Lawrence O'Brien of the staff of the President-elect asked that Special Inquiry investigations be conducted on the following individuals:

Andrew Hatcher
Assistant Press Secretary

Robert S. McNamara
Secretary of Defense

Chester Bowles
Under Secretary of State

O'Brien said he recognized that these should have been requested long ago, but that there had just been a slip up because things had been moving at such a fast rate. He noted that these appointments had already been announced publicly, but nevertheless he felt that the investigations were essential. These investigations are being ordered today for immediate attention.

O'Brien also asked that we conduct a Special Inquiry investigation of [redacted] who was most active in the campaign and who is presently employed in the Democratic National Committee. This investigation is also being ordered today.

In connection with O'Brien's request of yesterday for investigation of Herbert W. Klotz, advice was received that Klotz is to be appointed as liaison man with the White House for Governor Hodges, the new Secretary of Commerce.

O'Brien said that some consideration was presently being given to the appointment of [redacted]

feel that this was sufficiently "firmed up" to request any investigation. O'Brien said that he talked with the President-elect and had convinced him that it would be unwise to request any wholesale investigations, but that such investigations should be requested only when there was a reasonable possibility the person being investigated was going to be appointed to a position in the Government. He said once an investigation is started, if the person is at all prominent, there were immediate inquiries. He illustrated by the number of press inquiries that had been received by him concerning a possible appointment of Newton Minow, a member of Adlai Stevenson's law firm. The investigation on Minow was requested on December 8, 1960. O'Brien's principal interest is the political clearance of appointees, and he noted if investigations are requested and then no appointment is made, there is an unfavorable political reaction from the person being considered and from his political supporters.

ADD 7 KENNEDY

ROBERT STRANGE

KENNEDY ANNOUNCED THE SELECTION OF THE 44-YEAR-OLD MCNAMARA AS DEFENSE SECRETARY FROM THE DOORSTEP OF HIS HOME TO A CROWD OF NEWSMEN. MCNAMARA, WHO SERVED AS A LIEUTENANT COLONEL IN WORLD WAR II AND HAS BOBBED UP ON DIFFERENT SIDES OF THE POLITICAL FENCE ON VARIOUS OCCASIONS, WAS AT KENNEDY'S SIDE. NEITHER WORE A HAT OR COAT DESPITE THE COLD.

THE PRESIDENT-ELECT NOW HAS FILLED FIVE OF THE 10 CABINET POSTS. INFORMED SOURCES SAID HE HOPES TO COMPLETE THE CABINET BY FRIDAY WHEN HE FLIES BACK TO HIS PARENTS' HOME AT PALM BEACH, FLA.

IN SELECTING MCNAMARA TO HEAD THE DEFENSE ESTABLISHMENT WHICH ACCOUNTS FOR ABOUT ONE-HALF OF ALL FEDERAL SPENDING, KENNEDY FOLLOWED THE LEAD OF PRESIDENT EISENHOWER WHO ALSO CHOSE A TOP AUTO OFFICIAL AS HIS FIRST DEFENSE SECRETARY IN 1952.

EISENHOWER'S MAN WAS CHARLES E. WILSON, THEN HEAD OF GENERAL MOTORS CORP., FORD'S MAIN COMPETITOR. ALSO LIKE WILSON, MCNAMARA IS REPORTED TO HAVE LARGE STOCKHOLDINGS IN HIS COMPANY, OF WHICH HE WAS NAMED PRESIDENT ONLY FIVE WEEKS AGO.

MCNAMARA, WHO SUPPORTED KENNEDY IN THE NOVEMBER ELECTION, IS EXPECTED TO FOLLOW WILSON'S LEAD IN DISPOSING OF THESE HOLDINGS TO AVOID ANY POSSIBLE CHARGE OF A "CONFLICT OF INTEREST" IN HANDLING HIS GOVERNMENTAL DUTIES.

MCNAMARA, ONE-TIME PROFESSOR OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION AT HARVARD, ALSO HAS SERVED AS A FORD VICE PRESIDENT AND AS GENERAL MANAGER. HE ONCE WAS ONE OF FORD'S "QUIZZ KIDS" SPECIALIZING IN FUTURE PRODUCTION PLANNING.

MCNAMARA WAS REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN OFFERED THE \$25,000-A-YEAR DEFENSE POST BY KENNEDY AT A SECRET MEETING HERE THURSDAY NIGHT. HE WAS SOUNDED OUT EARLIER BY A KENNEDY AIDE AT DETROIT ON TWO POSSIBLE POSTS -- DEFENSE OR SECRETARY OF TREASURY.

MCNAMARA WAS DRIVEN TO KENNEDY'S HOME IN ONE OF THE FORD MOTOR CO.'S MOST EXPENSIVE CARS -- A FOUR-DOOR LINCOLN CONTINENTAL OF THE LIMOUSINE-EXECUTIVE TYPE. THE AUTOMOBILE REMAINED PARKED OUTSIDE THE KENNEDY HOME.

WAITING IN THE FRONT SEAT BESIDE THE CHAUFFEUR WAS R. H. MARKLEY, MANAGER OF THE FORD CO.'S WASHINGTON OFFICE, WHO HAD INSTRUCTIONS TO RELAY THE WORD OF MCNAMARA'S APPOINTMENT TO HIS WIFE IN DETROIT AS SOON AS IT WAS ANNOUNCED.

MARKLEY WAS IN TOUCH WITH HIS WASHINGTON OFFICE BY TELEPHONE -- A SPECIAL TELEPHONE INSTALLED IN THE LIMOUSINE. THE WASHINGTON OFFICE OF THE FIRM THEN WAS TO RELAY THE WORD TO MRS. MCNAMARA.

IN MAKING THE APPOINTMENT, KENNEDY SAID HE AND MCNAMARA AGREED "THIS COUNTRY MUST HAVE A DEFENSE ESTABLISHMENT SECOND TO NONE." BUT HE SAID IT ALSO MUST BE EFFICIENT "SO THAT THE WIDEST POSSIBLE USE CAN BE MADE OF PUBLIC FUNDS."

"IT MUST BE STRONG," SEN. KENNEDY ADDED, "NOT ONLY TO DEFEND THE NATION, BUT SO STRONG THAT THIS COUNTRY CAN MAINTAIN PEACE. PEACE IS THE OBJECT OF OUR DEFENSE ESTABLISHMENT."

MCNAMARA SAID LEAVING FORD WAS "ONE OF THE MOST DIFFICULT DECISIONS OF MY LIFE." BUT "AFTER MUCH THOUGHT," HE SAID, "I HAVE COME TO THE CONCLUSION THAT PERSONAL CONSIDERATIONS MUST BE SUBORDINATED."

ADD 10 KENNEDY

KENNEDY SAID ANYONE ACCEPTING A POST IN HIS ADMINISTRATION "MUST BE WILLING TO SERVE FOR A LONG PERIOD OF TIME." THAT WAS ESPECIALLY SO IN THE INSTANCE OF NATIONAL SECURITY.

THE PRESIDENT-ELECT SAID HE HAD NOT MET MCNAMARA PRIOR TO LAST THURSDAY AND LEFT SOMEWHAT VAGUE THE ORIGINS OF THAT MEETING. HE SAID THAT MCNAMARA'S NAME CAME TO HIS ATTENTION DURING HIS EFFORTS TO FIND THE BEST PEOPLE HE COULD TO TAKE POWER IN JANUARY.

KENNEDY EMPHASIZED THE POINT REPEATEDLY MADE IN HIS PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL HAVE A "DEFENSE SECOND TO NONE." HE FELL SHORT, HOWEVER, OF ENDORSING THE REORGANIZATION PROPOSALS MADE RECENTLY TO HIM BY SEN. STUART SYMINGTON, D-MO., AND MADE IT CLEAR THAT HOW MUCH THE PENTAGON IS OVERHAULED WILL LIE LARGELY WITH MCNAMARA.

MCNAMARA SAID HE ACCEPTED THE POST WITH A "TREMENDOUS SENSE OF CONFIDENCE" IN PRESIDENT-ELECT KENNEDY'S LEADERSHIP.

MCNAMARA TOLD NEWSMEN THAT ACCEPTING THE DEFENSE POST WOULD COST HIM AN ESTIMATED \$3 MILLION IN "PROFITS FOREGONE" OVER THE NEXT THREE OR FOUR YEARS.

THAT, HE SAID, WAS HIS ESTIMATE OF THE RISE IN HIS NET WORTH HAD HE REMAINED AT THE HEAD OF THE FORD CO., OF WHICH HE BECAME PRESIDENT NOV. 9.

HE SAID HE WOULD DIVEST HIMSELF OF 24,250 SHARES OF FORD STOCK NOW SELLING, HE SAID, AT \$65 A SHARE AND ALSO WOULD GIVE UP OPTIONS ON AN ADDITIONAL 30,000 SHARES.

THE STOCK, HE SAID, WAS DOWN \$750,000 OVER THE LAST FEW MONTHS AND "OBVIOUSLY" IS GOING TO RISE IN THE MONTHS AHEAD. MCNAMARA SAID HE WOULD REMAIN AS THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE AS LONG AS HE FULFILLED HIS RESPONSIBILITIES TO KENNEDY'S SATISFACTION.

THORNTON stated that MC NAMARA had an uncanny knack of selecting the proper people for the proper job. THORNTON also stated that MC NAMARA is most intollerant with people who have been misled by subversive or pseudo-subversive groups or ideologies. THORNTON stated he would highly recommend MC NAMARA for any position of trust or responsibility.



[redacted] described Mr. MC NAMARA as an exceptionally hard worker and not a "joiner" of organizations. He believes Mr. MC NAMARA is occasionally active as an alumnus of Harvard University and a member of an advisory group of Stanford Business School. He believes Mr. MC NAMARA to be a Director of Scott Paper Company,

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Philadelphia Pennsylvania. He may be a member of the Economics Club of Detroit but, if so, does not attend their noon luncheon meetings. [] says he has no hesitation in describing Mr. MC NAMARA as a person of the highest character and reputation; extremely loyal and patriotic to the United States Government and who is sacrificing much for his government because he feels he can serve a need in Washington. Mr. [] says there is no man higher in dedication and purpose and he has never known anyone Mr. MC NAMARA's equal in ability and capacity.

[] advises Mr. MC NAMARA was one of several young men hired personally by Mr. HENRY FORD II for Ford Motor Company. This group of men had all been Statistical Control officers in Washington, D. C., for the United States Air Force. Because of the group's phenomenal success at Ford Motor Company and their exceptional ability, this group of men became affectionately known as "the whiz kids". [] is acquainted with this group of men and says

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Mr. MC NAMARA has the most brilliant mind of this group. He describes Mr. MC NAMARA as "the smartest man I have ever known". [] says not only is Mr. MC NAMARA possessed of a brilliant mind and is a good thinker, but he is also a man of good judgment and a man who has not been adversely affected by unusual ability and success. Family life is important to Mr. MC NAMARA who with his family are active church members.

