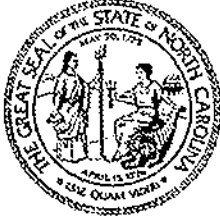

Dear Director Sessions:

As Director of the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation, former United States Senator, and former North Carolina Attorney General, I am very much aware of the strengths and weaknesses of our nation's Uniform Crime Reporting Program. In an overall perspective, the Uniform Crime Reporting Program is a local program of collecting crime statistics in a method which provides for common comparison and analysis. A critical part to the success and cohesiveness of the program is the national repository and guidance. That role, as you well know, has been fulfilled by the FBI for the last 50 years. As the State UCR Program administrators, we are troubled to hear that FBI support for UCR staffing is in jeopardy.

It is imperative for us to express our concern and seek your support not only to maintain appropriate funding for current UCR, but also to provide adequate resources to fully implement the National Incident Base Reporting System (NIBRS). Without federal involvement, each state's data collection efforts will become less and less uniform and throw the nation's only crime data index into chaos. To maintain local and state law enforcement support for the UCR program, the FBI must continue to provide this service as opposed to a non-law enforcement agency or contract firm. The success of UCR requires dedication and cooperative efforts of all local, state and national law enforcement agencies.

I know how easy it is to look to such programs as UCR in tight budgetary times, but elimination of national collection, and publication of crime data within the FBI would be a clear disservice to the nation. Furthermore, it would send an undeniable signal to the country's law enforcement community that the Federal Bureau of Investigation is not committed to working with state and local law enforcement.

Dear Mr. Morgan:

I have received your letter of May 18, 1990, regarding reports of possible cutbacks in FBI personnel responsible for our Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program.

I understand your concern over the FBI proposal to eliminate the UCR Program. You may rest assured that I do not want to see the elimination of the UCR Program, which is responsible for publication of the Uniform Crime Reports. These Reports are necessary and need to be continued since they are the only statistical series that address crime from the law enforcement perspective.

However, as I am sure you can understand, in these austere times the FBI cannot continue to receive mandated personnel reductions being imposed by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-76 without making adjustments in the manner in which the remaining resources are applied to the FBI's mission.

The Records Management Division (RMD), which houses the UCR Program, has been mandated to cut 147 positions (129 through A-76 and 18 through Gramm-Rudman sequestration) from its current staffing level by the end of Fiscal Year (FY) 1990. RMD lost 109 staff positions in FY 1989 due to A-76 reductions and is scheduled for a reduction of 73 staff positions in FY 1991.

RMD has the primary responsibility for maintaining the criminal and foreign counterintelligence investigative files for the entire FBI. In order to provide these services,

ROBERT MORGAN was recently elected Attorney General for the State of North Carolina, to replace the incumbent THOMAS WADE BRUTON and MORGAN will take office in early January, 1969.

MORGAN is approximately 42 years of age and resides in Lillington, N. C. He apparently practices law.

He is a veteran having served in the U. S. Navy and a graduate from East Carolina University, Greenville, N. C. He graduated from Wake Forest University Law School in 1950. He was elected Clerk of Superior Court of Harnett Co., N. C., at age 24, and at age 26 returned to naval duty during the Korean conflict. At age 27, upon completion of his service as Clerk of Superior Court, Harnett Co., he established a law practice in Lillington, N. C., and the following year was elected to the N. C. Senate where he served four additional terms. When he was 39 years of age, he was elected President pro tempore of the N. C. Senate.

He is married to the former [redacted] and they have two daughters, [redacted] and a foster son, [redacted]

He currently serves as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of East Carolina University and was President of that alumni association from 1957 through 1959. During his terms in the N. C. Legislature, he was considered a leader in many areas including jail and court reform.

For the information of the Bureau, ROBERT MORGAN, Attorney General of the State of North Carolina, has filed as a Democratic Party candidate for the United States Senate.

He announced on 1/24/74, that he would not resign from his position as Attorney General during his campaign to seek the Democratic nomination for the United States Senate since he has an obligation to the voters who elected him to stay and protect the dedicated employees who are now with him in the Attorney General's Office. MORGAN further stated that if he wins the nomination for the Senate, he will step down from his position as Attorney General at least 30 days before the November General Election.

