

Re Atlanta letter to New York dated 8-8-52 which is the last communication in file pertaining to BROTHMAN's correspondence with Reverend B. B. NIELSEN, 8703 3rd Avenue, Brooklyn 9, New York.

Associate Warden EUGENE GOODWYN furnished to SA GEOFGE H. TREADWELL of this office a photostatic copy of a letter from NIELSEN to BROTHMAN dated October 7, 1952. Mr. GOODWYN expressed the belief that the Bureau would possibly be interested in this letter due to the fact that NIELSEN informed BROTHMAN that he is considering accepting a position as Chaplain in an institution in the State of Texas and that he would possibly arrange to be in Atlanta to contact him on November 4, 1952, which NIELSEN believes is the correct release date for BROTHMAN. For the information of the New York Division and Bureau, BROTHMAN is scheduled for release on November 5, 1952.

Mr. GOODWYN particularly made reference to the statement in the letter as follows "I know I will see you as soon as you come to New York but will it have value to you if this plan materializes. Think it over and let me know." The last mentioned remark has reference to NIELSEN's visit to Atlanta and/or his visit to Texas.

As has been previously set forth in the correspondence to New York and Bureau, Mr. GOODWYN is of the opinion that NIELSEN is a Communist or Communist sympathizer. He bases this bract upon the continued correspondence with and reference to NIELSEN in ABRAHAM BROTHMAN's correspondence record. Wr. GOODWYN further pointed out that in monitoring BROTHMAN's corresponden it appears that NIELSEN has been in very frequent contact with BROTHMAN's wife since BROTHMAN's incarceration. Mr. GOODWYN added that Mrs. NACMI BROTHMAN, wife of subject, when visiting subject at the U. S. Penitentiary

For the information of the San Antonio Office the NIELSEN referred to is B. B. NIELSEN, a Lutheran minister who was formerly a chaplain at the Federal House of Detention, New York City. He has subsequently ceased this position and is now intending to seek employment in Texas, place or nature unknown. NIFLSEN has corresponded frequently with BROTHMAN during his incarceration and Penitentiary officials are of the opinion that NIEISEN is Communist or a Communist Sympathiser. (%)



On February 25, 19h3, one RAY SCHLOSSMAN, 630
Gholson Avenue, Cincinnati, Ohio, appeared at the Cincinnati Office and advised that during 1950 and 1952, he was incarcerated in the Federal Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia. He stated that during his incarceration he became acquainted with ABRAHAM BROTHMAN, EJGENE BENNIS, JOHN GATES and ALFRED DEAN SLACK.

SCHLOSSMAN advised that since his return to Cincinnati from prison, he has been discharged from one job after another due to being "blackballed" by a local private detective agency. He stated that he had gained certain information and had made friends with AHRAHAM BROTHMAN and was now in a position to use this information for his own good, or, as he termed it, "his ace in the hole." (%)

He stated that he became acquainted with ABRAHAM EROTHMAN at the Jewish services at the Penitentiary and through his work in the prison library he was able to assist BROTHMAN in obtaining various pieces of literature to which they were supposedly not entitled. He stated he recalled giving EROTHMAN copies of "The Compass," which was subscribed to by another immate by the name of JOE FISHER. (X)

During the interview SCHLOSSMAN jumped from point to point and from various pieces of information to various other pieces of information and it was difficult to keep him on one bit of information any length of time. SCHLOSSMAN stated that during his stay in the prison he had been under the treatment of a psychiatrist and readily admitted that he was very nervous .

SCHLOSSMAN stated that he did know that BROTHMAN offered to help ALFRED DEAN SLACK in obtaining a new trial and that he, SCHLOSSMAN, acted as the third man between BROTHMAN and SLACK at Atlanta. BROTHMAN wanted to supplement SLACK'S brief in order to interject the ROSENHERG case into SLACK'S brief. (U)

SCHLOSSMAN stated that he had information that BROTHMAN, FRANCESTELIO and one JACK FREDERS, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, were the owners of the Teleking Television Corporation. SCHLOSSMAN did not elaborate further on this or give any details regarding it (22)

He also pointed out that he had ascertained from EROTHMAN that BROTHMAN had set up in business the Terry Studio, Bronx, New York, while in Detention Headquarters, New York City. ()

SCHLOSSMAN reported that he was acquainted with one Dr. NATHAN RAPAPORTE, New York City, whose wife was a collector for the Communist Party by his own admission. He stated that Dr. RAPAPORTE was presently in Miami Beach, Florida, residing at 1123 Euclid Avenue. He stated that he knew RAPAPORTE had trouble regarding income tax evasion and had a collection of postage stamps valued at approximately \$75,000, which he was hiding from the Government.

SCHLOSSMAN stated that during his incarceration in Atlanta, he had played handball with GATES and also had some conversation with EUGENE DENNIS. (CC)


SCHLOSSMAN was interviewed at length to ascertan whether he had any information concerning missing Communist fugitives. However, he stated he had no information regarding them.

SCHLOSSMAN advised that due to the fact he was unable to obtain employment in Cincinnati, he was considering going to work for BROTHMAN and would do so if the Bureau desired. He was advised that the Bureau was interested in obtaining any information which he may have. However, no recommendation was being made as to where he should seek employment.

SCHLOSSIAN pointed out that he had other documentary information in the form of letters in his room and stated that he would bring the letters in to substantiate his statements.

RE: ABRAHAM BROTHMAN ESPIONAGE - R

In order that this office could more intelligently interview MCHLOSSMAN, at his suggestion, he was to return. It was contemplated that prior to his return a file review would be made regarding BROTHMAN in order that information in SCHLOSSMAN'S possession could be correlated more intelligently. However, SCHLOSSMAN did not return and on March 1h, 1953, SCHLOSSMAN telephonically contacted this office from New York, stating that he had contacted the New York Office and that they were not aware that he had made information svailable to this office. (U)



This office does not consider SCHLOSSMAN as a possible Security Informant due to his criminal record and due to the fact that he originally stated that the information he had was being used by him as his "ace in the hole" or in order to forward himself in any manner possible. (U)

As previously pointed out, this office advised SCHLOSSMAN that we were interested in obtaining all the information he had in his possession; however, the FBI was not in a position to clear his name or obtain employment for him. (W)

It is suggested that possibly the New York Office may desire to interview SCHLOSSMAN at length regarding his knowledge of BROTHMAN, which he may have obtained while in Atlanta, (4)



On May 22, 1950, Harry Gold admitted that he was the Soviet superior of Abraham Brothman but that his previous statements to the agents were false in that his contacts with Brothman were at the direction of a Soviet official, Semen M. Semenov. Gold furnished detailed information concerning his relationship with both Brothman and Semenov. Gold admitted: 3: that at the request of Brothman and Miriam Moskowitz, he had testified to the false story in 1947 before a grand july.

The Criminal Division in 1950 informed us that there was not sufficient evidence on which to base an espionage charge against Brothman for the transmittal of information relating to the national defense during war time. The Criminal Division did authorize prosecution against Brothman and Moskowitz for conspiracy to obstruct justice and for influencing a witness before a grand jury. Brothman and Moskowitz were convicted and on November 22, 1950, Brothman was sentenced to five years' imprisonment and \$5,000 fine on one count, and two years' imprisonment and \$10,000 on another count. The first count was reversed by the United States Court of Appeals on July 26, 1951. Moskowitz was sentenced to serve two years and to pay a fine of \$10,000. Both Brothman and Moskowitz have served their sentences.