[] has known Mr. MC NAMARA as a member of Barton Hills Country Club, but Mr. MC NAMARA does not play golf. [] has never known anyone in life who has a higher moral character. His associates are above question, as is his loyalty to the United States Government. Mrs. MC NAMARA, who has actively headed some Ann Arbor polio drives, is also of the highest character, reputation, patriotism and associates. [] recommends Mr. MC NAMARA and his family without reservation and with enthusiasm.

[] Ann Arbor, Michigan, was interviewed on December 16, 1960. [] has known Mr. MC NAMARA for about six years. [] said he and Mr. MC NAMARA are members of a small informal group who meet once a month at members' homes to discuss current questions. The group consists of leaders in business, industry, education and the professions. He said they represent the broadest possible viewpoint of business and politics. [] has also known Mr. MC NAMARA in connection with community affairs. DETAILS: AT WASHINGTON, D. C.PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATES

United States Senator PHILIP A. HART of Michigan advised SA PAUL E. BACKGROUND

Special inquiry ordered 12-15-60 at request of Kennedy Administration. McNamara has been designated as the choice of President-elect Kennedy for the position of Secretary of Defense. We conducted a previous Atomic Energy Act - Applicant investigation of McNamara in 1953, when McNamara, as Controller of the Ford Motor Company, was listed as an individual requiring access to restricted data prior to contract negotiations with that firm. Reports in that case were disseminated to the Atomic Energy Commission in 1953 and to the Army in 1958.

RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Investigation indicates McNamara is considered an extremely competent administrator. He joined the Ford Motor Company in 1946, served in various administrative capacities, and in the Fall of 1960 was designated president of the firm. All persons interviewed considered McNamara to be of excellent character and associates, to be an outstanding individual and executive and a loyal American whose integrity is above reproach.

Bureau files contain nothing of a derogatory nature concerning him.

Investigation complete except for agency checks at Secret Service and CIA.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the attached cover letter and summary memorandum be delivered by Mr. Evans.

SUMMARY

An applicant-type investigation was conducted concerning Mr. McNamara in 1953. This summary memorandum contains the results of that investigation, as well as the results of current inquiries concerning him.

I. BIOGRAPHICAL DATA

Birth, Education and Employment

Robert Strange McNamara was born on June 9, 1916, in San Francisco, California.

Mr. McNamara attended the University of California at Berkeley, California, from August, 1933, to May, 1937, when he was awarded a B.A. degree with a major in economics. He attended the Graduate School of Business Administration, Harvard University, Boston, Massachusetts, from September, 1937, to June, 1939, when he received a Master of Business Administration degree. An honorary Doctor of Laws degree was conferred on Mr. McNamara by the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, in May, 1955.

Mr. McNamara was employed as a junior accountant with Price Waterhouse and Company in San Francisco, California, from October, 1939, to July, 1940. From September, 1940, to July, 1942, Mr. McNamara was an instructor in accounting at Harvard University. In July, 1942, he was appointed an assistant professor in business administration at Harvard University and served in that capacity until December, 1945. He was on leave of absence from the latter position from March, 1943, to July, 1945, during which time he served in the armed forces of the United States. Mr. McNamara began employment with the Ford Motor Company at Dearborn, Michigan, in January, 1946. He served in various administrative

capacities with that firm and in the Fall of 1960 was designated president of the Ford Motor Company. Since October, 1958, he has been a member of the Visiting Committee to the Graduate School of Business Administration, Harvard University. Since June, 1949, Mr. McNamara has been a member of the Board of Directors of the Scott Paper Company, Chester, Pennsylvania.

Military Service

Mr. McNamara was appointed a captain in the Army of the United States on March 12, 1943, and ordered to active duty the same date. He was honorably released from active duty on April 3, 1946, with the rank of lieutenant colonel. On that date he was tendered an appointment in the Officers' Reserve Corps, Army of the United States. In July, 1951, Mr. McNamara was promoted to the rank of colonel in the United States Air Force Reserve. It is noted that his record is clear and that he received several service awards, including the Legion of Merit.

Marital Status

Mr. McNamara is married to the former Margaret Craig.

II. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATIONS

Interviews

Patrick V. McNamara, United States Senator from Michigan, who was interviewed during the current inquiry, advised that he is aware of the fact that Robert McNamara has been President of the Ford Motor Company for the past four or five weeks. Senator McNamara stated that what he has heard concerning Robert McNamara has always been favorable. Senator McNamara said he feels Robert McNamara is a loyal American and that he knows of nothing which would reflect on the character or reputation of Robert McNamara. Senator McNamara stated that he feels Robert McNamara is capable of handling a position of responsibility with the United States Government.

Robert Strange McNamara

Philip A. Hart, United States Senator from Michigan, who was interviewed during the current inquiry, advised that he has known Mr. McNamara for about fifteen years. He said he has never had any question whatsoever in his mind concerning Mr. McNamara's character, reputation, associates and loyalty. Senator Hart stated that Mr. McNamara is an extremely able man in his field and possesses every qualification needed to handle the position for which he is being considered. Senator Hart recommended Mr. McNamara for a position of high trust and responsibility.

Charles B. Thornton, President, Litton Industries, Incorporated, Beverly Hills, California, who was interviewed during the current inquiry, advised that he has known Mr. McNamara for nineteen years and during this time has considered him to be of excellent character and associates and of unquestionable loyalty. He said he considers Mr. McNamara to be an excellent administrator and organizer and a very brilliant, patient and decisive individual. Mr. Thornton also stated that Mr. McNamara is not tolerant of people who have been misled by subversive groups or ideologies. Mr. Thornton recommended Mr. McNamara very highly for a position of trust and responsibility.

Henry Ford, II, Chairman of the Board, Ford Motor Company, Dearborn, Michigan, who was interviewed during the current inquiry, advised that he has known Mr. McNamara since 1946. In that year he hired Mr. McNamara as an executive of the Ford Motor Company. He said Mr. McNamara has proven himself to be an excellent administrator and a person capable of making correct and appropriate decisions. His character, reputation and morals have never been questioned by Mr. Ford, and Mr. Ford considers Mr. McNamara's health to be very good. Mr. Ford stated that Mr. McNamara's family enjoys an excellent reputation and is highly regarded in the community. Mr. Ford said he considers Mr. McNamara to be extremely devoted and patriotic to his country and pointed out that Mr. McNamara would be sacrificing a great deal of wealth by accepting a Government position. Mr. Ford recommended Mr. McNamara for a position of trust and confidence.

George Romney, President, American Motors Corporation, Detroit, Michigan, who was interviewed during the current

inquiry, advised that he has known Mr. McNamara since 1942. His association with Mr. McNamara has been on a personal, social and business basis during that period. Mr. Romney commented favorably regarding Mr. McNamara's ability and pointed out that Mr. McNamara is an intelligent and able administrator. He said Mr. McNamara's character, reputation, habits and morals are above reproach. In Mr. Romney's opinion, Mr. McNamara is completely loyal and dedicated to the United States. Mr. Romney recommended Mr. McNamara very highly for a post with the United States Government.

Louis C. Miriani, Mayor of Detroit, Michigan, who was interviewed during the current inquiry, advised that he has known Mr. McNamara for about five years. He has attended social functions with Mr. McNamara and has worked with him on civic problems. He described Mr. McNamara as capable, intelligent and dependable and stated that Mr. McNamara enjoyed an excellent reputation. Mr. Miriani considers Mr. McNamara to be a loyal American and recommended him for a position with the United States Government.

John Bugas, Vice President, Ford Motor Company, who was interviewed during the current inquiry, advised that he has known Mr. McNamara since 1946. Mr. Bugas said it is his opinion that Mr. McNamara is extremely well qualified for the position for which he is being considered. He said Mr. McNamara is energetic, intelligent and capable and that his integrity is above reproach. He said he had no reason to question Mr. McNamara's morals, habits or associates and stated that Mr. McNamara is completely loyal to the United States.

[redacted] Scott Paper Company, Chester, Pennsylvania, who was interviewed during the current inquiry, advised that Mr. McNamara became a member of the Board of Directors of the Scott Paper Company in June, 1959, after [redacted] had contacted Henry Ford concerning the possibility of having some official from the Ford Motor Company serve on the Board of Directors of the Scott Paper Company. [redacted] pointed out that Mr. Ford recommended Mr. McNamara for such a position. [redacted] pointed out that in his contacts with Mr. McNamara since June, 1959, he has been tremendously impressed by the manner in which Mr. McNamara conducts himself, by his integrity and by his

Those acquainted with his professional reputation described him as an outstanding individual and as an extremely capable administrator whose integrity was above reproach. All persons regarded Mr. McNamara highly and said that he possesses good morals, habits, and associates. They regarded him as a loyal American and recommended him for a position of high trust and confidence in the Government.

McNamara: An Assessment Of Abilities and Lacks

Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara will have his critics and his detractors as long as he runs the Pentagon and my hope is that he can continue on the job. He is needed.

No Secretary of Defense can discharge his vast responsibility with as much competence, decisiveness, confidence, and at times overconfidence, as Mr. McNamara without criticism, some of it quite justified.

Nobody can make most of the decisions involved in spending nearly \$55 billion a year without making some doubtful decisions. Mr. McNamara is good, but not infallible. He is able, outstandingly able, but he is not automatically right all the time.

My objective in this column is to try to put the McNamara controversy into focus.

What is right about Secretary McNamara's operation? These things—and they are central.

Mr. McNamara is in effective control of the vast sprawling Defense Department as no Secretary has been before him. This is good; this is essential.

He is not exceeding his authority under the Defense Unification Act. He is simply exercising that authority more effectively than any of his predecessors. He may not have made a wise decision to award the \$6.5 billion contract for the TPX plane (tactical fighter, experimental) to General Dynamics, but it is legally and properly his decision to make.

For years leading members of Congress and others have been demanding a better coordination of the armed services, including the preparation of the budget. Most of the time in the past the White House and the Budget Bureau have given the Pentagon a budget ceiling and the services have cut up the pie with little reference to any integrated strategic conception to balanced military strength. It was each service for itself, depending upon which could curry the most favor with Congress.

It is vital that there be a co-ordinated civilian command under the President. Mr. McNamara is exercising that command today and in this era of complex, costly modern weapons systems it must be exercised. If Mr. McNamara weren't doing it, we would have to find an-

other. If he didn't exist, we would have to invent him.

What hasn't gone well?

