In his article, WELLER analyzed the status of the Communist world offensive. In connection with the article, a chart was presented indicating the vast Communist organization in France. The heading of the chart was concerned with the Politburo, and this heading was broken down into two main sections, one of which revealed the Comintern authority over Communist strategy in the Communist-owned countries, and the second of which pertained to the Government of the U.S.S.R. Under the latter section, the chart revealed the flow of intelligence information to the Politburo through the Russian Government operations in Paris, France. The chart revealed two main outlets from the Soviet Diplomatic Mission in Paris and under the caption, "Political Police 'MVD'" were listed the names ABRABOV, JAKOWLEV and SMIRNOV. According to the chart, the Political Police set-up of the Russian Government in Paris flowed directly to the Embassy of the U.S.S.R. in Paris.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known roliability, has advised that MARIAN SCHULTZ was born either on November 30, 1910 or October 30, 1910 in Russia. He claims to be a citizen of the United States by virtue of the naturalization of his mother, ROSY KOBIERSKI, who was naturalized on March 5, 1929. The records of Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, reflected that SCHULTZ had been employed in Shop 42 of the Engineering Installation Department of the New York Shipbuilding Company, and previous to that, had been employed as a kitchen man in the Drake Hotel in Philadelphia. His wife's name was listed as being CATHRYN SCHULTZ.

T-5 advised that SCHULTZ was a delogate to the 2nd National American-Slav Congress held at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania on September 23, 1944 from the Russian American Club at 735 Fairment Avenue, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He was also a delegate from Lodge 3021 to the 6th National Convention of the International Workers Order. SCHULTZ was listed as a member of the National Committee of American-Russian Fraternal Society at that Convention and also as a member of the Constitution Committee of that convention. He is considered to be one of the leaders of the Russian IWO Lodge in Philadelphia.

It is noted that the American-Slav Congress and the International Workers Order had both been cited by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order #9835.

Confidential Informant T-5 has also advised that SCHULTZ was a member of the United Peoples Club of the Communist Party, District #3, where he possessed Book #83122.

Confidential Informant T-2 advised on and the

The files of the Omaha Division reflect that the subject attended the National Farm Institute at the Hotel Fort Des Moines from February 14 to February 16, 1946. Upon subject's arrival at Des Moines he was met at his train by CHARLES F. RANSOM, an editorial writer of the Des Moines Register and Tribune, and JAMEN WALIACE, son of the former Vice President of the United States. The New York Division has, pursuant to Bureau instructions, requested that the recommendation be submitted to the Bureau as to the advisability of interviewing CHARLES F. RANSOM concerning his knowledge of the subject and subject's activities.

The report of SA EARL H. WILLIAMS dated September 24, 1946, at

Des Moines, Iowa, in the case entitled, "CHARLES F. RANSOM; INTERNAL SECURITY RM, reflects that RANSOM has been an officer in the Iowa Civil Liberties Union
and apparently has been connected with the National Federation for Constitutional
Liberties. This report further reflects that RANSOM's name appeared in a
notebook which was taken by the Kansas City Police Department from one ROBERT
WOOD, an avowed Communist from Oklahoma City. SA WILLIAMS' report also reflects
that an editorial appeared in the Des Moines Tribune on February 19, 1946,
entitled, "You Can Hear Anything About Those Russians". This editorial appeared
to be highly favorable toward the Soviets and particularly toward the subject
of this investigation.

Confidential Informant was unable to supply information which would indicate that RANSOM was a member of the Communist Party, as is reflected in the report of SA WILLIAMS.

SA ROBERT E. DOWD has discreetly contacted Mr. PAUL COTTON, former City Editor of the Des Moines Register and Tribune, who is now television column writer for that paper, and Mr. OGDEN DWIGHT, literary critic for the Des Moines Register and Tribune. Both these individuals are well known to SA DOWD and are cooperative with this Bureau. Both Mr. COTTON and Mr. DWIGHT stated that RANSOM is still connected with the Editorial Department of the Des Moines Register and Tribune and expressed the opinion that RANSOM would be cooperative if interviewed by Agents of this Bureau.

It is, accordingly, recommended that RANSON be interviewed for any information in his possession regarding the subject of this investigation.

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very few transient guests and that the majority of their clientele are individuals who return to Saratoga Springs year in and year out.

Mr. JAMES BENDON, Deputy Commissioner of Public Works, Saratoga Springs, New York, made available his records which reflected a receipt for the rental of the Saratoga Springs Convention Hall for the evening of August 11, 1945. Instant receipt reflected that the Convention Hall was rented to the American Birobidjan Committee, Ambijan, 103 Park Avenue, New York 17, New York. A thorough check through the records of the Department of Public Works and the City Tax Collector, failed to reflect the name of any individual who may have made the reservation at the Convention Hall or who may have paid the fifty dollar rental fee.

The 1944, 1946 and 1948 Saratoga Springs City Directories reflect the following information:

KATCHOR, MEYER (SARAH), proprietor, KATCHOR Farm Hotel, R.F.D 2, Saratoga Springs, New York.

The Saratoga Springs City Directories failed to reflect anyone named KATCHER, and the only name in these directories similar to KATCHER was the name MEYER KATCHOR, mentioned above.

It is to be noted that the Saratoga Springs City Directory is printed every two years, and that the 1950 directory failed to reflect the name of MEYER KATCHOR.

Miss BETTY USHER, Adirondack Credit Service, advised that their records reflected tone MEYER KATCHOR and his wife, SARAH, who for approximately six years, 1942 to 1948, operated a business known as Katchor's Hotel and Farm. The credit records reflected a divorce action, MEYER KATCHOR versus ESTHER KATCHOR, dated 4/30/32. The records further reflect that KATCHOR's wife as of June 1947 was Dr. S. H. GOODMAN. (SARAH GOODMAN). KATCHOR's credit record contained a Glens Falls "Post Star" newspaper clipping, dated June 8, 1944 to the effect that Technical Sergeant MORRIS A. KATCHOR, U. S. Air Force, was killed in action in Italy on April 25, 1944. The credit record described KATCHOR as of October, 1944 as being between forty-five and fifty years of age,

divorced from his first wife, ESTHER; remarried, residing in Saratoga Springs for approximately fifteen years, considered a permanent resident, race - white, of German ancestry.

Sergeant HENRY M. MAGINN, Acting Chief GEORGE WEST of the Saratoga Springs Police Department, and STANLEY VAN RENSSELAER, Saratoga Springs Police Judge, all advised that they have known MEYER KATCHOR for fifteen years or more. All stated that to the best of their knowledge, he has operated a legitimate boarding house and chicken farm in the rural section on the outskirts of Saratoga Springs, New York. All stated that they knew of no pro-Russian or pro-Communist tendencies on the part of KATCHOR.