On November 4, 1953, the Bureau received a copy of a report from the Warden of Lewisburg setting forth his recollection of Gold's interview by McCarthy Committee investigators and enclosing copies of two affidavits submitted by Gold to them. The warden advised that Gold was requested by Roy Cohn to submit an affidavit for Senator Jenner concerning his knowledge of one Shura Swan (also known as Alexander Svenchansky), who had been dismissed from the United Nations. Gold submitted two affidavits concerning Swan pointing out he heard of this individual through Abraham Brothman. Gold identified Brothman as "one of my sources of information for the Soviet espionage organization of which I was a courier." The interview of Gold by McCarthy Committee investigators did not exceed fifteen or twenty minutes. (%)

Information obtained by the McCarthy Committee from Gold concerning Swan (Svenchansky) is fully set out in a copy of memorandum from Mr. Belmont to Mr. Ladd dated November 5, 1953, which is attached hereto. Gold did not furnish any information to McCarthy Committee investigators which was not previously known to the Bureau.(U)

During interviews of Earry Gold on 8-2-50. and 8-3-50, he advised that in March, 1942, he had a conversation with Abrahan Arothuan in Sew York City. At this time Brothman advised Gold that his friend, Shurd Swon, subsequently identified as Alexander Svenchansky, had worked for the Soviet Union and had been laid off recently by them. Gold eaid he got the impression from Brothman that Swan had worked for Antorg and that Swan was the man who first introduced Brothnan to another Antorg employee who then induced Brothman to engage in industrial espionage. At this time Brothman asked field to see what, if enything, he could do to get Swan's job back for him at Amtorg. Gold said he told Brothman he would do what he could in this respect, but at the time he eaid he had no intention of deing anything about this since Brothman's story about Swan and his discharge did not ring true. Gold explained that the part that did not sound accurate was principally Brothman's request for Gold, a mere underling, to see what he could do for Swan when Swan undoubtedly chould have been able to help himself had he been the individual who was responsible for securing and developing Brothman for the Soviets as prothum claims suan did. Gold said that later on he had mentioned this matter to his doviet superior, Senen M. Senency, and was told by Senency in se many words to mind his own business and to tell 💉 Brothman that Semenou said for him to get a job in the United States Rubber Company. In late 1942 or early 🚟 1943 Gold, during a neeting with Brothman at which Swell was mentioned, conveyed Semenou's message to Brothman.

He was employed by the Antorg Trading Corporation in New York City from 1932 to April, 1942, and from May to December, 1942, by the Soviet Government Purchasing Connission in Mashington, D. C. He served in the United States Army from December, 1942 to September, 1945. He was employed by the United Mations in Hew York City from October, 1946 to December, 1952, when his employment was terminated after his rejusal to answer questions en Connunism before an earlier Senate inquiry. 
Thus chastised I was only too happy to let go of the subject. However, in telling Brothman of San's refusal, I softened the blow by saying merely that nothing was available at that time--for I had to keep in Abe's good graces so as to continue obtaining information from him. (2)

At the time of asking me to intercede for Shure Swan, Abe told me that while Shura, who was loyal to the Soutet Union, had been laid off at Autorg, there were ethers (presumably Americans employed at Amtorg) who ecretly ridiculed the USSE, but who had been retained.

Colline collected the comment of the New York office in regard to this matter and specifically requested the name of the unidentified investor in Techni-Flex who had recommended Brothman for employment. []

Supervisor Gillespie of the New York office stated that McAndrews, also of that office, recommended no comment with the exception of stating that the Bureau has nothing to do with where a man is employed. (U)

This matter was brought to the attention of Mr. Belmont who recommended that it be called to the attention of Mr. Michols or Mr. McGuire. Mr. Michols instructed the writer to contact the New York office and advise them to definitely identify the agents who had contacted.

Washington City News Service of November 4, 1959, reported that Brothman and Norman Gaboriault, President of Techni-Flex Corporation, present employer of Brothman, had testified before the McCarthy Committee November 3, 1953. In answer to your inquiry as to what our files show on Gaboriault, the following is set forth:

After the conviction of Brothman in November, 1950, and while he was confined to the Federal Detention Headquarters, New York City, awaiting the outcome of his appeal, information was obtained from a confidential source in April, 1951, that Brothman's appeal was being financed by Jacob Friedus, wealthy New York businessmen, also confined to the Federal Detentions Headquarters, New York City, on an income tax charge. Friedus was interviewed and advised he became acquainted with Brothman in jail and from discussions with him considered him to be a brilliant. scientist. Friedus agreed to help Brothman upon his release and entered into a tentative agreement with Brothman, giving Friedus an option on several chemical patents owned by Brothman. Friedus authorized Norman Gaboriault, President of Techni-Flex, which company is owned by the Friedus family, to pay \$5,000 to Brothman's lawyer to handle the appeal and \$100 a week to Naomi Brothman, subject's wife, for living expenses. Also, upon Brothman's release, he would go to work for Techni-Flex. Brothman was released from Atlanta Penitentiary November 5, 1952. The Bureau conducted an investigation of Brothman upon his release to determine his financial ability to pay a \$10,000 fine which was part of his original sentences. During this investigation Gaporiault

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was interviewed by Bureau agents in April, 1953, and he confirmed Friedus' story of the agreement between Techni-Flex and the subject. On February 18, 1953, information was received that Brothman was working at Techni-Flex, Port Jervis, New York, at a salary of \$175 a week. Subject has entered into an agreement with the Government to make payments of \$60 per month on this fine. (2)

Bufiles contain no identifiable, derogatory information on Gaboriault. Techni-Flex is not a key facility designated by the Department of Defense and is not an atomic energy facility. The Bureau has no record that this company holds classified contacts with any branch of the armed service.

You inquired as to whether we knew that Morman Gaboriault and Jacob Friedus had driven to Atlanta Penitentiary to pick up Brothman upon his release and drove him back to New York. Our files do not reflect this information. Our files do reflect that the Warden of Atlanta Penitentiary had advised our Atlanta Office by letter of November 6, 1952, that Brothman was released on November 5, 1952, after having been held thirty days for nonpayment of his \$10,000 fine; that Brothman was brought before the United States Commissioner in Atlanta on November 6, 1952, and released on Poor Convicts

You also inquired as to why wouldn't we open investigations on Friedus and Gaboriault. Upon receipt of the information that Brothman was being given financial assistance by Friedus, we checked into the background of Friedus and ascertained he had numerous business ventures and owned considerable property in New York. Included among his ventures were the Techni-Flex Corporation and the Starrett Television Corporation. Through a confidential informant in the Federal Detention Headquarters, we were able to keep informed of the relation between Brothman and Friedus which appeared to be strictly a business relationship. Friedus admitted in his interview on November 4, 1952, that he was destrous of exploiting Brothman's engineering talents since he considered Brothman a brilliant engineer. Gaboriault on his interview in April, 1959, stated his interest in Brothman arose when Friedus suggested that Techni-Flez give financial help to Brothman and his wife in return for the use of Brothman's patents and services upon the release.

Inasmuch as there is no indication that the relation. ship between Friedus and Gaboriault with Brothman was other than of a business nature and in the absence of information



Testimony of Brothman and his present employer, Norman Gaboriault, President of Techni-Flex Corp., before McCarthy Committee 11-4-53, reviewed pursuant to the Director's request. Testimony reflects Brothman refused to answer questions concerning employment, espionage or Communist activities claiming privilege of 5th Amendment.

Ruben referred to above is believed identical with William A. Reuben who authored series of articles concerning Rosenberg case appearing in "National Guardian," a pro-Communist publication, in 1951, claiming Rosenberg convictions a political frame-up. Bureau investigation of Reuben showed him to be sympathetic to Communism, but no proof of Communist Party membership. He is an Security Index.

