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

The subject has been identified by HARRY GOLD, convicted Soviet espionage courier, as the individual "JOHN" to whom GOLD passed information received from Dr. KLAUS FUCHS.

The records of the US Department of State, Washington, D. Co. reflect that the subject arrived in the US at San Pedro, California, on 2/4/41, listing his destination as the Soviet Consulate in MYC. He assumed his duties as a clerk at the Soviet Consulate in NYC on 2/8/41.

On 7/26/46, the subject advised the Department of Immigration and Naturalization, NYC, that he was then the Assistant Consul General or Vice Consul at the Soviet Consulate, NY.

A physical surveillance conducted on 12/27/46 by SA ROBERT J. WIRTH reflected that the subject and his family

Declarating on: OADO 4118 On 8/17/50 a Federal Grand Jury in the SDNY returned an indictment charging the subject and others with conspiracy to Violate Section 32, Title 50, USC, in that they had conspired to furnish information pertaining to the national defense of the US to a foreign nation; namely, the USSR. On 8/23/50, a bench warrant was issued for the subject by Federal Judge T. HOYT DAVIS of the SDNY. A superseding indictment was returned by a Federal Grand Jury of the SDNY on 1/31/51, charging the subject and others with a conspiracy to commit espionage. The other defendants, with the exception of the subject, were brought to trial on 3/6/51 and were found guilty.



YAKOVLEV, also known as John charging them with a violation of Title 50, Section 34 of the United States Code, in that they had conspired to violate the espionage laws by obtaining information relating to the national defense of the United States.

On August 23, 1950, a bench warrant was ordered by United States Judge T. HOYT DAVIS for the subject's arrest, and this warrant was issued on August 24, 1950. Criminal numbers C133-293 reflected that an indictment was filed on October 10, 1950, charging JULIUS ROSENBERG, ETHEL ROSENBERG, ANATOLI A. YAKOVLEV, also known as "John", DAVIDYGREENGLASS and MORTON SOBELL, with a violation of Title 50, Section 34, United States Code, in that they had conspired to communicate, deliver, and transmit to a foreign government, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republic, documents, writings, etcetera, relating to the national defense of the United States. On the basis of this indictment United States Judge WILLIAM BONDY, ordered a bench warrant for the subject's arrest on October 16, 1950, and this warrant was issued on the same date. Criminal number C 133-245 reflected that a superseding indictment was filed on January 31, 1951 against JULIUS ROSENBERG, ETHEL ROSENBERG, ANATOLI A. YAKOVLEV, also known as "John", DAVID GREENGLASS, and MORTON SOBELL, charging them with a violation of Title 50, Section 34 of the United States Code, in that they had conspired to deliver and transmit to the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, documents, etc., relating to the

national defense of the United States.

On March 6, 1951, defendants JULIUS ROSENBERG, ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL were brought to trial on the basis of the above indictment and on March 29, 1951, these defendants were found to be guilty as charged.

On March 6, 1951, the trial as to the defendant AMATOLI A. YAKOVLEV was severed.

Arrest was ordered by United States Judge JOHN C. KNOX, and this warrant was issued on December 5, 1952.



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In testifying before the Sub-Committee en Immigration and Naturalization of the Committee on the Judiciary, United States Senate, on June 9, 1949, LOUIS F. Stated that "Russky Golos" was a Russian language Communist newspaper. It is further noted that the "Daily Worker" is an east coast Communist newspaper.

A. GEORGE MOLEAN

On September 15, 1952, Mr. KENNETH DR FOREST, 450
Forest Avenue, Rye, New York, advised SA WILLIAM A. FLYNN,
JR., that he has known GEORGE MoLEAN for over 25 years and
that McLEAN at one time ran a hoopala game at a playland
amusement park at Rye, New York. IE FOREST described
McLEAN as an applé polisher and one who is forever attempting
to ingratiate himself with influential people.

During the early 1940's McLEAN worked as a real estate salesman for Mr. DE FOREST's wife in Rye, New York, and in such capacity he occupied an apartment at the address, 450 Forest Avenue.

DE FOREST stated that when he returned from the Navy after World War II, he was advised by one JOE FERRIS

that McLEAN had used a key to one of DE FOREST's bungelows and had rented the bungalow out in the evenings as a brothele TE FOREST said that it was entirely possible that MCLEAN had rented one or more of the bungalows to the subject or to the Russian Nationals, during the 1940's, as the Soviets had been coming up to Rye, New York, for a good many years.

DE FOREST described MoLEAN as being totally unreliable and as being of an unscrupulous character.

HARRY FEIN

FEIN was interviewed on October 28, 1952, at his place of business by SA ROBERT C. BALL and SA TROY COLEMAN of the Newark Office. At that time he stated that he did not know the subject and, in fact, failed to racognize the subject's name as one he had ever heard. He did state that he had contacted the Royle Durate in New York City in 1944 seeking informs a subject and his mother who was at that time residing in Russia. He stated that an individual who could have been the subject advised him that he should contact the International Red Cross. The only other contact with the Soviet Consulate that FEIN could recall was when he received a New Years greeting card in 1945.

In 1945 after the termination of World War II. FEIN stated that he received information from a relative in Russia to the effect that his mother had died during the siege of Stalingrad. FRIN noted that he had come from a wealthy family in Odessa, Russia, was educated in Palestine, and came to the United States in 1921. He attempted to enter the USSR in 1935 for the purpose of visiting relatives but was refused entrance by the Soviet Government because he had departed from Russia during the revolution. He insisted that he had been anti-Communist during his entire life.

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



Referenced letter requested that this office attempt to further identify one IVAN A. BULAGIN possible associate of the subject during 1944. BULAGIN's Address as given, 2525 North High Street, c/o L. C. ROTCHE.

The address 2525 North High Street, Columbus, Ohio is for the American Ceramic Society and this organization has been at the address for a score of years.

MR. CHARLES PEARCE, Executive Secretary of the American Ceramic Society, checked his records and advised that they had never employed an L. C. ROTCHE or IVAN A. BULAGIN. MR. PEARCE advised that the Society has several hundred members, however, and therefore searched membership lists for the above names. He could find no record of ROTCHE or BULAGIN.

MR. PEARCE and SA FRANCIS E. MURPHY then made a check of names phonetically similar to ROTCHE and BULAGIN. No possible phonetic name could be found for BULAGIN. However, it was determined that one L. C. ROCHE, Maryland Glass Company, Baltimore, Maryland, has been a member of the American Ceramic Society for many years but has never resided or worked in Columbus, Ohio. MR. PEARCE could not recall ROCHE ever receiving mail at 2525 North High Street.

The following is the result of an investigation conducted to identify L. C. ROCHE of the Maryland Glass Company, Baltimore, Maryland, who is mentioned in referenced letter.

This investigation, unless otherwise indicated, was conducted by SA CHARLES M. FLEURY.

The indices of the Baltimore Office failed to reveal any references to L. C. ROCHE.

The records of the Credit Bureau of Baltimore, Inc., as checked by SE JAMES R. COCHRAN on 3/5/53, reflected that a report dated 4/17/41 pertaining to LOUIS C. KROCHE. of 301 E. Gittings Ave., reflected that this person had been employed since about 1924 by the Maryland Glass Corporation, Mount Winans, Baltimore City, as Superintendent of the plant. This report stated that ROCHE was married to RUTHEROCHE; that he was about 44-45 years of age, and that he had lived at 301 E. Gittings Ave. since about 1924, sharing the property with his wife and four children.

It stated that he was a Chemist by profession and had been formerly employed by the Emerson Drug Co. of Baltimore. The report stated that he was well regarded by those who had been consulted and contained no derogatory information.

The records of the Supervisor of Elections of Baltimore City, Gay and Fayette Streets, Baltimore, reveal that LOUIS C. ROCHE, 301 E. Gittings Ave., registered on 11/22/39, indicating that he was 43 years of age, a factory manager, native born, and that he had lived in the State for 43 years. His Party affiliation was shown INDEXED-37

as one of the two major political parties. He registered in the following years and at no time changed his political preference:

A call was made on 3/10/53 to the above telephone number under suitable pretext, and a woman who identified herself as Mrs. ROCHE advised that LOUIS C. ROCHE resided at 301 E. Gittings Ave. and that he was employed by the Maryland Glass Corp.

A call was made to the Maryland Glass Corp. under suitable pretext on 3/18/53, and a man, one Mr. CLEVENGER, who identified himself as the Assistant Plant Manager of the Maryland Glass Corp., 2147 Wicomico Street, Baltimore, advised that LOUIS C. ROCHE, who is the plant manager, has been employed by the Maryland Glass Corp. for approximately 30 years,

and that he was formerly employed by the Emerson Drug Co. Mr. CLEVENGER stated that $M_{\rm T}$. ROCHE presently resides at 301 E. Gittings Ave. where he has lived for a number of years and that to the best of his knowledge, ROCHE was born and raised in Maryland, and that he has never resided outside of the State.

The Identification Record of the Baltimore City Police Department as checked by SE JAMES R. COCHRAN, failed to reveal a criminal record for LOUIS C. ROCHE.

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

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




In this connection it is noted that NATHAN CARL, 43-10 10th Street, Long Island City, New York, was interviewed on February 5, 1951 by SAS LEO H. FRUTKIN and JAMES P. LEE. He advised that he owned the Carl Pipe Bending Company located at the above-noted address and that his father LOUIS CARL operated the Carl Company, 103 20th Street, Brooklyn, New York,

LOUIS CARL was separately interviewed on the same date by the same Special Agents. Both NATHAN and LOUIS CARL were unable to identify a photograph of the subject. Both men recalled the sale of a pipe bending machine to the Soviet Government Purchasing Commission through the Lend Lease authority. This sale was made on April 2, 1947 for \$12,600. LOUIS CARL recalled that a representative of the Soviet government visited his shop, but he was unable to recall the subject or any other Russian who came to the shop.







In March, 1952 Lieutenant MARTIN JENNINGS (NA), Madison, New Jersey, Police Department, furnished information reflecting that LUKE N SHAREN resided at 250 Kings Road, Madison, New Jersey, and had resided there for approximately 19 years.

On March 29, 1952 Lieutenant JENNINGS advised that Dr. SHARENKOFF, brother of LUKE SHAREN, was in Madison, New Jersey in either 1942 or 1943.