CI T-1, of known reliability, advised that he has known KATCHOR for approximately twenty years. T-1 stated that KATCHOR came to Saratoga Springs in approximately 1930 or 1931; that he was married and his wife's name was ESTHER. The informant stated that KATCHOR and his wife, ESTHER, had one child, a son, who was subsequently killed while serving in the United States Air Force. T-1 advised that KATCHOR's first wife, ESTHER, was unfaithful, and that KATCHOR subsequently divorced her. T-1 stated that KATCHOR thereafter married a practicing dentist, SARAH GOODMAN, a hunchback. T-l advised also that SARAH GOODMAN was a practicing dentist in Saratoga, Springs for approximately three years during World War II, and it was believed that KATCHOR in the recent past, divorced SARAH GOODMAN. T-1 stated that SARAH GOODMAN at the present time, is residing in Saratoga Springs with her brother, Dr. ALFRED GOODMAN, 81 Phila Street, Saratoga Springs, New York. T-1 further advised that KATCHOR and his wife lived in Saratoga Springs only during the summer months and that during the winter months, KATCHOR returned to New York City.

T-1 stated that KATCHOR, who he believed to be Polish, on one occasion was in minor difficulty with the police authorities at Saratoga Springs, New York for soliciting tourists at the Saratoga Springs Railroad Station to come to his rooming house on the outskirts of Saratoga Springs. The stated that KATCHOR



and his wife, SARAH, always used a Post Office Box number and their mailing address as of October 28, 1948, MEYER KATCHOR gave as 220 East 16th Street, New York 3, New York; as of December 24, 1948, Dr. SARAH GOODMAN KATCHOR gave her address as 220 East 16th Street, New York 3, New York; as of January 10, 1949, MEYER KATCHOR gave his address as 685 LaFayette 🚟 Avenue, Brooklyn, New York. CI T-1 stated that MEYER KATCHOR never exhibited any pro-Russian or Pro-Communist tendencies.

CHARLES DEHN, JR., 193 Church Street, Saratoga Springs, New York, advised that he leased MEYER KATCHOR's chicken farm from KATCHOR from 1942 to 1946. DEHN stated that during that period of time, he was obsely associated with KATCHOR dur the summer months. He stated that KATCHOR ran a rooming house for summer tourists. DEHN advised that KATCHOR was "a sharp fellow, and that he was saying that he was going back to Russia. DEHN stated that KATCHOR repeatedly stated that he would like to go back to Russia because he believed Russia was a much better place in which to live. DEHN stated that he used to discuss the subject with KATCHOR frequently and that KATCHOR was very emphatic in his attitude. DEHN further advised that KATCHOR tried to get him to read the "Daily Worker an east coast Communist newspaper, and some other literature which he believed was written by "The Red Dean of Canterbury" DEHN stated that because of KATCHOR's continual remarks about what a fine country Russia was, and because of his efforts to have him read the "Daily Worker" and other pro-Communist literature, he had the impression that KATCHOR was a Communist.

DEHN further stated that KATCHOR always talked a great deal about collective farming and that he would like to set up a collective farming cooperative club in Russia or the United DHHN further stated that KATCHOR's former wife, Mrs. SARAHXGOODMAN KATCHOR, advised him that the subject divorced her approximately a year and a half ago. DEHN stated however, that he has heard that KATCHOR has since remarried.

Mrs. POLLY DEHN, mother of CHARLES DEHN, 178 Beacon Street, advised that she knows MEYER KATCHOR very well. Mrs. DEHN stated that she was acquainted with KATCHOR socially and that she recalled KATCHOR had been married when he

originally came to Saratoga Springs around 1930; that he had divorced his first wife; and that he had had a son by his first wife, who prior to his death while in the U.S. Air Force, had resided with his mother in California. Mrs. DEHN a stated that it was her belief that KATCHOR was a Russian, and that his reputation in the community, as far as she knew, was very good, and that she knew of no pro-Russian or pro-Communist sympathies on the part of KATCHOR.

CI T-2, of known reliability, advised that he has been closely associated with MEYER KATCHOR since 1932. He stated that KATCHOR was born on April 15, 1893, in Warsaw, Poland, that he was naturalized in Brooklyn, New York on February 21, 1928, Certificate No. 2686984, having arrived in this country on the SS Vasari at the Port of New York on September 26, 1922, and his father's name was BENJAMIN KACZOR: his mother's name was HINDAKACZOR.

CI T-2 advised that KATCHOR came to this country via South America; that he married his first wife, ESTHER, last name unknown, in South America; and that he was a tailor by trade. T-2 stated, however, that KATCHOR, at the time he resided in Saratoga Springs, New York, operated a chicken farm and rooming house in Saratoga Springs, New York. T-2 stated that KATCHOR divorced his first wife, ESTHER, in 1932, and that he thereafter married a Dr. SARAH GOODMAN, a dentist

T-2 advised that in 1949, KATCHOR made an application for a passport to France. He stated that he believed KATCHOR obtained this passport in New York City and that KATCHOR was going to make a trip to France in an effort to contact one of his few remaining relatives who lived in Europe.

T-2 stated that to the best of his knowledge, KATCHOR never went to Europe, however. T-2 stated that KATCHOR explained to him that he, KATCHOR, was going to France in order to buy a farm for a distant relative of his who was the wife of a rabbi, a displaced person, who was in 1949 living in France.

T-2 stated that KATCHOR was obsessed with the fact that he had only one living relative, a young girl who had escaped from the Russian zone of Germany and who had married a Rabbi, ISRAEL BRINBAUM, while both were displaced persons in France.

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T-2 advised that ISRAEL BRINBAUM and his wife, as of September 13, 1948, resided at the Hotel Neva, 14 Rue Bray, Paris 14, Rrance, and that as of October 21, 1946, ISRAEL BRINBAUM resided at Salzburg, Maxglan Verkstrasse, Yudenlager, Barak 16 Beith Bialik, Austria, and that as of October 16, 1946, they resided at Siebent Strass 3, Munchen Bayern, Germany, (U.S. Zone); that prior to October 16, 1946, Rabbi ISRAEL BRINBAUM could have been located in care of the Jewish Committee, Utica Yansy 14, Bysom, Poland.

T-2 stated that KATCHOR attempted to sponsor ISRAEL BRINBAUM and his wife in the United States, and that the YESHIVA of Spring Valley, New York, wanted Rabbi ISRAEL BRINBAUM to come to their institution as an instructor. T-2 stated, however, that Rabbi ISRAEL BRINBAUM was unable to come into this country because of a lung condition.

T-2 further advised that in approximately 1946 or 1947, KATCHOR, through the U.S. Mails, set up some sort of cooperative farming association. T-2 stated that KATCHOR drew up the organization of this cooperative farming club through a New York Attorney, and that KATCHOR was successful in collecting approximately twenty-five thousand dollars to forward the movement. T-2 stated, however, that the Securities and Exchange Commission evidently stopped KATCHOR from forwarding this cooperative farm club and required KATCHOR to return the twenty-five thousand dollars he had collected.

T-2 stated that KATCHOR had a son named MORRIS KATCHOR, who was born June 17, 1923 at Bronx, New York, and who served in the U.S. Air Force, ASN 19002633.

T-2 stated that KATCHOR, sometime during the 1940's, had been in business with one HARRY KATZMAN, 13 Buchanan Street, New York City. T-2 stated that he did not know the nature of this business relationship.

T-2 advised also that in December of 1948, MEYER KATCHOR swapped with WILLIAM OVSEOVITCH his property, consisting of a rooming house and chicken farm on R.D. 2, Saratoga Springs, New York, for an apartment house located at 685 LaFayette Avenue, Brooklyn, New York. T-2 stated that MEYER KATCHOR was residing at this address as of September 6, 1951, and it was his belief that

KATCHOR drives his entire income from the operation of this apartment house.