RECOMMENDATION:

Attached for approval is a letter to NYO requesting security for an extent of faboriault to determine his activities and the extent of his association with Brothman and Reuben


As you are aware, Abraham Brothman was convicted in November, 1950, for obstruction of justice in connection with the appearance of Harry Gold before a Federal Grand Jury in 1947. He originally received a sentence of seven years, but on appeal the conviction on one of the counts of the indictment was reversed and his sentence was reduced to two years. Brothman was released from Federal penitentiary at Atlanta on 11-5-52. He is presently employed as an engineer by the Techni-Flex Corporation, Port Jeruis, New York. (**C)

On 11-4-53, Brothman and Norman Gaboriault, President of Techni-Flex, testified before the McCarthy Committee in executive session in New York City.

Newspaper accounts of Gaboriault's testimony reflected that upon Brothman's release from the penitentiary, Gaboriault had sent an automobile to Atlanta to have Brothman picked up and brought back to New York. (U)

The Director requested to know what our files showed on Gaboriault. A memorandum from Mr. Ladd to the Director dated 11-6-53, reported that our files contain no identifiable derogatory information on Gaboriault. Gaboriault had been interviewed by Bureau agents in April, 1953, and pointed out he had hired Brothman on the recommendation of Jacob Friedus. The Director then inquired as to why wouldn't we open investigation on Friedus and Gaboriault. By memorandum dated 11-10-53, from Mr. Ladd to the Director it was pointed out that inasmuch as there was no indication that the relationship between Friedus and Gaboriault with Brothman was other than that of a business nature, no security type investigation was opened on these individuals. The Director noted on this memorandum You had better read the testimony Gaboriault, et al, given before the McCarthy Com."

The testimony of Brothman and Gaboriault given before the McCarthy Committee 11-4-53, has been obtained and reviewed. This review reflects that Brothman refused to answer any questions concerning his employment, espionage or Communist activites he might have been engaged in claiming his privilege under the 5th Amendment against self-incrimination. He also refused to identify Gaboriault who was at the hearing.



Bill Ruben mentioned above is probably identical with William A. Reuben, who authored a series of articles concerning the Rosenberg case which appeared in the "National Guardian," a pro-Communist publication, in 1951 and labelled the case a political frame-up. Reuben gave speeches throughout the country about this case and in a speech at Portland, Oregon, on 5-1-52, he viciously attacked the FBI and the Director. Investigation was instituted on Reuben in May, 1952. The investigation shows that Reuben has been sympathetic to the cause of Communism, but we have no proof of his actual Communist Party membership. Reuben is on the Security Index.

A review of the Gaboriault testimony reflects that the relationship existing between Gaboriault and Brothman probably is that of a business nature. Bufiles do not contain any identifiable derogatory information on Gaboriault.

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
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

SAS FRANCIS W. ZANGLE and WALTER C. ROETTING, JR., of this Office, conferred with AUSAS GEORGE BAILEY and JUDSON A. PARSONS, JR., 1/19/55. They advised that it is the present opinion of the USA'S Office, SDNY, that the outstanding count should be nolle-prossed in any event. However, they pointed out that technically BROTHMAN could be brought to trial on this count if it could be proved that any of the conversations in which BROTHMAN tried to induce HARRY GOLD to testify falsely. before the Grand Jury occurred in the SDNY. They therefore, requested that HARRY GOLD be interviewed to determine the place or places where these conversations took place. Both BAILEY and PARSONS stated that the USA'S Office is not insisting that GOLD be interviewed but is requesting that this be done if there is no reason why the Bureau feels that GOLD should not be interviewed at this time.(U)

PARSONS pointed out that the questioning of GOLD should be restricted to the period from 7/28/47, the date GOLD received the subpoens, to 7/31/47, the date GOLD testified before the Grand Jury. PARSONS requested that the entire four day period be covered but that emphasis should be placed on the night of July 30 and the early morning of July 31st. 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Tou will recall the above-captioned subject was convicted in the Southern District of New York on November 22, 1950, as a result of an indictment consisting of two counts. One count charged obstruction of justice and the second charged conspiracy to obstruct justice with Mirian Moskowitz, his partner, by reason of their having persuaded Marry Gold, admitted Soviet explonage agent, to testify falcely defore a Pederal Grand Jury, Southern District of New York, on July 31, 1947.

Brothman was sentenced to five years and fined five thousand dellars on the first count and was sentenced to two years and fined tent thousand dellars on the second count. His conviction on the count charging obstruction of justice was reversed on appeal because venue was not established. (1)



Cincinnati forwarded by attached letter of 9/27/55 a 39-page document written by Raphael David Schloseman who was in prison with Abraham Brothman, Alfred Dean Slack and Eugene Dennis. Apparently Schlossman is attempting to exploit news value of his story as document made available to Cincinnati office by newspaperman for information purposes. Schlossman claims to be anti-Communist but curried favor with Brothman to get a job on release. He mentions others who helped Brothman and names one Jerry who, for his services, was set up in a photography This refers to Jerome Tartakow, former NY 645-8, who furnished information to the MY office concerning Julius Rosenberg. Tartakow's identity as an informant has not been made public. information in Bufiles that Tartakow was paid by Brothman. Also alleges a guard in the Federal House of Detention, MIC, was given a television set for helping Brothman mail a propaganda sheet out of the prison. Also claims he received money from Mrs. Brothman to buy his way close to the Rosenbergs in the death house at Sing Sing. Schlossman states he visited Cincinnati office in Feb. 1953 and claimed he lost jobs due to Cal Crim Detective Agency, wanted to furnish Brothman information in exchange for FBI asking Cal Crim to leave him alone. States he was told FBI makes no deals or promises. Also said he could get job with Brothman and would do so if the Bureau desired. Was told no recommendations would be to made concerning his employment. Schlossman now serving prison term, Ohio State Pentientiary, for vehicular homicide.(%)



DETAILS:

By attached letter 9/27/55 captioned "Raphael David Schlossman, was., Information Concerning, Security Matter - C," the Cincinnati office furnished an Autostat of a 39-page type-written document prepared by Schlossman. This document was furnished to the Cincinnati office by Oliver Brown, reporter, "Dayton Daily News," who received it from one Helen Birkner who wanted an evaluation of it made to determine its use as a story.

This document relates Schlosanan's experiences in the Federal Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia. He tells of his knowing Brothman, Alfred Dean Slack, Eugene Dennis and others. Brothman was at that time serving a sentence for obstruction of justice in connection with the grand jury testimony of Harry Gold. Slack was serving a 15-year term for espionage in connection with furnishing information to Harry Gold. Schlossman states he deliberately cultivated Brothman in order to obtain a job after his relase from prison. He claims he did contact Brothman after his release and, although he was unable to get a job, he did borrow money from Brothman. Schlossman tells of other persons who helped Brothman and his friends in the Federal House of Detention, NTC, and mentions in particular one "Jerry," who, for his services, was set up in a photography studio with his sister in the Branz. undoubtedly refers to Jerome Eugene Tartakow, former who developed the confidence of Julius Rosenberg and acted as an informant of the NY office. Tartakow was a photographer prior to his incarceration and returned to this business upon his release. No information was received that he was paid by Brothman or his friends or was helped to set up a photography business. Tartakon's identity as informant has not been made public. W

Schlossman also states Brothman was successful in having a propaganda sheet mailed out of the Federal House of Detention by one of the guards who was given a Tele-King television set for his assistance. Schlossman also claims he was transferred from Atlanta to Sing Sing prison in New York and states he was successful in passing encouraging words to Julius Rosenberg through the prison grapevine. He claims he attempted to pass a message through the prison rabbi and shocked the rabbi by his suggestion. He also states Brothman assisted Slack in preparing his, Slack's, motion for a new trial and inserted therein material attacking the Bureau.