On April 28, 1947 Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, supplied a list of nine Bulgarian Communists whom he considered to be the most dangerous and subversive to the State of Michigan. Included in this group was Dr. VICTOR SHARENKOFF. NY NI FIA BULGAVIA

The May 2, 1948 issue of the Michigan edition of "The Worker" carried an article entitled, "Forty Years of May Day Struggle" which purported to be a story of the life of Dr. SHARENKOFF. Among other things part of this article noted that Dr. SHARENKOFF had been National President of the Bulgarian-American People's League for the last ten years.

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, has advised that the Bulgarian-American People's League was an organization dominated by the Communist Party.

The records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, as checked in March, 1949 reflected that Dr. SHARENKOFF's name appeared on the outgoing manifest of passengers departing from the United States aboard the MS BATORY from New York City on September 13, 1948.

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On March 27, 1953 LUKE SHAREN was interviewed by the writer while at his work as a driver for the American Railway Express Company in New York City. Mr. SHAREN stated that in 1943 his brother, Dr. VICTOR SHARENKOFF was hospitalized in the Brooklyn Hospital because of ulcers. After he was discharged from the hospital he went to Florida for a short while, but did not go to LUKE SHAREN'S home at 250 Kings Road, Madison, New Jersey.

Mr. SHAREN pointed out that his brother never stayed at his home for any length of time because he and his brother disagreed so strongly as to their politics. He stated that he had only met two or three of his brother's acquaintances and never knew them by name. He was unable to recognize the name of YAKOVLEV and was unable to identify a photograph of the subject. Mr. SHAREN stated that he last heard from his brother last summer, at which time Dr. SHARENKOFF was a professor of English in the University of Bulgaria. He noted that his brother was in poor health and was blind in one eye. Mr. SHAREN was unable to explain the fact that his brother had used his address as he had never stayed at his home and had never used it as a mailing address, to his knowledge.

Mr. PEARCE advised that the Society has several hundred members, however, and therefore searched membership lists for the above names. He could find no record of ROTCHE or BULAGIN.

Mr. PEARCE and SA FRANCIS E. MURPHY then made a check of names phonetically similar to ROTCHE and BULAGIN. No possible phonetic name could be found for BULAGIN. However, it was determined that one L. C. ROCHE, Maryland Glass Company, Baltimore, Maryland, has been a member of the American Ceramic Society for many years but has never



resided or worked in Columbus, Ohio. Mr. PEARCE could not recall ROCHE ever receiving mail at 2525 North High Street,

Telephone and City Directories for the period 1942-1946 were checked in Columbus, Ohio and no persons identifiable with ROTCHE, ROCHE or BULAGIN could be found. No credit records could be found at the Ohio Bureau of Credits and no criminal record found at the Columbus, Ohio Police Department.

The Baltimore Office advised that the indices of that office failed to reflect any information concerning L. C. ROCHE. The Credit Bureau of Baltimore, Inc., as checked by SE JAMES R. COCHRAN on March 5, 1953, reflected that a report dated April 17, 1941 pertaining to LOUIS C. ROCHE, of 301 East Gittings Avenue, reflected that this person had been employed since about 1924 by the Maryland Glass Corporation, Mount Winans, Baltimore City, as Superintendent of the plant. This report stated that ROCHE was married to RUTH ROCHE; that he was about 44-45 years of age, and that he had lived at 301 East Gitting Avenue since about 1924, Marsharing the property with his wife and four children.

It stated that he was a chemist by profession and had been formerly employed by the Emerson Drug Company of Baltimore. The report stated that he was well regarded by those who had been consulted and contained no derogatory information.

The records of the Supervisor of Elections of Baltimore City, Gay and Fayette Streets, Baltimore, as checked by SA CHARLES M. FLEURY, reveal that LOUIS C. ROCHE, 301 East Gittings Avenue, registered on November 22, 1939, indicating that he was 43 years of age, a factory manager, native born, and that he had lived in the State for 43 years. His Party affiliation was shown as one of the two major political parties. He registered in the following years and at no time changed his political preference: 1940; 1942-1944; 1946-1948; 1950-1951.

It is to be noted that RUTH ROCHE and LOUIS C. ROCHE, JR., also 301 East Gittings Avenue, were registered to vote and that their political preference was shown as one of the two major political parties.

The records of the Department of Motor Vehicles, State of Maryland, Baltimore, as checked by SE JAMES R.

NY 100-81002 -

COCHRAN, reveal that LOUIS C. ROCHE, 30 Distings Avenue, Baltimore, was issued operator's license No. 88241 on September 3, 1937. He was described as follows:

Race White Sex Male Height 6: 2" Weight 215 lbs. Born 1896

It is noted that the place of birth is not shown in these records.

The current telephone directory for Baltimore reflects that LOUIS C. ROCHE, 301 East Gittings Avenue, is a subscriber of number ID 8463.

Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised on March 10, 1953 that LOUIS C. ROCHE resided at 301 East Gittings Avenue, Baltimore, Maryland and was employed by the Maryland Glass Corporation.

Confidential Informant T-10, of known reliability, advised on March 18, 1953 that LOUIS C. ROCHE was the plant manager of the Maryland Glass Corporation, 2117 Wicomico Street Baltimore, Maryland and had been employed by that corporation for approximately thirty years. This informant further advised that ROCHE had formerly been employed by the Emerson Drug Company, and to the best of the informant's knowledge, ROCHE was born and raised in Maryland.

The Identification Division of the Baltimore City Police Department, as checked by SA JAMES R. COCHRAN, failed to reveal a criminal record for LOUIS C. ROCHE.

Confidential Informants T-11, T-2, T-13, T-14, T-15, T-16, T-17, and T-18, all of known reliability and all of whom have knowledge of Communist activity in the Baltimore, Maryland area, were contacted in March, 1953 concerning LOUIS C. ROCHE with negative results.

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On January 26, 1945 Mr. J. CLARK SUTHERLAND, geologist, Pacific Clay Products Company, 306 West Avenue 26, Los Angeles, California, advised SA ELMER F. LINBERG that IVAN ANISIMOVICH BULAVIN had been traveling around the United States inspecting clay kilns and other ceramic machinery to be purchased by the Soviet Government.

III MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION

Mrs. GLENNAMC BROOMWALKER, 14 East 90th Street.

New York City, advised SA WILLIAM D. WRIGHT, III in July,
1952 that she taught English at the Amtorg Technicum from a
January, 1944 to August, 1948. She advised she knew the
subject slightly and knew the subject's wife somewhat better.
She noted that she taught Mrs. YAKOVLEV and that her English
was not very good and inferior to the average Columbian
student among the Soviets. She first taught Mrs. YAKOVLEV
about 1947 and taught her for a year an a half, although she

for a longer period. She noted that the subject and his wife


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

Mr. CHARLES PEARCE, Executive Secretary of the American Ceremic Society, 2525 North High Street, Columbus, Ohio, once again checked his records concerning personnel and also concerning the membership of the society and failed to find any reference to the name of BULAVIN.

The records of the enrollment of students and instructors at Ohic State University for the period 1942 to 1950 were checked with the assistance of Miss BONNIE WOODBURY, Registrar's Office, and no name even phonetically similar to BULAVIN could be located.

Confidential Informants were both contacted on 4-2-53 and advised SA FRANCIS E. MURPHY orally that they had no knowledge of any person by the name of BULAVIN or BULAGIN.

A check of the Ohio Bureau of Credits, 83 South 4th Street, and the Ohio Retail Credit Company, 8 E. Broad Street, failed to reveal any information under the name of either BULAVIN or BULAGIN.

A check of the records of the Columbus Police Department and the Franklin County Sheriff's Office failed failed to reveal any arrest record concerning any individual with names phonetically similar to BULAVIN or BULAGIN.

Referenced letter requested Boston to identify individuals known as ARABIAN and PAPAZIAN.

The files of the Boston Office disclosed that the aftermentioned person known as ARABIAN is identical with GREGORY J. ARABIAN, 394 Mt. Auburn Street, Watertown, Mass. ARABIAN is the subject of Boston file 100-15496.

Boston files disclose that CRECORY J. ARABIAN was reported to be a member of the Communist Political Association and would be in contact with local CPA officials during 1944. ARABIAN is a member of the Metropolitan Boston Branch of the Armenian Progressive League of America, which organization has been cited by the Attorney General as within the purview of Executive Order 9835. ARABIAN was also a member of the International Workers Order in the Greater Boston area.

ARABIAN was born September 2, 1902 in Turkey and entered the United States in 1921.

According to who is of known reliability and familiar with phases of Armenian activities in the Greater Boston 6 20 area, stated that GREGORY J. ARABIAN continues to be considered as one of the principal members of the Metropolitan Boston Branch of the Armenian Progressive League of America.

The individual referred to as PAPAZIAN in the referenced letter is identical with ARIS APAZIAN, 16 Walcott Road, Watertown, Mass.

stated that ARIS PAPAZIAN is known to him as one of 670 the leaders of the Metropolitan Boston Branch of the Armenian Progressive League of America.

RECORDED - 67 According to the aforementioned informant, ARABHAN and PAPAZIAN are considered by many of the individuals in the Armellian population group as being strongly in favor of the governments of Soviet Armenia and the USSR.

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Referenced letter requested that consideration be given to interviewing ARABIAN and PAPAZIAN, upon identification of these individuals by the Boston Office, concerning any contacts that they may have with subject either before or after visiting the Soviet Union.

On the basis of the above furnished information obtained from and material contained in the files of the Boston Office on ARABIAN and PAPAZIAN, the Boston Office will not interview ARABIAN or PAPAZIAN, unless advised to the contrary by the Bureau.

Mrs. EMILY McCONNELL, Personnel Secretary, National Research Corporation, 70 Memorial Drive, Cambridge, Mass., stated that GIIBERT R. W. BOYER was formerly Personnel Manager of the National Research Corporation. According to Mrs. McCONNELL, BOYER resigned from the National Research Corporation during February, 1946.

Mr. ROBERT A. STAUFFER, Vice-President and Director of Research, National Research Corporation, Cambridge, Mass., stated that he recalled the request by this corporation in 1945 for visas to allow several of the engineers of the National Research Corporation to travel to the Soviet Union for the purpose of setting up equipment that was being sent to the Soviet Union by the National Research Corporation under the Lend Lease Program.

Mr. STAUEFER stated neither the Russian Consulate at New York City nor the Soviet Embassy in Washington, D. C. granted any visas in 1945 to the National Research Corporation to sent its engineers to Russia.