T-2 further advised that MEYER KATCHOR, was pitterly disappointed in the death of his son, MORRIS, and that he had been extremely anxious to have more children. He stated, however, that MEYER KATCHOR's second wife, SARAH GOODMAN, was a hunchback, and physically unable to bear children. He advised that KATCHOR, therefore, divorced SARAH GOODMAN, and eventually met a girl in New York City.

The Development of the Control of th CI T-2 advised that it was his opinion that KATCHOR was definitely pro-Communist and pro-Russian. T-2 stated that he used to argue with KATCHOR a great deal about Russia and the United States, and that KATCHOR continually insisted that RUSSIA was by far a better place in which to live. T-2 stated, however, that KATCHOR, to his knowledge, had not been to Russia since he left Europe to come to the United States in the early 1920's. T-2 advised that KATCHOR continually gave him pro-Communist liter ature to read in an effort to make him cognizant of the fact that Russia was a better place in which to live. T-2 stated that KATCHOR continually told him that he, T-2, did not understand the Russian formof Government, and that the only way he would become familiar with the Russian way of life was to read pro-Communist literature. T-2 advised that KATCHOR never exhibited any indications of violence and that he, T-2, did not think KATCHOR would be a potential threat to the security of this country. He stated that it was his opinion that KATCHOR had been tremendously impressed by the Pro-Communist and Pro-Russian literature which he had read, and that he had no first-hand information of conditions in Russia.

T-2 advised that KATCHOR's son, MORRIS, before his death, was not in sympathy with KATCHOR's ideas regarding Russia. He stated

that KATCHOR's son, because of this difference in Teeling about Russia, resided with KATCHOR's first wife, ESTHER, somewhere in California.

T-2 also stated that KATCHOR brought his mother over from Poland to the United States about 1937. T-2 stated that the mother of KATCHOR remained in this country for approximately three years and that she eventually went back to her native country, because she did not like the way of life in the United States. T-2 stated that since KATCHOR's mother left, this country, KATCHOR has not heard a word from her, and it was KATCHOR's belief that his mother was dead.

In of known reliability, made available information to the effect that

In July of 1944, FRED JEFFERY, Rutgers University Extension College, New Brunswick, New Jersey, advised that KATCHOR attended a short course in poultry husbandry from November 1942 to approximately January 15, 1943. Mr. JEFFERY, at that time, stated that KATCHOR was rabidly in favor of Communism as it existed in Russia and stated that Communism was the salvation of the world. On one occasion, Mr. JEFFERY recalled that KATCHOR stated that he wanted to go back to Russia to start a big poultry farm and help rebuild the country. JEFFERY stated also that KATCHOR had in his possession, books written by the so-called "Red Dean of Canterbury" which were in favor of Communism, and that KATCHOR attempted to induce other students in the classes, as well as the professors to read these books. Mr. JEFFERY stated also that KATCHOR, at almost every possible occasion, attempted to convert his associates or the members of the staff of the college to Communism. On one occasion, KATCHOR invited Mr. JEFFERY and his wife to go to New York with KATCHOR at KATCHOR's expense and attend some movies, showing Russian films.

Investigation regarding KATCHOR's activities in Saratoga Springs, New York during June of 1945, failed to reflect any pro-Communist or pro-Russian tendencies.

committee on Un-American Activities Report, 1948, page 49 and 225, reflected that "Jewish Life" is among typical examples of the Communist press and publications. The Committee also advised that "Jewish Life was published by the 'Morning Freihit Association Inc.'".

The Massachusetts House Committee on Un-American Activities Report, 1938, page 231, reflects that "Jewish Life" is a Communist international publication distributed by the Communists Progressive Book Shop in Boston, Massachusetts.

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HYMANKAPLAN, 14646 Sutton Street, engaged in the construction business with the firm HA KAPLAN and JOHNSON Company, 1214 South La Brea, was interviewed at his office, at which time he advised he is the son of HARRY KAPLAN, former President of the HAKAPLAN Company, Contractors, Chicago, Illinois. He advised his father had died in January, 1951. HYMAN KAPLAN stated he was married in 1937 and had not resided with his parents since that time. He came to Los Angeles, California, in about 1947 and prior to that time had resided in Chicago, Illinois, except for a short period of time when he worked in Shelby, Ohio. HYMAN KAPLAN advised he had never been in contact with any Soviet officials, nor would he have any knowledge of his deceased father having ever been in contact with them. A photograph of subject was exhibited to KAPLAN and he advised he could not recall having ever seen subject nor did he recall having ever heard subject's name mentioned.

He stated his father may have had various reasons for contacting Russian officials since he was affiliated with many charitable organizations such as the Northeast Home for the Aged, Jewish old persons home, crphans home, etc. in Chicago, Illinois. He stated his father was always trying to help others and may have had occasion to contact Soviet officials for the purpose of obtaining information concerning relatives or other matters for the needy or aged who are maintained by the various charitable organizations.

He stated he had no knowledge of any relatives residing in Russia and could recall no instances in which his father may have been attempting to obtain information concerning relatives. He advised he had some recollection that his mother may have had some brothers in Poland, but he was of the opinion these brothers had not communicated with his family for many years. He could recall no relatives with the name MENDINA or any similar name.

HYMAN KAPLAN stated his mother, HELEN KAPLAN, is now visiting in Los Angeles and may have additional information.

HELETHAPIAN. needmadnikoff. residing at 844 Masslein Avenue, in the HARRYAKAPIAN summer home, advised she came to the United States forty years ago from Poland, which later became part of Russia. She stated at the time she left Poland she had four brothers, one of which came to the United States at about the same time as Mrs. KAPIAN. She stated this one brother, ISADORE MADNIKOFF, presently resides in Chicago, Illinois, where he has been employed as a laborer by the H. KAPIAN Company, Contractors, for many years. Regarding the other three brothers, she stated she had heard nothing from them for more than fifteen years and is of the opinion they are all dead. She recalled that

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in about 1944 her husband observed a newspaper article listing the names of persons who had arrived in New York from Europe which reflected the name MINNIHAMADNIKOFF. Mrs. KAPLAN stated she had indicated to her husband this may be her niece who was about seven years old at the time she left Poland. She also recalled her husband stated he would attempt to find out if the MINNIE MADNIKOFF was a relative, but since she heard no more about the matter she did not know what action her husband had taken When the name MENDINA was mentioned to Mrs. KAPLAN she stated this very probably was the Russian pronunciation for MINNIE. Mrs. KAPLAN stated she knew of no contacts her husband had with any Soviet officials but added she was merely a housewife and that her husband being a big businessman had many business contacts and made many trips and that she was not acquainted with his business acquaintances nor familiar with his normal business activities. She stated for example, Mr. KAPLAN made many trips to New York and other parts of the United States in connection with his business and she seldom ever accompanied him on these trips.

Mrs. KAPLAN stated she and her husband had gone to Palestine in 1949 on a pleasure trip. She stated they had gone on a regular airline and were away from Chicago only six weeks, a week of which was spent in New York. A photograph of subject was exhibited to Mrs. KAPLAN and she advised she was not acquainted with, and has never seen YAKOVLEV.