No one in the military questions the principle of civilian control. But Secretary McNamara has seriously hurt military morale in the Pentagon and lacerated his relations with some members of Congress, less because of the substance of his decisions than their manner.

Whether Mr. McNamara knows it or not, his bright, young, civilian "Indians"—the civilian researchers and civilian strategists who do a lot of preliminary digging and assessing for their chief—have, in the judgment of the officer corps, treated their counterparts in the military so assertively, so aggressively, at times so arrogantly that at the colonel and even major-general level of the Pentagon morale is today grievously impaired.

Mr. McNamara has not handled his side of the presentation of the TPX decision to the Senate Investigating Committee wisely or persuasively. This may reflect his impatience with criticism. He has called the investigation "harmful" and the committee itself is becoming convinced that the "facts" thus far offered do not prove the merit of the McNamara decision.

Perhaps the officer corps and the political corps in Congress feel more "pushed around" by Mr. McNamara and his men than they should. But the manner in which the Secretary does his job, while not as important as its substance, is still important. I suspect that Mr. McNamara needs to be more honest and able men feel are so visible.

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McNamara: A Portrait Of Power!

The most hotly debated personality in Washington today is defense secretary McNamara. One of the most widely respected reporters in Washington today is Warren Rogers. The N. Y. WASHINGTON, April 6.—Robert "Strange" McNamara came to town like Alice stepping through the looking glass, and he can be forgiven if along about now he finds the Washington wonderland growing "curiouser and curiouser."

McNamara, a Republican, obeyed a summons from a Democratic President to become the eighth Secretary of Defense on Jan. 21, 1961. In the bargain,

he gave up the security of a job he knew, president of Ford Motor Co. at a half-million dollars a year for a \$25,000 post which had baffled and broken others before him.

Like Alice, McNamara brought his own guidelines with him—a way of looking at things so much in conflict with local mores that in no time at all the cry of "off with his head" arose in almost every quarter. Also like Alice, it has been not so much what he has done but how he has done it that has evoked all this wrath.

McNamara's immediate predecessor, Thomas S. Gates Jr., a very competent man who saw the

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country's defense needs clearly, was affable and good-humored, even in stress. He could cajole and smile his way through steamy sessions with the admirals and generals and, even more importantly, with the Congress and the press.

A Tough-Minded Man

The "soft" technique is foreign to McNamara. He prefers—so far, at any rate—to make his tough decisions first, let the hue and cry against them build to a crescendo, and roar back with a permanent-flourishing counter-attacks which almost invariably devastates his foes. He seems not to care that this technique litters the arena with dead and wounded feelings.

Yet, inconsistent as it may appear, this tough-minded man does care. He is, like a good, tough club fighter who loves to mix it, but who, despite himself, cuts easily.

This thin-skinned toughness was clearly evident when he told Senate investigators looking into the TFX jetplane contract award that his 12-year-old son Craig had asked when he would be "cleared." There is some reason to believe he knew the humanizing effect this would have on his public image, but there is no reason to think that he was anything but utterly sincere in his concern for what his family thinks of him.

His interest in how he appears to be going shows up also in the careful check that is made of incoming mail at the Pentagon. The general impression in Washington, particularly on Capitol Hill and among the press, is that he is a Peck's bad boy who may soon get into one fight too many and be expelled. But his mail can be revealed here.

indicates quite the opposite, as far as the American people are concerned.

As of April 2, for example, he had received 626 letters and telegrams since the controversy began over his award of the TFX contract to General Dynamics instead of Boeing of these 626, a total of 601 favored his policies and 25 opposed them.

This correspondent poured over the mail, stacked in a outaway corrugated box. It was an interesting commentary on McNamara's way of doing things that he had replied in some way to all 601 favorable messages but did not bother to acknowledge any of the 25 unfavorable.

The pro-McNamara mail praised his "strong leadership" and his "honest, integrity, intelligence and judgement." One short letter said in full: "Keep up the good work! You are doing a damn fine job! Congress has been in the saddle too long."

A man from Cayucos, Calif., sent a shamrock which he said had been in his family for 60 years. McNamara sent it back with thanks, but he referred to it as a "four-leaf clover"—a small but revealing example of how this complex man with so nimble a mathematical mind goes muscle-bound with words.

Influential Figure in Cabinet

The anti-McNamara mail was bluntly critical. One letter posed the question: "If you had operated Ford's in the way you gave the contract to General Dynamics, how long do you (think) you and Ford would last?" Another advised: "You are a brilliant man but you still have a lot to learn and a hell of a long way to go."

At 46, Robert McNamara is physically, mentally and influentially a very strong man. Tall, lean, dressed as unobtrusively as a department store floorwalker, with his metal-rimmed glasses and his hair parted almost in the middle like a John Held Jr. character, he would not attract much notice in a crowd.

But when he starts talking in his dry, rather cracked,

velce, and the statistics and the percentages roll out, it is impossible not to be impressed. And it is then that one notices he cares for his physical health as well as his mental, through mountain-climbing and badminton.

As to influence, only the President's brother, Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, outweighs him in the cabinet—and not always, particularly in the national security area.

The daring he has displayed here recently is not new. A native of San Francisco, he grew up as the only child of doing parents. At 15, tired of living with books while other boys played baseball, he went to sea, working his way to Latin America and the Orient. With that out of his system, he went back to books and, between studies at Harvard and service with the Army Air Corps in World War II, he became enamored of the laws of probability. It was his mastery of this esoteric discipline which led him to the top at Ford and which governs his thinking as he reshapes the Pentagon.

Where he goes from here may well depend upon whether he can reshape his public image—a cold fish. As his letter-writing critic said, he still has "a lot to learn and a hell of a long way to go."

Memo: McNamara for President

President Kennedy doesn't know it, but one of his top cabinet members has been sounded out by two influential Republican publishers about running for President—against the Democrats—in 1968.

An interesting memo giving this inside news is now being circulated right under Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's nose by his own military leaders. He does not know about the memo.

The memo claims that "feeler antennae" were extended to him by two prominent publishers high up in Republican policy councils when he visited New York City in late November.

Already the buildup of Bob McNamara is under way, the memo continues. He's gotten the humanizing treatment in the Luce (Fortune) and Curtis (Saturday Evening Post) publications, the twin organs of Republican respectability.

Like Eisenhower's, McNamara's ordinariness is being played into a sterling virtue. McNamara has a few of the qualities that the ordinary man finds annoying, but so few that he might find quite appealing.

Bob McNamara is not in-

aware of the growing political figure he is cutting on the national scene. Having already established one side of his archetypal Americanism—the competitive, hard, pragmatic, individualistic and success-striving—he must cultivate the other—the religious-idealistic, friendly, cooperative side.

In 1968, the Constitution will bar a third term, legally removing the distaste of any Secretary of Defense for the prospect of politically challenging his boss.

GOP strategists who are hopeful that Bob McNamara will take the political plunge have one thing going for them which was not present in 1948 when nobody, not even Mamie, knew whether her husband was a Republican or a Democrat. Peggy McNamara knows that up to 1952, Bob was true-blue to the party of Abraham Lincoln.

Red Peru?

You can take the headlines of a Communist plot in Peru with a large grain of salt. Real fact is that the military junta which seized control of Peru last July has been looking for an excuse to get more aid from the Kennedy Administration, and the best way of getting it is to wave the flag of communism.

So many governments have yelled wolf over communism that he might find quite appealing, however, that Washington is getting a bit blasé about it.

Furthermore, the record of

the Peruvian military is extremely interesting.

First, they kicked out the only democratically elected president in years, Manuel Prado, and used Sherman tanks given them earlier by the United States to do it.

Second, they did this in order to thwart a strong anti-Communist liberal, Victor Raúl Haya de la Torre, from taking office. Haya de la Torre, who represented a left-of-center faction similar to that of Italian Premier Amintore Fanfani, had just won a hard-fought election in which he was vigorously opposed by both the Communists and the military.

Third, the military leaders who kicked out Prado and thwarted the election of Haya had been schooled by the U.S. military.

They were flabbergasted, therefore, when President Kennedy broke off diplomatic relations. Finally, against the advice of the State Department, Mr. Kennedy resumed relations.

But the Peruvian military, though getting some aid from the United States, haven't got enough. The Communist disturbance has come just at the right time to be fanned up into an awesome menace so they can get more.

JKR's Friend

All last year, the secret voting in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee was

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7. for Kennedy policies. He squeaked through by a margin of one vote. At the current session it looks as if this one vote margin would be reversed largely through JFK's one-time good friend and former usher at his wedding, Sen. George Smathers, the dapper Florida Dixiecrat.

Smathers has asked for a place on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and despite his consistent opposition to Mr. Kennedy, Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and Democrat leader Mike Mansfield expect to give it to him.

The myth that Smathers is still a friend of the President's is not merely a myth.

The handsome Senator from Florida still claims to be a friend but the White House doesn't reciprocate that friendship. Mr. Kennedy respects

the civil amenities, entertains Smathers at breakfast with other Senators, but grifts his teeth in private over Smathers' continual opposition.

No Senator except Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) was more critical of Mr. Kennedy's original Cuban policy of watchful waiting

than JFK's former usher. And last October, Smathers even kept Congress in session one week extra to prevent his

friend in the White House from exercising a pocket veto of a bill to permit doctors and

the self-employed to get tax concessions for special pensions.

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McNamara Qualifies for Cosmos Club

Secretary of Defense McNamara has been elected to membership in the Cosmos Club— from which several Government officials resigned recently because a Negro was refused membership.

The election of Mr. McNamara was confirmed yesterday by Paul H. Oehser, club secretary. Mr. Oehser is director of the editorial and publications division of the Smithsonian Institution.

Asked whether Mr. McNamara, who is now in Asia, has accepted club membership, Mr. Oehser said: "I am not free to make any further comment."

The club is made up of persons prominent in art, science, literature, public service and professions. There was a stir in January when it became known that the Membership Committee had blocked the name of Carl Rowan, Negro Assistant Secretary of State, in addition to the resignation of several members. President Kennedy's name was withdrawn from the list of those proposed for membership.

The club membership subsequently voted for an anti-discrimination resolution, but it takes only two votes of the 12-man Membership Committee to reject an application.

McNamara Gives Chief Headaches

Robert McNamara, former president of Ford Motor Company, has all the earmarks of making an excellent Secretary of Defense, but he certainly caused his new chief, in the White House, some political headaches. The headaches run deep and could be permanent.



Headache No. 1 came when McNamara vetoed veteran labor leader Joe Keenan as assistant Secretary of Defense in charge of manpower. This is still causing Labor resentment. Furthermore, the Defense Department is sure to have labor troubles, such as the strike which tied up missile base construction, and McNamara will be wishing he had a man like Keenan to straighten things out.