Mr. JOHN HARDING DURANT, Business Manager of the Research Department, National Research Corporation, Cambridge, Mass., stated that no one from the National Research Corporation went to Russia in 1945. Mr. DURANT stated that if the Russian authorities in this country had granted the visas requested for the National Research Corporation, he would have been one of the engineers who would have gone to Russia at that time.

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
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
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

He further advised that he had continued his studies at the Brooklyn Institute in New York and was studying the Russian Isnguage at the American-


The American-Russian Institute has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

He explained his visit to the Soviet Consulate on May 5, 1943 as a response to an application made by him and he was referred to Mr. YAKOVIEV. He stated that he was advised by YAKOVIEV that it would take approximately nine months to clear his application with the Soviet Union. He stated that he had no intention at the time of the interview of going to the Soviet Union since he had been given a more responsible position by the Hazeltine Corporation. He did consider going to the Soviet Union following the war since he felt that warm.

SHEPPARD added that he had been contacted by YAKOVLEV on at least five for six occasions following his original contact of May 5, 1943, each time at the initiative of YAKOVLEV.







On January 4, 1945 T-3, of known reliability, advised that the subject visited the law offices of PAUL LAKERN and his associate located on the 32nd Floor of 10 East 40th Street, New York City.

ICCR resented this and was quite outspoken about it in conversation with Soviet officials. YAKOVIEV was instructed by the Soviet Embassy in Washington to bring these two organizations together and impress upon them the importance of their work.

YAKOVIEV spoke at the above-mentioned meeting and explained that the executive committees of both organizations were of great importance for the cause of unity among the Jewish people and that both organizations were doing great work in the field of moral and material aid to the Soviet Union and that the Soviet Government appreciated very much their work. According to JANOWSKY, YAKOVIEV stated that "we" (the Soviet officials) consider the work of Ambijan and the ICOR very important, each organization in its own field, the work of ICOR among the Jewish masses - workers and the poor middle class and the work of the Ambijan among the richer middle class and the rich Jews.

In order to expeditiously identify the various contacts of the subject, the Bureau is requested to allow such identification to be made without properly documenting each organization and individual unless such documentation is readily available. This procedure would be time saving and eliminate unnecessary effect

and some are of little significance.

In a number of cases only the last name of an individual is given and in order to properly reach a conclusion as to this individual's identity, it will be necessary to set forth certain speculations. is being made now because immediate future reports will contain identifications of the many contacts of the subject.

LAN ADOMIAN


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Regarding ADOMIAN, the records of Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, reflect that JOHN JACOB WEINROTH, also known as: JACOB WEINROTH and LAN ADOMIAN, was naturalized on March 26, 1940 in the United States Court in the Eastern District of New York. He was born in Mogilev, Russia on April 29, 1905 and entered the United States from Germany on November 1, 1923. He left the United States as a stowaway in February, 1938 to join the Spanish Army in Spain and reentered the United States at New York City on December 30, 1938.

LAN ADOMIAN was interviewed on September 29, 1950 by SAS JAMES P. LEE and RAYMOND P. WIRTH. At that time he admitted knowing the subject and the fact that he was vice Consul of the Soviet Consulate in New York City. He claimed he first met YAKOVLEV in 1944 or 1945 when he went to the Consulate to obtain a visa to visit Russia. He claimed he desired to visit Russia in order to observe and partake of the sultural life. ADOMIAN also claimed he only recontacted the subject on about five or six occasions but never obtained the visa he was looking for.

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He also mentioned that he had no contact with the subject after he left the United States nor did ADOMIAN ever have any correspondence with him. ADOMIAN also claimed that YAKOVIEV never requested him to perform any activities for him.


ADOMIAN stated he came to the United States at the age of eighteen and was a naturalized American citizen. He fought with the Abraham Lincoln Brigade in Spain in 1938 but would not admit that he had membership in the Veterans of the Abreham Lincoln Brigade. When he returned from Spain for a short period he acted as an interpreter and translator at the Amtorg Trading Corporation, an official Soviet agency. At the time of the interview ADOMIAN gave his true name as JOHN JACOB WEINROTH.


It is noted that the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade has been cited by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Since 1940 ADOMIAN has been engaged in the field of composing and arranging music on a free lance basis.

On November 30, 1953 Mr. TAGE HOGHIND, superintendent at the former residence of ADOMIAN's at 41 West 72nd Street, advised that ADOMIAN's currest residence was Hamborgo #29, Mexico 6, D.F. Mexico.

VLADIMIR DROZDOV





The records of Immigration and Natural Zation Service, New York City, reflected that VLADIMIR DROZDOV entered the United States at New York City on October 2, 1923. He was born on May 25, 1882 at Taratov, Russia and naturalized in New York City on November 18, 1929. His wife's name was ANNA and he had two children, MUL and NATALIE.

T-3, of known reliability, described DROZDOV as a

former official in the Czarist Imperial Court. He graduated with honors from Imperial Conservatory of Music in St. Petersburg, Russia. According to the informant, DROZDOV was not too prominent in White Russian circles in New York but known as a teacher of music. His son and daughter were



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also musically inclined. The informant stated that DROZDOV was apparently anti-Soviet but was reported to be a very heavy drinker.

VLADIMIR DROZDOV was interviewed on February 3, 1953 by SAS DWIGHT M. WELLS and FRANK J. REILLY at his residence at 203 West 81st Street, New York City. DROZDOV stressed the point that the main interest in his life was his music and that his relations with the representatives of the Soviet Government were based on a mutual interest in the arts and resulted in his attempts to enhance his own career in the music world. He admitted knowing and socializing with PAVEL P. MIKHAILOV, head of the Soviet Consulate in New York City in 1945, but claimed only a passing acquaintance with YAKOVLEV. He admitted he had written new music for the Soviet national anthem which he reportedly had given to the subject. He described this as having no political significance. He expressed a strong friendship for LEONID FEDOTOV, Secretary of the Soviet Consulate in 1945. He also admitted meeting both ANDREI GROMYKO and ANDREI VISHINSKY, former and present head of the Soviet Delegation to the United Nations, at official Soviet social functions. DROZDOV claimed he had never been requested by the Soviets to aid them in any manner or perform any actinimical to the interests of the United States. He further claimed to be a loyal American and had no use for Communism.

TIMOFEL REMIZOV NY. OREGON.

The registration statement of the TASS News Agency, the official Soviet news agency in the United States, filed with the Attorney General on June 3, 1947 regarding their organization and personnel, stated the following regarding

Among the list of entertainers to perform at this concert was the name EFIN VITIS.

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Regarding Metropolitan BENJAMIN, T-2, of unknown reliability, a priest who was attached to the Patriarchal Russian Orthodox Church at 15 Bast 97th Street, New York City in 1945, advised that the Russian Orthodox Church in the United States was formerly declared autonomous in 1924 and separated from Moscow. It grew to include some 350 parishes pledged to Metropolitan THEOPHILUS Of San Francisco who headed the church in 1945. In the year 1945 only seven parishes pledged allegiance to Metropolitan BENJAMIN JOHN FEDCHENKOFF who headed the Patriarchal Russian Orthodox Church in America.

In 1933 Metropolitan SENJAMIN entered the United States claiming appointment by the Moscow Patriarch as Metropolitan of Morth American and the Aleutian Islands. He campaigned to bring the autonomous Russian Orthodox Church in the United States into the fold of the mother church in Russia. The autonomous church group refused to accept the proposals of the Patriarchal Church because of the alleged demands of Metropolitan BENJAMIN that the church leaders given a loyalty pleage to the Soviet Government and not criticize it.

In 1945 the Sobar (Convention) of the Patriarchal Church was held in Moscow. It was decided that the autonomous church in the United States should combine with the churches of Metropolitan BENJAMIN to elect a new Metropolitan as "Patriarchal Exarch of all American and Canada". The autonomous faction rejected this proposal completely.

T-3, of known reliability, advised in 1948 that Metropolitan RENJAMIN was traveling to Riga, Latvia and was succeeded by Archbishop MAKARY at the St. Nicholas Cathedral, 15 East 97th Street, New York City.

MOSES ISAAC FIRKELSTEIN, with alies Moses Isaac Finley

T-1, previously mentioned, advised that

According to T-1, on



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9-4, of known reliability, advised that the following background information is known regarding MOSES ISAAC FINKELSTEIN. In 1943 he resided at 10 West 93rd Street, New York City. He was employed in 1941 by the American Committee for Democracy and Intellectual Freedom, Incorporated, 19 West 121st Street. In 1942 he was employed by the Jewish Council for Russian War Relief, Incorporated, 11 East 35th Street, New York City. He was the Executive Secretary of this organization. FINKELSTEIN's wife's name was given as MARY FREDA MOSCOWITZ.

In October 1946 the New York Supreme Court granted FINKEISTEIN
permission to change his name legally to MOSES ISAAC FINLEY.

The American Committee for Democracy and Intellectual Freedom was cited as a Communist front which defended Communist teachers by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, Report dated June 25, 1942.

On August 16, 1951 WILLIAM MARTIN CANNING testified before a public session of the MC CARRAN Committee and identified MOSES TINKELSTEIN as having been a member of the Communist Party unit at Columbia University and also that he, CANNING, had attended meetings of a Communist Study Group which met at FINKELSTEIN's home.

In September, 1945 a pamphlet announcing the opening of the New School of Jewish Studies, 13 Astor Place, New York City included the name of MOSES FINKELSTEIN on the list of "sponsors and educators".

The School of Jewish Studies has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The Appendix - Part IX of the 1944 Report of the Special House Committee on Un-American Activities, page 932 lists MOSES I FINKELSTEIN as a member of the School for Democracy as of January, 1942.

The School for Democracy was cited by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, Report dated March 29, 1944, pages 89 and 168 as follows:

was known as the School for Democracy (now merged with the Workers School into the Jefferson School of Social Science." The above "was established by Communist teachers ousted from the public school system of New York City."

T-5, of known reliability, provided the information that FINKELSTEIN from September 1, 1946 to March 28, 1947 was employed as a Membership Director of the American Russian Institute for Cultural Relations with the Soviet Union, Incorporated, 58 Park Avenue, New York City.

The American Russian Institute has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Newark Evening News", a home evening newspaper published in Newark, New Jersey in its issue of January 2, 1953 stated that FINKELSTEIN was dismissed as Assistant Professor of History at Rutgers University for failure to meet an ultimatum that he express willingness to answer a sub-committee regarding his possible Communist affiliations.