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KAPLAN stated that he has a brother and sister in Russia and that his family has not heard from them since the period around World War T. He advised that a person long since forgotten, came to the United States a short while after World War I and told his family that his brother and sister were well and still residing in Russia. He advised that his brother was MORRIE KAPLUN (ph). adding that MORRIE was born about 1900 and his early occupation was that of a carpenter. He further advised that his sister's maiden name was NAOMI KAPLUN (ph) and she was born in 1902. He stated that the unknown individual who brought his family news about his prother and sister advised that NAOMI was married but he did not know the name of her husband or anything about his background. KAPLAN advised that during World War I MORRIE and NAOMI both resided in the Village APOKISKA (ph), which was in the vicinity of Moscow, Russia. It was KAPLAN's opinion that his brother and sister are no longer living. He based this opinion on the fact that HARRY KAPLAN, his deceased boother? whom he described as a wealthy man, spent much money and time to no avail attempting to locate them. He could not state what steps were taken by HARRY KAPLAN in attempting to locate these two people.

KAPLAN further related that he has a great many Aunts and Uncles and cousins in Russia and Poland and that he has not heard from them since before World War I.

MEYER KAPIAN added that HARRY KAPIAN, his deceased brother, may have had an occasion to visit the Soviet Consulate at washington, D. C. for informational purposes due to the fact that he traveled through Palestine on a pleasure trip for approximately six months between two and three years ago and advised that he knows of no other member of his family who may have had an occasion to call on anyone in the Russian Embassy or its Consulates.

A picture of the subject was exhibited and a description of the subject was given to MEYER KAPLAN, who advised that he is not acquainted with and has never seen YAKOVLEV.

On December 26, 1951, CHARLES F. RANSOM, Editorial Writer, Des Moines Register and Tribune, Des Moines, Iowa, advised as follows concerning his contact with the subject in February, 1946, during the National Farm Institute held at the Hotel Fort Des Moines, Des Moines, Iowa, February 14-16, 1946.

CHARLES F. RANSOM advised that in February, 1946, he was contacted by JOHN ADAMS of the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce who asked him if he would be willing to meet the subject upon his arrival in Des Moines, Iowa, to speak at the National Farm Institute. STEPHAN SHUNDENKO, Secretary, Consulate General of the USSR of New York, had originally been scheduled to speak at the meeting but was unable to come and the subject was to speak in his place. ADAMS advised RANSOM that the subject could not speak much English and that he was desirous of RANSOM's presence to act as an interpreter. RANSOM had been teaching Russian Jat Drake University. RANSOM advised that he and JAMESAWALLACE, son of the former Vice President of the United States, who is a friend of his, went to the Rock Island depot in February of 1946 to meet the subject but were unable to locate him and returned to the Hotel Fort Des Moines where they contacted him.

He advised he had no association with the subject at the convention inasmuch as the subject was busy at the speaker's table the majority of the time nor did he see him make any contacts with people other than those present at the convention. He advised that he took the subject to his home after the first night of the convention in company with JOHN ADAMS and JANEYADAMS, who is the daughter of JOHN ADAMS, where they remained for about an hour for refreshments. He stated that he then took him back to the Hotel Fort Des Moines.

He further stated that he took the subject for a drive through the City of Des Moines and pointed out the various places of interest but that the subject at no time appeared sociable or communicative nor did he ask the whereabouts of or indicate that he knew anyone in Des Moines, Iowa. RANSOM also advised he was not contacted by anyone who wished to meet the subject.

He advised that while the subject was here on, he believes, the second day of the convention a group of people were going to the Des Moines Municipal COPY DESTROYED

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Airport to meet HENRY WALLACE and he asked the subject if he would like to go along also. The subject said he would, so RANSOM took the subject to the airport with him to meet HENRY WALLACE. He advised he introduced the subject to HENRY WALLACE, who was also met by his son, HENRY, JR., who was in the Navy at that time and a photograph was taken of the subject, HENRY WALLACE and himself. He advised that he took the subject to the train when he departed from Des Moines at the end of the convention.

RANSOM advised that other than the above information, he could think of nothing else concerning the details of the subject's visit to Des Moines. He stated, however, that he was of the impression that the subject kept to himself while in Des Moines and did not contact persons other than those at the convention.

ZINN stated that CLARA STRASSEL's sister, TNE, lives at 538 South Alvaroda Street, tos Angeles, California ZIMN related that JACOB INDEXTRANSPRANCE TO THE United States approximately forty years ago and resided in Denver, Colorado, for many years. He stated that they had a son, JACOB, and a daughter, ANNABELLE, ZINN stated that to the best of his knowledge, neither CLARA nor JACOP STRASSEL ever became citizens of the United States ZINN related that to his knowledge JACOB and CLARA STRASSEL had relatives in the small town in Russia where they were born. 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

A physical surveillance conducted on December 27, 1946 by SA Robert J. Wirth reflected that the subject and his family left the United States on the "S.S. AMERICA" on that date.

On August 17, 1950 a Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York returned an indictment charging the subject and others with conspiracy to violate Section 32, Title 50, United States Code, in that they had conspired to furnish information pertaining to the national defense of the United States to a foreign nation, namely, the USSR.

On August 23, 1950 a bench warrant was issued for the subject by Federal Judge T. HOYT DAVIS, of the Southern District of New York. 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FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

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I. PROSECUTIVE ACTION

The records of the United States State Department, Washington, D. C., reflect that the subject arrived in the United States at San Pedro, California on February 4, 1941, listing his destination as the Soviet Consulate in New York City. He assumed his duties as a Clerk at the Soviet Consulate in New York City on February 8, 1941. On July 26, 1946 the subject advised the Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, that he would then be Assistant Consul General or Vice Consul at the Soviet Consulate, New York City.

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II. INTERVIEW OF CHARLES F. RANSOM

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, has furnished information to the effect that the subject arrived in Des Moines, Iowa on February 14, 1946 for the purpose of attending the National Farm Institute, which was held at the Hotel Fort Des Moines on February 15 and 16, 1946. According to the Informant, the subject was met at the train by CHARLES F. RANSOM and JAMES WALLACE, son of the former Vice President of the United States, HENRY WALLACE.

RANSOM was also observed in the company of the subject at the meetings of the National Farm Institute and was observed to escort the subject to the train when the subject left Des Moines at 11:30PM, on February 16, 1946.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, furnished information to the effect that as of 1942 CHARLES F. RANSOM was employed as an Editorial Writer by the "Des Moines Register and Tribune" and had been so employed since September 6, 1937.

Confidential Informant T-1 has advised that RANSOM has been an officer in the Iowa Civil Liberties Union and apparently has been connected with the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties. (The latter organization has been cited by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835).

Confidential Informant T-1 further reported that RANSOM'S name appeared in a notebook which was taken by the Kansas City Police Department from one ROBERT WOOD, an avowed Communist from Oklahoma City.

According to this same Informant, an editorial appeared in the "Des Moines Tribune" on February 19, 1946 entitled "You Can Hear Anything About Those Russians." This editorial appeared to be highly favorable toward the Soviets, and particularly toward the subject.

