she first noticed subject boarding and he caught her eye inasmuch as he was flashily dressed. The subject went to the back of the aircraft and sat on an aisle seat. During the boarding procedure, a passenger agent entered the airplane and announced that someone had left a manila envelope in the boarding area. The subject left the airplane and apparently was the one who left the envelope as he returned to the plane and his seat with the envelope.

b7C

[redacted] stated the subject then went to the blue room (restroom), locked the door and stayed for quite a length of time. [redacted] stated this was reported to the second officer and the officer had to come back and open the door and she recalled hearing the second officer ask the subject what he had in the envelope and he remarked, "Just papers".

b7C

[redacted] stated that after the aircraft became air-borne, she began her services for the passengers. At this time, she recalled that several men, whom she considered businessmen, told her that the subject had taken a grenade

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out of a blue case and then she immediately informed the crew members of this incident. She stated that she continued her services for other passengers and that one or two other businessmen approached her and advised her that the subject now had a gun. She states these passengers were sitting in the same row with the subject now had a gun. She stated these passengers were sitting in the same row with the subject and that he had told them to leave that row of seats, which she recalled as the second row from the last row of seats on the right side of the plane. These seats were numbered D, E and F.

b7C

[redacted] stated that she believed the subject allowed a woman and a boy to remain on one side of the aisle of this row and that he then moved to the aisle seat. She stated at this time she believed the subject had put on a wig and possibly had been wearing a wig for sometime before he removed the other passengers from his row.

[redacted] stated that she continued her services to the other passengers and that the subject had some time prior to this called [redacted] one of the other stewardesses, and seemingly was giving her written notes that she was carrying to the cockpit. [redacted] whispered to [redacted] on one of her early trips to the cockpit that the subject would not speak and that he was only writing notes or making gestures to her.

b7C

[redacted] stated that she recalled when the information was reported to the pilot that the subject had a grenade, the pilot announced that the airplane had developed mechanical trouble and would make a landing at Grand Junction.

[redacted] stated that she never did see a grenade; however, she did see a gun which she described as having a square-type barrel as she was able to look at it from a side view.

b7C

[redacted] stated that [redacted] was now carrying all the communications from the subject to the pilot and that she believes the pilot made an announcement that there had been another change in plans and that the airplane was not going to land at Grand Junction. [redacted] stated she believed the pilot made this announcement after he had been advised that the subject had a gun.

b7C

[redacted] stated she recalled seeing a portion of a note that [redacted] was carrying to the cockpit and hastily showed it to her. She stated she recalled the words "pistol - hand grenade - pin pulled" and that these words were typed on an envelope.

b7C

[redacted] stated that she recalled having glimpses of other notes that [redacted] was carrying from the subject to the cockpit and that these other notes were typewritten and some were in printing or handwriting.

b7C

[redacted] stated that her assignment in the aircraft as a stewardess was in the coach cabin and that she spent most of her time in this area which was the same area where the subject was seated. She recalled that he wore gloves all of the time and that she believed he put these gloves on after he had given his first instructions to [redacted]

b7C

[redacted] stated that she continued her services to the other passengers in the airplane and that [redacted] time was now being spent carrying notes from the subject to the cockpit.

b7C

[redacted] stated that when the plane landed at San Francisco, the subject told her to turn off all the lights in the airplane and to go into the cockpit. [redacted] stated that while in the cockpit, she recalls reading a note that gave instructions to return all the other notes that he had written.

b7C

[redacted] stated that during the San Francisco stop, all three of the stewardesses on the plane had to sit on the back row with the subject during the landing of the plane. She stated the subject told a person that she now knew to be a prisoner to get the money and the parachutes and to bring them back to him.

b7C

[redacted] stated that the last time she saw the subject was when he asked her to open the airplane door to the stairs. [redacted] stated that this indicated to her the subject was acquainted with this type of airplane as the

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door to the stairs is sealed by pressure if closed and when in flight. She stated that when she left the rear area of the airplane after she had opened the pressure door that if the door had been closed again, the subject would have to have closed it.

b7C

[redacted] stated that during the time she was opening the door, the parachutes that had been brought to subject had to be moved in order for her to open the door.

b7C

She stated that she did not recall seeing the subject talk to anyone at any time other than to [redacted] and that she did not observe him smoking, eating or drinking at any time. [redacted] stated that when all the airline personnel were in the cockpit after being en route from San Francisco that subject had to come to the cockpit door and shout into it for [redacted] to come outside for him to give her another note. She stated the PA system was not working properly in the airplane at this time.