Headache No. 2 came when McNamara vetoed Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. for Secretary of the Navy and accepted John B. Connally, Texas oil attorney instead.

The Roosevelt appointment as Secretary of the Navy was to have been a cornerstone in Mr. Kennedy's political strategy. FDR, Jr. had fought hard for him long before the bandwagon rush developed. His appointment would have fol-

lowed an old tradition, set by Teddy Roosevelt, of a Roosevelt serving in the Navy Department. Finally, the Navy post was to be a build up for FDR to run for Governor of New York against Nelson Rockefeller.

However, Mr. Kennedy had given McNamara the right to veto his assistants in the Defense Department and McNamara turned thumbs down.

Since then, Kennedy has frequently been up in New York conferring with Democratic leaders regarding the best man to replace FDR, Jr., as Democratic candidate against Rockefeller. Mr. Kennedy regards Rockefeller as the Republican candidate for President in 1964, not Nixon, and he wants a potent, popular Democrat to try to polish Nelson off in his gubernatorial reelection race in 1962. FDR, Jr. with a Navy build-up would have been ideal.

This has caused Kennedy advisers to do a little speculating as to why the new Secretary of Defense should veto Roosevelt for the Navy, yet take an oilman like Connally. Connally could have been appointed to various other jobs, such as Secretary of the Army, which long remained open—and there would have been no argument. He's an able, intelligent attorney. But Vice President Johnson very much wanted him to be Secretary of the Navy.

Some Kennedy advisers

note that McNamara is taking advice from the New York attorneys for the Ford Motor Company, headed by Eddie Weisk, close friend and counsel to Johnson. Weisk's law partner, Cyrus R. Vance, will now become McNamara's counsel in the Defense Department. They wonder if it wasn't one of these New York advisers who put the kibosh on Franklin Roosevelt, Jr. to be Secretary of the Navy. If so, he did a great favor to Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, also made an opening for Johnson's campaign manager, John Connally.

Navy Contract

Vice President Johnson is famous on Capitol Hill for phoning publishers, editors, and TV executives to try to kill or modify news stories he doesn't like. One story he was not able to kill was published in Fortune magazine last month regarding three of Johnson's Texas supporters, plus his brother Sam, and the amazing Navy contract awarded them, practically without competitive bidding. Johnson's former assistant, John Connally, when he becomes Secretary of the Navy, will administer this contract. It was awarded the Transport Company of Texas, in which his late boss, Sid Richardson, was third largest stockholder, at a time when Connally was attorney for Richardson.

Second largest stockholder in Texas Transport is ex-Congressman John E. Boyle of

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McNamara, Robert S.

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Corpus Christi, a faithful contributor and money-raiser for Vice President Johnson.

At the time the contract was signed, in April, 1959, Sam Johnson, younger brother of the Vice President, held a \$16,000 Senate clerkship under the aegis of his elder brother. Sam conferred with Edgar Linkenhoger, president of TCT, while the Navy negotiations were going on. Afterward, Sam went to work for the company.

The contract was for operating the Navy's house-keeping facilities at Kwajalein in the mid-Pacific, and Fortune describes in well-documented detail how the admirals made sure that the Texas Company was placed in a favored position to get this profitable, cost-plus-fee deal.

The \$5,200,000 estimate for the first 15 months was followed by a \$13,300,000 estimate when the contract was extended for another 15 months, reported Fortune.

The \$18,500,000 total includes \$1,000,000 in fees for TCT.

John Connally, the attorney for the third largest owner of the company, hereafter will administer the Navy end of this same contract.

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Robert McNamara

A POST PORTRAIT

ARTICLE V

Washington, April 17—Robert McNamara has his own definition of President Kennedy's greatest value. He showed grace under stress. McNamara has often said:

And to illustrate his point he is especially fond of one anecdote. During one of the more tense moments amid the Cuban missile crisis McNamara and Kennedy stepped momentarily into the dusk outside the President's office. Along came little Caroline, surreptitiously stuffing something into her mouth.

"Caroline" called the President: "are you eating just before dinner?"

The little girl said nothing and quickened her pace away from the direction of authority. The President smiled, but called out sternly: "Well, what's the answer to my question? Yes? No? Or Maybe?"

McNamara was much impressed that Kennedy the man should show humor and concern about a fairly insignificant transgression at the very moment that Kennedy the President was engrossed by one of the toughest moments since World War II. That, McNamara likes to say, was truly "grace under stress."

BUT THERE IS EVEN MORE SIGNIFICANCE TO the anecdote. For one thing, this is the way McNamara likes to be himself—a cool, methodical and decisive operator who nevertheless will not desert the human touch with his family under the pressure or the volume of his work. And, for another thing, McNamara says emphatically, that the Cuban crisis was the finest hour of this Administration.

Sitting in his huge office in the Pentagon, short of his jacket, with a leg propped over the arm of his chair, a proud smile flickers over his face as he says:

"It was a perfect case of applying power in the national interest. This government has never operated more smoothly. The end result was favorable, of course, and every day makes it appear more favorable."

But it was not only effective in that sense. Internally we showed what we could do. This government has never operated as smoothly. The performance of individuals was never more effective."

The true value of the Cuban experience, McNamara feels, was complete vindication of the current Administration policies of flexible response militarily and of strong central control administratively. The system of delayed action convinced the Soviets we were serious, yet did not force them past the point of no return where nuclear war becomes inevitable.

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However, McNamara is well aware that avoiding global nuclear war—that which Premier Khrushchev has described as “the first class war”—is just part of the distance to peace and security. There is also, to continue Khrushchev’s terminology, “the second class war” which is locally confined as in the case of Korea, and “the third class war” which is war by domestic insurgents.

It is this “third class war” that worries us most. We can use missiles in the global war and we can send troops in the local war of aggression. But what do we do to save a nation when the invaders are really not invaders at all, but native sons, trained and financed by the Communists?

The importance of Vietnam to McNamara and his military and civilian aides is that it is a real testing ground. It is laboratory for the Communist Chinese to see how far they can go and in the same sense it is a laboratory for us as we develop ways to stop them.

From this viewpoint, there are no final conclusions yet. The Communists and the West are still experimenting. How much can the North Vietnamese pour into this? And will this amount force us to escalate our efforts? These are the things they must determine and we have comparable decisions to make.

★ ★ ★

McNAMARA TALKS IN SWIFT, CONCISE SENTENCES. There is the element of good humor in his demeanor as well as confidence and no-nonsense in his tone.

Are there no frustrations? “Oh,” scoffs McNamara. “I don’t think there is much difference in the ad-

ministrative problems here or in a large university or in a large corporation or any other large organization. You work to a common end, and people are the same in or out of government. Of course, the life or death of a nation as well as people is involved here, and that does imply extra pressures.

“You operate in a fishbowl here, but when you reach the point where you’re running any large administration you find you’re never a completely free agent—there are stockholders or trustees of some type.”

There are old-line generals, especially in the Air Force, who wait eagerly for the happy moment when McNamara will be gone and everyone can return to the good old days in which the civilians forked over the money and the military spent it as it damn well saw fit. McNamara does not think this era will be repeated.

It is his view that the system of management he has introduced is firmly established and can be operated by any competent Defense Secretary.

He is convinced that even a deliberate attempt to change it would run into opposition, especially from Congress.

This is quite true. Even when Congressman Hebert criticizes McNamara, he is apt to get most agitated when he points out that many of McNamara’s efficiencies were “stolen” from the House Armed Services Committee—that is, adopted after years of urging by the committee but presented as Defense Dept. innovations.

MUCH OF THE CONGRESS ADMIRES McNamara. Even when he ordered the shutdown of obsolete and wasteful bases, true Congressional protest was slim. The great majority of Representatives telephoned the Defense Secretary to say, “Look, I’ll state a mild beef for the record but if you feel this is right, then by all means go ahead.”

McNamara himself goes for little fakery. When Chicago’s Rep. O’Hara pleaded to get off the political hook by suggesting in a committee hearing that “you didn’t know they’d close our base and I’m sure you’ll look into it,” McNamara replied coolly that of course he knew that the base would be closed and there was no need to look into it because he was certain it was the right decision.

It is the fear of over-centralization that most disturbs Congressmen examining the McNamara regime, and the Secretary must defend himself against it in almost every interview. Some fear that he is leading the Defense Dept. toward a single chief of staff and even a single force in a single uniform, blotting out the individuality of the Army, Navy and Air Force.

“I don’t think we’re anywhere near that point,” McNamara says. “I’m only for unification of effort and unification of planning. We insist that elements of one plan be related to elements of the other. They are not independent of each other.”

The number and function of the Navy Polaris is directly related to the number and function of the Air Force Minuteman. The number of Army divisions is directly related to the number of tactical fighters.

There is no doubt that this requires centralization. But is it over-centralization? McNamara thinks not. He thinks the law establishing the Defense Secretary makes these decisions clearly his responsibility. “All progress is based on controversy,” McNamara says, and he insists that he permits complete freedom of argument on any issue. But once a decision is made, that’s it unless new facts are developed, he says, and then he expects loyalty from all in support of that policy.

He doesn’t always get it. Like other Defense Secretaries before him, he has been outraged by the manner in which disappointed generals and admirals will continue the fight in Congress and through press “leaks.” Even the FBI has been called into the Pentagon to investigate the source of these leaks, but the fact remains that neither McNamara nor any one else can shut off the flow of rebuttal.