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On December 26, 1951 CHARLES F. RANSOM, Editorial Writer, "Des Moines Register and Tribune," Des
Moines, Iowa, was interviewed by an agent of the Omaha
Office and advised as follows concerning his contact with
the subject in February, 1946, during the National Farm
Institute held in Des Moines, Iowa from February 14 to 16,

CHARLES F. RANSOM advised that in February, 1946 he was contacted by JOHN ADAMS, of the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce, who asked him if he would be willing to meet the subject upon his arrival in Des Moines, Iowa, to speak at the National Farm Institute. STEPHAN SHUNDENKO, CHOUNDER Originally been scheduled to speak at the meeting but was unable to come and the subject was to speak in his place. ADAMS advised RANSOM that the subject could not speak much act as an interpreter. RANSOM had been teaching Russian at Drake University.

RANSOM advised that he and JAMES WALLACE, son of the former Vice President of the United States, who is a friend of his, went to the Rock Island Depot in February of 1946 to meet the subject, but were unable to locate him and returned to the Hotel Fort Des Moines, where they contacted him.

RANSOM advised he had no association with the subject at the convention inasmuch as the subject was busy at the speakers! table the majority of the time, nor did he see him make any contacts with people other than those present at the convention.

RANSOM advised that he took the subject to his home after the first night of the convention in company with JOHN ADAMS and JANE ADAMS, who is the daughter of JOHN ADAMS, where they remained for about an hour for remained for about an hour for remained for the hotel Fort Des Moines.

RANSOM further stated that he took the subject

for a drive through the City of Des Moines and pointed out the various places of interest but that the subject at no time appeared sociable or communicative, nor did he ask the whereabouts of or indicate that he knew anyone in Des Moines, Iowa. RANSOM also advised that he was not contacted by anyone who wished to meet the subject.

RANSOM stated that while the subject was here, he believes on the second day of the convention, a group of people were going to the Des Moines Municipal Airport to meet HENRY WALLACE and he asked the subject if he would like to go along also. The subject said he would, so RANSOM took the subject to the airport with him to meet HENRY WALLACE. He advised that he introduced the subject to HENRY WALLACE, who was also met by his son, HENRY, Jr., who was in the Navy at that time, and a photograph was taken of the subject, HENRY WALLACE and himself. He advised that he took the subject to the train when he departed from Des Moines at the end of the convention.

RANSOM stated that other than the above information, he could think of nothing else concerning the details of the subject's visit to Des Moines. He stated, however, that he was of the impression that the subject kept to himself while in Des Moines and did not contact persons other than those at the convention.

It is noted that Confidential Informant T-3 of known reliability, has been in a



LOUIS F. BUDENZ was at one time Managing Editor of the "Daily Worker" in New York City, an East Coast Communist daily newspaper.







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

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IV. INFORMATION REGARDING EMANUEL J. NAIMAN

As previously noted in instant report, Confidential Informant T-3 advised on

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that EMANUEL NAIMAN applied for a Non-Immigrant visa at the United States Consulate, Montreal, Canada, on December 31, 1941, and at that time listed SOLOMON ALBAM, a resident of Crompond, New York and a partner in the Hudson Tea and Spice Company, 201 46th Street, Brooklyn, New York, as one of his sponsors. MAIMAN was born December 10, 1885 in Russia and was of Lithuanian nationality. He had resided in the United States in 1936 and had visited in the United States in 1936 he had lived in the vicinity of

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Russia and Germany and had then resided in France until March, 1939, and as of the date of his application he resided in Canada with his wife and son. It was noted that he had a brother in Russia and an aunt in England.

ing universities, from which he had graduated. He was listed as being the founder of a company known as know Publicite, which handled novelty electric signs, mirrors and advertising novelties.

In his application NAIMAN stated that he desired to make brief business trips to the United States, and noted that he had no political affiliations.

MAURICE M. MENIELSOHN, 24 Wolcott Street, Revere, Massachusetts, a storekeeper with business address care of Congress Store, 2632 Massachusetts Avenue, North Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Informant advised that NAIMAN subsequently filed applications for permission to depart from the United States on April 30, 1942; September 22, 1942 and November 16, 1942.

An additional sponsor was noted to be MOISEI REINE, 300 West 23rd Street, New York City.

It is here noted that the files of the New York Office contain no identifiable information concerning MAURICE M. MENIELSOHN or MOISEI REIME.

In November, 1943 the United States State Department advised that EMANUEL JAKOWIEWITSH NAIMAN was born October 10, 1885 at Smorgen, Russia. He was described as a Lithuanian Jew whose permanent address was 3661 St. Famille, Montreal, Canada, and he was reportedly President of Emao, Inc., 46 Great Jones Street, New York City.

In a visa application NAIMAN stated that from 1909 to 1915 he was Manager of the Putilo Factories in

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Lemingrad, Russia; from 1936 to 1939 he was owner of a publicity concern (Emso Electrical Newspaper) in Paris, France, and from 1939 to 1943 he was President of Emso in Canada. He listed his residences as follows:

1908 to 1924 - Moscow and Petrograd, Russia;
1924 to 1926 - Berlin, Germany;
1926 to 1939 - Paris, France;
March, 1939 to at least November, 1943 - Montreal,
Canada.

He was educated in King's High School, Warsaw, Poland, and received advanced education at the Superior Technical School, Warsaw, Russia, where he received an Engineering Degree.

NAIMAN had traveled on Lithuanian Passport Number 49, issued by the Lithuanian Consulate in France on September 8, 1937, which was valid until June 4, 1944. In October, 1943 he was issued American Non-Immigrant Visa Number 144 by the United States Vice Consul, Montreal, Canada, permitting his entry into the United States for approximately ten days. NAIMAN stated that he desired to visit the United States in order to conduct business for the Canadian Electrical News Company.

The records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, in 1943 reflected that EMMANUEL NAIMANN, File Number 99490/967, was admitted to the United States from Canada at Rouses Point, New York, on April 20, 1939. His Certificate of Admission reflected that he permanently resided in Canada and landed at the Port of New York on March 15, 1939 on the "S.S. ILE IE FRANCE." At the time of his readmission to the United States he stated that he intended to go to the New York and San Francisco World's Fairs in the interests of Esposition Des Brevets Et Des Invention Francais, of which he was a principal Director. The address for this concern was listed as being 92 Champ Elysee, Paris, France.

According to this file, NAIMAN listed his place of birth as being Smorgene, Lithuania. He was traveling on

a Class PP3 (2) Visa, for pleasure and business, Number 882, issued at Montreal, Canada on April 17, 1939. His last permanent residence was listed as being 2044 Metcalf Avenue, Montreal, Canada, where he resided with his wife, SOPHIE, His destination was New York and he furnished the name of the National City Bank, 42nd Street Branch, New York City, under the heading "Relative or friend in U.S." His temporary New York address was listed as being 1295 Madison Avenue, New York City.

On March 1, 1940 NAIMAN put up \$500.00 as a bond for his departure from this country on or before April 20, 1940. The witness to this bond was ROBERT TREVOR, 305 West 98th Street, New York City, who appeared to be an employee of Emso, Inc., 7 Great Jones Street, New York City.

NAIMAN departed from the United States on April 20, 1940 and his bond was cancelled.

It is here noted that the files of the New York Office contain no further information concerning ROBERT TREVO

Concerning Emso, Inc., Confidential Informant T-6
of known reliability, advised in 1943 that Emso, Inc. was
located at 46 Great Jones Street, New York City, and had
formerly been located at 7 Great Jones Street, New York City.