Schlossman claims he received money from Mrs. Brothman, the purpose of which was for him to buy his way close to the Rosenberge in the death house. [74]

The balance of this story relates Schlossman's life after getting out of prison and his unsuccessful attempts to establish himself in business. He is now incarcerated at the Ohio State Penitentiary serving a term for vehicular homicide. He blames his drinking for his trouble and ends his story on an optimistic note, telling of his cure of alcoholism through the Alcoholics Anonymous. (%)

Schlossman visited the Cincinnati office in February, 1953, and furnished information about Brothman, stating he was planning to go to work for him and would do so if the Bureau so desired. No recommendations were made to him concerning his employment. He also blamed Cal Crim Detective Agency for causing him to lose his jobs. He states he wanted, in exchange for the information, to have the FBI ask Cal Crim to leave him alone and was told the FBI makes no deals or promises to anyone. Schlossman also contacted the Cincinnati office by letter dated 1/17/55, written from the Ohio State Penitentiary, and requested a letter confirming the fact he had visited the Cincinnati office in 1953. No acknowledgement was made to this letter. (%)

Observations:

This document appears to be an attempt on the part of Schloseman to cash in on his friendship with Brothman and other Communists while in prison. He condemns Communism and claims he studied it in order to ingratiate himself with Brothman. He describes Brothman as "a wealthy industrialist." Since he was unable to obtain a job with Brothman's employer, Techniflex Corporation, upon release from prison, this is undoubtedly his next attempt to make money based on his experiences. The rest of his story dealing with his personal problems appears to be a play for sympathy on the part of Schlossman.

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

II. CONNECTIONS WITH THE CP AND FRONT ORGANIZATIONS

A. Signed 1943 CP Nominating Petition

The CP, USA, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. (2)

B. Subject Appeared Before CP Disciplinary Committee in 1946

On October 18, 1950, HARRY GOLD, a self-admitted Soviet espionage agent, advised SA ROBERT G. JENSEN that shortly after he (GOLD) arrived at BROTHMAN's place of business in May, 1946, he learned that BROTHMAN had appeared before a disciplinary committee of the CP. (W)

GOLD said that he learned this one night while having dinner at Carney's Restaurant, New York City, with MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ, JULES KORCHEEN, OSCAR JOHN VAGO and the subject. At this dinner, a discussion of what had gone on before a disciplinary committee of the CP took place. GOLD stated he was of the impression that KORCHIEN and BROTHMAN and possibly VAGO had just returned from this CP disciplinary meeting prior to dinner. GOLD advised he was of the opinion that BROTHMAN had called him at the BROTHMAN office and asked him to come to dinner. At this meeting, in the restaurant, GOLD said he learned that BROTHMAN and KORCHIEN had also been called before the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians (FAECT), the Congress of Industrial Organizations (CIO), a short time before GOLD began working for BROTHMAN. GOLD further stated that he was of the opinion that BROTHMAN and KORCHEEN had been brought before the FAECT by Dr. MILTON YUSEM, who was a former employee of EROTHMAN's. GOLD said that this came about because YUSEM insisted on BROTHMAN giving pay for overtime. As a result of this, GOLD stated that BROTHMAN and YUSEM had a violent argument and YUSEM was fired. [W]

GOLD further advised that he had no direct knowledge of this incident, but it is based upon what he heard at the dinner at Carney's. During the discussion at Carney's, dinner at Carney's, the opinion that there were two separate

and distinct meetings, the meeting before the CP disciplinary committee and the meeting before the FABCT. GOLD noted that he was of the impression that at the CP disciplinary committee meeting YUSEM claimed that BROTHMAN used his manufacturing ideas and methods without paying for or giving credit for same. During the course of this dinner, KORCHIEN said that he would like to punch YUSEM in the face. (L)

GOLD also stated that after some lengthy and violent discussion as to what had gone on at the CP disciplinary meeting, JULES KORCHIEN, at this dinner, said they should not get stirred up about it but he, KORCHIEN, would take the matter up with "CHESTER." GOLD further advised that he, himself, expressed no interest concerning "CHESTER," and pretended that he knew "CHESTER." However, GOLD related that he does not know, nor has he ever met "CHESTER."

GOLD stated that in the following week, probably on Tuesday, about 6:00 or 6:30 p.m., he walked into the office of ABRAHAM BROTHMAN. According to GOLD, KORCHIEN and the subject were in the midst of a conversation but continued talking on GOLD's entry. KORCHIEN was saying, according to GOLD, that he had discussed the entire matter with "CHESTER" and there would be no more complaints before the disciplinary committee. KORCHIEN said that "CHESTER" told him that he would straighten the whole matter out.

T-3, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised in March and April, 1946, that JULES KORCHIEN was a member of the CP, USA, in 1943, having had CP, USA, membership book number 9262, issued in New York City.

HARRY GOLD, in a signed statement dated October 2, 1950, advised SA's ROBERT G. JENSEN and RALPH J. T. CARTER, JR. that he first met OSCAR JOHN VAGO in May of 1946 on the morning that he came to work for A. Brothman and Associates. According to GOLD, VAGO was a partner in this firm and was also a design engineer and the chief draftsman. GOLD stated that many times in the ensuing months VAGO would spend a great deal of time in the subject's (29)

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office on 32nd Street, New York City, in discussing such matters as what had transpired in his own particular "Communist Party club" the night before. According to GOLD, BROTHMAN described VAGO as a sincere and convinced Communist. (%)

MILTON YUSEM was interviewed on February 4, 1954, by SA's WILLIAM F. THOMPSON and DONALD W. AARON. YUSEM stated that he had been employed by Abraham Brothman and Associates at 8503 57th Avenue, Elmhurst, Long Island, New York, from June to September, 1945. YUSEM stated that he did not get along with BROTHMAN and this was the main reason for his leaving that employment. (20)

The following information was taken from pages 264 and 265 of "The Story of the CIO" by BENJAMIN STOLBERG: (W)

"The FAECT was organized in 1944 mainly from the technical staff in the WPA. From the very beginning, the Federation has been under Stalinist leadership and its rank and file are chiefly CP followers."(W)

The "New York Times" of March 24, 1946, page 26, column 4, contained the information that the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians of the CIO had merged into the United Office and Professional Workers of America (UOPWA). (22)

The "CIO News," issue of February 20, 1950, on page 6, column 1, contained an article reflecting that the CIO Executive Board had voted to expel the UOPWA from the CIO, effective March 1, 1950. The Board acted, according to the article, on a report filed by the Trial Committee appointed to hear the charges against the UOPWA. (C)

The Committee found, "The policies and activities of the UOPWA followed and continue to follow exactly, without deviation, the program of the CP. Never in the history of the UOPWA has any policy ever been adopted which in any way was counter to the policies of the CP or to the interests of the Soviet Union, as these interests are reflected in the program of the CP." $|\mathcal{U}|$

C. Subject Reportedly A Communist

ROLF SIDNEY WOLLAN was interviewed on May 29, 1950, at Glenwood, Minnesota, by SA's MARTIN J. LUKOSKIE and ROY O. STUART: (22)

wollan advised that his brother, GERHARD Wollan, got him a job in December, 1945, with Abraham Brothman and Associates at their laboratory, 8503 57th Avenue, Elmhurst, Long Island, New York. At this time, Brothman and Associates! office was in Manhattan but later it was moved to 2928 41st Avenue, Long Island City, New York. WOLLAN was employed as a Laboratory technician until the middle of June, 1947, when he left.