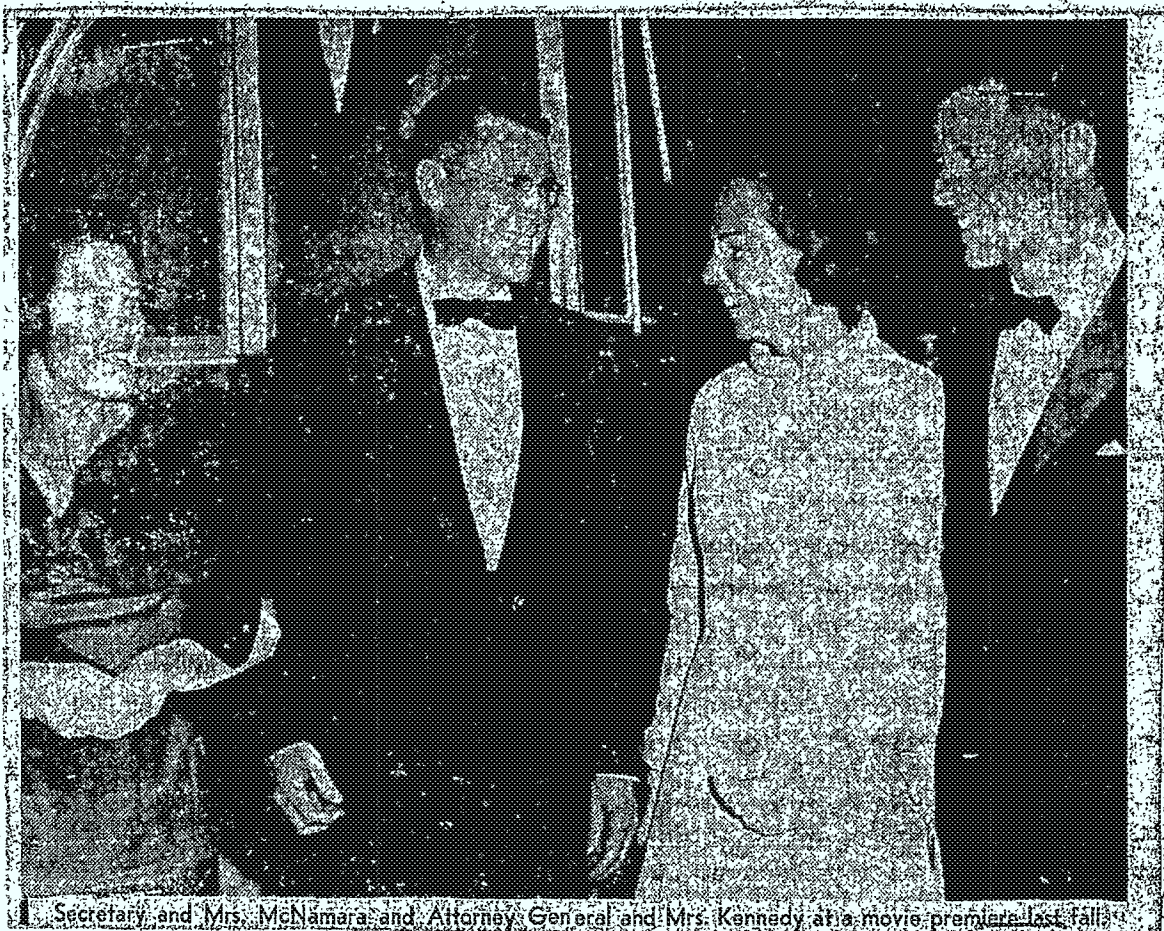
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McNAMARA SHOWS SPECIAL PRIDE IN THE team he has organized at the Pentagon, such men as Roswell Gilpatric (now departed), Paul Nitze, Harold Brown and Cyrus Vance (the deputy Defense Secretary and heir apparent to the top job). “We just couldn’t function without them,” he says. “I doubt if there’s ever been a more able group collected in the government. We also have some extraordinary military leaders. I think Gen. Maxwell Taylor is one of our greatest officers in decades.”

McNamara seldom talks of his own future. A close associate says, “I’m certain he’ll never go back to industry. He shows no interest in the money and he’ll never again be satisfied with simply building a better Ford. I’m sure he’ll stay in public service or go into a foundation or a university.”

Washington gossip has McNamara on the brink of every major job in government: Vice President and Secretary of State to name two. But there’s no indication he takes this seriously.

Right now he remains the most self-sufficient member of the Cabinet. He’s running the biggest business in the world and he relishes every moment.

On December 14, 1964, Mrs. MARTHA D. SULLIVAN, Chief of the Employment Branch, Personnel Division, OASD, (Administrative) Department of Defense, made available to SA [redacted] the personnel file for ROBERT S. MC NAMARA, Secretary of Defense, who resides 2412 Tracy Place, N.W.

A certificate of clearance dated March 1, 1961, disclosed a National Agency check made by OSD, dated December 20, 1960. Background investigation by United States Army dated October 1, 1958, and background investigation by FBI, dated May 5, 1953. Based on these investigations a classification of "Top Secret" was granted as of January 20, 1961.

Mr. MC NAMARA was appointed Secretary of Defense January 21, 1961.

On December 14, 1964, Mr. MARION BEASLEY-Chief of Personnel Security, OSD, made available to SA [redacted] the file for ROBERT STRANGE MC NAMARA, Secretary of Defense, who resides at 2412 Tracy Place, N.W., Washington, D.C. b6 b7C

Instant file contains a report dated October 16, 1958, reflecting results of investigation conducted by the Headquarters, Fifth United States Army, Chicago 15, Illinois. Mr. MC NAMARA was at that time employed by the Ford Motor Company, Dearborn, Michigan. As a result of this investigation he was granted a classification of "Top Secret" in connection with Department of Defense classified contracts being handled by the Ford Motor Company. A review of this report fails to reflect any derogatory information.

Instant file contains a letter dated December 19, 1960, from Mr. GEORGE J. GOULD, Director, Security Services, Office of the Secretary of Defense, to Mr. EARL F. LANE, Assistant Director, Washington Area Security Operations, United States Atomic Energy Commission, requesting that Mr. MC NAMARA, Secretary of Defense Designee, be authorized access to Atomic Energy Commission Restricted Data. As of January 5, 1961, the United States Atomic Energy Commission granted the above mentioned request. Mr. MC NAMARA's "Q" number is WA 113509. Instant file fails to reflect any information of a derogatory nature.

Associates

On December 14, 1964, the Honorable PAUL HENRY NITZE, Secretary of Navy, advised SA [redacted] he has a social and business association with MC NAMARA. Their respective families exchange home visits. It is necessary during normal course of business for NITZE to confer frequently with him. b6 b7C

NITZE stated both he and MC NAMARA are skiing enthusiasts and ski each year at Aspen, Colorado. As reported by NITZE, MC NAMARA was "brought up in California, studied at University of California, Berkley Campus, where he met Mrs. MC NAMARA. While attending school, during summer employment, MC NAMARA worked "as a sailor,"---one of GUS HALL's boys."

He became interested in accounting, subsequently taught at Harvard Business School. After a tour in the service during World War II, he became affiliated with the Ford Motor Company.

NITZE was not able to give dates or further specific information regarding above.

NITZE stated he could vouch for MC NAMARA's loyalty, discretion, patriotism. He recommended him for a position of trust and confidence.

On December 15, 1964, Doctor HAROLD BROWN, Director of Defense, Research and Engineering, Office of the Secretary of Defense, Pentagon, Washington, D.C., advised SA [redacted] he has known the HONORABLE ROBERT S. MC NAMARA, Secretary of Defense since February of 1961. Doctor BROWN said at that time Mr. MC NAMARA offered him the position he now holds. After accepting this position Doctor BROWN said he has had very close professional contact with Mr. MC NAMARA and a limited amount of social contact with him. Doctor BROWN considered Mr. MC NAMARA to be of very strong character, great loyalty and possessing an outstanding sense of right and wrong. He said Mr. MC NAMARA has never been associated with organizations or individuals of questionable character and is the most capable individual in the position which he now holds in the United States Government.

On December 14, 1964, Honorable CHARLES J. HITCH, Assistant Secretary of Defense (Comptroller) Department of Defense, Pentagon, Washington, D.C., advised SA [redacted] that he is acquainted with ROBERT S. MC NAMARA, Secretary of Defense, having met him in January, 1961, at which time both he and MC NAMARA were employed at Department of Defense, Pentagon. HITCH further advised that he places MC NAMARA "very near the top in all respects" never having known a person of greater honesty and integrity. HITCH stated that MC NAMARA can not perceive of disloyalty to the United States, and has no sympathy for anyone so inclined. HITCH further stated that he would say that MC NAMARA is "very much a puritan," socializes only when officially necessary and to HITCH's knowledge has limited social engagements to the minimum, devoting his time to the fulfillment of his duties as Secretary of Defense.

HITCH said that his relationship with MC NAMARA was of a business nature, including official social functions, and therefore could not give any comment as to MC NAMARA's friends and association affiliations other than that he knows that MC NAMARA is associated with the Aspen Institute, Aspen, Colorado.

On December 15, 1964, the Honorable EUGENE G. FUBINI, Assistant Secretary of Defense (Deputy Director Research and Engineering) Department of Defense, Pentagon, Washington, D.C., advised SA [] that he has known ROBERT S. MC NAMARA for four years, and has known him well for two years. FUBINI further advised that in his opinion MC NAMARA has done more than anyone to prevent and counter enemy threats against the United States, and therefore is of unquestionable loyalty. FUBINI stated that he has the utmost respect for MC NAMARA and has found him to be an extremely honest individual in their associations. FUBINI further stated that he has not socialized with MC NAMARA other than mutual official obligations and is of the opinion that MC NAMARA does not have much time for social activities.

On December 16, 1964, the Honorable ALEXANDER HENRY FLAX, Assistant Secretary of the Air Force, (Research and Development), Office of the Secretary of the Air Force, advised SA [] he has known MC NAMARA since May, 1963, solely in a business capacity. Since that time he has conferred with him at the most, once per week.

MC NAMARA is considered to be a remarkable fellow, wholly loyal and dedicated.

Nothing of a derogatory nature has ever been brought to his attention and he would recommend him for a position of trust and confidence based on his limited association.

On December 16, 1964, the Honorable PAUL R. IGNATIUS, Assistant Secretary of Defense, advised SA [] he came to Washington, D.C., in April, 1961, and prior to that time was connected with Hanbridge House, Incorporated, in Massachusetts.

He stated he knew the Honorable ROBERT S. MC NAMARA, Secretary of Defense only by reputation prior to 1961.

He said during the past three years he has never heard anything of a derogatory nature regarding MC NAMARA and believes he is doing an outstanding job for his country. He said he has no reason to doubt MC NAMARA's character, loyalty or associates, and is looking forward to his dynamic leadership as Secretary of Defense in the years to come.

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The Honorable CYRUS R. VANCE, Deputy Secretary of Defense, was contacted on December 15, 1964, by SA [redacted] regarding ROBERT S. MC NAMARA, Secretary of Defense. VANCE stated that he first met MC NAMARA on January 4, 1961, the day MC NAMARA came to work in the Defense Department. VANCE stated that he has worked very, very closely on a day to day basis with MC NAMARA since this time, and has worked especially close for approximately the last year, during which time he served as MC NAMARA's Deputy. He stated that he and MC NAMARA have socialized in each others homes and have become very close personal friends. VANCE said that in regard to MC NAMARA's character, associates, reputation and loyalty, he had no reservations whatsoever, and in recommending him he stated, "He is the finest public servant I have ever met."

BE LIEU, Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Installations and Logistics), was contacted on December 15, 1964, by SA [redacted] regarding ROBERT S. MC NAMARA and stated that he first met MC NAMARA approximately four years ago when MC NAMARA came to assume his position as Secretary of Defense. BE LIEU stated that he has worked closely at times with MC NAMARA on problems involving national defense. BE LIEU stated that he has met MC NAMARA occasionally socially but this was infrequent. He stated that with regard to MC NAMARA's character, associates, reputation and loyalty he would, of course, have no question. He stated that he would, of course, recommend MC NAMARA for a position of trust and confidence with the Government.