He has stated that the Attorney General's Office should be free and separate from the present administration of JAMES HOLSHOUSER, the present Republican Governor of North Carolina.

Should ROBERT MORGAN resign any time prior to 30 days before the November General Election, his position could be filled by an appointee of Governor HOLSHOUSER.

ROBERT MORGAN is a graduate of Wake Forest Law School and has served in elected office as Clerk of Superior Court of Harnett County, North Carolina, and as a member of the North Carolina Senate in the General Assembly of 1955, 1959, 1963, 1965, and 1967. He was President Pro Tem of the Senate in 1965. He was first elected as the Attorney General of North Carolina in the General Elections of November, 1968, and has served in that position to the present time.

Judge Carson To Become Attorney General Sept. 15

RALEIGH — Gov. Jim Holshouser announced Monday, as expected, that he will name a Republican Judge James Carson of Charlotte to replace Robert Morgan as N.C. attorney general.

Carson, 37, will serve from Sept. 15, when Morgan plans to resign in run full-time as Democratic nominee for the U.S. Senate, until the Nov. 5 general election.

The state Republican Executive Committee is almost sure to pick Carson as its general election candidate for the remaining two years of Morgan's term. The Democratic Executive Committee will choose an opposition candidate from among at least 10 hopefuls.

Carson, former lawyer and two-term state legislator from Mecklenburg County, has been openly seeking the appointment and nomination for months. For that reason he did not file for another term in his current job on the N.C. Court of Appeals.

THE DATE Carson will resign from the nine-member Court of Appeals is uncertain. He said that he has asked not to be given any new cases and that when he finishes his current court work, he'll step down. That, he said, should be in about 30 days.

Ironically, Holshouser will replace Carson, the Appeals Court's only Republican, with one of the three Democrats running for that court in the general election.

Legally, Republicans Holshouser could pick a Republican to serve the rest of Carson's term, but that appointee would serve only until the January swearing-in of the

November ballots, but that part of the controversy apparently also has been resolved.

State law requires ballots for general elections to be in the hands of county election boards no later than 60 days before the election date — this year, by Sept. 6.

Theoretically, until Morgan leaves office, there really isn't a vacancy. Thus, Holshouser said, the legality of printing ballots for the position could be questioned.

MORGAN said Monday however, that custom permits him to resign "to a date certain," meaning that the state elections board and Holshouser will be notified that he will resign as of Sept. 15 and that ballots can be printed.

The question of when Morgan should resign and how his successors should be chosen has created controversy, part of which crept into Holshouser's announcement Monday.

Morgan has refused to leave the attorney general's office before mid-September, saying that leaving earlier would let the governor's political operatives remove Democrats from the Justice Department.

Carson and Holshouser said Monday that they had planned no such thing.

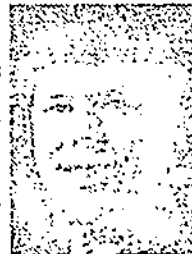
"I HAVE no plans to fire anyone," Carson said, adding that anyone in the department "doing a good job" has nothing to fear. He also guessed that department employees who are "more politically oriented," such as Neil Weaver and Carroll Leggett, would probably leave voluntarily when Morgan did.

Leggett and Weaver, active campaigners for Morgan, are known as his top political advisers within the department. Their political activity for Morgan, both say quickly, is done only on their own time.

Holshouser worked out loud Monday that Morgan's insistence on staying as attorney general until mid-September might delay the printing of

NO COMPLAINTS HAVE BEEN RECEIVED AT THE POST OFFICE RE WINDOW MAIL SERVICE. NO SUSPECTS DEVELOPED. U.S. SECRET SERVICE CHARLOTTE, N.C., NOTIFIED AND LOCAL AUTHORITIES COVERING VICTIM'S RESIDENCE, LILLINGTON, N.C., ALERTED.