Dr. JACOB MAN GERSHBERG

T-1 provided the information that the subject

The records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service reflect that Dr. JACOB MAX GERSHRERG, 48 West 83rd Street, New York City filed a petition for naturalization in the Southern District of New York on August 12, 1929. His date of birth was given as September 17, 1879 at Britchani, Rumania. His last foreign residence was given as Madrid, Spain and he emigrated to the United States from Valencia, Spain. He entry for permanent residence was made at New York on August 27, 1924. GERSHBERG was naturalized in the Southern District of New York on April 13, 1930, Certificate Number 3227801.

On September 9, 1946 Dr. JACOB MAX GERSHEERS, 125 Riverside Drive, New York City appeared at the Los Angeles Office and stated that he was in Los Angeles on a vacation and had visited a Dr. MAXIMILLIAM OBERMAYER, 2007 West Wilshire Boulevard on September 6, 1946. He attempted to get OBERMAYER to join his medical association which he claimed had for its purpose better



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
relationships between South American and United States doctors. GERSHEERG had identified himself by exhibiting his American Medical Association membership card numbered 55669 and his naturalization certificate numbered 3227801, issued April 14, 1930 at New York City. GERSHEERG claimed that OHERMAYER was very hostile and called him a fake and impostor. Apparently the purpose of GERSHEERG's complaint was to secure printing of a letter written by him threatening OHERMAYER with a law suit.

On September 21, 1946 the San Antonio Police Department, San Antonio, Texas, provided the information that Dr. JACOB MAX GERSHEERG, 125 Riverside Drive, New York City, had been arrested in connection with soliciting contributions from local physicians for the International Spanish Speaking Association of Physicians, 125 Riverside Drive, New York City. At the time of his arrest he claimed to have been born in Bessarabia and was an American citizen. He was released at that time due to lack of evidence of fraud in connection with his solicitations.

GRACE KOPPEL

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T-7, of known reliability, on October 28, 1943 advised that CRACE KOPPEL, 16 East 98th Street, New York City was a member of the Communist Party and transferred her membership in the Kew-Forest-Rego Branch in Queens to Section 16, Manhattan Communist Party effective October 15, 1943.

According to T-8, of known reliability, on Hovember 13, 1943
KOPPEL resided at 16 Bast 98th Street, telephone number AT 9-2876. She was employed by Russian War Relief at 11 East 35th Street, New York City and was a member of the United Office and Professional Workers of America and of the American Newspaper Guild. Her maiden name was GRACE LEVIN. Her husband, ALAN, was a member of the American Communications Association and had papers indicating he was a radio operator.

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T-9, of known reliability, on January 9, 1947 stated that GRACE KOPPEL in 1945 and 1946 was a member of the Herman Bottscher Club of the Communist Party, 350 East 81st Street, New York City was she was active in Russian War Relief.

LYDIA WIKIFOROFE

T-1 stated that this individual

number was listed to York City.

In 1944 Mr. MARTIN GOOLWING, 303 East 83rd Street, who was superintendent at 1201 Lexington Avenue for twelve years until September, 1943, advised SA WARREN R. HEARN that Mrs. LYDIA MIKEFOROFF resided there for over three years. At that time she was unemployed and separated from her husband who lived in Mexico. She had two daughters, one married to a B. ASHEUKOFF and resided in Mexico. The other daughter, NINA, he though was a teacher of Russian in some college in Connecticut.

The records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York
City reflected that NIKIFOROFF filed a petition for naturalization on March
23, 1929. She was born in Petrograd, Russia on March 8, 1886. Her husband
BASIL NIKIFOROFF was born on August 30, 1888 in Russia. She was granted March
Citizenship in the United States District Court, Southern District of New
York on July 5, 1928. She had two daughters, NINA and TANIA, both born in
Russia. At the time of obtaining her citizenship, her daughters were alleged
to be attending Cornell University. According to the Immigration and Naturalization Service records NINA NIKIFOROFF applied for derivative citizenship in
April, 1940.

The 1945 letterhead of the Russian American Club reflected that it

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The 1945 letterhead of the Russian American Club reflected that I was then located at 340 West 72nd Street, New York City. Listed among the executive committee was Mrs. L. 8 MIKIFOROFF.

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ALEXANDER POSTIATIN

T-1 provided the information that on

This individual is identical to Prince ALEXANDER POUTLATIN.

Immigration and Naturalization Service files reflect that he was born May 30, 1897 at St. Petersburg, Russia and arrived in the United States at New York on February 10, 1941. He filed petition for naturalization on May 27, 1948 and was naturalized in the Southern District of New York on November 19, 1951. His residence as of May 27, 1948 was 251 East 31st Street, New York City. He was married and his wife's name was MARIE, also born in Russia on February 21, 1901 and they have two children.

It was reported by Tolon

T-10, of known reliability, advised on October 15, 1947 that POUTIATIN was Chairman of the Russian Committee for Stalingrad. On March 13, 1947 this same informant advised that POUTIATIN was a member of the National Committee of the American Biro-Bidjan.

The Russian Committee for Stalingrad was under sponsorship of the American Biro-Bidjan Committee which organization was cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives Report dated March 29, 1944.

On October 31, 1942 ALEXANDER POUTIATIN with eleven others filed articles of incorporation with the Clerk of New York County for the incorporation of the Russian American Club for Victory. The purpose of this club was "to raise moneys particularly for Russian War Relief, Allied War Relief, Red Cross, USO and similar organizations". The funds obtained were to be obtained through proceeds of social functions. This club was located at 201 West 72nd Street, New York City.





T-11, of known reliability, on January 21, 1945 advised that POUTIATIN was President of the Russian American Club for Victory, known as the Club Pobeds. This informant knew of no Communist activities on the part of the club.

mikolal P. RYBAKOFF, editor of the anti-Communist Russian language newspaper "Rossiya" in New York City in 1948 described POUTIATIN was a "tool of the Soviet Government". He constantly followed the Soviet line in his church and organizational activities and in his articles written in the "Russky Golos", a Communist Russian language newspaper in New York City.

RYBAKOFF stated POUTIATIN was very active in the Patriarchal Russian Orthodox Church which is under the administration of the Patriarch of Moscow.

T-12, of known reliability, in 1949 advised that he knew POUTIATIN to be active in promoting that faction of the Russian Orthodox Church which favored the establishment of the spiritual and administrative jurisdiction of the Patriarch of Moscow. He knew POUTIATIN was formerly active in the Club Pobeda which was considered to be pro-Soviet and actively engaged in pro-Soviet propaganda. The informant believed that the pro-Soviet activities that POUTIATIN engaged in were caused mostly by religious seal.

FERDINANDA MESSEHOEFT REED

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The magazine "Time" dated August 12, 1940 contained the information that FERDINANDA WESSEHOEFT REED became co-owner of the Freedom of the Press Publishing Company, the publishers of the Daily Worker and the Bunday edition, "The Worker", east coast Communist Party newspapers. This article described REED as age 69 and the wife of WILLIAM REED, a former MASSET and Cambridge schoolmaster. She is the granddaughter of Dr. ROBERT WESSENGEFT who came to the United States from Germany in 1840.

In June, 1943 Reverend WILLIAM REED was interviewed and advised that he had separated from his wife because of paltical disagreements. He stated she was a strong Communist, is operating a book store in San Diego, California and spends her summers in Sandwich, Massachusetts. They had three children. MARY CORNED REED is in Russis and employed by the Soviet Press in Leningrad. She was formerly married to GEORGE H. COPELAND and divorced. There is one other daughter, NANCY REED and a son WILRED REED, ER. who was a United States Marine Corps Captain and killed in Java in 1942.

Also in June, 1943 Dr. CONRAD WESSEHORFT, 315 Marboro Street, Boston, Massachusetts was interviewed and advised that he was a brother of FERDINANDA REED, He stated she was about 73 years of age and was at that time operating the International Book Shop in San Diego, California. He described her as a great Communist anthusiast.

A statement of ownership and management published in the "Deily Worker" on October 2, 1951 listed among the owners of the Freedom of the Press Company, Incorporated, FERDINANDA W REED, 405 West De La Guerra, Santa Barbara, California. MAN

Dr. LAWRENCE B. SLOBODY

Tal advised that the subject on

STATE

Dr. BIOBODY is identical to Dr. IAMRENCE B. SIOBODY. Dr. BIOBODY was interviewed on January 19, 20 and 25, 1954 by SA ARTHUR E. REURAUER. He is currently residing at 875 West End Avenue, New York City with an office at One East 105th Street, New York City where he is attached to the staff of the Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospital as a Pediatrician.

The 1950 "American Medical Directory" reflects that Br. SLOBODY was born in 1910. He graduated in 1936 from the New York Medical College, Plower and Pifth Avenue Hospital, New York City. He was licensed in 1938 and is a Pediatrics specialist. He resided as of 1950 at 875 West Rnd Avenue and his office at that time was at 239 Central Park West.

During the course of the interview Dr. SLOBODY advised that he was a Pedistrician for children of Russians connected with the New York Russian Consulate from approximately 1941 to 1945. He advised that he had no records of any of his treatments during that period and therefore could not be more specific about the dates. He advised that he spoke only a few words of Russian and never had social or political contacts with any of the Russians. Most of his contacts with them were at three places, that is in addition to visits to various homes throughout the city. He mentioned the apartments above the Consulate at 7 East 61st Street, a Soviet private school at 6 East 87th Street and the living quarters above it and the building at 109th Street and Columbus or Amsterdam Avenue where numerous Russian lived.

After the war, about 1945, the Russians stopped coming to him for treatment of their children. He was never informed why. During the war he received cards and occasional gifts such as a fountain pen at Christmastime but this also ended about 1945 at which time he was apparently ruled out as their pediatrician. He stated this this way have been because of changing conditions when the war ended or possibly because he was no longer too interested in getting their business.

During the course of the interviews SLOBODY identified photographs of the subject and his wife, ANASTASIA YAKOVLEV but he could not recall YAKOVLEV's first name. Throughout the furnish of the following information Dr. SLOBODY gave no indication that he was aware of the importance of YAKOVLEV in the Russian espionage apparatus as had been disclosed in the newspapers.

Russians he met possibly due to their importance and the authority they appeared to represent and possibly also because of the great number of times he treated



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their children. He advised that altogether he may have treated their children on as many as thirty different occasions. He could not recall the years covered by the treatments but believed that they ran from 1943 to 1945 or early 1946.