[redacted] stated that she did not know at what area the subject left the plane; however, the crew members felt a pressure change and that she was with some of the other employees who went back to the rear of the airplane and the stairwell, and after looking around thoroughly could no longer see the subject.

[redacted] stated that she also recalled that the subject carried aboard a blue navy-colored bag that had red piping and he may have possibly carried another bag with him.

She was the [redacted] stewardess (chief stewardess) on UAL scheduled Flight 855 from Denver, Colorado to Los Angeles, California on April 7, 1972. The flight originated at Denver and departed at approximately 2:35 PM. Prior to the departure of the flight a UAL employee brought a large manilla envelope aboard the aircraft and inquired of the passengers as to its ownership. She stated stewardess [redacted] stated she located a male passenger who claimed to be the owner. [redacted] then delivered the envelope to that individual who was seated in seat 20D located in the last row on the left side of the aircraft. This passenger eventually was the person responsible for hijacking the UAL aircraft.

[redacted] stated that after the individual had received the envelope he went into the right rear rest room. She then notified the Captain who advised [redacted] to have the man return to his seat for take off. [redacted] stated she knocked three or four times on the restroom door and asked the man to return to his seat for take off. The individual refused to return to his seat and [redacted] then notified the Captain. The Second Officer then went to the rest room and was successful in having the individual return to his seat.

[redacted] did not observe the individual prior to his entering the restroom.

[redacted] related that this individual departed the rest room with a suitcase and the manilla envelope. She asked the individual what was in the envelope to which he replied "Just papers".

Approximately 15 to 20 minutes after take off a passenger from the rear of the plane went to Stewardess [redacted] and stated "the man in the rear of the plane has a handgrenade".

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b7C

[redacted] immediately advised the Pilot who in turn notified the passengers through the public address system that the aircraft would be landing at Grand Junction, Colorado due to a hydraulic problem.

A short time later two passengers advised [redacted] that a passenger in the rear had a gun who had given them a note for [redacted] give to the Pilot. [redacted] believed this note to have read "grenade pin pulled, pistol".

b7C

[redacted] stated an off-duty UAL pilot, whom she did not know, then came forward and provided her with an envelope and stated she was to deliver it to the Pilot. This envelope contained a number of pages of flight instructions and demands which included in part that the plane be diverted to San Francisco where UAL was to have \$500,000.00 in cash and four parachutes available. The envelope also contained one handgrenade pin and a bullet.

The instructions required the Pilot to return all notes to the hijacker. The Pilot advised [redacted] to request the hijacker allow the Pilot to retain the instructions until such time as they were no longer needed as the instructions were too extensive to memorize. The hijacker indicated he was agreeable to this by nodding his head to [redacted]. In addition to nodding his head the hijacker shook his hand containing the handgrenade in a clenched fist style towards [redacted].

b7C

[redacted] stated the aircraft landed in San Francisco at approximately 4:20 PM where the passenger baggage was immediately removed from the plane. After the passenger baggage was unloaded onto the airstrip the hijacker ordered that a Federal prisoner aboard the airplane and a UAL employee leave the airplane to obtain the \$500,000.00 and the parachutes and return them to the aircraft. [redacted] stated the prisoner and UAL employee returned to the aircraft with two flight bags supposedly containing the money and three parachutes, one of which appeared to have opened.

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The hijacker also ordered that his luggage from the baggage compartment be brought to him aboard the plane. She described the hijacker's suitcase as medium size and had a large black and green plaid pattern.

b7C She stated subsequent to the baggage being removed and the ransom money and parachutes being delivered, the hijacker gave a note to [redacted] ordering all of the passengers to deplane, stating the stewardesses were to remain aboard. After the passengers had deplaned the hijacker told Stewardess [redacted] she could also leave. The hijacker then handed [redacted] a note to deliver to the pilot ordering the pilot to take off immediately. She estimated the time of take off at approximately 6:30 PM. [redacted] stated she retained this particular note and had put it in her purse.