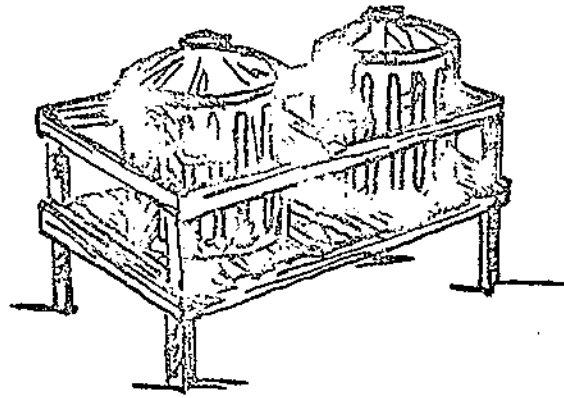

Garbage shall be stored in durable, rust proof, non-absorbant, water-tight, rodent proof, and easily cleanable containers with a close fitting fly-tight lid with handles.



USEFUL DEFINITIONS:

Solid Waste: Garbage, trash, rubbish, refuse and other discarded materials.

Garbage: Rejected food waste, animal offal and carcasses and industrial by-products.

Abandoned vehicles: Autos, buses, trucks, etc. that are no longer useful as such and have been left elsewhere than a recognized junk yard or an auto destructor.

Open (garbage) dump: The collection of solid waste at an illegal disposal site.

Sanitary landfill: A designated area for the disposing of solid waste on land in a sanitary manner.

Violation of the laws on solid waste control is a misdemeanor and punishable by fines not to exceed \$200.00. (N.C. General Statutes—Article 13 B, Chapter 130-166.33.)

The owner or occupant of any premise, business establishment, or industry shall be responsible for the sanitary storage of all solid waste accumulated at that premise, business establishment or industry.

All solid waste containers shall be maintained as to prevent a creation of a nuisance or unsanitary conditions. Containers that fail to meet this standard shall be replaced with acceptable containers.

All containers of garbage and trash shall be placed out only on pick-up days in front of or in alleyways served. All such containers are to be promptly removed after pick-up.

An examination of the leaflet by the Latent Fingerprint Section of the FBI Identification Division revealed two latent fingerprints and one latent palm print on the leaflet which could be of value in the event suspects are developed.

On July 21, 1975, Postmaster [redacted] and Mail Supervisor [redacted] United States Post Office, Wilmington, North Carolina, stated that no incidents have occurred and no information has been developed since the leaflet was initially found which would assist in identifying the unknown subject.

N.C. Organized Crime

— Fact Or Fiction?

RALEIGH — The specter of "organized crime" is much with us these days, in enormously successful movies like "The Godfather" and "The Valachi Papers" and in best-selling books like "Honor Thy Father."

And now, according to Attorney General Robert Morgan, there is organized crime right here in North Carolina, "spreading its tentacles" into such statewide activities as cigarette smuggling, narcotics, prostitution, theft rings and even legitimate business.

Morgan, a Democrat, has issued a series of seven news releases that describe, in sketchy detail, the inroads he says organized crime has made in the state. But he has declined to make public a study that is the basis for his assertions. When asked at a news conference to assess the extent of organized crime, he said that it "isn't all that serious."

So far, hardly anyone — including GOP Gov. Jim Holshouser and state legislators now meeting here — has seen the study, which was done by the Organized Crime Prevention Council under the auspices of Morgan's office.

But the study already has had important ramifications. It is the basis for two recent recommendations introduced in the General Assembly to give wiretap and no-knock powers to local and state police agencies.

It has led to the creation of a special 12-man unit in the State Bureau of Investigation (SBI) which, with \$180,000 in federal money for starters, is supposed to investigate — and convict, if possible — professional gangsters who may have gained a foothold in North Carolina.

The news releases have served to keep Morgan, one of the state's most aspiring Democratic politicians and a possible United States Senate candidate next year, in the public limelight at a time when Republicans have gained control of the governor's mansion and several other top state jobs.

Assistant Attorney General Howard Satisky, who prepared most of the study, emphasizes that it served a useful purpose.

"A lot of things we say can't be proven and a lot of it has already been reported," Satisky said in an interview. "Our purpose was just to tie it all together in one package."

Others, however, including some legislators who are interested in crime matters, are skeptical that the study has really been the close, hard look into organized crime that the attorney general says it is.

"You reporters have been played like a violin by Morgan," comments a top official of the Holshouser Administration who asked not to be identified. "If there's organized crime to the extent Morgan says there is, we've seen no evidence of it."