EMANUEL NAIMAN was listed as being President and Treasurer,
and Miss ALME GLUCK was listed as being Secretary of this
company. The company was described as being a manufacturer
of mirrors and electrical specialties.

The company was incorporated under New York Laws in June, 1939, with an authorized paid in capital of \$10,000. It had previously been located at 122 East 42nd Street and 1295 Madison Avenue, New York City.

NAIMAN was described by this Informant as being sixty-three years of age (in 1943), married, and a native of Russia who had spent fifteen years in the business of manufacturing an electric newspaper sign and a patented sharing mirror in Paris, France.

SECKET

Informant noted that ALMA GLUCK was not active in the management of this company and, in fact, had an outside employment as confidential secretary to the legal firm Boudin, Cohn and Glickstein, 20 West 43rd Street, New York City.

The same Informant also noted that NAIMAN held a patent on a novelty mirror known as "Wond-R-Mirror." His bank was listed as the National City Bank, 680 Broadway, New York City.

The files of the New York Office contain no further information concerning ALMA GLUCK. It is noted, however, that Confidential Informant T-7, another Governmental agency which conducts intelligence investigations, has advised that the legal firm of Boudin, Cohn and Glickstein was undoubtedly an important adjunct of the Communist Party.

Confidential Informant T-8, another Governmental agency which conducts intelligence investigations, advised on May 9, 1943 that the firm of Boudin, Cohn and Glickstein was prominent in Communist circles.

In September, 1950 Mr. FRANK J. MARKWALTER, 2h Stone Street, New York City, furnished a copy of a letter sent to him from the Emso Parcel Company (Parcels to Russia), 1823 Lincoln Avenue, Montreal, Canada, Telephone Wellington 5251. This letter was dated June 24, 1950 and in the letter Emso described itself as a company sending parcels to Russia and as having the concession from "Inturist - Moscow to collect the duty here." It was stated that Emso packed ten to twelve parcels in a box and sent them to New York "free zone" for reshipment to Russia. These were described as being gift parcels and not for commercial purposes.

The letter requested of Mr. MARKWALTER quotations on reshipping these parcels and further particulars in the event MARKWALTER was interested in handling such shipments. The signature on this letter was illegible.

It is not definitely known at this time whether

or not the Emso Parcel Company has any connection with the Emso Company, of which EMANUEL NAIMAN was at one time President. It is believed quite possible, however, that these may be one and the same firm.

Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised on December 14, 1943 that LOUIS S. BLOCH, of New York, received a cablegram on July 12, 1943, which read as follows:

Kindly learn Engine Bureau the address NAIMAN EMANUEL JAKOWIEWITSH engineer to inform his brother and wife's evacuation from Bobrouisk to Moscow Nagatinsky Shosse 7/5. Greetings from your niece. SOLA MART NAIMAN

LOUIS BLOCK was interviewed on August 2, 1946 by SAS T. Scott Miller and John F. Gleason and he was asked at that time about the above cablegram. BLOCH stated that the only name he recognized when he received the above cablegram was the name SOLA, as he had a niece named SOLA BLOCH, who resided in Moscow. BLOCH stated that he took this cable to another niece who resided in New York City, namely, Miss LOTTIE TUNICK, and she stated that the only thing she could make out of the cablegram was that BLOCH was being requested to advise an individual named NAIMAN, in this country, that NAIMAN'S relatives in Russia had been evacuated from Moscow. BLOCH stated that Miss TUNICK looked up a name in the telephone directory which was similar to the one in the cablegram and then made telephonic inquiries. As a result of these inquiries Miss TUNICK advised that if it was desired to communicate with the individual mentioned in the cablegram they should write a letter to the address of the individual with whom Miss TUNICK was talking, enclose some stamps together with the letter they wished to be forwarded, and this letter would then be forwarded. BLOCH stated that this procedure was followed and he subsequently received a letter from E. HAIMAN, Montreal, Canada, dated July 19, 1943. At the time of his interview he exhibited this letter to the interviewing Agents.

It is noted that in the course of this same in-

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terview BLOCH told in some detail of a number of contacts he had had with an individual known to him only as BORIS.

BLOCH identified a photograph of MIKHAIL A.

CHALIAPIN as being identical with BORIS. It is noted that

CHALIAPIN was an employee of the Soviet Consulate in New York

City and is known to have been involved in Soviet espionage

activities.

It is also noted that CHALIAPIN introduced himself to BLOCH in early 1943 by stating that he brought greetings from BLOCH'S niece in Russia and at that time gave BLOCH a letter in the handwriting of his niece, SOLA BLOCH.

Confidential Informent T-3 advised on

It is noted that a photograph of EMANUEL J. NAIMAN was exhibited to ELIZABETH BENTLEY, self-confessed former Soviet espionage courier, by SAS Thomas G. Spencer and Joseph M. Kelly in November, 1945, with negative results, and to WHITTAKER CHAMBERS, self-confessed former Soviet espionage courier, in 1949, by SAS Thomas G. Spencer and Francis X. Plant, with negative results.

It is noted that a photograph of NAIMAN, as obtained from the United States State Department, is on file in the New York Office.

The files of the New York Office contain no fure ther information concerning NAIMAN, other than that described above.

According to JENNINGS, DEL SIGNOR stated that LUKE SHAREN accompanied Dr. SHARENKOFF to the boat when SHARENKOFF departed from the U. S. at NYC. 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

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Februay 28, 1952 that she is the daughter of HARRY KAPLAN, now deceased who was President of the H. Kaplan Company, Contractors, located at 2205 West Roosevelt Road. She stated that she was born in the United States, but her father was born in Russia, eventuall coming to the United States in the early 1900s.

According to Mrs. KERNIS, all of her father's brothers and sisters were also born in Russia and all except one brother and sister emigrated from Russia to the United States along with their mother and father.

Mrs. KERNIS stated that her aunt and uncle in Russia corresponded with their relatives in the United States for several years but sometime in either the late 1920s or early 1930s for some reason unknown to her family, correspondence quit coming from her aunt and uncle in Russia. She stated that after the correspondence ceased, her father went to great lengths trying to find out what happened to his brother and sister but with no results.

Mrs. KERNIS stated that for other than the fact that her father might have contacted Russian authorities in the United States for information concerning her aunt and uncle she knew of no other reason why he would have an occasion to contact them, adding that her father was a very busy man, who discussed nothing concerning his business or personal life with his family.

Mrs. KERNIS could recall no relatives with the name any similar name.

A picture of the subject was exhibited to Mrs. KERNIS who advised that she is not acquainted with and has never seen YAKOVLEV.

Mrs. KERNIS advised that the only person in the family that knew anything about her aunt and uncle in Russia was Mrs. EDWAED BORTZ, her aunt, residing at 7825 South Phillips Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. She stated that Mrs. BORTZ worked closely with HARRY KAPLAN attempting to learn the whereabouts of her aunt and uncle.