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The Honorable WILLIAM STEPHEN AILES, Secretary of the Army was contacted on December 16, 1964, by SA [redacted] regarding ROBERT S. MC NAMARA, and advised that he has known MC NAMARA since February 1, 1961, when he, AILES, came to Washington, and was awaiting his swearing in as Under Secretary of the Army. During the time he was Under Secretary of the Army AILES stated he worked very closely with MC NAMARA, seeing him at least twice weekly regarding business problems, and socializing with him frequently. AILES stated that he has worked even more closely with MC NAMARA since becoming Secretary of the Army, and still maintains his social contacts with him. AILES stated that he has no reason to question MC NAMARA's character, associates, reputation, and loyalty, and in recommending him for a position of trust and confidence with the Government stated "I have absolute unlimited admiration and respect for him."

SA MAURICE F. DONEGAN, JR. caused a search to be made of the files of the Central Intelligence Agency, and was advised on December 14, 1964, that the files contained no pertinent identifiable information concerning the appointee. ✓

IC [] caused a search to be made of the files of the Bureau of Personnel Investigations, Civil Service Commission, and was advised on December 16, 1964, that no additional pertinent information was found concerning the appointee. ✓

On December 16, 1964, IC [] reviewed the newspaper clippings maintained in the libraries of The Washington Daily News and The Evening Star, and except for the following no derogatory information was obtained:

The library of The Washington Daily News contained an article from The Washington Evening Star dated April 18, 1962, entitled "MC NAMARA Scored on Contract." Representative GERALD R. FORD, JR., of Michigan accused MC NAMARA of an "evasion of the law" in awarding a steel contract to the Lukens Steel Company. Representative LAIRD, WWSconsin, said this action violated the laws covering competitive bidding in the procurement of defense materials.

Also at the Washington Daily News, an article from The Daily News dated September 3, 1964, reflected that Representative WILSON, California, accused MC NAMARA of using United States tax funds to propagandize to American servicemen about the JOHNSON Administration. He cited a telegram MC NAMARA sent to military base information offices describing the President's anti-poverty law.

On December 14, 1964, IC [] reviewed the Merchant Marine record of ROBERT STRANGE MC NAMARA, born June 2, 1916, at San Francisco, California.

No additional information since December, 1960.

On December 11, 1964, IC [] caused a search to be made at Coast Guard Headquarters, Intelligence Branch, and was advised by personnel no record could be found for appointee.

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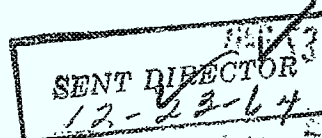
EDNA A. COERVER, Executive Secretary to Senator BARRY GOLDWATER of Arizona, advised that they were closing the Senator's Office on Capitol Hill and that the Senator did not plan to do any work from that office. She stated that she did not know how to contact the Senator except through the Republican National Committee. She suggested calling DEAN BIRCH, National Chairman of the GOP, who would be able to furnish us with the location of Senator GOLDWATER.

A call was placed to the Republican National Committee and the Office of Mr. DEAN BIRCH, and his Secretary Mrs. BOWEN took the message and stated that Mr. BIRCH was tied up in conference but would later in the day arrange an appointment for us to interview Senator GOLDWATER.

At 5:00 p.m. a call was placed to Mrs. BOWEN who stated she was unable to contact Mr. BIRCH. She, at that time, furnished Senator GOLDWATER's telephone number and stated

that it would be permissive for us to call him directly to set up an appointment.

This telephone call was made and an answering service took our number at WFO and stated that Senator GOLDWATER would return our call when he became available. A few minutes later Senator GOLDWATER did return our call at which time he was asked for an appointment. He was told we were conducting a special inquiry investigation concerning the Secretary of Defense, ROBERT STRANGE MC NAMARA.

Senator GOLDWATER stated that because of the pressure of business he would prefer to be interviewed on the phone. He stated that he did not know MC NAMARA well nor has he had much personal contact with him. He stated that he would be unable to give any specific comments concerning MC NAMARA other than to state that he considered him very alert, brilliant and obviously a good organizer. He stated that he had no question whatsoever concerning MC NAMARA's loyalty to the United States. He stated that MC NAMARA enjoyed an excellent personal and professional reputation.

He stated that the only reservation he had concerning MC NAMARA was that he did not consider MC NAMARA to be "completely honest." At this point Senator GOLDWATER was requested to set up an appointment with us at his convenience so that we might interview him personally. Senator GOLDWATER stated that he did not feel that this was necessary, explaining his former remark of MC NAMARA not being "completely honest" in the following way:

He stated that he, GOLDWATER, has had access to top secret information and is aware that MC NAMARA is not telling the American people the complete story in reference to the missile gap. He stated that perhaps this was not MC NAMARA's fault inasmuch as he might be under orders to make the various public announcements concerning our military preparedness. GOLDWATER stated that it appeared that MC NAMARA was bent on disarming this country. Senator GOLDWATER stated that he could not be more specific concerning his criticism of MC NAMARA but that it was just an impression on his part not having heard MC NAMARA testify and from reading his various public announcements.



Senator GOLDWATER stated that he did not want to appear adamant in reference to arranging an appointment for a personal interview but stated that he really was not well acquainted with Mr. MC NAMARA and could furnish no further information concerning him.

He suggested as a possible source of information concerning Mr. MC NAMARA Representative JERALD R. FORD, JR. of Michigan. He stated that he believed that FORD had caught MC NAMARA in some discrepancy concerning his testimony at the House of Representatives.

WFO will interview Congressman FORD.

SPECIAL INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

Attached airtel sets forth interview of Senator Goldwater concerning Secretary of Defense McNamara, who is subject of current special inquiry. Goldwater preferred to be interviewed telephonically and was favorable in his comments concerning McNamara, but feels McNamara not telling American people the complete story concerning the missile gap and might be under orders not to do so. Goldwater's comments will be included in the supplemental summary memorandum on McNamara to be sent to the White House.

U.S. Senator HOWARD W. CANNON of Nevada advised SA [] on 12/21/64, that he considers the appointee to be a fine man who has done a great job as Secretary of Defense. He stated he did not always agree with MC NAMARA's policies, but these were honest sincere differences of opinion. He stated he has known the appointee since MC NAMARA has been in office, and recommended him highly. Senator CANNON stated that the only social contact he has had with MC NAMARA has been at official affairs.

U.S. Senator STUART SYMINGTON of Missouri advised SA [] on 12/21/64, that he has known the appointee for four years socially and professionally. He described the appointee as an outstanding man and a very fine public servant who has done a good job in a tough position.

U.S. Senator ROBERT C. BYRD of West Virginia advised SA [] on 12/21/64, he has known the appointee for four years. He stated the appointee testified before their committee and he was very much impressed with his ability. He stated that the appointee has done a good job. He commented favorably concerning the appointee's character, associates, reputation and loyalty, adding that he has had no social contact with the appointee.

U.S. Senator PAT MC NAMARA of Michigan advised SA [] on 12/21/64, that he has known the appointee since he has been in office. He stated that he has the highest professional regard for the appointee as a fine man and an outstanding public servant. He recommended MC NAMARA without reservation. He added that he has known MC NAMARA socially at large official functions only.

On 12/17/64, the Honorable BROOKWAY MC MILLAN, Under-Secretary of the Air Force Office of the Secretary of the Air Force, advised SA [] that he has known the appointee since 1961 when MC NAMARA became Secretary of Defense. MC MILLAN stated he has known MC NAMARA in a business capacity only. He

stated that from his observations he considers MC NAMARA to be above reproach in relation to his loyalty, character, and associates. [] stated that he had no information coming to his attention of a derogatory nature concerning the appointee.

He was issued Diplomatic Passport #X-003050 on 7/19/61 for approximately one week's travel to France, Germany, and Italy on official business for the Department of Defense.

He gave his permanent residence as 80 Kalorama Circle, N.W., Washington, D.C. He listed his parents as ROBERT JAMES MC NAMARA, born approximately 1865 at Massachusetts; and CLARANELL STRANGE, born approximately 1885 at Yuba City, California. He indicated he was last married on 8/13/40 to MARGARET CRAIG, born 8/22/15 at Seattle, Washington.

On 12/21/64, Mr. ORVILLE L. FREEMAN, Secretary U.S. Department of Agriculture, advised SA [] he has known MC NAMARA and his family both socially and professionally since 1960 and considered the family the highest type of persons. He stated he had no reservations regarding MC NAMARA whatsoever and vouched for his character, associates, reputation, conduct, and loyalty. He recommended him highly.

Congressman FORD stated that he realizes that there has been a bitter feud between Senator BARRY GOLDWATER and MC NAMARA. He stated that GOLDWATER has spoken to him about his differences with MC NAMARA. Mr. FORD stated that he considered it a personality clash between GOLDWATER and MC NAMARA. He stated that both men, whom he admires greatly, are very categorical in what they say, and when the other party interprets what they say, they sometimes put the wrong connotation on what has been said or "read into it" what they want to from their point of view.

Congressman FORD stated that he realized that Senator GOLDWATER does not believe that the appointee has been completely honest with some of his testimony before various committees on Capitol Hill and in public announcements he has made. Congressman FORD stated that he did not agree with this and felt that the appointee was within his legitimate right, protecting the public interest and the administration in the manner in which he has testified or made public announcements. Congressman FORD stated emphatically that he has never caught the appointee in anything which he would consider would reflect on his honesty or integrity.

He mentioned that during the last campaign, he was one of seven members of a Republican Task Force, which had been appointed by Senator GOLDWATER, whose job it was during the campaign to attack the Department of Defense. He stated that they would attack the Department of Defense on numerous particular points. He stated that it was brought to his attention that Mr. MC NAMARA was unhappy with him feeling that possibly some of the criticism was not fair. He stated, that on the other hand, he knows that Senator GOLDWATER was unhappy with their task force, inasmuch as he did not think they hit at the Department of Defense hard enough. He stated that here was where it became a matter of opinion. GOLDWATER has his opinions, MC NAMARA has his opinions and he, Congressman FORD, has his opinions.

He mentioned that after he, FORD, won his re-election to the House of Representatives, he received a telegram from the appointee which stated something to the effect, Congratulations on your re-election. No hard feelings. All is forgotten.

Mr. FORD stated that he considered the appointee an outstanding public servant of tremendous ability. He stated that he was a fine man, both professionally and personally, and that he would recommend him without reservation for a position of trust and confidence.