He first treated the children when the subject resided in the West 80s between Central Park West and Columbus Avenue. Later they moved to a building on West 109th Street on the sixth floor. He recalled their children consisted of two small twins born around 1941 or 1942 and an older child who was a girl. He did not remember whether the tweins were boys or girls.

In addition to his visits to the subject's home, on eccasion the subject and his wife brought their children to SLOBODY's office which at that time was at 239 Central Park West. Also on occasion he would see the subject at the Russian Consulate. He got the impression that the subject was important and was possibly a member of the "Russian Secret Police" for the following reasons:

On the few occasion that he would see IAKOVLEV at the Consulate or possibly at the Soviet private school, the other Russians treated YAKOVLEV with respect and he acted with an air of authority. Unlike the others, when the children were even slightly sick, the doctor was called. Regardless of the time of day SLOBODY visited the subject's residence, on many occasions the subject was there as though he had no regular job. He commented on this fact to Mrs. YAKOVLEV and she replied that he was out of town and did a lot of travelling, giving the impression of the subject being his own boss.

The subject's wife spoke fairly good English but had a definite Russian appearance. She told Dr. SLOBODY that she did translating of documents. SLOBODY did not recall any maid, housekeeper or nursemaid at either of the YAKOVLEV residences. He did not know them socially and never conversed with them on anything unusual. Neither the subject nor his wife requested anything unusual of SLOBODY and he did not know of any Americans who had contact with the subject.

In 1945 other Russians stopped coming to him; however, oddly enough the YAKOVIEVE continued to have him for their children. At one time Mrs. YAKOVIEV made the statement that they prefer him to the other doctor being used. They did not mention who this doctor was. Also at this time he raised his prices but the YAKOVIEVE did not mind this, indicating that they were normally prosperous.

SEART

MENASHA UNGER

T-1 advised that the above captioned individual

The records of the Immigration and Naturalizations Service, New York City reflect that UNCER was born November 12, 1899 in Galicia-Austria, Poland. He entered the United States from Canada on February 27, 1936 and was naturalized in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York on August 13, 1942.

T-10 on March 24, 1947 advised that MENASHA UNGER was among the national committee members of the Ambijan Committee for Emergency Aid to the Soviet Union.

This committee known also as the American Biro-Bidjan Committee was cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, Report dated March 29, 1944.

T-13, of known reliability, on May 11, 1950 advised that UNGER was a member of the National Executive Committee of the Yiddisher Kultur Farband.

This organization was cited as subversive and Communist and affiliated with the Communist Party, USA by Attorney General Thomas Clark, letter to the Loyalty Review Board released on July 25, 1949.

T-10 on July 27, 1949 provided the information which indicated that UNGER was a newly elected officer of the Executive Committee of the American Federation for Polish Jews.

T-14, of known reliability, on December 20, 1949 advised that the American Federation for Polish Jews was under full control of left wing and progressive elements and the national council of this organization had decided to start promoting campaigns among Jewish and Polish organizations in the United States on behalf of the "present free democratic regime of Poland". Also, "to participate in every action for peace and for friendly relations between the United States and the Soviet Union.

T-13, on October 23, 1948, advised that UNGER was on the national Board of Directors of the School for Higher Jewish Education. This school is



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
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In the latter part of 1916 aDOLPH RITLS, superintendent at 33 Rest 22nd Street, New York City Advised that ANNA GEORGIEVNA THORP and her bushend J. OLIVER THORP had resided at 33 Rest 22nd Street for the past three years. This individual stated that Mrs. THORP was connected with Russian War Relief activities during the war and did considerable entertaining for Russian Army officers of obvious high rank and for Russian sivilians. In August, 1946 Mrs. THORP received word that her son, ANDREI M. MOCHENOV had died and she bold RLIAS that her son had been killed in Poland where he was employed as an engineer.

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The records of the Immigration and Naturalisation Service (INS),
70 Columbus Avenue, New York City reflect that ANNA THORP received her citisenship on August 6, 1936 in the United States District Court, Southern District
of New York. She had entered the United States at New York City under the
name ANNA THORP on December 13, 1933. She was born in Assan, Russia on February
11, 1888, She was married to one JOSEPPATHORP on March 18, 1932 in Moscow,
Russia and had a son ANDREI by a previous marriage. Her last foreign residence
was given as Moscow, Russia and she claimed to have emigrated to the United
States from Bremen, Germany.

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The aforementioned individual appears to be identical to one

LEX PRESSMAN.

On January 22 and 23, 1952 MARIA WICHER, Clairmont Circle, Decatur, Georgia was interviewed by SASC. DALIAS MOBILY of the Atlanta Office and RICHARD A. MINIHAN of New York Office.

This individual provided information regarding various individuals affiliated with Russian War Relief in New York City. She advised that during the period of her activity as Executive Secretary at the West Side Branch of Russian War Relief, she had occasion to have contact with what she described as a Russian Institute located somewhere on Park Avenue near 55th Street in New York City. She recalled that IEO PRESSMAN taught Russian at this institute during the period that Russian War Relief was active. She identified PRESSMAN as a piano instructor who was related to SERGEI KOURNAKOFF. KOURNAKOFF was a White Russian who obtained Soviet citizenship and returned to the Soviet Enion and allegedly died over there agmetime in 1948.

According to WICHER, PRESSMAN was married to the daughter of a former Russian impressarie, whose same she did not recall, who had fled from Russia following the revolution, bringing with him to this country costumes of the Russian Opera Company. She described PRESSMAN as one hundred percent pro-Soviet and recalled he was active in Russian War Relief and very often gave concerts under the suspices of this erganisation.

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The resords of the THS disclosed that ALEXANDER RELENKI entered the United States at New York on December 26, 1941. His last foreign residence was Antwerp, Belgium. He was accompanied by his wife, YALENTINE BELENKI.

BELENKI filed petition for naturalisation on April 30, 1948.

On January 18, 1949 he was afforded a hearing under eath by INS officials. He advised at that time he was born December 21, 1908 in Russia and was currently residing at 61 West 88th Street, New York City/with his wife. He came to the United States to establish permanent residence and he had last renewed his Russian passport in 1942 or the beginning of 1943. He advised that during World War II he was employed for a period as an engineer doing repair work for the Western Electric Company in Clifton, New Jersey. During this hearing BELENKI admitted he had been to the Soviet Consulate in New York City on two or three occasions in 1942-1943 but only for the purpose of renewing his passport.

BELENKI was afforded another hearing by INS on March 22, 1951. During this hearing he stated he was never a member of the Communist Party. He explained at that time that he had attempted to extend his Russian passport in 1943 only because he thought Russia and the United States would "get tegether".

Mrs. VALENTINE BELENKI, 125 West 76th Street, New York City was interviewed on March 16, 195h by SAS GEORGE M. OWEN and JOHN H. WAGNER. She advised at that time that BELENSKI was residing in Brussels, Belgium and had departed from the United States in February, 1952.

Mrs. BELENKI during the course of the interview, advised that she and her husband had met ALEXANDES FONTHE, Clerk at the Soviet Consulate in New York City when she and her husband visited the Consulate regarding his passport. She stated possibly that FOMINE visited their spartment socially. She claimed that she was unaware of any relationship between her husband and FOMINE other than a slight social acquaintanceship.

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VIADINIR KAZAKEVICH

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According to T-1, on

born on Angust 2, 1908 in St. Petersburg, Russia. He entered the United States on February 28, 1921 and attended school at the University of Southern California and Columbia University, New York City. He filed declaration of intention at New York City on June 28, 1926 but made no effort to be naturalised until 1935. According to the informant he was employed as a statistician and from 1935 to 1941 was attached to the staff of the Russian language newspaper "Russky Golos".

Priendship maintained a biographical file on VIADIMIR KAZAKEVICH. He was described as having published several books on banking and economics and had been a contributor for several years to "Science and Society" and "Soviet hussia Today". He was described as a specialist in the field of Russian economics and history and as such had spoken before many clubs, erganizations and colleges and had participated in many conferences and forums.

The National Council of American-Soviet Friendship has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10150.

Concerning "Science and Society" and "Soviet Russia Today", the following appears in a booklet entitled "Guide to Subversive Organisations and Publications", dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, US House of Representatives, 62nd Congress. In a signed statement dated November 30, 1945, ELIZABETH T. RENTLEY, self-admitted Soviet espionage agent, stated as follows regarding KAZAKEVICH:

professor at Cornell University, was a somewhat frequent visitor to Goles? office (JACOB GOLOS, BENTLEY'S Soviet espionage superior). This individual, who was not, to my knowledge, a member of the Communist Party, but had Communist leanings, was at that time barely making a living teaching the Russian language and giving lectures and writing excerpts for Communist publications. Madmir was not, to my knowledge, connected with any government agency, nor did he have any source for obtaining information, and as far as I know, was solely a friend of long standing of Golos. I do recall, however, that at some previous time he had some information concerning Trotskyites which he furnished Golos".

On September 27, 1919 MITCHELL SOLOMON of the INS advised that KAZAKEVICH and his wife, departed from the United States on September 23, 1919, both leaving as Russian citisens. According to SOLOMON, KAZAKEVICH'S Russian citisenship had been restered by the Soviet Union and his wife, though American born, had acquired Russian citisenship through her marriage to KAZAKEVICH.

KAZAKEVICH, prior to his departure had told Mr. SOLOMON that he was "lucky and

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
fortunate" to be able to return to Russia and that he was to report to the Ministry of Nigher Education at Moscow, KAZAKEVICH also made the statement that he had no intention of returning to the United States.

VIADIMIR POSNER

International Film Corporation, 701 Seventh Avenue, New York City, advised SA WALTER P. GAVIN on July 6, 1968 that WIADINIT POSNER was employed as General Manager of MiN International Film Corporation, a subsidiary of Loews Incorporated, from May 8, 1944 to November 14, 1947. He resigned on November 14, 1947 because of a slowdown in business. According to PATI, POSNER was bern October 24, 1908 in Leningrad, Russia, His services with Leews Incorporated went back to about 1935 when he was first employed as a sound engineer by MIN in Paris. France. He left the corporation in Paris about 1939 because of some difficulty with a superior and came to the United States about 1939 or 1940 and obtained a job with the Ilia Lopert Sound Film Transcription Company, New York City.