WOLLAN, was in charge of the laboratory and was a partner in Abraham Brothman and Associates. (%)

ROLF WOLLAN stated that on several occasions he had played handball with his fellow employees and the subject and after finishing they would usually go someplace to eat. At this time, a discussion usually took place and this would concern Communism and Soviet Russia. ROLF WOLLAN stated that almost all of the fellows employed by Brothman and Associates were Communists, and ROLF believed that to be an associate in Brothman and Associates one would have to be a Communist. ROLF stated that he knew his brother, GERHARD WOLLAN, was a Communist during the late 1930's and up until about 1945. ROLF further stated that GERHARD was a follower of EARL BROWDER and when BROWDER was expelled from the CP GERHARD discontinued going to any of the CP meetings. (W)

On October 12, 1950, ROLF WOLLAN advised SA's LESTER G. DAVIS and GRORGE P. DILLARD that he was first employed by A. Brothman and Associates in the middle of December, 1945, and left in the middle of June, 1947. ROLF WOLLAN stated that the members of A. Brothman and Associates were Communists although he did not know whether they were actual members of the CP. He stated, however, that from (22)

his observation and from their conversations he believed ABRAHAM BROTHMAN, HARRY GOLD and MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ to be Communists. He recalled that in 1945 there was considerable discussion at A. Brothman and Associates regarding the ouster of EARL BROWDER (former General Secretary of the CP, USA); that BROTHMAN and MOSKOWITZ opposed EARL BROWDER; that they felt that he (BROWDER) let the Party down during the war and should be ousted.

GERHARD NORVAL WOLLAN, when interviewed at the University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia, in October, 1950, furnished the following information to SA's LESTER G. DAVIS and GEORGE P. DILLARD: (%)

While employed by A. Brothman and Associates, he had a very heated argument with the subject, which he believed occurred in 1945, regarding EARL BROWDER. BROTHMAN, according to WOLLAN, favored the expulsion of BROWDER and the election of WILLIAM Z. FOSTER to head the CP, as he felt the aims of the CP could not be reached unless the Party stayed together as an organization. WOLLAN, on the other hand, agreed with BROWDER that the goals and aims of the Party could best be achieved by the Party losing its identity as such.

According to GERHARD WOLLAN, MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ agreed with BROTHMAN and although WOLLAN did not have too much discussion with her he recalled that she too favored the expulsion of POSTER. DROWDER. (U)

WOLLAN further stated that the general atmosphere at BROTHMAN's firm was pro-Communist and pro-Soviet Russia. He noted that it was difficult for BROTHMAN to have any associates who did not believe in Communism as BROTHMAN did; however, BROTHMAN did have some business associates who did not agree with his Communist views. (U)

On October 24, 1950, ROBERT KEITH TOWNSEND, 42
Prospect Avenue, Seacliff, Long Island, New York, was
interviewed by SA JOSEPH J. PALGUTA at his place of employment,
the Sperry Gyroscope Company, Lake Success, New York. TOWNSEND

stated he was employed from sometime in 1941 until the early part of 1942 by the Hendrick Manufacturing Company in New York City under the subject who was Chief Chemical Engineer.

TOWNSEND further stated that in October, 1945, upon being released from the Armed Services, he again went to work for BROTHMAN and his associates at their 32nd Street, New York City, office. TOWNSEND advised that he worked for BROTHMAN at the above address for six to eight months as a draftsman and that he had no connection with BROTHMAN's laboratory in Elmhurst, Long Island, New York. TOWNSEND advised he was unable to furnish any information concerning the activities of BROTHMAN and OSGAR VAGO, one of the subject's associates, other than that he, TOWNSEND, was of the opinion that both BROTHMAN and VAGO were CP members or CP sympathizers. TOWNSEND based the above opinion on having heard BROTHMAN and VAGO on numerous occasions discuss various CP rallies or CP front organization rallies which were being held in New York City. TOWNSEND also stated that he had observed both the subject and VAGO with tickets to these rallies. (W/

D. BROTHMAN Made Speech at CP Club Meeting in Approximately 1948

On September 27, 1950, and October 3, 1950, JOHN LAUTNER, a CP member for over 20 years, who at the time of his expulsion from the CP in January, 1950, was Chairman of the New York State Review Commission, furnished SA DANIEL F. O'CONNOR and JOHN M. COLLINS information. This information was obtained from BERNIE CHESTER (also known as BERNARD SCHUSTER), who, according to LAUTNER, was the unannounced Treasurer of the New York State CP at that time (1)

In approximately 1948, MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ and GERTRUDE KOGAN, both of whom were active in the Hetti Lapatine Club of the CP, Chelsea area, New York City, invited ABRAHAM BROTHMAN to a meeting of the Club. During the meeting, subject made a speech in which he attacked the Party leaders and defended EARL BROWDER JU

It is to be noted that HARRY GOLD advised SA's

JOHN M. COLLINS and THOMAS H. ZORILER on November 1-4,

1950, that in 1948 the subject followed the principles
of one FRANCIS FRANKLIN, who, about that time, had been
expelled by the CP. The subject was continually speaking
in favor of the papers FRANKLIN was publishing at
this time and tried to influence GOLD and everyone else
connected with the subject's firm into following and
agreeing with the FRANKLIN line of thought. GOLD stated
MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ was also in favor of the principles
espoused by FRANKLIN, which was quite natural for her, as
she adopted the subject's viewpoint on everything.

It is to be noted also that the "Daily Worker," an East Coast Communist daily newspaper, issue of March 24, 1948, contained an article stating that FRANCIS FRANKLIN had been expelled from the CP. The article stated that it was charged that FRANKLIN had, for a considerable period of time, in his club, section and place of employment and through other channels, worked to undermine the discipline, unity and authority of the Party; that he had been the center of a sectional group in the Party seeking to split the organization (U)

JOHN LAUTNER further stated on September 27, 1950, and October 3, 1950, that at a Chelsea Section Convention of the CP in June or July, 1948, a resolution was endorsed which was critical of the Party leadership. According to LAUTNER, this resolution was endorsed by MOSKOWITZ and KOGAN. He recalled that MOSKOWITZ and KOGAN lived in the same apartment and were also in difficulty with the Party because they refused to contribute to the Party fund drive. (W)

LAUTNER further advised that as a consequence, in the Spring of 1949, MOSKOWITZ and KOGAN were refused registration in the CP and BROTHMAN, thereupon, took steps to compose his difficulties with the Party. (%)

The subject sent an emissary to confer with BERNIE CHESTER and plead with CHESTER to come to his (the emissary's) home and talk to BROTHMAN so that BROTHMAN could settle his difficulties with the Party. (%)

CHRSTER to speak with EROTHMAN. (26)

According to LAUTNER, CHESTER was very reluctant to do so but finally agreed. LAUTNER stated he did not know whether MOSKOWITZ and KOGAN were received back into the Party; however, he knew that no further action was taken against the subject. [U]

LAUTHER stated that EROTHMAN was not a member of any CP branch but was a member-et-large. He further noted that during the war years (World War II) EROTHMAN was responsible to BERNIE CHESTER and must have been held in high regard by the Party. CHESTER told LAUTHER that EROTHMAN was one of the top Communists in the country and that he (the subject) had halped the movement a lot. (W)

CHESTER indicated to LAUTNER that EROTHMAN wanted to straighten out his difficulties with the Party before he left for Switzerland in 1949. CHESTER further told LAUTNER that when EROTHMAN returned from his trip to Switzerland he, the subject, would make a substantial contribution to the Party. [76]

T-4, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised in October, 1953, that ISIDORE GIEBY NEEDLEMAN, an attorney at 165 Broadway, New York City, is a suspected Soviet espianage agent. Informant also advised that NEEDLEMAN had been an attorney for the Amtorg Trading Corporation, the registered Russian trade agency in the United States. (%)

E. Member of the Young Communist League

On May 29, 1947, the subject, when interviewed by SA's DONALD E. SHANNON and FRANCIS D. O'BRIEN, has admitted membership in the Young Communist League (YCL) while he was a student at Columbia University.