Approximately 10 minutes after take off at San Francisco the hijacker told [redacted] and Stewardess [redacted] to go forward and sit directly behind the bulkhead where they remained until approximately 30 minutes prior to the hijacker jumping from the aircraft. At that time the hijacker came forward to the bulkhead and told [redacted] and [redacted] to turn off all the lights in the cabin and then go into the cockpit with the crew. b7C

At this time [redacted] stated the hijacker was dressed in a light olive military style flight suit, a gas mask on his face and a white towel over his head. b7C

A short time prior to the time that it was believed by the crew that the hijacker jumped from the aircraft he provided a note to the pilot containing additional flight instructions which directed the crew to pick up additional notes containing other instructions at various intervals. These notes had been placed on various seats in the cabin of the aircraft.

Subsequent to [redacted] picking up the second note the crew felt a movement in the aircraft which they believed to have been made by the hijacker when he bailed out of the plane. [redacted] stated their position at that time was in the Provo, Utah, area.

After the movement of the plane was felt [redacted] departed the cockpit and went to the cabin to pick up the additional set of instructions. When she returned to the cockpit she informed the Pilot she could not observe the hijacker in the aircraft. The pilot then instructed [redacted] to return to the area of the second note on the pretense she could not locate it in an attempt to make another observation of the cabin for the hijacker. [redacted] stated she then walked to the rear of the aircraft and determined the hijacker was not in the plane.

The cabin lights were then turned on and a search of the cabin area began by the crew.

[redacted] stated that the Pilot then turned the aircraft towards the Salt Lake City International Airport where they landed.

He was advised he was being questioned concerning the hijacking of a United Airlines passenger plane enroute from Denver, Colorado to Los Angeles, California on April 7, 1972. He was advised of his rights and presented with a waiver of rights form which he executed.

MC COY claimed he had nothing to do with the hijacking and that he was home at 360 South 200 East, Provo, Utah, with his wife on the evening of April 7, 1972. He argued his privacy was being invaded by having to answer questions regarding his activities and said it was no ones business where he was the previous evening.

MC COY was advised that he fit the description of the hijacker's description and was also a qualified pilot and parachutist. He repeated he did not commit the hijacking but did state that he went out to dinner returning home between 11:00 and 11:30 PM.

MC COY was advised that it was reported that [redacted] was looking for him on the evening of April 7, 1972 and could not find him and that his wife had left home at 8:00 PM and that he had not returned home until approximately 1:30 AM on April 8, 1972. MC COY denied that any of the above events occurred.

Additionally MC COY was told he was reported to have talked about how to successfully hijack a plane whereupon he claimed everyone talked about it and it was nothing unusual.

MC COY advised that he would graduate from Brigham Young University (BYU) at Provo, Utah in August of 1972 and received a degree in law enforcement which he would use to obtain a job with the police department to fly helicopters. In view of his education he warned he was well aware of interrogation tactics and could not be intimidated.

It is noted that MC COY was located and the interview commenced at the Army Operations Center, Salt Lake City International Airport, Salt Lake City, Utah. After being approached and the foregoing information furnished, MC COY was asked whether he had an automobile, to which he replied that he had a 1969 Volkswagen, which was parked behind a hangar in the vicinity of the Army Operations Office. The Agents and MC COY proceeded to the vicinity of the automobile where it was requested that permission be granted to search his automobile. He was told that Agents had no right to search his automobile unless he so consented. He advised that he would consent to the search of his automobile and he signed and executed a Consent to Search Form. MC COY personally unlocked the vehicle -- a 1969 green Volkswagen, North Carolina License L 5007 -- and was present during the search. Nothing appearing to be of an evidentiary nature was obtained.

MC COY was asked if he had any objection to completing an interview at the Salt Lake City Office of the FBI. He said no; however, he asked if he had to come and was advised that no he did not, that he was free to come and go at his choosing. He advised that he had no objection to completing the interview at the Salt Lake City Office and he was thereafter transported to the Salt Lake City Office.