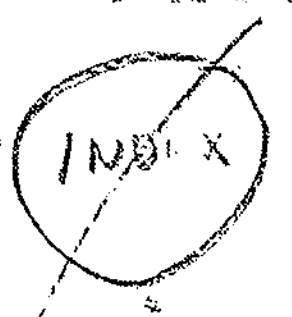
What information gathered by the council that has been released is in fact short on names, places and dates.

Satisky, a 27-year-old University of North Carolina Law School graduate who's been on the attorney general's staff since 1969, says those details can't be made public because there were gathered "on a confidential basis."

used in preparing the study came from local and state police officials who were interviewed by Satsky and others. No real investigations of organized crime were conducted because, Satsky explains, "that was beyond the scope of our work."

That information, say some of the police officials who were contacted by the Organized Crime Council, is based on speculation and rumors. Hard evidence on organized criminal activity is difficult to pin down, they say.

"We didn't provide any real evidence of organized (criminal) activity in our area," says Police Chief Don Roseman of Gastonia, who was interviewed for the study. "You hear a lot about organized crime, but it's hard to tell if we have any around here."

Adds Guilford County Sheriff Paul Gibson, "It's hard to say our area has organized crime — though I can say we usually find a bunch of thugs who may get together to rob some homes."

Satsky insists that the information the police gave him is valuable, if only because local law enforcement officials "have a clearer picture of the situation in their areas."

One of the press releases on the council's findings states that pornography seems to be on the rise in North Carolina, but it adds that police aren't sure whether the rise is directly related to organized crime.

"If you assume it (pornography) is criminal activity," the release states, "there is evidence that a lot of bookstores in North Carolina are owned by the same people but it is not known whether these people are involved in other criminal activities or are members of an organized crime syndicate."

Another release, on the influence of professional gangsters in legitimate businesses, says that "criminal syndicates" are purchasing textile mills around the state and have been "reportedly operating mobile home businesses in North Carolina."

Pressed for more details about organized crimes "infiltration" into legitimate business, Satsky said, "You can't really prove that." And Morgan points out: "It's a very tricky business saying that's definitely the case."

The term "organized crime" isn't meant to mean, Morgan and Satsky say, the Mafia, or any other well-publicized group. In fact, they add, there is little evidence that the so-called *Cosa Nostra* operates in North Carolina.

Rather, they contend, "organized crime" in North Carolina means regional, autonomous groups of criminals "that operate independently but (which) often assist one another when needed."

Satsky says any headline-grabbing use of the term—for example, labeling criminal activity as the work of the "Dixie Mafia"—should not be dignified on the Attorney General's Office.

Still, Satsky acknowledges that the council's findings have been released in a manner designed to gain extensive play in the state's news media.

A release about each section of the study—for example, the

portion dealing with illegal gambling activities in the state, has been issued separately, usually at well-attended press briefings in Morgan's office on Monday mornings—the day, not incidentally, when many reporters here to cover the legislature have nothing to do because the General Assembly doesn't meet until 8 p.m.

The reason for the staggered releases, Satsky explains, is because "there are study commissions all over the place and usually, when they issue their findings, they do it all at once and no one pays any attention. We feel that by releasing our results a portion at a time, we'd get more coverage and more support."

A few weeks ago, bills were introduced in both houses of the legislature calling for a sweeping reform of North Carolina's criminal code procedures, including provisions for wiretapping and no-knock authority.

Kenneth Pye, dean of Duke University Law School, who helped draw up the legislation, says the two controversial methods were included in the bill because of "the threat of organized crime in North Carolina."

Pye says evidence for that comes directly from Morgan's organized crime study, although he says he himself did not see the study.

The Organized Crime Prevention Council was set up two years ago with \$51,000 in mostly federal anticrime money to look into the existence of organized, professional criminal activity in the state.

"We just accepted the conclusions of someone else's work," Pye notes. "We made no independent study of organized crime ourselves."

Right now, it's far from certain that wiretapping and no-knock will receive legislative approval.

If they do become law, they undoubtedly will be used by the new organized crime unit in the SBI to help in their investigations. The SBI comes under Morgan's control, and though he's said in the past that he is opposed to using wiretap and no-knock methods, his office is expected to lend its weight to passage of both provisions. It is felt they would be specifically useful in pursuing and convicting professional criminals. No-knock would allow the police, armed with a search warrant, to enter a premise unannounced.

