SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

MOSKOWITZ testified before Grand Jury, SDNY, on 7/18/50 and 1/20/50. On 7/29/50 Grand Jury returned indictment against ABRAHAM BROTHMAN and MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ, charging MOSKO ITTZ with conspiracy to obstruct justice in violation of Title 16, U.S. Code, Sec. 241 (1946 Ed.). MOSKOWITZ arrested 7/29/50 on bench warrant issued by Judge SIDNEY SUGARMAN. At arraignment 7/31/50 defendants requested postponement until 8/2/50 as their attorney, WILLIAM L. MESSING, could not be present. Requested bail be set which was set by Judge T. HOYT DAVIS at \$25,000 each. At arraignment 8/2/50 before Judge DAVIS, both defendants pleaded not guilty and bail continued at \$25,000 each. Judge DAVIS set 2/11/50 for filing of preliminary motions, trial date to be set on 9/11/50. On 8/3/50 defendants obtained. Writ of Habeas Corpus alleging bail excessive. summary hearing on the writ 8/8/50 defendants withdrew their writ, as Attorney MESSING objected to line of cross-examination by Government attorney.

MOSHOWITZ testified before a Federal Orand Jury, Southern District of New York, on July 18th and 20th, 1950. According to a statement made by the United States Attorney, IRVING H. SAYPOL, Southern District of New York, in open court at the arraignment of MOSKOWITZ on July 31, 1950, MOSKOWITZ refused to answer questions before the Grand Jury on the grounds that the enswers would tend to degrade or incriminate here

On July 29, 1950, the Grand Jury returned the following indictment against Abraham Brothman and Miriam Moskowitz:

That from on or about the 28th day of May, 1947, and continuing up to and including the twelfth day of June, 1950, in the Southern District of New York, Abraham Brothman and Miriam Moskowits, the defendants herein, and RARRY DOID, a co-conspirator but not a defendant herein, and divers other persons to the Grand Jurors unknown, did unlawfully, wilfully, knowingly and corruptly combine, conspire, confederate and agree together, and with each other, to defraud the United States of America in the exercise of its governmental function of administering and enforcing the criminal laws of the United States of America, and to influence, obstruct and impede the due administration of justice therein, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 211

That, as the said defendants well knew, during this canapiracy, a Grand Jury of the United States, duly impaneled in and for the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, was conducting an investigation of possible violations of the espionage and other Federal criminal

That it was a part of said conspiracy that the defendant ABRAHAM BROTHMAN, and HARRY GOLD, a co-conspirator, would agree upon fictitious explanations of their associations with each other and divers other persons.

"4. That it was further a part of said conspiracy that when the defendant, ABRAHAM BROTHMAN, appeared before the aforesaid Grand Jury, he would give false, fictitious, fraudulent and manufactured information concern-

Southern District of New York, the same day who ordered the indictment entered upon the record, and further ordered that the indictment be sealed. Judge SUGARMAN ordered bench warrants issued for the arrest of BROTHMAN and MOSKOWITZ.

At 3:50 p.m. on July 29, 1950, MOSKOWITZ was arrested at the Ulster Chemical Company, Cliffwood, New Jersey, by SA FRANK RAISBECK of the Newark Office, SAS FREDERICK C. BAUCKHAM, VARRO L. RITTER, and ROBERT L. STEVENSON, JR. of the New York Office. MOSKOWITZ was advised that a warrant charging her with conspiracy te obstruct justice had been issued. She requested to see the warrant and was advised that it was not necessary to show her the warrant to her and was advised that it was not necessary for the meaning of the charge do this. MOSKOWITZ requested to call her attorney and was advised that she would be allowed to call her attorney when she returned to New York City, when we would be allowed to call her attorney when she returned to New York City, when

to the New York Office, arriving at the office at 5:45 p.m. At 5:55 p.m. MOSKOWITZ was photographed by Photographer WARREN CAYNOR and at 6:04 p.m. she was fingerprinted by SA WILLIAM F. NORTON.