Mr. PATI advised that POSHER applied for his United States citizenship papers shortly after his arrival in the United States but on January 28, 1943 he obtained a Russian pappeart numbered 137975 issued at New York City.

Mr. PATI stated that POSNER spoke English, Russian and French and was a motion picture engineer. He had received a degree at Paris University and was a member of the faculty at the Sorbonne. PATI stated that during the time he was employed by MHK International, POSNER made occasional trips in connection with business to Italy, France, England and Mexico.



T-1 provided the information that VIADIMIR POSNER was employed by the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Enternational Film Corporation in New York City.

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On September 10, 1953 Mr. CHARLES N. PATI advised SA JOSEPH 7. BUSH that he had not seen POSNER since November, 1947 when this individual resigned his position with MRN Film Corporation. He advised that he had no first-hand information regarding POSNER'S present activities but stated that he had heard that POSNER, following his termination of employment in the United States travelled to Berlin, Germany and that he had recently heard that POSNER was now located in East Berlin and supervising theatres and film distribution there. According to Mr. PATI, POSNER left the United States sometime in 1966.

ALEXANDER ALEXANDROV

T-1 advised on

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In a supplemental registration statement for the Tass News Agency filed with the Department of Justice on October 25, 1949, for the six months period ending en September 30, 1949, reflected that ALEXANDROV, 45 West 95th Street, New York City, was recalled to the Soviet Union and he left the United States on May 26, 1949. He was replaced by one VIADINIE NOREV as Acting Manager: of Tass, official Soviet news agency.





MAURICE SCHWARTZ



In a signed statement furnished to T-3, of known reliability, dated June 11, 1952 MAURICE SCHWARTZ of 26

East 10th Street. New York City advised that he was the founder and director of the Yiddish Arts Theatre. The purpose of this group was to further the arts and the Jewish Theatre.

In his statement SCHWARTZ denied ever being a member of the Jewish People's Fraternal Order or the International Workers Order. He did admit becoming a sponsor of the Jewish Writers, Artists and Scientists in 1943. Also in 1943 he was invited to participate in a program sponsored by the Anti-Fascist League of Moscow. He also allowed his name to be used on a letterhead of the Anti-Fascist League.

In his statement SCHWARTZ denied ever believing in the principles of Communism.

The June 7, 1945 issue of the "Daily Worker", East coast Communist newspaper devoted two full columns to SCHWARTZ'S life and theatrical activities. The article stated that SCHWARTZ had returned from Hollywood where he played a role in the film "Mission to Moscow".

The June 30, 1943 issue of the "Daily Worker" showed that MAURICE SCHWARTZ appeared as an honorary co-chairman of the National Committee to the Soviet Delegation which was sponsored by the Committee of Jewish Writers and Artists.

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In 19th SIMON WEBER, of the editorial staff of "Jewish Daily Forward" anti-Communist Jewish language newspaper, stated MAURICE SCHWARTZ was not a Communist newspaper, stated MAURICE SCHWARTZ was not a Communist but "played up to the Russians". In his opinion SCHWARTZ behaved in a diplomatic manner towards the Russians in order that he would be in a position to obtain theatrical engagements in Russia after the war. WEBER added SCHWARTZ engagements in Russia after the war. WEBER added SCHWARTZ was closely associated with "Jewish Daily Forward" and wrote articles for the paper and was generally identified with the paper's policies.

Mr. WARREN P. LIVINGSTON, Bankers Trust Company and an officer in Russian War Relief, Incorporated, advised SA JOHN F. HIGGINS in March, 1944 that CLAIRMONT was born on March 12, 1910 in Waco, Texas. Between September, 1944 and January, 1942 she was connected with the United American Spanish Aid Association, Boston, Massachusetts. In reference to her work with Russian War Relief LIVINGSTON advised she served as a public relations officer and speaker.

SA GERARD B. TRACKY ascertained from DAVIS WEINGARD, Treasurer of American Russian Institute that CLAIRMONT as of May, 1946 was residing at 934 Patterson, The Argyle, San Antonio, Texas.

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

When KACEDAN appeared at the Boston Office, he claimed it was a matter of official record that he had opposed Communism for many years. He stated that since 1926 he had made approximately one hundred anti-Communist speeches before various church and society groups. His purpose for joining the Massachusetts Council of american-Soviet Friendship was to assist in the collection of money and clothing, and his motive was purely patriotic. He also stated that he was a member of the Russian american Democratic Club; a Russian club called "Knowledge" and the St. Platen Brotherhood, which was affiliated with the Russian Orthodox Church. All these organizations, K.CEDAN stated, were anti-Communist in nature.

It was noted that in the information voluntarily furnished by KACEDAN that he never mentioned that he had any contact with the subject or any one else at the Soviet Consulate in Now York City.






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Records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, checked on August 24, 1953 failed to reflect any information regarding M.RGURIETTA KONENKOVA.

Rogarding ANNA GEORGIEVNA THORP, T-4, of known reliability, furnished information from July 1947 to March 1948 which reflected that she was probably a guiding force in that segment of the Russian Orthodox Church in New York City which was under the domination of the Moscow Patriarch.

FELIX KUSMIN T-2. of known reliability, advised

T-5, of known reliability, provided the information that KUSM'N first arrived in the United States in April 1929 at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania as a seaman. After his arrival he sailed on American merchant ships until February 1937 when he left for Spain aboard the SS PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT. He returned to the United States on Soptember 12, 1938 as a stowaway from Le Havre, France. On September 16, 1938 a Board of Special Inquiry of the Immigration and Naturalization Service ordered KUSMAN deported. In December 1938, he was released from custody of the Immigration authorities on 1,000 bond. On January 23, 1939, a bill was introduced in the House of Representatives KUSM.N's warrant of arrest and order of deportato cancel tion against him. The bill further provided that he be doomed lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence. KUSMAN subsequently re-entered the United States

on August 18, 1939 from Cuba as a legal alien!

T-6, of known reliability, provided information which reflected that KUSMAN filed his first citizenship papers in the United States District Court on June 14, 1940, Petition Number 464870. The informant also advised that KUSM.N stated he had been a Captain in the Spanish Army in 1936 to 1938.

FELIX KUSMIN advised during the course of an interview on Docember 3, 1952 by SIS EDWIND W. BUCKLEY and J.MRS N. JULIANO that in 1939 he became active in the VALB in Now York City and became chief fund raiser for the Spanish Rescue Ship, an organization attempting to aid Sp nish refugees coming to the United States. This organization lator became known as the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugoo Committee- Spanish Refugee Appeal.

At the time of the interview KUSM'N stated that he ceased being active in the J.FRC about five years previous. He admitted during the course of the interview that he was formerly a fund raisor for the JAFRC.

"The Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee was tho center from which he operated and FELIX KUSM'N of

During the interview on December 3, 1952, KUSMIN stated that when he left the JiFRC as a fund raiser, he was asked to be in charge of fund raising for the Civil Rights Congress in New Tork City. He claimed to have only held this position for about a month.

The records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, reflected that KUSMAN was released on \$25,000. bail on January 14, 1954 from incarceration at Ellis Island, New York, where he was awaiting deportation. KUSMAN is required to report to Immigration and Naturalization authorities weekly.

The VALB, JAFRC and Civil Rights Congress have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.



ROSALID SCHNEIDER, new SLAPO, furnished information that she was married to SAM SCHNEIDER on June 7, 1953 at New York. He was born in Russia on March 31, 1914, and was a musician by occupation.

The records of the Board of Elections, City of New York, reflected that SAM SCHNEIDER registered in favor of the Communist Party in 1936; and in the years 1937 to 1941, and 1946 to 1952, he registered in favor of the American Labor Party.

T-12, of known reliability, advised on March 7, 1951 that Local 802 of the American Federation of Musicians - AFL, located at 1267 6th Avenue, New York City, contained a group which he believed to be composed of either Communists or Communist sympathizers, for the reason that this group's advocacy of the Communist Party line had dated as far back as the SCOTTSBORO case, after which they were anti-war and anti-ROOSEVELT during the HITLER-STALIN Pact; then they advocated a second front and always supported the candidacy of VITO MARCANTONIO and protested the trial of the Communist Party leaders. The informant added that SAM SCHNEIDER was one of those he believed to be a member of this group.

In May 1951, T-12 mentioned that on April 27, 1951, a contract had been signed with Local 802 of the Musicians Union calling for several bands. Another contract of the same nature had been signed on April 30, 1951. These contracts, according to T-12, were signed on behalf of the United May Day Committee by LOUIS WEINSTOCK and on behalf of the Misicians Union, Local 802 by SAM SCHNEIDER. According the informant, it was



apparent that SCHNEIDER was the member of the union who the United May Day Parade Committee approached for their needs in respect to bands. There was no question in the informant's mind but that SAM SCHNEIDER was a Communist or a Communist sympathizer because among other things he also had been distributing copies of the "Daily worker", an East Coast Communist newspaper.

In December 1953, T-12 stated that he new nothing of SAM SCHNEIDER's outside activities or family background but that in his estimation, SCHNEIDER was a "red hot Communist" and would not trust him.


T-13, of known reliability, advised in December 1953 that he was acquainted with S.M SCHNEIDER through various union activities and described him as an extremely quiet individual who consituted one of the stronger memberships of Local 802. T-13 stated that he definitely believed SCHNEIDER to be pro-Communist and one who "must be watched."

Regarding the "Hollywood Ten", they were a group of motion picture writers and directors who were subpoensed before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in 1948 in connection with the Committee's investigation of Communist infiltration into the motion picture industry. Each member of this efforp was held in contempt of Congress for refusing to testify before the Committee as to whether or not he had ever been a member of the Communist Party.

Inexmuch as the captioned individual has resided at 2816 Bronx Park East, Bronx, MY, since 1947, and as his wife's name is SERTRUDE and his date of birth is 7/25/12, NY, MY, it appears the captioned individual is not identical to the SAM SCHNEIDER who is described in the report of SA WANGENHEIM.

The MY report of SA HOWARD L. CHAPPELL, dated 5/7/53, the report of SA WALTER W. HAUSER, dated 1/2/51, and the report of SA ALFRED W. GOFF, dated 5/21/51, in the captioned matter, were all reviewed as requested in referenced Bureau letter and it was ascertained that the information reported pertains to the captioned individual.