INTERVIEW WITH MRS. EDWARD BORTZ, 7825 SOUTH PHILLIPS AVENUE, CHICAGO, ILLINOIS

Mrs. EDWARD BORTZ, housewife, 7825 South Phillips Avenue, advised on March 13, 1952 that in February of 1913 she came to the United



States from Russia, her country of birth, following by three years HARRY KAPIAN, her brother, now deceased, who was formerly President of the H. Kaplan Company, Contractors, located at 2205 West Roose, welt Road, Chicago. She advised in August of 1913 another brother and sister followed her to the United States from Russia and in 192 her mother, father, six more brothers and sisters entered this country from Russia, leaving a brother and sister behind.

Mrs. BORTZ stated that her family in the United States had, until 1924, heard from MOTA RAPLUN (phonetic), her brother, and Mrs. HURANKA BALEKE (phonetic), her sister, both of whom remained in Russia, due to personal reasons, and until 1924 her family was sending money as well as regularly corresponding with them but sometime during that year her brother's and sister's correspondence abruptly stopped.

Mrs. BORTZ advised that correspondence from the brother and sister then started again in the early 1930s and both people wrote the family again asking for money, a request her family could not fulfill due to the depression. She stated that her brother and sister did not say why they quit writing in 1924. Mrs. BORTZ advised that a short while after they resumed writing, correspondence again stopped from them and this was the last time that any information of any type was received from her brother or sister. Mrs. BORTZ stated the Russian-Finnish War started and after that World War II broke and all during this time HARRY KAPLAN, her brother, did everything in his power to learn the whereabouts of the brother and sister. She stated that some of the methods he used in attempting to locate them was advertising in Russian language newspapers published in the United States and sent to Russia for consumption, by contacting the people coming to the United States from Russia, by contacting organizations in the United States whose job was to locate people in foreign lands, by contacting the Amalgamated Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago, who, according to Mrs. BORTZ, had contacts in Russia that supplied the bank information concerning people in that country, and by contacting the Red Cross, but none of these leads resulted in locating any information concerning the brother and sister.

Mrs. BORTZ stated that finally in approximately 1945 HARRY KAPIAN,

her brother, called her from his place of business around noon and told her that during the morning while he was away from his office an unknown person telephonically contacted his office from New York and gave his Secretary a New York telephone number for him to call later on in the day. She stated that her brother did not say whether it was a man or woman that called, further relating that her brother was very excited thinking that the call was information concerning their brother and sister. She stated that later on the same day her brother called her back very disappointed telling her that he called the number and no one at the number knew anything about the call to him. She advised that HARRY KAPLAN made no further investigation of this call, adding that he did not even know the New York subscriber to the telephone number.

On March 29, 1952, Lieutenant JENNINGS advised that LOUIS DEL SIGNOR, Maple Tree Inn, Ridgedale Avenue, Florham Park, New Jersey, had informed him that Dr. SHARENKOFF, brother of LUKE SHAREN, was in Madison, New Jersey, in either 1942 or 1943. Mr. DEL SIGNOR had stated that LUKE SHAREN accompanied Dr. SHARENKOFF to the boat when SHARENKOFF departed from the United States at New York City. At that same time, ROBERT LUKE SHAREN, son of LUKE SHAREN, was on leave from the United States Army and, according to rumor, had not accompanied his father and Dr. SHARENKOFF to the boat because he did not desire to be seen in the company of Dr. SHARENKOFF while he was wearing the uniform of the United States Army.

Lieutenant JENNINGS advised that ROBERT LUKE SHAREN was born on March 28, 1915, in Jersey City, New Jersey, and



is presently employed as a letter carrier, working out of the United States Post Office in Madison, New Jersey. ROBERT L. SHAREN also served in the United States Army from December 1, 1950 to November 1, 1951, when he possessed Army Serial #32237571. From the above information, it is apparent that Dr. SHERENKO (Ph.) is identical with Dr. VICTOR NICOLOFF SHARENKOFF.

In May, 1944, Mr. G. W. BERQUIST, Investigator in Charge, New York Public Library, New York City, made available the administrative file of Dr. VICTOR SHARENKOFF, who at that time was employed as a cataloger in the Slavonic Department of the New York Public Library, Fifth Avenue and 42nd Street, New York City. He had been so employed at the library since June 23, 1944. In his application for employment, he stated that he was born on January 7, 1892 at Tserovo, Bulgaria, and he gave his nationality as Bulgarian and his race as Slavonic.

This application reflected that he arrived in the United States on July 10, 1921 and that he had since remained in the United States, except for several trips to Europe. He had studied literature and law at the University of Sofia in Bulgaria and attended Columbia University in New York City from 1921 to 1924, when he received his PHD Degree in Indo-Iranian languages. From 1923 to 1924 he was an instructor in the Slavanic Department of Columbia University. He listed former employment in Bulgaria as being "Editor-in-Chief of Zimbdelsra Pravda", Sofia, Bulgaria, from 1919 to 1921, and as librarian at the American College Library, Samakov, Bulgaria, during 1913 and 1914.

Confidential Informant T-11, of known reliability, had reported that Dr. SHATENKOFF was listed as a delegate to the National Committee meeting of the American-Slav Congress on May 27, 1944, in Cleveland, Ohio.

The American-Slav Congress is an organization which has been declared by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

The United Committee of South Slavic Americans has been cited by the Attorney General as an organization coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

The March 1, 1946 issue of "Narodra Volya" carried an article captioned "Farewell to Dr. V SHARENKOFF", which stated that on January 26th a group of Bulgarians and Macedonians in New York gathered to give a dinner in honor of SHARENKOFF, who was described as President of the Bulgarian-American Club and President of the Bulgarian-American Peoples League of the United States of America. It was further stated that SHARENKOFF was, for many years, a leader and representative of the Bulgarians in New York City and that he was offered the editorship of "Narodna Volya" and was leaving New York for Detroit.

Confidential Informant T-13, of knówn reliability, had advised that the Bulgarian-American Peoples League was an organization dominated by the Communist Party and that it found its expression through the publication "Narodna Volya".

On December 27, 1946, Confidential Informant T-14, of known reliability, advised that Dr. SHARENKOFF was a registered member of the Communist Party District 7, in Detroit, Michigan, during 1947, having possessed 1946 membership card #88104 and possessing 1947 membership card #68913. According to this same informant, SHARENKOFF was listed as a "writer-editor", was assigned to the LaBelle Communist Club, was a member of the Bulgarian-American Peoples League of the United States of America, and had been in the Communist Party for 12 years.

On April 28, 1947; Confidential Informant T-15, of known reliability, supplied a list of nine Bulgarian Communists whom he considered to be the most dangerous and subversive in the State of Michigan. Included in this group was Dr. VICTOR SHARENKOFF.

The 1947 Annual Report of the Bulgarian-American Peoples League, as filed on August 18, 1947 with the Michigan Corporation and Securities Commission, reflected that Dr. VICTOR SHARENKOFF of 337 Pilgrim Street, Detroit, Michigan, was the President and Director.

Confidential Informant T-16, of known reliability, has advised that Dr. SHARENKOFF was elected to be a Vice President of the American-Slav Congress of Michigan to head the Bulgarian Nationality Panel for 1948.

The May 2, 1918 issue of the "Michigan Edition, The Worker" carried an article entitled "Forty Years of May Day Struggle", which purported to be a story of the life of Dr. SHARENKOFF. Among other things, this article noted that Dr. SHARENKOFF had been National President of the BAPEL for the last ten years.