Senator STROM THURMOND of South Carolina advised SA [redacted] on 12/22/64, that he has known the appointee professionally since the appointee has been Secretary of Defense. Senator THURMOND stated that he did not wish to make any further comments concerning the appointee.

Applicant-type investigations were conducted concerning Mr. McNamara in 1953 and 1960, the results of which were summarized in a memorandum dated December 29, 1960. A copy of that memorandum has been furnished to the White House. The attached memorandum sets forth Mr. McNamara's activities since December, 1960.

Several individuals acquainted with Mr. McNamara have not been available for interview. When these persons are interviewed, you will be advised. The checks of the records of several governmental agencies have not been completed. When the results of these checks are received, they will be furnished to you.

The Internal Revenue Service has advised that income tax returns were timely filed by Mr. McNamara for the years 1961, 1962 and 1963. There is no record of unpaid taxes, liens, audit examinations or intelligence investigations concerning these returns.

The investigation of Mr. McNamara covered inquiries as to his character, loyalty, general standing and ability, but no inquiries were made as to the sources of his income.

poration and six other companies. Lukens did not join in the increase, which was later rescinded by all companies.

Representative Melvin R. Laird, Republican of Wisconsin, said Mr. McNamara's action violated the laws covering competitive bidding in the procurement of defense material.

Senate hearings into steel industry pricing practices probably will start in about six weeks, Senator Estes Kefauver, Democrat of Tennessee, said today. That much delay is necessary, he explained, because steel companies have thirty days to respond to subpoenas issued by his Senate Antitrust and Monopoly Subcommittee for some steel company records.

Representative Ford, who brought up the subject of the Lukens contract during debate on the defense appropriation bill, called for a Congressional investigation.

"This was an obvious evasion of the law covering defense procurement," Mr. Ford said.

Congressman GERALD R. FORD, JR., of Michigan, was interviewed by SA [] on 12/29/64.

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Congressman FORD read a copy of the news article appearing in the 'Washington Evening Star' Newspaper of 4/18/62 which contained an article that Congressman FORD had accused the appointee, Secretary of Defense, of an "evasion of the law" in awarding a steel contract to the Lukens Steel Company.

Congressman FORD stated, after reading the news article, that he recalled the above incident well. He stated that this was at the time that United States Steel (USS) had proposed an increase in the price of steel and then President KENNEDY made a vigorous appeal that these prices not be raised.

Congressman FORD stated that USS had pioneered the development of a special type of steel used in the hulls of submarines and were the principal suppliers for this steel. He stated that several of the companies, including the Lukens Steel Company also became involved in this type of business.

He stated that it was his attitude that it was an evasion of the law for the Defense Department to award any contracts without having competitive bidding.

He stated that the Department of the Navy and the Office of the Secretary of Defense justified their actions because the Lukens Steel Company had not increased their prices. He stated that they also cited provisions under the procurement law which gives them flexibility in awarding contracts, citing the exigency provisions of these laws. Congressman FORD explained that under these provisions, it is necessary for them to obtain competitive bids. He stated they also took the attitude that inasmuch as the Lukens Steel Company had not raised their prices, they were cheaper than the proposed price scheduled published by USS; therefore, if they had gone through the formality of competitive bidding, it would have been only a formality.

Congressman FORD stated that there is an area there where a person can take a different view than the one he did. He stated that he still feels that Mr. MC NAMARA was wrong in his decision. He stated he did not feel that it was the spirit of the law or the way that Congress wanted the Executive Department to use these laws.

Congressman FORD emphasized that he still considers Mr. MC NAMARA a very able, talented and devoted public servant and that the above is just one of those many difficult decisions a person in his position must make which are naturally open to constructive criticism. Congressman FORD stated that he would recommend the appointee without reservation for a position of trust and confidence.

On 1/5/65 Representative BOB WILSON, Republican of California, advised SA [] in response to inquiry concerning news article that appeared in the "Washington Daily News" 9/3/64 that the accusation was made in the heat of political battle inasmuch as he felt the Democratic Party was doing something only for political gain and were using Government funds to promote their political party.

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He stated that he did not feel his comments were pertinent at this time. He added that he feels that MC NAMARA is certainly an honest man and a man of integrity. Representative WILSON did not comment further concerning the above matter.

The additional inquiries have also been highly favorable including favorable comments by Democratic Senators Russell, Ga.; Ervin, N.C.; Inouye, Hawaii; Stennis, Miss.; Kennedy, N.Y.; Jackson, Wash.; Hart and McNamara, Mich.; Cannon, Nev.; Symington, Mo.; Byrd, W.Va.; as well as Republicans Saltonstall, Mass.; and former Senator Beall, Md. Senator Thurmond (D - S.C.) did not desire to comment concerning McNamara.

Former Senator Goldwater (R - Ariz.) was favorable in his comments but feels McNamara is not completely honest in telling American people about the gap in guided missiles. He suggested; however, McNamara might be under orders in this respect. He recommended Representative Gerald Ford (R - Mich.) be interviewed and indicated Ford had caught McNamara in a discrepancy while testifying before Congress. Representative Ford stated he has never detected McNamara doing anything dishonest and recommended him without reservation.

In April, 1962, the local press quoted Ford as stating McNamara had evaded the law in awarding a steel contract without competitive bidding. Ford currently indicated the prices of the firm concerned were the lowest and although the spirit of the law was not followed, his criticism might be considered a difference of opinion.

Representative Bob Wilson (R - Calif.) was quoted by the local press in September, 1964, as accusing McNamara of using Government funds to propagandize the Johnson Administration. The incident involved a telegram sent by McNamara to military bases describing the President's anti-poverty law. Wilson currently advised his accusation was made in the heat of political "battle" and said he considers McNamara to be an honest man.

Information Not Included in Summary Memorandum

Don B. Reynolds in December, 1964, while testifying before the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration in Executive Session, alleged that a Mr. Evans of the Gruman Aircraft Corporation delivered \$100,000 to Bobby Baker's office on an unknown date in connection with the awarding of the TFX plane contract to General Dynamics Corporation.

McNamara, among others was interviewed in connection with that allegation. He advised there was no influence from the White House or the Capitol on his decision to award the contract to the General Dynamics Corporation. His decision was based upon the results of an extensive study by a staff of 250 men of the merits of the General Dynamics plane and other planes. This information is not included in the summary memorandum since the results of that inquiry have been previously furnished to the White House and there was no allegation against McNamara.

ACTION:

McNamara specifically requested the results of the investigation of him be delivered to the President. The previous summary memorandum was delivered personally to Mrs. Mildred Stegall at the White House since the President was out of town at the time. It is recommended that a representative of Mr. DeLoach's office also deliver the attached letter and summary memorandum to Mrs. Stegall at the White House.

SPECIAL INQUIRY

By letter dated 12/3/64, received 12/7/64, McNamara requested a Special Inquiry investigation be conducted concerning him and the results furnished to the President.

Applicant-type investigations were conducted concerning McNamara in 1953 and 1960, the results of which have been previously furnished to the White House. The previous investigations have been brought up to date. Our inquiries are complete with the exception of interviews with a number of individuals, including U.S. Senators who are members of the Senate Armed Services Committee, who have been unavailable to date, and the checks of the files of the Passport Office, Secret Service and Office of Special Investigations, Department of the Air Force.

Previous and current investigations, which included interviews with high business and Government officials, were highly favorable.

INFORMATION NOT BEING DISSEMINATED:

During an interview with Paul Henry Nitze, Secretary of the Navy, he advised that when McNamara was attending the University of California in the 1930's he worked one summer "as a sailor - one of Gus Hall's boys." When Agents pinned him down as to what he meant by this he backed away and stated the statement was made in jest and that actually he had no specific information in this regard. He indicated he would vouch for McNamara's loyalty and recommended him for a position of trust. Gus Hall is General Secretary of the Communist Party (CP), U.S.A., and has been affiliated with the CP for many years.

having joined the Party in 1927. The previous investigation of McNamara disclosed he was issued a seaman's certificate in April, 1937, at San Francisco, California, but had no recorded voyages. (McNamara attended the University of California from August, 1933, to May, 1937, and Harvard University from September, 1937, to June, 1939.)

The results of the interview with Nitze are included in the summary memorandum, however, his statement that McNamara was a "sailor - one of Gus Hall's boys" is not being disseminated since neither the prior nor the current investigations disclosed any indication that McNamara has been sympathetic to or affiliated with communism and since Nitze backed away when pinned down on this.

ACTION:

The information contained in this summary memorandum supplements that contained in a summary memorandum dated December 23, 1964.

Interviews

Barry M. Goldwater, former United States Senator from Arizona, advised at Washington, D. C., he is not well acquainted with Mr. McNamara and has had little personal contact with him. He stated he cannot make any specific comments concerning Mr. McNamara except to say he considers Mr. McNamara to be a very alert and brilliant individual who obviously is a good organizer. He said Mr. McNamara enjoys an excellent personal and professional reputation. He also stated he has no question concerning Mr. McNamara's loyalty to the United States.

Mr. Goldwater said his only reservation concerning Mr. McNamara is that he does not consider Mr. McNamara to be "completely honest." In explanation of this statement, Mr. Goldwater said he has had access to top secret information and he is aware Mr. McNamara is not telling the American people the complete story in reference to the "missile gap." Mr. Goldwater stated that perhaps this is not Mr. McNamara's fault because he might be under orders to make various public announcements concerning our military preparedness. He also stated it appears that Mr. McNamara is bent on disarming this country. Mr. Goldwater said he cannot be more specific concerning his criticism of Mr. McNamara because it is an impression he has received after reading various public announcements made by Mr. McNamara.

Strom Thurmond, United States Senator from South Carolina, advised at Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. McNamara professionally since Mr. McNamara became Secretary of Defense. Senator Thurmond stated he does not wish to make any further comment concerning Mr. McNamara.

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Richard B. Russell, United States Senator from Georgia, advised at Winder, Georgia, he has worked closely with Mr. McNamara and he feels that Mr. McNamara is a dedicated and patriotic American citizen. He said he also feels that Mr. McNamara will serve his country to the limit of his ability. He highly recommended Mr. McNamara as to his loyalty to the United States.

James Glenn Beall, former United States Senator, from Maryland, advised at Frostburg, Maryland, he has been acquainted with Mr. McNamara since Mr. McNamara was appointed Secretary of Defense. He stated he was a member of the United States Senate at the time Mr. McNamara's appointment was confirmed and although he and Mr. McNamara have disagreed on issues, he has never questioned the confirmation of Mr. McNamara's appointment. He described Mr. McNamara as an individual of the highest integrity as well as a devoted public servant. He highly recommended Mr. McNamara as an individual of excellent character and reputation and a loyal American.