After completion of the above, MC COY said he would furnish no further specimens and desired to see an attorney. The specimens were taken and MC COY insisted that they be returned to him. He was advised that he had voluntarily given these specimens and they would not be returned to him and would be retained by the FBI.

MC COY advised that he would not answer any additional questions concerning the hijacking as he had not been involved.

MC COY noted that he was limping as he had injured his right ankle in a skiing accident with a Brigham Young University ski class two to three weeks ago; however, he declined to give the name of the instructor or information relating to the injury other than to state it had been treated and he had been put in an ankle cast at that time by a doctor at the Brigham Young University Health Clinic, Provo, Utah. He advised that he did not recall the name of the doctor. He advised that he personally, himself, had removed the cast approximately two days ago as he could not fly a helicopter very easily with a cast and he had desired to fly on Saturday, April 8, 1972.

MC COY was requested to exhibit both ankles, which he did do and removed his boots from both feet and stated that his right foot was swollen, which was confirmed by observation. He advised that he had been treated and a cast placed on his right ankle for "pulled tendons or ligaments".

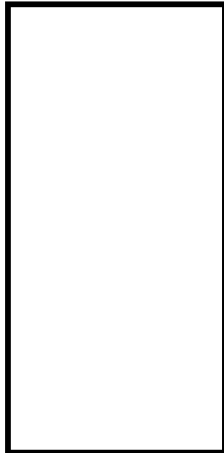

He formerly had a wig or hairpiece which did not fit and has since been discarded. The hairpiece kept slipping up on his head and did not fit.

He has several shrapnel scars on his body and one scar on his face which is about 1/4 inch in diameter located on his left cheek near the base of his nose and which is noticeable.

The first rough count indicated approximately \$501,000 in currency. This estimate was based on the number of whole complete bundles, and an estimate of the number of loose currency bundle straps. These currency bundle straps were in a highly mutilated condition and no attempt was made at this time to piece these straps together in order to preserve the straps for possible fingerprint identification.

A 1969 Volkswagen, motor number 119177108, bearing 1972 North Carolina license L5007, was the subject of a search behind the residence at 360 South 2nd East, Provo, Utah. This search was based on a search warrant issued by the United States District Court, A. M. FERRO, Magistrate, April 9, 1972, at Salt Lake City, Utah. The search commenced at 2:15 p.m. and continued until 4:00 p.m. During the period of the search the following things were noted:

The vehicle was a dark green Volkswagen with a sun roof. The mileage at the time of the inspection was 61861. It was noted the vehicle had a Duro-glass lined rear window, and it bore four 155 X 15 X A's Michelin radial tires. The rear window bore a Brigham Young University (BYU) Security Office parking permit number P2320, issued March 23, 1972. It also bore BYU parking permit B14244 which was due to expire May 31, 1972.

It was noted in inspection of the interior of the vehicle a portion of the Salt Lake City, Utah, Tribune newspaper, dated April 8, 1972, was located on a tray directly under the glove box. This newspaper was opened to page two and had been folded to reveal the story of a hijacked airplane from Denver, Colorado, in which the hijacker was believed to have jumped in the Provo, Utah, area, with \$500,000. This item was retained.

There was also a note in the tray under the glove box indicating RICHARD FLOYD McCOY, JR., has a bank account with the Provo, Utah, Branch of Walker Bank, account number 1243-0018-4117-6670.

Also located was an invoice from the BYU Health Center, dated March 21, 1972, indicating McCOY, student number 068365, had been admitted to the Health Center at 5:10 p.m., on March 21, 1972; and he had been checked by [redacted] who X-rayed McCOY's right ankle.

She was advised that she was being interviewed concerning her knowledge of a hijacking of a United Airlines passenger plane en route from Denver, Colorado, to Los Angeles, California, on April 7, 1972. She advised she was aware [redacted] RICHARD F. MC COY, JR., had been arrested after being charged with hijacking. [redacted] was advised that she was not being interviewed as a suspect in the hijacking, however, if at any time she wished to terminate the interview, she could do so if she desired.