III. SUBJECT'S CONTACTS WITH ELIZABETH T. HENTLEY, HARRY GOLD AND MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ

Subject's Interview, May 29, 1947

in his office, Room 1212, 2948 41st Avenue, Long Island City, New York, by SA's DONALD E. SHANNON and FRANCIS D. BROTHMAN was first questioned regarding his submitting information or furnishing blueprints to any individuals who might have connections with a foreign BROTHMAN stated that he had furnished blueprints to a number of individuals and it was a common practice in the engineering field to submit blueprints to certain individuals who might possibly be in a position to obtain contracts for a firm. (21)

BROTHMAN was then specifically questioned as to whether or not he had been acquainted with an individual by the name of JACOB GOIOS. The subject stated that he could not recall this name. A picture of GOIOS was exhibited to him. BROTHMAN denied knowing GOLOS at this time. a picture of ELIZABETH T. BENTLEY was exhibited to BROTHMAN. The subject identified HENTLEY as an individual whom he "HELEN." The subject was therupon questioned as to his acquaintanceship with HELEN. BROTHMAN then admitted that he did recognize the photograph of GOIOS but was unable to state the name of this individual. BROTHMAN then related the following concerning his knowledge of JACOB GOIOS and "HELEN."

According to the subject, sometime in 1938 or 1939, an individual came to him at his office at 114 East 32nd Street, New York City, at which time BROTHMAN was operating a firm under the name of the Republic Chemical Machinery Company, which Company was associated with the Hendrick Manufacturing Company at Carbondaie, Pennsylvania. This individual told EROTHMAN that he had contacts with the Russian Government and that he was in a position to get contracts from the Russian Government for BROTHMAN,

the subject would turn over to him blueprints of certain projects the subject was working on at that time. EROTHMAN stated that the blueprints were his own property and they were for the most part blueprints of shafts, vats and other equipment necessary in the operation of a plant manufacturing chemicals. W

According to EROTHMAN, GOLOS visited his office on several occasions and some time following the original visit he (GOLOS) introduced the subject to an individual known only as HELEN. EROTHMAN stated that he was under the impression that HELEN was the secretary to GOLOS. GOLOS impression that HELEN would, in the future, obtain advised EROTHMAN that HELEN would, in the future, obtain blueprints which had been accustomed to turn over to GOLOS. [6]

According to BROTHMAN, HELEN visited the subject's effice over a dozen times during 1938-1940 and sometime in 1940 HELEN stopped coming to his office and another individual named HARRY GOLD came to the subject's office and said he represented GOLOS, the individual BROTHMAN had already identified as the man who made the original contact with him. GOLD visited BROTHMAN's office on a number of occasions during 1940 and 1941. The subject stated that GOLD, at that time, was living in Philadelphia and used to make a trip to New York approximately every three weeks and obtain these blueprints from BROTHMAN. The subject and obtain these blueprints from BROTHMAN. The subject said that to the best of his recollection the last time GOLD picked up the blueprints was late in 1941 or early in 1942.

BROTHMAN emphatically stated that GOLD was the last individual to pick up any blueprints or material which was to be furnished to GOLOS. The subject also stated that he did not know the present whereabouts of GOLOS and denied that he was ever contacted by any other individual other than HELEN and GOLD as individuals who represented GOLOS (W/

BROTHMAN was questioned as to the nature of the blueprints that he had turned over to GOLOS, at which time he displayed the blueprints, copies of which he still had in his offices | U|

The subject stated that some of the blueprints which he turned over to GOIOS and HRIEN as well as to GOID were returned to him but others were retained by them, The subject emphatically denied that he had ever turned over any blueprints which were of a restricted or secret nature pertaining to the war effort of the United States or any plans which the United States might be concerned with at that time. (N)

The following is a copy of a signed statement which was obtained from BROTHMAN: "New York, N.Y.

May 29, 1947

"I, Abraham Brothman, make the following voluntary statement to Donald R. Shannon and Francis D. O'Brien, whom I know to be Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. No threats or promises of any nature were made to me to make this statement. I know that what I say may be used against me at any time in a

"In 1938 or 1939 a man whose name I do not recall court of law. B. Information From ELIZABETH T. BENTLEY

ELIZABETH T. BENTLEY, an admitted former Soviet espionage courier, was interviewed on June 15, 1950, by

SA's ROEERT M. KANE and JOHN R. MURPHY, JR. BENTLEY advised that she had handled EROTHMAN for a period of several months in either 1940 or 1941 but was unable to fix a specific date. She related that it was her recollection that JACOB GOLOS (a known Seviet agent) had recruited EROTHMAN as an espionage agent through his membership in the FAECT, of which EROTHMAN was a member and of which JULES KORCHEEN was a leading figure. BENTLEY stated that she recalled that GOLOS had told her that EROTHMAN was a member of the CP and that GOLOS had ordered him (the subject) to withdraw from the CP at the time of his recruitment. EENTLEY emphasized that this account by GOLOS was hazy in her recollection and that it might not have occurred in that exact manner. (%)

Introduced to the subject by GOLOS and had seen the subject regularly subsequent to their meeting, on which occasions EROTHMAN furnished to her blueprints and drawings. EENTLEY stated that she examined these blueprints at the time that she received them from the subject and stated that on every occasion the blueprints dealt with commercial kettles which, she understood, pertained to some type of a commercial vat. She stated that on each of the drawings there appeared the name of a factory and also the name of the Republic Chemical Engineering Company. (W

BENTLEY stated that she was unable to recall the exact number of times that she had met the subject, but stated that at each of their meetings a subsequent meeting was arranged. She stated that GOLOS also continued to contact EROTHMAN during the same period and she was unable to recall the number of such contacts by GOLOS. She further stated that any information which she secured from EROTHMAN was given to GOLOS to be forwarded to the Russians through "channels." (%)

BENTLEY further stated that after some months of contacting BROTHMAN in this manner, the exact date of which she was unable to recall, GOLOS advised her that BROTHMAN was to be turned over to a new contact. She stated

that upon informing BROTHMAN of this, he became extremely agitated and appeared to be terrified at the prospect of being handled by a new contact. RENTLEY stated that it was her opinion that BROTHMAN had previously felt that he was dealing with representatives of the CP and was frightened at the prospect of dealing directly with Russian representatives. BENTLEY told the subject that the change was being made in order to furnish him with a contact who would be able to talk his language in the chemical field. BENTLEY related that the subject had first refused to comply with her instructions so that it was necessary for her to arrange a later meeting at which she, the subject and GOLOS were present. At this meeting, she said BROTHMAN agreed to accede to their orders. [11]

BENTLEY further advised that during the Fall of 1940 GOLOS claimed to have become disgusted with the subject and told BENTLEY that he was turning him over to someone else. BENTLEY stated that she never learned from GOLOS or anyone else to whom BROTHMAN was then directed (W)

C. Information From THOMAS L. BIACK

At the request of United States Attorney IRVING SAYPOL, THOMAS L. BLACK, who admitted furnishing information to the Soviets from approximately 1935 to the middle of the 1940's, was interviewed by SA FRANCIS W. ZANGLE on November 15, 1950, and furnished the following: (M/