Mr. GEORGE STEWART, Clerk, Personnel Bectlon, U.S. Post Office, 8th Ave. and 33rd St., NYO, advised that the captioned person was an indefinite substitute clerk who resigned 4/30/53, for reason of poor health. He said SCHNEIDER later made application for re-employment but the Personnel Section was notified by the OSC by letter, dated 8/23/54, that for a 3 year period effective 8/10/54, the applicant was barred from Post Office employment, the reason for which was not given. In view of this information, no further investigation is being conducted by the NYO, RUC.

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the United States since 1922. He stated he was naturalized at the U. S. District Court at Boston, Massachusetts. KACEDAN further stated he was formerly a Captain in the White Russian army prior to his coming to the U.S. He also stated that he fought the Bolsheviks in Russia during his period of service with the White Russian army. KACEDAN stated he has always been against Communism and has made numerous speeches since he has been in the U. S. against the evils of Communism.

KACEDAN stated he was active with the United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston during the years 1941—1946. KACEDAN explained that the United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston encompassed numerous Russian, Ukrainian and Jewish organizations which were, in his opinion, not in any way favorable to the Communist political doctrines. He stated these United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston were primarily interested in aiding the victims in eastern Europe and especially those in western Russia, whose areas were devastated by the Nazi Germany armies.

KaC.DaN stated he has many persons among the Russian, Ukrainian and Jewish population groups in the Greater Boston area as his clients, and that many of them in the past have engaged him as an attorney to contact the Soviet Consulate for the purpose of handling some of their estates, as well as obtaining information from the Consulate as to the whereabouts of their relatives; as well as seeking information for some clients as to whether their relatives still were residing in Russia or countries now considered behind the "Iron Curtain."

With reference to one client, K.CELAN recalled that he was hired to represent a Russian person in Boston to try to obtain a visa for him so that he could visit his relatives in Russia. K.CEDAN stated that sometime during 1945 or 1946 he visited the Russian Consulate for this client to obtain the visa, but the Soviet Consulate refused to grant his client a visa.

On another occasion, KACELAN recalled telephonically contacting the Soviet Consulate, New York City, during 1943 or 1944, for another client, who desired to seek information about his relatives in Russia.

KACEDAN also remembered that he visited the Soviet Consulate in New York City during September or October 1945 for a client in Boston who was desireus of

seeking information from the Soviet Consulate about his wife who was in Latvia at that time. KACEDAN recalled that the Soviet Consulate was unable to do anything to furnish his client with any information regarding his client's wife in Latvia.

with reference to the aforementioned United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston, KACERAN stated these organizations supported the Russian war Relief for the purpose of helping the victims in eastern Europe, and especially western Russia. He stated that these organizations contributed money for the purpose of purchasing clothes, foods and medicine to be sent to these victims in those areas which were devastated by the Nazi armies. KaCERAN stated that he was cognizant that later the Russian Lar Relief was considered by many agencies as a Communist front movement in the United States. Nevertheless, KaCERAN stated that during the war years the primary purpose of the United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston was to give aid to the victims of eastern Europe.

KACEDAN recalled that the United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston directed a letter to the Consulate General of the U.S.S.R., 7 East 61st Street, New York City, dated August 12, 195h, informing the Consulate General that they would like to arrange a mass meeting in Boston sometime in September or October 1942 for the purpose of collecting funds for the Russian War Relief. KACEDAN stated that he personally wrote the letter because he represented the United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston as its attorney. This letter requested the Consulate General to send a representative of the Sovit Government to attend the aforementioned meeting for the purpose of saying a few words either in Russian or English about the devastation that the Nazi armies caused in castern Europe and especially in western Russia. KACADAN stated that it was the opinion of the committee of the United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston that the presence of a Soviet representative at the meeting would greatly contribute to it.

At this point, KACEDAN pointed out that the United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston were not interested in any Communist political ideology but, instead, were greatly concerned about helping the victime in eastern Europe and especially western Russia.

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Kacilan stated that the U.S.S.R. Complete telephonically contacted him during August 1942 and advised him that someone would come to be account the hardships being endured by the victims of eastern Europe. Kacelan recalled that the Consulate's Office did not specifically name a representative at that time, but assured him someone from the Consulate would be in Boston to make the speech. Kacelan, stated that this representative of the Consulate did appear in Boston at the meeting held during September or October 1942, but he was unable to recall the name of the Soviet representative.

KaCEDAN stated that the Soviet representative's speech was non-political but, instead, the speaker explained how the Nazis penetrated and devastated eastern Europe and western Russia.

KACEDAN recalled that during November 1945 a public meeting, which was attended by several hundred people, was held either in the Hotel Bradford or some other placed in Boston by the United Russian and Ukraiman Organizations of Greater Boston for the purpose of collecting funds for purchasing foods, clothes and medicines (especially penicillin) to be sent to the victims of eastern Europe and western Russia.

KACEDAN recalled that the committee of the United Russian and Ukrainian Organizations of Greater Boston had requested another speaker from the Consulate by letter and that the committee requested the Consulate's Office to contact KACEDAN because someone on the committee was of the opinion that KACEDAN was the best person for the Consulate to call inasmuch as KACEDAN was an attorney for the committee and had a law office in Boston.

K.CED.N stated that during November 1945 he did recall a telephone call from the Soviet Consulate in New York City regarding the request made by the committee for a speaker. The Soviet Consulate advised K.CED.N by telephone that no speaker was available at that time and if there should be one available they would call up immediately by telephone.

KACEDAN recalled that a speaker did arrive at the meeting held in Boston during November 1945 for the purpose of raising funds to purchase foods, clothes and medicines for the victims in eastern Europe and western Russia. KACEDAN stated he was unable to recall the name of the speaker who came to Boston during November 1945 from the Soviet Consulate except that this speaker again reiterated the horrible devastation that the Nazi armies had caused

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in eastern Europe and western Russia and that the needs of the victims in these areas were very great at that time.

KACEDAN stated he was unable to recall ever meeting any of the officials of the Soviet Consulate either in New York City or Boston, Kassachusetts.

K.CEINN also stated that the activities of the Russian war Relief in Boston expired about 1945 or 1946.

In the Fourth Report on Un-American activities in California in 1948, on Communist Front Organizations, page 169 reads as follows:

"Throughout the lite of the Communist movement in the United States, the Communist Party has maintained front organizations and conducted enterprises for the sole purpose of carrying on propaganda on behalf of the Soviet Union. Same of the more important of these fronts and enterprises has been the Russian war Relief."

The Communist Party, USA, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Administrative Details

For the information of the Bureau, BASIL WILLIAM KACEDAN is the subject of closed BS file 100-17987. KACEDAN, as Secretary of the United Russian-Ukrainian Committee of Greater Boston, introduced MICHAEL TRACH, National Secretary of the Ukrainian Section of the American-Slav Congress and the Ukrainian Morkers Society, IWO, at a meeting of the American-Slav Congress held in Boston on 5/11/47. KACEDAN stated at this meeting he had been a delegate to the American-Slav Congress held in New York City in 1946 and called for support of the policies as laid down by the late President FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, exemplifying the unity of American-Slavs (report of SA IOUIS H. BEIGBEDER, 5/27/47, Boston, entitled "BASIL KACEDAN, WAS., IS - R.").

On 5/22/53, KmCEDAN appeared at the Boston Office and stated his motive in calling was that he had applied for a position with the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Boston, as a translator or examiner, and he felt that during the course of any investigation it would be discovered he was formerly a member of the Massachusetts Council of American-Soviet Friendship. He, therefore, desired to have it made a matter of official record that he has been battling Communism for many years and was against the Communist ideology. He also stated he had made about 100 anti-Communist speeches to various churches and societies in the Greater Boston area since 1926. KMCEDAN stated many of his anti-Communist speeches appeared in the local newspapers, especially in Springfield, Mass., during the years 1926—1927.

KACEDAN stated he joined the Massachusetts Council of American Soviet Friendship around 1944—1945, and that his purpose in doing so was to assist the Russian people by collecting money and clothing to be sent to them because of the Nazi army's invasion of western Russia during world War II. He stated the money was collected for the purpose of purchasing medicines to be sent to western Russia.

KACEDAN stated to the writer he will still continue to combat Communism. He stated he believed firmly in the principles of democracy as practiced in the U.S. and stated he would be available at any time to cooperate with the FBI on any matters in which the FBI felt he could be of assistance.

It is noted that the birth date and marriage data concerning the Sam Schneider mentioned in rerep does not coincide with the Sam Schneider who is the subject of the security of Government employees investigation; however, it was noted that similar information was listed for both Schneiders namely registration with the Communist Party in 1936 and registration with the American Labor Party from 1937 to 1941. 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

INTERVIEW WITH MAURICE SCHWARTZ

MAURICE SCHWARTZ, prominent actor, was interviewed at the National Theatre, East Houston Street and Second Avenue, New York City, on February 25, 1955 by SAS EDGAR C. FOREST and WALTER A. WANGENHEIM. Mr. SCHWARTZ is currently appearing in a play entitled "The Grass Is Always Greener" at the National Theatre.

In answer to the question Mr. SCHWARTZ stated subject's name was familiar to him but he denied ever having associated with the subject or any other Soviet official. When shown a photograph of YAKOVLEV, SCHWARTZ again thought it was a familiar face but he could not place it.

He denied that he had ever had any close association with any Soviet official during the war years or at any other time.

In regard to the role he played in the motion picture "Mission to Moscow," SCHWARTZ stated that when the picture was in production he was appearing in a play in Hollywood. His agent had obtained a part for him in the motion picture for which he received approximately \$5,000 for about two days work. He explained that the role he had was that of a doctor and it was only a brief scene. SCHWARTZ recalled that there were many celebrities in the picture and also added that he was certainly well paid for the little he was required to do. SCHWARTZ stated that he never received any particular recognition for his part in the picture either from the Soviets or anyone else.

MAURICE SCHWARTZ insisted that he has always been anti-Communistic and claimed that in 1924 while he was in London with the Yiddish Art Group, he was asked to consider using the group through which to express certain political ideas. He could not recall the name of the individual in the group who attempted to talk him into this idea but he was certain that the individual was a Communist. At this time SCHWARTZ advised he made it known that the Yiddish Art Group belonged to all the people regardless of nationality and it was to be completely devoted to drama as such.