United States Attorney SAYPOL advised that neither a judge nor a commissioner was available for arraignment of the subjects and that MOSKOWITE

was to be placed in the Women's House of Detention, 10 Greenwich Avenue, New York City.

MOSKOWITZ refused to sign her fingerprint card and a list of personal property taken from her. She also refused to make a statement of any kind. MOSKOWITZ was offered food of her choice which she also refused.

At 6:20 p.m. MOSKOWITZ placed a telephone call to Attorney WILLIAM L. MESSING, Lexington, New York, Telephone Number 586. This telephone number, which is listed to a public telephone in Lexington, was first reported to be busy and later was reported to be out of order.

At 7:05 p.m. MOSKOWITZ decided to call Attorney MICHAEL E. ATKINS at Long Beach, Long Island, Telephone Long Beach 6-2158. This line was also reported to be busy.

At 7:20 p.m. Attorney MESSING was contacted by MOSKOWITZ at the above Lexington, New York, telephone number. She advised him that she had been arrested, was presently in the Federal Bureau of Investigation offices in the United States Courthouse, and would be placed in the Women's House of Detention. She also told him that she had been offered papers to sign including a finger-print card.

After speaking to Attorney MESSING, MOSKOWITZ again refused to sign her fingerprint card and property receipt.

At 7:25 p.m. as MOWKOWITZ was leaving the FBI Offices, she requested to call her family at Bayonne, New Jersey, Telephone Number Bayonne 3-2233J. She was allowed to place this call. However, the line was reported to be busy. She was informed that she could place this call and any additional calls she desired at the women's House of Detention. She was then taken to the women's House of Detention by the arresting New York Agents, arriving there at 7:50 p.m.

On July 31, 1950, BROTHAN and MOSKOWITZ appeared for arraignment before Federal Judge T. HOYT DAVIS of the Middle District of Georgia, a visiting judge sitting in the Southern District of New York. They were not represented by counsel. However, they advised the Court that Attorney WILLIAM L. MESSING, 350 Fifth Avenue, New York City, had been retained, but could not be present. At the defendants request, the arraignment was continued until August 2, 1950. The defendants then requested Judge DAVIS to set bail which was set at \$25,000 each. United States Attorney SAYPOL pointed out to Judge

DAVIS that the usual practice in the Southern District of New York before allowing defendants to bail is for the defendants to submit to fingerprinting and photographing. He pointed out that MOSKOWITZ had refused to sign her fingerprint card and requested the Judge to stipulate that before MOSKOWITZ be allowed to bail, she must sign her fingerprint card. The Judge then made the added stipulation as requested by United States Attorney SAYPOL and both defendants were remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal.

On August 2, 1950, the defendants were again brought before Judge DAVIS for arraignment at which time they were represented by Attorney MESSING. Both defendants pleaded not guilty to the indictment. Attorney MESSING argued for reduction of bail to \$1,000 for each defendant, claiming that the amount of bail recommended by the United States Attorney was excessive for the offense charged in the indictment and that the release of the defendants was necessary for both the preper preparation of the defense and for continuance of the defendants' business enterprises.

Judge DAVIS denied the request for reduction of bail and set September 11, 1950 for the filing of preliminary motions. The date for trial will be set on September 11, 1950. Both defendants were then remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal.

On August 3, 1950, Judge SIDNEY SUGARMAN, Southern District of New York, issued a writ of Habeas Corpus for defendants MOSKOWITZ and BROTHMAN.

On August 4, 1950 before Judge T. HOYT DAVIS the Government filed its answer to the Writ of Habeas Corpus, the answer claiming the defendants were held in lawful custody and that the Writ should be dismissed. Judge DAVIS set August 8, 1950 as the date for the summary hearing on the Writ to be heard.