BLACK stated that sometime in 1912 or 1943 he received a telephone call from HARRY GOLD. BLACK advised that at that time BLACK was living in Newark, New Jersey. BLACK related that GOLD stated that he had to see BLACK on a very urgent matter and as a result an appointment was made. During the meeting, GOLD told BLACK that he was about to be inducted into the Army, and that, as a matter of fact, GOLD had received his notice to take his pre-induction physical examination. GOLD said that he had been handling a centact who in the past had provided him with extremely valuable technical information for the Soviet Union who could still provide much more similar information. GOLD went on to say that this contact had been very badly handled before he had been turned over to GOLD, badly handled in the

sense that the contact was rather temperamental and in order to get information from the contact he could not be brusquely, but had to be handled with extreme tact, flattery, etc. GOLD added, according to BLACK, that this contact was so valuable he didn't want to see just anyone handle him and, therefore, he had recommended or was going to recommend to his Soviet superiors that BLACK be assigned that task. (20)

BLACK further advised that GOLD told him that this contact was a brilliant chemical engineer and among other things an expert on the design of mixing equipment for the chemical industry. BLACK told GOLD that it would be foolish to turn this contact over to him because he too expected to be inducted. [U]

BLACK noted that GOLD did not mention the contact's name at the time and it was some years later before he found out that this contact was ABRAHAM BROTHMAN. BLACK stated that the first time he found out that this contact was ABRAHAM BROTHMAN occurred at the time that BLACK first met the subject. BLACK related that GOLD asked him to go to BROTHMAN's laboratory because BROTHMAN needed some technical information or some ideas on technical matters which GOLD believed BLACK would be able to supply BLACK advised that HARRY GOLD was still working at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company at this time. On the trip to New York to meet BROTHMAN, GOLD told BLACK a little bit about the person BLACK was to meet. said that BROTHMAN was a chemical engineer in the consulting business and that currently he was working on the process to obviate the Dupont and Rhom and Hass patents on Methyl Methacrylate (Plexiglass). GOLD mentioned also that BROTHMAN was an expert on chemical mixing equipment and it was then that BLACK asked GOLD if BROTHMAN was the contact he had wanted BLACK to handle if GOLD were inducted. BLACK related that GOLD answered in the affirmative.

BIACK advised that he met BROTHMAN at the subway in Queens and that the subject drove BIACK and GOID to the subject's laboratory in his own car. BIACK noted that while he was in the subject's car he noticed a current issue of the "Daily Worker," previously described. BIACK further stated that during this meeting the subject asked him a great many questions on the general topic of sulfonation which seemed to have been the step in the subject's process for making Plexiglass with which the subject was having difficulties. (%)

BIACK stated that he had met the subject on about two other occasions. BLACK said that he had received a telephone call in Philadelphia from HARRY GOLD who was at that time an employee of BROTHMAN. GOLD asked BLACK if he would do him a special favor by picking up a sample of material at the Rhom and Hass plant in Bristol, Pennsylvania, and bring it to BROTHMAN's office. GOLD stated, according to BLACK, that the sample had been arranged for by telephone and that it would be waiting for BLACK, but that they must have it in a hurry and that was the reason they asked BLACK to pick it up. BLACK related that he picked up the sample and delivered it to BROTHMAN's office that evening. were GOLD, BROTHMAN and MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ. BLACK stated that the subject took them all out to dinner and during the conversation he recalled that the chief topic discussed was the Chinese Communist movement. BLACK recalled "nothing specific but I came away with the impression that BROTHMAN, MOSKOWITZ and GOLD were favorable to the Communist regime in China and appeared to follow the Party line in this country." [26]

BLACK also said, "From my conversations with HARRY GOLD, there was no doubt in my mind that BROTHMAN had been sympathetic to the Communist movement and to the Soviet Union for many years." (22)

BLACK related that on another occasion, which he believed was the first meeting with EROTHMAN, he was introduced to Dr. YUSSEM, then an employee of the MROTHMAN at this time was very dissatisfied with YUSSEM and the subject was thinking about discharging YUSSEM. On still another occasion, GOLD told MIACK that in discharging YUSSEM, subject had been brought before the appropriate committee of the CP to explain the alleged unfair treatment of YUSSEM and that this committee had instructed the subject to pay YUSSEM \$600. (W)

D. Information From HARRY GOLD

HARRY GOLD, on July 11, 1950, furnished two signed statements to SA's T. SCOTT MILLER and RICHARD B. BRENNAN concerning his knowledge of ABRAHAM BROTHMAN. GOLD related that he met BROTHMAN at the direction of GOLD's Soviet espionage superior, SEMEN SEMENOV, in 1941. According to GOLD, BROTHMAN stated that he did not get along with GOLD's predecessor, "HELEN" (ELIZABETH T. GOLD related that he used the alias of FRANK KESSIER in meeting BROTHMAN. During early 1942, BROTHMAN furnished complete and detailed information on Buna-S material to GOLD for transmission to the Soviets. received instructions from SEMENOV to congratulate and praise the subject for turning over this Buna-S material. According to GOLD, in late 1942, the subject delivered to GOLD information in great detail concerning mixing equipment for transmittal to the Soviets. BROTHMAN also furnished material concerning an Aerosol dispenser and magnesium powder to GOLD for transmittal to the Soviets. According to GOLD, this material was not turned over to GOLD further stated that EROTHMAN never received any remuneration for his work for the Soviets. GOLD advised that in connection with the Buna-S material the subject did receive money for blueprinting expenses. (20 SEMENOV.

GOLD further related that the subject was interested in receiving Soviet financial backing for work on various chemical processes. (W)

IV. PROSECUTIVE ACTION

On July 29, 1950, a Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York, handed up an indictment to Judge SIDNEY SUGARMAN charging ABRAHAM BROTHMAN and MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ with conspiracy to obstruct justice in that they moskowitz with HARRY GOLD, a co-conspirator but not a tefendant, agreed on fictitious explanations of their defendant, agreed on fictitious explanations of their associations with each other and divers other persons in association of Title 18, Section 88, (1946 Edition), United violation of Title 18, Section 88, (1946 Edition) to give false charging BROTHMAN with wilfully influencing GOLD to give false testimony before a Grand Jury on July 31, 1947, in violation of Title 18, Section 241, (1946 Edition), United States Code.

On November 22, 1950, the trial jury, Southern District of New York, returned a verdict finding BROTHMAN guilty of conspiracy to obstruct justice, and intimidation of a government witness. MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ was found guilty of conspiracy to obstruct justice. Inasmuch as BROTHMAN of conspiracy to obstruct justice. Inasmuch as BROTHMAN and MOSKOWITZ had been remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal at the start of their trial, they were continued in his custody.

On November 28, 1950, Judge IRVING R. KAUFMAN, Southern District of New York, sentenced BROTHMAN to five years imprisonment and \$5,000.00 fine on the count charging intimidation of a government witness, and two years

imprisonment and \$10,000.00 fine on charge of conspiracy to obstruct justice. MOSKOWITZ was sentenced to two years imprisonment and \$10,000.00 fine. Both defendants were to be committed until all fines were paid.

V. APPEAL ACTION AND CONFINEMENT

On July 26, 1951, the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit in a decision by Chief Judge THOMAS SWAN, with Judges LEARNED HAND and AUGUSTUS N. HAND concurring, affirmed the conviction of BROTHMAN and MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ on the conspiracy to obstruct justice count but reversed the conviction of BROTHMAN on the count in the reversed the conviction of BROTHMAN with attempting to persuade indictment which charged BROTHMAN with attempting to persuade HARRY GOLD to give false testimony before a Federal Grand Jury in 1947. [11]

The Circuit Court held that a motion for acquittal made at the conclusion of all the evidence properly raised the question of venue in the court below, and that such a motion need not specify the grounds therefore. Accordingly, it reversed BROTHMAN's conviction on the count in the indictment which charged BROTHMAN with attempting to persuade HARRY GOLD to give false testimony before a Federal Grand Jury in 1947. (W)

The records maintained by the United States Marshal in the Southern District of New York, as reviewed by SA LOUIS M. LUEDERS at the end of 1953, reflected that the subject was removed from the Federal Detention Headquarters, New York City, and transferred on August 28, 1951, to the United States Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia.