SCHWARTZ alleged that because of his anti-Communistic attitude through the years his greatest enemy has been the "Morning Freiheit," Yiddish newspaper. This publication has taken every available opportunity to criticize the plays he has produced and taken part in and to ridicule his performances. He mentioned that the play he is presently starring in received excellent reviews in all the New York newspapers with the exception of the "Morning Freiheit." This paper severely criticized the play. SCHWARTZ stated they probably resented the fact that there was a line in the play that referred to the Russians as "stupid." He recalled that he previously did the same play in California and was requested to delete the same line but refused to do so.

In response to the question, SCHWARTZ insisted he avoided any situation that placed him in the category of a supporter of the Soviet cause during the war years. He denied ever visiting the Soviet Consulate in New York City or participating in any function as a sponsor or guest of any pro-Communist or pro-Soviet organization. He insisted

that any information which linked him with the subject was erroneous. He also stated that any evidence to support the claims that he was friendly with the Soviets was wrong. SCHWARTZ also stated that there was no reason why he should conceal any past association with Soviet efficials in view he was certain that he was never friendly with the subject.

Concerning the "Morning Freiheit," the following information is contained in the "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., dated May 14, 1951:





Wr. Mrs. SEYMOUR ROSENTHAL, 161-08 Jewel Avenue, Flushing, New York, was interviewed on January 25, 1954, by SAS WILLIAM R. KLEIN and ROBERT L. SANDERS. He advised that he was born on RECEIN and ROBERT L. SANDERS. He advised that he was born on RECEIN August 14, 1921, in New York City. His parents were ISADORE ROSENTHAL nee and DORA ROSENTHAL. His wife's name was FRANCES ROSENTHAL nee FRIEDLANDER. He was employed, at the time of the interview, since 1948 with OSMOND B. JOHNSON, Incorporated, Printing Company, 601 West 26th Street, New York City.

ROSENTHAL advised that his wife's parents, DAVID and LILLIAN FRIEDLANDER, were born in Russia. They came to the United States in the early 1900's and left a large number of relatives in Russia with whom they corresponded. According to ROSENTHAL, his in-laws became concerned about their relatives during World War II. He suggested to them that they contact the Russian Consulate in New York to determine their whereabouts.

Since his in-laws were old and spoke poor English, SEYMOUR and his wife agreed to contact the Consulate for them. Sometime during the summer of 1944 the ROSENTHALS went to the Consulate and met YAKOVLEV who was an official there. YAKOVLEV gave them considerable encouragement and felt he might be able to get some information regarding the relatives' whereabouts. YAKOVLEV gave them an application on which they furnished all the information they could regarding the relatives.

ROSENTHAL's in-laws became very enthusiastic about locating their relatives and suggested to ROSENTHAL that he invite the subject to dinner.


The subject accepted the invitation and he and one PANITCHEV came to the FRIEDLANDER's residence. ROSENTHAL identified a photograph of YAKOVLEV and described him as a very bharming and entertaining person. Following the dinner YAKOVLEV played the piano and PANITCHEV, who spoke no English, danced.



ROSENTHAL recalled meeting the subject on only three occasions, namely, on his initial visit to the Consulate, on YAKOVLEV's visit to the FRIEDLANDER's home, and about one and a half years following his initial visit to the Consulate, he and his wife made a second visit to the Consulate. The purpose of the second visit was to again inquire about his in-laws' relatives On the last visit the subject informed them that he had been unsuccessful in obtaining any information.

ROSENTHAL stated that YAKOVLEV never asked for any information, nor was he furnished any, relative to the United States. ROSENTHAL had no acquaintance with any of the individuals in the ROSENBERG case but recalled reading in the newspapers that YAKOVLEV was involved in it.

In the course of the interview, ROSENTHAL admitted that approximately once a month between 1946 and 1948, he contributed drawings to the "Daily Worker", (an East coast Communist newspaper). He was paid about five dollars for each drawing. He had hoped the experience would lead to a commercial drawing job for a magazine. He claimed that, with the "increased international situation" between Russia and the United States, he no longer wanted to be associated with a Communist newspaper and stopped furnishing sketches. He denied ever being a member of the Communist Party (CP).



MC BRIDE and HUGO P. BLANDORI. At that time she stated she was known to her friends as "MASHA" SCOTT. Si was born on December 27 1017 was born on December 21, 1911, in Russia, and renounced her Soviet Citizenship in 1941. She denied ever being a member of the Communist Party in Russia or in the United States, but did admit being a member of the Komsomol while in Russia. The Komsomol was described as being similar to the Young Communist League in the United States.

The Young Communist League has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Mrs. SCOTT stated she had contact with the NKVD while in Russia when she sought permission to leave the Soviet Union to accompany her husband to the United States. She Union to accompany her husband to the United States. She stated it required almost four years to obtain permission from stated it required almost four years to obtain permission from the NKVD because they tried to dissuade her from making such a move, and imposed all sorts of obstacles upon her. She added that they never solicited her services.

During World War II, Mrs. SCOTT was active on behalf of the Russian War Relief and gave speeches throughout the East. She stated that she had been selected because she was an American She stated that she had been selected because she was an American citizen, wife of a writer, and one who was born in and knew the Soviet Union.

Mrs. SCOTT claimed that the only other organization she was active in was the East - West Association. She stated the purpose of this organization was to promote relations between the Far East and the United States, and for this purpose published a magazine called "Asia." She added the organization was no longer in existence.

JOHN SCOTT is the author of the book entitled "Behind the Urals," and was correspondent for "Time," and "Life" magazines in Russia and Germany.

At the outbreak of the war they moved to Paris, France, and stayed there until 1941 when they secured passage to Havana, and stayed there until 1941 when they secured passage to Havana, and finally came to the United States. She took out her first citizenship papers in 1941. (W)

MARIA BORDI stated that in 1946 she obtained a position as Official Photographer for the UN Secretariat. After returning from the Soviet Union she was employed by Russian War Relief as a lecturer and toured various Eastern cities. She added that among other places that she "may have lectured" was the Jefferson School of Social Science in New York City.

From 1946 until "sometime" in 1947 she was employed by the National Maritime Union. During the same period she also applied for a position as an English teacher with the Amtorg Trading Corporation but was refused because of the lack of a New York State Teachers Certificate. According to this record, their destination in the United States was to be in care of his uncle, BENJAMIN KCPMAN, 1129 Bayport Place, Far Rockaway, New York. Passage for the GLIKMAN family was to be paid by the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society. Their last foreign residence was Kaunas, Lithuania.

The records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service at New York City reflected that DINA and VICTOR GLIKMAN arrived in the United States at New York on August 3, 1947. VICTOR GLIKMAN was listed as a physician. (74)

A check of the New York State Department of Education, Eureau of Professional Licensure, in 1951 reflected that VICTOR GLIKMAN originally applied for an evaluation of his foreign credentials on November 10, 1947. In his original application, GLIKMAN indicated that he received his medical degree in August, 1942, from the Turkmenian State Medical Institute, at Askhabad, Russia. He claimed to have left Russia because of the totalitarian form of government. He made his way to the American Zone of Germany and worked as a resident physician in a displaced persons camp near Munich, Germany.

On January 13, 1951, Dr. GLIKMAN'S application for a license to practice medicine was denied by the New York State Board of Regents because of a policy of non-recognition of Russian medical education undertaken after 1927.

This record reflected that as of December, 1950, GLIKMAN'S residence was 140 East 95th Street, New York City.

T-5, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that in February, 1950, a BARSPMAN of 11-29 Bayport Place, Far Rockaway, New York, was a subscriber to the 'Daily Worker."

PAUL JINKLER, HILDA HOLLAND

The indices of the New York Office failed to reflect any pertinent information regarding HILDA HOLLAND. (K)

The Press Alliance, Inc. filed registration statement number 405 with the United States Secretary of State under the Mc Cormick Act on February 7, 1940. Their foreign principal was Opera Mundi, a French newspaper agency. The business of the agency was the syndication of news articles dealing in literature and artistic beauty. It represented journalists, illustrators and writers. (21)

The registration statement reflected that

PAUL VINKLEX was president and treasurer of the agency.

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BETTYAWINKLER was given as the vice president. At the time of registration both of these individuals resided in Paris, France.

On April 10, 1943, the agency was notified by the Department of Justice that it no longer needed to file a supplemental statement since the agency was inactive.

An article appeared in the New York "World Telegram" daily newspaper on July 30, 1945, referring to the treason trial of MARSHAL HENRI PHILIPPE PETAIN of France. It was stated in the article that the Pefense Attorney, JEAN LEMAIRE, proceed that the news service, Opera Mundi, of which PAUL WINKLER was Director, was used by the Germans in 1936 - 1937 to distribute propaganda in the United States. According to the article, WINKLER subsequently denied these charges. (U)

In 1942, the records of Immigration and Naturalization Service in New York reflected that PAUL WINKLER filed application for a non-immigrant visa on September 23, 1940. He was a citizen of France and possesseda French passport issued on August 31, 1940, which was valid until September, 1941. According to this record, WINKLER was born on July 7, 1898, at Budapest, Hungary. His occupation was given as a magazine publisher and the purpose of his coming to the United States was to be a manager of a press syndicate business. He intended to remain in the United States for six months (W)

In October, 1941, WINKLER obtained an extension of his passport until October, 1943. At that time he furnished his business address as 235 East 45th Street, New York City He also indicated that he and his wife were the officers of the Press Alliance at that address.

The contacts remaining are mostly those that occurred in only one instance and the foreign names involved and the nature of the contact offer little or no information by which to make a positive identification. (%) The interviews of individuals who were identified contacts of the subject have not been productive in that they have not brought forth any pertinent information regarding the subject activities while he was in the United States. 



SHERICH advised that he was born in Russia on February 9, 1900.

In 1922 he immigrated to the United States from Japan. Shortly after his arrival in the United States he began employment in the fur industry and had been in it ever since. SHERICH stated he had been going to the Russian fur auctions since 1943, and from 1946 to 1950 was a resident of Moscow while representing the British-American Fur Company as a buyer. He advised that he never had any dealings with any Russians personally, except in connection with the fur business.

SHERICH is a naturalized citizen, having been naturalized in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, on August 23 1926. (21)

The "Daily News", newspaper published in New York City, contained an article on page 20 of its issue of October 11, 1955. This article was captioned "Soviet Permits Yank, Russian Gal to Wed". This article date lined Moscow Russia, reflected that DANIEL SHERICH, representative of the British-American Fur Corporation, New York City, and TATIANA, TLAXEL, of Moscow, had obtained permission to marry within ten days of their application. They were cleared by the Soviet Government to leave the country ten days after their marriage.