On August 8, 1950 at the summary hearing held before Judge DAVIS the first witness called by the petitioners (BROTHMAN and MOSKOWITZ) was NAOMI BROTHMAN, wife of ABRAHAM BROTHMAN. She testified as to BROTHMAN'S financial ability and character. Upon cross-examination by Assistant United States Attorney ROY M. COHN, she was asked questions regarding her membership in the Communist Party; BROTHMAN'S membership in the Communist Party and Young Communist League, and her knowledge of HARRY GOLD. She declined to answer any of these questions on the grounds that the answers would tend to incriminate her. After these questions were asked, all of

which were objected to by Attorney MESSING with lengthy legal argument, it was noted by the writer, who was present in the court room, that ABRAHAM BROTHMAN signaled to MESSING that he desired to talk to him. MESSING asked for and received a five-minute recess to consult with his clients. MESSING indicated to the Court prior to the recess that in view of the line of questioning by the Government attorneys, he would rather have the Writ withdrawn than to continue with the hearing. After a five-minute recess, MESSING made application to the Judge to have the Writ withdrawn which application was granted by Judge DAVIS. Bail was continued at \$25,000 each and the defendants were remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE

#### Contacts with Confidential Informants

As previously reported, Confidential Informant T-1; of known reliability, has advised that one of the students who attended a class on the Heritage of the Communist Political Association on February 15, 1945, at the Chelsea Club of the Communist Political Association, 269 West 25th Street, New York City, was called "MIRRIAM".

The same informant advised that among the pupils who attended a class on America's Decisive Battle, a pamphlet written by EARL BROWDER, on April 25, 1945, at 257 West 19th Street, New York City, was MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ.

The same informant made available to the New York Office on May 27, 1949, a notebook containing various names and addresses of individuals affiliated with the Communist Party. The name, MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ, appears to this book and a notation has been made by the informant next to the name, MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ, that she is known to him to be a member of the Communist Party.

Confidential Informant T-1 on July 20, 1950, was shown a picture of Subject MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ. He advised that the subject looked familiar to him, but he could not positively identify her nor could he say that she is not identical with the individual referred to by him as MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ. T-1 stated that if he listed her name in the notebook as described above, he probably made the notation from records and other data available to him, without knowing her personally. He is unable to recall the individuals present at the Communist Political Association classes described above.

T-1 was requested to observe MOSKOWITZ personally in a discreet manner but refused to do so stating: "It wouldn't do any good; I'm certain I wouldn't recognize her and I don't want to take the chance of her recognizing me". It was pointed out to T-1 that such a thing could be arranged so that MOSKOWITZ would not observe him. However, he continued to protest that such a meeting would be fruitless.

The informant has previously advised Sn EDnARD w. BUCKLEY that he would not testify in any manner and he appeared during the above interview to be fearful of being called upon to testify if he would make any positive identification.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE (Cont)

A photograph of MIRINI MOSKOWITZ was exhibited to Confidential Informants T-2, T-3, T-4, T-5, T-6, T-7, T-8, T-9, T-10, T-11, T-12, T-13, T-14, T-15, and T-16, all of known reliability. All of these informants advised that they did not know MOSKOWITZ. T-6 stated that the photograph of MOSKOWITZ seemed "familiar" to him; however, he could not identify her nor could he furnish any reason why the picture seemed familiar.

Confidential Informant T-16 stated that the photograph looked familiar and may have been an individual whom he had seen at meetings of the Young Communist League. He could furnish no additional information.

#### Physical Surveillance

On July 28, 1950, MOSKOWITZ was observed by SA ROBERT L. STEVENSON, JR. to leave 29-28 41st Avenue, Long Island City, at 7:40 p.m. and proceed via Independent Subway to 151 Eighth Avenue, New York City. MOSKOWITZ was later observed to enter the automobile owned by ABRAHAM BROTHMAN and they spent some time in Manhattan and later drove to BROTHMAN'S home at 41-08 42d Street, Long Island City.

On July 29, 1950, MOSKOWITZ and BROTHMAN were observed by the arresting New York Agents, previously set out above, in the vicinity of 151 Eighth Avenue. At 10:20 a.m. they departed from New York City in BROTHMAN'S automobile arriving at the Ulster Chemical Company, Cliffwood, New Jersey, at 12:10 p.m.