The records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, as checked in March, 1949, reflected that Dr. SHARENKOFF'S name appeared on the outgoing manifest of passengers departing from the United States aboard the SS BATORY from New York City on September 13, 1948.

Confidential Informant T-17, of known reliability, has advised that in 1944, ALEXANDER BELIEFF of 1180 Anderson Avenue, Bronx, New York, was a delegate from the Bulgarian Macedonian Educational Club to a convention of the American-Slav Congress, and in 1945 he was listed as being an officer of the American-Slav Congress. This same informant described BELIEFF is being one of the Bulgarian Communist leaders in the United States.

In July or August, 1950, SA HAROLD V. CATES interviewed LUKE SHAREN, truck driver, Railway Express Company, Third Avenue and East 41st Street, New York City, concerning ALEXANDER BELIEFF. At that time, SHAREN advised that he had met BELIEFF socially over a period of years at various Bulgarian functions in New York. Ie stated that BELIEFF was a member of the Bulgarian-Macedonian Educational Club in New York and that he had heard that BELIEFF was quite active in that group. SHAREN stated that he believed





the club was made up of Communist sympathizers or left-wing element and he considered BELIEFF to be a Communist sympathizer. He noted that he had not had any recent contact with BELIEFF.

At that same time, LUKE SHAREN advised that he was the brother of Dr. VICTOR SHARENKOFF, organizer of the Bulgarian-Macedonian Educational Club in New York and former leader among Bulgarian Communists in New York. He believed that ALEXANDER BELIEFF was associated to some extent with Dr. SHARENKOFF but he did not know the nature of their association. SHAREN stated that he had had limited contact with Dr. SHARENKOFF for a number of years as he did not share his political beliafs and did not care to associate closely with friends of Dr. SHARENKOFF.

On November 21, 1950, ALEXANDER BELIEFF was interviewed at the New York Office by SAS HAROLD V. CATES and ROBERT C. BLOUNT. At that time, he advised that he was President of the Bulgarian-American Club of New York City but that this club had not been active for the past three years. He stated that the club was not known by any other name and that he, himself, was not a member of any other organization.

BELIEFF expressed himself as being in favor of Communism for Bulgaria, explaining that he meant Communism without control by Soviet Russia.

BELIEFF stated that he had been acquainted with Dr. SHARENKOFF for a number of years and he described SHARENKOFF as an "ardent" Communist. He stated he knew SHARENKOFF was a Communist as a result of various conversations with him in the past and by reason of the fact that SHARENKOFF was then employed by the Bulgarian Government as a professor of English at the University of Sofia. He stated that prior to returning to Bulgaria in 1948, SHARENKOFF was a leader among the Bulgarian Communists in New York, as well as a leader among Bulgarian Communist groups throughout the United States.

Confidential Informant T-18, of known reliability, advised on December 19, 1951 that SHARENKOFF was a member of the faculty at the University of Sofia in Bulgaria. This informant also described SHARENKOFF as having been an active member in the Communist element among Bulgarians in New York City.







An extetanding example of the "Legal" rest-dent agent is Anstoli A. Takovlev, who was the experior of Harry Gold during the latter's atomic capionage setivity with Ilaus Fuchs. Takovley and his wife entered the United States on February 4, 1941, 65 San Pedro, California, and on February 8, 1941, he secuned the duties of a clerk at the Seviet Conculate in New York City. From the first part of 1944 through late 1945, Takeview directed Earry Gold's espicage activity and received from him all of the atomic energy information turned over to Gold by Jucke in the United States. On July 26, 1946, coincident with his return from a two nonths' trip to Moscow, Yakovlev was notified to the Department of State as a Vice Consul of the USSR in New York. He departed from the United States for Paris, France, on December 27, 1946. He served so Vice Consul and later as Second Secretary of the Soviet Embessy in Paris until 1948, when he reportedly departed for the Soviet Union. It has been indicated that he may have again been in Paris in 1949, but there has been no confirmation of thise

An indictment charging Yakovlev and Juliue and Ethel Resemberg with conspiracy to commit espionage in violation of Section 34, Title 50, United States Code, was returned by a grand jury in the Southern District of New York on 8-17-30, and an 8-23-50, a bench warrant was issued for Yakovlev. On 1-31-51, a superseding indictment was returned charging Yakovlev, Julius and Ethel Resemberg, Morton Sobell and David Greenglass with the above-described violation. Defendant Greenglass pled quilty on 2-2-51 and on 3-16-51 the Resembergs and Sobell were brought to trial and found guilty.

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





> Attached is one copy of a letter to the Bureau from the Central Intelligence Agency dated October 2, 1952.

No information was located in Bufiles on Milton Buckos or Wiltiades Beckos.

Bufiles reveal that Professor Helen B. Pope, Fort Elfsporg, R. D. No. 3, Salem, New Jersey, wrote a letter to the Bureau dated August 9, 1952, and described herself as a retired teacher. In this letter of August 9, 1952, Professor Pope complained of "whispering" in her house and suggested that "smugglers" may desire the use of her house. (65-97760)

On 10/28/52 HARRY FEIN was interviewed by SAs ROBERT C. BALL and TROY COLEMAN at his place of business to The land Declassify on: BADR FEIN volunteered the following:

He stated he did not know the subject, and in fact failed to recognize the name as one he had ever heard. FEIN advised that he had contacted the Soviet Consulate, 51st Street and 5th Avenue, New York City, in 1944 seeking information concerning FEIN's mother, who was at that time residing in Russia.

FEIN advised that an individual who could have been the subject advised him that he should contact the International Red Cross and the only other contact with the Soviet Consulate was that FEIN received a New Year greeting card in 1945.

FEIN advised that in 1945, after the termination of World War II, he received information from a relative in Russia that FEIN's mother had died during the siege of Stalingrad.

FEIN insisted that he had been anti-Communist during his entire life, considers himself a liberal Democrat, and is willing to cooperate with the FBI in any matter whatsoever.

The report of SA EDGAR C. FOREST, New York, dated 8/27/52, reflects that

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It is noted the report of SA EDWARD J. CAHILL, captioned, "SOLOMON GREENBERG, aka; ESPIONAGE - R," Bufile 65-60803, New York, dated 11/3/52, reflects the following information concerning one ZORA PRESSMAN, aka, Rose Pressman, 315 West 57th Street, New York City, who was born 6/1/25.

Her parents, AARON and ANASTASIA PRESSMAN, were both born in Russia. On 10/11/51 ZORA PRESSMAN advised Bureau Agents that she had been employed by the Soviet Government Purchasing Commission in Washington, D. C., from 7/43 until 9/45. PRESSMAN reportedly denied membership in the Communist Party or that she had ever engaged in any espionage activities on behalf of the Soviet or anyone else so engaged.

She admitted, however, she had participated in May Day parades during the days she was a student.

It is noted that ZORA PRESSMAN was introduced to SOLOMON GREENBERG by CHARLES JASIK. ZORA PRESSMAN may be identical with the daughter of one PRESSMAN, who contacted the subject on 4/1/44.

Referenced letter also authorized the Newark Office to interview LUKE N.*SHAREN, 250 King Road, Madison, N. J. The referenced report of SA EDGAR C. FOREST, on page 29, reflects that LUKE SHAREN, Railway Express Company, 3rd Avenue and East 41st Street, New York City, was interviewed by SAs