She advised that RICHARD F. MC COY, JR. is married [redacted] and [redacted] residence located at 360 South 200 East, Provo, Utah, [redacted]

[redacted] advised she was not surprised when RICHARD MC COY was arrested for the hijacking because he had discussed with her on previous occasions his possible participation in a hijacking. She stated that after the hijacking committed by an individual using the name [redacted] which occurred in the fall of 1971, in the Western part of the United States, RICHARD MC COY had discussed this matter at length in her presence and had analysed that hijacking, commenting that if he had committed that hijacking, he would never have been caught because the FBI was not prepared for that case and that since that time the airlines have utilized "beepers" on the parachutes and have taken other steps to discourage hijackings.

For some time after the [redacted] hijacking, RICHARD MC COY discussed with her a hypothetical hijacking plan including improvements from the [redacted] hijacking; such as (1) he indicated he would ask for one-half million dollars, (2) he would utilize his own parachute instead to avoid the use of "beepers," (3) he would not be observed by the pilot or anyone in the cockpit, (4) he would not spend any of the hijack loot for many years because it would be "marked" with a substance that would be visible by use of an ultraviolet

light, and (5) he would not spend any of the money for many years because he believed he could not be prosecuted after seven years after the crime had been committed.

b7C [redacted] recalled that RICHARD had discussed in general terms a plan for hijacking a plane with a friend of his, [redacted] who works for the Utah Highway Patrol and works with RICHARD MC COY in a unit of the Utah National Guard in Salt Lake City, Utah. She stated she has been present when they have discussed the hypothetical hijacking, and it is her opinion that the conversations were a result of recent news items concerning hijackings, that they talked in general terms concerning this but did not appear to have been planning an actual hijacking.

b7C [redacted] advised she does not recall specifically when and where these discussions were held, but she does recall the two having discussed a hypothetical hijacking in her presence.

b7C [redacted] advised she recalls that about one month ago RICHARD while discussing hijackings advised that he had a "fool proof" hijacking plan and that if she would assist him in the plan he would pay her \$50,000. She stated that he advised her that her participation would consist of picking him up after he parachuted from the plane. [redacted] advised that she was uncertain as to how serious RICHARD was at this time but that she advised that she did not wish to participate in the plan. She stated that at this time he indicated he would hijack a plane from California and parachute from the plane somewhere in Nevada. She stated he did not elaborate on this plan and she did not inquire further into his plan because she did not consider at any time participating in such a venture. She had asked RICHARD what would happen if they got caught, and he stated he felt his plan was "fool proof" but that if he should be caught he would shoot himself rather than be taken into custody. This proposal made by RICHARD was in the presence of RICHARD's [redacted] who indicated that if he was serious she did not "want any part of such a scheme."

With respect to the parachuting activities of [redacted] [redacted] was asked if she recalled specifically seeing any equipment in their home. She pointed out that about April 4, 1972, she recalled that RICHARD was in his room with the door shut and as she attempted to enter the room RICHARD appeared to be reluctant to let her in. When he finally consented to let her in, she observed that he had a black helicopter type helmet which he had just finished painting black. She recalled having seen this helmet before when it was green in color. RICHARD displayed the helmet to her and asked her what she thought of the color. She recalled that she had no opinion and nothing more was said concerning this matter.

[redacted] was asked if RICHARD had recently had a cast on one of his legs, and she indicated that he had about two to three weeks ago incurred a skiing injury which necessitated a cast being placed on one of his legs from the knee downward. She stated that about twenty minutes later [redacted] again telephoned her, and she again advised him that RICHARD had not yet returned.

Upon learning that [redacted] was aboard a helicopter, RICHARD by radio within her hearing told [redacted] "thanks a lot loud mouth," to which [redacted] answered "I don't know what you're talking about." RICHARD then stated "you know what I mean, loud mouth," and [redacted] erred "negative." [redacted] stated that RICHARD later learned that [redacted] was piloting a plane accompanied by U. S. Senator FRANK MOSS.

She stated that he did not elaborate concerning the hijacking, except he mentioned that he had parachuted out of the plane with a parachute with a "beeper." She stated that he also said that if he could burn the money that he had received from the hijacking, he would do so because he was now so concerned. She stated RICHARD did not indicate where he landed after he parachuted from the plane, and he did not tell her where the money was located.

She stated he and his wife have been having marital problems and these problems have involved financial problems.