Warden W.H. HIATT, United States Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia, on November 6, 1952 advised the Atlanta Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that the subject was released from the United States Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia, on November 5, 1952. The subject was

brought before the United States Commissioner in Atlanta, Georgia, on November 5, 1952, and released on a poor convict's oath. Warden HIATT also advised that the subject would not be under supervision, as he was discharged by expiration of minimum sentence.

The records of the Clerk of the Federal District Court, Southern District of New York, under Docket Number C - 633 - 106, were examined on May 27, 1955, by SA WALTER C. ROETTING, JR. and found to contain an entry dated April 29, 1955, reflecting the approval by Judge NOONAN of the nolle prosequi filed against the count in the indictment which prosequi filed against the count in the indictment which charged BROTHMAN with attempting to persuade HARRY GOLD to give false testimony before a Federal Grand Jury in 1947.

The records further indicated that BROTHMAN had two dependent children. BROTHMAN, according to these records, dependent children. He was listed as one of the principals in A. Brothman and Associates, 114 East 32nd Street, New York City, operating as a consulting engineer (A)

It was determined from an inquiry on March 7, 1955, that the subject and his wife resided at 80 Kingston Avenue, Port Jervis, New York. It was also determined that the subject was employed on that date by the Techniflex Corporation, 55 Jersey Avenue, Port Jervis, New York.

These records contained a newspaper clipping concerning the subject's arrest, which information previously has been set out in instant report. (21)

C. Informants

confidential informants, who have furnished reliable information in the past, and who are familiar with CP and related activities in the New York City area, were contacted in April and May, 1956, and shown photographs of the subject. These informants advised that the subject was unknown to them.

D. Subject Making Payments on Fine

the Aureau notes with sensiderable interest the fallowing information in Aufiles concerning the Summal and Jerone identifies the who are referred to above and Daniel Eline, son af Emanuel. Baniel Eline is the subject of Philadelphia file 65-4343. It appears that Daniel Eline, who was last known to be employed as an associate professor at Fale University, was known to Marry Sold, convicted Soviet explonage agent. Sold has stated that he furnished Baniel Eline's name to his Soviet principal as a possible recruit into Soviet explonage. Baniel Eline, on interview, denied over being approached by the Soviete and no evidence was developed to indicate that such an approach was made. Accordingly, the Daniel Eline agter may alsoed. [7]

It should be noted that Harry Gald, during his explorage setivity on behalf of the devicte, worked for and received intelligence data from Abraham Brothman which material he turned over to his Zoviet principal. It is to be noted that during the period of time that Hold was working. for Brethman and was resetving intelligence information from him, Baniel Eline's brother, Jerone (Jerry) Eline, was apparently also in contact with Brothman. The following references to Jerone (Jerry) Eline, who to apparently identical with Jerry Eline referred to above, are set forth in the New York report of SA John P. Murphy, Jr., dated 6/30/50 in the Abruham Brothman eases Page 69 reflects a notation that Brothman berrowed \$5,000 from Jerone Bine who obtained the money from Maruell Levy. Aline related that Brethman agreed not to enter into competition with Stanton when he worked there as a chemical engineer. Houseer, Brothman piclated the agreement by entering into competition with Stanton after leaving the Laboratories. Eline further seld that Brothman elained, when leaving Stanton, , that the firm owed him money and a week before Brothman's errest, his attorneys disputched a letter to Stanton attempting to collect money for Brothman. Il inc oald he replied to this letter after reading of Brothman's arrest and proposed that he meet with Brothman in Philadelphia to settle the matter. He said he reserved no reply to this letter. It is not known whether or not Harry Gold was frustrumental in placing Jerome Kline in contact with Brothman or whether or not Harry Gold was actually sware of Jerome Kline's association with Brothman. It does appear significant, however, that Gold and Jerome Kline both had dealings with Brothman and that the name of Daniel Kline, Jerome's brother, was furnished by Gold to the Soviete as a possible explorage recruit.

The records of the Clerk of the USDC, SDNY, under Docket No. C-133-106, disclosed that ABRAHAM BROTHMAN made a payment in the amount of \$82.40 on May 28, 1958. The unpaid balance of his fine was recorded as \$4,859.73.

It is noted that ABRAHAM EROTHMAN was found guilty, on November 22, 1950, in the USDC, SDNY, of conspiracy to obstruct justice and intimidation of a government witness. On November 28, 1950, he was sentenced to five years imprisonment and a \$5,000 fine on the count charging intimidation of a government witness and two years imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine on the charge of conspiracy to obstruct justice. (W)

On July 26, 1951, the United States Court of Appeals, Second District, affirmed the conspiracy count, but reversed the count charging intimidation of a government witness. He was confined to the United States Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia, on August 21, 1951, and released on November 5, 1952.

Reportedly, the family of JOSEPH GRENBERG's wife owned the Bertlunel Apartments. It was set forth that the property, instead of being owned by YETTA SPIGLER, was actually owned by EMANUEL KLINE, South Philadelphia real estate dealer, and managed by his son, JERRY YETTA SPIGLER was reportedly the mother-in-law of JERRY KLINE. GOLD previously had furnished the name of JERRY KLINE's KLINE. brother, DANIEL KLINE, to the Soviets for possible recruitment. HARRY GOLD had met DANIEL KLINE through his brother, JOSEPH GOLD, who was a classmate of DANIEL KLINE. DANIEL KLINE was a member of a social group with which JOSEPH GOLD associated. GOLD recalls possibly he may have visited KLINE a few times at his home in South Philadelphia. The GOLDs subsequently moved to North Filladelphia and GOLD gradually lost contact with KLINE. GOLD subsequently heard that the KLINE family moved to West Oak Lane, Philadelphia.

JOSEPH GOLD recalls that the father of DANIEL KLINE was named EMANUEL KLINE, a well-known real estate dealer in South Philadelphia. He could not recall the names of DANIEL KLINE's brothers or sisters. When the name JERRY KLINE was mentioned, GOLD stated the name sounded familiar but he could recall nothing further regarding a JERRY KLINE.

The name YETTA SPIGLER was also not familiar to JOSEPH GOLD. He had no knowledge whether the KLINE family ever owned . property in Atlantic City. (\mathcal{U})

JOSEPH GOLD was familiar with the name ABRAHAM BROTHMAN through the newspaper accounts of BROTHMAN's trial and also because HARRY GOLD, his brother, was formerly associated with ABRAHAM BROTHMAN. JOSEPH GOLD has no specific knowledge of BROTHMAN other than from the aforementioned association. (U)

Regarding the fact that HARRY GOLD submitted DANIEL KLINE's name to the Soviets for possible recruitment. JOSEPH GOLD mentioned he presumed that HARRY GOLD knew DANIEL KLINE inasmuch as DANIEL KLINE came to the GOLD house on several occasions. However, JOSEPH GOLD stated he could not recall that his brother HARRY GOLD and DANIEL KLINE ever were in contact with each other outside of the GOLD home.

In conclusion, JOSEPH GOLD stated his recollection of the KLINE family is very vague inasmuch as the association occurred over twenty-five years ago. He has no knowledge of what became of DANIEL KLINE, and he has no information on any of the KLINE family since his association with DANIEL KLINE. (X)

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Photographs of JOSEPH GRENBERG were exhibited to JOSEPH GOLD, but GOLD failed to recognize this individual as anyone he has ever seen.

ReBulet 6/18/58 instructed that the interview of HARRY GOLD regarding JEROME KLINE and BROTHMAN is to be reported under the BROTHMAN caption, with copies disseminated to Bufile on GRENBERG.