Satsky and Morgan emphasize, however, that the study had no legislative or political intent; they insist that any fallout as a result of their work — such as the provisions for no-knock and wiretap authority — is strictly incidental.

But others, like Dean Pye and Sen. Tom Strickland, D-Wayne, who sponsored the bill which includes the two provisions, say there is a clear-cut relation between the study and the two proposals.

Says Strickland, who also has not seen the organized crime study, "You may criticize the study, but we have to proceed on the theory that organized crime is a problem in North Carolina. That's why those two (no-knock and wiretap) provisions are in the bill; how else are you going to stop organized crime in the state?"

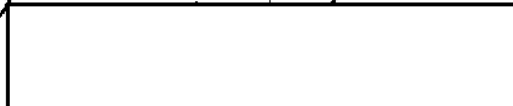

Dear Mr. Currin:

This letter is to advise you of an interview conducted by Assistant United States Attorney [Redacted] and Special Agent [Redacted] FBI, Fayetteville, North Carolina, on October 25, 1982, at Fayetteville, North Carolina. The subject interviewed was [Redacted], a white male [Redacted] years of age who resides at [Redacted] telephone number [Redacted]. He advised that he is a retired United States Army enlisted man and that he currently [Redacted].

[Redacted] had no information of any criminal wrongdoing on the part of Congressman Charlie Rose or former United States Senator Robert Morgan, and stated that what he has to say is based on hearsay and that he has taken the well known human trait of temptation and connected it with the opportunity both Rose and Morgan had to engage in bribery and corruption, and it is his belief that both of them could have been involved possibly in illegal or irregular activities in the granting of a Small Business Administration (SBA) loan, and possibly somehow in steering minority contracts at [Redacted] North Carolina, to [Redacted].

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He is a native American whose family was born in this country, and whose father was [redacted] and this gave him, [redacted] an inborn curiosity associated with [redacted]. He stated he would like to bring a lot of "here it is stuff" but he has no evidence. What he is bringing the interviewers is a case of smoke and it is his opinion that there is fire. [redacted] had formerly been [redacted] for [redacted] and after [redacted] went to work as a [redacted]. Sometime prior to [redacted] (the last time he had any contact with [redacted]) [redacted] told him that on one occasion [redacted] either Charlie Rose or Robert Morgan met with [redacted].

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[redacted] is [redacted]
[redacted] at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, and it is his, [redacted] opinion that Charlie Rose and Bob Morgan were probably receiving kickbacks from [redacted].

[redacted] stated that no one told him this but that it was his clear understanding that [redacted] pays kickbacks to one or two or both of these individuals. Again pointing out that it is human nature to fall to temptation but that one cannot fall to temptation unless one has the opportunity, [redacted] advised that both Mr. Rose and Mr. Morgan had been on important committees affecting government contracts and it is no doubt that somewhere along the line, they encouraged [redacted] to apply for [redacted] contract at Fort Bragg, and once having succeeded in receiving the contract, [redacted] arranged for kickbacks to them.

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Again [redacted] pointed out he has nothing substantive to base this on, he does not even have hearsay, it is merely a matter of using his curiosity and common sense that brings him to this conclusion.

He also pointed out that theft of government property at Fort Bragg is a big problem and that the Military Police and other law enforcement agencies at Fort Bragg are incompetent in their handling of these thefts of the government property. For example, he stated the Military Police will throw up a road block and search all vehicles passing through that road block. When a vehicle containing stolen government property realizes that it is coming up on a road block, it simply turns around leaving the base through another exit. [redacted] said that it would be more effective if the Military Police blocked every single exit from Fort Bragg and searched every single vehicle leaving and that way no vehicle containing government property could leave the base.

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He also pointed out that he has heard that soft drink trucks and beer trucks and food trucks are some of the biggest haulers of stolen government property. He advised he has no proof of this nor does he have any evidence to substantiate the allegation but he feels this is common knowledge and he felt obliged to bring it to the attention of the federal authorities.

[redacted] stated that these allegations have been made without the slightest bit of evidence against the United States Congressman and the former United States Senator, and because there is nothing upon which to base an investigation, he recommended no further investigative efforts be expended in this matter.