By communication dated April 8, 1972, the San Francisco Office of the FBI advised that [redacted] furnished the following information voluntarily after having been advised of the personal and official identity of the interviewing Special Agent, as well as after having been advised of his constitutional rights: b7C

[redacted] advised that during 1970, he was serving time for escape at the Deuel Vocational Institute, Tracy, California. On October 6, 1971, he walked away from the above facility. He stated that on April 7, 1972, he was in the process of being extradicted from Denver, Colorado, back to Los Angeles, California, where he was to be reassigned to a correctional facility in California. b7C

[redacted] said that at approximately 2:30 PM, April 7, 1972, he, in the custody of [redacted] Correctional Officer, Department of Corrections, State of California, boarded a United Air Lines flight in Denver, Colorado, enroute to Los Angeles. He said he and [redacted] were seated in Row 19 in the tourist section of the airplane on the left hand side. He advised he and [redacted] and a wheelchair passenger boarded the aircraft before any of the other passengers, and that after all the other passengers had boarded the plane, a stewardess, over the public address system, asked if anyone had lost a manila envelope, at which time a male passenger who was located in the rest room stepped out of the rest room momentarily and advised the stewardess the envelope belonged to him. At that time, the envelope was handed to this individual and he returned to the rest room. b7C

As the plane was getting ready to leave the airport, one of the stewardesses went back to the rest room to ask the above-mentioned individual to come out of the rest room and return to his seat. It appeared the passenger was reluctant to leave the rest room. At that time, a male employee on the airplane came back to the rest room and was successful in getting the above individual to leave the rest room and take his seat, which was in Row 20 on the right side of the plane next to the window. A short time later, the plane became airborne. At that time, [redacted] observed the previously mentioned individual b7C

b7C acting nervously and appearing to be playing with his coat as if he might have a gun underneath it. He said he alerted [redacted] to this individual's activities.

b7C A short time later, according to [redacted] a gray haired man with a mustache, believed to be an airlines employee, came back to the area where this individual, who was subsequently known to be the hijacker, was seated. He engaged the hijacker in conversation, at which time the hijacker motioned with his finger for the gray haired man to return to the front of the plane. A short time later, a male voice announced over the public address system that due to mechanical difficulties with the hydraulic system, the plane would be landing in Grand Junction, Colorado.

b7C [redacted] said he continued to observe the hijacker who would periodically ring the service bell, at which times different stewardesses would come back to the hijacker and be furnished notes by him. He estimated this occurred eight or ten times. Eventually the pilot announced that the plane would not be going to Los Angeles as scheduled but would be going to San Francisco.

b7C [redacted] stated that a short distance out of San Francisco, the pilot announced that the plane would not be going to the normal unloading area as all areas were being utilized. He stated that the plane, after landing, was parked in a position away from the airline terminal. A short time later, a stewardess came back to the area where he and [redacted] were seated and requested that [redacted], as well as the other passenger seated in Row 19, move to the front of the plane. She also made this request of a woman and young child seated directly behind [redacted].

b7C Throughout this activity, [redacted] observed the hijacker seated across from him holding a hand grenade with the pin removed. After the people around him had been moved to the front of the plane, the hijacker took a seat directly behind [redacted] in Row 20. A short time later, he handed over the back of the seat a note which said "Go up and see the captain". [redacted] said he went up to the front of the plane, at which time the captain advised him he was the one who would get the money. b7C

On April 8, 1972, [REDACTED] was located at his residence at [REDACTED] Utah, at which time he advised that he is employed by his father as a carpenter in building homes and that he is a member of the Utah National Guard and is an experienced skydiver, having jumped over a hundred times.

He advised that he is acquainted with RICHARD MC COY, who is a student at Brigham Young University and who is also a member of the Utah National Guard. He advised that MC COY is a pilot and can fly both helicopters and small planes and is an experienced skydiver.

He advised that MC COY has never discussed with him the hijacking of any airplanes, but he has been in groups; namely, the Alta Jump Club which meets at the airport in Sandy, Utah, in which they have jointly discussed the mistakes that individuals have made in trying to hijack previous planes.