Leverett Saltonstall, United States Senator from Massachusetts, advised at Boston, Massachusetts, he has known Mr. McNamara for four years. He stated that his association with Mr. McNamara has been limited to the conduct of Government business. He also stated he has never observed nor heard of anything that could be considered detrimental to Mr. McNamara as an individual or as Secretary of Defense. He said that during the period he has known Mr. McNamara he has noted that Mr. McNamara is courageous in his judgments and conscientious in connection with the enormous duties of his office. He also stated he considers Mr. McNamara to be an individual of excellent character, reputation and associates. He further stated that in his opinion Mr. McNamara's loyalty to the United States is above question.

Sam J. Ervin, Jr., United States Senator from North Carolina, advised at Morganton, North Carolina, that Mr. McNamara is an individual of excellent character and reputation. He said he feels that Mr. McNamara has no unfavorable personal characteristics. He stated Mr. McNamara is devoted to his country and his loyalty to the United States is above question. He said he sees no reason why Mr. McNamara should not continue in his position as Secretary of Defense.

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Daniel K. Inouye, United States Senator from Hawaii, advised at Honolulu, Hawaii, he is a member of the Armed Services Committee of the United States Senate and has been personally acquainted with Mr. McNamara since 1960. He said he has had frequent contacts with Mr. McNamara, both social and in connection with his testimonies before the Armed Services Committee. He stated he would rate Mr. McNamara "A" in connection with his morals, associates, ability and loyalty to the United States. He said he has never heard anything which would cause him to question Mr. McNamara's character or loyalty to this country. He described Mr. McNamara "as clean morally as is possible for a human."

Senator Inouye said Mr. McNamara is a dedicated servant of the United States Government. He said the only criticism of Mr. McNamara he has ever heard was that Mr. McNamara was "tough." He stated that he considers such a characteristic of an individual occupying the position of Secretary of Defense to be a virtue. He highly recommended Mr. McNamara.

John C. Stennis, United States Senator from Mississippi, advised at De Kalb, Mississippi, he has known Mr. McNamara on a close personal basis since Mr. McNamara became Secretary of Defense. Senator Stennis said he is a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee as well as the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee of the Armed Services Committee. He stated that the committee and the subcommittee deal with Mr. McNamara on a daily basis. He described Mr. McNamara as an individual of extraordinary capability and unquestionable and "unshakable" integrity. He said he has had occasional social contact with Mr. McNamara and, in his opinion, Mr. McNamara's associates and loyalty to the United States are above question.

Senator Stennis stated that, in his opinion, the position of Secretary of Defense is the most difficult with the exception of the Presidency. He said he regards Mr. McNamara most favorably as a capable individual who has displayed leadership through his knowledge as well as his ability to direct and to assimilate and evaluate facts. He described Mr. McNamara as the "strongest" individual in the most difficult non-elective position in the country.

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Henry M. Jackson, United States Senator from Washington, advised at Seattle, Washington, he has had close official and social contact with Mr. McNamara. He said he has never received any information which would cause him to question Mr. McNamara's character. He described Mr. McNamara as an outstanding individual who conducts himself in an exemplary manner at all times and who is not known to associate with any individual of questionable reputation. He said he has never had any reason to question Mr. McNamara's loyalty to the United States. He highly recommended Mr. McNamara for continued employment in a position of "great trust" with the United States Government.

Philip A. Hart, United States Senator from Michigan, advised at Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. McNamara for many years by reputation and personally since 1957. He stated Mr. McNamara is an individual of good character, who has reputable associates and an exemplary reputation. He said Mr. McNamara has done an outstanding job as Secretary of Defense.

Howard W. Cannon, United States Senator from Nevada, advised at Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. McNamara since Mr. McNamara became Secretary of Defense. He stated that although he has not always agreed with Mr. McNamara's policies, these were "honest" differences of opinion. He said he considers Mr. McNamara to be a fine man who has done a "great" job as Secretary of Defense. He highly recommended Mr. McNamara.

Stuart Symington, United States Senator from Missouri, advised at Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. McNamara socially and professionally for four years. He described Mr. McNamara as an outstanding individual and a very fine public servant who has done a good job in a "tough position."

Robert F. Kennedy, United States Senator from New York, advised at Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. McNamara socially and professionally since 1960. He said he considers Mr. McNamara to be an outstanding individual. He said the Government is very fortunate to have a man of Mr. McNamara's stature in its service.

Robert C. Byrd, United States Senator from West Virginia, advised at Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. McNamara for four years. Senator Byrd, who is a member of the Armed Services

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Committee of the United States Senate, stated Mr. McNamara has testified before this committee and he has been very much impressed with Mr. McNamara's ability. He said Mr. McNamara has done a good job. He commented favorably concerning Mr. McNamara's character, associates, reputation and loyalty to the United States. He pointed out he has had no social contact with Mr. McNamara.

Patrick McNamara, United States Senator from Michigan, advised at Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. McNamara since Mr. McNamara became Secretary of Defense. He said he has had limited social contact with Mr. McNamara. He stated he has the highest "professional" regard for Mr. McNamara, whom he considers to be a fine individual and an outstanding public servant. He said he would recommend Mr. McNamara without reservation.

Brockway McMillan, Under Secretary of the Air Force, Washington, D. C., advised he has known Mr. McNamara in an official capacity since 1961. He stated that as a result of his observations of Mr. McNamara, he feels that Mr. McNamara's character, associates and loyalty to the United States are above question.

Orville L. Freeman, Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., advised he has known Mr. McNamara and his family socially and professionally since 1960. He said he considers Mr. McNamara and the members of his family to be individuals of the highest type. He said he has no reservations whatsoever concerning Mr. McNamara and highly recommended him.

Gerald R. Ford, United States Representative from Michigan, advised at Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. McNamara by reputation for many years. He stated as the ranking minority member of the Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee, which is responsible for the budget of the Department of Defense, he has worked closely with Mr. McNamara during the past four years.

Representative Ford said that in connection with leadership, ability and integrity, he considers Mr. McNamara to be an outstanding individual. He said he has not agreed with Mr. McNamara regarding some policy decisions. He stated these were "honest" disagreements which resulted from differences of opinion.

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Representative Ford stated he is aware there has been a bitter feud between Mr. Barry Goldwater and Mr. McNamara. He said he considers the feud to be a "personality clash" between the two. He stated that both individuals are very categorical in their statements and sometimes they place the wrong connotation on remarks made by each other or "read into it" whatever they desire from their points of view.

Representative Ford said he is also aware Mr. Goldwater does not believe that Mr. McNamara has been completely honest in some of his testimonies before various congressional committees and in public announcements made by him. He said he does not agree with Mr. Goldwater in this connection. He stated he feels that Mr. McNamara was within his "legitimate right" in protecting the public interest and the administration through the manner in which he has testified or made public announcements. During the interview with former Senator Goldwater, whose comments are set forth hereinbefore, he suggested Gerald R. Ford, United States Representative from Michigan, as a possible source of information concerning Mr. McNamara. He said he believes that Representative Ford had "caught" Mr. McNamara in some discrepancy in connection with his testimony at the House of Representatives. Representative Ford emphatically stated he has never detected Mr. McNamara doing anything which would cause him to question Mr. McNamara's honesty or integrity.

Representative Ford further advised that during the recent election campaign he was one of seven members of a Republican task force which had been appointed by then Senator Goldwater to attack the Department of Defense. He said he has been advised that Mr. McNamara was "unhappy with him," Representative Ford, because Mr. McNamara felt that some of the criticisms made by the task force were unfair. He pointed out that on the other hand, then Senator Goldwater, was "unhappy" with the task force because he felt the task force had not hit the Department of Defense hard enough.

The April 18, 1962, issue of "The Evening Star," newspaper, Washington, D. C., contained an article entitled "McNamara Scored on Contract." This article indicates that Gerald R. Ford, United States Representative from Michigan, had accused Mr. McNamara of an "evasion of the law" in awarding a steel contract to the Lukens Steel Company. A copy of this article is enclosed.

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Representative Ford stated he recalls the above-mentioned article. He said the incident occurred during the time the United States Steel Corporation had proposed increasing the price of steel and the late President John F. Kennedy had made a vigorous appeal not to raise the price. He said the United States Steel Corporation has been a pioneer in the development of a special type of steel used in the construction of submarines and was the principal supplier of this steel. He added that several other companies including the Lukens Steel Company later engaged in such manufacturing. He indicated the above-mentioned contract was awarded to the Lukens Steel Company without competitive bidding and therefore it was his attitude that the action was an evasion of the law.

Representative Ford said that the Office of the Secretary of Defense and the Department of the Navy justified their actions because the Lukens Steel Company had not increased its prices. He said they also indicated that inasmuch as the Lukens Steel Company had not raised its prices, its prices were lower than the proposed prices of the United States Steel Corporation and therefore the procedure of having competitive bidding for the contract would have been nothing but a formality. He said the Office of the Secretary of Defense and the Department of the Navy also relied upon provisions of the law which gave them "flexibility" in awarding contracts. Representative Ford stated that although someone else could have a different attitude toward the matter, he still feels that Mr. McNamara was wrong in his decision. He said that he does not feel that the action was in the "spirit of the law" or carried out in the manner in which the Congress desired the executive branch to utilize the law.

Representative Ford emphasized he considers Mr. McNamara to be a very capable, talented and devoted public servant. He said the matter involving the Lukens Steel Company is just one of the many difficult decisions an individual in Mr. McNamara's position must make and which naturally are subject to constructive criticism. Representative Ford said he would recommend Mr. McNamara without reservation for a position of trust.

The September 3, 1964, issue of "The Washington Daily News," newspaper, Washington, D. C., contained an article entitled "GOP Congressman Hits at McNamara." This article indicated that

He indicated a telegram had been sent by Mr. McNamara to military bases describing the President's "anti-poverty law." A copy of this article is enclosed.

Bob Wilson, United States Representative from California, advised at Washington, D. C., that the accusation contained in the afore-mentioned newspaper article was made in the "heat of political battle" because he felt the Democratic Party was doing something for political gains and was using Government funds to promote the party. He said he does not feel that his comments are pertinent at this time. He stated he also feels that Mr. McNamara is undoubtedly an honest man and an individual of integrity.

Passport Record

The records of the Passport Office, Department of State, disclose Mr. McNamara was issued a diplomatic passport in 1961 for travel to Europe on official business for the Department of Defense. Those records contain no additional pertinent information concerning him.

Agency Checks

Information has been received from the United States Secret Service and the Office of Special Investigations, Department of the Air Force, indicating that their files contain either no record or no additional pertinent information concerning Mr. McNamara.

The central files of the FBI, including the files of the Identification Division, contain no additional pertinent information concerning Mr. McNamara.