He advised that he does not feel that MC COY would be a good suspect in this case in view of the fact that approximately three weeks ago, MC COY broke his ankle and has his right foot in a cast. He advised that the last time he talked with MC COY was the past Wednesday and that he went over on Thursday evening to MC COY's residence which is in Provo, Utah, and noticed that his car was in the driveway, but MC COY was not at home. He advised that he has had no contact with MC COY since that time and that MC COY has definitely never discussed with him the possibility of hijacking an airplane and attempting to get money out of the airlines.

[redacted] Utah, telephone [redacted], was interviewed in the Salt Lake City Office of the FBI, at which time he observed the parachute obtained during a search of the home of RICHARD FLOYD MC COY, as well as the harness and container. He described the harness as a Security Cross Bow and Short Bow Harness and the parachute as a Commander Mark 2, manufactured in 1968. To his knowledge, only seven of these chutes were manufactured and only two are in the State of Utah. He stated both items described above are his property and were loaned by him to McCOY sometime after March 23, 1972. He explained he is very poor on dates but recalled he returned home on the 23rd of March, 1972, after visiting his girl friend in Boston, Massachusetts. b7C

Prior to [redacted] leaving on this trip, McCOY had asked to borrow his skis and he told McCOY he could use them; however, McCOY did not borrow them and when at his house McCOY advised [redacted] he had rented a pair of skis and had broken his ankle. He stated McCOY was wearing a cast and he wondered why he wanted the parachute but McCOY stated he and a friend were going to jump and he [redacted] assumed McCOY was going to pilot the plane which he is capable of doing. b7C

McCOY asked him how much money it would take for him to commit a crime and after they got up in the millions he told McCOY he would not be interested in committing a crime at any price. He advised that McCOY did not say how much it would take to cause him to commit a crime.

b7C [redacted] stated after giving this considerable thought he now believes, even though he and McCOY were good friends, that since he would not be interested in committing a crime at any cost this was probably the reason McCOY never discussed it with him.

parachutes and \$500,000, all law enforcement agencies in the State of Utah were notified, as well as the National Guard and Hill Air Force Base who were requested to furnish helicopters and other aircraft as needed since subject's destination was unknown at that time. At approximately 8:22 PM, information was received that the aircraft was headed for the Coaldale marker in Nevada. Subject was described as a white male, approximately 25, 5' 5", 145 to 160 pounds, with dark complexion. The plane's direction was followed through contact with the Air Traffic Control Center at Salt Lake City until it was believed subject bailed out of the plane near the Provo, Utah, airport, where a continuous search was made throughout the night by local police agencies and all available FBI Agents.

Investigation conducted by the Salt Lake City Division and auxiliary Offices not pertinent to this case is not being included in this report but maintained as part of the file.

A detailed map is being prepared showing the jump area of the subject and will be included in the next report.

No leads are being set forth in this report for auxiliary Offices in view of the fact that they have been requested by the most expeditious means. Auxiliary Offices have been requested to furnish reports in this case covering their investigation.

Due to the splendid cooperation demonstrated by all law enforcement agencies in the State of Utah, as well as Hill Air Force Base and the Utah National Guard, a letter of appreciation was sent to the head of each of these agencies.

The number of people in the loading area at Gate B-4, awaiting Flight 855, indicated that there was an exceptionally heavy load of passengers boarding that flight.

The only passengers boarding Flight 855, which he specifically recalls, were a California Penal Institution Guard and his prisoner. He was initially approached by the guard who advised him that he had a prisoner and would be carrying a weapon aboard the aircraft. He recalled that when he first saw the prisoner in the terminal, it was apparent that the prisoner was handcuffed because his hands were placed together in front of him with a raincoat draped over them to hide the handcuffs. He recalls that the guard and prisoner had seats [redacted] and [redacted] which would be located to the [redacted]. He escorted the guard and prisoner aboard the aircraft after advising the Universal Check-in Agent at the gate that the guard would be aboard the aircraft with a weapon. Once aboard the plane, he advised the chief stewardess, and he saw her open the door of the cabin and tell the captain that there would be a guarded prisoner aboard the plane, that the guard would be armed and where they would be sitting.

He is certain that the prisoner was unhandcuffed upon boarding the plane because this is standard operating procedure.

He recalls that the prisoner was tall, approximately 6'4", had dark hair, was wearing light blue trousers and shirt, and was carrying a tan raincoat over his arms.

Witness Claims Hijacker Disguised Self On Plane

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — A prosecution witness said yesterday an accused hijacker changed into a shaggy wig and sun glasses April 7 shortly after boarding a United Air Lines flight en route from Denver to Los Angeles.

William Coggin, who is now a prisoner at a vocational institution in Tracy, Calif., told a federal court jury ~~Richard F. McCoy~~, a former student at Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah, was the last to board the plane and went directly to a restroom before takeoff.

McCoy, 29, dressed neatly in a conservative suit, is accused of the \$500,000 hijacking and ransom of the flight and parachuting from the craft over the university city.

The prisoner who talked with his five-year-old daughter prior to the beginning of testimony in the trial's second day, showed no emotion as Coggin said McCoy left the restroom wearing the wig and sun glasses.

But McCoy's wife and daughter broke into tears as Coggin, who was being extradited to California from Colorado, placed McCoy aboard the jetliner.

Coggin's testimony yesterday came after four crew members of the flight Monday failed to identify McCoy as the man who commandeered the jet and threatened to blow it up with plastic explosives.

Two crewmen who saw the hijacker told the sixman, six-woman jury Monday he was wearing what appeared to be a wig and a large bushy mustache. They could not identify the clean-shaven conservatively dressed McCoy.

FBI error stalls trial of hijacker

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — An error in a search warrant temporarily prevented presentation of evidence taken from Richard F. McCoy's home as the former Green Beret went on trial Monday, charged with hijacking a United Air Lines plane and bailing out with \$500,000 near Provo, Utah, April 7.

The defense moved to suppress evidence after testimony showed that the Federal Bureau of Investigation agent who signed an affidavit for a search warrant was not the same one who signed the warrant, as prescribed by law.

U.S. District Court Judge Willis Ritter delayed a ruling but admonished both sides to say nothing of the search of McCoy's house in Provo. He proceeded to impanel a jury, and five prospective jurors were disqualified in a few minutes.

McCoy, 29, a student in law enforcement at Brigham Young University and winner of the Purple Heart for arm and leg wounds received while serving with the U.S. Special Forces in Vietnam, sat stone-faced, dressed in a light gray suit.

After McCoy was arrested April 9, FBI agents said \$499,970, a parachute, a handgun, and a dead grenade were taken from McCoy's house.

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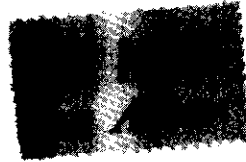

Utah Pirate Sentenced To 45 Years

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — Former Green Beret Richard P. McCoy Jr., 29, was sentenced to 45 years in federal prison yesterday for hijacking a jetliner and parachuting with \$500,000 ransom. Sentence was imposed by U.S. District Judge Willis Ritter after a jury convicted McCoy two weeks ago on one count of air piracy. The judge made no comment on the case.

In a plea for clemency, McCoy noted that as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam he was decorated for heroism.

"I hope you take consideration of my past record," he told the court.

The FBI said he hijacked a United Air Lines jetliner on April 7 while it was on a flight from Chicago to San Francisco. Agents said he jumped from the plane while it was over Provo, Utah, where he lived.

McCoy was taken into custody at his home two days after the hijacking, and just about all of the ransom was recovered.

The defendant was a Mormon Sunday school teacher and a police science major at Brigham Young University in Provo.

Federal court sentences skyjacker to 45 years

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal court has sentenced Richard Floyd McCoy to 45 years in prison for a \$500,000 skyjacking and parachute jump three months ago.

McCoy, a former Sunday School teacher, was sentenced Monday.

He had been convicted of taking over a United Air Lines 727 over western Colorado April 1, forcing it off its Denver-Los Angeles path to San Francisco where 85 other passengers were taken off and the ransom put aboard.

He then ordered it on a zig-zag course across the West, ending over his hometown of Provo, Utah, where he bailed out.

FBI agents arrested him two days later in the neatly kept house where he lived with his wife and two children. They found all but \$30 of the ransom.
